

FIVE CENTS GOLD

MEMBERSHIP IN LEAGUE MAY BE INCREASED TO FIFTY SOON

ADMITTANCE OF LATVIA AND ESTHONIA APPROVED BY THE LEAGUE'S POLITICAL GROUP

Applications of Lithuania and Hungary Adjudged Pending Delegate Hyman's Efforts to Settle Yalta Dispute and Approval of Count Apponyi—Political Committee Also Decided to Recommend Clause Protecting Armenians If Treaty With Turkey Is Signed.

GENEVA, Sept. 15.—By The Associated Press. That the membership of the League of Nations will be increased to fifty is regarded as certain should the Assembly adopt the recommendation of the political committee which today decided to approve the admission of Latvia and Estonia to the League. The applications of Lithuania and Hungary were adjudged pending Delegate Hyman's efforts to settle the Yalta dispute which is expected to be submitted Monday, although Hungary's application will come up again on September 23, when Count Apponyi arrives and furnishes all the information the commission requires.

To Protect Armenia

The political committee decided to recommend to the Supreme Council to include in the eventual peace treaty with Turkey a clause safeguarding the interests of Armenia.

The finance committee is scrutinizing the expenditures of the League Secretariat as well as the Labor Bureau. The committee to day asked Albert Thomas, head of the Bureau, how it happened that although the United States is not a member of the League he employed a number of Americans. Thomas replied: "I found a number of remarkably capable men in the United States and if I can find more like them I will take them wherever they come from."

The preponderance of Britishers and Frenchmen in the Secretariat and also in the Labor Bureau was severely criticized by the smaller states. The committee will probably recommend that as far as possible all states represented in the Assembly have a proportionate representation in the executive organizations.

Thanks Assembly

During today's session of the Assembly before Edwards, head of the Chilean delegation, thanked the Assembly on behalf of the Chileans for the four successive mandates given Alvarez, a Chilean. Wednesday during the elections of judges and deputy judges for the International Court of Justice, he remarked that the deadlock which ended Wednesday's session showed how wise is the provision of the Court's rules providing for a joint consultation committee in such cases.

Kannli thanked the Assembly on behalf of the people of Albania for admitting his country into the League.

The majority of the orators are continuing their demand for the widest possible publicity of the League's activities and of the discussions on the questions brought before the Assembly.

Deadlock Noted

GENEVA, Sept. 15.—By The Associated Press. The joint committee of the Assembly and the Council of the League of Nations selected Betschmann, of Norway, as the fourth deputy judge for the International Court of Justice. This selection must now be ratified by the Assembly and then it is to be held over.

Judge Shorthall Sets Fatty's Bail At 5000 Dollars

Movie Actor's Attorney Declares Sensational Developments Expected Involving Prominent Persons Outside Movie World.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—By The Associated Press. The Grand Jury yesterday returned a verdict of manslaughter against Roscoe Fatty Arbuckle, who is charged with having caused injuries to Miss Virginia Rappe, which resulted in her death. Judge Shorthall fixed bail at \$5,000.

It was said today that it now rests with the prosecution whether the murder or manslaughter charge will be pressed. In the latter case the testimony of Miss Belmont will be thrown out.

Arbuckle yesterday had lost none of his self-confidence though his "famous" smile was not in evidence.

Attorney Dominguez, counsel for the defense, yesterday declared that Arbuckle would be released on bail and that some sensational developments could be expected which would surprise persons outside of the moving picture world.

The State Attorney General is reported to be receiving numerous letters and cables from every corner of the United States urging him to have the case referred to the very highest and the guilty parties given the fullest extent of the law.

In Police Court Friday

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—By The Associated Press. The coroner's jury which returned a verdict yesterday charging Roscoe Fatty Arbuckle with manslaughter in connection with the death of Virginia Rappe, cinema actress, consisted of nine members, one of whom returned a minority verdict saying that the injuries resulting in the death of Miss Rappe were caused by the application of force, but I am unable to say who applied it.

Two charges of murder and two charges of manslaughter now rest against Arbuckle who although apparently deeply moved, received the verdict of the jury without comment.

District Attorney Brady announced last night that he had not decided what course he would pursue regarding the murder complaint in view of the manslaughter charges, but that he expects to set the matter before Friday when Arbuckle is scheduled to appear in police court for the purpose of pleading the murder charge.

Arbuckle when seen yesterday by newspapermen refused to give any statement.

Business Good Now

HARDING GREETS CENTRAL AMERICA FOR HUNDRED YEARS OF FREEDOM

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—By the Associated Press. President Harding called his felicitations to the Central American countries on occasion of the celebration of the centenary of the independence of those republics.

President Harding's message, which was identical to all five republics, said that the people of the United States rejoice with the Central American nations on this memorable day, and expressed the wish that they may long enjoy an era of peace and prosperity.

GRAFT SCANDAL DISCOVERED IN COLON

Attorney General of Nation Goes Across to Windy City and Brings Over Books Believed to Contain Sensational Evidence.

As the result of developments of a more or less sensational nature, one of the most carried out Saturday night on an opinion poll in the city of Colon, the Attorney General of the Republic, don Osvaldo Lopez, yesterday went over to the Atlantic side to make a personal investigation into the matter.

Attorney General Lopez, called on the governor, the Mayor and the Chief of Police and returned yesterday on the five o'clock train bringing over ten account books and certain numbers of loose leaves written in Chinese. These books, it is said, contain important information relative to the hiring of certain public employees of the city of Colon.

Books Mutilated, Report

An unconfirmed report last evening was to the effect that thirty pages in one of the books had been removed while these were deposited in one of the public offices in Colon. However, it was impossible to get a statement from the Attorney General last night, owing to the fact that the case is still under preliminary investigation, but when he was acquainted with the above report, he refused to confirm or deny it.

The Attorney General last night declared that the translation of the books would begin as early today as was possible.

HARDING GREETS CENT. AMERICA

BERLIN, Sept. 15.—By The Associated Press. President Ebert on behalf of the German government today cabled his congratulations to the presidents of Salvadorean Nicaragua, Guatemala and Honduras on the occasion of the celebration of the centenary of the independence of these republics.

SINN FEINERS WILL CONFER ONLY AS SOVEREIGN PEOPLE

MOROCCANS HAVE DESTROYED RAILROAD TRACK FROM NADOR TO BATEL BELONGING TO FRENCH MINING COMPANY AND WRECKED TELEPHONES.

MELILLA, Sept. 15.—By the Associated Press. The Moroccans have destroyed the entire railroad track from Nador to Bateil belonging to a French mining company and at the same time they tore down the telephone wires, cutting them into fragments.

Confirmation has been received of the news that the Moroccans intend retaking from their advanced positions when the Spanish begin their real advance, of which today's operations were merely preliminary. The Spanish objective was expected to be attained without difficulty, and the movement was executed with perfect efficiency. The occupation of the line from Biskra to Béchar gives the Spanish column a point of departure for a fresh forward movement whose objective has up to the present been kept a secret by the high command.

INVERNESS MEETING OFF

"Nation Formally Declared Independence," De Valera Says Therefore Irish Can Only Attend Conference as Representatives of Free Nation.

Lloyd George Announces Cancellation of Conference Considering Sinn Feiners Demand As Impossible Admission on Govt. Part.

LONDON, Sept. 15.—(By the Associated Press).—Eamon de Valera's letter to Premier Lloyd George declares that the Sinn Feiners are willing to enter a conference, but only as representatives of a sovereign state.

De Valera "declares in his letter: 'Our nation has formally declared its independence, and it is only as representatives of a sovereign state that we have authority and powers to act on behalf of our people.'

Conference Cancelled.

LONDON, Sept. 16.—By the Associated Press. The arrangements for the proposed Irish peace conference at Inverness have been cancelled, but the negotiations have been suspended.

This is the story in brief: On today's unexpected news when Eamon de Valera's claim to enter a conference as representative of independent and sovereign state the Premier declared that submission was impossible and announced the cancellation of arrangements for the conference and the necessity of consulting colleagues.

Premier Still Hopes.

With the extreme consideration for his opponent he has shown throughout the negotiations, the Premier is still careful not to close the door to possible future parleys, and even gives the Irish leaders the simplest time and opportunity to re-consider their position.

The Premier declared that there is but one answer to the claim which would be equivalent to Great Britain acknowledging Ireland's right to negotiate a treaty of closer association with some other foreign power, and he mildly re-iterates the Irish people for not making a single step to get generous advances from His Majesty's government. As a reparation to the good name of the government of Doctor Estrada-Perez, and as a justification to the country, will nevertheless go to the high post as Secretary of Public Instruction.

Law Makes No Distinctions.

One of the commissioners serving in the Balboa commissary informed me that Mr. J. B. Duncan had on different occasions gone to make purchases in the establishment accompanied by his father. On August 8 last Mr. Duncan accompanied by his father appeared in the Balboa commissary and ordered that four pairs of shoes \$4.00 each from that establishment to his residence. The inspector serving in that commissary should not purchase supplies until after school opens, when they will be advised by the teachers to whom the commissary command.

PRODUCT IN SUPPLIES**

Sir Ernest Shackleton remains
faithful to cane sugar, says Belvoir
Independent. Included in the sup-
plies of the Shackleton Rowett ex-
pedition will be a quantity of West
Indian crystallized sugar from Ca-
ro Estate, Trinidad, presented by
Mr. Thomas Prentiss through
Messrs. E. D. and F. Mann. The
sugar, which is of the finest qual-
ity, is being packed by the West In-
dian Produce Association of 14
Greenchurch Lane, London, E. C.,
which similarly handled the sugar
presented for the Arctic Expedition
of 1914. The sugar is carried in 14
bins packed in veneeta cases
three bins to a case. It was the
adoption of this system that enabled
the sugar to be salvaged when the
"Endurance" was crushed in the
Ice Pack in October 1915.

THE INTERNATIONAL JUDGES.

The long heralded election of the judges of the International Court of Justice has taken place and for an event of such supposed importance the election from all reports was very commonplace. The contests were not close nor hard fought and everybody seems to be satisfied and happy.

This side of the world seemed to fare very well with four of the eleven judges to our credit, including the Honorable John Bassett Moore, whose country is not a member of the League of Nations and many of whose countrymen declare that the League is deadlier than the proverbial door nail. All of which seems to indicate that it is not to be an entirely European Court any more than the League of Nations is to be an entirely European League.

The Latinas have fared very well in the election by electing a majority of the judges from Latin countries evenly divided between Europe and America. The judges from Latin countries are as follows: Dr. Rafael Alfonso, of Spain; Dr. Ruy Barbosa, of Brazil; Dr. Alvarez, of Chile; Dr. Bustamante, of Cuba; M. Weiss, of France; and Signor Anzilotti, of Italy.

It seems significant that no candidate from the Argentine was elected. This may have been due to the attitude of the government at present in power in that country with reference to the League, or it may have been due to the candidates. Evidently ability and experience count in the election more than geography or Judge Moore would not have been elected.

We wonder what will be the language of the court. It majority ruled it would be Spanish because there are more judges elected speaking that language than any other tongue.

A GLIMPSE OF THE NEWS.

Poor Fatty Arbuckle seems to be in more trouble now than he ever got into in the movies. Looks rather serious for him, but not so serious for the rough house art of alleged movie comedy. Evidently Fatty tried to pull some rough stuff off the lot. Broad stripes do not make a pattern that at all suits his figure, but it is possible that after a few years of hard labor Fatty will not be so fat.

We have always felt that the gallant old Venezuelan of Greece was a man of unusual courage and now we are convinced. Only a man with a superior brand of courage and a good supply of the brand would marry a young Mrs of forty seven years. Further proof of his courage is evident from the fact that he is going to the United States where he expects to spend part of his time campaigning in favor of the League of Nations. He evidently has forgotten what happened to another man, also a man of courage, who campaigned in the United States in favor of the League of Nations. It is said that he killed the League and almost killed himself.

The shipping situation is practically settled now and the United States will soon have a merchant marine second to none in the world. What do we get that stuff? Here

is—don't you see it in yesterday's edition?

"A special study of the trade routes between the United States, South America and China will be undertaken by Shipping Board of Trade in the near future," said an announcement published today."

Speaking of the action against Deputy Francisco Armas, P. R., we wonder what would happen if similar action were taken against members of the United States Congress. Wouldn't the high of Congress be empty and wouldn't the courts be worked to death?

In compliance with my orders, called his attention to the irregularity, explaining that he had no right to make purchases in the commissaries. Encaged by the "incarcerate" committed by the inspector in interfering with him, Mr. Duncan answered that he would make his purchases under any consideration as his father was privileged to do so, and he retired from the commissary without cancelling the order for the four pairs of shoes.

"When informed of these facts I reiterated my order to the Inspector to follow Mr. Duncan and seize any articles he may purchase. A few days later I arrived at the Balboa commissary and found Mr. Duncan discussing with the Inspector, and when informed by the latter that Mr. Duncan was there claiming the shoes he had previously ordered, I immediately left in my car to look for the outside inspector of La Boca whom I stationed in front of a house in Domingo Diaz Street, where I was told that Mr. Duncan resided, but unfortunately this information was false, as I came to know later that Mr. Duncan resides in North Avenue.

DUNCAN MAKES THREAT

"A summary of these facts were given by me to a local newspaper under my own responsibility, and this enraged Secretary Duncan, who, without respecting the high position he occupies, presented himself the same day the newspaper was published in the Balboa commissary accompanied by police lieutenant Raúl Arceo, a relative of the Secretary I am informed, and in said establishment Mr. Duncan had already sent one to jail for sander and that he would now send in another.

"Not content with this Mr. Duncan presented an appeal to the Fifth Circuit Court, which for reasons which I do not know he later refused from that Court and then presented to the Fourth Circuit Judge, asking for statements from two commissary inspectors and two employees of the Balboa commissary, as far as I know. In the meantime, the Mayor of this city summoned the Director of the newspaper which published my statement to his offices and ordered the latter to deliver the original copy of said information within the period of twenty-four hours. This original was retained until the Director of the newspaper demanded that it be returned through a memorandum.

"And so in this unusual manner jumping here and there, investigating an alleged delinquency in two separate tribunals, Mr. Duncan, from two sides pretends to intimidate the person who has dared to call him a contrabandista, as the dictionary of the language had a milder word to designate those who are engaged in illegal commercial transactions, condemned by all moral principles and prohibited by laws which he is compelled to know in his double character as a private citizen and a high public employee.

Law Violated

"Article 1 of Law 28 of 1919 says:

"Persons who in territory under the jurisdiction of Panamanian authorities sell, code, transfer or accept the sale, cession or transference in any form, by means of purchase or as a gift, of merchandise or coupons to buy in the Panama Canal commissaries or any articles coming from these establishments from persons not employed in the service of the Government of the United States in said enterprise will pay the National Treasury a fine of twenty five dollars for the first infraction and double the fine

or a sentence of ten days in jail in case of a repetition of the offense."

"Those who illegally bring into territory under the jurisdiction of the Panamanian authorities articles from said commissaries, will suffer the following penalties: seizure of the merchandise; a fine of one hundred dollars or a sentence of ninety days in jail and double the penalties of fine or jail sentence in case of a repetition of the offense."

"The Fiscal Code, referring to articles which do not pay tax, says in the article 86, paragraph 20 chapter 10:

"Merchandise which might be introduced by the National Government and those which might be imported by the President of the Republic or diplomatic representative accredited to the Republic for their exclusive personal use."

Consequently with the exception provided in Article 86 of the Fiscal Code, merchandise can only be brought into territory under the jurisdiction of Panamanian authorities free to import tax by employees of the Panama Canal and of the Panama Railroad as well as the members of the United States Army and Navy residing on the Isthmus. The privilege claimed by Mr. Duncan, father to buy in the Panama Canal Commissaries, under which a gentleman seeks shelter, is not recognized by the Government of Panama according to declaration made by this same Government in an official document known to the public which says in part:

"....If the Government of the Canal Zone permit them, speaking of the contractors and many other persons who are not employees of the American Government to make purchases in the commissaries, the Government of Panama will not be able to prevent it until an agreement is reached with the Washington Government; but it can prevent those persons from bringing into the cities of Panama and Colón the articles acquired in the commissaries."

President Renounces Privilege

"Having made this exposition, I must declare here in the name of Justice, that the President of the Republic has informed me that he does not desire to make use of the privilege which is conceded to him by the Fiscal Code and that in effect he has ordered that only those articles of imperative necessity which cannot be obtained in the commercial establishments of Panama should be bought for him in the Panama Canal commissaries. So on making a comparison of the procedure of these two public servants on the subject, my heart bleeds with sorrow to see the contrast between the extreme delacity of the First Magistrate of the Nation in renouncing from the right which is conceded him by an existing law clause, and on the other hand the efforts of Secretary Duncan to violate the law against making purchases in the Canal Zone commissaries in prejudice to merchants, in detriment to the Public Treasury, as a discredit to the Government, an affront to the good name of the country.

"Many have been the displeasures I have faced in carrying out my work and I have made a great number of enemies in complying with my honored but unavoidable duty of defending the interests of Panama's merchants which I have been entrusted with, and I will continue performing my duties without any kind of fear as my conscience is clear and my heart firm."

ONLY OFFICIAL NEWS FROM MOROCCO MAY BE PUBLISHED

MADRID, Sept. 15.—By The Associated Press.—The government's order issued yesterday stopping the newspapers from giving any news on the Moroccan campaign except that contained in the official communiques under threat of suspension and other penalties, had the effect of depriving the Spanish public of any information regarding the course of the operations in Morocco. The order not only prevents the publication of descriptions of battles, but also references to military responsibility for former reverses, as well as prohibited discussions on political and diplomatic questions and mention of other committees.

All proofs of articles referring to Morocco must be submitted to the censor before publication and in the event of decisions being made the blank spaces must be filled in order to avoid panic among the which might thereby consider alarming news suppressed. Similar restrictions apply to foreign correspondents who are unable to cable anything not contained in the communiques. All the newspapers have protested against what they called these inexplicable conditions but Minister de la Gobernación is adamant.

TRAITOR AGAIN IN POLITICS.

PARIS, Sept. 15.—By the Associated Press.—M. Gaillard, ex-Premier of France, speaking on the relations between France and Latin America during the course of an interview with the Uruguayan writer Adolfo Aguirre, which was printed in the newspaper L'Éclaireur, declared: France, notwithstanding the errors of its rulers, is the power best qualified to take the lead in the restoration of civilization because despite all she preserves the Democratic structure, and as you like to say in your countries "France is the prop of the Latin world."

A POOR MAN.

BERNE, Sept. 15.—By the Associated Press.—The Spanish government is demanding political and financial guarantees before permitting King Charles of Hungary to take up residence in Spain, especially restrictions of his household expenses estimated annually at £200,000 Swiss francs, caused by large suite of eighty persons which Spain desires to be considerably reduced.

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SPORTDOM

(By Long Short)

The failure of Henry Sullivan, of Lowell, Mass., to swim the English channel on his fourth attempt, recalls the efforts of swimmers from all corners of the world to accomplish the feat.

Only twice in history has the restless stretch of water given way to the efforts of aquatic stars. In 1875 Captain Matthew Webb, an Englishman, crossed from Dover to Calais in 21 hours, 35 minutes. He was favored by a light wind and a comparatively calm sea, actually swimming about 32 miles.

The distance across the channel at the narrowest point, Dover to Cape Gris Nez, a French headland in the Pas de Calais, is about 20 miles, but swimmers are compelled to zig-zag in combatting the waves and tides. The second successful attempt to cross the channel was made on September 6, 1911, by William T. Burgess, an Englishman by birth, but a naturalized Frenchman. Fifteen times previously he had attempted to make the perilous swim. On the sixteenth he swam from South Foreland, Dover, to Le Chatelet, a little village two miles east of Cape Gris Nez, in 22 hours, 35 minutes. He covered about 60 miles.

Burgess'feat was considered even more wonderful than that of Captain Webb, in that he met with the most adverse conditions. In mid-channel he was stung severely by jelly-fish and became ill and was ready to abandon the swim. When but a short distance off the French coast he met the ebbing tides and battled for three hours before reaching slack water.

Two other men said to have accomplished the feat could not prove their claims. Captain Davis Dalton, of New York declared he swam the channel in August, 1890, covering 60 miles in 23 hours, 30 minutes. He claimed to have swum the entire distance on his back, and to have been so blinded by salt water that his sight was impaired for months afterward.

Sam Mahoney, of Revere Beach, Mass., asserted that he swam from Sangatte, France to South Foreland, in September, 1908 but this was not proved.

Jabez Wolfe, the veteran English swimmer has made 21 unsuccessful attempts to cross and is planning another. In September, 1908, he arrived within sight of the Calais pier but became ill and was taken from the water. He had been in the water 28 hours.

Montague Holbein, of England, tried seven times to cross. In 1903 he arrived within a mile of Dover after swimming 22 hours, 21 minutes, giving up because of exhaustion.

Annette Kellerman, a native-born Australian, called the world's greatest woman swimmer, made several attempts without success. She is a citizen of the United States.

Rose Pitonof, of Boston, went to England in 1912 with the avowed purpose of conquering the channel waves but never found conditions favorable and returned to America.

Many others of lesser note have tried and failed. Sullivan has declared he will make another try in September. Omer Perrault, of Canada and Tiraboschi, the Italian swimmer, are training for the event.

Will Panama Have A Champion?

Claim for one of her native sons a championship in theistic line?

The question is a hard one to answer. Hard indeed until we see a little more of Ramon Arosemena in the prize ring. But even so, the staunch admirers of the Panamanian lad are bold enough to say that within a year he will be the undisputed lightweight champion of South and Central America.

Wise boxing experts shake their heads and say, that this young Panamanian boy needs more ring experience, that he needs to learn a little bit more of the tricks of the trade before he could compete against a sure enough titleholder.

But why so, what's the use of letting him fight second raters all the time? And knocking them into the land of nod. Terrible Terry McGovern battled himself into a world's title in one night. So did Johnny Kilbane. Jim Jeffries was a boxer in France until one day Bill Delaney saw him work, a year later Jeffries was a world's champion. Arosemena looks like a sure enough top pitcher. He is fast, can hit, and is a fine ring general. Still we dare not say any more, not just yet. But on the level, he is twenty-five percent better than Manuel Sanchez and the eyes of every native of Panama will be watching his ring career, and they will be wishing him good luck.
