MADRID, Nov. 8.—Ex-Premier Romanones, speaking at a banquet last night, said: "I know that the hour of alliances has sounded for Spain but it is the hour of alliances contracted by public opinion in common accord with the government and the king."
He further declared that the treaties of alliance between Spain and France, Great Britain and the United States "are the surest guarantees we have to avoid war. The moment has, therefore, come to establish bonds not only with France and Great Britain, but also with the United States and Portugal."



ADMITTED TO TRINIDAD BAR

Mr. Stanley Stone Served Four Years With the Colors—Welcome From Bench

The following is taken from a recent issue of the Port-of-Spain Gazette:

At 9:15 a.m. yesterday, a special sitting of the Full Court was held to consider the petition of Mr. Stanley Stanford Stone, praying for admission to practice as a solicitor and advocate in the Court of the colony. The Court was composed of His Honor the Chief Justice, Sir A. F. Lucie-Smith, Kt., Mr. Justice Russell, M.A., LL.B., and Mr. Acting Justice Deane, M.A. Those present at the Bar were Messrs. C. A. Child, F. S. LaChapelle, C. T. E. Worrell, J. L. Mathieu Perez, LL.B., Oliver V. Fitzwilliam and Robert M. T. Prizgar.

Mr. C. A. Child, in presenting the petition, said the papers were all in order and as Their Honors would see, Mr. Stone passed his examination as far back as 1915 and instead of being admitted to practice in the Courts of the colony, he elected to join the ranks with those thousands of men who at that time joined the colors. He left on his own in April 1915. On reaching England he enlisted in the 4th Battalion of the West Yorkshire Regiment. He obtained a commission and by the end of that year, within a few weeks of the arrival of the first Public Contingent, Mr. Stone was sent to the firing line in France. At Neuve Chapelle he had the misfortune to be wounded so seriously that he nearly lost his life. He took some months to recuperate and on recovery was transferred and did stonework from observation balloons at Messines and Paschendale up to the end of 1917. Then he proceeded to England and did instructing work till he was demobilized early this year. He has now come back to take up the career where he dropped it four years ago. As a result of his military service, instead of having 2000 years' practice to his credit which brings with it experience, he finds himself on the threshold of his career. He has been fortunate to get into partnership with Mr. Oliver Fitzwilliam, a gentleman whose sterling qualities are well known in this colony. He was sure he was getting the sentiments of both branches of the profession in wishing Mr. Stone success in his career—success which will be assured if he only gets from the public that support in the shape of work and yet more work which his talents and services so well deserve.

Mr. Stone then subscribed to the necessary oaths.

ANGLO-CHILEAN AMITY LAUDED BY TOCORNOL

Chilean Missioner Delivers a Flowery Discourse at Honor Banquet

POINTS TO COUNTRY'S TRADE

Says Solidarity in Connections Caused No Lapse in Countries' Commercial Relations

(By the Associated Press)

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The Chilean missioner emphasized the close relations between Chile and England from a standpoint of parliamentary ambitions and business relations, in speeches delivered during the course of the lords and commons banquet given in their honor and at which were present prominent businessmen and bankers.

Refers To Relations.

Señor Tocornol said in the House of Lords, referring to the relations between the two countries, that "It is solidarity in our connection which made it possible for a century of intercourse to elapse in dignified silence. Many amongst those who reached our shores are British subjects and the country is happy to have them there for the Britons and the Chileans sympathize readily, perhaps because there is a close resemblance between us than our geographical distance and the difference of speech allow us to perceive."

Following Britain's Lead.

Señor Iniguez told the House of Commons that Chile was mindful of Great Britain's recognition of the independence of the Spanish colonies of South America. "British parliamentary life is closely followed in Chile and Chile is making a steady evolution following the line of Britain's parliamentary regime," he said.

Anglo-Chilean Amity.

Speaking of the Chileans attending the banquet, many of whom have been in business here for 10 years, Señor Tocornol said: "We are at this moment interested with the very roots of the thriving trade of Anglo-Chilean amity." Speaking about the Chilean regime, he said: "Never has Chile suffered a national misfortune or celebrated a happy event that the British community has shown indifference. The British colony is always the first and the most generous in sharing our troubles and our joys. Britain has made a cult of work and has directed it overseas in that commerce between all the nations knowing well that reciprocity in the supply of objects for the satisfaction of the needs of mankind is the prime factor for promoting solidarity among the peoples."

Matter Now Critical.

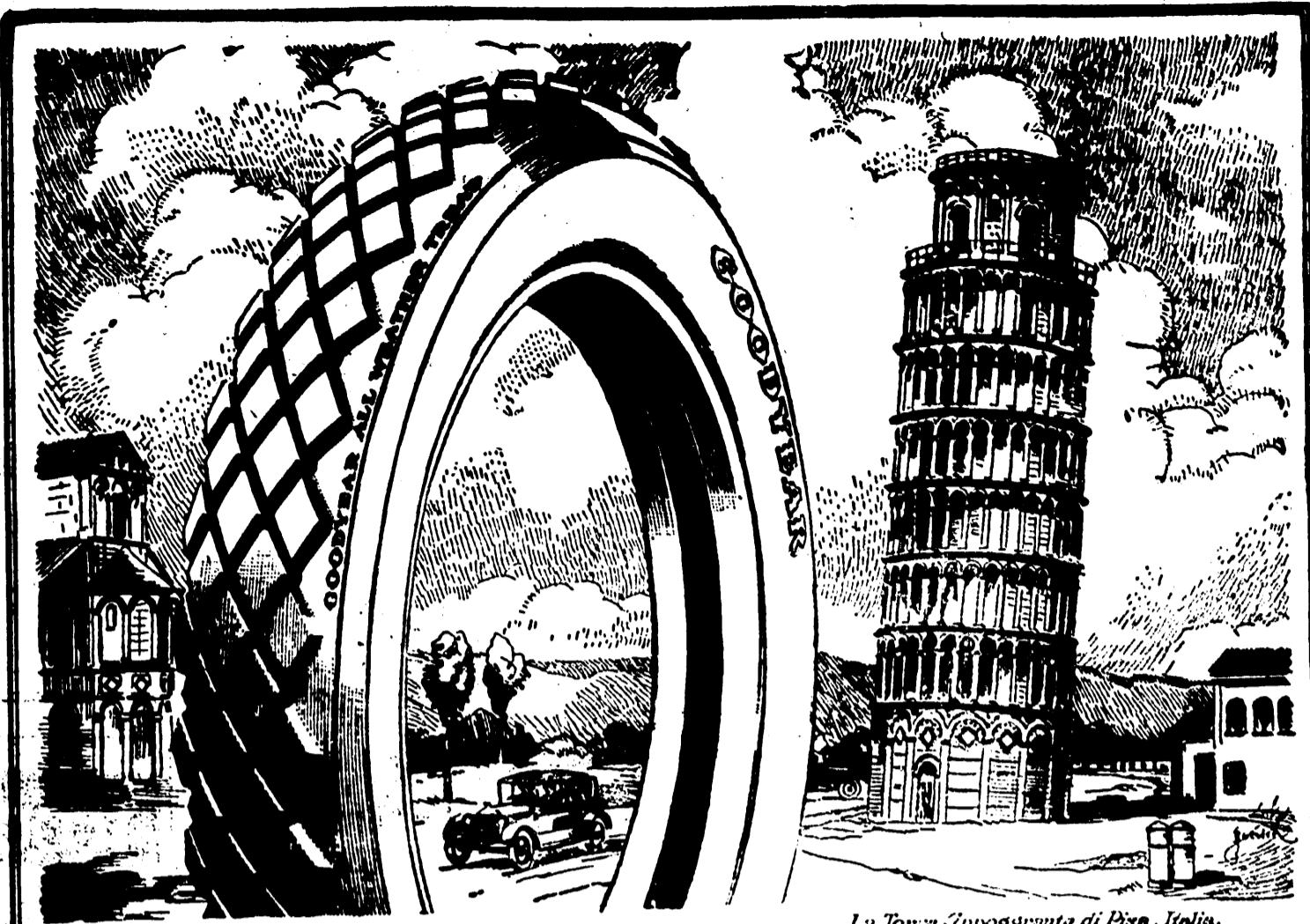

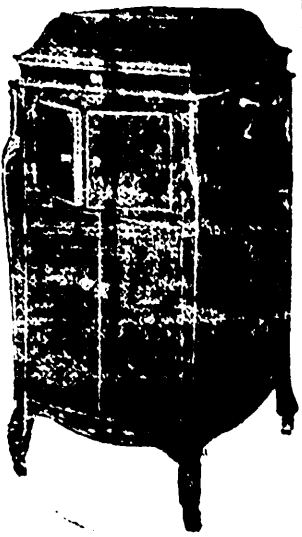

St. Mihiel Operation Succeeds; Argonne Offensive Follows close

"AVERAGE AMERICANS IN OLIVE DRAB"—By LIEUTENANT COLONEL ROOSEVELT

On First Day in Argonne Americans Break Through, But Lack of Training Prevents Proper Exploitation of Success—Battle Fierce One—Men Were Gallant But Lack of Orders.

BLOWN INTO FOE'S LINES

Germans Able to Gather Themselves and What Might Have Become a Rout Became Fierce Rear Guard Action, Which Lasted for More Than Month.

CHAPTER VIII.—(Continued.)

An amusing incident occurred in Lieut. Baxter's platoon during the battle. The men were advancing to the attack perhaps a couple of hundred yards from the Germans. They were moving forward in squad columns as they were going through a valley where they were going to be met by the enemy. The men were firing at the enemy and saw that a rabbit had come up in front of the left of the platoon and the men were firing at it.

The worst strain of the battle came during the last two days, when casualties had been so heavy as to make it impossible for the field officers and most of the company commanders, when the remnants of the remnants pressed forward and captured Herz-le-See and the railroad. It is always more difficult for the winners in a battle like this, for they generally do not know what is at stake. General Franz Bauer told me how during the fourth day, when battalions of 800 men had sunk to a hundred and it looked as if the division would be wiped out and even he was wondering whether we were not losing the efficiency of the division without getting a competent commander. The division commander, General Sumner, came to his headquarters and said: "General, the German high command has ordered the first general retreat since the first battle of the Marne."

General Sumner took command of the division just before Soissons, when General Billard was given the corps. He had previously commanded the artillery of the division. The division always regarded him as their own particular general. He was known by the nickname of "Sitting Bull." He is, in my opinion, one of the few really great troop leaders developed by us during the war. At this battle General Sumner is reported to have made a statement which was often quoted in the division. Some staff officer from the corps had asked him if, after the very heavy casualties we had received, we were capable of making another attack. He replied: "Sir, when the First Division has only two men left they will be echeloned in depth and attacking toward Berlin."

Besides the First Division, the Foreign Legion and the Second Division were meeting the same type of work and suffering the same losses. No finer fighting units existed than these two. A very real compliment that was paid the Second Division was the fact that the rank and file of our division was always glad when circumstances ordained that the division should fight side by side. I have often heard the junior officers discussing it.

The division was relieved by the Senforth and Gordon Highlanders. When I was going to the rear wounded I passed their advancing columns. They were a fine set of men—tall, broad-shouldered and fit looking. They, too, were in high spirits. The morale of the Allies had changed within twenty-

four hours. They felt, and rightly, that they had turned the Hun. Never from this moment to the end of the war did it change.

The Highlanders cheered as the wounded Americans passed by them. One lieutenant called out to me, "How far have you gone?" I answered, "About six kilometers."

"Well go another six."

After the battle the division was withdrawn to near Paris. Many of the officers came to see me. Major A. W. Kenner, the regimental surgeon, who had again distinguished himself by his gallantry, and Captain Leage were both in, looking little the worse for the wear.

CHAPTER IX.

"Millions of ages have come and gone."

During the next couple of months while I was laid up with my wound the regiment went to a rest sector near Pont-a-Mousson. There replacements reached them, wounded men returned and they gradually worked up to their full strength again. They enjoyed themselves fully. It was one of those sectors so common on the east of the western front where by tacit agreement little action took place. The nature of the country and its distance from the great centers of France made many parts of the front impracticable for an offensive either by the Hun or ourselves. The men were worn by hard fighting, and a division of the front line held the line for several stretches. A few shells would come whizzing over during the day and that was all.

One incident of this period occurred to a recruit, who was sent out the first night to a listening post. In the listening post was a box on which the guard sat. At some time during the previous night the Germans had crept up and put a bomb under this box. After looking around a little the recruit felt tired and sat down on the box. A violent explosion followed. Right away a patrol worked out from our lines to see what had happened. When they got there they looked carefully through every ditch or clump of bushes in the vicinity, but they could not find a trace of the man. He was reported as dead, blown to bits. On his march up into Germany that missing recruit reported back to the regiment on his return from a German prison camp. Instead of being blown to pieces he had simply been blown into the German lines. When he came to, he was being carried to the rear on a stretcher and had spent the rest of the war as a prisoner, except for a few scars, little the worse for wear.

Shortly after this the St. Mihiel operation took place. The plan was to nip off the salient by a simultaneous attack on both sides. Our division was the left flank unit of the forces attacking on the right of the salient, being charged with the mission of making a juncture with the Twenty-sixth Division, which was the right unit of the forces attacking on the left of the salient. The resistance was so slight that the operation partook of the nature of a maneuver rather than a battle. Our losses were practically nil. A large number of prisoners were captured and a considerable amount of material. The reason for this was that the Germans had determined to abandon the position and were in full retreat when we attacked. They had been misinformed by other spies, however, and started their movement about twenty-four hours too late.

The men had a fine time in this attack. During the time they had been in the Toul sector a high hill, called Mont Sec, behind the German lines, had given them a lot of trouble. From it the Germans had been virtually able to look into

our trenches. In the attack they not only took this hill, but left it far in the rear. Our unit captured a German officers' mess, including the cook and a fine pig. They promptly made the cook kill the pig and prepare him for their dinner, which they thoroughly enjoyed.

At another time a German company kitchen came up in the night to one of our outposts to ask him directions. When they found out their mistake it was too late, and they were promptly conducted to one of our very hungry companies.

St. Mihiel Operation.
The value of the St. Mihiel operation to our army was considerable. It gave our staffs an opportunity to make mistakes which were not too terribly costly. We fell down particularly on the question of handling our road traffic. The artillery and the trains in many instances became hopelessly jammed on the largely destroyed road. Each unit commander with laudable desire to get forward would do anything to accomplish that purpose—double back or cut across country. The result was, of course, a hopeless tangle. This alone would have prevented us carrying on a further attack, as no army can run away from its echelons of supply.

Immediately on the completion of the attacks the First Division, in company with a number of others, was withdrawn from the line and moved west by marching to a position of readiness for the Argonne offensive, which was to take place in a couple of weeks. The march was made mainly by night, as every endeavor was used to make a surprise attack. The troops bivouacked in the woods, keeping under cover during the day.

The battle was a fierce one. During the first day the Americans made a clean break through, but the lack of training showed and they were unable to exploit their success properly. The various units became dislocated and could not be transmitted. The men were gallant, but gallantry is no use when you do not get orders. Supplies did not come up. As a result the Germans were able to gather themselves, and what might have been a rout became a fierce rear-guard action which lasted for more than a month.

The First Division was held in army reserve and thrown in to take a particularly hard bit of territory. They were in eleven days in all and took all their objectives. As a result they were cited individually by General Pershing in Special Orders No. 211. The losses again were very heavy, nearly as heavy as at Soissons. It was in this battle Lieut. T. E. Emory was killed while making a daring patrol. Emory was a gallant young fellow, not more than twenty-two or twenty-three years of age. He had originally been intelligence officer for my battalion and had been quite badly wounded by a shell fragment in the Westfielder sector. As soon as he was cured he reported back to the regiment and took up his old work as scout officer. When the division took

over, contact had been lost with the enemy. A patrol was accordingly sent out at once, for it was possible that an attack would be ordered in the morning. Lieut. Emory was given forty men and sent out. Signal corps men were with him to carry a telephone. It turned out that the Germans were holding strong points rather than a continuous line of front.

On account of this and the darkness he filtered through without seeing them and unobserved by them. The first word his battalion commander received was a telephone message from the signal corps saying: "We have advanced about one and one-half kilometers and there is no sign of the enemy. The Germans have opened on us from the right flank."

Then, "They are firing on us from three sides. I believe we are surrounded." And last, "Lieut. Emory has just been shot through the head and killed."

Captain Foster and Capt. Wortley also were killed at this time, besides many other gallant officers and men. Foster when he died was but twenty-two years old. with that of 'N' Young? As a matter of fact, Matthews, the most famous lightweight pitcher in the history of the game, stood only fifty feet from the plate, while the pitcher of today must send the ball six to ten feet. I venture the assertion that if Matthews were at his best to-day he would not last a week in any league.

Walsh: "In using the spitball" working the ball where the two first fingers rest on it has the effect of making the ball leave the fingers first and the thumb last. You know, when you peg up a ball to throw it you usually grasp it firmly with the two first fingers and the thumb. If the ball is dry it naturally leaves the thumb first and the fingers last. But when you wet the ball in one spot it has a tendency to deflect the course, and the ball leaves the fingers first, passing over the thumb last.

Matthews: "For the 'adeaway' the ball is held very loosely at the tips of the fingers, the first two fingers being above the ball and the

thumb below it. The arms are thrown high above the head, but when the pitching arm begins to start the ball on its way the arm is brought out from the side of the body and raised to an angle of about 45 degrees. This motion is made through so quickly, however, that it is practically impossible for the batsman to detect the fact that he is going to get a spitball, very different from an over curve. In the drop curve the arm descends straight down in front, but in the fadeaway the motion of the arm from its position at an angle of 45 degrees is a small outward swing. When the arm gets in front of the pitcher, just about on the level with his chin, the hand is given a sharp twist forward or to the left, which brings the back of the hand on top and the body held still, which is exactly the position the rapid action of the arm sets on sideways or off the side of the ball. At the same time there is a rotary motion given to the hand. When the ball leaves the hand the arm is so twisted that the palm of the hand faces outward. "Mathewson is the only pitcher who ever used the 'fadeaway' ball, our pitchers have used it vainly to master this curve for many years. This is how Mathewson pitched the drop curve ball. To deliver this ball the arm must be thrown high above the head," he says. "As the pitching arm rapidly descends straight forward the arm is turned slightly outward, and when the arm is in front the hand is turned slightly outward and the snap, a hand only is given by the wrist, and the greater the snap the better will be the curve.

In holding the ball the first two fingers are above it and the thumb below. The ball is held rather loosely. When the wrist or snap of the wrist takes place at the moment of delivery the hand turns so that the thumb is on top of the ball and the first two fingers below it. A full arm swing is used. The body is bent far forward so that the weight of the body is behind the ball and as the arm descends with a mighty swing the weight of the body is shifted from right foot to the left.

As you can well guess, such a pitch is a great strain on the muscles of the arm when delivered with the power a pitcher possesses. Even an expert the ball can be used at varying speeds. When men are not on bases it is a fine ball to pitch, as it is desired to make the batter swing at a ground ball that can be easily fielded.
