Second Texas nurse tests positive for Ebola

DALLAS — The Ebola crisis in the U.S. took another alarming turn Wednesday with word that a second Dallas nurse caught the disease from a patient and flew across the Midwest aboard an airliner the day before she fell ill,

even though government guidelines should have kept her off the plane.

Amid growing concern, President Barack Obama canceled a campaign trip to address the outbreak and vowed that his administration would respond in a "much more aggressive way" to Ebola cases in the United States.

Though it was not clear

how the nurse contracted the virus, the case represented just the latest instance in which the disease that has ravaged one of the poorest corners of the earth — West Africa — also managed to find weak spots in one of the world's most advanced medical systems.

The second nurse was identified as 29-year-old Amber Joy Vinson.

Medical records provided to The Associated Press by Thomas Eric Duncan's family showed she inserted catheters, drew blood and dealt with Duncan's body fluids.

Duncan, who was diagnosed with Ebola after coming to the U.S. from Liberia, died Oct. 8.

Someone else's shoes

Downtown Tavares hosts blindness awareness event

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Once Sheryl Fernandes and Viv Morales were blindfolded with a mask and low-vision goggles, they entered a world of darkness and felt moments of fear and anxiety.

"This is scary and it's hard. I'm disoriented," said Morales, one of 20 participants who tried to maneuver around downtown Tavares for the "Close Your Eyes for White Cane Safety Day" hosted Wednesday morning by New Vision for Independence Inc., to raise awareness of blindness and low-vision impairment.

The two women were inspired to take part in the event on behalf of a blind male resident who recently moved to Benton House, an assisted living facility in Clermont, where they work.

"We wanted to learn some insight so that we can help him," Morales said. "This is something that we really need to learn," added Fernandes. "We want to make sure that we are

doing the right things for him."

They quickly found it is not easy to walk in a blind person's shoes. They were assigned to try to catch the bus, and they missed it. They also discovered it could be challenging walking around water puddles and maneuvering around curbs and crosswalks.

Some of the other two-member teams (one blindfolded, the other a guide) were assigned to ask for directions while walking a few blocks to different shops to make purchases or to climb the stairs of different government

Terminated Animal Services director disputes allegations

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The attorney representing Jacquelyn Johnston, who was terminated Oct. 10 as the county's Animal Services director, said her client disputes claims that she was responsible for euthanizing 147 animals in her short tenure.

Angela Root, in a letter Tuesday to the Lake

County Sheriff's Office, also states that Johnston was not in the county when 20 animals were put down in a single day.

"Ms. Johnston did not sign the kennel cards," Root said, referring to four initials that are needed prior to euthanasia.

In the nine days Johnston oversaw Animal Services, the center euthanized 147 animals,

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

and watch the fountain for a while and just relax."

Turkish company Via Properties bought the mall from Kohan Retail Investment Group in September.

"Via came in, they've got a vision for the mall, they see its potential and they want to make it happen," said Glidewell, who is in her 15th year with the mall. "We haven't had that in the past."

She said they will be meeting with contractors for the fountain and getting bids.

The interior of the mall is also being painted, changing colors

from pink and teal — which it has been for 34 years — to earth tones, Glidewell said.

The painting will start out in the center court and Glidewell said that area should be done in time for an Oct. 25 cruise-in car show at the mall so visitors can provide feedback. The painting should be starting within a week.

An interior landscaper will also be hired to work on the planters and to landscape the mall, Glidewell said.

In addition, she said the mall is working with AMC Lake Square 12 to renovate its theater and further changes are being discussed for the food court.

This past spring, Belk revamped

its store, changing colors from beige to a crisp white with accent walls of different colors, store manager Linley Bowyer said.

"We've repainted and reflowed the store to make a little bit more sense," she said. "So, that's why we're really excited to have the new mall owners that are wanting to revitalize the mall in this area because Belk is very invested in our communities."

Fabulous Finds, a consignment furniture store, moved into the mall over the summer.

"These new owners are motivated and they're motivated to make changes quick. Sooner is better for them, I can tell that," furniture store owner Don Mitchell said.

agencies to request documents.


"The big difference is there is no anticipation because you don't know when you are going to get somewhere because you can't see what is ahead," said Joanie Perciballi, who relied on Alisha Maraviglia, Tavares senior planner, as her guide.

"To put myself in another person's shoes and see what life is like without vision was really eye opening," added Nick Girone, a Mount Dora councilman, who was joined by his wife, Judy, as his guide.

Sandi Moore, executive director of the Leesburg Area Chamber of Commerce, said she is used to being independent, yet she had to rely more on her guide while blindfolded.

"It was a little humbling. You had to trust a lot more in every little thing, the little things that you take for granted," Moore said.

Wednesday's event marked the 50th anniversary of when the joint Congress proclaimed White Cane Safety Day in 1964 to promote the awareness and understanding of abilities and obstacles someone

with blindness faces every day.

"Life doesn't stop just because you lose your vision, at least it doesn't have to," said Chantel Buck, CEO and president of New Vision for Independence. "The importance (of this event) is helping to promote the abilities of someone with a visual impairment, and while everyday tasks can be difficult, they can certainly be overcome and that is what we try to do with our activities."

Based in Leesburg, the 10-year-

old nonprofit organization of New Vision provides free, adaptive training and services to residents of all ages in Lake and Sumter counties.

"Our youngest client has been 10-weeks-old and our oldest client has been 105," Buck said. "We run the gamut of services, and our services are provided at no cost to those that need us."

according to Lt. John Herrell, spokesman for the sheriff. On Oct. 9, sheriff's officials learned she euthanized 18 dogs and two cats.

Root said she disputes the total number of euthanizations. She has made a public records request for the kennel cards but said she has yet to see them.

Root says that while her client understands that Florida is an "at-will" employment state and she accepts her termination, the press release and statements from the Sheriff's Office concerning her client's termination is a "wholly fabricated version of events."

"The press release has ruined my client's career and led to worldwide, non-stop death threats," Root wrote. She said her client believes that euthanasia should be the last resort.

Sheriff Gary Borders previously said the majority of the animals

euthanized last week were sick or vicious.

In total, 49 dogs, 94 cats and four raccoons were euthanized, according to Herrell.

"Of those 49 dogs, 11 of them were brought in by their owners, who requested to have them put down due to illnesses," Herrell said.

Overall, eight animals euthanized during Johnston's tenure were adoptable, Herrell said.

After learning of the numerous animals euthanized on Oct. 9, Borders terminated Johnston the following day, Herrell said.

Root's letter contends the animals were euthanized by the kennel director, Jennifer Ferguson, in an effort to get Ms. Johnston terminated.

Root added far more animals were euthanized than her client was told previously.

"Ms. Ferguson went completely rogue and defied Ms. Johnston, and pulled far more animals then necessary and euthanized more animals than needed," Root wrote. "She

informed Ms. Johnston she needed space for approximately eight dogs and then pulled (10) more dogs than necessary and euthanized all of them."

Before joining Lake County this month, Johnston served as clinic supervisor for Miami-Dade Animal Services for three years.

Her last day there was Feb. 13, but it was not immediately clear why she lost her job.

Root said her client's job was eliminated due to alleged fiscal challenges.

Further, Root said she is requesting a meeting with Borders to discuss a resolution regarding the vilification of her client.

If a meeting is not held within the next two weeks, Root said her client will have no choice but to explore all legal options.

Johnston is the third director to leave the facility in a short amount of time. Previously, the head of the Animal Services division announced her resignation in March, citing a tight budget and public pressure over the department's euthanization

rate. Cyndi Nason was the second director of Animal Services to resign within the past year.

Nason and Marjorie Boyd both resigned amid pressure from animal activists who claimed the shelter was putting down too many animals.

Before Nason took the position last May, two internal audits — one focused on the shelter's record keeping and the other on pet licensing laws — cited at least 45 areas for improvements.

But the public criticism is only partly the reason for resignations, county officials said, pointing to funding issues that kept the county from hiring a field supervisor and rescue coordinator to help take the pressure off the director.

In August, two follow-up audits on Lake County Animal Services found the shelter still has problems with cash management, record keeping, proper recording of liens and facility needs.

Herrell said the Sheriff's Office did not have a comment.

Ohio, where three of Vinson's relatives work, confirmed she was the latest patient.

Even though the nurse did not report having a fever until Tuesday, the day after she returned home, the director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said she should not have boarded a commercial flight.

The nurse also knew before heading home that another nurse, Nina Pham, had been diagnosed with Ebola, and she had a slightly elevated temperature — 99.5 degrees, according to government officials.

While in Cleveland, she was contacted by health officials and told that her health would need to be more closely monitored for Ebola, the CDC said. It was unclear whether she was told not to fly.

From now on, CDC Director Tom Frieden said, no one else involved in Duncan's care will be allowed to travel "other than in a controlled environment." He cited guidelines that permit charter flights or travel by car but no public transportation.

On its website, the CDC says all people possibly exposed to Ebola should restrict their travels — including by avoiding commercial flights — for 21 days.

Ebola patients are not considered contagious until they have symptoms. Frieden

said it was unlikely that others on the plane were at risk because the nurse was not

vomiting or bleeding. Even so, the CDC is alerting the 132 passengers who were aboard Frontier Airlines Flight 1143 from Cleveland to Dallas-Fort Worth on Monday "because of the proximity in time between the evening flight and first report of illness the following morning." Officials are asking passengers to call the health agency so they can be monitored. The nurse flew from Dallas to Cleveland on Friday, Oct. 10.

Kent State said it was asking the workers related to Vinson to stay off campus for 21 days "out of an abundance of caution."

Her Ebola diagnosis was confirmed Wednesday.

Police looking for Walgreens robber

Leesburg police are investigating a Tuesday robbery at a Walgreens.

The incident happened about 5:45 p.m. at the drugstore on 27440 S. U.S. Highway 27.

According to a police report, a man wearing a black hoodie and sunglasses approached the counter and handed the Walgreens clerk a note that read "Give me the money, this is not a joke."

The clerk opened the register, the suspect grabbed an undisclosed amount of cash and fled in a white, 1990-era, two-door Honda Civic.

The vehicle was last seen traveling east on County Road 48.

The suspect is described as a white man about 20 to 30 years old, 5-feet-8 to 5-feet-10 and with a scruffy beard.

Teen horsing around arrested on exposure charges

A Sumter County teen, accused of performing a sexual act on a stuffed toy horse in a Wal-Mart full of customers, was arrested Tuesday.

According to an arrest report, Sean Johnson of Lake Panasoffkee was spotted removing a stuffed horse off a shelf and taking it to the bedding department. There, the 19-year-old allegedly pulled his pants down and performed a sex act on the toy.

Johnson then allegedly put the horse inside a comforter set and fled the store. But police were able to catch him as he was driving out of the parking lot, Brooksville Police Chief George Turner said.

Johnson was charged with indecent exposure and criminal mischief. He was released after posting a \$1,500 bond.

According to a handwritten statement, Johnson admitted "I did unmentionables to a stuffed animal."

Vehicular homicide nets 10-year prison term


A 26-year-old man was sentenced to 10 years in prison Monday on vehicular homicide charges stemming from a 2012 head-on crash on the Florida Turnpike in Lake County.

The sentence was part of an open plea by Lewis Anthony Fontana, of Winter Garden.

The crash occurred on Feb. 26, 2012, near mile marker 274 on the turnpike. According to an earlier interview with Sgt. Kim Montes, FHP spokeswoman, for "unknown reasons, Fontana was driving a 2011 Toyota pickup south in the northbound lanes."

The truck struck the front of a northbound BMW driven by Tammy Bryan, 36, of Ocala. She died at the scene.

Fontana was initially charged with DUI manslaughter and DUI with serious bodily injury before the State Attorney's Office switched it to vehicular homicide.

Residents ask commission to create sanctuary

Some people say asking City Hall for help is for the birds, and in this case they're right.

Thirty residents who live off the Ninth Street Canal on Island Way, Loves Point Drive, Rivera Drive

and Park Drive in Leesburg want to create a bird sanctuary in their neighborhood. The idea is being backed by Commissioner Bill Polk.

"I'm glad we're doing it," Polk said of the plan aimed at keeping hunters at bay in that neighborhood.

"They've been hunting


back there ever since they changed the gun laws," he said. "The Stand Your Ground law made it where you could shoot in your backyard, even in the city."

The commissioner noted many residents along the Ninth Street Canal had been feeding ducks for years — back before hunt-

ers began using the canal area as their personal shooting range.

"I even lived on the canal for 30 years, and I'm a hunter, but I never hunted back there," Polk said, expressing concern about the danger of guns being fired in city neighborhoods with

Nasty debate

Scott, Crist fight over jobs, law, electric fan

DAVIE — The Florida governor's race that was already one of the most negative in the state's history became even nastier — and weirder — as Republican Gov. Rick Scott and Democrat Charlie Crist fought over everything from self-defense laws and the economy to the use of an electric fan during a debate Wednesday night.

The start of the second debate was delayed by about five minutes as confused panelists pointed out that neither candidate was on stage. At that moment, Crist walked out and the audience was told Scott was refusing to join him because Crist had a small fan inside his lectern. The panelists spent a few minutes deciding what to do, with Crist insisting the debate go on without Scott.

The governor eventually walked on stage, and Crist kept his fan. With that flap over, the candidates continued the attacks on each other that

have marked the campaign. There is little common ground between Scott and Crist, which Crist noted after both men talked about their faith in God.

"I'm happy to be a Methodist, too. Maybe it's the only thing we agree on, Rick," said Crist, who preceded Scott as governor before he switched parties from Republican to Democrat.

The candidates disagreed on gay marriage and Florida's "stand your ground" law, as well as how each has handled education and the environment. They also blamed each other for rising utility costs.

When the candidates were asked if justice was served when neighborhood watch

volunteer George Zimmerman was acquitted of murder for fatally shooting unarmed teenager Trayvon Martin last year, Crist used the opportunity to suggest amending the stand your ground law, which allows use of deadly force if people are in fear for their lives.

"Everyone believes in that American premise and it is the right thing to do to defend yourself and your property," Crist said. "But when it gets to the point where you have a statute on the books that allows the instigator ... to end up killing another human being after they started the incident, there is something fundamentally wrong with

UF picks Cornell Provost Fuchs as next president

GAINESVILLE — Cornell University's provost was selected Wednesday as the University of Florida's next president, replacing Bernie Machen as the state's largest university continues its drive to become a Top 10 public university nationwide.

After three days of interviews and meetings the Board of Trustees named W. Kent Fuchs as the 161-year-old school's 12th president. The other finalist was New York University Provost David McLaughlin.

Once ratified by the Florida Board of Governors on Nov. 5 or 6, Fuchs' tenure will begin Jan. 1.

"It's going to be a great privilege to be a part of the Gator nation, to be one of the most enthusiastic Gator fans out there, to build on the legacy of excellence the leadership here was able to achieve and to take it to new heights," he said.

Fuchs' experience at Cornell fits in well with UF's top

A toll booth collector working just outside of Leesburg was arrested on his job early Wednesday after being accused of pocketing money from motorists.

Carlos Luis Acevedo, 29, was charged with grand theft and remained in the Lake County jail late Wednesday morning in lieu of 2,500 bail.





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Florida to spend millions on Ebola preparation

TALLAHASSEE — The nation's Ebola crisis has yet to reach Florida, but state officials want to spend millions to prepare for a possible outbreak.

This week, top health official asked for permission to redirect money from federal grants to buy full body suits for health care workers who may have contact with any potential victims of the virus.

Dr. John Armstrong, secretary of the Department of Health, said in a letter to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention that the state wants to spend more than \$7 million on the effort. The state plans to start spending more than \$1 million from accounts it controls, but is seeking a green light to use federal grant money for the

rest of the purchases.

Gov. Rick Scott has previously asked for 100 special suits from the federal government as well as 30 additional Ebola testing kits but the request has not been granted.

Florida does not have any confirmed cases of the virus, which is transmitted through direct contact with bodily fluids and not through the air.

Scott said he wants the federal government to act within the next 48 hours now that it has been reported that a second Dallas nurse caught the disease from a patient.

"In light of this second case in Dallas today, we are asking the CDC to support our

work to redirect these federal funds for Ebola preparedness," Scott said in a statement.

Scott previously called on hospitals to hold mandatory training to prepare their employees for Ebola. The department reported Wednesday that only 39 hospitals in Florida have reported that their training is complete.

The governor has also asked federal officials to brief Florida hospitals in the next two days on how to be prepared.

"We have to act with a sense of urgency to ensure our hospitals are prepared," said Scott, who ran a chain of hospitals in the '90s.

In Lake County, Saunders was involved with Lake-Sumter State College, the Lake County League of Cities and Leadership Lake County.

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

A nauseating day for Wall Street

NEW YORK — Fear drove Wall Street to one of its most dramatic, nauseating days in years on Wednesday.

Investors fled stocks and poured into bonds as worries about a global economic slowdown intensified. The Dow Jones industrial average dropped 460 points in afternoon trading, all three U.S. stock indexes were in negative territory for the year, and the so-called fear index spiked.

A late recovery limited the damage and left stocks mostly lower. But investors were shaken after the heaviest day of trading in more than three years.

"I think it's fair to call it a global growth scare right now," said Bill Stone, chief investment strategist at PNC Asset Management.

Investor concerns of a worldwide economic slowdown turned into outright fear after weeks of turbulence. Germany, Europe's biggest economy is struggling. Greece, a key actor in Europe's debt crisis three years

ago, could see its government collapse next year, putting a crucial bailout program in danger. A batch of worrisome economic news in the U.S. also fueled the selling.

Traders sold riskier investments and moved money into U.S. government bonds, gold and cash.

By the end of the day, the Dow Jones industrial average lost 173.45 points, or 1 percent, to 16,141.74. The Standard & Poor's 500 index lost 15.21 points, or 0.8 percent, to 1,862.49 and the Nasdaq composite dropped 11.85 points, or 0.3 percent, to 4,215.32.

The yield on the benchmark U.S. 10-

year note fell from 2.20 percent to below 1.91 percent. By the end of the day, it pulled back to a yield of 2.14 percent. The yield on bonds moves in the opposite direction of prices.

"It typically takes weeks for 10-year Treasurys to move 29 basis points," noted Tom Di Galoma at ED&F Man Capital. "Today it moved 29 basis points in 5 minutes."

Stone said he thought the plunge in bond yields likely played a role in the stock market's steep drop in early trading.

"I don't care who you are: to see the 10-year near 2 percent is shocking," he said.

Investors have grown

nervous of a stock market that had pushed ever higher, even in the face of a weakening global economy. The U.S. market has also not had a correction, a technical term for when a stock or index falls 10 percent or more, in more than 3 years. Historically a correction happens every 18 months.

Wednesday's slide brings the market closer to that long-predicted but elusive correction.

Michael Binger, senior portfolio manager at Gradient Investments, said that investors may have started to step back into the market in the last hour of trading as the S&P 500 approached a drop of close to 10 percent from its record close of Sept. 18.

"The market has been waiting for this 5 to 10 percent correction for quite some time, and we got it," he said.

Many market watchers say occasional corrections are a healthy phenomenon over the long term and give investors an opportunity to add to their holdings at a lower cost.

NEW YORK — Wal-Mart Stores Inc. cut its outlook for revenue growth for the current fiscal year as it confronts a tough global economic environment.

The world's largest company now expects annual sales to be up 2 to 3 percent, down from its guidance of 3 percent to 5 percent growth that it released a year ago.

The reduced guidance, announced at its annual analysts' meeting, comes as the Bentonville, Arkansas-based retailer reduces its capital spending on its physical stores because of its move to halve the store growth of its supercenters. At the same time, it's increasing its investment in online operations in an effort to pursue customers where they are shopping. That means spending \$10.4 billion to \$11.4 billion in capital expenditures on its physical stores during the next fiscal year. That's down from \$11.6 billion to \$12 billion be-

ing planned for the current year. The company plans to spending \$1.2 billion to \$1.5 billion on its e-commerce operations this fiscal year, up from a planned \$1 billion this year.

It's also conducting a major review of its U.S. Wal-Mart business and will update investors on its plans early next year, executives said.

"We'll give customers the choices they want and need by integrating digital and physical retail," said Doug McMillon, Wal-Mart's CEO and president, who took over the reins from Mike Duke in February. "We won't be just a store on the street. We'll support our customers' lives with them in the driver's seat, to save them money and time."

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



The Federal Reserve's latest tally of industrial production should shed light on how manufacturing is faring.



Police should be required to know the laws they enforce

Ignorance of the law is no excuse" — except when you're a police officer. That's essentially the argument the state of North Carolina made to the U.S. Supreme Court last week when it defended the drug conviction of a man whose car was stopped by police based on a misunderstanding of a state traffic law.

Great constitutional cases often involve small-time offenses and routine police work, and this is no exception. When an officer in the Surry County Sheriff's Department saw a Ford Escort with a broken right brake light, he pulled the car over and told the occupants he was citing them "for a nonfunctioning brake light." Apparently suspicious, the officer asked the owner of the car, Nicholas Heien, if he could search it.

The search turned up a plastic sandwich bag containing cocaine, and Heien was arrested. But then an interesting fact emerged: North Carolina law says that no person may operate a motor vehicle "unless it shall be equipped with a stop lamp on the rear of the vehicle." Heien's Escort had "a" working brake light — the left one. The issue for the North Carolina courts, and now for the Supreme Court, is whether the stop was reasonable under the 4th Amendment. If the Supreme Court rules that it wasn't, Heien can return to the state courts and argue that the evidence should be excluded.

In previous decisions, the court has held that evidence from a search can be admitted at trial if the police made a "good faith" mistake of fact — such as relying on a warrant that contained the wrong address. But mistakes of law are another matter. Heien's lawyers concede in their brief that "officers need flexibility to make quick, ad hoc factual assessments in the field — and they are expert in doing so. The law, by contrast, lends itself to careful ... analysis." A police officer can't read up in advance on every factual contingency or be expected to know that a search warrant is defective. But he can study the law at his leisure before he has to enforce it. And if police aren't penalized for making stops based on ignorance of the law, they won't have any incentive to educate themselves.

Because traffic codes are filled with minor and sometimes arcane requirements, it's already too easy for police to stop a car ostensibly because of a minor infraction but actually because they have a hunch that the vehicle contains drugs or other evidence of a serious crime. It would undermine the protections of the 4th Amendment even more if police could stop and possibly search a car because of a violation of a law that existed only in the officer's mind. The Supreme Court must hold law enforcement to a higher standard.

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
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

Leon Panetta shines helpful light on the White House

Thanks, thanks and more thanks to Leon Panetta, a former congressman, secretary of defense, budget director, White House chief of staff and head of three different agencies, including the CIA — someone, in short, who knows his way around Washington. He has made it clear the current political stalemate there is at least partly traceable to the leadership shortcomings of President Barack Obama. The observation matters.

It matters because Panetta has credibility and because a contrary view is proving a threat to fundamental American principles. That contrary view is that it's House Republicans who are solely at fault for absolutely refusing to compromise on much of anything. Panetta, who worked with Obama when he was heading up defense and the CIA, hardly lets the House off the hook, but sees Obama as isolated, overly professorial and consequently missing in action.

"My experience in Washington is that logic alone doesn't work," he said in an MSNBC interview about his new book, "Worthy Fights," which has stirred up lots of debate. "Once you lay out a position, you are going to roll up your sleeves and you have to fight to get it done. This is key in Washington. In order for presidents to succeed, they cannot just, when they run into problems, step back and give up."

It seemed to him, he said, that the president had done just that on budgetary, immigration, infrastructure and other issues. Without nearly as close-up a view, others have noticed the same thing. Obama has seldom bothered to get in the ring and tussle. To be sure, he has given lots of provocative speech-

He rewrites laws through a technique — issuing executive orders — that bypasses Congress and the Constitution. His defenders say other presidents have issued more, only there is a difference. es at fundraisers, but that can be the opposite of getting the other side to go along with something. Panetta says he has seen better presidents at work, such as the one he served as chief of staff, Bill Clinton. He vigorously engaged with equally fierce Republican opposition and found ways to make perfectly fine deals.

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presidents have issued more, only there is a difference. Most mainly did it on relatively small matters the power was meant to address rather than on very large matters it was not meant to address.

Some liberals say, well, you know, this technique is acceptable because there is no other way to achieve ends they see as vital. They are wrong on at least two counts, the first and most important of which is that their governmental druthers are not a fraction as important as maintaining a democratic republic in which those in high office actually obey the law and in which rights and freedoms are kept intact.

Yes, there are major issues that need addressing — a potentially ruinous debt, as an example of one the liberals do not worry much about — but there are other means of coping with stalemate. How about leadership by the president and more effort by a Senate that passes far fewer bills than the House. Just maybe Panetta and other critics have helped wake up Obama, maybe the president will find ways to get the House to compromise and maybe the upcoming midterm election will revitalized a Senate that is mostly practiced these days in snorting.

Panetta, who has primarily received attention for what he said in the book about Obama's foreign policy errors, has been kicked hard by some who think it egregiously shameful to embarrass the president. What about serving the country? Whether they work or not, Panetta's observations are aimed at that objective. Do these critics think that is such a bad thing to do?

Ex-LHS hoops standout Foster signs pro contract in Canada

PJ Foster is playing for pay.

The former Leesburg High School standout signed a deal recently to play professional basketball for the Halifax Rainmen in the National Basketball League of Canada.

"I called his college coach to ask about Foster and the two words he said about him were, 'not human,'" said Andre Livingston, owner of the Rainmen. "The kid hit 155 (3-pointers) in a college season. That's flat out shooting. If opponents fall asleep on him, he will make them pay."

Prior to signing with the Rainmen, Foster had tryouts with the Orlando Magic and Phoenix Suns in the NBA.

Foster played collegiately at Limestone College in Gaffney, S.C. A shooting guard with the Saints, he exploded onto the national scene during his senior season when he led the nation in 3-point shots made and attempted.

In two years at Limestone, Foster sank 235 triples. He helped Limestone to back-to-back NCAA tournament appearances, a Conference Carolinas regular-season title as a junior and a tournament championship to go along with a 21-9

record as a senior.

Foster was All-Conference first team and was the league tournament MVP. He led the Saints in scoring in 2013-14 and averaged 19.7 points per game while shooting 44 percent from the field.

"We are so excited for PJ," Limestone coach Brandon Scott said. "He has worked so hard on his game, and no one is more deserving of this awesome opportunity. He was such an easy player to coach as he was always willing to do whatever we asked him to do for the team."

SEC's Sankey embraces challenge of shaping the future of college sports

ATLANTA — Greg Sankey is limping around on a knee that is feeling the effects of 41 marathons, most of which he has run during the last 12 years when he has been working as the Southeastern Conference commissioner's right-hand man.

A few years back Sankey decided to run a marathon a month for a year.

He ended up doing it for 15 straight months, and

one month he ran two. The 50-year-old upstate New Yorker-turned-honorary-Southerner has never shied away from taking on challenges. And he may have a big one coming up next year.

As the SEC's executive associate commissioner and chief operating officer since March 2012, he's been handling day-to-day operations while Commissioner Mike Slive worked on major projects such as the SEC Network and the College

Football Playoff. The 74-year-old Slive announced Tuesday he will retire in July 2015. Sankey could very well be his replacement.

"Bottom line, I think

he has the potential to be one of the truly great leaders in intercollegiate athletics," Conference USA Commissioner Britton Banowsky said.

Freshmen emerging across the SEC

BATON ROUGE —The latest performances of Georgia's Nick Chubb and LSU's Leonard Fournette have firmly established them as players to watch in the Southeastern Conference — for the rest of this season and perhaps the next two.

Both ran for about 140 yards, serving as examples that freshmen are flourishing in the mighty SEC.

All across the league, coaches at programs ranging from the top to the bottom of the standings are showing they're willing to let recruits fresh out of high school compete for major roles — and many are showing they deserve it.

Chubb's rise was on the sudden side because he was predictably placed in a backup role behind Heisman Trophy candidate Todd Gurley. But when Gurley was suspended indefinitely last week because of accusations he violated NCAA rules by signing autographs for money, Chubb was thrust into a starting role. He delivered with 143 yards on 38 carries in a 34-0 rout of Missouri, letting fans of 10th-ranked know that the Bulldogs' running game could continue

to be a force for the immediate and long-term future.

"I knew going into the game that obviously we can still win with Chubb in there," Georgia quarterback Hutson Mason said, adding that the only thing he worried about was Chubb's durability. "The only thing I remember is him taking some hard licks and getting back up. He's just a tough cat. A lot of times, you don't really appreciate what a guy is doing in the SEC as an 18-year-old rookie who just graduated from high school,

carrying the team on his back."

At Texas A&M, defensive end Myles Garrett has 7 1/2 sacks, which is an Aggies freshman record. Speedy Noil is a fixture in the No. 21 Aggies' passing game, with 27 catches for 360 yards and three touchdowns. He is also the Aggies primary punt returner.

"I don't bring guys here to stand next to me on the sideline. The best guys play," Texas A&M coach Kevin Sumlin said recently. "Experience is relative. Just because you're a junior, if you haven't played, what kind of experience

is that? We're recruiting at a level where guys are coming into this program to compete and play."

At No. 3 Mississippi, freshman defensive end Marquis Haynes is coming off a two-sack performance at Texas A&M last weekend.

The leading punter in the SEC is Alabama freshman JK Scott, with an average of 46.7-yards per punt. The No. 7 Crimson Tide is also starting a freshman at left tackle, though the 6-foot-6, 323-pound Cameron Robinson hardly looks like one.

Rebuilding teams with newer coaches are bound to have more youth in the lineup. That holds true with second-year coach Butch Jones at Tennessee.

Freshman Jalen Hurd is the No. 1 running back and one of five true freshmen starters on offense, along with tight end Ethan Wolf, who has 15 catches for 134 yards. Already, Tennessee is looking more competitive, raising hopes that the Volunteers will be a rising force in the SEC East in coming seasons.

"It's exciting to see how much time we have to get bigger and stronger and faster and smarter and see what things are going to happen," Wolf said.

ranking, probably too far to climb into play-off contention.

That means the Seminoles are the conference's best — and perhaps only — hope of getting an ACC team into a four-team playoff that will leave out at least one power conference champion. If the Seminoles lose this weekend to the last currently ranked team on their schedule, the ACC could lose out on a postseason berth, the \$6 million payday that goes along with it and bear the stigma of being the worst of the Big Five leagues.

The Atlantic Coast Conference has only Florida State.

The defending NCAA champions have cruised to a 6-0 record and a comfortable spot near the top of the Top 25. But as the second-ranked Seminoles (6-0) head into this weekend's game against No. 5 Notre Dame, they are carrying not only their own title hopes but those of their whole conference.

"You want the league to do good; you want the league to do good nationally, no doubt about it," said North Carolina coach Larry Fedora, who like many of his colleagues added that he was mostly worried about his own team, for now.

But that only goes so far.

"You don't want to root for your enemy, but the enemy of your enemy is your friend," BC lineman Bobby Vardaro said, mindful of the fact that the Eagles and Seminoles will meet on Nov. 22. "Then it just looks a lot better when we beat them."

North Carolina quarterback Marquise Williams doesn't have any divided loyalties.

The foundation of college sports is being threatened in the courts, and their structure is being revamped. Sankey embraces the task of plotting a course for their future.

"Part of my effort to educate myself is trying to learn history. Where we've been and why," he said in a lengthy interview with the AP at the start of the football season. "One of the things you learn is it has always been a bit of a struggle, the tension between the existence of college athletics on campus.

"From a core standpoint it exists on our campuses because it's centered on education. Sometimes there's stress in there. There are problematic stories. There are volumes of great stories."

Sankey grew up in Auburn, New York, and went to college to be an engineer. That lasted about two years. He said he still remembers the spot in the garage of his childhood home where he told his father, a pipefitter, that he wanted to teach and coach basketball.

"So I became a phys. ed. major," he said. "It's like the most extreme transition you can make educationally."

Intellectual curiosity and willingness to make do have guided Sankey's career.

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Jets hope to turn season around with upset of Pats

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — The New England Patriots turned their season around in plenty of time.

It's probably too late for the New York Jets, especially if they drop their sixth straight game when they visit the heavily favored Patriots on Thursday night.

"We're desperate, to say the least," Jets coach Rex Ryan said.

The Patriots (4-2) quickly recovered from their low point, a 41-14 loss to the Kansas City Chiefs that unleashed speculation quarterback Tom Brady was slipping and coach Bill Belichick's genius was fading.

Unlike the Jets (1-5), that slide lasted just one week. A 43-17 rout of the NFL's last unbeaten team, the Cincinnati Bengals, took care of that. And they followed it with a 37-22 road win over the Buffalo Bills.

"We'll have to keep perspective," Brady said, "not ride the highs and lows because there's a lot of them."

The Patriots had just five offensive touchdowns in a stretch of 14 quarters, then scored seven in the last eight. Against Buffalo, Brady had his best game of the season

with 361 yards passing, four touchdown passes and completions to 10 receivers.

Ryan certainly didn't believe the criticism of the two-time MVP.

"That was hysterical," he said. "You know what I mean? It's like, 'Yeah, really? OK.' I mean, come on."


Now if he could only brush off criticism of his own quarterback so easily.

Geno Smith is last in passer rating in the league and was replaced in the fifth game by Michael Vick, who said he wasn't prepared. Smith started last Sunday's 31-17 loss to the Denver Broncos and Ryan is sticking with him against the Patriots.

"We have an opportunity here to kind of right the ship with our first division game," Smith said. "There is a shot. It's definitely one that's a stretch, but as long as we've got a shot, we've got an opportunity."

The first-place Patriots have a big edge over their last-place AFC East rival.

Brady has won 40 consecutive regular-season home games against AFC opponents and is 6-0 in Thursday night games. And a New England defense that has allowed the fifth-fewest yards in the NFL goes against an offense that has gained the

third fewest.

The Jets rushed for just 31 yards against Denver, but the Patriots are wary of the potential of running backs Chris Ivory and Chris Johnson.

"They're a big part of their offense," Patriots safety Devin McCourty said, not necessarily a good thing considering how the offense has struggled. "When you have two guys like that, it makes it tough to stop the running game."

Some things to look for as Ryan tries to break the longest losing streak in his six

seasons as Jets coach:

INJURY LIST: Both teams will be without key players who sustained major injuries last Sunday. Jets CB Dee Milliner (torn right Achilles tendon) and left guard Brian Winters (torn anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee) were placed on season-ending injured reserve. Patriots linebacker Jerod Mayo, their leading tackler, and running back Stevan Ridley, their top rusher, are out with serious right knee injuries.

"It hurts to lose a guy who's given so much to this team for so long," Patriots


linebacker Dont'a Hightower said of Mayo. "Not one man can fill those shoes."

REVIS VS. RYAN: Darrelle Revis faces the team with which he developed into a star cornerback from 2007-12 before leaving the Jets for Tampa Bay. In last year's opener, he had one tackle for the Buccaneers against his former team. He'll play the Jets for the second time on Thursday night.

"He's a great player, obviously," Ryan said. "Matching him on the top receivers and things like that. He's still just a great player."

GETTING THEIR KICKS: If the game comes down to field goals, both teams are in good shape. Nick Folk has made all nine of his attempts for the Jets and Stephen Gostkowski is 16 for 17 for the Patriots. He made his first 13, then missed a 36-yarder on a bad snap last Sunday. Then he connected from 42, 53 and 40 yards.

TURNING IT OVER: The Jets are tied for last in the NFL with a minus-9 turnover differential. The Patriots are tied for first at plus-9. Last Sunday, the Jets had a chance to tie with the ball deep in their territory with less than a minute left. But two plays later, Aqib Talib returned an interception for the clinching touchdown for Denver.

Redskins' RG3 practices, will reclaim starting job

ASHBURN, Va. — Robert Griffin III returned to practice Wednesday for the Washington Redskins, and coach Jay Gruden confirmed that the third-year quarterback will regain the starter's job this season.

Griffin threw passes in individual and one-on-one drills in his first such work since he dislocated his left ankle in Week 2.

"Once they say he's healthy and he practices with us, and we feel like he's ready to go mentally and we have a good game plan for him, then he'll be the starter," Gruden said. "But I don't know when that will be yet. It's hard for me to project. It could be one week, two weeks. It could be five weeks."

Griffin wore cleats with high ankle support and looked a bit rusty.

His first pass hit fullback Darrel Young on the back of the shin, but he also had some good throws during the one-on-ones when defensive backs were covering receivers.

Griffin took the first snap in each of the drills early in the practice, ahead of current starter Kirk Cousins.

"He looked fine. He got a little bounce in his step," Gruden said. "Everything else is going to be up to the trainers

and the doctor. There's nothing I can do as far as rushing him back."

The Redskins did not allow Griffin to be interviewed about his participation in practice.

Griffin isn't expected to play until Nov. 2 against Minnesota at the earliest. A more likely scenario has him back Nov. 16 against Tampa Bay following the bye.

"Obviously we'd like to have him back, but he still does need some work as far as getting back under center, getting the reps, getting the footwork back down, just the whole process of being a quarterback again," Gruden said. "It's not just about going out there and running half-gassers and throwing to wide receivers and routes vs. air. It's about handling the protections, the running game, the audibles, all that good stuff."

Griffin was hurt early in a 41-10 win over the Jacksonville Jaguars on Sept. 14. The Redskins (1-5) have since lost four straight with Cousins, and Gruden suggested for the first time that he might turn to third-stringer Colt McCoy if Cousins continues to struggle.

"Obviously if things continue in this downward spiral, then there's always a chance to see Colt," Gruden said. "But I think Kirk will play himself out of it."

Colts' Irsay ready to get back to work

INDIANAPOLIS — Jim Irsay wants to be a better team owner.

Six days after his six-game suspension ended, the 55-year-old Colts owner broke his silence by telling a small group of reporters that he's excited about the season, feeling well and is ready to move on.

"I've always said I've felt the role of a steward here and that you learn from your mistakes," Irsay said during a 30-minute news conference Wednesday. "You move on, think you can be a better person and be better at everything you do."

For Irsay, it was a tough, painful lesson.

Just days before Indianapolis' season opener in Denver, Irsay pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor count of driving while intoxicated and acknowledged he

was under the influence of the painkillers oxycodone and hydrocodone when he was arrested March 16 near his home in suburban Carmel.

Within hours of his court appearance, NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell handed down the suspension, which prevented Irsay from having any contact on football matters with the team or media.

Some players contend Irsay got off light as his three daughters helped oversee the

day-to-day football operations.

He didn't address those concerns, saying only that he accepted the restrictions and followed them to the letter.

But for a man who had never missed a Colts game after his father moved the team from Baltimore to Indy in 1984, there was nothing easy about the punishment.

He watched intently as Indianapolis (4-2)

lost its first two games, the longest losing streak of the Andrew Luck era, then watched gleefully as the Colts won four straight to move back into the AFC South lead after Thursday's win at Houston, just in time for his return to the office.

All the while, Irsay watched the games nervously with family and friends, pacing anxiously as he waited to return to owner's office he's had since 1997.

"I missed being there. It was tough not being with the guys before the game and praying with the guys before games. That was tough," he said, laughing as he acknowledged he talked with his daughters and relied on some of his favorite music to help him get through the tough times. A Jerry Garcia guitar was encased on the wall behind him.

Favre's record on Manning's back burner

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. — Even though he's just two touchdown throws shy of Brett Favre's NFL record of 508, Peyton Manning isn't getting caught up in history, and neither are his teammates.

It's easy to see why: they're too busy scything their way through a two-month thicket of opponents that averaged 10.75 wins a year ago.

"We've had a pretty salty schedule thus far," coach John Fox said Wednesday. "And this week is no different."

The Broncos (4-1) host the San Francisco 49ers (4-2) on Sunday night. Five nights later, the San

Diego Chargers (5-1) pay the Broncos a visit.

"Two big games coming up," Manning said. "That's plenty to think about."

The first half of the Broncos' season features six games against teams that reached the playoffs last year and none of their first eight opponents even had a losing re-

cord in 2013.

The 86 wins between those first eight opponents represent the most in Manning's 17-year career, rivaled only by the strength of schedule in his first season in Denver in 2012.

That year, the Broncos faced a gauntlet of teams over the first half of the season that had won 83 games the year before, or an average of 10.37.

In his other 14 seasons — he missed 2011 in Indy with neck problems — Manning's opponents over the first half of the season averaged 8.29 wins the year before.

The Broncos are atop the AP Pro32 power rankings despite a plethora of penalties, a propensity to let teams hang around too long and an inability to put together four quarters that either they or their fans could be proud of.

Yet, the stiff competition is undeniably a major reason that half of Denver's drives have ended with Britton Colquitt punting rather than Brandon McManus kicking extra points.

Mad Matt

NASCAR wanted the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship to be exciting, but it got a burst of full-bodied, raw emotion from competitors in Saturday's race at Charlotte Motor Speedway.

Specifically, Brad Keselowski made sheet-metal contact with at least three other cars as his No. 2 Team Penske Ford ran amok after the checkered flag was displayed.

The top storyline should have been Kevin Harvick's victory, which automatically pushed him into the next round of the Chase.

Instead, he became a footnote to Keselowski's antics on the cool-down lap, plus the bumping and banging Keselowski created on pit road after the 500-mile race.

"Kez" put dents into the cars of Denny Hamlin, Matt Kenseth and Tony Stewart — Stewart retaliated by throwing his No. 14 Chevy into reverse and smashing the nose of the angry driver behind him.

Once in the garage area, Hamlin was restrained from attacking Keselowski. But no one — no one — saw Kenseth, your typical Bruce Banner sort of driver, transforming into the Incredible Hulk and physically lunging on top of Keselowski.

Kenseth, always known for his mild manner and composure, tossed all that decorum out the driver's-side window and pounced on Keselowski in a fit of rage after Keselowski was interviewed by ABC while standing in a narrow lane between two haulers.

Kenseth was upset because he had removed all his safety gear after he got his No. 20 Toyota to pit road, then was slammed by Keselowski's battered machine.

"If he wants to come and talk about it like a man, then go do that, but to try to wreck somebody on the race track and to come down pit road with other cars

and people standing around, with my seat belts off, and drive into the side of me is just inexcusable," Kenseth said.

"There is no excuse for that. He's a champion, and he's supposed to know better than that."

Hamlin used language that can't be printed here, but made a Talladega prediction.

"My guess is that he (Keselowski) will probably try to wreck everyone; that's his only shot," he said. "He'll just be out of control like normal."

FOUR MUST GO



Kasey Kahne currently is in eighth place and on the bubble. The four drivers below him are Matt Kenseth, Brad Keselowski, Jimmie Johnson and Dale Earnhardt Jr. All know the only sure way to the Eliminator Round is a victory. Asked about his 'Dega game plan, Earnhardt said: "Go out there and win it. We can do it; we have won there a lot of times."

When Kevin Harvick got to Charlotte's Victory Lane, it was more relief than joy. "This was the night that we needed to win," he said. "I don't want to go to Talladega next week."




Is this really what NASCAR wanted?

CHARLOTTE REWIND

Junior talks about phantom vibrations and must-win situation

Dale Earnhardt Jr. was hoping to deposit a victory in Saturday night's Bank of America 500 at Charlotte Motor Speedway and advance to the next round of NASCAR's elimination playoffs. Instead, the Daytona 500 champion was forced to fight through a night of adversity with his No. 88 Hendrick Motorsports Chevrolet. He finished 20th.

Now dead last (tied for 11th) in the Chase standings, Earnhardt likely needs a victory at Talladega Superspeedway to advance to the next elimination round. Hendrick's drivers have struggled in the first five Chase races. Jimmie Johnson also is

ranked 11th and Kasey Kahne is on the Chase bubble in eighth place. Earnhardt talked to the media after the Charlotte race about his problems and outlook for Talladega.

What happened during the race?

"The vibration broke the shifter in half, and it just wasn't a good night. The car just wasn't handling well, and the vibration was really giving us a lot of problems. We had it in practice, but we still couldn't fix it. So, I don't know."

"We only had third and fourth gear and lost a lap trying to get off pit road on a green-flag stop.

"We had a pretty good car; a top-10 car. The vibration issue was causing a lot of balance issues, and grip issues. But we had a good-enough car to run in the top 10. This isn't what we need to do."

"I don't know. We've had some phantom vibrations throughout the year and not really had those until the last year and a half, or two years. So it is hard to say."

What's Talladega mean now?

"Go out there and win it. We can do it; we have won there a lot of times. I know what we need to do. We will just have to build a fast car and hope

that we don't have any gremlins and try to go out there and win it."

"We had a lot of gremlins tonight. We had a good car in practice, and we never could get a chance to show it. The vibration just tore the car all apart. Broke the shifter and made the car handle real bad."

"We did have a pretty good car all weekend; we were running OK there in the race. I think we could have easily finished in the top 10. The shifter slam broke in half. I mean it is steel, it shouldn't be breaking, but the vibration was that bad."





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

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FILM: Keaton soars again in 'Birdman' / C6

Pitt's WWII tank drama 'Fury' a barrage of heavy-handedness

The relentless barrage of heavy-handedness in David Ayer's World War II tank drama "Fury" begins immediately. A lone horseman approaches on the grim horizon of a foggy, corpse-strewn battlefield. Out of the muck leaps a man who pulls the rider down and savagely bludgeons him in the eye.

Ayer, a veteran of crime films like "Training Day" and "End of Watch," wants to make it clear from the start that he's making a film about the barbaric brutality of war. Setting it in April 1945 in the waning days of WWII in Europe only furthers the point that all war — even the supposedly "good" ones — is hell.

Into Germany rumbles Sgt. Don Collier (Brad Pitt) and his M4 Sherman tank. With "Fury" blazed on its

gun and a claustrophobic warren of bickering soldiers within, the tank is a killing machine, as are its hardened inhabitants. The cast — Shia LaBeouf as the gunner, Jon Bernthal as the loader, Michael Pena as the driver — work to show the darkness that has settled behind their eyes after years of war.

Good and bad — the usual battle lines of most WWII tales — isn't the dichotomy of "Fury." A far cry from his debonair "Inglourious Basterds"

Nazi-hunter, Pitt's commander is a tough, even cruel boss (and the eye-stabber of the opening). "We're not here for right and wrong," says Pitt. "We're here to kill."

Such bleak, unnatural mantras are occasionally spouted by Collier and his crew. The tank, a kind of a roaming lone wolf after its platoon is decimated, is joined by a new recruit, a fresh-faced, ill-prepared typist named Norman (Logan Lerman).

The air of the near-colorless "Fury" is relentlessly fetid, the screen filled with mud. The romance of "the greatest generation" has been drained

away, leaving only the harsh realities of war and perhaps a more honest view of what it does to men.

But "Fury" is by no means a realistic movie. It's an "unflinching" account of war — "unflinching," in quotes, because every moment of the film is composed to grind your face into the muck and be proud of itself for doing so.

Since this grisly verisimilitude is the point of "Fury," it ought to have considered drawing from real events for its story or central battle. Instead, it culminates in a lengthy, against-the-odds fight that has less in connection with WWII than the movie "300."

'Citizenfour' documentary presents witness to Snowden NSA leak

NEW YORK — With an uncommon view of history in action, a new documentary captures Edward Snowden's leak of NSA documents as it unfolded in a Hong Kong hotel room.

Laura Poitras' highly anticipated documentary "Citizenfour" premiered Friday night at the New York Film Festival. The one-of-a-kind film presents a remarkably intimate portrait of Snowden, including his first meetings with the journalists with whom he shared

thousands of documents revealing the previously undisclosed collection of Americans' phone and email records by the National Security Agency.

Initially communicating under the alias "citizenfour," Snowden reached out to Poitras, a hybrid journalist-documentarian, and *Guardian* reporter Glenn Greenwald. The film shows their very first meeting with Snowden and the days that followed as his revelations made international news.

From the beginning, Snowden is seen as highly aware that such

a leak would mean sacrificing his own freedom.

"I already know how this will end for me," he says. "And I accept the risk."

Snowden was charged with three felonies under the Espionage Act: unauthorized communication of national defense information, theft of government property and willful communication of classified communications intelligence to an unauthorized person.

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


The balance of the movie feels off, suggesting Ayer, who wrote and directed, may have intended a much longer cut of the film. As it is, it's composed of a handful of large chunks: the initiation of Norman; an open-field showdown with a German Tiger tank; a long interlude of improvised domestic life in a German village; and the final battle (easily a quarter of the movie). The drama of the pure-Hollywood end is weakened because the stories of the men haven't been articulated.

The same issue plagues village scene, in which Collier, with Norman in tow, tries to create a respite of order. In a bombed-out town, he orchestrates a dinner with a German mother (Anamaria Marinca) and her attractive daughter (Alicia von Rittberg). The scene's fragility is the movie's best moment, where every gesture is heightened by the women's fear.

But the scene's grace, too, is hackneyed. Norman plays the piano, and their less couth tank-mates cause an over-the-top interruption. Pitt's strong presence can do only so much for the forces of pretentiousness swarming around him.

For a better WWII tank thriller, look to Zoltan Korda's "Sahara," with Humphrey Bogart in the Libyan sands. Made during the war in 1943, it may have been propaganda, but its aim was truer than the pseudo realism of "Fury."

"Fury," a Columbia Pictures release, is rated R by the Motion Picture Association of America for "strong sequences of war violence, some grisly images and language." Running time: 134 minutes. One and a half stars out of four.

a phone interview from his Orlando home.

first thing that came to mind. I have had a lot of fun doing it."

In **duplicate bridge**, making the maximum number of tricks can be as important as making the contract itself, sometimes even more so. A player should never relax after he has assured the contract unless he thinks no one else will bid the game or slam his side has reached.

Take this case from a regional pairs tournament where North-South reached four hearts on the bidding shown. East won the opening diamond lead with the ten and correctly concluded that, given the bidding, declarer was much more likely to

hold a singleton diamond than West was.

East therefore shifted to a trump, and South made the normal play of taking the ace and cashing the king, catching West's queen. This might have satisfied many declarers, who would sooner or later have crossed to dummy, led a spade to the jack and wound up making five, losing a spade to East's king at the end.

But at one table, South was unwilling to settle for 11 tricks, which were a certainty even if the spade finesse lost. He saw a way to try for a second overtrick, and went for it.

Given East's overcall, South felt that East was more likely to hold the king of spades than West. So at trick four, declarer crossed to the king of clubs and led the queen of spades. East had to cover, and South took the king with the ace. Declarer then ran the rest of his hearts.

When the last heart was cashed, West, who was down to the Q-J of clubs and 10-8 of spades, could not find an effective discard in front of dummy's 9-3 of spades and A-8 of clubs. He tried discarding a spade in the forlorn hope that his partner had the jack, but it did him no good. South discarded the club eight from dummy, cashed the jack of spades, felling West's ten, and scored the last two tricks with the nine of spades and ace of clubs to earn a top score.

Keaton soars in 'Birdman'

NEW YORK — When Michael Keaton met Barack Obama shortly before Obama would become president, the then-senator had a question for the actor.

"Why don't you make more movies?"

It's a quandary that has long bedeviled moviegoers just as it has, so it seems, heads of state. Why did the roundly beloved Keaton — a manic comic actor, an intense live wire, a real-deal movie star — become such an infrequent presence on the big screen?

Even at the height of Keaton's stardom in the 1980s and '90s, he was famously picky, usually doing a movie a year and turning down about as many hits ("Splash," "JFK," among them) as he said yes to. But after a handful of flops in the late '90s and early 2000s, Keaton all but disappeared from movies.

"I did turn a lot of things down.

But a lot of the things I turned down, you would have turned down," said Keaton in a recent interview. "It was because I was bored. I was bored with what I would do. Maybe it just didn't interest me for a while, I don't know."

But Keaton's revival, begun with a handful of supporting roles, reaches a blistering, wildly meta crescendo in Alejandro Gonzalez Inarritu's "Birdman or The Unexpected Virtue of Ignorance." In it, Keaton stars as a washed-up, middle-aged actor, Riggan Thomson, trying to mount a serious play on Broadway based on a Raymond Carver story when all his fans want is for him to make a fourth "Birdman" film — a superhero identity that haunts him.

The reference to Keaton's "Batman" days is unmistakable, but "Birdman" — shot in long, flowing takes that capture the chaotic swirl of backstage life and a

theater full of people striving for their own sense of self-importance — only plays a little with Keaton's own persona. It's a gonzo portrait of an actor's out-of-control psychoses that appears certain to land the 63-year-old's first Oscar nomination.

Keaton's comeback is the result, he says, of sharpening his focus.

"I turned the dial up," says Keaton. "I don't know if I got re-interested or I settled a lot of other things in my life. I really don't know. I just thought: I'm going to dial the scope in a little more, like on a rifle. ... It's amazing when you focus on the things you want and keep your eye on the ball. You start to create it or something."

His hair trim and gray, Keaton is intense in person and initial-

ly standoffish. He doesn't look up from his phone entering a Manhattan hotel room. At the mention that many have overdone comparisons of him to his "Birdman" character, he grows tense: "If I were you, I'd take a higher road," he says.

Keaton has in many ways spent his career avoiding the typecast fate of Riggan. The Pittsburgh-native, Catholic-raised, youngest of seven began as stand-up. After his breakthrough in 1982's "Night Shift," he deliberately sought to avoid what he calls "glib young man" roles. When development on a third "Batman" film sought to lighten Tim Burton's universe, he bailed.

"He's a very self-assured guy. He doesn't need to be validated," says Inarritu ("Amores Perros," "Babel"). "In order to play a role like this and be naked — spiritually, intellectually, physically — you have to have a lot of self-assurance."

Keaton, who has a 31-year-old son from his marriage to Caroline McWilliams, spends much of his time on his ranch in Montana, fishing and hunting.

"People can say 'Oh, he hasn't been around because nobody's called,'" says Inarritu. "No, it's because he has a life. He has a ranch, he has a family."

"Jane the Virgin" was a project worth waiting for. The actress, whose credits include "The Bold and the Beautiful" and "Army Wives" and indie films, said she turned down a role on Lifetime's "Devious Maids," Marc Cherry's successful follow-up to ABC's "Desperate Housewives" that he produces with Eva Longoria.

"I didn't want to do a show about maids because there are other stories to be told" about Latinos, Rodriguez said in an interview. "I know all the women on 'Devious Maids' and I love and support and wish them only the best. ... It just wasn't my dream."

The positive buzz swirling around the sitcom is reminiscent of what Rodriguez encountered when the 2012 film "Filly Brown," in which she played an aspiring hip-hop artist, screened at Robert Redford's Sundance festival.

"I was the 'It Girl,'" she recalled. "People were like, 'Rah, rah, rah, you're amazing. You're going to

be Jennifer Lawrence' ... Yeah, I wish."

Such big-screen fame wasn't immediately forthcoming, but she's already determined how to handle herself whatever happens.

"I learned about the woman I want to be, that ego is the death of talent," said Rodriguez, who doesn't name names when it comes to anti-role models in the industry.

Besides, she says, she has already achieved a measure of success in the eyes of those she holds dearest, her family.

After graduating from New York University's Tisch School of the Arts, Rodriguez appeared onstage as artist Frida Kahlo and got one especially crucial review.

"You can do this. You're good," she recalled her father telling her. "I said, 'I made it. He believed in me. He accepted everything I wanted to accept and believe in.'

"I'm not a self-made anything," she said, firmly. "My father made me look in the mirror and say, 'Today's going to be a great day. I can and I will.'"

He is currently living in asylum in Russia, where he fled from Hong Kong with the aid of WikiLeaks' Julian Assange.

Poitras said she showed the film to Snowden two or three weeks ago, during which she shot footage (used in the film) of Snowden and his long-time girlfriend, Lindsay Mills, cooking dinner at their Moscow home.

Members of Snowden's family attended the screening, which was received with an emotional standing ovation. His father, Lonnie Snowden, told the crowd: "The truth is coming and it cannot be stopped."

"Citizenfour," which the Weinstein Co.'s boutique label Radius will release Oct. 24, had been shrouded in mystery. For fear of having her footage seized, Poitras edited the film in Berlin. She and Greenwald returned to the United States earlier this year only after sharing the Pulitzer Prize for public service given to *The Wash-*
