Sept. 27, 1963:

A man reported to the Police-station that a boy who was employed by him had flatten one of the tires of his car and had thrown sand in the same car, because he (the man) had dismissed the boy from his employ.

The boy was called to the Police-station and was given a strong reprimand for his conduct.

Sept. 28, 1963:

A woman from Cul-de-Sac, reported to the Police that the driver of a jeep had struck one of her sheep with the jeep on the Cul-de-Sac road and had broken one of its legs. She wanted payment for the sheep. The driver was questioned on the matter and explained that a number of sheep were grazing on the left side of the road and at the moment when he was about to pass; one of the sheep suddenly ran across the road and was struck by the jeep - He declared that he was not willing to pay for the sheep, since in his opinion he had no fault. The matter is being investigated.

While on patrol a Policeman observed a station wagon in the pond, in the vicinity of the "Cottage" - The owner who was questioned by the Police - Explained that the station wagon was parked on a decline in the "Cottage" yard, and all of a sudden it started moving by itself and ended up in the pond - The station wagon which was not insured was slightly damaged.

A woman in Philipsburg reported to the

Police-station that her husband had threatened to kill her if she should come near his home and requested the police to caution him. When the Police arrived on the scene the man in an insulting and angry attitude refused to be cautioned, ignored the Police, and said with a loud voice several times: "I DON'T WANT TO HEAR ANYTHING, I CAN ONLY DIE ONCE." He then got in a vehicle reversed same from his yard and drove away. The matter is under investigation.

A woman from Marigot, working at Cul-de-Sac, reported that a man pushed her down in the road at Cul-de-Sac (in the vicinity of where she works) and threatened her with a machete in his out stretched hand, while his wife stood by and remarked: "WE WILL PEPPER YOU ALL WITH FINE SHOTS." This matter is being investigated.

A 50-year-old man from Sucker Garden was brought to the Police station by a man and declared that another man had come to his home and cut him on his left wrist with a machete. The wounded man was sent to the hospital for treatment. The matter is under investigation.

Oct. 2, 1963:

A woman reported to the police-station that a man from Cole Bay had attacked her with a knife. She explained that formerly she had lived in concubinage with this man, but that now she wanted to end this relationship. She was advised to contact the detective, which she did and the matter is being investigated.

Oct. 5, 1963:

A number of drivers were again warned for not stopping at the "STOP" signs in certain places. The police Dept. in an attempt to get drivers conscious of the importance of stopping at the "STOP" signs has been doing this for about a month.

It is expected however that pretty soon the warnings will be changed into REPORTS which may result in FINES, since all drivers should know by now that they MUST stop at the "STOP" signs.

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
