## Tinkerbelle's killer gets probation

### Englewood man pleads no contest to fatally stomping girlfriend's dog

An Englewood man was sentenced to 60 months probation, with adjudication withheld, after allegedly killing his girlfriend's dog, Tinkerbelle, in January of 2018.

Chad Kolberg, a 6-foot, 1-inch, 200-pound man, was accused of stomping on the Shih Tzu mix. He pleaded no contest.

The dog died sometime after Kolberg's girlfriend left home following an argument around midnight on Jan. 23, according to court records. She was notified by Kolberg that Tinkerbelle wasn't feeling well around 2 a.m. At 2:30 a.m., he said the dog was fine, but at 4:30 a.m., she received a text saying Tinkerbelle was dead.

Kolberg told Animal Control he had no idea what happened, and he was home doing laundry and dishes all night after his girlfriend left, the report stated.

Tinkerbelle was found to have died from blunt force trauma to her head. Bruising covered the top of her head, and there was significant bleeding from her right ear, as well as abrasions under her chin, left shoulder, and inside her upper lip, according to the report. A broken canine tooth was found in her stomach.

Kolberg allegedly had blood on the bottom and edges of his shoes.

The veterinarian who conducted the necropsy said the dog's injuries could not

have been caused by falling off an object in the house and were not caused by "self-trauma." She

said the injuries as well as the blood on Kolberg's shoes could indicate the dog had been stomped on.

Animal Control Division Manager Brian Jones said Kolberg claimed the dog fell off a kitchen table, but her injuries were not consistent with that claim.

"I was like no, is your kitchen table like 100 feet high?" he said. "We were pleased with the outcome here. I think it holds him accountable."

Kolberg was charged with torturing an animal with intent to injure or kill, a third-degree felony. In addition to probation, he must pay outstanding fees totaling \$2,741, including \$2,000 to Animal Control's Animal Welfare Trust Fund and is barred from possessing any animals.

## Citing privacy concerns, some lawmakers oppose AG's opioid bill

### State is suing makers of Oxycontin, pharmacies, others

TALLAHASSEE — Throughout the 2000s, Florida lawmakers tried repeatedly to create a database of drug prescriptions to fight the pill mill crisis as it bloomed into a full-blown epidemic.

But every year for nine years, it was shot down over concerns about patient privacy. It was only when the issue escalated into a national crisis did lawmakers finally establish a database that could be used to track problem

doctors and keep addicts from getting pills.

Now, Florida senators are using the same excuse they used then — patient privacy — to reject a request by Florida's top law enforcement official. Attorney General Ashley Moody wants access to the database to bolster the state's lawsuit against the nation's largest drug makers, distributors and pharmacies, which could be worth billions in damages for Florida and its opioid victims.

On Monday, the Florida House passed their bill 111-0

granting her access to the Florida Department of Health's data.

But in the Senate, Moody's request remains in deep trouble, stranded in a committee with four days left before legislative session ends.

The extraordinary standoff, pitting Senate Republicans against their new attorney general, threatens to delay the state's lawsuit against companies like Purdue Pharma, the maker of Oxycontin, and pharmacy giants CVS and Walgreens.

Florida is one of many states

suing the companies over their roles in the opioid epidemic. If the bill succeeds, some say it could serve as a model for other states.

"This is a very significant piece of legislation," said William Large, president of the tort reform advocacy group Florida Justice Reform Institute, and a critic of Moody's effort. "If this passes, it will be the template for the other states to try to get the data in a civil context."

Florida was slow to react to

# Punta Gorda man sentenced for Circle K robbery

A Punta Gorda man was sentenced to 15 years in prison as a habitual felony offender for a 2017 robbery at Circle K located at 3035 Tamiami Trail in Punta Gorda.

Dickman allegedly robbed a Circle K just after

midnight in May 2017. He claimed to have a gun under his shirt and demanded the teller give him all the money in the cash drawer, according to a press release from the State Attorney's Office.

He then made the clerk go into the bathroom, took his cell phone, and told him to stay there for 10 minutes. When the clerk came out, Dickman was gone.

According to the press release, he was identified by surveillance video from the

store which showed a tattoo on his neck. There was also a sweatshirt recovered near the store that matched the one seen in the surveillance video being worn by the robber. Dickman's DNA was found on the sweatshirt, the press release stated.

Dickman's residence at the time of the crime was less than 1.5 miles from the Circle K. He pleaded to one count of robbery and one count of false imprisonment.

# Aviation Unit will increase patrols on the waterline

## Flights aim to deter boat thefts

Charlotte County residents near the water can expect to see more evening helicopter patrols as the Aviation Unit searches for boat and boat motor thieves.

"We're just adjusting our flights later in the night, so we can be out there when these thefts are occurring," said Chief Pilot Shane Engelauf.

The patrols are a response to the statewide trend of boat and boat motor thefts. According to the National Insurance Crime Bureau, Florida leads the nation in boat thefts. In 2016, the state had 1,291 thefts, more than twice the thefts as California, the state with the second highest number of thefts at 451. The top five cities for boat thefts are all in Florida, according to the NICB.

Katie Heck, spokesperson for the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office, said the county traditionally has lower amounts of thefts than the rest of the state, but it's still an issue.

The Charlotte County Sheriff's Office will be increasing patrols of boat yards, marinas, and the waterline in response to a statewide increase in boat and boat motor thefts. In addition to routine patrols, specialty units

## BOAT SECURITY TIPS

The Charlotte County Sheriff's Office Marine Unit recommends the following practices to make vessels a hard target for criminals, whether stored at home or in a boat yard or marina:

Record all your boat's information, such as serial numbers, ID codes, and HIN. Take photos and mark your property with a unique code, such as your house number.

Install an alarm system designed for the marine environment. Criminals don't like to make noise or attract attention. Dock lights triggered by motion are an inexpensive means to deter theft.

Secure your vessel. Lock the boat and ignition system, and keep your key in your residence.

Don't forget to check your security measures to ensure they are working and double check your insurance policies to confirm you have coverage.

Residents are always encouraged to be vigilant and report any unusual activities. Examples of suspicious activity could be vessels running without lights, carrying multiple large containers on deck, or people loitering in the areas of residential docks and public marinas, especially in the late night and early morning hours.

like the aviation unit will be flying overhead more often, according to a press release.

Last year, there were 44 total thefts and attempted thefts of boat, motors, boat trailers, GPS's, and lower end units. This year, there have been five boat-related thefts, including one stolen GPS, two lower end units, and five motors.

Engelauf said the Aviation Unit uses the FLIR (Forward Looking Infrared), which is an infrared camera that sees heat signatures.

"We're able to look at that and identify if somebody's hiding in a tree or something," he said. "You'll see the outline of their body heat. Or if they jump in a trashcan,

you'll see the outline inside the trashcan."

They also use a spotlight called the NightSun and night vision goggles. If he sees something suspicious, he'll alert the deputy assigned to the zone and give updates as the deputy arrives to the scene.

Heck encouraged residents to report anything suspicious when they see it happening — not to wait until hours or days later.

"If it's a theft out on the water, and we don't get there in time, it's gone," she said.

# Gas prices on a slow decline

## Statewide prices declined 18 days in a row, according to gas station data

Gas prices statewide are on their 18th day of decline.

In those 18 days, prices for regular gas have dropped 9 cents per gallon for regular gas statewide.

Locally, we're saving a few more pennies with the Punta Gorda metropolitan statistical area (MSA) prices, which includes all of Charlotte County, declining 13 cents since April 12.

## Why are they lowering?

Gas prices are moving in line with wholesale gasoline and oil futures "which all dropped last week," said Mark Jenkins, a spokesperson for the American Automobile Association (AAA).

Gasoline futures also declined 3 cents on the stock market, while wholesale gasoline slipped 4 cents per gallon in Florida.

The price of crude oil settled at \$62.80 per barrel last Friday. A week before, the price of crude oil was almost \$66 per barrel.

"The downward direction should help keep downward pressure on prices this week," Jenkins said.

However, stock prices have the ability to quickly change directions this time of year in response to international or domestic news that have negative implications on fuel supplies, he said.

## How do we compare?

As of Tuesday, Florida was the 13th cheapest state for gas nationally.

The lowest gas prices in the country are mostly found in the southeastern United States, Jenkins said. "Since most of these states are supplied by Gulf Coast refineries, this could be

a positive indicator that refineries in the area are moving past their various issues that have affected fuel supplies and led prices higher."

## How's the rest of the state doing?

The most expensive areas in Florida for regular gasoline are the West Palm Beach-Boca Raton area (\$2.805), Miami (\$2.777) and Gainseville (\$2.762).

Meanwhile, the cheapest areas in Florida for regular gasoline are the Melbourne-Titusville area (\$2.627), Jacksonville (\$2.629) and Punta Gorda (\$2.649).

## What's in store for the future?

More ambiguity.

Though nothing is set in stone, we can prepare ourselves for the worst considering past trends.

"The downward movement is encouraging," Jenkins said, "However, it's possible we haven't seen our highest prices of the season."

Last year, the Florida average jumped almost 10 cents in the second week of May—following the oil trends at the time.

Normally, the highest prices of the year occur by Memorial Day. Last year, the highest price statewide was on Memorial Day weekend at \$2.918.

There is some hope, though, as statewide prices Tuesday were 3 cents less than this time last year.

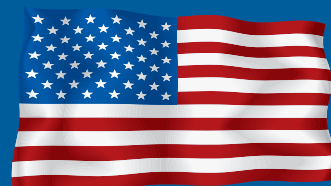

### Turtle time on beaches of SW Florida

**OUR POSITION:** *Keep it dark. Keep it clean.*

South Florida beaches enjoy a distinction that sets them apart from most others in the world: They are the home nesting sands of large numbers of loggerhead sea turtles. This is both a natural wonder, and a hassle.

Loggerheads are the most common type of sea turtle in the Atlantic. They had suffered population loss to such an extent by the 1970s they were classified as threatened or endangered species under the Endangered Species Act and thus granted special protections.

Now, groups of volunteers working with the Coastal Wildlife Club and Mote Marine Laboratory patrol beaches during turtle-nesting season — May 1 to Oct. 31. Out early every morning, turtle-patrollers chart and stake off new nests, watch over the nests and record activity.

Local ordinances require special outdoor lighting at beachfront homes and businesses. They require human visitors to clean up beach chairs and fill in holes that might hamper female turtles crawling from Gulf to nesting spot or turtle hatchlings headed from nest to Gulf. Humans are forbidden, by state law, from disturbing turtles or their nests, eggs or hatchlings.

"Making an effort to keep our beaches dark at night is one of the most important things you can do to help sea turtles," Robbin Trindell, the head of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's sea turtle management program, said in an email last week.

"Even small artificial lights from a house, a flashlight or cellphone camera can confuse female sea turtles and their hatchlings and cause them to wander off course."

So be advised: Keep the beaches as dark as possible. Shield lights. Remove beach chairs. Fill in holes. Don't let dogs run loose.

These are sound rules. Backed by law and threat of possible enforcement. And, yes, a hassle.

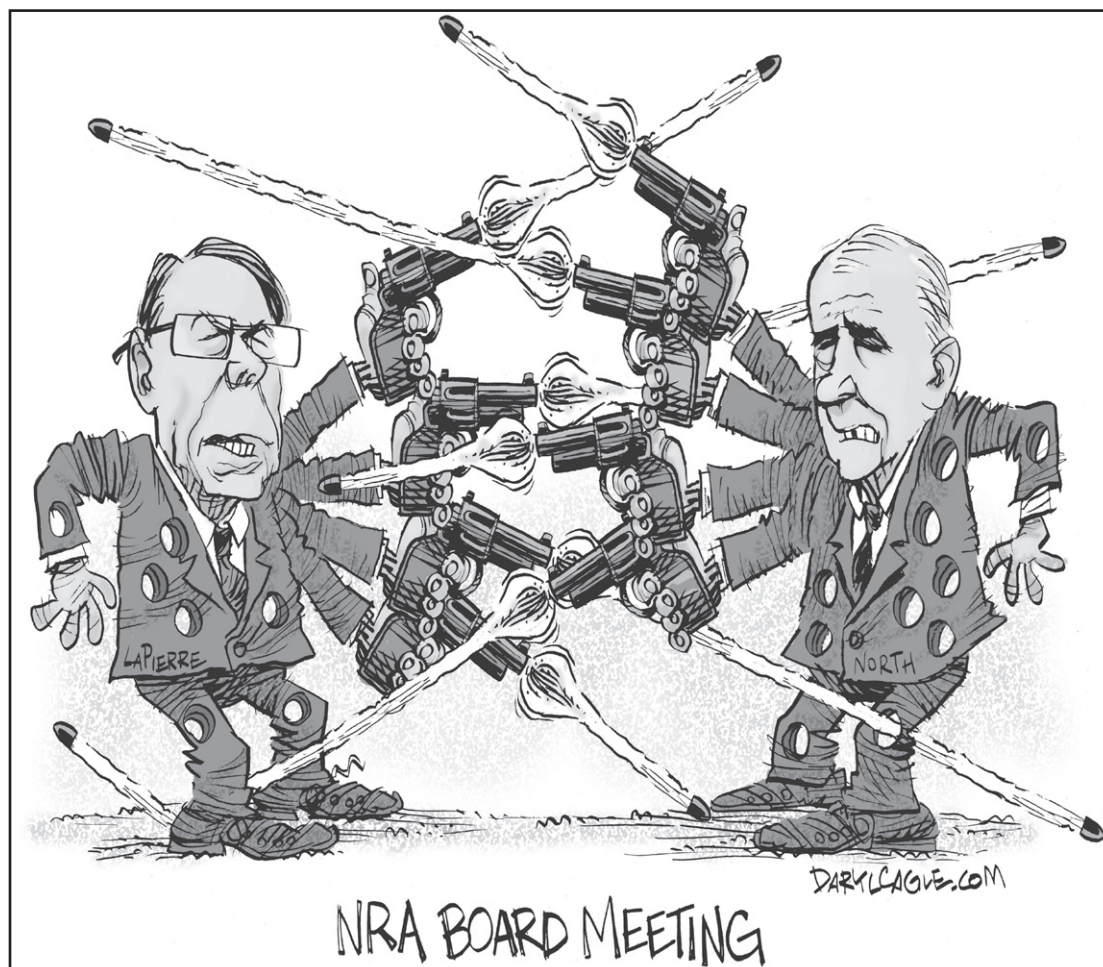
Add to the hassle policies restricting the hardening of the coastline. And restrictions that force public works projects like beach renourishment to occur outside the seven-month nesting season.

The reason is that vibrant wildlife adds immeasurably to our quality of life. Have you been at the beach and watched the reaction when a squadron of pelicans swoops in overhead, or when dolphins leap nearby, or when hatchlings tunnel from the sand and wiggle toward shore? Those are the times you realize, it's their world and we're just visiting. It's a big reason we try our best to protect habitat and co-exist.

South Florida is one of the two biggest loggerhead nesting regions in the world. Only Oman in the Middle East is visited by as many as 10,000 nesting females every year.

Sea turtle hatchlings have an extremely low rate of survival. But survivors travel hundreds of miles in the Atlantic. When they mature, females mate and return to their "natal" shores — the areas of their home nest — to lay nests of their own. That may be the most remarkable aspect of this life cycle, the homing instinct: The sea turtle you encounter this year is one who began here, roughly, decades before. Note also that loggerheads can live for more than 70 years.

Please do your part. On a good year, the beaches of Charlotte and Sarasota counties are home to approximately 6,000 nests. That's a lot of remarkable wildlife. Respect the rules so your grandchildren will be able appreciate this special natural wonder decades from now.

# Improving county's water quality is a critical task

As I mentioned in an earlier column, we created a water quality task force to enable us to address the Charlotte County Commission's strategic focus areas. The task force includes staff from multiple departments and divisions and one early job is to identify what we are already doing.

The scope of the undertaking is highlighted by breaking down all the categories of water, including surface, ground, well, storm, potable, waste and reclaimed. The relative quality of each type is determined by their designated uses and state or federal findings of impairment.

In an organization as large as county government, not everyone can be fully aware of all the work done by everyone else. This is why improving "line of sight" is so important. While not everyone will know exactly what their colleagues are doing, connecting their own work

with strategic goals gives them an understanding of how their job contributes to the overall success of the county and the community.

That said, identifying all of the projects underway is necessary to give county administration and the board a broad awareness of our efforts, progress and potential future initiatives.

Probably the most high-profile work underway is the sewer master plan, which kicked off with the East and West Spring Lake septic-to-sewer project. Design work is already being done on the next phase of the plan in El Jobean and the next area after that will be in the Ackerman-Countryman area of Port Charlotte, south of Edgewater Drive. The Utilities Department

has also undertaken a wastewater line repair and replacement program to address the many older pipes installed by General Development Utilities several decades ago.

Other projects include testing water quality and monitoring and restoring water-filtering clam and oyster populations in Charlotte Harbor. We performed sediment removal from stormwater canals to improve their functionality and installed a floating treatment system in Sunshine Lake to prevent future algae buildup. Our fertilizer ordinance aims to reduce nutrient loads from residences and businesses. We'll soon be restocking the snook fishery to help it recover from last year's red tide outbreak. That's not all, but you get the sense of how much is going on.

The task force also is reviewing what other communities have done when faced with water quality challenges. One finding is that the economic impact of allowing

water quality to degrade is a key driver behind convincing community leaders to act.

The County Commission is committed to restoring and protecting our water. Staff is actively working on many projects to meet the board's goals. The task force will bring additional information and proposals to the board in the coming weeks and months. We pledge to be diligent stewards of the natural bounty our county enjoys. I'll share more progress reports in future columns to let you know what we're doing and how it is working.

## Stewardship award

Ralph Mitchell, Charlotte County's University of Florida-Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences extension agent, wrote to me about a distinguished honor received by one of our master gardener volunteers:

"I had the opportunity to attend a ceremony

today where one of our master gardener volunteers, Becky Copenhaver, was awarded the Environmental Stewardship Award from the Florida Department Environmental Protection for (an) article she wrote about mangroves. DEP South District Office Director Jon Iglehart came up to present it. Mr. Iglehart said that their staff references the article when talking with new residents, snowbirds, or general customers as it is a perfect resource to talk about mangroves."

Congratulations to Becky on her recognition. We're fortunate to have so many people donate their time and expertise to help make Charlotte County a better place. Whether it's at the Extension Service, our libraries, Keep Charlotte Beautiful, the Community Emergency Response Team, advisory committees and more, volunteers are deeply appreciated by me and my colleagues.

## Softball tourney

Last month, the Punta Gorda/Englewood Beach Visitor & Convention Bureau partnered with Florida Half Century Softball to host one of their spring tournaments at Carmalita Field in Punta Gorda. The tournament, which Charlotte County has hosted the past several years, attracted 25 teams (23 of which came from outside Charlotte County). These teams generated approximately \$116,000 in estimated direct expenditures, which translates into over \$185,000 in total economic impact. In addition, more than 180 hotel room nights were tracked for the two-day event.

# Buckley's Pass, mural fencing to be considered

Repayment notices were sent recently to benefitted properties at Buckley's Pass. To date, 66 payments have been received totaling \$97,317. In addition, the bid for construction will be released and responses are due back in 30 days.

At its meeting today, the Punta Gorda City Council will consider an interlocal agreement with Charlotte County to place the benefitted properties into the Alligator Creek Waterway Unit, similar to properties within Burnt Store Isles. The current assessment for such properties in the Waterway Unit is \$25 per year. The potential for the assessment has been

brought up in previous public meetings and communicated in weekly reports.

City staff also addressed the Charlotte County Commission requesting \$150,000 from boater improvement funds to support construction of the navigational channel. This was previously not recommended by the county's Marine Advisory Committee. The County Commission did not support the

city's grant request.

## FY 2020 budget

Last week's report highlighted tentative position additions to the General Fund in the areas of public safety, engineering and information technology. Even with these enhancements, the following comparisons can be made:

In Fiscal Year 2007 at the height of the economic upturn, the full time equivalent position count was 313 and the ratio of employees to population was 1.8. In FY 2014 at the lowest point of the economic downturn, the position count was 263, resulting in a ratio of 1.5.

Using our population estimate of 19,957 in FY 2020 and comparing position count for the same departments/divisions that existed in FY 2007, the position count will be 286 and the ratio of employees to population will be 1.4.

## Fence request

The City Council will consider a request from the Punta Gorda Mural Society to consider installing a fence along the embankment areas of the Gilchrist Bridge (U.S. 41 SB) adjacent to the Harborwalk at today's council meeting. This request is due to the attractiveness of the area as the mural is nearing completion.

Visitors to this area have been observed climbing along the embankment in the locations where it meets the ground. The concern is that this area represents a potential trip hazard. The proposed fencing consists of decorative bollards connected by matching black metal chains. The intent is to remain consistent with the nautical theme of the mural and area, while providing an enhanced level of safety. Any material installation in this area will require approval from the Florida Department

of Transportation.

## Pickleball fencing

The fence contractor will be completing the work on the fencing toward the middle to end of May. The sound barrier material has been delivered and in storage. The consultant performing noise analysis will be able to complete his work thereafter.

# Red tide research bill wins final approval in Legislature

## State funding involves partnership with Mote Marine Laboratory

TALLAHASSEE — A bill aimed at finding ways to control and alleviate toxic red tide blooms has won final approval by the Florida Legislature.

The House voted 112-1 for the measure providing \$3 million a year for the next six years to research red tide. The bill now goes to Gov. Ron DeSantis.

The research would be a partnership between the state Fish and Wildlife

Conservation Commission and Mote Marine Laboratory.

Florida recently experienced one of its largest red tide blooms in recorded history. The 15-month bloom caused respiratory irritations in people and killed sea turtles, manatees, dolphins and fish.

The main sponsor, Republican Sen. Joe Gruters of Sarasota, said the state has traditionally spent money on red tide research during a bloom, but the money dries up when the bloom ends.

the pill mill epidemic of the 2000s. From 2001 to 2008, lawmakers proposed creating a key tool to help in the fight: a prescription drug monitoring program that would track doctors and pharmacies' prescribing habits.

Many other states had such a system, and as their numbers grew, more and more people from other states came to Florida for their pills.

Other states had a drug monitoring program that helped crack down on abuse. But Florida lawmakers continued to reject adopting a similar program. As the Sunshine State became a destination for addicts, governors in other states begged Florida to create a database.

It wasn't until 2009 that Florida did so, and it proved instrumental in shutting down pill mills. So instrumental, in fact, that the nation's opioid addicts that year turned to heroin, a chemically similar drug.

Today, current and former lawmakers see the same privacy argument, and some suspect it's just an excuse to give cover for big corporations.

"They used the word 'privacy,' which gets people's attention," said former Sen. Mike Fasano, who was instrumental in getting the drug database created in 2009 and is now the Pasco County tax collector. "What this comes down to is protecting the corporations that need to be held accountable for helping to create this epidemic we have."

Sen. Gayle Harrell, R-Stuart, tried and failed six times to get the bill passed in the House in the 2000s. She supports Moody's effort.

"It's the same privacy argument," she said. "But we have learned a lot along the way. And it's even, I think, less germane at this point."

The database tracks all monitored drugs, from oxycodone to sleeping pills. But Moody can't use it for her civil lawsuit. By law, it's restricted to criminal cases and administrative actions against doctors.

It's not Moody's only way to get the data. She could get it from the companies themselves, through the discovery process. But the companies could drag the process out for years.

She's asking lawmakers to use parts of the state's own data in her civil case. She would not get patients' names, dates of birth, sex or addresses. Each patient would be assigned a random ID number.

And she would only be allowed to get

the database under a court order, and under very specific circumstances.

Behind the scenes, some of the companies being sued have lobbied lawmakers against the bill.

Publicly, however, the most vocal opponent of Moody's bill has been Large, the president of the tort reform organization.

A Walgreens vice president is on the organization's board, but Large said he's mostly opposed to the bill for philosophical reasons.

"I'm advocating against this bill because it's an expansion of civil liability and uses a state database to prove the civil liability parts of the AG's case," Large said.

He also has practical concerns about the bill. He fears that each person's "unique identifier number" will not really be unique, and that whoever gets the data will be able to decode it.

He also fears a potential data breach. While Virginia's drug database was hacked in 2009, however, Florida's has not been. And privacy concerns have largely centered around the fact that police were getting access to the database at an alarming rate. Lawmakers tightened the system a few years ago.

A spokeswoman for Moody dismissed Large's concerns.

"These issues are nothing more than conspiracy theories of a high paid lobbyist of a defendant in the State's lawsuit with no basis in reality," Lauren Schenone said in a statement. "Experts have concluded that you are more likely to be struck by a meteor than have your privacy compromised by this bill."

Whether the Senate will take it up this week, in the final days of session, remains to be seen. Moody has been lobbying senators herself, and met with Senate President Bill Galvano, R-Bradenton, on Monday.

But on Friday, Galvano was skeptical his chamber would take it up. The bill has to pass the Rules Committee, but chair Lizbeth Benacquisto, R-Fort Myers, has refused to hear it, citing privacy concerns. Her brother-in-law is also a lobbyist for Walgreens.

"The concerns that were raised to me were regarding the privacy of certain information, and protecting certain information from an open analysis," Galvano said.

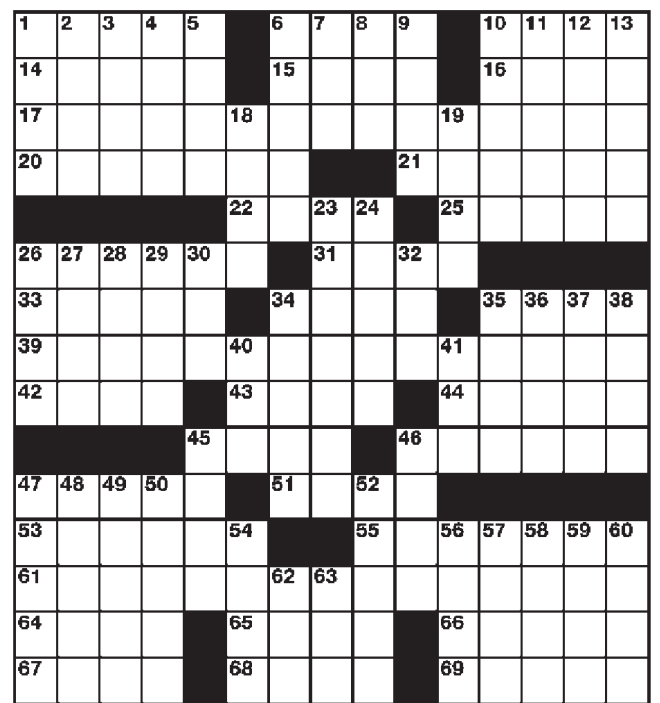
The bill sponsor, Sen. Tom Lee, R-Thonotosassa, thinks he has the numbers to get it passed — if it could get a hearing.

"I think there's clearly a privacy issue," Lee said. "And it is that there are certain pharmacies that want their information to remain private."

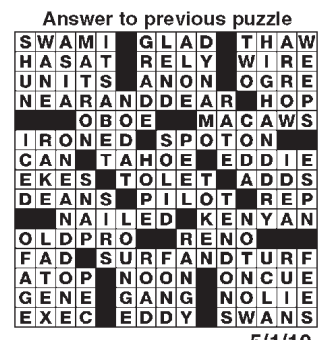

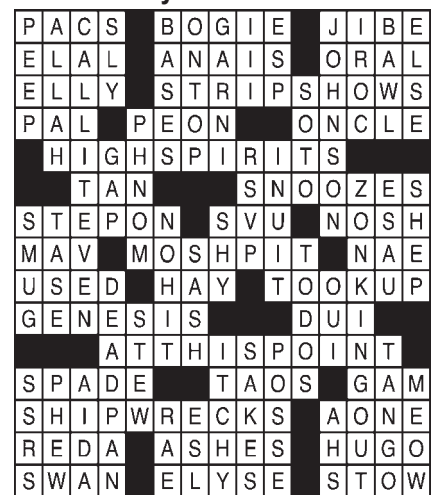

of the Village's southwest buildings facing Punta Gorda Isles. Evans believes that his grandfather, F.M. "Don" Donelson, who originally developed Fishermen's Village nearly 50 years ago, would have been especially proud.

"Fishermen's Village struggled in a state of disrepair for many years of its existence, until the early 2000s, when it came into its own," Evans recalled. "Now, the Village's new owner has a spectacular five-year plan that will modernize my grandfather's original vision, but maintain that Old Florida, small town feel." According to Evans, the Village is undergoing a major culture change as its traffic increases. Village owner Jon Larmore, with the help of his local and national team including Jeremy Hamilton, plans dramatic new experiences for visitors and locals.

"From what I've seen working with them," said Evans, "Fishermen's Village will continue to be Punta Gorda's greatest asset well into the future. Its full potential has yet to be realized."

The Pier will be a 6,000-square-foot, 300-seat, contemporary restaurant which will add a new dining genre to Fishermen's Village. Always seeking the perfect synergy of setting and cuisine, he's never written the same menu twice.

"We wanted to offer something unlike any other restaurant in town," said Stolpe. "This is the sort of fresh, new menu that you'd find in Tampa, St. Pete or Miami. We plan to work



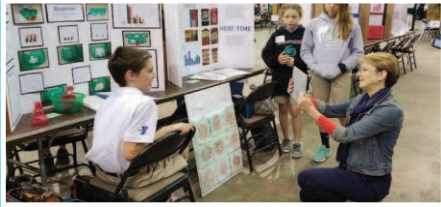

# Charlotte woman sentenced for counterfeiting operation

A Charlotte County woman was sentenced to 21 months in federal prison for her role in a counterfeiting operation last year, the Charlotte County Sheriff's Office reported.

Sabrina Fisher, 34, was arrested last July for making or possessing instruments for forging bills and forging bank bills. In September, the prosecution was taken over by the U.S. Attorney's Office, and she was indicted on three counts of uttering a forged bill and three counts of possessing instruments for forging.

The investigation began in May and led to the discovery of U.S. currency being counterfeited in DeSoto County and being transported throughout Florida. Charlotte, Sarasota

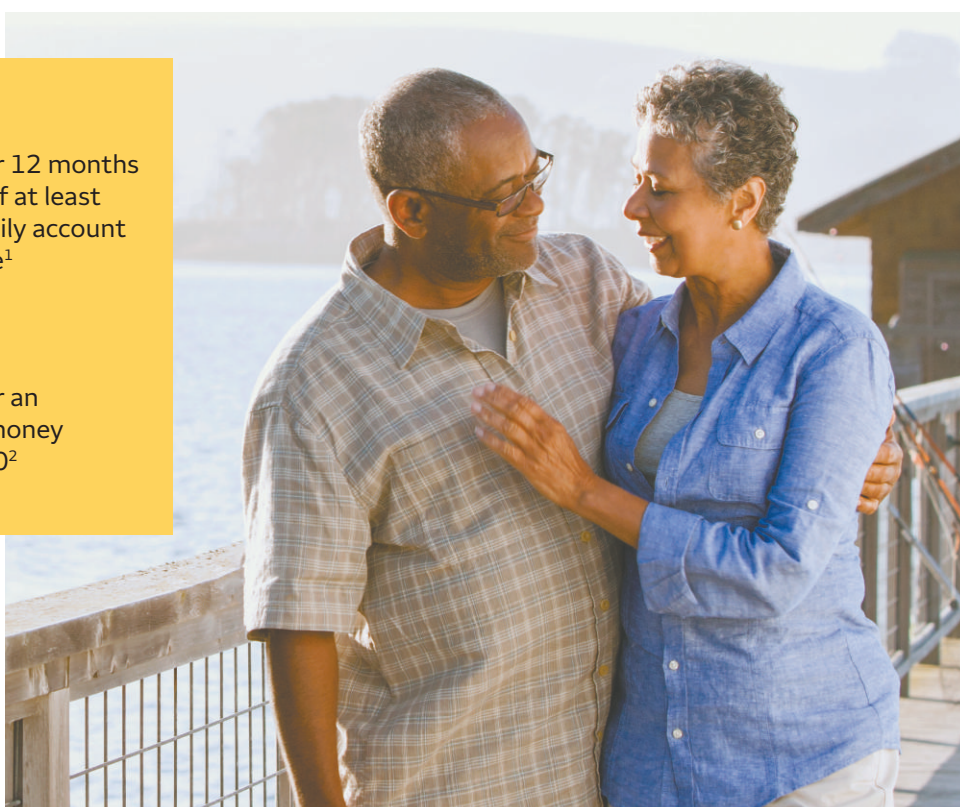

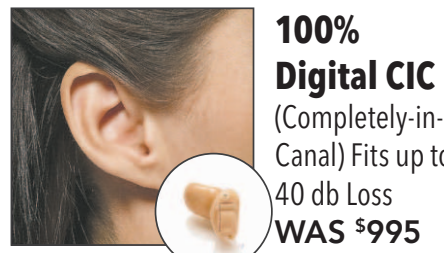

# Trump appointee has history of fighting National Weather Service

## Watchdogs, others warn against former AccuWeather CEO leading NOAA

President Donald Trump's pick to run the federal agency in charge of weather forecasting and water monitoring hit a snag this month. A federal report alleged widespread sexual harassment at AccuWeather, the former company of his nominee, Barry Myers.

It's the second time this year AccuWeather has faced accusations of a hostile work environment.

Few states have as intimate of a relationship with the agency Myers would lead, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, as weather-worried Florida. The agency's scientists study everything from sea level rise to coastal flooding and fisheries management. They predict hurricane activity. When storms arrive, its meteorologists forecast the rain and wind and surge.

Yet amid the controversy with Myers, Florida's two Republican senators, Marco Rubio and Rick Scott, wouldn't say if they support his nomination.

His former company's hostile work allegations aren't the only cloud to cast a shadow on Myers since Trump tapped him for the job in 2017. As the former CEO of the weather forecasting company AccuWeather, Myers made millions predicting the weather for clients. Meanwhile, he waged a decades-long war on the National Weather Service, often arguing that weather forecasts should mostly be left up to the private sector.

Myers would oversee the National Weather Service if confirmed.

Government watchdogs have questioned how Myers could oversee a federal agency that overlaps with a business he remains close to. The union representing federal meteorologists has questioned his credentials while environmentalists say a scientist should be in the job. The advocacy group Public Employees for Environmental Responsibility recently accused Myers of not telling the truth about his former company's sexual harassment settlement.

Scott recently voted for Myers in a committee but has been silent since.

During a recent stop in Tampa, Rubio said he had only "begun to look at the nomination" of Myers — an appointment first made 18 months ago — so he couldn't remark on him. But Rubio didn't seem concerned.

"I anticipate, given just the internal culture of (the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) and the way that agency operates that by and large it will continue to function professionally," Rubio said. "I'm pretty convinced that will be the case."

Private weather forecasting is a growing, lucrative industry, led by the Weather Channel. Private forecasters, including AccuWeather, rely on the nearly infinite data collected by the federal government every day from satellites and radar. These companies take that data, analyze it, repackage it with slick graphics and distribute it to their customers.

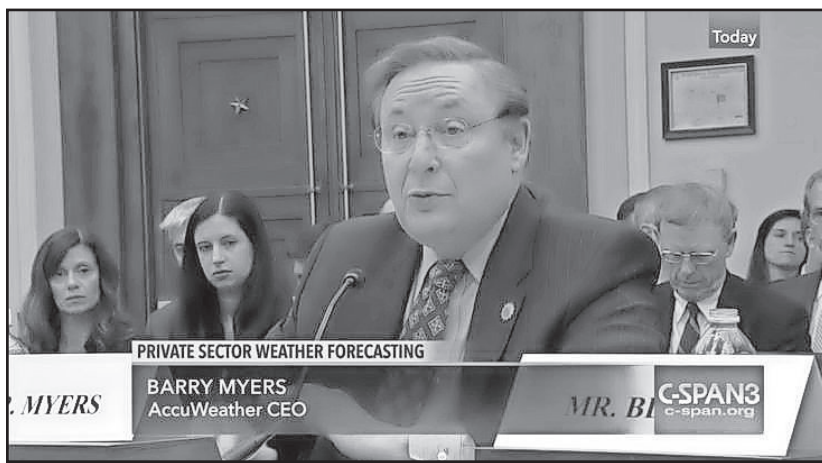
Barry Myers once joked he wasn't made to predict the weather.

He enrolled in meteorology as an undergraduate, he told the Wall Street Journal in 2014, but dropped out.

"I was never interested in learning, which I look at now as sort of funny," he said.

His brother Joel Myers earned a doctorate in meteorology and in 1962 he founded AccuWeather in Pennsylvania.

Barry became a lawyer. He climbed the corporate ranks of his brother's company and ascended to CEO in 2007. Inc. magazine reported in 2016 the company brings in \$100 million a year. Under Myers' watch, AccuWeather created one of the most downloaded mobile weather apps, and its forecasts

appears on local news sites and in newspapers across the country, including in the Tampa Bay Times.

AccuWeather is perhaps best known for its 90-day forecasts that many in the industry have described as a gimmick. But the company also says it has delivered life-saving weather warnings to companies that pay for its customized notifications.

Myers' battles with the National Weather Service started in 1990 with the creation of the Commercial Weather Services Association. For the next two decades, the association's lobbyists tried to convince Congress that the federal government shouldn't be in the business of forecasting, except during extreme weather. The battle was recently chronicled by an extensive Bloomberg News report.

Their argument found a receptive ear in then-Sen. Rick Santorum, from AccuWeather's home state of Pennsylvania. In the mid-2000s, he introduced a bill that critics said would have hindered the National Weather Service. In the most extreme interpretation, no one could get a weather forecast for free.

The Trump administration wouldn't make Myers available for comment. AccuWeather declined to provide contact information for him.

AccuWeather declined to provide contact info for Myers and suggested trying to reach him through the White House. The White House deferred to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. A spokeswoman there said to contact AccuWeather.

"Antagonistic," is how Phil Klotzbach described the relationship. He's a professor in Colorado State University's Department of Atmospheric Science and one of the country's foremost hurricane experts often cited in Florida.

"I would definitely be very, very cautious," Klotzbach said. "We should be encouraging (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) to do more, not less. There's plenty of room for private sector, too."

Others are less concerned. Craig Fugate, the former administrator of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, said the National Weather Service enjoys near universal support from Congress and is popular with most Americans.

Unlike his predecessors, Myers isn't a scientist. But Fugate noted that Myers is more intimate with meteorology than many previous administrators, many of which come from other fields. In that sense, Fugate thinks Myers could help the agency modernize.

"Some people are afraid they're going to sell off the weather service and privatize everything, but I don't see that happening. I'm not sure how much could be done before Congress steps in," said Fugate, who also once led Florida's Department of Emergency Management. "Then again, there are a lot of areas where the administration has done something that Congress has yet to deal with."

•••

Last year, then-Sen. Bill Nelson helped blocked Myers' nomination.

Nelson objected to what he said was an "immense cloud of conflict of interest" over Myers stake AccuWeather and his brother Joel's position heading it.

Joel Myers has also acknowledged founding a hedge fund that trades futures based on his weather predictions. What if Barry Myers — knowingly or otherwise — gave his brother advanced knowledge of a storm or a shifting weather pattern and Joel used that information to profit his fund?

In the face of such questions, Barry Myers stepped away from AccuWeather in January and sold his interest in the company.

But Walter Shaub, the former director of the U.S. Office of Government Ethics, said the arrangement could allow Myers to reclaim his stock after his tenure as NOAA administrator. He recently called Myers a "deeply concerning" appointee and said the deal to unload his stocks raises the possibility of a "sham transaction."

The latest news about AccuWeather's workplace environment only solidified Nelson's opposition, the Florida Democrat recently told the Tampa Bay Times.

It was learned in February that AccuWeather, which has a federal contract, agreed to pay \$290,000 to women who said they were sexually harassed at the company. On April 12, the Washington Post reported that federal investigators found conditions for women there were "so severe and pervasive, that some female employees resigned." The investigation covered Myers' time as CEO. AccuWeather denies the allegations and it noted the company remains a qualified federal contractor. Myers in a recent op-ed said the company didn't fight the charges because it was being sensitive to female employees and didn't want to disrupt the workplace.

Myers' nomination expired last year without a Senate vote. Trump re-nominated him earlier this year.

"For so many reasons, (the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) administrator is not the job for Barry Myers," Nelson told the Times last week. "We can do better and we must."

But Nelson's replacement is Rick Scott, a Republican. With a larger majority this year — thanks partly to Scott's victory over Nelson — Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell is breaking Senate tradition to speed up Trump's appointments. Myers could be included in that fast track, though McConnell's office wouldn't confirm that.

Scott has not publicly spoken about Myers. "Senator Scott looks forward to discussing Mr. Myers' nomination" during his Senate Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee confirmation hearing, Scott spokeswoman Sarah Schwirian said April 1.

There was no discussion during that hearing. Without any debate, Myers was recommended by the committee for confirmation on a 14-12 party-line vote. He awaits the approval of the full Senate.

Scott voted for Myers. His office has not responded to a request for comment since.

# Spoonbill landing in city

## North Port OKs new statue at Price, Sumter intersection

NORTH PORT — A rather large roseate spoonbill is about to land in the city. The City Commission on Tuesday night approved the purchase of a spoonbill statue to be placed at the intersection of Price Boulevard and Sumter Boulevard.

It's part of the city's ongoing drive to place artwork in public places throughout North Port. This roseate spoonbill is a bit larger than those residing in the marshes in North Port. While not yet complete, it is projected to stand 10-12 feet high, with a wingspan of 6-7 feet. It will be placed on the north-west corner of the intersection, in the grassy area in front of the

Walgreens Pharmacy. The city's art advisory board recommended the purchase of the \$10,000 statue to honor the many water birds that reside in the city. The sculptor is Donald Gialanella, of St. Petersburg. In a statement, he said the statue will be welded mild steel and powder coated. "Maintenance will be nil," he said. "It will be incredibly strong, weatherproof and safe for human interaction." The statue is expected to be completed by June.

# North Port releases flood rating results

## Some residents could see discounts on flood insurance

NORTH PORT — The city of North Port is currently rated a Class 6 community in the national Community

Rating System. What does this mean? It means discounts on flood insurance rates for many residents in the city. "We have improved our rating over time," said

Elizabeth Wong, Storm Water manager for the city of North Port. "This year we have gone up a number, which is good." Areas are rated on a 1-10 scale. Municipalities

receiving a 1 rating earn no discounts on flood insurance premiums, while those rated a 10 receive a 45 percent rate discount. With the 6 rating, North Port residents in an AE

rating zone will receive a 20 percent discount on their flood insurance rates. The community ratings are annually issued by the National Flood Insurance Program. "A lot of the score is based on community outreach and communications," Wong said. "Here

in North Port, we hand out fliers, talk to homeowners and provide information in all sorts of ways." She said anyone can go to the city of North Port website and access flood information. "All someone has to do is type the word 'flood' on the web page and all the information pops up."

# Sarasota County gets on board with composting

SARASOTA — Sarasota County officials are hoping residents will get involved in composting to cut down on food waste. It has scheduled a series of workshops for its residents. The "Let's Make Some Black Gold" workshops "will provide participants education on the basics and benefits of composting, including reducing the amount of waste generated while creating landscape-friendly mulch and other composting byproducts," the county

said in a news release. UF IFAS Extension Sarasota County Agent Randy Penn will lead the home composting workshop, the news release states. It will also keep continue its popular rain barrel workshop. It "teaches residents how to collect rain water and sells barrels for what the county pays." That teams with "the composting workshops will offer attendees the option to purchase a GEOBIN-brand composting bin for the \$25 cost to the county. Bin purchase is not required to attend, however."

"The composting workshops are a great introduction for anyone looking to get started with home composting," said Penn. "They're also a great way to help reduce the amount of food and yard waste we dispose of in landfills." Officials said that Sarasota County residents put more than 275,000 tons of waste to landfills, according to data in the news release. It states about a quarter of it is "food waste, yard clippings, paper scraps and other organic material that could be composted."

Sarasota County leaders have encouraged residents to reduce water use through rain barrels since 2009. "Since then, residents have bought more 3,200 rain barrels, with the potential to capture more than 176,000 gallons of stormwater after each rain," the county said. # Are you guilty of these five top sunscreen mistakes?

May is National Skin Cancer Awareness Month, and according to data from the Skin Cancer Foundation, the number of new melanoma cases is expected to rise by nearly 8 percent in 2019.

So this is a fitting time to discuss some of the most common mistakes that people make when applying sunscreen and how to fix those bad habits to lower your risk of skin cancer and signs of aging.

## MISTAKE #1: NOT WEARING SUNSCREEN EVERY DAY

If you do not wear sunscreen every day, it can't protect your skin from the sun's UV rays. A little bit of sun exposure every day adds up.

There are a variety of SPF options available that are safe and effective for even sensitive skin types, so there is no reason not to wear sunscreen. Many of my female patients now use a daily tinted SPF instead of facial foundation. For daily use, choose at least an SPF of 15. Do not rely on SPF in your makeup. It is better to use a tinted sunscreen.

## MISTAKE #2: USING THE WRONG TYPE OF SUNSCREEN

You have probably heard of the recent legislation aimed at banning certain chemical sunscreen ingredients that have been shown to damage coral reefs. The Florida Keys recently passed such a ban.

When possible, choose sunscreens that do not contain oxybenzone and octinoxate, the two ingredients in question in the ban.

The SPF 15 that you use every day is not strong enough for prolonged exposure. If you are going to be in direct sun for more than 20 minutes, choose an SPF of 40+ and reapply every hour. You should choose water-resistant SPF if you'll be swimming, boating, or sweating a lot.

## MISTAKE #3: RELYING ON SPF IN MAKEUP

Unfortunately, makeup foundations and facial powders that contain SPF do not provide adequate sun protection on their own. This is because the amount used in studies is much higher than the amount an average person applies.

You would need to apply 14 times the normal amount of powder and seven times the normal amount of foundation to achieve the SPF on

the label. While you can still use these products to boost your SPF protection, always pair them with a standalone sunscreen.

Lip balms that contain SPF are a great choice for the lips. These can help to lower your risk of developing skin cancer on your lips, since the skin in this area is thin and does not produce its own natural antioxidants.

## MISTAKE #4: NOT APPLYING ENOUGH SUNSCREEN

If you do not apply enough sunscreen, you won't be getting the maximum SPF protected listed on the bottle. Always apply ½ teaspoon of sunscreen to your face, and one ounce (think a full shot glass) to your body.

If you are outside all day, I recommend that you reapply sunscreen at least every hour, or after swimming or sweating.

## MISTAKE #5: MISSING COMMON AREAS

Don't forget to apply sunscreen to commonly missed areas, like the tips of your ears, the back of neck, your hairline, the part of your hair on your scalp, the back of your hands, and tops of your feet.

## BOTTOM LINE

Wearing sunscreen on a daily basis is one of the most effective ways to reduce your risk of skin cancer and accelerated skin aging. Keep these tips in mind when applying SPF this beach season!

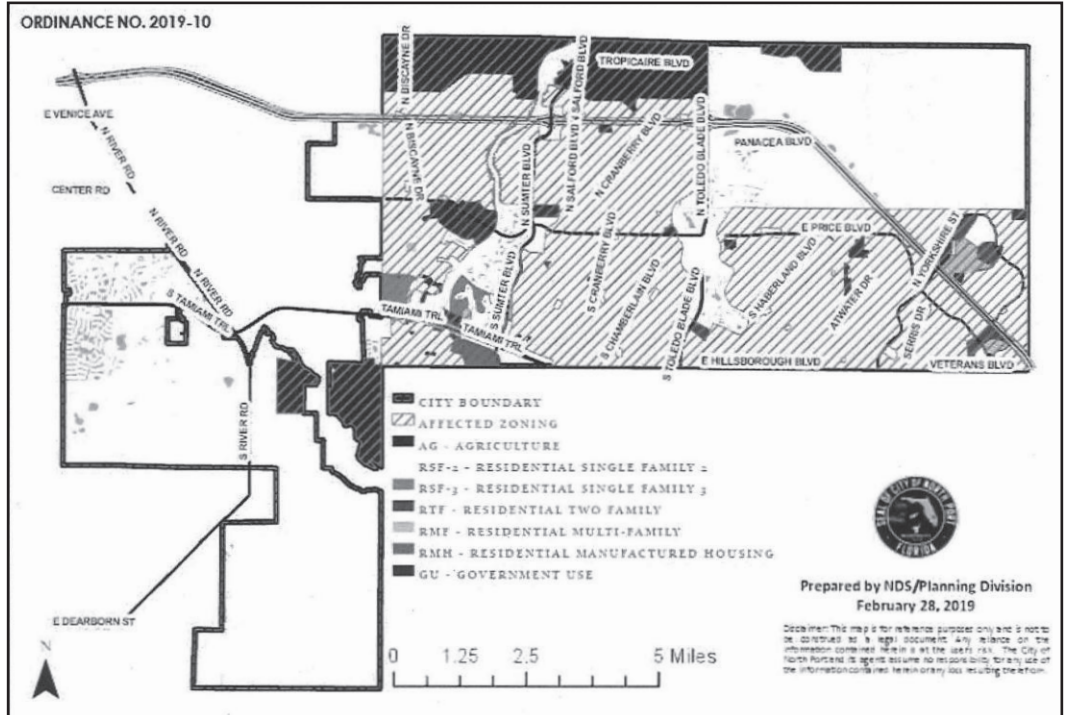

# FGCU entrepreneurship students report earning \$2.5M in gross revenue

When college student Jade Gibson posted an advertisement on Craigslist in 2017 offering to play her violin at events, it was just a way for her to make some pocket cash.

"My parents got mad and said, 'You need to take that down because you are going to get kidnapped or something,'" said Gibson, 21, a Florida Gulf Coast University student.

Gibson said she ignored her parents and continued to try to drum up clients.

What started out as Gibson just trying to make some extra cash has turned into a business she calls Jade Strings. Gibson and a group of other women — all of whom play string instruments — perform at weddings and other events. Gibson said the business grossed about \$80,000 between 2018 and February 2019.

Gibson is a student in FGCU's two-year-old entrepreneurship degree

program, and she credits her success to it. The program keeps a log of how many businesses its students start and how much the businesses gross. Students reported \$2 million in gross revenue in fall 2018 compared to \$2.5 million in spring 2019, the program's number show.

The program's 2018 numbers show 87 students reported having 122 businesses. In 2019, 119 students reported having 181 businesses.

Sandra Kauanui, director of the Institute of Entrepreneurship, said it has been surprising to see some of her students have some early success. She said she believes the students' accomplishments are tied to them being innovative and self-starters.

"They are not saying, 'OK, what do I do next?'" she said. "They are just going out and getting it done."

When Corey Umstott, 24, a junior, began taking classes at FGCU in 2018,

he was a business major, and his dream was to open an automotive repair shop.

He said when he learned about the entrepreneurship program, he decided to switch his major and join FGCU's Runway Program, a startup incubator for student entrepreneurs.

Umstott, a longtime mechanic, said the program helped him launch a different idea — a mobile auto repair service called Eagle Auto Repair. Umstott said he goes to people's homes and places of work to perform everything from oil changes to repairs.

He started the business last month and has made about \$1,800. Umstott said he thinks his idea has lots of potential because he has created a unique service for Fort Myers.

"If people text me at two in the morning, they have got something going on with their car, I am able to respond to them," he said. "They feel like they have that personal mechanic on their side instead of just going to a shop and being another number."

## 'People think ... I'm Jade Strings'

Gibson is a hustler. She has gone from performing by herself, playing with her sister to creating a business that features 12 performers who live in different parts of the state.

Gibson said Jade Strings tries to set itself apart by offering more than a performance.

"You can hire anyone really that can play a violin," she said. "The difference between us and

a violinist is we care about the theme. We care about the story."

Gibson said she tried various ways — not just Craigslist — to land gigs when she was mostly playing as a lone performer. She followed wedding vendors on Instagram. She also used to visit venues that held weddings and other events and offer to play.

Gibson said she had 50 events booked at one point. Gibson's sister helped out during some of the performances.

Gibson said it wasn't until late 2017 that she realized her ability to play the violin could lead to a lucrative business. She said she filed the paperwork creating her business in 2018, but she struggled with what to name it before settling on Jade Strings.

"People think that's my name now," she said. "I go into meetings, and people are like, 'Oh, Miss Strings, right this way.' Now, I'm Jade Strings. I love it, actually. I tell people that's going to be my celebrity name if I ever get famous."

Gibson believes she has found what she is meant to do. She has been on three career tracks — music therapy, marketing and finally entrepreneurship — since coming to FGCU.

She said her plan is to focus solely on her business and expanding it when she graduates in December.

"I love music, but I realized I didn't really like studying music," she said.

Gibson said it was Kauanui who convinced her to change her major to entrepreneurship and join the Runway Program. Gibson said she is glad she did.

"I had the creative aspect of my business down," Gibson said. "I had the marketing side down, but I did not have the financial side down."

She said one of her first events after she posted the Craigslist ad was a wedding in Miami.

"I think I charged my first bride \$80 because I didn't know what to charge," Gibson said.

## Rough start leads to success

For senior Sofia Blanno, the road to getting a business off the ground has been a little bumpy. She wanted to create an app, but she said she ran into issues getting it started.

Blanno said she was frustrated about the fate of her business, so she talked to one of the entrepreneurship program's mentors. She

said he didn't beat around the bush about what she should do.

"He basically said, 'Listen to me,' Blanno said. "You are going to fail at this idea. You are going to spend all your money. You either need to pivot, or you need to find someone who knows what they are doing in regards to technology on your team."

Blanno decided to pursue a new idea.

She has launched a website for a clothing subscription company. It's called Best Dressed. Blanno's customers fill out a style survey, and she sends them a box of clothes to rent with an option to buy.

Blanno, 22, said she started sending out clothes in October, and so far, she has made about \$20,000 in gross revenue.

"I think that it's rapidly going to increase the amount of revenue that we earn," she said. "By the end of this year, I think it's going to be great. I see ... the company going a lot of good places by the end of December of this year."

Blanno said her success is the result of all the things she has learned through the entrepreneurship program about technology, accounting, taxes, social media advertising and building a website.

"There is no way that I could have learned all this by myself," she said. "I have learned a lot by myself, but I think, the Institute of Entrepreneurship, what they do well is they kind of give you the means and then they kind of push you."

and donated by Brad Pike of Off the Wave and Funky Thrifty in Englewood. The paintings feature the 1973 derby winner Secretariat, the 1977 winner Seattle Slew, the 1978 winner Affirmed, the 2004 winner Smarty Jones, the 2015 winner American Pharoah and a special painting of tiny Hope, the local miniature celebrity. The event is at

Genth's ranch at 1030 Morningside Drive in Englewood where she has 25 horses, gives lessons and trail rides and boards horses. She has a handful of miniature horses, including Hope.

Hope is a therapy horse. Five years ago, Genth realized children everywhere were hurting following the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting in Connecticut that took the lives of 20 students and six adults.

Genth learned one of

the Sandy Hook relatives flew in therapy horses to work with the grieving children after the massacre. She also wanted to help local disabled children, the elderly, battered women and others in crisis situations. She and her nephew Leland, now 9, brought Hope, who stands 28 inches tall, to hospitals, nursing homes, Hospice, and other places. They've met blind patients and children with severe special needs.

"Hope comes into their

room and puts her head on the patient's bed or lets the person pet her from their wheelchair," Genth said. "People are so surprised that this teeny, tiny horse came to visit them. Their eyes light up. It's so soothing and calming for them both."

Understanding Genth's passion for horse therapy and longtime connection to the boating world, the Derby Day committee thought she was the perfect person to do a joint fundraiser at the stables.

Derby Day is sponsored by the newly formed Englewood Fillies members Cheyenne Alford, Sue Atamanchuk, Kathy Castellano, Laurie Farlow, Karen Gardiner, Beth Michaels, Kim Parks, Mary Smedley, Karen Tyree and co-chairs Elaine Miller and Carol Moore. They are donating proceeds to Genth's

Branded Heart Stables and the Englewood Beach Waterfest. Waterfest non-profit organization puts on the annual Offshore Powerboat Association World Championships each November at Englewood Beach.

"Derby Day is dedicated to my family, it's all about horsepower," said Genth, whose father Richard was the president of Chris-Craft Boats, Thunderbird/Formula, Donzi, Wellcraft Marine and Century Boats and president of Westship World Yachts of Tampa.

"Before my mother met my father she was a water skier at Cypress Gardens. My father was an Air Force colonel (who flew in World War II with the famed Flying Tigers)," she said. "Then after my parents married, my dad raced boats."

Richard, who died at 77,

was an offshore powerboat champion.

"I raced in my first competition at 23," Genth said. "My father started the offshore races in Sarasota. The proceeds went to the Make A Wish Foundation."

Genth said the donation will help her and Leland continue bringing Hope to spread hope. Genth said she speaks to children about bullying and being kind to animals. She helps the elderly reduce blood pressure and stress during their visits.

In addition to miniature horses, Genth has a giant horse — Mister Shameless, who stands at 17 and one-half hands tall.

"He is the king of the barn and hope is the queen."

# Our native grape, the muscadine

## Good for small fruit growers, they boast intense flavor

The first time that I tasted a muscadine grape was in Georgia. It was a pleasant difference from what I was used to, namely northern bunch-type grapes.

The thick skin and extra-large berry contained an intense grape flavor that made you want to eat more! Better yet, muscadines are just about pest-free and are in fact Florida natives. Available for home gardens in black, purple, pink or bronze varieties, these southern grapes make a great addition for any small fruit grower.

As mentioned above, muscadines are available in a multitude of cultivars. Several that may be available from local garden centers or on-line plant sources are recommended for Florida. Now while some muscadines have female flowers and

must have a pollinizer to set fruit, these bronze cultivars — ‘Carlos’, ‘Granny Val’, ‘Pineapple’, and ‘Tara’ — for example, are self-fertile with perfect flowers that will produce fruit without cross-pollination.

These black-fruited varieties — ‘Noble’, ‘Polyanna’, and ‘Southern Home’ — are also self-fertile.

Muscadines are adapted to a wide range of soils. Locally, these grapes most often come well-rooted in containers and you can plant them most anytime. Make sure to provide

adequate water during establishment and during droughty conditions. Once established, fertilize each plant with one-quarter pound of 8-8-8 or 10-10-10 (or its equivalent with micro-nutrients) in April after growth begins. Put the fertilizer down in bands about one foot to either side of the vine. During the second year, apply one pound of fertilizer per vine in March. From then on you can apply three pounds of fertilizer per vine during March.

Common spacing for muscadines is fifteen feet between plants in rows fifteen feet apart. Since grapes are vines, trellises will have to be constructed to support their growth. A two-wire system is commonly used where grapes are trained to a wire at two and one-half feet and at five

feet. This allows for easier training and good fruit production.

At planting, erect a five and one-half foot stake next to each grape and tie the stake to the top wire of your trellis. As the first shoots develop, select the best one and tie it with a string to the stake. At this point, remove all of the remaining shoots.

This one good shoot will become your trunk. Tie the shoot as it grows all the way to the top wire where it should be cut off. Many lateral and base shoots will develop. All except those to be trained along the wires should be removed.

Maintain a lateral (four total) to grow from each side of the trunk where a wire is located. The laterals along each wire will produce the fruit. Pruning to maintain productive fruiting can

be conducted in January. I would suggest referring to the resource publication for this article, *The Muscadine Grape* — <https://edis.ifas.ufl.edu/pdffiles/HS/HS10000.pdf> — for more details on the pruning system that will produce the most fruit.

Protecting this tasty crop from animals may be a problem. Barriers made from bird netting or chicken wire will help keep wildlife away — squirrels has been my problem. The only insect pest that I have had recently were aphids which can be spot-treated with insecticidal soap used as per label instruction.

Muscadines are ready to eat in August through September. They store well in the refrigerator for a period of time. All of your efforts will pay off however with large muscadine grapes full

of juice and flavor! For more information on all types of fruits to grow in Charlotte County, please call our Master Gardener volunteers on the Plant Lifeline on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 1 to 4 pm at 941-764-4340 for gardening help and insight into their role as an Extension volunteer.

# Why is Punta Gorda “The City of Hibiscus”?

## Annual Hibiscus Festival is coming up this weekend

Good day to all! Did you know the 15th Annual Hibiscus Festival is coming up this weekend, May 3-5, downtown at City Market Place? I sure will be glad when the city is done with Gilchrist Park construction! Since Punta Gorda has not only been proclaimed the hibiscus city twice, but is also the birthplace of a world-renowned hibiscus hybridizer, I believe it appropriate to rerun this column.

In 1926, the city council first passed an ordinance proclaiming Punta Gorda as “The City of Hibiscus.” In conjunction with the proclamation, 2,200 red hibiscuses were ordered and planted throughout the city, which apparently made quite an impression on native son Harry Goulding, known as “Pete” to everyone in town.

Pete’s dad, Joseph, had moved to Punta Gorda from North Carolina in 1895, intent on harvesting egret plumes in the Everglades. At the time a sought-after complement to ladies’ hats, they were literally “worth their weight in gold.” Soon after his arrival though, the market dissolved when their use became illegal. Joseph however, fortunately for us, decided to stay, becoming a fisherman.

Not too long afterward, in 1908, Harry was born.

Brought up in the business, Pete began as a “footer,” whose job was moving a large gill net’s loose end (“foot”) to shore once fish were driven into the open net. The net’s other end already being anchored to shore. Soon he began keeping the records for Captain Joe’s fishing operation, going on to become a bookkeeper, and eventually vice-president and secretary of the Punta Gorda Fish Company, one of five located on the railroad dock at the foot of King Street (U.S. 41 north) in the 1920’s. Pete loved the fishing industry, but his passion became hibiscus hybridization.

He and his wife Reba, who grew up in Charlotte Harbor, resided in a small “board and batten” cottage, still standing albeit with subsequent additions, on West Retta Esplanade. The story goes that in the early 1930s, Pete travelled throughout the state, gathering samples of the 12 hibiscus varieties growing in Florida. From that stock, in his

backyard, he developed many of those seen today, with almost 500 registered varieties to his credit.

Pete was also what some might call a “character” and a great storyteller with sharp wit, evidenced by some of the names bestowed on his creations; Hokey Pokee, Peeping Tom, Mini Skirt, Sleeping Single, and Honey Do. He especially enjoyed messing with “out-of-towners” visiting him when they would inquire about his name, Harry or Pete? He’d respond, “My full name is Pedro Pathiro Patholo Guatemala Gouchinhimier Diaz Goulding,” and then grin mischievously as they tried to write it all down.

Known internationally as “Mr. Hibiscus” and “King Harry,” Pete was visited by hibiscus aficionados from around the world hoping to learn his techniques. His “hobby” garnered him hundreds of awards at flower shows and the American Hibiscus Society proclaimed his blooms “Best in the World” five times. The Society’s local entity, the Harry Goulding Chapter, is named in his honor. On July 6, 1988, the city council, recognizing the accomplishments of Punta Gorda’s native son, proclaimed Harry Goulding Day and in 2000, the council reaffirmed Punta Gorda’s status as “The City of Hibiscus.”

Pete passed away in 1993 leaving the city, state, and world a more beautiful place.

Fortunately, there are several practitioners in southwest Florida continuing his legacy. You can see some of Harry’s creations at the History Park in Punta Gorda on Shreve Street, look on the right side of the Cigar Cottage, and view photographs of Harry “Pete” Goulding at Charlotte County History Collections on line.

You can also purchase this year’s signature bloom, “Mandarin Wind”, some of King Harry’s creations, and new hybridizations at the Hibiscus Festival coming up this weekend, May 3-5, downtown this year at City Market Place. Join us for great music, plants, and food, just \$2 to get in.

I told them that many times, of course, when they were still here with me. But there comes a time when you know you can never say those words enough to those you love.

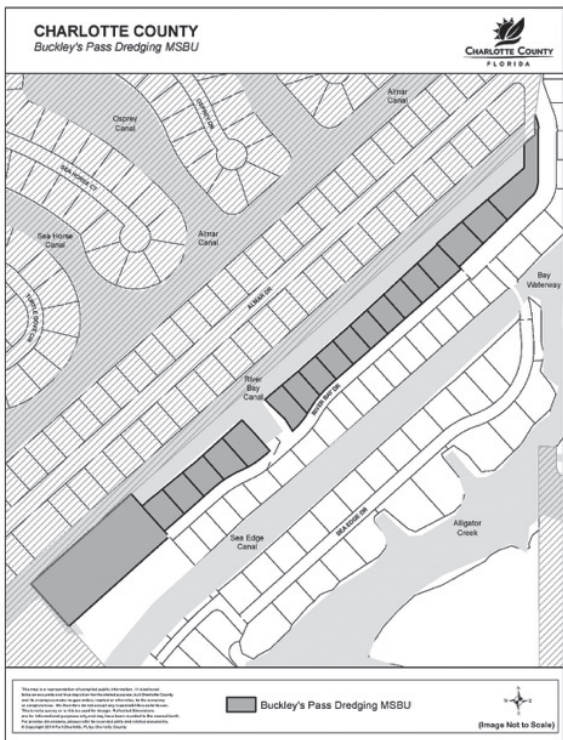

## NOTICE OF HEARING TO IMPOSE AND PROVIDE FOR COLLECTION OF SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS IN THE BUCKLEY’S PASS DREDGING MSBU



Notice is hereby given that the Board of County Commissioners of Charlotte County, Florida, will conduct a public hearing to consider creation of the Buckley’s Pass Dredging Municipal Service Benefit Unit (MSBU), as shown above, and imposition of special assessments to fund the Buckley’s Pass Dredging Project to improve water access to Alligator Creek and Charlotte Harbor. The hearing will be held at 10:00 A.M., or as soon thereafter as the matter can be heard, on May 28, 2019, in the Commission Chambers, Room 119, 18500 Murdock Circle, Port Charlotte, Florida, for the purpose of receiving public comment on the proposed Buckley’s Pass Dredging MSBU, the imposition of assessments, and collection of the assessments on the ad valorem tax bill.

All affected real property owners have a right to appear at the hearing and to file written objections with the Board of County Commissioners any time prior to the public hearing. If a person decides to appeal any decision made by the Board of County Commissioners with respect to any matter considered at the hearing, such person will need a record of the proceedings and may need to ensure that a verbatim record is made, including the testimony and evidence upon which the appeal is to be made.

The assessment for each parcel of real property will be based upon the total number of water access units (docks, ramps, slips, lifts, etc.) assigned on the date the assessment is imposed. A more specific description of the Dredging Project and the method of computing the assessment for each parcel of real property are set forth in the Initial Assessment Resolution adopted by the Board on March 12, 2019. Copies of the Initial Assessment Resolution and the preliminary Assessment Roll are available for inspection at the MSBU Division located at Room 229, Charlotte County Administration Center, 18500 Murdock Circle, Port Charlotte, Florida.

The proposed maximum annual assessment is \$399.95 per Water Access Unit. The assessments will be collected on the ad valorem tax bill, as authorized by Section 197.3632, Florida Statutes. The County Commission intends to collect the assessments in three (3) annual installments, the first of which will be included on the ad valorem tax bill to be mailed in November 2019. Failure to pay the assessments will cause a tax certificate to be issued against the real property which may result in a loss of title.

# Trump proposes asylum changes

## President suggests migrants pay application fee

WASHINGTON — Asylum seekers waiting to get into the U.S. sleep in small tents set up by the border, depending on volunteers and churches to bring them food and clothing. Some scrape together 25 cents to pay a toll to get on an international bridge where they can use a bathroom.

They've fled violence-ridden homelands, often arriving at the U.S. border deep in debt, paying \$7,000 or more to smugglers. Under President Donald Trump's latest immigration proposal, they could face another demand on their meager resources: a fee to process their asylum applications. It's not known how much the fee might be, but any amount would likely be a burden.

"If we came from our country, it's because we didn't have the opportunity to work. We don't have money," said Suanny Gomez, a 24-year-old woman

from Honduras who waited in a tent with her 5-year-old son, William.

The proposed application fee and other changes are the latest in a series of proposals from an administration struggling to cope with a surge of migrant families arriving at the southern border. The migrants have overwhelmed federal resources and complicated Trump's efforts to claim victory at the border as he runs for re-election next year.

The fee proposal was part of a memo Trump signed Monday directing his attorney general and acting homeland security secretary to take additional measures to overhaul the asylum system, which he insists is plagued by "rampant abuse." It said the application fee would not exceed the cost of processing applications, but officials did not immediately provide an estimate for what that might be.

# Campus shooting leaves 2 dead, 4 injured

## Suspect in custody in shooting at North Carolina university

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — A shooting on a North Carolina university campus left two people dead and four wounded Tuesday, prompting a lockdown and chaotic scene in the state's largest city.

UNC Charlotte issued a campus lockdown late Tuesday afternoon, saying shots had been fired. Later in the evening, the campus was declared secure after a suspect was taken into custody.

"Shots reported near Kennedy. Run, Hide, Fight. Secure yourself

immediately," the university said in an alert, referring to the school's Kennedy building on campus.

Mecklenburg Emergency Medical Services Agency said on Twitter that two people were killed, two others had life-threatening injuries and another two people were treated for less serious injuries. They said the numbers could change.

Aerial shots from local television news outlets showed police officers running toward a building, while another view showed students running on a campus sidewalk.

The Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department later said that the campus had been secured and that officers were going through buildings to let people who had sheltered in place know that it was safe. Police said that one suspect was in custody, and it didn't appear that others were involved.

It was not immediately clear whether the victims were students.

The university has more than 26,500 students and 3,000 faculty and staff. The campus is located northeast of the city center and is surrounded by residential areas.

# Dems vow to enforce subpoenas as Trump resistance grows

WASHINGTON — Democrats are steeling for a no-holds-barred fight with President Donald Trump as the White House ignores subpoenas, denies access to witnesses and otherwise stonewalls congressional oversight in the aftermath of special counsel Robert Mueller's investigation.

In the latest case, Trump, his family and the Trump Organization have filed a lawsuit against Deutsche Bank and Capital One attempting to thwart congressional subpoenas into his financial and business dealings, asserting the requests are out of bounds.

That comes as Trump's Treasury Secretary is declining to produce the president's tax returns, Attorney General William Barr is threatening to back out of his agreement to appear this week before the Judiciary Committee and former White House Counsel Don McGahn and other officials are being told not to testify before Congress.

The standoff pits the legislative and executive branches in a constitutional showdown not seen since the Watergate era. Neither side is expected to back down. Trump says since Mueller finished his report of Russian interference into the election, there's no further need to investigate. And while Democrats say it's their duty to conduct oversight and are adamant that they will win in the end, they are also confronting the limits of their own enforcement powers.

"He's prepared to fight us tooth and nail. And we're prepared to fight him back," said Rep. Maxine Waters, D-Cal., the chairwoman of the Financial Services Committee. "He obviously has something to hide."

# Guaidó urges opposition uprising in Venezuela

## Opposition leader calls for military to oust socialist leader Maduro

CARACAS, Venezuela — Opposition leader Juan Guaidó took a bold step to revive his movement to seize power in Venezuela, taking to the streets Tuesday to call for a military uprising that drew quick support from the Trump administration and fierce resistance from forces loyal to socialist Nicolas Maduro.

The violent street battles that erupted in parts of Caracas were the most serious challenge yet to Maduro's rule. And while the rebellion seemed to have garnered only limited military support, at least one high-ranking official announced he was breaking with Maduro, in a setback for the embattled president.

In a Tuesday night appearance on national television, Maduro declared that the opposition had attempted to impose an "illegitimate government" with the support of the United States and neighboring Colombia. He said Venezuela had been a victim of "aggression of all kinds."

Meanwhile, Guaidó sought to keep the momentum going at the end of the day by releasing his own video message in which he pressed Venezuelans to take to the streets again on Wednesday.

The competing quests to solidify a hold on power capped a dramatic day that included a tense moment when several armored vehicles plowed into a group of anti-government demonstrators trying to storm the capital's air base, hitting at least two protesters.

U.S. National Security Adviser John Bolton said the Trump administration was waiting for three key officials,

including Maduro's defense minister and head of the supreme court, to act on what he said were private pledges to remove Maduro. He did not provide details.

The stunning events began early Tuesday when Guaidó, flanked by a few dozen national guardsmen and some armored crowd-control vehicles, released

# Florida lawmakers approve new private school voucher bill

TALLAHASSEE—Florida lawmakers sent Gov. Ron DeSantis a Republican-crafted bill Tuesday to create a new voucher program for students to attend private and religious schools using taxpayer dollars traditionally spent on public schools.

The GOP-led House voted 76-39 largely along party lines to authorize the \$130 million Family Empowerment Scholarship program after hours of debate over two days. It would be available to as many as 18,000 students in its first year, limited to families of four with annual incomes of \$77,250 or below.

DeSantis is a strong supporter of what the GOP calls school choice efforts and is expected

to sign the bill into law. Former Gov. Jeb Bush, who pushed for similar school voucher bills during his tenure, was in the House chamber for the vote.

"We're making history today," said Republican Rep. Jennifer Sullivan of Eustis, who chairs the House Education Committee. "It is not about public vs. private. It is about our students. We are giving parents real choice in this bill."

Democrats contend the program would strip away money from cash-strapped public schools. They note that the Florida Supreme Court found a similar law unconstitutional in 2006 and claim this proposal would meet the same fate, although DeSantis has appointed three new justices with a far more conservative outlook than

the previous court.

"The proponents of this legislation won't be satisfied until our entire education system has been privatized," said Rep. Lorraine Ausley, a

Tallahassee Democrat. "These (vouchers) are slowly killing our traditional public schools."

Sullivan said she expected the measure would survive a court

challenge. "I don't think it's unconstitutional. That will ultimately be for the Supreme Court to decide," she said.

Florida already has other voucher programs, including a tax break for businesses that provide private school scholarships for low-income students. Other programs provide vouchers for students with special needs, those who are disabled and those who are bullied. Thousands of students attend private schools through these programs, some of which have lengthy waiting lists.

The new voucher program would place priority on the students from the lowest-income families. All students in the program would be eligible until they graduate high school or turn 21, whichever comes first. In addition to the

vouchers, the bill modifies the "Best and Brightest" program that awards bonuses to the most effective classroom teachers and to principals based on a school's academic improvement. It eliminates use of a teacher's SAT or ACT scores as a factor in getting a bonus, according to a Senate staff analysis.

But it was the voucher part of the bill that attracted the most attention and debate, and there were a few Democrats who supported it. One was Rep. Kimberly Daniels of Jacksonville, who said she realized she was a "sore thumb that sticks out" in her party but noted that constituents in her urban district were in favor because many public schools are sub-standard.

"I believe there's room for all types of schools and all types of education," Daniels said.

### Police say man threatened pet store after puppies got sick

PEMBROKE PINES (AP) — A Florida man is accused of calling a pet store and threatening to "shoot all the employees" because his newly purchased puppies got sick.

Police in Pembroke Pines arrested Jamie A. Militana on Monday and he's charged with making a false report of an explosive weapon. A judge set a \$15,000 bond and he remained in jail Tuesday.

The SunSentinel reports that Militana is accused of calling Puppies and Rescues on April 5 to complain about his puppies getting sick. A police report says Militana told the employee who answered the phone that he has a shotgun and would come to the store.

### Teen detained following social media threats against school

VERO BEACH (AP) — Authorities say a Florida teen has been detained after posting threats against a school on social media.

Treasure Coast Newspapers reports that the Vero Beach High School student was detained off-campus Monday.

An Indian River County school district spokeswoman says the student had been seen on campus but was later detained by sheriff's deputies off school grounds. The sheriff's office says no weapons were involved or recovered.

Officials say the high school and a nearby learning center were briefly placed on a precautionary status where classes proceeded normally but not a full lockdown.

### 3-year-old boy dies after kayak capsizes in Florida

BRADENTON (AP) — Authorities say a 3-year-old boy died after a kayak capsized in Florida.

The Tampa Bay Times reports that the boy fell into the water Saturday near Snead Island in Manatee County.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission says a kayak with two adults and two kids on board overturned as they were heading back to shore. The adults and an 8-year-old child were rescued.

Officials say the younger child, Caleb Nopal, was found dead about three hours after the search began.

### Judge calls insurer 'barbaric' for denying cancer therapy

MIAMI (AP) — A federal judge in Miami recused himself from judging a lawsuit over an insurance company's denial of coverage for a prostate cancer treatment, calling it "immoral and barbaric."

The Miami Herald reports U.S. District Judge Robert Scola cited his personal experience with prostate cancer and said he can't be impartial in the case against UnitedHealthcare.

Richard Cole, a prominent Miami attorney, accuses United Healthcare of denying his request for proton beam therapy because it's more expensive than traditional radiation treatment.

Another federal judge also withdrew from the case because he's friends with the 71-year-old lawyer.

### Negotiators reach deal on Florida state budget

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Florida legislative negotiators struck a deal Tuesday night on a multibillion-dollar state budget for the fiscal year that begins July 1, including a significant increase in spending on public schools.

The House and Senate cannot cast final votes on the spending plan at the earliest until late Friday, the scheduled final day of the 60-day legislative session. State law requires a 72-hour "cooling off" period before a final vote so the document can be reviewed.

Public schools, which make up a large chunk of the spending, would see an overall increase of more than \$782 million or about 3.7% in the main account compared with last year, according to budget documents. That translates to a little over \$242 additionally per student for the coming school year.

The agreement also calls for a nearly 2% increase in discretionary money that Florida's 67 school districts can use for a variety of purposes, including raises for teachers and school staff.

The budget includes about \$682 million for environmental needs such as Everglades restoration and protection of Florida's many freshwater springs. It would spend more than \$280 million on education construction and maintenance work and tens of millions of dollars on a variety of programs to help the Florida Panhandle recover from Hurricane Michael.

# Instagram story aims to engage new generation with Holocaust

JERUSALEM — For seven decades, survivor testimony has been the centerpiece of Holocaust commemoration.

But with the world's community of aging survivors rapidly shrinking and global understanding of the genocide that killed 6 million Jews declining, advocates of Holocaust remembrance are seeking new and creative ways to share witnesses' stories with younger generations.

Much as Anne Frank's diary gripped the older generations, an Instagram account based on a true 13-year-old Jewish victim's journal, called Eva.Stories, is generating buzz among the young.

"If we want to bring the memory of the Holocaust to the young generation, we have to bring it to where they are," said the project co-producer, Mati Kochavi, an Israeli high-tech billionaire who hails from a family of Holocaust victims, survivors and educators. "And they're on Instagram."

Kochavi and his daughter, Maya, have created a series of 70 Instagram stories that chronicle the downward spiral of Eva Heyman's life in the fateful spring of 1944 when the Nazis conquered Hungary.

Heyman was one of approximately 430,000 Hungarian Jews who were deported to Nazi concentration camps between May 15 and July 9, 1944. Of the estimated 6 million Jews killed in the Holocaust, around 568,000

were Hungarian, according to Israel's Yad Vashem Holocaust memorial.

Heyman's tale, produced as a Hollywood-style movie with a cast of foreign actors and multi-million dollar budget, will stream throughout Israel's Holocaust Remembrance Day, which begins at sundown Wednesday. The installments appear as if Heyman had owned a smartphone during World War II and was using

Instagram to broadcast her life updates.

The story goes live Wednesday afternoon, opening with Heyman's happier adolescent experiences then darkening as night falls. The Nazis tighten their hold on Hungary's Jews, confiscating her family's business, belongings and home, deporting Heyman to the ghetto and ultimately to the Auschwitz death camp. The story's climactic event

is timed to follow Israel's two-minute siren that wails nationwide on Thursday, bringing the country to a standstill at 10 a.m., in annual commemoration of Jewish Holocaust victims.

Even days before the series' release, the account had amassed over 180,000 followers.

One of them was Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, who posted a video to Instagram on Monday urging Israelis to follow the account and spread stories of survivors via social media in order to "remind ourselves what we lost in the Holocaust and what was returned to us by the creation of the state of Israel."

"What if a girl in the Holocaust had Instagram?" asked the trailer, released on Sunday. The brief film shows simulated cellphone footage of Heyman's fictionalized life, from dancing with friends and a birthday with her grandparents, to Nazi troops marching through the streets of Budapest.

Dozens of Holocaust victims kept diaries of their experiences, with the best known work written by Anne Frank.

The Kochavis pored over scores of the diaries before deciding on Heyman, who, Maya Kochavi said, is the kind of girl "a modern kid in 2019 could connect to," with an unrequited middle school crush, family drama and grand ambitions to become a news photographer.

They hope Heyman's firsthand account will engage otherwise disinterested or uninformed youth.

# Sri Lanka lifts social media ban imposed after Easter blasts

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka — Sri Lanka on Tuesday lifted a social media ban that was imposed after the Islamic State-claimed Easter bombings, a sign of security easing even as a Cabinet minister said he and others had received intelligence that they could be targeted by the same group in possible new attacks.

President Maithripala Sirisena ended the blocking of Facebook, WhatsApp, YouTube and other popular sites, but asked the public to "act in a responsible manner" on social media, according to a government statement.

The government had said it was seeking to curb the spread of misinformation when it blocked social media in the wake of the April 21 bombings at churches and luxury hotels that killed 253 people.

Sri Lankan officials have warned that suspects linked to the bombings are still at large, and on Tuesday, Sri Lanka's health minister, Rajitha Senarathna, said he and seven other government ministers had been identified by intelligence officials as targets of possible additional suicide attacks this week, by the same Islamic State-linked group of Sri Lankan militants.

Senarathna said he stayed at home Sunday and Monday upon the officials' request. He declined to provide additional information about the source or type of intelligence.

At the same time, some of Sri Lanka's South Asian neighbors investigated possible activities in their countries inspired by the Easter attack.

In India, the country's National Investigative Agency said it had arrested a 29-year-old Indian man who identified himself as a follower of Mohammed Zahran, the Sri Lankan militant who officials say led the Easter attacks.

Investigators said in a statement late Monday that Riyas A., also known as Riyas Aboobacker, was plotting a similar suicide attack in the southern Indian state of Kerala. Three other people were brought in for questioning about suspected links to IS, according to the statement.

During a search of their homes, digital devices including mobile phones, SIM cards, memory cards, pen drives, diaries with handwritten notes in Arabic and Malayalam and untitled DVDs and CDs with religious speeches were seized, the statement said. The digital material was being forensically examined.



# Dems say Trump agrees to \$2 trillion infrastructure tab

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump and Democratic congressional leaders agreed Tuesday to work together on a \$2 trillion infrastructure package — but put off for later the difficult question of how to pay for it.

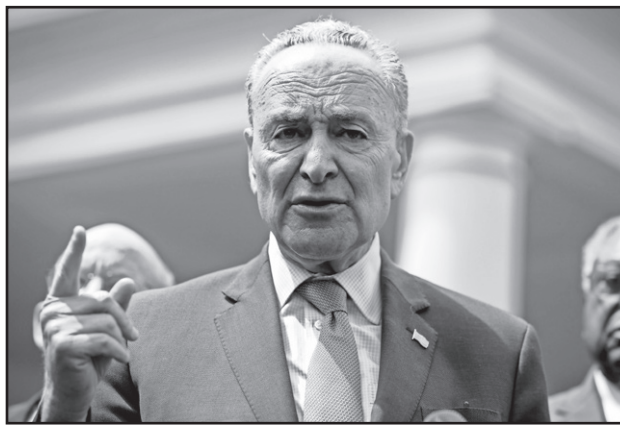
Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer said there was “good will in the meeting” — a marked departure from the last meeting between Trump, Schumer and House Speaker Nancy

Pelosi, which ended with Trump walking out in a huff. Schumer said the two sides agreed that infrastructure investments create jobs and make the United States more competitive economically with the rest of the world.

Most importantly, Schumer said, “we agreed on a number.”

“Originally, we had started a little lower. Even the president was eager to push it up to \$2 trillion, and that is a very good thing,” Schumer said.

Added Pelosi: “We did come to one agreement:

that the agreement would be big and bold.”

Pelosi and congressional Democrats

had asked for the meeting with Trump to discuss launching an ambitious building program that’s a top priority for the party and has been a rare area of potential bipartisan accord with Republicans. Trump, too, has long promised a big infrastructure plan.

The dozen Democratic lawmakers in the meeting with the president called it a constructive start. They said Trump agreed that infrastructure investments should go beyond roads and bridges and include broadband, water systems, and enhancements to the

electrical grid.

Democrats also put the onus on Trump to come up with a funding source, and said they would meet again in three weeks, when the president will present his ideas. The nation’s top business groups and labor unions support increasing the federal gasoline tax, currently 18.3 cents a gallon. It was last raised in 1993.

Asked whether Trump supports raising the gas tax, White House adviser Kellyanne Conway said before the meeting: “This president is the guy who lowers taxes.”

## Barr to face Mueller report questions at Senate hearing

WASHINGTON — Attorney General William Barr on Wednesday will face lawmakers’ questions for the first time since releasing special counsel Robert Mueller’s Russia report, in what promises to be a dramatic showdown as he defends his actions before Democrats who accuse him of spinning the investigation’s findings in President Donald Trump’s favor.

Barr’s appearance before the Senate Judiciary Committee is expected to highlight the partisan schism around Mueller’s report and the Justice Department’s handling of it. It will give the attorney general his most extensive opportunity to explain the department’s actions, including a press conference held before the report’s release, and for him to repair a reputation bruised by allegations that he’s the president’s protector.

Barr is also invited to appear Thursday before the Democratic-led House Judiciary panel, but the Justice Department said he would not testify if the committee insisted on having its lawyers question the attorney general.

His appearance Wednesday will be before a Republican-led committee chaired by a close ally of the president, Sen. Lindsey Graham of South Carolina, who is expected to focus on concerns that the early days of the FBI’s Russia investigation were tainted by law enforcement bias against Trump.

Democrats are likely to focus on Barr’s statements and actions in the last six weeks that have unnerved them. The tense relations are notable given how Barr breezed through his confirmation process, picking up support from a few Democrats and offering reassuring words about the Justice Department’s independence and the importance of protecting the special counsel’s investigation.

## US stocks post meager gains; S&P 500 index hits new high

Wall Street capped a day of mostly wobbly trading with meager gains Tuesday, enough to nudge the S&P 500 to an all-time high for the third straight day.

The benchmark index spent much of the day hovering below its previous high, but edged up in the last few minutes of trading.

Household goods makers, health care stocks, utilities and other sectors helped lift the market, narrowly offsetting a steep decline in communications companies.

Google’s parent company, Alphabet, led the slide after the search giant reported a slowdown in revenue growth. Retailers and hospitality industry companies also fell.

The market’s latest gyrations came as investors weighed the latest batch of corporate earnings reports.

The S&P 500 rose 2.80 points, or 0.1 percent, to 2,945.83, a record. The Dow Jones Industrial Average added 38.52, or 0.1 percent, to 26,592.91. The Nasdaq fell 66.47 points, or 0.8 percent, to 8,095.39.

## ‘Hadestown’ leads Tony Award nominations with 14 nods

NEW YORK — “Hadestown,” singer-songwriter Anaïs Mitchell’s Broadway debut, earned a leading 14 Tony Award nominations Tuesday, followed by the jukebox musical “Ain’t Too Proud,” built around songs by the Temptations, which received a dozen nominations.

The musical “Hadestown,” which intertwines the myths of Orpheus and Eurydice and Hades and Persephone, bested more familiar names, including stage adaptations of the hit movies “Tootsie” and “Beetlejuice,” which both also got best musical nods. The giddy, heartwarming “The Prom” rounds out the best new musical category.

“Hadestown” also was the only new musical on Broadway directed by a woman, Tony Award nominee Rachel Chavkin, who earned another one Tuesday.

“I’m trying not to swear, but I am so proud of the 14 nominations. There is just not a weak spot on the team. There is no

place where we haven’t all been working our asses off to make this show feel as ancient and as ‘now’ as possible, simultaneously,” she said by phone.

The best-play nominees are the Northern Irish drama “The Ferryman,” from Jez Butterworth; James Graham’s “Ink,” about Rupert Murdoch; Taylor Mac’s Broadway debut, “Gary: A Sequel to Titus Andronicus”; Tarell Alvin McCraney’s “Choir Boy”; and Heidi Schreck’s “What the Constitution Means to Me,” a personal tour of the landmark document at the heart of so

many American divisions.

Des McAnuff, who directed “Ain’t Too Proud,” pointed to the timeliness of his musical, which charts the rise, sacrifices and challenges facing the 1950s group that sang “Baby Love” and “My Girl.” “I think when people come to the Imperial Theatre, they’ll find that the story is as pertinent now as it was when they lived it,” he said. “It applies to Black Lives Matter and what’s going on in this country in terms of the tensions today.”

### US weighs designating Muslim Brotherhood a terrorist group

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump and his national security team are weighing whether to designate the Muslim Brotherhood a foreign terrorist organization, the White House said Tuesday.

White House press secretary Sarah Sanders said Trump was consulting with his advisers and leaders in the region who share his concern about the Islamism movement with followers across the Middle East. “This designation is working its way through the internal process,” she said.

The New York Times first reported on Tuesday that the administration was pushing to designate the group, but the idea is not new. Some people think the Muslim Brotherhood does not meet the legal criteria required for the designation.

The group was founded in Egypt in the late 1920s and now operates in many countries. Egypt’s President Abdel-Fattah el-Sissi came to power in 2014 after removing his predecessor, Mohammed Morsi, who came from the Muslim Brotherhood. Egypt has since outlawed the group and has encouraged the U.S. to follow suit.

To meet the legal criteria for the designation, a group must engage in terrorist activity that threatens the security of Americans or the defense, foreign relations or economic interests of the United States.

### US opposes giving Stone full copy of Mueller report

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal prosecutors say they oppose a request from Roger Stone to see an unredacted copy of special counsel Robert Mueller’s Russia report.

Stone, a longtime confidant of President Donald Trump, appeared in court Tuesday for a brief status conference. He was charged in Mueller’s investigation with lying to Congress, obstruction and witness tampering.

His attorneys want to be able to view the full report as they prepare for trial. Material relating to Stone’s case was blacked out in the report.

Jonathan Kravis, an assistant U.S. attorney, says the government has no obligation to provide the information Stone seeks. He says prosecutors have already given Stone significant information, including grand jury testimony and material that may be favorable to his defense.

A judge did not immediately rule.

### Georgia Democrat Abrams won’t run for Senate in 2020

ATLANTA (AP) — Georgia Democrat Stacey Abrams says she will not run for a U.S. Senate seat in 2020, dimming her party’s hopes of a Senate majority and renewing speculation about her political future after last year’s unsuccessful run for governor catapulted her to national acclaim.

Abrams, 45, came within 60,000 votes of being the first black woman elected governor in U.S. history. She

told The Associated Press she hasn’t ruled out a presidential bid, though she’s in no rush to join a Democratic field that already includes 20 candidates.

“I’m going to continue to watch how the national conversation around the presidency unfolds,” Abrams said in an interview after she told Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, her chief Senate advocate, of her plans.

### West Virginia hospitals sue opioid companies seeking damages

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) — Hospitals in West Virginia have banded together to sue some of the country’s largest opioid companies, saying they flooded Appalachia with powerful painkillers and forced medical centers to deal with the financial repercussions.

Nearly 30 West Virginia hospitals and 10 affiliates in Kentucky have signed on to the suit filed Monday in Marshall County, West Virginia. The hospitals’ lawyer said the case is the first time a large group of hospitals in a state has teamed up to take legal action against opioid firms. The hospitals are seeking monetary damages to cover the costs of treating people with opioid addictions.

The suit is just the latest legal action against opioid companies. There are about 2,000 such suits across the country filed by state and local governments, American Indian tribes, unions, hospitals and others seeking to hold the drug industry responsible for the opioid crisis.

Hospitals in West Virginia,

which has the nation’s highest opioid overdose rate, “are at the front line of the opioid epidemic, and our ability to deliver care has been compromised because of the enormous amount of resources we have had to dedicate to treating those affected by it,” said Ronald Pellegrino, chief operating officer at West Virginia University Hospitals, one of the plaintiffs.

### Chewy.com hopes to overcome gnawing Wall Street memories

NEW YORK (AP) — PetSmart’s online pet store Chewy is selling its stock in an initial public offering that may revive memories of the days when its breed of internet retailing seemed like a lost cause.

The Dania Beach, Florida, company is setting out to raise \$100 million, but that figure listed in documents filed Monday is likely to change in the weeks ahead as Chewy’s bankers gauge investor demand for the IPO. If all goes according to plan, Chewy’s share will trade under the ticker symbol “CHWY.”

It marks the latest IPO in a parade of unprofitable technology companies led by ride-hailing services Uber and Lyft trying to persuade investors that they are mining markets that eventually will turn into money makers.

Chewy, which hasn’t been profitable since it was founded in 2011, stands out from the rest of the crowd because of its involvement in online pet sales — a niche that turned into a financial wasteland as hundreds of internet companies imploded after raising billions of dollars during the late 1990s.

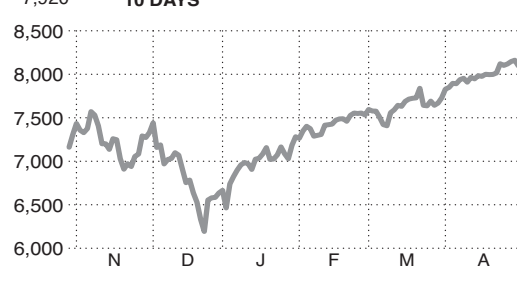
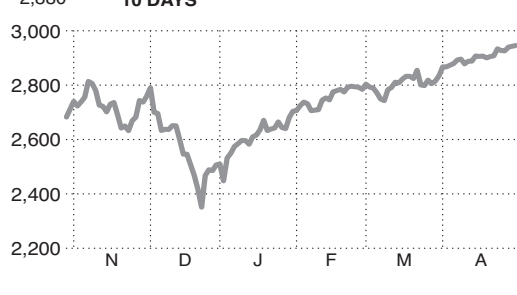

# Assessing effectiveness of SAM-e for post-menopause mood

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** I am a 52-year-old woman coming out the other side of menopause. I've had a smooth ride through it, with the exception of occasional mood swings. I've been taking SAM-e since I found out about it on the internet. I did not want to take a prescription medicine, nor did I feel my mood swings were strong enough to warrant doing so. I just wanted to be a little more upbeat, positive and energetic. I have found it to be very helpful. Recently, I have had a few people tell me that SAM-e can cause various issues, most notably thyroid malfunctions and cancers. Can you please speak to both the efficacy and potential harm of SAM-e for women in my situation? — J.A.

**ANSWER:** S-adenosyl methionine is a naturally occurring substance commonly used as a supplement in the U.S. for arthritis and depression. The evidence on SAM-e is mixed, but there are small studies that show SAM-e to be effective for depression, about as effective as some prescription

drugs, but with fewer side effects. However, larger studies were not as hopeful, and my opinion is that while it is a lot better than nothing, SAM-e is not as effective as the better-studied prescription drugs for depression. This may not be applicable to mood swings. Since it does seem to be working for you, I can reassure you on one point: There is no reliable evidence that SAM-e increases risk of cancers or thyroid disease. The major side effects, which are rare, are upset stomach and dizziness. SAM-e may interact with other medica-

tions, so if you do start taking any, please discuss with your doctor or pharmacist.

**DEAR DR. ROACH:** My husband is 72 and suffers from heart disease, kidney disease and diabetes. Almost daily, he chokes, with extreme coughing and loss of breath, when eating or drinking. This is getting worse as time goes on. Is there a relationship between this constant choking and heart disease? Heart surgery is not possible because of his kidney disease. Is there anything we can do to keep him from choking? — S.T.

**ANSWER:** The word "choking" is nonspecific. I can't be sure what you mean exactly. However, in a 72-year-old person with medical issues, the most common problem that is described as choking while eating or drinking is a swallowing issue, the medical term for which is dysphagia, from the Greek roots meaning "bad eating." This is separate from painful swallowing (odynophagia).

The underlying defects are generally broken down into two

categories: problems in the mouth to pharynx and problems in the esophagus. When I hear "choking," I tend to think more of problems in the mouth and pharynx.

There are many concerns for frequent choking, gagging and coughing, but the one that is most concerning to me is aspiration, when food or liquids go into the trachea and lungs instead of into the esophagus and stomach. This can lead to infection and damage to the lungs. Because of this, it's very important to get him evaluated.

Evaluation of suspected aspiration is complicated and may require multiple professionals, including a radiologist, speech-language pathologist, ENT doctor and gastroenterologist.

I don't have enough room to discuss all the possible reasons for your husband's symptoms. Treatment will depend on the findings of the workup, but it often includes swallowing rehabilitation and changes in food consistency.

South used a combination of cue bidding and Key-Card Blackwood to reach this excellent slam. The opening lead was an obvious singleton, but even with a club loser, the contract was cold if the missing trumps split 3-2. South gave some thought as to

what he might do should West have four trumps. Declarer's first good play was to play dummy's nine of clubs while winning the first trick with his ace. A trump to the king and a trump back to the ace confirmed the 4-1 split. South led a low heart to dummy's king and a heart back to his ace, then led a low club toward the dummy. West correctly discarded a diamond, as ruffing would have made the hand a breeze for declarer. Dummy's king won the trick, and South continued with dummy's eight of clubs. East won this trick and led a low heart, but South ruffed with his queen of spades. He now led a low spade to dummy's nine, taking the marked finesse against West's 10. South drew the last trump and claimed 12 tricks after a very well-played hand. Note that unblocking the club spots was crucial to declarer's success. Failing to do so would have resulted in defeat. Also, it was essential to cash two high hearts before leading a second club, or West could have defeated the contract by discarding a heart.

# Jupiter day spa had 'early-bird special' for men

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. — A Jupiter police detective testified Friday that he decided Orchids of Asia Day Spa was an "illegitimate" business after he watched last year as eight men got off a golf cart and went inside. One of the men came back outside, did a "Touchdown Jesus" celebration with his arms raised to the heavens then went back inside.

Later, Detective Andrew Sharp interviewed some of 25 men charged with soliciting prostitution at the Jupiter spa and found out the business had an "early-bird special" that provided a discount on sex acts for men who showed up before 1 p.m.

Those were among the details revealed Friday as attorneys for New England Patriots owner Robert Kraft argued that a judge should throw out covert

surveillance videos that allegedly show their client paying for sex on Jan. 19 and 20 at the spa. The search warrant that led to the cameras being installed at the business was not properly obtained, they claim.

Kraft, 77, is facing two counts of soliciting, a second-degree misdemeanor. He was caught up in a sting at the storefront business connected to a monthslong, multicounty investigation. Authorities initially said the case involved an international human trafficking operation, but no human trafficking charges have been filed.

Alex Spiro, Kraft's New York-based lawyer, grilled Sharp for nearly six hours Friday. Sharp, who requested the search warrant that allowed installation of the surveillance cameras, is one of 30 witnesses subpoenaed by the defense, a highly unusual number in a suppression hearing involving a misdemeanor case.

"You don't see 30 witnesses subpoenaed in a homicide trial," said assistant state attorney Greg Kridos.

Prosecutors have countered in court documents that the motion to suppress should be tossed. They say Kraft, a part-time Palm Beach County resident, did not have a lawful expectation of privacy as a customer of the spa because he was there "engaging in criminal conduct."

Hanser ruled that Kraft's right to a fair trial trumps the media's request for the surveillance videos to be released immediately. A coalition of media organizations filed with the court to have the videos released because they are public records.

That ruling does not impact Kraft's attempt to get the videos tossed out of a possible trial. Hanser could decide the videos cannot be admitted into evidence, but still release the footage

to the public at a later time.

Hanser said he will privately watch both videos before he decides on the motion to suppress.

Court observers say it's unlikely prosecutors will move forward with their cases against Kraft and the other "johns" if video evidence is tossed.

Sharp testified that his investigation's goal was to close down Orchids of Asia because the business was a "criminal enterprise."

Sharp said tactics other than surveillance cameras were considered to gain evidence from inside the spa, but it was decided that cameras "were the only option."

Five cameras were installed inside the spa, one in the lobby and four in private massage rooms, Sharp said.

"This was not a run-of-the-mill prostitution business," Sharp said. "It was a criminal enterprise."

the three-minute video shot near the Carlota air base.

In a surprise, Leopoldo Lopez, Guaido's political mentor and the nation's most-prominent opposition activist, stood alongside him. Detained in 2014 for leading a previous round of anti-government unrest, Lopez said he had been released from house arrest by security forces adhering to an order from Guaido.

"I want to tell the Venezuelan people: This is the moment to take to the streets and accompany these patriotic soldiers," Lopez declared.

As the two opposition leaders coordinated actions from a highway overpass, troops loyal to Maduro fired tear gas from

inside the adjacent air base.

A crowd that quickly swelled to a few thousand scurried for cover, reappearing later with Guaido at a plaza a few blocks from the disturbances. A smaller group of masked youths stayed behind on the highway, lobbing rocks and Molotov cocktails toward the air base and setting a government bus on fire.

Amid the mayhem, several armored utility vehicles careened over a berm and drove at full speed into the crowd. Two demonstrators, lying on the ground with their heads and legs bloodied, were rushed away on a motorcycle as the vehicles sped away dodging fireballs thrown by the demonstrators.

The head of a medical center near the site of the street battles said doctors were treating 50 people, about half of them with

injuries suffered from rubber bullets. At least one person had been shot with live ammunition. Venezuelan human rights group Provea said a 24-year-old man was shot and killed during an anti-government protest in the city of La Victoria.

Flanked by top military commanders, Defense Minister Vladimir Padrino López condemned Guaido's move as a "terrorist" act and "coup attempt" that was bound to fail like past uprisings.

"Those who try to take Miraflores with violence will be met with violence," he said on national television, referring to the presidential palace where hundreds of government supporters, some of them brandishing firearms, had gathered in response to a call to defend Maduro.

As events unfolded, governments from around

the world expressed support for Guaido while reiterating calls to avoid violent confrontation.

Bolton declined to discuss possible actions — military or otherwise — but reiterated that "all options" are on the table as President Donald J. Trump monitors developments "minute by minute."

"All agreed that Maduro had to go. They need to be able to act this afternoon, or this evening, to help bring other military forces to the side of the interim president," Bolton said. "If this effort fails, (Venezuela) will sink into a dictatorship from which there are very few possible alternatives."

Security Department officials 90 days to come up with new regulations to ensure that applications are adjudicated within 180 days of filing, except under exceptional circumstances. He called on officials to immediately revoke work authorizations when people are denied asylum and ordered removed from the country. He also wants to bar anyone who has entered or tried to enter the country illegally from

receiving a provisional work permit.

Immigration advocates said the fees could push applicants further into poverty.

"Asylum seekers are fleeing persecution, and have left their families, communities, homes, jobs and possessions behind in order to save their lives," said Archi Pyati, policy chief at Tahirih Justice Center.

Democratic House Majority leader Steny Hoyer said Trump was undermining American ideals.

"This latest move will do nothing to address the humanitarian crisis on our border of the Trump Administration's own making," he said in a statement.

On Tuesday, acting Homeland Security Secretary Kevin McAleenan described that crisis, telling a House subcommittee the department was running out of money and out of resources for dealing with the mass of people coming to the border. He said the White House would send a supplemental request for

funding, along with some legislative suggestions.

McAleenan, formerly the U.S. Customs and Border Protection commissioner, said the system had cracked under the sheer volume of people coming to the U.S. In a single day, April 16, nearly 5,000 people crossed the border. Agents and officers don't have the resources to hold, process or properly care for them.

"Simply put, the system is full and we are well beyond our capacity," he said. "The status quo is not acceptable."

McAleenan has been in charge for about two weeks, following the resignation of Kirstjen Nielsen, who left amid a staff shake-up orchestrated by the White House.

Most Central Americans seeking asylum say they are fleeing violence and poverty, and many request admission to the U.S. under federal and international law. About 20 percent of those who claim asylum in the U.S. are granted it, but the rates vary by country of origin.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi is urging the committee chairmen to push forward with their oversight agendas, shelving for now calls from the left flank to launch impeachment hearings against Trump.

Congress has a range of tools available to try to force compliance from the White House, either through civil lawsuits compelling administration officials to testify or produce documents, or by holding others in contempt of Congress with fines or even, in rare cases, jail time.

On Tuesday, the chairman of the House intelligence committee, Adam

Schiff, made a criminal referral to the Justice Department about Erik Prince, the founder of the security firm Blackwater, alleging he lied to the committee in 2017.

Schiff said Tuesday there is strong evidence that Prince, a prominent supporter of Trump, "willingly misled" the intelligence committee as it probed connections between Trump's campaign and Russia.

"The evidence is so weighty that the Justice Department needs to consider this," Schiff said.

Congress is buckling in for several actions in the aftermath of Mueller's report, which did not find that Trump or his campaign knowingly conspired with Russia in the 2016 election. But

the report pointedly did not clear the president of obstruction of justice and, in fact, recounted 10 instances where Trump tried to interfere with the investigation.

For lawmakers, their ability to conduct oversight of the White House is a core responsibility that extends beyond investigating the president into agency actions that can touch the lives of Americans.

"If the executive branch can deny the legislative branch the ability to bring witnesses to testify under oath and for the production of documents, the executive branch will have essentially eliminated the oversight function of Congress," said Rep. David Cicilline, D-R.I., a member of the

Judiciary Committee.

Yet while Democrats have vowed to go to court, those proceedings could last years, possibly past Trump's tenure. And if they chose to hold officials in criminal contempt, which would take a vote of the full House, it would be referred to Department of Justice officials unlikely to side with the Democrats.

Some Democrats have thrown out other options: daily fines for not showing up, for example, or cutting appropriations for an official's agency. But those ideas might not be politically popular.

There's also an option that would be even more contentious and hasn't been used in decades — trial and even imprisonment by Congress. Called

"inherent contempt," this process was often used in the country's early years but hasn't been employed in almost a century. While Democrats have vowed to use all of the available legal tools, they have shown no interest in going that far.

Despite drawbacks, Democrats say they will have to fight on multiple fronts to get the witnesses and documents they need.

"If you let them get away with this, then what do you have?" said House Oversight and Reform Committee Chairman Elijah Cummings on Monday. "If the president can get away with blocking any information and anybody from testifying before the Congress, what road are we going down?"

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Knowing their favored horses won’t start the Kentucky Derby on the rail left Richard Mandella and Bob Baffert more relieved than happy.

What matters for the Hall of Fame trainers is turning workable starting spots into victory — and a long-sought celebration for Mandella.

Omaha Beach is the 4-1 early favorite for Saturday’s

145th Run for the Roses after drawing the No. 12 post position on Tuesday. That could be a good sign for the colt and Mandella, considering that the horse favored to win the Derby has taken the past six.

“I hope it comes out that way,” Mandell said.

Baffert-trained Game Winner is the 5-1 second choice from the No. 16 post in the 20-horse field for the first leg of the Triple Crown.

Game Winner will start inside stablemate Roadster,

the 6-1 co-third choice with Improbable, a Baffert colt who will go off from the No. 5 hole in the 1¼-mile race at Churchill Downs.

Omaha Beach enters the \$3 million showcase on a three-race winning streak. The dark brown colt is coming off a one-length victory in the slop over Improbable in the Arkansas Derby, a race that demonstrated his recent knack for getting up front quickly and staying there.

Mandella believes Omaha

Beach and Hall of Fame jockey Mike Smith, who won last year’s Derby for Baffert aboard Justify, will make the most of his spot.

“It’s really important if you get luck with it,” Mandella said. “If you get a bad luck, a good post position doesn’t work.”

“His last couple of races he kind of sits back and bides his time a little bit, then decides when to just cruise along.

# Bobrovsky, Blue Jackets beat Bruins to take 2-1 series lead

Sergei Bobrovsky kept up his impressive postseason play, making 35 saves as the Columbus Blue Jackets beat the Boston Bruins 2-1 to take a 2-1 lead in their Eastern Conference semifinal series

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Sergei Bobrovsky kept up his impressive postseason play, making 35 saves as the Columbus Blue Jackets beat the Boston Bruins 2-1 on Tuesday night to take a 2-1 lead in their Eastern Conference semifinal series.

Boone Jenner and Matt Duchene scored for the Blue Jackets, who won a second-round home game for first time in franchise history.

Game 4 of the best-of-seven series is

Thursday night.

Tuukka Rask had 32 saves for Boston. The Bruins' only goal was a fluky one in the last minute of the second period, the only chink in an otherwise brilliant game by Bobrovsky, who is having the best postseason of his career thus far.

Bobrovsky withstood a flurry by Boston earlier in the second period, including an acrobatic save that saw him sweep away a puck from in front of the goal line. The Bruins pulled Rask with 2:11 left but couldn't beat Bobrovsky with the 6-on-5 advantage.

Columbus overcame deficits twice to win Game 2 in overtime at Boston on Saturday but never trailed in Game 3. There were some big hits but the game was less testy than the previous two meetings between the two teams in the postseason.

The Blue Jackets struck late in the first period when Jenner, skating left to right across the slot, slid the puck past Rask on the glove side before the goalie could adjust. The tally with 1:23 left was Jenner's first of the postseason.

With Zdeno Chara in the penalty box for high-sticking Jenner in the face, the Blue Jackets swarmed for an extended time in front of the Boston net before Duchene tapped in another goal with 7:18 left in the second.

Boston made it a one-goal game with 40 seconds left in the middle period when in a knot of players in front the Columbus net, the puck trickled behind Bobrovsky and over the line. The goal initially was waved off by an official, but a video review determined that play hadn't stopped

before the puck slid in. Jake DeBrusk got credit for the goal.

Boston's best opportunity to tie the score came with just under 9 minutes left when David Savard went to the penalty box for tripping, but 16 seconds later Patrice Bergeron was whistled for the same infraction, creating a 4-on-4 and then a brief Columbus advantage.

NOTES: Tuesday's game was the latest in April that Columbus has played in franchise

history. The Blue Jackets, who won a playoff series for the first time, have never played in May. ... Columbus rookie Alexandre Texier was a healthy scratch for the first time in the playoffs. ... David Krejci joined Ray Bourque (125) and Bobby Orr (66) as the third player in Boston franchise history to have 60 playoff assists. ... Columbus has won 13 of 15 games dating back to March 24.

## Enes Kanter goes for 26 in Game 1 even with sore shoulder

Portland center has dominant performance in opening contest despite injury

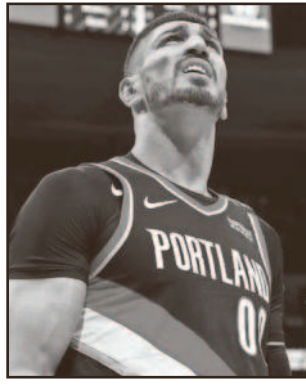
DENVER — Enes Kanter didn't even think about his sore left shoulder as he soared in for a first-quarter dunk and hung from the rim with his left hand.

Then, the Portland center grimaced and briefly grabbed the shoulder.

On the bench soon after, Kanter pointed to his head as if to say he needed to be more cautious with his injury.

Sore shoulder and all, Kanter finished with 26 points in a 121-113 loss to the Denver Nuggets on Monday night in Game 1 of the Western Conference semifinals. All things considered he held up just fine.

"I don't have another choice," Kanter said. "I don't even try to think about my shoulder. It's the playoffs. Just got to go out there and

play hard and play smart."

Kanter suffered the shoulder injury in the Trail Blazers' deciding Game 5 win over Oklahoma City last Tuesday. He was questionable heading into the series opener against Denver, but looked sharp early as he scored 10 of his

points in the first quarter. That dunk, though, got everyone's attention, especially the look on his

face after. Then again, it was so instinctual — clear path, dunk it, just like usual. "I told him to just dunk it

with his right hand, rather than put two on it," Meyers Leonard said.

Sound advice.

Now more treatment awaits as he and the Blazers try to rebound in Game 2 on Wednesday.

"Just keep playing through it," Kanter said. "Pain killers, injections, anything I can do to help my teammates. Doesn't matter. One arm, two arm, I'm going to go out there and help my teammates win."

Kanter hit 11 of 14 shots and all four free throws. He also grabbed seven rebounds.

"Enes was terrific," Blazers coach Terry Stotts said. "He was very efficient, finished around the basket, playing through the shoulder injury. I couldn't have asked for anymore from him."

The Blazers struggled to stop Nuggets big man Nikola Jokic, who scored 37

points and grabbed nine rebounds. Kanter tried to slow him down, but simply couldn't. No one could for the Blazers. The player nicknamed The Joker was unstoppable.

"He kind of got what he wanted all night," said forward Maurice Harkless, who fouled out with just over three minutes remaining. "We've just got to do a good job of making it tough on him, whether it's being physical or whatever it is. We've got to make it harder for him."

Kanter was waived by the New York Knicks following the trade deadline and signed by the Blazers just before the All-Star break as a backup to starter Jusuf Nurkic. But Kanter became an even more valuable asset for Portland when Nurkic broke his leg in an overtime victory at home over the Brooklyn Nets on March 25.

## Forward-thinking: Avs defenseman Barrie chips in on offense

Colorado Avalanche defenseman Tyson Barrie is constantly thinking as a forward. His goal and two assists in Game 2 at San Jose helped Colorado tie the second-round series at one apiece.

DENVER — Colorado Avalanche defenseman Tyson Barrie has developed a reputation as forward thinking.

Easy to understand why: He's constantly thinking as a forward.

His father was an NHL forward. As a kid, he was a forward. And now he's chipping in on offense much like a forward.

Barrie has a goal and seven assists so far in the postseason. His first career playoff tally arrived Sunday in Game 2 at San Jose, helping the Avalanche send the second-round series back to Denver tied at a game apiece. Game 3 is Tuesday at Pepsi Center.

"I feel really confident

in my all-around game right now," the 27-year-old Barrie said. "I like playing against other team's top lines. I enjoy the challenge. The offensive part, I've got to keep trying to bring it."

His first postseason goal Sunday showed off his offensive instincts: After Gabriel Landeskog's shot bounced off Sharks goaltender Martin Jones, Barrie jumped down low and sent a rolling puck into the corner of the net.

That's Barrie being Barrie. He's coming off a regular season in which had a career-high 59 points (14 goals, 45 assists), which was the most by an Avalanche defenseman since Ray Bourque had 59 in 2000-01.

"Tyson's worked on his game over the last handful of years and gotten really

good at creating offense, jumping up in the rush and making plays when he gets it in the O-zone," Landeskog said. "He's also defending real well right now because first and foremost, that's what a 'D' has got to do. No doubt, he's got the skill of a forward and can make the plays."

Pressing forward just runs in the family. Barrie's father, Len, was a forward who played in 184 NHL games with Philadelphia, Florida, Pittsburgh and Los Angeles Kings. Len Barrie wound up his career with 19 goals and 45 assists.

Tyson Barrie actually was a forward until his teen years, which he credits for his moves now.

"If you grow up a defenseman your whole life, you're not working

on the toe drag or beating guys on offense," said Barrie, who's a native of Victoria, British Columbia. "I always did that. I always made sure to really try to enjoy that part when I was playing hockey. I think it shows in the way I play. I like scoring and trying to beat guys one-on-one and stuff."

Even with his switch to the blue line, his offensive skills remain firmly entrenched. He was the scoring leader among defensemen in each of his four full junior seasons with Kelowna of the Western Hockey League. The Avalanche selected the 5-foot-10, 190-pound Barrie in the third round of the 2009 draft.

He's been assisting with the scoring load ever since. He became the

highest-scoring defenseman in franchise history earlier in the season, passing John-Michael Liles. Barrie has 75 goals in the regular season along with 232 assists.

"He's developed a skill-set to be an offensive threat on the ice," Landeskog said. "He's getting rewarded for it."

To be clear: Barrie doesn't shirk his defensive responsibilities for the sake of sneaking into the offensive play. He's developed a knack to know just when to rush into a play.

"Some of the plays he makes, they're not high-risk plays, but he's up the ice and making an impact offensively," coach Jared Bednar said. "Just good decisions on when to shoot, when to hang on. He's getting pucks through

to the net and been highly competitive on the defensive side of things, too, just his gaps and breaking up plays. He's more physical down low.

"You can tell it matters to him — winning matters. He's playing his hardest every night to make an impact in the game."

Barrie had five assists against Calgary, including three in the series clincher. He also helped shut down Flames standout Johnny Gaudreau.

In Game 2 against San Jose, he had two assists to go with his goal.

"He's been really good," Bednar said. "He's certainly been a guy down the stretch that's getting better and better. In the playoffs, he's taken it to a whole new level."

## Bickertstaff for coaching job

Person familiar with plans tells AP the Cavaliers are interviewing former Memphis coach J.B. Bickerstaff

CLEVELAND — The Cavaliers are interviewing a coaching candidate with a very familiar name.

Former Memphis coach J.B. Bickerstaff is meeting Tuesday with the Cavaliers about their job, a person familiar with the team's coaching search told The Associated Press, speaking on condition of anonymity because the team is not revealing its plans. Bickerstaff's father, Bernie, was a longtime NBA coach and currently is a senior adviser with the Cavaliers.

The 40-year-old Bickerstaff was fired earlier this month by the Memphis Grizzlies, who made a coaching change and demoted general manager Chris Wallace to their scouting department in the wake of a disappointing 33-49 season. The Grizzlies had numerous injuries and crumbled after a 12-5 start.

Bickerstaff was named the Grizzlies' interim coach in November 2017 to replace David Fizdale.

Bickerstaff has previous experience as an assistant with Charlotte, Minnesota and Houston, and he has been praised for his ability to help develop young players.

Bickerstaff is the third known candidate to meet with the Cavaliers, along with Dallas assistant Jamahl Mosley and Miami assistant Juwan Howard. The team also is expected to interview Utah assistant Alex Jensen and has received permission to speak with Portland assistants David

Vanterpool and Nate Tibbetts, who are still involved in the playoffs.

The Cavaliers are looking for their sixth coach since 2013 after parting ways with Larry Drew following a 19-63 season. Drew took over in October when Cleveland fired Tyronn Lue following a 0-6 start.

Earlier this month, GM Koby Altman said there was no timetable to find a coach. He promised to be respectful in talking to coaches on teams in the postseason.

Mike will have to figure that out."

Baffert, meanwhile, aims to match Ben Jones' record with his sixth Kentucky Derby win and second straight. He won last year with Justify, culminating in the Triple Crown. That came three years after he took the Triple Crown with American Pharoah.

It remains to be seen how the Derby will unfold hitting the first turn with so many horses vying for the same spot, but improbable is in a relatively good spot.

Game Winner, who won the Breeders' Cup Juvenile here last fall, and Roadster will have their work cut out for them, starting from post positions that are a combined 4 for 87 in the Derby. When it was noted that Roadster's No. 17 post is 0 for 40, nervous laughter grew in a crowded room of horsemen including Baffert, his connections and the media.

Baffert later took all of his horses' slots in stride, if only because none was on the rail. War of Will drew that unenviable spot and was given 20-1 odds as a result.

"I like the 16 hole, it's a good spot," he said of Game Winner's position. "Roadster, he's out there. I don't know. I always get two horses together. A lot of times in California

they draw so ... I'll be watching those two leaving there."

War of Will's trainer, Mark Casse, chose to be encouraged about his horse's post.

"It could be worse, I think," he said of the horse who had a three-race winning streak halted in the Louisiana Derby. "Our horse is really on his game, so he'll come away from there running."

"I think we'll probably be on the lead and play catch me if you can. And you know, if we come away from there like he normally does, we're going to come away from there running. ... I've thought I had great draws before and gotten wiped out, so maybe this is the change."

Points leader Tacitus will start from the No. 8 post with 10-1 odds as he tries to give trainer Bill Mott his first Derby victory. The son of Tapit and Close Hatches by First Defence has Grade 2 wins in the Wood Memorial and Tampa Bay Derby during a three-race surge.

Another 10-1 choice is unbeaten Maximum Security, who starts from the No. 7 hole and will try to follow up his victory in the Grade 1 Florida Derby.

Todd Pletcher entries Spinoff and Cutting Humor face 30-1 odds after drawing the Nos. 19 and 10 post positions.

Also eligible is 30-1 Bodexpress, who can get into the field with a defecation.

the Twins.

"It's undeniably the Rays," Miller writes. "But the Minnesota Twins deserve maybe an April Champions visor, or maybe a pair of novelty April Champions socks. Other than the Rays, no team has increased its playoff odds more than the Twins, who entered Sunday with the third-best record in baseball, the third-best run differential and the second- or third-best offense in baseball."

The biggest loser? The Rays' AL East rival Red Sox. "They were supposed to

be quite good again after winning 108 regular-season games and the World Series in 2018," writes Bleacher Report's Rymer. "In actuality, they're bad. Very bad. Their 12-17 record is one of the worst in MLB, and only the Miami Marlins and Baltimore Orioles have done worse than their minus-31 run differential."

Rymer points to slow starts by 2018 AL MVP Mookie Betts and Jackie Bradley Jr., staff ace Chris Sale's struggles and "horrendous" defense.

Both ESPN writers, as well as colleagues Jeff Pagan and David Schoenfeld call the Red

Sox "the biggest disappointment so far."

"Certainly the Red Sox, not just because of their record, but because of some putrid all-around baseball," Schoenfeld writes. "Heading into Monday, only the Baltimore Orioles and Miami Marlins had a worse run differential, and Boston is somehow 0-6 in games Chris Sale has started."

Writes Matz, "Of the three teams that rank at the bottom of the majors in run differential, two were expected to be awful (O's, Marlins) and the other is ... the defending champs??? The Red Sox earn this dubious distinction, and it's not even close."

Nationals 3B Anthony Rendon to IL after missing 7 of 8 games

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nationals third baseman Anthony Rendon is finally heading to the injured list with a bruised left elbow after sitting out seven of Washington's past eight games.

Rendon joins two other members of the team's starting infield on the IL: first baseman Ryan Zimmerman and shortstop Trea Turner.

The 38-year-old has already announced this will be his final season.

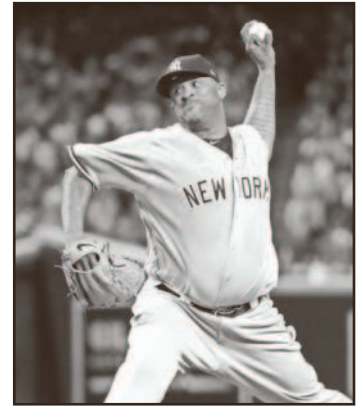
Sabathia joined Randy Johnson and Steve Carlton as the only lefties to reach 3,000 strikeouts.

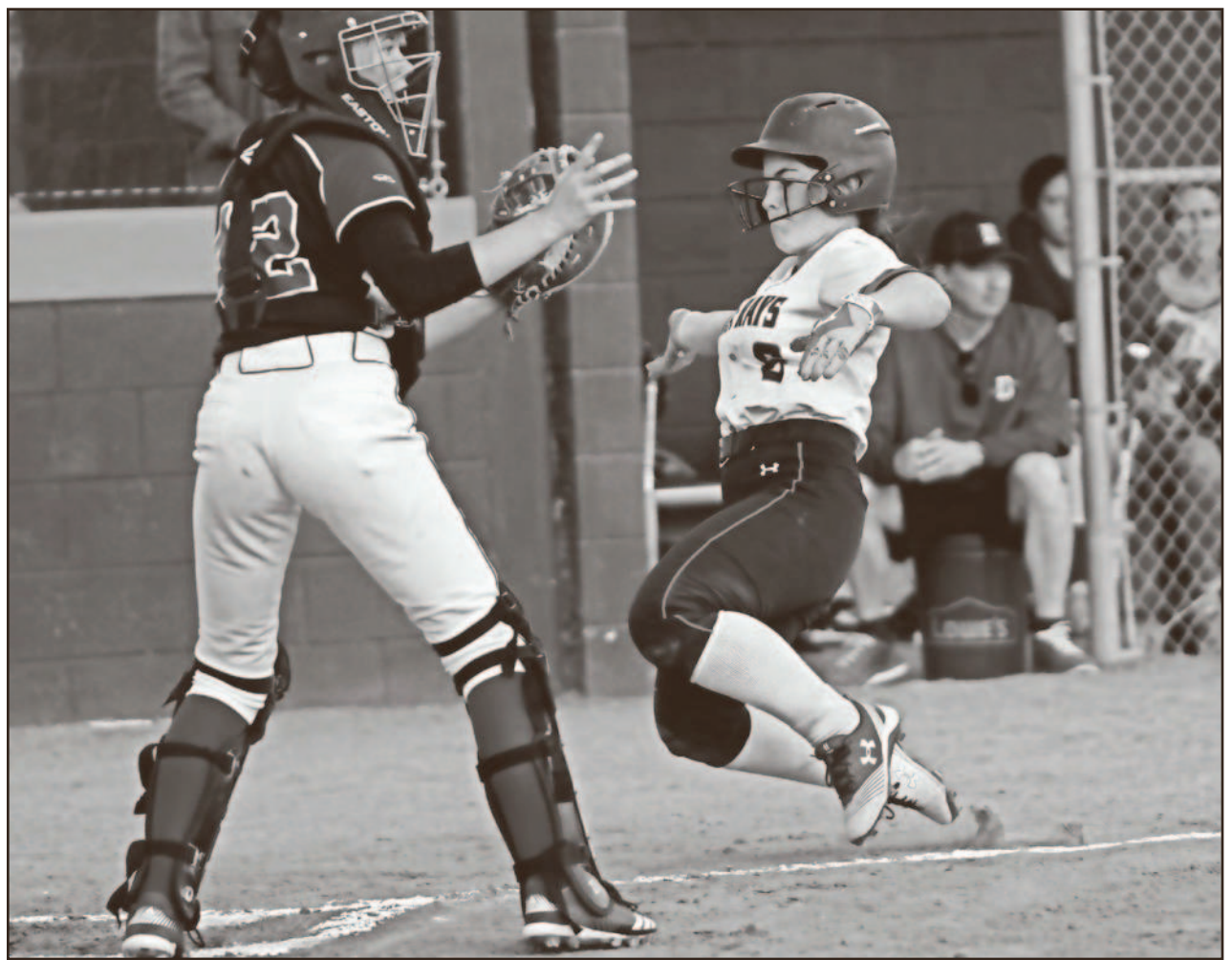

# How have Rays posted majors' best record through April? Here's 10 reasons why, and how they can maintain

It starts with the pitching, which has been phenomenal. But also hitting hard, scoring first, having fun.

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — There's plenty of people around who are surprised by all the good things the Rays have done in finishing April with a majors-best 19-9 record. Just not the man roaming centerfield for the local nine.

"We've played just the way I thought we could, to be quite honest," Kevin Kiermaier said. "And it feels good to sit here and say right now in this moment we have the best record in baseball."

That record, completed for the month with Tuesday night's game rained out and rescheduled as part of a moved-up afternoon doubleheader (1:15 EDT), doesn't really get the Rays anything more than some increased national TV chatter.

But it's a good first step — 17 percent actually — toward where they want to be after all six months and 162 games.

"You've got to be happy with the way this team has come out of the gate strong," manager Kevin Cash said, "A lot more to do obviously, but really thrilled with just the way everything's come together."

"The offense, pitching, defense. It seems in all of our wins, you can point to those three areas as to why they helped get the wins individually that night. We felt like we were balanced. And if you're doing a one month review, you've got to like what you see."

There obviously has been plenty good, to go along with a dash of not-so-much, such as injuries that have sidelined Matt Duffy, Austin Meadows and Joey Wendle; a 1-4 record in one-run games; occasionally shaky bullpen work.

But, really, it's been a heck of an opening month, and combined with the plague of injuries on the Yankees and the apparently hellacious World Series hangover staggering the Red Sox, has the Rays sitting atop the AL East.

Here are 10 key elements in their success thus far, and reasons if they can sustain anything close for optimism going forward:

## 1. Making their pitch

The Rays have the best ERA in the majors (2.95), the most strikeouts (280) and the third lowest opponents average (.215) through Monday. They've allowed two or fewer runs in more than half their

games, a majors-most 15 of 28, plus one or none 10 times. Counting the eight scoreless outings by openers, their starters have been the majors' best, with a 2.04 ERA, .189 average and 10-plus strikeouts per nine innings. Five relievers have saves in what's been a deep bullpen bolstered by callups. "Coming out of spring we've said and been consistent that our pitching is going to carry a big load," Cash said. "And after one month if you're going to review, they've certainly done that. A lot of guys have thrown the ball well." While they aren't likely to sustain that level of dominance, the depth of the staff has been impressive and encouraging. "All of 'em," Cash said. "You can't find a negative in there. And that's probably a reason we've had the success, the record where it is."

## 2. Plus/minus rating

A good predictor of season success is usually run differential, premised on the basic concept of scoring more than you allowed, although skewed by blowouts. When the Rays have made the playoffs they've been good at it. Thus far, they've been the best, their plus-47 10 better than the next-in-line Yankees, and 78 up on the Red Sox.

## 3. Different driver every day

The Rays are a true sum-of-their-parts squad, with no established superstar position players, but plenty of pretty good ones, who've all done their share of great things. "It's been a new hero each game," Kiermaier said.

## 4. Taking their hacks

Hitting the ball hard doesn't mean you're going to get on base, but it helps. The Rays, through Monday's StatCast readings, put a majors-most 213 balls in play with an exit velocity of at least 100 mph. Their average exit velo of 90.3 mph ranked second best to the Yankees, and up notably from last year's 87 mph, which was 26th. Tommy Pham is leading charge with 34 balls in triple digits.

## 5. First things first

The combination of stellar pitching and an aggressive offense has repeatedly gotten the Rays off to good starts, as they've outscored teams

29-4 in first innings. That's the most runs scored for any team in the first and fewest allowed, and the largest margin of any team for any frame. They've scored in the first in 18 games, including 10 of 12 road games.

## 6. Cash's kids

A prevalent part of the narrative since spring has been how well they all get along, how unselfish they are, how much fun they have together. Obviously winning is at the root of some of that, but they're confident it's real deal, and here to stay. "Just a true joy to be a part of," Kiermaier said.

## 7. For openers

No, not that kind of opener. Series openers. The key to success over a full season can boil down to winning series, which usually means two out of three, with an occasional sweep mixed in. Thus far they're 8-1. Their first step has been big, winning the opening game eight times, and all five on the road.

## 8. Going deep

Accruing depth to provide quality coverage at every position was a priority, and that's paid off so far as they've weathered the loss of Duffy, Meadows, Blake Snell and Wendle.

## 9. And the winner is ...

Voting is months away, but Rays have done well enough to emerge among the way-too-early favorites for major awards: Tyler Glasnow, at 5-0, 1.75, for the Cy Young; Brandon Lowe, hitting .289 with six homers, 17 RBIs, a .917 OPS for Rookie of the Year; Yandy Diaz (.298-7-18-.990) and Meadows (.351-6-19-1.097) for MVP.

## 10. Ya gotta believe

Rays execs and staff felt they had a pretty good team, but sometimes the players have to see it to believe it. And this first month has done a lot to build confidence in the clubhouse, which helps keep good times going and bad from lingering. "We control our own destiny, and that's a beautiful thing," Kiermaier said. "It's up to us to sit here and keep writing this story of a season."

# Lamar Odom talks Big3 comeback attempt: 'I'm going to give you life, but take your basketball skills'

The doctors told Lamar Odom's loved ones to say their final goodbyes. Now the former New York high school phenom is not only breathing, he's back playing basketball.

So Odom can't complain. But there remain problems stemming from his stroke, heart attack and coma from four years ago.

"My damn memory," Odom said in an interview Tuesday with the Daily News. "I can't remember s---."

Odom, 39, was referencing his short-term memory loss, like his tendency to forget the location of an item he just placed down. He said doctors recommended mental exercises to combat the problem. More pressing to his latest endeavor, however, is a sudden difficulty in dribbling a basketball.

He figures that will come back.

"From the stroke, some of my balance is not the same, my equilibrium is not the same, but I'm working on it to get it better," Odom said. "Handling the basketball

came so naturally. When I see that going between my legs and going behind my back is a problem, I think that's the coma and stroke and heart attack."

Odom is among 132 players entering the Big3 draft on Wednesday in Las Vegas, joining, among other entries with comeback stories, Eddy Curry and Greg Oden.

Only 31 will be picked from the pool for Ice Cube's 3-on-3 league, making Odom a longshot. But he does bring cachet and name-recognition as a two-time NBA champion and former reality TV star associated with the Kardashians.

For Odom, just making it this far is an accomplishment considering his prognosis after he overdosed on drugs inside a Vegas brothel and slipped into a coma.

"All my doctors say I'm a walking miracle," Odom said. "They couldn't really believe how I came back so fast. When I woke up I couldn't walk or talk."

Odom said he was driven to a basketball comeback by watching LeBron James achieve greatness during his last

season with Cleveland in 2017-18. At 33 years old, James played 82 games and carried an underwhelming supporting cast to the NBA Finals.

Odom, who said he remains in top physical condition ("Looking good is big to me — if it wasn't for basketball, I'd look good anyway"), played with a Filipino team at a February tournament in Dubai. He was unimpressed with his performance.

"I was a bum," Odom said. "It was good just to go out there and compete, get my feet wet. But I was a bum."

At this point, Odom understands that the gifts he was given as a player — the playmaking as a 6-10 forward, the dribbling touch of an elite point guard — are just gravy on top of a beating heart.

"For me it's just a blessing to be able to play. I'm just refining all my skills," Odom said. "I think God made a deal with me. He said, 'I'm going to give you life, but I'm going to take your basketball skills.' But I don't mind working to get it back. It's going to be a tedious process, but it'll come back."

# Paying homage to our first responders at the Tampa Firefighters Museum

Today and every day, I'm thankful that there are people brave enough to be first responders.

In my hometown, I know quite a few lifelong fire and rescue personnel, and believe me, I know that it takes a special

person to run directly into danger when everyone else is running away from it. Recently I found a wonderful museum in Tampa that both honors the city's firefighters, as well as informs the public about what it is, exactly, that those brave men and women do.

The Tampa Firefighters Museum is housed in a downtown Tampa building that was actually a firehouse from 1911 to 1974. It's directly across the street from, and stands in sharp contrast to, the much newer and shinier Tampa Fire Rescue Station One.

The museum's stated mission is to preserve the heritage of the Tampa Fire Department, as well as promoting life safety education and fire prevention within the community. But the building itself is a wonderful source of fire education, too.

During its active service years, the building presided over the 63-year transformation from horse-drawn apparatus to diesel-powered rescue and firefighting vehicles. Today, the

museum stands as a tribute to the city's firefighters, past, present and future, and the rich legacy they have left.

On the day I visited the free museum, I was fortunate enough to be greeted by Joy Bunch, who said she just ran the gift shop, but was obviously much more important to the operations of the museum than she let on. There was a big Tampa Firefighters Museum fundraiser coming up, and she was in charge of registering participants. When I was up at the front, a young firefighter came in to register and she spoke with him for a few minutes.

After he left, she told me that the fundraiser was an annual one that honored a young Tampa Fire Rescue driver/engineer who had passed away a few years ago. Joy is Matthew Bunch's mother. Now she devotes her time and resources to the 5,000 square-foot museum that holds mementoes from Tampa's storied firefighting history, from 1895 to present.

Within the exhibit space, where horse-drawn steamers used to park, are two old

fire trucks, as well as numerous hose carts. There's a large children's section, with a wooden fire truck they can climb upon, a big floor map where they can find their own neighborhood fire station and a wall covered with some old and newer firefighting tools. All are labeled with names and descriptions of what they do.

Upstairs is a beautiful 2,500 square-foot room and kitchen with the building's original dark wood flooring. People can now rent out this space where firefighters used to sleep and eat for their own special events.

One of the last, and most touching, things I did before I left the museum was to visit the Memorial Room. That's where those Tampa firefighters who lost their lives on the job are honored, with their badges displayed. There is also a video playing on a loop in the

room, that shows older films of brave firefighters battling flames in the city.

And every few minutes, soft bagpipes playing "Amazing Grace" can be heard.

# Music drives the vibe of Englewood's on Dearborn

When Merrill and Tony Hodge first bought the Dearborn Street building that housed a mini-mall back in 2004, they thought they would just continue to lease it out and relaxingly spend Tony's retirement in Englewood. They had moved to the area from Marco Island, after falling in love with the area and the people who lived here.

But by 2009, the mini-mall tenants had begun to flame out and the huge property, which also included a courtyard, had fallen into disarray. The couple decided to take action and use the space to open something of their own.

"My husband is Austrian, and he's always wanted to have himself a little bar," Merrill said. "And he's been in the restaurant business since he was born, practically. Of course, this isn't exactly a little bar."

She's right — it's not little and it's certainly not just a bar. Englewood's on Dearborn is a music event spot, where live music is played every evening they are open. The musicians are primarily blues-related, with some classic rock and dance bands sprinkled in, and they play at venues up and down the Suncoast, though Merrill also books some Grammy Award winners, too.

Music drives the

vibe of Englewood's on Dearborn. It originates from a stage back in the spacious courtyard and is piped into the main dining room, if diners choose to eat inside. If the weather is bad, the musicians set up on an inside stage in that dining room.

The bars are also plentiful, with one out front by the street, another in the main dining room and a third in the courtyard. But music and alcohol are not all the Hodge's place has going for it.

"We also have great food, and we have a very eclectic menu," Merrill said. "Because of where Tony is from, we have the Schnitzels and Hungarian Goulash, and we sell out of that all the time, but my Chef (Chris Coyne) worked in New Orleans for 10 years, so we also have things like Etouffee and Shrimp and Grits."

Merrill and Tony have a distinct division of duties at their business, and they're both there almost all the time. Merrill helps Chris expedite food orders back in the kitchen and Tony works in the front of the house, acting effectively as the face of Englewood's on Dearborn and greeting everyone who comes in the door.

All the regular customers are familiar with his fedora and colorful euphemisms, both of which have ended up on t-shirts sold at the bar. Though the couple has completed several renovations and

updates to the property in the last few years, the next one will include a gift shop, where people can buy restaurant/bar branded merchandise and even fedoras similar to the one Tony wears.

As much as the Englewood community appears to love and support the Hodges and their establishment, it's obvious that the couple loves them right back. Merrill said she and Tony feel very fortunate to be both living and operating their business in Englewood.

"I just love this town," she said. "We live about a mile from the downtown area and I can walk my dog here in the morning and get a cup of coffee. This place just has a relaxed feeling."
