Flying bloodhound sniffs bombs in national forest

huge, flying metal detector is temporarily based at Leesburg International Airport to help the U.S. Navy find buried debris at the Pinecastle Bombing Range in the Ocala National Forest.

A company called Battelle, headquartered in Columbus, Ohio, has equipped a helicopter with detection gear in order to find buried ferrous metals like

iron and steel. Flying at tree-top level, the helicopter can locate spent target bombs and other materials the Navy can then recycle, officials said.

"Whether it's utilities, or ordnance, or pipelines," the helicopter can find them, project manager Jeff Gamey said. "In this case, we're looking for ordnance... and we've done that at probably close to 50 sites around the U.S. as well as sites in Canada

and Australia." The 19,000-acre range has been used by the Navy for target practice for 50 years under a special-use permit from the U.S. Forest Service. Currently, F/A-18 Hornet jet fighters and other aircraft take off from Naval Air Station Jacksonville or from aircraft carriers off the Florida coast to use the range, according to the website www.military-

The helicopter normally flies 3 to 6 feet above the ground — depending on obstacles — and sweeps an area back and forth like a lawnmower to spot buried items, Gamey said. When it hits on an item, it's usually found within 12 inches of that hit.

But at Pinecastle, the pilot has to fly above the trees. "When we're at that

Senate blocks bill boosting vets' benefits

WASHINGTON — A divided Senate on Thursday derailed Democratic legislation that would have provided \$21 billion for medical, education and job-training benefits for the nation's veterans. The bill fell victim to election-year disputes over spending and fresh penalties against Iran.

Each party covets the allegiance of the country's 22 million veterans and their families, and each party blamed the other for turning the effort into a chess match aimed at forcing politically embarrassing votes.

Republicans used a procedural move to block the bill after Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee Chairman Bernie Sanders, I-Vt., chided GOP lawmakers about their priorities.

"I personally, I have to say this honestly, have a hard time understanding how anyone could vote for tax breaks for billionaires, for millionaires, for large corporations and then say we

TAVARES Big changes at Lake's animal shelter

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is Part 2 of a two-part series that looks at changes made at Lake County Animal Services since a critical audit took place as well as the significance of spay and neutering programs.

Lake County Animal Services Division of-

ficials say big changes have occurred at the animal shelter since two critical internal audits cited at least 45 recommendations for improvement.

In addition, shelter officials now agree there is a need for a low-cost spay and neutering program, which would help reduce the number of animals brought to the shelter, in effect, preventing the euthanization of dogs and cats.

INTERNAL AUDIT

Bob Melton, inspector general with the Lake County Clerk of Court's office, who conducted the audit, said one of the first recommendations for improvement was one of the most significant: Inadequate records at the shelter caused problems in keeping an account of 1,609 of

don't have the resources to protect our veterans," said Sanders, the measure's chief author.

Democrats noted that more than two dozen veterans groups supported the legislation. But Republicans said they still favor helping veterans while also wanting to be prudent about federal spending.

"We're not going to

be intimidated on this," said Sen. Jeff Sessions of Alabama, top Republican on the Senate Budget Committee. "We're going to do the right things for the veterans of America."

The fight over priorities demonstrated again the bitter divisions that have restrained the legislative process in recent years. Efforts to address immigration, a tax overhaul and job creation all seem likely to go nowhere this year.

Republicans criticized how most of Sanders' bill was paid for — with unspent money from the withdrawal of U.S. troops from Iraq and the winding down of American military involvement in Afghanistan. The GOP says those are not real savings because no one expected those dollars to be spent as those wars ended.

Republicans also objected to provisions making more veterans without service-con-

nected injuries eligible for treatment at Department of Veterans Affairs facilities. They said that would swamp an already overburdened system.

The vote sidetracking the bill was 56-41, with supporters falling four votes short of the 60 they needed to prevail. Sens. Jerry Moran of Kansas and Dean Heller of Nevada were the only Republicans voting to keep the legislation alive and the only lawmakers crossing party lines on the vote.

In areas where the helicopter cannot get close enough to the ground to get a good reading, the Navy sends in a ground crew to scan the area, said Jim Brantley, director for public affairs and communications for the Naval Facilities Engineering Command Atlantic.

"Those pine trees down there, they get tall," he said.

The scanning is being done in coordination with the forest service, said Mark Marini, a re-

Gamey explained that the helicopter has been demagnetized in order to minimize the impact on its readings. He said ferrous metal objects, like iron and steel, distort the Earth's magnetic field, allowing the helicopter's sensors to find that distortion and locate an item based on its magnetic signature.

"It's similar to taking a compass and holding it next to a metal beam," Gamey said. "You can see the deflection. That's the same sort of effect that we're measuring."

A scanning project like this normally takes about three weeks, but the Pinecastle job is expected to last approximately two months because of the area's size, Gamey said. Plus, bombing operations are still going on at the range and the helicopter cannot fly during those.



> "We're looking for spent munitions and range material to go pick up and pinpoint where it is, and it reduces the cost of us having to scour through the brush trying to find this by sight," he said.

In addition to spent munitions, range clearance includes finding targets that no longer look like targets because they have been smashed to pieces, according to Marini.

"We're trying to look in areas where... the brush is so tall and thick that we can't see in it," he said. "So, we're using the helicopter to go and pinpoint anomalies that are found, and then we go investigate directly there. We're trying to be good stewards of the environment and not disturb the brush as much doing it that way."

Targets on the range are made to mimic military targets, such as boxes made to look like bunkers or old tanks, Marini said. He added the munitions they are looking for are practice bombs which do not have live components.

Pinecastle does have a Live Ordnance Impact Area, which area residents can attest to, but Marini said strict range

The Pinecastle bombing range is southwest of Astor and northwest of Altoona. The clearance project there is expected to be finished in mid-April, Marini said.

The helicopter, a 206 Long Ranger, is equipped with 16 sensors in attached white booms, pilot Doug Christie said. Other projects done using this technology included searching San Francisco's Port Chicago for ordnances from an explosion of a munitions ship during World War II, Gamey said.

The technology also is useful in diamond exploration because it can map geological changes in ferrous metals that would be an indicator for diamonds nearby, he added.

According to Battelle's website, the company is the world's biggest nonprofit research and development organization, and it has more than 22,000 employees worldwide. It was founded in 1929 and "serves the national security, health and life science and energy and environmental industries."

Court: School can ban US flag shirts for safety

SAN FRANCISCO — Officials at a Northern California high school acted appropriately when they ordered students wearing American flag T-shirts to turn the garments inside out during the Mexican heritage celebration Cinco de Mayo, a federal appeals court ruled Thursday.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said the officials' concerns of racial violence outweighed students' freedom of expression rights. Administrators feared the American-flag shirts would enflame the passions of Latino students celebrating the Mexican holiday. Live Oak High School, in the San Jose suburb of Morgan Hill, had a history of problems between white and Latino students on that day.

The unanimous three-judge panel said past problems gave school officials sufficient and justifiable reasons for their actions. The court said schools have wide latitude in curbing certain civil rights to ensure campus safety.

"Our role is not to second-guess the decision to have a Cinco de Mayo celebration or the precautions put in place to avoid violence," Judge M. Margaret McKeown wrote for the panel.

OCALA — Three young adults with BB guns allegedly have confessed to damaging at least 60 vehicle and business windows in Lake County.

Austin Terrance Fagan, 20, Kameron Colby Cole,

22, and Kaitlin Alexis Prusansky, 18, all of Marion County, were arrested Wednesday on 50 similar accusations of leaving a trail of shattered windows in that county, according to the Marion County Sheriff's Office.

Roundabout to be discussed


Lake County will hold a public meeting on March 13 regarding a controversial \$1 million roundabout to be built at the intersection of County Road 561 and County Road 455, south of Astatula.

The intersection is in a completely rural area with hardly any homes or businesses in sight — just fields and trees.

"Does this pass the common sense test?" County Commissioner Jimmy Conner, a critic of the project, said last February when the board voted 4-1 to accept grant money for the work.

Both federal and state highway funds will pay for the project, which Conner said would not even be considered if local money was at stake.

Calling the project "absurd," Conner took County Commissioners Leslie Campione and Sean Parks to task for changing opposition they had to the project in 2011. Both countered by saying the roundabout will improve traffic safety in the area, according to engineering

As city officials develop plans for converting the recently purchased Celebration of Praise Church into a municipal complex, the 69,000-square-foot building already has a temporary name and some new life.

A city spokeswoman said the grand opening for the Celebration Center is tentatively being planned for sometime in June.

In preparation, City Manager Darren Gray said the city is focusing on the maintenance that needs to be completed before that.

"Inoperative locks have been repaired and estimates are being gathered for re-keying the entire building," Gray said.

Gray said walls have to be repaired, lighting must be upgraded in the gymnasium, blocks will be leveled around the pool to avoid tripping hazards and restroom facilities must be made ADA compliant. In addition, fire extinguishers and kitchen fire-suppression systems must be inspected and certified and the building will be treated against termites. Gray also said that the fire sprinklers were inspected and deficiencies were found, something the city is repairing, along with several air conditioning units that must be serviced or replaced. Gray said the roof warranty was just transferred to the city and event planning is underway. Meanwhile, the event schedule is filling up quickly. Last week, the city announced that the "Pat Burke Hoops Life Basketball and Life Skills Program" will visit the site from March 10 through June 7. On May 8, city employees will be treated to breakfast at the new facility. On May 9, local children will enjoy a symphony jazz fest, with performances by south Lake's three local high schools. And on May 17, there will be a water safety day for the

Officials have cash to spend – or give back

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's continued economic recovery is giving state legislators a reprieve from years of budget battles and a way to boost the election-year fortunes of Gov. Rick Scott.

As unemployment has dropped and consumer spending has risen, the Republican-controlled Legislature has gained a budget surplus expected to be more than \$1 billion to work with when the annual session starts next week.

Scott has made clear how he wants a big chunk of that surplus spent.

He has rolled out a series of proposals to cut taxes and fees by nearly \$600 million. Many of them would return money directly to consumers — a contrast to his previous tax cut proposals aimed primarily at corporations and businesses.

The biggest item on Scott's list is a rollback of auto registration fees raised when former Gov. Charlie Crist was in office and the state's economy was in a near freefall.

Despite the hefty price tag, legislative leaders have backed Scott.

"Everyone understands it's important to return some of the additional revenue to our constituents," said Sen. Joe Negron, R-Stuart and Senate budget chief.

Legislators may wind up tweaking in-

dividual portions of the tax and fee cuts offered by Scott, but they insist they will approve a package worth a half-billion dollars.

House budget chief Rep. Seth McKeel, R-Lakeland, said assuming that legislators are backing Scott's proposals just to help get him re-elected is wrong.

"I want the governor to be re-elected," McKeel said. "But we also have a whole lot of House members running for re-election. We have a whole lot of senators running for re-election. Clearly, election year dynamics are at play throughout the building."

Scott has done more than ask for tax and fee cuts. He also has asked that legislators hold the line on college tuition rates and recommended a \$74.2 billion budget that calls for additional spending in a wide range of areas, including child protection investigation, Everglades restoration and providing help for the state's beleaguered freshwater springs.

Splits are already emerging over some of Scott's spending proposals.

Democrats are questioning whether or not the budget will do enough to restore the cuts that occurred when the Great Recession hammered state revenues.

"I feel there's a tremendous amount of unmet needs that do not appear to be on the priority list," said Rep. Mark Pafford,

Shale brings hopes in Southeast

GILLSBURG, Miss. -Residents living above an oil-rich shale formation that stretches across southwest Mississippi and Louisiana have been waiting on a boom for years. A steady trickle of drilling is already boosting the rural region's economy, and spending by two oil companies could make 2014 the year that many other locals finally cash in on the oil far beneath their feet.

Already, Max Lawson has spent hours watching the round-theclock work of shoving pipe into the ground in his back pasture. The process began two years ago when Encana Corp. built a big gravel pad, but didn't take off until late last year when a convoy of 200 trucks carted in a drilling rig and other equipment to bore into the earth looking for oil.

"They call it the Gillsburg Christmas tree," he said while standing near the brightly lit rig. "It looks like a little city over here at night."

Gillsburg and surrounding Amite County lie above a prime section of the Tuscaloosa Marine Shale, a geologic formation that stretches in boomerang shape across Louisiana's midsection and into southern Mississippi. Drillers

have known about the formation north of the Gulf of Mexico for years, but affordable technology to remove the oil from the shale's tight pores was slow to develop.

Thanks partly to advances in hydraulic fracturing techniques, Encana Corp. and Goodrich Petroleum plan to spend hundreds of millions of dollars in the area in 2014. So far, Goodrich and others have drilled more than 30 wells across the region, trying to find the right methods.

Goodrich Chief Operating Officer Robert Turnham said that number could double or triple in the area straddling the state line just this year if drillers continue to make progress.

"It's at a stage where you need more wells that have consistent results, that show the repeatable results there are in other plays," Turnham said.

Louisiana State University scientists estimate the formation holds 7 billion barrels of oil, though that total isn't proven yet. Most of it is a light, sweet crude that can be sold to refiners for more than \$100 a barrel. By comparison, the federal government estimates that the U.S. has about 40 billion barrels of proved oil reserves.

Still, the exploration isn't without financial risks because of the tricky nature of the rock that holds the oil. Goodrich's stock took a big dive Feb. 20 when it announced results that failed to meet analysts' expec-

tations. One key issue was a troublesome well Goodrich drilled elsewhere in Amite County that initially produced a disappointing 500 barrels per day.

For the region's economy, though, the drilling has already provided a much-needed infusion, even if it's not an all-out boom yet.

Heavily wooded with only a handful of small towns, Amite County has relied on forestry in recent decades. But Georgia-Pacific LLC closed a plywood mill in Gloster in 2009. Combined with other business closures, Chancery Clerk Ronnie Taylor said Amite County lost as many as 850 jobs. The county's 4,600 workers had an 8.7 percent unemployment rate in December, higher than Mississippi's average. Here and there, pastures are reminders of the county's fading dairy industry.

Bernell McGehee, an accountant in Liberty, said his family leased some forestland south of town to Encana for a \$300-an-acre one-time payment. He stands to earn more in royalties if the land produces oil.

"Any debts we've had, we've pretty much been able to get rid of," he said.

McGehee is a partner in the Ward's restaurant in Liberty, Amite County's only fastfood franchise. He said sales have gone up about 10 percent over the last year, enough to persuade the owners to buy a small lot to add more parking.

the 13,527 animals that were noted as coming into the facility.

The department, previously known as the Internal Audit Division with the Lake County Clerk of Court's office, recently changed its name to enable it to follow standards established by the Association of Inspectors General and to start on the path to pursue accreditation for offices of Inspectors General.

"We found that animals were unaccounted for and the software was not being used properly," he said. "There were also significant issues in how the animals were cared for — for example, keeping the lights off in the quarantined area during the day and keeping the animals in the dark."

Cyndi Nason, the county's new director of animal services, who took the place of Marjorie Boyd after she resigned in April 2013, said the shelter uses a new computer software system to keep better track of animals.

The previous system, she said, was "antiquated and not used correctly."

The audits also cited how the county was missing out on hundreds of thousands of dollars a year because licensing laws pet weren't being followed. At the same time, the audit found the county was not charging enough for the licenses.

"We have tightened the way we handle money," Nason said.

According to the audit, it was noted, "current kennel operations may not maximize the safety or well-being of animals." There also is no air conditioning in any of the rooms. Mike Brown, president of Harris Air Conditioning Inc., has since volunteered to put in a free air conditioning unit at the shelter. Nason said the lights have been fixed in the quarantined area and she is interested in having the whole shelter area brightened. Further, the audit stated, "practices and procedures relating to animal socialism and behavior should be

improved."

Nason said she makes sure the animals get out at least once every day, and she is working to set up play groups for the animals to get more exercise.

Melton said the audit showed during fiscal year 2012, Animal Services euthanized 4,571 animals, which equates to a "live release rate of 77 percent for dogs and 31.1 percent for cats," and is "reasonable compared to other counties.'

In the last four months, animal services has not euthanized any adoptable dogs, according to Brian Sheahan, director of the Department of Community Safety and Compliance and Nason's boss.

The audit recommended a more formalized process for making a decision to euthanize animals, as opposed to the director of animal services solely making the call.

That process is already implemented, according to Nason.

for disease control and standard operating procedures for the vetting of animals, whether they are suitable for adoption or not." The continued goal, he added, is "to reduce euthanasia overall." "We can always do a

better job with adoptions, and improving our relationship and coordination with rescue partners," he said.

In 2013, 15 percent of dogs deemed adoptable were found new homes.

Melton said that in the next three months, the Division of Inspector General plans to perform a follow-up audit of animal services to determine the status of the recommendations.

SPAY AND NEUTERING PROGRAMS

While the current spay and neutering rebate program has been successful, according to Nason, the county needs more low-cost spay and neutering programs. Funding, however, is a big con

county meeting.

"It is money well spent," he said of the programs.

In October 2013, the county implemented a spay and neutering program, where residents can fill out the paperwork at animal services to receive a \$50 rebate if they spay or neuter an animal.

Doreen Barker, president of the South Lake Animal League, a nokill animal shelter for dogs and cats, said spay and neuter programs are essential to reducing the pet population crisis and euthanasia of pets.

"The reason for the number of pets in the shelters is because people don't spay and

commission neuter their pets," she said.

Barker said the animal league's mission is to get to the root of the problem of the overpopulation of pets, and assist the community with educational tools on the importance of spaying and neutering animals.

Miguel Abi-hassan, chief executive officer of the Halifax Humane Society, which handles animal services for most of Volusia County, said in 2012 the society opened the Halifax Humane Society Redinger Clinic, offering low-cost spay and neutering services.

Since then, in the areas surrounding the clinic, located near the city of Holly Hill, there was a 20 percent reduction in intakes to the shelter, Abi-hassan said.

Abi-hassan added that euthanization rates have also decreased by close to 20 percent over the last few years.

Simply spaying and neutering animals is not the full answer to solving the problem of overpopulation of pets, Abi-hassan said.

"It has to involve the local government, the local business community and all of the rescue and feeding volunteers," he said.

Previously, Abi-hassan said Halifax used to have a rebate program, but it did not help as many people as "a structured and centralized facility easily accessible, which offers discounts at the door.'

Now, the humane society performs 10,500 spay and neutering surgeries a year, compared with 2,500 when the rebate program was in place.

Since putting in high-volume place spay/neuter programs at First Coast No More Homeless Pets in Jacksonville, a nonprofit, the number of animals euthanized in shelters has dropped from 23,104 in 2002 to 2,150 in 2012-13. Total shelter intake also dropped from 33,847 animals in 2002 to 13,345 in 2012-13.

Both Orange and Marion counties offer low-cost spay and neutering services.





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Venezuelan protests persist at start of holiday

CARACAS, Venezuela — The start of a weeklong string of holidays leading up to the March 5 anniversary of former President Hugo Chavez's death did not completely pull protesters from the streets Thursday as the government apparently hoped.

Hundreds of students rallied on a leafy street in east Caracas demanding an end to the government crackdown on protests and the release of those jailed in recent weeks. When some of the protesters later moved toward a major highway, government security forces fired with tear gas.

In Valencia, about 105 miles west of the capital, protesters manned burning street barricades and clashed with police.

President Nicolas Maduro announced this week that he was adding Thursday and Friday to the already scheduled long Carnival weekend, and many people interpreted it as an attempt to calm tensions.

Thursday's student protest was intended to send the government a message that demonstrators would not be distracted by a vacation.

"They want to demobilize us with this decree that joins Carnival with these two days commemorating the Caracazo," said student leader Juan Requesens, using the common term for a wave of anti-government protests in 1989.

"Maduro is mistaken," he added. "We're going to continue in the street, we're not going to leave our democratic fight for six days at the beach"

dent-led demonstrations this month in several cities have taken a toll that the government puts at 16 dead. The mostly middle class opposition joined the protests, but for the most part they have not expanded to poorer neighborhoods where Maduro's support base resides.

roadblocks, The mostly in middle class neighborhoods, have become just another irritation for some already frustrated by food shortages, soaring crime rates and inflation that hit 56 percent last year.

"I'm fed up. I have an empty refrigerator and I can't even go to the supermarket because of this barricade," said Alma Castillo, a 33-year-old homemaker in Caracas. "I'm not a Chavista, but it's not fair that our own neighbors do this to us. The protest has to be organized and peaceful."

Russian moves raise stakes in Ukraine conflict

SIMFEROPOL, Ukraine — Masked gunmen stormed parliament in Ukraine's strategic Crimea region Thursday as Russian fighter jets scrambled to patrol borders, while the newly formed government pledged to prevent a national breakup with strong backing from the West — the stirrings of a potentially dangerous confrontation reminiscent of Cold War brinksmanship.

Moscow granted shelter to Ukraine's fugitive president, Viktor Yanukovych, state media said. He was said to be holed up in a luxury government retreat and to have scheduled a news conference Friday near the Ukrainian border.

As gunmen wearing unmarked camouflage uniforms erected a sign reading "Crimea is Russia" in the provincial capital, Ukraine's interim prime minister declared the Black Sea territory "has been and will be a part of Ukraine."

been celebrating his signature the 1991 Soviet collapse meant Olympics even as Ukraine's drama came to a head. The Russian leader has long dreamed of pulling Ukraine — a country of 46 million people considered the cradle of Russian civilization closer into Moscow's orbit.

For Ukraine's neighbors, the specter of Ukraine breaking up evoked memories of centuries of bloody conflict.

"Regional conflicts begin this way," said Polish Foreign Minister Radoslaw Sikorski, calling the confrontation "a very dangerous game."

Russia has pledged to respect Ukraine's territorial integrity. But the dispatch of Russian fighter jets Thursday to patrol borders and drills by some 150,000 Russian troops — almost the entirety of its force in the western part of the country - signaled strong determination not to lose Ukraine to the West.

Thursday's dramatic developments posed an immediate challenge to Ukraine's new authorities as they named an interim government for the country, whose population is divided in loyalties between Russia and the West. Crimea, which was seized by Russian forces in the 18th century under Catherine the Great, was once the crown jewel in Russian and then Soviet empires. It only became part of Ukraine in 1954 when Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev transferred jurisdiction from Russia — a move that was a mere formality until Crimea landed in an independent Ukraine.

In the capital, Kiev, the new prime minister said Ukraine's future lies in the European Union, but with friendly relations with Russia.

Arseniy Yatsenyuk, named Thursday in a boisterous parliamentary session, now faces the difficult task of restoring stability in a country that is not only deeply divided politically but on the verge of financial collapse. The 39-year-old served as economy minister, foreign minister and parliamentary speaker before Yanukovych took office in 2010, and is widely viewed as a technocratic reformer who enjoys the support of the U.S.

Shortly before the lawmakers chose him, Yatsenyuk insisted the country wouldn't accept the secession of Crimea. The Black Sea territory, he declared, "has been and will be a part of Ukraine."

In Simferopol, the Crimean regional capital, gunmen toting rocket-propelled grenades and sniper rifles raised the Russian flag over the local parliament building. They wore black and orange ribbons, a Russian symbol of victory in World War II. Oleksandr Turchynov, who stepped in as acting president after Yanukovych's flight, condemned the assault as a "crime against the government of Ukraine." He warned that any move by Russian troops off of their base in Crimea "will be considered a military aggression."

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The escalating conflict sent Ukraine's finances plummeting further, prompting Western leaders to prepare an emergency financial package.

Yanukovych, whose abandonment of closer ties to Europe in favor of a bailout loan from Russia set off three months of protests, finally fled by helicopter last week as his allies deserted him. The humiliating exit was a severe blow to Russian President Vladimir Putin, who had

Scenes of death in South Sudan

MALAKAL, South Sudan — House after house has been burned to the ground. Hospital patients have been shot by armed rebels while lying in their beds. Dozens of corpses litter the streets.

"This is about revenge now. There is no humanity here," said Col. Jan Hoff, an officer in Norway's army who has served in Afghanistan, Iraq and Syria.

South Sudan, he said, is the worst he's seen.

"It's absolutely horrific," Hoff said this week as he led a heavily armed U.N. convoy through the streets of Malakal, the capital of oil-producing Upper Nile state. "This is tribe against tribe. In Syria it was foreign fighters against the government.

Here I don't think it's about the government."

A corpse nearby is already a skeleton wrapped in a soldier's uniform. Hoff said he counted 30 bodies on a recent day. A colleague had counted 70. The dead include both civilians and soldiers.

Human Rights Watch said Thursday that both government and rebel forces are responsible for serious abuses that may amount to war crimes for atrocities committed in Malakal and Bentiu, another capital of an oil-producing state, despite a cease-fire signed in January. Reprisal killings, based on ethnicity, are common place.

"Armed forces from both sides have extensively looted and destroyed civilian property, including desperately needed aid facilities, targeted civilians, and carried out extrajudicial executions, often based on ethnicity," said Human Rights Watch, which called the destruction and violence against civilians "shocking."

A week ago forces loyal to former vice president Riek Machar retook Malakal in a bloody assault that forced the government army to make what it labeled a tactical withdrawal.

Government officials this week said they would retake the town, but on Wednesday, as the U.N. convoy drove through, there was no sign of South Sudan's army. The only talk was how rebels were pushing north toward the oil fields that provide the world's newest nation.

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AVOICE An opportunity to right-size the US military

n crafting a military budget for a nation not at war for the first time in 13 years, the challenge is to transform U.S. forces to meet changing security demands while slashing spending.

There is pain and risk in the plan that Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel previewed this week to meet those twin imperatives. But the transformation has to happen, and the \$496-billion military budget for 2015 that the administration will send to Congress next week — down from \$520 billion in 2014, not counting \$92 billion for the war in Afghanistan — is a reasonable blueprint.

It would reduce troop strength in every military branch, active and reserve, while increasing only special forces. For instance the Army would be cut from 520,000 active-duty troops to about 440,000, the smallest number in decades. Overhead would be slashed through cuts in headquarters budgets and civilian personnel. An entire class of Air Force fighter jets would be eliminated. And active-duty military personnel would get a pay raise of only 1 percent.

The downsizing is appropriate, but it isn't risk free. Hagel said it would create some gaps in training and diminish the U.S. military's capability to execute extended or simultaneous ground operations.

But the public has no stomach for long, grinding ground wars like those in Iraq and Afghanistan. The threat from nations with big armies has been surpassed by terrorism, which is better met with small, mobile special forces. And deep troop cuts would enable the military to hit spending targets in the Budget Control Act of 2011 while sustaining readiness and technological superiority, a necessary balance.

But Congress has to get real. Hagel warned that a return to the deep, acrossthe-board cuts slated for 2016 under sequestration would compromise national security. That's debatable, but Congress can't keep demanding savings while rejecting attempts to actually cut spending.

It can't continue pumping up military pay and benefits that have risen 40 percent more than growth in the private sector since 2001 — and more than the Department of Defense requested. Congress can't keep rejecting benefit cuts, such as the small reduction in cost-of-living increases for some military retirees it passed and then repealed this year. It can't continue favoring weapons systems based on where they're built rather than whether they're needed, or rejecting the department's request to close domestic bases, as it has for two years. This is an opportunity to create the military the nation needs. Congress must seize the moment.

hat you think of Sen. Ted Cruz (R-Texas) depends on who you believe. Is the freshman senator on an "ego trip," putting himself before country (Dana Milbank, The Washington Post), or is he standing on his principles (Cruz's conservative supporters)?

ABC chief White House correspondent Jonathan Karl says Cruz is "so hated" among GOP senators that "he's going to need a food taster."

In a telephone interview with me, Cruz acknowledges he would not win a "Mr. Congeniality" contest if it were up to the Republican leadership in the Senate, but contends that they and some of his colleagues are out of touch with the will of the people: "The reaction in Washington is the polar opposite of the reaction outside Washington," he says. "People across the country are frustrated that so many elected officials in Washington are not listening and ignoring the concerns of the people." I ask him about his controversial move last week to change Senate rules by requiring 60 votes to pass the debt ceiling increase, instead of a 51-vote majority. Cruz responded, "...there is no universe in which I would be willing to consent to allow (majority leader) Harry Reid to raise the debt ceiling with no spending reforms on only 51 votes. How does Cruz expect to get the reforms he wants without a Republican Senate majority, not to mention a Republican president?

Not true, says Cruz. While acknowledging that Tea Party candidates Christine O'Donnell (Delaware) and Sharon Engle

to that list. "Every one of these," he says, "was elected by the Tea Party against huge opposition from the establishment and all of their money."

Can promoting such candidates win back the Senate for **Republicans in November? Cruz** says, "Many of the critics are saying the path to victory in November is for Republicans to put their heads down, don't rock the boat, don't take any stands. ... I think history has proven that that is a consistent path to failure. The way to win in November is for Republicans to take principled stands. ... That doesn't mean we need to fight on everything. You pick your battles. ... When Washington politicians retreat on every issue, it demoralizes grassroots conservative activists who are the key to winning in November."

Given the results of the last two presidential elections and their own poor record, the GOP establishment may want to put themselves on "Cruz control."

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






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playing in numerous tournaments against some of the state's best teams.

Lake Minneola's three losses — to Ocala Vanguard, Orlando Christian Prep, and Jacksonville Potter's House Christian — have a combined record of 72-16, including a 30-1 record for Orlando Christian Prep, which won the Class 2A state championship.

In addition, Lake Minneola has a win against Lauderdale Lakes Boyd Anderson, which played Oviedo late Thursday in a Class 7A state semifinal game and a road win in last week's regional championship game against Lake Wales.

Both of those wins, Cole said, should help Lake Minneola against Ruskin Lennard.

"Lennard is a lot like us," Cole said. "They do the things we like to do. like play fast, shoot well and get after the ball on defense. Boyd Anderson and Lake Wales are similar to both of us, so we've done the things

we need to do to win the game. "We just have to go

out there (today) and do it again."

Another reason for Cole's confidence in the Hawks is team unity. He said this group of players is closer than previous teams. Cole created Lake Minneola's program from scratch, starting three years ago when the school opened.

He has always fostered closeness on his teams, but he said this year's unit has taken that to a new level.

"No player on this team has an agenda," Cole said. "They've bonded better than any of our other teams and each player wants to succeed so their teammates will succeed. Everything is about the team. Even off the court, these guys hang out together and do things as a group.

"I'm proud of how these guys have come together and the payoff is that we get to play in Lakeland." Cole knows how much goes into winning championships. He reached two Final Fours as a high-school

player and won two championships as a professional in Europe.

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He is driven to succeed and his work ethic has won over his players. It has also earned the respect of area coaches, some of whom have led teams to Lakeland.

"I've had seven or eight coaches call me and wish us luck," Cole said. "(Oviedo coach) Ed Kershner called and so did (Bartow coach) Terrance McGriff. Both of those teams are playing in state semifinal games, but they took the time to call. That really means something and it shows that we're doing the right things at Lake Minneola."

Cole said he has tried to maintain a sense of normalcy at practices this week, but he hasn't been able to shield his players from the magnitude of today's game. He said there is "a lot of talk" around campus about the game and students are congratulating his players for their successes this season.

It all got to be too much, and as he walked up to the 18th green at PGA National, he shook hands and headed straight to the parking lot. He said then he was "not in a good place mentally."

Now he is playing well. He is adjusted to his equipment. He's engaged to tennis play-

er Caroline Wozniacki, who followed him around the golf course.

"I'm in a great place," McIlroy said. "I couldn't be happier."

The finish didn't hurt. The 24-year-old from Northern Ireland took aim at the flag over the water on the par-3 17th and made a 12-foot birdie putt. He finished with a fairway metal into the front bunker, and a simple shot to 4 feet for birdie on the par-5 closing hole.

He still hasn't won a PGA Tour event since the BMW Championship at the end of the 2012 season. He hasn't won on the European Tour since Dubai at the end of that year to capture the money title on both sides of the Atlantic.

But with every tournament, he's moving in the right direction.

"I've reached a point now where I'm very comfortable with everything in my game and my swing," he said. "I'm seeing shots the way I want to see them. When I do that, I feel like the scores are just a byproduct of all the hard work and making good swings."

SURPRISE, Ariz. — When Texas Rangers manager Ron Washington fills out his lineup card on opening day, he will likely write down the names of players from seven different countries, plus Puerto Rico.

Baseball is clearly universal at Texas.

"When we're out there on the field, we're all from the same country. We all represent the Texas Rangers," said Elvis Andrus, the shortstop from Venezuela. "Where you come from, or your nationality, actually don't matter. When we're all together, we're family."

Yu Darvish, the ace from Japan who finished second in the AL Cy Young voting last season, has been tabbed the opening day starter for the Rangers. His primary catcher is Geovany Soto from Puerto Rico.

The Rangers expected starting infield includes first baseman Prince Fielder (a Californian), second baseman Jurickson Profar from Curacao, Andrus and third baseman Adrian Beltre from the Dominican Republic. The planned outfield includes Shin-

Soo Choo from South Korea, Leonys Martin from Cuba and Alex Rios, who was born in Alabama but grew up in Puerto Rico.

"I was just putting baseball players out there," Washington said. "Geez, I never thought about all the different nationalities."

There are players from different cultures and different languages — the Rangers even have a translator well-

versed in both Japanese and Spanish.

But what never gets lost in translation is baseball and trying to get the Rangers to the playoffs for the fourth time in five years.

"Whoever can help our team to win ballgames, it doesn't matter what color. ... I don't think anybody is looking at nationality here, or colors, or anything," Beltre said. "Baseball is baseball no matter where you're from, and how you look. If you've got the talent to do your job well, you're going to be welcomed to open arms everywhere."

Over the past eight years, the Rangers have developed a strong presence in the Dominican Republic and that branched throughout Latin America. They also started scouting heavily in Japan and throughout the Pacific Rim — that is what

led to them bidding big and being able to sign Darvish two years ago.

"Our mentality is we want the best players regardless where they're from," general manager Jon Daniels said. "Obviously it's worked out that way, where we've got a lot of international players. Some of that is because I think we're open-minded to it, some of it is because a few years ago we set out to establish a prointernationalgram ly and feel that we've done well there."

The GM also points out that some of the formation of the current roster was the way players became available and the timing of such. He said the Rangers never set out to have an all-international starting lineup.

"It's unique, and I think each of these guys bring something different," he said. "I'm kind of looking forward to watching them come together."

Stewart confident about leg heading into Phoenix

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Tony Stewart does not consider the Daytona 500 a disaster, despite the engine problems that spoiled his return to racing from a broken right leg.

The three-time NA-SCAR champion wound up 35th in the season-opening race, but he logged enough laps during Speedweeks that he feels good going into the upcoming stretch of seven consecutive races. Stewart missed the final 15 races last year after breaking his leg in two places during a sprint car crash in Iowa.

His first time back in a race car was Feb. 14, the day before he competed — and was crashed out of — the exhibition Sprint Unlimited. He also raced in the Budweiser Duel before the 500, giving him 672 miles of racing in three events.

Stewart goes to Sunday's race at Phoenix International Raceway "a lot more confident

than I was before we got to Daytona."

"I think having all the races that we ran, and actually getting in a crash, while not a great thing, allowed me to sort of test my leg and it felt good," Stewart said in a Stewart-Haas

Racing team release. "There have been some little things that have felt a little different, but for the most part, it's felt like an old pair of tennis shoes that you're just comfortable with. I think the whole time in Daytona exceeded my expectations of what I hoped it would be like." But the 500 itself was

a letdown for SHR.

Stewart had the engine issue and Danica Patrick was involved in a crash and finished 40th. It left only Kevin Harvick and Kurt Busch, the two newcomers to the organization, in contention for a solid finish and both had difficulties at the end. Busch wound up 21st and Harvick was involved in the final accident of the race and finished a team-best 13th.

Stewart said Sunday's race at Phoenix will be a better indicator of where the team is than Daytona, one of only four restrictor-plate races on the schedule.

"Daytona and Talladega have always just been two different forms of racing," Stewart said, referring to the necessary teamwork and drafting. "What happens at Phoenix and the races after that has to be done on your own. You can't help each other at Phoenix. You just have to go race."

He likes his chances at Phoenix, where he has one win, eight topfives and 12 top-10s in 23 career starts. He's completed all but 14 of 7,257 laps on the 1-mile oval.

But PIR is also the

place that pushed Stewart into becoming a full-time race car driver in 1993. Still working eight-hour days at \$5-an-hour at a machine shop in Columbus, Ind., Stewart headed West to run USAC Silver Crown season-opening Copper World Classic. He qualified second to Davey Hamilton, then led 31 of 50 laps before finishing second to Mike Bliss.

Stewart earned \$3,500 that day — a payout that convinced him running the Silver Crown, Sprint and Midget races across the nation that year sounded a lot better than returning to the machine shop.

He never looked back, learning how to adapt in every kind of car he drove out of "fear that I'm going to have to get a real job if I'm not successful.

"To think that it all kind of started at Phoenix, I guess you could say it's the place where my career came full-circle," he said.

The 39-year-old Australian has won seven majors in her long career, but none since the Kraft Nabisco Championship in 2006. Her results have been consistent, if not dominant, in recent years — she had six top-10 finishes on the LPGA Tour last year and one win at the ShopRite LPGA Classic.

"I've had a good career and I feel like I want to finish in the fashion that I started," she said. "I just continue to work hard, and my working hard now is probably a little different to my working hard 20 years ago, but it's still working hard."

Webb birdied four of her first six holes on Thursday, then sank a difficult 15-foot putt to save par on the par-4 11th hole. Her only mistake on the green was a close miss on the 12th hole when her birdie putt from 2 feet lipped out of the hole.

Creamer has also had a fast start to the year, finishing tied for third at her first two tournaments — the Bahamas LPGA Classic and the Women's Australian Open. She's played well on this course in Singapore, too, finishing in third place here last year.

The American hasn't had a win on the LPGA Tour, though, since her breakthrough victory at the Women's U.S. Open in 2010.

"My main goal is just to be very consistent this year and a win happens by itself, you don't have to force any of that," she said.

World No. 1 Inbee Park, who finished runner-up to Sweden's Anna Nordqvist last week at the LPGA Thailand tournament, had a 2-under 70 and was in a tie for seventh with four others.

Park, the winner of three majors last year, could lose her top ranking to Suzann Pettersen this week if the Norwegian wins the event and Park doesn't finish higher than a tie for third. Pettersen had a 1-under 71 on Thursday for equal 12th place.

"It wasn't a bad putting day, but I hit the ball great today," Park said. "And I didn't get myself in big trouble so that's good."

Sixteen-year-old Lydia Ko of New Zealand struggled with her putting, making just two birdies and finishing at 1-over 73, tied for 27th place with Nordqvist, American Michelle Wie, former No. 1 Yani Tseng and several others.

Ko is not the youngest in the field this week. Fifteen-year-old Singaporean Amanda Tan won a qualifying tournament in January to become the youngest-ever player at the HSBC Champions. She was in last place after a 7-over 79. Friday, February 28, 2014

Yellen: Fed monitoring recent weaker outlook

WASHINGTON—Federal Reserve Chair Janet Yellen noted that economic data have pointed to weaker-than-expected gains in consumer spending and job growth. She said the Fed will be watching to see whether the slowdown proves only a temporary blip caused by severe winter weather.

Yellen's comments

gave encouragement to Wall Street. Investors read the remarks as offering at least a hint that the Fed might slow or suspend a pullback in its economic stimulus.

"We have seen quite a bit of soft data over the last month or six weeks," Yellen said, citing job growth, housing, retail sales and industrial production.

She said the Fed needs to "get a firmer handle on exactly how much of that

set of soft data can be explained by weather and what portion, if any, is due to a softer outlook."

Yellen repeated the Fed's assurances that its pullback in its bond purchases is "not on a preset course" and could be modified if there was a "significant change."

Yellen said the job market's recovery is "far from complete" and that she expects Fed policies to favor low interest rates "for quite some time."

S&P 500 hits record high

NEW YORK — After knocking on the door all week, the stock market logged a record on Thursday.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index had moved above its previous all-time high on numerous occasions this week, only to fade in afternoon trading. On Thursday, the index stayed higher after getting a boost from strong earnings reported by a number of U.S. companies including the drugmaker Mylan and several retailers.

The stock market has staged an impressive turnaround in February, after slumping at the start of the year on concerns about the prospects for growth in China and worries about the health of the U.S. economy. Growth in corporate earnings and optimism that the Federal Reserve will keep supporting the economy have helped support demand for stocks.

"In the last few days we've flirted with it, and now we've got

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 74.24, or 0.5, percent, to 16,272.65. The Dow is still about 1.8 percent below its record close of 16,576.66. The Nasdaq composite climbed 26.87 points, or 0.6 percent, to 4,318.93. The Nasdaq is also short of its record close of 5,048.62 set in March 2000.



Horses are far more interesting than they appear

have learned everything I know about horses from my daughter, Genna, who has had a love affair with the beautiful animals since she was 12. Unlike many young women, Genna didn't desert her horses for young men when she reached her teenage years but has kept coming back to them through marriage, two children and a horse-riding accident.

Genna first trained a horse at a YMCA Horse Camp in Ohio. After we moved to Florida, her stepfather took her to an auction where he bought her a beautiful, bay-colored Arabian thoroughbred filly. We moved Wendira, better known as Wendy, into a paddock next to our new home and Genna began the tedious chore of making a riding horse out of her. She also trained her in dressage.

For two years Genna also worked at Lady

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Lake Arabian, showing their beautiful Arabian horses at local and statewide horse shows. When she was 17 she decided she wanted to work with thoroughbreds in the summer, so she began looking for jobs in Ocala. After making phone calls and putting in applications she decided to go up to Irish Acres and see if she could convince them to hire her. On the way home, the smile on her face lit up the car. I laughed at her and said, "I never saw anyone so happy to get a job shoveling

horse manure." Her second year at Irish Acres, Genna finally was given a trailer on the farm to live in. Work on a horse farm begins at 6 a.m. The drive from Lady Lake took her an hour, which meant getting up at 4 a.m. to take care of her own horses before she left for work.

I went to visit Gen-

Call to reserve your spot today: (352) 430-2121 na in her trailer one day and was enjoying watching the yearlings romp in their field when suddenly they all began running right toward the trailer. I grabbed Genna and she laughed and said, "They know where the fence is and they won't go over it. They do this all the time." And sure enough they ran, thundering down through the field and around inside the fence until they had their fill.

Genna is now a night manager at a thoroughbred farm and works long hours, from 4 p.m. to 6 a.m., keeping watch over her beloved horses. The horse is a delicate animal in spite of its size and needs careful monitoring. Genna spends the night driving around the large acreage in a Gator, watering and feeding and checking up on about 30 horses. Her most immediate concerns are the mares in foal this time of year. Many of them are born at night.

Much of Genna's time is spent sitting in the mare barn watching the expectant mothers who are ready to foal. I telephone her late at night, and we talk when she isn't riding the range. me some of the funny things her charges do.

Did you know that horses play with toys? I can't imagine it, but Genna says they are really funny. They have a kind of stick ball that they play with by themselves and sometimes with the horse in the next stall. Out in the pasture they will sometimes pick up a large stick and carry it around in their mouth just like a dog.

She described to me how she was able to change the disposition of a nasty mare by sweet-talking her and playing with her.

Some horses are very affectionate and have definite likes and dislikes. She was cleaning up in a stall and one of the mares actually came over and hugged her by putting her head over Genna's shoulder and pulling



her up against her. Horses out in the pasture at night will sometimes have a sentinel stand guard while the rest of them lie down to sleep. I asked her why, and she told me that horses are prey animals and they do it to protect themselves. They also will snuggle up on a cold night to keep warm.

Nighttime on a horse farm can be an exciting place, according to Genna. It is much darker than in town, so you can see more stars and constellations. She often sees shooting stars when she is riding around checking on the horses.

Some nocturnal animals are attracted to the horse feed and water troughs. She often sees coyotes and, of course, owls and eagles. One night a funny, fat little possum was running in front of her vehicle and wouldn't get out of the way. It even turned around and ran under the front of the Gator. She finally got rid of the

possum and a rabbit ran out from the grass onto the roadway. The Fourth of July

The Fourth of July is not a good time on a horse farm because sometimes the fireworks spook the horses and they have to be watched carefully. They could stampede and hurt themselves.

Horses are subject to stomach problems, from which they can get very sick and even die. They will lie down on the ground and roll and can injure their insides.


Baby horses must have a series of shots just like human babies to keep them from catching communicable diseases. They also must have their hooves checked and trimmed regularly to prevent infections. On a horse farm, computers are used to keep track of the horse's immunizations and their accomplishments.

If you are interested in learning more about Florida horses, you can find thoroughbred farm tours on the internet. They are a good part of Florida's economy, and, by the way, they are a good place for a youngster to get a summer job.

Pioneers envisioned useful water routes across Florida

While looking at the Withlacoochee River, we got a little sidetracked by the once-proposed Trans Florida Canal, not to be confused with the Cross Florida Barge Canal, which had been started but thankfully stopped before completion.

We ended last week with the proposed Trans Florida Canal route through south Lake County, as described in the 1924 Polk Directory.

The next portion of the narrative mentioned another waterway, Shingle Creek, not previously mentioned in this series.

"The really interesting thing, however, is that out of Lake Louisa, below Clermont, southward, flows Shingle Creek, which passes through Lake Hatchineha and Davenport Creek, and thence into Lake Kissimmee; and through Okeechobee and the west canal, Lake Flirt and the Caloosahatchee River, past Ft. Myers, to the Gulf of Mexico, at the south end of Sanibel Island," the Polk Directory states. "This route makes it possible for a small boat to enter the St. Johns River at Jacksonville, and pass up

(six miles long), Lake Louisa, Shingle Creek, Davenport Creek, Lake Hatchineha, Lake Kissimmee, the Kissimmee River, Lake Okeechobee, the west canal, Lake Flirt, the Caloosahatchee River to the Gulf of Mexico, a distance of over four hundred miles."

Look back at the reference to Harris Creek. The editor added a note that it might be called Haynes Creek. It had been known as the Little Ocklawaha because it connected Lake Griffin to Lake Eustis. The Dora Canal was also called the Little Ocklawaha, as well as the Elfin River.

For years the waterway between lakes Griffin and Eustis was incorrectly spelled Haines Creek. Local historian and author Bobby Grenier took the sleight to Capt. Melton Haynes personally and fought a good fight to get the government to change it, which it did in 2005. The directory re-

minded readers the proposed canal would be an all-inland fresh water waterway. It also

mentioned its boon to tourism.

"It would be one of the finest trips in the United States, anywhere, if it were cleaned out; and at the same time there would be the east canal systems from Lake Okeechobee to Ft. Lauderdale, Palm Beach and Miami on the East Coast," the directory optimistically stated. "This is told to prove that Lake County is the backbone of the State, for we have traced the flow of water from Lake County to the Gulf of Mexico at two points and the Atlantic Ocean at two points."

The Polk Directory also promoted other benefits of a completed waterway across Florida.

"This project will not only give us water transportation to the great marts of the nation, thereby reducing freight rates, but will reclaim much valuable land, rich in nitrogen and humus," it stated. "It will open up 125 miles of lake coast in the county to water transportation and do for these points what the railroads have done for the interior; it will stimulate immigration to these fertile lands.

"It will make the most picturesque route in the United States. The Ocklawaha River trip from Silver Springs to Palatka has been enjoyed by countless thousands, but the continuation of the trip some 30 to 100 miles farther will add to variety and extent of the charm and beauty."

The article in the directory began, "From Lake County to the seven seas will soon be a reality for boats up to four-foot draught. Canals have already been constructed and the Federal engineers have plans drawn and the money has been appropriated by Congress for a lock at Moss Bluff."

US home sales plunged 5.1 percent in January

WASHINGTON — Sales of existing U.S. homes plummeted in January to the worst pace in 18 months. Cold weather, limited supplies of homes on the market and higher buying costs held back purchases.

The National Association of Realtors said Friday that sales fell to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 4.62 million units last month. That was down 5.1 percent from the December pace. The sales rate declined 5.1 percent over the previous 12 months.

5.09 million homes were sold, the most in seven years.

"Such a picture confirms that the U.S. housing market reached its peak at the end of 2013 and further reacceleration is unlikely near term," Annalisa Piazza of Newedge Strategy said in a research note.

Home building dipped 16 percent in January from December, the Commerce Department said this week. Signed contracts to buy homes plunged in December, foreshadowing the January drop-off, the Realtors said in a separate report.

The weather has kept would-be

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Higher mortgage rates and higher prices have contributed to a slowdown in home buying in five of the past six months. Freezing temperatures and snowstorms have also caused most housing activity to slip this winter. The flagging sales suggest a deceleration from the momentum for much of 2013, when

buyers from venturing to open houses, while construction crews have endured work stoppages.

But sales also declined in parts of the country where weather was less of a factor. This suggested that price pressures and tight inventories are also weighing on the real estate market.

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After buying a house, it can be wise to delay big projects

Although many buyers these days avoid properties that require major renovation, that doesn't mean they're shunning first-year projects designed primarily to make the houses they do purchase their own.

Even during the real-estate boom, when buyers often had some money left over after down-payment and closing costs, wisdom dictated that you didn't embark right away on anything too extensive. That wisdom still prevails.

If you've owned a house before, you have a sense of how to proceed. If you're a newbie, Jean Wolf, who recently downsized to a 16-year-old rancher in Gibbsboro, N.J., after 50 years in a large house, offered this advice:

"Let your thoughts simmer a little and live in the house for awhile. Your ideas will probably change."

"Our first major project was removing all window treatments, except for Venetian blinds, since some windows were covered with four layers," she said. A new refrigerator and

stove, more comfortable flooring and a patio were among other undertakings.

Jeff Block, an agent with Berkshire Hathaway Home Services Fox & Roach in Philadelphia, said that "if a home is in move-in condition, buyers prefer to wait a year or two, so they better understand how they use the space.

"Of course," he noted, "the danger here is one to two years plus procrastination, as well as being busy, often turns into five-plus years or never."

A priority, suggested Noelle Barbone, office manager at Weichert Realtors' Media, Pa., office, should be changing the locks "on all exterior doors (and) access codes to security systems and garage-door opener panels."

Sellers are, of course, supposed to surrender keys at closing, but there's always one that might have been provided to a neighbor for "when I'm away" situations that may have been forgotten. RichMcIlhenny, of Re/Max Services

in Blue Bell, Pa., said he reminds his buyers to consult their accountant "about deducting interest, points, real estate taxes and possibly moving expenses from their returns for that year."

To help that along, Barbone recommended placing a copy of the settlement sheet in your files, so that everything you need at tax time is in one place.

The best thing buyers can do right away? Start paying down the mortgage, said Martin Millner, an agent with Coldwell Banker Hearthside in Yardley, Pa.

"Making extra payments at the outset is a good habit to get into, and will pay dividends in terms of chopping time off the mortgage," Millner said.

Since many a pro-



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spective buyer has an inspector going over the properties under consideration with magnifying glass and fine-tooth comb, the obvious after-purchase task is to tackle the checklist.

Harris Gross, of Engineers for Home Inspection in Cherry Hill, N.J., suggests that buyers setting priorities for repairs or improvements start with safety (structural and water-related) and comfort issues (heating, cooling) rather than then cosmetics "such as pink wallpaper, outdated kitchen" and the like.

Does that ever happen?

Said Block: "When they call me to sell their home years later, sometimes they corrected most or all of the inspection items, and sometimes they end up disclosing the exact same list as their inspection report summary of defects."

Barbone and McIlhenny both cited as important getting the heating system tuned if it wasn't done by the seller under the agreement of sale.

McIlhenny recommended that the boiler or furnace be "serviced yearly and radiators bled if it is a hot-water system."

For older systems, contracts are often arranged with service providers of annual maintenance.

But even if the system is brand-new, a buyer should ask the installer's name and whether the warranty is transferrable.

If a home warranty was not offered as part of your purchase, buying one "makes sense because it covers items like appliances, heaters and water heaters," Barbone said. "It is \$500 well spent."

And don't forget those little things utterly unrelated to repairing or decorating but critical to living in any new place:

"Be sure to file a forwarding address with the post office," said Barbone. "Make yourself familiar with trash-collection days."

Said Millner: "The biggest mistake that buyers make is thinking that after they move into a house, they have to do everything at once.

"Generally," he said, "that is not realistic, and too often, they end up doing nothing."

With well over 2,000 named lakes, plenty of public landings and hundreds of smaller backwater fishing holes, the stretch Florida's Central Highlands south of Ocala that includes Lake and Sumter counties ranks today as one of the nation's premier freshwater fishing destinations.

In 1823, the Treaty of Moultrie Creek established the region as a reservation for Native Americans we generally called Seminoles. It wasn't a generous grant. Look at any map. There's almost as much water here as land.

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ary largemouth bass — "inch for inch, pound for pound, the greatest fish that swims" — that lures most anglers to our lakes and rivers.

Credit James Alexander Henshall for that. The scientist and later a commissioner of the U.S. Bureau of Fisheries had a passion for bass fishing. He thought Kentucky bass were the boldest and brawniest of the species. Then he visited Florida.

When the roads that first connected Leesburg, Tavares, Mount Dora and Clermont were sandy trails through woods, over pine ridges and across marshy plains, Henshall published the Book of the Black Bass.

It sparked a trend, then a tradition that today feeds an industry worth more than \$16 billion in the U.S. and about \$1 billion in retail sales annually in Florida.

Leesburg native Bill Brooker has been fishing local lakes and rivers all his life, and Brooker Bait & Tackle, 1351 W. North Boulevard in Leesburg, is a regular stop for local anglers and tournament pros who regularly visit the area. Brooker is a generous font of fishing facts and knows which fish are biting what and where almost every day. If fishing is your future, right now is the time.

"Bass fishing here is good all year around," Brooker explained, "but the best time to fish for anything around here is March through May and June."

For bass anglers, it's bedding season. Bass spawn from December into April where the water is warm enough around 58 degrees and usually near a log, a weed bed, a dock or a cypress knee.

Bucks fan the bottom with their tails to shape a sandy bed three to four feet across. The larger, fatter females, thick with roe, cruise the shallows, checking out the real estate and depositing their eggs where they find accommodations most suitable.

They will stand guard until the eggs hatch, fending off all sorts of real and imagined predators — including crank baits, spinners, even plastic worms — with swift, violent attacks.

They don't feed while

bedding, but trespassers get no mercy. And anglers with a deft touch can bring home a whole dinner on a single well-aimed cast.

Bass bed continuously in every lake and river in the region for the next two months or so, influenced by sunlight, water clarity, water temperature---which can change with each rain---available cover such as weeds, stumps and dock pilings and the curious gravitational pull of the sun and moon, once charted in almost every newspaper in America under the name "The Solunar Table."

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Generally, fish are most active around dawn and dusk, especially where conditions are ever-changing---at the mouths of rivers and streams, for example. When the weather turns cold black crappie — socalled "speckled perch," or just "specs," tend to school in the deepest channels and holes.

The casual rod-andreeler who happens upon one of those channels when school is in session soon learns why crappie anglers scoff at their bass-obsessed colleagues. Crappies are scrappy. In ideal conditions they will strike almost anything and the action can be non-stop and furious.

Bluegills and bream school in April, May and June, Brooker said.

A century ago "pot fishers" looking for supper made do with a piece of red twine and a strip of pork skin tied to a hook. William Bartram described backwoods "bobbers" in 1777 who attached feathers or a squirrel tail to a hook and dribbled it across the surface of the water.

Freshwater fishing is a bit more sophisticated, with hundreds of rods, reels and accessories and thousands of artificial baits designed as much to appeal to anglers as their prey.

Brooker said every tackle box should have a simple range of artificial baits.

squirrel tail to a hook "Plastic worms will and dribbled it across work almost anytime on almost every fish," Brooker said. "A rattling lure can irritate fish like bedding bass enough to draw a strike," he said.

Round that out with one or two topwater plugs that float, darters that swim erratically when worked, and a few spoons, spinners, and jigs and you're ready for almost anything that swims.

After that, Brooker

said, the most important skills any angler can develop are patience, persistence and peace of mind.

"Even a bad day fishing is a great day to be alive," Brooker said, a sentiment shared by Confucius, Marcus Aurelius and Dame Juliana Berners, the English nun who wrote the first book on fishing more than 500 years ago.

For Henry Wood, a retired Pepperidge Farm plant manager from North Carolina, no day is complete without a bicycle ride.

"I took it up to keep my diabetes in check," said the tall, lanky Wood. "Now, if I don't get in 10 or 20 miles or so I start to feel anxious, like I've missed something important," he said.

Wood is fortunate. With more than 90 miles of golf cart paths in The Villages, he doesn't have to worry much about automobile traffic.

Some 200 members of The Villages Bicycle Club venture outside the retirement enclave three times a week on group rides that average about 60 cyclists.

Their destinations — Camp Wildwood, Harbor Hills and Ocala National Forest — include some of the best reasons our part of Central Florida is a mecca for cycling enthusiasts.

In the past, hundreds of miles of rolling hillsides were the draw. Today, a combination of well-maintained offroad trails, converted rail lines and a growing number of bicycling parks and Cyclocross circuits make our part of the country one of the best bicycling regions in the state.

And that's not even counting our cyclefriendly weather.

Steve Perezluha knows almost every stretch of country road around here and almost every weather condition intimately.

Perezluha rides about 30,000 miles every year, much of it in Lake County, to train for international events.

Last year the 22-yearold won the Florida State Road Race Championships and placed third in the USA National Championship Time Trials in Wisconsin. Two years ago, Perezluha was the youngest competitor to finish the grueling Race Across America from Oceanside, California to Annapolis, Md. He finished ninth. The ride took him 12 days.

"Physiologically, Steve Perezluha is probably the best road racer in the U.S.," said Ken LaRoe. LaRoe, president of First Green Bank in Mount Dora, sponsored Perezluha last year and is himself an avid cyclist who rides hard three to four times a week.

For LaRoe, riding is a pleasurable pastime, but fitness is the goal, a key element of his personal and business philosophy.

"Physical fitness helps you focus, it helps you work hard and it helps you be more productive," said LaRoe, who pays a physical therapist to visit First Green Bank every month to help bank workers meet their per-

It's wild out there — our pesky pests and predators

Florida's tropical climate is well-suited to a variety of wildlife, some of which doesn't mix that well with humans. It has been said that everv body of water larger than a swimming pool has an alligator in it, and that's not much of an exaggeration. There are also snakes aplenty - a few of them poisonous - bears, covotes, panthers and hundreds of varieties of creepy crawly things.

It could be worse. South Florida has all those things, but it also has a swelling population of boa constrictors.

Here's a look at a few of the critters you might be forced to contend with.

GATORS

Florida is one of the few places on earth where you can see a modern-day dinosaur in your own backyard. The American alligator is a fearsome-looking creature, to be sure. They can grow to well over 600 pounds in the wild and their massive jaws are stacked with dozens of sharp teeth. But their stealthy manner is almost as frightening as their appearance. They glide alone

unseen underwater, or just below the surface, or they blend in with tall grass and logs along the banks of the state's many rivers and lakes.

Yet, for its ferocious countenance, the alligator is a surprisingly shy animal. Few people are ever attacked by alligators in Florida, and those who are unfortunate enough to tangle with these prehistoric monsters generally can blame bad luck more than bad intentions.

Pets can't say the same. Many a lakefront resident can tell stories about alligators bolting suddenly onto the banks and snatching a beloved Chihuahua or Yorkie that had the misfortune to wander too closely to the water.

Relocating them doesn't help because they find their way back to their original stomping grounds.

sonal fitness goals.

First Green even sponsors employees who enter cycling and other competitive sporting events to the tune of \$500 per worker.

LaRoe's road racing days ended three years ago when his wife, Cindy, was severely injured in a bicycle accident. It's no secret among touring cyclists in Central Florida that road riding can be perilous.

"In the old days a cyclist on a country road might have a problem with one out of 1,000 drivers," LaRoe said.

"These days, with people texting as they drive, it's more like one in 100," LaRoe cautioned.

That hasn't dampened LaRoe's enthusiasm. Instead, it's opened new alternatives, and thousands of area cyclists are taking part.

Rich Dybdahl of Pure Cycles in Mount Dora bubbles with enthusiasm for the newest cycling trend — cyclocross.

"Cyclocross is a combination of road racing and motocross," Dybdahl said. "Riders complete a set number of laps on a circuit with obstacles and straightaways and the best time for the ride wins."

Invented in Belgium, Cyclocross combines the best elements of road racing — the annual Tour de France is the most famous with what's called Criterium or "crit" racing, wherein riders complete multiple laps on a defined circuit that could snake through a downtown area or through suburbs.

"Cyclocross and Crit races are much more spectator-friendly," Dybdahl explained. "That's one of the reasons the events are increasingly popular here. Lots of people who like bicycle racing don't necessarily want to compete."

For Justin, Mike and Dana Ivancovich, coowners of Wildwood Cyclery, it's all about pleasure.

"We sponsor events, and a couple of our friends race, but most of our customers are looking for a pleasurable way to stay fit and enjoy the weather here," Justin explained. The family moved from Arizona three years ago to open Wildwood Cyclery.

"We came here because of The Villages," Justin said. "Today, Village residents are about half of our customers."

Bicycling can be expensive. Suitable starter bikes can be found in big box stores priced in the \$100 range, less for children's bikes. Good second-hand bikes on Craigslist can range up to \$300 and even more for name brands with special features.

But a serviceable bicycle for regular use will run in the \$300 to \$500 range to start and racing bikes, whether for trails through the woods or any of the numerous cycling events in the region, can range from \$500 well into the thousands.

"The smart thing is to work your way up before investing in a high quality bike, and don't neglect the safety gear such as helmets, lights and mirrors," Ivancovich said.

"Once you've ridden with others a few times and learned some of the basics, you'll be much better equipped to buy a bike that will last you for a long time," he said.



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
