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Deputy arrests man after using Marchman Act

Man accused of kicking officer

A Port Charlotte man was charged Tuesday with battery on a law enforcement officer after being transported to the hospital under the Marchman Act.

The Marchman Act allows for involuntary commitment of a person impaired by alcohol or other substances. A deputy initiated the Marchman Act on Joshua Glen Duncan, 29, of the 17400 block of Harris Avenue in Port Charlotte, and he was brought to Bayfront Health Punta Gorda.

According to the arrest affidavit, Duncan was argumentative with the medics and belligerent with hospital staff, who secured him in a locked room. When he asked to go to the bathroom, he refused to pee in the bottle given to him to collect a urine sample and said he would pee in the corner if he couldn't use the bathroom, according to the affidavit.

Duncan reportedly kicked the wall of the room forcefully twice, and the deputy wrote in the affidavit he "felt (Duncan) would be a harm to himself if left unsecured."

Other deputies helped handcuff Duncan to the rails of his bed, reportedly for his own safety.

But when one deputy picked up some of his property, Duncan "became enraged," yelling about wanting his hat and jacket back. The deputy placed the items on a chair outside the room and returned to explain what he was doing. As he walked past the foot of the bed, Duncan lunged forward and kicked the deputy in his upper leg and hip area.

The deputy charged him with battery on a law enforcement officer, "due to his inability to control his anger, his deliberate

Who wears short shorts?

College basketball players' hemlines creep up

At his first practice as a Michigan freshman, Jordan Poole panicked when coach John Beilein shook his head and told Poole his basketball shorts were too short and he had to stop rolling down the waistband.

"I was like, 'Yo, let me talk to Bob (Bland, the team equipment manager),' " recalled Poole, now a sophomore guard. "I was like, 'Bob, I need some smaller shorts. If Coach won't let me (wear) them, I don't know how good I'll be.'"

Beilein eventually relented as Poole wore a smaller size — and continued to roll down the waistband to make the shorts look even tinier.

Poole's shorts stop about four or five inches above his knee with little breathing room between skin and fabric, and he isn't alone in college basketball. Nobody seems able to pin down when and where this throwback look reignited into a sports fashion statement.

But it's obvious:

Charlotte County honors Mac Horton

Commissioners to decide to name the West County Annex for former commissioner, school board member, elections supervisor

ENGLEWOOD — Mac Horton's service to the Englewood community and Charlotte County will not be forgotten.

In 2015, the county first recognized Horton's service by dedicating the Winchester Boulevard South corridor to him. As a county commissioner, Horton had long remained committed to its construction. At the Winchester dedication, the *Sun* reported how Horton said, "Anybody who does government service and has something named for them — particularly before they die — it's really, really an honor."

Mac Horton will get to enjoy that honor again.

County commissioners will be asked Tuesday to dedicate the county's new West County

Annex to Horton. An official ribbon-cutting ceremony is scheduled for 1 p.m. April 2 at the annex, 6868 San Casa Drive in Englewood. The public is invited.

Horton and his family aren't taking the honor lightly. He was surprised and excited Charlotte County is still willing to recognize his efforts, that so many people with whom he worked over the years still value his contributions.

"We are all ecstatic," his wife Esther said, speaking for their family. "It's just wonderful."

Former Charlotte County Property Appraiser Frank Desguin first talked with Commissioner Bill Truex about dedicating the West County Annex to Horton. Desguin, a Democrat, and Horton, a Republican, worked hand-in-hand to preserve Charlotte's

DC meeting gets mixed reviews from North Port officials

NORTH PORT — When city commissioners and the city manager of North Port went to Washington, D.C., last week for a city planning meeting, the reviews were decidedly mixed.

“Very beneficial,” Mayor Chris Hanks said about the meeting of the National League of Cities. “To hear of issues other cities are facing, and the solutions they have tried, was worth being there.”

Vice Mayor Commissioner Debbie McDowell said the key theme she picked up at the conference was “infrastructure. Lots of issues in that area.” She said other issues such as homelessness and technology were also common themes.

“Better than in past years,” was the way commissioner Vanessa Carusone described the meeting. “We also had a chance to visit with our local House representatives, which we visited as a group. We had a chance to discuss

our local issues. Very worthwhile.”

Her comments were echoed by Commissioner Peter Emrich. However, Commissioner Jill Luke was not so impressed.

“I won't go back next year,” she said. “Washington is so dysfunctional and so political, I have decided I could get more done

working here at home. I'm not going back.”

Luke said she would like to save taxpayers “the \$3,000 or so it cost for me to go there. It is not a good use of that money.”

The group is headed to Tallahassee next week for meetings with state officials. “I expect we'll get a lot more accomplished there,” Luke said.

Charlotte commissioner questions proposed development

Residential project on mining site is 1,204 acres

At least one Charlotte County commissioner was not impressed by a proposed development

with a giant lake and no clear public access to a conservation area.

The 1,204-acre mostly residential project near the Lee County line still advanced a step earlier

this month. Charlotte County commissioners voted 3-1 to send the project to the state Office of Economic Development for review. The Planning and Zoning

Board had voted to recommend the project in February. The developer must still gain approval for rezoning and a site plan.

Presented by Minnesota and Florida-based developer, Neslund Family Ltd. Partnership, the project includes up to 1,384 residential units on land that is now an excavation pit. The location is south of Bermont Road between U.S. 41 and Interstate 75. It is north of another approved but undeveloped large scale project called McNew. Both of these large residential and commercial projects

would draw water and sewer services from Lee County.

Neslund is proposing to build homes on narrow strips of land around a large lake, to be created after the mining work is complete in a few years. During the process of excavation, some 533 acres of land was set aside as private conservation land. The developer promoted that land as possibly for recreational use for people who would live in the development.

Commissioner Christopher Constance questioned whether the conservation land and the future lake would be any great contribution to the county, given that the public might not

have access.

“So what you're doing is, the mine has agreed to conservation lands for the public good, and now, they want to turn around and have us transmit this so that the private concern can use those conserved lands for the private people to use,” he summarized. “I don't know if I'm too excited about that.”

He said he would prefer getting some commitment for public access.

“This looks like a tiny little piece of property, but we're dealing with over 1,200 acres and to open up all of that acreage to the public... is an absolute liability nightmare,” said Robert Berntsson, the developer's local lawyer.

Later, before voting against the transmittal, Constance said, “I think if this were let go and turned over to the county then we would have a large public lake that we could utilize...I also view this as a bit of urban sprawl.”

Commissioner Ken Doherty asked the developer representatives if the developer would be willing to go on the record as at least considering public access.

“Oh, absolutely,” Berntsson said.

When it came time for a vote, none of the four commissioners made a move for several minutes. County lawyer Janette Knowlton finally advised them they had to make some kind of a motion. Commissioner Joe Tiseo made the motion to approve, which was supported by Doherty and Commissioner Stephen R. Deutsch. Commissioner Bill Truex was not present.

One resident, Carl Bolling, spoke at the hearing to express worries about how the project would affect people living next to it on Orange Blossom Boulevard. The neighbors also fear they will lose access to the conservation area they currently enjoy.

“I'm glad to see at least one of the commissioners is on it,” he said.

“Some guys like to show off their leg,” Louisville forward Jordan Nwora said Wednesday in Des Moines, Iowa, “especially if you’ve got bounce.”

While it’s a bit of a chicken-or-egg debate, most believe sports apparel companies began to downsize their shorts after noticing players rolling down their waistbands. Uniforms already were becoming tighter, following the trend of non-sportswear such as skinny jeans and buttoned-to-the-top fitted dress shirts.

“Everything is faster now with social media,” said Paul Lukas, who runs Uni Watch, a blog devoted to sports uniforms. “If a trend is happening at some high school in rural wherever, everyone will know about it and it can become cool.”

The length of basketball shorts has risen and fallen over the years like a yo-yo.

Wilt Chamberlain’s 1960s shorts look like underwear compared with today’s standards. Larry Bird and Magic Johnson showed plenty of leg in the 1980s. Jazz point guard John Stockton was among the last to wear the form-fitting style.

Then things went the other way in the 1990s. There’s a theory that Michael Jordan started the trend of requesting looser shorts so he could grab the hems when he was bent over and tired.

The Fab Five from Michigan took it farther — literally. The group that reached the 1992 and ’93 NCAA championship games used yards more

fabric than the uniforms Poole and his teammates wear today, their billowy shorts hanging below the knees.

“Yeah, I don’t know about those,” Minnesota guard Amir Coffey said. “It’s more comfortable,” Poole said of the shorter style. “You don’t have to worry about the shorts

being too baggy and you crossing over the ball and it hitting your shorts.”

Some college players ask their equipment managers for shorts a size smaller than they typically would wear. Some roll the waistband to make them shorter.

Louisville forward Dwayne Sutton said

he prefers two rolls, sometimes three. In high school, he said, opponents told him that’s how girls wear their shorts.

“I don’t care,” he said. “I just laughed at it.”

Companies such as Under Armour have begun placing branding inside the waistband.

Players said the Adidas Nations camp customized its shorts to a tighter fit.

“I actually wish mine were shorter,” Ohio State guard Musa Jallow said. “But if I keep on rolling them, it wouldn’t be appropriate.”

In the 1970s and ’80s, sock height rose with

shorts height as knee-high tube socks were in fashion. With the longer shorts in the 1990s, ankle-length socks became the rage.

Now it’s about showing all the leg you can.

“Pushed-down socks, rolled-down shorts, baby,” Minnesota’s Jarvis Omersa said.

Most current college players began wearing their shorts smaller in high school. Some say former Illinois and Oakland guard Kendrick Nunn started the trend at Simeon. Others point to former Cal star and current Celtics guard Jaylen Brown or former Indiana guard OG Anunoby for starting the hiked-up look.

Poole said he wore shorter shorts in high school when nobody else did. He said he played for a “strict coach” at Milwaukee’s King High School who, like Beilein, wasn’t keen on a freshman standing out with a different style.

“I feel faster,” he said. “I feel more athletic with the short shorts.”

After Michigan reached the national championship game a year ago, Poole said he has seen more college players latch on to the trend. He turned to teammate Xavier Simpson in the locker room and asked, “Are you in the short-shorts game?”

Simpson laughed and indicated his thigh-length shorts to acknowledge he has indeed adopted the look.

Not many NBA players sport the shorter length. Poole hopes to change that.

“If I can get there, I’m going to bring it there,” he said. “I’m a trendsetter.”

historic courthouse in downtown Punta Gorda. Horton was the county’s Supervisor of Elections at the time.

“His public service to Charlotte County as a school board member and as a county commissioner ‘representing West County,’ and as a Supervisor of Elections is unmatched, as well as his community involvement,” Desquin wrote in his formal request to the county. “I can think of no better example than Mac spearheading the campaign to save Charlotte County’s historic courthouse when so many others shortsightedly wanted it demolished.”

Horton’s political career started when he decided to serve as an elected Englewood Water District supervisor, and won the post from 1972 to 1975. He was then elected to the Charlotte

County School Board, where he served from 1984 to 1996.

In 1996, Horton first ran for the District 3 Charlotte County commission seat. He won it and held it until 2004. He ended his elected career serving one term as the Charlotte County Supervisor of Elections from 2004 to 2008.

The new 18,900-square-foot,

four-acre annex was built to replace the 12,000-square-foot annex that had been on the site for 40 years. The West County Annex was budgeted for \$6.5 million from the 2014, funded

with 1-percent local option sales tax. The project came in under budget at \$5.1 million.

The new annex houses the Englewood offices of the Charlotte County Tax Collector, the

Supervisor of Elections and Property Appraiser, and the county’s Human Services and Utilities departments. Besides county offices, the building is also home to the free Englewood

Community CARE Clinic, the Florida Department of Health’s Women, Infants, and Children program, and the Center for Abuse and Rape Emergencies.

act of throwing himself at the bottom of his bed, throwing his left foot out to kick and making contact with said foot,” writing that Duncan had made prior statements acknowledging him as a deputy.

He did not suffer any injury from the kick, he wrote in the affidavit.

In a typical Marchman Act, a person is held for 72 hours, during which they are assessed by a physician for further treatment, which can be ordered by the court. The Marchman Act can be initiated by family members through a court order, or in an emergency, law enforcement can initiate the request if the person is brought to their attention or is clearly impaired in public.

Local defense attorney Russell Kirshy said intoxication is not a defense against kicking a deputy, he said, but stated the case sounded to him like “a sad commentary.” The whole point of the Marchman Act is to “get somebody help who can’t help themselves,” he said.

“I’ve always found it very shocking, if you will, when somebody who is either mentally ill or severely addicted to drugs or alcohol is taken into

custody for something that is probably a symptom of their problem,” he said.

Kirshy said ideally, a prosecutor would see the person was compromised at the time of the crime and resolve the case in a reasonable way, though that may depend on the person’s criminal history.

Duncan had no other criminal history in Charlotte County. His bond was set at

\$6,500 on Wednesday.

Katie Heck, spokesperson for the Sheriff’s Office, commented only, “A Marchman Act is protective custody, an action deputies can take on someone when they have committed no crime (other than being intoxicated) but are a danger to themselves or others. The PCA clearly outlines a charge for Battery on LEO.”

Kids explore the outdoors with Tinkergarten

NORTH PORT — A line of children marched along a trail that runs through the Garden of the Five Senses, some stopping to pick up sticks to drop into their small silver buckets, others stopping to pluck pine cones off the ground.

The sticks soon turned into carrots and pine cones became sweet potatoes. The children gathered around a large pot, plopping in their imaginary ingredients and stirring their stone soup.

The kids spent Wednesday morning at Tinkergarten, an early education class introducing children ages 18 months to 8 years to the outdoors.

Amber Arehart, Tinkergarten leader and mother of three young boys, decided to start a class in North Port after noting that the city had few opportunities for children to learn and play outdoors.

"I'm homeschooling and my boys learn by play, they learn by being outside," Arehart said. "They don't learn by sitting down and doing, and they love nature and I couldn't find anything around here that was nature-based at all. It's also to bring community here, which a lot of parents are really looking for."

Brody Weller took pine cones, or sweet potatoes, out of his pot, adding water to his soup instead. The 4-year-old came to the park accompanied by his great-grandmother Mary Byrd and 6-year-old sister Amelia.

Byrd said she didn't realize how much fun the children would have at the class, noting that Arehart's outdoor activity was helpful for Brody, who is autistic.

"She's allowing them to be creative," Byrd said. "That is wonderful, and they're learning. They're learning how to interact with the other children."

Arehart said the class helps kids feel more comfortable playing among larger groups of children. Arehart expects to see more

grandparents, aunts and uncles attending the class, hoping it will encourage families to spend more time playing with their kids.

"It's a great thing," Byrd said. "It's an advantage for the community."

Shayla Trainor brought her 3-year-old son Isaac to the class to give him a chance to socialize with kids his age, adding that he doesn't often get to interact with other children.

"He is getting the interaction he needs," Trainor said. "In our neighborhood that we live in, we don't really have a bunch of kids that live there, so he needs that. It's a great opportunity for him to have this."

Trainor said she also hopes to connect with other parents through the class.

"When we first moved here, there was nothing, so now having this it's more family oriented," Trainor said. "It's reaching out to maybe more parents, plus as parents we will probably make friends with other parents here and get together outside of this."

Sonia Farnsworth wiped dirt off her 2-year-old daughter Julianna's small hands. Julianna had spent the morning searching for sticks for her stone soup, along with her 6-year-old brother Hunter. Farnsworth, like several other parents, hoped the class would teach their children how to interact with other kids.

"I wanted them to be out of the house, let all that energy out and not just watch TV and play video games all day, but actually get out and enjoy the fresh air and the sunshine," Farnsworth said. "They need to learn how to be social and share and take turns."

The next class will take place at Garden of the Five Senses on Sunday from 3 p.m. to 4:15 p.m. Free classes will run through March 31.

Spring classes will be offered every Wednesday, starting April 3 through June 5 from 10 a.m. to 11:15 a.m.

Punta Gorda Housing Authority gets boost

Funds will help families become self-sufficient

To better serve the city's families in need, the Punta Gorda Housing Authority has received a grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to fund the Family Self-Sufficiency coordinator position.

The one-year grant is for \$53,250 and will go to the salary and benefits of that coordinator.

PGHA staff assistant Jeanie Calvert is in training to take over the position, according to Kurt Pentelecuc, PGHA executive director. Calvert was unavailable for comment at the time of this report.

"(Jeanie) already has the background for the position," Pentelecuc said. "She can work with and move clients to better their life and incomes and get them off the FSS program and move them out of Section 8 so they can sustain self-sufficiency."

The FSS program is a five-year, incentive-based, voluntary program that assists Section 8 families to gain financial independence and build their assets, according to the PGHA website. Section 8 is a federal rent subsidy program under HUD that provides vouchers to eligible households.

FSS coordinators work in the community, building relationships with employers and other service providers in the area. They also ensure that participants have greater access to financial

HOW TO APPLY FOR A VOUCHER

A person interested in receiving a Section 8 voucher must begin by applying for the wait list. Section 8 applications are not always available; therefore, an applicant must wait until the list is open.

- Some key points to this process are the following:
 - Section 8 applicants must meet the income limits for their family size
 - Section 8 applicants must be 18 years or older
 - Local Preferences are given to elderly applicants, disabled households, working families, and victims of a disaster, as declared by the Executive Director of the Housing Authority
 - Section 8 applicants must provide proof of legal status, birth certificates, and social security cards
 - If applicable, the following court documents are needed: marriage license, divorce decree, and child support court order

education, literacy, empowerment and coaching programs.

Through those programs they can gain the knowledge and skills needed to make better decisions in reaching their goals and achieving self-sufficiency and financial stability.

"The FSS coordinator meets with our clients ... they sit down with them and establish goals and execute contracts with HUD," Pentelecuc said. "We monitor the clients and make sure they are on the right track to achieve their goals in becoming self-sufficient."

For each member of the program, PGHA also establishes an escrow account, according to the PGHA website. Once an eligible participant increases their "earned" income, they also increase their potential of a monthly credit that is deposited into their account. Upon successful completion of the program, the participant receives the money that has been accruing in the account.

PGHA has established a Program Coordinating Committee which is a group of social service providers and community leaders committed to supporting the mission, goals, and objectives of the FSS program and its participants.

El Jobean sewer construction expected to start by May

Charlotte County does not have all the easements it needs yet to lay pipes

Construction will begin soon on the new sewer system in El Jobean, although the county does not have all the property owner agreements needed to lay down pipes.

Installation of \$3.2 million worth of equipment and construction services should begin in May, following appropriations of funds on March 12 by Charlotte County commissioners, said Charlotte County Utilities spokeswoman Caroline Wannall. This is for a booster station on Railroad Avenue and for the construction contract with Poole & Kent Company, she said.

"We've been working on this project for quite awhile," Wannall said. "This is a big step."

It takes 30 to 60 days after the contract signing to get the project underway on site, Wannall said, and everyone is aiming to start before the rainy season. Construction can continue through the rainy season, however, Wannall said. Once started, the project contract allows 400 calendar days for completion.

What remains to be completed is acquiring easements from the property owners to lay underground pipes. Staff from the county's Real Estate Office have been working on this, and have not reported any major snags, Wannall said. Homeowners are offered a payment for the use of their land. In exchange, they cannot build above the

pipe location.

"As of now, we haven't heard that home owners have said they would not provide the easements," Wannall said. If some do, the county can reroute the project to less optimal sites.

The County Commission decided to undertake the septic to sewer conversion project in this historic, waterside neighborhood several years ago. At \$9.2 million for less than 300 households, it is the most costly per housing unit of the conversion projects, Deputy County Administrator Travis Mortimer has said. It is also considered one of the sites causing the most damage to waterways, said Utilities Director Craig Rudy.

The neighborhood was laid out along the Myakka River in the 1920s. Septic systems do not work well in tidal areas and areas where the water table is high, such as El Jobean, water quality experts have said. The state Department of Environmental Protection identified the pollution in the river in the 1990s.

Some residents have welcomed sewers, due to their failing septic systems, others were angry at being forced to switch. It will cost each household \$11,500 over 20 years, and they must also pay sewer bills now. The county is paying for much of the project with money out of a lawsuit filed against the BP oil company. BP was sued by the federal government over the 2010 Deepwater Horizon explosion in the Gulf of Mexico.

Sunseeker a game-changer for Charlotte County

OUR POSITION: *The Sunseeker resort will pay huge dividends to Charlotte County.*

If Allegiant Travel President John Redmond was a preacher, we can imagine what his opening remarks may have been at Wednesday's groundbreaking ceremony for the Sunseeker resort.

"O ye of little faith ..."

He's not a preacher, however. He is a doer. When he developed the concept of a resort in Florida, on the waterfront, within a couple of hours of three Allegiant airport hubs, he was confident he was on to something.

It's been about two years since he ventured to Punta Gorda to outline his plan to a group of area businessmen and members of the *Sun* news team. Everyone left that meeting excited.

But skeptics cropped up as some of the old buildings, purchased by Sunseeker and scheduled to be demolished, remained standing. There was less talk of a groundbreaking and more discussion about Allegiant's investors and board questioning why they would want to build a resort in a town no one has ever heard of. A town without a downtown. A town with no major draw except the fact it has a waterfront.

Redmond never wavered.

He knew what he wanted to do. The same man responsible for much of the success of Las Vegas' mega casinos was not about to back down from an idea to turn little ol' Charlotte Harbor into a destination for Allegiant travelers, conventions and snowbirds.

He called it "validation" when TPG Sixth Street Partners agreed to invest up to \$1 billion in Sunseeker resorts.

This past week Redmond and his team — which includes Micah Richins, chief operating officer; and Jason Shkorupa, vice president of food and beverage — got to preside over the groundbreaking for Sunseeker.

Redmond said there could be as many as 1,600 guests on any given day at the resort — which will include hotel rooms and long-stay suites. There will be up to 10 restaurants and bars which will serve top-of-the-line cuisine and casual food perfect for sitting by the water and catching a sunset.

Plans for the state's largest pool have been scaled back for now, but there will be a pool — on a rooftop. And the public will have easy access via the harborwalk and a parking lot on Tamiami Trail.

Another plus is the amount of landscaping Sunseeker will do along Tamiami Trail that will present an attractive welcome to those driving north from Punta Gorda and destinations south. It will be the first real entryway into Charlotte County.

Richins and Shkorupa talked of plans to make Sunseeker an integral part of the community. They expressed ideas for events like fireworks, golf tournaments and events at Kingsway Golf Club, which Allegiant has purchased. They even left the door open to once again use the shoreline in front of Sunseeker for the Freedom Swim on the Fourth of July — once construction is completed, of course.

When you go back and look at what that waterfront portion of Charlotte Harbor looked like a year ago and imagine the resort and landscaping that will rise from the bare land there now, the difference will be night and day. Add in the windfall in tax revenues and Sunseeker will be right up there with Babcock Ranch as a game-changer in Charlotte County.

Public right to know threatened in Legislature

Sometimes I wonder if the Florida Legislature lives to please the National Rifle Association.

One potential gift for the NRA and its gun toting supporters in this year's legislative session includes a little bill that would make photographs, video or audio recordings that depict the scene of a mass killing exempt from the public records law. It has sparked objections from First Amendment advocates and news organizations that have used videos and audio recordings to chronicle the response to shootings in several instances.

Of course you'll never find the NRA's fingerprints on the bill. And the NRA's lobbyist, Marion Hammer, says she didn't produce the bill and has merely put it on her "tracking list."

"We have no position on it," Hammer said in an email.

Legislators say Hammer has not contacted them, but they all know such crime scenes produce more and more support for gun control.

Sen. Tom Lee, R-Thonotosassa, who is sponsoring the Senate version along with Sen. Lauren Book, D-Plantation, said he believes the bill will be amended from its current form to improve access to information. He is working with the First Amendment Foundation to make the bill less restrictive.

"You can't trust government to police

itself," Lee added.

No murder scene is nice to see. And no reporter relishes the chance to have a look, but many of us have used crime scene photos to question whether law enforcement did its job.

Lee said Senate President Bill Galvano asked him to sponsor the bill after Galvano and others toured the scene of the Parkland school shooting last year.

Galvano said he was responding to a commission created after the Parkland school shooting that recommended limiting access to graphic videos and photos to protect the families of victims. Galvano said he has put the brakes on the bill to regroup and rethink the language in it because he wants to be sure there is adequate information available to review the acts of law enforcement and other officials.

"It's necessary oversight," Galvano added.

House sponsor James Grant, R-Tampa, said recently that the bill is needed to prevent images of violence from encouraging similar crimes and to protect the families of victims from seeing the deaths of loved ones repeatedly used on social media.

Senate Bill 186 and its companion, House Bill 7017 would make all

photos, video and audio recordings that depict the killing of a victim of mass violence exempt from public disclosure.

If the bills pass as written, Floridians would have to wage a costly court battle in order to see the kind of scene that might make a voter support gun control. And no news organization would be able to use those records to analyze what happened. The bill makes other changes which could seriously restrict access to information about the crime. A spouse or family member could request copies of photos, but if they shared them with others, they could be convicted of a felony.

We need look no further than the Parkland High School murders a year ago and the murder of 49 people at the Pulse nightclub in Orlando in 2016 to understand why such secrecy is a bad idea. Thanks should go to the Fort Lauderdale Sun Sentinel and the costly legal fight it waged to gain access to video and audio recordings during the shootings at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School. The result was a compelling analysis of an unprepared and overwhelmed school district and law enforcement community when faced with one 17-year-old shooter who had armed himself with an AR-15. The newspaper compiled its report from interviews, witness statements, police reports, body camera footage, 911 recordings and police

radio transmissions.

"Access to the records are absolutely critical to the public's understanding of what happened at Pulse and Parkland," Barbara Petersen, president of the First Amendment Foundation, said in a letter to lawmakers.

Without public access to footage and other materials, we might never have seen the sheriff's deputies hiding behind trees while children were being shot. We might not have discovered the incredibly disorganized response on a school campus where security was entrusted to unarmed coaches who were slow to respond to the threat even after one of them watched the shooter (who had previously been identified as a young man likely to shoot up the school) enter the campus carrying a canvas gun bag.

The shooter had moved across three floors of a classroom building, injuring 17 and killing 17, dropped his weapon in a stairwell and left the building to walk to a nearby Walmart before any police officers rushed into the building. Inadequate radio communications between the various police agencies seriously hampered the response, and only police officers from Coral Springs ran toward the gunfire. And it slowed the response of rescuers who were blocked from entering the building to save people who lay dying.

The school resource officer on duty that day

hid behind buildings and cautioned arriving law enforcement officers to establish a perimeter and keep away from the building where shots were being fired.

It was sheer chaos. Despite the number of school shootings and plans developed by many law enforcement agencies for dealing with a shooter on campus, most failed to react in a timely fashion, inadvertently leaving behind a textbook example of how not to react to a school shooter.

The reports also uncovered heroism on the part of a number of teachers, coaches and other staff at the school who saved many students and prevented even more death. Records reviewed by the Sun Sentinel also were able to point out situations where school officials took steps that saved lives. Some teachers covered the doors of their classrooms, moved students into areas away from the doors and locked the killer out. Other school officials sacrificed their own lives as they attempted to stop the shooter.

We know all of this because South Florida news organizations spent the time and money fighting to obtain access to the records. Those records would be sealed from public view if pending legislation is approved. The bills appear to be on a fast track. Last week, the Senate Rules Committee approved the bill and placed on the senate calendar for action

Passage could mean that no news organization or independent study could take a good look at exactly what happened to cause the mass killing or determine whether law enforcement officers and school officials did what they were supposed to do.

It would also mean that no Floridian would ever see the kind of scene that might make a voter turn against those who support the proliferation of guns like the AR-15 that has been used to massacre so many. Much of what has been disclosed by newspapers has already sparked substantial change. Gov. Ron DeSantis suspended the Broward County sheriff from office and called for the dismissal of the county school superintendent. Schools around the country have learned more about how to deal with threats of violence.

As hard as it is to view the aftermath of mass violence, we need to preserve the right to do so. You never know when it might save lives.

Marijuana move shows Tallahassee can get it right

It's too soon to say common sense is the wave of the future in the state capital; we can always hope.

Something rare happened Monday in Tallahassee. There was an outbreak of common sense when Gov. Ron DeSantis signed the repeal of Florida's ban on smokable medical marijuana.

We must note this, even though DeSantis' move wasn't a surprise. He said in January that, paraphrasing here, the ban made no sense.

Well, it didn't. DeSantis told lawmakers to repeal the ban, or he would do an end run. The governor vowed to drop the state's appeal of a court ruling that basically said the ban subverted a 2016 amendment legalizing marijuana.

Florida voters approved that amendment by a landslide 71 percent.

But old fuddy-duddy Florida lawmakers never met a voters' will they couldn't subvert. And thus a measure came through the Legislature that banned smoking the weed. Gov. Rick Scott signed it, of course.

Patients could use the drug in other forms, such as oils or candy, but inhaling the smoke was a toke too far.

This happens when self-righteous gasbags are put in charge of making laws. Medical marijuana advocates have long maintained that smoking is the best delivery system to get pain relief.

Patients with dreadful diseases like cancer, Parkinson's, ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease), and PTSD say smoking the medical weed gives them relief from pain or debilitating symptoms. The state insisted on this charade of faux morality without regard to what it meant for the people who needed help.

For the people. Hmmm. Where have I heard that phrase before?

Yeah, it's the slogan for powerhouse Orlando attorney John Morgan. He

bankrolled the successful amendment drive and continued advocating for the state's silly prohibition to be overturned.

He found an ally in DeSantis.

That may seem like an unlikely pairing, given that Morgan seriously considered running for governor as a Democrat. He also endorsed Andrew Gillum, who ran against DeSantis. But maybe not so strange.

The state should have more important things on its plate than whether a terminally ill patient gets relief from smoking marijuana or chews a piece of candy. That was real reefer madness.

embrace freedom and regulatory relief, but they're the ones who came up with the absurd ban in the first place. The temptation to meddle in how people live their lives can be overwhelming for the holier-than-thou crowd.

There are details to be worked out, of course. And this medical marijuana victory was small in the big picture, but it was important.

Are you fashion conscious? Some people always want to look their best. They want to wear the right labels and dress to impress. For the child

of God however, we need to be more concerned with how we are dressed before God. The Bible talks about being dressed in white garments as our appropriate attire.

The white garments of jubilation are referred to in Ecclesiastes 9:8: "Let your garments always be white, and let your head lack no oil."

Solomon was referring to those special times of weddings, reunions and feast days when people in his day would bring out their white clothing for that special occasion. White was the symbol of joy. Solomon is encouraging us to enjoy every occasion.

The child of God needs to be clothed in the white garments of joy. "Rejoice in the Lord always. Again I will say, rejoice!" (Phil. 4:4).

The white garments of justification are the only fitting clothing that we can wear as we stand before a Holy God. The filthy garments of our own righteousness will not suffice. We must put on the pure white garments of Christ's righteousness by believing in Him. We give Him our sins and He gives us His righteousness.

"We'll have hot dogs,

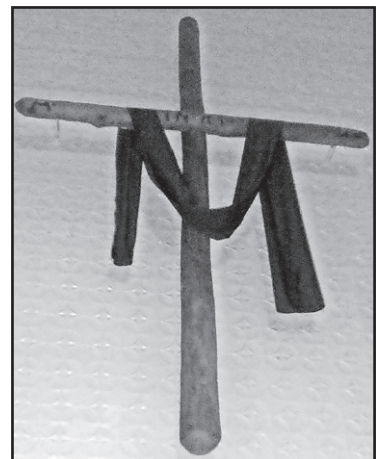

The stage is set for unprecedented major flooding this spring for most of the nation, U.S. weather officials said Thursday.

More than 200 million Americans are at risk for some kind of flooding, with 13 million of them at risk of major inundation, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration said in its spring weather outlook. About 41 million people are at risk of moderate flooding.

Major flooding now occurring in Nebraska, Iowa, South Dakota, Missouri and other Midwestern states is a preview of an all-too-wet and dangerous spring, said Mary Erickson, deputy director of the National Weather Service. "In fact, we expect the flooding to get worse and more widespread," she said.

This year's flooding "could be worse than anything we've seen in recent years, even worse than the historic floods of 1993 and 2011," she said. Those floods caused billions of dollars in damage, and officials said this

year's damage in Nebraska, Iowa and South Dakota has already passed the billion-dollar mark.

Forecasters said the biggest risks include all three Mississippi River basins, the Red River of the North, the Great Lakes, plus the basins of the eastern Missouri River, lower Ohio River, lower Cumberland River and the Tennessee River.

"This is the broadest expanse of area in the United States that we've projected with an elevated risk that I can remember," said Thomas Graziano, a 20-year weather service veteran and

director of the Office of Water Prediction. "Is this the perfect storm? I don't know."

A lot depends on how much rain falls in the next couple months, Graziano said, but

forecasters say it will be more than average.

Fentanyl-linked deaths: The opioid epidemic's third wave

BOSTON — Men are dying after opioid overdoses at nearly three times the rate of women in the United States. Overdose deaths are increasing faster among black and Latino Americans than among whites. And there's an especially steep rise in the number of young adults ages 25 to 34 whose death certificates include some version of the drug fentanyl.

These findings, published Thursday in a report by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, highlight the start of the third wave of the nation's opioid epidemic. The first was prescription pain

medications, such as OxyContin; then heroin, which replaced pills when they became too expensive; and now fentanyl.

Fentanyl is a powerful synthetic opioid that can shut down breathing in less than a minute, and its popularity in the U.S. began to surge at the end of 2013. For each of the next three years, fatal overdoses involving fentanyl doubled, "rising at an exponential rate," said Merianne Rose Spencer, a statistician at the CDC and one of the study's authors.

Spencer's research shows a 113 percent average annual increase from 2013 to 2016 (when adjusted for age). That total was first reported

SUV crashes through barrier, hits 4 kids on Florida beach

ORMOND-BY-THE-SEA (AP) — A sports utility vehicle driven by an 82-year-old man ripped through a wooden barrier separating a parking lot from the beach and hit four children in the sand, the Florida Highway Patrol reported.

The children and their parents were getting ready to leave the beach for the day Wednesday afternoon when William Johnson, of Yarmouth, Massachusetts, attempted a U-turn and drifted onto the shoulder of State Road A1A. The SUV careened through the parking lot of Al Weeks Sr. North Shore Park and onto a ramp leading to the beach before dropping 20 feet into the sand near the water's edge.

"It's unbelievable to me how this happened," Jan Youwers, a tourist from Wisconsin who was renting a kayak across the street with her husband, told The Daytona Beach News-Journal. "They were literally the only people on the beach."

Youwers said she and her husband ran to the crash. She said the mother had taken beach stuff to the family's vehicle and was on her way back when the SUV hit her children. The father was on the beach but wasn't hit.

"The parents were amazing," Youwers said. "They kept all of their children lying still and

Death toll from cyclone surpasses 500 in Africa

More torrential rains caused a dam to overflow

CHIMANIMANI, Zimbabwe — A week after Cyclone Idai lashed southern Africa, flooding still raged Thursday as torrential rains caused a dam to overflow in Zimbabwe, threatening riverside populations. The confirmed death toll in Zimbabwe, neighboring Mozambique and Malawi surpassed 500, with hundreds more feared dead in towns and villages that were completely submerged.

Aid agencies and several governments continued to step up their deployments, with helicopters in short supply for hundreds of thousands of people displaced by the cyclone.

Spokesman Herve Verhoosel of the World Food Program told reporters in Geneva of the “alarming news” that the Marowanyati dam in Zimbabwe was hit by heavy rains overnight, putting populations in the region at risk.

Zimbabwe's defense minister said more than 120 bodies had been washed into neighboring Mozambique, where residents there buried them, and more bodies were still being recovered in rivers, raising the official death toll in the country to 259.

“Most of the bodies were washed into Mozambique and

because they were in a really bad state, they could not keep the bodies,” Defense Minister Oppah Muchinguri said, speaking in the eastern city of Mutare. “So they ended up burying them.”

Meanwhile, the confirmed death toll in Mozambique rose to 217, the Portuguese news agency Lusa reported, and in Malawi, at least 56 people were killed. But that was sure to rise. Mozambican President Filipe Nyusi has estimated that 1,000 people could have been killed in his country alone. Zimbabwean officials have said some 350 people may have died in their country.

Homes, villages and entire towns were submerged across central Mozambique, where flooding created a muddy inland ocean 30 miles wide. The U.N. food aid agency said 400,000 people were displaced and “in urgent need of life-saving assistance” in Mozambique's coastal city of Beira and flooded areas along the Pungue and Buzi rivers.

The persistent rains lifted in some areas on Thursday, and floodwaters began to recede in Beira, the worst-hit city, and in the countryside, according to a Mozambican government report.

Aid groups were continuing to work non-stop to rescue families desperately clinging to tree branches and rooftops for safety from the surging waters.

It will be days before Mozambique's inundated plains drain toward the Indian Ocean and even longer before the full scale of the devastation is known.

Ferry packed with Iraqis celebrating holiday sinks; 94 die

MOSUL, Iraq — A ferry overloaded with people celebrating the Kurdish new year and Mother's Day capsized in the Tigris River near the Iraqi city of Mosul on Thursday, killing nearly 100 people, including families, officials said.

Many of the dead were women and children who could be seen struggling to swim against a strong current, their heads bobbing in the water opposite restaurants and an amusement park where people had been celebrating minutes earlier.

An Interior Ministry official said 94 people were killed in the accident, which residents said was the worst in recent memory. The official spoke on condition of anonymity in line with regulations.

Col. Hussam Khalil, head of the Civil Defense in Iraq's northern Nineveh province, told The Associated Press the accident occurred as scores of people were out in the tourist area, known as Ghabat,

celebrating Nowruz, which marks the Kurdish new year and the arrival of spring.

The boat had been ferrying people to a small island nearby. Abdulrazzaq Falihi, a rescuer with the river police of Mosul, said he pulled more than 20 bodies from the water.

“Children, women, and young, what can I tell you? It was a difficult situation,” he said.

A man who identified himself as Abdul-Jabbar al-Jbouri appealed for the police to look for his wife and children.

“My wife and three daughters are in the water!” he screamed.

Mosul was devastated by the war against the Islamic State group, which occupied the city for three years. Iraqi forces drove the militants from Mosul in 2017 after a grueling campaign that left entire neighborhoods in ruins, and residents are still struggling to rebuild.

Videos of the ferry disaster posted online showed people struggling against the strong current. Young men who had been lunching on the banks

jumped into the water with their clothes on to try and save people.

The usually tame Tigris is running high this time of year, fed by snowmelt from mountains in Turkey. The river swelled further after a rainy season that brought more precipitation than in previous years.

Falah al-Taii, director of Nineveh health department, said the number of victims that arrived at the forensic department and in the hospitals in Mosul is more than 60, the majority of them women and children.

Khalil said the ferry sank because of a technical problem, and that there weren't many boats in the area to rescue people.

Saudi Aziz, a 23-year-old Kurd, said he was on another ferry crossing the river. He said the stricken ferry was overloaded with around 150 people when it capsized. He said it wasn't long before he saw people drowning, their heads bobbing up and “sliding away across the water like plastic bags.”

Man sets fire to bus with more than 50 kids on board

ROME — The driver of a school bus in northern Italy set fire to the vehicle on Wednesday, but the 51 pupils on board escaped with no serious injuries.

The man, a 47-year-old Italian of Senegalese origin, wanted “to punish Europe for policies, unacceptable in his view, against migrants,” Milan anti-terrorism prosecutor Alberto Nobili said.

The suspect, who recorded a YouTube video announcing his attack, faces charges of kidnapping and attempted mass murder, with terrorism as an aggravating circumstance.

Nobili, whose comments were carried by the ANSA

news agency, described the driver as a “lone wolf” with no links to Islamic State or other Islamist groups.

The episode that “sparked” the attack was a stand-off between migrant rescue vessel Mare Jonio and Interior Minister Matteo Salvini, ANSA reported the driver as telling Nobili and prosecutor Luca Poniz.

Events, involving children aged around 12 and three adult minders, unfolded on a suburban highway on the southeastern outskirts of Milan.

“We were all very scared,” one boy, interviewed anonymously by La Repubblica newspaper, said. “He tied us all up and seized all mobile phones so that we could not

call the police.”

However, one mobile fell on the floor. The boy, deemed a “hero” by La Repubblica, used it to call the police after managing to untie his hands.

A police chase ensued, at the end of which the bus crashed. Officers forced open the back door and helped students off the bus, while the driver threatened suicide.

He was arrested after setting fire to the bus, which he had previously doused with petrol.

“He wanted revenge for his daughters” who died at sea while trying to reach Italy, said another boy from the bus, according to a video posted by Agenzia Vista.

“He wanted revenge for his three daughters and to kill us,” he said.

Andrew Gillum's new mission: Register 1M new voters for 2020

MIAMI GARDENS — Andrew Gillum, the Democrat who narrowly lost his bid for Florida governor last year, said Wednesday he's getting back in the political arena for 2020.

His mission: Lead an effort to register and engage 1 million new Florida voters. His objective: Help the eventual Democratic nominee evict President Donald Trump from the White House.

“It is so consequential that we get this thing right,” Gillum said at a kickoff rally for the effort at Florida Memorial University in Miami Gardens. “It is consequential not only for the state of Florida, but for the United States of America

that Florida deliver like we never have delivered before.”

Gillum acknowledged that the effort might not be as fun as running for president — which he isn't doing — or getting involved as a campaign volunteer. He sought to motivate interest in the effort by repeatedly invoking Trump.

“What is happening in Washington, D.C., is not normal. There is nothing normal about what we see happening in the White House. He ain't normal. There's a lot about him that ain't normal,” he said.

If Democrats can complete their mission, Gillum said “we can deny Donald Trump a second term right here in the state of Florida.” Florida awards 29 electoral votes, more than 10 percent of the total

needed to win the presidency. The message Gillum wants Florida to send is, “Sir, your eviction notice is served and you are out of the White House.”

Gillum's effort involves a new organization, Bring It Forward, which was his 2018 slogan. It will also involve Gillum's political committee, Forward Florida, which has about \$3.9 million.

Also on Wednesday, the Florida Democratic Party announced its own \$2 million effort to register 200,000 voters before the 2020 presidential. There is some overlap between the two efforts, said Terrie Rizzo, chairwoman of the Florida Democratic Party.

“This investment is monumental for the party and is about creating the electorate we want, not the one we have been

told we have,” Rizzo said in a written statement.

“The Florida Democratic Party has not dedicated enough resources to voter registration in recent years, and we are making it a top priority ahead of 2020.”

The party said the effort would involve technology and data, hiring “dozens” of full-time field organizers across the state, and investing in county Democratic Party organizations.

Gillum said some of the new registrations would come from felons who have finished serving their sentences, who now can register to vote because of an amendment voters added to the state Constitution last year.

He criticized Republican efforts to scale back the impact of the amendment. “I want us to be able to

send an unapologetic message to the Legislature to get their hands off Amendment 4,” he said. “It is the law of the land. It is enshrined in the Florida Constitution.”

To many Democrats, Gillum, 39, emerged from the 2018 loss as a superstar. He's no longer mayor of Tallahassee, but has a gig as a CNN political analyst, helping him stay in the public eye.

His advance publicity on social media for Wednesday's event ignited a flurry of hope among fans — and scorn among some critics — that the former Tallahassee mayor might announce his own presidential candidacy, something that didn't happen.

Several Broward activists who attended the event said they'd like to see

Gillum run for president — someday.

Gloria Pierce of Pembroke Pines is a big fan. “I love — love — Andrew Gillum,” she said, adding she's glad he's waiting because she doesn't think the time is right in 2020.

Losing a high-profile election isn't necessarily career-ending. Beto O'Rourke, who lost the U.S. Senate race in Texas last year, is running for president, and Stacey Abrams, who lost a race for governor of Georgia, is contemplating a candidacy.

Appearing Friday on HBO's “Real Time with Bill Maher,” Gillum noted a precedent set by the nation's 16th president. Abraham Lincoln “lost, went on to become president.”

Prosecutors clear dead serial rapist of 1983 murder

FORT LAUDERDALE (AP) — Florida prosecutors want a deceased serial rapist cleared of a 1983 murder, saying DNA evidence shows the killer was actually a man executed for a similar murder.

Broward County prosecutors asked a judge Thursday to dismiss Ronald Stewart's 1985 conviction for the murder of a 20-year-old Regina Harrison. They say the real killer was Jack Jones, who was executed in 2017 for a 1995 Arkansas murder. Jones also pleaded guilty to a 1991 Fort Lauderdale murder. Stewart was arrested in 1983 for serial rapes in the Fort Lauderdale area. He pleaded guilty to three and no contest

to second-degree murder for Harrison's slaying and sentenced to 50 years. He died in prison in 2008. Prosecutors say Stewart's serial rape convictions and the evidence behind them stand.

Woman charged with manslaughter in boy's hot-vehicle death

ORLANDO (AP) — Authorities say a Florida woman has been charged in the death of a 4-year-old boy who was left in a hot minivan for more than six hours.

The Orlando Sentinel reports 27-year-old Mariah Butler was arrested Tuesday and charged with aggravated manslaughter and child neglect.

The Orange County Sheriff's Office says Logan Starling was one of five children that Butler brought to the Elite Preparatory

Academy, where she worked as an administrative assistant, in September. Investigators say Butler didn't realize she left Logan in her vehicle until the boy's teacher asked about him that afternoon.

The school's director ran out to the minivan, found Logan and rushed the child across the street to a fire station. Logan was later pronounced dead.

Rescuers helping turtle find raccoon stuck off coast

SARASOTA (AP) — A seafaring raccoon has been plucked off the Florida coast and safely released on dry land.

News outlets report Mote Marine Laboratory and Aquarium workers were helping an injured turtle in Sarasota

waters Wednesday when they spotted the normally land-based bandit parked atop a channel marker. Area police departments and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission were called in to assist the raccoon, which initially fled rescuers by diving overboard.

A video posted online by Sarasota police shows the swimming raccoon darting around rescuers before returning to the boat, where it was placed in a cooler and returned to shore.

It's unclear how the raccoon managed to get to the channel marker.

Squabble over airport's name heads to court

ORLANDO (AP) — Apparently, this region ain't big

enough for two airports with the name “Orlando.”

The authority that governs Orlando International Airport has sued the authority for the much smaller Orlando Melbourne International Airport on Florida's Space Coast, claiming its name is misleading passengers into believing they're going to the theme park mecca instead of the coast.

The lawsuit filed this week in federal court asks that the airport in Melbourne stop using the word “Orlando” in its name.

The Melbourne airport is located about 70 miles southeast of the Orlando airport, which was the nation's 11th busiest in 2017.

Melbourne airport officials have said in the past both airports compete for the same market share.

Florida man pleads guilty to mailing bombs to Trump foes

Bombs were sent in September but none detonated

NEW YORK — A Florida man pleaded guilty Thursday to sending pipe bombs to CNN and prominent critics of President Donald Trump in a wave of attacks that harmed no one but spread fear of political violence across the U.S. for days leading up to last fall's midterm elections.

Cesar Sayoc, 57, sobbed as he entered the plea before a federal judge in New York.

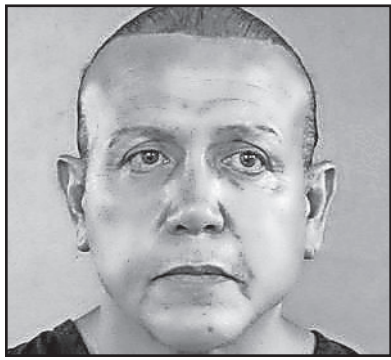
"I'm extremely sorry," he said, adding that he never intended for the devices to explode.

He could get life in prison at sentencing Sept. 12 on 65 counts, including using weapons of mass destruction and mailing explosives with intent to kill. In exchange for his guilty plea, prosecutors dropped a charge that carried a mandatory life sentence.

Sayoc sent rudimentary bombs — none of which detonated — to 16 targets, including Bill and Hillary Clinton, former Vice President Joe Biden, several members of Congress, former President Barack Obama and actor Robert De Niro. Devices were also mailed to CNN offices in New York and Atlanta.

The bombs began turning up weeks before the hotly contested midterms, contributing to an already tense political environment.

Sayoc was arrested in late October at a Florida auto parts store. He had been living in a van plastered with Trump stickers and images of Trump opponents with crosshairs over their faces.

On Thursday, he told the judge he made objects designed to look like pipe bombs and filled them with explosive powder from fireworks.

"Did you intend they would explode?" U.S. District Judge Jed Rakoff asked.

"No, sir," Sayoc said.

"What would prevent powder from fireworks from exploding?" Rakoff asked.

"I was aware of the risk they would explode," Sayoc said.

The first of the bombs was discovered Oct. 22 in a mailbox at an estate in New York City's northern suburbs owned by the billionaire George Soros, a liberal political activist.

A device addressed to the Clintons was discovered the following day, followed a day later by a slew of bombs found at the homes or offices of prominent Democrats. One, addressed to former CIA director John Brennan, was sent to CNN in New York.

Over several days, investigators tracked the packages to a mail center in Florida. Prosecutors said the evidence against Sayoc included DNA that linked him to 10 of the devices and fingerprints on two of them.

Boeing to make safety feature standard on troubled Max jets

Sensor that may help prevent plane from stalling could be cause of at least one Boeing crash

Boeing will make standard on its troubled new airliner a safety feature that might have helped the crew of a jet that crashed shortly after takeoff last year in Indonesia, killing everyone on board.

The equipment, which had been offered as an option, alerts pilots of faulty information from key sensors. It will now be included on every 737 Max as part of changes that Boeing is rushing to complete on the jets by early next week, according to a person familiar with the changes.

The person spoke on condition of anonymity because Boeing and federal regulators are still discussing details of the upgrade to the Max fleet, which was grounded worldwide after a second deadly crash this month in Ethiopia.

The cause of the accidents has not been determined, but investigators probing the crash of a Lion Air Max jet have focused on an automated system designed to use information from two sensors to help prevent a dangerous aerodynamic stall.

The sensors measure whether the plane is pointed up, down or level in relation to the direction of onrushing air. Software on the Max can push the plane's nose down if data from one of the sensors indicates the plane is tilted up so sharply that it could stall and fall from the sky.

In the Lion Air case, the sensors malfunctioned and gave wildly conflicting information, and the plane crashed minutes after takeoff. A preliminary report described a grim fight by the pilots to control the plane as it pitched downward more than two dozen times.

It is not known whether the same flight-control system played a role in the March 10 crash of the Ethiopian Airlines jet shortly after takeoff from Addis Ababa, but regulators say both planes had similar erratic flight paths, an important part of their decision to ground the roughly 370 Max planes around the world.

The CEO of Ethiopian Airlines said Thursday that the carrier's pilots went through all the extra training required by Boeing and the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration to fly the 737 Max 8 jet that crashed, killing 157 people from 35 countries.

Tewolde Gebremariam said the training was meant to help crews shift from an older model of the 737 to the Max 8, which entered

airline service in 2017. In a statement, he said pilots were also made aware of an emergency directive issued by the FAA after the Lion Air crash, which killed 189 people.

The New York Times reported that the pilots of the Ethiopian plane never trained in a simulator for the plane. Gebremariam said that the 737 Max simulator is not designed to imitate problems in the new jet's flight-control software. He declined to say whether the pilots had trained on the simulator.

The Ethiopian jetliner was on a regularly scheduled flight from Ethiopia to neighboring Kenya.

In an emotional gathering Thursday in the Kenyan capital of Nairobi, the victims' relatives asked for lawyers to help them pursue their case.

The government will assist in obtaining death certificates for the victims, he said.

Officials have delivered bags of scorched earth from the crash site to family members of the victims because of the problems identifying the remains.

Facebook left millions of passwords readable by employees

SAN FRANCISCO — Facebook left millions of user passwords readable by its employees for years, the company acknowledged Thursday after a security researcher exposed the lapse.

By storing passwords in readable plain text, Facebook violated fundamental computer-security practices. Those call for organizations and websites to save passwords in a scrambled form that makes it almost impossible to recover the original text.

"There is no valid reason why anyone in an organization, especially the size of Facebook, needs to have access to users' passwords in plain text," said cybersecurity expert Andrei Barysevich of Recorded Future.

Facebook said there is no evidence its employees abused access to this data. But thousands of employees could have searched them. The company said the passwords were stored on internal company servers, where no outsiders could access them.

The incident reveals yet another huge and basic oversight at a company that insists it is a responsible guardian for the personal data of its 2.2 billion users worldwide.

The security blog KrebsOnSecurity said Facebook may have left the passwords of some 600 million Facebook users vulnerable. In a blog post, Facebook said it will likely notify "hundreds of millions" of Facebook Lite users, millions of Facebook users and tens of thousands of Instagram users that their passwords were stored in plain text.

Facebook Lite is a version

designed for people with older phones or low-speed internet connections. It is used primarily in developing countries.

Last week, Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg touted a new "privacy-focused vision" for the social network that would emphasize private communication over public sharing. The company wants to encourage small groups of people to carry on encrypted conversations that neither Facebook nor any other outsider can read.

The fact that the company couldn't manage to do something as simple as encrypting passwords, however, raises questions about its ability to manage more complex encryption issues — such in messaging — flawlessly.

Facebook said it discovered the problem in January. But security researcher Brian Krebs wrote that in some cases the passwords had been stored in plain text since 2012. Facebook Lite launched in 2015 and Facebook bought Instagram in 2012.

Recorded Future's Barysevich said he could not recall any major company caught leaving so many passwords exposed internally. He said he's seen a number of instances where much smaller organizations made such information readily available — not just to programmers but also to customer support teams.

Security analyst Troy Hunt, who runs the "haveibeenpwned.com" data breach website, said that the situation is embarrassing for Facebook, but that there's no serious, practical impact unless an adversary gained access to the passwords. But Facebook has had major breaches, most recently in September when attackers accessed some 29 million accounts.

'Snakes ... why'd it have to be snakes?'

Dozens of rattlesnakes removed under Texas home

ALBANY, Texas (AP) — A Texas homeowner who reported seeing "a few" snakes under his home actually had dozens of rattlesnakes living beneath his house.

Big Country Snake Removal, which was called in to help, said the homeowner crawled underneath his home after strong winds disrupted his cable television service. He saw a few snakes, quickly crawled out and contacted the snake removal company.

Workers later pulled 45 rattlesnakes from underneath the home near Albany, about 150 miles west of Dallas, according to the company's Facebook page. Video shows numerous large snakes coiled up as workers use long poles to pull the animals out.

Snakes will begin slithering out from underneath Texas homes as the weather warms up, increasing the risk of snakebites, said Nathan Hawkins, the owner of Big Country Snake Removal.

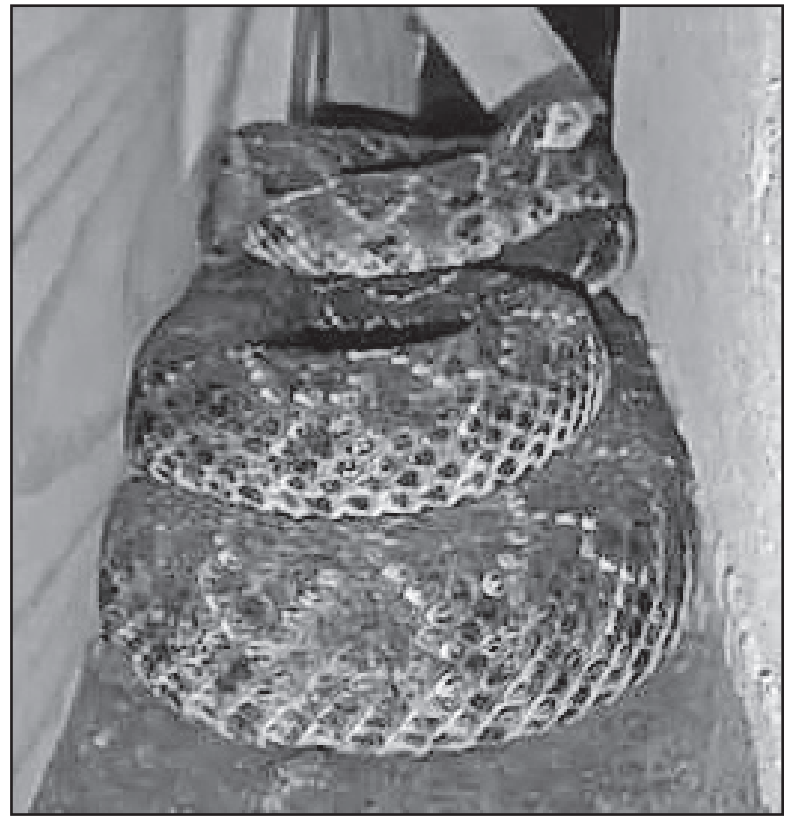

"They'll start emerging, and then what they're going to do is they're going to start trying to find food. And then they're going to start breeding," Hawkins said.

Hawkins told Abilene TV station KTXS that his company removes about 2,000 snakes per year.

State wildlife officials say that about 7,000 people are bitten by venomous snakes each year in the United States but very few bites are fatal. Officials say that on average, one to two people die in Texas each year from a venomous snake bite.

S&P 500 ends 2-day losing streak as tech leads stocks higher

Technology companies powered a broad rally for U.S. stocks Thursday, snapping the market's two-day losing streak.

Apple and chipmakers led the wave of buying, helping to drive the technology sector to an overall gain of 2.5 percent. The sector is up 21.1 percent this year so far, well ahead of the S&P 500's 10 other sectors.

Retailers and industrial companies also notched solid gains, which easily offset losses in stocks.

Levi Strauss soared as the storied jeans maker went public for the second time.

The latest gains erased the market's modest losses from a day earlier, when the Federal Reserve said it expected the U.S. economy to slow down and that it no longer expected to raise interest rates this year.

While investors appeared to be circumspect about the central bank's economic outlook, any concerns seemed to take a backseat Thursday to the likelihood that the Fed will hold off on raising interest rates. "Overall, stocks are rallying

because interest rates have gone down and we know that the Fed is going to continue to be the market's friend," said Karyn Cavanaugh, senior markets strategist at Voya Investment Management. "There's absolutely no reason not to be in stocks when you have an incredibly dovish Fed that is going to support asset prices."

The S&P 500 index rose 30.65 points, or 1.1 percent, to 2,854.88. The Dow Jones Industrial Average gained 216.84 points, or 0.8 percent, to 25,962.51

Not everyone with an inactive vaccine needs vaccination

DEAR DR. ROACH: In a recent column on the measles vaccine, you wrote: "Older people may lose immunity, and some people born between 1963 and 1967 may have received an inactive vaccine." Wait, what?! How do we know if we were not properly vaccinated, and what should we do about it? — L.T.

ANSWER: There were two types of measles vaccines available between 1963 and 1967. One type was a live, attenuated vaccine, and there were three strains given: the Schwarz, Edmonston B and Moraten strains. If given on or after the 1st birthday, these strains continue to provide lifelong immunity.

A second, killed vaccine was available only during those years, and was frequently given as a series of two or three injections. People who received the killed vaccine are at risk for developing a condition called atypical measles if they are exposed to a person with measles.

If you have your original vaccination record, it should say what

type of vaccine you received. If it doesn't, or if you received killed vaccine, you should consider yourself inadequately vaccinated. High antibody titers by blood testing is not sufficient.

Not everybody who is inadequately vaccinated needs to run out and get the vaccine. However, people planning international travel or people who are in an area of the United States with measles outbreaks and at high risk for exposure should be revaccinated with two doses of MMR vaccine (there is no single-dose measles vaccine).

DEAR DR. ROACH: Your recent article was pro-vaccination. I also have been pro-vaccination until recently, when my daughter brought to my attention that the vast majority of vaccines are made with aborted fetal tissue. I checked and found this to be the truth. I am appalled that this fact is not publicized and that I have had vaccines made with aborted fetal tissue. That I have unintentionally participated in the murder of innocent children through vaccination is a betrayal of my trust in the medical profession and my personal faith. You may find that this is the major reason for the decline in vaccination rates. There should be an informed consent before any vaccination occurs with the option of being vaccinated with a serum that is not contaminated with fetal tissue. — J.G.

ANSWER: In July 1962, a pregnant woman was exposed to rubella, and underwent a therapeutic abortion given the high likelihood of severe fetal damage. The cells from this fetus were used, and

continue to be used, to produce the rubella vaccine, which requires a cell line. From this one fetus, over 300 million doses of rubella vaccine have been produced. It is certainly not the case that production of the vaccine requires any additional abortions, nor has there ever been fetal tissue in any vaccine, as vaccines are purified extensively.

The National Catholic Bioethics Center wrote an opinion, which states:

"One is morally free to use the vaccine regardless of its historical association with abortion. The reason is that the risk to public health, if one chooses not to vaccinate, outweighs the legitimate concern about the origins of the vaccine. This is especially important for parents, who have a moral obligation to protect the life and health of their children and those around them."

From one family's tragedy came cells that have prevented 11 million deaths and 4.5 billion cases of disease. It is my position that using the vaccine honors that loss.

Dad allows his daughter's lice infestation to linger

DEAR ABBY: I take care of two girls. I have never asked for money from their dad. Because they are poor, I go to great lengths to make sure they get the same advantages as everyone else.

I took the girls to the hair salon because I wanted them to feel pretty. When it was the youngest girl's turn, the stylist found lice in her hair! She was at what they call an "infestation period." After that it's an infection and then baldness.

I went to their father and asked about the lice. He knew the entire time that she had lice and did not warn me or my family. Abby, he knowingly put my loved ones at risk! I know he doesn't care about the lice, so he's probably making her go to school despite the lice policy. What should I do? — Infested In California

DEAR INFESTED: Father of the year this man isn't.

Of course he should have warned you so you could caution your children. He should also be watching his children more closely to be sure they shower regularly. Keep an eye on him, because he may be neglecting his girls in other

ways. Could he be unaware that a head lice infestation can be treated?

Because you are concerned about the girls' welfare, perhaps the school should be alerted.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, as many as 12 million lice infestations occur in the United States each year, and they are NOT caused by poor hygiene. While they may be inconvenient and cause severe itching, the condition is treatable, and they do not generally cause baldness.

According to kidshealth.org, head lice are "spread mainly through head-to-head contact, but sharing clothing, bed linens, combs, brushes and hats also can pass them along. Kids are most prone to catching lice because they tend to have close physical contact with each other and share personal items."

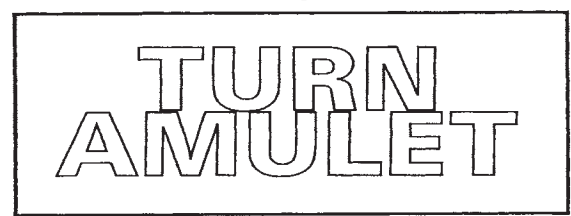

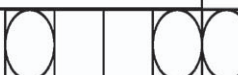

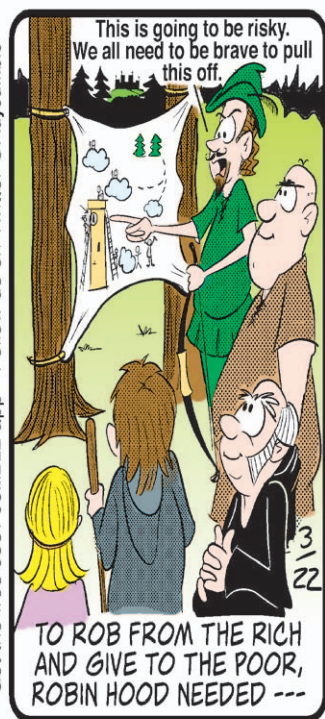

The contract of one no trump can be a difficult one to play. The opponents have roughly the same values as you do, sometimes more, and they have the advantage of the opening lead.

East won the opening diamond lead with his 10, cashed the king of diamonds, and shifted to the six of spades. Declarer played low from his hand and lost to West's jack. West

cached the queen of diamonds and led a diamond to East's ace. South discarded a heart from dummy and one heart and one club from his hand.

East shifted to the queen of hearts. South won this with his king and did well to play a heart to dummy's ace, dropping the jack from East. East had shown up with 10 points and had passed as dealer, meaning that he couldn't hold either black king. A spade to the ace brought more good news when the king fell from West. Declarer knew that West had started with two spades, four hearts, and four diamonds. That left him with three clubs, presumably to the king. South led a low spade to dummy's 10, forcing West to shed a heart. The queen of spades was now good, but there was no entry to it.

Declarer cashed dummy's 10 of hearts and discarded the queen of spades, leaving a three-card ending with only clubs in the North, South, and West hands. A low club to declarer's 10 lost to West's jack, but West was forced to lead a club from the king and declarer had his contract. Phew!

in late 2018, but Spencer looked deeper with this report into the demographic characteristics of those people dying from fentanyl overdoses.

Increased trafficking of the drug and increased use are both fueling the spike in fentanyl deaths. For drug dealers, fentanyl is easier to produce than some other opioids. Unlike the poppies needed for heroin, which can be spoiled by weather or a bad harvest, fentanyl's ingredients are easily supplied; it's a synthetic combination of chemicals, often produced in China and packaged in Mexico, according to the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration. And because fentanyl can be 50 times more powerful than heroin, smaller amounts translate to bigger profits.

Jon DeLena, assistant special agent in charge of the DEA's New England Field Division, said 1 kilogram of fentanyl, driven across the southern U.S. border, can be mixed with fillers or other drugs to create 6 or 8 kilograms for sale.

For drug users, fentanyl is more likely to cause an overdose than heroin because it is so potent and because the high fades more quickly than with heroin. Drug users say they inject more frequently with fentanyl because the high doesn't last as long — and more frequent injecting adds to the risk of overdose.

There are several ways fentanyl can wind up in a dose of some other drug. The mixing may be intentional, as a person seeks a more intense or different kind of high. It may happen as an accidental contamination, as dealers package their fentanyl and other drugs in the same place.

Or dealers may be adding fentanyl to cocaine and meth on purpose, in an effort to expand their clientele of users hooked on fentanyl.

marks measured in 30 places in Nebraska, Iowa and South Dakota, Kansas City forecaster Kevin Lao said.

The river "remains vulnerable to moderate flooding for the remainder of the spring and early summer," Lao said. "People should be prepared for major flooding along the Missouri River ... going into the future."

Most of Nebraska, except right along the Missouri River, is unlikely to see major flooding

again this year, but the rest of the flooded area is still prone to more, Low said.

Several factors will likely combine to create a pulse of flooding that will eventually head south along the Mississippi: above average rainfall this winter — including 10 to 15 inches earlier this year in a drenching along the Ohio and Tennessee Valleys; the third wettest year in U.S. history; and rapidly melting snow in the Upper Midwest.

Extra rain will bring more farm runoff down the Mississippi, which will likely lead to more oxygen-starved areas in the Gulf

of Mexico and likely make the summer dead zone larger than normal, said Edward Clark, director of NOAA's National Water Center in Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

It's too early for scientists to make the complex calculations to see if human-caused climate change played a role in the flooding. However, scientists said the conditions are consistent with what they expect from global warming.

"You can think of climate change as steroids for these rain events," said Texas A&M University climate scientist Andrew Dessler.

Orlando and Parkland, Florida.

Unlike with the decade-long assault weapons ban, the government isn't allowing existing owners to keep their bump stocks. They must be destroyed or turned over to authorities. And the government isn't offering any compensation for the devices, which can cost hundreds of dollars. Violators can face up to 10 years in prison and thousands of dollars in fines.

Lunsford bought three bump stocks over the years and wanted to recoup at least some of the money he shelled out, but it bothers him that he and others have been put in this position.

"I've never committed a crime with it, and just because of that one killer up in Las Vegas that used one that killed a bunch of people, they're going to make people pay for it," he said.

But Shannon Watts, the

founder of Moms Demand Action, said: "It was because of bump stocks that the gunman in Las Vegas was able to kill 58 people from a hotel window. ... It just goes to show the incredible lethality and dangers of these accessories."

The prohibition goes into effect less than two weeks after the mosque shootings in New Zealand that left 50 people dead. New Zealand's prime minister reacted swiftly to the bloodshed by announcing on Thursday a ban on military-style semi-automatic firearms and high-capacity magazines.

The U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives first ruled that bump stocks were legal in 2010, and since then, the government estimates more than 500,000 have been sold.

They were originally created to make it easier for people with disabilities to fire a gun. The device essentially replaces the gun's stock and pistol grip and causes the weapon to buck back

and forth, repeatedly "bumping" the trigger against the shooter's finger.

Technically, that means the finger is pulling the trigger with each round fired, a distinction that led the ATF to allow the devices.

They were considered by most gun owners to be a novelty and weren't widely known until a gunman attached bump stocks to several of the AR-type rifles he used to rain bullets on concertgoers outside his high-rise Las Vegas hotel room.

The attachments were swiftly condemned by even ardent gun supporters, including President Donald Trump, who directed the Justice Department to rewrite the regulations to ban them. The impending ban was announced in mid-December.

Owners are being advised to either destroy them by crushing, melting or cutting them up or set up an appointment with the ATF to hand the devices over.

A week before the ban was set

to take effect, bump stocks were being sold on websites and by at least one company that took over the inventory of Slide Fire, the Texas manufacturer that was the leading maker and has since shut down.

Ryan Liskey, of Virginia's Shenandoah Valley, said he isn't sure what to do with his bump stock. He said he got the device as a lark after trying it on the range with some friends.

Starting next week, a person in possession of a bump stock can face federal charges of illegally possessing a machine gun.

The rule was met almost immediately with resistance from gun rights advocates. A federal judge in Utah refused to block it last week, and in February, a judge in Washington said the Trump administration can move forward with it, saying it was reasonable for the ATF to determine a bump stock performs the same function as a machine gun. An appeals court is set to hear arguments in the case on Friday.

comes the day after the government announced a ban on "military-style" semi-automatic firearms and high-capacity magazines like the weapons that were used in last Friday's attacks.

An immediate sales ban went into effect to prevent stockpiling, and new laws would be rushed through Parliament that would impose a complete ban on the weapons, Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern said.

"Every semi-automatic weapon used in the terrorist attack on Friday will be

banned," Ardern said.

The prohibition includes semi-automatic guns or shotguns that can be used with a detachable magazine that holds more than five rounds. It also applies to accessories used to convert guns into what the government called "military-style" weapons.

The ban does not apply to guns commonly used by farmers and hunters, including semi-automatic .22 caliber or smaller guns that hold up to 10 rounds, or semi-automatic and pump-action shotguns with non-detachable magazines that hold up to five rounds.

The legislation is supported not only by Ardern's

liberal Labour Party but also the conservative opposition National Party, so passage of the legislation is expected. New Zealand does not have a constitutional right to bear arms.

The announcement brought immediate comparisons to the United States, where contentious debate over gun control remains unresolved after frequent mass killings.

Firearms experts said the ban in New Zealand has wide support.

Polly Collins of Christchurch was thrilled to hear of Ardern's announcement as she visited a memorial to the victims.

"The prime minister is amazing," she said. "It's

not like in America, where they have all these things and then they go 'Oh yeah, we'll deal with the gun laws,' and nothing's done."

One of New Zealand's largest gun retailers, Hunting & Fishing New Zealand, said it supports "any government measure to permanently ban such weapons."

"What (Ardern's) done is a very brave move, and it's the kind of move that can only be done in a common-law country where guns are not a right," said Alexander Gillespie, a professor of international law at Waikato University. "Guns are a real privilege. If there was a legal right like there is in the United

States, this would be much more difficult."

There are nearly 250,000 licensed gun owners in New Zealand, which has a population of 5 million. Officials estimate there are 1.5 million guns in the country.

She said there will be "tightly regulated" exemptions for some owners such as hunters and farmers. The government said the police and military would be exempt. Access for international shooting competitions would also be considered.

Ardern's announcement came as authorities said all 50 bodies from the attacks were formally identified.

Trump says it's time for US to recognize Israel's sovereignty over Golan Heights

JERUSALEM — President Donald Trump announced Thursday that the United States will recognize Israeli sovereignty over the Golan Heights, a fertile expanse of land Israel seized from Syria decades ago, handing the government of Benjamin Netanyahu another prize and angering the international community.

In a tweet that reverses long-standing U.S. policy, Trump said it was "time" to recognize full Israeli control over the disputed swath of land, an estimated 700 square miles that extends from eastern Israel near the Sea of Galilee to the border with Syria.

"After 52 years it is time for the United States to fully recognize Israel's Sovereignty over the Golan Heights, which is of critical strategic and security importance to the State of Israel and Regional Stability!" Trump tweeted.

In Jerusalem, Netanyahu beamed as he stood next to U.S. Secretary of State Michael R. Pompeo shortly after Trump made his announcement.

Israel maintains — and the Trump administration agrees — that inroads in Syria made by Iran through its proxy, the Lebanon-based militant group Hezbollah, were moving military threats closer to Israel in the Golan region. Netanyahu said Iran was trying to destroy Israel and the Jewish people.

The driver suddenly busted a move before being busted.

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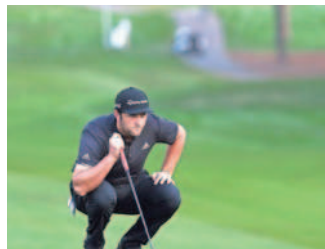

Kabengele, Mann lead 4th-seed FSU over Vermont

Seminoles pull away from tight game, face dangerous No. 12 Murray State next

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Florida State got a first-round scare from sharp-shooting Vermont.

In the end, the Seminoles were just too long and too strong for the upset-minded Catamounts.

Mfiondu Kabengele had 21 points and 10 rebounds, and Florida State withstood a barrage of 3-pointers from 13th-seeded Vermont in a 76-69 victory Thursday in the opening round of the NCAA West Regional.

Terance Mann added 19 points for the fourth-seeded Seminoles (28-7), who were tied with the Catamounts at halftime but pulled away late.

“I thought we exercised physicality, the quality

of our depth, our athleticism and strength in the second half, getting the ball to Mfiondu,” said FSU coach Leonard Hamilton. “I thought he was a little bit bigger, stronger and taller.”

Anthony Lamb had 16 points to lead a balanced, long-range attack for Vermont (27-7), which lost for the first time in seven games. Three Catamounts — Stef Smith, Ernie Duncan and Ben Shungu — each finished with 15 points.

The America East champs went small — no starter stood over 6-foot-6 — and stayed close by hitting 16 of 32 3-point attempts. The Seminoles countered by wearing out Vermont down low, outscoring the Catamounts

30-14 in the paint.

A dunk by Kabengele gave Florida State a 50-45 lead with nine minutes left, part of a 6-0 run that put the Seminoles ahead for good. Another by the 6-10 sophomore made it 61-53, and the cheers of Vermont fans, who made the four-hour drive south from Burlington, gave way to the tomahawk chop from behind Florida State's bench.

Florida State led by 12 with a minute left and withstood a late run by Vermont. FSU will face No. 12 Murray State next.

Rays settle up with Snell on \$50 million deal

Five-year contract puts ends to distraction

PORT CHARLOTTE — The Rays have signed Cy Young award winner Blake Snell to a five-year, \$50-million deal that could keep him with the team through 2023.

The contract covers this season, Snell's three years of arbitration eligibility and his first year of free agency, which is significant.

There are \$2 million in escalator clauses that could raise the total value, though no options. The Rays said it is the largest contract given to a pitcher before reaching arbitration.

“Since being drafted in 2011, Blake's talent and hard work have enabled him to establish himself as one of the most dominant pitchers in the game,” said Rays principal owner Stuart Sternberg said in a statement. “We're looking forward to seeing him take the mound for the Rays for years to come.”

The agreement was somewhat unexpected given that Snell said recently he planned to go to arbitration after past discussions on a long-term deal failed to produce an agreement, and further when the team opted to stick with its salary structure and give him just a \$15,500 raise for winning the award, to \$573,700, for this season.

Under the new contract, Snell gets a \$3 million signing bonus and salaries of \$1 million this season, then \$7 million in 2020, \$10.5M in 2021, \$12.5M in 2022 and \$16M in 2023, with the opportunity to increase that by up to \$2M based on top 3 Cy Young award finishes.

The Snell agreement comes a day after the Rays signed infielder/outfielder Brandon Lowe to a deal that guarantees him \$24 million over six years and could be worth up to \$49 million over eight.

Tyler Amaral, Forward, Charlotte

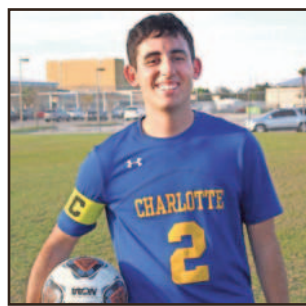

impact and provided a spark mid-season."

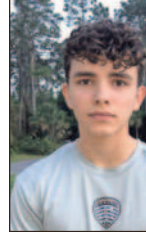
Jonathan Villarreal, Defender/Midfielder, Charlotte

Jeremiah Bohdanets, Forward, North Port

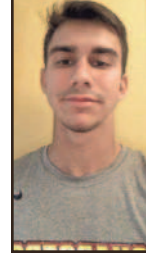

many off the field obligations and holds a 4.8 weighted GPA."

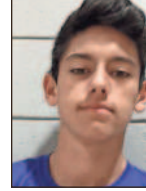
Andrew Syzonenko, Defender, North Port

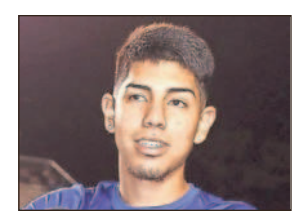
Connor Anderson, Midfielder, Venice

Following up Brandon Lowe, Rays prospect Nate Lowe — who will begin the season in the minor leagues — also crushed a three-run homer as Tampa Bay took a 6-1 lead in the first.

While Snell's extension and both of the Lowes' blasts stole the show on Thursday, the pitching debut of Brendan McKay was another reason for optimism among Rays fans.

Though the 2017 first-round pick is just 23-years-old and was facing big-league hitters for the first time, McKay had little trouble in his two innings of work.

Aside from a first-pitch

fastball that Braves third baseman Austin Riley smoked for a solo home run in the first inning, McKay was otherwise in control on the mound — throwing 17 of his 28 pitches for strikes.

"He was very poised, very polished. Being only a year and some change out of college, I think the upside is extremely

high with him." One day, McKay could be the next former first-round pick to sign a long-term extension with the Rays. But for now, he's simply happy that he got to put on a big league uniform and face off against hitters at the highest level of pro baseball.

"Yeah, I was getting excited, but I wasn't trying to overplay what it is," McKay said of learning about his Thursday start.

"I told my parents and they came down this week so they got to see me. I let me family members know so they can follow along. It's a great experience."

Duffy returns to the lineup

Absent for the majority of spring training due to a nagging hamstring injury, Rays infielder

Matt Duffy batted leadoff and played third base on Thursday.

just trying to get the best out of me every game"

His fire and sometimes freakish quickness and athleticism made him a hard player to defend. A 20-goal season earned him the title of the Sun's Boys Soccer Player of the year. "You've got to respect him," North Port coach Joey Sorbino said. "Whether they mark him with three guys or one guy or if he's running free, you know he's gonna make a difference in the game regardless and that's a special player."

Sorbino has known Arango and most of the North Port players for some time. A former player with the Bobcats, he's been involved with the program and club teams in the area as Arango has come up.

But when tryouts came ahead of Arango's senior year,

Sorbino saw a different mentality in his striker — a desire to make the leap from good to great.

"He came up to me at tryouts and said, 'This is my year,'" Sorbino said. "They can talk all they want, but I wanted them to know that nothing is gonna come of it until they back it up on the field. From Day 1, he understood that he had to prove himself first and he did that and he led them. He needs to feed himself with the highest opposition possible, and he does that."

Despite playing a big role, passion and heart only go so far in the world of sports. So what makes Arango so difficult to game plan for?

Well, he's lightning fast, quite agile with the ball and possesses a strong soccer IQ.

Port Charlotte goalkeeper Hunter Cole has been in first hand over the past few years. The two played on the same team back in middle school.

Now in high school, Cole had the challenge of lining up across from him.

"He knows my weaknesses well," Cole joked. "I've played with him my entire life. Since he was young, he could always adapt to different styles of play and pressure."

Cole said one of the hardest positions for a keeper to defend Arango is in one-on-one situations. Arango's unpredictability turns a potential save into a sure-fire goal with ease.

"It's unpredictable where he'll shoot," Cole said. "It's just straight reaction at that point."

Coming into his senior season, Arango was bold in his aspirations. He wanted the single-season record of 28 goals. Though he fell short, 20 goals is nothing to look down upon. After a blazing start to the season — 14 goals in 12 games — opposing teams began to notice, constantly throwing physical double teams his way and diminishing his goal totals.

"When he touches the ball, there's three guys flocking to him," Sorbino said. "When you score goals, that's what happens. But also, when you're a great player that's what happens. Their game plan is to shut him down."

"He doesn't get frazzled easily, he carries the weight on his shoulders well. That's not something he's had in the past. This year he's matured and the leadership we got from him and the other captains this year is one of the main difference on the team."

Twenty goals created 20 memories for Arango in his final season as a Bobcat, but the memory that stands out is the one goal he couldn't get.

Down 2-1 against Braden River in the district semifinal, North Port needed a score to force overtime in the second half, but couldn't get it that season, and his high school career, came to a close.

Arango doesn't know what's

in store for him after high school. He is confident he'll be playing collegiate soccer, but is still in talks with some schools. For now, it's up in the air.

As one of the better offensive weapons to come through North Port High, Arango became a go-to person for young players to look up to and model themselves after.

That's the legacy Arango wants to leave behind — a passionate, hard-working athlete that gives everything to the sport he loves.

"It was good helping all the younger kids, pushing them, training them," Arango said. "I stepped up this season. I knew I had to fill that role of being a leader on the team. I'll tell them all my experiences to help them and motivate them. I want them to have good seasons after I leave, so I do what I can to help."

Ichiro gets hero's sendoff in Tokyo

Mariners' great retires after second game

TOKYO — The magnitude of the moment — of sharing the field with the towering Ichiro Suzuki in his farewell — left Seattle Mariners teammate Yusei Kikuchi in reverential silence. Asked what that experience meant, the Japanese rookie pitcher paused for a full minute. "Since spring training until now, Ichiro told us that it is a gift for him to play in Tokyo," Kikuchi finally said through a translator Thursday night. "But for me, he gave me the greatest gift that I can play with him."

Ichiro was showered with cheers and chants while taking his final bow, and the Mariners sent him out with a win by beating the Oakland Athletics 5-4 in 12

innings. The 45-year-old Ichiro went 0 for 4 in the second game of the Major League Baseball season. He got a chance at a storybook ending at the jammed Tokyo Dome when he came up with two outs, a runner on second base and a tie score in the eighth inning, but grounded out. Ichiro, whose pro career began in his homeland in 1992 when he was 18, took his spot in right field to begin the bottom of the eighth. He then was pulled to one more ovation, punctuating his walk with waves, tips of the hat and hugs as cameras flashed all around.

Ichiro's teammates met him outside the dugout for a proper send-off in a three-minute tribute. Kikuchi, who worked into the fifth inning, bowed to Ichiro — the 27-year-old

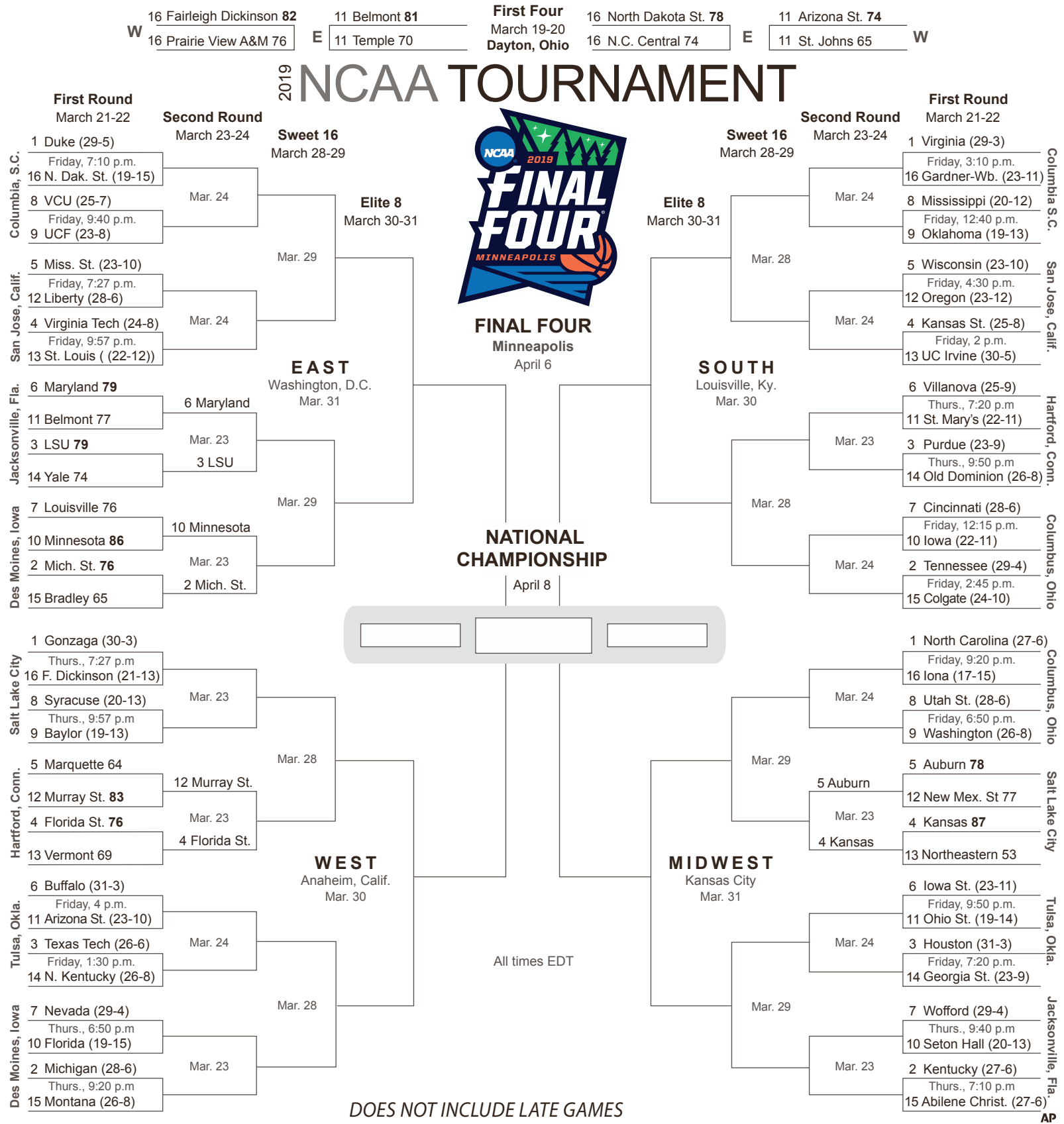

The 10th-seeded Gophers won their first NCAA Tournament game in six seasons behind 24 points from freshman Gabe Kalscheur, who helped Minnesota roll past Louisville 86-76 in the opening round of the East Region on Thursday.

The win for Pitino came against school that fired his father. Rick Pitino coached the Cardinals for 16 seasons before his 2017 dismissal.

"This wasn't about getting the win for coach Pitino. It was about getting the win for us in general and advancing to the next round," said Minnesota's Jordan Murphy, who scored 18 points.

AUBURN 78, NEW MEXICO STATE 77

Red-hot Auburn of the Southeastern Conference will be Kansas' opponent in Saturday's second-round NCAA Tournament Midwest Regional contest.

The No. 5 seed Tigers, who have won nine straight games since a 27-point loss to Kentucky on Feb. 23 at Kentucky, held on to defeat No. 12 seed New Mexico State, 78-77, in the first NCAA game of the day Thursday in Salt Lake.

Down two with 6 seconds left, New Mexico State missed a chance to tie or take the lead when AJ Harris passed up a layup to throw the ball to Terrell Brown for a 3-point attempt. Brown missed but was fouled. Then he only made one of three free throws.

The Aggies still had a chance to win on their final possession after Auburn's rebound attempt on the missed free throw went out of bounds.

Trevelin Queen (14 points, four threes) missed a 3-pointer from the corner that left his hand right before the final horn.

MICHIGAN STATE 76, BRADLEY 65

Cassius Winston scored 26

points and second-seeded Michigan State held off Bradley 76-65 on Thursday in the opening round of the East Region.

Xavier Tillman had 16 points with 11 boards for the Spartans (29-6), who'll face Big Ten rival, 10th-seeded Minnesota, on Saturday in search of their first trip to the Sweet Sixteen in four years. Michigan State throttled the Gophers 79-55 in East Lansing back on Feb. 9.

Bradley gave the Big Ten champions all they could handle, though.

It was a one-possession game until Matt McQuaid drilled a crucial 3 to put Michigan State ahead 61-55 with 3:31 left.

MARYLAND 79, BELMONT 77

Maryland's Eric Ayala deflected a pass to set up a steal by Darryl Morsell that stopped Belmont's last-second attempt at an NCAA Tournament upset and the Terrapins escaped with a 79-77 victory Thursday in the East Region.

Playing their second tournament game in less than 48 hours, the 11th-seeded Bruins left no doubt they belonged after receiving one of the selection committee's final at-large bids.

But the mid-major powerhouse from Nashville, Tennessee couldn't knock off the No. 6-seeded Terrapins (23-10) from the Big Ten, despite a 35-point performance by Dylan Windler.

KANSAS 87, NORTHEASTERN 53

Dedric Lawson had 25 points and 11 rebounds, and Kansas dominated inside for an 87-53 rout over Northeastern on Thursday in the opening round of the Midwest Region.

The fourth-seeded Jayhawks (26-9) had a notable size advantage inside and used it, outscoring the Huskies 50-16 in the paint while grabbing 17 more rebounds.

Kansas shot 56 percent and advanced to Saturday's second round against fifth-seeded Auburn.

LSU 79, YALE 74

As LSU's comfortable lead started to disappear, most of the crowd at Veterans Memorial

Mays scored 12 of his 19 points in the second half and sealed the game from the charity stripe. The third-seeded Tigers (27-6) needed each one of his free throws.

MURRAY STATE 83, MARQUETTE 64

Murray State's Ja Morant is the star of the NCAA Tournament's first day after leading No. 12 seed Murray State to an 83-64 blowout of No. 5 seed Marquette.

Morant ended up with 17 points, 16 assists and 11 rebounds to lead four players in double figures.

Markus Howard scored 26 points for Marquette but shot 9 of 27.

Murray State advances to a

second-round matchup with Florida State.

KENTUCKY 79, ABILENE CHRISTIAN 44

With PJ Washington watching from the bench in a cast, second-seeded Kentucky romped to a 79-44 victory over NCAA Tournament newcomer Abilene Christian.

Keldon Johnson scored 25 points in a huge mismatch that was over by halftime. The Wildcats shot 60 percent in the opening period, held Abilene Christian to 5 of 26 from the field.

Reid Travis added 18 points and Tyler Herro 14 for Kentucky.

Kentucky advanced to the second round of the Midwest Regional on Saturday to face either Wofford or Seton Hall.

GONZAGA 87, FAIRLEIGH DICKSON 49

When it comes to a 16 seed beating a 1, it's still true — anything really can happen in

the NCAA Tournament.

Just not on Thursday night. And not against Gonzaga.

One year after dreamers and underdog lovers rejoiced at top-seeded Virginia's first-of-its-kind, first-round loss, the Gonzaga Bulldogs crushed any thought of a repeat with a wire-to-wire 87-49 thumping of Fairleigh Dickinson in the West Region.

Rui Hachimura led the Zags (31-3) with 21 points and eight rebounds.

VILLANOVA 61, ST. MARY'S 57

The defending national champions are moving on in the NCAA Tournament.

Phil Booth scored 20 points, fellow senior Eric Paschell added 14 and No. 6 seed Villanova held off Saint Mary's 61-57 in the first round of the South Region.

Jordan Ford and Malik Fitts each had 13 points for Saint Mary's, which never trailed by more than eight but also couldn't draw even.

The Gaels' last chance ended with a steal by Saddiq Bey.

Gators grind out upset of Wolf Pack

Hayes, Hudson combine for 31 points, will face No. 2 Michigan Saturday

DES MOINES, Iowa — Florida nearly squandered a double-digit lead before finally stopping a Nevada comeback and pulling off a 70-61 upset in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

Kevarrius Hayes scored 16 points, Jalen Hudson added 15 and the 10th-seeded Gators won their tournament opener for the third straight year.

Andrew Nembhard, whose last-second shot beat LSU in the Southeastern Conference Tournament last week, drove to the basket for a

layup with 1 ½ minutes left and Florida scored the last seven points after the seventh-seeded Wolf Pack had rallied from down 18 to cut the deficit to just two points.

The Gators (20-15) were the third double-digit seed to win on Thursday.

Cody Martin scored 23 points and twin brother Caleb Martin had 19 for the Wolf Pack (29-5). The two combined for 28 of their team's 33 points in the second half of the West Region matchup.

The Gators controlled the pace with their deliberate offense, often letting the shot clock

run into single digits before shooting. The SEC's top-rated defense clogged passing and driving lanes and contested almost every shot.

KeVaughn Allen made back-to-back shots to start a 12-0 run early in the second half that swelled the lead to 51-33 with 14 minutes left.

That's when things started to turn.

The Wolf Pack began to bother Florida with their full-court press. After Caleb Martin stole the ball from Jalen Hudson in the backcourt and dunked, it was 58-51 with 6 minutes to play. Caleb Martin's two free

throws made it 63-61 with 2:02 left, but Nevada could get no closer.

Game's tallest player, UCF's Tacko, ready for VCU

COLUMBIA, S.C. — The tallest man in college basketball is finally on the game's grandest stage — 7-foot-6 Tacko Fall is set for the NCAA Tournament.

Fall's ninth-seeded UCF (23-8) open East Region play Friday night against No. 8 seed VCU (25-7).

"For me, for us, I would say it means everything," said Fall, who's been the tallest player in college since joining UCF in 2016. The native of Senegal entered prep basketball as a project and slowly worked his way into a key performer to help the Knights make the NAAs for the first time since 2005.

"We just put our heads down and say we have to make it and we made it happen," Fall said with a grin.

Fall is impossible to miss on the court, standing a half a foot or more above opponents. Year by year, Fall has increased his skill level from a raw freshman to a much more polished senior.

He averaged seven points a game his first season, despite an astonishing .750 shooting percentage which was then a UCF record.

Fall had 94 blocked shots his sophomore year (another single-season high) and was

selected as the American Athletic Conference defensive player of the year.

As a junior, Fall topped his freshman season by making 79 of 103 field goals for a .767 percentage. This season, Fall has improved his positioning underneath and his basketball knowledge in understanding the game, UCF coach Johnny Dawkins said.

"He's really improved his skillset," Dawkins said. "He scores around the basket, doesn't need to dunk everything to score" as in the past.

And then there's the Fall away from the court, a thoughtful, humble person who wants to be engaged in the community.

Fall, a Muslim, was asked Thursday his feelings about the killing of 50 people at two mosques in Christchurch, New Zealand, a week ago.

Fall didn't hesitate with his reply, saying in Senegal there are Christians and Muslims who work alongside each other and live in peace.

"I love the game of basketball, but it's always bigger than that," Fall said. "Being able to represent what we are about means a great deal to me. I was very sad when I saw what happened down in New Zealand. I thought about it a lot. But we've just

got to learn how to get along. I mean, everybody, we all pretty much are people, regardless of the religion."

Fall is eager to concentrate on basketball this week. If he's playing well, he can give VCU a difficult challenge to overcome.

Rams coach Mike Rhoades said his players did "awareness drills" he uses when the Rams face an opponent with a different style or player with great size or quickness.

"A guy like Tacko Fall around the rim that you're not just going to go in and shoot a finger roll," Rhoades said. "That's not going to happen."

Dawkins, Fall's coach, said he's been remarkable to coach, receptive to teaching and working hard to get better.

Fall is more of a throwback center without the shooting ability from the perimeter.

While many NBA mock drafts don't have Fall getting picked, Dawkins believes his skill and personality make him an asset to any team he's on.

"I hear the game has changed and his style of play no longer exists, but when you have a player like Tacko Fall with his personality, with who he is, in any community, he'll be one of the best people you'll ever have," he said.

UConn using No. 2 seed as motivation for tourney

STORRS, Conn. — UConn comes into this year's NCAA Tournament feeling a little disrespected and that could be bad news for the rest of the field.

The Huskies (31-2), who have been to 11 consecutive Final Fours, open play Friday evening in the Albany Region as a No. 2 seed against No. 15 seed Towson.

The Huskies expected to be the region's top seed with a No. 2 ranking in the polls, four wins over top-25 teams and losses only to top-five opponents Baylor and Louisville on the road.

"Obviously we don't agree with it, but there's nothing we can do about it," said UConn forward Napheesa Collier, who is averaging more than 20 points and 10 rebounds a game. "I think it does

put a little bit more of a fire under our butts just because, like I said we don't agree with it, and we just want to prove to everyone that we should have been a one. We can be, and we're going to come out swinging."

Coach Geno Auriemma notes that his teams have lost in the NCAA Tournament when they were a top seed and have won the national championship when they were not.

Being seeded second rather than first, means little more than having to pack both white and blue jerseys if they make it to Albany, where they could meet No. 1 seeded Louisville again.

"I mean, we're not in one of those conferences that perennially wins women's basketball national basketball championships, so we can't be expected to lose two games and

not be dropped," joked Auriemma, who is hoping to guide the Huskies to a 12th national title. "I'm just happy they kept us at two instead of four."

Friday's game will mark the return for UConn of All-American Katie Lou Samuelson, who sat out the Huskies regular-season finale and the entire American Athletic Conference Tournament with a back injury.

Auriemma said the senior's shooting form has returned, but she not back to full mobility.

He said he never considered sitting Samuelson, who is averaging just under 19 points per game, in the first round.

"If I tell coach I'm good, then he's going to trust me," Samuelson said. "He's going to believe me and he's going to let me do what I need

to do."

STRINGER STILL OUT

No. 7 seed Rutgers will face No. 10 seed Buffalo without Hall of Fame coach Vivian Stringer, who has not coached since late February because of an undisclosed illness.

Stringer, 71, is in her 24th year at Rutgers and 48th season of coaching.

Timothy Eatman, who has been serving as acting head coach. He filled the same role in 2016, when Stringer missed three games to care for and later mourn her mother.

"It's always hard when your head coach isn't around, but we have a great coaching staff and supporting staff," Rutgers senior forward Stasha Carey said.

"Coach Eatman knows what he's doing. He's been doing it pretty well the past couple games.

"The good thing is we have talked to her and she gave us some words of encouragement, so that made us feel a lot better," Carey added. "And we are just going to take that and run with it as far as we can."

DIVIDED FAN BASE

Buffalo's men's and women's teams will be playing at the same time. The women face Rutgers at 4:30 p.m. The men tip at 4 p.m. in Tulsa against Arizona State.

"Nate (men's coach Nate Oats) and I have had our moment where we've looked at each other and said 'wow, what are we doing here?'" Buffalo coach Felisha Legette-Jack said. "It's really fun to go

through this with what I call my brothers and to come out to the airport in Buffalo and see two planes that are headed in opposition directions to take the athletic department to postseason play."

LEARNING TO WIN

Towson (20-12) had its first winning season since 2011-12, and had its most wins since 2007-08.

The Tigers played just one ranked team this season, falling to Syracuse in December, 98-55.

"It's exciting for all of us," Towson red-shirt sophomore guard Kionna Jeter said. "We've never been here before, so it's a great experience. At the end of the day we still have to play basketball no matter the name or who we are playing."

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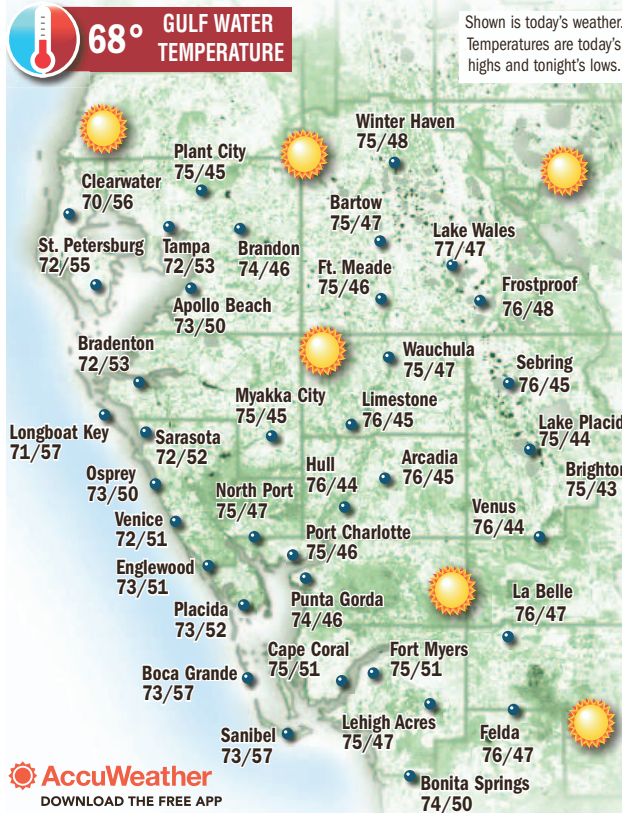

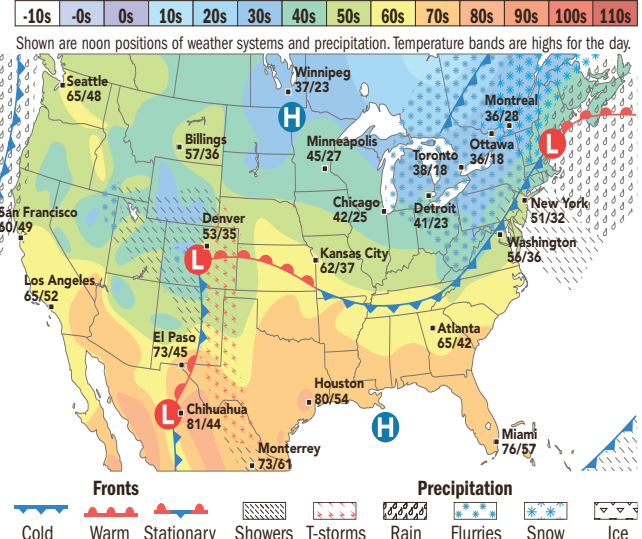

Bucs first team in league with 2 female coaches

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — The Tampa Bay Buccaneers have hired Maral Javadifar and Lori Locust as assistant coaches, becoming the first NFL team with two female coaches on their staff.

Locust and Javadifar are also the first full-time female coaches in franchise history.

Locust will be an assistant defensive line coach and Javadifar an assistant strength and conditioning coach.

"I know how hard it can be to get that first opportunity to coach at the highest level of professional football," Buccaneers coach Bruce Arians said in a statement.

"Sometimes, all you need is the right

organization to offer up the opportunity. The Glazer family and our general manager, Jason Licht, were extremely supportive of my decision, and I know Maral and Lori will be great additions to my coaching staff."

Locust joins the Bucs after working as the defensive line coach for the Birmingham Iron of the Alliance of American Football. Last year, Locust served as a defensive coaching intern for the Baltimore Ravens during the team's training camp.

Javadifar has most recently worked as a physical therapist in Seattle. A native of Queens, Javadifar played basketball at Pace University in New York.

Cardinals finalize extension with Goldschmidt for club record sum

JUPITER — Before the Cardinals could assemble a crowd to welcome Paul Goldschmidt to Busch Stadium and begin the sales pitch to have him call St. Louis home for years to come, they were able to make a club-record commitment to their new first baseman.

The Cardinals and Goldschmidt are finalizing a five-year extension worth around \$130 million, according to a source familiar with the negotiations. The deal is expected to be finalized by Saturday.

The extension will

start after 2019 and carry through 2024.

The completion of the deal is pending a physical. That is scheduled for Friday, and a press conference to introduce Goldschmidt, 31, as a fixture for years to come could happen as soon as Saturday.

It's a swift resolution to conversations the Cardinals expected to go into the season as they introduced Goldschmidt to the home crowd and gave his family a chance to see what it was like to call St. Louis home in the summers.

John Mozeliak, Cardinals president of baseball operations,

declined comment.

"We are working toward something," he said.

The Cardinals felt their best edge was to surround Goldschmidt with Cardinals history and Cardinals tradition and sellout crowds and then present him with one of the largest offers ever from the club.

Goldschmidt's extension surpasses Matt Holliday's seven-year, \$120-million contract as the largest in club history. He also surpasses Yadier Molina's \$20-million salary to become the highest paid Cardinal ever.

The Cardinals acquired the six-time All-Star from Arizona in a four-player deal that sent catcher Carson Kelly and pitcher Luke Weaver along with a draft pick and a prospect to the Diamondbacks.

He arrived with one year remaining on his contract. He will make \$15.5 million this season.

Since 2012, Goldschmidt has rivaled Cincinnati's Joey Votto as the most productive first baseman in the National League. He's one of six players with at least 200 home runs in the previous six seasons and he's the only National League player who was a part of the past six All-Star teams.

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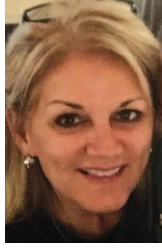

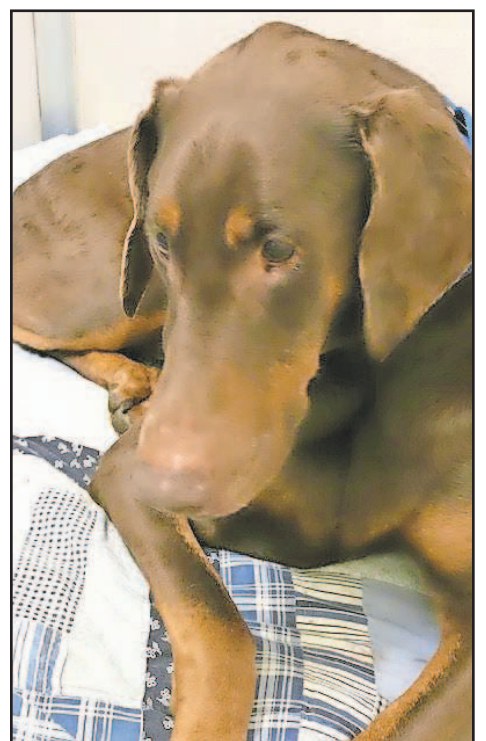

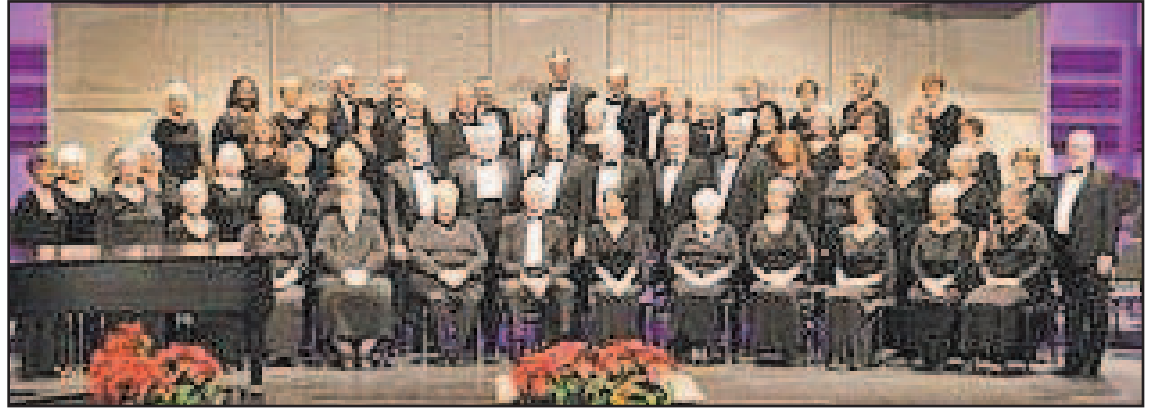

with a surprise donation of \$6,500 from an anonymous source.

"Wow!" Mike Mansfield, Habitat's executive director, hollered when the news was broken. "We are overwhelmed by the support. We like to think everybody knows what we do in the community. Every day, we find out they don't know what we do."

The Charlotte Community Foundation faces the same type of problem. Habitat builds houses for those who normally wouldn't be able to afford to buy one - 35 are scheduled to go up this year. Charlotte Community literally helps provide the foundation for Habitat's work and the work of other

nonprofits.

"So much more can be done if we're all working together," said Ashley Maher, the foundation's executive director. "Something like this helps us to get to know nonprofits and their needs so we can articulate those needs to donors."

"It's very fulfilling to be able to have the opportunity to help so many individuals."

Brand nodded. "We want to be a collaborator for all nonprofits in Charlotte County," he said. "We want to connect them to larger donors. 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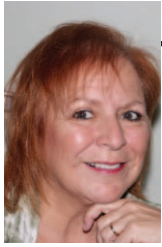

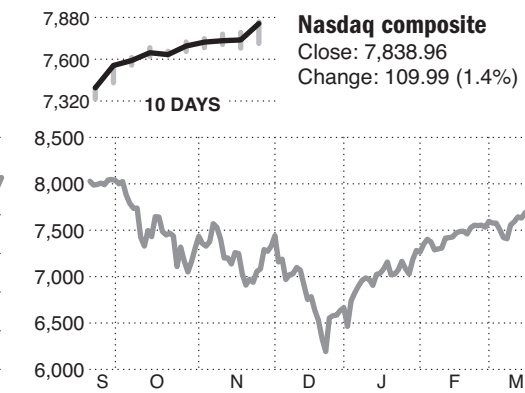
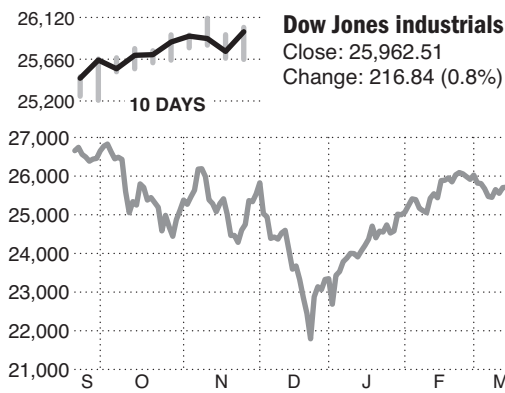
