French Cabinet Approves Poincaré's Stand As Strenuous Efforts Are Made To Find Common Ground For British and French Conference

LONDON, Aug. 10.—By the Associated Press). The delay in the meeting of the Allied Premiers, is affording opportunities for activities by intercessors who are endeavoring to find a formula that will carry the negotiations beyond tomorrow's meeting.

Premier Thiers of Belgium and Minister Giannini of Italy called at Lloyd George's Downing Street residence this morning, and an unusual bustle at the headquarters of the various delegations indicated that strenuous efforts were being made to find a common ground for the British and French conference.

If these fail it seems certain that tomorrow's meeting will end the conference. As far as could be foreseen today, the only hope is in a submission by the French of the new reparations plan, but there is no indication that Premier Poincaré contemplates any such action.

## Special Cabinet Meeting.

PARIS, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press).—A Cabinet meeting was held yesterday morning to consider Premier Poincaré's report of the developments at the London conference. The meeting was presided over by President Millerand who came especially for that purpose from Rambouillet. After the meeting a telegram was sent to Poincaré informing him that the Cabinet has approved the stand he has taken.

## Officials Less Pessimistic.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—By the Associated Press).—Official circles are less pessimistic today, though admitting the gravity of the reparations and other questions under consideration by the Allied Premiers.

The belief was expressed that a Franco-British agreement with regard to the reparations problem could be arranged if as an official declared, Britain would not regard Premier Poincaré's proposals as political and consider them as purely an economic matter aimed at obtaining more money from Germany.

## Sun Is Hopeful.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—By the Associated Press).—Italian Foreign Minister Schuster told the Associated Press tonight, that he thought that there is still a basis for an Anglo-French agreement on the new reparations proposal.

BANK OF CENTRAL AND  
SOUTH AMERICA SUCCESSING  
MERCANTILE BANK OF A.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press).—The formation has been announced of a bank of Central and South America to succeed the Mercantile Bank of the Americas, which is being liquidated. The new bank with a capital of \$5,000,000 and surplus of \$2,000,000 will take over the Mercantile's share of the affiliated banks in Colombia, Peru, Costa Rica, Venezuela and Nicaragua but not its trading concerns which are held responsible for the Mercantile's financial difficulties last year. The New York bankers charged with the reorganizing of the Mercantile Bank include E. R. McNamee of J. P. Morgan Company, Walter Frazee, Gates, McCarragh, W. V. Kim and W. C. Potter, who will name the directors of the new bank.

ELEVEN MISSING  
FROM CREW OF U. S. S.  
RALEIGH: ASHORE.WILL ASK LOAN  
TO BUILD ROAD  
TO PORTOBELODeputy Alspach Says He Will  
Ask Assembly For \$600,000  
With Which To Construct  
New Highway

CARTAGENA, Aug. 10.—Deputy Alspach told the Star &amp; Herald today that he was in hopes that with the meeting of the National Assembly on September 1, the sum of \$600,000 would be voted as a loan to complete the road from Colon to Portobelo.

"I know that Dr. Poens is with us and that the project has his sympathy," the veteran statesman said. "I am sure that the loan will be approved and this will open the construction of some 35 kilometers of roads linking up Cartagena, Maracaibo and the ancient port of Portobelo with the city of Colon."

"This is most productive country and it would open up the coast, not only to agriculture but to the tourist business as well, for we would then have one of the finest drives on the Isthmus and it will mean a great attraction to the visitor and that best of all visitors the man who stays here for some weeks and not for a few hours."

"From this country produce like ivory nuts, coconuts, balata and charcoal could be shipped in great quantities and the Atlantic side shipping business would unquestionably increase."

"Then there is the wonderful mountain of Cerro Brava with its beach nearby and I am sure that it will mean great things for this side if the project is put through."

The congressman has set his heart upon the construction of this road and has been very active in bringing the matter to the attention of the authorities. Roads have been built and are being built on the part

MILITARY AND  
PANAMA CANAL  
APPROPRIATIONSFull Text of Act of Congress  
Pertaining To Local Activities For Fiscal Year 1923 Is  
Quoted By Morrow

Governor Morrow has issued a circular quoting extracts pertaining to the Panama Canal from the Act of Congress making appropriations for the military and non-military activities of the War Department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923, and for other purposes.

The part of this circular, printed at the Balboa Heights Administration Building, quoting the military and general appropriations for 1923, is as follows:

**Contingencies of the Army**  
For all contingent expenses of the Army not otherwise provided for and embracing all branches of the military service, \$285,000.

Provided further, That none of the funds appropriated in this Act shall be used for the payment of expenses connected with the transfer of surplus property of the War Department to any other activity of the Government where the articles or lots of articles to be transferred are located at any place at which the total surplus quantities of their same commodity are so small that their transfer would not, in the opinion of the Secretary of War, be economical.

**Quartermaster Corps**  
None of the funds appropriated in this Act shall be used for the payment of expenses of operating sales commissaries other than in Alaska but which the prices charged do not include the customary overhead costs of freight, handling, storage, and delivery, notwithstanding the provisions of the Act of July 5, 1901.

None of the funds appropriated in this Act shall be used for payment of expenses of operating any unit of the War Department selling services or supplies at which the cost of the services or supplies so sold does not include all customary overhead costs of labor, rent, light, heat, and other expenses properly chargeable to the conduct of such unit.

**General Defense, Panama Canal**  
For operation and maintenance of fire-control installations in seacoast defenses, \$10,000.

**Medical and Hospital Department**  
For the manufacture and purchase of medical and hospital supplies, including disinfectants, for military posts, camps, hospitals, hospital ships and transports, for laundry work for enlisted men and Army nurses while patients in a hospital, and supplies required for mosquito destruction in and about military posts in the Canal Zone, \$10,000.

**Bilingual Corp**  
For paying the Panama Canal such reasonable charges exclusive of subsistence as may be approved by the Secretary of War for caring in its hospitals for officers enlisted men, military prisoners, and civilian employees of the Army admitted thereto upon the request of proper

END OF WAR IN  
IRELAND IS IN  
SIGHT, REPORT

Fall of Cork Expected Hourly  
As 1,000 Nationalists Land  
Within Ten Miles of City,  
Correspondent States.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(By Radio).—The end of the war in Ireland is in sight and the fall of Cork is hourly expected, says a Free State bulletin from the Irish National Army headquarters, bearing a clock date.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press).—The Evening News' Cork correspondent reports that the end of the war in Ireland is in sight and the fall of Cork is hourly expected.

He said that 1,000 nationalists landed in the west parishes of Youghal and Union Hall, and are now within ten miles from Cork. They are encountering stiff opposition and the battle, which is the biggest of the war, is likely to last for many days. The irregulars have a full squadron of cavalry opposing the nationalites.

**Cable Service Slumped.**

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press).—Cable communications between Britain and the United States suffered a break of from ten to twelve hours as a result of the recent seizure of the cable stations in Ireland by the Irish irregulars cutting the connection of the remaining cables.

## RED SCHOOL BLUES NO MORE TO BE RED

**Educators Plan To Reform the "Little Red Schoolhouse" If Teacher Doesn't Like It She Can Sit On a Tack!**

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—By the Associated Press—Add to the list of idle sunshines: the "little red schoolhouse" that was once the effigy of modern science, the quaint institution of American rural life, the "little red schoolhouse," now denigrated by educational experts of Columbia University as "danger to national progress."

Experiments conducted for the past year in a tiny school in Warren County, N. J., have proved to Dr. Fannie Dunn, of Teachers' College, Columbia, that the problems of tending the evils of the "little red schoolhouse," as Dr. Dunn calls it, can be solved by the same methods that have brought progress in teaching the young of the cities "how to shoot."

Forty-four pupils attended the typical schoolhouse in Warren County, which was seven miles from a post office, and out in the open country. A single teacher, National Education Association, was forced to instruct eight grades. Mrs. Katherine Cook, of the Federation of Columbia Education, and Dr. Dunn, too many Columbia educators say. They hope to cut the legs off the rural education that will end the number to 4000, changes that seem appallingly revolutionary to plant of the modern schoolboy.




