POLAND'S REQUEST FOR U.S. SUPPORT IN SILESIAN PLEBISCITE QUESTION IS REFUSED BY STATE DEPARTMENT

U. S. MAY NOT INTERFERE IN PURELY EUROPEAN POLITICS IS SECY. HUGHES CONTENTION

American Representatives on European Councils Should Act Solely as Observers Except in Cases where U. S. is Directly Affected.—Reports from Oppeln, Declare that the Situation Continues Serious. — Inter-Allied Commission Needs Force to Enforce Decisions.

WASHINGTON, May 18. Poland has informally appealed to the United States for support in the Silesian plebiscite question.

Relying to the Polish government's appeal for American support in the Silesian controversy, the United States government reiterated its announced policy of non-interference in questions of purely European character.

It is indicated that the Polish Minister Lubomirski failed to convince Secretary of State Hughes that there is cause for the alteration of that policy and that the United States representatives on European councils should act solely as observers except in cases where the United States is directly affected.

Situation Continues Serious
(By The Associated Press)

PARIS, May 18.—Reports from Oppeln declare that the situation in Silesia continues serious. The members of the inter-allied commission are reported to be making efforts both in Polish and German circles to reach an understanding, but they have declared that their efforts will probably not be successful if the forces at their disposal are not increased to at least three times their present number. In this respect the newspaper Le Temps recalls that last week the Ambassadors' Council unanimously decided to demand the consideration of the proposal to send additional reinforcements to Upper Silesia.

Chief Justice E. D. White, Author Of The White Award In Limits Dispute Between Panama and Costa Rica, Reported Dying.

WASHINGTON, May 18. Physicians in attendance at the bedside of Chief Justice Edward D. White of the United States Supreme Court, announced at eleven o'clock this morning that they entertained little or no hope for the aged jurist's recovery. Late last night it was announced that his condition was exceedingly precarious.

The Chief Justice was operated on Saturday for bladder trouble and since the operation has been in rather low condition. He has shown no relapse after Tuesday's relapse when he sank into unconsciousness.

Chief Justice White has recently been the central figure in the international boundary dispute between the Republics of Panama and Costa Rica on which he rendered an award in 1900.

PANAMA CANAL BLDG. DIVISION TO BE ABOLISHED EFFECTIVE JUNE 1, GOV. MORROW DECREES

All Construction and Repair Work Now Carried On Under Old Department Will Be Passed Over to Supply Department. J. B. Fields to Be Constructing Quartermaster. — Further Reduction in Force Withheld Pending Ass't, Eng. of Maintenance's Arrival.

The Building Division of the Panama Canal is to be entirely abolished effective June 1 and the construction of all buildings and like structures now being performed by the Building Division, Roy Watson or formed by that division will be transferred to the Supply Department. This is officially announced and to do this will be thought of difficulty since it is often mentioned that a great reduction would be made.

Withholding Reduction.
Action on the reduction of force is being withheld until the arrival of the Assistant Engineer of Maintenance of the Panama Canal who is due to arrive Friday morning on the United States Army Transport San Michel. M. B. Stevens, Private secretary to Governor Morrow said yesterday that advice has been received that the Assistant Engineer is on the San Michel.

GOVERNOR MORROW PRESCRIBES BOUNDARIES OF CANAL ZONE TOWNS EFFECTIVE JUNE 1.

According to New Limits Ancon And Balboa Are One Town. New Limits Fixed For Corozal, Fort Clayton, Pedro Miguel, Panama And Cristobal.

Town limits for every town in the said highway to the Transformer Canal Zone are prescribed in an official circular signed by Governor Jay J. Morrow yesterday afternoon. The newly established limits become effective June 1.

Ancon and Balboa are outlined as a single town while the other towns upon which limits are prescribed are Corozal, Fort Clayton, Pedro Miguel, Panama and Cristobal.

The following will be the new town limits:

ANCON—BALBOA.—That area lying within the line beginning at the junction of Third Avenue and Gaillard Highway at the Canal Zone Panama boundary line running east and west. The Panama Railroad main line to a point just opposite the north end of House No. 36, Annex, southwest of the Canal Zone, or D. No. 10, to a short line to the old French Canal Zone Panama boundary line, and thence along the said boundary line to the point of beginning.

COROZAL.—All streets and roads connective with Gaillard Highway and lying within the area beginning at the Dahl railroad crossing and extending north on the said highway to its intersection with the short line of La Union Bay, thence along the said short line to the railroad bridge over the old French Canal Zone, thence easterly to the East River, across the river on Bolivar Highway, northerly along the East River to Folk's River and thence along the shore line of Folk's River bridge and extending north on the to the point of beginning.

FORT CLAYTON.—All street and roads connective with Gaillard Highway and lying within the area beginning at the Dahl railroad crossing and extending north on the said highway to its intersection with the short line of La Union Bay, thence along the said short line to the railroad bridge over the old French Canal Zone, thence easterly to the East River, across the river on Bolivar Highway, northerly along the East River to Folk's River and thence along the shore line of Folk's River bridge and extending north on the to the point of beginning.

Constitutional Liberals Warn Obregon That Fate Similar To Madero's May Be His Lot If His Policy Is Not Changed.

MEXICO CITY, May 18. Beware of the fate of Madero who failed to heed the solicitations to change his policy and fell," is the warning sent to President Obregon by 138 Liberal Constitutionalists deputies and senators.

The warning contains charges that General Calles, who was Secretary of Interior in the Huerta administration and is now Secretary of Treasury, attempted to cause a disaffection against the Obregon administration and that his Radical sympathizers again attempted to invade the Chamber of Deputies Tuesday evening to attack the Liberal Constitutionalists who were holding a caucus.

The Fire Department dispersed the Radicals.

EX-SECRETARY F. K. LANE DEAD

Death Follows Operation for Appendicitis When Heart Trouble Became Acute.—Died a Poor Man Leaving No Estate.

Lane Started Life as Newspaper Reporter and Later Became Part Owner of Tacoma Daily News.—Began Law Practice in 1889.

BOSTON, Mass., May 18. Franklin Knight Lane, Secretary of the Interior during the Wilson administration, died today following an operation for gall stones.

The death of ex-Secretary Lane was due to heart failure following an operation performed on May 6 for gall stones and appendicitis.

After the operation ex-Secretary Lane said: "I am surprised to be alive. I hope I will live a long life doing good things for others without the thought of money." He died a poor man and left no estate.

Starts as Reporter.

Franklin Knight Lane, like many men who have risen to high rank in the United States, New York, Boston, etc., he was a New York newspaper reporter, became editor and part owner of the *Tacoma Daily News*, in

New York, etc.

He became editor of *The Tacoma Daily News*, in 1889, he studied law and in 1890 was married to Miss Anne Wintermute, of Tacoma, Washington.

Admitted to Bar 1900.

Still part owner of the *Tacoma Daily News*, he studied law and in 1890 was admitted to the California bar. He received his education in California and in 1900 was married to Miss Anne Wintermute, of Tacoma, Washington.

Gov. Morrow Sails Today.

Dr. Nelson Gwynn sails today on the S. S. *Carthage* to New Orleans en route to Washington, also bound on a diplomatic mission with Dr. Ricardo Labrador as his secretary. During Dr. Gwynn's absence, the Department of Foreign Affairs will be under the control of Dr. Ricardo J. Alfaro or Dr. Enrique A. Morales, Secretary of Government and Justice and Secretary of Finance and Treasury, respectively.

Dr. Eduardo Chanci will also head a mission to Peru and will sail at an early date probably with Dr. Jose Isaac Fabrega as his secretary.

Provides for Expenses.

To provide the funds necessary for the maintenance of these missions and the expenses which will incur in their work, the Department of Finance and Treasury last Saturday issued a decree providing for the payment of these expenses from the funds of the National Defense Loan. This provision was objected to by the Fiscal Agent of the Republic, A. T. Ross, but his objections were overruled by a subsequent decree issued in the exercise of power which declared his objections unfounded and ordered the accounts paid.

These commissions were appointed Monday, May 16, by virtue of an executive resolution and are created for the purpose of carrying out certain diplomatic work intended to prove the validity of the claims of the Republic of Panama to the territories in dispute with Costa Rica and to show why the White Award cannot be accepted by Panama.

Pope Appoints New Church Dignitaries.

ROME, May 18. The Pope has appointed Monsignor Lorenzo Lanzi, Nunzi to Peru as Nunzi to Poland succeeding Monsignor Ratti. The latter will be named Cardinal in the June consistory and later will be appointed Archbishop of Milan.

The Pontiff has also appointed Monsignor Petrelli apostolic delegate in the Philippines as Nunzi to Peru. Monsignor Petrelli was already appointed Nunzi to China in 1918 but the opposition of France supported by the United States prevented the creation of a nunciature in Peking.





MEXICAN REDS.

The horns' nest of Bolsheviks and various other types of red radicals that has been permitted to thrive in Mexico for the last five or six years has become quite troublesome. This is trouble that Mexico brought upon herself when asylum was offered to these renegades and they were permitted under Mexican protection to carry on the work and propaganda that was not permitted in other countries.

Naturally the present government is not entirely responsible for the condition and it is gratifying to see that President Obregon will take action toward eradicating the influence of these pernicious radicals from his government. They have come to Mexico to do and to encourage the unsuspecting Mexicans in doing things that no engineer would dare to attempt in their own countries.

LICENSED MANSLAUGHTER

In view of recent trials decisions and sentences in the Canal Zone Court respecting accidents on the streets and highways of the Canal Zone resulting from careless driving of automobiles the following editorial from the New York World is of unusual local interest:

There are two master reasons why automobile deaths in New York State jumped from 150 in the first four months of 1920 to 350 in the corresponding period this year. One of these reasons is, and one is not, a condemnation of the collective sense of the community.

Man can neither be blamed for the snows of the previous winter that saved lives by discouraging street speed, nor credited with the open season that is now passing into summer. But the State is to blame for not legislating a remedy for automobile killings.

There is a remedy, proved and tried. It is in the law. Massachusetts, and later New Jersey and Connecticut, have shown that automobile deaths can be checked by legislation. In New York even the one remedial law that was passed this spring, providing for suspending license for cause, will sleep for lack of machinery for its enforcement.

The automobile deathrate in New York is now equal to the normal deathrate from all causes whatever of a city like Hoboken, Troy or Portland, Me. It would not be easy to convince the families of the slain that these deaths are not in most cases manslaughter permitted by the State.

It would appear that New York State needs a little of the medicine that Judge Hanan has been prescribing for chauffeurs who drive motor cars without any regard for the lives, safety or convenience of the general public. Punishment is not the only remedy; there should be prevention as well as a sentence in the penitentiary for the offender does not pay the innocent suffered for the loss of a life.

"GUILTY OF MURDER IN SECOND DEGREE" IS VERDICT OF JURY IN JAPANESE SHOOTING CASE

Mitsugi Ohira, Fireman Aboard Peruvian Steamer Equador, Faces Long Term in Gamboa Penitentiary for Killing His Countryman Kameki Yamamoto.—Ohira Explains He Was Goaded Beyond Mental Endurance by Constant Tricks of Deceased Who He Says Was Favorite of Engineer.

Colon. May 18.—Mitsugi Ohira, fireman aboard the Peruvian steamer Equador, faced trial today before a jury at Cristobal on the charge of first degree murder for the shooting of Kameki Yamamoto, also a Japanese member of the crew of same steamer, on the 1st of April in the harbor of Cristobal, about the noon hour.

The story told by Ohira on the witness stand varied somewhat.

He said he was not given a pistol.

VIDA Y RESUMEN.

Porque escribió el libro más leído en España en este medio siglo y porque fui mi amigo, dejando de oír cuatro palabras sobre el principito Pedro Kropotkin antes de que su nombre despareciese de los periódicos diarios.

El principito Kropotkin vivió treinta años en Highgate, un suburbio del norte de Londres, todo clase media, donde no hay apenas vecinos que no sea propietario del mindín, como "shanty" en que vive; cada uno no pertenece a una distinta confesión religiosa; y a pesar de este individualismo de la economía y de la conciencia, todas las casas son iguales y todas las gentes parecen ser las mismas, por esa uniformidad profunda de Inglaterra que le hace siempre tan extraña a Kropotkin, como el tipo de Kropotkin y su dedicación de un sistema social en su posterior anillo eran extraños en Highgate. Pero lo más extraño era querer despedir a un visitante hasta la puerta del jardincillo de su casa, con la princesa a su derecha y su hija echada a su izquierda, y como los tres Kropotkin andaban hacia atrás desde la puerta del jardín hasta la de la casa, con los ojos puestos en el camino que tomó el visitante, porque era un gesto que se revolvía el principito al plato del profeta anarquista.

Era un principito verdadero, principial en todo. Fuerte de cuerpo y de alma, valeroso, generoso, abnegado, austero, hospitalario, servicial, marido fiel y padre amante. Trabajó toda la vida en Geografía y en Historia, y consagró su mayor entusiasmo a la propaganda de su ideal anarquista. Se le metió en la cabeza desde joven que los hombres son naturalmente buenos y que es la opresión de la autoridad, y toda autoridad se le antojó opresiva, lo que los deformaba y hace malos. Era la idea que antes que Kropotkin mantuvo Rousseau; pero a mí se me figura que a Kropotkin se debió ocurrir de propia meditación, y que era, más que idea, sentimiento, porque como Kropotkin había sido toda la vida bueno y recto, no creía que se pudiera ser de otra manera; y cada vez que se acuerpó con la maldad humana, tuvo que atribuirla al maliciose de un tirano, y la tiranía la atribuyó, a su vez, a un error que condujo a los hombres a nombrar gobernantes y a ignorártolos.

Este era tema que nunca discutió, ni aun entre sus mejores amigos, sin exaltarse y perder la causa. Dogma central, sobre esa piedra desmanteló su iglesia. Era el supuesto que hace posible los portentos de riqueza y de amor cuya posibilidad nos describen en "La conquista del paraíso", que ha sido el Evangelio popular del último tercio del siglo XIX. Yo lo hej en un grupo de obreiros asturianos y gallegos que no sabían leer; en La Habana, hará unos veintiocho años. Y luego he sabido de cortijos desdichados y extremos y de viviendas obreras en varias capitales donde se leía hace veinte años, a la luz de candiles de aceite, con la misma euforia con que yo me había persuadido al leerlo de que habían "descubierto las cadenas" para verlos transportados a la edad de oro en un paraje de hadas, maravillas y sueños.

Yustizaramos aquellas esperanzas, aunque nunca he llegado a creer, como marxistas, que el hombre sea tan malo que no haya posibilidad de redención, porque esto es lo que, en, quieren o no quieran, los partidarios de la interpretación económica de la Historia, o de que los neones son los negocios, y triunfan hoy más, y dicen como proverbiu y te diré lo que piensas, ahora se me figura que ni la malicia ni la bondad son inherentes al hombre, sino meramente adhesivas, porque la bondad o maldad de

los hombres está determinada en buena parte por el valor de las instituciones en que se crean y viven. Y, sobre todo, por los sentimientos que se les inculquen; pero en otra buena parte es indeterminable, porque el hombre es libre; tan libre, en efecto, que, frecuentemente pegue buenas obras las que le hacen malo, sugiriéndole el sofisca del orgullo, que consiste en decir: "Mi acción es buena; luego yo soy bueno", juicio que lleva implícita la convicción de que son malos los demás y es, por ende, uno de los orígenes del mal, si no es todo el origen, porque también es causa de que uno se sienta malo "que el mundo no nos da lo que nos deba, con lo que el alma se amontona, aunque sea no tanto como cuando uno se figura, inspirado también por el orgullo, que podrá subir de carretera el Monte Blanca, y se queda en el comienzo del camino.
