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High court OKs travel ban

WASHINGTON — A sharply divided Supreme Court upheld President Donald Trump's ban on travel from several mostly Muslim countries Tuesday, the conservative majority taking his

side in a major ruling supporting his presidential power. A dissenting liberal justice said the court was making a historic mistake by refusing to recognize the ban discriminates against Muslims.

The 5-4 decision was a big victory for Trump in the court's first substantive

ruling on one of his administration's policies. It also was the latest demonstration of a newly invigorated conservative majority and a bitter defeat for the court's liberals.

The ruling came on an issue that has been central for Trump, from his campaign outbursts against "radical

Islamic terrorism" through his presidency. He tweeted a quick reaction — "Wow!" — and then celebrated at greater length before TV cameras.

Chief Justice John Roberts wrote the majority opinion for the five conservative justices, including Trump nominee Neil Gorsuch, who got his

seat only after Republicans blocked President Barack Obama's nominee for the last 10 months of Obama's term.

Roberts wrote that the travel ban was well within U.S. presidents' considerable authority over immigration

TAVARES — Sheriff Chris Daniels Memorial Highway is a busy portion of State Road 19, stretching from Lane Park Cutoff to U.S. Highway 441.

It's fitting, since Daniels was a busy man before he died in a freak accident at a 2006 charity school bus race fundraiser on his 47th birthday.

Maybe the motorists will see the sign with his name, dedicated in a ceremony today with Sheriff Peyton Grinnell, thanks to a law introduced by

state legislators Larry Metz and Dennis Baxley.

It's just too bad that most of the drivers never got the chance to know him.

"Sheriff Daniels was an outstanding, forward-thinking leader who cared for his community and this agency," said Sheriff's Lt. John Herrell.

He was a good man to work for.

"I remember he would always welcome any employee to come to him with any concerns or issues they were

Ryan sets House vote on bill

WASHINGTON — House Speaker Paul Ryan scheduled a long-awaited showdown vote on a broad Republican immigration bill for Wednesday, but is showing little confidence that the package will survive.

Underscoring the legislation's weak prospects in his GOP-run chamber, Ryan, R-Wis., declined to answer questions Tuesday about a separate, narrow measure Republicans are privately

BISMARCK, N.D. US, Canada reach deal on disputed \$244M water project

Canada will have a say in the operation of a major Missouri River water project in the northern U.S. under a deal negotiated by officials in the two countries to end a 16-year-legal battle.

The agreement on the \$244 million Northwest Area Water Supply project won't be final until a federal appeals court formally dismisses the case, and the state of Missouri also is still fighting the project in court. But the deal will end the international dispute that has held up completion of the project first authorized by Congress in 1986.

KNOXVILLE, TENN. Ex-Pilot Flying J president apologizes for racial slurs

The former president of the nation's largest diesel fuel retailer has apologized for the language he used in secret recordings.

The recordings captured former Pilot Flying J President Mark Hazelwood using racial slurs and profanely criticizing his own board of directors and his boss' football team and fans. Hazelwood was convicted earlier this year of conspiracy, wire fraud and witness tampering by a jury who heard the recordings.

Hazelwood's new defense team said in a statement Monday that the jury shouldn't have heard the recordings. They've requested a new trial.

Migrants meet hostile reception

MILAN — On both sides of the Atlantic, migrants flooding across borders by the hundreds each day have met a hostile reception and governments unable to agree on how to cope with the arrivals. In Europe, where far-right parties have joined the governments in Italy and Austria and made gains elsewhere, even the most basic decision of which port would accept a ship filled with migrants has been fraught.

On Tuesday, yet another rescue boat loaded with migrants struggled to find safe harbor in the Mediterranean, while in Austria police cadets playing the role of desperate refugees rattled a chain-link fence demanding to be let in as part of a high-profile training exercise to test the mettle of a new border force charged with preventing an influx of migrants.

“We have had migratory crises in the past, but that is not what we are going through now. What we

are living through now is a European political crisis,” French President Emmanuel Macron said after a day-long meeting with Pope Francis at the Vatican during which they discussed the issue.

The European crisis mirrors the one in the United States, where a broad-ranging Republican immigration bill was set for a vote Wednesday, with little certainty that it would survive. With legislation in disarray and a global uproar over the separation of more than 2,300 migrant children from their parents, the Trump administration abruptly reversed a key element of its zero-tolerance immigration policy last week, halting the practice of separating immigrant families caught illegally crossing the border, but leaving more than 2,000 separated children in limbo in government-contracted shelters.

The standoffs in Europe involve multiple governments, all running their own immigration policies but with open borders among them.

Twice this month, as calm seas and warm weather

spurred greater numbers to set sail, rescue ships filled with migrants have been left in a holding pattern in the Mediterranean. The latest standoff involves the German-operated Lifeline, which has sailed for five days without safe harbor. France, Portugal, Italy and at least one other country agreed to divide up the migrants on board, and said Malta would take in the ship.

But the German aid group operating the ship said Malta had sent a message refusing entry into its territorial waters, further confusing an agreement that had taken days to negotiate.

Malta also flatly refused to accept an empty rescue ship, the Aquarius, which needed some mechanical work before it could resume its sweeps of the Mediterranean. The ship headed to the French port city of Marseille instead.

It was the Aquarius that touched off last week's showdown, when the ship, operated by French aid groups and carrying 630 migrants, had its journey to land extended by a week after Malta and Italy

refused docking rights. Spain ultimately accepted the passengers, and the Aquarius traveled an additional 900 miles to get there.

“It's five useless days to come here when the Aquarius is not on the migrant route to rescue, and that's a shame in terms of saving human lives,” Frederic Penard of SOS Mediterranee said in Marseille, where the ship was expected on Friday. Italy, which believes the rescue ships operated by aid groups only encourage more migrants, also refused docking in Sicily.

Italy's new right-wing interior minister, Matteo Salvini, has contended that the rescue boats essentially provide “taxi service” at sea for the human traffickers.

But with calm seas and fair weather, more migrants continued to take their chances crossing from North Africa.

Spain's Maritime Rescue Service picked up over 400 people from the Mediterranean on Monday, bringing the total number of rescued migrants to around 1,800 in just four days.

CLERMONT Man accused of impersonating officer

LEESBURG Commission gives initial approval to homes project

City commissioners gave the nod Monday to the first reading of an ordinance to change zoning from townhouses to single-family homes at Lake Griffin Reserve.

The property is north of U.S. Highway 441, west of north Lake Avenue and north of Fernery Lane. It is not far from the intersection of U.S. 441 and Newell Hill Road and close to Lake Griffin.

"In meeting with the current property owner, it was expressed that a reduced number of single-family units (100) would be a more appropriate use of the land," planning and zoning officials noted in a memo to commissioners.

The original zoning on the 19 acres would have allowed 160 townhouses. There is no development on the property at this time.

Groveland pleased to launch fireworks at alternative site

GROVELAND — Fireworks for the Fourth of July at Lake David Park have been a tradition for as long as anyone can remember — but this year, with the park's planned updating, holding the celebration there posed problems.

The good news is it's been decided the show will go on — just somewhere else — at Lake Catherine Blueberries, 5849 Lake Catherine Road, north of State Road 50 on State Road 19.

Mayor Dina Sweatt said the council was determined not to cancel the Fourth celebration.

"We were adamant about not letting the

Fourth of July go, it's a big event," Sweatt said. "So when the blueberry farm came into play, we partnered with them."

Fire Chief Willie Morgan said that since 1976, when he was hired by the department, the fireworks have always been at Lake David,

although they used to shoot from the south side of the lake. The only year in memory that the event was canceled was during the firestorm of 1998.

Sumter Co., schools ink emergency shelter pact

The Sumter County Commission and the County School Board entered into an agreement Tuesday to offer schools as pet-friendly emergency evacuation shelters.

Last year, schools were used as shelters for Hurricane Irma evacuees. The School Board also provided its resources in earlier storms, including Matthew, Fay, Jeanne and Frances, but there was never a formal agreement between the Commission and the Board.

Recently, the Federal Emergency Management Agency said that it would not reimburse the School Board for its expenses without a formal local agreement. This arrangement allows the County Commission to reimburse the School Board directly and in turn request reimbursement from FEMA.

"The county is legally responsible for shelter operations," said David Casto, Sumter County's emergency management director. "FEMA and the Florida Division of Emergency Management made it clear that an interlocal agreement is required to qualify for federal assistance."

He added that the agreement is "just a matter of formality, since the School Board always supported the (County Commission), as safety is its priority."

School administrative employees will manage the shelters, and the Commission will reimburse the School Board for the staff's time and other expenses.

Lightning kills man in Sarasota

SARASOTA — A 33-year-old Seffner man who was killed by lightning on Siesta Beach on Sunday is the 501st person in Florida struck and killed by lightning since 1959, according to records compiled by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

The victim, James W. Barton, who was identified Monday by the Sarasota County Sheriff's Office, is

the third lightning death in Florida this year and first in Sarasota since August 2016, when 50-year-old Fontella Span was struck while taking refuge in a gazebo at Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Park.

There were five lightning-related deaths in Florida in 2017.

Barton was standing on an unguarded part of Siesta Beach about a mile from the main beach pavilion Sunday at about 2:15 p.m. when a storm moved in from the southeast.

Thunder and lightning could be heard, and lifeguards on the main beach notified patrons about 20 minutes before its arrival using horns, a truck with a public address system, and raising double red flags.

Barton was too far away to receive those warnings at his spot in the 6000 block of Midnight Pass Road.

CLERMONT - For the next several weeks, the Clermont Police Department and Flippers Pizza Restaurant are conducting Hero Deliveries throughout the city.

Hero Deliveries is an idea inspired by the Clermont Police Department's Community Oriented Policing and Problem Solving Unit (COPPS).

It is the second year of the initiative, which is designed to reinforce the concept that "Families that eat together stay together."

"Sharing time together as a family is proven to be one of the most valuable crime-prevention methods," said Officer David Colon of the COPPS unit. "We will visit households every other week for the next few months in an effort to spread crime-prevention tips and a positive outlook on life. With our visit, the families will be able to see a couple of police officers come to their door, and

after a short greeting, hand them a crime-prevention flyer, and wish them a good dinner as a family, compliments of Flippers Pizza and the Clermont Police Department."

The implementation for Hero Deliveries stems directly from 21st century policing concepts that were outlined in previous presidential task force recommendations.

Some of the recommendations focus on communication and transparency through non-enforcement activities.

"When cops show up

at your door, it's usually to assist in emergency situations," said Chief Charles Broadway, who will be one of those delivering pizza. "This program builds trust and legitimacy between police officers and the people they serve, only this time they are serving in another way.

"We hope to continue to help facilitate communication and relationships with our residents by breaking down the traditional barriers that so often exist between police officers and the citizens that we serve," Broadway added.

Catherine Blueberries will host the event on their property with help from the city. Fireworks will be launched from two locations, creating a dueling show. There will be hourly demonstrations of BMX riders, a sanctioned steak and dessert cook-off with prizes. Traditional activities such as face painting, watermelon eating and pony rides are scheduled along with new activities such as a game arcade, gaga dodgeball and water tag.

"We did an event last year for the Fourth that was extremely

successful," said Jamie Lowe, one of Lake Catherine's owners.

"When the city approached us, the city had concerns about having it at Lake David, and it seemed like a good partnership."

The city is providing \$20,500 for the event, along with the fire department to launch the fireworks, police and volunteers. Any fees collected above expenses will be divided among the Faith Neighborhood Center, South Lake Dixie Youth and the Groveland Police Explorers.

The Miss Firecracker contest will remain at the Puryear Building, and winners will be announced on the main stage at the farm.

Musical entertainment

features six bands playing classic rock, bluegrass and Latin music on two stages. The bands are: Gunner Down, the Freightliners, Midnight Rising, the Steven Green Band, Mariachi Voces de Mexico, and Johnny Lee Wyatt & the American Fools.

The Lake Catherine venue offers more parking and space for activities, Lowe said. New this year will be full liquor bars.

Food vendors include American, barbecue, soul food and Puerto Rican fare.

The Groveland Fire Department is in charge of shooting the fireworks.

"Remember when I got on the department they had already been doing it," Morgan said. "We

had a handful of mortars, and the city would spend \$300, and that gave us 20 or 25 shells." In comparison, this year there will be about 450 shells, he added.

Former Mayor Connie Fleetwood said she remembers back in the '60s when the Fourth celebrations in Groveland included a watermelon eating contest and "grease the pole."

While the event is free and open to the public, nonperishable food donations for the Faith Neighborhood Center are requested. Festivities begin at 4:30 p.m., and fireworks at 9:15. The event closes at 11:45 p.m.

Captain Roy Routh said beachgoers in the vicinity of four lifeguard towers on the main beach were asked to clear the water and seek shelter. He said

many of them moved, but some remained on the beach during the storm.

"We are very concerned for their safety," Routh said of the patrons, who cannot be forced to leave. "They have been warned multiple times."

Sarasota County lifeguards use lightning detectors and receive real-time weather information.

Barton was on the beach when lightning struck him, according to Routh.

"When we were called by dispatch, the call came over as a lightning strike," Routh said. "We had two lifeguards respond in our beach patrol truck. We were notified that CPR is in process. There were two beach patrons apparently giving the patron CPR. They were joined by two of our Sarasota County fire medics.

"We continued CPR until (Barton) was transported off the beach."

Barton was later pronounced dead at an area hospital, according to the Sheriff's Office.

Wayne Racine of Maryland said he left Siesta Beach before the

storm arrived on Sunday.

"I started noticing the flags changing and then the lifeguards were trying to get people off the beach," Racine said. "There were a couple people back here and trying to move forward (onto the beach). They weren't looking up at the sky and seeing the cloud formations."

Once the storm began, Racine was in his car and his family, which had been on the beach for two hours, decided to go back to their condo.

"Once we got there that condo shook," he said. "It really rocked."

Routh said it was the first time he has responded to a lightning related death in Sarasota County. The odds of being hit by lightning are 1 in 1,171,000, according to NOAA, who also reports that 4,141 people have been killed nationwide by lightning since 1959. Only 10 percent of people who were struck were killed, leaving 90 percent with "degrees of disability," the NWS says.

Lightning-related fatalities averaged 45 from 1988 to 2007, but

declined to 27 over the past 10 years. Of the 16 deaths in 2017, 15 of them were men (since 2008, 224 men and 63 women died from lightning strikes).

Routh recommends that beach patrons heed flag warnings from lifeguards even when the skies appear clear. He says visitors should pack light in case they are asked to leave the beach quickly.

"I know a lot of people are reluctant to leave because they see a sunny sky," Routh said. "They don't realize there's something coming from the east. It's not easy clearing the beach when people think they are OK. Sometimes people don't hear the warning."

Tents and pavilions are not considered safe shelter during an electrical storm and lightning travels easily through salt water.

Routh said patrons are the "tallest point in a very large, open area" if they remain on the beach. He said Sarasota County will review its beach policies to ensure the best beach safety procedures are being followed.

much as \$600 million, the Florida Education Association acknowledged.

"Florida is a wealthy state ... we can afford to make funding for education and educator salaries a priority," FEA President Joanne McCall said.

Although salaries are decided by county school boards and vary widely, Florida's average annual teacher salary is \$12,000 less than the national average of \$59,660. The FEA said that ranks Florida 45th in the nation in pay for teachers and school staff.

In a conference call announcing the pledge drive, McCall was joined by several teachers who talked about juggling second jobs to make ends meet.

"Despite the challenges being a teacher in Florida, I love my job and I love my students," said Brian Kerkes, an Osceola County teacher who works part-time at Disney World.

Republican Gov. Rick Scott and the GOP-led Legislature approved a state budget five years ago

that allowed for at least a \$2,500 teacher raise. But that came shortly after Scott and lawmakers forced teachers and other public employees to contribute 3 percent of their pay to the state's retirement system.

According to the National Education Association, teacher pay in Florida has declined by 12 percent over the past decade because of inflation.

The FEA, a steady supporter of Democratic candidates, has a combative relationship with Scott and many Republican leaders. Four of the Democratic candidates for governor already have signed onto the union pledge, along with a handful of the party's candidates for the Legislature and other offices.

The FEA has its own election battle on its hands, with McCall challenged for the top post by Vice President Fedrick Ingram. The contest, to be settled in October, could distract one of the Florida Democratic Party's staunchest allies heading into a big election season.

The 140,000-member FEA is the largest labor organization in the Southeast.

having, but he wanted for them to bring with them a proposed solution. That wasn't because he needed help solving problems; he simply wanted to cultivate that sense of buy-in and ownership throughout the agency."

No doubt, it was that openness and empathy that led to his rapid rise in the ranks. As a lieutenant, he was always open, accessible and honest

as the public information officer. It was a trait that served him well as sheriff. It was an exhausted, pained Chris Daniels who said, "It's been a tough day," when Deputy Wayne Koester was killed and two others were wounded in a 2005 ambush.

He quoted John 15:13 at Koester's funeral. "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friend."

He liked to praise his staff. Corrections training officer Clifford Matthews was headed

home after spending the night in the department sheriff's helicopter looking for an escaped state prison convict when he saw the man rapping a convenience store clerk. He chased him into a nearby garage and held him until help arrived.

"Cliff's conduct was exemplary of what you'd expect of from a law enforcement officer," Daniels said. "This shows that there is no such thing as off duty."

When Sheriff George Knupp was forced to step down as sheriff 2004, Maj. Chris Daniels was

ready to step up.

"He was very excited to begin the process of getting the Sheriff's Office accredited, and we were awarded our first-ever accreditation in 2007, not long after his untimely death," Herrell said.

"It was a process he began, and we remain accredited to this day (the department undergoes inspections of policies and practices every three years in order to maintain accreditation). In a way, each time we get re-accredited, it's a bit of a tribute to him."

discussing. It would focus on the issue that has grabbed public attention in recent days: the Trump administration's separation of migrant children from their parents when families are caught crossing the border without authorization.

"If that doesn't succeed, then we'll cross that bridge," Ryan told reporters about his preference to focus on trying to pass the broader bill. "But the last thing I want to do is undercut a vote on what is a great consensus bill."

Many conservatives are preparing to vote against the wider ranging bill because it would provide a chance for citizenship for many immigrants who arrived illegally in the U.S. as children. They have blasted that provision as "amnesty," and the emerging, narrower bill would give them a chance to show they are addressing family separation without risking the wrath of hard-right voters.

The broader measure would also stop

the Homeland Security Department from separating migrant families and provide \$25 billion for President Donald Trump's border wall and other security measures. Democrats are expected to solidly oppose that bill, which is a compromise between GOP moderates and conservatives.

Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y., weighed in from across the Capitol, criticizing Trump for lacking a process for bringing families back together. Trump signed an executive order last week reversing his own administration policy of separating families, but many children remain apart from their parents. "This administration needs to present a plan ASAP of how to unify the kids and how to deal with border. They have no plan," Schumer said.

and responsibility for keeping the nation safe. He rejected the challengers' claim of anti-Muslim bias that rested in large part on Trump's own tweets and statements over the past three years.

But Roberts was careful not to endorse either Trump's statements about immigration in general or Muslims in particular, including his campaign call for "a complete and total shutdown of Muslims entering the United States."

"We express no view on the soundness of the policy," Roberts wrote.

The travel ban has been fully in place since December, when the justices put the brakes on lower court rulings that had ruled the policy out of bounds and blocked part of it from being enforced. It applies even to people with close relatives in the United States and other strong connections to the country.

In a dissent she summarized aloud in court, Justice Sonia Sotomayor said, "History will not look kindly on the court's misguided decision today, nor should it." Justices Stephen Breyer, Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Elena Kagan also dissented.

Sotomayor wrote that based on the evidence in the case "a reasonable

observer would conclude that the Proclamation was motivated by anti-Muslim animus." She said her colleagues in the majority arrived at the opposite result by "ignoring the facts, misconstruing our legal precedent and turning a blind eye to the pain and suffering the Proclamation inflicts upon countless families and individuals, many of whom are United States citizens."

She likened the case to the discredited Korematsu v. U.S. decision that upheld the detention of Japanese-Americans during World War II. Roberts responded in his opinion that "Korematsu has nothing to do with this case" and "was gravely wrong the day it was decided."

The travel ban was among the court's biggest cases this term and the latest in a string of 5-4 decisions in which the conservative side of the court, bolstered by the addition of Gorsuch last year, prevailed. He was chosen by Trump after Republicans in the Senate refused to grant a hearing to federal appeals Judge Merrick Garland who was nominated by Obama in March 2016.

Soon after the ruling, the campaign of Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky, who orchestrated the strategy to keep the high court seat away from Obama, tweeted a photo of McConnell and Gorsuch.

The Trump policy applies to travelers from five countries with overwhelmingly Muslim populations — Iran, Libya, Somalia, Syria and Yemen. It also affects two non-Muslim countries, blocking travelers from North Korea and some Venezuelan government officials and their families. A sixth majority Muslim country, Chad, was removed from the list in April after improving "its identity-management

and information sharing practices," Trump said in a proclamation.

The administration had pointed to the Chad decision to show that the restrictions were premised only on national security concerns.

The challengers, though, argued that the court could not just ignore all that had happened, beginning with Trump's campaign tweets to prevent the entry of Muslims into the United States.

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High court rules against Calif. law

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court on Tuesday effectively put an end to a California law that forces anti-abortion crisis pregnancy centers to provide information about abortion.

The 5-4 ruling also casts doubts on similar laws in Hawaii and Illinois.

The California law took effect in 2016.

It requires centers that are licensed by the state to tell clients about the availability of contraception, abortion and prenatal care, at little or no cost.

Centers that are unlicensed were required to post a sign that said so.

The court struck down that portion of the law. The centers said they were singled out and forced to deliver a message with which they disagreed. California said the law was needed

to let poor women know all their options.

Justice Clarence Thomas, in his majority opinion, said the centers "are likely to succeed" in their constitutional challenge to the portion of the law involving licensed centers.

That means that while the law is currently on the books, its challengers can go back to court to get an order halting its enforcement.

An attorney for the challengers said Tuesday that they expect to be able to do that quickly. California had not been enforcing the law, however.

"California cannot co-opt the licensed facilities to deliver its message for it," Thomas wrote for himself, Chief Justice John Roberts and Justices Anthony Kennedy, Samuel Alito and Neil Gorsuch.

He called the requirement for unlicensed centers "unjustified and unduly burdensome."

Justice Stephen Breyer

said among the reasons the law should be upheld is that the high court has previously upheld state laws requiring doctors to tell women seeking abortions about adoption services.

"After all, the law must be evenhanded," Breyer said in a dissenting opinion joined by his liberal colleagues, Justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Sonia Sotomayor and Elena Kagan.

Attorney General Jeff Sessions and anti-abortion groups were among those cheering the decision.

The Trump administration had argued that California's law violates the rights of licensed centers but had no objection to the requirement for the unlicensed centers.

"Speakers should not be forced by their government to promote a message with which they disagree, and pro-life pregnancy centers in California should not be forced to advertise abortion and undermine the very reason they exist," Sessions said in a statement Tuesday.

California Attorney General Xavier Becerra, a Democrat, called the decision "unfortunate" but said "our work to ensure that Californians receive accurate information about their healthcare options will continue."

The abortion-rights group NARAL Pro-Choice California was a prime sponsor of the California law.

NARAL contends that the centers mislead women about their options and try to pressure them to forgo

abortion. Estimates of the number of crisis pregnancy centers in the U.S. run from 2,500 to more than 4,000, compared with fewer than 1,500 abortion providers, women's rights groups said in a Supreme Court filing.

NARAL president Ilyse Hogue said in a statement after Tuesday's decision that the Supreme Court had "turned its back on women and condoned the deceptive tactics used by fake women's health centers."

California's law was challenged by the National Institute of Family and Life Advocates, an organization with ties to 1,500 pregnancy centers nationwide and 140 in California.

The group was represented at the Supreme Court by Alliance Defending Freedom, a Christian law firm.

NIFLA president Thomas Glessner applauded the court's decision Tuesday.

He called the decision "monumental" and said it was a "great day for pro-life pregnancy centers" and for free speech.

Other cities and states have also passed laws related to crisis pregnancy centers.

In 2014, a federal appeals court in New York struck down parts of a New York City ordinance, though it upheld the requirement for unlicensed centers to say that they lack a license.

Other states have laws that regulate doctors' speech in the abortion context.

In Louisiana, Texas and Wisconsin, doctors must display a sonogram and describe the fetus to most pregnant women considering an abortion, according to the Guttmacher Institute, which supports abortion rights.

Similar laws have been blocked in Kentucky, North Carolina and Oklahoma.

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First alleged dealer charged with overdose death

DAYTONA BEACH — A 31-year-old man became the first accused drug dealer to be charged in the death of a client in Volusia County when he was indicted in a Deltona mother's fatal overdose.

A grand jury on Monday indicted Steven Montilla of Sanford on a charge of first-degree murder in the death of 34-year-old Jacqueline Griggs.

"The message we're trying to send here is if you're going to be out there selling this stuff, selling this poison, we're coming to get you," Volusia County Sheriff Mike Chitwood said during a press conference Monday.

Griggs was found unresponsive in her home on Oct. 21 by her mother, Deborah Couture. Griggs was seated on a toilet fully clothed with a needle in her arm, a sheriff's report states.

Griggs overdosed on heroin mixed with fentanyl, Chitwood said.

Montilla already is in custody on related charges. He was sentenced May 31 to three years and three months in Florida state prison for drug trafficking and using a communication device to commit a felony.

He previously has served prison time for trafficking cocaine and sale, manufacturing or delivery of marijuana.

The Sheriff's Office has responded to 31 overdose deaths so far this year, Chitwood said. That number accounts only for deaths in Deltona, DeBary and areas of the county outside city limits.

"Unfortunately, Jacqueline has a story that I think has become all too familiar in our society," said Chitwood, noting that Griggs was an international baccalaureate student in high school and had aspirations of becoming an attorney before addiction altered her path.

Deputies found several needles, lighters, a spoon, a used pipe and clear plastic baggies containing white powder residue in close

proximity to Griggs' body, according to the report.

Deputies tried to revive Griggs with Narcan nasal spray but she showed no signs of life, the report states.

Griggs was the single mother of a 3-year-old girl. The girl's father, Dominic Tronolone, to whom Griggs was engaged, died in August 2014. He, too, died of an opioid overdose, Chitwood said.

As part of the Sheriff's Office's commitment to "treat every overdose death as a homicide," Chitwood said detectives began to "text message with our scumbag, murdering drug dealer."

Posing as Griggs, investigators texted Montilla stating "the h was good... u got some more I can get later?" according to the sheriff's report. Deputies arranged a drug transaction at a Publix on Courland Boulevard.

Montilla arrived at the rendezvous point with a "trafficking amount of heroin" — at least 4 grams but less than 14 — and was arrested.

"In every case we can, we're going to go after these scumbags who are slinging poison on our streets," Chitwood said. "We're going to put them behind bars where they belong, where they can't end the life of another person addicted to their deadly product."

Capt. Brian Henderson, commander of investigations at the Sheriff's Office, said the trafficking charge allowed deputies to get Montilla off the street while they compiled a murder case.

With Montilla in prison, "we know he can't sell any more drugs that lead to more overdose deaths," Henderson said.

The charge against Montilla follows a Flagler County case earlier this year in which a man was charged in an overdose case.

In February, Joseph Colon, of Palm Coast, was charged with first-degree murder in the November overdose of 23-year-old Savannah DeAngelis, also of Palm Coast.

Colon, who has a history of drug charges dating to 2010, sold DeAngelis heroine laced with fentanyl, investigators said.

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Officer gets Medal of Honor posthumously

WASHINGTON — A battle that began 22 years ago ended at the White House on Tuesday when President Donald Trump awarded the Medal of Honor to a deceased Army intelligence officer from Kentucky for gallantry exhibited on the battlefield during World War II.

Trump bestowed the nation's highest military honor upon 1st Lt. Garlin M. Conner, who the president said now takes his "rightful place in the eternal chronicle of American valor."

Conner's widow, Pauline, accepted the framed medal on her husband's behalf.

The lieutenant was honored for volunteering, despite being wounded, in January 1945 to go to the front line near the town of Houssen, France, during the Battle of the Bulge to

observe German enemy forces and direct artillery fire against them. He carried out the mission while lying prone in a shallow ditch.

Hours later, as swarms of German forces rushed forward, Conner ordered friendly fire onto his own position, "courageously choosing to face death in order to save his battalion and achieve victory for freedom," Trump said.

The artillery fire Conner directed is credited with killing 50 German soldiers and wounding 100 more, ultimately repelling the assault.

Conner was discharged from the Army in June 1945, and his family battled for the past 22 years with the Army's awards branch and eventually in the courts for the outcome that finally came Tuesday. Except Conner didn't live long enough to see it.

He died in November 1998.

'Space force' is not needed

Welcome to the age of the space force. Last week, President Donald Trump directed the Pentagon to create a "space force," a sixth branch of the United States Armed Forces.

Sure, it's possible to create another branch of the military. We can waste billions upon billions of taxpayer dollars to create another group of officers, new commands and additional bureaucracy. But it might be better if we first look at the resources we already have.

To be clear, our current branches of the military already have a presence in (and a close eye on) space. Proof of how seriously our military takes the space beyond our atmosphere is all around us, including in our own backyard in Tampa, Jacksonville and the Panhandle, all of which are home to major military installations.

The Air Force Space Command already exists. It's headquartered at Peterson Air Force Base in Colorado.

Its mission is clear: "Execute combined global capabilities to defend the homeland and enable space combat operations."

And it's not just a couple of folks in an office. The Space Wing bills itself as "the U.S. Air Force's most geographically dispersed wing," with operations in 22 locations across the world. Those sites include Clear Air Force Station, Alaska; Copenhagen, Denmark; Adelaide, Australia; and Eglin Air Force Base near Pensacola.

That's right, Eglin, right here in Florida. It's home of the 20th Space Control Squadron. And if you thought the Space Wing's mission was concise, you'll think the 20th Space Control Squadron's mission statement is out of this world.

"The mission of the 20th Space Control Squadron is to execute multiplatform, tactical space warfighting domain characterization, recognition, and responsiveness to achieve 21st Space Wing and United States Strategic Command intent. 20th SPCS uses a global network of near-earth and deep-space weapons systems to conduct space object identification and provide targetable intelligence in support of space situational awareness and space domain control."

Eglin's place in this space force is remarkable. The AN/FPS-85 phased array radar at Site C-6 is "the only phased array radar dedicated to tracking more than 16,000 near-earth and deep-space objects," according to the Air Force fact sheet. The sheet also says the radar can track an object the size of a basketball at a distance of 22,000 nautical miles. Pardon us for stating the obvious, but that is amazing.

The Air Force took ownership of the site in September 1968 and space operations with the radar began in 1969. That means Eglin has been tracking space for nearly 50 years.

Not only that, but there are three Ground-Based Electro-Optical Deep Space Surveillance System sites that report directly to Eglin, again here in our home state. These three sites are located in Socorro, N.M.; Diego Garcia, British Indian Ocean Territory; and Maui, Hawaii.

America doesn't need a new space force. It's not to say the military shouldn't have one eye beyond our skies, but our government should find a way to bolster and improve the projects and commands already dedicated to this mission before looking to create a whole new branch of the military just yet.

How the US should help end a mass starvation in Middle East

We remember when Aleppo became a household word. The carnage inflicted on Syrian civilians in that city by their autocratic leader, Bashar Assad — with help from Russian forces — ingrained in the world's collective consciousness the depths a despot will reach to cling to power. Thousands died. Much of the city was razed.

Soon, Hodeida, too, may become a household word. Hodeida is the primary port of the broken Middle Eastern nation of Yemen, a country ripped apart by three years of civil war.

United Arab Emirates-backed forces loyal to Yemen's exiled government, together with Saudi air power, have launched an offensive to retake Hodeida, now held by Houthi rebels. The Houthis control much of the Arabian Peninsula nation and are well-entrenched in Hodeida.

The fighting could drag on for months.

The peril isn't confined to the 600,000-some Yemenis who live in Hodeida; the metropolis is a lifeline for Yemenis throughout the country.

More than three-fourths of Yemen's food arrives via the Red Sea port.

The United Nations

estimates that fighting in Hodeida could inflict mass starvation on as many as 8 million of the country's 28 million Yemenis.

An estimated 50,000 Yemeni children already have died of starvation. More than a million Yemenis are infected with cholera. Yemen is already the world's worst humanitarian disaster, and the looming battle for Hodeida could make that disaster far worse.

Western media haven't yet paid extensive attention, so don't feel neglectful if much of this is news to you.

But the magnitude of the suffering and a larger geopolitical struggle could raise the profile of the Yemenis and their plight.

The war in Yemen has become a proxy conflict pitting Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, both longtime U.S. allies, against Iran, which Riyadh accuses of actively helping the Houthi rebels.

The Saudis say Iran has been supplying the missiles Houthi forces are using to strike targets on Saudi territory. Saudi and Emirati fighter jets, meanwhile, have been behind a relentless bombing campaign against Houthi rebels that has killed thousands of Yemeni civilians.

The United States is not

a bystander in this crisis. Washington provides intelligence, munitions and aerial refueling for Saudi and United Arab Emirates fighter jets. Since taking office, President Donald Trump has sought even closer ties with Riyadh. So it comes as no surprise that the Trump administration has said little about the peril Yemen's people face.

But the U.S. can't afford to stay silent as the suffering intensifies.

If it does, it risks accusations of complicity in the horror unfolding in Yemen.

"The U.S. already has blood on its hand in the Yemen crisis," The Washington Post quoted U.S. Rep. Ted Lieu, D-Calif., as saying earlier this month. "We should not make them even bloodier."

The Trump administration has enough sway with the Saudi and Emirati regimes to make the case for a halt to the offensive on Hodeida.

If pushy diplomacy doesn't work, the U.S. has another card to play — shutting down military support that Riyadh and Abu Dhabi need to fight the Houthis.

The alternative, allowing this mass starvation to intensify, cannot be an option.

Trump's trade tirade hits Harley and the Midwest

Hogs — as in Harley-Davidson motorcycles — are fleeing the United States, while Wisconsin dairy cows are crossing their legs in anticipation of distress. This is what President Donald Trump's trade war mentality looks like: lots of short-term pain for Midwestern industries.

On Monday, Milwaukee-based Harley said it would shift production of motorcycles for the European market from U.S. to overseas plants to escape the pain of retaliatory tariffs. The European Union raised tariffs on Harleys from 6 percent to 31 percent in response to Trump administration tariffs on foreign

steel and aluminum. That would increase the cost of every bike sold in Europe by an average of \$2,200.

Wisconsin dairy farmers and cheesemakers, too, are feeling pinched by retaliatory tariffs, these imposed by Mexico as a ripple effect of a steel and aluminum fight. The dairy industry also is vulnerable to attempts by European countries to steal its customers as Trump wages trade battles. The Europeans want to cut deals with dairy-importing nations decreeing that only salty goat's milk cheese exported from Greece can be marketed as "feta," or only hard cheese from Parma, Italy, could be marketed as "parmesan." Where would that leave the dairy farmers of Wisconsin? With weaker branding, weaker exports and uncomfortable cows. "I could see us getting to the point where we're dumping our milk in the fields," Jeff Schwager, president of Sartori, a

Wisconsin cheese producer, told The New York Times.

We'll find out if Trump's tough talk on tariffs is worth the cost in the long run; maybe some nations will cut their customary duties on goods imported from the U.S. Our view is that free and undisrupted trade, not protectionism, is the path to greater prosperity for Americans. The global economy is here to stay, creating an enormous, growing market for U.S. goods. On the flip side, American consumers and businesses benefit from gaining access to the best and least-expensive exports from abroad. It's a classic win-win.

But Trump's skeptical. His first impulse is to kill trade agreements, which is what he did with the Trans-Pacific Partnership, an agreement with 11 other countries that Trump abandoned. He's also threatened to leave NAFTA if that agreement isn't renegotiated to his liking. The fight over steel and aluminum is causing the biggest

ruckus because it has incited China to threaten retaliation — at potential great cost to Midwest manufacturers and farmers. Trump says he trying to fix unfair trade deals that destroy American jobs, but his attempts to bully foreign countries have invited retribution. China's targets include soybeans, which are grown in Illinois and shipped down the Mississippi for export to Asia.

Trump ran for the presidency claiming he could save existing jobs at U.S. factories. But it was always more a sales pitch than a strategy, exemplified by the fact that he ignored details of the fast-moving, interdependent nature of the global economy. Trump worries a lot about trade deficits with other specific countries, yet such narrowly calibrated statistics don't reflect the overall scope of trade and investment flows. For example, the president has called out foreign automakers for scorn, without acknowledging

that companies like BMW and Toyota produce many of their vehicles in the U.S., while Ford and GM have assembly lines in Mexico.

One more point, about an industry we know well: The Trump administration, as we've written, has slapped costly tariffs on Canadian newsprint in order to protect one U.S. paper producer. That decision is costing U.S. newspaper publishers millions of dollars. It's another example of the president's literal-minded take on a dynamic issue.

Trade deals should be fair, of course. And, yes, disagreements are inevitable. We hope all these conflicts can be sorted out. But there should be no turning from globalization. The benefits are too great, and the U.S., as the richest, most flexible economy in the world, is in a position to win.

The restaurant has indoor and outdoor seating for 150, she said.


In the winter, a wall of glass slides back to create an open-air restaurant.

Garlic & Greens

Early season pea shoots provide a flavorful intro to summer

Garlic with pea shoots is a combination worth exploring. It's hardly a secret, especially in Asia where pea greens are widely consumed.

In many regions, peas are sown throughout the summer specifically for their greens, every week or so like American farmers plant lettuce.

A simple, heaping pile of pea greens in brown sauce is one of my favorite Chinese foods.

The culinary deconstructionists in the Cook's Illustrated test kitchen, meanwhile, have broken down the savory nature of pea greens into "grassy," "slightly bitter" and "tastes like peas but not sweet."

They conclude this flavor is maximized in a pan with nothing more than garlic, salt and fat, and I have seen no evidence to the contrary.

Unless your local store has an extra-special produce section, you'll only find pea shoots at the farmers market, or in your backyard.

Before you harvest from your own pea patch, consider the trade-off between a mouthful of greenery today and a handful of peas tomorrow.

The peas you already

have in the ground, climbing their way up the trellis and probably showing some pale yellow flowers, perhaps dangling some little peas that your kids are waiting patiently to eat?

You'd better let those gangly climbers live.

But if they need to be thinned, eat the ones you pull.

And you can always trim the shoots for a quick snack. The last 6 inches of a 3-foot plant are heavenly, and a little trim here and there won't stop progress. Pruned plants will continue growing undaunted, sometimes with more vigor in response to the insult.

Elsewhere in the garden, the appearance of garlic flowers, aka scapes, marks the New Year according to the garlic calendar.

After months of eating soft, sprouting garlic cloves, we can eat new garlic. The plant is alive and juicy and the flavor is sharp and spicy. Scapes are the first taste of the season's new garlic crop.

Scapes, like pea greens, are curly.

Each garlic flower wants to go around twice before uncurling and standing up, eventually opening into a purple flower that looks like a celestial explosion.

China Train Pea Greens

- 1 bunch pea greens, chopped

or left whole

- 1 handful garlic scapes, chopped into inch-long sections
- 1-2 tablespoons butter
- 1-2 tablespoons olive oil
- Black pepper, salt, garlic powder, to taste
- Bacon (optional, sort of); I keep my bacon frozen and cut it lengthwise off of one end, like slicing a sausage but through the ends of several pieces of frozen bacon at once. Most heavy knives have no problem because the fat prevents bacon from freezing rock-hard. It doesn't take a lot of these little bacon bits, sometimes called lardons, to make a difference in a meal. Use a slice of bacon's worth of lardons for this dish.

For the Train Sauce:

- 4 tablespoons soy sauce
- 4 tablespoons oyster sauce
- 2 teaspoons fish sauce
- 2 teaspoons sesame oil
- 3 tablespoons lime juice

Make the sauce by stirring together the ingredients. Cook the lardons (if using) patiently, until they are crispy, then remove from pan. Add the oil, butter and scapes, turn the pan to medium, and wait for the glorious fragrance of fresh garlic to fill the room.

Add the pea sprouts; spread them around so they are evenly distributed, and wait until they flatten down, about 30 seconds. While still bright green, turn the pan to high

and add the sauce. Bring to a boil and let the sauce boil 30 seconds, then stir it around and turn it off.

Serve with the carbohydrate of your choice, or unadulterated in all of its savory, tangy, green garlicky glory.

More to try

And finally, a recipe created by my 5-year-old son, Remy:

Pea Green Chips

1. With a heavy pan on lowest setting, melt 2 tablespoons salted butter. Lay pea shoots in the pan next to each other, taking up the whole pan without crowding them together too much; keep it all one layer. (Remy uses the leaves exclusively, carefully removing them and discarding the stems.)

2. Keep the heat on the lowest setting. Listen to the pea greens sputter peacefully as their moisture cooks out. Let them cook a half-hour or more until crispy.

Remy calls it good here, but predictably, I add some form of garlic: scapes, bulbs, even minced leaves if you have them. Let the the garlic cook, and gently mix it with the delicately crunchy pea greens.

Serve on a plate, next to a piece of toast.

IN THE KITCHEN

You don't need meat to have a complete meal

Vegetarian means a different thing today than it did when I was growing up. Today when we speak of vegetarians, we think of a special group of people that follows a precise diet plan. When I was young, we enjoyed vegetables as a simple way of life.

There was seldom a day when Mother didn't cook vegetables. My mouth waters when I think of her wonderful fresh green beans cooked with some small red potatoes. I also liked fried okra (Tommy Bishop and I always wanted okra that "rattles") and tomatoes (yes, I know tomatoes are really fruit, but to me they are much better served as a vegetable), and don't forget a thick slice of Vidalia onion to complete the meal.

Now take a look at a young person's plate. How many veggies do you see? Not many. You probably see potatoes (more than likely french fries). They need to learn to appreciate the better foods on the table — vegetables of all kinds.

Vegetarian Chili

- 1 tablespoon oil
- ½ cup chopped green bell pepper
- ½ cup chopped onion
- 1 can (14.5 oz.) Mexican stewed tomatoes
- 1 zucchini diced, do not peel
- 1 yellow squash, diced
- 1 tablespoon chili powder
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- ¼ teaspoon salt or to taste
- 1 can vegetable broth (about 2 cups)
- 1 (16 oz.) can black beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 (11 oz.) can whole kernel corn
- 1 (16 oz.) pinto beans, drained and rinsed
- 2 tablespoons margarine
- ¼ teaspoon Tabasco (or to taste)
- Shredded Mexican cheese (to sprinkle over top)
- Tortilla chips

Heat oil in large Dutch oven over medium heat. Add bell pepper and onions. Cook until tender, but not browned. Add tomatoes and cook about 3 minutes. Add zucchini, yellow squash, chili powder, sugar and salt. Cook about 1 minute. Add remaining ingredients and simmer uncovered about 15 minutes. If chili gets too thick, add more water or broth. Serve as suggested.

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PRACTICAL POT WATCHER

Flavors abound when iced tea is home-brewed

It's summertime — time for vacations, picnics and sweltering heat. The time of year when nothing tastes as good or feels as refreshing as a nice, tall glass of iced tea. It's one of those easy things, too, which is probably one of the reasons it has become such a popular summer drink.

If you're eating out, it doesn't matter whether you're going the fast-food route or indulging in something really fancy iced tea seems to be always available, normally with a choice between sweet and unsweet.

You may also be offered a choice of raspberry tea.

But strangely enough, the waitress rarely asks whether you would like lemon with your tea — if you want lemon with your tea, it's up to you to ask for it.

On the other hand, if a customer asks for water, lemon is usually offered.

Of course, if you're going on a picnic or having a meal at home, the possibilities expand. You can pick up a bottle or a jug of tea from the supermarket, in which case sweet, unsweet and raspberry tea are just the beginning. There's also green tea, tea with lemon and honey-sweetened tea, to name a few.

But if you're brewing your iced tea at home, the sky is the limit. Mint tea, for example, is a great treat for a hot summer day. You can make it very

simply by popping a sprig of mint, with the leaves slightly bruised to release the flavor, into a glass of black or green iced tea. Or, if you don't have a patch of spearmint or peppermint in the garden, you can always resort to teabags from the supermarket. I keep three types of mint teabags on hand. For those times when I'd just as soon avoid caffeine, there's the herbal tea, Bigelow's Mint Medley, which is simply a blend of spearmint and peppermint.

If I'm feeling bedraggled by the heat and want a bit of a caffeine lift, I go for Plantation Mint (also from

Bigelow), which combines mint and black tea. And for those few friends who believe passionately in the superiority of green tea over black, there's a box of green tea with mint.

Having trouble waking up after a nap? My own choice would be between Irish Breakfast Tea, English Breakfast Tea, Constant Comment and Bigelow's English Teatime. The first three, incidentally, are readily found in a decaffeinated version; so far, I have seen English Teatime only in the high-octane variety.

Constant Comment, with orange peel and

spices, is one of the older flavored teas, and it's great hot or cold, when you're feeling particularly self-indulgent. Bigelow's Toasted Coconut, a black tea flavored with toasted coconut and almond, is also very nice hot or cold.

Fanatic tea fanciers would probably consider it a heathenish practice, but when I make iced tea using either Constant Comment or the Toasted Coconut, I like them with milk. And after all, if iced coffee is served with milk, why not iced tea?

Lavender is slowly becoming a fairly popular flavor. I've had it

in salad dressing made for a sweet fruit salad, and in baked goods.

More recently I've noticed it being used in herbal teas. A good one for iced tea is the Lemon Lavender Lane, from Celestial Seasonings, which has recently appeared upon the market. Although both Twining and Bigelow market their teabags in individual foil packets for freshness, Celestial Seasoning considers it a sounder ecological practice to dispense with the individual wrappings as well as tags and strings.

So as soon as I open a box of Celestial Seasoning

teabags, I store them in a container with a tight-fitting lid to keep them fresh, flavorful and fragrant. When using teabags for iced tea, I extend the brewing time by a couple of minutes. The hot tea can then be allowed to cool to room temperature. Or pour the hot tea back and forth between two large measuring cups or other containers to help it cool before pouring it over ice cubes.

ZE'S CHICKEN MARINADE

Marinade will season whole chicken or eight pieces.

Ingredients:

- 1 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon black pepper
- ½ teaspoon cumin
- ½ teaspoon paprika
- ½ teaspoon of cayenne pepper (optional, but I recommend it)

- 4 tablespoons yellow onion, freshly chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, roughly chopped
- ½ cup vegetable or olive oil
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 1¼ cup of your favorite traditional beer

Directions:

In a bowl large enough to hold all of your chicken, mix all of the spices. Add oil and soy sauce to

spices, then while slowly stirring, carefully add beer a little at a time to keep beer from foaming up.

Once combined, add chicken and toss to coat. Cover chicken with plastic wrap or transfer to plastic food storage bag, place bowl or bag on a plate lined with a paper towel, and place in the bottom of the fridge. Let chicken marinate for 4 to

12 hours. When ready to Grill or bake, remove chicken from marinade and discard leftover marinade.

If you would like to baste chicken with marinade, make a second batch or reserve some marinade for basting prior to adding chicken to the mix. Never use marinade that chicken has been sitting in.

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Bulgur + lamb = good stuff on the grill

But that all-or-nothing notion is more about zeitgeist than it is about science. While you can certainly eat healthfully and get all the nutrients you need without red meat, you can include it if you are smart about it.

One strategy is to go with smaller portions than, say, the eight-ounce burgers

or 12-ounce steaks you might ordinarily cook up and fill that extra space on your plate with vegetables and/or whole grains.

The accompanying recipe is a supremely tasty example of how satisfying that tactic can be. In it, whole-grain bulgur wheat, cumin, garlic and herbs are mixed with lean ground lamb to form

flavor-packed, Middle-Eastern-style meat patties that are chargrilled and served with a lemony three-herb sauce.

Besides adding a wonderful texture and earthy, nutty taste to the rich lamb, the bulgur provides whole-grain nutrition and volume, so the relatively modest amount of meat has a satisfying presence on the plate.

Served drizzled with the sauce, and perhaps alongside a heap of simply grilled vegetables or a large salad, these lamb patties are a compelling way to enjoy meat in healthful balance.

Grilled lamb and bulgur patties with herb sauce

4 servings (makes 8 patties)

Ingredients

- 1/3 cup bulgur wheat (medium-coarse grind)
- 2 medium cloves garlic
- 1 large shallot (2 ounces)
- 1 1/2 cups lightly packed fresh parsley leaves, plus more for garnish
- 1/2 cup lightly packed fresh cilantro leaves
- 1/2 cup lightly packed fresh basil leaves
- 12 ounces lean ground lamb
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1 1/2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon finely grated lemon zest
- 3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 to 2 tablespoons water

Steps

Cook the bulgur according to the directions on the package and allow to cool slightly. Prepare the grill for direct heat. Pulse the garlic in a mini

food processor. Add the shallots; pulse until they are chopped as well. Add the parsley, cilantro and basil; pulse 10 to 15 times, until they are chopped yet still have some texture. Transfer half the herb mixture to a mixing bowl (leaving the other half in the food processor). Add the ground lamb, cooked bulgur, cumin, crushed red pepper flakes, and 1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper to the mixing bowl. Use your clean hands to blend well and then form eight oblong patties of

equal size. Add the lemon juice and zest and the remaining 1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper to the herb mixture in the food processor; pulse to incorporate, then, with the motor running, drizzle in the oil and as much of the water as you need, depending on how thick you want the sauce. Transfer to a serving bowl. Place the patties on the grill; close the lid and cook for about 3 minutes per side (for medium), until grill marks have formed.

5 essential pans to use for baking, more

I have devoted an entire cabinet in my kitchen to baking pans. And then some. It's a little embarrassing. Square pans in multiple sizes. Round pans in multiple sizes. The new loaf pans. The old, maybe-I-can-still-use-them loaf pans. I could go on. I have surely gone overboard, but my hoarding notwithstanding, having a few different baking pans and dishes is smart and it's a worthwhile investment.

Plus, these pans are versatile, so you can do much more with them than baking.

Here are my essentials and a few ideas about what you can

do with them.

- Rectangular baking dish. The most common size is 9 by 13 inches. You can choose from glass, metal or even ceramic, and what you choose really depends on what you think you'll be making most. Glass is better for all-purpose cooking/roasting, although you can get away with baking if you keep a close eye on your baked goods and/or turn down the temperature (glass is a better insulator than metal, so cakes can brown and cook through faster). Cooking savory dishes such as lasagna, mac and cheese, strata and casseroles in Pyrex (or ceramic) is better, because you can slice and serve straight from the dish without

worrying about scratching the surface. You'll also get nice browned bits when you roast chicken with vegetables. If you're more interested in baking at that size — mega brownies, for instance — stick with metal.

- Square cake pan. Typically 8- or 9-inch squares, although I think the larger size is more versatile. Again, look for metal pans with right-angled corners. This is the classic brownie pan, meaning it's also good for other desserts (cakes or bars). I also use it to bake one of my favorite coffee cakes. Square pans are a nice vessel for baked eggs, or a small casserole or batch of mac and cheese.

- A loaf pan. The standard sizes are 9 by 5 inches or the slightly smaller 8 1/2 by 4 1/2 inches, and they're pretty much interchangeable as long as you tweak the cook time if you're swapping one

for the other. I generally prefer metal over glass for the same reasons mentioned above.

- Round cake pan. Also available in 8- or 9-inch sizes. Pick whichever size you prefer (go for metal, though) and adapt recipes accordingly. If you think you'll ever be making a layer cake, consider buying at least two in one size. Or a savory cheesecake.

- Pie plate. Standard size is 9 to 9 1/2 inches. You can buy cute ceramic ones, but I prefer good ol' Pyrex — it's cheap, bakes evenly and lets you see exactly what color your pie is.

Yes, definitely make pies in your pie dish! Or pie-adjacent dishes, including quiche. I've also used mine to make shortbread. When you need something shallow for dipping (bagels in toppings) or breading (chicken cutlets, above), a pie plate is very handy. It's great for a gratin, too. Even baked oatmeal is an option.

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Lightning win streak in limbo

A suspended game gives Leesburg chance to set league record

The Leesburg Lightning team-record winning streak came to an end Monday with a 5-1 loss to Seminole County.

Or did it? Even though Leesburg's 13-game winning streak was snapped, the team still has a chance to extend that mark by one game. That potential victory — from a suspended game to be completed on July 12 — would give the Lightning the

Florida Collegiate Summer League record of 14 consecutive wins, breaking a mark they currently share with the 2009 DeLand Suns.


Then again, a loss in that game would shear a win off the streak and leave Leesburg with a 12-game mark.

Confused? Don't be. It's actually quite simple. The guidelines governing the Lightning's consecutive games winning streak is spelled out by rule 9.23 in the Major League Baseball rulebook ... with which the FCSL complies. That section, titled "Guidelines for Cumulative Performance Records,"

governs how hitting streaks, consecutive-game playing streaks and suspended games are handled.

According to subsection 9.23(d), which states, "all performances in the completion of a suspended game shall be considered as occurring on the original date of the game." In layman's terms, when a suspended game is subsequently completed, the game — and all the statistics that go with it — are treated as if the game were played to completion when it was originally scheduled.

On Monday night, Harden joined an elite fraternity. He won the NBA's most valuable player award, beating out New Orleans' Anthony Davis and Cleveland's LeBron James.

Three top Hockey Hall of Fame class

Willie O'Ree didn't know he had broken the NHL's color barrier when he made his debut in 1958. Martin Brodeur couldn't see the three Stanley Cup titles and jaw-dropping career ahead when he played his first game in goal for the New Jersey Devils in 1992 and, a year later, Gary Bettman didn't know he would end up growing the league by leaps and bounds over the next 25 years as its commissioner.

All three will go into the Hockey Hall of Fame together as the headliners of a trail-blazing class of 2018 that also includes diminutive forward Martin St. Louis, four-time gold-medal-winning Canadian women's national team star Jayna Hefford and Russian Alexander Yakushev.

O'Ree was the first black player in the NHL, Bettman has overseen the league's expansion into a multibillion-dollar industry and Brodeur piled up the most wins and shutouts of any goaltender in NHL history.

"This is an exciting class to be around because everyone has tried to take their game to the next level," Bettman said Tuesday. "I really wasn't focused on whether this was happening now; I was really focused on whether Willie O'Ree was going to be selected

Late goal lifts Argentina into next round

Lionel Messi and Argentina finally got things going at the World Cup.

Messi scored an exquisite 14th-minute goal to give the two-time champions the lead in a must-win game against Nigeria on Tuesday,

but it wasn't until Marcos Rojo's 86th-minute strike that Argentina was assured of a place in the round of 16 with a 2-1 victory in St. Petersburg, Russia.

Victor Moses scored from the penalty spot in the 51st minute for Nigeria, putting Argentina in danger of being

eliminated without winning a match in Russia.

It took an unlikely goal by Rojo — a center back — to save Argentina with a cushioned volley into the corner.

The win gave the Argentinians second place in Group D and allowed the soccer-mad nation to forget about

the 3-0 loss to Croatia last week that sparked days of soul-searching within the squad and back home.

Argentina will play France in the last 16 in Kazan on Saturday, keeping alive Messi's

NEW YORK CBS Sports hires Steratore as rules analyst

CBS Sports has hired former referee Gene Steratore as a rules analyst for its NFL broadcasts. Steratore retired this offseason after leading the officiating crew at the Super Bowl in Minneapolis. He says that after 15 years of officiating in the NFL, "it's time to hang up my whistle for a new challenge." CBS Sports announced Tuesday that Steratore would provide analysis in New York on Sundays throughout the NFL season. He will join announcers in the booth for its Thanksgiving and NFL playoff coverage, including the Super Bowl, which is in Atlanta next year. Steratore also will provide analysis during CBS Sports' college basketball coverage, including the NCAA men's championship. He started officiating college basketball in 1997 and finished as a Big Ten primary official. Says Sean McManus, chairman of CBS Sports, "His strong communication skills combined with his knowledge of the rules will allow him to quickly interpret and explain the calls, giving viewers a better understanding of the rules and enhancing our overall coverage."

COLORADO SPRINGS, COLO. Daly says USGA won't let him use cart

John Daly has withdrawn from the U.S. Senior Open, citing a deteriorating knee condition and blaming the USGA for not allowing him to use a golf cart. The 52-year-old two-time major champion went on Twitter to say the USGA turned down his request to use a golf cart, which could have been allowed under rules that conform with the Americans with Disabilities Act. The USGA responded, saying it offered Daly a chance to provide additional information about his condition. Daly said he never received such a request.

LONDON Joshua ordered by WBA to fight Povetkin

Anthony Joshua was ordered to sign a deal to fight Alexander Povetkin "within 24 hours" or face being stripped of the WBA portion of his world heavyweight boxing titles. The WBA lost patience with the talks between Joshua and WBC champion Deontay Wilder for a unification bout, and want Joshua to fight its mandatory challenger from Russia. WBA president Gilberto Mendoza said on Tuesday in a statement: "The WBA have allowed over a month extension to negotiate with Povetkin and also ongoing discussions with Deontay Wilder. "It appears the Wilder team have not returned the contract for the fight and therefore we are requesting a date for the Joshua versus Povetkin fight with immediate effect." There seemed no choice for Joshua (21-0, 20 KO).

Academy standout, took home the Rookie of the Year award.

Harden walked onto the stage at the NBA awards show in Santa Monica wearing sunglasses and a black-patterned, beige coat. He hadn't prepared a speech, but he couldn't help but think back to his NBA journey.

"Sixth man of the year to MVP," Harden said before walking off.

Harden became the first Houston Rockets player since Hakeem Olajuwon in 1994 to be named MVP. It came after a season in which Harden led the NBA in scoring with 30.4 points per game, three-pointers made with 265 and 50-point games with four. He notched the league's first 60-point triple-double in January and, together with Chris Paul, his backcourt mate

who also appears headed to the Hall of Fame, helped the Rockets to a franchise-record 65 wins.

In the days before Harden won the award, he didn't think of it as something he needed to validate his season. How he felt was enough — this season was the most fun he'd had.

"Just basketball-wise, from a business standpoint, family," Harden said. "Just, I'm in a really, really good place in my life."

because that to me was a very important act for the Hall to take."

Bettman has been commissioner since 1993, during which time the NHL has expanded its footprint across North America and increased from 24 to 31 teams. In that time, the league has gone from a \$437 million business to one with almost \$5 billion in revenue. It's been an occasionally bruising ride, with three work stoppages, including one that canceled the entire 2004-05 season and led to the salary cap. But Bettman has been nothing if not a strong leader, and all-time great Wayne Gretzky said the efforts to help each club compete have made the game stronger.

"His leadership and love for hockey is very evident," Gretzky said. "Hockey has become more entertaining year after year, thanks in part to his passion for the game."

Brodeur lifted the Stanley Cup three times with

the Devils between 1995 and 2003. He leads all goalies with 691 wins and 125 shutouts in 1,266 regular-season games with the Devils and St. Louis Blues, and he won the Vezina Trophy four times. He won 113 playoff games and had a 2.02 postseason goals-against average. Brodeur also scored two regular-season goals and another in the playoffs — more than any other goalie.

The Montreal native was the last real standup goaltender as the position moved almost exclusively to the butterfly technique, and his puck-handling prowess led the NHL to institute the trapezoid behind the net as a way to increase scoring.

"You play your whole career and you don't expect to get this phone call, but when it does, it definitely does feel pretty good," said Brodeur, the Blues assistant GM who was sitting alongside Hall of Fame defenseman Larry Robinson at prospect camp in St. Louis when he got the news. "I want to thank the committee for putting me on so early."

While Brodeur and St. Louis were first-ballot

selections, O'Ree had been waiting decades for this honor since making history at the Montreal Forum on Jan. 18, 1958, with the Boston Bruins. He was 32.

A native of Fredericton, New Brunswick, in Eastern Canada, O'Ree finished with four goals and 10 assists in 45 NHL games during the 1957-58 and 1960-61 seasons despite being 95 percent blind in his right eye. O'Ree was the first black player in the NHL but he will be the third inducted into the Hall of Fame, joining Edmonton Oilers goalie Grant Fuhr and Canadian women's national team captain Angela James.

"Willie paved the path for the rest of us," Fuhr said. "In that way he is a true builder of the game. If you look up the word 'builder,' there should be a picture of Willie. He is the Jackie Robinson of hockey."

Bruins owner Jeremy Jacobs said O'Ree receiving this honor was long overdue, adding "Willie has been a tremendous figure in our game both on and off the ice for over 60 years."

quest for a first world title. He might have retired from international soccer for a second time — and for good this time — if it wasn't for Rojo's goal.

Messi kicked the ball out of play with his first touch, was tackled with his next, but then he started to put on a show.

Messi's 65th international goal owed as much to Ever Banega's long, driven pass over the defense as the forward's exquisite control on his left thigh, another touch with his left foot, and then a cool right-footed finish into the corner.

Messi, who later hit the post off a free kick, and the recalled Banega ran the game in the first half for Argentina. The team's biggest problems arose whenever Mascherano lost possession in front of his own defense.

And it was Mascherano who gave away the penalty with a pull on Leon Balogun at a 49th-minute corner. Moses converted — and marked the goal with a somersault — to put Nigeria back in control of the race for second place in the group.

Croatia 2, Iceland 1: Croatia ended Iceland's chances at the World Cup and helped out Argentina at the same time. Ivan Perisic capitalized on a defensive error to score a 90th-minute winner Tuesday, giving Croatia a 2-1 win over Iceland in Rostov-On-Don, Russia, and first place in Group D on Tuesday. The Croats will face Denmark on Sunday in Nizhny Novgorod. Fielding a side filled with reserves after already being assured of a spot in

the round of 16, Croatia started to take control of the match in the second half. Milan Badelj, moments after hitting the bar, scored the opening goal in the 53rd minute. He sprinted into the area and sent a bouncing shot past goalkeeper Hannes Halldorsson. Iceland equalized in the 76th when Gylfi Sigurdsson scored from the penalty spot after substitute Dejan Lovren handled the ball.

Denmark 0, France 0: A game neither France nor Denmark needed to win produced the World Cup's first 0-0 draw amid boos and whistles from fans on Tuesday in Moscow. A slow-paced game out of step with a vibrant tournament ensured already-qualified France won Group C and Denmark advanced as runner-up. A French team with six starters resting barely tested Denmark goalkeeper Kasper Schmeichel until substitute Nabil Fekir tried two long-range shots.

Much of a 78,011 crowd in Luzhniki Stadium whistled misplaced passes and slow play as the game progressed and Denmark protected its point.

Peru 2, Australia 0: Already-eliminated Peru ended Australia's hopes of advancing to the knockout round at the World Cup with a 2-0 victory on Tuesday in Sochi, Russia. The Australians had to beat Peru and hope Denmark lost to France in the other Group C match, but neither result happened. Andre Carrillo's first-half goal — a half-volley from inside the area — was Peru's first in a World Cup since 1982, the last time the South Americans played in the tournament. Peru hadn't won a World Cup match since defeating Iran in 1978. Peru captain Paolo Guerrero, who almost missed the tournament because of a doping suspension, scored the second goal early in the second half to give his team an honorable finish after two opening losses.

The game that has created this quirk for the record books was the first game of a doubleheader on Saturday between Leesburg and Winter Park at Orlando Bishop Moore. Game one of the double-dip was suspended due to weather with the Lightning leading the Diamond Dawgs 1-0 in the middle of the second inning.

In a nutshell, when that game is resumed at 4:30 p.m. on July 12, Leesburg can establish a league record for consecutive wins if it holds off Winter Park.

However, there's a flip side.

If the Diamond Dawgs come back to win that game, Leesburg's winning streak will revert back to 12 games — where it stood heading into the originally scheduled doubleheader.

Both scenarios were confirmed Tuesday by FCSL President Stefano Foggi.

"We've never had a situation like this before," Foggi said. "Our goal has always been to have suspended games rescheduled and played as quickly as possible and (July 12) is the next time the Lightning and Diamond Dawgs play in Winter Park. We could have rescheduled the game for one of the league's off days, but we don't like to do that for a variety of reasons."

"The Lightning's winning streak is an amazing accomplishment and I'm glad they still have a chance to set a new record."

Foggi said league officials were asked why Saturday's suspended game was not picked up once the weather cleared. After all, the second game of the doubleheader was played to completion, with the Lightning winning 14-2.

Why wasn't the first game completed before the second game began?

"We have always treated each game as an individual game," Foggi said. "We do that because the game originally scheduled for a particular day might have a special function attached to it ... a pregame promotion or a dignitary throwing out the first pitch who is available only for a specific time."

"We have to protect those activities, too. There is no easy way to do it, but this is a policy that has evolved for us over the years, because of all the weather issues that come up in Florida during the summer months."

Lightning manager Rich Billings said he chalks up the scenarios still in play to the nuances of summer baseball and how league officials have to find ways to get as many scheduled games played between lightning strikes and raindrops. He didn't spend much time thinking about the winning

streak before Saturday's asterisk-creating events or after Monday's loss to the Scorpions.

His focus, just as it has been since before opening day, is to get his team prepared for the next game on the schedule.

"I really don't understand why we didn't just finish the first game on Saturday and then play the second game," Billings said. "I'm sure there was a reason why we didn't and if I asked someone in the league office to explain it to me, I'm sure it would make perfect sense. But, we can't worry about the winning streak. It's over for now."

Billings said the nearly three-week span between the start and finish of the suspended game will not change his approach to games played between now and then. His lineup is set — the players in the lineup when the game was suspended will still be in the game.

However, the way in which he will handle his pitching staff when the

game resumes likely will change.

"We'll have to see how things play out," Billings said. "We'll see who's available. That part will be a little tricky. I don't plan to hold pitchers out of games leading up to (July 12) just so we can have them for that game."

"The consecutive-wins record is nice and we've let the guys talk about it and have some fun with it, but we all want to win a championship ... that's what counts the most."

Elevating the game

Green Valley serves up a roller coaster thrill ride

CLERMONT — On the drive up to the pro shop at the Green Valley Country Club, you are treated to an excellent view of the third hole. Before you even get out of the car, you know you are in for something unique.

That view of the third hole reveals a long downhill fairway to a green that is heavily guarded by two large bunkers. It is the downhill fairway that is a dead giveaway that this course is special.

The Clermont area in general is known for being out of the ordinary for Florida when it comes to elevation changes, and Green Valley has carved out a gem of a course that makes full use of those hills.

"It's a fun golf course," said Terry Govern, Green Valley's general manager and head pro. "You can play a lot and never get tired of it. On a lot of courses, if you play them a lot, you get to know every shot. That's not the case here."

Green Valley offers tees that range from just over 7,000 yards at the back to just under 5,000. It's also a bargain with specials available online (www.gvcountryclub.com) for \$24 at 10 a.m.

The course was originally built in 1966 as a nine-hole course. In 1991 Green Valley brought back the original designer, Lloyd Clifton, to add another nine holes.

Playing the course, you would have no idea which are the old holes and which are the newer holes. That, of course, was the reason Clifton was brought back.

It was not a case of just adding 10 through 18. Instead, the newer holes are sprinkled among the original holes, and it all blends for a course that feels like it was all built at the same time.

There are a few signature holes on the course, from the par-4 No. 3 that you view as you enter the course to a good test of the nerves on Nos. 7 and 8. The par-4 seventh features a second shot over water, and No. 8 uses the water again on the longest par-3 on the course.

Then there is No. 10, a great way to start the second nine with a fairway that wraps around a large lake and offers temptations of cutting across the lake to glory.

On many of the holes you can stand over a shot and almost hear Dirty Harry in the back of your mind. You know, the old "do you feel lucky" line. With plenty of doglegs, the urge to cut corners can be strong. It's a course with a high

risk-reward factor.

And for those who decide to challenge the course only to pay the price by coming up a little short, well, there are plenty of opportunities to take your mind of that ballooning score.

On No. 6, a modest par-4, there is a sweeping view over Lake Minneola with the Citrus Tower clearly visible in the distance. Then there is No. 9 with water down the right side and a bird sanctuary with more than 20 species out in the rushes. Sandhill cranes and other birds are constantly roaming the course.

"This course rolls, which is not typical of a Florida course," Govern said. "We've got really nice views and we're kind of Clermont's home course. It's challenging enough, and the rough can be tough. But the fairways are generous for the most part. If you play the right yardage for your game, you're really going to enjoy yourself out here."



LONDON Uber wins back license in London, but on probation

A London court gave ride-hailing firm Uber a shorter than usual license to keep operating in the capital, accepting Tuesday the firm's claim that it has changed its aggressive corporate tactics and is now a more responsible corporate citizen.

But Chief Magistrate Emma Arbuthnot granted an operating license lasting just 15 months, short of the five-year permit Uber had had been seeking. That means the company will remain under scrutiny and serve a probation period of sorts in meeting the terms of regulators at Transport for London.

"The rapid and very recent changes undergone by (Uber) lead me to conclude that a shorter period will enable TFL to test out the new arrangements," the judge wrote in her ruling.

MIAMI Royal Caribbean invests in ship to attract millennials

Royal Caribbean has invested \$120 million in a 15-year-old ship as part of a plan to attract younger travelers with shorter cruises.

A company news release says the Mariner of the Seas arrived at its new home last week in PortMiami. The ship will offer 4-night weekday and 3-night weekend trips from Miami to the Bahamas. Its first voyage left Monday.

Besides restaurants and bars, other new attractions include a virtual reality bungee trampoline, a pair of racer waterslides, a glow-in-the-dark laser tag room, a room escape challenge and a surf simulator.

DETROIT Lexus recalls cars to fix fuel leaks that can cause fires

Toyota's Lexus luxury brand is recalling about 121,000 cars worldwide because of fuel leaks in the engine that can cause fires. The recall covers certain 2006 through 2013 IS350 cars, as well as the 2010 through 2014 IS350C, and the 2007 through 2011 GS350 and GS450h. All have 3.5-liter V6 gasoline engines.

Restaurants, houses and growth runways

"Our house ... is a very, very, very fine house ..." — Crosby, Stills and Nash, "Our House"

While in high school I worked at my parents' lunch restaurant in Lake Zurich, Illinois, then a sleepy little town that has since become a booming suburb of Chicago. Even though restaurants are often-times bad investments, my parents opened one anyway. My Mom said, and I remember it well: "People have to eat." Mom built a solid business that she later sold when she and my Dad traded frigid Illinois winters for sunny Florida.

I was thinking about my Mom's "people have to eat" rationale recently while researching the large, publicly traded homebuilders. The shares of these companies have fallen since the start of the year, presumably because interest rates have risen slightly and because the pace of sales has slowed a bit. I believe that the country's largest homebuilders have a multiyear growth runway ahead of them, so naturally the falling share prices further piqued my interest. Rising rates or not, people have to live somewhere, as well as eat.

In the past, homebuilding was a relatively low-margin, capital-intensive, boom-and-bust industry dominated by thousands of local builders. Small homebuilders still put up the majority of new houses in America, but that's changing quickly. The ten largest homebuilders have been growing

their market share and now construct almost a third of all new homes. Industry consolidation is often a sign that the remaining players will become more profitable since they face less aggressive competition.

Less competition isn't their only advantage, though. Homebuilding costs are rising, which should also benefit the larger players because they can borrow money cheaper than smaller builders; buy materials in bulk and save money; and spread their design and labor costs over more projects. All this means more profit per home than subscale competitors.

Additionally, the largest homebuilders are moving to an "asset light" business model, which has substantially improved their returns on capital. Instead of having their money tied up in land that may or may not be developed in the near future,

some homebuilders are increasingly using purchase options to reserve land they may buy rather than buying the land outright.

This sometimes means they end up paying a few percent more for a parcel of land. But by securing construction sites this way, companies can build more homes where the demand (and prices) are currently highest and forgo projects that may not be as profitable. In the old days when a project got scrapped, the homebuilders had to find a buyer for their land, which isn't always an easy task. Now, when a project doesn't work out, they walk away from the land and forfeit the small option payment.

Form, not function?

The Trump administration may deliver on its promise to reduce a commonly used tax form to postcard size, but it does not shrink the workload for many Americans filling out their taxes.

A draft copy of the new 1040 income tax form given to The Associated Press by a staffer on the Ways & Means Committee shows that the form will be reduced from two full pages to a double-sided half page. But the legwork to claim many popular deductions and provide other critical information has been moved to one of six accompanying worksheets.

The postcard-sized form was a big selling point for the administration during its promotion of the divisive new tax law — President Donald Trump even kissed a version of the postcard at one meeting to show his approval. Experts say that while the law does simplify the process for some Americans, many will still have to go through the same hoops to complete their taxes with this new format.

The tax law greatly increases the standard deduction, meaning that millions of Americans will claim the deduction and skip the time-consuming process of itemizing on their taxes. The Tax Policy Center estimates that about 27 million fewer taxpayers will itemize under the new law.

Taxpayers may still need to crunch the numbers to see if they should itemize or not. And 19 million filers will continue to itemize, according to TPC, so they will still need to fill out one or more of the six additional forms.

The supplemental

paperwork would be needed to make common tax moves, such as a reporting an educator expense or claiming a deduction for interest paid on a student loan, as well as reporting childcare expenses and retirement savings contribution credits.

"Don't confuse creating a postcard with simplifying a tax filing. It's not the same thing at all," said Howard Gleckman, a senior fellow at the Tax Policy Center.

Gleckman said that most taxpayers are going to have to fill out one if not more of the new accompanying forms. And the new structure makes some beneficial components of tax law, such as the ability to claim the earned income credit — which is designed to help low

to moderate-income working people — harder to find.

The postcard is more of a concept than practice anyhow.

The bulk of taxpayers complete their taxes online, meaning they still answer all the same questions regardless of how the paperwork is laid out. And unlike a postcard from vacation, those that fill out their taxes on a postcard will likely want to send it in an envelope to protect their private information on the document, such as their Social Security number.

"I am not sure this is going to make a whole lot of difference," Gleckman said.

The Treasury was expected to unveil the new form this week and did not immediately comment on the draft

document. The IRS also did not comment.

A failure to dramatically simplify the tax filing process as promised may earn criticism from Democrats who might oppose the \$1.5 trillion tax plan, which cut taxes for many Americans but gave its biggest benefits to corporations and wealthy individuals.

Rep. Lloyd Doggett, D-Texas, who is a member of the House Ways and Means Committee and a fierce critic of the tax law, said in a statement Tuesday that the postcard "only adds needless complexity and confusion."

"Why stop at a postcard?" he said. "(Why not) make it a postage stamp, with a catalogue of schedules required to complete filing?"

By allowing her son to live (rent-free, I assume) under the conditions you have described, she's enabling it to continue for the foreseeable future. Unless changes are made, it could ruin your marriage. A first step should be to set a date by which her adult son should move out and insist he get help for the issue that led to the restraining order.

A falsecard need not be flagrant to be successful. Sometimes, the play of a seemingly insignificant spot card can be enough to lead the opposition astray.

Consider this deal from a French tournament. North-South did well to reach the good club slam after East's opening pre-empt, and West led the diamond king. East overtook the king with the ace and returned the diamond queen. South ruffing high.

Declarer's only problem was what

to do with his J-10 of spades. Many options were open to him, but the simplest and best approach appeared to be to try to establish dummy's hearts by cashing the K-A and ruffing a heart. If the outstanding hearts divided 3-3, as in the actual deal, or if the queen fell doubleton, his problems would immediately be over. Even if the hearts divided 4-2 and the queen did not fall, other chances would remain.

So at trick three, South cashed the ace of trumps, planning next to draw a second round before tackling the heart suit. But this was where East found the subtle play that diverted South from the winning course. Instead of routinely following low on the ace of clubs, East dropped the eight!

This falsecard had a telling effect on declarer, who reasoned that East would not have dropped the eight unless it was his only club. Surely, South thought, East would have retained the eight if he could, hoping for a possible overcuff of dummy.

Declarer therefore abandoned his plan to establish hearts in favor of ruffing two spades in dummy with the 9-7 of clubs. But when South led a spade to the king and returned a spade toward his hand, East produced the six of clubs to sink the seemingly unsinkable slam.
