ALLIES DEMANDS TOO SEVERE, SAYS VON SIMONS

WAGES OF BUTCHERS ON C. Z. INCREASED

TARIFF BILL DOOMED, IS BELIEF

Both Republican and Democratic Senators Have Conceded Defeat of the Closure Petition For Vote at 1:30 p.m. To-day on Bill.

Borah and McCumber Both Announced That They Would Continue to Hold Measure Before Senate and Try For Another Vote.

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. Both the Republican and Democratic senators conceded last night the defeat of the closure petition on the emergency tariff bill, which will be voted upon at 1:30 o'clock Wednesday.

The closure vote requires a two-thirds majority, while the petition which its opponents say represents a large part of the Republican strength in this particular measure, only contained thirty-four names. Wednesday will be the first time the closure plan is invoked since the Senate controversy over the Versailles treaty.

Bill's Defenders Stubborn

While the leaders failed to state what would become of the Fordney bill in the event of its defeat on Wednesday, both Senators Borah and McCumber announced that they would hold it before the Senate and make every possible effort to secure another vote before the present session ends. The leaders said that instead of side-tracking the bill as planned, it will probably be laid aside temporarily when taken up today, but private predictions generally admitted that there is little prospect of the enactment of the measure.

The duties on wool, which the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee was considering today for the purpose of framing a permanent tariff agreement, caused a lively tilt in the Senate when Senator Borah said that it is a "money" how any tariff could and wool growers when two years supply is now on hand, whereupon Senator Snoot contended that the passage of the bill would raise the price of raw wool. Senator Underwood said that the sugar tariff would cost consumers \$10,000,000 annually if passed, and that it would raise the price of sugar to twelve or thirteen cents per pound. He asserted that the proposed new duties were prohibitive and that it would make the tariff burden for the relief of special interests, adding that for the first time Republican leadership faced the country with a direct proposal to erect a tariff wall not for revenue but to establish an embargo in time of peace.

Bill Severely Attacked

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. The emergency tariff bill today remained for the first time almost exclusively before the Senate and it received many hard knocks from all its opponents who took every opportunity to attack it. Senator McCumber was its only consistent defender. All elements are awaiting Wednesday's action to determine whether the bill will be side-tracked or its consideration continued under the rule of limited debate.

The prospects caused a feeling of uneasiness to pour in after Vice-President Marshall ruled that all amendments must be submitted and voted before tomorrow's vote. Every senator is expected to make a statement that they have no amendments to offer before the debate.

THE SOVIET GOVERNMENT IS EXPECTED TO RATIFY KRASSIN AGREEMENT

2,261 TOURISTS DUE IN NEXT 3 MONTHS

S. S. Megantic of White Star Line Due To-day With Three Hundred Sightseers Aboard From Cruise Among W. I. Islands.

According to reliable statistics, the total number of tourists who will visit the Isthmus during the months of February, March and the early part of April is estimated at approximately 2,261.

The first tourist boat to reach the Isthmus this month will be the White Star Line's Megantic which is scheduled to arrive in Canal Zone from the States with three hundred tourists aboard to-day. The Megantic is on a winter cruise to the West Indies.

The Toloa, chartered by the American Express Company is expected from New York with one hundred tourists en route to South America. The Toloa will sail the same day and return again Sunday en route to the West Indies.

The Calanques is due with 90 tourists en route to the West Indies, February 11. She is chartered by Thomas Cook and Son. After the Calanques the next tourist boat to arrive will be the Hawkeye State, chartered by the American Express Company and bringing one hundred tourists to the West Indies.

The Tulu, chartered by the Raymond Whitecomb Company is bringing 125 tourists on February 25, and the Metapan, chartered by the American Express Company will arrive February 27 with 85 tourists. They are all en route to the West Indies.

Touring West Indies

On March 1 the Toloa will again come here with four hundred tourists and the White Star Line's Megantic will arrive the same day with four hundred tourists. The Megantic going to the West Indies again and the Toloa going there also so this trip instead of South America.

Two more tourist boats are scheduled to arrive here in March. The Pastores with 125 passengers and the Tulu with 100. Both will be going to the West Indies. For these trips the Pastores will be under charter by the Raymond Whitecomb Company, while the Tulu will be chartered by Thomas Cook and Son.

On April 1 the Megantic will bring four hundred tourists and the Calanques, chartered by Raymond Whitecomb Company, 123 all going to the West Indies.

The number of tourists visiting the Isthmus during the months of February and March and the earlier part of April will amount to approximately 2,261.

RAISE TO BE RETROACTIVE TO AUG. 1920

Manager Jackson's Recommendation For Advance After Six Months' Satisfactory Service Won't Affect New Adjustment.

Members of Building Trade Crafts and Electricians Also Get Raise Effective Immediately and Retroactive Also To August, 1920.

(By The Associated Press)

A meeting of the Panama Canal Wage Board was held yesterday with the following result:

The retail butchers' rates recommended for an increase in wages from \$1.07 to \$1.08 (25) and \$1.08 to \$1.09 with the exception that the rate for the man in charge of the retail cold storage will be \$1.10 per week.

The recommendation of Mr. J. J. Jackson, manager of the canal messary division, "That all retail butchers be advanced to the top rate after six months' satisfactory service" was referred to Chief Quartermaster R. K. Morris for comment as it could not have any effect on the adjustment mentioned above.

Recommended For Raise

The wholesale butchers were recommended for increases as follows: Foreman beef kill from \$21.48 to \$24.00; Foreman beef Offal from \$18.50 to \$20.00; Foreman sausage-maker from \$22.00 to \$23.19; Foreman beef cooler from \$20.00 to \$22.50; Foreman cutting and curing from \$19.00 to \$20.21.

The following rates have been approved by Governor Harding, upon the recommendation of the Board for the building trades with the agreement to make them effective immediately and retroactive to August 1, 1920. All men regardless of what work they were on under construction by the building division will receive this back pay: Carpenters \$1.33 per hour; Bricklayers \$1.40; Plasterers \$1.40; Plumbers \$1.42; Painters \$1.24; Metal Lathers \$1.41.

Electricians Get Raise

The new rates for electricians which will also be paid is \$1.25 per hour, but is not effective as far back as other building trades rates as their base is different.

The cases of foundry foreman Le Roy Smith, W. C. Huck and Mr. Stube were referred to their respective superintendents for comment.

The case of chief clerk of the Ancon hospital, A. H. Khachadorian, steam shovel and draymen, watchmen, mechanical division, chauffeurs and dispensary assistants are still under consideration. The board disagreed on the case of quarantine inspector and will submit separate recommendations to Governor Harding.

The case of general operators on the locks is tabled awaiting further data from the employees involved. The cases affected by the 72 cent per diam increase granted to navy yard employees, that are listed alphabetically under case No. 15, are being held up pending comment from Mr. Kinney, superintendent of

WORLD'S PEACE DEPENDS ON LEAGUE

Opinion Voiced by Dr. Harmonio Arias, Panama's Delegate to First League Assembly Just Closed in Geneva.

Distrust Disappears After Delegates Realize That They Were Representatives of Nations in World's Parliament.

(By The Associated Press)

Dismissing the League of Nations, which he represented at the League of Nations together with Mr. Arias (Panama), Dr. Harmonio Arias yesterday made the following statement:

The meeting of the first conference of the League of Nations Assembly may be considered an event of profound significance. Up to a short time ago many thought that the League was simply a Wilsonian dream, but now, even the most skeptical are beginning to be convinced that the League is a living organization which will depend on the peace of the world.

Most Critical Time

The first session of the League Assembly had necessarily to be the most critical moment of the existence of the League, inasmuch as it was the fruit of the great war and it was feared that it would not only be a failure, but a state of affairs together with the pretensions, ambitions and fears of some of the powers, would overshadow every idea that tended to establish a new basis for international cooperation.

For these reasons, among others, was thought at first that the Assembly would be nothing less than a group of diplomats surrounding in vain a phantasm, subtleties, high falutin phrases and voting robbery, and reliance being to favor in the true intention of the parties in the League, without reaching any practical results.

Distrust Disipated

Fortunately, the distrust which prevails in such cases was quickly dissipated and the majority of the delegates after a few sessions became convinced that they were not diplomats of the old school but the representatives of nations in a Parliament, that in the agreements to be reached in that Parliament depended to a great extent the peace of the world, and that the existence of the League must be justified by their acts. It would undoubtedly perish if it were placed in international banquets which heretofore has bequeathed us such deplorable results. As a result of this the Assembly acquires an atmosphere of dignity and different decorations with rare exceptions gradually threw aside their purely national tendencies to follow the trend of international aspirations.

It may be asserted, speaking in general terms, that the delegates from the forty states represented in the League Assembly, were all ways animated with the best intention to maintain at all costs a spirit of attention and concern in the decisions of the Assembly which would permit in the near future, the amputation of that term may be employed of certain national aspirations which would threaten the peace of the world or at least affect the fate of other nations.

GERMANY CAN ONLY ACCEPT WHAT IS POSSIBLE BUT NOT THE IMPOSSIBLE, HE SAYS

He Tells Reichstag That Germany Will Attend London Conference and Promises Success if Negotiations Deal With Possibilities. German Press Unanimously Declares That Terms Will Mean Commercial Death of Germany Who is Powerless to Oppose Victory of Madness.

BERLIN, Feb. 1. Foreign Minister von Simons told the Reichstag this afternoon, according to the Boersen Zeitung, that Germany cannot subscribe to the allied demands on the ground that they are incapable of fulfillment.

The Boersen Zeitung says that von Simons explained to the Reichstag how the possibility of reaching a settlement presents itself to the German government, and will declare that the invitation to attend the London conference can only serve a useful purpose, and he will promise success if the negotiations deal with anything possible and not with the impossible.

Terms Are Absurd

BERLIN, Feb. 1. Herbert Grimm, member of the Reichstag, today commented on the separation terms laid down by the allies, and said: "The reparations figures are absurd, the tax on exports is a solitary world wide Germany's export business of her goods. It is monstrous that the United States and England will permit that Germany, their best customer, be ruined by the enforcement of such terms."

The Allies, says the Zeitung, think that the allied terms enslave the Germans forever, darken the European situation, engender new hatreds and opens the way toward a world revolution. Press Condemns Terms

BERLIN, Feb. 1. The news papers unanimously voice the opinion that the reparations conditions laid down by the Paris Supreme Council sound the commercial death knell to central Europe, including France, Italy and Belgium. The press, however, does not intend to advise the cabinet regarding the course it should follow in this crisis for reaching a conclusion, saying that Germany is powerless to oppose this victory of madness. Some conservative organs, discussing the probable effects of the enforcement of the allied conditions, suggested that they would leave Germany as a pariah in the hands of the extremists. 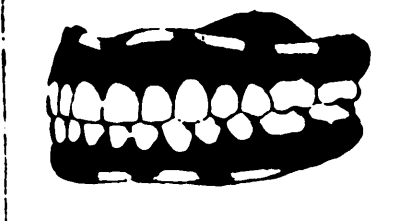

No More Passports For Costa Rica Now

Consul Villafranca Notifies Panama Canal That San Jose Government Will Waive This Expense For Canal Employees.

COLON, Feb. 1. Consul Ricardo Villafranca said today that his government at San Jose had advised him that they would be pleased to waive the necessity of passports for Isthmian Canal employees who were employed by the Panama Canal of the Panama Railroad.

This will mean a saving of 90 per cent for the American passport costs \$10 and it also saves a great deal of trouble in having it vised by the United States Consul.

In lieu of these passports the vacationist will need a statement from Balboa Heights that he is an American citizen and employee, together with a certificate of vaccination from the quarantine officer at either Cristobal or Colon and those papers must be presented to Mr. Villafranca at his office on Market Street, Colon who will charge \$5 for issuing a paper and vising the vaccination certificate.

A similar ruling will employ to adult members of families of the employees.

WORK SCARCE IN DETROIT
