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Forecast shows a cloudy weekend with chance of rain

A warm Friday should give way to cooler temperatures and rain as Southwest Florida gets closer to Halloween.

Partly cloudy skies are expected for today with highs around 80 degrees and lows in the mid-60s.

According to the National Weather Service, a tropical disturbance is traveling north out of the Caribbean and interacting with an oncoming cold front, increasing the chance of rain in the Southwest Florida area over the weekend.

Saturday is expected to be mostly cloudy with a chance of showers and thunderstorms in the morning and an 80 percent chance of rain in the afternoon. Highs for that day are expected to be in the 80s. Saturday night showers are also likely with a slight chance of thunderstorms. Saturday night temperatures are expected to be in the lower 70s with a chance of rain at 70 percent.

The National Weather Service forecasts Sunday as partly cloudy with a slight chance of showers, breezy highs in the mid-70s and a chance of rain at 20 percent.

Sunday night through Tuesday, which is Halloween, will see mostly clear skies and cooler weather. Lows for Sunday and Monday are expected to be in the low 50s. Daytime highs on Monday are expected to be around 70 degrees.

Forecasts show Tuesday as being mostly clear with lows in the upper 50s and highs in the 70s. Wednesday is expected to be partly cloudy with a chance of showers, highs in the lower 80s and a chance of rain at 20 percent.

Moody's Analytics and Forbes have ranked the North Port metropolitan statistical area among cities with the highest projected job growth over the next three years.

ew studies are analyzing women and their role in the workplace. Working Mother and Good Housekeeping magazines and the Welch's company report that the average working mom puts in 98 hours a week between hours in the office and duties at home, essentially the equivalent of more than two full-time jobs.

That's a lot of hours, and that's a lot of women putting in those hours, with more than 70 percent of women with children younger than 18 working, according to the U.S. Department of Labor.

Another new study examined the guilt moms feel about the amount of time spent away from the kids. That feeling by working moms can often come from childhood experiences and the way their own parents operated. Apparently, moms who grew up with breadwinning fathers and stay-at-home mothers tend to "work like their fathers but want to parent like their mothers," Dr. Ioana Lupu, one of the co-authors, said in Romper

The challenges for women are many. Females make up nearly half of the U.S. workforce, but earned only 83 percent of what men made in 2015 and have far less upward mobility, as evidenced by the fact that only 5.8 percent of S&P 500 companies' chief executives are female, a recent WalletHub study found.

Hurricane Irma FEMA fraud confirms identity theft victims

eaders are contacting me questioning letters from FEMA, verifying their registration for disaster assistance after Hurricane Irma. One dismissed a notice taped to his door from a FEMA-contracted inspector who had attempted a home inspection. Another said he was home when an inspector unexpectedly showed up. But none had any hurricane damage and hadn't registered with FEMA. So, what's the problem?

FEMA registration requires the applicant's name, address, Social Security number and date of birth. Bingo. Confirmation they're

victims of identity theft.

The crooks' endgame? They used this personal identifying information for a quick "smashand-grab"-type crime netting them up to \$500 for each bogus FEMA registration.

That's because FEMA confirms it can transfer one-time Critical Needs Assistance funds up to \$500 to displaced residents in the initial stages of a disaster if it determines it's necessary for expenses like medications, food and water.

As proof, one reader forwarded me his bogus FEMA-confirmed registration form which listed 10 dependents living in a mass shelter, noting electronic funds transfer information had been provided.

Were these Florida readers also possible victims of the Equifax data breach which hacked some

146 million consumers' credit files, compromising their Social Security numbers and dates of birth? The timing appears more than coincidental.

If so, let's do some math. FEMA confirms over 2.5 million Florida households registered for Hurricane Irma assistance. Just one percent of that figure is 25,000. Want to bet there are at least 25,000 compromised Florida

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Holistic wellness resort set for Warm Mineral Springs

NORTH PORT — While city officials are working to revamp the historical buildings on the Warm Mineral Springs land, another local company is planning to bring amenities right across the street.

Firmo Construction, a Sarasota-based company, announced Thursday they are bringing a "holistic wellness resort" to Ortiz Boulevard.

"It's walking distance to cross the road and

the spring is there," said Eric Collin, president of Firmo Construction, adding the spring was a big selling point for the location.

The resort will offer a slew of services such as a nutritionist, yoga and pain management.

They are going through the final phases of permitting for the site. Collin said the groundbreaking will happen around this December or January 2018 and the project will be completed by the end of next year.

The site will mostly be

in North Port limits with some in unincorporated Sarasota County, all along Ortiz Boulevard.

The first phase of the plan will cost around \$3 million and the entire project will be privately funded.

Collin said he hopes the site will help diversify what the spring has to

"We're trying to complement that by bringing holistic medicine, the hotel and assisted living to offer things for people who come in town and visit," he said. "We have

a pool of visitors who spend half the day there and then don't have much to do. This will give them the ability to have an entire health program, to visit the spring and then have other types of

treatment."

The facility is the first of three phases planned from Firmo. They are in the process of designing an independent hotel and assisted living facility that will also come to the grounds.

Collin said permitting for the hotel and living facility should be done

The hotel will be two floors and have 38 rooms.

Collin added it may "somewhat" compete with the already existing Warm Mineral Springs Motel.

"It's really a complement to the spring facility by adding a lot of amenities," Collin said. "It's a diamond in the rough. You have the spring, but the facility is old and there isn't a lot around."

FEMA opens Disaster Recovery Center in Sarasota

A Disaster Recovery Center will be open through Sunday in Sarasota, according to FEMA officials. It will open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. today and Saturday, and from 9 a.m. to noon Sunday at the Robert L. Taylor Community Center, 1845 34th St., Sarasota.

The center will offer in-person support to people and small-business owners. Recovery specialists from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) and the State of Florida are available to provide assistance to anyone filling out their applications or updating their status. Voluntary organizations are available and offer a variety of services to help survivors recover. The State of Florida does not offer Food For Florida (Disaster SNAP/D-SNAP) at DRCs. A list of Food for Florida sites is available online. The registration process requires information such as insurance policies and bank information

for possible direct transfer of funds. You are encouraged to register before visiting a DRC.

The SBA offers low-interest federal disaster loans for homeowners, renters and businesses. The SBA is the federal government's primary source of money for the long-term rebuilding of disaster-damaged property.

If you have phone and/or internet access, you may register in one of the following ways:

Online at DisasterAssistance.gov.

- Call FEMA at 800-621-3362 for voice, 711 and Video Relay Service. If you are deaf, hard of hearing, or have a speech disability and use a TTY, call 800-462-7585. Information on the registration process is available in ASL at: fema.gov/medialibrary/assets/videos/111546.
- Download the FEMA App and apply. You may have other needs while visiting a
- If you have a disability and require a reasonable accommodation, please see a DRC manager when you arrive.
 - · Language translations are offered

through Telephonic Interpretation Services in 200 languages.

If you have already registered, it is not necessary to visit a DRC, but you may still want to go speak with a Recovery Specialist to update your status or find help from the other

organizations. FEMA grants do not have to be repaid. FEMA assistance is nontaxable and will not affect eligibility for Social Security, Medicaid or

other federal benefits. Survivors should register even if they have insurance. FEMA cannot duplicate insurance payments, but underinsured applicants may receive help after their claims have been

WalletHub ranked Florida 24th for best states for working moms, analyzing various factors, such as availability of child care, the numbers of professional opportunities and the quality of work vs. home life balance. On the Aug. 26 observance of Women's Equality Day, Florida did rank second for lowest gender pay gap, partly because there isn't much of a separation to potentially occur in a state where stifled salaries for both men and women lag behind much of the country.

In addition to sometimes sensing like they need to prove themselves even more than male peers, some working mothers who work long hours also try to volunteer in their communities. They say at times they can feel like they're not able to give as much of themselves at home. Clearly, having it all isn't easy.

Ashley Maher is one of those "superwomen" who manages to be everything to everybody. A mother of 1- and 6-year-old sons and wife to her husband, Eddie, she's the Director of Marketing and Development for the Charlotte Community Foundation.

She said that since she moved to Port Charlotte from Michigan 10 years ago, she has always been involved with nonprofits. That hasn't stopped her from raising her two sons to, hopefully, one day follow in her charitable footsteps.

'Someone once told me that (when it comes to raising children) the days are long and the years are fast, and that's so true," Maher said. "I have the utmost admiration for stay-athome moms, my sister is one and my mother was one. But I think anyone who knows me knows that I just don't stop it's like organized chaos all the time."

Maher said that before working for the Community Foundation, she used to be employed at a homeless coalition, which is where she first began taking her older son along with her. It's having her family with her while doing socially significant work that gives her a sense of personal fulfillment.

"I think that it's a good example to set for my kids," she said. "My son knows the importance of giving back."

Darcy Woods also takes her son with her to volunteer. She is a print

advertising salesperson for the Community Shopper, and though her hours are technically 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., anyone who has ever been in sales knows those times are just a suggestion. A salesperson is never off the clock.

When she is not working at her job, Woods volunteers at organizations like the Port Charlotte Little League, where her 13-year-old son D.J. plays, and serves on other professional and community-oriented boards in the area. She says that though she has had to make some sacrifices through the years to do all the things she does, for D.J. to see how hard she works has been a positive thing.

"He's a very good kid, who makes straight As and has had perfect attendance since he began school," Woods said. "He's also seen how much this community gives and he's been to the homeless shelters and seen how little those kids have. I think those things will make him a better adult."

Donna Barrett, **Executive Officer of** the Charlotte-DeSoto **Building Industry** Association, does have adult children who grew up understanding the meaning of giving back, but she also has a 10-year-old daughter and an 18-year-old son who are now learning those same lessons. Before Barrett met her

keep food on the table. "Thank goodness I had a phenomenal baby sitter at that time," she said. "I used to tell myself that it was the quality of time, and not the quantity of time, that was important. I had to make the most of every minute we had together."

By the time her first son (now 25) was born, Barrett and her first husband had already gone their separate ways. She said that when she looks at her son now, and sees all the successes he has already achieved in his life, she has no regrets at all about the way he was raised.

With two younger children at home now, Barrett is still working hard at her job and doing a lot of volunteer work as well with organizations like the Port Charlotte Bandits, Future Builders of America and the Charlotte County Chamber of Commerce's Leadership Charlotte.

She says her theory is that to get anything in life, you need to give up something — so what are you willing to give up?

"My children understand that when we come home, I give them that time," she said. "I would hope that one day my children would think of me as someone who made the right sacrifices at the right times. Now, as always, having my faith and having my children are my main priorities, and I feel that it's the outlook you have that makes the difference."

FAST FACTS

Many organizations argue that giving women equal pay means less dependence on public assistance and higher disposable income to stimulate the economy. In the workplace, groups contend the increased payroll cost of paying women more results in company loyalty and productivity, ability to recruit higher skilled employees, less employee turnover and the reduction of recruiting and training expenses.

Equifax files in that pile of 146 million hacked accounts? Multiply \$25,000 by \$500. That's \$12.5 million worth of "low-hanging fruit" for easy picking, courtesy of the U.S. taxpayers. Claiming these false losses is a felony, with a maximum five-to-10-year prison term and up to

\$250,000 in fines.

Although no ill-gotten gains come out of victims' pockets, it should be a huge wake-up call that they remain ID theft victims, forever enabling crooks to open new credit in their names.

They all need to "padlock" their credit information with a credit freeze, guaranteed by every state's "freeze laws." Freezes are not credit reporting agencyoffered "locks." Freezing

prevents any creditor from opening new credit in your name because it can't run a credit check without your authorization.

And since there's a 50-50 chance your personal information was part of the Equifax breach, it should be everyone's wake-up call as well.

If you haven't already done so, place a freeze with each of the three CRAs, Equifax (www. freeze.equifax.com or

800-349-9960), Experian (www.experian.com/ freeze/center or 888-397-3742) and TransUnion (www.transunion. com/securityfreeze or 888-909-8872).

A freeze has no expiration, but can be temporarily lifted whenever you're applying for new credit. Freeze fees vary by state law. In Florida, CRAs can charge \$10 each to freeze and lift, but seniors 65-plus can freeze for free.

Finally, if you've registered with FEMA for disaster assistance, protect yourself against fraud. FEMA doesn't charge for disaster assistance or home inspections. Stay alert for false promises to speed up the insurance, disaster assistance or building permit process.

All FEMA representatives, including contracted inspectors, have a laminated photo ID and should have no

problem showing it. If you don't think they're legitimate, don't provide any personal information. Contact local law enforcement and the FEMA fraud hotline at 800-323-8603. David Morris is the

Groups oppose state **Constitution Revision Commission action**

TALLAHASSEE — It took just 22 minutes for the Constitution Revision Commission to accept for consideration just six of more than 2,000 public proposals to change the state

constitution. In a process unique to Florida, which only takes place every 20 years, a commission comprised of political appointments has the authority to put constitutional amendments directly on the ballot, then letting voters decide. This exercise in government by the people is especially consequential since changing the constitution has a much more lasting effect than simply making state

For the commission to advance a public proposal, it must be nominated by a commissioner and receive 10 votes from the 37-member commission. Commissioners have already submitted 12 proposals of their own for review.

But the CRC, meeting in Tallahassee, rejected hundreds of citizen recommendations that called for limiting money in politics and political committees, updating medical references to abortion, establishing religious protections for businesses, creating a state commission on sea-level rise, electing the Public Service Commission and other actions.

The commission must decide by May which proposals will go on the ballot.

"There was a big sign at the meeting that read, 'Florida Speaks, We Listen.' Florida spoke and they did not listen," said Pamela Goodman, president of the League of Women Voters Florida. "It's just

another example of public officials believing they are better equipped to make decisions than the public."

Goodman was not alone in condemning the CRC for turning away the vast majority of citizen proposals during its brief meeting. A letter, signed by more than a dozen statewide organizations, was immediately sent to the CRC protesting the panel's action.

Despite the commission hosting a series of public hearings across the state since spring, the missive cited the panel's failure to accept citizen input, compared to past CRCs.

For example, during the last CRC held in 1997-98, a total of 696 publicly-filed proposals were read before the full CRC and 128, or 18.4 percent, achieved the 10-vote threshold needed to move forward for further consideration.

This was in stark contrast to the current commission allowing just six proposals to go forward, accounting for less than 0.003 percent of those filed.

"The citizens of Florida were told their voices would be heard and would shape this process," the letter stated. "Actions speak louder than words, and this commission's actions are brazenly dismissive of the concerns and suggestions of Floridians."

CRC Chairman Carlos Beruff, a Manatee County developer, responded by commending citizens for their involvement.

"The CRC has received historic public input," he said. "Floridians are encouraged to continue reaching out to commissioners with ideas before Oct. 31, which is the deadline for commissioners to file proposals to be taken up during

the CRC process."

Another signatory of the protest letter is Liza McClenaghan, state chair for Common Cause Florida. She said a May public hearing in Fort Myers drew hundreds of citizens, but questioned if the CRC heard their

"They did a good job of seeking public input, but feedback and discussion of that input has been lacking," McClenaghan said. "They should go back to the public again when they finalize their proposals."

The composition of the CRC also came under fire. For the first time in history, the commission was appointed exclusively by Republicans.

Gov. Rick Scott named 14 of the members, House Speaker Richard Corcoran and Senate President Joe Negron each appointed nine members, and Florida Supreme Court Justice Jorge Labarga filled out the remaining three posts.

"The litmus test for their appointments was that commissioners were conservative and Republican," Goodman said.

Julie McGillivray, president of the League of Women Voters of Charlotte County, was another to charge the CRC with pursuing party politics over open government.

'Sadly, I'm not surprised. We went into this hoping for the best, but were not optimistic because of the commission's makeup. We feel the deck was stacked," she said. "The public is yearning for responsible and transparent government. While this process may have had the appearance of transparency, this still has the feel of a smokefilled room."



Our View

New option for homeless comes at cost

OUR POSITION: Behind the "no camping" ordinance is the goal of redirecting the homeless into positive housing rehabilitation programs.

arasota County is expected to take another step forward this year in the fight against chronic homelessness — but it's one that will naturally come with a cost.

Earlier this month, county commissioners discussed with Sheriff Tom Knight the ramifications of a proposed Quality of Life Ordinance, which will be brought to a public hearing in November. The ordinance would create a process for dealing with chronic homelessness by prohibiting camping at public parks and giving violators alternatives to jail and fines.

On the surface, it may sound like an excuse for simply rousting troublesome vagrants. It's not.

Key to the ordinance are requirements that law enforcement follow strict standards established by the courts — the so-called "Pottinger" rules developed decades ago in a court settlement between the ACLU and the city of Miami.

According to the proposed ordinance, deputies — or code enforcement officials — would have to offer alternatives to anyone found "camping" in parks (without specific authorization).

"Campers" would be asked to participate in a special program known as SHIFTS, the Sheriff's Housing Initiative Facilitating Transient Services. They would be offered a bed in a homeless shelter. (Both Sarasota County and the city of Sarasota have contracted for a number of beds at a Salvation Army shelter in Sarasota.) Officers would be required to drive the person to the shelter and bring his or her belongings.

If no bed were available, officers would be obliged to send the person on his way. If there were one, though, and if the person refused, he or she could be arrested and brought to jail.

That is the worst alternative. In the past, the revolving door has done little to deal with the root causes of chronic homelessness, and the related problems of disorderly conduct and misdemeanors that come with it.

And jails are expensive.

The Sheriff's Office figures it cost more than \$3 million in 2016 "to incarcerate individuals without homes in the Sarasota County Jail."

A more efficient and humane approach is to get these people into a shelter, expose them to constructive programs and help them find legitimate housing.

As Knight pointed out, that also comes with a price tag.

The Sheriff's Office's estimates administering the ordinance could cost \$540,000 a year — for two specialized teams (in the north and the south of the county) of a deputy and mental health clinician, supervised by a sergeant.

If adopted, the ordinance would go into effect next March. In the meantime, Knight's office and county officials agreed, they will meet to figure out other enforcement options. They may be less expensive. While deputies will be needed at a certain point, county staff also might have a role in the process, County Commissioner Charles Hines said.


One way or another, Knight offered a realistic assessment of the situation.

"Policies are easy," he said, "but you've got to have the people to enact the philosophy and the policy to make it work the right way. ... And that's not free."

We appreciate the decent, progressive and hopeful nature of this approach. And also recognize

it comes with a price.

But considering the \$3 million now associated with jailing this population — and the possibility of breaking a harmful cycle — this could be money well spent.

Facebook farce: The substitute for a smoking gun

he Kremlin knows a bargain when it sees it.

We are supposed to believe that it bought the American presidential election last year with \$100,000 in Facebook ads and some other digital activity. Frankly, if American democracy can be purchased this cheap — it's probably not worth having.

The latest obsession in the Russian collusion story, the Kremlin's digital activity has generated headlines and put Facebook and all of Silicon Valley on the defensive, although this looks to be one of the most over-hyped stories of the

The Russians, as far as we know, bought more than \$100,000 in Facebook ads between June 2015 and May 2017. A little more than half was spent

after last November, when, obviously, Donald Trump had already won.

The scale here is singularly unimpressive. A serious House campaign might spend \$100,000 on digital. In a presidential campaign, the amount is a rounding error. The Trump campaign spent around \$90 million on digital in 2016. Hillary Clinton employed a considerable digital staff, and announced she was spending \$30 million on digital the last month of the campaign alone.

If tens of thousands of dollars was decisive amid this tsunami of tens of millions, the Russian trolls working somewhere in St. Petersburg should strike out on their own and start a political consultancy or an internet publishing company. They are geniuses.

It doesn't appear that much of the Russian material was explicitly advocating for Trump's election, and some of it wasn't even right wing. One Russian Facebook page highlighted discrimination against Muslims. Another promoted anti-police videos for a Black Lives Matter audience.

Other pages were on the right and supportive of Trump. But much of the Russian Facebook activity was peddling online tripe indistinguishable from indigenous American

online tripe — in fact, it was ripped off from content produced by Americans.

One suspicion has been that the Trump campaign helped direct the Russian online effort. What we know about the Russian activity so far makes that doubtful. Why, if the Trump campaign was running its own digital campaign that was magnitudes larger, would it bother with a tiny Russian effort that wasn't always focused on Trump or his message?

The Daily Beast ran a story last week with the headline, "Trump Campaign Staffers Pushed Russian Propaganda Days Before the Election." This referred to Kellyanne Conway and others associated with the Trump campaign retweeting posts from a Twitter account that masqueraded as a

project of the Tennessee Republican Party, when it was really operated by Russian trolls. Conway tweeted a post from the account once, according to the story. And the report adduces no evidence that the Trump supporters knew the origin of the

It is outrageous that Russians meddled in our democracy at all, and if there are ways to lock them out of our social media going forward, we should do it. Let's not pretend, though, that the Russian online activity was the key to the election. This is classic conspiracy thinking — that some small secret cabal is responsible for a world-historical outcome that had much more obvious causes (Hillary Clinton's poor campaign,

for one).

There may yet be truly damaging Russia revelations. Trump's campaign manager during a decisive phase of the primary campaign, Paul Manafort, worked with shady characters from that part of the world. The notorious Don Trump Jr. meeting with Russians promising oppo on Clinton spoke of a willingness to cooperate with anyone who might be useful. The Trump family's business dealings could always produce a

nasty surprise. But all the focus on Facebook serves, for now, as a substitute for a smoking gun in the absence of a real one.

Are the Rays moving to a Tampa stadium? Not so fast

ays moving to Tampa!

Um, not so fast. I was getting ready for dinner Tuesday when WFLA, Channel 8, opened its 6 p.m. newscast with what seemed like a blockbuster.

The station was reporting that the Tampa Bay Rays had settled on a site near Tampa's Ybor City for a proposed new stadium. On air and through social media, the anchors breathlessly hyped a story from reporter Jeff Patterson that made it sound like it was done deal.

There is one major problem: The story didn't

on anything.

The story also wasn't the earth-shaking scoop WFLA's social media machine made it out to be. Back on Aug. 21, more than two months ago, the Tampa Bay Times first reported that Hillsborough County was "focusing" on the Ybor site and was trying to consolidate enough

land to make building a stadium feasible.

The Times reported then that the county hoped to "make an announcement soon."

Well, that announcement came Tuesday. It's a big deal, but it's just another incremental step in a process that is a long way from being over.

Rays President Brian Auld sought to douse the flames with a statement that called it "another important step in the site selection process." He said the Rays would evaluate it, along with a proposal from Pinellas County.

In my estimate from having extensively covered the build-up to Raymond

James Stadium and Amalie Arena, we are a minimum of four years — and likely longer — from seeing the first pitch in a new ballpark.

Assembling the land is important, but the Rays have to analyze that and other proposals to make sure their new home is in the right place. Then comes the fun part — figuring out how to pay for it. That alone will likely take a year or more, especially when it gets down to haggling over how much the Rays and Major League Baseball will pay.

I assume the Rays will choose to be in Tampa likely at the Ybor site. But they haven't done that yet and there a million hurdles they have to clear before it becomes a real thing.

WFLA ought to be embarrassed by its overreaction. It turned a solid, informative update by Patterson into something that was confusing, misleading and over-hyped. I think we all know why.

Social media doesn't thrive on accuracy. It thrives on clicks, and shouting "RAYS SETTLE ON TAMPA" is major clickbait. The problem is, when that is proved to be wildly premature, it drains the credibility of a news operation.

It's not uncommon for news outlets to have a social media editor — I don't know if that's the case at WFLA — whose job it is to hype stories. Assuming the Rays eventually do settle on Tampa, I suppose WFLA will fall all over itself saying had it had the "scoop."

I went on one of their Facebook threads and it had already lit up with comments shortly after the "news" broke.

I tried to offer a clarification (using the information in their own story). I looked for that comment this morning, but it wasn't

I assume it was deleted. After all, can't let facts get in the way of clickbait.

The column moved on website FloridaPolitics.

Pirates, Tarpons meet for playoff spot

PUNTA GORDA — The last two meetings between Charlotte and Port Charlotte have had a lot on the line — a district

But the loser of both those games — Port Charlotte — was still guaranteed a playoff berth as the district runner-up.

That's no longer the case in 2017.

Tonight's game between the Pirates and Tarpons somehow has more riding on the line with North Fort Myers already locked in as the District 6A-10 champion. One team will keep its playoff hopes alive while the other is likely done for the year.

"It's simple — win and go to the playoffs," Port Charlotte quarterback Paul Barnes said.

The Pirates (6-1, 3-1) enter the matchup clinging to a playoff spot in Region 6A-3. In the latest points standings released Tuesday, Port Charlotte fell to eighth with 36.14 points after being seventh last week and just fifth two weeks ago despite not losing a game since Sept. 29 to North Fort Myers.

Meanwhile, the Tarpons (4-3, 3-1) have made a slow climb to ninth and find themselves just one spot back of their rivals with 33.43 points.


As if this rivalry needed any more juice.

"It's a big game. We've got to win, they've got to win. It'll be a great game," Charlotte coach Binky Waldrop said.

It should be a great game, as rivalries typically are, but it's definitely been a long week for the coaches involved. With so much pressure on one game and playoff hopes hanging in the balance, Port Charlotte coach Jordan Ingman is using any extra time he can to prepare for this one.

Even if it means only a little bit of sleep.

"There's not a lot of sleep that goes into these weeks," Ingman said. "You

love coaching them but there's definitely a lot of coffee and late nights."

Players also enjoy playing in them despite all the pressure. Barnes is itching to take the field tonight for his final snaps in the rivalry, looking for his first win over the Tarpons as a three-year starter.

"I love these games. The North Fort Myers game, the scrimmage against Venice at the beginning of the year, Riverview in the spring — these are the games I love," Barnes said. "I love the close games. These games we just played against Island Coast and Ida Baker are fine to see the other kids succeed, but these games that come down to the last minute where you're biting your nails are the fun games. I love those."

There's even more added spice to tonight's matchup.

Barnes' former understudy Alex Muse, who came in for Barnes when he was hurt in last year's playoff game, is now the quarterback at Charlotte.

Muse changed colors

for one simple reason he wanted a chance. He threw a touchdown pass in Port Charlotte's regional quarterfinal loss to Clearwater last November and hoped to get a chance to start this season.

That wasn't happening with Barnes in the fold, so Muse transferred over the summer, carrying with him a chip on his

"I just feel like I've got to prove that I shouldn't have been passed up," Muse said.

"It'll be a war, I know that," he added on the game's intensity.

Charlotte has won 32 of the 36 meetings in the rivalry's history, which dates to 1982. Ingman took over the Port Charlotte program in 2012 and won his first two games over the Tarpons before losing the next four, including a playoff game in 2015.

Last year's meeting early looked like his third victory but he saw his team squander a 17-0 first-half lead, resulting in a 21-17 Charlotte win

late. Just like every year, though, this is a new season and Waldrop can testify to that.

The Tarpons lost 23 seniors from last year's state semifinal squad. They only have 11 this season and have dealt with growing pains throughout the year as an inexperienced squad that's lost three games by a combined 83 points.

The Pirates, on the other hand, have 18 seniors and 19 juniors.

"They're a good football team," Waldrop said. "They're veteran, they have speed, they're good up front, they have an experienced quarterback and they have a good kicking game."

Based on their bodies' of work this season, you can say that Port Charlotte is the favorite to win tonight. That hasn't been said often in this rivalry.

Not only are the Pirates more experienced, they're also getting healthy at the right time. Marc Jean-Louis and Caden Marcum both returned last week while Skylar Razwilavich and Christian Clark will return from injuries tonight.

There's been injury after injury for the Pirates all season, yet they're one bounce away from being undefeated. Different players have stepped up at different games when called upon, something that Ingman believes will pay big dividends tonight.

"When you play these games, you better play as a team or you're not going to win," Ingman said. "We've had to do that all year so it's been great preparation for this game. It's not like we've relied on one guy.

"We've been having everybody do their job so in these games where you play a good football team like Charlotte, everybody has to do their job."

Or you can kiss the playoffs goodbye.

Bobcats Kubik earns state bid

LAKEWOOD RANCH – On a day when blustery conditions sent scores soaring, North Port's Zack Kubik fired a 1-over-par 73 to take top honors at the Region 3A-6 golf tournament Wednesday at Lakewood National Golf Club.

The Bobcats senior was the only area qualifier for next week's state tournament as both boys and girls teams from Charlotte High School fell short in the team competition.

"I had two three-putts with the 73, so there were a couple of shots I left out there, but overall it was a good round," said Kubik said, who finished three shots ahead of Lakewood Ranch's Matt Burton. "The wind was super tough out there. I had to hit a lot of stingers and low shots. It was playing at least 20 yards into the wind

most of the time.

"But I played a practice round here on Saturday, and it was the same exact wind. We only had a couple of holes downwind, but those are fun downwind at least."

Despite improving on last week's score in the district tournament by eight shots, the Charlotte boys team finished ninth with a total of 361. Billy Brumbaugh led the Tarpons with an 83, followed by Jacob Smith (85), Jackson Varner (94), Bryce Hayse (99) and Ben Kamberg (105).

Gulf Coast shot 320 to win the team title, edging Lakewood Ranch by two strokes, as both teams moved on to next week's state tournament. Riverview's Josh Perna beat teammate E.J. Odegard in a playoff for the second individual qualifying spot with a par on the first extra hole. Kubik's Bobcats teammate, Chad Baker, shot an 86.

Kubik just missed qualifying for the state tournament last season, so he picked a good time to shoot one of his best rounds of the year.

"In these conditions, it's pretty good," Kubik said. "On any other course, not in these conditions, you'd be shooting 67. It was a good round finally to pull through in regionals and go on to states."

On the girls side, it was Lakewood Ranch comfortably taking the team title with a score of 341, 41 shots ahead of Gulf Coast. Charlotte finished fifth with 403.

"If it was calm out, this golf course is going to be tough for the girls to play," Tarpons coach Josh Hoffart said. "The greens are on a very high level, and it's not something the girls are used to and it's not something you can be ready for. You mix in the wind and it was

tough on the greens. "From tee to green we played great. We were getting on the greens in regulation. It was just hard to get the ball in the hole."

Laren Fender shot 86 to lead the Tarpons, while Becky Davis had 89. Other Charlotte golfers were Madison Wiley (113), Stephanie Gonzalez (115) and Natasha Peet (116).

"We had some high hopes as a team and especially my top two girls maybe advancing," Hoffart said. "But today was tough for everyone. There's above average scores for every team. It just came down to who could find a way to master those greens today, and a handful of girls were able to do that and we weren't able to pull that off. But we played well and I'm excited for them. We put in a lot of work this season. They never stopped and never said, 'I don't want to play anymore.' They just kept

trying to find a way to

get a two-putt or better, but it didn't happen."

On the verge of a blowing a 2-0 lead with a tiebreaker set staring them dead in the face, the Tarpons rallied from six points down in the fourth set to defeat Clearwater 3-1 (27-25, 25-23, 15-25, 26-24) in a Region 7A-3 quarterfinal. The victory earns Charlotte a fourth date with Port Charlotte in Wednesday's semifinal.

A poor serve cost the Tornadoes a chance to pull away in the fourth.

A kill by Skylar Gribben and back-to-back blocks by Alani Qualls pulled the Tarpons within 23-21 and then two straight aces by Shelby Beisner tied it.

Beisner sent the next serve long, but Clearwater gave possession right back on a serve out of bounds to tie things again. Eva Le's ace and a kill by Kaitlyn Chavarria then finished off the Tornadoes to send the Tarpons into an eruption of joy.

"The pressure was definitely high,' Gribben said. "I think just us pulling together and pulling through together as a team and not individuals really helped us. It's just an awesome win. It felt great."

Beisner led the Tarpons (20-5) with 17 kills and six aces — both team highs while also recording 17 digs. Gribben was also huge with 11 kills and 19 digs and Emily Vaughn added 10 more

Abby Hayse defended a vaunted Clearwater attack with 20 digs, and Qualls did her work at the net with nine blocks to go with seven kills. The Tornadoes (19-4) had four hitters tally more than 100 kills during the regular season and all four of gave the Tarpons all they could handle.

Freshman Sandy Cao led Clearwater with 17 kills while Olivia Jones had 14, Mariah Ramirez 13 and Hailey Bossetti 10. "I knew from the

Trump keeps some JFK files sealed another 180 days, citing national security

President Donald Trump blocked the release of hundreds of records on the John F. Kennedy assassination Thursday night, bending to CIA and FBI appeals, while the National Archives moved to turn over some 2,800 other records.

"I have no choice," Trump said in a memo, citing "potentially irreversible harm" to national security if he were to allow all records out now. He was placing those files under a six-month review while letting the 2,800 others come out Thursday evening, racing a deadline to honor a law mandating their release.

Officials say Trump will impress upon federal agencies that "only in the rarest cases" should JFK files stay secret after

the six-month review.

Despite having months to prepare for disclosures that have been set on the calendar for 25 years, Trump's decision came down to a last-minute debate with intelligence agencies - a tussle the president then prolonged by calling for still more

Much of Thursday passed with nothing from the White House or National Archives except silence, leaving unclear how the government would comply with a law requiring the records to come out by the end of the day - unless Trump had been persuaded by intelligence agencies to hold some back.

White House officials said the FBI and CIA made the most requests within the government to withhold some information.

No blockbusters had been expected in the last trove of secret files regarding Kennedy's assassination Nov. 22, 1963, given a statement months ago by the Archives that it assumed the records, then under preparation, would be "tangential" to what's

known about the killing.

But for historians, it's a chance to answer lingering questions, put some unfounded conspiracy theories to rest, perhaps give life to other theories — or none of that, if the material adds little to the record.

Researchers were frustrated by the uncertainty that surrounded the release for much of the day.

"The government has had 25 years — with a known end-date – to prepare (hash)JFKfiles for release," University of Virginia historian Larry Sabato tweeted in the afternoon. "Deadline is here. Chaos."

Asked what he meant, Sabato emailed to say: "Contradictory signals were given all day. Trump's tweets led us to believe that disclosure was ready to go. Everybody outside government was ready to move quickly."

Trump ordered agencies that have proposed withholding material related to the assassination to report to the archivist by March 12 on which specific information in the records meets the standard for continued



secrecy.

That standard includes details that could cause "harm to the military defense, intelligence operations, law enforcement or conduct of foreign relations," Trump wrote in his order. The archivist will have two weeks to tell Trump whether those recommendations validate keeping the withheld information a secret after April 26.

Experts say the publication of the last trove of evidence

could help allay suspicions of a conspiracy — at least for some.

"As long as the government is withholding documents like these, it's going to fuel suspicion that there is a smoking gun out there about the Kennedy assassination," said Patrick Maney, a presidential historian at Boston

But the further withholding of thousands of pages of apparently

Private prisons boost lobbying as federal detention needs grow

WASHINGTON — One of the country's largest private prison companies is spending record amounts on lobbying amid efforts by the Trump administration to detain more undocumented immigrants, federal records show.

The GEO Group, which has contracts with Immigration and Customs Enforcement, the Bureau of Prisons and the Marshals Service, has spent nearly \$1.3 million on lobbying from Jan. 1 through Sept. 30, according to new lobbying records filed with Congress. That tops \$1 million spent last year. The company spent at least \$400,000 on seven lobbying businesses in the third quarter alone, the disclosures show.

GEO's increased spending comes as ICE is seeking proposals for five new immigrant detention facilities and the Homeland Security Department is asking Congress to fund more than 51,000 beds, up from the current 34,000. ICE is the Florida-based

Pablo Paez, the GEO Group's vice president for corporate relations, said the company's lobbying practices "have always

Trump declares opioid emergency but pledges no new money

WASHINGTON — In ringing and personal terms, President Donald Trump on Thursday pledged that "we will overcome addiction in America," declaring opioid abuse a national public health emergency and announcing new steps to combat what he described as the worst drug crisis in U.S. history.

Trump's declaration, which will be effective for 90 days and can be renewed, will allow the government to redirect resources, including toward expanded access to medical services in rural areas. But it won't bring new dollars to fight a scourge that kills nearly 100 people a day.

"As Americans we cannot allow this to continue," Trump said in a speech at the White House, where he bemoaned an epidemic he said had spared no segment of society, affecting rural areas and cities, rich and poor and both the elderly and newborns.

"It is time to liberate our communities from this scourge of drug addiction," he said. "We can be the generation that ends the opioid epidemic."

Deaths have surged from opioids, which include some prescribed painkillers, heroin and synthetic drugs such as fentanyl, often sold on the nation's streets.

Administration officials said they also would urge Congress, during

end-of-the year budget negotiations, to add new cash to a public health emergency fund that Congress hasn't replenished for years and contains just \$57,000.

But critics said Thursday's words weren't enough.

"How can you say it's an emergency if we're not going to put a new nickel in it?" said Dr. Joseph Parks, medical director of the nonprofit National Council for Behavioral Health, which advocates for addiction treatment providers. "As far as moving the money around," he added, "that's like robbing Peter to pay Paul."

Democratic House leader Nancy Pelosi said, "Show me the money."

Trump's audience Thursday included parents who have lost children to drug overdoses, people who have struggled with addiction, first responders and lawmakers.

Trump also spoke personally about his own family's experience with addiction: His older brother, Fred Jr., died after struggling with alcoholism. It's the reason the president does not drink.

Trump described his brother as a "great guy, best-looking guy," with a personality "much better than mine."

"But he had a problem, he had a problem with alcohol," the president said. "I learned because of Fred."

Trump said he hoped a massive advertising campaign, which sounded

reminiscent of the 1980s "Just Say No" campaign, might have a similar impact.

"If we can teach young people, and people generally, not to start, it's really, really easy not to take 'em," he said.

It's a path taken by previous presidents, including Richard Nixon, Ronald Reagan and George H.W. Bush, all of whom tried to rally the nation to confront drug abuse but fell short of solving the problem. Some people have become hooked on opioids after being prescribed prescription pain killers by doctors after injuries or surgery.

As a presidential candidate, Trump had pledged to make fighting addiction a priority. Once in office, Trump assembled a commission, led by Gov. Chris Christie of New Jersey, to study the problem. The commission's interim report argued an emergency declaration would free additional money and resources, but some in Trump's administration disagreed.

"What the president did today was historic and it is an extraordinary beginning set of steps to dealing with this problem," Christie told reporters at the White House after the speech.

Some also faulted the White House for not issuing a wider emergency declaration to deal with the crisis.

Rob Brandt, an Ohio

man who lost his 20-yearold son to a heroin overdose in 2011, called Trump's public health emergency order a "good incremental step" but urged greater focus on prevention and long-term treatment.

"The federal government has lagged behind in truly decisive action," said Brandt, who opened an opioid recovery center in Medina, Ohio this year, run on private donations and grants.

"We lost 64,000 Americans last year," he said, "and if you look at, if we were to have a foreign country attack us and kill 60,000 Americans or a terrorist attack that killed 60,000 Americans, we would print money to combat that."

Crossing a Honolulu street? Don't text to avoid a fine

HONOLULU (AP) — Of all the beautiful scenery to see in Honolulu, city officials want to make sure residents and tourists get a good look at the street.

Honolulu this week became the largest city in the U.S. to make it illegal for people to look at cellphones, tablets or video games while crossing a road or highway.

It remains to be seen how the law can be enforced in a city that draws international visitors. The tourism industry is trying to educate visitors, but a smattering of tourists said they had no clue.

Police spokesperson Michelle Yu says officers have discretion to issue a warning or a ticket. A first offense carries a fine of between \$15 and \$35.

Centuries-old tomb linked to Paul Revere's ride reopened

BOSTON (AP) — A 200-year-old tomb under the historic Boston church closely associated with Paul Revere's famous midnight ride in 1775 has been reopened.

The Boston Globe reports the tomb at the Old North Church was briefly reopened Tuesday for a structural assessment ahead of a renovation of the city's oldest surviving church, which turns 300 years old in 2023. The tomb was reserved for church officials.

It's one of 37 tombs under the church, dating from 1732 to about 1860. They contain the remains of notable figures of early Boston, including the USS Constitution's first commander.

Boston archaeologist Joe Bagley says the barrel-vaulted tomb was relatively well preserved, but many of the stacked wooden coffins had collapsed and revealed skulls and bones.

The church is where two lanterns were lit to tell Revere the British were arriving by sea.

Kansas Democrat seeks change in harassment investigations

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) — A Democratic leader wants the Kansas Legislature to have independent attorneys investigate sexual harassment allegations.

Minority Leader Jim Ward also promised Thursday that fellow Democrats in the Kansas House will undergo training on sexual harassment at a December retreat.

And Ward pledged that he'll be willing to remove committee assignments from any House Democrat found to have committed sexual harassment.

The Legislature's policies say that allegations against lawmakers by their employees are investigated by its administrative services office. Republican leaders said they trust that process.

Ward commented a day after a former Democratic legislative staffer said she was propositioned by a lawmaker in 2015 and that in 2016 female college-student interns acted as after-hours designated drivers for intoxicated lawmakers. Ward was not minority leader at the time.

Missouri attorney killed as man he recently defeated in court is tied to case \$5.75 million judgment

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Kansas City police on Thursday were at the home of a man who had recently lost a \$5.75 million judgment won by an attorney who was shot to death on the front porch of his home.

Friends identified the victim as Tom Pickert, 39, who reportedly had just returned home after walking his children to school near their house in Kansas City's Brookside neighborhood.

Pickert's wife called police just around 8 a.m. Wednesday after hearing gunshots and finding her husband fatally wounded.

Police not release any suspect information but said they do not think others are in danger. Several people contacted police after the shooting to express concern about their own safety, police

Shortly after the shooting police asked for help finding a white 1997 Chevrolet van with Missouri license 6FA 453. By late afternoon, police

found the van in Raytown unoccupied.

Police spoke with the van's owner at police headquarters and then let the man leave.

They have the van in police custody and are processing it for evidence.

Pickert was an attorney for the firm Fowler Pickert Eisenmenger LLC in Kansas City. The shooter may have walked up to him and shot him at close range. A car was heard speeding away immediately after the shooting.

Pickert won a

this summer against a businessman who had shot a homeless man on his property. Last week, Jackson County court officials started the process of seizing the man's real estate to pay the judgment. The court filed paperwork that would prevent the man from selling or transferring the

property. Police spent Wednesday searching the man's suburban residence and a business he owned in Kansas City.

Police were at the home

on Thursday.

Sgt. Kari Thompson would not say whether Pickert had been threatened before the shooting. She would not say whether the people who contacted police worried about their safety were attorneys who had dealt with the man whose home police are searching.

As a personal injury attorney, Pickert focused on medical malpractice, nursing home and longterm care abuse cases, according to his biography on his firm's website.

Q&A: Why wiping of Georgia elections server matters

Election reform activists sued Georgia officials on July 3 demanding its highly questioned statewide elections system be immediately retired. Four days later, technicians at Kennesaw State University, which administers the state's elections, destroyed a key piece of evidence – wiping clean an elections management

server. The server, holding data on Georgia's 6.7 million voters and files used to stage elections, had been exposed on the open internet for at least six months until early June. A security expert, Logan Lamb, first alerted officials to the gaping vulnerability in August 2016 but it had gone unpatched.

WHY PRESERVE THE DATA?

It's necessary to know whether the server might have been hacked and

the outcome of last November's election and a special House of Representatives vote on June 20 altered. Data on the server included passwords used by county officials to access elections management files.

HOW DID THE ASSOCIATED PRESS LEARN OF THE DATA **DESTRUCTION?**

It obtained a Sept. 18 email written by an assistant state attorney general to lawyers in the case. The AP also was given 180 pages of email exchanges of election administrators obtained in an open records request. The documents confirmed the irretrievable deletion not just of the main server but also of two backups on Aug. 9.

WHO ORDERED THE **SERVER WIPED?**

Secretary of State Brian Kemp — a Republican running for governor in 2018 — oversees Georgia's elections and is the

main defendant. On Thursday, he blamed the wipe on "the undeniable ineptitude" of Kennesaw State's elections center. His spokeswoman told the AP that Kemp's office did not order the destruction and did not know of it beforehand. Kennesaw State officials refused to comment.

Emails in the open records request show that a senior university engineer instructed technicians to wipe the server's hard drives.

The Atlanta FBI, which made an image of the server when it temporarily took custody in March, would not say whether it retained that copy or whether it has done a forensic examination to determine whether the server was accessed by hackers and had files altered.

The state attorney general's office, Kemp's lawyer in the case, notified the court Wednesday of its intent to subpoena the FBI for the image.

WAS IT A CRIME TO **DESTROY THE DATA?**

That's not clear. The plaintiffs' local attorney sent an email July 10 to the defendants' lawyers reminding them of their electronic evidence. The case was later transferred from state to federal court. A Republican state representative, Scot Turner, called Thursday for a criminal investigation. It appears no judge was asked for an order mandating the preservation of evidence. So the defendants could not be held in contempt of court.

WHAT'S NEXT?

Legal briefs are due Oct. 30, after which Presiding Judge Amy Totenberg will weigh their motion to dismiss the case. Meantime, Georgia's legislature has begun discussing replacing the state's 15-year-old elections system with modern equipment that includes an auditable paper trail at an estimated cost of at least \$100 million.

On Nov. 7, Conyers, Georgia, a city near Atlanta, will test new equipment that produces a paper trail in its local elections.

FPL to seek \$1.3 billion in Hurricane Irma costs

TALLAHASSEE — Florida Power & Light will seek to recoup an estimated \$1.3 billion from customers to cover the costs of restoring electricity after Hurricane Irma barreled through the state last month, the utility said Thursday.

The costs would start showing up in customers' bills in March — just as they get done paying off costs from Hurricane Matthew in 2016. If the new plan is approved by the state Public Service Commission, FPL customers would continue paying Irma costs through 2020.

"FPL's storm reserve fund was fully depleted by hurricanes Hermine and Matthew last year, and as with most states across the U.S., the costs of responding to major natural disasters are not covered by the regular rates paid by electric customers in Florida," FPL spokesperson David McDermitt said in an email Thursday. "We understand that no one wants to pay more for energy or any other service, and we plan to request permission from the Florida Public Service Commission to recover Hurricane Irma recovery costs over the next few years to keep the impact on electric rates more manageable for FPL customers.'

The proposal comes as legislative committees and the Public Service Commission begin looking at hurricane preparedness and restoration issues after Irma knocked out electricity to millions of Florida homes and businesses.

But those reviews are unlikely to affect FPL's ability to recoup hurricane costs from customers. A rate agreement approved last year by the Public Service Commission makes clear that the utility is able to recover costs of restoring power after hurricanes.

Irma was significantly more expensive for FPL than Hurricane Matthew, which hammered parts of the East Coast in 2016, though it never made landfall in the state.

The Public Service Commission in February approved a request from FPL to recover \$318.5 million in costs related to Matthew.

FPL, the state's largest utility, began collecting the Matthew costs in March and is expected to finish in February 2018. For a residential customer who uses 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity a month, Matthew has added \$3.36 to monthly bills.

Under the new

proposal, that same FPL customer would start paying \$4 a month in Irma charges in March 2018 — effectively seeing a 64-cent increase because of the end of the Matthew charges in February, according to the utility. The monthly amount would increase to about \$5.50 in 2019, with the storm costs expected to be paid off by the end of 2020.

The utility industry commonly uses a 1,000-kilowatt-hour residential bill as a measuring stick. But many residential customers use more power than that each month, and rate impacts on businesses are measured differently.

A formal request to recover the Irma costs had not been posted on the Public Service Commission website as of Thursday morning.

Florida rejects one-way traffic during evacuations

TALLAHASSEE — Opening road shoulders to traffic when hurricanes or other disasters threaten Florida will continue to be the primary way to speed evacuations rather than converting all traffic lanes to the same direction.

Michael Dew, secretary of the Florida
Department of
Transportation, told
members of the House
Select Committee on
Hurricane Response
and Preparedness on

Thursday that too many safety impediments remain to making highways one-way for evacuees, a process known as "contraflow," which is used in coastal areas of Georgia and South Carolina.

Instead, Florida will continue to use paved shoulders as extra lanes, a process used on northbound Interstate 75 between Wildwood and the Georgia state line and along westbound Interstate 4 from Tampa to Orlando as Irma approached.

"Let me be very clear this morning," Dew said. "If our research, modeling or traffic-operations data showed that contraflow or one-way operations on highway corridors were safe and effective, we would take whatever actions were necessary to implement such plans."

An estimated 6.5 million people left their homes as Hurricane Irma approached in early September, a situation that Dew said put "unprecedented" pressure on the state highway system.

Dew said the state looked at different evacuation options after Hurricane Matthew put a strain on the east-west Interstate 10 last year. "Our research on this issue has shown that one-way operations come with a number of challenges, drawbacks and unintended consequences," Dew said.

Reversing the direction of half of a highway would require at least two law-enforcement officers at each interchange. It also can only be done during daylight hours and would limit the ability of relief operations and fuel trucks to travel into impacted areas. In addition, it would limit the options for motorists on reversed lanes to exit

for fuel, food and lodging due to closed ramps, and would lead to backups where lanes merge as the contraflow comes to an end.

David Casto, the emergency management director in Sumter County, which includes Wildwood, said the use of shoulders by evacuees works but needs some improvements, including public awareness.

"I don't think the public knew about that plan," Casto said. "The public didn't understand when they saw that barrier saying, 'Go left, get on this shoulder.' And then they hit those rumble strips, psychologically something happened. And some of those issues have to be worked on."

Dew said his department's future design standards for highways will include emergency shoulder use.

The Department of Transportation estimated that the law-enforcement needs for emergency shoulder use on I-75 would require two officers, while contraflow on the road would take 120 officers from other pre-storm work. Along I-4, the projections are similar.

FBI: No foreign terror links in Florida mall bomb plot

MIAMI — No evidence has surfaced of links to foreign extremists in an alleged plot by a Honduran man to bomb a Florida mall despite his claimed allegiance to the Islamic State group, an FBI agent testified Thursday.

Agent David Clancy said at a bail hearing that Vicente Adolfo Solano appears to have come up with the idea on his own before sharing the plan with an acquaintance who turned out to be an FBI informant. Under close surveillance, the two of them then began plotting to bomb the busy food court at the Miamiarea Dolphin Mall.

"Mr. Solano indicated throughout the (FBI) recordings that the plans were his alone," Clancy testified. "He was pretty much always on his own."

last Friday after accepting a fake bomb from undercover FBI operatives outside the mall. Clancy said Solano had already set a 40-minute timer he thought would give him enough time to plant the device and escape undetected.

Solano was denied release on bail by U.S. Magistrate Judge Chris McAliley, who noted there is strong evidence against him, including numerous video and audio recordings and his own confession after arrest. He also faces a potential life prison sentence if convicted.

"The evidence is compelling that you intended to kill many people," the judge said.

Solano, who is scheduled to enter a plea in

early November, said nothing during the hearing. Immigration officials say he arrived from Honduras in the late 1990s and is in the U.S. legally under the temporary protected status program.

His attorney, public defender Alex Arteaga-Gomez, said Solano has no violent criminal history and has generally kept to himself while in the U.S., working as a painter. He said Solano has not traveled overseas in at least a decade and owns no weapons.

"He's lived a working class life," Arteaga-Gomez

said.
According to the FBI, the first evidence that Solano had become sympathetic with the Islamic State was in March when he changed his Facebook profile name to "Abad Solano" and wrote, "I am Abad, son of Allah. May our black flag live on and we continue our battle."

However, Clancy said there is no indication that Solano ever converted to Islam and while under surveillance was never seen going to any house of worship.

"I'm not aware of any religious affiliation," the agent testified.

Solano also made three anti-U.S., pro-Islamic State videos, wearing a black mask and standing in front of the black flag associated with the group. Those videos were sent to the FBI confidential informant, and investigators found the flag during a search of Solano's apartment. Agents also found sketches of the mall food court and evidence that he had done research on the Islamic State and its leaders.

Initially, Assistant U.S. Attorney Karen Gilbert said Solano wanted to bomb the mall on the busy "Black Friday" November shopping day after Thanksgiving. Later, Solano told the informant the timing didn't matter as long as the building was crowded.

"He wanted to kill as

many people as he could at the food court on a crowded Friday night," Gilbert said.

Clancy also provided a few more details about the informant, who he said Solano has known for about six years. The informant served about four years in prison after he was convicted of posing as a police officer and had previously done undercover work for the Drug Enforcement Administration.

It was the informant who went to the FBI after Solano began discussing his hatred of the U.S. and its policies around the time of the 2016 presidential election, Clancy

"It was a conversation that built over time. The conversations became increasingly more serious and frequent," the agent testified.

Anti-death penalty prosecutor's office to seek death penalty

Ayala agreed to abide by

the decision and created the panel.

Florida House Speaker sues Tampa over 'illegal tax'

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Florida House Speaker Richard Corcoran is filing a lawsuit to stop what he calls an illegal tax being charged by the city of Tampa.

The Republican legislator announced the lawsuit on Thursday. The lawsuit is part of a series of moves Corcoran announced to go after local economic development and

local tourism marketing agencies.

Tampa enacted what it calls a "tourism marketing assessment" earlier this year. Hotels in the Ybor City and downtown area add a \$1.50 per night charge on each room.

Corcoran said local officials were "spitting in the face of the constitution" by enacting the fee without legislative authority.

The House lawsuit could complicate a proposal to build a new ballpark in Hillsborough County for the Tampa Bay Rays. The Rays currently play in neighboring St. Petersburg.

Florida hurricane fund may pay out as much as \$5.1 billion

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Hurricane Irma's damaging rampage through Florida may require the state fund that provides backing to private insurers to pay up to \$5.1 billion in claims.

Anne Bert, chief operating officer for the Florida Hurricane Catastrophe Fund, said Thursday the fund will be able to pay claims with cash. That means the fund will not have to borrow any money.

of the fund is important because the state can impose a surcharge on most insurance policies to replenish it if money runs out. Some critics have called the surcharge a "hurricane tax."

Banks and tech companies help stocks higher; drugmakers dive

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks rose Thursday as gains for technology companies and banks helped the market recover some of its losses from earlier in the week.

However drugmakers and

distributors tumbled. The European Central Bank said Thursday it will begin gradually reducing the bond purchases it's been making to strengthen the regional economy. Investors were glad the bank isn't being more aggressive. The euro weakened and European stock indexes jumped. Technology companies recovered some of the ground they lost a day ago, and banks and credit card companies jumped as bond yields continued to

Drugmakers sank after Celgene and Bristol-Myers Squibb slashed their forecasts. Late in the day, drugstores and companies that distribute medications sank on reports Amazon is taking steps to move into the pharmaceutical business by getting licenses to distribute medications wholesale.

For years the European Central Bank has bought bonds to help strengthen the region's economy. Starting in January the bank plans to cut the size of its purchases in half, to 30 billion euros a month.

Scott Wren, senior global equity strategist for Wells Fargo Investment Institute, said investors were relieved the bank did not announce a bigger cut in bond purchases or take more

aggressive steps.

"The market was a little bit fearful that the ECB was going to be more hawkish," he said. "That wasn't the case."

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 3.25 points, or 0.1 percent, to 2,560.40. The Dow Jones industrial average gained 71.40 points, or 0.3 percent, to 23,400.86. The Nasdaq composite lost 7.12 points, or 0.1 percent, to 6,556.77. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks added 3.98 points, or 0.3 percent, to 1,497.46.

France's CAC-40 jumped 1.5 percent and the DAX in Germany gained 1.4 percent. Britain's FTSE 100 added 0.5 percent.

The euro fell to \$1.1657 from \$1.1807 as investors think interest rates in Europe will stay lower for longer than they had expected. The weaker euro helped shares of companies that export goods from Europe.

Bond prices edged lower. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note rose to 2.46 percent from 2.44 percent as yields and interest rates remained at seven-month highs. Higher rates mean banks can make larger profits from mortgages and other lending. SunTrust Banks rose 83 cents, or 1.4 percent, to \$60.61 and American Express jumped \$2.16, or 2.3 percent, to \$95.69.

And Wren, of Wells Fargo, said the ECB and the Federal Reserve might both end up raising interest rates faster than investors currently expect. Concerns about higher interest rates helped push stocks lower

on Wednesday and Wren said the same fears could have a big effect on stocks in 2018.

"The market should be worried about the Fed raising rates three times next year, like they've hinted," he said.

Drugmaker Celgene plunged after it reduced its forecasts for this year, partly because it expects weaker sales of its new psoriasis treatment Otezla. Celgene also said it won't meet its longer-term goals: it cut its profit and sales projections for the year 2020 as it anticipates weaker sales of new products and medications to treat cancer and inflammation.

Celgene stock lost \$19.57, or 16.4 percent, to \$99.99. Bristol-Myers Squibb lost \$3.05, or 4.8 percent, to \$60.95 after it reduced its annual forecast. Other drugmakers including Amgen and Gilead Sciences also stumbled.

Materials companies climbed after a round of strong company results. Chemicals maker Dow DuPont jumped \$1.96, or 2.8 percent, to \$73.05 and industrial and medical gas company Air Products and Chemicals gained \$6.80, or 4.4 percent, to \$161.39.

Drugstores, prescription drug distributors and pharmacy benefits managers sank after the St. Louis Post-Dispatch reported that Amazon has received wholesale pharmacy licenses in at least 12 states, the latest suggestion the company intends to enter that market. Investors in those companies fear Amazon will slash prices and hurt their revenue.

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House Republicans to investigate Obama-era uranium deal

WASHINGTON — House Republicans are opening investigations of the Obama administration's 2010 decision to approve the sale of American uranium mines to a Russian-backed company, lawmakers said Tuesday.

Rep. Devin Nunes, a
California Republican and
chairman of the House
Intelligence Committee,
said at a news conference that his panel and
the House Oversight
Committee would jointly
probe the deal, which
President Donald Trump
has called "the real Russia
story."

Nunes and other Trump supporters have raised the 7-year-old uranium deal while four congressional committees and Special Counsel Robert S. Mueller III are looking into Russia interference the 2016 election and whether Moscow had any direct links to the Trump campaign.

Nunes said the House probe would focus initially on whether the FBI or Justice Department had investigated attempts by Russian officials to gain influence over the American energy industry.

"This is just the beginning of the probe," Nunes told reporters. "We're not going to jump to any conclusions at this time."

The House probe of the uranium deal parallels a Senate Judiciary Committee probe into whether the FBI had evidence that Russian nuclear officials were

involved in fraudulent dealings in 2009 before the uranium deal was approved.

In April, Nunes stepped away from leading the House Intelligence Committee probe of Russian interference in the 2016 election after the House Ethics Committee said it was investigating whether he had improperly disclosed classified information.

But he and his staff have used his chairmanship to push parallel investigations aimed at Trump's opponents and critics, including Fusion GPS, the political research firm behind an unverified dossier of allegations about Trump's ties to Russia.

Trump and his supporters frequently cite the 2010 purchase of Uranium One by Rosatom, a Russian-run company, as a counter to questions about Russian support for Trump's presidential bid.

The sale was approved while Hillary Clinton led the State Department

and some investors in the U.S. company had relationships with former President Clinton and had donated to the Clinton Foundation.

The State Department was one of nine U.S. departments or agencies that approved the sale.

Clinton's presidential campaign and former State Department officials said she was not involved in the approval process by the Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States, a government panel charged with examining foreign acquisitions of U.S. companies.

Republicans have tried to link Clinton to the deal, citing Canadian financier Frank Giustra, a top Clinton Foundation donor.

He sold his company, UrAsia, to Uranium One, which was chaired by Ian Telfer, also a Clinton Foundation donor. Giustra has said he sold his stake in the deal in 2007, while Clinton was competing with Barack Obama for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Want to see the 'secret' JFK assassination records? Here's how

FORT WORTH, Texas If you've ever wanted all of the hidden details surrounding the assassination of JFK 54 years ago, just make sure your internet connection is fast when more files finally see the light of day Thursday.

The release by The National Archives and **Records Administration** consists of 3,810 documents, including 441 formerly withheld in full and 3,369 documents formerly released but with portions redacted.

To get your hands on the files first you'll have to go to the National Archives website.

Depending on the speed of your internet connection the download could take 10 minutes or more.

1. Scroll down to the 'Files" section and click the blue hyperlink titled "October 2017 release." (There may be multiple blue hyperlinks with the corresponding title labeled as part 1, part 2 and so on. Previous releases have had as many as 18 parts, so getting all of the files may take a while.)

2. The contents of each file will be inside a ZIP folder that you can open and access thousands of PDF files of paperwork regarding Kennedy's assassination.

3. Each part will also contain a Microsoft Excel document containing the agency, original document date, origin source, title of the document, name of sender and recipients connected to each PDF

The documents were previously withheld in accordance with the JFK **Assassination Records** Collection Act with 88 percent of them released to the public since the late 1990s. The records being released now were previously identified as assassination records, but withheld in full or in part.

While the National Archives and Records Administration has not publicly commented about what the final 11 percent of secret

documents contain, the record keepers have stated on their website that much of what will be released will be tangential to the assassination events.

With the release approaching, many wondered if it would be held up by national security or law enforcement agencies. If they provided President Donald Trump with reasons to keep the files under wraps the president could choose to prevent their release.

But on Saturday, President Trump tweeted, "Subject to the receipt of further information, I will be allowing, as President, the long blocked and classified JFK FILES to be opened."

President Trump followed that tweet up with another on Wednesday afternoon adding to the suspense around the release of the documents. "The long anticipated release of the .JFKFiles will take place tomorrow. So interesting!" he tweeted.

Trump's longtime friend and political adviser Roger Stone is also an avid conspiracy theorist who wrote a book about the claim that President Lyndon B. Johnson, Kennedy's vice president, was involved in Kennedy's assassination.

Stone tweeted Saturday morning and again Monday that he urged Trump to release the classified documents.

sensitive material means the full record will still be kept from the public for at least six months - and longer if agencies make a persuasive enough case for continued secrecy.

The collection includes more than 3,100 records comprising hundreds of thousands of pages — that have never been seen by the public. About 30,000 documents were released previously with redactions.

Whatever details are released, they're not expected to give a definitive answer to a question that still lingers for some: Whether anyone other than Lee Harvey Oswald was involved in the assassination.

The Warren Commission in 1964 reported that Oswald had been the lone gunman, and another congressional probe in 1979 found no evidence to support the theory that the CIA had been involved. But other interpretations, some more creative than others, have persisted.

The 1992 law mandating release of the JFK documents states that all the files "shall be publicly disclosed in full" within 25 years — that means by October 26, 2017 — unless the president certifies that

"continued postponement is made necessary by an identifiable harm to the military defense; intelligence operations, law enforcement, or conduct of foreign relations."

That doesn't allow the president, for example, to hold some records back because they might be embarrassing to agencies or people.

"In any release of this size, there always are embarrassing details," said Douglas Brinkley, a professor at Rice University.

The law does not specify penalties for noncompliance, saying only that House and Senate committees are responsible for oversight of the collection.

majority vote, preventing Democratic opponents from blocking it with a filibuster in the Senate.

Republicans in the House, though, were upset that they were being asked to accept the Senate's version of the budget, with the additional \$1.5-trillion deficit, rather than their own resolution. Conservatives, in

particular, balked that Republicans who railed for years against deficits under President Barack Obama now were accepting the red ink for the tax package.

"Conservative leaders would have slammed this Big-Government Budget under Pres. Obama. Now, they demand Republicans in Congress vote for it," tweeted Rep. Justin Amash

(R-Michigan). "2011-2016: Principles! 2017: End justifies the means." The budget serves as

a partisan blueprint of fiscal priorities for the federal government, but does not carry the force of law. The president and the

Republican leadership in Congress have argued that economic growth generated by the tax cuts will more than cover the

Republicans are

pushing to unveil the tax cuts package next week, promising to lower corporate and individual tax rates, but also do away with some deductions used by Americans who itemize their returns.

They are racing to pass the sweeping overhaul in the House by Thanksgiving and the Senate by year end, hoping to achieve a top GOP priority ahead of next year's midterm election.

Critics say the tax package will primarily benefit corporations and wealthy individuals.

House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi (D-California) said the package is little more than the "trickle-down" economics of days past, "shaking down the middle class, ripping off the middle class.'

"They say, 'Oh, it'll pay for it.' Never has. Never has," she said. "It's nonsense.'

been and continue to be focused on promoting the benefits of public-private partnerships in the delivery of secure residential care in correctional and detention facilities.'

'We do not take a position on, nor advocate for or against, criminal justice or immigration policies such as whether to criminalize behavior, the length of criminal sentences, or the basis for or length of an individual's incarceration or detention," Paez said in an emailed statement.

GEO and its leading competitor, CoreCivic formerly known as the **Corrections Corporation** of America — stand to gain considerably from President Donald Trump's hawkish immigration policies. Trump wants to deport as many as 3 million undocumented immigrants who commit crimes, and said during the presidential campaign that private prisons "seem to work a lot better" than those operated by the federal government.

Both companies lobbied House members and senators on fiscal 2018 appropriations for the Homeland Security Department and Justice Departments, disclosures show.

CoreCivic spent \$220,000 on lobbying in the third quarter, bringing its yearto-date total to \$640,000. The Tennessee-based company spent about

\$1.1 million on lobbying in 2016, according to the nonpartisan Center for Responsive Politics. A CoreCivic representative did not respond to a request for comment.

GEO and CoreCivic have seen their stock values rise since Trump won last November's election. In April, GEO won the first major immigrant detention contract awarded by ICE under the new administration: a 10-year agreement to develop and oversee a 1,000-bed facility in Conroe, Texas, estimated to generate \$44 million in annual revenues.

A political action committee representing GEO donated at least \$45,000 to a joint fundraising committee supporting Trump and the Republican National Committee last July. And Susie Wiles, a managing partner at Ballard Partners, one of the lobbying companies retained by GEO this year, was a senior strategist and co-chairwoman for Trump's campaign in Florida.

Business opportunities for both companies are on the horizon. In late September and earlier this month, ICE issued requests for information to identify sites for five new temporary immigrant detention facilities to be opened in southern Texas, Chicago, Detroit, Utah and Minnesota. ICE said the Texas facility should be able to hold 1,000 male and female immigrants, while the other four should have capacities ranging from

200 to 1,200 detainees.

FCC chair to work with Congress on prison cellphone issues

COLUMBIA, S.C. — The chairman of the Federal Communications Commission said he's willing to work with corrections officials, telecom companies and the FBI to combat cellphones in the nation's prisons.

In a letter obtained Thursday by The Associated Press, FCC Chairman Ajit Pai wrote to U.S. Rep. David Kustoff of Tennessee, telling him that he'll try to arrange a meeting among those groups within 120 days and report its progress to Congress, fulfilling a request

"I share your concerns about the proliferation of contraband wireless devices in prisons and the potentially devastating implications for public safety," Pai wrote in the letter, dated Tuesday. "We continue our efforts to push for even better procedures and solutions for this very serious problem."

Pai was responding to a letter sent earlier this month by Kustoff and dozens of other House members and U.S. senators. In it, they wrote that addressing the security threat posed by contraband cellphones is "an issue of critical

importance" and called on the FCC to bring together the different groups for a discussion, giving a deadline for resolving how best to prevent prisoners from using contraband phones behind bars.

Inmates use the phones, the members of Congress wrote, to continue the violent crimes and gang activity that landed them behind bars in the first place. The signees, which include both of South Carolina's U.S. senators and all of its Republican House members, asked the FCC to set up a meeting with state prison officials, cellphone companies and the FBI within 120 days, and to report back to Congress on their progress.

Noting that some on Capitol Hill would like to fix the issue by congressional mandate, the members wrote they would prefer a more "collaborative approach."

The interaction follows letters by a top official with the U.S. Department of Justice and South Carolina Corrections Director Bryan Stirling describing the dangers posed by inmates' unfettered ability to communicate via cellphones.

Earlier this year, Stirling, a leading voice on the need to eradicate the phones from prisons, wrote to Attorney General Jeff Sessions, beseeching the top prosecutor for help pursuing FCC permission to jam cell signals.

South Carolina Gov. Henry McMaster also lobbied, writing a memo to Sessions in August on the dangers of prison cellphones and thanking him for any help he could provide. Assistant Attorney General Beth Williams also weighed in, telling FCC officials that addressing the security threat posed "should be a chief priority" of both the FCC and Justice, which oversees the federal Bureau of Prisons. U.S. Rep. Mark Sanford has also called for action.

Stirling and others in his position say the phones — thrown over fences, smuggled by employees, even delivered by drone — present the biggest threat to prison security. A decades-old law says federal officials can grant permission to jam the public airwaves only to federal agencies, not state or local ones. Telecommunications companies are opposed, saying jamming cell signals could set a bad precedent and interfere with legal cell users nearby.



BALTIMORE — The state agency charged with protecting Maryland's nistory nas conciuded that Baltimore officials didn't have the legal authority to remove three statues commemorating the Confederacy and says it reserves the right to order the city to put them

Elizabeth Hughes, director of the Maryland Historical Trust, shared the trustees' conclusions in an Oct. 20 letter to the head of Baltimore's architectural preservation agency.

Hughes said the state trustees "will not concede that MHT lacks the authority to compel restoration.'

"That said, the Trustees believe that the best way forward is for MHT and the City to work cooperatively towards a mutual resolution," she wrote.

In the wake of violent protests in Charlottesville in August, Baltimore

Mayor Catherine E. Pugh ordered the removal of four statues in Baltimore, including those commemorating Confederate generals, soldiers and sailors, and women, and one of Roger Taney, the chief justice of the Supreme Court who wrote the Dred Scott decision declaring black Americans had no civil rights.

Pugh's staff concluded that she had broad authority to order the monuments taken down under her powers to safeguard the public and under the city parks department director's powers to protect the monuments.

Two of the statues already had been vandalized.

City Solicitor Andre Davis said the city had not issued a formal response to the state trust.

"We remain confident that an acceptable resolution of the different perspectives on these issues is within reach," he said in a statement.

On Aug. 16 — the morning after the monuments had been removed — city officials sent a letter to the state trust informing it that they believed the contract didn't apply because the situation was an emergency. The letter was provided to The Baltimore Sun under a Public Information Act request.

The state trust provided Hughes' letter in response to questions about the city letter.


The future of the monuments remains unclear. They are in storage while Baltimore officials try to find them a permanent home.

In her letter, Hughes asked that the city find somewhere to put the monuments within nine months and secure their installation within 18 months.

While the Trustees appreciate that the issues concerning relocation are complex, they also believe that establishing benchmarks are imperative to seeing this matter through to resolution," she wrote.

Other documents the city released suggest officials have had a difficult time finding a place to send the monuments.

on Wednesday. In 2013, the Memphis City Council renamed Forrest Park, Confederate Park and Jefferson Davis Park as Health Sciences Park, Memphis Park and Mississippi River Park, respectively.

Davis was the Confederacy's only president. Nathan Bedford Forrest was a Confederate general and the first Grand

Wizard of the Ku Klux Klan.

Lee Millar, a spokesperson for the local Sons of Confederate Veterans chapter, says the group hasn't decided whether to appeal to the state Supreme

City Council attorney Allen Wade says the city is prepared to oppose the Sons of Confederate Veterans' further efforts.

Cocktail Party' delivers upsets, chaos for Florida and Georgia

GAINESVILLE - "The World's Largest Outdoor Cocktail Party" has been a sobering experience for favorites over the years.

With a dozen upsets in the last four decades, the Southeastern Conference series between Florida and Georgia has become one of college football's most unpredictable rivalries.

The third-ranked Bulldogs (7-0, 4-0 SEC) and Gators (3-3, 3-2) don't even have to delve too deep into their history to realize anything can — and often does - happen in nearby Jacksonville.

"I hope they feel comfortable about

this game," Florida linebacker David Reese said. "I hope they feel like it's to their advantage. It's their game to lose, really."

Even though the Gators have won three in a row and 21 of the last 27 meetings, they are two-touchdown underdogs heading into Saturday's game. In this series, that's hardly cause for concern.

"These are the games we were made for," Florida defensive tackle Khairi Clark said. "I feel like we play harder in big-situation games against higher ranked teams or whatnot."

In the last 33 meetings between the SEC East heavyweights, the Cocktail Party has seen an unranked or

lower-ranked team beat a ranked team 12 times. Half of those upsets happened this century.

There has been a top-ranked team go down (Florida in 1985) and four more top-five teams falter (Georgia in 2002, 2003 and 2005; and Florida in 2012). Equally telling: Top-10 teams are a mediocre 16-12 in the series.

"At the end of the day, it boils down to players, guys making plays, not turning the ball over, how you respond to a little adversity," said Georgia coach Kirby Smart, who played in the rivalry in the late 1990s. "In this game, it's traditionally been a seesaw-type game."

Girardi's 910-710 regular-season record with the Yankees is sixth in victories managing the

Cashman said he and owner Hal Steinbrenner had spoken directly with Girardi this week.

"He has a tireless work ethic, and put his heart into every game he managed over the last decade," Cashman said. "He should take great pride in our accomplishments during his tenure."

Girardi wore uniform No. 25 as a player with the Yankees from 1996-99, when he helped win three titles, but switched to No. 27 when he earned the manager's job over Don Mattingly and succeeded Torre after the 2007 season - signifying the team's quest for its 27th championship.

Koepka opens with a 64 to lead HSBC Champions

SHANGHAI - The **HSBC** Champions is the first stop for Brooks Koepka on his four-week Asian adventure that will include two weeks on the beaches of Vietnam and Thailand and a title defense in Japan.

Splotches of mud on his shirt were evidence that it started with a wild ride at Sheshan International.

"Yeah, I had some fun in the water," he said.

Koepka played so beautifully on Thursday that the U.S. Open champion had reason to believe his 8-under 64 for a one-shot lead could have been much lower. He burned the edge of cup on a few birdie putts, missed one birdie attempt from 4 feet and turned a certain birdie into an aggravating bogey when he threeputted from 4 feet on No. 3.

But he got away with his worst swing of the

Wanting to play conservatively on the par-5 eighth, Koepka hit 3-iron off the tee and pulled it so badly that he disappeared down the banks of a winding stream along the entire left side of the fairway. Enough of the golf ball was showing from the shallow stream that he

removed his shoes and tried to whack it out. He did well enough to advance it some 50 yards, leaving him 275 yards remaining over a pond that guards the front of the green.

Koepka hammered a 3-wood right at the flag. and the ball settled about 20 feet behind the cup. He made it for birdie and a wry smile.

"It was an interesting hole to say the least," Koepka said. "I hit an awful 3-iron, hit it in the water and was lucky enough to at least hit it and advance it and hit a great 3-wood in there just past the pin. We were laughing. It was almost kind of destiny to make that putt."

Along the way, he ticked off another goal for 2017 — the lead to

himself after the opening

It wasn't much − just one shot over Kiradech Aphibarnrat of Thailand and Gavin Green of Malaysia – but it was where he wanted to be.

"Any time you can get off to a good start and be close to the lead or have the lead, that's what you want," Koepka said.

Kiradech dressed in black out of respect to the five days of funeral ceremonies back home for King Bhumibol Adulyadej, who died last October. This week ends a year of mourning, and Thais throughout the country were clad in back in honor of the late king.

Kiradech made 10 birdies, including seven in a row around the turn. "I wore all black today

as my own tribute," Kiradech said. "It is a special day as the final day of official mourning. It would be a great honor if I could win and take this trophy back to Thailand and dedicate it to our late king."

Patrick Reed and Haydn Porteous of South Africa were at 66, while the group at 67 included Matt Kuchar and Justin Rose.

"Drove it well. Found a lot of fairways," Kuchar said. "If you're not playing in fairways, you're just hoping for pars."

Koepka would have taken one on No. 8, and instead he did one better.

The rest of the round except for that threeputt bogey from 4 feet was crisp for Koepka considering he had not played since the Presidents Cup.

Starting on the 10th hole under abundant sunshine at Sheshan International, he capped off the back nine with a 7-iron into 20 feet on the 17th for birdie and then a massive drive on the par-5 18th that left him only a 6-iron to 20 feet, which he holed for an eagle.

He already was 6 under for the round and looked to go even lower with a shot into 4 feet at No. 3, only to walk away with bogey.

"I felt like I played really well," he said. "I drove it pretty well and putted extremely well except for litlte hiccup."

Dustin Johnson and Henrik Stenson were among those at 68. Johnson, who won this World Golf Championship in 2013, was moving closer to the lead until his wedge into No. 8 went just over the green, his chip ran 6 feet by and he took a bogey. It was on this hole two years ago that Johnson's shot hit the pin and caromed back into the water, which he says is the most irritated he's ever been on the golf course.

The former No. 1-ranked Ko is one shot ahead of Su Oh and two ahead of defending champion and two-time winner Feng Shanshan, Madelene Sagstrom and Eun Hee-Ji, who won by six strokes in Taiwan last week for her first LPGA Tour title since 2009.

"Today I tried to be positive and as confident as I can," said Ko, who finished second in Taiwan last week. "I think playing well last week really gave me good momentum going into today."

Ko opened with a birdie, one of seven in an unblemished round on the par 71, 6,246-yard course at the TPC Kuala Lumpur.

The Bulldogs used six turnovers, including one at the 5-yard line in the final minutes, to hand the Gators their only loss and knock them out of the national title hunt.

2007: No. 20 Georgia 42, No. 9 Florida 30

This one gave the rivalry a jolt of energy. Having lost 15 of the previous 17 games, Georgia coach Mark Richt ordered his team to get a celebration penalty following its first touchdown. The Gators made it six in a row with Matt Leach's 33-yard field goal with 33 seconds remaining. Georgia finished with 202 yards on the ground, one of the few times the team with more rushing yards lost.

2002: Florida 20, No. 5 Georgia 13

Georgia looked like legitimate national title contenders until unraveling against Ron Zook's unranked Gators. Florida trailed 13-12 in the fourth when Rex Grossman capped an 89-yard drive with a TD pass to Ben Troupe.

1997: No. 14 Georgia 37, No. 6 Florida 17

The Bulldogs ended seven years of frustration against Florida thanks to four touchdown runs from Robert Edwards. Georgia knocked the defending national champion Gators out of the division race.

1992: No. 20 Florida 26, No. 7 Georgia 24

Steve Spurrier's favorite win against his most hated team. The Head Ball Coach had two freshmen offensive tackles and two losses in league play, but managed to knock off Georgia.

straight fourth-quarter comeback against Louisville in his fifth career game before a fumbled handoff with true freshman running back Cam Akers. It was Blackman's third turnover of the game.

Louisville quarterback Lamar Jackson led his team down the field for a game-winning field goal.

The Seminoles immediately returned to practice on Sunday after the loss. Fisher said he started the see his players' spirits rejuvenated on Monday and Tuesday before the team departed for Boston College Wednesday night for Friday's game.

"When you come off a game like that, Sunday is a grind when you go through a walk-through (practice session). Even Monday, sometimes, they start pushing back through it and it was really good," Fisher said.

"Then, Tuesday, they were back and guys were sharp in meetings. Everything is good," Fisher added.

For the third time this season, FSU hits the road looking to bounce back from a home loss.

Boston College is trending up after wins during three of its past four games, including road wins over Louisville

Like the Seminoles' combo of Blackman and Akers, the Eagles also feature a freshman duo behind quarterback Anthony Brown and running back AJ Dillon.

Most recently, Brown passed for 275 yards and three touchdowns during last week's win over Virginia, while Dillon led the way with 272 yards rushing and four touchdowns in a win over Louisville on Oct. 14.

"I guess they finally found the pieces to their puzzle that they've been missing for the past couple years," FSU safety Trey Marshall said. "It seems like they've got their groove and we've got to come out with a game plan to stop them."

Fisher said Blackman's energy in practice this week has been good, along with his attention to detail while practicing handoffs to running backs. Akers has also taken heed to the urgency of being FSU's top running back with junior running back Jacques Patrick sidelined

indefinitely after a knee procedure this week.

The Seminoles felt like they should have beaten Louisville and moved a step closer to bowl eligibility last week.

But the team hopes to show it has the fortitude to overcome its slow start to finish with at least five or six wins to earn a bowl invitation later this season.

"We want to come out and win for our fans, but ourselves as well, too," Marshall said. "It's our record, you feel me? We just want to go out there and win for us and the fans."

Brate caught touchdowns in four straight games earlier this season. Howard had a breakout game Sunday with two scores of his own. Between the two, the Bucs have seven touchdowns from tight ends, the most in the

NFL this season. Going back to the start of 2016, they have 18, matching the Chargers for the league high.

"Once we can get that real fluid and consistent, it will be very hard to stop us," Howard said.

Brate tied for the NFL lead among tight ends last year with eight touchdowns. When Howard was drafted, it looked hard for him to repeat that scoring success. He's on pace to break the team record he shares with Jimmie Giles, and Howard's presence looks to have helped more than hurt. "Having two tight

ends that are able to both block and catch, it's pretty hard for defenses to defend," Brate said. "As long as we keep improving, keep pushing each other, we think the sky's the limit for us."

Only four times in

Bucs history has any tight end caught six or more touchdowns -Brate last year, and Giles three times between 1979-85. Both are on pace to do so this season.

That falls in line with Dirk Koetter's tight end history, going back to Tony Gonzalez in Atlanta (8 TDs in 2012 and in 2013) and Marcedes Lewis in Jacksonville (10 TDs in 2010).

Howard is on pace to get eight touchdown passes and more than 500 receiving yards. Only three NFL rookie tight ends have ever done that: New England's Rob Gronkowski in 2010, Atlanta's Junior Miller in 1980 and Chicago's Mike Ditka in 1961.

The Bucs called a misdirection play that got Howard wide-open for a 58-yard touchdown against the Giants. His 33-yard TD catch Sunday at Buffalo came on the exact same play.

Bills coach Sean McDermott called it a "sneak route" - everything pointing one way and Howard sneaking through.

"It was crazy. I thought 'This play probably won't work (again) until Week 15," Howard said.

The emergence of offense with two prominent tight ends has been fashionable since New England drafted Gronkowski and Aaron Hernandez in 2010. They combined for 16 touchdowns as rookies and the Patriots went 14-2; in 2014. The Colts got eight touchdowns each from Coby Fleener and Dwayne Allen and Indianapolis won 11 games and reached the AFC Championship Game.

The Bucs and Panthers are now at opposite ends of the tight end spectrum. Without Olsen, Carolina is one of two NFL teams not to have a

tight end score a touchdown. Fleener and Allen have moved on from the Colts, the other NFL team without a tight end touchdown.

There's an opportunity for Brate and Howard Sunday: The Panthers have already given up four touchdowns to tight ends. Only five NFL teams have allowed more.

"Both are good routerunners, both catch the ball," Koetter said. "O.J. has really good speed, Cam has an uncanny ability to twist his body and get open. I just look at it as two tight ends that can really play."

NFL memo tells teams of player advocacy plans

The NFL has sent a memo to the 32 teams rounding up its engagement initiatives with players, and looking toward what is next.

The update, obtained by The Associated Press, mentions plans to amplify players' advocacy in communities and within the government structure at local, state and national levels.

After reviewing topics discussed with a players' coalition at last week's owners meetings - criminal justice reform, law enforcement, community engagement, and collaboration-andlisting various programs in which the league and players are involved, the memo outlines plans for "media amplification and platform development" through programs launched in Weeks 13-15 of the schedule (Nov. 30-Dec. 18) and in January and February, through the Super Bowl.

The NFL says it will be "utilizing league assets in driving awareness around issues that are important to our players."

Hightower to have season-ending surgery

A person familiar with the situation says the New England Patriots linebacker Dont'a Hightower will miss Sunday's game against the Los Angeles Chargers and is facing season-ending surgery on his right shoulder.

The surgery will be for a torn pectoral muscle, the person told The Associated Press on the condition of anonymity Thursday because it has not yet been announced by the team.

Hightower left Sunday's win over Atlanta in the second half with the shoulder issue and sat out the first practice of the week Wednesday. He's missed two games this season with a knee injury.

Duke, Colson, Bagley earn preseason honors

Duke is the favorite to win the Atlantic Coast Conference men's basketball title.

The ACC on Thursday also announced Notre Dame forward Bonzie Colson as its preseason player of the year and Blue Devils forward Marvin Bagley III as the preseason rookie of the year.

The announcements came a day after voting at the league's media day in Charlotte.

Duke received 57 of 69 first-place votes. Rival North Carolina was picked second, followed by Notre Dame, Miami, Louisville and Virginia.

The Blue Devils return senior Grayson Allen and brought in one of the nation's top recruiting classes, led by Bagley, to a program that went 28-9 last year and won the ACC Tournament. This marks the 17th time Duke enters a season as the ACC favorite.

Astros' World Series run lifts Houston amid Harvey recovery

HOUSTON — Paul Daulong hopes the Houston Astros jersey his daughter gave him after Hurricane Harvey's flooding devastated the family's home will be a good luck charm as his beloved baseball team tries to win its first World Series.

So far, it seems to be working.

Daulong started wearing the jersey after the Astros trailed the New York Yankees three games to two in the American League Championship Series. They won the next two games in Houston to advance to the fall classic against the Los Angeles Dodgers. He forgot to wear it during Game 1 of the World Series, which the Astros lost, but remembered to put it on for Wednesday's Game 2, which they won in extra innings.

"Normally I'm not real superstitious," he said this week from his dust-covered home, a gutted structure held up by exposed wooden beams but devoid of furniture and appliances. "But I'm wearing it now and I'm not taking it

The Daulongs and others in the Houston area impacted by

Harvey have used the Astros' championship run as a source of inspiration to slog through difficult days filled with tiring repairs, bureaucratic red tape and uncertainty about the future.

"It gives you a positive note to start thinking about," said Paul Daulong, 70. "It's been nothing, other than the last week they fixed the fireplace. So it's frustrating. With the Astros winning, it makes you feel good."

Amid the Astros' quest, the city has continued rebuilding from Harvey's devastating flooding, which inundated some areas with more than 50 inches of rain in late August. Officials have estimated that more than 136,000 homes and structures were damaged during Harvey in Harris County, which includes Houston.

Officials say it will be months before all of the debris covering many front lawns is removed. Nearly 100 people still remain in an American Red Cross shelter in Houston and nearly 9,000 families in Harris County who were displaced by Harvey are still living in hotels.

Mary Daulong, 69, said she and her husband — who are temporarily living in an apartment — have scheduled their rebuilding activities at their home around Astros' games.

"We would work here until

it was dark. Now we cannot. Whatever time the Astros come on, is when we stop working here," she said.
Houston Mayor Sylvester

Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner said in the aftermath of Harvey, the Worlds Series isn't just about the Astros.

"Quite frankly, they are carrying the city on their shoulders and on their backs and in their mitts," said Turner. "The storm may have come, but it hasn't dampened our spirit, our enthusiasm."

Astros manager A.J. Hinch said the team understands its responsibility to represent Houston and bring awareness "to the things that are needed to rebuild our great city."

"It gives the city something to rally around and gives people something to cheer for that otherwise may not have a lot to be hopeful for," said Astros pitcher Justin Verlander.

Houston resident Tom Flores, 70, said while cheering on the Astros in the World Series won't make up for people losing their homes, it still gives people some hope.

"I got friends of mine who

lost their home and everything but they are still Astros fans and this does take a little bit of the sadness off," he said.

An event like the World
Series can be a powerful
source of motivation for a
community dealing with
adversity, said Tim Bono,
a lecturer in the Psychological and Brain Sciences
Department at Washington
University in St. Louis.

"It'll be important for people in Houston to continue to direct attention toward that and say, 'Hey, look how we all came together to cheer on our sports team. Let's continue to do that to support each other and to especially direct resources ... for those areas that still need our help in recovering from the aftermath of the hurricane," Bono said.

Paul Daulong said the Astros provided a good example for the community by going through their own rebuilding process after several losing seasons.

"We have totally put the Astros ahead of the problems that are occurring right now," he said. "We just gotta keep our heads up and make sure that just like the Astros are going to come through against the Dodgers, we'll make it back as well as we can."

Dodgers' foundation tested after bullpen blasted

LOS ANGELES —
Kenley Jansen is 6-foot-5 and very wide. The Los Angeles closer is undeniably imposing in his home whites on the Dodger Stadium mound even before he throws his cutter, one of the most sadistic and dependable pitches in baseball.

That cutter doesn't always cut, however.

When Marwin Gonzalez's tying, ninth-inning homer cleared the fence and stunned Dodger Stadium on Wednesday night, Jansen suddenly didn't look powerful enough to carry his team to a title on his broad shoulders.

Neither did the Dodgers' bullpen, which no longer seems invincible after the Astros' 7-6, 11-inning victory in Game 2 of

the World Series.
"The ball really carried the

whole night," Jansen said after a game featuring eight homers, the most in World Series history. "You can't do anything about that. One missed pitch. You got

me."

Actually, the Dodgers' bullpen missed more pitches in Game 2 than it had missed in its nine postseason games before it. One of the most successful relief groups in recent baseball history was battered for 11 hits and six runs by the Astros, including an astonishing four homers in the final three innings.

"We battled out there," said Jansen, who had never blown a postseason save and never given up a homer on an 0-2 pitch in his career until Gonzalez connected. "Every at-bat, nobody was giving up. We still continued to go out there and pitch, and we didn't come up big this time."

Over 30 ¾ innings during its first nine playoff games, the Dodgers' bullpen had allowed only 12 hits, three earned runs and one homer.

In seven disastrous innings of Game 2, the bullpen gave up 11 hits, six earned runs and those

four homers.
And a team that had been 98-0 when leading after eight innings took its first defeat.



Suspended Florida players get pre-trial intervention

Arkansas at Mississippi

GAINESVILLE -Seven suspended Florida players, including standout receiver Antonio Callaway, are entering a pretrial intervention program that could result in the dismissal of felony

credit card fraud charges. State Attorney Bill Cervone filed paperwork with the Alachua County

court Thursday that showed the outcome of a monthlong investigation. The players will need to make restitution and comply with probation protocols over the next 12 months to get the charges dropped without any legal findings. The intervention agreements still need to be approved by a judge in the coming weeks.

Callaway, running

back Jordan Scarlett, defensive lineman Keivonnis Davis, defensive lineman Richerd Desir-Jones, linebacker James Houston, linebacker Ventrell Miller and receiver Rick Wells were charged with fraudulent use of a credit card and identity theft. Each of them made one charge with a stolen credit card number, ranging in value from \$500 to \$2,000,

the facts involved, the relative roles and culpability of the various defendants, and their individual backgrounds, seven of the defendants have been identified as being qualified for participation in a statutory felony pre-trial intervention program," Cervone said in a statement.

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

Chronic pelvic pain not suffered exclusively by women

DEAR DR. ROACH:

My 46-year-old son has suffered for nearly five years with what seems to be CPPS (chronic pelvic pain syndrome). Being the mother, I am involved only to a limited extent, as my son, of course, is embarrassed to go into details with me. Although after he read an article delineating the symptoms of CPPS, he said, "Yes, that's exactly it!"

He has sought medical help, but after two colonoscopies and several prostate exams, he has been told only variations of "We can't find anything" and "There's nothing we can do for you."

Articles I've read state that millions of men suffer from this worldwide, and it is the third most common reason men visit a urologist. Can you shed any light on this painful, mysterious condition and outline what steps he might take next?

—VP

ANSWER: I've written several times about chronic pelvic pain in women, but this is the first question I've received on chronic pelvic pain in men. It is indeed far more common than many, including me, may have thought: 10 percent overall, and about 1 man in 8 (13 percent) in your son's age group — the most common group to have this symptom. As men get older, the condition decreases in frequency.

The definition of CPPS is "chronic pelvic pain in at least three of the six preceding months, in absence of other identifying causes." As such, it's really unclear what is causing this condition or even if the prostate is the source of the problem. There is some evidence to suggest that it is: Prostate inflammation often is found, but men can have symptoms with or without inflammation, and with or without evidence of bacterial infection. Most men have urinary symptoms as well, including increased urinary frequency and discomfort when voiding. Some men also have pain or discomfort during sexual activity. Symptoms often are ascribed to chronic prostate infection, but antibiotics may not be helpful in treatment, and unlike most cases of chronic bacterial prostatitis, there is no tenderness of the prostate.

The severity of CPPS can be measured by a tool that is available online (http:// www.upointmd.com/ NIHCPSIEnglish.pdf. The scores range from 0-43: The

mean score for someone with CPPS is about 20. He can fill out this form and take it to his urologist.

No treatment has been shown to alleviate symptoms in all men; however, there are several treatments that are effective in some, and combinations of treatments may be effective in the majority of men. Most experts will try a course of antibiotics; however, if it isn't effective, it should not be repeated. Medications like tamsulosin (Flomax) are helpful in some, as is the prostate medicine dutasteride (Avodart). Cognitivebehavioral therapy is very helpful for some men. Other medications that sometimes are tried include steroids, anti-inflammatories and medications for chronic pain, such as gabapentin (Neurontin). One study suggested that there is some benefit from acupuncture and myofascial trigger point release by a pelvic floor physical therapist.

Less-common therapies with some evidence for benefit include botulinum toxin (Botox) injection, heat therapy and shock waves to the bladder. Finding a specialist in chronic pelvic pain for men would be ideal.

Opening lead: Seven of \Diamond

South won the opening diamond lead in his hand with the ace and led a low trump. West rose with his ace and continued with a second trump to East's king. East continued with the 10 of trumps to the board's jack. The defense had prevented any possible club ruff and there was no obvious tenth trick for declarer.

South was, of course, hoping for a 4-3 split of the East-West spades. He led a spade to his ace, crossed back to dummy with the king of diamonds, cashed the king of spades and ruffed a spade. Bad news and good news. The spades were not splitting well, but West's exact distribution was known. West had started with five spades, two hearts, and one diamond therefore five clubs. South reasoned that West held the ace of clubs, or he would have led a club after winning the ace of hearts in an effort to get a diamond ruff.

South put this information to good use. West had already discarded two of his clubs on the third trump and on the second diamond. He had to shed the 10 of clubs on South's last trump as dummy parted with the six of diamonds. A diamond to dummy's queen finished West. West had to keep all of his spades, so he discarded the queen of clubs. South now led a club to his king. This lost to West's ace, but West had to lead a spade and dummy's queen-10 took the last two tricks. Well played!

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

Auto review: Chevy's Colorado ZR2 is a big-boy truck toy

In the Colorado ZR2, Chevrolet has fielded a purpose-built pickup truck that boasts a number of exclusives.

It's the only midsize truck available with a diesel engine, the only one to come standard with true "off-road" suspension and the only one with locking front and rear differentials.

So, who cares?

Chevrolet engineers made a splash at last year's Los Angeles Auto Show by bringing a number of pre-production ZR2s to a gritty industrial space they'd rented.

For the duration of the show, Chevy hosted wannabe terrain-tacklers eager to show off their off-road skills on a bumpy, rocky course fabricated at the former factory site.

But even then the questions that formed in my mind were: Who is this truck for? And, how many of those people are there?

The ZR2 is a midsize pickup truck. Despite its massive 17-inch wheels and overblown 31-inch tires, it can be mounted without a stepladder and drives surprisingly like a sedan.

Around town, it's sporty and responsive, easy to maneuver through traffic. It can even be parked in a normal-sized parking spot.

For a truck with fat tires, it's quiet on the freeway, which makes it possible to enjoy the adequate sound system.

The truck's infotainment system, which features an 8-inch color touch screen, connects easily to a telephone. (A Wi-Fi hot spot is standard too.) The HVAC system functions well.

The seats are comfortable, even on longer drives, and though the "extended cab" rear seating area is really more like an extended storage area, there's plenty of legroom and headroom up front. (Rear passengers will need to be rather small if they are to experience reasonable legroom.)

Chevy engineers have taken pains to make the cabin comfy. Standard are heated, leather-trimmed bucket seats, with power lumbar adjustments and a telescoping, leather-wrapped steering wheel.

The ZR2 is delivered standard with a 3.6-liter V-6 engine, which produces 308 horsepower and 275 pound-feet of torque.

But the preferred option — a \$3,500 upgrade — is the 2.8-liter, four-cylinder, turbo diesel engine. It makes an acceptable 186 horsepower and a phenomenal 369 pound-feet of torque.

Corner to corner, the turbo diesel is quite zippy, for a truck. In the rough, it makes the ZR2 a wall crawler.

Off road is where the ZR2 really performs. It's so capable, in fact, that I wasn't able to find anything to challenge it.

The grunty diesel

engine, combined with the ZR2's four-wheel drive, long suspension travel and Multimatic DSSV shock dampers, made short work of deep sand, slushy mud, rocky roads and desert washboard. Indeed, the truck was almost as smooth on rough surfaces as it was on the freeway.

Since the ZR2 was twice delayed getting to me because previous drivers had damaged it during their test periods, I was perhaps too reluctant to throw the ZR2 up or down a steep cliff, or hit sand berms at the high speeds.

And I didn't even engage the locking differentials, which would have made near-vertical assaults possible, even on uneven ground.

The truck's plastic-like interior raised concerns

about durability and longevity. Would the dash and door panels survive the sun-baking and dust-brushing they'd get from repeated exposures to harsh weather? Only time would tell.

I also wondered about the spare tire placement, which on the model I borrowed was attached to a rack bolted square in the center of the truck bed. That would have complicated plans to haul anything substantial on an overland adventure, such as motorcycles, mountain bikes, kayaks or camping equipment.

A Chevy executive explained that this is an option, desired by dedicated rock crawlers, because it allows for even more ground clearance under the truck, where the spare is typically stored.

Chevy's marketing people say their ZR2 appeals to truckers "in search of their next adventure and determined to stray off the beaten path." They want a truck tough enough for "overland travel, rock crawling, traversing two-track trails and bombing through the desert," while also gentle enough for daily driving.

Those customers, who Chevy said are cross-shopping Toyota Tacoma TRD midsize and Ford Raptor full-size trucks — both of them more expensive vehicles — have added to the Colorado bottom line. The ZR2 now accounts for about 10 percent of Colorado sales, the company said.

Although the truck's sales are still dwarfed by the Tacoma's roughly 130,000 trucks sold this

year, according to Kelley Blue Book, the Colorado's 72,000 moved by dealers is a strong number.

That puts the Colorado far in front of the competing Nissan Frontier, GMC Canyon and Honda Ridgeline. (Full-size work trucks from Ford and Chevy sell better, of course, with Ford turning over about 575,000 of its F-150s this year, and Chevy about 365,000 Silverados.)

Despite the mathematics, I'm still left wondering who's buying the ZR2s. I haven't seen any among the German and Swedish sport utility vehicles crowding the streets. I haven't seen any in the company parking garage.

I guess I'd better call the Chevy guys and ask them to extend the loan. I need to go canyon crawling.

Performance unlikely to be affected by bad cam sensor

ear Car Talk: I have a 1996 Ford Explorer with 164,000 miles. It runs fine, but a year ago, the check-engine light came on and indicated a problem with the cam position sensor. The Explorer lives on a very small island with dirt roads and no mechanic. It is driven a maximum of about 40 miles a year, from the marin to our cabin, which we visit once a month or so. After a year with the check-engine light on, the Explorer still runs great. Should I worry? Peter

No. I'm guessing you retreat to a rustic cabin on a desolate island precisely so you don't have to worry. So don't start now.

The sensor probably is bad, Peter. But the effects of a bad cam position sensor are most likely to be felt at high speed. So just don't take any dirt highways on the island.

That sensor helps the computer compare the positions of the cam shafts and the crankshaft. And it uses that

information to control the timing of the fuel injectors and the spark.

But, like I said, those things become more critical at higher speeds. And if you're just moseying (and I hope you are) from the marina to your cabin and back, you might never notice any problem at all.

And at worst, if it fails completely, it won't disable the vehicle; it'll put it into a so-called limphome mode — which is what it sounds like. You might not even know the difference! In any case, in the worst-case scenario, you'll still be able to limp to the cabin.

At that point, you need to befriend a Ford mechanic, and then invite him to spend a peaceful, bucolic weekend on a secluded island. Then tell him to bring a '96 Explorer cam position sensor with him.

How to get a newfangled car through the car wash

Dear Car Talk:

I have a 2017 Buick LaCrosse that has the gas-saving feature of shutting off the engine at stops and then restarting when the brake is released. It also has an unfortunate feature of putting the transmission into park whenever the start/stop button is pushed to stop the engine; the only way to leave the car in neutral is to leave the engine running. So, how do I manage to get the car through a commercial car wash? Are they familiar with this peculiarity? I asked a salesman at my Buick dealer this question. His response was that the car-wash tracks are wet and, therefore, slippery: "Just leave it in park and let the wheels slide." That is about the dumbest thing I have ever heard. Is there a way

to run the car through a car wash without sliding the tires? The only way I can think of is to leave the engine running, and then the transmission can be put into neutral. However, I don't think the car-wash people would like that. — Newton

The salesman's an idiot, Newton. I mean, I'm an idiot, too, but since this is my column, I'll call him out first.

I'll call him out first. Putting the car in neutral is exactly what you should do. If your car wash is the most common type, where the driver stays in the car, then you can leave it running, use the foot brake when you come out the other end, then put it back in drive and go. If it's a car wash that requires you to exit the vehicle, you may have to open the driver's door first, before putting the car in neutral, to prevent it from shifting into park automatically when you open the door.

Actually, lots of cars are having trouble getting through automatic car washes these days. Car washes haven't had this much publicity since "The Bikini Carwash Company II" came out in 1993.

It turns out a lot of the new "autonomous driving" safety equipment is not playing well with these car-cleaning tunnels. For instance, a lot of new cars have a wonderful feature called "automatic emergency braking." If the car senses an object in front of you — like a stopped car or a human dressed as a tuna fish sandwich — and you don't brake in time, it assumes you're distracted and it automatically stops itself for you. Now, what do you think it does when it sees a giant spinning buffer heading toward your grille (unless the system disengages itself when the car is put in neutral)?

Other cars automatically apply the parking brake if the car is stopped for more than a few seconds. This also is a great safety improvement. It's prevented people from stepping out of the car without putting the transmission in park first and running over themselves. Hey, it happens!

So for people like

you, with newer cars, you'll have to check your owner's manual. More and more of them now have instructions for going through an automatic car wash. It's more complicated than in the old days, when all you had to do was decline the muffler polish, give the guy your eight bucks and remember to close the window. Now you often have to disable a bunch of safety features, lest you find yourself at the front of the line, unable to go forward through the car wash, with 16 people behind you getting furious while you scan the index of your owner's manual.

I'm not intimately familiar with the 2017 Buick LaCrosse, but if it'll stay in neutral with the car running, and it doesn't have those safety features engaged, you should be fine. Hope you can clean yourself up, Newton.

any restaurant owners frame their first dollar bill.

After Hurricane Charley, Diane Caputo framed what might have been her last.

She'd stood watching in tears as a backloader shoveled up the remains of her then-22-year-old Monty's Restaurant & Pizzeria. Suddenly, the operator shut down his machine, reached into the bucket and pulled out a dollar bill, which he handed to her.

The rescued bill became a symbol of survival, framed for the wall of a new Monty's that would open across U.S. 41 in Publix shopping center.

Over the years, it's taken more than symbols to save the longest-lived Italian restaurant in two towns. Time after time—from divorce to destruction, through the hands of a less-impassioned owner and an interim manager—Diane Caputo has had to step in to keep Monty's

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

true to its reputation for fresh, scratchmade meals out of her own recipe book.

In the 34 years since she first opened Monty's Restaurant & Pizzeria with her ex-husband and her late father, Caputo has seen enough reversals for four lifetimes. "But you don't get more than you can handle," she insisted.

When her dad, Robert Seyler, saw what a natural she was at running a dining room, he asked her, "Do you want your own restaurant?" and in 1983 bankrolled the original Monty's, named after her ex.

Monty's was a modest, 2,000-squarefoot place set sideways to Tamiami Trail. "I guess I've been in smaller kitchens," laughed 1990s Monty's pizza man, now-manager Richard Carmean. "You could sit in the dining room and watch your pizza being tossed."

"It was a little hole in the wall, but everybody loved it," said Caputo.

Both of her daughters grew up there. Her youngest, manager Angela Caputo, who started out propped up in her infant seat in the back, continues to be Diane's right hand. Daniella Boccio, a local Realtor, continues to help from outside the business while raising grandchildren Ava and Vincent.

But life happened, and Monty's began to flounder. It wasn't until Diane was back in charge, cooking and training as usual, that business became good enough for her to plan an expansion.

Hurricane Charley had different plans.

Crushed by the storm, personal illness and 24-hour care of her father, who was dying of cancer, Diane had to withdraw after Monty's relocated to Publix plaza. Family came first. She sold to a former employee.

Over time, Diane began hearing from customers that things just weren't the same at Monty's. Its new owner was doing things differently, they said. Once a local landmark, Monty's restaurant was fading into obscurity and about to

"I couldn't let Monty's die," she said. "I took it back in 2007; brought back my recipes, quality ingredients, and customer service; got the debt under control; and launched an aggressive marketing campaign." She introduced gluten-free pizza and pasta before anyone else in the area.

Monty's ended up doing so well, during the worst of the recession, that Diane won the 15th Annual (2009) Southwest Florida Blue Chip Community Business Award, established to honor small businesses that triumph over adversity.

After bringing her restaurant back from the brink three times, she vowed, "If I can turn this place around in a recession, in a shopping center, I can rebuild on the other side of 41, where the original Monty's was.'

The new, 4,500-square-foot Monty's, which opened four years ago, can best be described as a grand tribute to quality, tenacity, and family.

Oriented to dominate the land and U.S. 41 rather than crouch beside it, Monty's is designed exactly the way Diane and her older daughter, Daniella, wanted-with an enclosed patio and bar, three high-ceilinged dining rooms, and a large kitchen.

"But I still felt badly," she confessed. "After we opened, I felt we failed. Again,


things weren't the same under the transitional manager I'd put in place.

'One night I just lost it. I hollered, 'How hard is it to make fettucine Alfredo? You've got the recipe book right there!"

When the cook said, "What recipe book?" she knew they were in trouble. It was time to haul Monty's back from the brink a fourth time. "It took us a couple of years to really come back. But now I know we're making things exactly the way we did when we first opened.'

City zoning overhaul suggested by frame

The City of Punta Gorda is rapidly out growing its present set of zoning regulations, says County Zoning Director Tom Frame. City officials should probably consider re-vamping them in the near future. The City-County Planning Council is reviewing the city's zoning regulations for the City Council. Frame also said the city should look into the possibility to establish more "planning unit development" zones. Besides Frame pointed out that Punta Gorda could include more detailed definitions in its zoning regulations, so the zoning ordinances would be easier to enforce.

'Little Culture' plans in **Punta Gorda discarded**

Plans for transforming the Bay Front Community Center near Gilchrist Park into a Punta Gorda Cultural Center have been discarded, according to city officials. A year ago the City Council gave local artist Barbara Carlson permission to begin a nonprofit cultural center in the building. She planned to make it a place where local artists could display their work and where classes in arts and crafts would be offered. Plans never got off the ground because Mrs. Carlson moved to another state, said City Manager Robert Hollander. No one else who is associated with the project has contacted the city. "The Center is still being used by various community organizations and enjoyed," said Director of Public Works, Don Roll.

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

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Your Charlotte Symphony Orchestra: Something for every taste

"A symphonic orchestral performance is like a good meal," said Maestro Raffaele Ponti, the music director and conductor of the Charlotte Symphony Orchestra. "You have to have a good aperitif, something to start the festivities and get people in the mood, a main course and a little dessert. There has to be a good balance."

To explain how he achieves musical balance, Ponti is facilitating "A Musical Happy Hour: 2017-18 Concert Series," at Florida Gulf Coast University's Renaissance Academy, 117 Herald Court Suite 211 in Punta Gorda. The two-hour seminars precede by two days each of the Charlotte Symphony Orchestra's six performances for the season and are set for 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Nov. 10 and Dec. 1 and Jan. 12, Feb. 23, March 16 and April 6, 2018. Participants may register for the seminars individually or for all six.

In the seminars, Ponti explains why he chose each piece of music for the program and examines one of those pieces in depth. In keeping with the happy-hour theme, refreshments and light hors d'oeuvres will be served.

"These classes are for the lay person and in them I try to debunk the myth that you have to understand classical music to enjoy it," Ponti said. "Classical music is for everyone. You can't watch a film without a symphony orchestra playing. We're going to make it accessible, fun and social for everyone."

Ponti will use technology to help make his point. For example, he'll have participants listen to Beethoven's First Symphony performed by the NBC Symphony Orchestra conducted by Arturo Toscanini then the same piece performed by the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Herbert von Karajan.

"We'll analyze the difference in tempos, dynamics, intensity, styles and colors. Then I'll ask, 'Which one do you prefer?' — a question that opens a flood of debate," Ponti said. "It's wonderful because it's not about me telling them what to like and how to like it. It's about the participants



learning how to listen creatively."
Unlike a painting, where a viewer can step back and study the work, music is "only in the air for a split second." His classes allow participants to experience the music the same way

he does, according to Ponti.

"People will start listening to the symphony in a more imaginative and creative way," Ponti said. "Instead of listening like a bystander, they'll become an involved listener. Instead of listening to a piece of music, they listen for specific voices, for example an oboe solo. It's that creative listening that I'm hoping to show them."

"One thinks they know music until they take this class," said Tony D'Anna, of Punta Gorda, who attended Ponti's 2013 classes. "He opens your mind to the sounds of the different instruments."

The experience of creative listening carries over to the concert hall two days later when participants attend the concert "in a hall, with their orchestra and their conductor," according to Ponti.

"The participants in these classes say what they learn in class makes the performance more enjoyable and interesting," he said. "After we've broken down the performance in class, it becomes more interactive for them."

"Maestro Ponti and the classes are fabulous," said Sherry Bechtold, a Punta Gorda resident who also attended Ponti's classes in 2013. "When you go to the concert you know what to listen for, making the performance more meaningful."

Tarpons win County championship with 23-14 win

nce again the Charlotte Tarpons JV football team stands alone at the top of the county football teams after their 23-14 win at Port Charlotte. The Tarpons got out the broom with season sweeps over Lemon Bay and the Pirates to run their record to 7-0 with just one game left on their schedule.

The Tarpons used a grinding ground game led by Ashar Thomas, Malakai Menzer, Jaden Opalach and quarterback Daniel Rennie to move the chains and keep the big strike Pirate offense off the field.

The Tarpons ran the ball 11 straight times before Rennie found Menzer on a 23 yard pass to put the Tarpons up 6-0 with 1:40 left in the first quarter. Thomas found pay dirt from 3 yards out with 1:25 left before the half to give the Tarpons a 12-0 lead after the two-point conversion failed.

What looked like a nice shutout going on for Charlotte turned bad just 11 seconds later as Dylan Lockhart found a seam and returned the ensuing kickoff 75 yards to cut the Tarpon lead in half.

With the ball back in the Tarpons' hands, Aaron Wesley intercepted a pass on the Pirates' 39 yard line. Johnathon Arias found Lockhart for a 61 yard touchdown and the two point conversion was successful to put the Pirates on top 14-12 with 45 seconds left in the half.

The Pirates scored 14 points in just 40 seconds to break the shutout and grab a 14-12 lead. They weren't done with their bag of tricks as the Pirates were successful on an onside kick to give them another shot at the Tarpons defense from the Charlotte 46.

The Pirates couldn't score and gave up the ball with 6 seconds left before the break. On the final play of the exciting first

Thomas covered 25 yards of real estate for a touchdown midway through the third quarter to take a 20-14 lead after Rennie called his own number for the conversion points.

The Tarpon defense made the play of the game when the Pirates decided to go for it on a 4th and 3 inches on their own 48 yard line early in the fourth quarter. There was no doubt as to who won the battle for the line of scrimmage as Arias tried to sneak for a first down but was met with a surging defensive line that pushed him back for a loss on the play.

Opalach had a 37 yard touchdown run called back to the Pirate 49 because of an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty. Noah Paramore kicked a 25 yard field goal with 2:17 left in the game to put it away 23-14.

On this 130 th anniversary of the City of Punta Gorda's birthday, the Punta Gorda History Center will again recognize carefully selected individuals who have made significant contributions to the growth and success of the City of Punta Gorda. On Saturday evening Dec. 2, the distinguished Punta Gordans below will be inducted into the Punta Gorda History Hall of Honor at the PGHC's annual "Southern Supper."

- O.B. Armstrong (1838-1914)
 -O.B. Armstrong was a pioneer businessman and one of four black men who voted for the incorporation of the City of Punta Gorda in 1887. In addition to owning a grocery on Marion Avenue, he and his wife ran the restaurant in theDade Hotel.
- Peggy Desguin (1928-1977) -Peggy was a teacher, community leader and founder of what became the Charlotte County Historical Center.
- F.M. "Don" (1927-2001) and Jean Donelson - "Don" supported by wife Jean, still a Punta Gorda

resident, was the developer of Emerald Pointe and drove the creation of and founded Fisherman's Village. He also started Punta Gorda's Royal Order of Ponce de

Leon "Conquistadors."

- Harry "Pete" Goulding (1908-1992)-Pete hybridized a wide variety of hibiscus (over 500 varieties). Many of the plants blooming in the City today can be traced to Mr. Goulding. Known as "Mr. Hibiscus," he truly made Punta Gorda the City of the Hibiscus. He was also vice president and controller of the Punta Gorda Fish Company and a Justice of the Peace and Coroner for Charlotte County.
- Robert (1925-2002) and Joann Helphenstine–Robert and Joann founded the city's dominant car dealership and major business "Palm Auto." Robert, in addition to serving on many community organization Boards, also served on the City Council for 10 years.

Robert did and Joann continues to generously contribute to many of the county's nonprofits.

• Joyce Hindman (1919-1997) -Joyce was a Punta Gorda city councilman and mayor for over ten years and a local business man. While mayor, he single-handedly drove the effort to keep Punta Gorda as the county seat.

- Dr. Vernon Jordan-A Punta Gorda mayor, Dr. Jordan was a town dentist. He was also an owner of Punta Gorda's first movie
- Luther Koon–(1873-1956) A major cattleman, Luther Koon was also President of Punta Gorda State Bank. He used his own money to prevent panic during depression. His cherished ambition was to make Punta Gorda one of the most outstanding cities on Florida's gulf coast.
- Lois Peeples (1907-1994)—
 Prominent business woman,
 Lois Peeples, was co-owner with
 husband and state senator, Vasco
 Peeples, of an IGA Grocery on
 Marion Avenue. President of the
 Punta Gorda Woman's Club for
 many years, she was active in
 many civic organizations including 50 years with the Red Cross.
 Lois also served as Elder with the
 Presbyterian Church. She was the
 first woman inducted into the
 local Rotary.
- Edward Wotitzky (1876-1941) A 941-916-8800.

pioneer merchant, Edward came to Punta Gorda to work with his father, Jacob, in around 1890. He operated a sailing vessel that delivered goods to and from the gulf islands and as far away as Miami. He served as supervisor of elections, as a city councilman (commissioner), and was owner of Punta Gorda's first business hotel, the Dade Hotel. He also was Justice of the Peace for Charlotte County.

The "Southern Supper" event will be held at 5 p.m. on Dec. 2 at Hurricane Charley's. It will be both an evening celebrating those who have so much contributed to what Punta Gorda is today and a fundraiser for the Punta Gorda History Center, whose mission is to preserve and educate about Punta Gorda's past and develop an understanding of what those who preceded us did for us.

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
