ASSOCIATION OF COLON AUTOISTS MAY BE FORMED

Association, It is Said, Would Aim to Aid Authorities in Eliminating the "Speed Evil" and Have All Vehicles Carry Tail Lights.

CRISTOBAL, May 23.—Automobile owners on the Atlantic side have under consideration the question of forming an association similar to those in the United States and Europe.

The association would look after the interests of the private car owner and would be composed of private owners alone, it was said today.

Another reason given for the forming of an association of this kind was that it would assist the authorities in the regulation of traffic on the Atlantic side and make the examination of chauffeurs for a license more difficult than one, saying that none but fully qualified men or women would receive the license to drive.

BEHNS AINER PORT ZONE NOW REOPENED

HUNDREDS STRANDED ON ISTHMUS

HOW RED CROSS WORKS AND HOW CASH IS SPENT

A Peep Into the Diary of One of the Red Cross Workers of the Canal Zone Chapter Explains Noble But Silent Work of Institution.

These are little human interest sketches from real life taken from the rough notes of a worker at the Canal Zone Chapter of the American Red Cross. They are printed practically as written with no attempt to change them as they speak for themselves. In order that there be kept anonymous to the persons concerned case numbers will be used instead of names.

Case No. 1 Case Number one was employed as a riveter in Mechanical Division let out on account of reduction of force. Came to me and told me his wife had just got out of hospital and he did not have a cent. I found his family consisting of wife, mother and two children living over Hall Way House in Chorrizo, P. R.

What would that family have done without the assistance of the Red Cross? There they were destitute, owing rent, no employment, in a foreign country and facing return to the States in the dead of winter with only such clothing as they had here. Suppose that man had come up you, could you have done as much for him for \$2? But remember, that is what you \$2 will help to do if you give it to the Red Cross. But you are not asked to give it only to buy a ticket to a dance that will be worth more than that. If you buy a ticket and don't go, fine business. The ticket also includes membership in the Red Cross. Don't you think an organization that does the kind of work related above is a pretty good organization to belong to?

German Attack Though Considered as Very Serious, is Not Yet Regarded as a Casus Belli, by French, as it Was Executed by Irregular Troops.—Allied Representatives Call on Chancellor Wirth Yesterday and Asked Him to Close Silesian Frontier.

BOY BROWNS AT THE BELLA VISTA BEACH SUNDAY

Went Swimming With Other Boys and Did Not Show Up at Dressing Time.—Body Found After Tide Went Out.

Julio Varela, a nine year old Panamanian boy, son of Francisco Varela and Luz Clement was drowned in some unknown manner Sunday at the Bella Vista bathing beach, where he went swimming accompanied by three other boys of more or less his same age.

At about 9:30 o'clock Sunday morning the unfortunate boy accompanied by his three friends Francisco and Cristobal Cantoral and Pedro Escobar, left his home for the Bella Vista beach. When the boys arrived they found the great crowd which usually crowds the beach on Sundays and holidays, and after leaving their clothes at a place where they usually started off together, however they were not together long as each soon started in his own direction.

Everything went along well without anyone expecting or even having the least idea that the coming of those four small boys would have such a tragic end. Hours passed and the time arrived when the boys got together again to dress and start for home and it was then that the disappearance of Julio was noted.

A search was started immediately and the boys even went as far as communicating their fears to several persons present, but all their efforts failed to reveal any trace of the whereabouts of the small companion. The news of the boy's disappearance soon reached the city and about 6:30 o'clock in the evening a great crowd which grew as the distracted mother hurried to the scene of her son's disappearance could be seen marching along the beach to engage in a search for the missing boy.

The police was notified at 7:30 o'clock and a number of policemen were sent out to aid in the search, but all to no avail no trace of the missing boy could be found. Later another search party composed of lieutenant Sanchez and several policemen was sent out and shortly after the party's arrival at the beach at a point about 35 meters from the establishment named "El Recreo" near the old Bella Vista sawmill the lifeless body of the child was found where it had been cast up by the waves.

When it was known that the boy's body had been found the Judge of the Superior Court and Doctor Harzara went to the beach and after complying with the usual legal formalities ordered that the body be brought to this city and handed over to his parents.

Large Gathering Attends U. N. I. A. Variety Concert.

"I Am Glad For Improvement Of Colored People," Says C. A. Graham, President.

The Variety Concert held on Saturday night last under the auspices of the U. N. I. A. was a most successful affair. The promoters were Miss Haylet, Lynch and Malena. The hall was tastefully decorated with the colors of the association and palms and evergreens. The attractions were numerous and afforded much amusement. The past office, which was in charge of Mrs. Wright and Miss Walker had a break business. Fully 300 letters were mailed. Mrs. Haylet was in charge of the Fishing Weir, Mrs. Malena, Ice Cream and Mrs. Constable, Cakes. Prizes were won by Misses E. and W. Johnson, L. Lynch, Mrs. Wright and Mr. C. G. Grant.

Sunday Afternoon's Meeting.

On Sunday afternoon last the association held its weekly meeting, which was well attended. The meeting began with the singing of the opening ode "From Greenfield's Ivy Mountains," after which invocation was offered by the Captain. The scripture lesson was read from: - A select musical program was rendered. Addresses were delivered by Mr. Graham, President of the association; Messrs Merritt, Deane and James. Mr. Graham in his opening remarks in part: "Again, I feel it a great amount of pleasure to be here this afternoon. It is a pleasure indeed, because I can well remember a couple of years ago the colored people would have done anything rather than help themselves. I am especially glad for the improvement of the Negro. I feel certain that if I should call one of the most ignorant of our members here this afternoon and ask him why he is here he would answer in a manner which would benefit everyone, then how much more would you not be benefited if one of our intelligent men should speak. If we keep to the teachings of this association we would be as wise as a serpent and harmless as a dove." The classic privilege of education rise innately in the individual himself. If Moses had drawn up the book of laws and presented it to the children of Israel they might have been skeptical; they might have been inclined to refuse it. They might have asked who is Moses? But Moses commanded the respect and belief of the people by getting the laws from God. They excluded Moses and accepted the law from God. Men of intelligence who have soared in the realm of intellectuality have been inspired and

have written books for our intellectual benefit and instead of sitting patiently and listening you get impatient. Let me entreat you to be as wise as a serpent and as harmless as a dove. Listen even to infants for sometimes you learn lessons from them. I appeal to you to look into these things very seriously. We are living in a time when we must be very serious. I say it without successful contradiction that the Negro has been the most light-hearted of all races. Jefferson on Anti-Negro Slavery said "that there has never been a people, who in his knowledge, were so able to bear and yet so ready to forgive." This great and magnanimous scheme which emanated from the "Hon." Marcus Garvey, and which the skeptics say is the project of a fanatic and a semi-lunatic is doing great things for the Negro God made man the god of this earth and some of the things he does were the most marvelous.

Here the speaker read an extract from a book on the "Aphorism of a Man's Heart," and commenting on it he said: "The aphorism of man's heart is an he thinks Marcus Garvey thinks he can establish the greatest Negro republic and because he thinks so, it shall be so (cheers). The time is coming when you shall reap the fruitage of our labors. When we who have spoken from time to time from this magnificent platform to keep your spirit held shall have passed to the Great Beyond you who are left on this terrestrial ball shall reap the benefits of our labors. The singing of one stanza of "Oh my Comrades" and the pronouncing of the benediction by the Executive Secretary brought the meeting to a close.

ATHLETES TO BE SENT TO JAMAICA.

From information received, we are in a position to state that definite arrangements have been made to hold a championship athletic meet at Kingston, Jamaica, November at which the best athletes will represent the Isthmus. An athletic enthusiast, who has just returned from that place on a two-weeks vacation, was deputed to interview the President of the Jamaica Athletic Club, who said that to hold a meeting as suggested would entail heavy expenditure to make the necessary preparations and he would not undertake to put the matter before his committee except there could be sufficient guarantee that the Isthmian athletes were up to the same standard of the Jamaica athletes.

The Panama representative said that he thought the Isthmian athletes were about the same standard and that their visit to the island would warrant the extra expenditure. With this assurance the President placed the matter before his committee and it was finally decided to hold a championship meet as stated above.

Now that the Jamaica side of the arrangements are being perfected, the athletes here have their work of selecting the best athletes to represent the Isthmus and raising funds to pay their expenses. Two meetings have been called for tomorrow night, one in Colon to be held at Mr. Holt's residence, and the other in Panama at the Pacific Club for the purpose of laying out the scheme for making the necessary preparations. All athletes are asked to attend.

**SUPREME COURT ACQUITS MAYOR BOYD OF CHARGE**

The action brought against Mayor Boyd by Dr. Guillermo Patterson, Jr., has been decided adversely for the latter by the Supreme Court of Justice of the Republic of Panama.

It appears that the Patterson and Diaz family a woman have been litigating over a parcel of land which lies partly in the Republic of Panama and partly in the Canal Zone.

During the month of May last year, the Supreme court of justice of the Republic of Panama rendered a decision as regards that portion of the property under Panamanian jurisdiction, confirming the sentence of the lower court which favored the Diaz family.

In view of the decision of the Supreme Court, Mayor Boyd was instructed by the Court to place the Diaz family in possession of the property in question and the Mayor, complying with these instructions, visited the property and informed the squatters thereon that in future they would be expected to recognize the Diaz family as the owners of the land and to pay rental and sign lease contracts with them.

The Mayor also ordered the removal of some wire fencing erected on the land in question which appears belonged to the Patterson family.

Dr. Patterson, Jr., it is understood, had some time previous effected a partition of the property in dispute with his father, the latter continuing as owner of the parcel lying in the Canal Zone which the former became the owner of the parcel lying in Panamanian territory.

This partition was made on June 12, 1918, before Notary Public No. 2, and presented for registration at the Office of the Public Registrar. However, it appears that the partition was irregular, in that it was effected during the litigation which the Supreme Court decided in favor of the Diaz family, and after the regular inspection previously made by the lower court to establish the boundary between Mata Rodonda and La de Caceres.

It is understood that in the partition between Messrs. Patterson, senior and Patterson, junior the boundaries given were so contradictory to the boundaries given in the original titles as inserted in the Public Registrar's office, that the representative of the Diaz family, memorialized the Chief Registrar regarding the discrepancy with the result that this functionary announced that the memorial had been erroneous and ordered that the registration of the latter document be cancelled.

This is in brief the history of the case which caused the suit against Mayor Boyd by Dr. Patterson, Jr.

The Supreme Court, in upholding the action of Mayor Boyd, pointed out that if the Mayor had failed to obey the Chief Registrar's instructions, he would have been liable to imprisonment for a period of from two to three years according to law.

**ATLANTIC SIDE PARS**

**CRISTOBAL, May 20.** Mr. H. R. Wilford, vice president of Goethals, Wilford and Boyd and president of Wilford, McKay and Company, called on the Royal Mail steamer Orleans last evening to Havana, and will be away for several weeks. Mr. Wilford stated that the shipping trade in Havana was rapidly becoming better and that looked for considerable further improvement in the near future.

The proposal of Mayor Azupard to erect a flag pole in the Colon park has met with universal approval and work will be commenced on the project very soon. The pole will be sixty feet high and the national flag will be raised on all holidays.

Cleaning up work is being done on the land at the north of the park and the Colon Municipal Court proposes to concrete the sidewalks, erect concrete seats, and generally improve this very pleasant plaza.

The Messrs. Ehrman of Panama were on board the Orleans yesterday, seeing friends off to Havana.

Mr. Roy Banks sailed on the Orleans last evening for Havana, Cuba. His mother was at the pier to see him off.

Mr. Louis Phillips, manager of the International Banking Company's Colon branch, is expected back from the United States this coming week with Mrs. Phillips and family.

Dr. O'Brien proposes to leave for New Orleans very shortly and will visit Hot Springs, Arkansas, being away from the Isthmus for several months. This will be the first visit of the Isthmus specialist, based for quite a while his last being in Europe.

No word has yet been received of the sailing of any of the Panama railroad steamers from New York, although it is believed that the service is nearing its end.

There was a large congregation at the Cristobal Y. W. C. A. today morning to help the Rev. Harry Owen speak on the subject of "Five minutes after death" and all his hearers that there was no such thing as death as that it only began at that time.

Friday evening's entertainment at the Cristobal Y. W. C. A. was well attended and Miss Louis Coffey and her entertainers received a great reception for an excellent program.

**MEXICAN WAR CHIEF MURDERED FRIDAY**

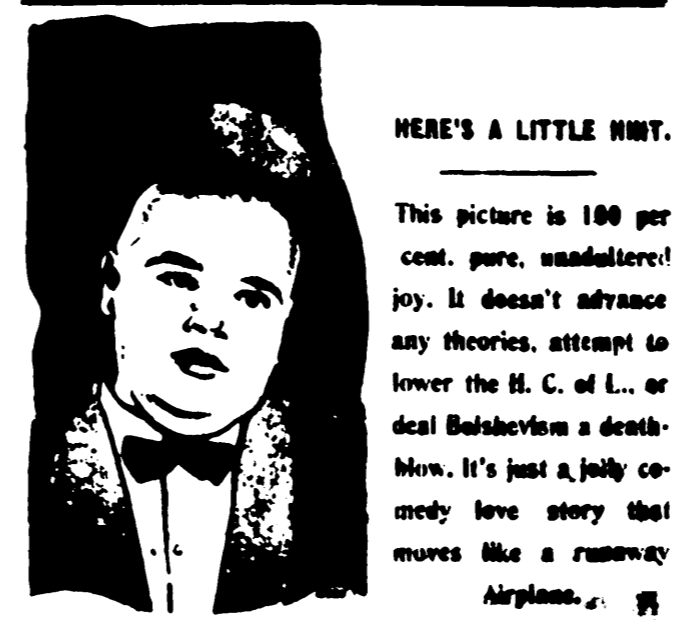
