Police have 'person of interest' in attempted murder

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A 29-year-old man was injured early Tuesday after multiple shots were fired into his Eustis home.

Bradley Bishop was shot in the leg and airlifted to Orlando Regional Medical Cen-

ter, according to Eustis police.

Investigators have identified another 29-year-old man, Andrew "Smurf" Woodruff, as a "person of interest" in what they call an attempted homicide.

The shooting hap-

pened around 5:30 a.m. Tuesday in the 100 block of Kensington Street. Officer Robert Simken, police spokesman, said a number of people were in the home when multiple shots were fired into it, but only Bishop was shot and no motive has

been developed. "It is unknown at this time if it was random weapons fire or motivated," Simken said.

No further details on

the shooting were provided.

Police cordoned off the area and searched for the shooter with the help of police tracking dogs, but were unable to find the suspect.

Classics coming to Wooton Park

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The Antique Boat Museum in Clayton, N.Y., which houses the largest collection of antique and classic boats in North America, wants to open a satellite location in Tavares.

A letter of intent to lease two structures at Wooton Park — the trail head storage building and a picnic pavilion — will be considered tonight by the Tavares City Council.

According to Bill Neron, the director of economic development and grants for the city, the Tavares location, if approved and developed, will be an adjunct facility of the larger museum.

Neron said the letter of intent for a lease is "the very, very initial stage."

He added after the letter of intent is agreed upon, there will be a six-month window for the museum to do preliminary activities such as

fundraising, coming up with cost estimates, examining the facilities, and coming up with early architectural renderings. After that, if the museum still wants to develop there, they will then have to agree to a full lease with another six-month time frame in

order for them to come up with final architectural and construction plans.

Neron added the museum will be renovating the two existing structures into museum space.

Staff has recommended the approval of the

letter of intent, according to documents from the city.

Neron said the addition of the museum is a good idea because it is a "very unique facility that will bring visitors to downtown Tavares and it just fits in with our whole waterfront capital city."

Board makes changes to school standards

ORLANDO — Florida education officials on Tuesday tried to end a long-simmering debate over what its school standards should be and how schools should be graded.

The State Board of Education unanimously adopted a handful of changes to the "Common Core State Standards" that came in the wake of a political backlash, particularly from conservatives and Republicans. Proponents say that standards were weakened in some states in response to No Child Left Behind, which penalized schools where one or more groups of students did not make adequate yearly progress, as measured by graduation rates, test

scores and other factors.

The state board also heard a presentation from Education Commissioner Pam Stewart on an upcoming overhaul the state's signature A-to-F school grading system that was put in place 15 years ago by former Gov. Jeb Bush.

The changes to the Common Core standards weren't major. In Florida changes include 13 clarifications in English language arts, including adding cursive writing as a requirement for students in the second through fifth grades. Kindergarten and first-grade students would be also required to "identify" an author with prompting and support, as opposed to simply "name" the author of a text. Still board member Andy Tuck

Legendary aircraft to touch down in Leesburg

Some of history's most legendary aircraft will visit Leesburg International Airport on Monday for the first stop of the 2014 Commemorative Air Force AirPower History Tour.

This is almost a repeat performance for people who missed another vintage airplane event, the national Wings of Freedom tour, that came to the airport last month.

Monday's event will bring together classic war birds and other historic planes for an up-close look, cockpit tours and

memorable rides. Aircraft arrive at noon and will be on display through Wednesday, when they head off to Sarasota.

The collection features "FIFI" — a flying B-29 Superfortress. This type of large, silver bomber first took flight in 1942 and primarily was used in the Pacific Theater during World War II.

Nearly 4,000 of the four-engine, 99-foot-long aircraft were built before production stopped in 1946. The aircraft's most notable members included the "Enola Gay" — the first plane to drop an atomic bomb

in Hiroshima, Japan. The B-29 named "Bockscar" dropped a second atomic bomb over Nagasaki, Japan.

Also featured will be the P-51 Mustang, which was among the most iconic fighters in World War II and later served in the Korean War. The British military originally commissioned the North American Aircraft Corp. to develop this sleek, single-engine plane in 1940.

Original versions were widely used for low-level flying and combat because of limited

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said he believes they will eventually make Florida a role model.

"I think because of the development of these standards we will have states over the country trying to implement our standards," Tuck said.

The benchmarks for learning language arts and math were adopted by Florida in 2010 and have been approved by more than 40 other states. The standards were developed by a coalition of state leaders and establish what a student

should know to be prepared for college and the workforce.

In Florida and elsewhere, the standards have been criticized as being part of a federal intrusion into state education.

"Instead of listening to teachers, administrators, school districts, school boards and parents, the state is proposing minor cosmetic changes that don't address the real concerns of everyone involved in public education," Florida Education Association President Andy Ford said in a statement.

In response, Gov. Rick

Scott ordered hearings on the standards. The state fielded more than 19,000 comments from teachers, parents and others. The result was 99 proposed changes, including 37 clarifications to the current standards, 60 new standards, 52 of which are for calculus, and two deletions.

In regard to the new statewide assessment and grading system, Stewart said she remains "on track" to make a decision in March. It will replace its existing tests which are primarily known as the FCAT.

Those changes would go into effect next

school year.

Stewart's plan removes items that automatically cause a school's grade to drop. The plan also eliminates SAT scores and certain graduation rates from the complex formula used to evaluate high schools.

"We think it is truth in advertising," Stewart said of the plan. "We aren't giving a false impression of how our kids are performing."

Nearly half of Florida's high schools received an A grade for the past school year, amid an ongoing debate over the accuracy and complexity of the grading formula.

he said.

He added it will help make Tavares more of a destination.

In the 40 years since its founding in Clayton, the museum has built up a substantial waterfront campus that encompasses 4.5 acres of public program space, 1,900 feet of dockage and 1,300 feet of St. Lawrence River shoreline. The 10 buildings on the campus contain 29,000 square feet of exhibit space and 33,000 square feet of public programming, collections storage, archives, library and administration space.

The museum features a collection of more than 320 antique and classic boats among thousands of recreational boating artifacts. The exhibits and programs are supported by 20,000 square feet of boat collection storage located a short distance from the museum's main campus

Frederick H. Hager, executive director of the Antique Boat Museum, emphasized the preliminary work in Tavares is an exploratory phase.

"This first step was to find a home, a potential home, everything has to come after that," he said.

Hager said the exploratory phase will include getting "a better understanding of what kind of support there would be in the community."

He added they will have to figure out the business plan and the ability to raise funds for the project.

Hager added in a perfect scenario, a very small opening could take place this coming winter, and if everything went well, museum officials could make an announcement in the fall.

He said the boating activity in the area as well as existing supporters in the area helped draw interest to Tavares.

"There's a lot of boating activity, a lot of indigenous boats from that area, there's a deep and rich history of boating in Central Florida," Hager said.

Lou Ronca, a member of the Sunnyland chapter

of the Antique and Classic Boat Society and a donor of the Antique Boat Museum, said the Tavares facility would be much smaller than the museum facility in New York. He stressed that it was still premature to provide specific details and it was still early in the process of looking into the possibility and community support for the potential Tavares facility.

Ronca said the museum has been looking throughout the country and Canada for several years at potential satellite facilities.

He added the community for such a facility exists in Tavares.

"This has become a mecca for old boats," Ronca said.

The lease would be for 10 years with the opportunity to renew the lease for an additional 10 years, according to documents from the city of Tavares. The documents state the museum would have to spend a significant amount of money on reconfiguring the structures and the city would own them after the lease ends.

The museum would also have to pay \$80,000 so the city could replace the buildings the museum will be taking, according to documents from the city of Tavares.

The rent will be only \$1 a year, but according to Neron, there is value for the city in the renovations that will be done to the structures to make them museum quality.

"From humble beginnings as a riverside gathering of antique boat enthusiasts, the Antique Boat Museum has evolved into a national institution which makes substantial economic and cultural contributions to Clayton, the North Country region (of New York) and the preservation of North America's maritime heritage," the museum states on its web site.

The museum also hosts an annual Antique Boat Show and auction which has become the longest running show of its kind in North America.

Allison engines. Then military forces began building the planes with much more powerful, Packard-built Merlin engines that excelled over the war in Europe. Within five years, more than 50 countries around the world incorporated the P-51 Mustang into their aerial fleets.

Also on display will be the C-45 Expediter was used in World War II as a multi-engine trainer and as a capable transport vehicle. The U.S. military used more than 4,500 of these military versions of the popular Beechcraft commercial planes between 1939 and 1945.

Another plane on the tour is the Stearman Speedmail, an open-cockpit biplane from the 1930s. Only 40 of the big "square-tailed" Model 4's were created by the Kansas-based Boeing-Stearman Aircraft Co. They were sold as executive and mail transport planes originally priced at \$16,000.

Admission to the AirPower History Tour is \$10 for adults, \$5 for ages 11-17 and free of kids 10 and younger. The price includes a free B-29 cockpit tour.

Let's say that in a given case

you're the opening leader against a

suit contract and you decide to lead

from a holding of A-K-x-x of a side

suit. Let's also say that your partner-

ship agreement is that you lead the

king from such holdings.

Now let's suppose that in the same

situation you hold the A-K alone. In

that case, according to standard con-

vention, you would lead the ace fol-

lowed by the king to indicate a doubleton. You hope partner can then gain the lead and play a third round of the suit for you to ruff.

This brings us to the accompanying deal where West led the A-K of diamonds, on which East played the 2-3 and declarer the 5-6. West then shifted to a low spade, expecting his partner would win with the ace and return a diamond for him to ruff.

But South won with the ace, drew trumps and finished down only one (200 points) instead of down two (500 points), which would have been his lot had West led a club instead of a spade at trick three.

East complained bitterly, contending that West should have led a club at trick three. He argued that if he had held the ace of spades, he would have played his jack of diamonds on West's king at trick two as a suit-preference signal, indicating that he had an entry in spades. This would be in keeping with the standard agreement that the play of an unnecessarily high card in this type of situation is a signal for the higher-ranking side suit to be led.

By extension, East argued further, his play of the three of diamonds — a low card — asked for a club lead at trick three.

East was right.

Sinkhole or drainage problem?

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Residents of the Hartwood Reserve subdivision in Clermont, where a supposed sinkhole opened up Monday, wonder if a drainage problem is to blame instead.

The 15-foot-wide and 4-foot-deep hole, first spotted Monday morning at the intersection of Powderhorn Place and Peaceful Valley Drive, is only about 100 feet away from another

10-foot-wide and 10-foot-deep hole that opened up at the subdivision last July because of an underground leak.

"It's more like road erosion, that what we (some residents) are deducing, because this hole happened on the same street just a short ways from the other one, almost one year ago," said a resident of the subdivision who did not want to be identified. "If you look at it from the

Man arrested after falling asleep during alleged break-in

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A 26-year-old Umatilla man, suspected of trying to burglarize at least two stores early Saturday, was captured later that morning after a third victim discovered him sleeping on her couch and clutching a knife, according to Mount Dora police.

The woman called police, who came to her Mount Dora home in the 400 block of Highland Street about 8 a.m. and reportedly found the man still sleep. Officers said they were able grab the weapon from his hand before he woke up and arrested him.

Duane Timothy Immich was jailed on a number of charges, including armed burglary, possession of burglary tools,

criminal mischief and grand theft.

He remained in the Lake County jail Tuesday on no bail.

The woman told police when she arrived home, she found a case of beer missing from her refrigerator and an open beer on the living room table, her stove had been used and cooking items from her home were found in a nearby parking lot.

Mount Dora police said when they questioned Immich, he told them he had been to a bar the night before, where he had met the homeowners and "crashed" on their couch.

Murder convict gets new sentencing

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Evidence of a family history of sexual assault, physical abuse and alcoholism was presented Tuesday by the new defense lawyers of a former death-row inmate, granted a new sentencing hearing after his 2003 murder conviction of a Mount Dora woman.

The Florida Supreme Court vacated the death sentence for Eric Lee Simmons two years ago in the murder of 48-year-old Debbie Tressler, after citing that his lawyers during the initial sentencing hearing failed to fully investigate and present mitigating evidence, including his low intelligence, a brain injury suffered as a child and substance abuse.

According to testimony presented last week, Tressler, a Sorrento woman, was last seen calling for help from a car driving on State Road 44 on Dec. 1, 2001. Two days later, her body was found beaten, stabbed and raped in a wooded area in Sorrento, and witnesses identified Simmons' car as the one that had Tressler in it. DNA evidence was found in his car.

Simmons, who was living in Mount Dora at the time of the murder, also was sentenced to life on the rape charge in the first trial and the defense is hoping that jurors will come back with a life sentence on the murder charge in the current hearing.

Music death suspect compared self to rape victim

JACKSONVILLE — The Florida software designer accused of killing a black teenager during an argument over loud music compared himself to a rape victim, telling his fiancée in a recorded jailhouse phone call that

the police were trying to blame him for the shooting when he was only defending himself.

In a series of taped phone calls and jailhouse visits released Tuesday by prosecutors, Michael Dunn also expressed surprise at the media attention his November 2012

shooting of 17-year-old Jordan Davis outside a Jacksonville convenience store had drawn and expressed confidence that he would be exonerated once a jury heard all the facts.

Dunn, 47, was convicted Saturday of three counts of attempted

second-degree murder for shooting at three of Davis' friends who were all inside an SUV, but the jury hung on a first-degree murder charge for Davis' death. Dunn, who is white, has argued that he fired at Davis after the teen threatened him

standpoint of mainly the drains, this hole is lower than where the last one was. It's like the water is coming down the road and overflowing and the drain is not able to handle it so it just collapsed."

Austin Evans, another resident, said he wonders the same thing, because oftentimes while walking his dog, which he does at least twice a day, he sees water build-up on the top of the roadway that won't go down the drain.

"The water settles on the road there," he said. "Not all of it goes down the drain and sometimes there's so much you can't walk on it (the sidewalk). You have to walk around to

get back onto the sidewalk," Evans said, pointing to the corner of Powderhorn Place and Peaceful Valley Drive, where Monday's gaping hole is now taped off.

Bechtol Engineers from DeLand were called to the scene on Monday after the sinkhole appeared near a bus stop on that corner and workers have been monitoring it since.

Project Manager Tim Rogers, who was there Tuesday, said the hole has not grown since initial measurements were taken on Monday. He noted that sinkholes, which can open up anywhere, have a tendency to grow deeper or wider.

However, Rogers could not rule out a sinkhole or blame the problem on a drainage issue at this time.

"We're pumping it with flowable fill and stabilizing it so we can go down and see what's going on," he said. "Once the fill is hardened, we'll be able to dig some holes to take samples of the dirt down below it to see what the strata is like; to see if there are any hollow spots down there and see how we can fix it."

Clermont officials said a city worker was sent out to monitor the filling because it is near an 8-inch water main pipe.

"A Clermont city worker will be on the

scene at the water control valve during pumping so that if there are any breaks in the line, the water can be shut off right away," said spokesperson Dorris Bloodsworth in a press release.

The sinkhole is in a private gated community and a member of the subdivision's Homeowners Association Board has had Clermont police at least twice remove print and television reporters from the scene.

That worries Miles Hensley, a resident just five houses down from the latest hole, because he wonders what the HOA Board has to hide.

"This directly affects me and I know that the last hole stood open for about six months before it was fixed," Hensley said.

Another resident who did not want to be identified said she was worried about the potential for home depreciation if additional holes open up.

"We'll have to wait and see, but what I and a lot of my neighbors don't want is to see the value of our homes go down no matter what it is causing these holes to happen here," she said. "It also has me on edge because every little noise the house makes has me wondering if it's not something happening under the ground."

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Nun imprisoned for nuke protest

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — An 84-year-old nun was sentenced Tuesday to nearly three years in prison for breaking into a nuclear weapons complex and defacing a bunker holding bomb-grade uranium, a demonstration that exposed serious security flaws at the Tennessee plant.

Two other peace activists who broke into the facility with Megan Rice were sentenced to more than five years in prison, in part because they had much longer criminal histories of mostly non-violent civil disobedience.

Although officials said there was never any danger of the protesters reaching materials that could be detonated or made into a dirty bomb, the break-in raised questions about safekeeping at the Y-12 National Security Complex in Oak Ridge. The facility holds the nation's primary supply of bomb-

grade uranium and was known as the "Fort Knox of uranium."

After the break-in, the complex had to be shut down, security forces were re-trained and contractors were replaced.

In her closing statement, Rice asked the judge to sentence her to life in prison, even though sentencing guidelines called for about six years.

"Please have no leniency with me," she said. "To remain in prison for the rest of my life would

be the greatest gift you could give me."

She said the U.S. government was spending too much money on weapons and the military, and she told the judge about the many letters of support she had received, including one from youth in Afghanistan.

"This is the next generation and it is for these people that we're willing to give our lives," she said.

Rice, Greg Boertje-Obed and Michael Walli all said God was

using them to raise awareness about nuclear weapons and they viewed the success of their break-in as a miracle.

Their attorneys asked the judge to sentence them to time they had already served, about nine months, because of their record of good works throughout their lives.

Rice is a sister in the Society of the Holy Child Jesus. She became a nun when she was 18 and served for 40 years as a missionary in western Africa teaching science.

Walli's attorney said the activist served two tours in Vietnam before returning to the U.S. and dedicating his life to peace and helping the poor. Walli said he had no remorse about the break-in and would do it again.

"I was acting upon my God-given obligations as a follower of Jesus Christ," he told U.S. District Judge Amul Thapar.

and raised a shotgun or something that looked like one after he asked the teens to turn down their rap music. No shotgun was found in the SUV.

Dunn is facing 60 years in prison when sentenced and State Attorney Angela Corey says she will retry him on the murder charge, which carries a potential life sentence. A phone message left for Dunn's attorney, Cory Strolla, was not immediately returned.

In a December 2012 phone call with his fiancée, Rhonda

Rouer, Dunn compares himself to a rape victim, saying the detectives wanted to blame him for the shooting, not Davis and his friends. Inmates at the Duval County Jail are warned that all phone conversations and visits will be recorded and can be shared with prosecutors except for those with their attorneys.

"So not to wallow in, you know, despair or anything, but you know I was thinking a lot about this today and I was like I'm, I'm the victim here," Dunn told Rouer. "I was the one that was being preyed upon and I fought back."

"And then, you know, it's not quite the same, but it made me think of like the old TV shows

and movies where, like, how police used to think when a chick got raped, 'Oh, it's her fault because of the way she was dressed.' Yeah, and I'm like, so it's my fault because I asked them to turn their music down," he said in a laughing voice. "I got attacked and I fought back because I don't want to be a victim and now I'm in trouble. I refuse to be a victim and now I'm incarcerated."

Dunn then told Rouer that he had no motive to shoot Davis other than self-defense. Apparently referencing his engagement to Rouer and his son's wedding, which he had attended right before the shooting, he said his life had been "perfect."

started the second week of the Lake County courthouse re-hearing, the testimony of Dr. Michael Cunningham, an alleged expert in clinical and forensic psychology, took up most of the day. He presented a slideshow of Simmons' family tree, and how more than a dozen members between the suspect and his grandparents were either sexually abused by family members or sexually assaulted others.

One family member allegedly sexually assaulted a farm animal.

Cunningham also testified that as a sleeping child, Simmons became tangled in some blankets and was taken to a doctor, who said he had been deprived of oxygen during the incident. As a result, Simmons displayed slower cognitive abilities and had difficulty controlling his moods, Cunningham said.

Simmons, a high school dropout, was always behind in school, including reading at a second-grade level at the age of 13, Cunningham testified. He said while Simmons' IQ was tested at 72, it was probably more like 68.

"That's in the mental retardation range," Cunningham said.

Cunningham noted that Simmons' family has had a history of

alcohol abuse, including his father, who was convicted for a shooting death that stemmed from a 1981 bar fight. Simmons himself started substance abuse at an early age, stealing sips of alcohol from his father's beer and marijuana from an uncle's stash, Cunningham said. It got to a point

where, as an adult, Simmons started drinking more and would even take beer with him in the shower, the doctor testified.

"If not at work, he had a quart of beer in his hands," Cunningham said.

The jury was sent home for the day about 5 p.m. Tuesday and

prosecutors are expected to start their cross examination of Simmons sometime this morning before recalling one of their radiology expert witnesses.

It is not clear if Simmons will take the stand in his defense, but closing arguments are expected to start this afternoon.

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Shortage of execution drugs becomes more acute

ST. LOUIS — The nation's shortage of execution drugs is becoming increasingly acute as more pharmacies conclude that supplying the lethal chemicals is not worth the bad publicity and the legal and ethical risks.

The scarcity of drugs for lethal injections has forced states to scramble for substitutes. And experts say that whatever alternatives are found will almost certainly face costly court challenges made more complicated by laws that cloak the process in secrecy.

On Monday, the Tulsa, Okla.-based compounding pharmacy the Apothecary Shoppe agreed to stop selling pentobarbital to the Missouri Department of Cor-

rections after the pharmacy was named in a lawsuit filed by death row inmate Michael Taylor alleging that the drug could cause "inhumane pain."

Missouri previously paid \$8,000 in cash for each dose of the drug. The settlement will probably mean changing delicate execution procedures just a week before Taylor is scheduled to die for raping and killing a 15-year-old Kansas City girl in 1989. Gov. Jay Nixon said Tuesday that Missouri is prepared to carry out the Feb. 26 execution but declined to elaborate.

Messages left with spokesmen for the corrections department were not returned. The Apothecary Shoppe declined interview requests.

Budget office: Wage hike would lift pay, cost jobs

WASHINGTON — Boosting the federal minimum wage as President Barack Obama and congressional Democrats are proposing would increase earnings for more than 16.5 million people by 2016 but also cut employment by roughly 500,000 jobs, Congress' nonpartisan budget analyst said Tuesday.

In a report containing ammunition for both supporters and opponents of the Democratic election-year proposal, the Congressional Budget Office said gradually raising the minimum from \$7.25 hourly to \$10.10 would lift 900,000 people above the federal poverty level by 2016. That is out of 45 million who would otherwise live in poverty without an increase.

But the analysis also noted a downside: About 0.3 percent fewer jobs, especially for low-income workers; higher costs for business owners and higher prices for consumers.

The study was unveiled as the Senate prepares for a March debate on a plan by Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, ramping up the minimum in three steps to \$10.10 by 2016. The proposal is backed by Obama and is a key-stone of Democrats' campaign-season plans to highlight their effort to make incomes more equitable, but it faces strong Republican opposition and long odds of approval by Congress.

The analysis, which examined increases very similar to Harkin's, immediately added fuel to the partisan dispute over the proposal. It put

authoritative weight behind longtime GOP claims that increasing the minimum wage would cost jobs by forcing companies to spend more on wages, putting Democrats on the defensive.

"This report confirms what we've long known: While helping some, mandating higher wages has real costs, including fewer people working," said Brendan Buck, spokesman for House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio. "With unemployment Americans' top concern, our focus should be creating — not destroying — jobs for those who need them most."

The budget office said its estimate of employment losses was approximate. It said the actual impact would likely range from a very slight employment reduction to a loss of 1 million workers.

"If and when Democrats try to push this irresponsible proposal, they should be prepared to explain why up to a million Americans

should be kept from having a job — beyond the work already lost due to Obamacare," said Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., using a favorite nickname of the GOP's favorite election-year target — Obama's 2010 health care overhaul.

Democrats cited other studies that they said concluded employment would not be reduced. They said job-reduction claims are overblown and outweighed by the benefits to workers and the overall economy as low-paid employees use their higher incomes to spend more money.

The CBO job-loss figures "do not reflect the overall consensus view of economists which is that raising the minimum wage has little or no negative effect on employment," Jason Furman, chairman of the White House's Council of Economic Advisers, said in a blog post with council member Betsey Stevenson. Instead, they emphasized the millions who would gain higher wages and the 900,000 boosted above poverty.

"No matter how the critics spin this report, the CBO made it absolutely clear: Raising the minimum wage would lift almost one million Americans out of poverty, increase the pay of low-income workers by \$31 billion, and help build an economy that works for everyone," said House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif.

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

Riot police move in against main protest camp in Kiev

KIEV, Ukraine — Thousands of police armed with stun grenades and water cannons attacked a large opposition camp in Ukraine's capital on Tuesday that has been the center of nearly three months of anti-government protests after at least nine people were killed in street clashes.

The police dismantled some of the barricades on the perimeter of Independence Square, and many of the protest tents were set on fire. But the 20,000 demonstrators fought back, armed with rocks, bats and fire bombs, and singing the Ukrainian national anthem.

Opposition leader Vitali Klitschko urged the protesters to defend the camp.

"We will not go anywhere from here," Klitschko told the crowd, speaking from a stage in the square as fires burned around him, releasing huge plumes of smoke into the night sky. "This is an island of freedom and we will defend it," he said.

Many heeded his call. "This looks like a war against one's own people," said Dmytro Shulko, 35, who was



heading toward the camp armed with a fire bomb. "But we will defend ourselves."

The protesters appeared to sense that Ukraine's political standoff was reaching a critical turning point after the deadliest violence yet was paralyzing the capital.

As the tents went up in flames, defiant protesters shouted "Glory to Ukraine!" Earlier in the day, protesters attacked police lines and set fires outside parliament, accused President Viktor Yanukovich's government of ignoring their demands once again.

As darkness fell, law enforcement agencies vowed to bring order to the streets and shut down subway stations in the capital. In Independence Square, Orthodox priests prayed for peace.

"We see that this regime again has begun

shooting people; they want to sink Ukraine in blood. We will not give in to a single provocation," opposition leader Arseniy Yatsenyuk told the protesters. "We will not take one step back from this square. We have nowhere to retreat to. Ukraine is behind us, Ukraine's future is behind us."

The clashes dimmed hopes for an imminent solution to the political crisis and fueled tensions that began soaring following new steps by Russia and the European Union to gain influence over this former Soviet republic.

Earlier in the day, thousands of angry protesters shouting "Shame!" hurled stones at police and set trucks blocking their way on fire. Riot police retaliated with stun grenades and fired what appeared to be small metal balls, as smoke from

burning tires and vehicles billowed over Kiev.

Olha Bilyk, spokeswoman for the Kiev city police, told The Associated Press that two policemen were killed, likely by gunshot wounds, in Tuesday's clashes and seven civilians died, including three who were shot.

In addition to the deaths, the Interior Ministry and medics for the protesters said 40 police and about 150 protesters were injured.

Protesters stormed the office of the president's Party of Regions on Tuesday, but police pushed them away. When firefighters arrived to put out a fire, they discovered the body of an office employee, Kiev's emergency services said.

U.S. Ambassador Geoffrey R. Payatt called for dialogue, but also threatened both sides with sanctions.

"We believe Ukraine's crisis can still be solved via dialogue, but those on both sides who fuel violence will open themselves to sanctions," Payatt said on Twitter.

The protests began in late November after Yanukovich froze ties with the EU in exchange for a \$15 billion bailout from Russia.

Two members of punk group Pussy Riot released

SOCHI, Russia — Two members of the punk group Pussy Riot ran out of a police station in their trademark garish balaclavas Tuesday after being released following several hours of questioning in Sochi, the host city of the Winter Olympics.

Nadezhda Tolokonnikova and Maria Alekhina, along with seven others, were detained by police near Sochi's ferry terminal, a popular area for fans celebrating the Olympics, and taken to a police station for questioning.

Police said they were questioned in connection with a theft at the hotel where they were staying. No charges

were filed. Tolokonnikova said the detention was the latest in a series of harassments against the group since Sunday. She said they had been detained for several hours on the previous two days.

Pussy Riot gained international attention in 2012 after barging into Moscow's main cathedral and performing a "punk prayer," in which they entreated the Virgin Mary to save Russia from Vladimir Putin, who was on the verge of returning to the Russian presidency.

Tolokonnikova and Alekhina were sentenced to two years in prison, but were released in December under an amnesty bill.

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Salvadoran sea survivor leaves hospital

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — The Salvadoran fisherman who says he drifted at sea for more than a year left a hospital Tuesday after treatment for the psychological and physical effects of his journey.

Jose Salvador Alvarenga said he wouldn't be returning to his hometown of Garita Palmera, but he did not say where he was headed.

"I'm doing well, thank you," he told re-

porters. "Thank you everyone. God bless you."

He appeared strong and walked on his own, surrounded by family members, doctors and a lawyer.

Alvarenga's story stunned the world when he washed up on a Pacific atoll several weeks ago, seemingly robust and barely sunburned. But turned out to be swollen, dehydrated and in pain from the ordeal.

He said he survived on raw fish, turtles and bird blood and came

close to giving up hope of being rescued after several large ships came near his small fishing boat but none tried to rescue him, even though sailors on at least one even waved at him.

All of the doctors who have seen Alvarenga expressed concern about his mental state, saying he appeared shaken. He asked to be given as much privacy as possible amid an international media furor over his apparent ordeal.

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Libyan militia to lawmakers: Resign or risk arrest

TRIPOLI, Libya — Two Libyan militias called Tuesday for legislators to step down or be detained, an ultimatum that escalates a po-

litical standoff in the North African nation. The head of Parliament refused and called it an attempted coup.

Parliament's term expired on Feb. 7, but lawmakers voted to ex-

tend it with plans to hold new elections in the spring. Since then, hundreds of protesters have held daily demonstrations demanding the legislative body be dissolved.

Rival militias, which wield the real power in Libya, have lined up behind competing political factions in what has become a power struggle between Western-backed Prime Minister Ali Zidan and Islamist factions in parliament that are trying to remove him. Tuesday's ultimatum raised fears the situation could devolve into armed confrontation.

It came a day after Libyans marked the third anniversary of the start of their revolution that toppled long-time dictator Moammar Gadhafi but left

the country with no strong central government or military. Successive governments have relied on former rebels who fought Gadhafi to fill the security vacuum, but the fighters formed armed groups that have gradually turned the country into fiefdoms independent from government authority.

The al-Qaaqaa and al-Sawaaq militias called on the parliament "to hand over power" by 9 p.m., saying lawmakers who refuse to do so will be considered "usurpers" and will be detained. Several militiamen appeared on TV, with one reading out the joint statement.

Opposition leader arrested in front of supporters

CARACAS, Venezuela — Opposition leader Leopoldo Lopez emerged from days of hiding and surrendered to police before thousands of supporters on Tuesday, saying he hopes his arrest awakens Venezuela to the corruption and economic disaster caused by 15 years of socialist rule.

Speaking with a megaphone to more than 5,000 people, Lopez said that he doesn't fear going to jail to defend his beliefs and constitutional right to peacefully protest against President Nicolas Maduro.

"If my jailing serves to awaken a people, serves to awaken Venezuela ... then it will be well worth the infamous imprisonment imposed upon me directly, with cowardice, by Nicolas Maduro," Lopez told a sea of supporters who, like him, were dressed in white to symbolize non-violence.

Lopez was being sought by authorities for allegedly inciting violence during

protests last week in which three people were killed as government forces clashed with protesters. He faces charges including homicide and vandalism of public property. Maduro accuses Lopez of leading a "fascist" plot to overthrow him.

After the short speech, Lopez descended from a statue of 19th century Cuban independence hero Jose Marti, and waving a flower over his head, walked a few feet to a police line, where he turned himself in to face what supporters say are trumped-up charges.

Opposition politicians urged calm as Lopez, still waving, was pulled into an armored vehicle and driven away. A cordon of heavily armed police blocked supporters from marching downtown as they had originally planned.

Hours after the arrest, Maduro addressed a rival crowd of red-shirted oil workers, and said he personally oversaw security forces to make sure the opposition march and Lopez's surrender didn't result in violence.

Caution needed on drone strike

Another American citizen may end up on the Obama administration's "kill list."

The man is in Pakistan. He's allegedly affiliated with al-Qaida and responsible for the murders of Americans overseas.

When asked about the rationale behind a potential drone strike, White House press secretary Jay Carney simply referred the questioner to President Barack Obama's May 2013 speech at the National Defense University in D.C. In it, he discussed the ethics, legality and effectiveness of drone warfare. However, only one component of this triad is under review here: effectiveness.

On Sept. 30, 2011, the Yemeni cleric Anwar al-Awlaki was killed by a drone-launched Hellfire missile in Yemen. He was an American citizen. But he was also an operational commander in al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula (AQAP), where he served as a catalytic force for new recruits and actively plotted the murder of innocent Americans.

Considering the imminent threat he posed, the difficulties that would have attended his capture and the approval of the Yemeni government, the strike on Awlaki was ethical, legal and effective. The possible strike in Pakistan may be ethical and legal as well — but would it be effective?

Pakistan's official attitude on drone strikes is almost incomprehensibly inconsistent. For example, in 2008 then-President Asif Ali Zardari secretly cobbled together a list of "high-value" drone targets with American officials. Less than a year later, he pleaded for the United States to relent. In December 2011, Pakistani generals revamped their drone policy, pledging to fire upon unauthorized aircraft. At his inauguration ceremony last summer, Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif demanded an immediate cessation of drone strikes.

Is this neurotic status quo sustainable? What happens when the political pressure becomes too great? According to Pew Research, only 5 percent of Pakistanis support drone strikes. The Pakistani government is on the cusp of renewed talks with the Taliban, so leaders have asked the United States for a drone hiatus. Now may not be the time for a highly publicized assassination.

Here's the most confounding, frustrating aspect of this saga: According to reports, U.S. officials know where the al-Qaida operative is hiding. Why can't we point to his cave or compound and let the Pakistanis deal with him? Perhaps they can use one of the F16s we sold them.

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

Michele Bachmann: Undeterred and undiminished

With less than a year left in her fourth and final term in Congress, it's a little early for an exit interview, but not too early to get the views of Rep. Michele Bachmann (R-MN) on issues dear to a "founding mother" of the Tea Party movement and on how to beat Hillary Clinton in 2016, if the Democrat decides to run.

Bachmann remains confident and resolute despite many political setbacks. We met in her office while much of Congress was fleeing the Capitol Building ahead of a major storm that eventually dumped a foot of snow on Washington. The snow was a big deal to residents of the nation's capital, but little more than flurries to a Minnesotan like Bachmann.

Bachmann is made of sterner stuff and has time and time again stood up for her social and economic principles, refusing to compromise on them despite sometimes strong opposition from within her own party's leadership.

She retains her Christian and conservative worldview, calling it a "grid" through which she sees everything. I note that a majority of her colleagues and much of the rest of the country seem to have a different "grid" and cite as examples the growth and cost of government and the failure of conservatives to slow what they regard as the cultural slide.

"That's the reality we work in, but so what?" she says. "That doesn't deviate from my responsibility ... but you continue to have to go forward, even if you don't see the results."

Why does she think little has

stopped the cultural slide, even when Republicans control all three branches of government, as they did for a time during the George W. Bush administration?

"It's because of their worldview," she responds, implying it isn't enough to be a Republican, or even conservative. For a truly conservative agenda to advance, she believes, voters will have to send to Washington more people with a biblical worldview. That is a difficult task, given the growing secularization of the country, especially; it appears, among the young. She acknowledges "politics is downstream from culture. It merely reflects what is going on (in society)."

If Republicans nominate a male presidential candidate in 2016, how should he run against Hillary Clinton, if she is the Democratic nominee?

Bachmann was the only female GOP candidate in the race when she ran for president in 2012. She says, "Two things that need to be done: Remind people (Clinton) is seeking to become commander in chief (and look at) how she has operated in the past with these types of responsibilities. She was in charge during the Benghazi debacle. If a person reads the Senate Intelligence (Committee) report and the House Foreign Affairs (Committee) report released (last) week, it is damning

for Hillary Clinton."

Bachmann says Clinton testified before Congress that she was "aware" of the deteriorating conditions in Benghazi but did nothing. "She has a real problem when it comes to Benghazi," says Bachmann. Clinton, she adds, must answer for what happened.

In addition, she says, Clinton is "the godmother of Obamacare," trying "behind closed doors" to push through something similar when Bill Clinton was president.

Maybe such an approach will work, but would the lure of the "first female president" overcome these concerns in voters' minds? Bachmann says: "Effectively she would be Obama's third and fourth term in office." That might scare enough people to vote for the Republican nominee.

Bachmann says a lot of people "aren't ready" for a female president. "I think there was a cachet about having an African-American president because of guilt." (Presumably she means because of slavery and the lengthy denial of civil rights to blacks.) "People don't hold guilt for a woman," she says, adding that while people vote for women for virtually every other office "I don't think there is a pent-up desire" for a woman president.



She says while Obama was "new and different," Hillary Clinton has been around a long time and is less likely to stir the juices as Obama did.

It may be time to test that theory.








NATIONAL WEATHER FOR FEBRUARY 19, 2014

Lake Minneola, Eustis on to regional finals

Lake Minneola was no slouch on defense either as the Knights (19-10) struggled to get the ball across midcourt against the Hawks ball-hawking trapping defense.

Both teams struggled to score in the second

period, although Ocala Vanguard was able to narrow the deficit to 13 points with the aid of an 8-2 run midway through the quarter and went into the locker room at halftime trailing 42-29.

Neither squad was able to make a real move in the third period as Marcus Dodson hit two shots to compliment Anthony Brown's 10-point effort in the period to give Lake Minneola a 56-41 ad-

vantage going into the final stretch.

Avery Brown, overshadowed in the first 3 periods by his twin brother's scoring binge, guided the Hawks at the end as he made 2 early baskets on nifty drives and then was sent to the free throw line by the Knights where he was a perfect 10-for-10 over the last 3-1/2 minutes as the Hawks ran out the clock for the 74-66 victory.

In Eustis' win, Kiron

Williams scored 20 points as the Panthers improved to 22-7 with the win.

Coy Patterson and Antwon Clayton added 13 points apiece for Eustis and Jaylon Graham dropped in 12.

Eustis will be looking for its first Final Four appearance under coach Mike Bowe. Lake Minneola will be vying for the first state semifinal in school history.

Wise wins on halfpipe for another American gold

KRASNAYA POLYANA, Russia — David Wise considers himself a dad and husband first, a freestyle skier second.

That might be why he also became an Olympic champion.

Soaring through sloppy snow and sleet, Wise won the first gold medal in the young sport of halfpipe skiing Tuesday, outclassing a field in Sochi that had trouble with the slow, waterlogged conditions.

Sightlines were less than per-

fect on the first true soaker of a night at the action-sports venue, but not so bad that Wise couldn't look down from the top and see his wife, Lexi, and the rest of his family members cheering at the base of the halfpipe.

Many of them were holding big pop-out pictures of his 2-year-old daughter, Nayeli, stapled to wooden sticks.

"To see that face looking back up at me was cool," Wise said.

After placing a heart-shaped rock Lexi gave him into one

pocket, the 23-year-old from Reno, Nev., dropped into the halfpipe and scored a 92 — a mark that held up to beat Canada's Mike Riddle by 1.4 points.

Kevin Rolland of France took bronze.

That podium pretty much went to form, a fact not lost on Wise or any of the others, who have watched expected results in other action sports at these games get shuffled — partly because of conditions and maybe because of pressure. Shaun


A call from a friend at the track meant Rick Hilliard got the news a few minutes before everyone else. He locked himself in the office of the bar he owned and cried with a friend. As word spread, patrons emptied the building, sobbing as they walked to their cars.

Dale Earnhardt died on the last lap of the Daytona 500 13 years ago today — long

enough, Hilliard figures, for a new driver to take on the number and the success Earnhardt enjoyed at Daytona International Speedway.

"I know he wouldn't have wanted to see the No. 3 buried," said Hilliard, 59, the owner of the First Turn Lounge in Port Orange, which is filled with memorabilia recalling the life and legend of a man he wasn't intimidated to call friend after

meeting Earnhardt at another local restaurant in 1982. "It's time to do it."

Not everyone feels the same, and the sight Sunday of 23-year-old rookie Austin Dillon capturing the pole for the Daytona 500 in Earnhardt's iconic No. 3 brought a range of emotions for NASCAR fans.

Randy Davis, 53, of St. Petersburg said the return of the No. 3 felt like a slap in the face to the Earnhardt family and race fans, who continue to pack the infields and grandstands at NASCAR races while displaying his number.

"The man died in it," said Davis, who is camping in the infield for the 500. "It should be retired."

For others, the blow was softened by the fact that Dillon is the

grandson of team owner Richard Childress, who owns the rights to the number on the racing circuit and enjoyed so many triumphs with Earnhardt.

"I am glad it stayed in the family," said Lane Duple, 64, of Co-coa, who has attended 49 consecutive Daytona 500s and recalls the normally rowdy infield fell quiet that day 13 years ago and how fans later flocked to the fence near where Earnhardt had crashed to place memorials.

Afterward, there was speculation the number would remain in the Earnhardt family. Dale Earnhardt Jr. raced the No. 3 on a few occasions with the permission of Childress but decided he couldn't do it anymore.

"You just don't grab the car keys off the counter and go run out the door and haul down the road with your dad's car," he said in an interview with

ESPN in 2010. "I didn't do it when he was alive, and I won't do it now."

Asked last week about the return of the No. 3 car, Earnhardt Jr. said, "People know what it means to them and that's all that's important. I don't really tend to spend a lot of time thinking about it. I'm quite comfortable with how it's going down. I'm glad it's back. It was going to come back eventually. I think everybody knew that."

Only the most hardcore fans remember Childress raced in the No. 3 car before handing the wheel over to Earnhardt and now his grandson, who was asked about the importance of respecting the 3's legacy.

"I think Dale was so important in driving that number," he said. "He was the guy that made that number what it is today. But like I said earlier, Dale Earnhardt is Dale Earnhardt not only because of the number, but be-

cause he was a hero and created so many things for this sport. The number, for me, hopefully, I can continue the legacy that it has and keep on moving on with it."

As he fired up some bacon in the Speedway infield Monday, Mike Stewart, 55, of Ocala was another who found it disrespectful to Earnhardt's legacy to not retire the black car, dismissing the move as a ploy to make money.

"They should have left it buried with Dale," Stewart said.

But as Dillon leads the pack this Sunday in the 56th running of the 500, Hilliard is convinced the one man whose opinion would matter most will be looking down and smiling.

"He wouldn't want it not to be there," Hilliard said. "I know he'll be saying, 'That's great.'"

Gomes' beard is gone, his hunger remains

FORT MYERS — It's time to cut off all that Boston beard talk.

For Jonny Gomes, it wasn't too stressful to get rid of the bushy growth that flourished along with his team last season.


"I mean, no one died," he said Tuesday with just a patch of light-brown hair below his lip remaining. "We're going to be all right."

Looking much younger than his 33 years, the outfielder arrived at spring training after having his beard shaved off on national television last Wednesday. Some Red Sox teammates from last year's club that won the World Series were shocked at his new, almost unrecognizable appearance.

He looks like "a freshman in high school," right fielder Shane Victorino said.

"I wouldn't go back that far," manager John Farrell said with a smile, "but he looked young."

Gomes and first baseman Mike Napoli encouraged teammates to grow beards in spring training last season, their first with Boston. They kept growing theirs and,

along with catcher David Ross, sported the longest beards by the end of the season.

More than a curiosity, it was part of a change in a dour clubhouse culture and helped many new players bond in a more enjoyable atmosphere. Gomes hit just .247 last season when he platooned in left field with Daniel Nava. But the value of his personality may have been greater. That led Farrell to start Gomes in left field in five games of the six-

game World Series victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

"There was an edge that we had a little bit more when he was in the lineup," Farrell said. "Jonny brought an intangible that others feed off of."

Gomes was hitless in his first nine at-bats, then hit a three-run homer in the sixth inning that broke a 1-all tie in Game 4. Boston won 4-2.

"He adds so much and it starts with what he does between the

lines," Farrell said.

Gomes has played on five teams since starting with Tampa Bay in 2003 and four have reached the postseason. The Rays lost the World Series in 2008 but he didn't play in that postseason. He was with Cincinnati in 2010 and Oakland in 2012 but both lost the division series. His team finally went all the way last year.

"I've been fortunate and unfortunate to bounce around and in bouncing around I've

always been extremely focused on the game at hand, the pitch at hand," Gomes said. "You truly see what works and what doesn't work."

"There's hundreds of ways to lose a clubhouse and lose momentum. There's not that many things you have to do to win. There's not many things you have to do to keep a tight clubhouse."

The right-handed hitting Gomes and switch-hitting Nava figure to platoon again in left field. Grady Sizemore, sidelined the last two seasons, also will get a look in left.

Whatever role he plays, Gomes is looking ahead to helping the Red Sox achieve the same goal as last year. While the beard may be gone, his hunger remains.

"I was extremely hungry to win a World Series title, but, once you take a bite of it, that's definitely what it's all about," he said. "My hunger turned to starvation. I've got to do what I can to start collecting them."

Gomes' enthusiasm and drive rub off on his teammates.

"When you've got a guy who's been with a number of different teams, he's had to battle for everything he's

had in his career," Farrell said, "and yet he believes so strongly in himself. Those are part of the conversations that other guys feed on."

Many of them followed his lead in growing their beards. Now only Napoli remains.

"The beard didn't hit or throw a fastball all year," Gomes said. "I think I'll be all right."

And Gomes reminded Victorino that the clean-shaven person is still the same.

"He said, 'don't judge the book by its cover,'" Victorino said. "And I said, 'I will promise you, I know one thing. I will not judge your book by the cover.' So Jonny definitely looks young, but I'm sure that facial hair will grow back."

NOTES: DH David Ortiz took batting practice for the first time. ... RHP Jake Peavy went through long tossing Tuesday and irritation in his right ring finger had lessened, Farrell said. ... Tigers slugger Cabrera feeling fresh for 2014

LAKELAND — Miguel Cabrera had already been in camp for a few days when he really caught the eye of new Tigers manager Brad Ausmus.

At 8 a.m. on the first official reporting date for Detroit's position players, well before team meetings and an extra-long workout, Cabrera was sweating after hitting in the batting cage.

The two-time AL MVP has been energetic since his arrival and is looking forward to being healthy after a core abdomen injury bothered him down the stretch and throughout postseason. It is the same injury that has the Tigers taking it easy with starting pitcher Justin Verlander.

Cabrera said he feels fine and doesn't plan to take any extra precautions this spring.

"Right now I feel healthy, I feel more

fresh, and I'm trying to be 100 percent by the season," Cabrera said. "I feel good and I am ready to play."

Cabrera backed up his Triple Crown season of 2012 by hitting a league-high .348 with 44 homers and 137 RBIs in 2013.

This year, Cabrera has a chance at even bigger numbers since he is moving back to first base, where he is more comfortable, after the Tigers traded Prince Fielder.

Cabrera played mostly third base the past two seasons, and new first base coach Omar Vizquel, who is also working with the infielders, said he is going to leave Cabrera alone.

"Miggy knows what he's doing," Vizquel said. "I might point out some things the first week, but after that I can leave him alone."

Cabrera said he felt at home back at first base. The Tigers have struggled defensively

at the corners the past two seasons, but with young Nick Castellanos taking over at third and the sure-handed Jose Iglesias at shortstop, the Tigers have fortified the defense significantly.

The Tigers lost in the AL championship series last season to Boston. They later traded Fielder to Texas for star second baseman Ian Kinsler.

On a club filled with stars, the three-time AL Central champs remain the team to beat in their division.

"I like it that expectations are high. We've got a great ballclub, but we've still got to go out there and play. We don't know what's going to

happen on the field, so I think the first thing we can do is be healthy, and then we can build," Cabrera said.

Serena Williams struggles but wins in Dubai

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — Top-seeded Serena Williams faced some early struggles before defeating Russia's Ekaterina Makarova 7-6 (8), 6-0 in the second round of the Dubai Championships on Tuesday.

Williams, playing in Dubai courtesy of a wild card, has been sidelined with a back injury since losing to Ana Ivanovic in the fourth round of the Australian Open last month.

It took Williams the first set to adjust to the left-handed Makarova's ability to jam many of her shots into the top-ranked American's body.

"I felt a little rusty, but it was OK," Williams said. "Body is fine. I just had to get my feet moving, but it was OK."

The 24th-ranked Makarova broke Williams' serve in the first game of the match and was serving for the set at 5-4. That's when the Russian played an error-riddled game to allow Williams to even the score to 5-5.

Williams had one set

point on Makarova's serve in the 12th game, but smacked a backhand return over the baseline.

In the tiebreaker, Makarova had two set points at 6-4 and 6-5, but couldn't take advantage of the opportunities.

Williams took the first set on her third set point in the tie-

breaker when Makarova shipped a forehand long.

"I was really telling myself to stay positive, because I was making a lot of errors that I normally don't make, and my serve just wasn't popping the way it normally is," Williams said. "It definitely got better in the second set."

In the second set, the

real Serena Williams showed up and raced to a 5-0 lead.

However, she had trouble serving out the final game of the match — facing three break points before winning on her second match point when Makarova made a forehand error.

"She never gives up, and in that last game she started play-

ing even better," Williams said. "I knew that I wanted to close it out there, because she'd probably feel comfortable with holding serve and it would have been a longer match."

Williams now plays Lucie Safarova of the Czech Republic or fifth-seeded Jelena Jankovic of Serbia in the quarter-finals.

Earlier, Ivanovic sent sixth-seeded Angelique Kerber packing 3-6, 6-3, 7-6 (6).

The former top-ranked Ivanovic had three match points on Kerber's serve in the 12th game but couldn't close it out against the German who reached last week's Doha final.

Ivanovic even faced a battle in the tiebreaker. The Serbian led 5-1, but Kerber battled back to where she even had a match point at 6-5.

"The first two sets a little bit too many errors on my side and a little bit from her side," Ivanovic said. "She's such a tough competitor and retrieves lots of balls."

"I'm just so happy to be through."

Seventh-seeded Simona Halep, who won last week's Qatar Open

in Doha, retired with a right Achilles injury while trailing Alize Cornet of France 6-1, 1-1, in the first match of the day.

Halep complained of an inflamed Achilles during her run to the Doha title.

"I wanted to try because I like to try to fight for my chance, but here I couldn't," Halep said. "After one set I realized that it is dangerous to continue."

Eighth-seeded Caroline Wozniacki had to overcome a one-set deficit to outmaneuver Sabine Lisicki of Germany 2-6, 6-3, 6-3 and move into the second round.

"I knew she was going to come out hot and just go for her shots, and I felt like I was just a step behind," said Wozniacki, who sports an 8-carat diamond engagement ring from fiance, golfer Rory McIlroy everywhere she goes except on court.

"It was nice to win this one, and, you know, onwards and upwards, as they say."

Wozniacki will face German qualifier Annika Beck in the second round. Beck defeated Samantha Stosur of Australia 1-6, 6-1, 6-4.

Malzahn wants slowdown rule tabled until next year

AUBURN, Ala. — Auburn coach Gus Malzahn wants to slow down consideration of a rule taking aim at up-tempo offenses.

Malzahn said Tuesday that he has spoken "numerous times" over the previous five days with the chairman of the committee

that passed a proposal designed to rein in offenses like the Tigers' hurry-up, no-huddle attack.

He has asked Air Force coach Troy Calhoun, the committee chair, to push consideration of the rule until next year.

"This is not a rule change year," Malzahn said. "For a rule to

be changed, it has to be under the umbrella of health and safety. There's absolutely zero documented evidence that it is hazardous to (speed up) the pace of play, only opinions.

"What I asked him to do is move this to next year, when it is a rule change year where we can hear both sides and have a healthy debate on moving forward with the rule."

The playing rules oversight panel, which meets March 6, must approve the proposal.

The rule, if it's passed, would give defenses time to substitute by penalizing offenses for snapping the ball before the 40-second play clock has ticked down to 29.

Southeastern Conference coaches Bret Bielema of Arkansas and Nick Saban of Alabama voiced their concerns before the Calhoun-led panel about the effect of the fast-paced offenses on player safety.

Malzahn said he was caught off guard when he learned about the proposed change last week. He has spoken with other coaches who have voiced their opposition but not to Saban or Bielema.

The vocal opponents have included Mississippi's Hugh Freeze, Texas Tech's Kliff Kingsbury, Texas A&M's Kevin Sumlin and Arizona's Rich Rodriguez — all run fast-paced offenses. Malzahn said he has also contacted the SEC office, which told him to follow the proper channels.

"I'm just going to do

everything in my power, the right way, to stand up," Malzahn said.

The SEC's top three offenses last season — Texas A&M, Auburn and Missouri — run no-huddle attacks. Missouri's 78.3 plays per game led the league but all three averaged at least 72.

Malzahn's offense has helped the Tigers play for the national championship twice, including a loss to Florida State in January.

He doesn't believe

fast offenses lead to more injuries.

"I've been running a fast-paced offense since 1997, and I've never felt like on either side that it was a health and safety issue on offense or even on the other side," Malzahn said.

He declined to say how often he runs plays within 10 seconds, but said the rule would have a big impact.

"It's just a complete rule change," Malzahn said. "It changes the dynamics of tradi-

tional football in a lot more ways than anyone would think. Not just if you get behind by a couple touchdowns and it's late in the game, you couldn't properly come back. But the way you coach your quarterbacks. Because it wouldn't just be 10 seconds.

"You got a 5-yard penalty, so it would probably be more of the four or five seconds into that. And it would just change the dynamics of football."

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Athletes work around sponsorship ban

SOCHI, Russia — Want to see the glasses and goggles that aerial skier Lydia Lassila and snowboarder Lindsey Jacobellis wore at the Sochi Olympics? If you go to the website of the company that manufactures their eyewear, you might be in for a shock.

On the Australian section of Bolle.com, photos of Lassila, Jacobellis and other competitors at the Sochi Games have been digitally blurred to obscure their faces.

This isn't a throwback to the days when Soviet propaganda chiefs airbrushed people out of photos. It's an extreme application of regulations meant to make sure that companies such as Bolle, which do not sponsor the Olympics, don't get to advertise off the back of them.

So the Olympics are a Pepsi-free zone, because Coca-Cola is an Olympic sponsor. In Sochi's Olympic Park, only Visa cards work for payments or in ATMs, again because Visa is a sponsor. At one Sochi venue, an Olympic worker even slapped a white sticker over the Dell logo on a journalist's laptop, because the computer manufacturer isn't an Olympic sponsor.

For Olympians, the dense and confusing thicket of rules severely restricting advertising is a serious issue. In theory, Olympians could be disqualified if they use the games to plug non-approved brands. The International Olympic Committee even holds athletes responsible for how their sponsors behave outside the Olympic bubble.

Rule 40 of the IOC charter states: "Except as permitted by the IOC executive board, no competitor, coach, trainer or official who participates in the Olympic Games may allow his person, name, picture or sports performances to be used for advertising purposes during the Olympic Games."

The rule means athletes cannot allow their images to be used for any commercial advertising, whether Olympic-related or not, for the duration of the blackout period. Even physical advertising such as billboards and magazines are covered, though it's not clear

how that would work logistically.

Pandora, the jewelry company that sponsors U.S. figure skaters Ashley Wagner and Gracie Gold, isn't an Olympic sponsor. It has had to put on hold an advertising campaign it prepared with Gold and to stop running magazine ads that showed Wagner, their agents said.

For Sochi, the rule applies from nine days before the opening ceremony until three days after the closing — Jan. 30 to Feb. 26.

While the IOC has steadfastly defended the policy, the committee appears willing to consider changes in the future.

"Ninety-five percent of our clients come from outside the state," said Mandy Wettstein, director of strategic alliances. "This is the world headquarters. We have representation in other cities but the production is done here."

The company, at 8500 U.S. Highway 441, has separate websites that offer a variety of services including Search Engine Optimization (SEO); pay per click pro-

grams (PPC), social media marketing and programs, application and widget development (Apps) and ad agency services as desired.

By the end of 2011 THAT! Company! was No. 183 on *Inc. Magazine's* list of the 500 fastest growing privately held companies in the U.S.

The magazine's 30th annual list represented that year's most comprehensive look at a most important segment of the economy — America's independent entrepreneurs, which included companies such as Microsoft, Zappos, Intuit, Jamba Juice, Zipcar, Clif Bar, Vizio, Oracle and other well-known names.

THAT! Company! and Wettstein recently aided the city of Umatilla

in its rebranding, which resulted in Umatilla becoming Nature's Hometown, rather than the implication of being a pass through as the Gateway to the Ocala National Forest. Both play on a nature theme but the first is more inviting and a way to make Umatilla a destination.

Other Lake cities have also gone through the branding process.

CEO Ken Knorr wanted his company to do the same thing, so the 25 employees got together and brainstormed.

"Ken wanted us to be known as the company who did that ad, created that campaign," said Wettstein. "He wanted us to be that company."

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


Home construction

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

For Mardi Gras, make spicy sauteed Creole duck breasts

With Mardi Gras looming, I thought it might be fun to cook up some New Orleans-styled goodies featuring duck, andouille sausage and Creole seasoning. These rich ingredients are typical of the fare from this town that knows how to party — an instinct that goes into overdrive during Mardi Gras. And in this recipe, I've figured out a couple ways for us to have our cake and eat it, too. It delivers big flavor without the usual complement of fat and calories.

We start with the star of this show, the breast of duck, a well-

known fount of flavor that — depending on how you cook it — doesn't have to be terribly heavy. I do recommend that you saute the breast with the skin on; that's how to maximize its deliciousness and moistness.

But you can remove and discard the skin — along with most of the serious fat and calories — afterward. In happy fact, duck meat without the skin is leaner than white meat

chicken. And duck fat is not bad fat. Yes, some of it is saturated, but a large percentage of it is mono- and poly-unsaturated, with the same properties, incredibly enough, as olive oil.

The duck and its sauce are brightened with homemade Creole seasoning, which has at least as much flavor, and significantly less salt, than many store-bought versions. My version is modeled on the spice mixes of two of New Orleans's greatest chefs — Paul Prudhomme and Emeril Lagasse.

A great all-purpose mix, my blend works equally well with chicken, shrimp, beef, pork, eggs and vegetables. In

Healthy teriyaki chicken wraps

Whether you'll be hosting a crowd or watching solo, Oscar night calls for dinner with a bit of panache.

So let's reverse engineer this. To help you get in the mood, you'll want to drink something with bubbles. Sparkling wine is the obvious choice, though don't forget the sparkling cider for those abstaining. But you don't have to sip them straight up. Sparkling wine and cider are delicious when doctored.

For either, consider pureeing watermelon, then pouring the puree into ice cube trays and freezing. Drop one cube into each glass, then top with the sparkling beverage. Or for something more wintery, grab a jar of amarena cherries, an Italian treat of sour cherries

packed in syrup. Drop one into each glass, then fill and sip.

With the drinks sorted, we need something that works with bubbles. Fried food is perfect, but who wants to deep-fry at home? The other happy companion to bubbles is Asian food. So I created a simple teriyaki chicken that is served in lettuce wraps. The recipe comes together quickly, but has wonderful savory, yet light, flavors that work perfectly with your cocktails.

TERIYAKI CHICKEN LETTUCE WRAPS

■ Start to finish: 20 minutes
■ Servings: 8

INGREDIENTS:

■ 1/4 cup low-sodium soy sauce
■ 1/4 cup honey
■ 1 tablespoon grated fresh ginger

Dogs don't appreciate flowers or dinner reservations, so many will come in the form of packaged doggie treats, either commercially prepared ones or those made in small, gourmet batches by artisan bakers, such as Sarah Lavery of The Pet Bakery of Oakmont, Pa. But if you're even the tiniest bit comfort-

able in the kitchen, you can make some dog-gone good pet cuisine yourself at home, in some cases at a fraction of the cost with ingredients you already have in your pantry.

It's almost as easy as ripping open a bag of Snusages, and a heck of a lot healthier for your dog, whose nutritional needs are important, too. Besides, it's fun, especially if you get the kids involved.

You do have to be extremely careful about the ingredients. Tempting as it is to simply scrape what's left of tonight's dinner into the dog

dish, not all leftovers are created equal. Onions, for example, can make dogs anemic, while even a single serving of grapes or raisins can lead to rapid renal (kidney) failure. Fat trimmings can cause pancreatitis, while raw yeast dough could expand in your pet's digestive system, causing pain and possible rupture of the stomach or intestines. Chocolate can make dogs extremely sick.

With help from three new cookbooks geared toward pets, we've come up with a

over some so I suggest that you place the pie on an aluminum foil-lined cookie sheet.

CHOCOLATE CHIP PIE

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 unbaked 9-inch, deep-dish pie shell
- 2 large eggs
- 1/2 cup all purpose flour
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 3/4 cup (1 1/2 sticks) butter, softened
- 1 cup chocolate chips
- 1 cup chopped nuts (I prefer walnuts)

DIRECTIONS:

- 1) Preheat oven to 325 degrees.
- 2) Beat eggs in large mixing bowl on high speed until foamy. Beat in flour, sugar and brown sugar.
- 3) Beat in butter. Stir in chocolate chips and nuts. Pour into pie shell.

- 4) Bake for 55 to 60 minutes or until knife inserted halfway between edge and center comes out clean (kind of hard to do, with the chocolate chips). Cool on wire rack. Serve with ice cream if desired.

■ **Note:** If using frozen pie shell, use the deep-dish style, thawed completely. Bake on a baking sheet and increase baking time slightly.

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Food with a twist: Let pretzel sticks give your party a lift

Pretzel sticks don't get much respect. They're neither burly like rods nor twisted like knots.

They deserve more than a toss into the snack bowl. Make them a key player at your Super Bowl gathering: Employ them as edible pickup sticks, replacing toothpicks. Think of the time you'll save not fishing errant toothpicks out of the sofa or shag carpeting.

And think of pretzel sticks as conversation starters if the commercials are duds. Here are some ideas to get

you started. (When dealing with firmer foods — cheese, peanut butter cups — use a wooden skewer to poke a hole for the pretzel.)

MEATBALLS: Mix 1 pound ground beef with 2 tablespoons fine breadcrumbs, 1 tablespoon beaten egg, 1 tablespoon minced onion (or use a favorite recipe). Using a scant 1 tablespoon of meat mixture, roll into a ball and place on a parchment-lined baking sheet. Shape remaining mixture into balls. Bake at 400 degrees, about 20 minutes or until nicely browned. Drain meatballs on paper towels. Cool slightly. Spear

each with a pretzel stick.

CHEESE: Let cheese (cheddar, Monterey Jack, Muenster) come to room temperature; cut into 1-inch cubes. Spear with pretzel stick. Small, fresh mozzarella balls (bocconcini) also work.

SAUSAGE: Cook or grill Italian, bratwurst or Polish according to package directions. Allow them to cool enough to handle, then cut crosswise into 1-inch chunks. Spear cut surface with pretzel stick.

CHEESE-STUFFED OLIVES: Choose larger blue- or feta-stuffed olives. Anchor pretzel in the cheese.

fact, you might want to double the recipe and keep the extra at the ready for future use. Here, I season the duck ahead of time and let it stand for 15 minutes, which allows the spices to flavor the meat more deeply. But if you're short on time, just sprinkle the duck with the seasoning right before cooking.

The tomato-based sauce is flavored not only with my Creole spice mix, but with Louisiana's holy trinity of vegetables: carrot, celery and bell pepper. Also, in a nod to the city's trademark richness, there's a soupçon of Andouille sausage. Imported by Louisiana's French settlers in the mid-1700s, andouille usually is made of smoked and coarsely ground pork. It's spicy, too, with the American version having picked up more heat than the French over the centuries. There's so little andouille called for here that you might consider using the full-fat version, but you're welcome to seek out leaner brands at the supermarket; they'll be made of chicken and turkey, not pork. In either case, this sauce, like the Creole seasoning, is widely useful. Try it with shrimp, chicken, beef, or pork and see for yourself.

By the way, if duck has always struck you as gamey, you haven't tried Peking (also known as Long Island) duck breast, the kind employed in this recipe. I serve duck breast once a week at home and the family loves it. It's so quick and easy to prepare that I put it in the same category as steak. As a matter of fact, duck breasts pair up nicely with any of the sauces you'd use

with steak.

Meanwhile, back to Mardi Gras. Ladies and gents, let the good times roll!

SPICY SAUTEED CREOLE DUCK BREASTS

- Start to finish: 1 1/2 hours (40 minutes active)
- Servings: 6

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 2 ounces andouille sausage, finely chopped
- 1/2 cup finely chopped yellow onion
- 1/2 cup finely chopped green bell pepper
- 1/3 cup finely chopped celery
- 1 tablespoon plus 1/2 teaspoon Creole seasoning (purchased or use the recipe below), divided
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- 1 cup low-sodium chicken broth
- 1 cup chopped or crushed canned tomatoes (preferably fire roasted)
- 2 whole Peking duck breasts (4 halves, about 2 to 2 1/2 pounds)

DIRECTIONS:

- 1) In a medium saucepan over medium, heat the oil. Add the sausage and cook, stirring, until browned, about 5 min-

utes. Use a slotted spoon to transfer the sausage to a bowl, then return the pan to the heat and add the onion, bell pepper and celery. Cook, stirring occasionally, until golden, 6 to 8 minutes. Add 1 to 1 1/2 teaspoons of Creole spice mix (or more if you want a very spicy sauce) and the garlic and cook, stirring, for 1 minute.

2) Add the chicken broth and tomatoes, then bring the mixture to a boil and simmer until much of the liquid has reduced, about 20 minutes. Set aside.

3) While the sauce is simmering, using a very sharp knife, lightly score the skin on each duck breast half in a crisscross pattern, cutting well into but not entirely through the meat. Pat the breasts dry and sprinkle them on both sides with the remaining 2 teaspoons Creole spice mix, making sure that the mix gets into the cracks of the scored skin. Let stand for 15 minutes.

4) In a large cold skillet, place the duck breasts, skin side down. Turn the heat to medium-low and cook until the skin looks very crispy, about 12 minutes. Do not pour off the fat; the liquid fat in the pan helps to render out the fat in the skin.

5) When the duck skin is

crisp, transfer the breasts to a plate. Pour off all but 1 tablespoon of the fat from the pan. Return the duck to the skillet, skin side up, and cook for another 3 to 5 minutes for medium-rare. Transfer the duck to a clean plate, skin side up. Cover loosely with foil and let it rest for 10 minutes before slicing.

6) Pour off any remaining fat in the skillet. Add the sauce and the browned sausage to the skillet and bring to a simmer, scraping up any browned bits in the bottom of the pan. Add any juices that have collected on the plate the duck breasts are on.

7) Remove and discard the skin from the duck, if desired (separating it by slicing off the skin with a paring knife). Thinly slice the duck and arrange it on 6 serving plates. Spoon some of the sauce over each portion.

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon hot paprika
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1 1/2 teaspoons onion powder
- 1 1/2 teaspoons cayenne
- 1 1/2 teaspoons dried oregano

- 1 1/2 teaspoons dried thyme
- 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt

DIRECTIONS:

- 1) In a small bowl, combine all ingredients. Store in an airtight container for up to 6 months.

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February is National Potato Lover's Month

Considering how hard it had to struggle for acceptance when it was first brought from the New World to Europe, the potato has come a long way. Where it was once thought of as something fit only for livestock feed, it has become one of our most versatile vegetables, and — in the shape of both chips and French fries — one of our most popular snacks.

No picnic is complete without potato salad, and the proper composition for potato salad is a subject that is hotly argued at family gatherings. Probably the only area of almost universal agreement is the use of red potatoes, which are less inclined than white potatoes to soak up dressing and become soggy.

No special dinner feels complete without either baked or mashed potatoes to accompany the steak or roast beef. And in the modern kitchen, mashed potatoes are as often as not an instant affair, poured out of a box and stirred together with butter and milk or water, and carried triumphantly off to the dinner table. In fact, you can probably forget about the butter, since these instant potatoes are now available in a myriad of versions: butter-herb, but-

HELPFUL HINTS

■ Ever wonder about the green color that sometimes shows up under the skin when you start to peel a potato? Well, it's nothing more than chlorophyll, the same stuff that makes grass and leaves green, and it develops when potatoes are exposed to excessive light. The Idaho Potato Commission recommends that you not eat the green part because of its bitter flavor — just peel it off and discard it. But it's okay to use the rest of the potato.

■ Don't you just hate it when a recipe calls for a "large" or "small" fruit or vegetable, and you have no idea how large or small it is supposed to be? Well, here's a good rule of thumb for potatoes: three medium potatoes weigh about a pound, and one of those medium potatoes should give you a cup of cubed potatoes, or a half cup of mashed potatoes.

■ The potato is a remarkably useful vegetable: To remove stubborn food stains from your fingers, cut a slice of raw potato and rub it over the stains, then rinse with tap water.

ter and garlic, cheese and so forth.

But should you find yourself without a handy box of the instant stuff, or if you want to impress a visiting mother-in-law, here's the old-fashioned way to prepare mashed potatoes:

Put cubed potatoes into a saucepan with enough water to cover, and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer until potatoes are tender. The time required depends, of course, on the quantity of potatoes being cooked. When tender, drain, using either a

colander or a sieve. Return potatoes to pan and shake over heat to remove any excess moisture.

Some cooks press the potatoes through a ricer; others use a potato masher, and I have several friends who use an electric mixer. Once potatoes are smooth, you can season them with butter, salt and pepper to taste. You can also add whatever other seasonings you like, but try to stop short of gilding the lily.

After all, mashed potatoes from scratch may be a bit more bothersome than those from a box, but they're incredibly good. Even if your mother-in-law isn't coming to dinner, why not celebrate Potato Lover's Month by treating yourself to a batch?

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

few treats — all made with “people food” — that you can feel good about feeding your dog and that won't gross out your kids while making them.

“A balanced, home-made varied diet for your dog keeps your dog healthy, happy, and out of the veterinarian's office,” writes Gayle Pruitt in “Dog-Gone Good Cuisine: More Healthy, Fast and Easy Recipes for You and Your Pooch” (St. Martin's Griffin; Feb. 18, 2014; \$21.99). “Plus, they deserve it.”

The treats just might appeal to the two-legged loves of your life, too. I know this because after I tried to sweet-talk my daughters into sampling the goods (pretty unsuccessfully, I might add), I taste-tested all three myself. They weren't terrible, just on the

bland side — the type of cookie you'd reach for only when there absolutely wasn't anything else to eat in the house.

An entire section of “Dog-Gone Good Cuisine,” in fact, is devoted to equal-opportunity recipes the entire family can share. Case in point is the Salmon Florentine I made the other night for my parents. They thought it was delicious, and you would, too. Other drool-inspiring, human-friendly dishes include Classic Chicken Soup, Cinnamon Chicken and Lamb Burgers with Cucumber Sauce. It's a dog's life, indeed.

BEEFY RED HEARTS

■ Plain, unflavored gelatin can help to prevent arthritis, arthrosis and other degenerative joint disorders in dogs.

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 cups Lakewood Organic Super Veggie Juice, or other organic vegetable juice
- 3 or 4 ice cubes

- 7 envelopes Knox gelatin
- 1 pint beef broth (no onions)

DIRECTIONS:

- 1) Pour the juice into a bowl and add ice cubes. Sprinkle gelatin over the juice; stir until gelatin has dissolved, about 5 minutes.
- 2) In a saucepan, bring beef broth to a boil. Add gelatin mixture and stir until gelatin has dissolved, about 5 minutes.
- 3) Place in a rectangular glass baking dish and refrigerate until firm, about 3 hours.
- 4) Cut into squares or use a heart-shaped cookie cutter.

PEANUT BUTTER AND BUCKWHEAT KISSES

■ Peanut butter is a good source of protein, vitamins and healthy fats. As anyone who's ever had to sneak a pill into their dog's mouth with a spoonful of the stuff knows, it also tastes good. Just be sure to choose an all-natural brand without added sugar or salt.

INGREDIENTS:

- Vegetable oil for greasing
- 13/4 cups buckwheat flour, plus extra for dusting
- 1/2 cup and 1 tablespoon steel-cut oats
- 1 heaping teaspoon blackstrap molasses
- 1/2 cup boiling water
- 1/3 cup unsweetened creamy peanut butter

DIRECTIONS:

- 1) Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a cookie sheet.
- 2) Put buckwheat flour and oats into a bowl.
- 3) Measure blackstrap mo-

lasses into a small bowl. Pour boiling water over molasses and stir until dissolved. Add peanut butter and stir. Add to bowl with the flour and oats and mix together to form a soft dough. (If it is a little dry, add a few tablespoons of water.)

4) Lightly flour a clean work surface with additional buckwheat flour and turn out the dough onto it. Roll small pieces of dough into balls about half the size of golf balls. Put them on the prepared cookie sheet and press down gently on each ball with your thumb. Bake for 25 minutes.

5) Let the kisses cool (they should be quite hard), then store them in a sealed container. They should keep for at least a week.

SWEET POTATO BISCUITS

■ A good source of dietary fiber and vitamins B6 and C, sweet potatoes make a

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 large sweet potato, baked and mashed
- 11/2 cups all-purpose flour (I used whole-wheat)
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup rolled oats
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

DIRECTIONS:

- 1) Mix all the ingredients together and knead a few times. Roll the dough into a thick sheet and cut out desired shape of biscuits.
- 2) Arrange all the biscuits on a baking tray lined with parchment paper and cook in a preheated 350-degree oven for 30 minutes, until crunchy and golden brown.
- 3) Store them in an airtight container or sealed jar for up to 2 weeks.
- 4) Makes 1 dozen biscuits.

This easy but still special seafood dish pairs creamy, cheesy spinach with heart-healthy salmon. It's both pretty on the plate and low-cal enough that you can splurge on dessert.

■ Plus, you don't have to worry about feeding any leftovers to your dog — the recipe comes from Gayle Pruitt's “Dog-Gone Good Cuisine,” a book of healthy recipes for humans and their canine kids.

■ For added nutrition, swap cooked quinoa tossed with toasted pine nuts and chopped fresh parsley for the rice — it's full of protein and fiber.

INGREDIENTS:

- 4 ounces frozen spinach, thawed, drained and squeezed of excess moisture
- 4 ounces ricotta cheese
- 1 tablespoon grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 large egg
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 2 tablespoons chicken broth
- 2 6-ounce salmon fillets
- Lemon slices, for garnish

DIRECTIONS:

- 1) Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2) Add spinach, ricotta, Parmesan and egg to a food processor and puree.
- 3) Brush oil on bottom and sides of a glass ovenproof dish. Add rice to bottom of dish and spread out evenly. Spoon the chicken broth evenly over the rice.
- 4) Place salmon fillets over the rice and spoon the pureed mixture over the top. Bake for about 20 minutes; when done, spinach should be puffed.
- 5) Garnish with lemon slices.

- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 teaspoon hot sauce
- 1 teaspoon fish sauce
- 3 medium carrots, cut into chunks
- 1 small yellow onion, quartered
- 1 1/2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken thighs
- 2 tablespoons canola or vegetable oil
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 2 tablespoons cool water
- 1 head Boston lettuce, separated into leaves (or similar broad, tender lettuce)

DIRECTIONS:

- 1) In a small bowl or glass measuring cup, whisk together the soy sauce, honey, ginger, garlic powder, hot sauce and fish sauce. Set aside.
- 2) In a food processor, combine the carrots and onion. Pulse until fine-

ly chopped. Add the chicken, then pulse several times to begin chopping the chicken. Add the sauce, then continue pulsing just until the chicken is well chopped, but not ground. The pieces should be about 1/4 to 1/2 inch.

3) In a large skillet over medium-high, heat the oil. Add the chicken and cook, stirring often and breaking up any clumps, until cooked through, about 8 minutes. In a small glass, stir together the cornstarch and water, then add to the skillet. Stir and cook for another 2 minutes.

4) Transfer the chicken to one side of a serving platter. Arrange the lettuce

leaves on the other side. Diners help themselves by spooning the chicken into individual leaves, using the leaves as they would a sandwich wrap.


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

Couple new to Florida aren't happy with gay neighbors

DEAR ABBY: My husband and I relocated to Florida a little over a year ago and were quickly welcomed into our new neighbors' social whirl. Two couples in the neighborhood are gay — one male, one female. While they are nice enough, my husband and I did not include them when it was our turn to host because we do not approve of their lifestyle choices. Since then, we have been excluded from neighborhood gatherings, and someone even suggested that we are bigots!

Abby, we moved here from a conservative community where people were pretty much the same. If people were "different," they apparently kept it to themselves. While I understand the phrase "when in Rome," I don't feel we should have to compromise our values just to win the approval of our neighbors. But really, who is the true bigot here? Would you like to weigh in? — **UNHAPPY IN TAMPA**

DEAR UNHAPPY: I sure would. The first thing I'd like to say is that regardless of what you were told in your previous community, a person's sexual orientation isn't a "lifestyle choice." Gay people don't choose to be gay; they are born that way. They can't change being gay any more than you can change being heterosexual.

I find it interesting that you are unwilling to reciprocate the hospitality of people who welcomed you and opened their homes to you, and yet you complain because you are receiving similar treatment.

From where I sit, you may have chosen the wrong place to live because it appears you would be happier in a less integrated neighborhood surrounded by people who think the way you do. But if you interact only with people like yourselves, you will have missed a chance for growth, which is what you have been

offered here. Please don't blow it.

DEAR ABBY: I'm 14 and in high school. My father died in a car accident when I was 8. A man who attends my church took me under his wing and has been like a father to me ever since. He is very supportive most of the time. However, he spans me with a belt when he feels I misbehave.

My mom doesn't know about it because she works long hours to support the family. I like the nurturing and encouragement this man gives me, but I can't take another beating. What should I do? — **BLUE IN THE SOUTHWEST**

DEAR BLUE: What you are describing is a form of child abuse. This "nurturing" man has no right to hit you. You shouldn't have to tolerate being beaten in order to feel supported.

Tell your mother what has been going on, or a teacher or a counselor at your school. You appear to be an intelligent young man. Your silence is what enables those beatings to continue, so please do not remain silent about this any longer.

DEAR ABBY: If you are divorced from your wife, do her parents remain your in-laws? This is to settle a disagreement. — **SHARON IN TEXAS**

DEAR SHARON: Legally, no. But relationships are not always based on legality. Sometimes divorced couples remain extended family members, particularly if there are children involved.

Main Street, Wildwood, FL 34785, to replace the existing headworks bar screen with a new 3mm rotary drum screen. The facility is located at 1290 Industrial Drive, Wildwood, Sumter County, Florida. The Department has considered the effects of reclaimed water discharged to groundwater and has assigned File Number FLA013497-012-DW1 to the project.

The Department will issue the permit with the attached conditions unless a timely petition for an administrative hearing is filed under sections 120.569 and 120.57 of the Florida Statutes before the deadline for filing a petition. The procedures for petitioning for a hearing are set forth below.

A person whose substantial interests are affected by the Department's proposed permitting decision may petition for an administrative proceeding (hearing) under sections 120.569 and 120.57 of the Florida Statutes. The petition must contain the information set forth below and must be filed (received by the clerk) in the Office of General Counsel of the Department at 3900 Commonwealth Boulevard, Mail Station 35, Tallahassee, Florida 32399-3000. Petitions by the applicant or any of the parties listed below must be filed within fourteen days of receipt of this written notice. Petitions filed by any persons other than those entitled to written notice under section 120.60(3) of the Florida Statutes must be filed within fourteen days of publication of the notice or within fourteen days of receipt of the written notice, whichever occurs first. Under section 120.60(3) of the Florida Statutes, however, any person who has asked the Department for notice of agency action may file a petition within fourteen days of receipt of such notice, regardless of the date of publication. The petitioner shall mail a copy of the petition to the applicant at the address indicated above at the time of filing. The failure of any person to file a petition within the appropriate time period shall constitute a waiver of that person's right to request an administrative determination (hearing) under sections 120.569 and 120.57 of the Florida Statutes. Any subsequent intervention (in a proceeding initiated by another party) will be only at the discretion of the presiding officer upon the filing of a motion in compliance with rule 28-106.205 of the Florida Administrative Code. A petition that disputes the material facts on which the Department's action is based must contain the following information:

- (a) The name, address, and telephone number of each petitioner; the name, address, and telephone number of the petitioner's representative, if any; the Department permit identification number and the county in which the subject matter or activity is located;
- (b) A statement of how and when each petitioner received notice of the Department action;
- (c) A statement of how each petitioner's substantial interests are affected by the Department action;
- (d) A statement of all disputed issues of material fact. If there are none, the petition must so indicate;
- (e) A statement of facts that the petitioner contends warrant reversal or modification of the Department action;
- (f) A concise statement of the ultimate facts alleged, as well as the rules and statutes which entitle the petitioner to relief; and
- (g) A statement of the relief sought by the petitioner, stating precisely the action that the petitioner wants the Department to take. A petition that does not dispute the material facts on which the Department's action is based shall state that no such facts are in dispute and otherwise shall contain the same information as set forth above, as required by rule 28-106.301.

Because the administrative hearing process is designed to formulate final agency action, the filing of a petition means that the Department's final action may be different from the position taken by it in this notice. Persons whose substantial interests will be affected by any such final decision of the Department have the right to petition to become a party to the proceeding, in accordance with the requirements set forth above.

Mediation under section 120.573 of the Florida Statutes is not available for this proceeding. 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
