FIVE CENTS GOLD

SESSIONS IN BRUSSELS OF LEAGUE ENDS

Council Refers Question of Danzig to League Assembly to Meet in Geneva and Will Settle Lithuanian-Polish Dispute by Plebiscite.

Balfour Predicts That Four Great Powers Now Out of League Will Enter Shortly as Without Them League's Future is Not Clear.

(By The Associated Press) BRUSSELS, Oct. 20. The Council of the League of Nations closed its sessions in Brussels this morning after referring the question of the region of Danzig to the Assembly at Geneva. The Council decided on a plebiscite to dispose of the territory disputes by Poland and Lithuania, thus including the line fixed by the Supreme Council of December of 1919.

The British representative, the Hon. Balfour, while making his closing address said that the four great powers who are not members of the League now, will enter shortly. "Without these great powers, he added, it is impossible to predict what the League may accomplish." The main body of the secretariat, numbering over 200, left by a special train for Geneva to take possession of the League's new home.

Submits 16 Agreements.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Oct. 20. Great Britain has submitted to the League of Nations for registration sixteen international agreements entered into since the covenant was made effective on January 22, according to advice received from the League Council's headquarters.

These agreements include engagements entered into by the British Empire as a whole and specific engagements of India, South Africa and Canada. They cover widely different subjects like the Anglo-French oil agreements signed at San Remo, the agreement on commercial relations with Ethiopia, the agreement with the Soviet of Russia for the exchange of war prisoners and various accessions and denunciations regarding the treaties existing prior to January 10.

The registration of these agreements is made in compliance with the Article 18 of the covenant which provides that no treaty or international engagements shall be binding until it is registered.

Subject of Debate.

(By The Associated Press) BRUSSELS, Oct. 20.—The Italian representative Tettini's motion regarding monopolies was the subject of an interesting clarifying debate in the League of Nations' council's session yesterday afternoon, according to a statement made by the Belgian representative Huygens, who declared that the motion recognized as necessary but that it would be more fully discussed later.

DESPERATE RAID BY D'ANNUNZIO CAUSES TRIESTE OCCUPATION.

(By The Associated Press) ROME, Oct. 20.—Italian troops occupied Trieste on Sunday owing to the report of the imminent landing of D'Annunzio there, but the latter telegraphed denying that he had the intention of occupying the city, according to the newspaper *Il Corriere d'Italia* and *La Idea Nazionale*.

It is reported that General Cavallini assembled the officials at Trieste and appealed to their patriotism, recommending unity and discipline for the defense of the country and asking all to abstain from any attempt to carry out a raid.

SOVIET RUSSIA RATIFIES PEACE WITH POLAND WHO AGREES NOT TO GIVE HELP TO GENERAL WRANGEL

Tchitcherin Declares That This Agreement Was a Compromise Gained Through Territorial Concessions Made to Poland.

(By The Associated Press)

LONDON, Oct. 20. The Russian Soviet ratified the preliminary peace treaty with Poland after Commissioner Tchitcherin explained that Poland had agreed not to assist General Wrangel, to cause a rebellion in Soviet Russia, says a wireless dispatch from Moscow. Tchitcherin declared that this agreement was a compromise gained through territorial concessions made to Poland.

New Revolt Reported.

BUCHAREST, Oct. 20.—A new revolution is reported to have broken out Friday in the regions of Odessa, Kherson and Podolia. In the vicinity of Belta the revolutionists headed by Ukrainian Nationalists are proceeding to Voznesensk to join the forces revolting in that district. The insurgents have taken charge of the telegraph and railroads between Odessa and Kiev.

Lithuanian Government Resigns.

LONDON, Oct. 20. The central news agency receives a dispatch from Riga announcing that the Lithuanian government has resigned and that a dictatorship under Chlapeckis, who is pro-Bolshevik, is contemplated.

Poles Attack Lithuanians.

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 20. A dispatch from Kovno says that the Polish troops assailed the Lithuanian position on the railroad near Drusy and that after five hours of heavy fighting the Lithuanians were forced to retreat three kilometers.

Withstands Reds Drive.

PARIS, Oct. 20. The Foreign Office hears that General Wrangel has succeeded in withstanding the Bolshevik drive. It is reported that his position is now apparently secure and that he will be able to hold Crimea and part of Taurida during the winter.

Exterminates Alexandrovsk.

SEBASTOPOL, Oct. 20.—General Wrangel has evacuated Alexandrovsk.

ACCLAIMS SOVEREIGN WILL OF PEOPLE OF SOUTH AFRICA.

CAPETOWN, October 20.—The Free State Nationalist Congress to day adopted supplementary resolutions to the declaration of the party's principles acclaimed the sovereign will of the people of South Africa, their right of self-determination, their right to secede from Great Britain or to break any existing bond between the Union and Great Britain, and expressing opposition to a closer imperial union and advising that no decisive step regarding the secession should be taken unless a majority of the people so declare it through a referendum.

ITALIAN CABINET FAVOR DEFINITIVE NEGOTIATIONS WITH JUDEO-MUSLIM.

(By The Associated Press) ROME, Oct. 20.—An important meeting of the Council of Ministers was held on Monday evening under the presidency of Guido De Mattei, which it was decided to assume the Adriatic negotiations with the Jugoslavs to bring them to a conclusion one way or the other before the re-opening of the Parliament on November 10.

It was announced that the negotiations would be held at Isola delle Femmine and that they would have a two-fold aim, to let fall and to end amicably.

ASIA-AMERICA ORDERED TO EVALUATE 10,000,000.

(By The Associated Press) BELGRADE, Oct. 20.—The government has announced that the Asia-American troops have been ordered to evaluate the plumb line between the British and American oil fleet in the zone of Kielgut in connection with the request of the Council of Ambassadors.

REPORT OF REGRADING COMMITTEE

Favors Fixing Twenty Dollars Increase Between Each Grade Instead of Ten Dollars as Heretofore To Make Clearer Definition in Grades.

Committee Basés Findings on Report of Congressional Joint Commission on Reclassification of Salaries in States.

The following is the report rendered to Governor Harding by the Committee on Clerks composed of A. McElwane, R. K. Morris and H. A. Smith, regarding the reclassification of Panama Canal employees.

Memorandum for Governor. In accordance with your approval of recommendation of the Executive Secretary, in his memo, radiogram to you of July 29, that the Committee on Clerks be authorized to reclassify office and clerical positions from **\$1000** down, the Committee has the honor to submit the following report:

"The Committee has held numerous meetings and as a basis for the work of the Committee, called for a general survey of the clerical and related positions in the Canal and Panama Railroad organization. A request was received from the President of the Central Employers' Union that representatives of the various classes of clerks be heard by the Board in order to present arguments regarding classification for their various kinds of work. This request was granted and the request was made that such employees appear before the Board as the Board would be glad to have assistance and help from the clerks if they had any knowledge which would be of assistance to us. However, with the exception of a committee of commissioners assistants who appeared before the Board, no help, assistance or suggestion has come from the Federal Employers' Union.

Board on U. S. Scale.

FOREIGN AND DOMESTIC POLITICS OF JAPAN ARE CRITICIZED BY OPPONENTS.

(By The Associated Press) KUMAMOTO, October 20.—The convention of 3,000 members of the Kenpo Kai or opposition party adopted a resolution to the effect that the domestic and foreign policies of the Japanese government are the chief anxiety of the Japanese people as the result of the negotiations regarding the California problem, however, the Cabinet is conducting the negotiations in an unsatisfactory manner.

The resolution also demands a general reform of the foreign policy, the stabilization of economic conditions by the adjustment of the financial administration and the immediate inauguration of universal suffrage.

NEWTON CHARGED FOR EXPENSES OF REPARATIONS COMMISSION TO NATION.

(By The Associated Press) VIENNA, Oct. 20.—The newspaper *Aero Abroad* complains that each representative of the allied powers in Vienna and a section of the reparations commission are receiving a salary of \$1,000,000 annually, all of it costing the country half a million dollars a year. The individual offices typists in the judicial section are drawing a pay equal to that of five departmental chiefs of the Foreign office. The paper says that a bankrupt country cannot afford these expenses.

CORONER'S VERDICT IN MAYOR MCGOWEN'S INQUEST CLAIMS DEATH DUE TO HEART FAILURE

W. D. EASTMAN GOES TO NEW YORK ON VACATION

Mrs. McSweeney, Attends Inquest and Resists Coroner's Attempts to Have Her Speak About Lord Mayor's Connection With Republican Army.

COAL MINERS TO VOTE ON SETTLEMENT.

London Reports Coal Strike Settled Yesterday But Adds That It Is Contingent on Result of the Miners' Ballot.

At Last Moment Wednesday Evening, Miners Presented New Demands Which May Be Threatened to Break Conference.

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Oct. 20. The verdict of the coroner's jury in the MacSweeney inquest was that the deceased died of heart failure due to a delayed heart and acute induration following an attack of septic which was caused by exhaustion from his prolonged refusal to take food.

This verdict was delivered after twelve minutes deliberation by the jury. Mrs. MacSweeney, the Lord Mayor's wife, was dressed in black and she was the only witness present on behalf of the MacSweeney family. She maintained her composure throughout and successfully resisted the coroner's attempts to get her to characterize MacSweeney's occupation as other than a volunteer officer of the Republican army.

35 Persons Arrested.

The inquest was attended by thirty-five persons aside of the coroner's jury including Mrs. MacSweeney the deceased's brother and sisters, the chaplain, Irish representatives and representatives of the British government.

During the MacSweeney inquest, it was revealed that five days prior to the Lord Mayor's death, the Home Office doctor read a statement to his regard as follows: "The Secretary of State solemnly warns you that you will not be released and that you alone will be responsible for any consequences which may ensue on your persistence in refusing food." To this MacSweeney replied that he had been told the same thing previously.

Will Visit Mother.

Although the display of armed force was even greater than at the funeral of Fitzgerald, the appearance of the military forces did not create any special tension as it did on that occasion.

Barcelona Students Protest.

BARCELONA, Oct. 20.—The students of the Barcelona University stoned the British consulate here to protest against the death of Lord Mayor MacSweeney. It is believed that the students are Catalans who followed the body of the hunger striker Murphy to the cemetery yesterday afternoon. Although the display of armed force was even greater than at the funeral of Fitzgerald, the appearance of the military forces did not create any special tension as it did on that occasion.

Not Against Unions.

Premier Lloyd George, replying to the criticism, defended the measure, saying that it was not intended as an attack against the trade unions, but was absolutely necessary in face of the threats of the subversives and the Triple Alliance, headed as a general assembly, to the legislation which is always done.

It is reported that while the Spanish troops were fortifying the advanced position a strong force of Moors attacked the working parties who dropped their tools, took up their arms and defended themselves gallantly, succeeding in driving off the Moors who left a large number of dead behind. The casualties among the defenders were eleven killed and 40 wounded.

GRANADA, Spain, Oct. 20.—An earthquake shock lasting ten minutes was felt at 6 o'clock Friday evening over the whole province of Granada. Damage were done to some small villages but the number of casualties are not yet known. In some places the entire population left their homes.

THE SCRAPPING OF THE COVENANT

Every day's discussion of the league of nations issue makes more clear the necessity of scrapping the covenant shaped at Paris preliminary to constructive cooperation among the nations for the common welfare of humanity. Those nations that have joined the league may scrap it or amend it as they please. The United States, not having committed itself, can adopt the direct method of ignoring the covenant.

The repeated assertion that a league of nations is a necessity of world peace becomes a little tiresome in view of the lack of any logic or fact to support the assertion. Why is a league necessary or desirable?

The theory adopted by the Paris negotiators was that the nations would not stand together for honor, freedom, and self-government unless they were bound in writing. Although the strongest nation in the world had just participated deservingly in the task for maintenance of the government without any treaty obligation, the idea that a league must be formed became an obsession in influential minds. So earnestly and incessantly was this idea thrust into the peace negotiations that the world, like an innocent bystander, accepted the fragmentary reports from the conference as evidence that mankind could never recover unless a league were formed.

Propaganda and suppression did double work in preparing the public mind for acceptance of the covenant as the one and only remedy for the world's ills. In countries where public opinion is rudimentary the league covenant was adopted as a matter of course. In the country where public opinion is all powerful, the league covenant has lost prestige with every day's examination.

There are several reasons from the American viewpoint why a league of nations is undesirable as a means of promoting world peace. The first of these reasons is, of course, that a league cannot operate with authority without deriving its authority from national sovereignties which to that extent are enfeoffed or destroyed. Power must come from some source, and the only source in this case is national sovereignty. The national sovereignty of the United States rests in the people. They have delegated authority to a government by an instrument in writing. Until and unless they amend or repeal that instrument the government which they have created cannot give away any of its powers. Hence any treaty which attempts to transfer power from the United States government to a league of nations, in a manner contrary to or incompatible with the Constitution, is void. The Versailles treaty, qualified as it stands, would undoubtedly be set aside by the United States Supreme Court when ever the inevitable conflict should arise.

But there are other reasons why a league is not desirable. It is the reason that the world is always in a state of flux and cannot be petrified by treaties. Whatever the nations may agree upon today may be upset tomorrow by new conditions or new nations. The peoples of the generation cannot wholly bind their posterity, for as hard as they may. The dead hand will not stay forever in the struggle for Xanadu. This generation will not consent to be bound by the past, and the next generation will be equally independent. The present generation has taken leave to amend the Constitution. The next generation may, if it pleases, abolish the Constitution and set up a soviet or a league of nations.

Still another reason why a league

bound by writing is undesirable is the fact that the nations cannot cooperate as freely and effectively for liberty and peace as they could if they were not bound in writing. Already the terms of the Paris covenant have proved to be hindrances and not aids to the speedy concord of free nations. The misunderstanding regarding Article X is sufficient to set all nations by the ears.

Another reason, auxiliary to the foregoing, is that some important nations cannot be bound by writing. Germany's written word is worthless, and humanity has been put on notice that it loses many at its peril. A world league with important nations left out is not a world league, and with certain nations included it becomes a seedbed of treason, stratagems and spoils.

The question then arises, what is the alternative? If a league is not done over how can the nations get together?

If we're left to us to answer, we should say that nations can best get together by mutual voluntary sympathy, i.e., the free exercise of their complete sovereignty. They cannot be brought together by intrigue or by contract if they are not truly sympathetic. The U.S. and the lamb among nations will not cooperate for world peace merely because of an instrument in writing. But the steward of governing nations will quickly get together when their existence is threatened. They can confer now at any time with a view to mutual cooperation against instant dangers. The less they are bound by such outstanding covenants as the Paris covenant the easier they can confer and the sooner they can agree upon practical methods suited to each particular occasion. They can exclude enemies and traitors from their conference something which the league of nations cannot do.

So long as the instinct of liberty animates free nations there will be a tendency to cooperate against common danger. The red blood of free men, not pieces of writing, will keep the world safe. Wasn't that the wisdom of the nation?

WORLD'S NORTHERN HEMISPHERE'S CROP GREATER THIS YEAR

(By The Associated Press)

TOKIO, Oct. 28.—A bulletin of the International Institute of Agriculture announces that the aggregate wheat and rice crops of the northern hemisphere amounts to 62,000,000 metric tons compared 61,000,000 which was last year's total. The production of barley was eight per cent larger than in 1919 and the production of oats was 21 per cent larger. The maize production of South Europe was good. In America was up ten per cent over the 1919 production. The probable yield of meat was favorable.

BALBOANS ARE TO VOTE ON TWO DIFFERENT ISSUES

Americans Citizens of Legal Age Will Cast Their Vote for President of U. S. November 3rd in Age Limit for Mock Elections Voters

Six weeks ago there was started on the Canal Zone an election campaign. The idea was to arouse the interest of the many Americans who have been separated from their homes in the United States and have them take more than the ordinary interest in the political situation in the home country. In order to carry out the idea it was considered that massmeeting as no provision has ever been made to allow people to vote on the Canal Zone, that there should be a "mock election" and that the campaign on the national issues should be separate from the local issues. This has been done especially in Balboa.

Separate Issues

In addition to the Republican and Democratic parties it was deemed advisable to start some new parties so the Bachelor, Independent, and People's parties were formed. The ballot for the presidential nominees will be printed on a special form which has been provided and will be given to every American citizen twenty-one years of age and over who has registered his name with the Bureau at the Balboa club-house. The color will be pink. The local ballot will be white and will carry the names of the candidates nominated by the different factions. Any American citizen, resident of the Balboa district, which includes La Boca, East Balboa, Balboa and Balboa Heights, who is seventeen years of age or over will be entitled upon making application to the Bureau at the club-house and will be permitted to cast his ballot on election day, November 2nd.

Una Doctrina Monroe para el mundo

Sigue agitándose más y más, en el debate electoral en los Estados Unidos, la cuestión relacionada con el artículo 10 del pacto de la Liga de Naciones, que ha constituido, como suele decirse, el caliz de batalla de la contienda.

Ayer nos permitimos hacer un ligero comentario acerca de una declaración que el Presidente del Consejo de la Liga de Naciones, Monsieur Paul Bourgeois, hizo respecto a la importancia que se le habia dado en los Estados Unidos al mencionado artículo 10, diciendo que lo sorprendió ver que al rededor de ese artículo se girase toda la campaña electoral de aquél país, pues los hombres de Estado europeos no lo consideran esencial ni de vital importancia, creyendo que podría eliminarse del pacto sin afectar en modo la efectividad de la Liga de Naciones, pues era sólo su fundamento moral.

A ese propósito el Secretario de Estado Mr. Colby, ha hecho igualmente declaraciones de importancia, que el cable nos la daba a conocer como las de Bourgeois. Ni go a este Colby el derecho a hablar en nombre de los simpatizantes del pacto, ni a reducir o aumentar la significación de sus compromisos.

Estas declaraciones de Colby son en cierto modo sorprendentes y extrañas. Yo diré que Bourgeois es sólo su opinión personal, y parece haber tenido toda la intención de desbaratar, como lo hiciera con una peseta de jabón, todo el argumento de los republicanos en contra del pacto de la Liga. El mismo Presidente del Consejo de la Liga dio reconocer que sus declaraciones tendrían probablemente un efecto importante en las elecciones presidenciales en los Estados Unidos. Y el señor Colby, demócrata y uno de los más altos funcionarios del gobierno simpatizante del pacto en nombre de los Estados Unidos, miembro del partido y del gobierno que han sido cerebro y brazo de esa nueva doctrina de política universal, rechaza aquellas declaraciones, que tienen toda la apariencia de favorecer su causa, y niega toda autoridad a quien las hace.

La incomprensible "Misterio de la política alta", que no están a nuestro alcance.

Claro esto que al decir Bourgeois que el artículo 10 del pacto no era otra cosa que su fundamento moral, dejaba indudable todo el alcance que dicho artículo puede tener, y al asegurar que podría eliminarse sin afectar por eso la efectividad del pacto porque los hombres de Estado de Europa no lo consideran esencial, en una contradicción, intencional, con el solo objeto de desvirtuar el argumento de los republicanos y allanar así el camino hacia la ratificación del tratado de Versalles y del pacto adicional de la Liga de Naciones por los Estados Unidos.

En cambio el Señor Hitchcock pronunció en San Luis de Missouri un discurso en el cual declaró que la convención de la Liga, y sobre todo el artículo 10, constituye una especie de Doctrina Monroe para el mundo entero, tanto más efectiva cuanto que esta respaldada por 36 naciones. Y que si amella, o poyada solamente por los Estados Unidos, ha bastado para impedir en 36 años los avances de las ambiciones imperialistas sobre la América Española y para proteger ésta de un modo efectivo, debe existir esa razón que el artículo 10 del pacto de la Liga obre del mismo modo en todo el mundo.

Este mismo pensamiento, claramente expresado, parece traslucir en las palabras de Paul Bourgeois. Por eso causan verdadera extraña las declaraciones, tan drásticas y repudiadas del Secretario Colby.

Seguramente que Bourgeois dará una réplica a esta especie de filigrana del hombre de los relaciones exteriores de los Estados Unidos. Cuando se nos acomete, podemos apreciar hasta donde han sido acrediadas o creídas nuestras juntas.
