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### FASCISTI GROUP FORMING IN MEXICO

Investigation By Press Reveals That Movement in Jalapa is Aimed At Suppression of Radical Elements

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 17. (By the Associated Press.)—Newspaper investigation here reveals that the Jalapa movement to organize a Fascist will be doubtless followed in Mexico City and all important cities in the republic, although the society is as yet merely in an embryonic state.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17. (By Radio.)—The steamship Paris, carrying M. Clemenceau, former French Premier, is expected to reach quarantine at midnight, docking in the morning. M. Clemenceau is reported to be in the best of health and enjoying the trip.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. (By Radio.)—Political leaders in the House of Representatives have decided to take up the ship subsidy bill next Thursday, providing for three days general debate with a final vote on December 20th.

### TO SUBSTITUTE BURNETT CITY OF HONOLULU

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. (By Radio.)—The Shipping Board steamer President Harrison has been assigned to the Los Angeles Steamship Company to replace the City of Honolulu burnt in the Pacific Ocean three weeks ago.

### DRAFT OF NEW TREATY BETWEEN U. S. AND PANAMA MAY BE READY FOR MORROW'S O. K. IN DECEMBER

State Department Officials Have Been Studying Conditions on Canal Zone and Gradually Shaping New Agreement Which Will Be Submitted To Canal Zone Governor's Examination Before Being Submitted To Senate or Panama Government For Ratification

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. (By the Associated Press.)—It was announced here this morning that the new treaty with Panama is expected to be completed during December. Governor Morrow will then return from the Canal Zone and resume his conferences with the State Department on the conditions of the proposed new agreement.

Since President Harding's message to Congress calling attention to the need for a new agreement with Panama, State Department officials have been studying conditions on the Canal Zone and gradually shaping the new treaty. Governor Morrow was associated with the drafting of the original, but had to depart before matters relating to the Canal Zone were taken up. Therefore he will return here to examine the draft before it is submitted to the Senate and the Panama Government for ratification.

### TO CONSIDER CHANGES IN INTERNATIONAL LAWS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. (By the Associated Press.)—The State Department announces the appointment of John Bassett Moore as American representative on the International Commission of Jurists to consider changes in the rules of international law.

### MAYOR REGULATES OPERATION OF MOTORCYCLES

Motorcycle Operators Must Pass Examination Before Panamanian Examiners in Order To Operate Within City Limits

Alcalde Leonidas Pretel has issued Decree No. 20 of 1922 under date of the 14th inst. and effective today which is of much importance to motorcycle operators within the limits of the city of Panama. The essential parts of the decree are as follows:

Article 1.—In order to operate a motorcycle the operator must provide himself with a license issued by the Alcalde after examination by the Examiners of Motorcycle operators.

Article 2.—The examiners referred to in the preceding article are named by the Alcalde and have the right to collect \$ 1.50 for each examination. For the license \$ 1.00 must also be paid the Municipal Treasurer.

Article 3.—The examinations will consist of questions and points agreed upon by the Alcalde and the examiners considering the letter and spirit of the respective law.

Article 4.—The provisions of Decree No. 8 dated the 2nd of March of the present year which this article in motorcycles and operators, especially Article 26 which fixes the speed limit at twelve miles per hour.

Article 5.—The following examiners of motorcycle operators are named: Agustín Arias P. and Victor Chacon who must take charge jointly.

Article 6.—This decree will be in force and effect on the 18th of November, 1922.

### Gov. Neff Asked to Protect Mexican Folks in Tex.

MARTIN, Texas, Nov. 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—Immediate protection for Mexican nationals at Breckenridge, Texas, was requested this afternoon by Secretary of State Hughes in a telegram to Governor Neff. The message said that the Mexican Government had complained that its citizens at Breckenridge are threatened and that the Mexican Consul had been told by the Mayor that he "could give them no protection." Governor Neff replied that state troopers have been dispatched to investigate the situation and protect the citizens.

### Dr. B. P. De Castro To Conduct School For DEAF AND DUMB

Himself Afflicted With This Defect He Will Instruct To Others No Afflicted Scientific Instruction He Has Received

Dr. Benjamin F. de Castro, well known Panamanian deaf-mute has been appointed principal and teacher of the public school for the deaf and dumb soon to be established here.

Dr. de Castro will be glad to teach such pupils evenings between the hours of seven and nine excepting Saturdays, Sundays and other holidays. He requests all afflicted to apply at once.

He states that there are many of these unfortunate in the Republic, entirely uneducated and objects of pity and further there are no schools for them in all of Central America, Colombia, Ecuador, Venezuela nor the West Indies.

There are about fifteen known deaf and dumb people at present in the Republic of Panama who will probably take advantage of the school which has the support of the Secretary of Public Instruction, the Sub-secretary and Miss Maria Requena.

Dr. Castro who resided in the United States for 14 years graduated with high honors about seven years ago receiving two gold medals. He was profuse in expressing his thanks to President Porras for establishing the school when seen last night.

### Far Eastern Republic Joins Soviet Russia.

BERLIN, Nov. 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—The newspaper Neue Faber has received a dispatch from Moscow quoting the Russian Telegraph Agency's China correspondent to the effect that the government of the Far Eastern Republic today unanimously decided to dissolve the republic and make it a part of Soviet Russia. It adds that a revolutionary board of seven members has been established and that Moscow delegates to the All-Russian soviet congress have been selected.

### PANAMA GOVT. ASKED TO PROTEST AGAINST RULING OF P. R. R. Co.

Panama Agencies Co. Protest Against 25 Cents Carriage Rate, Claiming They Can Do Same Work For Two Cents

In connection with the question of the transportation of liquor between Colon and the Orizaba freight house it is understood that representations were made to the Superintendent of the Panama Railroad yesterday protesting against the charge made for carriage.

Article three of the National Prohibition Act, it is said, provides that liquor may be carried over the Zone but only in case the Panama Railroad is the carrier. The Company therefore takes the position that liquor must be transported in its equipment for the entire distance including the short distance from the boundary line between Colon and Orizaba, and the freight house.

Won't Stand Comparison It is contended by the merchants that the Railroad Company arbitrarily makes a charge of twenty-five cents for carrying a barrel of a freight car and the same ruling could be applied with as much reason to a wheelbarrow or other vehicle.

It is also claimed by the interested parties that the charge of twenty-five cents for carrying a fifty pound package the distance of fifty feet is not comparable when compared with the charge of twelve and a half cents for hauling the same package the distance of forty odd miles, that is, 25 cents from the boundary line to the freight house and 12 1/2 cents from the freight house to Panama.

The Panama Agencies Company has forwarded a memorial to the Secretary of Foreign Relations which explains the attitude of the merchants. A few translations reads:

### COPIAPO ROCKED 3 TIMES YESTERDAY

El Mercurio's Correspondent in Devastated Area Reports Death List Continually Increases As Ruins Are Uncovered

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 17. (By the Associated Press.)—Advised from Copiapo report three strong earth shocks during the night, shaking down the half demolished buildings and throwing the inhabitants into terror.

Death List Grows Daily SANTIAGO, Nov. 17. (By the Associated Press.)—A correspondent of the Mercurio arrived at Humbero Baje this morning and found only two hours spending. The death list is the lower numbers twenty-six. The inhabitants have all fled to the hills, following a telegram from Santiago on Thursday quoting an astronomer's prediction of another quake. The correspondent proceeded on her way to Valparaiso and reports 200 dead in the city. He declared that the number is continually increasing as fast as the ruins are uncovered. Re-occupation has not in on a number of the bodies threatening an epidemic outbreak.

### TURKISH SULTAN FLEES TO MALTA TO ESCAPE KEMALISTS DECISION TO TRY HIM ON TREASON CHARGE

Sultan Appeals To British Commander-in-Chief To Help Him Leave Constantinople—On Boarding British Warship Sultan Emphatically Declared That He Was Not Abdicating But Merely Removing Himself From Danger—Kemalists Undecided As To How Trial Will Be Held

### "Drys" See Victory in Results of Elections.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—A summary of the results of the Fall elections issued yesterday by the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals of the Methodist Episcopal Church shows that "Seventy-nine per cent were re-elected to the House of Representatives and 221 'drys' were elected and seventy-two 'wets'." The "drys" also gained three votes in the Senate. In Ohio there was a majority of 107,000 against beer, and California passed its home dry law by a majority of 60,000.

### ROTARY STRIVES TO CREATE CLING FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN

Surgical Staff of Santo Tomas Hospital Fully Capable of Caring For Children Afflicted With Remediable Deformities

Crippled Panamanian children will soon have the advantage and chance of cure that similar unfortunate in the United States have.

A special committee comprising R. K. Vile, Stanley Dandon and Leopoldo Anselmi of the Panama Rotary Club have been investigating the matter and have reached the conclusion that the condition of such children is entirely feasible.

After consulting Major Edgar A. Booth, Superintendent of Santo Tomas Hospital, who is also President of the Rotary Club, it developed that the opportunity is present and measures leading to the alleviation of the suffering of many children will be taken at once.

Good Surgeons Available The Santo Tomas Hospital surgeons are amply qualified to care for such children and any sufferer has the right to the service the hospital affords free of charge to those without the means to pay.

### Will Form New Gov. to Succeed Wirth.

BERLIN, Nov. 17.—(By Radio.)—Wilhelm Cuno, general manager of the Hamburg-American steamship line, has accepted the task of forming a cabinet to succeed Chancellor Wirth. It was unofficially announced here this morning.

Chancellor Cuno plans to begin the work of organizing a ministry upon his return this morning from Hamburg, whether he will to adjust affairs in connection with his position as director-general of the Hamburg-American Line. Cuno has prepared to organize a " cabinet of work" comprising members of the middle and socialist parties. He does not believe that the cabinet can be definitively constituted before Monday.

### MUSSOLINI TALKS PLAINLY TO DEPUTIES

Fascist Premier of Italy Tells Deputies in Unmistakable Terms That He Asks No Favours, Just Demands Them

ROME, Nov. 17. (By the Associated Press.)—Premier Mussolini in his initial address to the Chamber of Deputies today, threw down the gauntlet to that body and indicated in unmistakable terms that he was not there to ask favours but to receive them. "What I am doing today," he declared, "is a formal act of courtesy. For too many years ministerial crises have been settled by the Chamber by political manoeuvres, but the Italian nation has overthrown the Cabinet and given itself a ministry in spite of parliament."

### Outlines Financial Program

ROME, Nov. 17. (By the Associated Press.)—Minister of the Treasury Tangara outlined his financial program in parliament today. Drastic fiscal changes were foreshadowed. Minister Tangara stated that in consequence of the agreements with Britain and the United States, the Italian treasury hoped to shortly resume its former position.

He detailed the program of economies by which he expects to balance the budget in the course of three years and informed the parliament that the Italian treasury deficit amounts to 9,000,000,000 lire, 4,000,000,000 lire for 1922 and 5,000,000,000 lire for 1923, according to the present estimates. The treasury intends to put into execution the principle of bringing expenditures back to prewar standard while aiming to keep up revenues to post-war figures.

### Gets Confidence Vote

ROME, Nov. 17. (By the Associated Press.)—The Chamber of Deputies today voted confidence in the Government by a ballot of 206 to 116.

Premier Mussolini and his Government were bitterly attacked during his speeches in the Chamber presided by the vote of confidence, by deputies Turati, Conti and Nicolucci, leaders respectively of the Socialist, Republican and German groups, raising two hours wild disorder during which such insults and threats of violence were hurled that former Italian President Benito Mussolini threatened to resign as President of the Chamber.

In a forceful half hour speech, the Premier announced his foreign and internal policies and warned his adversaries that the Fascist Government is permanent. He affirmed his strength to enforce the law and demanded full powers for a policy of action and not words. His speech was received with cheers, although he threatened to dissolve the parliament. Even the Socialists failed to greet the new government with their usual demonstration. Premier Mussolini then made a speech to the Senate and returned to the Chamber which shortened the list of orators at his request.

### RECORD OF VOTES CUTS 7 LEADS MAJORITY 90

BOSTON, Nov. 17. (By the Associated Press.)—A record of the senatorial vote in the last election, shows a gain of 90 votes for Cullen, the democratic candidate.

### ADMIRAL SIMS RETURNS FROM PORT HOPE

PORT HOPE, Nov. 17. (By Radio.)—Rear Admiral Sims retired, and Mrs. Sims returned here today on his native town for the first time in fifty-four years.

**INDUSTRIAL CONDITIONS SHOW IMPROVEMENT IN UNITED STATES**


WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. Increased employment in fifty-six of the 65 leading cities of the United States was reported today by the Department of Labor in a statement which said:

"Employment has picked up in all sections of the country and shows a healthy and encouraging condition existing today. The oil industry shows marked improvement in the Southwest; silk mills are experiencing livelier revival in the Middle Atlantic states; the iron and steel industry as rapidly recovering everywhere, although a car and labor shortage seems to be holding operations up and employment is a 75 per cent production.

"Railroad shops are increasing, though being held back in some sections of the country from showing large gains in employment due to the continuance of labor controversies on some lines. One of the features of the month's survey is the continued steady employment offered to the building trades throughout the entire country.

"Highway construction programs are still under way, taking care of a tremendous amount of common labor, while large municipal programs are on foot, with every indication of their continuance throughout the winter months, the weather conditions permitting.

At the present time we sell large quantities of Panama rum prepared by Diers and Ulrich in Colon which we transport to Panama by means of the railroad referred to.

The Panama Railroad refuses to accept the liquor brought from the stores to the freight house in privately owned vehicles, and insists that its own trucks be used for this purpose, at a cost of 25 cents per case.

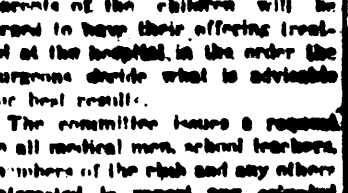

### RIFLE MATCHES FOR THE WINTER SEASON

After the greatest outdoor rifle season on record, riflemen have turned their attention to the indoor ranges and several thousand are now shooting the 22 calibre in the 6th annual championship matches of the National Rifle Association. The matches began on November 12 and will continue until next spring, some 33 rifle competitions for teams and individuals being carried to the later part of April. If there are ties for the championships as there was this season, it may be the middle of next summer before we know the winners.

This should be the banner year for indoor rifle shooting for there are more ranges than there were a year ago. Incidentally there are a number of matches for beginners in this year's program, and this should help. There are certain team matches, too, in which a certain number of beginners must be used. This forces clubs to make an effort to get new members, to pull them into their clubs. The junior will be the same as last year, the official having to be recognized by the N. R. A. In military schools and colleges the prize must be a commissioned Army officer.

All the matches will be at 50 and 25 feet. No effort is being made to get teams who shot in the 50 foot matches to compete, or vice versa. It will be necessary for all teams to choose a unit.

During the period from November 12 to December 9 the standing, kneeling, sitting and prone team matches at 75 feet, and the standing, kneeling, sitting and prone team matches at 50 feet, will take place. December 1 to December 23 the beginners' individual matches at 50 and 75 feet will take place. The individual standing championships on January 7, the kneeling championship on January 14 and prone championships on January 21.

The National Rifle Association grand aggregate matches at both distances will be shot from December 31 to January 27, as will the military team match. The civilian inter-club championship, 50 and 75 feet, inter-collegiate, high and military schools' championship will be shot between February 6 and March 3, and the individual 50 and 75-foot championships between March 4 and 24. The individual qualification matches will begin April 1, the Aet-Cup match March 25 and the military team and individual championships March 4.

The present individual champions at 50 and 75 feet are J. H. Ladd of Birmingham, Wyo., and T. K. Lee of Birmingham Ala.

Many world's records were made in the shooting last year and we haven't any doubt but that some more will be made this season.

RUBBER ROADS

London is shortly to be the scene of a new type of road surface. Experiments have now been conducted for some years with a view to discovering an entirely new type of surface which will be equally suitable for horse and for motor traffic. If the rubber road just put all the claims made for it, it will not only solve the noise problem which has been baffling experts for years but will reduce the wear and tear of all forms of road transport vehicles to a minimum. It is also anticipated that the rubber block will give about 15 years' wear which is about double that of concrete paving.

In the endeavor to find an ideal road surface, engineers have experimented with some novel materials which include such wondrous substances as iron glass and cork. Cast-iron used in conjunction with concrete, forming what may be described as an armored road has been tested for some time past in France. A road of this type has been laid at Lyons and has proved quite satisfactory having proved exceptionally heavy traffic with a minimum amount of wear.

From road makers have also produced a glass road surface which has been found to possess certain advantages and has been tested in France. The surface is composed of a material consisting of waste glass such as old broken bottles. This material is crushed and subjected to a heavy pressure in molds. The blocks are thus rendered very tough and extremely durable, and owing to the gritty nature are not liable to become slippery through wear or in wet weather. They are moreover capable of resisting a pressure of four tons to the square inch. The cost at the time of the first tests was found to be equal to that of concrete.

Civil engineers have also obtained good results with concrete paving blocks. They have been found to possess the advantage of being non-absorbent and therefore not liable to expand and contract when laid in areas of non-slippery when wet.

The most important question is the present time is that of providing surfaces suited not only to the nature of the traffic passing over them but to be particularly suitable where extra strain is imposed. For example, during the busiest hours, omnibuses pass charging down the number 508 push up, or approximately an every 3 seconds.

This fact provides an interesting instance of localized road deterioration "hot holes" are chiefly caused by concussion. The stopping and starting of heavy vehicles and the constant strain caused by changing gear at the heel and foot of inclines wears away the hardest road surface in a short time. Moreover, at the point where two different types of roads meet a ridge is often formed owing to the different level of the surface. Consequently traffic passing over the point with a bump and lumps on the lower surface with considerable impact, the continual pounding speeds causing "pot holes" and other irregularities.

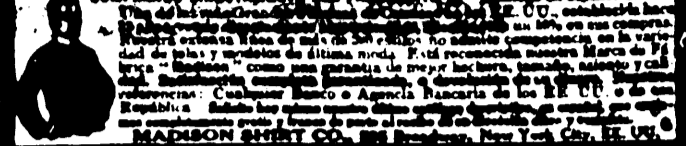

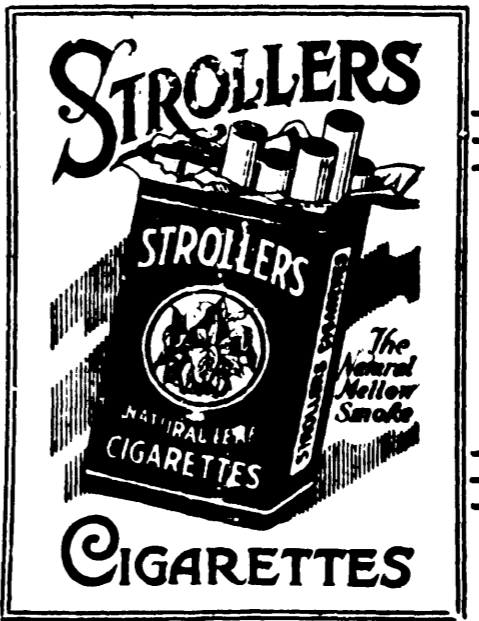
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
