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Topic

The DHWG meet-ups for Spring 2014 will focus discussions on the intersection of online or blended teaching activities and primary resources in the humanities. "Online" courses can take a variety of forms, including blended in-person classes with online components, fully online courses in existing programs, and the new courses in UF Online which has no residential component. In Spring 2013, the DHWG looked in-depth at the topic of scholarly curation, including projects to create digital archives for digital or digitized primary sources. This semester, we will connect scholarly research in digital archives and with primary resources available online to opportunities to enhance teaching and learning in online courses. In this semester's meet-ups, we will share resources and ideas around developing assignments that take students deep into online primary sources, both contemporary and archival.

In this first Spring 2014 DHWG meet-up, we have the opportunity to discuss the Ecclesiastical & Secular Sources for Slave Societies (ESSS) project with Project Director, Jane Landers (Professor of History, Vanderbilt University), as a special guest. This project digitally preserves nearly 300,000 endangered ecclesiastical and secular documents which relate to non-European groups in the Americas, and is an important resource for diasporic studies. What kinds of class activities could be built around such a project? This informal lunch discussion precedes Prof. Lander's formal presentation at 2:30pm in Smathers Library 1A:
