ALLIES DEMANDS TOO SEVERE, SAYS VON SIMONS

WAGES OF BUTCHERS ON C. Z. INCREASED

TARIFF BILL DOOMED, IS BELIEF

Both Republican and Democratic Senators Have Conceded Defeat of the Closure Petition For Vote at 1:30 p.m. To-day on Bill.

Borah and McCumber Both Announced That They Would Continue to Hold Measure Before Senate and Try For Another Vote.

(By the Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. Both the Republican and Democratic senators conceded last night the defeat of the closure petition on the emergency tariff bill, which will be voted upon at 1:30 o'clock Wednesday.

The closure vote requires a two-thirds majority, while the petition which its opponents say represents a large part of the Republican strength in this particular measure, only contained thirty-four names. Wednesday will be the first time the closure plan is invoked since the Senate controversy over the Versailles treaty.

Bill's Defenders Stubborn

While the leaders failed to state what would become of the pending bill in the event of its defeat on Wednesday, both Senators Borah and McCumber announced that they would hold it before the Senate and make every possible effort to secure another vote before the present session ends. The leaders said that instead of side-tracking the bill as planned, it will probably be laid aside "temporarily" when taken up today, but private predictions generally admitted that there is little prospect of the enactment of the measure.

The duties on wool, which the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee was considering today for the purpose of framing a permanent tariff agreement, caused a lively tilt in the Senate when Senator Borah said that it is a "mystery" how any tariff could and wool growers when two years supply is now on hand, whereupon Senator Smoot contended that the passage of the bill would raise the price of raw wool. Senator Underwood said that the sugar tariff would cost consumers \$100,000,000 annually if passed, and that it would raise the price of sugar to twelve or thirteen cents per pound. He asserted that the proposed new duties were "prohibitive" and that it would make the touring masses carry a great financial burden for the relief of special interests, adding that for the first time Republican leadership faced the country with a direct proposal to build a tariff wall not for revenue but to establish an embargo in time of peace.

BILL Severely Attacked

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. The emergency tariff bill today remained for the last time almost exclusively before the Senate, and it received many hard knocks from all its opponents who took every opportunity to attack it. Senator McCumber was its only consistent defender. All elements are awaiting Wednesday's action to determine whether the bill will be side-tracked or its consideration continued under the rule of limited debate.

The prospects caused a certain amount to pour in after Vice-President Marshall ruled that all amendments must be submitted and voted on before tomorrow's vote. Every Senator had changes to offer, but they have been held over until the next time from the debate.

THE SOVIET GOVERNMENT IS EXPECTED TO RATIFY KRASSIN AGREEMENT

LONDON, Feb. 1. The Central News Agency learns that the Soviet government is expected to ratify the Krassin agreement without changes. It is satisfied with the result of Krassin's work, and will appoint him representative in London.

The same dispatch adds that Lenin suffered a cold recently, but otherwise he is quite well.

RAISE TO BE RETROACTIVE TO AUG. 1920

Manager Jackson's Recommendation For Advance After Six Months' Satisfactory Service Won't Affect New Adjustment.

Members of Building Trade Crafts and Electricians Also Get Raise Effective Immediately and Retroactive Also To August, 1920.

A meeting of the Payroll and Wage Board was held yesterday with the following results:

The retail trades are recommended for an increase in wages from \$167 to \$180 (\$107.5) and \$200 respectively retroactive to Aug. 1, 1920, with the exception that the rate for the man in charge of the retail end storage will be con-

tinued.

The recommendation of Mr. J. J. Jackson, manager of the committee, is to recommend to the retail butchers to be adjusted to the top rate after six months' satisfactory service, was referred to other Quartermaster R. K. Moore for comment as it could not have any effect on the adjustment mentioned above.

Recommended For Raise
The wholesale butchers were recommended for increases as follows:

Foreman beef kill from \$20.48 to \$247.68.

Foreman beef offal, from \$20.60 to \$20.60.

Foreman sausage-maker, from \$22.60 to \$28.19.

Foreman beef cooler, from \$20.60 to \$22.56.

Foreman cutting and curing, from \$10.65 to \$20.71.

The following rates have been approved by Governor Harding, up on the recommendation of the Board for the building trades with the agreement to make them effective immediately and retroactive to August 1, 1920. All men regardless of what work they were on in dependence on the building division will receive this back pay:

Carpenters ... \$1.33 per hour

Bricklayers ... \$1.40

Plasterers ... \$1.48

Plumbers ... \$1.42

Painters ... \$1.25

Metal Workers ... \$1.44

There are no changes in the above rates for the building trades for the October 1 adjustment.

Electricians Get Raise

The new rates for electricians which will also be paid \$1.25 per hour, but is not effective as far back as other building trades rates as their base is different.

The cases of foundry foreman L. Roy Smith, W. G. Hock and Mr. Stabe were referred to their respective superintendents for comments.

The case of chief clerk of the Ancon hospital, A. H. Khachadurian, steam shovel and dredgermen, watchmen, mechanical division, chauffeurs and dispensary assistants are still under consideration.

The board disagreed on the case of quarantine inspector and will submit separate recommendation to Governor Harding.

The case of general operators on the docks is tabled awaiting further data from the employees involved.

The cases affected by the 72 cent per diem increase granted to navy yard employees, that are listed alphabetically under case No. 10 are being held up pending comment from Mr. Kimball, superintendent of the Assembly house.

2,261 TOURISTS DUE IN NEXT 3 MONTHS

S. S. Megantic of White Star Line Due Today With Three Hundred Sightseers Aboard From Cruise Among W. I. Islands.

According to reliable statistics the total number of tourists who will visit the Isthmus during the months of February, March and the early part of April is estimated at approximately 2,261.

The first tourist boat to reach the Isthmus this month will be the White Star liner Megantic which is scheduled to arrive in Balboa from the States with three hundred tourists aboard to-day. The Megantic is on a winter cruise to the West Indies.

Liner the Toba, chartered by the American Express Company, is expected from New York with one hundred tourists en route to South America. The Toba will sail the same day and return again Sunday en route to the West Indies.

Due February 11

The Galamare is due with 60 tourists en route to the West Indies February 11. She is chartered by Thomas Cook and Son. After the Galamare the next tourist boat to arrive will be the Hawkeye State, chartered by the American Express Company and bringing one hundred tourists to the West Indies.

Touring West Indies

On March 1 the Toba will again come here with four hundred tourists and the White Star liner Megantic will arrive the same day with four hundred tourists, the Megantic going to the West Indies again and the Toba going there also on this trip instead of South America.

Two more tourist boats are sched-

uled to arrive here in March, the Pastores with 125 passengers and the Toba with 100. Both will be going to the West Indies. For these trips the Pastores will be under charter by the Raymond Whitcomb Company, while the Toba will be chartered by Thomas Cook and Son.

On April 1 the Megantic will bring

four hundred tourists and the Galamare, chartered by Raymond Whitcomb Company, 123 all going to the West Indies.

The number of tourists visiting

For the first time in the history of its existence the Century Club will be represented with a float in the carnival parade. This announcement was made yesterday in a letter from the club to Jose Miethe, Director of the Fiestas.

The Century Club is the only club in Panama so far to have a float in the parade and this decision is due largely to the club's new president, B. C. Poole who is also having other social activities arranged for at the club for the carnival.

WORLD'S PEACE DEPENDS ON LEAGUE

Is Opinion Voiced by Dr. Haraldio Arias, Panama's Delegate to First League Assembly Just Closed in Geneva.

Distrust Disappears After Delegates Realize That They Were Representatives of Nations in World's Parliament.

Discussing the League of Nations, in which he represented the Republic of Panama together with Mr. Nicanor Garay, Dr. Haraldio Arias yesterday made the following statement:

"The meeting of the first conference of the League of Nations Assembly may be considered an event of profound significance. Up to a short time ago, many thought that the League was simply a Wilsonian dream, but now, even the most skeptical are beginning to be convinced that the League is a living organization on which will depend the peace of the world."

Most Critical Time

"The first session of the League's Assembly is likely to be the most critical moment of the existence of the League, inasmuch as it was the fruit of the great war just ended and it was feared, not without reason, that the resentment, hate and suspicion created by that

of the powers, tended to establish a new basis for international cooperation.

"For these reasons among others, was thought at first that the Assembly would be nothing less than a group of diplomats abounding in vainglory, subtleties, high falutin' phrases and vainglory reserved for the true intention of the parties interested, without reaching any practical results."

Four More Cases Brought from Colón Yesterday Isolated in Ancon Hospital—Disease Still of Mild Type

Four more cases of smallpox were discovered in Colón. Yesterday reports from Colonel H. C. Fisher, Chief Health Officer for the Canal Zone, showed up to 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

All of the four cases, together with two other cases from Monday which remained in the isolation ward of the Colón hospital, were brought over to Panama on the 11 o'clock train yesterday.

There is at present a total of forty-eight cases of smallpox isolated in the Ancon hospital. All of these cases, with the exception of one, were brought over from the Atlantic side. The patient with the other case was taken out of the Canal zone but an investigation by Major Henry Goldthwaite, Health Officer for Panama, showed that this patient also was brought from the Colón and shortly before it was discovered that he had the disease.

No deaths have been reported.

GERMANY CAN ONLY ACCEPT WHAT IS POSSIBLE BUT NOT THE IMPOSSIBLE, HE SAYS

He Tells Reichstag That Germany Will Attend London Conference and Promises Success if Negotiations Deal With Possibilities. German Press Unanimously Declares That Terms Will Mean Commercial Death of Germany Who is Powerless to Oppose Victory of Madness.

Press Condones Terms

BERLIN, Feb. 1. Foreign Minister von Simons told the Reichstag papers unanimously voice the opinion that the reparations conditions laid down by the Paris Supreme Court sound the commercial death knell to Central Europe, including France, Italy and Belgium. The Press, however, does not intend to advise the cabinet regarding the course it should follow in this case for reaching a conclusion, saying that Germany is powerless to oppose "this victory of madness."

Some conservative organs discuss the probable effects of the enforcement of the allied conditions, suggesting that they would leave Germany as a plaything in the hands of the extremists. Particular anger is directed against the 12 percent tax on

Senator Townsend announced that he intended to call on the post office superintendents and congressional leaders for a meeting there when this was important legislation pending. He challenged the opponents of the tariff bill to continue filibustering against legitimate legislation and into the consequences.

Senate statemans joined in the discussion and many produced signs showing that the bill would increase the cost of living. Senator Walsh stated that it would have an additional cost of fifty dollars per family, and Senator Smith suggested that the nation would benefit considerably by the wheat bill. Senator Harrison declared that a reduction from South America and Central America would follow the bill's passage.

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
