Fishery developers put plan on hold

PLACIDA — Developers have shelved their plans to convert the Fishery property in Placida to a resort condominium and marina complex — at least for the moment. “We have taken a continuance,” said Robert Berntsson, attorney for Sarasota-based Potomac Group. The corporation has plans to redevelop the 13-acre Fishery complex into a mixed-use development of three, six-story buildings with 148 condominium units, a 40-room hotel, a new marina, a restaurant and other retail space. The Fishery, now with the ambience of an “old Florida” enclave, is located at the junction of Gasparilla and Placida roads, west of the Coral Creek Bridge. Charlotte County commissioners were expected to be asked Tuesday for final approvals Potomac Group's plans, but the agenda item has been pulled. While Berntsson did not say why, the decision to ask for the continuance may have resulted from the Charlotte County Planning Commission meeting earlier this month. The advisory board voted to recommend denying the project. The planning board saw a groundswell — if not a tsunami — of opposition to the plan. The commission chambers, where the meeting was held, proved too small for more than 200 people who expressed objections to the development.

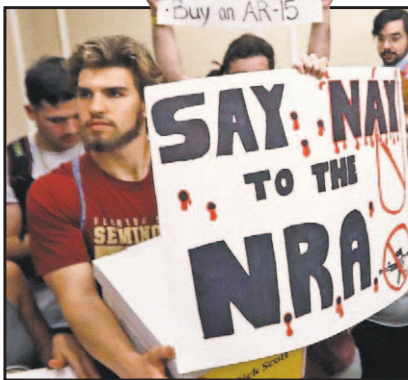
Scott and Legislature seek gun safety changes

Gov. Rick Scott and Florida's Republican Legislature called for major changes to gun laws Friday but their proposals fell far short of what survivors of the Parkland massacre and Democrats are demanding. The slaughter of 17 people at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School last week, in the final weeks of an election-year session of the Legislature, immediately galvanized supporters of gun control and forced elected leaders to take immediate action. “The goal of this plan of action is to make massive changes to protecting our schools,” Scott told a packed news conference in Tallahassee, two days after thousands of people swarmed the Capitol to demand new restrictions on military-style assault weapons and high-capacity magazines. In the most significant change, state leaders agree that anyone who wants to buy a gun must be at least 21. Under current law, only handgun buyers must be 21. Beyond that, top Republicans disagree. The Legislature wants a three-day wait for gun purchases, but Scott does not. The Legislature wants to allow trained teachers to carry guns; Scott does not. Scott wants police or relatives to be able to take away a mentally unstable person's guns without having to forcibly commit them. The Legislature does not. After seeking advice from sheriffs, educators and mental health experts, and attending the funerals of several of the

Parkland victims, Scott acted decisively Friday, demanding more forceful state action than he did after the Pulse nightclub massacre that took 49 lives two years ago. In somber tones, Scott began a news conference by reciting the names of all 17 victims in alphabetical order. “Alaina Petty. Meadow Pollack...” he said slowly. He unveiled a plan to spend \$500 million for safer schools, including \$50 million more for mental health counseling, in response to the killing by a 19-year-old former student who had repeatedly made threats of extreme violence. “No one with mental issues should have access to a gun,” Scott said. “It's common sense.” Under Scott's proposal, judges can prevent a violent or mentally ill person from buying or owning a gun based on a sworn petition by a police officer,

health expert or family member. In addition, anyone involuntarily committed under the Baker Act must surrender all firearms for at least 60 days. Scott said federal background checks are unreliable and repeated his criticism of the FBI for a “complete failure” for failing to pursue a tip about the Parkland killer. Under the Legislature's plan, gun owners would first have to be committed under the Baker Act before police could seize their guns, and they would have to be adjudicated mentally ill by a judge before permanently losing their weapons. “Whenever you are going to deprive someone of something, you have to do it under a condition that provides clear evidence that that is necessary,” said Rep. Jose Oliva, R-Miami Lakes. Under Scott's proposal, police could ask a judge for permission to seize weapons without the use

of the Baker Act — a plan sought by Broward Sheriff Scott Israel. Scott's plan also requires school resource officers in every Florida public and charter school, including one for every 1,000 students; a Department of Children and Families (DCF) case manager assigned to all 67 sheriffs; active shooter drills in every school; and state-approved school safety plans. Democrats criticized the plans by Scott and lawmakers as too little, too late. They renewed calls for background checks on gun buyers and an outright ban on the sale and possession of assault weapons, both of which Scott opposes. “There is support for an assault weapons ban,” said Rep. Carlos Guillermo Smith, D-Orlando. “That's what the students want, that's what the teachers want, that's what the

Local reaction to governor's school safety plan

While Gov. Rick Scott listed many provisions for enhanced student safety measures, one Charlotte County School official says shared statewide funding will be spread too thin. “Where is the money coming from?” asked Charlotte County Schools spokesman Mike Riley. “It costs our school district \$2 million for school safety. How can the \$450 million (proposed through state grants and new

state funding by Gov. Scott Friday) be split up fairly for all of the governor's requirements when there are 67 counties? Lee, Sarasota and Dade counties are all larger than us. “We have one psychologist for every 1,800 students and one guidance counselor for every 400 students,” he said. “There are licensed, uniformed, gun-carrying, law enforcement officers at each and every one of our schools, elementary through high schools.”

Scott's \$450 million proposal makes it mandatory for one School Resource Officer for every 1,000 students at a school by the start of the 2018 school year in August. SROs must be sworn sheriff's deputies or police officers and present during all hours students are on campus. In Sarasota County, each School Resource Deputy has more than 100 hours of annual training on topics including cyber bullying, gangs, campus safety, active shooter scenarios

and more. All law enforcement members of the sheriff's office are also trained in crisis intervention and de-escalation techniques, according to Sarasota County Sheriff Tom Knight. With limited funding mechanisms, currently, there aren't Resource Officers at all Sarasota County Schools. Some elementary schools have no full-time officer. A deputy is assigned to patrol near the

Charlotte County Commission hopeful enters District 4 race

PORT CHARLOTTE — It is more than a campaign pledge when Kevin Randolph says that, if elected county commissioner, he would make serving the citizens of Charlotte County his full-time job. Randolph is already devoting every day, all day, to attending county meetings and researching local problems in preparation to become the next District 4 representative. “I definitely have to get more involved in the issues,” said Randolph, explaining he has lived in Port Charlotte for just a year. “It takes a lot of time.” Although this is his first

official run for elective office, Randolph seriously considered vying for a seat on the North Port City Council last year, but found himself on the outside looking in. “I found out how hard it was to get your foot in the door in the political arena,” he said. His campaign emphasizes his business experience, including a stint as co-owner of Goodfellas Moving in North Port. Randolph boasts more than 20 years of business background — from the Chicago steel mills to Pennsylvania die casting — in management, budgeting, and research and development. He plans on using this practical knowledge to

steward a leaner, more efficient operation in government. “We need a tighter systematic approach,” he said. For example, Randolph said more oversight is needed with the 1 percent sales tax projects as well as Charlotte County Utilities initiatives like the sewer expansion program. He said the numbers don't add up when it comes to paying for sewers, although he supports the overall program. “Where's the money coming from? Are we focusing on the right areas?” he asks.

Randolph said local residents have a lot of the same questions he is asking, and wants to represent the voice of the people on the Charlotte Commission. While attending county meetings, he said people tell him they are concerned about the environmental impacts of major projects planned for the waterfront, such as the huge Sunseeker hotel/condo development in Charlotte Harbor. The county currently is reviewing a rezoning proposal that would allow for three, six-story buildings with 148 condominium units, a

ENGLEWOOD — Clare Naughton-Rockwell was at the coffee shop in Alexandria, Virginia, as Congressmen and House Majority Whip Steve Scalise and four others were shot nearby while practicing for the annual Congressional Baseball Game for Charity.

“What people don’t realize is how many people are impacted by a mass shooting,” she said. “The road was blocked for four days while they collected evidence from that 10-minute shooting.”

The then 20-year-old said she suffered nightmares afterwards.

“I would wake up worried if my college would be shot up,” said Naughton-Rockwell, Thursday while holding a sign on with the photographs of two victims in the Valentine’s Day shooting Marjory

Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida.

Naughton-Rockwell joined Englewood resident John Munn, a member of a local Indivisible chapter, at the crowded Englewood Farmer’s Market on Dearborn Street. They stood at the entrance holding a large sign with the faces of all

17 victims.

“I’m going to stand for the kids because they can’t speak,” Naughton-Rockwell said. “These teenagers should have been learning long division and getting their driver’s license. Instead they are in the ground.”

Naughton-Rockwell and Munn spoke to nearly everyone who would stop and look.

“Please call your congressman and tell him how you feel about gun violence,” Munn said. “Vote locally for people who have the same views as you do on this subject.”

Naughton-Rockwell moved to the area recently. She registered to vote here so she could have a voice in the November election.

“I’d really like to have a march along Dearborn Street,” she said. “People should not forget how these students and their teachers in Parkland

suffered. The families of the victims at Virginia Tech suffered. There’s just too much suffering and not enough living.”

Munn said he plans to have his sign on display along Dearborn Street during the annual Wine Walk.

Munn said any politician who receives money from the National Rifle Association should be scrutinized.

“In politics, it’s about the money and who can buy the power and control,” he said. “These aren’t the same people you see crying with the students and parents of victims of gun violence. It’s time to stop military-grade weapons from getting in the hands of the mentally ill. It’s time to stop having fire drills and have real meaningful ways to keep kids safe. When was the last time a school was set on fire with kids in it?”

“It’s sad that a little 8-year-old said, ‘Mommy, I can’t wear my light-up shoes anymore because a shooter might see me when I’m hiding,’” Munn said.

“That’s not the kind of world any child should have to live in. Us adults must do better.”

Vote-by-mail ballots requested

SARASOTA — Those planning to vote-by-mail should have their ballots in early, according to the Sarasota County Supervisor of Elections.

Residents using vote-by-mail, should mail ballots as soon as possible or should have their ballots turned in to the supervisor of elections no later than 7 p.m. on election night. In addition to mailing

in ballots early, voters should also follow the instructions included in the vote-by-mail ballot. According to a press release from the supervisor of elections voters should complete and sign the ballot certificate envelope.

Signatures on the ballot envelope should match the signature on file in the voters registration database.

The March 20 election includes the School District ad valorem

millage election, Holiday Park Park & Recreation district election, and the town of Longboat Key general election.

Ballots for the March 20 election should be returned by 7 p.m. to the following supervisor of elections offices
Sarasota County Terrace Building, 2001 Adams Lane, Sarasota, R.L. Anderson Administration Building, 4000 Tamiami Trail S., Venice, and Biscayne Plaza, 13460 Tamiami Trail, North Port.

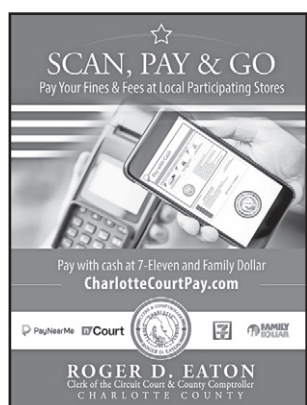
Coke, candy and court fines: Clerk of Court offers remote cash payments

PUNTA GORDA — Charlotte County residents can now pay court fees with cash without ever coming to the Charlotte County Justice Center.

The Charlotte County Clerk of Court is the first in the state to offer the remote cash payment program, which allows individuals to pay fines at local 7-Elevens or Family Dollars around the county.

"The foundation of what we do is serving the public and interacting with individuals who need access to justice, and it's important for us to provide that access," said Clerk of Court Roger Eaton. "I spent 10 years in the clerk's technology department, and now I'm able to use that experience and provide these convenient, innovative systems to better serve the public." Eaton said nCourt,

which provides the clerk's access to credit and debit payments, was trying the program out in another state and asked if Charlotte County would be interested as well. Through a partnership with PayNearMe, the program gives citizens the opportunity to pay cash at retail locations close to their homes or workplaces.

"People are working 8 to 5," Eaton said. "That's our business hours, so this provides an opportunity to

go outside of work."

To make a cash payment, residents simply log on to the go to the clerk's website at CharlotteCourtPay.com and select the new cash option. A bar code will be provided, which they can either print or have sent to their mobile phone. A retail location is provided based on the user's zip code, where they can go to have the bar code scanned and pay with cash. When the payment is complete, a notification is sent to the clerk's financial system within minutes.

The program also protects citizens' privacy. The cashier at the retail location will only see the amount owed and no information about the fine being paid. 7-Eleven and Family Dollar are currently the only two locations offering the program, but the clerk is also working to add CVS Pharmacy as another option.

The new service comes at no extra cost for taxpayers. Those using the service pay a \$5.99 service fee for transactions under \$199.99 and a fee of \$7.99 for transactions above \$200. The total amount that can be accepted is \$1,000.

After going live Friday and announcing the new program with a press release Tuesday, the clerk already received one cash payment made at a 7-Eleven by Wednesday.

Eaton said he's very proud to be the first in the state to offer the program, following the implementation of a jury app and a fraud alert notification system last year.

"I'm constantly seeking ideas about innovation and possibilities to better deliver a service to the public," he said. "We're trying to set the trend here in Charlotte County." Email: aeasker@sun-herald.com

County Libraries and Orioles team up for 'Big League Reader'
Sarasota County is once again going to bat with the Baltimore Orioles and the Big League Reader program to encourage youth literacy and foster a love of reading. Children who sign up at a county library and read three or more books during February earn a free reserved grandstand ticket to the Orioles Spring Training game at Ed Smith Stadium on March 10, versus the Pittsburgh Pirates. The first 100 kids that finish the program will also receive a free t-shirt when they return to the library and get their scorecard stamped. campus and neighborhood.

One way North Port City Commissioners planned to combat that was to pay for one North Port Police Officer assigned to all five elementary schools beginning in August. There are already SROs at North Port High School and Heron Creek and Woodland middle schools.

“We were working on school safety initiatives with the Sarasota County School Board before the governor’s mandate,” said North Port Mayor Vanessa Carusone. “I’m glad the governor included charter schools because we have unsuccessful in even talking about having school resource officers with Imagine Schools in North Port.

Sheriff Knight unveiled a plan last week to increase school safety by asking the School Board to hire dozens of highly trained safety officers. Knight said he’s been trying to convince school administrators of having armed former law enforcement officers on school campuses, but was ignored.

“The new superintendent is open to this pilot program,” Knight said in a press conference. “I also spoke to School Board members about it ... These safety officers would be on the campus and socialize with students. They wouldn’t know if they are a parent or a volunteer. They would be very much like a sky marshal. They would be trained by the sheriff’s office and be willing to respond during an active shooter situation. Many have managed major incidents and have knowledge of weaponry and tactics. They already have guns and a permit to carry. They train twice a year with law enforcement as per the Florida statute.”

Charlotte County Sheriff Bill Prummell said he’s already working with local, state and federal partners on some of the governor’s proposed requirements.

“Speaking specifically about Governor Scott’s action plan, we are already in compliance with many of the requirements set forth,” Prummell said. “I have met with my staff numerous times over the last couple of weeks to look at ways to strengthen our security and response protocols. I also have upcoming meetings with several of our community stakeholders to do the same so we are all working together and moving, not only in the same direction, but in the right direction.”

Like the governor, local sheriffs

and school administrators don’t favor arming teachers.

Knight’s plan mirrors the governor’s which gives sheriffs the authority to train additional school personnel or reserve law enforcement officers to protect students if requested by the local school board.

Scott is also changing the way schools and law enforcement train for mass casualties.

“Both faculty and students must participate in active shooter drills and local sheriff’s offices must be involved in training,” Scott said during a press conference Friday, adding, there will be a Safe Schools Allocation including school hardening measures such as metal detectors, bullet-proof glass, steel doors, and upgraded locks.

For years, Charlotte County Schools discussed arming teachers and still doesn’t support it.

“I would like to quote former superintendent of Charlotte County Public Schools Dr. Doug Whitaker, who summed it up in two words,” Riley said. “Unmitigated disaster.”

Instead Scott wants crisis-intervention training for all school personnel done by the new school year. Districts receiving Safe Schools Allocation funds must enter a contract with the local sheriff, the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice, the Florida Department of Children and Families, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement and any community behavioral health provider for information sharing and coordinated prevention or intervention services.

Scott is working to establish a new, anonymous K-12 “See Something, Say Something” statewide, dedicated hotline, website and mobile app.

“Our students are actively engaged with these platforms and this makes it even easier to speak up,” wrote Tracey Beeker, Sarasota County Schools spokeswoman in a statement Friday.

“In addition, we are pleased that an emphasis has been placed on mental health issues across a broad spectrum of options. Sarasota County employs a culture of ‘Education First, Safety Always,’ and the Governor’s plan is a complement to the focused efforts across our school district to keep our students safe. We are thankful to Governor Scott for his leadership on this important topic and look forward to working with him, the Florida House and Senate, the Sarasota County Sheriff’s Office and municipal law enforcement on all proposals that benefit our students and their continued safety and well-being.”

survivors of Parkland and Pulse and every other shooting we’ve had in our state want.”

Democratic U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson, who’s likely to be challenged by Scott this fall, accused the governor of capitulating to the gun lobby.

“The governor’s plan doesn’t do one thing to ensure comprehensive criminal background checks or ban assault rifles like the AR-15,” Nelson said. “His leadership is weak and by recommending raising the age to 21, he is doing the bare minimum. Enough is enough. We need to get these assault rifles off our streets and expand criminal background checks for anyone acquiring a gun.”

Scott reiterated his opposition to a ban on weapons such as the AR-15-like assault rifle used in the Parkland attack on Feb. 14.

“I know there are some who are advocating a mass taking of Second Amendment rights for all Americans. That is not the answer,” Scott said.

Senate President Joe Negron, R-Stuart, suggested that an assault weapons ban would violate the Constitution.

“I think there’s a delicate balance. Even in difficult times, we have to follow the Constitution. We have to show fidelity to the Constitution,” Negron said at a second news conference with nearly a dozen Republican lawmakers.

The Senate and House plans are similar to those sketched out on a yellow legal pad last weekend by Sen. Bill Galvano, R-Bradenton, before several busloads of Parkland students arrived in

Tallahassee Wednesday.

After visiting the school, Galvano said he and Senate leaders decided that addressing gaps in gun and school safety laws was the top priority for the legislative session.

The Legislature’s plan falls short of what Floridians want, according to an internal poll for Senate Republicans that shows a majority of residents support an assault weapons ban.

In a major departure from Scott’s plan, Republican legislative leaders said they want a three-day wait for all gun purchases in the state.

It would be the first waiting period in more than three decades, and it quickly provoked opposition from the state’s sizeable and vocal population of gun owners.

“It’s gratuitous gun control,” said Marion Hammer, the venerable Florida NRA lobbyist. “We oppose punishing law-abiding gun owners.”

Lawmakers want to equip teachers with guns through a voluntary “marshal” program that requires teachers to be sworn officers by their county sheriff, after a minimum of 132 hours of training, similar to the initiative underway in Polk County.

House Speaker Richard Corcoran, R-Land O’Lakes, gave assurances that even under a very tight timetable, the proposals will be debated at length during committee meetings and the public will be heard.

The changes must be approved in the next two weeks of the annual legislative session that’s scheduled to end on March 9.

“An open dialogue is critical,” Scott said. “But I will not accept the old tired political notion that we don’t have enough time to get anything done.”

GOV. SCOTT’S ACTION PLAN

This is the complete text of Gov. Rick Scott’s speech delivered Friday in Tallahassee:

Alyssa Alhadeff, Scott Beigel, Martin Duque Anguiano, Nicholas Dworet, Aaron Feis, Jamie Guttenberg, Chris Hixon, Luke Hoyer, Cara Loughran, Gina Montalto, Joaquin Oliver, Alaina Petty, Meadow Pollack, Helena Ramsay, Alexander Schachter, Carmen Schentrup, Peter Wang.

Unfortunately, none of the plans I’m announcing today will bring any of them back, but it’s important to remember them. The 17 lives that were cut short and all the hopes and dreams that were ruined have changed our state forever. Florida will never be the same.

Today, I am announcing a major action plan. I will be working with the legislature aggressively over the next two weeks to get it done.

This week we asked law enforcement leaders, education leaders, and health leaders from all over the state to drop what they were doing, clear their schedules, and immediately get up to Tallahassee for urgent conversations about what we can — and must do — to make our schools and communities safer. We must take care of our kids.

I can tell you that everyone said yes, and they came, and they got to work.

I have also spent a lot of time in Parkland meeting with families and students. I’ve been there nearly every day since the shooting. I have listened to their ideas to make sure this never happens again.

I also met with students who courageously came to Tallahassee to have their voices heard. What we saw in this building on Wednesday is what our democracy is about and why we live in the greatest nation on earth.

My message to them has been very simple — you are not alone. Change is coming ... and it will come fast.

This is a time when I believe we must all come together, and even cross party lines. Of course, we won’t all agree on every issue, but I do believe this is a moment when our state can come together around a common sense set of actions.

I also want to encourage people to listen to each other and keep listening to each other. I’ve done a lot more listening than talking this week. Sometimes leading involves more listening than talking.

I’ve listened to things that I agree with, and to things I don’t agree with. It’s important to consider all viewpoints.

I’ve broken my action plan down into three sections. Gun laws, school safety, and mental health. We must get this done in the next two weeks.

First, on guns:

I want to make it virtually impossible for anyone who has mental issues to use a gun. I want to make it virtually impossible for anyone who is a danger to themselves or others to use a gun.

I want to create a new program in Florida — I call it the Violent Threat Restraining Order. This concept is very simple, and very common sense in my view.

This will allow a court to prohibit a violent or mentally ill person from purchasing or possessing a firearm or any other weapon when either a family member, community welfare expert or law enforcement officer files a sworn request, and presents evidence to the court of a threat of violence involving firearms or other weapons. There would be speedy due process for the accused and any fraudulent or false statements would face criminal penalties.

Let’s take a moment to look at the case of this killer. This person was not stopped from legally purchasing a weapon, was not arrested, was not detained, and was never forced to turn in his weapons.

Let’s review the warning signs here ... he had 39 visits from police, his mother called him in, DCF investigated, he was kicked out of school, he was known to students as a danger to shoot people, and he was reported to the FBI last month as a possible school shooter.

And yet, he was never put on the list to be denied the ability to buy a gun, and his guns were never removed from him.

We will also strengthen gun purchase and possession restrictions for mentally ill individuals under the Baker Act. If a court involuntarily commits someone because they are a risk to themselves or others, they would be required to surrender all firearms and not regain their right to purchase or possess a firearm until a court hearing. We are also proposing a minimum 60-day period before individuals can ask a court to restore access to firearms.

Also, we will require all individuals purchasing firearms to be 21 or older. Let me repeat — we will require all individuals purchasing firearms to be 21 or older.

There will be exceptions for active duty and reserve military and spouses, National Guard members, and law enforcement.

Next, we will prohibit a person from possessing or purchasing a firearm if they are subject to an injunction for protection against stalking, cyberstalking, dating violence, repeat violence, sexual violence, or domestic violence.

We will establish enhanced criminal penalties for threats to schools, like social media threats of shootings or bombings. We will also enhance penalties if any person possesses or purchases a gun after they have been deemed by state law to not have access to a gun.

And, we will completely ban the purchase or sale of bump stocks.

The second part of my action plan provides \$450 million to keep students safe.

Today, I am calling for a mandatory law enforcement officer in every public school. These law enforcement officers must either be sworn sheriff’s deputies or police officers and be present during all hours students are on campus.

The size of the campus should be a factor in determining staffing levels by the county sheriff’s office, and I am proposing at least one law enforcement officer for every 1,000 students. This must be implemented by the start of the 2018 school year.

We will also provide sheriff’s departments the authority to train additional school personnel or reserve law enforcement officers to protect students if requested by the local school board.

And, we will require mandatory active shooter training as outlined by the Department of Homeland Security. All training and code red drills must be completed during the first week of each semester in all public schools. Both faculty and students must participate in active shooter drills and local sheriff’s offices must approve and be involved in training.

We are also increasing funding in the Safe Schools Allocation to address specific school safety needs within each school district. This includes school hardening measures like metal detectors, bullet-proof glass, steel doors, and upgraded locks. The Florida Department of Education, with FDLE, will also provide minimum school safety and security standards by July 1st to all school districts.

All school safety plans must be submitted to their county sheriff’s office by July 1st each year for approval. Once all plans and requests for school hardening have been approved by the county sheriff’s office, in consultation with local police, plans will be forwarded to the Department of Education by the school district to receive any state funds.

School districts must also take all capital outlay funds received from taxpayers and use it for school hardening before it can be spent on any other capital outlay. All safe school allocations must be spent in accordance with the sheriff approved plans.

We will also require each school district that receives a Safe Schools Allocation to enter into an agreement with the local sheriff’s office, the Department of Juvenile Justice, the Department of Children and Families, the Department of Law Enforcement and any community behavioral health provider for the purpose of sharing information. That will allow us to better coordinate services in order to provide prevention or intervention strategies.

We will also establish a new, anonymous K-12 “See Something, Say Something” statewide, dedicated hotline, website and mobile app.

Next, we will establish funding to require access to dedicated mental health counselors to provide direct counseling services to students at every school. These counselors cannot serve dual roles, like teaching or academic advising. Every student must have the opportunity to meet one-on-one with a mental health professional, and receive ongoing counseling as needed.

Each school will be required to have a threat assessment team including a teacher, a local law enforcement officer, a human resource officer, a DCF employee, a DJJ employee, and the principal to meet monthly to review any potential threats to students and staff at the school.

Finally, we will require crisis intervention training for all school personnel. This training must be completed before the start of the 2018 school year.

The final part of my action plan includes \$50 million in additional funding for mental health initiatives.

We must expand mental health service teams statewide to serve youth and young adults with early or serious mental illness by providing counseling, crisis management and other critical mental health services.

We are also requiring every sheriff’s office to have a DCF case manager embedded in their department to solely work as a crisis welfare worker for repeat cases in the community. This will require 67 additional employees to be hired at DCF by July 15th.

Finally, we will provide law enforcement and mental health coordination matching grants to allow sheriffs to establish special law enforcement teams to coordinate with DCF case managers.

Before I take your questions, I want to close with this.

The goal of this plan of action is to make massive changes in protecting our schools, provide significantly more resources for mental health, and do everything we can to keep guns out of the hands of those dealing with mental problems or threatening harm to themselves or others.

I know there are some who are advocating a mass takeaway of 2nd amendment rights for all Americans. That is not the answer.

Keeping guns away from dangerous people and people with mental issues is what we need to do.

I do know that some are going to accuse me of unfairly stigmatizing those who struggle with mental illness. I reject that. I am not asking them to wear a scarlet letter, nor am I unsympathetic to their plight. I have a family member who has dealt with these issues. It is hard on them and it is hard on the family.

But, what I am saying is no one with mental issues should have access to guns.

It’s common sense, and it is in their own best interest, not to mention the interests of our communities.

And much of what I’m proposing involves giving law enforcement the ability to stop people from harming themselves and others, while giving them the tools to keep our schools safe.

We know for certain that we cannot simply rely on the current federal background check system.

This killer should not have been able to purchase or even possess a weapon.

And we know that the federal government can’t even be counted on to investigate or act on serious and credible threats as we saw with the FBI’s complete failure.

It’s obvious we can’t trust the federal process which is why we have to make these changes here in Florida.

I’m an NRA member, a supporter of the 2nd Amendment, and the 1st Amendment, and the entire bill of rights for that matter. I’m also a father, and a grandfather, and a Governor.

We all have a difficult task in front of us ... balancing our individual rights with our obvious need for public safety.

But of course, some will say it’s too much, and some will say it is not enough. I respect everyone’s opinion, and I don’t ridicule those who disagree with me. An open dialogue is crucial.

But, I will not accept the old, tired political notion that we don’t have enough time to get anything done. Government does not have to be slow or lethargic. And when it comes to protecting our schools and our kids, we need to be swift and decisive.

I also understand that I am proposing half a billion dollars for school safety and mental health initiatives.

But let me be clear — there is nothing more important than the safety of our children. Our kids deserve nothing less. Fortunately, our economy is booming, and we have the resources to protect our schools and our students.

And, if providing this funding means we won’t be able to cut taxes this year — so be it.

And, if we have to give up some of the projects we all hold near and dear — so be it.

Rooney stood up for beliefs, open dialogue

OUR POSITION: Rep. Tom Rooney will leave Congress with a long record of distinguished public service.

Florida Rep. Tom Rooney was true to himself last week when he called it quits, taking the opportunity to get out from under the grinding weight of hyper-partisanship and congressional gridlock after five terms.

Tom Rooney will leave Congress with his dignity intact.

The Okeechobee Republican, who represents a large swath of this paper's circulation area on the Southwest Coast and in central Florida, announced late Monday afternoon that he would not seek re-election in November. The decision came as a surprise. Perhaps it shouldn't have.

Rooney's conduct in office reflected his belief in the

importance of public service as part of a collegial and thoughtful democratic process. Unfortunately, a collegial, thoughtful democratic process, with fact-based discussion and give and take across the aisle, doesn't exist in Washington, D.C. How long has it been now?

And so, Rooney departs that train wreck.

Rooney is a senior Republican on the House Intelligence Committee, which is investigating whether Russia meddled with the 2016 presidential election. A week ago, he said partisanship had poisoned the committee and could lead to national security concerns. It was a frank concession.

Rooney has set himself apart in other ways in recent years.

Most notable was his dis-endorsement of then-GOP presidential candidate Donald

Trump after the release of the "Access Hollywood" tapes in 2016.

In a statement at the time, the congressman said: "I don't want my boys growing up in a world where the president of the United States is allowed to speak or treat women the way Donald Trump has."

Rooney went out on a limb like few others at what seemed to be a pivotal time. We admired his courage, even if it seemed it might cost base support. While it no doubt caused friction later, the impact at the polls was minimal. Trump won the district by 27 points; Rooney the same.

Rooney also challenged party orthodoxy by leading a charge to reinstate limited congressional earmarks. It was a difficult position, considering the GOP's strict position on earmarks, but his reasoning was based on

sound Constitutional principles: By ceding power of the purse, the legislative branch was turning over critical spending decisions to executive branch bureaucrats.

Rooney also stepped up when challenged by dissenters last year to hold a local town hall meeting. He did, and in a packed and sometime antagonistic hall full of constituents in Englewood, Rooney calmly articulated well-formulated, conservative positions. We only wish he had done more of the same over the years: He was his best spokesman, but he seemed to shy away from the role.

Rooney also was a champion for Florida's agriculture community — especially citrus farmers who have been slammed with a one-two punch of citrus greening and

Hurricane Irma. He worked to get badly needed emergency funding this year that should revive the industry.

A former Army JAG officer — he also taught constitutional law at West Point — Rooney concentrated on veterans issues and sought improvements to the Veterans Administration.

Even those who disagreed with Rooney, as we did on occasion, could admire a man who believes in the true spirit of public service, as reflected by his years in the military and in Congress. In this regard, he served his country twice.

We wish Rooney well in the next stage of life — time he'll spend with his family, earning a good living and, perhaps, outside of the daily grind of politics.

Our loss. We thank him for his service.

Having these truths to pass on will pressure those unions that must be kept unto death. The final results can be that you end up with a lot of unwanted baggage.

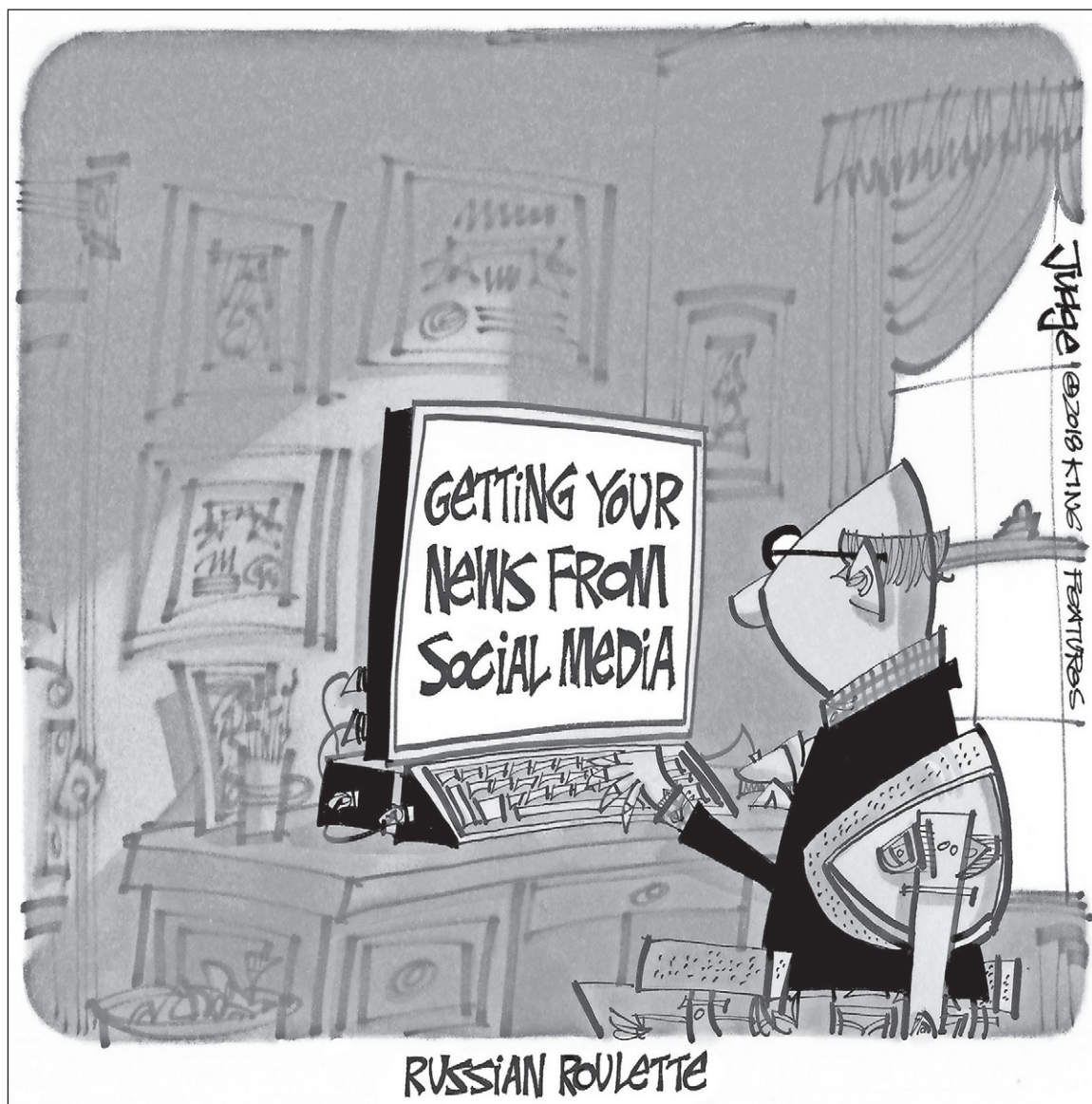

Sarasota County, city of North Port reach agreement

SARASOTA — Nearing the eve of a joint meeting between the county and city leaders, the two governments have reached an agreement in principle that could end a festering, months-long dispute over parks.

Late Thursday, county Parks Director Carolyn Brown sent a letter to the various sports leagues that use the Wellfield and Chuck Reiter Fields in Venice announcing that an agreement had been reached.

After an initial agreement negotiated by county and city staff was rejected by city manager Ed LaVallee, he and County Administrator Jonathan Lewis met a week ago and reached a new agreement in principal.

Both the County Commission and the City Council will have an opportunity Tuesday to dissect and discuss the agreement before the two boards meet in their joint session Wednesday afternoon at the Venice Community Center.

Central to the agreement is a separation of the two aforementioned parks that have been central to the dispute.

Under the proposed agreement the county will maintain and operate Chuck Reiter Park though Sept. 30, 2021. After that date, the city will assume maintenance and operation of the park.

As for Wellfield Park, it will become a county

owned or leased park this year, and be incorporated into the county parks system. The county has proposed taking a deed to the property, while the city has countered with offering a 99-year lease.

That issue remains to be determined by county and city leaders, possibly during their meeting Wednesday.

According to the agreement the county will also continue to maintain and operate the following parks in the city: Venice Beach, Marina Park and boat ramp, Brohard Park, and the east side of Venetian Waterway Park.

The city will assume maintenance and operational responsibilities for all other parks in the city including Pinebrook Park.

With the exception of the county taking over Wellfield Park this year, the remainder of the agreement goes into effect Oct. 1, 2019, when the existing parks interlocal agreement expires on its own terms Sept. 30, 2019.

If county commissioners and the City Council approve the agreement in principle, it will form the basis for a new interlocal agreement on parks, and could serve as the model for a new agreement with North Port.

The dispute started last November when county leaders, looking for ways to reduce expenditures and shore up expected budget deficits, agreed to send a letter to all four cities notifying them of an intent to terminate

existing parks interlocal agreements.

This letter had to be sent by Dec. 1, county attorneys explained, to preserve the county's right to do so in the future.

As predicted then by County Commissioner Charles Hines, the letters met with a negative reaction, particularly in Venice, where one city councilman mischaracterized the letter and fired up parents involved in the sports leagues. Those parents have appeared at several county commission meetings imploring commissioners not to close the parks, which they had been led to believe was the intent of the county.

"I look forward to working with all of the Youth Sports stakeholders to begin to plan for the future of Wellfield and Chuck Reiter, two facilities that I have spent many, many years playing and coaching youth sports on," Hines wrote in an email.

"With that experience, I'm very aware of the shortcomings of these two facilities due to the lack of long-range capital dollars being allocated to them. With the change of the interlocal agreement, the county will now at least have control of Wellfield's future and can begin to budget and plan for the many needed upgrades to this facility which will benefit all of the residents of the South County area."

Percy Angelo, an active member of the Friends of Cape Haze, does not know why Potomac Group asked for the continuance. The Friends group, along with Gasparilla Island Conservation Association, opposed the redevelopment plan.

"Through with the Chew" week

It seems that every day is an opportunity for American culture to commemorate accomplishments or failures of its citizens in one form or another. This week, if no one knew, is Through With Chew Week, according to Drug Free Charlotte County and the Florida Department of Health's Tobacco Free Florida program.

Drug Free Charlotte County and the FDH Tobacco Free Florida

Program were raising awareness about the dangers of smokeless tobacco, which includes chew and dip.

The public awareness campaign was created to reduce the use of smokeless tobacco among young people, according to a Drug Free Punta Gorda press release. The goal is to combat the use of smokeless tobacco among teens and adults. The promotional week runs through Feb. 24.

"While we are proud that youth smokeless use is at an all-time

According to the Drug Free Charlotte County press release the rate of smokeless tobacco use has fluctuated and disproportionately affects certain areas:

- In 2012, the rate of adult smokeless tobacco use was 3.2 percent. In 2016, the rate was at 3.0 percent. This decrease is minimal compared to the rate at which cigarette use has dropped (17.7 percent to 15.5 percent.)
- According to the 2017 Charlotte County Teen Social norm Survey, 91 percent of county middle school teens don't smoke cigarettes and 88 percent of county high school teens do not smoke cigarettes.

low, the number of adult Floridians using smokeless tobacco is still an issue," said Dr. Kellie O'Dare, Tobacco Free Florida bureau chief. "We want to remind smokeless tobacco users that our cessation services are for everyone — not just

smokers." According to the release, at least 28 cancer-causing chemicals have been identified in smokeless tobacco. Smokeless tobacco users have an 80 percent high risk of oral cancer and a 60 percent higher risk of esophageal cancer and pancreatic cancer compared to non-users.

There is no scientific or medical evidence that proves smokeless tobacco use is an effective method to help people quit smoking. Floridians who want to quit any form of tobacco have access to the state's free resources.

Manta Rays outlast Packers to advance to regional semifinals

ENGLEWOOD — Before Thursday night, it had been 15 years since Lemon Bay last won a district championship and earned the right to host a regional quarterfinal game.

After first defeating No. 1 seed Charlotte and then No. 2 seed Cape Coral on the way to a district championship win last week, the Manta Rays found themselves trailing Largo by 10 points in the third quarter before storming back to win 59-52 and advance to the 7A Regional semifinals against Cape Coral.

"I was more concerned with, 'How many times can I push that emotional button? How many times can I draw that out?' Midway through the third and going into the fourth I could see some momentum building on defense," Lemon Bay coach Sean Huber said. "(Largo) started to take quicker shots, which helped us. They started to get a little desperate, taking quicker shots deeper on the floor and we got in a rhythm."

Following a physical first half, Lemon Bay went ice cold from the field and turned the ball over three times as Largo built a 39-29 lead early in the third quarter.

But the Manta Rays never wavered, mounting a 10-0 run to tie the game as they fed off the ferocious efforts of Tyler

Caron and Hayden Wolff in the post.

Wolff, who scored a team-high 15 points, also finished with 13 rebounds and 5-for-5 free-throw shooting as he proved to be too much for the Packers to handle. Caron added 13 points and 16 rebounds of his own, giving Lemon Bay several second-chance opportunities in the fourth quarter.

"They're banging us down low with two Division-I football players being recruited by everyone and their mother," Huber said of Isaiah Bellamy and Raymond Collins. "They're fantastic players, they're big strong dudes. Even in person they were a lot bigger than I thought from watching film, they were a handful to keep off the glass in the first half."

Aside from point guard Amant Deliu, who finished with 15 points for Largo, the Packers struggled to establish much offensive rhythm, instead capitalizing on rebounds and turnovers.

Largo forced Lemon Bay to turn the ball over 16 times and blocked five of the Manta Rays shots, but the Packers defense faltered in the paint as Wolff and Caron helped kickstart the comeback.

"I mean they have Division-I football players down there, but I'm going to be a Division-I football player too, so it's a good battle," Wolff said. "They fought hard,

they were probably the best post we've played all year, maybe the best we will play. But Tyler Caron and I fought hard and battled to get the win."

The Manta Rays reached the bonus in the fourth quarter, and their 10-for-12 free-throw shooting in that quarter gave them enough cushion to wait out the clock for their 13th win in the past 14 games.

Lemon Bay and Cape Coral will meet again in the regional semifinals on Tuesday at

7 p.m. at Lemon Bay High School as the Seahawks look to avenge last week's district championship loss to the Manta Rays.

With Lemon Bay now in the 'Sweet 16' and one win away from the regional championship game, the Manta Ray faithful finally have something to rally behind for the first time in a long time.

"I think it's getting the students involved in the game," Huber said. "Like they feel like they're a part of the game, they're not just

watching the game. And once you get that kind of buy-in from your crowd, we're gonna come back every time we play at home. So, I'm hoping to see everyone out here Tuesday at 7 because it's gonna be a good one."

Via's overtime jumper sends North Port to regional semifinals

NORTH PORT — Ben Via owned the final seconds Thursday, making the defining plays before the buzzer in both regulation and overtime to propel North Port past Venice 56-55 and send the Bobcats into the regional semifinals.

Via scored 11 of his 18 points in the fourth quarter or overtime, nailing a heavily-contested elbow jumper with five seconds remaining in overtime to put North Port in front for good.

"I saw Cristian had the ball so I tried to run up and get it and get a quick mid-range jumper," Via said. "I saw that Aaron had position to maybe get a rebound so I tried to get it up before the buzzer to maybe get a put-back."

That put-back wasn't needed, as Via's attempt made it through the rim to sink Venice.

"In the timeout, Ben Via looked at me and said 'Coach, give me the ball,'" Bobcats head coach Ryan Power said. "We got the ball back and cold-blooded, he knocked down a very contested jump shot."

His game-winning jumper wasn't Via's first go-ahead basket of the night. In fact, it was his third in the final seven minutes of the game. He also blocked Venice's potential game-winning three-point attempt at the end of regulation.

"It's always been about defense," Power said. "Finally in the fourth

quarter, we rushed them into some turnovers and bad shots and capitalized to take them down court for some baskets."

Venice led by nine points early in the fourth quarter before the Bobcats came roaring back. Via and senior forward Aaron Dismukes led the comeback that gave North Port a 47-46 lead with 2:23 left in the game. After a Reece Jackowiak layup and Jaivon Heiligh free throw gave Venice a two-point lead, Dismukes finished strong at the rim through contact to tie the game with 14 seconds left in regulation. He also threw down a thunderous dunk in overtime.

"Aaron is bigger than most of the guys on their team," said Power. "We got him the ball. He missed a couple layups early but he stayed confident. When he got that steal in overtime, we were able to swing the momentum back our way."

The Indians seemed to be in control throughout the entire game, stretching the lead to as many as 11 points. However, North Port hung around and never let the game get too far away from them.

"We missed a bunch of gimmies around the basket and they just hit a couple shots," Venice head coach John Flynn said. "It's very disappointing. I thought we were kind of in control there, and it just got a little sideways on us. That's how it goes, it's basketball."

McCall was platted by the CH&N Railroad in 1909. After building a two-story railroad depot there a small town sprung up. McCall's location is best described as the intersection of State Road 776 and County Road 771 (Gasparilla Road).

Most of the community's residents worked for the railroad. But Abe, being a citrus expert, had been hired to come to the area to work in a new citrus grove. And Mary, being a very industrious gal, soon was self employed raising cattle.

Mary related to me the following:

"I decided to raise some cows. I drove up to Tampa to buy 'em, \$2 a piece, a day or two old. They had to be kept warm, so I put 'em one-at-a-time in the trunk of my car. I would leave it open just enough to give the calf air. I would sell 'em in Arcadia at the auction for maybe \$60 when they were yearlings.

"I did all the work with the cows, but I never could kill anything. Abe would slaughter them. Sometimes, I would take the whole beef to the Ainger Store in Englewood. This was before meat-inspection days. I would line the truck bed with green palmetto fronds before I put the beef in to keep it clean.

"Those were segregation days, and I did have a couple of problems, not only was I a woman raising cattle, I was black. We had open range then. Everybody branded their cattle, mine was A.N., then turned 'em loose to let 'em graze wherever they wanted.

"I bought a very special bull — not pure Brahman, a cross. He was very expensive. A.C. Frizzell, a big rancher here had a lot of purebred Brahman cattle, I guess he didn't want my bull getting to his cows, so he castrated him. Mr. Frizzell knew he had done something wrong, he had gone too far. He ended up giving me one of his prize champion purebred Brahman bulls plus \$200. He was 3 years old and weighted 2,135 pounds. The Emperor Manso — oh, he was a beauty.

"Then another time, after the open-range policy went out in 1949, I leased pasture land for my cattle. I had bought 20 Santa Gertrudis calves, the kind the Vanderbilt ranch was raising. Mr. Keene, the foreman of the ranch rounded them up and took 'em back there on the 2V Ranch. He knew they weren't his. But I finally got 'em back.

"I finally sold my cattle after my husband passed away. But I sure did love my cows."

Besides being a lady rancher, Mary became locally respected for another accomplishment.

From 1942 until 1964, when schools were integrated, the Baker Academy in Punta Gorda was the county's only school for African-American children. Mary drove a school bus for the Academy during those years.

"I drove 19 years and 4 months," said Mary. "First I would drive to Englewood and pick up the children. There were a few black families there then, I would come back, pick up children in McCall, Murdock, then go to Punta Gorda.

"I sure got those kids to school and I didn't have any trouble with them either. The school bus was the only way those kids could get to school unless they lived in Punta Gorda. I also carried them to places like Daytona, Miami, Ocala and Orlando to games and other things. About two years before I stopped driving they finally gave me a substitute driver to help but until then I did all that driving myself.

"I drove a 32-passenger bus, and 48 and 64-passenger buses. When I went on a long trip I drove a 66-passenger.

"Sometimes a boy or girl wouldn't be at the bus stop and I just knew they were trying to play hookey — I would get off the bus, go in their house and pull 'em out of bed and get 'em on the bus. In later years when I would see 'em we would laugh and laugh about that, but somebody had to get

those children to school to get some education.

"In 1964, five months before I could have retired, they fired me. They told me they were going to have another driver, a white man. Integration had come about. You see now there were a lot of white kids getting on the bus and some of the parents in Englewood didn't want their kids being driven by a black person.

"They did have to pay me all the money they had withheld for my retirement, but it wasn't the same as if I had retired, because then they would have had to put money in too.

"But I guess what was important,"

remembered Mary, "was all those 19 years and 4 months, I at least got those kids to school."

Martha Conway, great-granddaughter of William Goff, Englewood's first pioneer, knew Mary well. She says, "Sick or well, Mary drove that bus for years. She was determined to do her part in helping those kids get some education — education she had been unable to get. A lot of people around here thought Mary was a real heroine."

"Those were unfair times," Mary said. "Segregation was wrong and it was stupid, but we had to get through it — and we did."

Retired school leader remembered

The Charlotte County educational community is mourning the passing of Ben Graham, who passed away peacefully at the age of 86 last Friday, Feb. 16.

Ben Wesley Graham was born on July 9, 1931, in Haines City, Florida. He spent more than 20 years serving in various educational positions in Charlotte County schools.

Following his already extensive history in education, in 1962, Graham was offered a job as principal of Baker Academy in Punta Gorda. "Mr. Graham was a very stern teacher and principal," said Sonja Wright, a previous student of Graham's at Baker Academy. "But he always encouraged students to walk on the right path and pursue a higher education."

After the four years he spent at Baker, Graham then pursued an Early Childhood Education certification at the University of Alabama, and continued on to become a teaching specialist for Charlotte County schools in 1967.

One year later, Ben

went on to become the very first Community School Director at Sallie Jones Elementary School in Punta Gorda.

Following his first year as the Community School Director, Graham was granted a one-year leave of absence to continue his study toward a Doctor of Education Degree at the University of Miami.

Graham returned to Punta Gorda with his newfound knowledge and took on the position as Assistant Principal of Charlotte High School from 1969 to 1970.

Starting in the fall 1970, Graham served as the Principal of Baker Elementary School until his retirement in 1985.

Additional positions that Graham held included President of Big Brothers and Sisters of Charlotte County, a Board of Directors member for the United Way of Charlotte County, as well as a member of the Steward and Trustee Board of Bethel A.M.E. Church in Punta Gorda.

Florida NRA: Governor, legislative plan are 'political eyewash'

TALLAHASSEE — Marion Hammer, long-time Florida lobbyist for the National Rifle Association, blasted the proposals by Gov. Rick Scott and the Florida Legislature Friday, calling them "political eyewash" that will only "punish law-abiding gun owners." "It's gratuitous gun control," she said. "We oppose punishing law-abiding gun owners. This had nothing to do with law-abiding gun owners and it punishes law-abiding gun owners for the acts of a criminal and the failure of the FBI, DCF and the SRO who wouldn't do his job."

Hammer said the NRA "conceptually" supports the idea of restricting gun access to the mentally ill but could not comment on the specific proposals by the governor and

legislators because they had not yet released the language and "this is very tricky stuff."

"The devil is in the details and we haven't seen any language," she said. "For years, we have supported keeping guns out of the hands of people with mental illness when we couldn't get anything else."

She said the age limit is also nothing more than a symbolic change.

"If the age limit had been 21, he wouldn't have been able to buy it from a gun dealer which doesn't mean he wouldn't have been able to get one," she said. "He could have bought one from a friend. He could have gone to a street corner where he knew somebody was selling guns — because in any major city, you can buy a gun in less than 30 minutes illegally."

The age limits will affect "hunters who shoot birds with shotguns, deer and

subsistence hunters," Hammer said. "That is going to affect people who obey the law. Did the Parkland shooter obey the law? Did any of these mass murders? It just makes no sense."

Although both the governor and legislative plans exempt veterans and members of the military from the age limits to purchase a firearm, Hammer said that underscores the unequal application of the law.

"When you're 18 years of age, you can go overseas and die for your country," she said. "How can they say we don't trust you to buy a gun, but you can die for your country?"

Hammer acknowledged that the nation is watching as Florida breaks a decades-long ban on restricting access to guns.

"This has national implications," she said. "My lawyers are waiting to look over everything they are doing."

Man yells 'murderers!' as he's put to death

STARKE — As the execution drugs were being administered, inmate Eric Scott Branch let out a blood-curdling scream. Then he yelled "murderers! murderers! murderers!" as he thrashed on a gurney as he was being put to death for the 1993 rape and slaying of a college student.

The drugs included a powerful sedative Thursday evening and the 47-year-old inmate, following the outburst, gave a last guttural groan and turned silent. Minutes earlier, he had just been addressing corrections officers, saying it should fall to Florida Gov. Rick Scott and his attorney general to carry out the death sentence — not to those workers present.

"Let them come down here and do it," Branch said. "I've learned that you're good people and this is not what you should be doing."

Branch was pronounced dead at 7:05 p.m. Thursday after receiving the injection at Florida State Prison in Starke. The governor's office made the announcement.

Asked later whether Branch's scream could have been caused by the execution drugs, Department of Corrections spokeswoman Michelle Glady said "there was no indication" that the inmate's last actions were a result of the injection procedure. She said that conclusion had been confirmed by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement.

Branch was convicted of raping and fatally beating University of West Florida student Susan Morris, 21. Her naked body was found

buried in a shallow grave — a crime whose brutality was noted by the Florida Supreme Court in denying one of Branch's appeals.

"She had been beaten, stomped, sexually assaulted and strangled. She bore numerous bruises and lacerations, both eyes were swollen shut," the justices wrote.

Evidence in the case shows Branch approached Morris after she left a night class on Jan. 11, 1993, so he could steal her red Toyota and return to his home state of Indiana. He was arrested while traveling there.

Branch also was convicted of sexually assaulting a 14-year-old girl in Indiana and of another sexual assault in the Florida Panhandle that took place just 10 days before Morris was killed, court records show.

The jury in his murder case recommended the death penalty by a 10-2 vote under Florida's old capital punishment system, which was ruled unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court in 2016. The high court said juries must reach a unanimous recommendation

for death and judges cannot overrule that. Florida legislators subsequently changed the system to comply.

One of Branch's final and unsuccessful appeals to the U.S. Supreme Court involved whether he deserved a new sentencing hearing because of that jury's 10-2 vote in his 1994 trial. The Florida Supreme Court has ruled that the new system of sentencing did not apply to inmates sentenced to death before 2002.

Relatives of victim Susan Morris said they remain profoundly grieved by her violent death, though Morris was 21 when she was killed, more time has passed than the number of years she lived, the family statement said. Still, the pain remains.

"Twenty-five years ago, Susan's life was suddenly and brutally extinguished. We have grieved for her longer that she was with us. Yet because of who she was ... she will never be forgotten by those who love her," said the statement, read out by her sister Wendy Morris Hill shortly after Branch was put to death.

Ex-commissioner get sentence in bribery case

MIAMI (AP) — A former Florida city commissioner has been sentenced to four years and three months in prison following a wide-ranging corruption investigation.

A U.S. Department of Justice news release says 56-year-old Luis Santiago was sentenced Thursday. The former Opa-locka commissioner previously pleaded guilty to a bribery conspiracy charge.

Authorities say Santiago conspired with former city manager David Chiverton, former assistant public works director Gregory Harris and others to obtain thousands of dollars in illegal cash payments from businesses and individuals in the South Florida city.

Ex-deputy caught stealing on his own body cam

DAYTONA BEACH (AP) — A former Florida sheriff's deputy who was caught by his own body camera stealing cash from a driver he arrested has been sentenced to probation.

The Daytona Beach News-Journal reports 35-year-old former Volusia

County deputy John Braman entered no contest pleas to petty theft, official misconduct and grand theft Thursday, and he will serve his four four-year probation sentences concurrently.

Grand theft and official misconduct are felonies punishable by up to five years in prison or a \$5,000 fine. Petty theft can earn up to a year in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

Members of the class of 2018 are hoping to participate in the annual Project Graduation party, in which they spend the night enjoying games, music, food and activities in a safe environment.

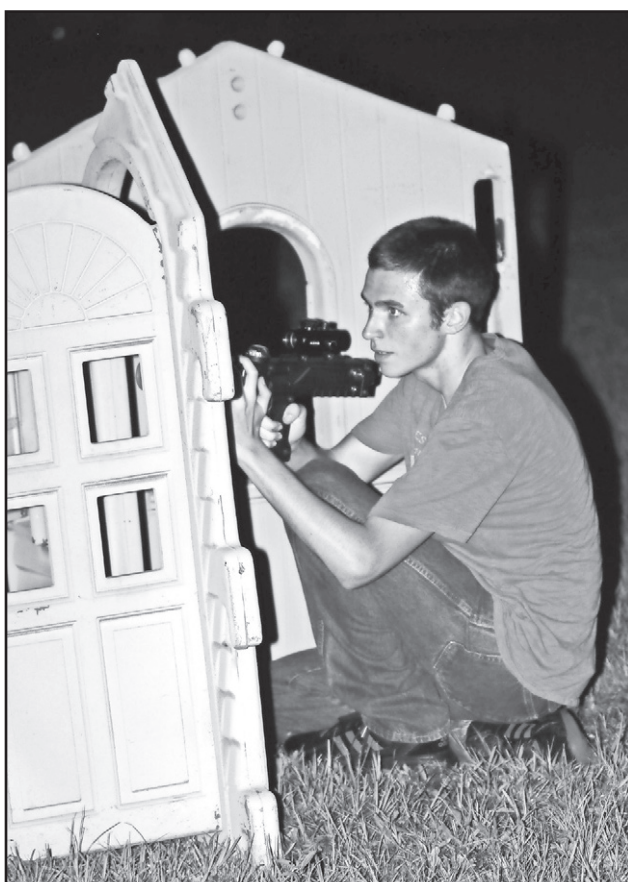

Hearing examiner to tackle challenged school materials

MURDOCK — A 2017 house bill has Charlotte County School Board members talking of putting together a team and/or selecting a person to serve as hearing examiner.

The hearing examiner would be responsible for approving textbooks and other instructional material for CCPS

students if a material is challenged by a member of the community.

"I'm not privy to the reasons why legislators included the requirement of the unbiased hearing officer," said Michael Riley, CCPS community liaison.

"The bill doesn't provide reasons other than to say to provide petitioners the opportunity to proffer evidence as to why the instructional

material should not be adopted.

"The officer then gives a recommendation to the Board. Then the board decides."

The bill revises district school board responsibilities for review and adoption of public K-12 instructional materials. It also provides greater transparency in the school district instructional materials adoption process and

more opportunities to review and challenge materials, according to a House summary analysis for the bill.

Further, the bill authorizes county residents to challenge the use or adoption of instructional materials, revises requirements relating to public hearing for adoption of such materials and revises annual allocation for purchase of

instructional materials.

If a piece of instructional material is challenged, the hearing examiner would be responsible for making a recommendation to the board. The school board would then decide to approve or disapprove the recommendation.

As the board moves forward with discussions regarding the bill, the hearing examiner would be appointed by

the superintendent. In the school board workshop, board members suggested looking into hiring retired educators who still reside in the county.

At the workshop, school board chairman Ian Vincent said that CCPS does have an advantage because there are many retired educators who live in the county.

Punta Gorda eyes commercial zoning changes

PUNTA GORDA — After Aldi awakened a renewed need for zoning changes along the Jones Loop Road corridor, city staff unveiled proposed amendments Wednesday to attract large-scale commercial businesses.

The proposed Interchange Commercial Area Zoning District establishes new classifications on Jones Loop Road and around the Interstate 75 exchange. The move is designed to welcome businesses — such as Aldi — that are drawn to arterial roads in

high-density areas. City Council discussed the new zoning district Wednesday, agreeing to send the matter to public hearing. It will next be discussed by Planning Commission.

Aldi's plea for a high-end store off Jones Loop Road was a turbulent one. Punta Gorda Board of Zoning Appeals originally recommended the rejection of the variance appeal by low-cost grocer Aldi, saying it didn't meet several city zoning criteria. City staff also recommended denial by literal definition of city code.

But the appeal had no problem passing City

Council last August. At the same time, the council directed staff to create criteria for the new zoning district, making it easier for businesses to open up shop.

The district — a hybrid of two commercial zoning classifications — is geared towards commercial projects up to 40,000 in total floor space.

Retail, office buildings, medical, hospitals, bars or restaurants, multi-family residential, education or assisted living facilities would be permissible under the proposed zoning change.

"As there is

currently no area in the city that is this zoning classification, individual property owners would have to consent or come in for rezoning," said Mitchell Austin, the city's urban planner.

Classifications created in the new district may also apply to the commercial corridor along U.S. 41, however, it's best suited for an area with larger developable parcels. Given this criteria, Jones Loop Road fits perfectly.

Smaller parcels of land, Austin said may create a "spot zoning scenario," Austin said.

District 4 Councilwoman Lynne Matthews said, "This is something that can help

encourage commercial development and further businesses to annex into the city. ... I think we should encourage growth on the 41 corridor.

"That's where we want commercial development to come in. We're running out of space downtown," she added.

Planning Commission is set to review a request Monday for annexation and rezoning for a commercial property on Jones Loop Road adjacent to Walmart. No plans have been announced to develop the parcel, which is over 13 acres. Planning Commission meets at 2 p.m.

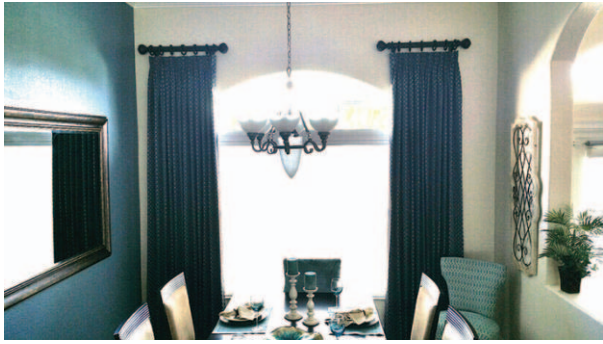

Stray bullet hits Rotonda home during hog hunt

ROTONDA — A bullet casing landed on a chair inside Norbert Andrade's manufactured home at the same time as a feral hog hunt was held at nearby Charlotte Harbor Preserve State Park in Rotonda. The bullet, though, is not the kind the U.S.D.A. is using to hunt the hogs, officials say.

"I've lived here for 23 years, this is the first time it's ever happened," said the 79-year-old retired fire service member.

"I went to empty the garbage and I saw there was a bullet hole in the side door of the house. I followed it inside and

saw the casing landed on a chair in my room. I called the (Charlotte County) sheriff to report it. I gave them what appeared to be a .30 caliber bullet which I'm sure came from the state forest. I was out in front porch in the morning and could hear shooting. It happens all the time on the weekends."

Skip Conroy, spokesman for the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office said there was an investigation after the bullet was removed as evidence by a deputy.

"There was an investigation, but little to go on," Conroy said. "As I understand it, the USDA were not

using rifles for their hunt. They were using shotguns."

While rifles can fire a bullet that can travel several hundred yards in a relatively straight line, a shotgun fires a spray of pellets that cover a wide area at close range.

To combat the out-of-control swine population, the state preserve used the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Feral Swine program to remove hogs from some of the 46,000-acres. The hogs, which are descendants of domestic pigs that breed in the wild, are not native to Florida. The are destructive to vegetation and trails, and can be dangerous to people.

The preserve butts up against residential backyards in the Rotonda West development. For years, hogs have come out of the park to feed, and their rooting destroys lawns and landscaping in the development.

The use of aerial hunting is new.

On the morning of Feb. 11, residents who border the state park watched and some recorded videos of a hunter in a helicopter firing a weapon at hogs.

Tanya Espinosa, USDA spokeswoman, said at no time did the helicopter go near the private property. She said the hunters are "highly trained" to identify the hogs on the ground.

The USDA used aerial shooting over ground-based shooting, because it was more effective in reducing the population at the state forest. The USDA shot and removed 54 feral hogs during the recent hunt to reduce disease and destruction created by the swine.

That same day, CCSO also didn't know what was happening. Calls were coming from worried residents who live near the Charlotte Harbor Preserve State Park. Deputies

responded to the calls.

Andrade said he also alerted board members of the Village of Holiday Lake where he lives and management at the Charlotte Harbor Preserve State Park.

"No one was notified that there would be hogs being hunted at the state park," he said. "We don't get told if people are hunting out there either. I don't know if this has anything to do with the aerial hog hunt. I believe it happened at 11 or 12 in the morning. I just know I always hear guns being fired from what I believe is hog hunting. I'm not sure if anyone is allowed to be hunting out there, but they do it."

The USDA said there currently aren't any other contracts for aerial hog hunts at the state park in Rotonda.

The USDA said Thursday, officials were notified the homeowner found a stray bullet on their property.

"It is our understanding that is was determined to be of a different type than those used by USDA in their program,"

Dee Ann Miller, USDA spokeswoman said.

"Each year, feral hogs are removed from Florida state parks to ensure visitor safety and to protect our natural resources," John Aspirolea, manager of the Charlotte Harbor Preserve State Park, wrote in an earlier email to the Sun. "Feral hogs can cause damage to structures and property, while also disrupting and damaging native plants and animals."

Andrade said there was no warning to residents about the aerial or other authorized hog hunts. He understands some people may be out there firing weapons without permission like the USDA.

"It would be good to know when they are hunting," he said. "I served in the fire service for 32 years so I wasn't scared a bullet landed in my house. I'd have to be hit by a bullet before I'm scared. I just think people should know about stray bullets. I think everyone knows now."

There are better ways to charge a phone than accessory mode

Dear Car Talk: I propose to leave my iPhone 4 permanently plugged into my car's cigarette-lighter socket, engine running or not. When the car is not running, the ignition key would be turned to the "accessory" position. My questions: Would this keep my phone always charged? Could this cause my car's battery to discharge completely and be unable to start the car, or cause any other problem? — Mark

Yeah. The "other problem" is that your car could get stolen. If the key is in the ignition, and it's set to accessory, you'll light up a few dashboard lights, which will be a neon sign that says "Steal me!" to any passing car thief or delinquent teen.

And they'll take your iPhone, too. Although an iPhone 4 is borderline — you might get lucky, and they might unplug it and toss it out the window as they pull away.

In terms of the battery, I'm not so worried about your iPhone, on its own, draining your car's battery, Mark; the car battery is huge compared to your iPhone's battery. But without knowing what kind of car you have, I don't know what else gets powered when you put the key in the accessory position.

In the old days, accessory mode basically powered up the radio and the cigarette lighter — which is what counted as sufficient entertainment back in the day. But now, when you put the ignition in the accessory position, depending on the car, the blower motor may kick in, the instrument panel may light up and the infotainment screen may come on. So I think you'd be better off circumventing the accessory position.

Ask your mechanic to safely wire up one of your power ports so that it stays hot even when the car is shut off. And make sure it's still fused. You don't want a car fire, either.

Some cars have power ports wired that way, but lots — including, we assume, yours — don't. But you can change that. Then all you'll be drawing is the about .08 amps your phone will use, plus whatever the car usually draws when it's turned off (alarm, emissions computer, keyless entry sensors, etc). And, crucially, you'll be able to take your key with you.

And if the phone is all you've got plugged in, and your battery and charging system are in good working order, you shouldn't have any problem starting the car the next day. And your Sleepy LaBeef playlist will always be charged up and ready to go, Mark. Rock on.

Car's odd behavior on left turns probably signals bad motor mount

Dear Car Talk:

I just bought my wife a new Honda and inherited her old 2005 Volvo S80 T6. My "new" ride has 182,000 miles on it, a killer stereo and an odd problem I've never seen before: When making a left turn while moving, the engine will rev, as if in neutral, when I step on the accelerator. Once I take my foot off the gas, the car finds a gear and I can accelerate normally. This doesn't occur when making a right turn, and it doesn't happen if I come to a stop before turning left. Have you seen this issue before, and is it anything to be concerned about? Thanks! — K.C.

It's not a problem, as long as you're willing to make three right turns every time you want to go left, K.C.

Actually, this sounds like a classic case of a bad motor mount.

There are four mounts that attach the engine and transmission to the frame of the car. These mounts serve two purposes: They hold the engine and transmission in place, and they provide cushioning to isolate the engine's vibrations from the rest of the car — so your teeth don't chatter while you drive.

If one of your motor mounts is broken, the engine will be able to move out of place, and depending on which mount is bad, it could be at its worst when you're making a left turn. My guess is it's the mount closest to the firewall.

And when the engine moves, it's probably pulling on the transmission's shifter cable, and momentarily putting the transmission into neutral — just as if you had shifted into neutral yourself. When you lift your foot off the gas and the engine returns to its proper position, the

2018 Smart ForTwo Electric

In past reviews, I've written about the sublime pleasure of driving around Los Angeles in a convertible on a warm, balmy night.

Now I've found a way to make it even more sublime: Add silence.

The Smart ForTwo — which you'll see in great numbers in any major European capital, but in small numbers in the United States — is a suitcase-sized two-door designed for intelligent urban living.

The Electric Drive, its battery electric brother, is the smart Smart ForTwo, a plug-in commuter car that is small in stature but large in fuel savings.

With only 57 miles of range between charges, compared with the 238 offered by the Chevy Bolt EV or the 151 on the Nissan Leaf, the Smart ForTwo electric is not going to be the ideal long-distance traveler.

Also offered as a cabriolet, it must be the world's smallest, cutest and most affordable convertible plug-in.

Plus it's so small and light that if it runs out of juice, you can simply sling the shoulder harness over your back and haul the little guy home.

Smart cars first hit the road in the 1990s, as a result of co-design efforts between Mercedes-Benz and the Swatch watch company. After a succession of two-passenger, four-passenger and even roadster

variants, the Daimler-owned company settled on the ForTwo model, and later added a battery-electric-vehicle, or BEV, version.

Propelled by a 17.6-kWh battery connected to a 60-kW electric motor, the electric ForTwo is said to produce the equivalent of 80 horsepower and 118 pound-feet of torque.

On such a small vehicle (it reportedly weighs 2,363

pounds, and is almost cubic in its squat dimensions), that's plenty of pep. The Smart scoots around town capably, and gets quickly up to freeway speed, even in the battery-saving Eco mode.

States to forego most of \$650M legal settlement with Takata

DETROIT (AP) — Japanese airbag maker Takata Corp. has reached a \$650 million deal to settle consumer protection claims from 44 states and Washington, D.C., but only a fraction of the money will be paid due to Takata's financial problems and bankruptcy.

In an agreement announced Thursday, the states said they will not collect the settlement so that victims of Takata's faulty airbag inflators can get a bigger piece of the company's remaining money. There's an exception, though. South Carolina, which led the states, will get just over \$139,000 to cover costs of the investigation.

Takata airbag inflators can explode with too much force and spew shrapnel into drivers and passengers. At least 22 people have died worldwide and more than 180 have been hurt.

Attorneys general for the states alleged that Takata concealed airbag safety issues and failed to disclose safety defects.

Takata was forced into bankruptcy last

year amid lawsuits, multimillion-dollar fines and crushing recall costs involving airbag inflators that use the explosive chemical ammonium nitrate as a propellant. The chemical can deteriorate over time when exposed to high heat and humidity and burn too fast, blowing apart a metal canister. A reorganization plan was approved last week by a federal bankruptcy judge in Delaware.

"We were able to resolve this investigation while ensuring that the needs of injured consumers take priority," South Carolina Attorney General Alan Wilson said in a statement.

Also under the deal, Takata agreed not to represent its airbags as safe unless supported by scientific evidence, not to falsify any testing data and to keep cooperating with automakers to make sure replacement inflators are available. It also will not sell any air bags that use ammonium nitrate unless it's for recall replacement parts. Some of the provisions already were included in an agreement with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Messages were left Thursday seeking comment from a Takata spokesman.

As part of a criminal plea agreement with the U.S. Justice Department, Takata agreed to pay victims \$125 million and another \$850 million in restitution to automakers who bought its inflators and are stuck with recall and litigation costs. Under the restructuring

plan, Takata will sell most of its non-airbag assets to a Chinese-owned rival for \$1.6 billion.

The problem touched off the largest automotive recall in U.S. history. Up to 69 million in the U.S. and another 60 million worldwide are being recalled, according to court documents and the U.S. National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

problem corrects itself. So ask your favorite mechanic to check for a bad motor mount. At our shop, we open the hood, put the car in gear, plant a foot firmly on the brake pedal, and then step on the gas — bringing the engine speed up to roughly where it is when you experience the problem.

By the way, don't do this with the car facing anything, or anybody, you care about. If a motor mount is bad, you'll actually see the engine lift up out of its cradle. And I'm guessing yours will lift up a lot. So stand back.

That test will tell your mechanic if a motor mount is bad, and, if so, which one. And if you get the mount fixed, this thing ought to run like a dream again, K.C. At least for another week. Good luck. ***

two in a standard metered parking space — and the turning radius is so tight that while you can't literally turn on a dime, you can maneuver easily in very narrow situations.

The stiff suspension helps with cornering, while also, unfortunately, accentuating every wrinkle in the pavement. The regenerative braking system — which uses the electric motor to slow the car down and return energy to the battery when the accelerator is released — makes for almost one-pedal driving.

The brakes will last a long, long time.

Dashboard displays and a dash-mounted energy gauge provide data on energy use, battery power and remaining range. A very small rearview screen, housed inside the rearview mirror, improves the limited visibility.

It's easy to forget, once behind the wheel, what a tiny car this is. The driver and passenger space is substantial for a small sedan. I had plenty of leg room and head room, and was hardly aware when I was driving that there was very little actual car in front of me or behind me.

As for trunk space, well, no. There is a little cubby behind the seats, but you

won't be bringing your golf clubs along unless you're planning to putt-putt at Scandia or Sherman Oaks Castle Park.

The Smart starts at a very low MSRP. A gasoline-powered ForTwo is priced from \$15,410. The base model electric drive, non-cabriolet version starts at \$28,850, before factoring in any rebates or tax incentives, which in some areas could total \$10,000.

That's cheap! And, as is sometimes the case with automobiles, you get what you pay for. Even the upgraded electric version, which includes such amenities as leather upholstery, heated seats, heated steering wheel and

a fancy JBL sound system, retains much of the entry-level car's feeling — in the plastic door panels and interior parts, for example, and the absence of adequate sound-deadening materials in the carpet, glass or roof.

But the drop top aspect is beautiful. The canvas top

slides down with the push of a button. Good wind management makes the ForTwo almost as quiet on the freeway with the top down as with the top up.

What's left is the sound of silence.

The slow pace of BEV car sales, even in forward-leaning California,

proves that electric vehicles aren't for everyone — especially for people with long commutes, or large families, or towing needs, or no place to conveniently charge.

But the Smart ForTwo electric drive cabrio ought to go right to the top of the list for everyone else.

New brewers, barkeepers, and bikers

After only five years, the Fort Myers area appears to dominate the local craft brewery scene.

Its first brewery, Fort Myers Brewing Co., was soon joined by eight others in Cape Coral and Fort Myers, with four more coming this spring.

Why the sudden explosion of suds? According to Kent Bailey, Florida Brewers Guild president, "That's what the people want ... variety, flavor, creativity. I think it's a pent-up need."

With pent-up need also hitting Punta Gorda, new pubs proliferate and good-naturedly patronize one another — whether they're brewers, barkeepers or bikers.

Peace River Beer Co. has room to grow

Bill Vaughn is a creative guy. He discovered home brewing one day when he was suffering from songwriter's block. That was a lucky day for local beer geeks.

Now distributing to Lee, Collier and Charlotte counties, his **Bury Me Brewing** grew so fast that Vaughn and partners **Barry Schrayner** and **Mee Wichitsakulrat** (Barry + Mee = "Bury Me." Get it?) were feeling pinched in their 4,000-square-foot Fort Myers plaza location.

A 7,000-square-foot former gourmet shop and spice-blending warehouse in Punta Gorda's automotive district was just the thing. Its tasting room alone is 3,000 square feet.

There, the partners

ventured into a second brand — **Peace River Beer Co.** — something that few other Florida brewers have done.

Now Vaughn has even more room to flex his creativity: two separate brands with themed names — like Bury Me's graveyard-schtick Creamation Honey Cream Ale and Peace River's outdoorsy Pitch Tent Porter.

Conveniently painted barn red and now outfitted with two wooden Indians, a canoe, rugged picnic tables and barnboard signs that the creative Vaughn and wife Heather made by hand, Peace River Beer fits right into the riverside world of Punta Gorda.

Vaughn also has beer-garden plans for the fenced-in plot out back and dreams of beer fests with other breweries. "We're not done by far!" he laughed.

Peace River Beer Co. (941-655-8352), 1732 Steadley Ave. off Boca Grande (turn at the Napa sign), is open Sunday to Wednesday, 1 p.m. to 10 p.m., Thursday to Saturday noon to midnight, with food trucks every night.

New Monk in town

The **Belgian Monk** opened the day after Peace River in the former Shorty's 2 location. It isn't brewing its own, but serves Bury Me's Hell Bound Honey Brown and about a dozen other fine drafts.

And now that its hood is in place, the tasting menu has kebabs made with fresh, locally baked bread stuffed with a mixture of beef and lamb cooked on a vertical rotisserie and piled high with veggies and homemade yogurt sauce.

The professional proprietor, **Dave Robbins** (still teaching philosophy at Florida SouthWestern), has created a unique ambiance that attracts everyone from other barkeepers to local cartoonist **Ron Bates**, who painted its Belgian mural.

The **Belgian Monk** (833-843-6665), 318 Tamiami Trail, is open Monday to Thursday 11 a.m. to midnight, Friday and Saturday to 2 a.m., Sunday noon to midnight.

Biker bar brotherhood

They aren't brewing it either, but there's always a cold beer at the local fellowship of biker bars — sometimes whether or not they're open for business.

It's a sad day when a favorite Harley hangout closes its doors, no matter how decrepit it might have been. "Where do we go now?" regulars cry.

When **Our Place**, at 12459 Tamiami Trail heading south from Punta Gorda, closed last spring, it was hard, but everybody kind of expected it.

Entrepreneurs **Susan Filkins** and **Jamie Charleston** — otherwise known as lead guitarist for local metal band **Toledo Blade** — have spent the last eight months brightening up **Our Place**, painting it Harley colors and rechristening it **Hawgz & Dawgz**.

Housed in a 1950s structure that once served as the sales office for Tropical Gulf Acres, it never ceased being a destination for riders on the steel horse trail.

FGCU uses baseball to push books

Rays fans buying spring training tickets got a bit of a surprise when they showed up to Charlotte Sports Park on Tuesday. Florida Gulf Coast University held its first annual "Building Bridges Through Baseball" to promote awareness of the school's accessibility to Charlotte County residents.

"I was just here to buy spring training tickets," said John Malone. While doing so, he heard about the FGCU event and decided to check it out. He has an 11-year-old that, he said, is looking toward the future. Malone found the information provided at the event to be helpful.

Another ticket buyer got the same surprise that morning. John Murphy said, "I was just here to buy tickets and heard this guy touting this (the event) so I decided to check it out ... that and the free hot dogs. You can't go to a baseball stadium and not get a hot dog." Cheney Bros. provided food and drinks for attendees.

Jared Forma is General Manager with the Stone Crabs. He said that they partnered with FGCU originally just to promote education. They were trying to figure out how to use baseball as a boost, deciding that the "Building Bridges Through Baseball" event would be a good start. "We held the event

to promote awareness about education in the community and to show how accessible FGCU is (to the region)," said Forma.

Multiple speakers presented to a small crowd including FGCU baseball coach Dave Tollett and pitcher Mario Leon.

"It's always good to be home," said Tollett at the event. "This is my home. I love this place. I was born and raised here and this is my home. I thought I would never leave. I had the ultimate job, coaching here and there, where ever they needed me." Tollett coached at Charlotte High School before taking the coaching job at FGCU 17 years ago. "I took that job for

\$3,000 because I had a dream and I believed it would turn into something like this, but this quick ... there's no way. We started playing in 2001 and there's no way that I thought 17 years later we'd be beating Florida and Florida State and Miami all in the same year. But we did. And we did it (I believe) by doing it through the community — Southwest Florida. Early on we had zero scholarships so I had to get athletes from Southwest Florida of who I knew. All the baseball coaches that I've been working with and coaching against, boy they were really helpful."

FGCU pitcher Mario Leon followed Tollett

at event. He said he grew up in Naples and decided to go to FGCU at first because it was close to home. "When I was getting recruited out of high school there weren't many offers (to play baseball)," said Leon. "FGCU might be the only real one that I got. The deciding factor for me was that I got to stay at home. But I realized (later on) that being from Naples and getting to go to FGCU meant that I got to make an impact on the community that I grew up at. I think that's an opportunity that a lot of kids from Charlotte County (can have)."

Leon believes that being so close to home will give CCPS students an opportunity to go to one

of the best universities. "I know I'm biased when I say that but I believe that," he said. "FGCU has taught me and molded me to be the man that I am. Coach Tollett specifically has taught me to be the man that I am. He's shown me that there is a lot more to life than just baseball. I have to make a man out of myself. I have to pursue a career outside of baseball because unfortunately it doesn't work out for all of us ... not all of us get to go onto a professional level. So our education is the most important thing that we have. Those are the kinds of people that are coming out of FGCU."

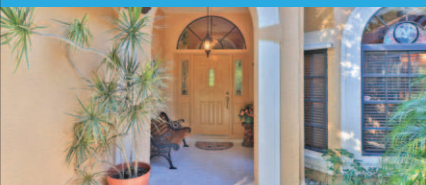

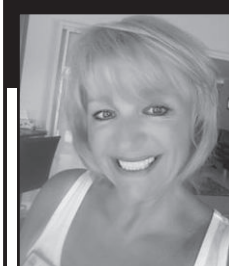

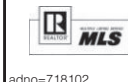

Former top campaign aide to Trump pleads guilty in Russia investigation

WASHINGTON — Richard W. Gates III, who helped manage Donald Trump's presidential campaign after making millions of dollars advising Ukraine's pro-Kremlin government, pleaded guilty Friday to conspiracy against the United States and lying to federal agents, becoming the latest former Trump aide to cooperate with prosecutors in the sprawling Russia investigation.

The guilty plea is unusual because court papers reveal that Gates lied to special counsel Robert S. Mueller III and the FBI as recently as Feb. 1, when he already was negotiating with prosecutors about the raft of criminal charges he was facing.

Gates' original three lawyers applied to withdraw from the case the same day, a hint of a behind-the-scenes personal drama that preceded Friday's denouement. Gates, 45, looked haggard, with dark circles under his eyes, when he appeared in court before U.S. District

Judge Amy Berman Jackson.

Gates is the fifth person to plead guilty to charges stemming from the Mueller probe, and the first to confess to more than one criminal charge. While Gates could face more than five years in prison on the two charges, he is expected to be sentenced to about 18 months, according to a person familiar with the plea negotiations.

Mueller has proven adept at securing cooperation from Trump's former associates as he investigates Russian meddling in the 2016 election, and whether anyone in the Trump campaign assisted in that operation or committed other potential crimes, including obstruction of justice while in the White House.

Gates' plea poses the biggest immediate risk to Paul Manafort, who was Trump's campaign manager and Gates' longtime business partner.

Prosecutors had filed several dozen charges against Manafort and Gates, including tax evasion, bank fraud and conspiracy, mostly stemming from their alleged attempts to hide more than \$30 million from their consulting and

lobbying work for the Kremlin-backed government in Ukraine.

They both pleaded not guilty when the first indictment was unveiled on Oct. 30. Gates now is expected to testify against Manafort, who said Friday that he is innocent of the charges.

"Notwithstanding that Rick Gates pled today, I continue to maintain my innocence," Manafort said in a statement. "I had hoped and expected my business colleague would have had the strength to continue the battle to prove our innocence. For reasons yet to surface he chose to do otherwise. This does not alter my commitment to defend myself against the untrue piled up charges contained in the indictments against me."

Several hours later, the special counsel's office unveiled a superseding indictment against Manafort that also accused him of secretly paying former European politicians to advocate for Ukraine, part of an undisclosed effort to lobby members of Congress and the

A look at the guilty pleas so far in Mueller's probe

A former senior adviser on President Donald Trump's election campaign pleaded guilty Friday to charges from special counsel Robert Mueller's investigation. With his plea on federal conspiracy and false-statements charges, Rick Gates became the fifth person to plead guilty in the Mueller probe into Russian meddling in the 2016 presidential election and possible coordination with Trump's campaign.

Here's a look at the four others:

Michael Flynn

Trump's former national security adviser, a retired general who had led the Defense Intelligence Agency, was the first White House official charged in Mueller's probe. The plea on Dec. 1 to one count of lying to the FBI requires Flynn to cooperate with prosecutors. The favorable deal suggests that prosecutors thought Flynn's cooperation was key to other parts of the probe. Flynn was a national security surrogate during the later parts of the campaign. He was charged with lying about conversations with Russia's ambassador to Washington during the transition.

George Papadopoulos

Papadopoulos, a former Trump campaign aide whom the White House has described as a low-level volunteer, became a major figure in Mueller's probe when he pleaded guilty on Oct. 30 to lying to the FBI. Papadopoulos was arrested in July and has been interviewed repeatedly by authorities, according to court documents. After entering his guilty plea, he was ordered not to contact other Trump officials and prohibited from foreign travel. Papadopoulos, in fact, appears to have been the trigger for the whole investigation. In a conversation with an Australian diplomat, Papadopoulos told him he had learned the Russians had "dirt" on Hillary Clinton in the form of "thousands of emails." The conversation was prior to that information becoming public and the diplomat informed U.S. authorities.

Trump administration to open US Embassy in Jerusalem in May

WASHINGTON — Accelerating controversial plans, the Trump administration will open a small U.S. Embassy in Jerusalem in May to coincide with the 70th anniversary of Israel's declaration of independence, a State Department official said Friday.

Secretary of State Rex Tillerson approved preliminary security plans for a limited contingent, including the ambassador, David Friedman, and a skeleton staff, to move into a section of the American Consulate in the Arnona neighborhood of Jerusalem, said Steven Goldstein, the under secretary for public

diplomacy and public affairs.

"The goal is to open a small footprint in May, and, over time, open a more full embassy by the end of 2019," Goldstein said in an interview.

The May 14 date — the date Israel originally declared independence

— significantly accelerates the schedule for transferring the U.S. Embassy from Tel Aviv, where it always existed along with the rest of the world's diplomatic missions, to the disputed holy city of Jerusalem. (According to the Hebrew calendar,

Obama administration.

None of the charges against Gates and Manafort cite Russian meddling in the presidential election, which was the impetus for Mueller's investigation. But the allegations extended through 2017 and thus overlapped with the pair's work in the top ranks of the Trump campaign, according to court documents.

It's unknown whether Gates has more to offer beyond testimony against Manafort. He served as a senior adviser to the Trump campaign after Manafort stepped down as campaign manager in August 2016, helped organize Trump's inauguration in January 2017, and had access to the White House as an outside adviser in the early weeks of the administration.

Gates' guilty plea marks an emphatic fall for the married father of four. The son of a career Army officer, Gates had maintained

an appearance of wealthy prestige while living in an upscale neighborhood of Richmond, Va.

After breaking with his original three lawyers, Gates was represented by Thomas C. Green, who negotiated the plea deal with two prosecutors, Andrew Weissmann and Greg D. Andres, from Mueller's team. The Los Angeles Times first reported an expected deal on Sunday.

Gates is scheduled to return to court on May 14 for a status hearing.

Gates' guilty plea for lying to investigators stems from his account of a dinner discussion on March 19, 2013, between Manafort and Rep. Dana Rohrabacher, R-Calif., who has been a strong advocate for better U.S. relations with Russia.

Three weeks ago, as he was negotiating his plea deal, Gates told the FBI that Manafort and an unnamed lobbyist had told him they didn't talk to Rohrabacher about Ukraine.

But, according to a court filing Friday, Gates

had helped Manafort prepare a report that "memorialized for Ukraine leadership the pertinent Ukraine discussions that Manafort represented had taken place at the meeting."

Last year, Manafort and Vin Weber, a former Minnesota congressman and a partner in the Mercury Public Affairs business in Washington, filed belated reports to the Department of Justice under the Foreign Agents Registration Act, listing the Rohrabacher meeting as part of their lobbying work on behalf of Ukraine government interests.

Rohrabacher acknowledged to The Times in an interview last year that he had discussed Russian and regional issues at what he called "a nice little dinner" at the Capitol Hill Club. Three days after the meeting, Manafort contributed \$1,000 to Rohrabacher's re-election campaign.

Rohrabacher declined to comment when contacted by a reporter on Friday, saying, "I can't do any interviews off the

cuff" before hanging up.

Weber did not immediately respond to requests for comment. A statement from Mercury said the company is cooperating with prosecutors and "confident (they) have acted appropriately throughout."

Rohrabacher spokesman Ken Grubbs said Friday that Ukraine only came up "in passing" because the men "reminded and talked mostly about politics."

"As the congressman has acknowledged before, the meeting was a dinner with two longtime acquaintances — Manafort and Weber — from back in his White House and early congressional days," Grubbs said in an email. "It is no secret that Manafort represented (then-Ukrainian President) Viktor Yanukovich's interests, but as chairman of the relevant European subcommittee, the congressman has listened to all points of view on Ukraine. We may only speculate that Manafort needed to report back to his client that

Ukraine was discussed."

The Podesta Group, a business with high-level Democratic connections, also last year reported doing lobbying work for the Ukraine interests under Manafort's direction. Tony Podesta, whose brother John Podesta was the chairman of Hillary Clinton's 2016 presidential campaign, left the company after the initial indictment of Manafort and Gates last year. The company disbanded soon after. Tony Podesta did not respond to messages left for him late Friday.

In two major indictments, prosecutors painted a detailed picture of how Manafort and Gates used offshore accounts to illegally funnel tens of millions of dollars into the United States to purchase real estate and finance luxury lifestyles.

Their income dried up after political unrest forced Yanukovich to flee to Russia in 2014, and the indictment says they turned to fraud to obtain more than \$20 million in loans.

Richard Pinedo

The California man had the misfortune to unwittingly sell bank accounts to Russians meddling in U.S. elections. Richard "Ricky" Pinedo pleaded guilty to using stolen identities to set up bank accounts that were then used by the Russians. The U.S. government acknowledged that Pinedo did not know that he was dealing with Russians.

The plea was announced on the same day that Mueller's office charged 13 Russians, including a businessman close to Vladimir Putin, in an elaborate plot to interfere in the 2016 U.S. presidential election. The federal indictment was the most direct allegation to date of illegal Russian meddling during the campaign.

Alex Van der Zwaan

The 33-year-old attorney pleaded guilty to lying to investigators about his interactions

with Gates. Van der Zwaan was fired last year by law firm Skadden, Arps, Slate, Meagher & Flom. A Dutch citizen who lives in London, he is the son-in-law of a Russian billionaire. Van der Zwaan admitted to lying to federal investigators while they questioned him about the production of a legal report that Paul Manafort and Gates are accused of secretly funding by funneling \$4 million through an offshore account. The charge does not involve election meddling or relate to the Trump campaign's operations.

Independence Day this year will be celebrated on April 18.)

President Donald Trump in December announced he was recognizing Jerusalem as the capital of Israel and ordering the embassy transfer, reversing decades of U.S. and international policy and enraging the Arab world and many allies.

While Israel claims Jerusalem as its "eternal and undivided" capital, Palestinians also claim the eastern part of the city as their capital in a future independent state.

The status of Jerusalem was to be decided in final peace talks. The Palestinians now contend that the U.S., once the broker of such talks, has disqualified itself as a mediator by taking Israel's side.

The move has been celebrated in Israel, which has long had its ministries,

parliament and government offices in Jerusalem. But it generated a wave of furious, weekly protests in Palestinian territories.

Vice President Mike Pence, visiting Jerusalem last month, gave the first sign that the embassy transfer was being accelerated, when he announced to the Israeli Knesset, or parliament, that the move would take place by the end of 2019.

U.S. officials say the 2019 deadline would see a substantial annex of the consulate in Jerusalem becoming the embassy. A new building to house a full embassy, however, will still take several years to establish, the officials said.

Israel Katz, the Israeli minister of intelligence, congratulated the Trump administration in a tweet Friday. "There is no greater gift than that!" he said. "The most just and correct move."

Majdi Khaldi, diplomatic adviser to Palestinian Authority President Mahmoud Abbas, decried the "unfortunate announcement" that

he described as "illegal, irresponsible and unacceptable to Palestinians."

Trump's move, Khaldi said in an interview, "gave the Israelis a pretext to say that Jerusalem is unified under Israeli rule," contravenes international law and will impede peace efforts.

"It cancels any peace offer," Khaldi said.

Trump, speaking at the White House on Friday alongside visiting Australian Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull, reiterated a claim he has made that his administration is making "great progress" on promoting peace in the Middle East. Several former ambassadors to Israel say, in fact, peace has never been further away.

Jerusalem, a 6,000-year-old city, was divided for 19 years, from the date of Israel's 1948 founding until the war of 1967, when Israel seized the eastern half of the city from Jordan.

The embassy move is scheduled to take place on the date marking Israel's Declaration of

Independence in 1948, which Palestinians call Naqba Day, or the day of the catastrophe.

State Department lawyers, meanwhile, were examining whether it is legal to accept private donations to fund a diplomatic mission, following a proposal by Las Vegas casino magnate and pro-Israel hawk Sheldon Adelson to pay for the new embassy.

Adelson is a major contributor to the Republican Party, a loyal supporter of Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and owner of a popular tabloid in Israel. Trump's Jerusalem decision was seen in part as a gesture to Adelson as well as to evangelical Christians, a key component of the president's base of political support.

However, Goldstein said there were "no formal talks" between the State Department and any private citizen for financing the embassy, and no formal requests made to the State Department for such an arrangement.

Trump has promised the "ultimate deal," a final agreement on Israeli-Palestinian peace, and placed the negotiations under the direction of his 37-year-old son-in-law, Jared Kushner.

None of the parties to possible future negotiations, however, has seen any part of the plan that the Trump administration periodically declares is imminent, and the Palestinian Authority cut off all contact with the United States following Trump's Jerusalem announcement.

Daniel Shapiro, a former U.S. ambassador to Israel under President Obama, agrees that the embassy belongs in Jerusalem but that the Trump administration has failed to give the proper assurances especially to the Palestinians.

"Before May 14, the administration should do what it failed to do in December: describe this decision in the context of a broader, credible plan for two states, including a Palestinian capital in East Jerusalem," Shapiro said.

national economy as having improved rather than worsened in the past 12 months, 39 percent to 24 percent, according to a survey released Friday by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research. Another 36 percent said they don't see much difference.

"Well, I hold a job again," said Republican-leaning David Peterson of Torrance, California, 67, a quality assurance manager at an aerospace company who was forced to work at a security job for a year. "But recent events would point toward things getting worse ... It's a lot of violence in

the news. A lot of violence in the country. A lot of natural disasters."

Can-do optimism has been a feature of American culture since the nation's founding. But the poll suggests it's been challenged in the 13 months since Trump took office, amid devastating mass shootings, a deadly race riot in Charlottesville, Virginia, record-setting hurricanes and Trump's volatile White House. Not contributing to a sense of safety has been Trump's feud with North Korea.

But Trump also has the improving economy in his pocket, low unemployment and a stock market that has only recently begun to wobble. He and the Republican-led Congress scored a

major policy victory at the end of 2017 by passing tax cuts into law.

That's important to how Americans feel about the lifelong businessman and his presidency. His base of support remains historically low but solid, with about about 35 percent of Americans saying they approve of how Trump is handling his job overall. Nearly two-thirds disapprove.

Yet 45 percent say they approve of Trump's handling of the economy. That's higher than the 34 percent who approve of how he's handling foreign policy and 37 percent who say the same of Trump's handling of immigration.

Even among Democrats, just 8 percent of whom say

they approve of how Trump is handling his job overall, 21 percent say they approve of his handling of the economy. Among Republicans, three-quarters approve overall while 82 percent back his performance on the economy.

Republicans stand far ahead of Democrats and independents in terms of optimism about how things are going in the country.

For example, 57 percent of Republicans but just a tenth of Democrats think the direction of the country will improve in the next year. Nearly 7 in 10 Republicans — but just 13 percent of Democrats — believe the national economy is likely to improve. Republicans are even more optimistic than

Democrats when it comes to thinking their personal finances will improve, 54 percent to 27 percent.

And in general, 64 percent of Republicans but just 11 percent of Democrats think the country is headed in the right direction. Overall, just 32 percent of Americans think the country is headed in the right direction, while 68 percent think it's on the wrong track.

The AP-NORC poll of 1,337 adults was conducted Feb. 15-19 using a sample drawn from NORC's probability-based AmeriSpeak panel, which is designed to be representative of the U.S. population. The margin of sampling error for all respondents is plus or minus 3.9 percentage points.

More companies end ties with NRA as pressure mounts

NEW YORK — Three more companies said Friday they had ended discount programs with the National Rifle Association, as U.S. corporations take a closer look at investments, co-branding deals and other ties to the gun industry after the latest school massacre.

Petitions are circulating online targeting companies that offer discounts to NRA members on its website. #BoycottNRA has trended on Twitter.

Members of the NRA have access to special offers from partner companies on its website, ranging from life insurance to wine clubs. For a second consecutive day, companies listed on the site have cut ties to the group as it aggressively resists calls for stricter gun control in the wake of the mass shooting last week at a Florida high school that left 17 dead.

The insurance company MetLife Inc. discontinued its discount program with the NRA on Friday. The car rental company Hertz and Symantec Corp., the software company that makes Norton Antivirus technology, did the same.

Insurer Chubb Ltd. said Friday it is ending participation in the NRA's gun-owner insurance program, but it provided notice three months ago. The program that provided coverage for people involved in gun-related incidents or accidents had been under scrutiny by regulators over marketing issues.

Those defections arrived a day after car rental company Enterprise Holdings, which also owns Alamo and National, said it was cutting off discounts for NRA members. First National Bank of Omaha, one of the nation's largest privately held banks, announced that it would not renew a co-branded Visa credit-card with the NRA.

Other companies, including Wyndham Hotels and Best Western hotels, have let social media users know they are no longer affiliated with the NRA, though they did not make clear when the partnerships ended.

The swiftness of the corporate reaction against the NRA has differed from that of past shootings, including the 2012 Sandy Hook Elementary School massacre that claimed 26 lives and the killing of 58 people in Las Vegas last fall, said Bob Spitzer, a political scientist at SUNY Cortland and a scholar on gun politics. Spitzer said the reaction was likely a reaction to the student mobilization that followed the Florida shooting, but he said it was too soon to tell how significantly it will sway the country's wider gun debate.

"If this is as far as it goes, it probably won't have any measurable effect. If other companies continue to (cut ties) it can start to have an

adverse public relations effect," Spitzer said. "Usually what happens is that the storm passes, and the NRA counts on that."

Spitzer noted that it was not the first time big business has been pulled into the gun debate. In 2014, Chipotle asked customers not to bring firearms into its stores after gun rights advocates brought military-style rifles into one of its Texas restaurants. A year earlier, Starbucks Corp. made a similar statement after the Newtown, Connecticut, shooting.

Larry Hutcher, an attorney who specializes in commercial law and litigation, said companies are reacting to a perception that public opinion is shifting on gun regulation. Polls show growing support for gun control measures, including 97 percent backing for universal background checks in a Quinnipiac University survey released Tuesday.

"It's based on the fact that these companies

and their marketing officers are reading the tea leaves. It makes economic sense to get on the side of the majority of Americans," said Hutcher, co-managing partner of Davidoff Hutcher & Citron LLP.

NRA Executive Vice President Wayne LaPierre said this week at the Conservative Political Action Conference, that those advocating for stricter gun control are exploiting the Florida shooting.

President Donald Trump has aligned himself with the NRA, suggesting some teachers could be armed so that they could fire on any attacker. However, Trump has also called for raising the minimum age for purchasing semi-automatic rifles, a move the NRA opposes.

On Friday, a large Wall Street money management firm said that it wanted to engage with major weapons manufacturers about what

comes next. Blackrock Inc., which manages \$6 trillion in assets, has become one of the largest stakeholders gun manufacturers like Sturm Ruger & Co., American Outdoor Brands Corp. and Vista Outdoor Inc. through indirect investments. The money is placed in index funds, so Blackrock cannot sell shares of individual companies within the index. Its fund clients invest in indexes that might contain companies like Ruger.

On Friday, spokesman Ed Sweeney said Blackrock will be "engaging with weapons manufacturers and distributors to understand their response to recent events."

Blackrock, through indirect investments, holds a 16.18 percent stake in Sturm Ruger, an 11.91 percent stake in Vista, and a 10.5 percent stake in American Outdoor, according to the data firm FactSet.

US asks judge to approve seizure of Pharma Bro's assets

NEW YORK — "Pharma Bro" Martin Shkreli appeared in court Friday for the first time since a judge locked him up for his on-line antics, and the brash former pharmaceutical CEO had a new look since his bail was revoked in September: a scruffy beard that made his appearance less boyish.

He also was wearing a loose-fitting jail uniform instead of street clothes as

he listened to the government argue that he's on the hook for more than \$7 million for his securities fraud conviction.

"Under the circumstances, I think he's doing remarkably well," his attorney, Ben Brafman, told reporters when asked about his client's stint in a fortress-like federal jail in Brooklyn.

Shkreli was convicted on charges he cheated investors in two failed hedge funds.

U.S. District Judge

Kiyo Matsumoto didn't immediately rule on the government's demand that Shkreli should have to forfeit \$7.3 million in assets, including a one-of-a-kind Wu-Tang Clan "Once Upon a Time in Shaolin" album that he has boasted he bought for \$2 million.

Prosecutors also want him to give up \$5 million in cash in a brokerage account, his interest in a pharmaceutical company and other valuables including a Picasso painting. The defense has argued

that Shkreli owes nothing, because the hedge fund investors actually ended up making a profit off drug company stock he gave them. It also says that unlike most securities fraud cases, Shkreli himself never made anything off the scheme.

"This case was never about money as far as Mr. Shkreli is concerned," the defense said in court papers. The papers added: "Simply put, Mr. Shkreli was not indicted because he stole anyone's money."

Shkreli, 34, is perhaps best known for boosting the price of a life-saving drug and for trolling his critics on social media, where he became known as "Pharma Bro."

Shkreli was out on bail during his trial last year. But the judge decided to jail him for violating his bail conditions because of a social media posting offering a \$5,000 bounty to anyone who could get a lock of Hillary Clinton's hair while she was on a book tour.

Are there polite tussles to sub for Streep, Hanks or other A-listers, earning bragging rights? We can only hope.

Stomach pains

Oscar guests are often hungry. It may be self-imposed, either because of nominee nerves or a skin-tight gown with no room for error or eating. Attendees do have a chance to nibble during a pre-show cocktail hour that includes hors d'oeuvres trays, but skip that and it's three hours or more until a

post-ceremony dinner at the Governors Ball. Not all are invited, which means some famished guests end up asking their limo driver to head to fast food, fast. Advice from an insider: carry a clutch roomy enough for a ham sandwich and don't fret that you'll get busted by security.

Stay in your lane

There are two paths on the Oscars red carpet:

one for famous people, and one for everyone else. Stanchions and velvet ropes separate the recognizable from the not. Famous folks walk on the side of the carpet closest to the cameras and reporters, and stars often collide or share impromptu carpet greetings. The non-famous, meanwhile, walk along the carpet closest to the fan bleachers, with beefy-looking security guards ushering

them along to reduce star-gazing across the aisle. There's everything to see, folks, but move along.

Writers, stat!

Live shows inevitably hit speed bumps, such as last year's super-sized one in which Warren Beatty and Faye Dunaway presented "La La Land" with the top trophy that belonged to "Moonlight." Such gaffes and other standout moments become fodder for the host, with a village of comedy writers backstage to help craft witticisms. The best, like Kimmel's teasing rebuke to Beatty ("Warren, what did you do?") feel spontaneous and are out quickly so the audience doesn't lose the thread. Hosts also need to be ready with "savers" to follow a joke that bombs, says longtime awards writer Bruce Vilanch, who offers up an example: "That was about as funny as a screen door on a submarine."

Winners, meet media

Oscar recipients are shepherded backstage for photos and video and to face a rapid-fire Q&A session with a packed room of journalists (yes, "how does it feel to win" and "where will you keep your trophy" are staple queries). While the winners clutch their award and, in some cases, a celebratory glass of booze, reporters hold up numbered cards to be called on by an academy representative. This has caused more than one star to exclaim they feel like they're at an auction and playfully call out numbers. Reporters giggle. With backstage monitors showing the ceremony, some winners ask to pause the questions to hear outcomes for nominated friends or colleagues. Reporters oblige.

Hollywood readies movie inspired by Flamin' Hot Cheetos

This could get cheesy. Hollywood has more than warmed up to the idea of a biopic about the inventor of the ever-popular Flamin' Hot Cheetos.

"I had two weeks to prepare a presentation for the company executives," Montanez told Fox News Latino, describing how he had to go to the library to learn about marketing strategy from a book.

Besides the promotion

and instant lifestyle upgrade, the invention also earned Montanez the title of "Godfather of Multicultural Marketing."

"Many times, greatness will come in ridiculous forms," he said. "A ridiculous idea might be a billion-dollar idea."

"Ghosts of Mississippi" screenwriter Lewis Colick will author the script, having developed the pitch for the movie alongside Montanez and producer DeVon Franklin.

Manage pain to protect yourself from opioid addiction

Headlines declaring that life expectancy in the U.S. has declined for the first time since 1993 because of deaths from opioids are the latest red-flag warning that, as a nation and individually, we need to change both our approach to managing pain with opioids and how we address illicit drug use.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that between 2015 and 2016, there was a 28 percent increase in fatal opioid overdoses! In 2016, more than 63,000 Americans died of drug overdose — and 42,249 of those deaths involved opioids. Those drugs are now killing more folks than guns or breast cancer!

To focus the country's health care providers and YOU on the problem, the Food and Drug Administration asked the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine to develop a plan to curb the epidemic. Their report, "Pain Management and the Opioid Epidemic: Balancing Societal and Individual Benefits and Risks of Prescription Opioid Use," is out, as

are additional publications, Congressional testimonies and journal editorials based on the findings.

If you or a loved one is dealing with acute, chronic or surgery-related pain, it's important to understand the risks and benefits of using opioids and to learn about the full range of pain-management alternatives that are available. A new study shows that 60 percent of opioid overdose deaths involve people who suffer from chronic pain.

The Benefits: Severe pain interferes with healing, quality of life

and overall health and well-being. Opioids can eliminate severe pain and allow you to heal or participate in activities that will help you banish the source of pain.

The Risks: Unless pain medicines are administered within a pain-management plan that targets tapering off the drugs as you heal and feel better, it is possible to become addicted even at low doses. (Management of chronic pain associated with end of life is another matter; hospice targets comfort for whatever time remains.)

1. If opioids are the right medication for your pain control, ask your physician to refer you to a pain-management specialist who will guide you through your medication regimen and protect you from addiction.

2. Be conscientious about physical therapy, changing diet to decrease pain/inflammation, adding stress management and other at-home activities when prescribed. It may seem counterintuitive that the strain (and sometimes pain) of physical therapy, along

with diet and meditation, can ease chronic pain, but it can!

3. Ask your doctor about taking non-opioid analgesics, including ibuprofen and prescription NSAIDs like celecoxib (Celebrex) and indomethacin (Indocin). A recent study in JAMA found that for "patients presenting to the ED [emergency department] with acute extremity pain, there were no statistically significant or clinically important differences in pain reduction at 2 hours among single-dose treatment with ibuprofen and acetaminophen or with 3 different opioid and acetaminophen combination analgesics." That matters because it's reported that nearly 19 percent of people leave EDs with an opioid prescription — and even short-term use can trigger dependence. We suggest that even for persistent pain, some NSAIDs are more or less equivalent in effectiveness to low-dose opioids.

4. Consider acupuncture; pain-management group therapy; gentle stretching; water therapy; and tai chi or yoga.

My boyfriend has become very secretive lately with his phone, and I've noticed he's followed a lot of male modeling accounts on Instagram. Should I confront him about it, or am I overthinking things? — Conflicted In Iowa

DEAR CONFLICT-ED: You are not overthinking. Because you are having doubts about your boyfriend's faithfulness, ask him why he has become secretive with his phone and why he is viewing male models on Instagram. Unless he's trying to become a model, it is possible that he may be bisexual. If that's the case — and you are correct that he would "do anything" for you — he should level with you about it.

P.S. If you have been having unprotected sex with this young man, I urge you to be tested for STDs.

DEAR ABBY: I'm a 15-year-old girl in my sophomore year. School is going really good, I'm getting my grades up, I made

the varsity lacrosse team, and I have amazing friends. But our school tells us that during our sophomore school year, we should start to look at colleges. Neither of my parents went to college, and I'm not sure what I should be doing to prepare. I'm only an average student, and I don't really know what I should ask my guidance counselor or look for in a college. What do you think I should do? — Student In New York

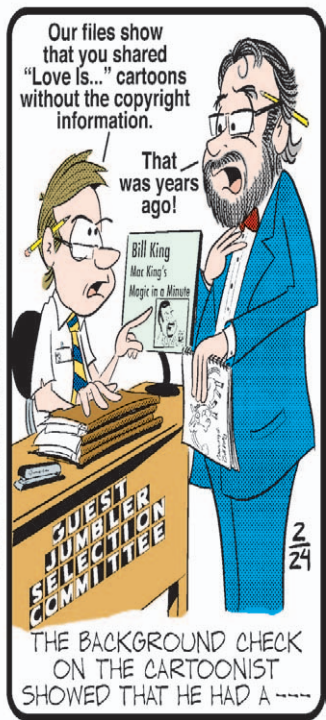

Trump, Turnbull praise each other on immigration and taxes

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump and Australian Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull put their “mateship” on full display Friday at the White House as they took turns praising each other’s approaches on immigration and taxes.

Their relationship got off to a rocky start a year ago, but none of that was evident as they prepared to field questions from journalists in the East Room after an afternoon of talks, including about jobs.

Trump congratulated Turnbull on “your immigration reforms and on Australia’s commitment to merit-based immigration.

“Are my friends from Congress listening to that? Merit based,” said Trump, who has been arguing for changes to turn the U.S. immigration system into one that is more focused on merit and the skills bring to the U.S., and less focused on family ties. His immigration demands have upset lawmakers, mostly Democrats.

“We want to do merit-based immigration also,” Trump said, adding that such a system “really protects the interest of Australia and its people. “It’s the way to go.

And you’ve been very successful with it,” Trump continued. “Here, we’re working very hard to do the same. In that sense, we’re going to, hopefully, follow in your footprints.”

When it was his turn to speak, Turnbull complimented Trump by calling the president’s decision to cut taxes “one of the most powerful arguments” he is using to persuade lawmakers to further reduce business taxes back home.

Trump signed a \$1.5 trillion tax cut into law in December, significantly shaving taxes for corporations and the wealthy while providing more modest breaks for middle-class individuals. The Republican president and his economic advisers have argued that dropping the corporate tax rate from 35 percent to 21 percent will benefit workers through greater investment in the U.S. and in those companies, and through the creation of good-paying jobs. No Democrats voted to cut taxes.

Turnbull, who was accompanied by the largest Australian political and business delegation ever to visit the U.S., said he and Trump spent a lot of time talking about jobs. Turnbull told Trump that Australians have been “inspired, I have to say, by

your success in securing the passage of the tax reforms.”

Turnbull said some corporate taxes in Australia have been cut, “but we’ve got more work to do.”

“The economic stimulus that your reforms have delivered here in the United States is one of the most powerful arguments that we are deploying to persuade our legislature to support reducing business tax,” the prime minister told Trump. “Because, as you are demonstrating and as we all know, when you cut company tax, most of the benefit goes to workers. It produces more investment. And, when you get more investment, you get more jobs.”

Trump opened the news conference with good news for Turnbull, announcing that a still-to-be built U.S. combat ship will be named the USS Canberra to honor an Australian cruiser that was lost fighting alongside the U.S. Navy during World War II. Canberra is Australia’s capital.

Trump said the ship will symbolize the “enduring friendship” between the U.S. and Australia as it sails the open sea. “There is no closer friendship,” he said.

Turnbull appeared elated by the announcement, noting that the ship will

be built by an Australian company in Mobile, Alabama.

“What a great example of a hundred years of mateship,” he said, referring to when the U.S. and Australia first fought together in World War I.

Relations between Trump and Turnbull got off to a tumultuous start within days of Trump taking office in January 2017 after they sparred by telephone over a plan for the U.S. to accept hundreds of mostly Muslim refugees that Australia didn’t want to take in itself.

Trump had campaigned against immigration, including by Muslims, and disliked the deal, which was arranged by Trump’s predecessor, Barack

Obama.

But Joe Hockey, Australia’s ambassador to the U.S., said the former businessmen now “understand each other” and enjoy each other’s company.

Both leaders dismiss speculation that their relationship had been damaged by that telephone call. Since then, Turnbull has met Trump in New York, but Friday’s meeting in Washington was their first in the context of an official visit.

Trump has not been to Australia yet as president. Asked if he’d like to visit when he and Turnbull appeared in the Oval Office, Trump said: “We will be there, yes. Great place.”

Corps: Agency worked to inform on Harvey flood risk

HOUSTON (AP) — The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers says that leading up to and during Hurricane Harvey it “worked diligently” with officials to inform the public on flooding risks from Houston reservoirs that ended up inundating thousands of homes.

The Corps’ statement Friday comes in response to a Houston Chronicle report earlier this week that the agency failed to share with the public a forecast ahead of Harvey’s arrival that Barker and Addicks reservoirs would flood adjacent neighborhoods.

The Corps’ forecast was made Aug. 24, the day before Harvey made landfall. Local officials didn’t issue flood advisories for areas adjacent to the reservoirs until the next two to three days.

Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner said Friday he didn’t see the forecast and the possibility it might not have been released was concerning.

US deportations targeting more people with no crime records

SAN DIEGO (AP) — New government figures show people arrested by deportation officers increasingly have no criminal backgrounds, reflecting the Trump administration’s commitment to cast a wider net in its push to expel people in the U.S. illegally.

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement said Friday that 65 percent of the arrests its agents made from October to December were of people with criminal records.

That’s compared to 82 percent during the same period of 2016. In other words, criminal arrests rose but arrests of non-criminals jumped at a much faster rate.

Overall, there were more than 39,000 deportation arrests from October to December, up from about 27,000 during the final full three months of the Obama administration.

The 43 percent surge in overall arrests is consistent with trends since Trump took office.

Judge agrees to halt construction of Louisiana oil pipeline

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — A federal judge has agreed to suspend construction of a crude oil pipeline that is being built through a swamp in Louisiana’s Cajun country.

U.S. District Judge Shelly Dick’s order Friday is a victory for environmental groups challenging the Bayou Bridge pipeline project.

Dick granted the groups’ request for a preliminary injunction halting pipeline construction in the environmentally fragile Atchafalaya Basin until their lawsuit over the project is resolved.

The judge’s two-page order bars the company that is building the pipeline “from taking any further action on the project” pending a trial on the merits of the case.

It wasn’t immediately clear if the order is limited to work in the basin or applies to the entire length of the 162-mile-long pipeline from Lake Charles to St. James Parish.

Washington lawmakers exempt themselves from records law

OLYMPIA, Wash. — Washington state lawmakers have overwhelmingly approved legislation that will make some of their records public in the future, but will circumvent a recent court ruling that found they were already fully subject to the state’s public disclosure laws.

The measure retroactively removes the legislative branch from the state’s voter-approved Public Records Act so that lawmakers are able to attempt to shield records sought by a coalition of media groups, led by The Associated Press, who prevailed in court last month.

It passed the Senate on a 41-7 vote Friday, and then was quickly approved by the House

83-14. The bill heads to Gov. Jay Inslee with a veto-proof margin.

The quick action comes just two days after the bill was introduced. Only four lawmakers spoke during the brief debates in both chambers, all saying that the measure is intended to increase transparency.

The bill, co-sponsored by Democratic Senate Majority Leader Sharon Nelson and Republican Senate Minority Leader Mark Schoesler, allows the release of some lawmaker correspondence, including those with lobbyists; information from lawmaker calendars; and final disciplinary reports beginning on July 1.

However, because of the retroactivity language, it would prohibit the release of the records being sought by the coalition of news organizations that

sued last September.

“This bill is a significant and major step forward for the people of Washington and this institution as we step into the sunlight, requiring what I believe are the most important disclosures for the people of Washington to hold their elected representatives accountable,” said Democratic Rep. Gerry Pollett.

The Legislature is appealing the Jan. 19 ruling of Thurston County Superior Court Judge Chris Lanese, who ruled state representatives and senators and their offices are fully subject to the same broad public disclosure requirements that cover other local and state elected officials and employees at state agencies.

Senate Republican Minority Leader Mark

Schoesler said the ruling was too broad and “completely unworkable.”

“Just as important as transparency is the ability of lawmakers to effectively work on behalf of those who sent us here,” he said.

Republican Sen. Mark Miloscia, who voted no, said that the rushed process and ultimate outcome “feeds into the cynicism that we see, that we can’t trust politicians.”

“The Legislature should be leading on transparency, not giving the impression that it’s hiding stuff,” he said.

Under the measure, exemptions from disclosure would include records of policy development, as well as any records that would “violate an individual’s right to privacy.” While final disciplinary reports against lawmakers would be subject

to disclosure, emails or other documentation of allegations of things like sexual harassment or misconduct that doesn’t result in an official report — which were among the records the news coalition was seeking — would not.

Any person wanting to challenge a records denial would have to seek review by the Senate Facilities and Operations Committee or the House Executive Rules Committee, whose rulings would be final. Unlike denials under the state’s Public Records Act, no review by the courts would be allowed.

An attorney for the media coalition said the group’s litigation would continue, and that the effort to make the law retroactive would be part of the ongoing case.

California parents face new charges in kids’ torture case

RIVERSIDE, Calif. — A Southern California couple suspected of starving and shackling some of their 13 children pleaded not guilty Friday to new charges of child abuse.

David and Louise Turpin previously entered not-guilty pleas to torture and a raft of other charges and are being held on \$12 million bail.

Louise Turpin also pleaded not guilty to a new count of felony assault.

Louise Turpin, dressed in a blouse and blazer, looked intently at more than a dozen reporters in the courtroom. David Turpin, wearing a blazer, tie and black-rimmed glasses, kept his eyes on the judge during the hearing. Both said little except to agree to a May preliminary hearing.

The couple was arrested last month after their 17-year-old daughter escaped from the family’s home in Perris, California, and called 911. Authorities said the home reeked of human waste

and evidence of starvation was obvious, with the oldest sibling weighing only 82 pounds.

The case drew international media attention and shocked neighbors who said they rarely saw the children, who appeared to be skinny, pale and reserved.

Authorities said the abuse was so long-running the children’s growth

was stunted. They said the couple shackled the children to furniture as punishment and had them live a nocturnal lifestyle.

The children, who range in age from 2 to 29, were hospitalized immediately after their rescue and since then Riverside County authorities, who obtained temporary conservatorship over the

adults, have declined to discuss their whereabouts or condition.

Attorneys representing the adult siblings told CBS News, however, that the seven are living at Corona Medical Center, where they have an outdoor area for sports and exercise, and are making decisions on their own for the first time.

“That in itself is a new

FBI docs list range of payments to top players

New details of payments to players in a federal investigation that has lurked in the shadows since first rocking college basketball last fall mark the latest threat to the sport's basic foundation, showing the breadth of alleged corruption.

Bank records and other expense reports that are part of the investigation list a wide range of

impermissible payments from agents to at least two dozen players or their relatives, according to documents obtained by Yahoo Sports.

The depth of the violations raises questions about the structure of college athletics, a business funded primarily through college football and basketball, including \$19.6 billion in TV money for the NCAA Tournament over the

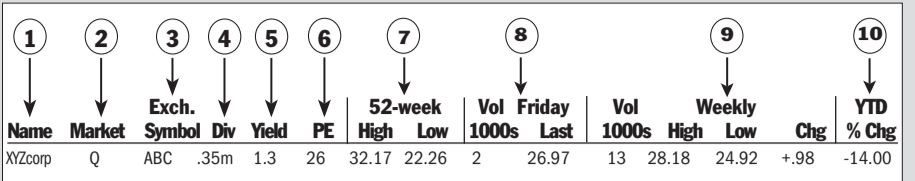

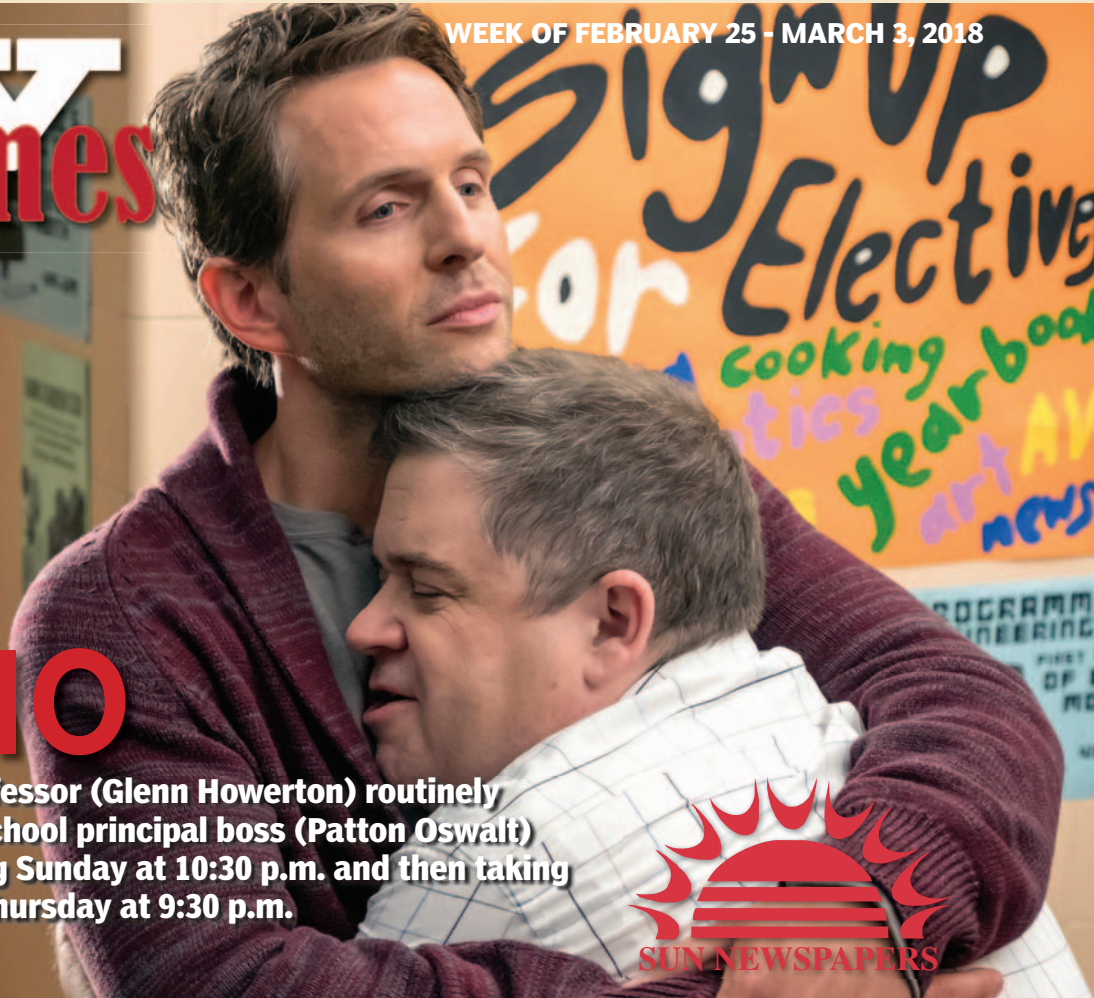

Self-Absorbed Scholar Treats Brainiac Students as Pawns

Fans of "It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia" and the deplorable (yet funny) behavior of its central characters will want to go back to school with co-creator and co-star Glenn Howerton on the new NBC comedy "A.P. Bio," airing Sunday at 10:30 p.m. and then taking its regular time slot on Thursday at 9:30 p.m. Howerton plays the disgraced Harvard philosophy scholar Jack Griffin, who is forced to take a post at a Toledo, Ohio, high school teaching Advanced Placement Biology. But Jack makes it clear from the start to his appalled honor roll students that he will not be teaching any biology. Instead he will use the kids to take his revenge on his imagined nemesis, Miles (Tom Bennett), who "stole" his dream job at Stanford.

Miles, however, is oblivious to Jack's animosity and only wants the best for him. The same is true for Jack's new boss, the much put-upon Principal Durbin (Patton Oswalt), who is thrilled to have a Harvard professor among his faculty and so painfully over-accommodates his rude and regulation-breaking actions. Far less impressed with Jack is the teacher trio of Mary (Mary Sohn), Stef (Lyric Lewis) and their former bullying victim turned cohort, Michelle (Jean Vilpique).

"First of all, I've not officially, like, left 'It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia,'" Howerton points out. "So, I hope people understand that. This is just a totally separate project that I'm doing. I think one of the tough things about doing a show for 12 years is people might have a hard time seeing you as anything else, and I realize that that could be a little bit of a struggle for me as an actor. But that's why it was important for me to get to do something with someone who has a distinctive voice like Mike (O'Brien, creator and executive producer). You know, I wasn't even planning on jumping into anything else. But when I read the script and saw it was Lorne Michaels and Seth Meyers (executive-producing), I couldn't pass it up. But mostly, I just loved the script and the character."

Of course, a cursory glance at Jack would perceive that he's every bit as superficial and self-absorbed as Dennis on "Sunny," and that the actor appears to have been typecast for this new role.

"Typecast? I think it's possible that that could start to happen," Howerton allows. "This character definitely shares some traits with the character on 'Sunny,' but I think he's distinct in other ways. I think there's some real heart to this guy. I think he really wears his heart more on his sleeve than he even realizes, where I don't think he's as hardened as, say, Dennis. No. I think there's a little bit more tenderness to this character,

even though he wouldn't want people to realize that. But, yeah, he's snarky. I don't know. I like doing it. It's fun. I like playing that kind of character."

The initial traces of Jack's heart can be seen in the subtle signs of grief he displays for his late mother, although his only spoken references are of having to live in his "dead mom's apartment."

"The show is so jampacked with comedy as far as I'm concerned that I never tried for that stuff to be funny at all," Howerton says. "I mean, I'm always looking for some sort of a truth in everything. I wanted those

moments to feel as though this is a man who is grieving, but who doesn't want to believe that he's grieving, someone who feels a terrible sense of loss and sadness but who, if you asked him, he'd be like, 'I don't care.' I like to think that he is the type of person who actually has such big feelings that he has to act like someone who doesn't care and has to act like somebody who doesn't have big feelings because everything hurts too much. That's my take on the character, because I think if you have been hurt enough in your life as a human being, you might start to put up a shell."

Another hint to the unseen depth of Jack Griffin are the reasonably valid philosophical truths he draws

"What I love is that Mike wrote a character who is intellectually smart but emotionally immature. And that's a very funny combination because he does some of the dumbest things a human being would ever do, but he has some smart reason for why it's OK that he did it, you know. And I always love watching characters justify ridiculous behavior because I think you can get behind that. A character can do something absolutely ridiculous and insane as long as the audience understands why the character thinks that's a good idea, and I think Mike did a really great job with that. Like, people will do ridiculous things for selfish reasons as long as they have a justification for it."
