And if her husband hadn't found her at their home in Venice suffering from a stroke invol ing a blood clot, she said she could have died. What's more, if she were taken to the nearest hospital

## Historic AC Freeman House gets ADA makeover in Punta Gorda

Entry ramp and other changes part of city's ADA Transition Plan By DANIEL SUTPHIN Staff Writer

The historic AC Freeman House is getting an upgrade as part of Punta Gorda's Americans with Disabilities Act Transition Plan.
Built in 1903, the city is currently installing an
ADA ramp at the rear of the historic building. Previously, the house was fixed with a wheelchair lift, but it was no longer operable. The new ramp is expected to be completed within the next two to three weeks, according to Ted Kielb of ERS Construction, the
company building the ADA ramp.
The Transition Plan,
which was set in motion which was set in motion back in 2016, details a number of disability accommodations for cityowned parks and facilities like the century-old
historic house historic house.
itted to ensuring that all visitors and residents, including those with disabilities, are able to access and use all of our programs, services and activities," said Melissa Reichert, city communica tions manager.
The house was placed Historic Landmarks list in 1987. It was moved to its present site at 311 W. Retta Esplanade and restored in 2006.
"The date the facility was constructed or renovated is important to determine so that be applied," Reichert said be applied," Reichert said.
"The recommendations to the property comply with the ADA requirements." Part of the new renovations called for removal of the wheelchair lift. The

lead to term limits for school board members throughout the state. The issue is working through committees and could result in a constitutional amendment for voters to consider in 2020 . Baxley has been a fixture Baxley has been a fixture
in Tallahassee for about 20 years. He spent most of that time in the Florida House, where he was elected seven times before successfully running for the Senate in 2016. Baxley's plan would imit board members to no more than eight

consecutive years. The Tampa Bay Times reported he said in a committee hearing last
month that school board term limits are needed term limits are needed would bring fresh ideas. "This is an issue I've actually evolved on," Baxley said. "I've always taken a position that the people decide."
A similar bill is working through the House.
Now, if I were a Now, if I were a cynica
sort, I might look at
that "fresh ideas" thing as a smokescreen. Republican lawmakers
enjoy messing with pub enjoy messing with publii
schools and could feast on inexperienced board members.
And, of course, it's all in the details. How would the proposed amendment be worded? Would it be a straight up eight consecutive years, or would workarounds?
In Hillsborough, for instance, county commissioners are subject to term limits. That didn't keep Republican Ken Hagan from winning a fifth term in office last November. It's legal, too. Commissioners are
limited to two terms in
a particular district but can restart the clock by running
district.
Hagan has
at doing that.
The Hillsborough
School Board has seven members, two of whom are elected countywide. Could a board member who doesn't want to leave jump from a specified distric
seat?
Details aside, I imagine
Details aside, I imagine
there will be wide support for this if it is on the ballot. Polls show people generally favor term limits, which always has seemed strange to me. I mean, you'd have
to believe at least some to believe at least some
people who keep voting people who keep voting

Term limits take out the guesswork, though. There are valid reasons to support the concept
too, of course. Even the too, of course. Even the servant can get stale after too many years in office. They get too cozy with big-money supporters. They can lose touch wit the people who hired them.

During their meeting Tuesday, commissioners unanimously approved a joint stipulation brought to them by County that ends the litigation "The stipulation will get us the relief we were seeking," Elbrecht told commissioners as he introduced the item for their consideration. addition, thistles are edible In Florida, there are seven species of true thistles (genus Cirsium), which belong to the Aster family (Asteraceae) only two species are found:
the Nuttall's thistle (Cirsium nuttallii) and the more common purple thistle (Cirsium horridulum). Purple thistles are commonly found in pinelands, prairies, roadsides and dis turbed sites. purple thistle is a biennial -
that is, a plant that lives for two years. It usually forms a basal rosette of leaves in the first year, then flowers and fruits the second year. In southern Florida, the seasons can be mixed, with the plant not taking a break between first and second year growth. Typically, the purple thistle goes through three stages of growth. The first stage, or
rosette stage, takes place during the winter months. During this stage, the plant consists of a rosette of leaves that are circular and growing flat or close to the ground. The second stage, or bolting stage, takes place from late January through July The stalk of the thistle bolts up from the rosette. The third stage

## Astronomers reveal first image of a black hole

Humanity has gotten its first glimpse of a black hole, and it looks like a flaming doughnut


Scientists revealed the first image ever made of a black hole after assembling data gathered by a network of radio telescopes around the world.

WASHINGTON - Humanity got its first glimpse Wednesday of the cosmic place of no return: a black hole. And it's as hot, as violent and as beautiful as science fiction imagined.
In a breakthrough that thrilled the world of astrophysics and stirred talk of a Nobel Prize, scientists released the first image ever made of a black hole, revealing a fiery doughnut-shaped
from Earth from Earth.
Waterloo theoretical physicist Avery Broderick one of the leaders of the research team of about 200 scientists from 20 countries, declared as the colorized orange-and-black picture was unveiled.
The image, assembled from data gathered by eight radio telescopes around the world, shows light and gas swirling around the lip of a supermassive black hole, a monster of the universe whose existence was theorized by Einstein more than a century ago but confirmed only indirectly over the decades.

Supermassive black holes are situated at the center of most galaxies, including ours, and are so dense that Light gets bent and twisted around by gravity in a bizarre funhouse effect as it gets sucked into the abyss along with superheated gas and dust.
The new image confirmed yet another piece of Einstein's general theory of relativity. Einstein even predicted the object's neatly symmetrical shape. "We have seen what we tuought was unseeable. We have seerd Doeleman of Hicture of a black hole, announced Sheperd Doeleman of Harvard, leader of the project. director of the East Asian Observatory in Hawaii, said the fiery circle reminded her of the flaming Eye of Sauron from the "Lord of the Rings" trilogy.
Three years ago, scientists using an extraordinarily sensitive observing system heard the sound of two much smaller black holes merging to create a gravitational wave, as Einstein predicted. The new image, published in the Astrophysical Journal Letters and announced around

## Families of massacre victims criticize notification process

parents crammed into area hospitals and parents crammed into area hospitals and
a Marriott Hotel near the school, where families were mostly directed after the shooting. Those low-level employees failed by a lack of leadership, they said. The 15 commissioners, who include tw victims' fathers and several law enforcement executives, wanted to hear from the relatives so they can make recommendations on how police agencies should notify families after mass shootings.
Families became last on this list of Guttenberg, the father of 14 -year-old Jaime. "Whatever gets decided needs to start with families first."

## 1 dead, 17 hurt in North Carolina gas explosion

Search and rescue crews sift through rubble

DURHAM, N.C. - A leaking gas line exploded Wednesday in a Durham shopping district, kiling one person and inju
more than a dozen others as firefighters evacuating people from buildings near the rupture, authorities said.
The blast reverberated across the North Carolina city - turning one building to rubble, shattering filling the air with acrid smoke.
Jim Rogalski, 58, wa working in his office destroyed building when the explosion blew out the windows. At least four people working in cubicles by the windows suffered
deep cuts, bloody head wounds
"There was lots of screaming. ..." Rogalski said. "It was pretty frantic there for a little bit until help showed up.
Rogalski was seated one dow away from the win "It was terrifying," he said. "The whole building shook. Things started falling - ceiling tiles, and structure and glass and debris. Lots and lots of dust. It was tough to see
beyond 20 feet or so" beyond 20 feet or so. about 15 minutes after the about 15 minutes after the manager sent an email warning that the city's fire department was investigating the smell of gas and that workers shouldn't leave the building
through the front door, he said as a friend gave him
a ride home to Chapel Hill. Rogalski said he was forced to abandon his car in a nearby parking deck because authorities
worried the blast may have worried the blast may have
weakened the structure. weakened the structure
Durham Fire Chief Robert Zoldos said the blast at 10:07 a.m. involved five buildings on the block and catastrophically damaged one. The leak had been reported during construction a half-hour
earlier, prompting the earlier, prompting the evacuations.
On Wednesday afterjutted out of the collapsed building, along with bent sheet metal, bricks and wood. A massive stream of water from a ladder truck sprayed onto the remnants, draining down the

## ONE COURSE LEFT TO MASTER

The Masters should have been the first major Rory Mcllroy won. Now it's the only one he's missing.

Augusta National was thought to be the domain of Tiger Woods when he won four green jackets before turning 30 . Now he is 43 , so far removed from his last Masters victory that the club has changed leadership twice since he last won.
They are the central figures at the 83 rd Masters, which starts on April 11 , even as they share the stage with a cast of characters so deep that 23 of the last 25 majors have been won by players ranked No. 25 in the world or better.
Woods has such a hold on the game that his Sunday red shirt packs as much interest as a green jacket, especially now. To see him two years ago hobble to the Masters Club dinner for past champions was to wonder if he would ever play again, and it was only a few weeks later that he had a fourth surgery on his back to fuse his lower spine.
He not only returned, he capped his remarkable comeback by winning in Georgia for his 80th PGA Tour victory. But it was at East Lake, not Augusta. Is his comeback complete without a 15th major? His entire spring has been geared toward this moment, a chance to win the Masters for the first time in 14 years. "I'm right there where I need to be," he said. "I've gotten a little bit more consistent with my play, and I think that everything is headed on track toward April."
Mcllroy still wore those curly locks when he took a four-shot lead into the final round at Augusta in 2011, only to throw it all away with a tee shot behind cabins, a four-putt from 12 feet, a wild drive along the azaleas and an 80 on his scorecard. He responded by winning four of the next 15 majors. He returns to Augusta needing only a green jacket to join the most elite group in golf with the career Grand Slam. He played in the final group last year. He is getting closer.
Is he excited? Not as much as it might seem.
Mcllroy has spent the last year reading books on life, not golf. He is working more on his attitude than his putting, determined not to let his sport define his success. It is starting pay off, not only with his victory in The Players Championship against golf's best field, but the fact he has yet to finish out of the top 10 in the seven PGA Tour events he has played this year. Las Vegas has made him the favorite at Augusta. "I would have said a couple of years ago, 'I need to win a Masters,' where now it's 'I want to win it'. And I'd love to win it", he said. "But if I don't, I'm OK. Maybe some people
will say that I'm not motivated enough. Believe me, I am motivated to make the most of what I have and to put my name among some of the greats of our game.
Three months into the year, six months into the PGA Tour season, golf doesn't feel as though it really starts until Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player hit the honorary tee shot, until "Fore, please" is heard on the first tee as players are introduced, and until that first big cheer makes fans wonder where it came from and what it was for.

## TIGERTALES

Woods was still figuring out what his body would allow him to do last year at the Masters, where he didn't break par until the final round and was never in the tournament. He has started slowly this year, each tournament a little better than the previous one. Worth noting is he was in the hunt until the final hour in his last two majors, leading briefly on Sunday in the British Open and chasing Brooks Koepka all the way to the end at the PGA Championship.

## BATTLE FOR SUPREMACY

Mcllroy at No. 3 is among five players who have a chance to reach No. 1 with a Masters victory. All five - Justin Rose, Dustin Johnson, Mcllroy, Koepka and Justin Thomas - have won majors and been No. 1 before. It has never been this crowded at the top since the ranking began in 1986 .

SLUMPING SPIETH
Outside of Woods and Mcllroy, no other player at the Masters is more fascinating than Spieth. In his five appearances, he has tied the tournament scoring record in a wire-to-wire victory, been runner-up twice and has been in the mix every Sunday. But he is in the worst slump of his young career, winless since the 2017 British Open, no performance in the top 20 this year. He says his game is close. The Masters, where he has
been atop the leaderboard in eight of the 20 rounds he has played, might be the ultimate measure of how close - or far - he really is.

for the NBA draft on Wednesday morning. Barrett tied with fellow Duke freshman Zion Williamson for the top scoring average in the ACC this season. They led Duke (32-6) to the ACC tournament championship and the No. 1 ranking in the final

A calm and peaceful morning on the bass lake, shortly before the schoolie bass started busting shad on the surface and destroyed the tranquility.

I don't know how boat shoes got their name, but they don't deserve it. They're terrible. They don't breathe, they get wet and stay wet, and if you wear them more than occasionally they become a nasty, stinky mess. Bleh.
But if not boat shoes, what are you going to wear on your feet while boating? Good news you have choices.
A few of my charter captain friends favor white PVC boots of the type worn on commercial shrimp boats (aka Pine Island Reeboks). There are advantages: Your feet don't get wet from water on deck, they're more or less impervious to sharp objects (unless such objects have significant force behind them), easy to clean, and they identify you as being a member of "the club." On the other hand, they're clunky, don't breathe, and aren't the most comfortable choice.

How about regular sneakers? They're plenty comfortable, and you don't need to buy anything special or change shoes to go on the

boat. Be careful to get a pair with non-marking soles, or you'll have to do a lot of back-breaking scrubbing to get the shoeprints off your deck (or worse, the boat owner's deck). Water on deck ends up in your sneaks, and fish blood stains them forever.
In recent years, manufacturers have been offering specialist footwear for a variety of activities. For the boater and angler, there are now shoes that look a lot like street sneakers but are made to drain water, dry quickly and shrug off most stains. They also have non-marking sole material, and many include extra cushioning to absorb the effects of pounding seas. Don't expect them to be cheap (about $\$ 70$ to $\$ 200$ ) or attractive, unless you like garish colors and gaudy patterns.
Since none of the above work for me, I wear sandals (on the boat, off the boat, running errands, in the woods, etc.). For me, they're ideal because it's almost like not wearing shoes, but the bottoms of my feet are protected from
most sharp objects and hot surfaces. However, I don't recommend them to everybody. To wear sandals in this type of environment, you have to be OK with risk. All it takes is one dropped knife or mislaid hook. Plus you get a weird tan pattern on your feet.
Not all sandals will stand up to the rigors of boat life. I've been through a lot of brands - some good, some iffy and some awful. The OluKai Ohanas I wear now are the best I've seen. I won't hesitate to hop over and push the boat, even with a few oysters around. Don't try that in dollar store flip-flops.
At the far end of the spectrum from my white-booted buddies are those who go barefoot. Tried it. Can't do it. I liked the sure-footedness, but there are just too many things you could step on. If you're on this list, bully for you. I hope you're as smart as you are tough, or you're going to end up in the ER someday.

I too was plagued with lubber grasshoppers and was told the only way to eradicate them was to use two bricks to smash them. Through trial and error, I've found if you catch the early hatchlings in late afternoon as they rise on top of the grass, just spray the colony with a cheap insect spray. It has taken three years of vigilance, but I only found one hatch this season and quickly dispatched them. Get out there with your insect spray.

SKIP:
It does work, and l've done it too. But l'm not a big fan of poisoning things outdoors, where residual toxins will probably kill things other than the intended targets. My usual method of killing lubbers was more personal and 100 percent environment-friendly: I just popped their heads off. I recognize that this method is not for
everyone, but I chose it because the targets were guaranteed. These days, I don't bother. Once I found out how much the opossums enjoy them, I decided I'd rather leave them as marsupial munchies instead.

## LICENSES

Resident saltwater or freshwater: Annual $\$ 17,5$-year $\$ 79$. If you fish from shore in salt water only, a license is required but it is free. A combo license for both freshwater and saltwater fishing is $\$ 32.50$ annually.

## Keep these basics in mind while you're fishing the Harbor this spring

We are definitely in the spring swing of things on Charlotte Harbor. The water has just come alive in the past few weeks.
The snook and redfish bite is incredible. Our sharks have returned and the blacknoses are bigger than last year. The tarpon up the river are starting to head down to the Harbor and the migratory tarpon are starting to fill the Harbor in search of food. There seems to be a good number of tripletail in the area and they appear to be hungry. I think the only fish that seem to be so-so right now are the trout.
The whitebait has already infested the usual areas of the Harbor. Everyone gets excited when the whitebait shows up, and that's to be expected. Whitebait opens doors that have been creaky and stuck for the past few months.
The first few weeks are painful until you get back into "net shape" - at least they are at my age. I laughed at myself the other day. I threw the castnet about five times that morning and then laid down on the front of the boat. Eight years ago I could throw that net all day long. Now all I wante to do was go back to bed. Another charter captain was beside me and hollered over and asked if I was OK. "Nope," I said. He asked if I needed help. "Nope," I said again.
There are two basic rules I have for this time of year. First, pack for bear. With our winte species still here and the summer species showing up, you never know what you'll come across and you should be ready for it. You'll hear me preach this every spring and fall, and that's because I believe it's important.

I want to bring everything from light tackle to shark and tarpon gear. You may want to fish for snook and redfish that day but what if you pass a cobia along the way? What if the wind and tides aren't in your favor and you need to spend a few hours on the flats pitching artificial lures for trou while you wait for the water to come in? Don't be afraid to change up your plan while you're out there.
My second rule: Always bring shrimp. It doesn't matter whether l'm going to throw that castnet for whitebait - l'm still going to bring a few dozen shrimp. Sheepshead are still a valid target this time of year, and the chances of them eating a greenback are pretty darn slim. The trout can go either way on bait - as can cobia, redfish, tripletail, snapper and tarpon - so having both will be a benefit. You'll never go wrong having a few shrimp with you.
We've also been catching a lot of extras in our castnets that you might want to throw in the livewell too. The other day we caugh all sizes of blue crabs and a few squid in our nets. The smaller blue crabs go in the livewell for tarpon, redfish, sheepshead, black drum, cobia and bonnethead sharks. I don't keep the large ones as I don't like eating blue crab, but if you do, have at it.
Keeping a squid or two isn't a bad idea either. Snapper will eat it, and you can also cut it up and use it to tip your sabiki rigs. Just make sure you rinse any ink off your boat immediately as it will stain badly if allowed to dry.
Stick to these two rules and you should be
able to have a good time out on the water for the next couple months. This is all good advice during the fall transition also, so cut this column out and paperclip it to 0 ctober in your calendar so you don't forget..

1 small ripe avocado, coarsely chopped 6 tbsp butter
2 tbsp lemon juice, divided
1/4 tsp garlic powder
2 tbsp salsa
$20 z$ cream
1 tsp Dijon mustard
1/3 cup fine dry breadcrumbs
Combine the avocado, butter, 1 tbsp. lemon juice, salsa and garlic in a blender. Cover and process until smooth. Combine Dijon mustard and cream. Dip the flounder fillets in mustard mixture and dredge in breadcrumbs. Place on a buttered baking dish and bake at $450^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ for 7 minutes. Turn the flounder fillets over and bake for 7 minutes more. Warm avocado sauce for 30 seconds in microwave. Top the baked fillets with the avocado sauce and serve. Serves 4.

## WHY IT MATTERS

Sea turtles are an important part of the ocean's food web. Hatchlings provide fat and protein to a wide variety of predators during their breeding seasons. Plus, we like sea turtles.

## HOW WE HARM IT

Baby turtles can be killed if they can't make it to the water quickly or get confused by lights. Adult turtles are sometimes hit by boats or tak baits meant for reef or open-water fish.

## MAKING BETTER CHOICES

Avoiding harm to turtles is pretty easy if you follow these simple tips:

- During turtle nesting season (April through October), avoid disturbing females laying eggs on the beach. Don't shine lights on or near the beach, as this can disorient both adults and hatchlings. Avoid digging holes or trenches in the sand, as these can trap babies rushing toward the surf. Don't leave chairs or other debris on the beaches, either - they can tangle turtles.
- If you hook a turtle, use a long dehooking too to remove the hook if possible. If not, cut the line as close to the turtle as you can. Sea turtle have very powerful jaws - be careful.
- Keep a close watch when boating in areas tur tles are know to frequent. They have to surface to breathe and can be hit. Boca Grande Pass often has many turtles passing through.

Southwest Florida's anglers are very, very lucky that the FWC operates the Charlotte Harbor Fisheries Independent Fish Monitoring field station, from which researchers have been sampling fish populations in Charlotte Harbor for many years. This gives fishery managers valuable information on long-term fluctuations in the populations of many of the species of fish which live in Charlotte Harbor.
If you've spent much time on the water in our area, you've probably seen these guys (and gals) at work. They operate the boats that have "Marine Research" written on the side. You might see them dragging nets behind the boat, or wading in the shallows pulling nets by hand.
A recent conversation with Dave Blewett, director of the facility, offered a bit of insight about the effects of last year's red tide episode on our snook population. Blewett reports that in some areas, especially in backwaters near the ICW, that there are essentially no baby snook being seen from last summer's spawn. But in other areas that are further inland, there are tiny snook being found from that spawn.
Overall, he rates the success of last year's snook spawn in Southwest Florida as weak. But he notes that years of weak spawning success happen regularly for a variety of reasons, and that because individual snook spend many years spawning in the estuary, it's unlikely that fishermen will notice a downturn in the fishery as a result of one weak season. For snook, it takes a few consecutive years of poor spawning success to have a noticeable effect on the fishery.
Blewett also noted that the impact of last year's red tide on the snook population was far less pronounced than the cold weather snook kills approximately a decade ago when it was thought that as many as half of the adult snook in Florida perished.
No one knows the numbers of snook that died last year, but he estimates that perhaps 10 percent of the population of adult snook on the Gulf coast may have perished. This is an interesting observation for sure. Of course, the distribution of the mortality was uneven, which means that the fish in some areas were relatively unaffected while there were areas where the impact was more severe. And now for something completely
different: Have you ever witnessed a bad car wreck or some other horrible accident? It produces an unsettling combination of fear for the safety of those involved and an adrenaline rush as you figure out what to do to help. Rush in immediately to render aid? Call 911 first? Are there safety concerns for you at the accident scene?
We thought we had stumbled into such a situation recently. One of our tour boats was returning from a day cruise to the islands. As it neared Punta Gorda, it encountered a small boat that was swamped, barely afloat and surrounded by a floating debris field that included seat cushions and other stuff.
Fearing the worst, the captain had passengers and crew keep a lookout for survivors in the water, and notified the U.S. Coast Guard in Fort Myers Beach of the situation and their position as he slowly and carefully motored up to the stricken vessel. They eventually got alongside the small boat and were able to get vessel registration numbers for the USCG, which instructed our boat to stand by on the scene and continue to look for possible victims in the water until emergency assistance arrived.

Shortly thereafter, a commercial towboat arrived, presumably having monitored the radio conversation between our boat and the USCG. Then something unexpected happened: A sailboat motored up near the swamped boat and began picking up the floating items, then went to the boat and tied it off
When asked, the folks on the sailboat said that they'd been towing the small boat astern, had lost their tow, and had come back to recover it. So there was no crisis and no need to continue looking for victims, which was a relief, and the search was canceled. It's not clear why the sailboat did not tell anyone on scene what had happened. Presumably they were not monitoring a VHF radio since they did not join the conversation about the swamped boat. Had they done so, a lot of worry and effort would have been avoided.

# Wildifower Preserve bindy despiteconstruction 

It was a beautiful cool and sunny morning - what every Floridian celebrates about spring, hopeful that it will last for months and months. We were on our way to Wildflower Preserve for our monthly birding survey. We met Tom and Gayle Duch, with whom we have done this Lemon Bay Conservancy survey for six years.
LBC board member Eva Furner takes our information and consolidates it. She is creating a Wildflower bird list and brochure. It will show which birds are here in the four different seasons. In addition, the surveys reveal new birds and birds that are becoming rare. Wildflower is closed to the public right now because of construction. However, we are anticipating seeing it finalized in the coming years.
As we arrived, we saw that wildflowers were blooming everywhere - so fitting to see at Wildflower Preserve. Once upon a time, this was a golf course; however, Lemon Bay Conservancy purchased the property a while back and is turning it into a wonderfu nature preserve. LBC decide to improve the preserve and closed it for renovations.

The property is still in rough condition from having a lot of work done to create the final plan, and wild hogs have made hiking in some of the areas quite difficult. Nevertheless, we were sighting a lot of birds and enjoying huge fields of wildflowers.
Several mourning doves and a mockingbird greeted us in the parking lot. We heard quite a bit of bird song from the cardinals. As we hiked the main trail, we sighted a red-shouldered hawk on the snag of a dead tree. A boat-tailed grackle came along and there was a bit of a confrontation before they both flew away.
Tom got his eye on a bird quite far away. When we looked in the binoculars, we saw it was an American kestral. A red-bellied woodpecker was working its way up the side of a pine tree right along the trail. Moonflowers were blooming everywhere and vines were growing up into the palms and pines, with huge clumps of the beautiful white flowers in bloom. As we turned the corner, the sun highlighted a male cardinal. His bright red feathers were aglow in the morning light.
A huge flock of white ibis flew overhead
along with a single great egret. Red-winged blackbirds were flitting along the shore of one of the ponds. However, we didn't see much here because were struggling through muck and terrain that the pigs had rooted up. With such rough hiking, it was not a good idea to look up for birds, and we kept our eyes on where we were walking.
We finally reached firm ground where a happy cottontail rabbit sat nibbling on some leaves. Several common gallinules were scooting across the water as we approached one of the ponds. We could here a pileated woodpecker off in the distance. The huge mulberry tree was covered with berries - a real treat for the birds when they ripen in a few weeks.
Gayle's sharp eye spotted a prairie warbler high in the trees. The bright yellow stood out against the green of the treetops. We also heard common yellowthroats singing in a stand of trees. As we hiked on, we had a little flurry of palm warblers flying back and forth in the shrubs. Further along the trail, we sighted a lone pine warbler.

Another red-shouldered hawk was
sitting on the limb of a dead tree about a quarter of a mile away. Looking through the binoculars it appeared to be the light color phase. Suddenly several blue jays started harassing the hawk, driving it from one tree to another to another. Finally it just gave up and flew away. There was no mid-morning nap for this hawk.
As we were exiting, Tom was beckoning to us to hurry up because he had sighted a blueheaded vireo. Fortunately, it hung around for a few minutes and we got to see it
Shortly afterward, we saw several black vultures circling overhead. That seemed like a message that it was time to leave. We had a wonderful morning at Wildflower Preserve, but we were all hungry and it was time for some coffee and breakfast. We'll be back next month to see what has changed. When people come to me for help with improving their fishing skills, I usually steer the conversation toward their goals. Finding out what they really want to do and why is key to determining what skills they need to work on and in what areas they should focus their efforts.
However, this also frequently puts me in the position of having to burst bubbles. For example, when a local angler recently told me that he wanted to target pompano but also want to fish mostly in the canals of Punta Gorda Isles, I had to tell him it wasn't a realistic plan. Sure, you might catch a pompano in PGI. I once caught a 22 -inch gag in 2 feet of water from a Palm Island dock. But I don't expect it to happen again, and I don't expect you to hook more than a handful of pompano in many years of fishing in PGI.
So then I asked him which he wanted more: To catch pomps, or to stay in the canals. After thinking for a moment, he decided he was willing to travel a bit in pursuit of pompano. We sat down and built a strategy for him, much of which I'm now going to share with the rest of you.

## WHERE TO GO

Pompano might show up anywhere, but some places are much more likely. These fish generally prefer hard-packed sand and shell to soft mud, are more comfortable in higher-salinity waters, and are particularly
drawn to steep dropoffs. Looking for areas that meet all of these specifications leads us to the Gulf passes, which are often pompano hotspots.
There are also certain inshore areas that regularly host pompano. One of the most widely known is the Cape Haze bar. You can find your own smaller spots as well. Just cruise along slowly on deeper flats or along the outer edge of the bar in 4 to 6 feet of water. This time of year, the water is clear enough that you can spot shelly areas and dropoffs.
There are a few spots on the lower east side that pompano like, but there are a lot more in Pine Island Sound. Yes, that's a long haul, especially if you're putting your boat in at Laishley or Port Charlotte Beach. But this is a "go to where the fish are" situation. Plus, it's a good thing for you to have a wider knowledge of fishing spots.

## BAITS TO USE

Many fishermen seem to think that pompano feed mostly on shrimp. While shrimp are on the menu, adult pompano eat them only occasionally. As juveniles, their diet is primarily small bivalves (clams, coquinas, etc), sand fleas and other small crustaceans. As they grow into adulthood, they focus more on larger bivalves, such as calico clams, sunray venus and tellins (which goes far in explaining their preferred habitat).

So does that mean you should be using clams for bait? You can, but most anglers prefer to offer them their childhood favorites: Sand fleas and shrimp. Even as grownups, they'll still eat what they liked as kids.
Pompano also eat smaller fish as the opportunity presents itself. More than one beach snook fishermen has been surprised by a pompano grabbing his snook lure. Spoons retrieved slowly just over the bottom can be very effective, and soft plastic shad work also.
The best choice, though, is a silly jig. These lures are very simple, just lead molded onto a hook and painted. But they are deadly on pompano when fished right: Let it sink to the bottom, then lift it several feet up and let it fall rapidly. The sound of the heavy bait thumping on the sand, the sediment that puffs up, and the bright colors (pink, orange or chartreuse) are all attractive to pompano.

To make a good lure better, you can add a piece of cut shrimp or Fish Bites attractant. This is called tipping, and it can really help fish find your lure when visibility is low due to heavy surf or murky conditions.

## TIPS AND TRICKS

Pompano are hard fighters but don't usually go for cover, so there's no need for heavy tackle. Lighter gear (something in the 8 - to 15 -pound class) is more sporting and
will put a bigger smile on your face. Although pompano don't school as tightly as jack crevalle or ladyfish, they do form loose aggregations. Where you find one pompano, there are almost certainly others nearby. Keep fishing that spot - work it very thoroughly.
Because of what pompano eat, they spend most of their time looking downward. No matter what your using to catch them, keep it near the bottom. If it's not within a foot or so of the sand, it's probably going to be ignored.
You may have heard about pompano "skipping" in boat wakes. A passing boat will often disturb pompano and cause them to jump out of the water. Sometimes you can turn around and successfully cast to those fish. However, here's the important bit that many anglers miss: If pompano were there once, they'll probably be there again. Treat any spot where you skip pompano as a potential honeyhole for later

The fishing has gone crazy with the warmer temperatures and the migration of bait coming into the Harbor. Schools of bait are everywhere, and there seem to be predatory fish on almost every school. This is a great time to get kids, beginners and intermediate fly fishers out on the water. With bites coming fast and furious, it's an opportunity for the less experienced fisherman to work on some important techniques. Let me give you a few examples.
Casting is, of course, the most important aspect of fly fishing to practice. But you don't need fish for that - you can practice it on the lawn at home any time. If you can throw a pile of line and fly 30 feet from the boat, you are able to work on a couple things on the water.
First off, you need to get good at stripping. No, we're not removing any pieces of clothing to loud raunchy music - we're just moving the fly. After you make a cast, the line must be controlled up under a finger (or fingers) on the rod hand. From this point, strip the fly by pulling the line back toward your body through the fingers with the opposite hand, (making the line outside the rod tip shorter).
I know for many of you this may sound very trite and remedial, but quite often I have people on my boat who say they have"fly fished for years" - but they have no idea that they need to move the fly or how to do it. Just last week, I had two trout fisherman from New York who had trouble with this very thing. Don would make a nice short cast

30 to 40 feet, then mend his line (we were drifting so the line would bow). And then he'd just wait, staring down the line.
I laughed and asked him if he was tired. "No, why?" Dude, ya gotta move the fly! I did a quick demo and explained the process, and hooked a nice mackerel in so doing. Don and his buddy Greg went to work, trying out their new stripping skills.
It was working. I would see the lines jump as the fish hit the flies - but then the rodtips would immediately go straight up in the air, and no fish would be hooked. OK, guys, it's time for another demo. Let's work on the "strip set."
First I explained it to them. As you fish the fly back and feel a take, leave the rodtip down and just make a harder quick strip. If you don't feel the fish, just resume stripping as normal until the next take. Raising the rodtip (we call that a trout-set) is a hard habit to break, but in saltwater fly fishing it's a must.
In fresh or salt water, if you are fishing any kind of streamer pattern, leave the rodtip down until you feel the weight of the fish after strip setting. Then and only then raise the rod tip a little. If you get a hit and then immediately raise the tip of the rod, you have now moved the fly completely out of the fish's line of sight. He's swimming around wondering where his dinner went!
Leaving the rodtip down will make you much more productive. It will also save you the time and trouble of recasting so often. Having to recast will just give you more chances of
spooking fish or tangling fly and line. Now let's move on to another dient. Steve has been fishing with me for several years now, and he's a great guy to spend a day on the boat with. Steve has really improved his casting and fishing techniques during our time fishing together. He has worked on his casting to the point that he can cast equally well with either hand, which gives him a big advantage in certain scenarios with wind and having a fish show up on his backhand side. But still, he's one of these guys that has a dark cloud hanging over his head when it comes to catching fish.
We put an end to that this week. With the Harbor alive with bait and busting fish, we spent the first couple hours running from blitz to blitz casting a 6 weight. You could see that cloud just dissipate from hanging over his head. I don't have a clue how many fish he caught. I do remember they were all on the big side for schoolies. Five- and 6-pound jacks burning off line and bending that 6 weight in half. Ladyfish up to 24 inches jumping and fighting like little tarpon. Mackerel up to 27 inches smoked that little 6 weight reel, then stayed in the cooler to later be smoked themselves for fish dip.
When the bite slowed down, I sat him on the cooler to catch his breath and have a drink as I pointed the boat toward the backcountry.

The tide had come in enough to allow me to navigate the skiff to almost anywhere I wanted to go. As I sat the boat down in a sandhole and picked up the pushpole, Steve
said maybe he should quit while still on a "fish-catching high."I told him that we'd catch some snook and a couple of reds, then on the way back to the ramp we'd catch a trout or two to give us a slam. I reminded him to relax on the casts when we spotted the fish and continue to strip set just like he had all morning.
Except for trout-setting on a couple of nice snook and casting right on the tail of a 30 -inch red, Steve did very well and landed several snook to 23 inches. He landed a nice little redfish and leadered one that got away at the boat. Of course, he said it counted and that it was my fault it got away. I said, "Let's head for the dock; you've done enough damage for today."
Off we went. About halfway back, he yelled "What about my trout? I want my slam!" "love it. The dark cloud was gone and he was anxious to finish off the day with a couple more fish. I sat the boat down on a nice little grassflat. He caught two trout and was ready to head in. I said he had one slam, he said he had two.
Fishing is great right now, don't miss out on some great "catching practice" while the action is hot.
Stay fly.

# Our problems have solutions 

Recent appointments by our governor give me more hope than I've ever had on the state level. I am extremely disappointed in our cities and counties lack of insight; they are dumping sewage frequently and getting by saying they are sorry.
This is especially disheartening because we already know how our water quality can be improved. We don't need to reinvent the wheel. Chesapeake Bay programs are making headway on several fronts: Improving water quality, reducing pollution inputs, and rebuilding their oyster population.
Gov. DeSantis is attacking our water programs aggressively and appointing people who are very qualified to understand and address our real problems. Ron Bergeron, appointed to the South Florida Water Management District board, and Dr. Tom Frazier as our state's first-ever chief science officer, are true experts - they care about our future.
I've worked with both of these men, and I believe in their integrity and dedication to our natural resources. I'm convinced they can and will contribute positive ideas and workable solutions, if we allow them to do their jobs. They have a wealth of firsthand understanding of our waters and ecosystems. There is hope, but it will take time and cooperation from other government bodies - especially our legislators.

Governments do not normally work
quickly. There are many good reasons for this, but this time they need to get our problems turned around now! We do need to use our voices to promote working solutions. We must be careful not to allow distractions to derail our goals. We must stay vigilant and focused to save our waters. There is serious big money in development and other powerful business interests that would rather see us focused on celebrity gossip or fighting each other.
We have momentum, but we need serious traction and dedication. There are many groups keeping water quality on our radar. This is the time to make sure we are reducing our nutrient inputs - each of us, everywhere we can. Don't just blame the big problems. Remember, solutions start at home for all of us.
I am shocked that our local governments get by with continuing to dump untreated or partially treated waste into our waters. Sarasota and Venice have an appalling record of adding to our water problems. They need to be forced to cease and desist yesterday. This is criminal and must stop now!
Suncoast Waterkeeper is preparing to file lawsuits on Sarasota County under the Clean Water Act. They say that Sarasota's Bee Ridge waste water treatment plant has continued to discharge between 2.5 and 3 million gallons of waste water daily into the Phillippi Creek watershed. According to the suit, this has been going on since 2013.

The amount of nutrients equals the amount of all the septic systems along the creek; doubling the nutrient load put into our waters. This has been a huge contributor to our red tide problems for a decade at least. It must stop! With Midnight Pass closed, much of these nutrients end up flowing out of Venice Inlet.
Venice has been a habitual offender also, dumping whenever we have a big rain event. Their Gulf beaches are closed frequently because of sewage spills. I believe much of our red tide and fish population reduction is a direct result of these spills. Our algae problems are fed by these nutrients too.
OK, we have problems - what can we do? Consider what the Chesapeake Bay restoration folks are doing, which is working. Here is an excerpt from an article I found at ChesapeakeBay.net:

The Chesapeake Bay Program measures progress toward the achievement of water quality standards in the Bay using three environmental factors: dissolved oxygen, underwater grass abundance (to measure water clarity) and chlorophyll-a.

- Chlorophyll-a: Last year we saw a reduction in chlorophyll-a, a measure of algae growth. Large algae blooms can block sunlight from reaching underwater grasses, causing them to die. As they decompose, the water loses oxygen, which fish and other underwater life need to survive.
- Underwater grasses: Underwater grasses absorb excess nutrients and need clear water to
thrive. In 2018, the acreage of grasses increased indicating that the water was clear of algae blooms and excess sediment.
- Dissolved oxygen: Just like humans, underwater life needs oxygen to survive. An increase in dissolved oxygen, like we saw last year, means that blue crabs, striped bass and other critters had more access to a resource they need to survive.
This year the Chesapeake was 40 percent cleaner than it was at its worst, but it's taken 35 years to get to this point. I know this is a long time, but we have been polluting for much longer. Improvements are closely linked to reduced nitrogen loads from its watersheds.
This is helping reduce algae and increase the healthy seagrasses. Also, their oyster programs are showing impressive positive results, producing food-quality oysters and cleaner waters. Clams can help also.
These are win-win opportunities, and we can duplicate here. Look up these types of successful campaigns that are working for other areas. We don't have to figure everything out - we need to use the resources we have available to research how others are dealing with the same issues.

One of the benefits of kayak fishing is access to wadable spots other folks can't get to from shore or by boat. We both enjoy wade fishing and the opportunity it gives us to get really close and personal with grassflats and the things that live there.
Unfortunately, many flats have a soft, sticky bottom or are surrounded by deep water that blocks waders access. From a boat angler's point of view, shallow flats and shoal bars often block their access to the flats and oyster bars where redfish hang out A kayak addresses all of these issues, and will carry your gear, a cooler and keep you dry at the same time. Still, wading is a great way to fish and a good reason to stand up while kayak fishing.
When the tide drops, the gamefish you are targeting come out of the mangroves and head for deeper sand holes nearby. This is the time to be wading along an oyster bar in 6 inches of water and casting to those bronze shadows at the drop off. First, though, you must have the proper footwear and park your kayak so that it will still be there when you return.
Before you hop out of your kayak to wade anywhere, check the bottom with your paddle. Even though the water is only 6 inches deep, the mud below may go down another 2 feet. Sand bottom may look firm but turn out to be soft and sticky, holding
your feet in place as your kayak drifts away. Lots of new kayakers end up sitting in the water when their feet get stuck to the bottom. That's when folks wearing automatic inflatable PFDs wish they had the manual type. If you do end up walking on a sticky bottom, walk on your toes, keeping the weight off your heels. It just works better. Our favorite places to wade fish from a kayak include oyster bars. They build a really firm bottom and are usually close to feeding fish. Approach the bar from the lee (downwind) side and hop out on the white shells. These are the dead oyster shell fragments that are not as sharp as the darker live oysters. The best bars have both light and dark shells. The light ones for wading on and the dark oysters keep the fish around.
Sticky bottom will steal most shoes right off your foot. We recommend using basic scuba boots for their relatively low cost and the big zippers for easy on and off. There are lots of wading boots out there that cost more than these scuba boots. Most boots come in high and low top versions, but we recommend the high top to keep more debris out. Whatever you decide on, be sure to rinse and dry them thoroughly after each use or you'll never want to wear them again. We built a PVC contraption that hooks up to a shop vac blower and will dry four boots in about 20 minutes. It's pretty noisy, though.

The little folding anchors most kayak anglers carry are great for pausing to re-rig on a drift. But if you are walking away from your only ride home, bring a bigger hook When we hop out to wade, we use a big anchor and a stake-out pole if we can. Many small oyster bars have mangroves nearby where a kayaker can tie off. Just park on the leeward side, tie off to a tree, and run an anchor out the stern to hold it off the shells. On a sand bar, we will use everything we have to secure the kayak. Near any channel, the issue of boat wakes makes anchoring problematic. We generally avoid shoal bars and other spots like that
The alternative to anchoring your kayak is to tow it along behind you. This has its drawbacks. If there's a breeze, it is better to walk into it if you are towing a kayak However, this will shorten your casting distance. Wading downwind, your kayak will be passing you or pushing you as you wade along. Another issue becomes obvious when a hooked fish circles around you and gets hung up on the kayak. Keep your kayak close and raise your rod to help keep the fish clear.
Now about safety: Wading anglers commonly tow a bait bucket with shrimp and a stringer for their catch. We have done it too. The shrimp scent from your bait bucket attracts your target fish - which is not a bad thing, but unfortunately, stingrays
are also attracted. Stingrays aren't really a problem unless you step on them. Now, just practice the "stingray shuffle" - slide your feet forward instead of picking them up and putting them down. It's the only dance step you need to learn for a safe and fun time wade fishing from a kayak on the flats of Southwest Florida.
If you want some real excitement, a stringer with struggling and possibly bleeding fish attached will attract sharks looking for that exact thing. Sharks are usually skittish, but just in case, always attach the bait bucket to a belt loop or something breakable with a light 6-foot line. Then attach your stringer to the bait bucket which is several away from your leg. If you're properly equipped and take appropriate precautions, wade fishing is a lot of fun. We hope you enjoy using your kayak to get to some amazing spots where others can't. Remember, trout over 20 inches, snook and redfish are closed now to help with red tide recovery.

Tips for coexisting with alligators

PROVIDED BY THE FWC
The American alligator， Florida＇s state reptile，is an important part of Florida＇s wetland habitats．This large reptile is found throughout the state in freshwater lakes， ponds，swamps and slow－ moving rivers．Occasionally they＇re found in brackish waters as well．
During spring，alligators become more active and visible．When temperatures rise，their metabolism increases and they begin seeking prey．Although alli－ gator bite incidents resulting in serious injury are rare in Florida，the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission recommends taking precautions when having fun in and around the water．
Because alligators control their body temperature by basking in the sun，they can be easily observed．If you see an alligator，keep your distance．Also，never feed alligators because it is dangerous and illegal．When fed，alligators can overcome their natural wariness and earn to associate people with food．
Alligators are most active between dusk and dawn． To reduce the chances of
conflicts with alligators， swim only during daylight hours and in designated swimming areas．
The FWC also recommends pet owners keep their animals on a leash and away from the water because pets can resemble an alligator＇s natural prey．
The FWC places the highest priority on public safety and urges people who believe an alligator poses a threat to people， pets or property to call FWC＇s toll－free Nuisance Alligator Hotline at 866－FWC－GATOR 866－392－4286）．When someone concerned about an alligator calls the Nuisance Alligator Hotline， the FWC will dispatch one of our contracted nuisance alligator trappers to resolve the situation．The FWC also works diligently to keep Floridians and visitors informed，including providing advice about living with alligators．

If you're getting cut off, use a short piece of knottable wire leader. Avoid swivels, which make tempting targets for bluefish.

941-922-9671 stupid. Snook, trout and redfish are steady in Sarasota Bay, and we're seeing a lot of catch-and-release action. Pompano are still on the beach, but probably not for long.

Blackfin tuna are steady for the guys who know how to target them. There are some huge mangrove snapper on the ledges from 35 feet out, and the lanes and yellowtail have also been good. We're still hoping for hogfish, but they've been absent.

There are still good numbers of big kingfish off the beaches, with a few just outside the breakers. Troll a live threadie or blue runner for a serious smoker.

When winds allow, the bottom fishing is good. Fish 80 to 110 feet for a mixed bag of snapper and decent red grouper. The best bite is of course on less-known spots. Kingfish are around the artificial reefs and bait pods.

The Venice Pier has had a lot of fish around - blue fish, Spanish mackerel and a few pompano. The water is clear and bait is abundant. Silly jigs and spoons are hot.

The jetties have been on and off for pompano. The best bite has been on outgoing tides with east winds, and a silly jig is a good proposition there. Hammerhead and bull sharks have been cruising offVenice Beach. Snook are showing up along the ICW. Lemon Bay is hit or miss with snook, redfish and trout. Tarpon are here and there; a couple have been jumped at the Venice Pier.

Whiting have been eating cut shrimp in the surf. We're also seeing a few pompano scattered on the beaches. Big snook have been coming out of the rivers into the ICW and willing to eat big whiting, mullet or ladyfish. The topwater bite has been good for redfish and snook in the morrings along protected shorelines. Tarpon have moved up into the Harbor and the creeks, but there are few in the Pass.

Spanish mackerel are taking trolled spoons around bait pods in the Harbor and outside the bars in 6 feet of water. Some bluefish are mixed in. Catch-and-release snook action is good on live whitebait in the canal mouths. There are largemouth bass around the spillways of Port Charlotte hitting live shiners and Rat-L-Traps. Expect a tilapia or two if you're throwing a small enough lure.

On the days that allow, it's common for anglers to catch limits of snapper on the deeper reefs and wrecks. Blackfin tuna are also on those structures and responding well to chum. Sharks are out there too, eating many fish as they're being caught.

Tarpon are at the U.S. 41 bridges and in the Harbor. A few fish have been caught in the big pass as well, but not that many. Cutbait and small crabs are catching fish.

Juvenile and subadult tarpon are all over the passes, the middle holes, the river mouths Sanibel. They're not in huge numbers, but they're very fishable.

The Fort Myers Beach bridge has had a lot of fish snook, mangrove snapper, sheepshead, jacks - but everything is small. The Sanibel Causeway has seen a few tarpon, but not enough to call it a run yet. Red seaweed has been around and kind of a pain, but it seems to be lessening.

Small bull and sharpnose sharks are all over the flats off Pineland. Any fresh or frozen cut fish is going to get attention.

The Hurricane Bay Bridge has been producing good numbers of big snook, and the shark fishermen have been finding hammerheads there at night.

THE FISH COACH'S TIP OF THE WEEK: A lot of anglers are switching to whitebait, if they can catch any. Catching whitebait is only a part of the equation - if you can't keep it alive, you might as well buy it frozen at the tackle shop. Here are some tips for keeping your whitebait frisky: Don't overload the well, especially on a rougher day. The ride to your fishing spot will probably kill a bunch of your baits. Round wells work a lot better than rectangular ones for this purpose. If your boat doesn't have one, consider having one installed if you plan to do a lot of whitebait fishing. A well full of bait needs a lot of oxygen, but forcing the baitfish to swim against a strong current will weaken them. A wide outlet that flows a little slower will keep your bait healthier than a high-pressure small outlet (same for the drain). You can also add an aeration system to help supply plenty of oxygen for your baitfish. - As the Fish Coach, Capt. Josh Olive offers personalized instruction on fishing techniques.
