AMERICAN LEAGUE, BRUM'S PROPOSAL

Basis Is Absolute Equality For All American Nations For Common Action Against External Foe And Arbitration Of Inter-American Disputes

FREE CAILLAUX OF TREASON CHARGE

Ex-Premier of France Stands Guilty of Commerce and Correspondence With Enemy. Jury of Peers Decides

Caillaux is Convicted of Placing Personal and Political Ambition During War Above Country's Interest

(By The Associated Press) PARIS, April 22. Joseph Caillaux, ex-premier of France and twice minister of finance, stands to-night convicted of having placed his personal and political ambition during the war higher than the interests of the country that honored him and gave him birth.

Caillaux, while escaping conviction of the heinous charge of high treason, was found by his former peers to have been imprudent and reckless and very close to treasonable ambitions, for such is the interpretation of the verdict, "Guilty of commerce and correspondence with the enemy," which had just been handed down against him by the French Senate.

First of Sort This is the first verdict of this sort to be rendered since the war began in any of the allied countries.

Commerce as interpreted by the senators and judges does not mean financial trading but commerce by means of common news while correspondence is not meant in the literal or technical etymology of the word.

Determined To Finish The senators entered the Luxembourg palace this afternoon with the determination to have finished with the affair which took up their time in the past three months and entered into the discussion in a vigorous and businesslike manner, presenting a strange contrast to their bored attitude during the closing days of the trial.

The Senate High Court convened at 2:30 o'clock and immediately went into secret deliberation, discussing whether the accused was guilty of high treason, intelligence with the enemy, commerce with the enemy or merely "Defeatism."

Gravest Degree First Ballots were taken on the above charges in the order given in order to consider the gravest degree of crime first.

Heavy Banishment The verdict rendered means a sentence of five years banishment which may be lessened to one year as extenuation of the circumstances is found.

Uruguay's President Urges Adoption Of Policy Like States'

Tells University of Montevideo Students First Step in Formation of Proposed League Is For Other American Countries to Make Declaration Similar to Monroe Doctrine Placing Them on Same Footing for Joint Action Against European Aggression and to Secure Solidarity of American Continent.

(By The Associated Press) MONTEVIDEO, April 22. The President Brum asserted that the formation of an American league in the wake of the Monroe Doctrine for all the American nations for common action against offense to any one of them from outside nations and for the arbitration of inter-American disputes, was proposed by Doctor Radazar Brum, president of Uruguay, in his address to the students of the University of Montevideo last night.

Should Make Declaration As a step in the formation of such a league, President Brum declared that the other American countries ought to make a declaration similar to the Monroe Doctrine in the United States for joint action against European aggression and to secure the solidarity of the American continent.

Should Help Nations He said that the league should be formed without prejudice to adherence to the League of Nations and should any member of the American league have a controversy with the League of Nations, then that nation should ask for the cooperation of the American league in the settlement of the controversy.

Purely Continental "The Pan-American policy is purely continental and does not interfere in any way with our good understanding with Spain, Portugal, England, France, Italy or any other European countries with whom we can maintain the most cordial relations and closest commerce ties provided they show respect for our personality.

Taking up the question of the Monroe Doctrine he pointed out how it had constituted, on the whole, an efficacious safeguard for the territorial integrity of many of the American countries. President Brum asserted that the formation of such a league in the wake of the Monroe Doctrine for all the American nations for common action against offense to any one of them from outside nations and for the arbitration of inter-American disputes, was proposed by Doctor Radazar Brum, president of Uruguay, in his address to the students of the University of Montevideo last night. "That is that sufficient reason for us to take an interest in the future and to turn away from the Monroe Doctrine with the pretext that it is not now necessary," he asked. "I believe that today more than ever we should render foresight in searching for formulas that may assure for ever the peace and full independence of the American countries. "It has been affirmed by the enemies of the Monroe Doctrine that the attitude of the United States might injure the susceptibility of the country threatened which itself protected without even having asked for such aid but, apart from the fact that such a statement is devoid of all seriousness, the inconsistency pointed out would be alleviated if the American countries made a declaration similar to the Monroe Doctrine lending themselves to intervene in favor of any of them, including the United States. In the event of their having to engage in a war with an overseas country in the defense of their rights. "Such a declaration incorporated in the international obligations of each country would create a situation of great dignity placing them on a footing of perfect moral equality with the United States. "Its practical application would be, if Uruguay, for example, were attacked by some European country, then the United States and the rest of the American countries would intervene in Uruguay's defense and if the country were the United States, then Uruguay with the other American countries would take unjust action against the unjust aggressor. "In this manner, the Monroe Doctrine, proclaimed as a standard of the foreign policy of the United States, would become a defensive alliance between all the American countries," he said. "New Idea, Solution Pointing out that the Monroe Doctrine was not intended to apply to inter-American conflicts, President Brum said that the solution of such problems should be looked for in the new idea, that of American solidarity. BISHOP CRAIK MORRIS PAYS OFFICIAL VISIT TO ST. PETER'S CHURCH

Accompanied by the Rev. Maurice Hyde and the Ven. Archdeacon F. R. Carson, the Right Rev. James Craik Morris, D.D., paid his first official visit to St. Peter's Church on Boca last Sunday evening.

In spite of the fact that the majority of the members are residing in Panama and its suburbs, owing to the recent exoduses, the church edifice was almost filled with worshippers. The service was conducted by the rector, Rev. J. F. Mulcaire, assisted by the vicar, Rev. J. W. Will, pastor of the church, made a few opening remarks and stated that Rev. A. G. Kirkham was indisposed in consequence of which he could not be present, much to the disappointment of all present.

The collection was next taken up after which the rector, who was introduced. He opened his address by stating how very pleased he was to find himself before such a gathering and congratulated Pastor Will on his fine church, congregation and choir. He also stated that he has visited the church about eleven years ago when he met Dr. W. S. Comparing the Isthmus of Panama to the Isthmus of Corinth, so well known in sacred history, the speaker called attention to the opportunities of the church in these parts. Before going further however, he made it clear that the church does not mean any particular building or company, or sort of worshippers, but any company of believers, regardless of their denomination they belonged to, comprised the church.

CAN TANK OIL HERE EASIER THAN COLOMBIA

Oil Company Official Tells How Nearness to Coast Is Great Factor Of Isthmian Oil Fields

CRISTOBAL, April 22.—G. W. Moore, vice-president of the Sinclair Panama Oil corporation and who is responsible for the quality of the oil that flows into this country, said today that it is easier to get oil from the fields in Bogas than from the fields in Colombia.

Colombia's Oil Possibilities

Colombia, undoubtedly has the most oil in the world today," said Mr. Moore, "and there seems an unlimited quantity of it but the government does not seem willing to help in the manner that it might and there, of course, is the great difficulty."

"It is not easier to bring oil from the fields in Bogas to the tanks than from the interior of Colombia," he was asked.

Panama's Big Point

Mr. Moore answered without a moment's hesitation and said that the main thing point for Panama, with oil within 100 or 150 miles from the coast, the question of cost of pipe lines which was always a most serious matter had been reduced to a minimum.

"It might cost as much as one hundred million dollars to bring pipe lines from the interior of Colombia to the coast," he added.

Enlightened Government

Mr. Moore is no stranger to Panama. He arrived on the Hornsby with Arline Roosevelt and before signing for Bogas paid a tribute to President Llorente, whom he described as one of the most progressive men in Latin America today.

"Panama has indeed a great future," he concluded, "and that future is in safe hands when men like Llorente and Porras are at the helm."

No turn in the game can be more upsetting or develop more annoyance. But Heron might have had the ball dead to the cup, so far as you could tell from his expression.

Certainly, in the way of temperament he compares favorably with O'Connell, Travers and Travis, the three leading exponents of wonderful temperaments in American golf.

This is especially noteworthy on the greens, where he goes a few feet with a combination of cool and coolness. He doesn't waste a lot of time fussing with the stroke, but on the other hand he is never hurried. Should Hate Traffic
"You should hate the traffic because of its impurities, its hypocrisy, and its false pretenses, its commercialism, its greed, its avarice, its selfish love of gain at the cost of human misery, for its domination in politics, for its domination of the most corrupt influences in order to secure votes."

"You should hate it because it utterly disregards all law of God and man, and tramples under foot not only the state constitution, but attempts to trample under foot the constitution of the United States, the greatest compact of laws that man has ever enacted."

"You should hate it because it is a burden to the laborer's back. "You should hate it because it produces paid hands to the honest toilers of our land. A sub-chaser and a tug were sent out from Balboa at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday night but the leaking barge had already been beached when they arrived there. The goods on the barge were assigned to Mr. Kieruff's land, La Venta, in Anton.
