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Canal project spurs concerns

Burnt Store Isles homeowner opposes lock widening

PUNTA GORDA — As Burnt Store Isles prepares to widen its canal lock, one homeowner is not convinced it is a wise use of limited funds.

The project to broaden the passageway from 17 to 21 feet would cost an estimated \$100,000 and come from BSI

Property Owners Association reserve funds. The proposal already has been endorsed by the BSI Canal Advisory Board.

But Bill Hughes questions the project's timing, expense and consequences.

"Is it necessary to spend \$100,000?" he asked.

Hughes is concerned that association reserves

may be needed elsewhere due to heavy summer rains damaging the seawalls. He worries that if the walls don't hold up, the subdivision could be caught short of funds.

"With all this rain coming down, the canal panels could start to collapse," he said.

In addition, Hughes

Empty Bowls for hunger

"It's Sunday, you know? It could be football for some of the guys, people could be doing something else, but they're over here instead, helping out.

Prevention group nets \$625K grant

NORTH PORT — North Port's Alliance for Substance Abuse Prevention group received a \$625,000 grant that will help the organization continue its efforts to keep local youth off drugs.

Gil Kerlikowske, director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy, announced in a release that \$19.8 million in new Drug-Free Communities Support Program grants were being awarded to 147 communities across the country. NP-ASAP was one of the grant recipients and will receive \$125,000 annually over five years in DFC grant funds to involve and engage the community to prevent substance use among youth.

North Port Police Chief Kevin Vespia, chair of NP-ASAP, said there are a lot of things the group is hoping to do with the money to help teens lead healthy and safer lives.

"It will be a hard decision," he said. "We're going to be targeting toward our youth so they're not dependent on substance abuse. We hope to expand what we've already done."

Vespia, who said NP-ASAP has been

Philadelphia architect Milton B. Medary designed the Singing Tower along with sculptor Lee Lawrie (the man behind the bronze Atlas

at Rockefeller Center in New York City). The Tower is made of coquina, marble and ceramic tiles.

"I definitely was in awe," said Tiffany Snider of Pompano Beach, who was visiting for the first time with family. "It's bigger than we expected."

The entire complex is bigger, better and more beautiful than expected.

As you enter the gardens, you are immediately inspired and greeted by a saying from Edward Bok's grandmother: "Make the world a bit better or more beautiful because you have lived in it."

There is an orientation video first-time visitors should see before exploring. It plays in the

Punta Gorda Police Chief Albert “Butch” Arenal received a standing ovation when he stepped up to accept the Pinnacle Business of the Year Award for the department at the Punta Gorda Chamber of Commerce's Annual Awards Dinner Saturday night.

“I have to share this with our city manager, Howard Kunik, and our mayor, Bill Albers, because we couldn't do what we do without them,” Arenal said.

In other categories, the Large Business of the Year award went to Fishermen's Village; Medium Business of the Year to Spa One Day Spa and Salon; and VIP Financial Services received Small Business of the Year honors. Peace River Wildlife Center was awarded Non-Profit of the Year, while Newcomer of the Year was awarded to Foot

Landing.

“We listened to the community, and everyone said we needed a running store here,” said owner Sherri Lennon.

The Members Choice award went to the Animal Welfare League. “It's been a tough year, but thanks to all of you, we pulled through,” said Sharon Thomas, AWL executive director, as she accepted the award.

Sue Randall, owner of Village Fish Market, received the Diplomat of the Year award for earning the most points by attending chamber functions and bringing in new members.

John Wright, president of the Punta Gorda Chamber of Commerce, announced that he would be awarding two President's Awards this year. The first went to Bill and Kate Albers for their dedication to the community, and the second to Dr. Pat Land, president of the Charlotte campus of Edison State College, “...who sometimes doesn't get the accolades

she should,” said Wright.

Two “saloon ladies” from the Charlotte Players provided levity for the evening, followed by Vido and Guido, who wheeled in a mysterious, large package. Inside was Ron Monck, outgoing chairman of the board. The audience was treated to a montage of “the man, the myth and the legend.”

“Thank you all for allowing me to do this; it's been the highlight of my career,” said Monck.

Monck cited the variety of events the chamber held over the year to promote business, including Latin Fest, garage sales, craft sales, Business over Breakfast, luncheons and 62 ribbon-cuttings.

A Savannah hurricane is what Helen Salins remembers most about WWII

Helen Salins of Polynesian Village man-
ufactured home park in
North Englewood joined
the WAVES during World
War II. She was 25
and already a talented
artist and a graduate
of Northwestern
University with a degree
in English.

“I got in the WAVES
(Women Accepted for
Volunteer Emergency
Service) because I had
two dear friends who
were killed at the start
of the war. One was
shot down over enemy
territory in his plane
and the other commit-
ted suicide on the way
to being drafted.

“I think I was one of
the first 1,600 WAVES
to sign up. I started out
as an ensign and four
years later, when I was
discharged from the
Navy, I was a lieutenant
senior grade,” she said.

“My entire four years I
did typing, bookkeeping
and personnel work at
various posts around
the country.

“My most exciting
adventure of the war
was during a hurricane
that hit Savannah, Ga.
I had never been in a
storm like that before,”
Salins said. “The storm
was wonderful and so
exciting. It bent the
palms in Savannah in
half.

“I was the duty officer
during the storm and
couldn’t leave my post.
It was my job to get the
troops off the street
and protected. I wasn’t
afraid — it didn’t occur
to me at the time.”

After she finished her
time on duty, the young
WAVE headed back to
her hotel room at the
Gen. Oglethorpe Hotel
in Savannah.

“The water in the

lobby of the hotel was
ankle-deep. The hotel
staff placed brick piers
linked together by
wooden planks across
the lobby so we could
stay out of the storm-
water in the building,”
Salins explained. “Then
the hotel’s staff invited
everyone to come in
and have a meal for a
dollar. They came in
from all over.

“The wind blew so
hard (that) rainwater
was seeping into the
building through the
hotel’s brick walls. They
took the hotel’s laundry
and stacked it up, trying
to stem the water that
was coming through the
walls.”

Eventually Salins
moved out of the hotel.

“I rented a house on
the beach. The beach
was wonderful,” she
said. “Coming from
Chicago, I wasn’t used
to the beautiful weather
and the wonderful
beach they had.”

Savannah was a far
cry from her first duty
station of Cleveland,
Ohio. But Cleveland had
some advantages, too.
Salins spent much of
her off time visiting art
museums and art shows
around town.

“I always wanted to be
an artist from the time I
was very small, but my
mother told me, ‘You
must be able to earn a
living so you must get a
real job,’” she said.

That’s why she got
an English degree at
Northwestern and end-
ed up teaching school
for a couple of years.
But art was always her
first love.

After a few months
in Cleveland, Salins
requested a transfer
to California. They
sent her to Savannah.
The last year or so of
the Second World War,
she was transferred to

“I worked in the
Navy’s coding depart-
ment in D.C. for a while.
It was mostly typewriter
work,” she said.

About the only thing
she remembers about
her job was that she got
her hands dirty because
of the ink the Navy used
in its decoding work. She
has no idea what they
were decoding or why.

Come V-J (Victory
over Japan) Day,
Aug. 15, 1945, and the
end of the war, Salins
was given a choice of
reupping, staying in the
Navy and being trans-
ferred to the personnel
department or getting
out and going home.
She chose the latter.

She had served four
long years in the service
and was looking for
something different
to do. Salins found it

when she met her future
husband, Harold.

“I met a hometown
boy who had served in
the Army in World War
II. We got married in
1947,” she said.

Years later the couple
opened a women’s
clothing store in a
Chicago suburb that
they ran for years. They
decided to retire and
move to the Englewood
area in 1981. Six years
later, Harold died.

They have two daugh-
ters, Lois and Barbara.
On April 18, 2014, Helen
Salins will celebrate her
100th birthday.

That’s what’s so cool about it.” Joann Winkler, a teacher at Liberty Elementary School and the leader behind Empty Bowls in Charlotte County, explained that the charity actually started in Michigan, and has since become international.



The bowls from Sunday’s Empty Bowls event came in a variety of shapes and sizes. The bowls will be fired in a kiln so that volunteers can return Sept. 29 to paint and glaze them. The finished products will be donated to the Empty Bowls dinner fundraiser.

applying for grants for the past four years, added they are hoping to have access to the first round of funding by the end of October. “It’s all about

to certain memberships allows members to set their own schedule at the gym. doesn’t want the wider lock to serve as an invitation to larger boats entering the BSI canal system. But Doug Rhees, president of Burnt Store Isles POA and a member of the Canal Advisory Board, said the issue is boater safety. “Our goal is not to allow bigger boats into

the neighborhood but to allow safer passage,” he said. Rhees said boats, large and small, now have trouble maneuvering through the narrow strip, explaining that dealing with the fluctuating winds and tides is a constant challenge. He said larger boats have an even tougher time. “It’s a tight turn to get into the narrow trough,” he said. The batter boards that buffer the canal lock

show the wear and tear over the years. And boats that knock into them don’t fare any better. “It’s an expensive event,” Rhees said. By simply removing two four-foot-by-four-foot cement blocks that serve as a buttress, the lock can be expanded and made safer, he said. “I think it will make a huge difference.” In addition, Rhees believes the increased waterway access will enhance home values in

Burnt Store Isles, which has 900-plus waterfront lots. The improvement also would make the subdivision more competitive with Punta Gorda Isles, which has less of a restriction on boat size into their neighborhood, he said. As for the price tag, Rhees said BSI is in good enough financial shape to absorb the cost without the need for a special assessment. He said BSI will spend only about \$160,000 of this

year’s \$220,000 budget for seawall repair and replacement, which is paid through the city’s canal maintenance assessments. Gary Disher, canal maintenance supervisor for Punta Gorda, said despite the daily downpours, there has been only minimal damage to Burnt Store Isles seawalls as a result of the rain. “We haven’t had any major failures at all,” he said, crediting the city’s proactive maintenance

policy that repairs flaws before they fail. Disher explained that the wider canal would, no doubt, result in safer passage, adding that the Florida Department of Environmental Protection already has given preliminary approval for the project. “They’re on board with what we need to do,” he said. “There’s very little overall impact (on the environment); it’s almost negligible.” Email: groberts@sun-herald.com

Sunnybrook sidewalk project gets mixed reactions

ENGLEWOOD — Linsey Peyton is an avid runner and, thanks to a sidewalk project on Sunnybrook Boulevard, she'll soon be able to run a little more safely in her own neighborhood.

“They just got here,” said Peyton, who lives on Sunnybrook. “I think it's wonderful they're doing sidewalks so I can go running without dealing with some of the crazy drivers here.”

The only complaint she has is how the presence of the construction crew building the sidewalk from South Access Road to Boundary Boulevard in Rotonda makes her dogs anxious. It's a sentiment shared by her neighbor,

Shelli Rainey.

“I'm not happy with it,” Rainey said. “The (construction) mess has blocked our driveway. We had to park in our neighbor's driveway (Thursday). My dogs are going crazy because of this.”

Rainey said there isn't a call for the sidewalk and in her more than two years of living on Sunnybrook Boulevard, she's not seen one person walk on the road.

“I don't see any purpose in this sidewalk,” she said.

Nick Barnes, who moved to the area in January, said the construction is only a slight nuisance.

“I feel the time of the year could have been better chosen considering the season,” Barnes said. “It

just might be better to do the construction at night. The only notice we had was from the electronic sign down the road.”

The sidewalks will be 8 feet wide, according to Charlotte County project manager John Elias.

“The cost of the project is \$502,635,” Elias said. “It was funded through the sales tax program. The project was in design and planning for a year.”

Elias said the project should take 150 days.

“We're excited to build this on Englewood East connecting South Access Road to an existing sidewalk on Boundary Boulevard,” he said. “This will connect to a future project on Gulfstream and Oceanspray boulevards.”

Don't take the quick buck of 'surplus' sale

OUR POSITION: *Surplus sensitive land? Not in this case.*

The good news last week was that the state trimmed the amount of “surplus” land it had proposed to sell in the Charlotte Harbor region from 45 to 28 acres.

The bad news? There is still some on the list. The Charlotte-area properties were on a computer-generated list of preserved state land the Department of Environmental Conservation considered potentially “surplus.” The Legislature came up with the scheme to sell the “surplus” — presumably less-sensitive land — to generate as much as \$50 million and use it to buy other land — presumably more-environmentally sensitive. Sounds reasonable.

The problem is that “surplus” is something that sounds reasonable in the abstract, but often is far less so in reality. After all, the Charlotte Harbor Preserve State Park alone has some 42,000 acres. So how can removal of 28 hurt?

Two well-respected environmental groups believe it will. The Lemon Bay Conservancy and the Charlotte Harbor National Estuary Program have objected, and their objections sound solid.

In a memo released last Thursday, estuary program director Lisa Beever wrote a point-by-point dissection of the proposed sites, situated in the Charlotte Harbor Preserve, Cayo Costa State Park, Gasparilla Island State Park and the Yucca Pens Preserve, an area along Burnt Store Road in Charlotte and Lee counties.

She suggested one should be better managed by the DEP, not sold. About another, she wrote, “Maintaining control of these hydrological connections may become important in the near future to ensure appropriate (or at least better) freshwater flows to the Charlotte Harbor Preserve.” Other parcels were “not buildable” or were sensitive fish habitat. Yucca Pens will become “more valuable” for conservation as Burnt Store Road is widened.

Members of the Lemon Bay Conservancy also argued vigorously that the parcels were small pieces of a larger network of preserved property that is critical habitat for juvenile fish.

So far, the DEP has removed some 1,000 acres from its list, including Cayo Costa property bought years ago and now underwater. Throughout the state, local environmental groups are pushing back. No wonder.

As reasonable as this idea may have sounded in the abstract, the reality is something else. It's an exercise that is generating ill will and is likely to bring in far less than originally advertised. The process could poke small holes in our preserved-lands network and bring unwanted development along the coast.

The fact is, we'd much rather see a renewed commitment to the two-decade-old Florida Forever program. Instead of nickel-and-diming preservation — from 45 acres to 28 acres to three or four — how about re-investment in wildlife habitat, wetlands and the preservation of sensitive lands?

Public interest groups have begun a campaign to put a Water and Land Conservation Amendment on next year's ballot. By constitutional amendment, it would set aside 33 percent of net proceeds from documentary taxes — a tax on real estate transfers — for land conservation programs.

It would ensure a continued flow of state funding for conservation. That's seems a far better idea than the questionable practice of selling off land we already own for something else down the road.

The billionaire vs. the plumber

Michael Bloomberg is the mayor of New York and a media mogul who weekends in Bermuda and whose net worth is an estimated \$27 billion. Victor Head runs a plumbing business with his brother in Pueblo, Colo.

The two clashed from a distance in the Colorado gun recalls, and Head gave the billionaire a righteous drubbing. The defeat of two pro-gun-control Colorado state senators in recall elections sends a message that should be heard all the way back on the Upper East Side, and maybe even in Hamilton.

It wasn't too long ago that Bloomberg's Mayors Against Illegal Guns was supposed to be the great equalizer in the gun debate. This was before dozens of mayors quit the organization, some

of them explaining that it had dawned on them that the group wasn't against illegal guns so much as for making more guns illegal. And before the Colorado recall.

The gun-control measures at issue are relatively mild compared with what gun-control advocates truly want. Colorado limited magazines to 15 rounds and imposed background checks on private transactions. Nevertheless, it was a career-ending vote for the two targeted Democrats.

The recallees, state Senate President John Morse of Colorado Springs and Sen. Angela Giron of Pueblo, weren't fighting on hostile territory. In terms of registration, Morse's district is split three ways among Democrats, Republicans and independents. Giron's district is a heavily working-class area that has been a Democratic stronghold forever.

It was always thought that Morse could go down, and he did by 51 percent to 49 percent. That Giron would follow him and by a larger margin, 56-44, was shocking.

Democratic National Committee Chairwoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz waved off the defeats. She blamed "voter suppression, pure and simple," and the National Rifle Association and the Koch brothers.

It is true that the recall didn't have Colorado's accustomed voting by mail and turnout was low, but it was a free and fair election. As for the NRA and the Koch-backed group Americans for Prosperity, they certainly played in Colorado. The pro-recall forces were still badly outspent, by as much as 8-to-1 according to some estimates. Mayor Bloomberg wrote a check for \$350,000.

For his part, Victor Head embarked months ago on a grass-roots campaign to take on city hall. When he heard that Colorado was going to adopt new gun-control measures in the wake of Newtown, Conn., Head initiated what would become the recall with that most fearsome of political weapons — some fliers.

He printed and

distributed them to local gun clubs to make people aware of an upcoming townhall meeting for Giron. Head got dozens of people there, but he felt Giron short-circuited the discussion. At the next town hall, he again handed out fliers to build a crowd, but this time Giron ruled that the discussion was to be exclusively about mortgages.

Head still got Giron to agree to hold one more town hall before the vote on guns, and this time roughly 1,000 people showed up. If Giron didn't realize then that she had a populist revolt on her hands, she needed to be in a different line of work — and now she is.

What so got under Head's skin, the sense that his representative wasn't listening to him, added fuel to the recalls

more broadly. Morse turned away people who wanted to testify on the measures in the Senate. It was a notable act of highhandedness in a body that, as Dave Kopel of the Colorado-based Independence Institute points out, usually has limitless patience for citizen input.

The anti-recall side can now make excuses, but it used to be clear-eyed about the stakes. In an interview with The New Republic prior to the recall, Giron explained, "For Mayors Against Illegal Guns, if they lose even one of these seats, they might as well fold it up. And they understand that."

Score one for the plumber.

Obama, the reluctant warrior on Syria

On Tuesday, President Obama made the case for a limited military strike in Syria if diplomacy fails.

But he still sounded like a man looking for an escape hatch.

"I've spent 4 ½ years working to end wars, not to start them," he said. "Our troops are out of Iraq. Our troops are coming home from Afghanistan. And I know Americans want all of us in Washington — especially me — to concentrate on the task of building our nation here at home."

He'd hit that same reluctant warrior theme in a spate of television interviews the day before the speech. In those appearances, the president returned again and again to all the reasons he hoped to avoid military action against Syria, and said very little about his once-fervent goal of driving Syrian President Bashar Assad out of power.

"This is not a problem I'm looking for," he told CBS. "I'm not looking for an excuse to engage in military action. My

central goal throughout this process has not been to embroil ourselves in a civil war."

It's also clear that Obama would prefer not to launch even limited airstrikes over the opposition of most Americans and Congress. As he told NBC: "For me, the president, to act without consensus in a situation where there's not a direct imminent threat to the homeland or (U.S.) interests around the world, well, that's not the precedent I want to set."

Small wonder that Obama embraced the sudden (if still unlikely) prospect of a negotiated deal with enthusiasm, and even took pains not to set the talks' goals too high.

"My narrow concern," he said, "is making sure that Assad does not use

these chemical weapons again."

That's a narrow goal that now, thanks to an unexpected diplomatic assist from Russia, of all countries, just might be achievable — unlike Obama's attempts to move public opinion, win a vote in Congress or build an international alliance in favor of military action.

It's been a bad three weeks for Obama and his foreign policy team. A president who proclaimed that use of chemical weapons would cross a "red line" discovered that a Syrian despot was willing to call his bluff not once but a dozen times.

A president who relied on antiwar eloquence to win his job found it harder to move public opinion when he tried to sell a military intervention he didn't sound completely sold on himself.

A president whose foreign policy was based on rejecting unilateralism found himself without many allies after Britain's prime minister couldn't persuade his Parliament either.

A president who prides himself on running a no-drama White House couldn't keep his staff on the same page: Secretary of State John F. Kerry has consistently sounded more hawkish than the president, and Army Gen. Martin Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, more skeptical.

White House aides tried to spin Russia's offer as the product of Obama's deft diplomacy, but it didn't look so deft close up. Instead, Obama's missteps turned what could have been a brief episode — the initial plan was for about 48 hours of missile strikes that would have been over a week ago — into a long-running melodrama.

Obama has belatedly discovered something Bill Clinton and other presidents learned the hard way: It's possible to commit U.S. military forces to action without much public support, but only if you bring clarity, resolve, patient diplomatic preparation and an impressive list of allies.

Now the president

is hoping that Assad and Russia's Vladimir Putin will help him find a way out. They may, but there's no reason to expect that they'll make it easy.

In any case, Syria's chemical weapons aren't likely to disappear quickly. Even if Assad follows through on his foreign minister's promise to join the Chemical Weapons Convention, implementing the treaty normally takes years.

Libya's Moammar Gadhafi signed up in 2004, but only about half the country's stockpile of weapons had been destroyed by the time he fell seven years later.

The United States and Russia are still dismantling their chemical weapons arsenals, even though more than two decades have passed since the end of the Cold War.

Besides, in the Middle East, every silver lining has a cloud. It's not clear what impact even a successful outcome of the chemical weapons crisis would have on the larger problem of Syria's civil war. Obama said he hoped a diplomatic

solution on chemical weapons might lead to a peaceful resolution of the larger conflict.


But one of his own former advisors on Syria, Frederic C. Hof of the Atlantic Council, says the outcome could work the other way, especially if Congress makes it clear that it won't authorize military action.

"Without the credible threat of military force on the table, (Assad) will return to business as usual, killing and terrorizing large numbers of civilians using conventional weapons," Hof warned.


U.S. policy on the Syrian civil war has often seemed like a search for the least bad option. Even now, when a diplomatic solution to the chemical weapons crisis seems possible, that's still true. Assad may agree to stop gassing his enemies, but Syria's larger problems are a long way from being solved.

Obama's role questioned

Lawmakers debate whether US was outfoxed on Syria

WASHINGTON — Lawmakers assessing the agreement on Syria's chemical weapons argued Sunday about whether President Barack Obama was outfoxed by the Russians and had lost leverage in trying to end the civil war, or whether

his threat of military action propelled the breakthrough. Obama said the turn to diplomacy had laid "a foundation" toward political settlement of the conflict. The deal announced Saturday in Geneva by U.S. and Russian diplomats sets an ambitious timetable for elimination of Syria's chemical weapons by

mid-2014, with rapid deadlines including complete inventory of its chemical arsenal within a week and immediate access by international inspectors to chemical weapons sites. The agreement came in response to an Aug. 21 chemical weapons attack near Damascus, the capital, that the U.S. believes was carried

out by the government of Syrian President Bashar Assad. Republican lawmakers said that committing to remove or destroy Syria's chemical weapons was laudable, but the agreement fell short by not mandating military action should Assad fail to comply.

Report: Many US bridges old, risky and run-down

WASHINGTON (AP) — Motorists coming off the Frederick Douglass Memorial Bridge into Washington are treated to a postcard-perfect view of the U.S. Capitol. The bridge itself, however, is about as ugly as it gets: The steel underpinnings have thinned since the structure was built in 1950, and the span is pocked with rust and crumbling concrete. District of Columbia officials were so worried about a catastrophic failure that they shored up the horizontal beams to prevent the bridge from falling into the Anacostia River. And safety concerns about the Douglass bridge, which is used by more than 70,000 vehicles daily, are far from unique.

An Associated Press analysis of 607,380 bridges in the most recent federal National Bridge Inventory showed that 65,605 were classified as "structurally deficient" and 20,808 as "fracture critical." Of those, 7,795 were both — a combination of red flags that experts say indicate significant disrepair and similar risk of collapse. A bridge is deemed fracture critical when it doesn't have redundant protections and is at risk of collapse if a single, vital component fails. A bridge is structurally deficient when it is in need of rehabilitation or replacement because at least one major component of the span has advanced deterioration or other problems that lead inspectors to deem its condition poor or worse. Florida bridges among sturdiest in nation

ORLANDO — Whether it's durable construction, attentive maintenance or just a fortunate geography that doesn't include the freeze and frost-filled winters of the North, Florida's bridges

continue to be among the sturdiest in the nation. The Florida Department of Transportation said that of the 6,661 bridges it maintains and another 2,496 bridges it inspected last year that are owned by local jurisdictions, 17 have structural deficiencies and

two are fracture critical. One is a small drawbridge owned by Miami-Dade County that crosses the Miami River. The other, Broad Causeway Drawbridge, is owned by the city of Miami. Combined they have a daily traffic average of more than 25,000. But FDOT says structural deficiencies

in both spans are being addressed. Florida Transportation Secretary Ananth Prasad said the state's approach to bridge care helps keep the number of bridges in the two red-flag categories low.

30 years later, ban on gay blood donors endures

NEW YORK — The U.S. gay-rights movement has achieved many victories in recent years — on marriage, military service and other fronts. Yet one vestige of an earlier, more wary era remains firmly in place: the 30-year-old nationwide ban on blood donations by gay and bisexual men. Dating from the first years of the AIDS epidemic, the ban is a source of frustration to many gay activists, and also to many leading players

in the nation's health and blood-supply community who have joined in calling for change. In June, the American Medical Association voted to oppose the policy. AMA board member William Kobler called it "discriminatory and not based on sound science." Last month, more than 80 members of Congress wrote to the Department of Health and Human Services, criticizing the lifetime ban as an outdated measure that perpetuates inaccurate stereotypes about gay men.

Alabama church marks 50th anniversary of bombing

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Hundreds of people black and white, many holding hands, filled an Alabama church that was bombed by the Ku Klux Klan 50 years ago Sunday to mark the anniversary of the blast that killed four little girls and became a landmark moment in the civil rights struggle.

The Rev. Arthur Price taught the same Sunday school lesson that members of 16th Street Baptist Church heard the morning of the bombing — “A Love That Forgives.” Then, the rusty old church bell was tolled four times as the girls’ names were read.

Bombing survivor Sarah Collins Rudolph, who lost her right eye and sister Addie Mae Collins in the blast, stood by as members laid a wreath at the spot where the dynamite device was placed along an outside wall.

Rudolph was 12 at the time, and her family left the church after the bombing. She said it was important to return in memory of her sister, who was 14, and the three other girls who died: Carole Robertson and Cynthia Wesley Morris, both 14, and Denise McNair, 11.

“God spared me to live and tell just what happened on that day,” said Rudolph, who testified against the Klansmen convicted years later in the bombing.

and visitors sang the old hymn “Love Lifted Me” and joined hands in prayer. The somber Sunday school lesson was followed by a raucous, packed worship service with gospel music and believers waving their hands.

During the sermon, the Rev. Julius Scruggs of Huntsville, president of the National Baptist Convention USA, said, “God said you may murder four little girls, but you won’t murder the dream of justice and liberty for all.”

Later Sunday, Attorney General Eric Holder and others were set to attend a commemoration. Former Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, a Birmingham native who went to school with McNair, was among the scheduled speakers.

The dynamite bomb went off outside the church Sept. 15, 1963. Of the Klansmen convicted years later, one remains imprisoned. Two others died in prison.

Two young men, both black, were shot to death in Birmingham in the chaos

that followed the bombing.

Birmingham was strictly segregated at the time of the bombing, which occurred as city schools were being racially integrated for the first time. The all-black 16th Street Baptist was a gathering spot for civil rights demonstrations for months before the blast.

The bombing became a powerful symbol of the depth of racial hatred in the South and helped build momentum for later laws, including the 1964 Civil Rights Act and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Floods transform Colorado’s ‘Gore-Tex Vortex’

LYONS, Colo. (AP) — The cars that normally clog Main Street in Lyons on the way to Rocky Mountain National Park have been replaced by military supply trucks. Shop owners in Estes Park hurriedly cleared their wares in fear that the Big Thompson River will rise again. A plywood sign encouraged residents mucking out their homes to “Hang in there.”

Days of rain and floods have transformed the outdoory mountain communities in Colorado’s Rocky Mountain foothills affectionately known “The Gore-Tex Vortex” from a paradise into a disaster area with little in the way of supplies or services — and more rain falling Sunday.

The string of communities from Boulder to Estes Park, the gateway to Rocky Mountain National Park, is a base for backpackers and nature lovers where blue-collar and yuppie sensibilities exist

side by side. Now, roadways have crumbled, scenic bridges are destroyed, the site of the bluegrass festival is washed out and most shops are closed.

Chris Rodes, one of Lyons’ newest residents, said the change is so drastic that he is considering moving away just two weeks after settling there.

“It’s not the same,” Rodes said. “All these beautiful places, it’s just brown mud.”

Estes Park town administrator Frank Lancaster said visitors who would normally flock there during the golden September days should stay away for at least a month, but it could take a year or longer for many of the mountain roadways to be repaired.

Meanwhile, people were still trapped, the nearby hamlet of Glen Haven has been “destroyed” and the continuing rain threatened a new round of flooding, he said.

“We are all crossing our fingers and praying,” he said.

The residents who remained or began trickling back — if they were allowed to do so — were left to watch out for one another. Restaurateurs and grocers in Lyons were distributing food to their neighbors as others arrived in groups carrying supplies.

Scott Martin, 25, drove the half-hour from Boulder Saturday to deliver drinking water and gasoline to a friend’s parents. He fled Lyons amid a torrential downpour on Wednesday night after the mountain stream that cuts through town gushed into his basement.

Martin grew up tubing down the river and hiking the mountains, and like many residents, he still jumps in the water after work. Looking into the cottonwood and aspen trees at the outskirts of town, he wondered when he would be able to do

those things again.

“Best case, it’s just mud everywhere; in everyone’s yard and all the streets,” he said.

From the mountain communities east to the plains city of Fort Morgan, numerous pockets of individuals remained cut off by the flooding. Sunday’s rain hampered the helicopter searches, and rescuers trekked by ground up dangerous canyon roads to reach some of those homes isolated since Wednesday.

The surging waters have been deadly, with four people confirmed dead and two more missing and presumed dead after their homes were swept away.

Hundreds of people have still not been heard from, but with phone service being restored to some of the areas over the weekend, officials hoped that number would drop as they contacted more stranded people.

Obama: Russia doesn’t share US ‘values’ in Syria

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama says a U.S.-Russian agreement offers a chance to destroy Syria’s stockpile of chemical weapons and promises to end the threat they pose to Syrians and the world.

But the two powers are divided over the fate of Syrian President Bashar Assad. Obama, speaking in a television interview taped before Saturday’s announcement of the chemical weapons deal, said Russian President Vladimir Putin is “protecting” Assad and doesn’t share American “values” in Syria.

“He has a different attitude about the Assad regime,” Obama told ABC’s “This Week.”

“But what I’ve also said to him directly is that we both have an interest in preventing chaos, we both have an interest in preventing terrorism. The situation in Syria right now is untenable. As long as Mr. Assad’s in power, there is going to be some sort of conflict there.”

Obama’s interview was taped Friday and aired Sunday.

Police: Ohio mobile home fire kills man, 5 kids

TIFFIN, Ohio (AP) — A fire swept through a mobile home Sunday morning, killing a man and five young children, police said.

The fire was reported shortly before 8 a.m. Sunday in a mobile home park in Tiffin, about 50 miles southeast of Toledo, city police said in a release.

Part of the mobile home was engulfed in flames when fire crews arrived, police said. Fire crews pulled the man and the children from the home, and all six were taken to Tiffin Mercy Hospital, where they were later pronounced dead, police said.

Police did not immediately release the identities of those killed or comment on a possible cause.

Neighbors in the park of about 85 mobile homes said a man lived in the home with his girlfriend, their son and the girlfriend’s four daughters. They estimated that the five children ranged in age from about 1 to about 5 or 6. The woman was at work at a fast-food restaurant when the fire occurred, they said.

HOUSTON (AP) — Celebrity cook Paula Deen fought back tears as she was greeted by a supportive crowd during an appearance at a Houston cooking show.

Saturday’s event was Deen’s first public appearance since June when it was revealed that in an earlier legal deposition she acknowledged using racial slurs in the past. Within a few days the Food Network yanked her show off the air, Smithfield Foods dropped her as a celebrity endorser, and retailers such as Walmart removed her products from shelves.

The Houston Chronicle reports about 1,500 people gave Deen a standing ovation Saturday when she appeared at the Metropolitan Cooking & Entertaining Show. She told them their hearts were “as big as your state.”

Deen held two cooking demonstrations, including tips on how to make peanut butter pie.

Summers withdraws name from Fed consideration

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lawrence Summers, who was considered the leading candidate to replace current Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke, has withdrawn his name from consideration, the White House said Sunday.

In a statement, President Barack Obama said he had accepted Summers’ decision.

“Larry was a critical member of my team as we faced down the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression, and it was in no small part because of his expertise, wisdom and leadership that we wrestled the economy back to growth and made the kind of progress we are seeing today,” Obama said. As director of the National Economic Council, Summers oversaw the administration’s response to the economic and financial crisis early in Obama’s first term.

Still, Summers faced opposition from some Democrats, including members of the Senate Banking Committee. Summers alluded to the opposition to his candidacy in a letter he sent to Obama Sunday to formally withdraw from consideration.

Report: Radiation in bunker 7 times above normal

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — A military report says a contaminated bunker discovered at a West Texas military post had nearly seven times more than the accepted level of radiation.

The El Paso Times obtained a July 3 report on the bunker at the Biggs Army Airfield at Fort Bliss in El Paso.

The newspaper reported that military inspectors found high levels of uranium in one specific location. University of Texas at El Paso expert John Walton says the amount of contamination was “not huge.”

Walton says workers in the bunker may have inhaled or swallowed contaminated paint chips, which would have led to a “very small and limited exposure of soldiers” over a half-century.

That lines up with Fort Bliss officials’ statements downplaying the threat of radiation exposure from the bunker.

Ariz. mom booked in Calif. death of children

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) — Two children found dead in a Southern California hotel room after their suicidal mother crashed her car outside a shopping complex were a 13-year-old boy and a 10-year-old girl, a police spokesman said Sunday.

The children’s mother, Marilyn Edge, 42, of Scottsdale, Ariz., was arrested Saturday and booked on suspicion of murder in the deaths, Santa Ana police Cpl. Anthony Bertagna said. She was expected in court Tuesday for an arraignment hearing.

Further information, including the names of the children, the motive and the cause of death, was not being released, he said. The children’s father lives out-of-state and was not notified of their deaths until Sunday.

Edge was driving a car with Georgia license plates when she crashed into an electrical box outside a shopping complex in Costa Mesa on Saturday morning. After the crash, Edge refused to get out of the car and tried to choke herself with a belt or rope as rescuers worked to free her, he said. Police found propane in Edge’s car.

Deputies: Man who couldn't swim drowned in pool

DAVIE (AP) — Authorities say a Broward County man who couldn't swim drowned in a pool. Detectives are investigating the death of 28-year-old Anish John from Davie. They say he died early Sunday morning, a few hours after jumping into a swimming pool at a party. A sheriff's office report says John was under water for several minutes before other party-goers noticed him, pulled him out and tried CPR. Fire rescue transported him to Holy Cross Hospital where he was pronounced dead after 1 a.m. Authorities have not said why John jumped into the pool.

1 killed, 1 injured when car explodes outside home

DESTIN (AP) — Authorities in northwest Florida are investigating a car explosion outside a vacation home that killed one person and injured another person visiting from Illinois. The state fire marshal's office said Sunday that the explosion was accidental and there's no indication of foul play. Firefighters, paramedics and deputies responded to reports of a loud explosion and fire on Saturday evening in Destin. The Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office says 35-year-old Michael Todd Brower from his injuries and 58-year-old Luis Lopez remains in critical condition at Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola. Both were visiting from Illinois. The investigation continues.

Miami seeks changes in '98 homeless settlement

MIAMI (AP) — The city of Miami is asking a federal judge to make changes in a 1998 settlement governing the way homeless people are treated. One change proposed in this week's filing would permit Miami police to arrest homeless people if they refuse to take a bed in a shelter. It would also allow shelters to substitute floor mats when there aren't enough beds. When the settlement was approved there were several thousand homeless people living on Miami streets. City officials now say there are about 800 chronically homeless. Still, downtown businesses, arts and sports facilities and residents say the presence of so many homeless is bad for business and tourism. The city also seeks modification of the settlements rules on littering, fires and temporary structures in parks, public nudity and others.

Possible sinkhole forces residents from apartments

MOUNT DORA (AP) — Several residents are being forced out of their central Florida apartments because of a possible sinkhole. Five families living at the Hampton Villas Apartments in Mount Dora have been moved out on Sunday as engineers inspect the building. Resident Nestor Concepcion tells WFTV: "Not only is the floor going down, the walls are coming in." Yellow caution tape surrounds the building and there are red signs that warn residents the structure is severely damaged and it's unsafe to enter.

Man arrested for shooting outside Orlando Walmart

ORLANDO (AP) — A man has been arrested for firing shots in a Walmart parking lot in Orlando. An Orange County Sheriff's Office report says deputies responded to the scene Sunday morning and found 43-year-old Rodney Drake Summers on the ground near the entrance of the store with his arms and legs spread. He was pointed out by witnesses as the shooter. Summers claimed someone had stolen his bicycle and told deputies he was trying to get it back. He approached three people and pulled out his gun, firing several rounds into the ground and another in the air. No one was injured. He was taken into custody and charged with reckless discharge of a firearm, reckless display of a firearm and aggravated assault.

8 teens charged with inciting riot at facility

FORT WALTON BEACH (AP) — Eight teens are being charged with inciting a riot at a juvenile detention facility in Fort Walton Beach. The Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office announced the charges on Sunday. The riot happened Saturday night at the Gulf Coast Treatment Center, a detention facility contracted by the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice. Deputies were called to the scene after reports that the teens were assaulting the staff and damaging facility property. Police also arrived to help control the situation. Staff members say some of the teens began throwing chairs and flipping tables. A sheriff's office statement says one teen took a staffer's radio and began speaking gang jargon.



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Crist prepares to run for old job with new party

OCALA (AP) — Charlie Crist hopes that the hug that hurt him becomes the hug that now heals him. Democratic President Barack Obama embraced Crist, then Florida's Republican governor, at a 2009 rally. Republican Marco Rubio used the image to successfully chase Crist from the GOP and defeat Crist, running as an independent, in the 2010 U.S. Senate race. Now Gov. Rick Scott also is using the hug to attack Crist. The difference is Crist is now a Democrat and embracing the hug. "That hug cost me more than you'll know with my former party," Crist said at a Marion County Democratic fundraising dinner this month. "But that hug today has a whole different feel to it."

Once one of the state's most successful Republican politicians, Crist is nine months into his new life as a Democrat and is preparing to run for his old job with his new party. And considering Obama carried Florida twice, the hug may not be a bad thing as Crist tries to convince Democrats he's one of them and not just a politician trying to redefine himself and jump-start a dead political career. "I'm proud to be a Democrat!" Crist said to enormous applause as he began speaking at the sold-out dinner. "We're proud to have you," a guest shouted back. By the end of the 28-minute speech, there was another shout: "Run, Charlie!" It seems clear Crist intends to run, and it's highly expected he'll do so. He's been building up to an announcement for more than a year. Last summer he spoke at the Democratic National Convention and campaigned with and for Obama in Florida. In December, he made

the full conversion to Democrat, tweeting a photo of himself holding his voter registration card while standing in the White House. And with a new fundraising quarter starting Oct. 1 and a major Florida Democratic Party conference at the end of October, it makes sense to announce soon. Crist says he'll make a decision in the fall. He'd immediately become the front-runner in a race that now has only one credible candidate — former state Sen. Nan Rich, who has struggled to raise the money needed for a statewide campaign. There are reasons Democrats could be skeptical of Crist — as the Republican Party of Florida has pointed out almost daily for more than a year. In the past, he's said he is a Jeb Bush and Ronald Reagan Republican. He's praised Sarah Palin. He repeatedly said it would be hard to find anyone more conservative than he is. But even when he was a Republican, there were those in the GOP who thought Crist was too

close to the middle, and there were Democrats who praised him. Republican Tom Gallagher repeatedly called Crist a liberal when the two challenged each other for the 2006 GOP nomination. And shortly after Crist took office, then-Rep. Terry Fields endearingly called Crist, who is white, Florida's first black governor. So some Democrats see the transition as natural. "I had a pretty good seat to how he governed as a Republican, and

I found very little to disagree with," said Dan Gelber, a former Senate Democratic leader. That included expanding early voting in 2008, being a leader on climate change, vetoing a bill that would have required ultrasounds before abortions, vetoing a teacher merit pay bill and restoring voting rights for non-violent ex-felons. Scott has since signed ultrasound and teacher merit pay bills and reversed Crist's effort to allow ex-felons the right to vote.



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15 dead as tropical storm, hurricane batter Mexico

ACAPULCO, Mexico (AP) — Tropical Storm Manuel edged onto Mexico’s Pacific coast Sunday while Hurricane Ingrid swirled offshore on the other side of the country, as heavy rains and landslides caused at least 15 deaths and led authorities to evacuate thousands.

Stormy conditions led some communities in affected states to cancel Independence Day celebrations planned for Sunday and Monday.

The U.S. National Hurricane Center said Manuel began to weaken as soon as it made landfall near the port of Manzanillo during the afternoon, but remained a threat to produce flash floods and mudslides. It was predicted to dissipate by Monday.

In the southern coastal state of Guerrero, six people died when they lost control of their SUV on a rain-swept highway headed for the tourist resort of Acapulco. Landslides killed two people in Guerrero, and the collapse of a fence killed one person in Acapulco.

Manuel had maximum sustained winds of about 45 mph and was moving to the northwest

at 9 mph late Sunday afternoon. Its center was about 15 miles north of Manzanillo.

Rains from Ingrid caused landslides that killed three people in the central state of Puebla, and a woman died when a landslide buried her house in Hidalgo state.

The hurricane center said Ingrid, the second hurricane of the Atlantic

storm season, could reach the Mexican mainland early Monday after gathering strength over the warm waters of the Gulf of Mexico. It was packing top sustained winds of 85 mph as it slowly crawled toward land with little change in strength in hours.

Manuel was expected to dump 10 to 15 inches of rain over parts of

Guerrero and Michoacan state, with maximums of 25 inches possible in some isolated areas. Authorities said those rains would present an especially dangerous threat in mountains, where flash floods and mudslides were possible.

Ingrid also was expected to dump very heavy rains. It had maximum sustained winds of

Rep. Mike Rogers, chairman of the House Intelligence Committee, said the U.S. is “being led by the nose by” Russian President Vladimir Putin.

“So, if we wanted a transition with Assad, we just fired our last round, and we have taken our ability to negotiate a settlement from the White House, and we’ve sent it with Russia to the United

Nations,” Rogers, R-Mich., said. “That’s a dangerous place for us to be if you want an overall settlement to the problems.”

Russia, which already has rejected three resolutions on Syria, would be sure to veto a U.N. move toward military action, and U.S. officials said they did not contemplate seeking such an authorization.

Obama said Saturday that “if diplomacy fails, the United States remains prepared to act,” and Secretary of

State John Kerry warned during a visit to Israel on Sunday that “the threat of force is real” if Assad fails to live up to the terms of the agreement.

Sen. Bob Corker of Tennessee, the top Republican on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said the threat of force “is still very much in Russian hands.”

“That’s the most important element, is the veto piece,” Corker said. “So in many ways, our credibility in the region, and certainly relative to

the chemical warfare, is very much driven by Russia, which has its hands firmly on the steering wheel.”

Democrats insisted that while the agreement itself doesn’t commit the U.S. to using force, the option of acting independently of the U.N. remains.

Democratic Sen. Carl Levin of Michigan, chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said Russia’s primary aim has been to force the U.S. to give up that option. “Russia has failed in that

goal,” Levin said.

To Sen. Robert Menendez, D-N.J., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, the threat of American military action is “the only reason we’ve gotten to this point, even to this possibility.”

Obama said in an interview with ABC’s “This Week” that if Syria can be stopped from using chemical weapons, “then we may also have a foundation” to begin the process of reaching a political settlement to civil war.

officials say that even bridges that are structurally deficient or fracture critical are not about to collapse.

The AP zeroed in on the Douglass bridge and others that fit both criteria — structurally deficient and fracture critical. Together, they carry more than 29 million drivers a day, and many were built more than 60 years

ago. Those bridges are located in all 50 states, plus Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia, and include the Brooklyn Bridge in New York, a bridge on the New Jersey highway that leads to the Lincoln Tunnel, and the Main Avenue Bridge in Cleveland.

The number of bridges nationwide that are both structurally deficient and fracture critical has been fairly constant for a number of years, experts say. But both lists fluctuate frequently, especially at

the state level, since repairs can move a bridge out of the deficient categories while spans that grow more dilapidated can be put on the lists. There are occasional data-entry errors. There also is considerable lag time between when state transportation officials report data to the federal government and when updates are made to the National Bridge Inventory.

Many fracture critical bridges were erected in the 1950s to 1970s

during construction of the interstate highway system because they were relatively cheap and easy to build. Now they have exceeded their designed life expectancy but are still carrying traffic — often more cars and trucks than they were originally expected to handle. The Interstate 5 bridge in Washington state that collapsed in May was fracture critical.

Cities and states would like to replace the aging and vulnerable bridges, but few have the money;

nationally, it is a multi-billion-dollar problem. As a result, highway engineers are juggling repairs and retrofits in an effort to stay ahead of the deterioration.

There are thousands of inspectors across the country “in the field every day to determine the safety of the nation’s bridges,” Victor Mendez, head of the Federal Highway Administration, said in a statement. “If a bridge is found to be unsafe, immediate action is taken.”

“We go by the old saying of making sure your house is in good shape before you add new additions,” Prasad said. “As a result, the state of Florida has invested way more than what we get from national allocations on bridges.”

The FDOT’s policy is that “once a bridge is identified as structurally deficient, it must be programmed for repair or replacement within six

years,” spokesman Dick Kane said.

Federal funding for bridge repair and replacement is based on need and fluctuates yearly.

Many highway bridges have sufficiency ratings — scored on a 100-point scale — that help determine a state’s eligibility to receive federal funding for their maintenance or replacement.

For the current fiscal year, Florida has \$265 million in federal funding for bridge repair and replacement, FDOT said. In addition, \$154 million in state funding has also

been set aside.

The most-traveled bridge currently on Florida’s structurally deficient list is the state-owned Philip D. Beall Sr. Bridge, which crosses Pensacola Bay. It was built in 1960 and has an average daily traffic of 51,700 vehicles.

Its sufficiency rating is 37.7. It has been slotted for replacement in 2017 and is undergoing a project development study.

Another state-owned bridge, Palm Beach County’s Flagler Memorial, sees a daily average of 16,123 vehicles use it to

cross the Intracoastal Waterway. Its 42.6 sufficiency rating helped it garner construction money for a \$94 million replacement project that is set for completion in 2016.

Officials considered closing it but left it open during the process under a limited basis as to not disrupt a main commerce artery.

Prasad said that in bridge care, it’s important not to ignore preservation needs: “Bridges are a little different in that when you replace or create a new bridge, communities get energized.

“If you keep doing that at the expense of neglecting preservation needs, that’s when you’re going to pay the price sometime down the road. That’s when your preservation needs will be such that you don’t have the resources.”

But not all bridges in the state are owned or controlled by the FDOT or are eligible for state funds.

Prasad said it’s the locally controlled bridges that are the biggest challenge and concern because those municipalities are the shortest on funding.

On some college campuses, students have urged boycotts of blood drives until the ban is repealed. Over the summer, activists organized a “National Gay Blood Drive” — asking gay men to visit blood centers, take tests to show their blood was safe, and then try to donate in defiance of the ban.

In the face of such pressure, the Food and Drug Administration — the HHS agency that regulates

America’s blood supply — has been unwavering. The lifetime ban will be eased, the FDA says, “only if supported by scientific data showing that a change in policy would not present a significant and preventable risk to blood recipients.”

Under the auspices of HHS, a few studies are in progress that might lay the groundwork for a review of the policy. Department spokeswoman Diane Gianelli said the studies reflect a commitment to “continuously improving the safety and availability of the nation’s blood supply.”

However, some activists are impatient at the prospect of a research process that’s likely to extend over several years with an uncertain outcome. They argue that the U.S. could move now to emulate Spain and Italy, where blanket bans on gay blood donations have been replaced by policies that ban donations by anyone — gay or straight — who’s recently had unsafe sex, while allowing donations from gays and bisexuals whose blood is tested as safe and whose sexual behavior is deemed to pose no risk.

“We do not think HHS is moving fast enough,” said Jason Cianciotto of Gay Men’s Health Crisis, a New York-based nonprofit engaged in AIDS prevention and care.

Cianciotto said the ban “perpetuates the stigma that gay and bisexual men are dangerous to public health,” and thus undercuts efforts to combat HIV.

The FDA says its policy is not intended as a judgment on donors’ sexual orientation, and instead is based on the documented risk of blood infections, such as HIV, associated with male-to-male sex.

According to the FDA, men who have had sex with other men represent about 2 percent of the U.S. population, yet accounted for at least 61 percent of all new HIV infections in the U.S. in 2010.

The FDA implemented the ban in 1983, when health officials were first recognizing the risk of contracting AIDS via blood transfusions. Under the policy, blood donations are barred from any man who has had sex with another man at any time since 1977 — the start of the AIDS epidemic in the U.S.

Feds: Man tried to enter US via red chile shipment

COLUMBUS, New Mexico (AP) — Authorities say an immigrant suspected of entering the country illegally attempted to make his journey in a shipment of red chile.

U.S. Customs and Border Protection officers working at a New Mexico border checkpoint said the man was discovered Sept. 5 face down among a commercial load of the spicy stuff.

The man, who authorities described as a Mexican national, told agents that he climbed into the commercial hopper while it was being staged in Mexico. He got into the truck-full of chile in hopes of catching a ride to Chicago, the El Paso Times reported.

Agents said he got less than 100 yards into New Mexico before he was discovered. He will be returned to Mexico, officials said.

Syrian official: Chemical weapons deal a ‘victory’

BEIRUT (AP) — A high-ranking Syrian official called the U.S.-Russian agreement on securing Syria's chemical weapons a “victory” for President Bashar Assad's regime, but the U.S. warned Sunday “the threat of force is real” if Damascus fails to carry out the plan.

The comments by Syrian Minister of National Reconciliation Ali Haidar to a Russian state news agency were the first by a senior Syrian government official on the deal struck a day earlier in Geneva. Under the agreement, Syria will provide an inventory of its chemical arsenal within one week and hand over all of the components of its program by mid-2014.

“We welcome these agreements,” Haidar was quoted as saying by the RIA Novosti agency. “On the one hand, they will help Syrians get out of the crisis, and on the other hand, they averted a war against Syria by removing the pretext for those who wanted to unleash one.”

There has been no official statement from the Syrian government, and it was not clear whether Haidar's comments reflected Assad's thinking.

The deal, hashed out in marathon negotiations between U.S. and Russian diplomats, averts

American missile strikes against the Assad regime, although the Obama administration has warned that the military option remains on the table if Damascus does not comply. President Barack Obama said last week the U.S. Navy will maintain its increased presence in the eastern Mediterranean Sea to keep pressure on Syria and to be in position to respond if diplomacy fails.

“The threat of force is real, and the Assad regime and all those taking part need to understand that President Obama and the United States are committed to achieve this goal,” U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry said Sunday in Jerusalem, where he briefed Israeli leaders on the agreement.

He also said the agreement, if successful, “will have set a marker for the standard of behavior with respect to Iran and with respect to North Korea and any rogue state, (or) group that tries to reach for these kind of weapons.”

French President Francois Hollande said in a televised address to his country that he has not ruled out the “military option,” either. Otherwise, he said, “there will be no pressure.”

The U.S. accuses the Assad government of

using poison gas against rebel-held suburbs of Damascus on Aug. 21, killing more than 1,400 people. Other death toll estimates are far lower. Syria denies the allegations and blames the rebels.

The suspected chemical attack raised the prospect of U.S.-led military action against Syria that the rebels hoped would tip the civil war in their favor. But as the strikes appeared imminent, the Parliament of key U.S. ally Britain voted against military action and Obama decided to ask Congress for authorization first, delaying an armed response.

Russia then floated the idea of Syria relinquishing its chemical arsenal to avert Western strikes, and the Assad regime quickly agreed. On Saturday, Moscow and Washington struck a framework agreement to secure and destroy Syria's chemical stockpile.

For Syria's opposition, the deal is disappointing in many ways. It defers any U.S. action for the foreseeable future and does nothing to address the broader civil war or the use of conventional weapons, which have been responsible for the vast majority of the more than 100,000 deaths in the conflict.

Italy: OK to right shipwrecked Costa Concordia

GIGLIO ISLAND, Italy (AP) — Authorities have given the final go-ahead for a daring attempt Monday to pull upright the crippled Costa Concordia cruise liner from its side in the waters off Tuscany, a make-or-break engineering feat that has never before been tried in such conditions.

The ship capsized there 20 months ago, and Italy's national Civil Protection agency waited until sea and weather conditions were forecast for dawn Monday before giving the OK to try to right it. In a statement Sunday, the Civil Protection agency said the sea and wind conditions “fall within the range of operating feasibility.”

The Concordia struck a reef near Giglio Island the night of Jan. 13, 2012, took on water through a 70-meter (230-foot) gash in its hull and capsized just outside the harbor. Thirty-two of the 4,200 passengers and crew members died. The bodies of two of the dead have never been recovered, and may lie beneath the wreckage.

Never before have engineers tried to right such a huge ship so close to land. If the operation succeeds, the Concordia will be towed away and broken up for scrap.

Salvage experts had originally hoped to right the 115,000-ton vessel last spring, but heavy storms hampered work. Crews have raced to get the Concordia upright before another winter season batters the ship against its rocky perch — damage that would increase the chance that it couldn't be towed away in one piece.

Salvage master Nick Sloane seemed optimistic in the final hours before the operation began, saying Sunday that testing of the machinery in recent days had actually lifted the 300-meter (985-foot) ship up about 10 centimeters (2.5 inches), or 0.15 degrees. There have

been concerns that the rocks of the reef on which the Concordia is resting were so embedded in the hull that the ship would resist being pulled off.

“We know that ... she is lively enough to move,” Sloane told reporters.

The operation to bring the ship vertical involves dozens of crank-like pulleys slowly rotating the ship upright at a rate of about 3 meters (yards) per hour, using chains that have been looped around its hull. Tanks filled with water on the exposed side of the vessel will also help rotate it upward, using gravity to pull the exposed side down.

Once upright, those tanks — and an equal number that will be fixed on the opposite side — eventually will be filled with air, rather than water, to help float the ship up off the reef so it can be towed away.

Last week, the head of Italy's Civil Protection agency, Franco Gabrielli, said there was no “Plan B”

if the rotation failed since there would be no other way to try again. But Sloane said he was confident the ship would withstand the stress of the rotation.

The most critical time will be the first hour or so of the operation, since that's when the ship will be detached from the reef.

This weekend, tourists and locals waded and swam in pristine waters just beyond the harbor, with the hulking wreck an ugly backdrop and reminder of the harrowing night when a few thousand people straggled ashore. Since the Concordia came to rest on its side, visitors have come to gawk at the wreck, providing the tiny fishing island a year-round tourist season it never had before.

Mayor Sergio Ortelli has asked for patience from the island's 1,400 residents during Monday's operation, which he expected would last about 10-12 hours.

Bombings kill 58 in south and central Iraq

BAGHDAD (AP) — A wave of car bombings and other attacks in Iraq killed at least 58 people in mostly Shiite-majority cities on Sunday, another bloody reminder of the government's failure to stem the surge of violence that is feeding sectarian tensions.

Iraq is experiencing its deadliest bout of violence since 2008, raising fears the country is returning to a period of widespread killing such as that which pushed it to the brink of civil war following the 2003 U.S.-led invasion. More than 4,000 people have been killed in attacks since the start of April, including 804 just in August, according to United Nations figures.

High costs keep Japan focus on nuclear

TOKYO (AP) — Japan will once again be without atomic energy as its only operating nuclear reactor goes offline Sunday for refueling and maintenance, and other plants remain closed for intensified safety checks following the 2011 meltdowns at the tsunami-stricken plant in Fukushima.

But despite signs that the Fukushima crisis is worsening, Japan's commitment to restarting many of its 50 idled reactors appears stronger than ever, a year after a previous government said it would begin to phase out nuclear power completely.

Prime Minister Shinzo Abe, who took office in December, says nuclear power remains essential,

even with a surge in generation capacity from solar, wind and other renewable sources, and that the world's No. 3 economy cannot afford the mounting costs from importing gas and oil.

Four nuclear plant operators have applied to restart a dozen reactors under revised safety guidelines, though the pace will be relatively slow, with the first expected to come online early next year at the earliest. Inspections take about six months for each reactor, and obtaining consent from local governments may also take time.

Only two reactors have been operating in Japan since July 2012, both at Ohi in the west. The No. 3 reactor went offline for maintenance on Sept. 2, and the No. 4 reactor is being shut down Sunday night. They are among the dozen that have applied to restart.

Pakistani Taliban issue demands before peace talks

PESHAWAR, Pakistan (AP) — The Pakistani Taliban demanded Sunday that the government release militant prisoners and begin withdrawing troops from the group's tribal sanctuary before they participate in peace talks, raising doubts about prospects for negotiations.

The demands came as a roadside bomb claimed by the Taliban killed a major general and two other soldiers as they were riding in a vehicle in the country's north-west, the military said. The general was the top army commander in an area containing the Swat Valley, where the military carried out a major offensive against the Taliban in 2009.

Another female police officer shot in Afghanistan

KANDAHAR, Afghanistan (AP) — Gunmen shot the top female police officer in a troubled southern Afghan province Sunday, leaving her facing possible paralysis just months after her predecessor was killed, government and hospital authorities said. It was the latest in a series of attacks on prominent women in Afghanistan, where just 1 percent of the police force is female.


The officer, identified only as Negar, was buying grass for her lambs outside her home when two gunmen drove up on a motorbike and fired at her, said Omar Zawak, a spokesman for the governor of Helmand province.

The 38-year-old suffered a bullet wound to the neck, and the medical team treating her is trying to keep her from being paralyzed as a result of the injury, said one of the doctors who operated on her.


Many bridges in Puerto Rico considered risky

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) — Puerto Rico's salty ocean air is corroding dozens of bridges across the U.S. territory, continually weakening the structures and posing a challenge for officials trying to prioritize which ones to repair first.

The island has 31 bridges considered fracture critical and structurally deficient, according to a review of federal data by The Associated Press. The fracture critical designation means those bridges have no redundant protection and could collapse if just one vital component fails.

PENSACOLA (AP) — Interesting fact No. 1: The world record for hunger care relief packages put together in three minutes is 554.

Interesting fact No. 2: That record is about to be broken.

Shattered actually.

The Meals of Honor program, founded by Pensacola's Jodie Butler, is expecting to put together 3,000 hunger care relief packages in three minutes this Veterans Day.

Ask Butler and he will tell you he is not out to break records. Instead, he is more interested in the publicity that comes with it.

"I just knew that if there was a record that we could break, that I could turn that into PR and be able to feed more," Butler said. "We're going to break a world record for feeding homeless veterans on Veterans Day. It's going to be big."

If Butler's name does not sound familiar, it should.

Spurred into action by the death of his brother-in-law, Marine Corps Staff Sgt. Daniel Clay, in Iraq on Dec. 1, 2005, Butler has made aiding veterans his life's passion.

"We lost my brother-in-law almost 14 months to the day after we lost his sister," Butler said. "His letter that he left us told us to honor those that are protecting that which is worth protecting. And I thought about that.

"I've always been one that's been grateful for the military. I say 'Thank you for serving,' but I've never done anything tangible. I didn't know what to do. I just started looking for ways and I didn't have to look far. When we first started, we collected phones and sent them in and got calling cards. That's where it began."

That was in 2007, when Butler started the Help Them Call Home program, which helped deployed military members stay in contact with

friends and loved ones. “My original goal was to get 100 phones to turn in and get 100 calling cards,” Butler said. “We sent millions and millions of minutes of calling cards — \$25,000 dollars worth.

“Now we do meals. I got very, very ill, and they kind of dwindled the program down as we withdrew our troops in Iraq.”

Butler suffers from hypokalemia, an affliction he was born with that can cause temporary paralysis.

“I’ve had this problem since I was born and we didn’t know,” Butler said. “My condition fluctuates between a jellyfish that blinks — where I can’t move anything but my eyes — to where I stiffen up so bad it tears my muscles.”

As more and more troops began to return home, the immediate need and effectiveness of the calling card program dwindled.

That’s when Butler discovered a new need.

“I just started seeing homeless veterans everywhere,” he said. “The homeless population is not good for veterans, but it’s smaller than a lot of people realize. It would not take that much to be able to feed them.”

So Butler founded Meals of Honor, a nationwide program where people can donate used cellphones, laptops and other devices to help feed homeless veterans.

“We can fill a need here, just like we did before, where it doesn’t cost anybody,” he said. “They don’t have to pay for the shipping label. They don’t have to pay for the box. Phones are just laying around. Ink cartridges are changed every month in businesses.”

In exchange for the phones, Meals of Honor is able to purchase VitaMeals — a mix of rice and lentils — to provide to homeless veterans.

LAKELAND (AP) — Fundraisers were held this weekend to help cover funeral expenses for the 12-year-old Lakeland girl who authorities said was bullied for months before her suicide.

Fundraisers for Rebecca Sedwick's funeral were held Saturday in Brandon and at a car wash in Lakeland on Sunday, according to WTSP TV.

Her funeral was scheduled for Monday — exactly a week after her death — at the Whidden McLean Funeral Home in Bartow and attendees were asked to wear bright colors.

Sedwick was “terrorized” by as many as 15 girls who ganged up on her and picked on her for nearly a year, Polk County Sheriff Grady Judd said. The bullying started over a “boyfriend

issue" last year and some of her writings in her diaries found at home "would break your heart," he said, as she talked of how depressed she was about the situation.

Last Monday, authorities said she climbed to a tower at an abandoned concrete plant and hurled herself to her death.

Authorities have seized computers and cellphones from some of the girls as they decide whether to bring charges. The parents of the other girls were also cooperating with authorities.

After Rebecca's suicide, police looked at her computer and found search queries such as "what is overweight for a 13-year-old girl," "how to get blades out of razors," and "how many over-the-counter drugs do you take to die."

LUTZ (AP) — A man remained in stable condition in the hospital Sunday after attacking his father who shot him in the chest during the fight, Hillsborough County deputies said.

Deputies responded to a 911 call of a domestic related shooting in Lutz late Saturday involving a father and son. According to detectives, Eric Harris and his girlfriend returned to the home after a football game. Eric Harris, 26, was drunk and began arguing with his girlfriend, authorities said.

The argument spilled over into an argument with his father, Henry Harris, who was about to take his four pit bulls for a walk.

Eric Harris attacked his father from behind and placed him in a choke hold. Henry Harris told deputies he could not breathe, his arms began to tingle, and he started to lose consciousness. He was able to break free, but his son went at him again. Henry Harris then pulled out his handgun and shot his son once in the chest. Henry Harris and a neighbor called 911 and waited for deputies to arrive.

MIAMI (AP) — Two Bahamian citizens have been rescued after their boat capsized off the Florida coast more than a week ago.

A Coast Guard helicopter crew hoisted the two men from the capsized boat east of Riviera Beach on Saturday. A photo released Sunday by the Coast Guard shows two men resting on the hull of the boat.

Authorities say the Coast Guard Sector in Miami received a report of the capsized vessel Saturday afternoon and diverted a boat and helicopter to the area to search for the men. The men told rescuers they had been drifting at sea for eight days and had ingested salt water.

The two men were transferred to Del Ray Medical Center for further treatment.

MIAMI (AP) — The governor of a central Venezuelan state will receive the keys to the cities of Miami and Doral.

Miami Mayor Tomas Regalado will join Doral Mayor Luigi Boria, who is the first Venezuelan-born mayor in the United States, to present the keys to both cities to Henrique Capriles on Sunday morning.

Capriles is the governor of the state of Miranda in Venezuela.

Miami Mayor Thomas Regalado says the event will “demonstrate the exile community’s solidarity in his fight for democracy in Venezuela.”

Capriles is one of Venezuela’s opposition leaders.

ST. PETERSBURG (AP) — A 2-year-old boy is in the intensive care unit after falling into a pit with some heated coals at a campground in St. Petersburg.

The Pinellas County Sheriff's Office is investigating Sunday's fall. Detectives say it appears to have been an accident.

The child was taken to the hospital for treatment and is in stable condition in the Intensive Care Unit of Tampa General Hospital.

Team owner says NASCAR had no choice

Hendrick: Reversal of on-track result was necessary

JOLIET, Ill. — Rick Hendrick said he had never seen the NASCAR brass reverse an important ruling during his 30-plus years in the sport. "I think the world knew it, and they had to do what they did."

Dolphins hold off Colts' comeback

INDIANAPOLIS — This time, Ryan Tannehill was the one celebrating in Indianapolis on Sunday. And Miami's defense had Andrew Luck fuming. The Dolphins' second-year quarterback matched his counterpart virtually throw-for-throw. Tannehill did a better job managing his team's offense in the second half and cheered his defense after it thwarted another Colts' comeback bid to hold on for a 24-20 victory. "It's nice to win and that's the important thing no matter who we are going against. It's nice to win," Tannehill said. "He (Luck) did a good job; I don't really know what his numbers were, but from what I saw, he did a great job of moving around the pocket, but the defense really stepped up and made a play when it counted."

Tannehill was better. It was a stark contrast from a year ago, when the two first-round draft picks met as rookies. Luck stole the show that day by throwing for an NFL rookie record 433 yards and two scores in a three-point win. In Sunday's meeting, with a chance to show everyone how much he and the Dolphins (2-0) had progressed, Tannehill was the winner. While the two quarterbacks finished with similar numbers — Tannehill was 23 of 34 for 319 yards and one touchdown, while Luck was 25 of 43 for 321 yards and one TD — the difference came down to managing mistakes. Tannehill lost a third down fumble at his 39 in the third quarter, but all the Colts could get was a go-ahead field goal.

Luck, however, stopped one fourth-quarter scoring chance by forcing a deep throw to Reggie Wayne that was picked off by Brent Grimes in the end zone.

Luck had a chance to make amends after

driving the Colts (1-1) to the Miami 23-yard line with 1:45 left in the game. Miami, however, forced three consecutive incompletions and refused to allow the suddenly elusive Luck to escape the pass rush on fourth down. All Tannehill had to do then was pick up one first down, kneel down once and shake hands with the guy he's been following since they were Texas high school stars.

Luck, who has engineered eight fourth-quarter comebacks in 18 games, blamed himself for the loss.

"I guess I'm a little angry at myself," Luck said. "Again, credit to them, they put us in all these situations, but I feel like we are a better team than what we showed."

The Dolphins, meanwhile, couldn't have been happier.

They started fast, jumping to a 14-3 lead after two possessions, rallied twice

and shut down the Colts when they needed, too.

weather-delayed 16-14 victory.

Brees shrugged off the mistake that gave Tampa Bay the lead early in the fourth quarter to complete three consecutive passes for 54 yards to lead the Saints (2-0) into position to beat their NFC South rivals for the fourth time in a row.

He finished 26 of 46 for 322 yards, although interceptions by linebackers Dekoda Watson and Mason Foster led to all of Tampa Bay's points.

"I think wins like this are vital because no matter what you've done in the past, you've got to kind of prove it to yourself that this team can do that and overcome those types of odds and circumstances and get a win — on the road, in the division," Brees said. "These just become so meaningful, and our team got better today."

The game was interrupted by a 69-minute suspension of play because of lightning that sent fans at Raymond James Stadium scurrying for cover in the first quarter.

The Bucs (0-2) lost on a field goal in the closing seconds for the second consecutive week. Foster scored on an 85-yard interception return for a 14-13 lead.

However, Rian Lindell missed a 46-yard field-goal attempt with just over a minute left, giving Brees one more chance to bring the Saints back.

"It's tough to lose no matter (how)," Foster said. "You've got to tip your hat to Drew Brees and his receivers making great plays. He's a great quarterback. He's proven that over the years."

Brees led his team into scoring position with completions of 15 yards to Jimmy Graham, 8 yards to Darren Sproles and 31 yards to Marques Colston.

It was the 22nd time during the regular season Brees has led a winning drive in the fourth quarter or overtime since joining the Saints in 2006.

"The fact of the matter is we've worked so hard. We've conditioned ourselves to be prepared for these opportunities, and you just visualize success," said Brees, who threw a first-quarter TD pass to Graham, who had 10 catches for 179 yards. "You visualize yourself making plays, so really I can say there was no doubt among our team."

The Bucs played resilient defense to stay in the game, but in the end weren't able to generate enough offense.

Raiders run past Jaguars

OAKLAND, Calif. — Darren McFadden, Terrelle Pryor and the Oakland Raiders looked like a high-powered offense compared to Jacksonville. McFadden ran for 129 yards and Oakland's defense held the Jaguars out of the end zone until the closing minutes, as the Raiders won their home opener 19-9 on Sunday. Pryor ran for 50 yards and threw for 126 in his first home start for the Raiders (1-1), and Marcel Reece scored on an 11-yard run to help Oakland bounce back from last week's late loss in Indianapolis. Sebastian Janikowski added four field goals.

Playing the depleted Jaguars offense sure helped the cause. Jacksonville (0-2) came within 2:53 of becoming the first team since the 2006 Raiders and Buccaneers to fail to score a touchdown in the first two games.

The Jaguars entered the game without quarterback Blaine Gabbert (right hand), receiver Justin Blackmon (suspension) and tight end Marcedes Lewis (calf), and then lost star running back Maurice Jones-Drew in the first half to an ankle injury.

A week after allowing six sacks, dropping five passes and punting a franchise-record 11 times in a 28-2 loss to Kansas City, the Jaguars offense was nearly as bad under Chad Henne.

Jacksonville crossed midfield for the first time in the opening quarter in this game, as opposed to the fourth last week. And the Jaguars got their first touchdown of the season on Henne's 13-yard pass to Clay Harbor after a fumble by McFadden late in the fourth quarter.

The Jaguars went over 36 minutes without a first down and didn't generate any offense until the game was out of hand.

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BRONCOS 41, GIANTS 23

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Big brother Manning got the better of his kid sibling, with lots of help from Denver's one-man ground game. Peyton Manning didn't need another record-tying seven touchdown passes Sunday, settling for two in the Broncos' 41-23 romp over Eli and the Giants.

The older Manning is 3-0 in the NFL against Eli, with the other two victories coming when Peyton was with the Colts. He got this win with a huge boost from Knowshon Moreno, who rushed for two touchdowns and 93 yards on 13 carries. Denver (2-0), which has won 13 straight regular-season games, ran for 109 yards altogether.

With Manning finding Wes Welker and Julius Thomas for touchdowns, and Moreno scoring on sprints down the right side of 20 and 25 yards, Denver dominated much of the matchup.

eliminated Martin Truex Jr., Bowyer's teammate at Michael Waltrip Racing, from a Chase berth.

Once officials dug deeper, however, their investigation found at least three separate attempts to manipulate the race. NASCAR could not prove the teams were working together, although Gordon wound up being clearly disadvantaged by the schemes, missing the final qualifying spot by one place. Gordon, a four-time champion, wasn't eligible for either of the two wild-card spots. That prompted France to step in.

"There was one team, one driver, who was directly impacted negatively, as Brian said, by all this, and we decided that we were going to do something that was unprecedented," NASCAR President Mike Helton said on ESPN before Sunday's race.

Hendrick said it was the right call.

"It's something you shoot for the whole year. ... We had all four drivers in last year and we wanted to do it this year," Hendrick said. His team had already qualified five-time champion Jimmie Johnson, Kasey Kahne and Dale Earnhardt Jr.

NASCAR tweaks restart rules: In Joliet, Ill., NASCAR tweaked its restart rules and will now allow the second-place driver to beat the leader to the start-finish line after confusion has reigned all season.

Many fans felt NASCAR missed a call last week when it failed to penalize Carl Edwards for jumping the final restart.

Edwards clearly beat leader Paul Menard to the line, wasn't penalized and won the race. NASCAR said Menard spun his tires. Going forward, the leader controls the start in the restart zone. But once the green flag waves, the second-place car can beat the leader to the line.

Hight gets 2nd straight FC win

CONCORD, N.C. (AP) — Robert Hight took his second straight Funny Car victory to kick off the Countdown to the Championship playoffs at the NHRA Carolina Nationals on Sunday.

Hight powered his Ford Mustang to a run of 4.083 seconds at 312.64 mph to race to the victory against points leader Matt Hagan in the final round. Hagan had a quicker run of 4.066, but Hight posted a quicker .055 reaction time to hang on for his second win in 2013 and 29th of his career.

A's sweep Rangers

Mets' rookie sinks Marlins in 12th

ARLINGTON, Texas — The Texas Rangers better start paying attention to that tight AL wild-card race.

Their chances for the AL West title are pretty slim after the division-leading Oakland Athletics won 5-1 Sunday to complete a three-game series sweep and take a commanding 6 ½-game lead with two weeks left in the regular season.

"I'm disappointed. I certainly expected us to respond better," manager Ron Washington said. "They outpitched us, and they certainly outhit us. The punched the ball out of the park. They played well in every phase."

Texas lost its sixth in a row, all at home and never leading in any of them, and is 2-11 in September after beginning the month with a two-game lead. Coupled with a sweep by Pittsburgh, this was the Rangers' first winless homestand of at least six games since moving to Texas in 1972.

"Just as quickly as it started, it can turn around," general manager Jon Daniels said. "It's got to."

The Rangers and Tampa Bay, both with 14 games left, are tied for the two AL wild-card spots in a rapidly tightening race. Cleveland, Baltimore, the Yankees and Kansas City are within 3 ½ games of Texas and the Rays.

"As bad as we've played, we're still in a good position to make the playoffs," Daniels said.

Texas starts a four-game series at Tropicana Field today. The Rangers have a majors-best 42-32 road record.

Tigers 3, Royals 2: In Detroit, Alex Avila homered twice, including a tiebreaking solo shot in the eighth inning that lifted Detroit. Detroit's Max Scherzer struck out 12 in seven innings, but he was denied his 20th victory when Kansas City tied it off Drew Smyly

(6-0) in the eighth. Avila answered in the bottom half with a homer to right-center. Joaquin Benoit pitched the ninth for his 20th save in 20 chances.

Angels 2, Astros 1: In Houston, Jerome Williams won a third straight start for the first time since April 2004, and Los Angeles sent Houston to its 98th loss of the season. Houston, a big league-worst 51-98, is on the verge of becoming the first major league team to reach triple figures in losses in three consecutive seasons since Kansas City from 2004-06. Josh Hamilton had an RBI triple in the first off Paul Clemens (4-5).

Orioles 3, Blue Jays 1: In Toronto, Miguel Gonzalez pitched 5 ½ innings before leaving with a strained right groin, and Danny Valencia hit a two-run double. The Orioles won their first road series since taking two of three at San Francisco on Aug. 9-11. Baltimore slugger Chris Davis, who hit his 50th home run of the season Friday, went 0 for 3 and struck out twice. He also drove in a run with a bases-loaded walk.

Mets 1, Marlins 0, 12 innings: In New York, slumping rookie Travis d'Arnaud hit a winning single with two outs in the 12th inning. Dillon Gee and Tom Koehler took a pitchers' duel into the eighth inning before the Marlins and Mets each used five relievers to finish off the fifth extra-inning matchup this season between the NL East's worst teams. Vic Black (1-0) pitched a perfect 12th inning for his first career win.

Pirates 3, Cubs 2: In Pittsburgh, Francisco Liriano took a no-hit bid into the seventh inning before faltering in his first no-decision this season, and pinch-hitter Justin Morneau singled in the go-ahead run in the eighth. Morneau, acquired from Minnesota on Aug. 31, drove in his first run for the Pirates. Kyle Farnsworth (1-0) pitched a scoreless eighth, and Mark Melancon completed a three-hitter with a perfect ninth for his 16th save in 18 chances.

Cardinals 12, Mariners 2: In St. Louis, Yadier Molina broke out of a slump with a home run and three singles as Shelby Miller and St. Louis remained tied for first place in the NL Central. Matt Adams also homered as St. Louis won for the seventh time in nine games and kept pace with Pittsburgh. Both teams are 87-62 with 13 games remaining. Miller (14-9) gave up one earned run and three hits in five innings.

Brewers 6, Reds 5: In Milwaukee, Sean Halton hit a solo homer with one out in the bottom of the ninth inning to lift Milwaukee to the comeback victory. Halton's home run came off reliever Zach Duke (1-2), the fifth Cincinnati pitcher. It was Halton's third homer of the season and first career walk-off. Jean Segura sparked a rally with a two-run triple and Carlos Gomez made a game-saving catch for Milwaukee, which dealt a blow to the Reds' pursuit of the NL Central title.

Nationals 11, Phillies 2: In Washington, Wilson Ramos had four hits and five RBIs, Jordan Zimmermann pitched seven innings for his NL-best 18th win and Washington kept up its late playoff push. Denard Span extended his hitting streak to 26 games, Bryce Harper hit a pair of doubles and a single and scored three times, and every player in the Nationals' starting lineup had at least one hit.

Giants, 4, Dodgers 2: In Los Angeles, Hunter Pence hit two more home runs, and pinch-hitter Brett Pill connected for a tiebreaking shot leading off the eighth inning. Pinch-hitter Yasiel Puig grounded out with the bases loaded to end the game. The NL West-leading Dodgers lost three of four to San Francisco, and the magic number to clinch their first division title since 2009 remained at four after second-place Arizona won.

Diamondbacks 8, Rockies 2: In Phoenix, Paul Goldschmidt homered and went 4 for 4, driving in career high-tying five runs to lead Arizona past Colorado.

Colorado star Todd Helton did not play, a day after announcing he would retire at the end of this season. The crowd at Chase Field cheered him early in the game and he waved his cap in appreciation.

Goldschmidt had an RBI single in the first inning, hit a two-run homer in the third and added a two-run double in the fourth, all against Jhoulys Chacin (13-9). Goldschmidt leads the NL with 114 RBIs.

Padres 4, Braves 0: In Atlanta, Burch Smith struck out 10 in seven innings to earn his first major league victory, and Chase Headley and Tommy Medica homered. The Braves lead the NL East by 10 games over Washington. Atlanta opens a three-game series at Nationals Park on Monday night, and can clinch the division by winning twice there. Smith (1-1) held the Braves hitless until pitcher Julio Teheran singled to lead off the sixth.

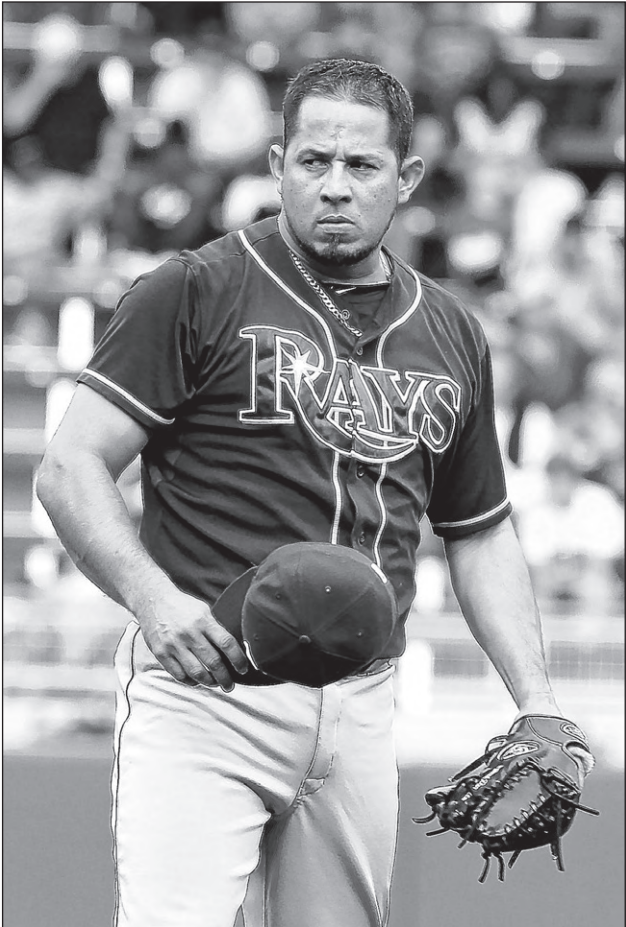

KIWIS CLOSE IN ON DELETING ELLISON FROM CUP

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Emirates Team New Zealand is getting closer to pushing the delete button on software tycoon Larry Ellison in the America's Cup.

On one of the liveliest days of the regatta, Dean Barker and the rest of the Kiwi crew earned a split Sunday with Oracle Team USA to move within two races of yanking the oldest trophy in international sports away from the American-based powerhouse.

The day got revving when Oracle Team USA skipper Jimmy Spithill posted a tweet that some people found offensive. Spithill later deleted it.

It ended with a race that saw four lead changes, strong winds on San Francisco Bay and a shift in momentum back to the Kiwis.

"I think if you didn't enjoy today's racing you should watch another sport," Barker said.

Team New Zealand, which almost capsized during a 52-second loss Saturday, leads 7-1.

Today is a lay day. If Team New Zealand sweeps Tuesday's two races — weather permitting — it will claim the Auld Mug for the Royal New Zealand Yacht Squadron for the second time in 18 years.

Even if it continues to split races, Team New Zealand can essentially run out the clock against Oracle Team USA, which brought the America's Cup back to the United States in 2010 after a 15-year absence.

CYCLING

Horner wins Vuelta as oldest grand tour champion: In Madrid, American Christopher Horner completed the biggest victory of his career, becoming the first American to win the Spanish Vuelta and the oldest champion of one of cycling's three-week grand tours.

"I've been a professional for almost 20 years, so this represents a lifetime of hard work," the 41-year-old veteran said. "A grand tour is always a goal for a cyclist to show how good of a rider you are. The memories will last forever."

Horner navigated the final flat stage without mishap to arrive in Madrid together with his RadioShack-Leopard teammates after effectively clinching the race in the northern mountains over the last three days.

Vincenzo Nibali of Italy and Spaniard Alejandro Valverde — both former winners — were second and third, respectively. The previous oldest winner for one of the three grand tours — the Vuelta, Tour de France and Giro d'Italia — was Fermin Lambot, who won the 1922 Tour at 36.

TENNIS

Djokovic wins as Serbia ties Canada: In Belgrade, Serbia, Serbia reached the Davis Cup final after Janko Tipsarevic won the decisive singles match against Vasek Pospisil to clinch a 3-2 victory over Canada.

Tipsarevic beat Pospisil 7-6 (3), 6-2, 7-6 (6) to send Serbia into the final against the Czech Republic, which beat Argentina at home.

By winning the doubles on Saturday, Canada had moved within one victory of reaching its first Davis Cup final. But in the opening singles Sunday, top-ranked Novak Djokovic beat Canada's Milos Raonic 7-6 (1), 6-2, 6-2 to tie the series at 2-2.

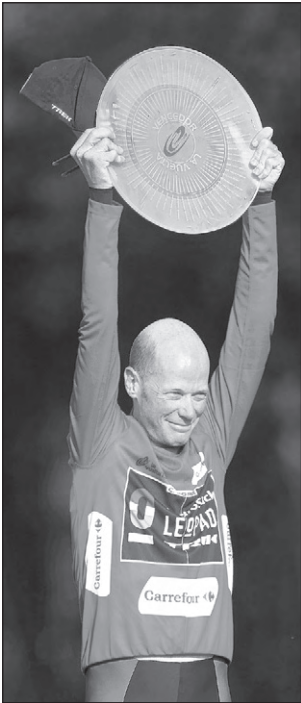
Canada had never made the semis before, while Serbia won the event in 2010. The finals against the Czechs will be played in Serbia in November. ...

In Quebec, Ontario, Lucie Safarova of the Czech Republic beat sixth-seeded Marina Erakovic of New Zealand 6-4, 6-3 to win the Bell Challenge.

BASKETBALL

Ukraine advances to Euro quarterfinals: In Ljubljana, Slovenia, Nemanja Nedovic stole the ball, raced down the court and soared for a thundering one-handed dunk.

It was just one of many highlights by Nedovic, who outplayed Tony

Parker in Serbia's 77-65 victory over France at the European basketball championships.

That dunk gave Serbia its biggest lead of 14 points midway through the fourth quarter. With France cutting the gap, Nedovic made a 3-pointer that gave his team a 10-point lead with 2:28 left in the game.

The win gave Serbia first place in Group E, with both teams having already qualified for the quarterfinals. Lithuania took second, France third and Ukraine fourth. ...

In Washington, Tayler Hill scored a career-high-tying 16 points to help the Washington Mystics defeat the New York Liberty 70-52 and clinch the third playoff seed in the WNBA Eastern Conference. Kia Vaughn scored 10 points and grabbed 12 rebounds for her second-straight double-double and her third of the season to help the Mystics split their four-game season series with New York. ...

In Uncasville, Conn., Izzy Castro Marques made two free throws with 1.9 seconds remaining in overtime and the Connecticut Sun edged the Indiana Fever 82-80. Castro Marques led Connecticut (10-24) with 19 points. Mistie Bass had 16 points and 12 rebounds and Renee Montgomery added 16 points for the Sun. ...

In Los Angeles, Candace Parker and Jantel Lavender each scored 16 points as the Los Angeles Sparks routed the Phoenix Mercury 89-55. Nneka Ogwumike had 12 points and eight rebounds for the Sparks (24-10) in a preview of the Western Conference semifinals. They've clinched the second and third seeds and will open a best-of-three series Thursday in Los Angeles. ...

In San Antonio, Danielle Adams scored a franchise-record 39 points and the San Antonio Silver Stars closed a disappointing season by routing the playoff bound Atlanta Dream 97-68.

Adams drove the lane for a spinning layup to top the franchise record of 38 points set by Becky Hammon on July 30, 2009 against Sacramento. A second-year forward from Texas A&M, Adams was 13 for 23 from the field and 10 for 12 on free throws. She left the game with 1:36 remaining to a standing ovation.

HOCKEY

Kadri, Raymond lift Maple Leafs: In London, Ontario, Nazem Kadri and Mason Raymond both had a goal and an assist for the Toronto Maple Leafs, who opened their preseason schedule with a 4-3 win over the Philadelphia Flyers.

Toronto jumped to a 3-0 lead in the first period in a span of 3:05. Kadri scored first, and Troy Bodie doubled the Maple Leafs' lead against goalie Steve Mason. Raymond made it 3-0.

Philadelphia rebounded quickly with a goal from Doug Clarkson in the first, and tallies by Brayden Schenn and Nick Cousins early in the second to tie it. ...

In Columbus, Ohio, rookie defenseman Ryan Murray scored 4:38 into overtime to lift the Columbus Blue Jackets past the Pittsburgh Penguins 5-4 in the preseason opener for both teams. Murray took a feed from R.J. Umberger and beat backup goalie Jeff Zatkott. Murray was the No. 2 pick in the 2012 NHL draft but missed the season with a shoulder injury. ...

In Dallas, Vladimir Tarasenko scored the only goal in a shootout to give the St. Louis Blues a 6-5 victory over the Dallas Stars in a preseason game.

Tarasenko flipped the puck over the shoulder of Jack Campbell and into the upper left corner of the net.

First-round draft pick Valeri Nichushkin scored two goals to give Dallas leads of 4-3 and 5-4.

More money, no problems

Mayweather leaves no doubt after latest victory

LAS VEGAS — Two years. Four more fights.

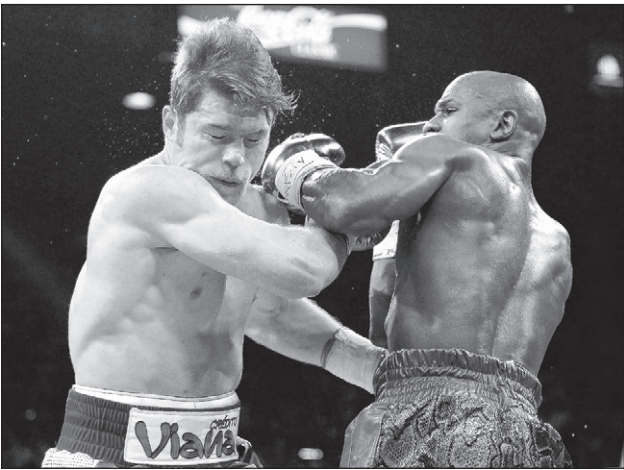
The end of Floyd Mayweather Jr.'s career is in sight, because even the best fighter of his era can't beat Father Time. He'll be 38 and another \$150 million or so richer when his lucrative contract with Showtime ends, and by then even the fighter raised from birth to be in the ring will likely have had his fill.

Appreciate his spectacular skills while you can. After what Mayweather did Saturday night to Canelo Alvarez, it's hard to argue when he proclaims himself as one of the greatest ever to lace on the gloves.

The only real question now is, can anyone give him a legitimate fight?

"I don't know what the future holds now," Mayweather said. "I'm not psychic."

Maybe not, but

Mayweather knows this: He'll fight next May (Cinco de Mayweather he calls it) against someone and he'll make another huge purse to fund his ever growing collection of exotic cars and his six-figure bets on football and basketball games. After that, there will be three more fights, and then Mayweather plans to retire to his Big Boy mansion on a golf course near the Las Vegas Strip.

"I've only got 24 months left," he said.

Whether he sticks to that plan remains to be seen, of course. Fighters can be their own worst

enemies when it comes time to calling it quits, and Mayweather by then would likely be 49-0 and one fight away from breaking the unbeaten mark set by Rocky Marciano before he retired.

Mayweather's problem right now is he might be too good. Alvarez was supposed to be the one fighter who could give him a tussle, but the Mexican champion spent all night punching at air as Mayweather put on a virtuoso performance that had everyone raving except the one ringside judge who somehow

Williams provides FSU a new threat

Former DB runs for 110 yards in debut on offense

TALLAHASSEE — It might be time to give Florida State's backfield a new nickname.

"Wild & Free" worked perfectly when it was a two-man show featuring James Wilder Jr. and Devonta Freeman. But junior Karlos Williams, a safety who switched to running back after the season opener, had a breakout performance in Saturday's 62-7 drubbing of Nevada and could be in the mix the rest of the year.

Williams ran eight times for 110 yards, including a 65-yard touchdown run on his first career carry.

"When I got out, there was nothing but green grass," Williams said.

The Seminoles (2-0) had a lot of open spaces against the Wolf Pack.

They ran for 377 yards and had six different players score on the ground.

Williams' outing was the most impressive, though.

With plenty of talent in

the secondary and running back Mario Penders academically ineligible, coach Jimbo Fisher asked Williams to move to the offensive side of the ball following a 41-13 win at Pitt.

For Williams, the swamp made sense.

He played in 12 games, mostly on special teams, as a freshman and served as a backup safety and kick returner last season.

Although he was widely regarded as one of the nation's top safeties coming out of Ridge Community High School in Davenport, he had plenty of experience with the ball in his hands.

Williams ran 69 times for 564 yards and seven touchdowns as a senior.

So he was a little rusty, but far from lost.

"I'm not trying to say that I was rubbing a crystal ball, but that guy is a talented cat," Fisher said. "He's very dynamic

with the ball. He's big, strong and explosive. He's natural. When he gets in space, he can hit home runs. ... Karlos will provide us with a very big piece of the puzzle in my opinion as the year goes on."

If so, FSU might need another catchy moniker for its backfield trio.

Williams and Freeman (109 yards) became the first FSU teammates to rush for 100 yards in the same game since Chris Thompson (103) and quarterback EJ Manuel (102) did it against Clemson last season.

Wilder ran six times for 45 yards and a score, still dealing with a shoulder injury sustained in the opener.

After watching Williams in practice, Wilder had high expectations for his new backfield mate.

"If he gets a toss sweep and gets one little crease, I told him he was a track star and he was going to be gone," Wilder said. "He just did it. That boy is fast.

"He has a nose for the end zone and he's desperate to get there. I think I overheard somebody say his yards per carry was like 13 or 14 yards per carry, and that's pretty scary because he still doesn't know everything yet."

Irish coach preaches patience

SOUTH BEND, Ind. — Notre Dame coach Brian Kelly is preaching patience for his struggling defense.

Kelly said he is seeing signs of improvement for the Fighting Irish defense, which so far this year has looked nothing like the squad that led the Fighting Irish into the national championship game a season ago.

The 22nd-ranked Fighting Irish (2-1) are giving up 23.5 points and 411 yards. Even worse, two of their opponents they've face — Temple (0-3) and Purdue (1-2) — rank among the 30 least productive offenses in the nation.

Kelly said the Irish are still figuring themselves out, saying they are adjusting to a new middle linebacker and a new safety. He said the Irish have struggled in communication because of that. But he said he saw signs of hope in the 31-24 victory over Purdue on Saturday night.

All clear for Alabama until November: Now that Alabama has survived its latest meeting with Johnny Manziel, the Crimson Tide are set to settle into an accommodating slice of schedule as the No. 1 team in the country.

The Tide remained top ranked in The Associated Press college football poll after a 49-42 victory against Texas A&M in College Station, Texas.

The Tide will play five of the next six weeks at home and will be heavily favored in every game. In fact, Alabama faces only two more teams currently ranked: No. 21 Mississippi (Sept. 28) and No. 6 LSU (Nov. 9).

Glucosamine, chondroitin worth a trial

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am in my 70s and was diagnosed with "serious lower-back arthritis" a few years ago. The pain was occasionally excruciating. My current doctor put me on glucosamine and chondroitin, and the change has come close to being miraculous. The pain is greatly lessened, and some other arthritis areas (e.g., my neck) have subsided almost completely. Bending down can still be difficult and it can be painful to do my PT exercises, but the condition is tolerable now.

Senior-citizen friends disagree: Some have had my experience, but others claim the supplement does nothing for them. Is there a downside to long-term use? — D.J.

ANSWER: People tend to have strong opinions about combination glucosamine and chondroitin. For those in whom it works, it can have great effect. My experience is that only about a third of people who take it have that good a response. Another rough third get some benefit, but maybe not even enough to keep taking it. For the last third, it is useless. That being said, well-designed trials have failed to show benefit with glucosamine and chondroitin. However, the medications appear to be safe and there are few side effects, even in long-term use. I have often recommended that people who want to try it to give it a few weeks, and continue only if it really works.

DEAR DR. ROACH: My mother is 86 and still can go to the grocery store, but needs assistance. She walks very slowly with a cane. She won't go with the assisted-living facility bus because she wants me to go with her and let her hold on to me while she gets out of the car and, using a cane, crosses the street from the parking lot to the store. Once she is in the store, using a grocery cart is enough to support her. But it takes hours for her to shop then she is worn out and complaining about hurting feet, legs, etc. I've suggested the electric carts, but she won't use them because she "does not know how to." She could be taught. So, as her daughter, what is my prime responsibility? To help her shop so it takes her less time, even though she enjoys the outing? The

complaints get worse and worse as time goes on. Is it better for her to walk or use the cart? Should her doctor recommend using the cart? She does enjoy the outing and needs the cognitive stimulation. — N.L.B.

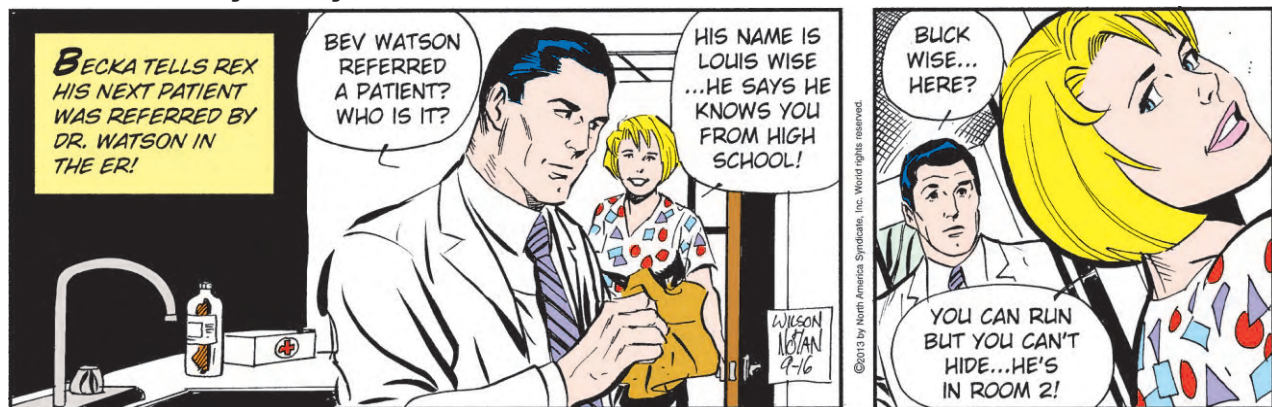
ANSWER: I have mixed emotions about this. On the one hand, you want to make things easier for her; on the other, she clearly has her own mind about it. From a medical perspective, more exercise (not using the motorized cart) is probably better for her.

At some point, your mother will decide when it's too much. If the choice ever becomes using an electric cart for outings versus not going on outings, then I would recommend the cart. Until then, as long as she is safe (not in danger of falling), I would let her decide how she wants to go out and shop with you. As I often do, let me once again recommend regular exercise, supervised by the physical therapist her assisted-living facility is sure to have, as a way of improving her functioning and reducing her fall risk. And let me commend you for being there to help her.

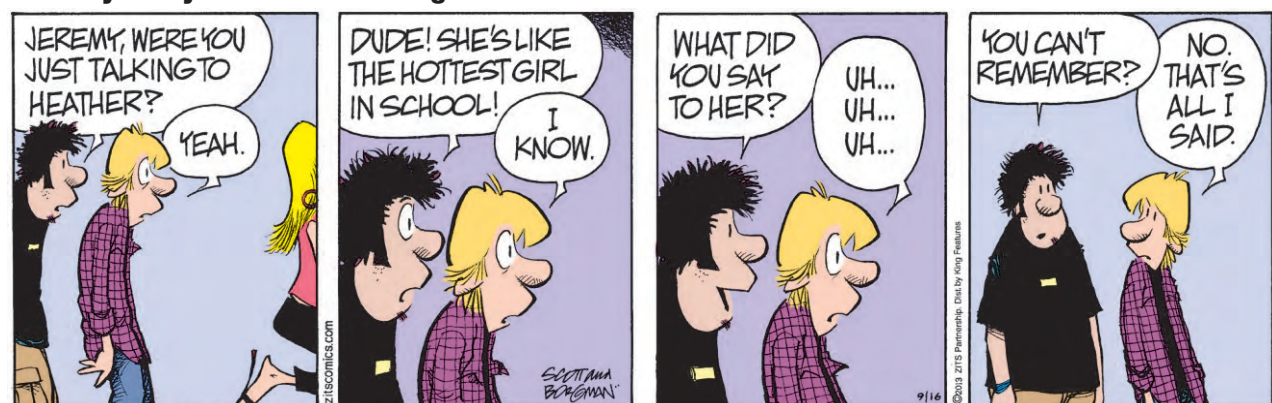

Q 1 - Both vulnerable, as South, you hold:

♠ A 8 6 5 ♥ J 10 7 ♦ 10 9 5 2 ♣ K 7

The bidding has proceeded:

What do you bid now?

A - It depends on style. In modern methods the re-raise is pre-emptive, designed to quiet the opponents, so you must pass. If, however, you play that three spades is invitational, you have a near-maximum for your initial raise, so you should proceed to game.

Q 2 - Neither vulnerable, as South, you hold:

♠ 8 ♥ J 9 5 3 ♦ K 10 9 8 4 ♣ A Q 6

The bidding has proceeded:

What action do you take?

A - While it is tempting to rebid two no trump, despite your fair hand you do not have a source of tricks. You have already shown your values and partner is not interested. Pass, before you land in hot water.

Q 3 - Not vulnerable, you hold:

♠ Q J 10 9 5 ♥ 10 7 ♦ 5 4 3 ♣ 10 6 2

Partner opens the bidding with one heart. What do you respond?

A - Your hand might take no trick at hearts but is likely to deliver three at a spade contract. If there was a guarantee that the auction would end at a low level in spades, you would certainly respond one spade. But any response by you could trigger vigorous action from partner, and that might prove expensive. Pass.

Q 4 - Both vulnerable, as South, you hold:

♠ A K 2 ♥ K J 8 5 3 ♦ A 8 7 2 ♣ 4

What do you bid now?

A - Since three clubs is forcing, it is easy to bid a lazy three spades. However, it might sound to partner as if you are simply taking a preference with a minimum opening bid, and perhaps only two trumps, when that is far from the case. Jump to four spades to highlight both the strength of your trumps and the shortage in clubs.

Q 5 - Neither vulnerable, as South, you hold:

♠ K J 7 ♥ 8 6 3 ♦ A Q 10 3 2 ♣ 10 4

What do you bid now?

A - First, do not even consider two diamonds— since you are a passed hand, partner is allowed to pass. That leaves a choice between a raise to two hearts or an invitational jump to three hearts. With only three-card support and marginal high-card values, we would be content with two hearts, prepared to act strongly next should partner make a move.

Q 6 - Both vulnerable, as South, you hold:

♠ 8 ♥ Q 10 9 5 2 ♦ K 10 9 4 3 2 ♣ 9

What action do you take?

A - While it is tempting to double, you will be in an uncomfortable position should the opponents rescue themselves into some club contract and partner doubles. Take the same action if you play negative doubles and, should partner double, which is for takeout, removal to your six-card suit is probably the wisest action.

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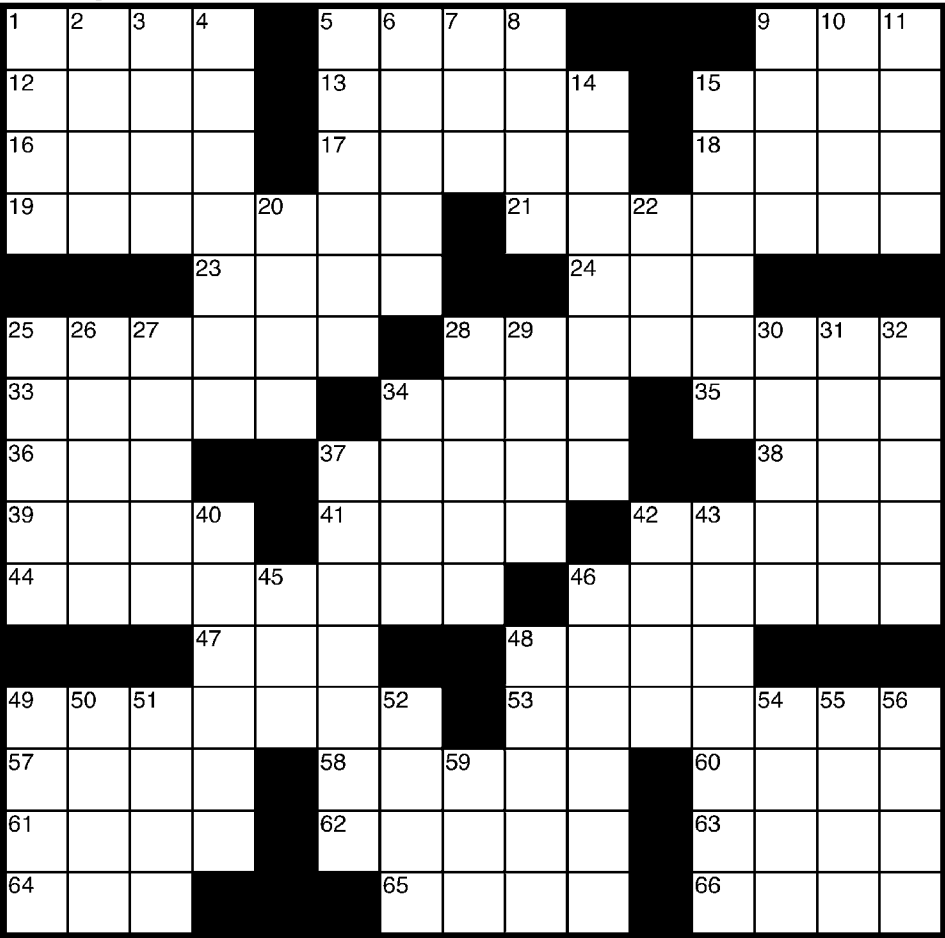
