COLLAPSE OF CONVENTION TODAY FEARED

French Cabinet Approves Poincare's Stand As Strident Efforts Are Made To Find Common Ground For British and French Conferences

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) The delay in the meeting of the Allied Premiers, is affording opportunities for activities by interested parties who are endeavoring to find a formula that will carry the negotiations beyond tomorrow's meeting.

Premier Theunis of Belgium and Minister Giannini of Italy called at Lloyd George's Downing Street residence this morning, and an unusual bustle at the headquarters of the various delegations indicated that strenuous efforts were being made to find a common ground for the British and French conferences.

If these fail it seems certain that tomorrow's meeting will end in conference. As far as could be foreseen today, the only hope is in a submission by the French of the new reparations plan, but there is no indication that Premier Poincare contemplates any such action.

Special Cabinet Meeting.

PARIS, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) A Cabinet meeting was called yesterday to consider Premier Poincare's report of the developments at the London conference. The meeting was presided over by President Millerand who came especially for that purpose from Rambouillet. After the meeting a telegram was sent to Poincare informing him that the Cabinet has approved the stand he has taken.

Officials Less Pessimistic.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) Official circles are less pessimistic today, though admitting the gravity of the reparations and other questions, under consideration by the Allied Premiers.

The belief was expressed that a Franco-British agreement with regard to the reparations problem could be arranged if as an official declared, Britain would not regard Premier Poincare's proposals as political and consider them as purely an economic matter aimed at obtaining more money from Germany.

Bull Is Hopeful.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) Italian Foreign Minister Schanzer told the Associated Press tonight, that he thought that there is still a basis for an Anglo-French agreement on the new reparations proposal.

BANK OF CENTRAL AND SOUTH AMERICA SUCCEEDS MERCANTILE BANK OF A.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) The formation has been announced of a bank of Central and South America to succeed the Mercantile Bank of the Americas, which is being liquidated. The new bank with a capital of \$5,000,000 and surplus of \$2,000,000 will take over the Mercantile's share of the affiliated banks in Colombia, Peru, Costa Rica, Venezuela and Nicaragua but not its trading concerns which are held responsible for the Mercantile's financial difficulties last year. The New York bankers charged with the re-organizing of the Mercantile Bank, include E. R. Matthews of J. P. Morgan Company, Walter Frew, Gates McGarragh, W. V. King and W. C. Potter, who will name the directors of the new bank.

ELVEN MISSING FROM CREW OF U. S. RALEIGH; ASHORE.

ST. JOHN'S, New Foundland, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) Contrary to first reports that the entire crew of the British cruiser Raleigh was saved when it grounded in the Belle Isle straits, eleven members of the vessel are missing. Admiral Pakenham with the remainder of the crew have established quarters on the beach coast and are conducting a search for their lost comrades. So far their efforts have been unsuccessful.

MILITARY AND PANAMA CANAL APPROPRIATIONS

Full Text of Act of Congress Pertaining To Local Activities For Fiscal Year 1923 Is Quoted By Morrow

Governor Morrow has issued a circular quoting extracts pertaining to the Panama Canal from the Act of Congress making appropriations for the military and non-military activities of the War Department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923, and for other purposes.

The part of this circular, printed at the Balboa Heights Administration Building, quoting the military and canal appropriations for 1923, is as follows:

Contingencies of the Army

For all contingent expenses of the Army not otherwise provided for and embracing all branches of the military service, \$65,000,000. Provided further, That none of the funds appropriated in this Act shall be used for the payment of expenses connected with the transfer of surplus property of the War Department to any other activity of the Government where the articles or lots of articles to be transferred are located at any place at which the total surplus quantities of the same commodity are so small that their transfer would not, in the opinion of the Secretary of War, be economical.

Quartermaster Corps

None of the funds appropriated in this Act shall be used for the payment of expenses of operating any commissaries other than in Alaska at which the prices charged do not include the customary overhead costs of freight, handling, storage, and delivery, notwithstanding the provisions of the Act of July 5, 1901.

None of the funds appropriated in this Act shall be used for payment of expenses of operating any utility of the War Department selling services or supplies at which the cost of the services or supplies sold does not include all customary overhead costs of labor, rent, light, heat, and other expenses properly chargeable to the conduct of such utility.

Seacoast Defense, Panama Canal

For operation and maintenance of fire-control installations at seacoast defenses, \$10,000.

Medical and Hospital Department

For the manufacture and purchase of medical and hospital supplies, including disinfectants, for military posts, camps, hospitals, hospital ships and transports, for laundry work for enlisted men and Army nurses while patients in a hospital, and supplies required for mosquito destruction in and about military posts in the Canal Zone, \$1,000,000.

Banquet Cases

For paying the Panama Canal such reasonable charges, exclusive of subsistence as may be approved by the Secretary of War for caring in its hospitals for officers, enlisted men, military planners, and civilian employees of the Army admitted therein upon the request of proper authority.

WILL ASK LOAN TO BUILD ROAD TO PORTOBELLO

Deputy Alzupuri Says He Will Ask Assembly For \$600,000 With Which To Construct New Highway

CRISTOBAL, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) Deputy Alzupuri told the Star and Herald today that he was in hopes that with the meeting of the National Assembly on September 1, the sum of \$600,000 would be voted as a loan to complete the road from Colon to Portobello.

"I know that Dr. Porras is with us and that the project has his sympathy," the veteran politician said. "I am sure that the loan will be approved and this will mean the construction of some 25 kilometers of roads linking up Galva, Maria Chiquita and the ancient port of Portobello with the city of Colon."

"This is most productive country and it would open up the coast, not only to agriculture but to the tourist business as well for we would then have one of the finest drives on the Isthmus and it will mean a great attraction to the visitor and that best of all, visitor the man who stays here for some weeks and not for a few hours."

"From this country produce like ivory nuts, coconuts, balata and charcoal could be shipped in great quantities and the Atlantic side shipping business would increase."

"Then there is the wonderful mountain of Cerro Boma with its beach nearby and I am sure that it will mean great things for this side of the project is put through."

The congressman has set his heart upon the construction of the road and has been very active in bringing the matter to the attention of the authorities. Roads have been built and are being built on the Pacific coast.

WEEKS' SECRETARY TO BE SHOWN NEED FOR MEANS OF CROSSING THE CANAL

The recent accident which caused the death of a woman who was crossing the locks at Pedro Miguel with an infant, has re-opened the question of an adequate ferry across the Canal.

The unfortunate woman was walking over the gates with the child in her arms when she fell into the water.

One of the lock attendants plunged in and managed to keep the pair afloat until help arrived and all were extricated. The hero of this occurrence narrowly averted drowning and the woman subsequently died from exposure.

At the Rotary Club meeting yesterday it was decided to call the attention of Assistant Secretary of War Schofield to the great necessity of safe and sufficient transit for individuals across the waterway.

Men familiar with the situation claim that people accustomed to high places or passing over narrow footways, frequently are attacked by vertigo and it is not uncommon to assist persons so affected over the gates.

WOULD INCLUDE THE CANAL IN LEGISLATION

Re-classification Bill Rates Plus 25 Per Cent. Differential Will Be Paid If Adopted—F. E. U. Will Discuss Matter Sunday

The Re-classification bill pending before the Senate of the United States is intended to increase the salaries and wages of employees of the United States Government so as to compare favorably with those being paid by commercial concerns in the United States for similar services and is drawn up to specify what constitutes professional and semi-professional and non-professional occupations, said F. E. U. Goldsmith yesterday.

"It sets out fully the responsibilities and duties to be performed by the occupants of the various grades or positions and designates the salaries which shall be paid for such work, and in some cases provides for two, three or four promotions in the particular grade dependent upon the service and efficiency rating," he continued.

"In all cases where a bonus has been paid for the particular grade, that amount has been included in the particular grade or occupation and in many cases additional compensation of anywhere from 10 to 15 per cent per month is added thereto."

When information was received from Washington of the introduction of this bill, advice was asked of the National Federation of Federal Employees as to what, if any effect the passage of the Re-classification bill would have upon the conditions of the Panama Canal Act, especially with reference to the 25 per cent differential. F. E. U. Goldsmith was advised that the Re-classification bill would not affect the application of the Panama Canal Act.

COCONUT TRADE RAPIDLY DYING SAYS SHIPPER

Export Duty Now Out of All Proportion To Present Market Price Is Sending Business To Other Lands, Is Contentious

CRISTOBAL, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) Conditions in the coconut market on the Atlantic side are worse today than they have ever been, it is declared.

One of the largest exporters told the Star and Herald today he has received a cable which states "Conditions are bad for coconuts in the United States no demand whatever and even at the low price existing in Colon cease buying for the present."

The exporter said that the present price offered farmers from the Atlantic coast is 83 per thousand and at this price there is no profit for the planters who gather the nuts and transport them down to Colon.

Up to March, 1922, conditions were better, the normal price existing then being from 92 to 95 per thousand, but under present conditions unless a better market can be found for the full, the coconut export trade will be in great danger, it is declared.

From San Antonio.

A letter from one of the largest New Mexico coconut shippers says: "I have just received a letter from Captain Wright, now in the United States and he seems quite optimistic regarding the coconut business but he does not believe that it will open up until 1924. He writes that the American manufacturer..."

ANDREWS CHOSEN SUPERINTENDENT OF ZONE SCHOOLS

Lang's Successor Leaves For Isthmus August 25, Cable Says—Wilson To Be Assistant Superintendent In Kuerer's Place

William W. Andrews has been appointed Superintendent of Schools for the Canal Zone, a cable received at the Balboa Heights Administration Building yesterday announced.

Mr. Andrews is not known on the Isthmus. His appointment followed cable instructions to the Washington office of the Panama Canal by Governor Morrow when F. A. Kuerer, Assistant Superintendent of Schools and who was to succeed A. R. Lang as Superintendent, called in his resignation.

Mr. Andrews has never been on the Isthmus and is not known here. Wilson is Assistant Superintendent. Frank E. Wilson, who was appointed to succeed Mr. Kuerer, contrary to expectations, did not get the office of Superintendent but he will come here as Assistant Superintendent in accordance with his original appointment.

Mr. Wilson is scheduled to leave New York for the Isthmus, September 5.

Mr. Andrews, the new Superintendent, sails from New York August 25 according to the cable.

Former Superintendent A. A. Lang sailed for California Sunday on the steamer Ecuador.

NO MEXICAN RECOGNITION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) The hopes of the Mexican officials for the United States Government's recognition of the (Burgess) Government was given a setback today when the State Department announced that the recent Willard decisions of the Mexican Supreme Court does not in the opinion of the Department effectively protect the rights of American land owners.

NEW BORN IN GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) The newly appointed Governor of Bermuda, assumed office today. He succeeds General Sir James Willmots.

END OF WAR IN IRELAND IS IN SIGHT, REPORT

Fall of Cork Expected Shortly As 1,000 Nationalists Land Within Ten Miles of City. Correspondent States

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(By Radio.)—The end of the war in Ireland is in sight and the fall of Cork is hourly expected, says a Free State bulletin from the Irish National Army headquarters, hearing a Cork date line.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) The Evening News' Cork correspondent reports that the end of the war in Ireland is in sight and the fall of Cork is hourly expected.

He said that 1,000 nationalists landed in the west passage of Youghal and Union Hall, and are now within 10 miles from Cork. They are encountering stiff opposition and the battle, which is the biggest of the war is likely to last for many days. The irregulars have a full squadron of cavalry opposing the nationals.

Cable Service Suspended.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) Cable communication between Britain and the United States is suspended as a result of the recent seizure of the cable stations in Ireland by the Irish irregulars, causing the cessation of the remaining cables. The foreign exchange business was almost at a standstill and other trades were also seriously affected.

Many commercial messages were delayed, resulting in wireless communication also. Cable company officials indicated that an appeal to the British Government is considered impracticable since England has adopted a non-intervention policy regarding the conflict in Ireland.

Blow Up Newspapers.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) It has been reported that the irregulars have exploded a tank. The Victoria Hotel, barracks and newspaper offices, are said to have been blown up.

MAN WHO'S PLAYERS.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) Reginald Dunn and Michael O'Sullivan, were landed at the Wandsworth prison at eight o'clock this morning for the purpose of Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson. A crowd of about 100 Irishmen and women assembled outside the prison an hour before the execution took place and the hymns and prayers for the souls of the concerned men.

BANK ROBBER ESCAPED.

BELMONT, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) A band of armed men raided the banks in Kings-Court, vicinity of Caves, and escaped with booty amounting to 2,400 pounds.

ANOTHER DEBT.

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 10.—(By the Associated Press.) Minister of the Interior Berro resigned today in order to be in a position to ask for repatriation or reparations by arms from the Conservative Deputy Sanchez Ayerra, owing to the attack he made yesterday in the chamber on account of the authorization given by Minister Berro for the repatriation of valuable objects given and President Yrigoyen to the purpose of honoring Juan Manuel Berro has called by the Argentine for a duel which he thought of unacceptable.

RED SCHOOL BLUES NO MORE TO BE RED

Educators Plan To Reform the "Little Red Schoolhouse" If Teacher Doesn't Like It She Can Sit On a Tack

NEW YORK, Aug. 10. By the Associated Press.—Add to the list of idols smothered in the cradle by the efficiency of modern science the quaint institution of American rural life, the "little red schoolhouse" now downgraded by educational experts of Columbia University as a danger to national progress.

Experiments conducted for the past year in a tiny school in Warren County, N. J., have proved to Dr. Fannie Dunn, of Teachers College, Columbia, that the problems attending the evils of the "little red schoolhouse," as Dr. Dunn calls it, can be solved by the same methods that have brought progress in teaching the young of the cities "how to shoot."

Forty-four pupils attended the typical schoolhouse in Warren county, which was seven miles from a trunk line railroad, two miles from a post office, and out in the open country. A single teacher was forced to instruct eight grades. There are still 50,000 similar schools in the United States, just Kenyon L. Butterfield, president of 10,000 teachers, Columbia educationists say. They hope to cut the number to 10,000, changes that rural education that will end the semi-appraisal, revolutionary to plant of the modern schoolhouse.

Americans who remember the rural, plaster-cast of a meaner that was exacted of every country schoolboy who was forced to read the little red schoolhouse 20 years ago, are reminded for those one-teacher institutions that will remain. This restricted movement about the room, the installation of pupil helpers for the teacher, a more "teach-by" spirit among the youngsters, and the application of the "automatic" idea in teaching the children to gain a large part of the education themselves from the school library, are part of the new plan evolved from the Warren County tests.

Despite Whittier's legend of the famous schoolboy of the "little red building," whose feet of tan boot-takened splendid health, Professor Thomas W. Wood of the Eye Sight Conservation Council of America, who is interested in the experiments, says that 87 per cent. of the pupils in rural schools in New York state have health defects, as opposed to 72 per cent. of unhealthy city children. In the whole United States, Dr. Wood says, 15,000,000 of the 21,000,000 school children have health defects.

So appressing are the faults of country schools, the expert says, that much of the suggestion of the cities results from the inability of the schools to make country life attractive. Efforts are now being made through meetings at Columbia of such educators as Miss Churlis, from a post office, and out in the open country. A single teacher was forced to instruct eight grades. 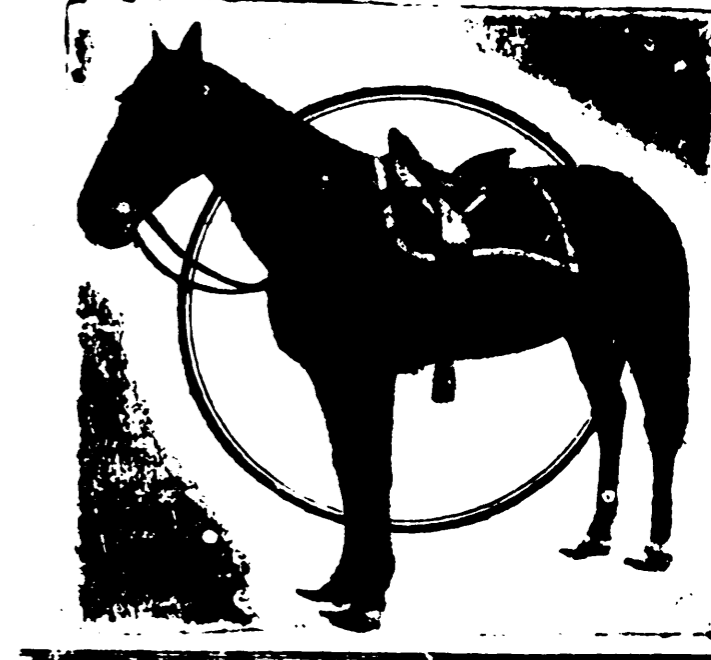

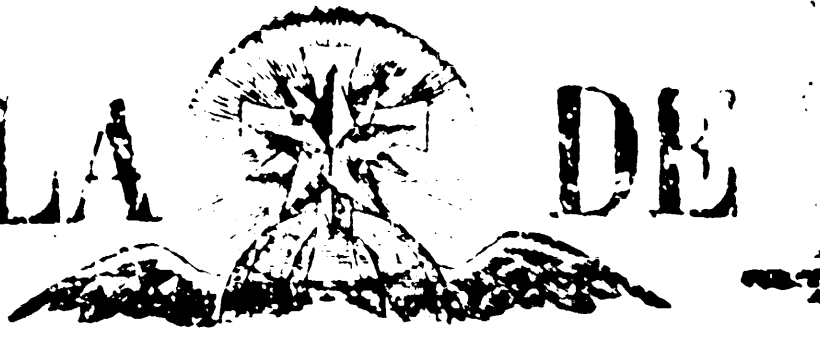

La comunicación cablegráfica entre Inglaterra y E. E. U. está difícil

Londres, Agosto 10. Un despacho de Cork para The Evening News dice: "Esta próxima el final de la guerra en Irlanda. La caída de Cork es segura y se cree que no demorará."

Se asegura que miembros de las pas. nacionales han desembarcado y están ahora a unos 10 millas de Cork. Esta situación a una resistencia firme al avance y se está desarrollando una batalla que será la más grande de la guerra en Irlanda y probablemente durará muchos días. La comunicación cablegráfica entre la Gran Bretaña y los Estados Unidos se ve sujeta a demoras de diez o veinte horas a causa del reciente terremoto de estaciones cablegráficas en Irlanda por los revolucionarios irlandeses, causando una interrupción de cables. Las operaciones del cambio extranjero están casi paralizadas y otros negocios han sido afectados también. Las personas que nos dispensan el honor de leerme día a día, habrán podido observar que no somos dados al pesimismo, y que más bien tenemos marcada tendencia a ver el mundo y las cosas a través de un prisma de bondad. Yo sé que este mundo que habitamos fue el mejor de los mundos. Por lo que respecta a nuestro amado terruño hemos creído siempre correlativamente, que si algunas cosas malas hay en él, iguales y acaso peores existen en otros pueblos análogos más todavía, pues más de muchos es consuelo únicamente de tortos, siempre nos ha venido la idea de que en desventura irregularidad o deficiencias en la vida pública y administrativa, lejos de ser incorregibles irán desapareciendo poco a poco. Incapaz de seguir al señor Duncan en sus elucubraciones, que solo han servido para fortalecer en el público sensato la impresión de culpabilidad y demostrar cómo se halla de atormentada su conciencia, me limitaré a manifestarle que después de las observaciones que siguen, yo no entraré en polémica alguna con él sobre un tema que ya ha sido amplia y judicialmente debatido.

El Secretario Duncan no ignora que lo esencial en el juicio de que se trata es que él compraba en los comisaratos de la Zona del Canal a pesar de la prohibición contenida en la ley 28 de 1919, ni nega, antes bien lo confiesa expresamente haber hecho compras en esos lugares; pero pretende defenderse alegando que estaba autorizado para ese efecto. Toda persona imparcial tiene que convenir con justicia en que si el Secretario Duncan compró en los comisaratos hasta el 11 de Septiembre de 1920, según se ha demostrado plenamente y él lo admite, fue con violación de la ley 28 de 1919, que comenzó a regir en esta ciudad el 19 de Marzo del propio año, pues la teoría del doctor Lombardi de que sus disposiciones no eran obligatorias por que no estaba reglamentada en el país de ser un sofisma que el mismo debe haber repudiado ya, procurando olvidarlo para siempre.

Arguye también el señor Duncan que la nota de clandestinidad que existe en su caso y que de consiguiente no hay delito, supuesto que él estaba autorizado para comprar en los comisaratos y tenía cuenta corriente en ellos, con lo cual no hace sino repetir argumentaciones lógicas debidamente rebatidas en la audiencia. Con efecto, la carta del Presidente Lefevre, que el señor Duncan estima su escrito, no podía concederle una autorización que la ley le negaba, porque esta, que es la declaración de la voluntad soberana, estaba por encima de aquel, y así tendría que resolverse la Corte en cumplimiento de su deber. En la tocante a la intrusión clandestina, como puede haber dudado alguna vez el señor Duncan nunca llenó los requisitos establecidos por la misma ley ni pagó los impuestos correspondientes al Fisco? ¿O es que el Secretario Duncan consumía vorazmente en la propia Zona del Canal, o en los mismos comisaratos, los artículos que allí compraba? En verdad que esto parece inverosímil, pues ya se ha visto que no eran helados ni pastillas lo que él compraba, sino azúcar, manteca, platos, cuchara, etc., etc., por valor de más de doscientos balboas mensuales. Por lo demás, la clandestinidad debe entenderse en relación con las autoridades de Panamá y no con respecto a las de la Zona. Las últimas estaban enteradas de lo que ocurría con el señor Duncan, pero las primeras, a excepción del señor Lefevre, que cometió un error, no lo sabían.

En la discusión judicial yo me he atendido a los cargos delictivos contra Alvarado en los autos de procedimiento, y así lo habré hecho cuando abogado en un caso. Con respecto a la columna esos cargos son dos, de acuerdo con el enjuiciamiento. No es que yo haya dividido el delito, como dice el señor Duncan; de ser esto posible, la división sería obra suya, pues el título de proceder se funda precisamente en los cargos señalados por la acusación. Con referencia a la injuria he dicho que en este caso se la hace consistir en lo mismo que constituye la columna, y por eso he sostenido que no existe, porque yo creo que no pueden coexistir los dos delitos, como lo afirma el señor Duncan.

Alvarado dijo que el señor Duncan se presentó al comisarato de

para el señor Duncan no debería haber diferencia alguna entre ordenar y comprar, desde luego que la cuestión, moralmente considerada, juzgándola desde el punto de vista del honor, viene a dar el mismo resultado, es a saber, el propósito manifiesto, la intención declarada del señor Duncan de comprar en los comisaratos contra expresa prohibición de la ley. En cuestiones de honor no hay términos medios.

Las razones legales que yo he adducido en defensa del Diputado Alvarado permanecen en pie, con toda la fuerza que los da la verdad, plenamente demostrada. Tratada nuevamente la parte sustancial del asunto, debo terminar aquí, porque me es imposible darle a este escrito la extensión que tiene el del señor Duncan. Pero antes de hacerlo, quiero sugerirle una idea al Secretario Duncan, y es la de que abra en El Tiempo una encuesta entre los abogados de la ciudad sobre los siguientes puntos:

1. Cuando comenzó a regir en la capital la ley 28 de 1919, publicada en la Gaceta Oficial número 3066 de 29 de Febrero del mismo año; 2. Que valor legal tiene la carta del Presidente Lefevre para el Secretario Duncan, en que le manifiesta que personalmente no se opone a que le vendan en los comisaratos de la Zona; 3. Si es o no cierto que se ha infringido la ley citada al comprar en los comisaratos después de su vigencia, así como el artículo 86 del Código Fiscal, introduciendo reclamaciones, pero no los hubo; 4. Y al país mercaderías que no han pagado el impuesto comercial. Aclarados estos puntos, lo demás es obra de computaría, como vulgarmente se dice.
