CLAUDE WATHEY ENDORSED "BULL-FIGHT" ON THE LORD'S DAY

On Saturday night last after inhaling the sweet perfume of whisky for an indefinite time, and drunk with the pleasure of having some of his hirelings call him "boss"; Deputy Claude Wathey jumped on the bandstand, at the bull-fight in Cul-de-Sac - many expected to hear him blow a trumpet or play a guitar, but instead he announced: "Everybody is invited to a dance, which will be held here tomorrow, from 4 p.m. to 1 a.m." Many (even though under their "acid") were shocked by this announcement, and the applaud was very weak. Deputy Wathey disappointed because he did not get the great applaud he expected, repeated the announcement.

Since we do not endorse bullfights on Sundays we investigated the matter and discovered that no previous permission was granted by the Lt. Governor to keep a public dance at Cul-de-Sac on Sunday.

Considering it our duty to protect our community and especially our YOUTHS from the menace of "Bullfights" on Sundays, we called the Major of Police by telephone on Sunday night about 8:30 p.m. and informed him that according to our information a public dance was being held at Cul-de-Sac without permission. He promised to check the matter as he had no previous knowledge of it.

To our surprise and astonishment the bullfight continued, and when we checked the matter with the Major the next morning, we were told by him that; permission was granted verbally by the authorized person, either in the late afternoon or the early evening hours of Sunday August 13.

The only authorized person to give permission for the keeping of public dances (bullfights) on this island is the Lt. Governor - And as far as we know, the present Lt. Governor Mr. J.J. Beaujon has never before given a verbal permission to keep a public dance. We would be very pleased if Mr. Beaujon would let us know why he picked a Sunday to give a verbal permission to keep a bullfight?

The procedure is as follows: The person desirous of keeping a public dance must make a request to the Lt. Governor on a stamped paper of Fl.1.--
