Everglades City School faculty and students extend their thanks to the Conservancy of Southwest Florida and the Walmart Foundation for this wonderful opportunity.

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


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Recipe for Good Eating

Pineapple Upside-Down Cake

Ingredients:

1/2 Pineapple (peeled & cored) 6 TBS Unsalted Butter 3/4 cup Light Brown Sugar

1 ½ cups Flour (all purpose) 2 tsp Ground Cardamom

1 TBS Dark Rum

½ cup Pineapple Juice (unsweetened)
2 TBS Dark Rum to drizzle over cake

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350°. Slice pineapple into 3/8-inch pieces (use already peeled and cored for ease). Melt butter in a well-seasoned cast-iron skillet. Add brown sugar and simmer for about 4 minutes. Remove from heat and place pineapple slices in a ring on top of sugar mixture.

In a large bowl, sift together flour, cardamom, baking powder and salt. Separately, beat softened butter with an electric mixer, gradually beating in granulated sugar. Add eggs, one at a time and continue beating. Add vanilla and rum, then half of the flour mixture. Continue beating at low speed until just blended. Beat in pineapple juice, then the rest of the flour mixture. Pour over pineapple topping in the skillet and bake for approximately 35-45 minutes (until golden brown and tester comes out clean). Let cake stand for 5 minutes and transfer (inverted) onto a serving plate. Drizzle dark rum over cake. Serve warm. Delicious!

Low interest rates are disappointing for retirees dependant on interest income to meet their cash flow needs. The Fed announced that rates will remain low. Meanwhile, economic growth is less than robust, investors are anxious about oil prices and banks are tightening credit to many Eurozone countries.

To overcome this, a creative financing maneuver emerged. Neither the Fed nor The European Central Bank (ECB) can directly rescue or bailout Greece, Italy, Spain or Portugal. What our Fed can do is offer lines of credit under so-called swap agreements. The ECB provides low cost funds to Europe's banks who then buy high-yielding bonds from Greece, Italy, Spain, Portugal, etc.

We can't control inflation or the stock market. We can control how we prioritize investments and expenses. Stay focused and invest accordingly.

Fishing Report

March has always been known for being a windy month. However, it does mark the beginning of improved fishing

for Tarpon and Snook. If the weather has been warm for a few days, Tarpon will show up and feed. Snook have not shown up out front, but some large ones are being caught in the backcountry. Tom Richardson fished with Capt. Steve Huff and released a 21-lb fish last week. Last month Redfishing was spotty for me; some days produced good fish, but there were lots of days you could only catch "rats" or undersize fish. Trout fishing on the other hand has been great on both the oyster bars in the backcountry and on the grass flats out front. Pompano and Jacks are being caught while drafting for Trout. Some of these Pompano are large. On my last charter we caught several nice Tripletail and Mackerel. At this time of year, all sorts of catches are possible. Some of our winter fish like Sheepshead are still here and Spring fish like Tarpon are just waiting to move in. As we get into the month we should see improvement across the board.

The Living Gulf Coast

Crested Caracara (Caracara cheriway) Other names: Mexican eagle, Mexican buzzard, Audubon's caracara / Status: FL = threatened, IUCN = LC / Length: 19.3-22.8 in. (49-58 cm) / Wingspan: 47.2 in. (120 cm) / Weight: 2.3-2.9 lb (1-1.3 kg) / Life span: to 17 years / Nests: in interior mainland SW Florida, predominately around Okeechobee / Found: Glades, Hendry, Charlotte counties, mainland / Months found: (lower case indicates nesting season) ifmamiJASONd.

Although it looks more like an eagle and feeds like a vulture, the crested caracara is actually a member of the falcon family. Its large size and long, bright yellow legs make it an unmistakable sighting and a great subject for photography. Its unusual name is an onomatopoeic version of its froglike grating call, cara, cara. The caracara is widespread throughout Mexico, the Caribbean,

and the northern edge of South America, from Ecuador through Guyana. It is an uncommon sighting in Florida where the population estimate is roughly 500 birds. The consensus is that the Florida population is in decline because of the continued expansion of large citrus farms into its woodland habitat. The only other North American populations are in Arizona and Texas, where it is also fairly uncommon.

The best places to look for these large and picturesque birds are along rural highways where it loves to perch atop fence posts and forage near open pastureland or agricultural fields. It is most common around Lake Okeechobee but can also be found near Immokalee along State Road 29 or the back roads of Hendry and Glades counties.

The caracara is a carrion eater and will often harass black and red vultures until they relinquish a road-kill to this aggressive bird. Because the caracara feeds on carrion, the front portion of its face is devoid of feathers much like vultures. The caracara also preys upon reptiles, birds, and mammals when given the opportunity.


WILLIAM STANLEY BROWN



Art, fishing, and the call of open water have always been an integral part of Bonnie's life since her husband and sons are all former commercial fishermen. While "snow birding" in Florida, Bonnie was introduced to the ancient oriental art form known as Gyotaku, meaning "fish rubbing" in Japanese.

TAXING THINGS



About Capital Gains and Losses



Did you know that almost everything you own and use for personal or investment purposes is a capital asset? Capital assets include a home, household furnishings and stocks and bonds held in a personal account. When you sell a capital asset, the difference between the amount you paid for it and its sales price is a capital gain or capital loss.

Here are 10 facts from the IRS about how gains and losses can affect your federal income tax return.

- $\underline{\mathbf{1}}$. Almost everything you own and use for personal purposes, pleasure or investment is a capital asset.
- $\underline{2}$. When you sell a capital asset, the difference between the amount you sell it for and your basis which is usually what you paid for it is a capital gain or a capital loss.
- 3. You must report all capital gains.
- <u>4.</u> You may only deduct capital losses on investment property, not on personal-use property.
- 5. Capital gains and losses are classified as long-term or short-term. If you hold the property more than one year, your capital gain or loss is long-term. If you hold it one year or less, the gain or loss is short-term.
- **<u>6.</u>** If you have long-term gains in excess of your long-term losses, the difference is normally a net capital gain. Subtract any short-term losses from the net capital gain to calculate the net capital gain you must report.
- <u>7.</u> The tax rates that apply to net capital gain are generally lower than the tax rates that apply to other income. For 2011, the maximum capital gains rate for most people is 15 percent. For lower-income individuals, the rate may be 0 percent on some or all of the net capital gain. Rates of 25 or 28 percent may apply to special types of net capital gain.
- **<u>8.</u>** If your capital losses exceed your capital gains, you can deduct the excess on your tax return to reduce other income, such as wages, up to an annual limit of \$3,000, or \$1,500 if you are married filing separately.
- $\underline{9}$. If your total net capital loss is more than the yearly limit on capital loss deductions, you can carry over the unused part to the next year and treat it as if you incurred it in that next year.
- <u>10.</u> This year, a new form, Form 8949, Sales and Other Dispositions of Capital Assets, will be used to calculate capital gains and losses. Use Form 8949 to list all capital gain and loss transactions. The subtotals from this form will then be carried over to Schedule D (Form 1040), where gain or loss will be calculated.

For more information about reporting capital gains and losses, see the Schedule D instructions, Publication 550, Investment Income and Expenses or Publication 17.

Florida Tales Acrefoot Johnson Part 3

Last part we were left that Acrefoot had completed the first leg of Ft.Meade to Ft. Ogden, leaving behind in the dust old Ed Donaldson. Donaldson, he may have been an Indian Fighter at one time but being a fighter and staying in a Fort or Post and getting not much exercise. James farmed part time and was in good shape for the walking position and the Indian Fighter wasn't, the mail must get there on time or the contract could be lost. Acrefoot had spent the night with his family and was ready to start back

when he ran into Ed Donaldson. Donaldson said well "I guess you gave up and couldn't go anymore and it looks like I'll win this race and get the job". Acrefoot said "No ED, it's you the one that has lost the job, I'm on my way back to Ft. Meade". James had started out riding his horse but it was just too rough of country to travel by horse back. He then started walking the route twice a week. He would make it to Ft. Meade drop his mail pouch off of letters. He would walk an extra 12 miles to Bartow to spend the night with his sister just to keep from paying the 25-30 cents for a bed at the hotel. A place called Cock Crow, his sister would make him a big breakfast of a dozen eggs, buttermilk biscuits, and almost a bucket of grits. He would put the extra food in a (hoe sack or a lard can he also carried to keep his clothes dry when he had to ford a creek or river) to eat on the way, He also cut a few swamp cabbage to help ward off the hunger pains till he could get to the next settlement. He also took special orders from people that wanted him to pick up in town, Ft. Meade or Ft. Ogden and deliver them for a little extra cash. Some of his route was what was called the Wire Road. It was constructed by the International Ocean Telegraph Company and ran to Punta Rassa to Cuba by underwater cable. This is the cable that the sinking of the Battle Ship Maine would be transmitted to Punta Rassa. He would turn towards the settlements to pick up and deliver mail to places like Joshua Creek, Gumhead, Cow pens, Crewsville and Bereah. He did his job so well on foot he earned the Name Acrefoot for which everyone knew him by, either from his large Shoes or the giant stride he could maintain at a steady 8 miles per hour. A VISIT TO EVERGLADES NATIONAL PARK

Part II Fishing by Dave Gibson

I rise early before the sun anxious to begin my Florida Bay fishing adventure. After a few obligatory shore bird pictures and a hot shower, I meet my parents whom I've invited to join me. It brings tears to my mother's eyes imagining their daughter and my sister Sue at this very place a decade ago. There is no trace of the motel that Sue



and I stayed at, which was wiped out by Hurricane Wilma in 2005, as we make our way to the marina.

I have arranged for two days of charter boat fishing with Capt. Dean Steffen, Chokoloskee, FL, (239) 695-4370, who is on time and ready to depart. The only way I could convince my mom of joining my dad and I this morning was to agree to her terms of allowing her to purchase eyeglasses for me. Wanting her to enjoy a new experience, I acquiesce knowing that I will need them for my driver's license eye exam in May. Having never worn glasses before, I'm later tested at a "Magoo-like" 20/80 in one eye and 20/200 in the other and considered illegal to drive. Thanks to my mom, peoples' children and pets on Nederland roads will now be a bit safer! The motorists between Tampa and the Everglades don't know how lucky they were.

We turn west to a spot known as Clubhouse Beach. We land a few small crevalle jacks and spotted sea trout before moving on. The next locale is occupied by another craft that's pulling in nice fish. We angle the perimeter still into only small ones. With barely a tug on my dad's line, he wrests aboard a mighty 6 inch lizardfish slightly larger than the shrimp that it just engulfed. Fishing has gone from fair to worse with dad's trophy the butt of jokes for the next few days. Suddenly my mom has a real arc to her rod and hauls in a 3 lb. bluefish – the best catch of the day! Heading back for lunch, we cruise a waterway through the mudflats passing a small flock of flamingos along the way. The afternoon brings two 17 ½ red drum and decent trout action above the sea grass.

The following day we begin fishing inside the Cape Canal to an incoming tide. We anchor beside an offshoot channel and the bite commences immediately! After a few undesirable but fun catfish, 2 lb. to 3 lb. black drum take our bait one after another. Dad lands the only sheepshead of the trip that's teeth look like that of humans' or sheep. Captain Dean hooks into a big fish thrashing in the shallows when he hands me the pole and grants me the privilege of bringing it in! A sleek black-lined monster snook is admired and released. Eventually the fishing slows and flocks of least sandpipers swoosh above our heads. A peregrine falcon dives into one bunch of birds only to come up empty. We can do no wrong today and try a different area landing yet more sizable black drum. A bald eagle alights on its nest and ospreys, night herons, and a lone American crocodile greet us back at the marina.

The morning's fishing was phenomenal and it is hard to imagine the afternoon being any better. We set up by one of the nearby keys and cast our shrimp-baited jigs toward the mangroves slowly retrieving our offering along the bottom. With the warming waters the red drum bite is on with the fish all measuring, like the day before, 17 1/2". There is a slot limit on red drum with only fish between 18" and 27" allowed as "keepers." We land 3 or 4 within the slot. Now, almost every other cast results in a bite or a fish. Casts closest to the mangrove roots in a particular sheltered cove produce the most. Running out of a gross of shrimp our captain warns of the impending close of our adventure. Told that I have just a few casts left, I target another curve in the shore to the other side of the boat. I cast and quickly retrieve until I achieve the perfect lob next to root structure. At last my jig drops just inches from the mangrove to a tug on my line. Another jerk and I set the hook into what feels to be a giant fish! Rod bent precipitously, it strips line trying its best to get away! After repeated runs and working the fish to keep my line out of the propeller, I bring him beside the boat and give the order to net it. Aboard, it glistens in the sun when I lug it high in the air. At this size, red drums are known as bull red drums and at all of 8 pounds, 28 1/2", this one must be released. After a few pictures the captain revives the fish in the murky water, lest it become shark food, and with a few wags of its tail swims away. The only thing that would have made this day better is if my sister Sue was here to enjoy it with me.

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
