

### **Convicted killer on trial** Prison inmate accused of beating cellmate to death

PUNTA GORDA — A convicted killer is on trial in Charlotte County this week for second-degree murder after he allegedly beat his cellmate to death in 2010 while an inmate at Charlotte Correctional Institution.

Leo Lansing Boatman, 27, of Largo, Fla., pleaded guilty in July 2007 to killing with an AK-47 assault rifle

two Santa Fe (Gainesville) College students who were camping in the Ocala National Forest in January 2006, according to multiple media reports. Boatman was sentenced in Marion County to life in prison without parole and was eventually transported to CCI.

Court records show Boatman allegedly killed his CCI cellmate, Ricky Morris, 28, by "punching, kicking, stomping and beating the victim



and repeatedly smashing the victim's face onto a cement floor" in August 2010. The Sun previously reported Morris was found unresponsive and bleeding in the two-person cell around

CHARLOTTE HARBOR — Former Florida Sen. Nan Rich, Democratic candidate for governor in 2014, came out swinging Monday in an address to 40 members of the Democratic Women's Club of Charlotte County at the club's headquarters.

### **Post-Charley:** Insurance rates still high

People who survived Aug. 13, 2004, will never forget it.

It was just after 4 p.m. on Friday the 13th. That's the day that Hurricane Charley, a category 4 storm, slammed into Charlotte and DeSoto counties, causing massive destruction.

With Charley still fresh in everyone's mind, most residents take the necessary precautions against another catastrophic weather event that might hit the area. And one of the most important items that should be on top of their list is proper insurance coverage.

But if the area has not seen a Hurricane Charley in nine years, then why have homeowners' insurance premiums remained high while reinsurance rates have dropped?

Recently, Jeff Atwater, the state's chief financial officer, sent a letter to Insurance Commissioner Kevin McCarty, asking the same question. Why have property insurance rates not declined with the "significant drop" in reinsurance rates that have occurred worldwide?

Most insurance companies in Florida purchase reinsurance to shore up their reserves in the event

# Local Elks give kids a boost to camp

n classrooms across Charlotte County, dozens of kids may be daydreaming about the great times they had a few weeks ago at the Florida Elks Youth Camp.

Charlie Parsons is proud.

And for good reason. The Punta Gorda Elks Lodge 2606 sent those kids to a dream summer camp. As they do every summer, the local Elks pick up much of the tab.

The camp is a couple of hours up Interstate 75 in Umatilla, and looks like a wonderful place for a Florida kid. Charlie proudly showed me pictures of Port Charlotte and Punta Gorda kids swimming, fishing, boating, playing tug-ofwar, soccer, flag football, softball, basketball,



volleyball, kickball, and climbing all over the signature Challenge Ropes Course. The lakefront facilities look beautiful and well-maintained, and Charlie says the staff keep the kids busy all week.

That's one of the best things about the camp, he pointed out: that camper-to-staff ratio. There is one staffer and one counselor-intraining for every eight campers.

#### "Once the kids get there, the kids aren't on their cellphones or computers or video games," so they are engaged with each other for their stay, Charlie explained. They get to know their counterparts from Charlotte County, and campers from all parts of Florida who are camping with them.

"We had hundreds of kids in Charlotte County this summer – Englewood sent up 200, and we had at least 100 from Punta Gorda," he said.

Charlie figures it costs about \$250 per kid to get them to camp. The Elks work with the families, and get kids up there whether they can pay anything or not. No child is denied the opportunity to go to this camp for financial reasons, he said.

The Ropes Course is one of the big confidence-builders for the campers, he explained. Many have not seen such a contraption, which is made of thick ropes — some elevated on telephone poles high above the ground. The campers, of course, are secured by safety devices, but they are encouraged to work their way through the course without falling.

"Some kids don't want to get up on the course when they first get there. But, when they go the next year, that's the first thing they want to do," Parsons said. "If there is a kid who is in a wheelchair, or has prosthetics,

the staff has harnesses and they know exactly what to do. The kids go right up."

The course teaches teamwork, self-esteem building, problem solving, communication, and, I would think, overcoming fears!

The Elks, with lodges in Port Charlotte, Deep Creek, Rotonda West, Englewood and Punta Gorda, do a lot of good for a lot of people. They offer an extensive children's therapy services program and transport many, many people to therapy appointments.

Sending kids to camp – kids who ordinarily wouldn't get to go for one reason or another — is a good idea.

companies layer their reinsurance. Company A may go to one reinsurer and obtain \$50 million once its deductible is reached and then purchase another \$50 million from Company B to also bolster its reserves.

So, in a nutshell, a drop in reinsurance rates 'does not translate into a one-to-one reduction" in a property owner's premium, according to McCarty. "Depending on the size of that residual rate need and current loss experience and expenses," McCarty wrote, "increases in premium may still be warranted despite a decrease in reinsurance costs.' "It's like saying gas prices have gone down, so food prices should drop immediately," Nolan said. "It just doesn't work like that. There are other components that are involved as well." Whether insurance premiums fall or not, residents should examine their policies to ensure they have sufficient coverage in case another Hurricane Charley decides to come roaring into Charlotte County.

"An insurance company must evaluate its reinsurance need and purchase accordingly," McCarty wrote. "In a time when reinsurance rates are dropping, an insurance company may choose to purchase reinsurance. In fact, several Florida property insurance companies are being required by their rating agency to buy more reinsurance than they initially planned to purchase. This is likely to keep rates up and move additional premium and exposure to reinsurers." Another issue McCarty cited was timing, stating that a company's policy period runs from June 1 to May 31 and then they do an "actuarial review" of its loss experience and expenses to determine appropriate changes that must be made on both a statewide and

"This initial funding and surplus transfer would be somewhere in the area of \$13 to \$14 billion, which is the approximate cash surplus of the two separate entities combined," Chapman said. "Next, we combine the bonding capability already in place of these two entities. Based on current assets and cash flow this would provide for up to an additional

mechanisms that are in place now.

A Joint Underwriter Association with rates equal to exposure is needed to pick up the few policies that would not have coverage available through the voluntary market, according to Chapman.

"Once the decision is made to move forward, the national market insurance carriers along with the Florida domestic marketplace will begin providing policies that pay for all nonhurricane related risks," he said. "Would they still pay for tropical storms and tornadoes? Yes, the only peril the FLHA would be responsible for is a hurricane."

"We the people need to do this," Chapman said. "The Legislature won't because of the political surroundings."

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

Kenneth didn't think his dad had any heart trouble, but he said his dad kept his medical history mostly private. Kenneth pointed out his dad was known to have a bad back, but he stood through Wilson's funeral at the Charlotte Harbor Event & Conference Center because "he put everybody If convicted, Boatman could face an additional life-in-prison sentence. In March 2011, Boatman turned down a plea offer in the case.

Silva also had been an officer with the Lake Placid Police Department since May 2010. He was able to coordinate his schedules between Lake Placid and the Sheriff's Office, allowing him to help both agencies as much as possible.

In Lake Placid, Silva assisted with CPR and first aid classes and helped with event security. He also completed over 600 hours of postacademy training, which included what Chief of Police James Fransler described as "intense courses," such as firearms instruction.

"Since his time with the Lake Placid Police Department, officer Silva strived to assist in any capacity," Fransler stated in a letter to the media Monday.

"Ted was a great asset to the department and will sorely be missed."

Silva's family released this statement: "Ted was a faithful and religious man whose greatest joy was uniting two families in Christ."

as they started their new school year.

Sabrina Staley's sixthgrade class was eager to switch classes, a process that begins with sixth grade in the school. First, though, students told the class something interesting they did over the summer.

"The school has such a family feel," said Michelle Bagan, a school trustee who has two children at Charlotte Academy. "We even feel that the teachers are family and stayed — which is true for most of our teachers," explained Staley, who is now the school's program coordinator and math teacher for grades six through eight. "Children here feel safe and nurtured. They're taught what it means to be a leader from a young age, and also how to serve."

Academy students participate in Backpack Kidz, Toys for Tots and other community efforts.

Older students mentor younger students — a foundation of Montessori learning — but it's common to see older and younger students together, Staley said. Although Charlotte Academy students tend to be high-achieving, the school accepts students of all abilities, said interim head Dr. Gerald Friedman, including those with learning disabilities if staff believes it can accommodate them and help them. Monday was Friedman's first official day at Charlotte

Academy, too. A former math teacher, he has taught all grades, including college level, and led both public and private schools in Cleveland and Ithaca, N.Y.

"Students who might get lost at other schools don't get lost here," Friedman said. "The math concepts these students can do are amazing."

Most are reading in kindergarten, Staley added. By the time they leave the school, they're usually far ahead of their peers entering high school, in the top 5 percent of their public and private high school

of appointments to such agencies as the Department of Children and Families, the ombudsman for seniors, and the Department of Education, "where there have been five commissioners since Scott was elected. No wonder we can't find stability in our education system.

"There is a pattern here. It shows the ineptness of the Scott administration. It needs to be changed," she said.

Rich, of Destin, was elected to the Florida House of Representatives in 2000 and served in the State Senate from 2004 to 2012, and as the Senate minority leader from 2010 to 2012, when her term expired.

In her remarks to the women's club, she castigated Scott for refusing to accept \$2.4 billion in federal high speed rail funds, \$1 billion of which, she said, went to California instead for rail service between classes, according to the school's statistics.

But it was much worse, Rich said, when Scott turned down \$51 billion to expand Medicaid in the state, "devastating our hospitals" and potentially losing out on as many as 120,000 jobs. "It's a disaster," she said. "It's morally reprehensible. It goes back to the word 'leadership.'"

Then, she said, there was the immigration bill that passed overwhelmingly in both the House and the Senate, which would have enabled undocumented workers and youth to obtain driver's licenses, that Scott vetoed. "It was horrible," she said. "It just hurts young people. He doesn't understand the legislative process.

"There are few decisions the governor has made that are good for Florida," Rich added, "and that's why I'm running for governor."

Questions from the audience addressed her lack of name recognition and campaign funds. Former governors Rubin Askew, Bob Graham and Lawton Chiles started out with minimal name recognition, she said. Graham's was 3 percent. "I'm already ahead of him," she smiled. "I've got 12 percent." And, she said, her "likes" on Facebook have gone from 300 three months ago to more than 16,000 today.


Her campaign funds? "Well, Gov. Scott will have \$100 million and I won't have \$100 million," she said, smiling again. But in her trips around the state, she added, people are telling her that "we let the governor buy this the last time and we're never going to let anyone buy it again."

She said she was counting on "grass-roots, people on the ground like you," to help with fundraising, and that as governor she would protect "women's ability to control their lives and their own bodies.

"I was the first woman Senate minority leader," Rich said, "and I plan on making history as the first woman governor of Florida."







### New look online for economic development

As part of an overall marketing campaign aimed at luring new business to the county, Charlotte County's **Economic Development** Office unveiled its new website Monday.

The bright and colorful new site is loosely modeled after Enterprise Florida's "tie"-themed business brand, which features an orange men's necktie as the "i" in the word Florida.

While the office chose to use a conch shell rather than the somewhat controversial necktie as part of its new logo, the blue, green and orange colors are similar and mark a fresh departure from the stodgy and difficult-to-navigate site the EDO previously had.

"Websites have a tendency of getting stale over time, so we're trying to freshen it up," said **Economic Development** Director Tom Patton. "Having a good website is critical.

The new website features, among other things, rotating images, links to state and local business partners, a regional map, information minute promotional video pushing shovelready property near the Punta Gorda Airport. It also provides key information to "site selectors" who may be considering Charlotte County as a place to expand a business.

"These days, site consultants do all of their shopping over the Internet," Patton said. "When I first started in economic development, they used to visit the community to get the answers to all of their questions. These days, they do 80 percent of that work before they visit. So if they come to your community, you know that you have made it onto their short list."

The new website is more attractive and easier to read, Patton noted, providing much of the information site consultants look for right at their fingertips.

In addition to having professionally shot videos and interactive maps detailing the locations of airports, seaports, roads, and rail for global companies, the website also will have a database of available commercial

lease within the county.

Realtors and commercial property owners will be able to log into a database to add their commercial listings along with specific criteria for interested companies scouting for new locations.

So far, reaction to the new website, which was created by Punta Gorda marketing firm Marketing Alliance, has been positive.

In an email to Patton on Monday, Robert C. Peterson, new business development manager for Florida Gulf Coast University and facilitator for the Charlotte Assembly steering committee, said this is about the department's new online presence:

"Very nice job on the new website. Very informative and easy to navigate."

Patton said the new site is just one component of a larger marketing strategy that includes social media, print advertising, trade shows, and site consultants visits.

### **Squeezing insurers** not the way to get **lower premiums**


**OUR POSITION:** Lower insurance premiums a good goal, but it won't happen quickly.

lorida Chief Financial Officer Jeff Atwater is right and wrong when he says Floridians should be seeing savings in their property insurance bills. In a Friday letter to Insurance Commissioner Kevin McCarty, Atwater asked him for his input on the failure of the state's private insurers to pass along significant costs savings they have enjoyed as their reinsurance costs have fallen recently.

Citing a poll of insurance underwriters and brokers in The Insurance Insider, Atwater told McCarty insurers had seen reinsurance costs savings between 15 percent and 20 percent. "Can you please explain why a significant drop in reinsurance costs worldwide has not yet corresponded to a significant drop in property insurance rates for Floridians?" Atwater inquired.

McCarty responded Monday morning with a letter that defended the insurance industry, saying many companies are being forced to buy more reinsurance coverage to strengthen their financial bottom lines and retain high credit ratings, according to a report in the Orlando Sun-Sentinel. Part of the reason for that, according to a report in the online trade publication Insurance Journal, was a requirement that insurers pay into its Florida Hurricane Catastrophe Fund, or Cat Fund. That fund was mocked for providing "phantom coverage" due to its projected \$1.5 billion funding shortfall. The Cat Fund has \$17 billion in reinsurance exposure, but only \$8.5 billion in cash. To make up the difference, it would have to issue bonds, but Cat Fund executives told legislators it could expect to raise only about \$7 billion.

There are a number of factors at play in the private insurance market that could eventually produce lower rates for customers. Primarily, a dearth of landfalling tropical storms and hurricanes in the past six years has enabled insurers to reap millions of dollars in premiums while avoiding catastrophic payouts. Second, the Legislature has passed measures in the past two years that have allowed state-run Citizens Property Insurance to raise premiums and "depopulate" its customer base. The intended effect of those measures is to force property owners into the private market, where increased competition should drive prices lower. While we support Atwater in his effort to focus attention on stubbornly high premiums, McCarty and others are correct in pointing out the mitigating factors that make his analysis flawed. For example, a report by the Insurance Information Institute found non-catastrophic claims leapt 80 percent since 2005's Hurricane Wilma. The report notes that claims often increase during economic downturns. Atwater should also press the Legislature to redouble its efforts to reduce the size of Citizens, the largest property insurer in the state and continue to reduce the exposure of the Cat Fund. If accurate, the industry's contention that the Cat Fund's inadequate funding forced insurers to buy more private market reinsurance, the Legislature is as much to blame for stubborn premium levels as private insurers, who must also compete with Citizens' below-market rates. Getting insurance coverage "right-sized" is key to the state's rebounding real estate industry. That means getting more private companies back into the game at profitable premiums levels. It won't always be popular, but it's a better policy than the hurricane crap shoot Florida has been playing for nearly a decade.

# US energy manipulation

hy is it that natural gas sells in the U.S. for \$3.94 per 1,000 cubic feet and in Europe and Japan for \$11.60 and \$17, respectively? Part of the answer is our huge supply. With high-tech methods of extraction and with discovery of vast gas-rich shale deposits, estimated reserves are about 2.4 quadrillion cubic feet. That translates into more than a 100-year supply of natural gas at current usage rates. What partially explains the high European and Japanese prices is the fact that global natural gas markets are not integrated. Washington has stringent export restrictions on natural gas.

Naturally, the next question is: Why are there natural gas export restrictions? Just follow the money. According to OpenSecrets.org, The Dow Chemical Co. Walter E. Williams Guest Columnist

"posted record lobbying expenditures last year, spending nearly \$12 million, and is on pace to eclipse that number this year." The company has spent hundreds of thousands of dollars contributing to the political campaigns of congressmen who support export restrictions. Natural gas is a raw material for Dow. It benefits financially from cheap gas prices, which it fears would rise if Congress were to lift export restrictions. Dow argues, "Continuing optimism for U.S. manufacturing is founded on the prospect of an adequate, reliable and reasonably priced supply of natural gas." Of course, Dow and other big users of natural gas get support from environmentalists,

who are anti-drilling and anticipate that export restrictions will

serve their ends. Big natural gas users and environmentalists have foreign allies, suggested by the statement of Saudi Prince Alwaleed bin Talal, who told Saudi Arabia's oil minister, Ali al-Naimi, that rising American shale gas production is "an inevitable threat." Nigeria's oil minister, Diezani Alison-Madueke, agrees, saying that U.S. shale oil is a "grave concern." In light of these foreign "concerns" about U.S. energy production, one wonders whether foreign countries have given financial aid to U.S. politicians, environmentalists and other groups that are waging war against domestic oil and natural gas drilling. It would surely be in their interests to do everything in their power to keep the West

dependent on OPEC nations for oil and gas.

Natural gas producers would like to export some of their product to Europe and Japan to take advantage of higher prices. One effect of those exports would be to raise natural gas prices in the U.S. and lower them in the recipient countries. Industrial giants such as Dow, Alcoa, Celanese and Nucor are members of America's Energy Advantage, a lobby group that says it is unpatriotic to allow unlimited natural gas exports. It argues that export restrictions keep natural gas prices low and give U.S. manufacturing companies a raw material advantage, which allows them to produce goods at lower prices.

I'd like to ask Dow, Alcoa and other companies that lobby against natural gas exports whether their argument applies to them. After all, they ship a lot of their domestic products overseas. For example, Alcoa exports tons of aluminum. Export restrictions on aluminum would lower domestic aluminum prices, thereby benefiting the aircraft industry, as well as making other aluminum-using manufacturers more competitive. Unfortunately, I doubt whether Alcoa would see it that way. In general, it is poor economic policy to encourage domestic American industry through costly and inefficient methods such as export restrictions.

But there's another effect of the natural gas export restrictions. The huge supply and resulting low prices have begun to act as a deterrent to future energy exploration and production. According to a Wall Street Journal article by Dr. Thomas Tunstall, research director for the Institute for Economic Development at the University of Texas at San Antonio, titled "Exporting Natural Gas Will Stabilize U.S. Prices" (May 29, 2013), natural gas production at three major shale oil fields in Texas has flattened out at 2012 output levels.


Tunstall concludes, "Over the long haul, market dynamics which include the ability to export without undue uncertainty or restriction — will best manage global supply and demand curves for natural gas." I agree.

## In the Arab world, US is low on leverage

The "Arab Spring" may not have succeeded in bringing democracy to the Middle East. But it has provided powerful evidence of a different phenomenon: the illusion of U.S. influence over governments we once considered our clients.

Take Egypt. Before 2011, the Bush and Obama administrations tried to nudge the autocratic Hosni Mubarak toward democracy; Mubarak ignored the advice. Last year, the Obama administration pleaded (gently) with the freely elected Mohamed Morsi to make his Muslim Brotherhood government more inclusive; Morsi ignored the advice. Now Egypt's armed forces have seized power and the United States is begging Gen. Abdel Fattah Sisi to refrain from cracking down too hard. Will he comply? Not likely. Whatever happened to our leverage as a superpower? If the United States could be expected to have influence over any institution in the



Arab world, it would be the government of Egypt, which collects \$1.6 billion a year in American aid.

But two factors have diminished the leverage that the United States once gained by doling out foreign aid: less money and more competition.

First, \$1.6 billion doesn't buy what it used to. U.S. aid to Egypt has been shrinking for most of Sisi's career. Adjusted for inflation, this year's \$1.6 billion is only about one-third as much as the United States spent on Egypt aid in 1986. little more than a drop in the bucket for Egypt's sprawling economy. Sisi and other Egyptians know this all too well but American politicians often sound as if they haven't noticed.

And other powers have stepped in to fill the breach. Last month, Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates and Kuwait announced that they were rushing \$12 billion in economic aid to Egypt to help the military regime stabilize the economy. Those gulf monarchies had an agenda too; they fear the Muslim Brotherhood, don't yearn for the restoration of democracy, and would be perfectly happy if Sisi cracked down hard. If foreign aid creates leverage, the sheikdoms' \$12 billion trumps our

plotted to undermine it, and the military and its secular supporters say the United States is being too hard on Sisi now. All sides, including Sisi, cast themselves as nationalists; appearing to bow to U.S. wishes won't help the general maintain his sky-high popularity.

In any case, the stakes for Egyptians are too high for U.S. advice to count for much. "We're a sideshow," notes Steven A. Cook, an Egypt scholar at the Council on Foreign Relations. "If you're an Egyptian leader, one of your best political strategies right now is to stick it to Washington."

And that's precisely what Sisi is doing. "You turned your backs on the Egyptians, and they can't forget that," he told The Washington Post last week. "Talking a lot about aid and U.S. assistance really hurts our pride and dignity, (but) if the Americans want to cut assistance, they can." The general's prickliness reflected another paradox: As leverage, foreign aid can be hard to use. Threatening to

cut military aid may be a useful way to get Egyptian leaders' attention; but actually reducing military cooperation could hurt U.S. interests as much as Egypt's — not only in keeping peace with Israel, but also in counter-terrorism efforts across the Arab world. That's why the Obama White House quickly walked away from the temptation to call Sisi's takeover a coup and freeze U.S. aid. Instead, it was left to Secretary of State John F. Kerry to categorize the military's action this way: "In effect, they were restoring democracy."

For Egyptians, the message was familiar, if not entirely clear: For two decades, American politicians have threatened to pull aid if things didn't change, but they never dared pull the trigger. This time is unlikely to be much different. The same limits apply, in different propor-tions, to U.S. policy in other parts of the Arab world. In 2012, Obama proposed major new funding to support


nascent Arab democracies; most of the money never came through. "We're responding to events of historic consequence with the equivalent of the change we can find in the couch cushions," said Tamara Cofman Wittes of the Brookings Institution's Saban Center, who ran democracy aid programs at the State Department.


That doesn't mean the United States has no influence over events in the Arab world. It just means we have less sway than we often imagine — and the source of our influence may not be the size of the checks we write.

"We do have leverage, but it's not where we think it is," Wittes said. "What they want is international recognition. They want to be connected to the rest of the world. And they want our blessing. # Mob boss Bulger guilty

### Boston crime figure convicted of 11 killings

BOSTON — James "Whitey" Bulger, the feared Boston mob boss who became one of the nation's mostwanted fugitives, was convicted Monday in a string of 11 killings and dozens of other gangland crimes, many of them committed while he was said to be an FBI informant. Bulger, 83, stood

silently and showed no


reaction upon hearing the verdict, which

a case that not only transfixed the city with its grisly violence but exposed corruption inside the Boston FBI and an overly cozy relationship with its underworld snitches. Bulger was charged

primarily with racketeering, which listed 33 criminal acts — among them, 19 murders that he allegedly helped orchestrate or carried out himself during the

1970s and '80s while he led the Winter Hill Gang, Boston's ruthless Irish mob.

After 4 1/2 days of delibera-



murders, **BULGER** along with nearly all the

other crimes on the list, including acts of extortion, money-laundering

and drug dealing. He was also found guilty of 30 other offenses, including possession of machine guns.

Bulger could get life in prison at sentencing Nov. 13. But given his age, even a modest term could amount to a life sentence for the slightly stooped, whitebearded Bulger.

As court broke up, Bulger turned to his relatives and gave them a thumbs-up. A woman in the gallery taunted him as he was led away,

apparently imitating machine-gun fire as she yelled: "Rat-a-tattat, Whitey!"

Outside the courtroom, relatives of the victims hugged each other, the prosecutors and even defense attorneys.

Patricia Donahue wept, saying it was a relief to see Bulger convicted in the murder of her husband, Michael Donahue, who authorities say was



### Judge: NYPD targeted minorities

### Suspect in Idaho shootout fired at FBI once or twice

SAN DIEGO (AP) — A close family friend suspected of abducting a 16-year old girl after killing her mother and younger brother fired his rifle at FBI agents before they killed him deep in the Idaho wilderness, authorities said Monday.

Hannah Anderson didn't know her mother and brother were dead until she was rescued from 40-yearold James Lee DiMaggio, San Diego County Sheriff Bill Gore said.

"I can't make it any clearer: She was a victim in this case. She was not a willing participant," Gore said at a news conference with Hannah's father, Brett Anderson.

During a shootout with the FBI, DiMaggio fired at least once and perhaps twice, the sheriff explained.

Hannah Anderson reunited with family in San Diego to begin what her father said would be a slow recovery. He thanked the horseback riders who reported seeing the pair near an alpine lake, saying the search might have taken much longer without them.

"She has been through a tremendous, horrific ordeal," said Brett Anderson, who declined to answer questions and pleaded for privacy.

The massive search spanning much of the Western United States and parts of Canada and

That enabled investigators to focus efforts on a specific portion of the Frank Church-River of No Return Wilderness, a roadless 3,600-squaremile preserve in the heart of Idaho.

"They just didn't fit," said John, 71. "He might have been an outdoorsman in California, but he was not an outdoorsman in Idaho. ... Red flags

kind of went up.' Initially, it was the lack of openness on the trail and a reluctance to

engage in the polite exchange of banter like so many other recreationists John has encountered during horseback excursions.

The riders were puzzled why Anderson and DiMaggio were hiking in the opposite direction of their stated destination, the Salmon River.

But more than anything, it was their gear - or lack of it. Neither was wearing hiking boots or rain gear. DiMaggio, described as an avid hiker in his home state of California, was toting only a light pack. It even appeared Anderson was wearing pajama bottoms.

The riders had a second encounter Wednesday, this one at the lake as they were getting ready to head back down the trail. They saw Hannah Anderson soak her feet in the lake and

again avoid interaction. Still, nothing about their behavior raised suspicion that DiMaggio was wanted for murder and kidnapping. "If she was sending us

signals that she was in trouble, we didn't key in on it," Mary Young, 61, said at a news conference Sunday in Boise.

It wasn't until Thursday afternoon when the Johns returned home and saw the girl's photographs on the news that they made a connection and notified police.

On Friday, police found DiMaggio's car, hidden under brush at a trailhead on the border of the wilderness area. A day later, searchers spotted the pair by air, and two FBI hostage teams moved in on the camp at Morehead Lake, about eight miles inside the wilderness border and 40 miles east of the central Idaho town of Cascade.

Rescue teams were dropped by helicopter about 2 1/2 hours away from where Anderson and DiMaggio were spotted by the lake, said FBI spokesman Jason Pack. The team had to hike with up to 100 pounds of tactical gear along a rough trail characterized by steep switchbacks and treacherous footing.

The teams waited until Anderson and DiMaggio were no longer near each other before moving in.

#### **Obama orders** intelligence review

EDGARTOWN, Mass. (AP) — President Barack Obama is directing his national intelligence director to form a panel of outside experts to review government intelligence and communications technologies.

It's one of the reforms Obama promised last week to help instill public confidence in U.S. surveillance programs exposed by National Security Agency leaker Edward Snowden.

In a memorandum Obama signed Monday and released by the White House, he asks intelligence director James Clapper to empanel outside experts to review U.S. surveillance technologies, particularly how the government can maintain the public trust and how such surveillance affects foreign policy at a time when more and more information is becoming public.

Obama requested an interim report within 60 days, and a final report and recommendations by mid-December.

The memo was released as Obama vacationed on Martha's Vineyard.

#### Manning defense focuses on mental health

FORT MEADE, Md. (AP) - Lawyers for Army Pfc. Bradley Manning opened their case Monday in the sentencing phase of his trial by attacking commanders' decisions to send the young intelligence analyst to Iraq and let him keep his top-secret security clearance despite emotional outbursts and concerns about his mental health.

Manning faces up to 90 years in prison for disclosing reams of classified information through the anti-secrecy website WikiLeaks. His lawyers are presenting evidence in hopes of a lighter sentence.

Manning's brigade ommander, Col. David Miller, testified the 2nd Brigade's 10th Mountain Division deployed in late 2009 with 10 to 15 percent fewer intelligence analysts than the authorized number. But Miller denied feeling any pressure to take soldiers who should not have deployed. "In a counterinsurgency fight, you can always use more," he said.

#### **Police ID victims** in RI slayings, abduction

JOHNSTON, R.I. (AP) -A man was charged with two counts of murder and kidnapping Monday following a weekend double homicide that touched off a search for a missing toddler.

Authorities believe **Daniel Rodriguez** broke into the home of Evelyn Burgos, 40, before shooting Burgos and her 25-year-old daughter, Vanessa Perez, and abducting Burgos' 2-year-old son, Johnston Police Chief Richard S. Tamburini said Monday.

The toddler, Isaiah Perez, was found unharmed Sunday night after a police officer spotted him wandering through a Providence housing project. He is now in the care of state child welfare officials.

Rodriguez, who is either 27 or 28, was arraigned Monday on two counts of murder as well as burglary, kidnapping and gun charges. He was apprehended Sunday and is being held without bail.

Authorities said Rodriguez was Burgos' boyfriend but not the boy's father. Authorities issued a nationwide Amber Alert following the boy's abduction.

#### **CEO Murdock** to buy Dole for \$13.50 a share

LOS ANGELES (LA Times) — David H. Murdock, chairman and chief executive of Dole Food Co. in Westlake Village, Calif., is taking the produce company private in a deal valued at \$1.21 billion.

The Los Angeles billionaire will pay \$13.50 a share in cash for all the outstanding shares of common stock he doesn't already hold. As of June, he and his family members owned nearly 40 percent of Dole shares.

The purchase, months in the making, comes after Murdock made a \$12-a-share proposal in June. The transaction represents a 32 percent premium over the \$10.20-a-share price at which the stock was trading just before the negotiations first became public.

### US budget gap shrinks through July

#### WASHINGTON

(Bloomberg) — The U.S. government posted a 38 percent smaller budget deficit in the 10 months through July than a year earlier, even as the shortfall last month was wider than economists forecast, the Treasury Department said Monday.

Outlays exceeded receipts by \$97.6 billion last month, compared with a \$69.6 billion shortfall in July 2012, the Treasury said in Washington. The result, reflecting a difference in the timing of payments in July last year versus this year, compared with the \$96 billion median estimate in a Bloomberg survey of 27 economists.

In the fiscal year that ends Sept. 30, the Obama administration projects

the federal deficit will shrink to \$759 billion, the smallest gap in five years as a stronger economy bolsters revenue. Increased tax collections and payments to the Treasury from Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac as housing improves are taking the pressure off of Congress and the White House to achieve an agreement on dealing with spending, deficits or automatic budget cuts.

"The improvement in the federal budget deficit over the past year is the fastest on record and the result of rising revenues and shrinking outlays," Dean Maki, the New York-based chief U.S. economist for Barclays, wrote in an Aug. 9 research note. "Revenues are increasing because of income growth, a rising

stock market, and higher tax rates, while outlays are shrinking because of budget cuts and lower unemployment."

For the first 10 months of the 2013 financial year that began Oct. 1, the nation's deficit narrowed to \$607.4 billion compared with a \$973.8 billion shortfall over the same period from a year before.

Monday's report showed revenue rose 8.4 percent in July to \$200 billion from the same month a year earlier. Spending totaled \$297.6 billion compared with \$254.2 billion a year earlier, it showed.

The U.S.'s AA+ credit-rating outlook was increased in June to stable from negative by Standard & Poor's based on receding fiscal risks, less than two years after

the company stripped the world's largest economy of its top ranking.


American employers added 162,000 workers in July, according to a Labor Department report Aug. 2. The jobless rate fell to 7.4 percent last month from 7.6 percent in June and was down from 8.2 percent a year earlier.

The Congressional Budget Office said Aug. 7 that last month's budget figures were "distorted by quirks of the calendar" such as July 1, 2012, falling on a Sunday, requiring government payments to be made in the previous month. Without that shift this year, the July 2013 deficit would have been \$10 billion smaller than it was a year earlier, the CBO said.

#### Cambodia suspends military programs with US

WASHINGTON (AP) -Cambodia has suspended international military cooperation programs with the United States and others following that country's recent, disputed election, the State Department said Monday.

The reason for Cambodia's action was not immediately clear. State Department spokeswoman Marie Harf told reporters that Cambodia's Defense Ministry has postponed or canceled a number of programs. She provided no details.

It could be a preemptive move after U.S. lawmakers called for cuts in direct aid to Cambodia's government if the vote was not free and fair. But Harf said the U.S. does not regard this as a suspension of overall military ties.

"We haven't indicated that's something we want," Harf said. "We are going to keep watching the process as it unfolds and see where it goes from here."

### Volunteers spread word about 'Obamacare' changes

MIAMI (AP) — With just 50 days until Floridians are able to go online and shop for private health insurance under a new federal law, hundreds of volunteers are fanning out across the state to inform people about the law and the coverage opportunities available under it.

Volunteers, who are mobilizing grassroots efforts similar to election campaigns, say they're finding that people are hungry to hear more.

"There was some expectation that because the issue has a charged political history... that there would be this very large portion of people that wouldn't want to engage in it and would just slam the door in your face or if you're at a table, just walk away," said John Gilbert, national field director of Enroll America, a nonprofit group sponsoring a national marketing campaign of the health care law. "Very, very few people are actually not engaging with us.'

received more than 20 phone calls within an hour of speaking on a local radio show, the organization said during a conference call with reporters Monday.

Enroll America is focusing tens of millions of dollars and 3,000 volunteers in Florida, Georgia, Arizona and seven other states with a strong GOP presence where officials have been resistant to the Affordable Care Act. The state of Florida isn't spending any additional money on outreach efforts and will rely on roughly \$14 million from federal officials to get the message out to 3.5 million uninsured Floridians. That compares to the nearly \$28 million spent reaching out to Washington state's much smaller 960,000.

Seventy-eight percent of uninsured adults don't know about opportunities that will be available to them in 2014 under the Affordable Care Act, according to Enroll America. That's part of the reason organizers say they plan to

have several conversations with people during the process, relying on house parties, phone banks, staffing tables at community events and a massive social media campaign.

"This is not a conversation about politics. This is a conversation about what does this mean to you, your family and your pocketbook," said Anita Fete, director of state assistance.

But volunteers don't have any details yet about the bottom line because the federal government hasn't released how much premiums, co-pays and deductibles will cost in the exchange. The rates will likely come out next month. A survey of 7,300 people in five states including Florida by the Cigna insurance company found that price was the most important factor when choosing plans under the exchange, followed by having a relationship with a doctor.

But the organization said its job is to educate residents about the options and steer price questions toward more general rhetoric, such as 'you may qualify for a subsidy," Gilbert said.

State insurance officials recently said rates will rise an average of 5 to 20 percent for small businesses and 30 to 40 percent in the individual market under the exchange, but countered that those increases are partly due to consumers receiving more benefits. The higher costs will also be offset by federal subsidies in many cases.

Insurance Commissioner Kevin McCarty said most of the state's roughly 3.5 million uninsured residents will not see extreme price hikes. The new insurance plans will be more comprehensive, making direct comparisons to existing plans impossible.

Critics said the projections were misleading because the state didn't release figures for the actual plans.

Last week, a progressive advocacy group announced its plans to go on the offensive on 'Obamacare" in Florida.

'When we are met with what we believe is mythical info... we are going to push back aggressively," said Brad Woodhouse of Americans United for Change.

Meanwhile, conservative groups like The Heritage Foundation will hold a town hall event in Tampa later this month to highlight what they call failures of the law and discuss ways to strip funding for it.

CEO Mike Needham warned that health care premiums will increase and businesses will cut jobs because they can't afford to offer health coverage to employees.

U.S. Sen. Marco Rubio, the Florida Republican who has been a vocal critic of the Affordable Care Act, planned to discuss the law with business leaders in Gainesville on Monday night.

largest drivers of uncertainty in our economy today is the cloud of 'Obamacare' hanging over it," he said during an event in Jacksonville earlier Monday.

The new marketplaces, which are open for enrollment Oct. 1, will have the feel of an online travel site where individuals, families and small businesses can compare different private insurance plans. #### Fla. terrorism suspect pleads not guilty

A Miami organizer

JACKSONVILLE (AP) — A 19-year-old Florida man accused of conspiring to aid al-Qaida and traveling to the Middle East to join terrorist groups pleaded not guilty Monday in a federal court in Jacksonville.

During a brief arraignment hearing, Shelton Thomas Bell entered the not guilty pleas to two federal counts of trying to provide material support to terrorists.

An indictment said Bell planned to join Ansar Al-Sharia, which is an alias for al-Qaida in the Middle East region. The group has taken responsibility for attacks on Yemeni forces, including a suicide bombing during a parade in May 2012 that killed more than 100 soldiers.

Bell participated in physical, firearm and other training in Florida to prepare for armed conflict, federal agents said. Bell is also accused of soliciting others to travel overseas with him to train. In September 2012, Bell and a juvenile went to Amman, Jordan, and made contact with someone who investigators said could help them travel to Yemen to participate in violent jihad, according to the indictment. The indictment does not say whether Bell ever entered Yemen. Bell is being held at the Duval County Jail in Jacksonville on state charges, including two counts of grand theft, organized fraud and knowingly and intentionally participating in a motor vehicle crash. He was arrested Jan. 29.

At their funeral, Rev. Richard L. Marquess-Barry said Livingston "would not leave her sisters behind to suffer."

Livingston was the oldest of Chesterfield and Grace Gibson Finley's seven children. According to The Herald, she left Miami for Florida A & M University in 1950 hoping to become a nurse. But soon her mother asked her to come home to help care for her younger siblings. And that's what she did for the next six decades.

The newspaper reports Livingston deferred her college plans so that her siblings could earn their degrees. Two became teachers. Eventually she earned an Associate of Arts in education from Miami-Dade College. And at age 70 she received a Bachelor of Science degree from Florida Memorial College.

The area is a popular spot to search for megalodon shark teeth. The shark was about the size of a modern whale shark and went extinct 4- to 20 million years ago.

In July, Wes Kirpach found half of a 3.75-inch megalodon shark's tooth. Kerry Kirpach found a similarly sized tooth an hour later.

Later the Dallas-area teachers realized the cracks along the broken half of each tooth perfectly aligned.

One man who has been searching for the fossils for 30 years says he's never heard of anyone recovering matching megalodon tooth halves.

WASHINGTON (Washington Post) -You feel yourself float up and out of your physical body. You glide toward the entrance of a tunnel, and a searing bright light envelops your field of vision.

Rather than an ascent into the afterlife, a new study says these features of a near-death experience may just be a bunch of neurons in your brain going nuts.

"A lot of people believed that what they saw was heaven," said lead researcher and neurologist Jimo Borjigin. "Science hadn't given them a convincing alternative."

"It's a scary situation," Shanley said, and guests credited him with saving lives by knocking on doors to awaken them. Inside, they heard what sounded like thunder and then the sound of water, as if it were a storm. Evacuation took about 10 to 15 minutes, according to staff and witnesses.

Amy Jedele heard screams coming from one of the adjacent buildings around

10:30 p.m., and several minutes later, the sounds of sirens. She and her fiance, Darren Gade, went outside. "That's when you could hear the pops and the metal, the concrete and the glass breaking," she said.

The first portions of the building to sink were the walkways and the elevator shaft, Gade said.

"You could see the ground falling away from the building where the building started leaning," Gade said. "People were in shock to see a structure of that size just sink into the ground slowly. ... You could see the stress fractures up the side of the structure getting wider."

Then, as a part of the leaning building crumbled quickly into the ground, dust shot up around the site, amateur video of the collapse shows.

In one of the adjacent buildings, firefighters and police officers knocking on doors woke up Maggie Moreno of San Antonio. She couldn't fully open the door to her unit.

"It sounded like popcorn," said Moreno, who was visiting with her husband, daughter and two grandchildren. "The building was just snapping."

Luis Perez also was staying at a nearby building. He said he was in his room when the lights went off around 11:30 p.m. He said he was on his way to the front desk to report it when he saw firefighters and police outside. "I started walking

toward where they were at, and you could see the building leaning, and you could see a big

The Nasdaq also benefited for Apple's advance, rising 9.84 points, or 0.3 percent, to 3,669.95. The company makes up 7.9 percent of the index. Stocks have been

ear Mr. Berko: My broker tells me that low interest rates are inflationary. How is this possible? As a result, he has recommended that I invest \$25,000 of my \$120,000 individual retirement account cash into Treasury inflation-protected securities. He also believes that the market has peaked and wants me to stay out of stocks for a while. He would have me keep the remaining \$95,000 in short-term liquid investments, such as money market funds and floating-rate mutual funds—SL, Oklahoma City

Dear SL: I think your broker is correct; low interest rates are very inflationary. However, I think his recommendation of Treasury inflationprotected securities, or TIPS, misses the mark by a wide margin.

There are two kinds of inflation. First, there's political inflation, at 1.5 percent, which is a silly number used by the Obama administration to support its economic and domestic policies. Then there's real inflation, which is probably between 9 and 14 percent. Real inflation reflects the increasing cost of fuel; rent; health, home and auto insurance; cab fare; bank fees; groceries; property taxes; prescription drugs; and fixing a car or an appliance. The ever-growing cost of these items (numerous others, too) is making life miserable for many Americans. And yes, low interest rates are disastrously inflationary, especially for retired folks, who need five times more money in savings and certificates of deposit to produce the same income they earned five years ago. I know it's hard for

Americans to believe that our government would lie to them intentionally. However, since the Obama administration started to criminally fudge the inflation numbers to meet its political agenda, TIPS have become a bloody ripoff. And that's why I won't recommend them.

Quite a few investors believe that your broker is right about the Dow Jones industrial average. Since mid-2009, the Federal Reserve has used extraordinary measures, forcing interest rates down to match the administration's politically calculated inflation rates. And as bond yields plummeted, investors were driven to volatile and risky equities in search of higher returns. Flooding the economy with trillions of dollars has inflated current and potential corporate earnings and pushed stock prices beyond reasonable valuations. The law of gravity applies to the objects of a financial nature, such as stock prices.

My 50 years in this game have taught me that rising interest rates have always been a downer for stocks. That doesn't mean stock prices can't continue to increase, but for that to happen, future earnings would have to grow at an exceedingly strong pace to counteract the headwind of rising rates. #### Agents: 44 gunned down in Nigeria mosque

MAIDUGURI, Nigeria (AP) — Suspected Islamic militants gunned down 44 people praying at a mosque in northeast Nigeria, two security agents said Monday, the latest in a slew of violence blamed on religious extremists in this country.

The slayings occurred Sunday morning at a mosque in Konduga town, some 22 miles outside Maiduguri, the capital of Nigeria's Borno state.

A state security service agent and a member of a civilian vigilante group working with the military said Monday they counted the bodies at the mosque after the attack. Usman Musa of the civilian group says four of its vigilantes were also killed when they responded to calls for help.

#### Zimbabwe chief: 'Enemy' tossed like 'garbage'

HARARE, Zimbabwe (AP) — Zimbabwe's longtime President Robert Mugabe said Monday his party will not yield its victory in disputed elections and proclaimed he has disposed of his main political rivals, with whom he had ruled in a tense coalition government, "like garbage."

In his first public speech since the July 31 elections, Mugabe spoke at the annual Heroes' Day gathering at a national shrine in Harare that honors guerrillas killed in the war against whiteminority rule in Rhodesia, as Zimbabwe was known before 1980.

Speaking in the local Shona language, Mugabe called on his main challenger, outgoing Prime Minister Morgan Tsvangirai, to accept defeat, then dismissed him and his followers in scathing language.

### **Egypt postpones dispersing protest camps**

CAIRO (AP) -Egyptian authorities on Monday postponed plans to disperse two Cairo protest camps demanding the return of ousted President Mohammed Morsi after thousands of his supporters reinforced the sit-ins when news leaked to the press, military and security officials said.

Officials said they wanted to "avoid bloodshed," and the delay is likely to temporarily ease tensions that had spiked overnight, with the country bracing for a new bout of violence if the police move against protesters. However, the country remains on edge as to how the standoff between the militarybacked government and the protesters will end.

A judge meanwhile ordered that the deposed president, detained since his July 3 ouster, should be held for 15 more days pending investigations into charges he conspired in 2011 with Palestinian militants, an official said.

The postponement announcement came as Morsi supporters held new rallies demanding his return to power, marching down a main boulevard at the heart of Cairo chanting anti-military slogans and waving

the toppled president's picture.

Tens of thousands have occupied two encampments in Cairo's streets since even before Morsi's July 3 overthrow. At least 130 of his supporters have been killed

in two major clashes on the edges of the larger encampment.

An Egyptian security official, speaking anonymously as he was not authorized to talk to reporters, said the postponement came after a

plan to end the sit-ins by setting up cordons was leaked Sunday to the media. Thousands poured overnight into the sit-ins to prevent such a takeover.

"We were stunned by the masses" who came to the camps, one military official told The Associated Press. A push into the sit-ins would trigger a "massacre," he said.

A second security official said however that leaking the news served to "uncover the Brotherhood's reaction to security forces' advances," referring to Morsi's Muslim Brotherhood group.

The security forces had planned to form cordons around the Cairo protest sites as

early as dawn Monday, giving a chance for protesters to leave while preventing others from getting in, so as to minimize casualties before the push with water cannons and tear gas, according to officials who spoke earlier to The Associated Press.

### Hard-liners challenge Iran's proposed Cabinet

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Hard-line parliamentarians challenged Monday the Cabinet proposed by Iran's new president, accusing him of nominating ministers who are friendly to the West or who back "sedition" against the country's clerically dominated system of government.

President Hasan Rouhani fired back at his critics, saying he chose Western-educated ministers based on their competence and that the country is tired of "extremism."

MEXICO CITY (LA Times) — President Enrique Pena Nieto unveiled a historic energy reform proposal Monday that he said would allow foreign companies to invest in Mexico's stateowned behemoth of an oil company without ceding state ownership of the country's petroleum resources.

"This is the moment to utilize all of our energy to move and transform Mexico," Pena Nieto said in a nationally televised speech from Los Pinos, the Mexican White House. "Petroleum and other hydrocarbons will continue to be the exclusive patrimony of the nation. We will continue being owners of the petroleum income."

#### Hungarian charged with Nazi-era war crimes dies

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — Laszlo Csatary, a former police officer indicted in June by Hungarian authorities for abusing Jews and contributing to their deportation to Nazi death camps during World War II, has died. He was 98.

Csatary died Saturday of pneumonia in a Budapest hospital, said his lawyer, Gabor Horvath B. Hungarian authorities have said Csatary was the chief of an internment camp set up in a brick factory for around 12,000 Jews in Kosice — a Slovak city then part of Hungary in 1944.

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

It's possible that laborinducing drugs might increase the risk - or that the problems that lead doctors to start labor explain the results. These include mothers' diabetes and fetal complications, which have previously been linked with autism.

Like most research into autism causes, the study doesn't provide conclusive answers, and the authors say the results shouldn't lead doctors to avoid inducing labor or speeding it up since it can be life-saving for mothers and babies.

Simon Gregory, lead author and an associate professor of medicine and medical genetics at Duke University, emphasized, "We haven't found a connection for cause and effect. One of the things we need to look at is why they were being induced in the first place.'

Government data suggest 1 in 5 U.S. women

twice as many as in 1990.

Smaller studies suggested a possible tie between induced labor and autism, but the new research is the largest to date, involving more than 600,000 births. The government-funded study was published online Monday in JAMA Pediatrics.

The researchers examined eight years of North Carolina birth records, and matched 625,042 births with public school data from the late 1990s through 2008. Information on autism diagnoses didn't specify whether cases were mild or severe. Labor was induced or hastened in more than 170,000 births.

Overall, 5,648 children developed autism three times as many boys as girls. Among autistic boys, almost one-third of the mothers had labor started or hastened, versus almost 29 percent of the boys without autism. The differences were less pronounced among girls.

Oxytocin and prostaglandins are used to start or speed up labor but the study doesn't identify specific medications.



Among girls, autism was not tied to induced labor; it was only more common in those born after labor was accelerated; they were 18 percent more likely to have the developmental disorder than girls whose mothers had neither treatment.

Autism affects about 1 in 88 U.S. children. Symptoms may involve communication problems including avoiding eye contact and unusual repetitive behavior including arm-flapping. Causes are uncertain but experts believe it probably results from a combination of genetics and other factors. These may include mothers' illnesses and medication use while pregnant, fathers' age at conception, and problems affecting the fetus during childbirth — all suggested but not proven in previous research.

The study's biggest strength is bolstering the growing consensus that risks for autism occur before birth or soon after, said Dr. Byron King, director of Seattle Children's Hospital's autism center. He was not involved in the study.

### NFL: Tampa Bay Nicks' return boosts Bucs

TAMPA — The Tampa Bay Buccaneers are counting on the return of guards Carl Nicks and Davin Joseph to bolster their offensive line.

Nicks, who was an All-Pro in 2011, missed the final nine games of 2012 with a toe injury.

Joseph, a two-time Pro Bowl selection, missed the entire season after having surgery on his left knee.

Although the Bucs are being cautious this summer, both players are expected to be in the lineup for the season opener against the New York Jets on Sept. 8.

The 6-foot-5, 349-pound Nicks, who last played Oct. 25, might see limited playing time at New England on Friday night.

"I think I'm going to play this week," he said Monday. "I've got to get some live action on the toe."

The pain persists on the underside of his left foot, and Nicks does not expect it to go away anytime soon.

"I might have to deal with it my whole life. So it is what it is, but I have all the confidence in the world that I'll be playing," he said.

"I'd lie if I'd tell you it didn't affect me at all, but it affects the way I walk, the way I stand around right now. I've got to stand a certain way; it's just something I've got to deal with." Joseph will not travel with the team on its fourday trip to New England. "Right now strengthening is the biggest thing with Davin," Bucs coach Greg Schiano said. "Carl's going to come and if everything goes well, Carl should take some plays Friday night. We'll see if that comes off or not, depending on how he feels after practice." Nicks is hopeful of making it all the way back to the form that made him an All-Pro with the New Orleans Saints in 2011, but he admits he has a long way to go. "I think with the rehab program I've got, and the way they're letting me rest, work, rest, work, I think it'll be fine," he said. "Maybe I'll just take it easier during the week. seven innings a start over 32 games, combined for an MLB-best 2.21 ERA and threw seven complete games (more than any team has for the season) in a 19-game span. But then Matt Moore



### **MINUS-10 BLUES** Dolphins seek turnover turnaround

DAVIE — A goal-line interception at Miami Dolphins practice Monday prompted shouts of delight on defense and a collective sag of the shoulders on offense. There was no expression of either celebration or frustration by coach Joe Philbin, who instead impassively looked at his shoes.

"The initial reaction," Philbin said later, "is that from an offensive standpoint, we've got to do a better job. Conversely, on defense it's fantastic."

Improving turnover differential is Philbin's top priority. Defensive players are encouraged to take frequent swipes at footballs hanging from the walls of team meeting rooms, and many of Miami's offseason moves were made to increase takeaways or reduce turnovers.

The Dolphins tied for fourth-worst in the NFL last year with 16 takeaways, and also ranked in the league's second division with 26 turnovers. That differential of minus-10 tied for eighth-worst.

"If you ask me why we were 7-9 last year, I would say minus-10," Philbin said. "That's the starting point of everything. It's the starting point of our offense, and it's the starting

point of our defense."

The Dolphins have endured four consecutive losing seasons, and during that span they're minus-36 in turnover differential, worst in the NFL. Miami chases reigning AFC East champion New England both in the standings and in turnover differential, where the Patriots led the league in 2012 at plus-25.

In an attempt to gain ground, the Dolphins parted with running back Reggie Bush, cornerback Sean Smith and linebackers Karlos Dansby and Kevin Burnett. Bush was benched during one game last year for fumbling, Smith dropped too many potential interceptions, and Dansby and Burnett combined for zero interceptions and fumble recoveries.

The Dolphins added linebackers Philip Wheeler and Dannell Ellerbe, defensive end Dion Jordan and cornerback Brent Grimes. The Dolphins believe Wheeler, Ellerbe and top draft pick Jordan will create more turnovers with their speed and blitzing ability, while Grimes has 13 career interceptions.

Friday's exhibition victory at Jacksonville hinted at progress. Miami's defense recovered two fumbles and made two interceptions, while the offense committed only one turnover. Last year the Dolphins enjoyed a turnover advantage in only five games - and won them all.

A year of experience for Ryan Tannehill should help. He started all 16 games as a rookie last year, and was the only passer among the top 30 to finish with more interceptions (13) than touchdown passes (12).

"Ryan is going to make considerable strides this year," said former Dolphins quarterback Chad Pennington, who has worked with Tannehill. "I think what he learned last year is that in the NFL, there are more games lost than won.

'When you look at the games the Dolphins won last year, Ryan didn't have outstanding stats, but they were good solid stats. And sometimes when he threw for big yards, you'd look at the turnovers, and that's what cost them the game. That's what I think he has learned the most — that he doesn't have to look pretty, but it has to be effective and efficient and consistent."



MOSCOW — Over 10 hurdles, David Oliver had

no trouble. Stepping past a tiny steel beam jutting from the floor inside Luzhniki Stadium soon after winning a gold medal? Now that proved more difficult.

His trouble began after his nearly flawless 110-meter hurdles Monday night at the world championships. Oliver tripped and tumbled to the ground but quickly picked himself up and rubbed his stinging knee. His comic touch, however, was still intact: At least, he said, his misstep happened after the race.

For years, injuries have halted Oliver in the hurdles. For years, he's struggled to find his rhythm. It all came together when he finished just ahead of teammate Ryan Wilson.

Had it not been for a trip over the final hurdle, defending champion Jason Richardson could have grabbed the last spot on the podium. But his stumble opened the door for Sergey Shubenkov of Russia to slip into the third spot — much to the delight of the Moscow crowd.

SUN SENTINEL CORAL GABLES — From his small store, Harry Rothwell can almost see the University of Miami athletic complexes. It is maybe a long foul ball from Alex Rodriguez Park down Ponce de Leon Boulevard.

Inside allCanes, like many other stores of its kind, is an assortment of Hurricanes gear from T-shirts to office supplies. Then there are jerseys, which inevitably, include numbers.

And there's no coincidence allCanes' website is topped with an ad reading "Be the first to get the EIGHT." Though a name is missing from the back, there's no mistaking it is prominently featured because star running back Duke Johnson wears the No. 8. Revenue from its sale is spread among many parties, but not Johnson since NCAA rules prohibit it.

A growing number of college football observers are questioning whether the NCAA rule is fair.

'The players actually do deserve something for having their jerseys made," Rothwell said. "Nobody can go to our store right now or any store and not know the No. 8 is probably being made this year because of a guy named Duke Johnson. So I tell players over the years, I know exactly how they feel. But we're playing within the

rules that are out there."

A limited edition No. 8 jersey sells for \$119.99 at allCanes, while replicas of No. 31 and No. 57 are marked down from \$59.99 to \$29.99.

The online shop for the Hurricanes' official athletic website has an assortment of jerseys for \$89.95 apiece. The top row includes the No. 8.

"You have to pick some number," Miami athletic director Blake James said. "It's one you have to look at what fans are going to want to wear. Those are guesses many times as to what number the fans are going to want to buy. You try to get an idea from the retailers."

The NCAA's official website contained a link to an outside company selling jerseys until last week. But after it was discovered users could type in star players' names

to find their jersey, that option was pulled from the NCAA website.

Then there's the class-action lawsuit filed by former and current college athletes against the NCAA. The group, led by former UCLA basketball star Ed O'Bannon, sued over the millions made commercially from their images. They seek compensation for all uses of the image after eligibility is exhausted.

Rothwell, however, is looking at alternate ways of returning the favor. He'll pay former Miami basketball star Shane Larkin, who is now in the NBA, to sign autographs in a few weeks simply because he sold so many of his No. 0 jerseys.

"I would love to see, for the players whose jerseys are being made, that there's some kind of stipend given when

they leave or graduate," Rothwell said. "It's the same thing with the EA Sports games, put something aside for them because there's money being made off their successes. The universities tend to think 'It's our U, it's our Gator head, it's our Seminole head,' that they're mine. But our sales and sales across the country go up when our team is winning."

And star players find their numbers on racks more frequently. Seeing his jersey for sale reminds Johnson of his responsibility to produce. Miami starting quarterback Stephen Morris said it's an honor to see his No. 17 jersey in stores, and his mother tries to buy every one she finds.

But is he owed a cut of the profits?

"I don't really know what to say about that," Morris said. "The decision is going to be made when I'm out of the NCAA anyway. I don't have a say in it. It's something that's a business aspect, you have to understand that and move on from it."

James sees no reason for controversy unless the players' names are involved.

"It's hard to understand why people pick the numbers they do," he said. "With that said, we can only make a couple of numbers. ... Obviously, you look at the numbers you think people will wear."

Taking the auction into account, West came up with a well-reasoned defense to beat South's spade game. However, better declarer play would have thwarted even that effort.

After a competitive auction, South bought the hand at four spades. West's double can only be accounted for by the fact that West was aware of declarer's limitations!

West led the king of hearts, on which East contributed the nine to start an echo showing an even number of cards in the suit - in this case obviously four because of East's heart raise. With all the high cards in hearts and diamonds accounted for and South marked with the rest of the spade honors by the auction, West reasoned that East almost surely held the queen and jack of clubs to justify any action, so at trick two West shifted to the king of clubs.

Declarer won with dummy's ace and led a trump to the king. West pounced with the ace and reverted to clubs, East winning with the ten. Now East had to decide whether to persevere with clubs or revert to hearts. He reasoned that, since West surely knew whether a second heart would cash or not, would continue with a third club. West ruffed with the eight to complete a one-trick set.

Good as the defense was, it should never have been permitted to succeed. All declarer needed to assure the contract was to allow West's king of clubs to hold the second trick. Now West would have no way to get East on lead for a club ruff.
