Scandal-plagued Pruitt resigns

EPA administrator faced months of ethics investigations before stepping down

WASHINGTON — Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Scott Pruitt resigned Thursday amid ethics

investigations of outsized security spending, first-class flights and a sweetheart condo lease.

With Pruitt's departure, President Donald Trump loses an administrator many conservatives regarded as one of the more effective members of his Cabinet. But Pruitt had also been dogged for months by a seemingly unending string of scandals that spanned more than a dozen federal and

congressional investigations. In a resignation letter released to media outlets, Pruitt expressed no regret for any actions he had taken since being tapped by Trump to lead EPA last year.

"It is extremely difficult for me to cease serving you in this role first because I count it a blessing to be serving you in any capacity, but also, because

Small twister, big deal

Weather Service classifies July 4 tornado an EF-0, but it was still vicious

TAVARES — Jim Jordan was a busy man Thursday, but not cooking seafood or greeting diners to his restaurant, Fish Camp of Lake Eustis.

He was still surveying the damage caused by a tornado Wednesday afternoon that tore a hole in his roof and sent diners on the outside deck scrambling for cover.

"We've got your back," a produce supplier told him on her way out to her car.

Roofers were getting ready to cover his top, too.

"We hope to be open again by Tuesday," he said.

The National Weather Service estimates the twister that raced across the lake from the Leesburg area was an EF-0, the lowest intensity tornado, which has winds of 70 to 80 mph. The worst is EF-5, with winds of 200 mph.

Trump closes in on court pick

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump is moving closer to deciding his next Supreme Court nominee amid intense jockeying from various factions seeking to influence his choice to replace retiring Justice Anthony Kennedy.

Trump's current top contenders are federal appeals court judges Amy Coney Barrett, Brett Kavanaugh and Raymond Kethledge, said a person familiar with Trump's thinking who was not authorized to speak publicly.

Deputies shoot Eustis man during standoff

Man charged at SWAT team following 3-hour standoff

EUSTIS — Alan Tracey Richards, 55, broke into the home of his estranged wife Thursday, threatened to kill her and her brother, and said: "I'm going to die tonight."

Three hours later he was dead after charging the Lake County Sheriff's SWAT team with a

gun pointed at his head, yelling and threatening the deputies.

"They have been going through a separation, and apparently he has been making threats in recent weeks," sheriff's Lt. John Herrell said of Richards and his wife, Wendy. In June, he showed up and trashed the house. "...his wife said he was suicidal and he made some comments that led his wife

to believe he was not quite stable."

Eustis police called Orange County law enforcement officers when they learned he was at Orlando International Airport. That agency determined he did not meet the requirements for involuntary commitment in a mental hospital, Herrell said.

Eustis police, who responded to 406 N. Center St., at 3:41 a.m. Thursday, called the Sheriff's Office for assistance, including the special weapons team and its crisis negotiator.

Wendy's brother, Gary L. Babb, was trying to act as the go-between between Tracy and the Sheriff's Office, but Richards refused to talk.

"He refused to comply, refused to come out," Herrell said.

About 6:30, Richards emerged from the house with the gun to his head. He saw the deputies and the officers in the area. SWAT team members repeatedly ordered him to drop his weapon.

HARRISBURG, PA. AG argues church abuse grand jury report should be public

Pennsylvania's attorney general told the state Supreme Court on Thursday he supports a request by news organizations that the court order the release of an extensive report into child sexual abuse and attempts to cover it up in several of the state's Roman Catholic dioceses.

Attorney General Josh Shapiro also said in the court filing that his office opposes requests by unnamed parties to present their own evidence, question witnesses and rewrite the grand jury report "in accordance with their preferred view of the facts."

He argued the report should not be delayed, calling it a matter of exceptional public interest.

JERUSALEM Israel lays down red lines for postwar relations with Syria

As Syrian government forces press on with a furious offensive against rebel-held areas in the country's south, Israel is quietly acknowledging that President Bashar Assad's forces will soon be on its doorstep, laying down red lines for postwar relations with the Syrian leader.

Israel's main concern is to keep archrival Iran, an Assad ally, as far away from its border as possible — along with its proxy, the Lebanese militia Hezbollah.

It is a turnaround from a few years ago, when Israeli leaders were publicly predicting Assad's overthrow and some voices even mused about peace with a future democratic Syria.

SAN JUAN, PUERTO RICO Puerto Ricans accused of misusing \$8M in funds

A mayor and two former government officials in Puerto Rico face public corruption charges in separate cases that involve a total of \$8 million in federal and local funds, authorities said Thursday.

The suspects are the mayor of the town of Sabana Grande and the former directors of finance for the town of Toa Baja, which has struggled to pay its employees amid an 11-year recession.

U.S. Attorney Rosa Emilia Rodriguez told reporters that the former officials from Toa Baja are accused of using nearly \$5 million worth of federal funds to pay the town's public employees and municipal contractors.

"Not only is that illegal, it's immoral," she said.

Another nerve agent poisoning in UK

AMESBURY, England — In this normally pleasant town of 10,000 residents a stone's throw from the mysterious Stonehenge monument, the new reality is sinking in: Novichok, again.

Four months had passed since the nerve agent attack on a former Russian spy and his daughter, and the collective nightmare seemed to be fading. No longer were forensics experts in oversize hazmat suits combing the area for an invisible killer developed by the Soviet Union in Cold War times.

Eager tourists, drawn by an unusually long spell of glorious summer weather, were back at Stonehenge, and England's World Cup team was surging, buoying spirits. Then a local couple with no obvious connection to Russia or to espionage fell desperately ill and the government said Novichok was to blame.

Some are embracing the "keep calm and carry on" ethos that helped England through two world wars, but others were frightened by the seemingly random poisoning of two innocents who now lie critically ill in a local hospital.

"It's shocking, and it's scary," said Elaine Read, a worker at The Kings Arms pub who used to occasionally share a pint with Dawn Sturgess, one of the victims. "Nobody expected it to happen again. Everyone was saying it was Russia, but now it's just two ... local people. They're just like us."

She said it's difficult to feel safe after what happened to Sturgess, 44, and 45-year-old Charlie Rowley. Both became violently ill within hours of each other on Saturday. At first, authorities believed they had taken some bad heroin or crack cocaine, but it turned out to be Novichok.

"You don't know where it is, that's the trouble," Read said of the elusive nerve agent. "You don't know how Dawn and Charlie got it, how

it crossed their paths."

The bizarre case, combining elements of a murder mystery and a spy thriller, is stoking international tensions ahead of next week's NATO summit, which will deal in part with worsening relations between Russia and the West.

Britain's interior minister demanded Thursday that Russia explain how two people were inadvertently poisoned with the same military-grade nerve agent used to attack ex-Russian spy Sergei Skripal and his daughter, Yulia, in the nearby town of Salisbury in March.

Britain has accused Russia of being behind the attack on the Skripals, which the Kremlin vehemently denies. British Home Secretary Sajid Javid told Parliament on Thursday that it is now time for Russia to explain "exactly what has gone on."

"It is completely unacceptable for our people to be either deliberate or accidental targets, or for our streets, our parks, our towns to be dumping grounds for poison," Javid said.

In Amesbury, residents were advised to wash their clothes and take other

precautions if they were at the locations believed to have been frequented by the latest victims.

Some were staying inside to avoid any risk of contamination, but most were going about their business. A few parts of town remained cordoned off by police, including the Baptist Church, but activity in the easygoing town center continued unabated.

"I'm not so easily scared, but there has to be more to it," said Justin Pritchard, enjoying a beer with a friend.

"We don't know what's going on. First, they said it was the Russians. Now this is completely separate. Originally, we all thought it was the Russians, now it doesn't seem quite right," he said, noting that Sturgess and Rowley have no connection to Russia.

British officials said Thursday they believe the latest victims were not deliberately targeted but came into contact with the Novichok used in the Skripal poisoning. Police said the couple was exposed to the nerve agent after handling a contaminated item, but provided no details.

That isn't convincing to

Rick Bird, 65, a retired British army veteran who was trained in the handling of nerve agents during his military career. He said he never dreamed nerve agents would be deployed in Britain.

"The latest case seems to be an odd one," Bird said. "The first one in Salisbury, we thought we were all over it. This came totally out of the blue. It's the fear factor, for everybody."

The last few days have been traumatic for some residents, particularly those who live close to areas that were shut down to the public because of possible contamination.

Alex Brittany, 29, said he woke up to find the Baptist Church near his home being cordoned off. The experience left him shaky.

"It is quite frightening," he said. "What scared me this time was that the cordons were near where I live. You expect big attacks in London, Manchester. But Amesbury? Salisbury? Wow. Really?"

Experts say just a few milligrams of the odorless Novichok liquid — the weight of a snowflake — is enough to kill a person within minutes. And finding it is the problem.



LADY LAKE Lady Lake store clerk charged with stealing \$4,200

A gas station attendant with a long criminal history was arrested this week for allegedly stealing about \$4,200 for the store's register over the course of eight days in June.

According to an arrest affidavit, the manager of Sunoco at 413 S. U.S. Highway 441 in Lady Lake reported that Steven Lee Peck, 36, had



been caught on closed circuit video stealing from the register between June 16 and June 24. Each time, Peck took between \$600 and \$1,150.

Peck, who lives in Lady Lake, was charged with grand theft and booked into the Lake County Jail. He has a criminal record in Lake County that goes back to 2009 and includes arrests for drug possession, battery and DUI.

PALM BEACH Florida man accused of raping child, recording incident

A man is accused of recording himself raping an 11-year-old then threatening to share the video with the child's mother, Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office records state.

Amilcar Morales-Aguilar, 34, was arrested Sunday on three counts of sexual assault on a minor. He is being held in the Palm Beach County jail without the possibility of posting bond.

The child was 11 years old when they met about three years ago at church, according to sheriff's records. It's unclear where the church is located.

After meeting, Morales-Aguilar persistently asked the child to come to his home, records state. It was not immediately clear where Morales-Aguilar lived at the time, though records indicate he most recently stayed in Lake Worth.

The child eventually agreed to go over. That's when he raped the 11-year-old and recorded it, sheriff's records state.

He texted the child the next week and said he would show the video to the child's mother unless the child returned to his home.

He raped the child repeatedly over the next two years, according to sheriff's office records.

Man runs over sunbathers

Driver, 78, reportedly suffered a medical issue on New Smyrna Beach

NEW SMYRNA BEACH — Noelle Kirby heard a rattle and crash while on the beach Thursday and turned around.

A 78-year-old Mount Dora man had apparently suffered a medical episode while

driving his car on the beach near Esther Street Park and ran over two people, who suffered non-life-threatening injuries, an official said.

Witnesses said it could have been much worse if not for the actions of a young passenger in the car and two quick-thinking beachgoers.

Kirby was less than 20 feet from the Chevrolet Monte Carlo when it wrecked a tent and ran over the two people.

The car was headed for her,

but someone in the passenger seat grabbed the wheel and the car swerved before it could hit her or her 2-year-old son.

"He had a completely blank stare," Kirby said of the driver. "Some kid in the passenger seat took the wheel and the car swerved back onto the main (driving lane). ... He saved a lot of people doing that."

Shortly after 1 p.m., the 78-year-old driver was heading south when he suffered a "medical episode," said Capt.

Andrew Etheridge, a spokesman for Volusia County Beach Safety Ocean Rescue.

The two sunbathers, a 44-year-old woman from Montreal and a 35-year-old man from Oviedo, were both "conscious and alert," after being run over, according to Beach Safety. The victims — who did not know each other — were taken to Halifax Health Medical Center

Little Groveland museum has no interest in display about the Groveland Four episode

GROVELAND — It has been written about in books, there is a major motion picture coming out about it and the Lake County Historical Museum is creating a display about it.

Yet the little community museum in Groveland has largely ignored the Groveland Four episode that continues to enrage people across the nation in hopes of letting the community put the darkest episode in the city's history behind it.

At the Groveland Historical Museum, which is operated by the Groveland Historical Society, there is no mention of the time in 1949 when four young Black men were accused without evidence of raping a white woman.

Howard King, a longtime

Groveland resident and a board member of the Groveland Historical Society, had a simple explanation.

"Enough people are talking about it that we don't have to," King said.

Last week, a 90-minute PBS documentary titled "The Groveland Four," highlighted the incident, when Norma Padgett, a 17-year-old Groveland farm girl, accused Walter Irvin,

Samuel Shepherd, Charles Greenlee and Ernest Thomas of raping her. Thomas fled Lake County the next day but was tracked down, shot and killed by a posse, including then-Sheriff Willis McCall. Both Shepherd and Irving were sentenced to death while Greenlee, a juvenile, was given a life sentence.

Deputy to be released from hospital

LADY LAKE — Sheriff's deputy Austin Pringle, who was struck by a car while investigating an auto burglary on the side of the road in Lady Lake Wednesday morning, is expected to come home from the hospital Friday, according to Lt. John Herrell.

Pringle was on his way home at the end of his shift at about 6:15 a.m. when he heard a call about a car burglary. He had stopped to talk to a man when they were both struck by the car.

Cerontae Hodge, 22, had a "serious" leg injuries and was taken to Leesburg Regional Medical Center. He told deputies Pringle tried to shove him out of the way.

Pringle was taken to Orlando Regional Medical Center with head injuries.

It seems unlikely that charges will be filed against the woman who accidentally struck the two who were standing in Gray's Airport Road early

Cops: man robbed vendor of fireworks

Clermont man took fireworks from tented stand before firing shots

CLERMONT — A Clermont man is accused of stealing fireworks from a tent on the Fourth of July and pulling a gun on at least two people who confronted him.

Jose Diaz Santisteban, 24, of 15928 Robins Hill Loop, is charged with armed robbery, grand theft, aggravated



assault with a firearm and tampering with or harassing a victim or witness, the Lake County Sheriff's Department reports.

Stand owner Rachel Albaugh told deputies that she and a stand employee confronted Santisteban behind the stand on High Grove Road about 10 p.m., where she saw he had \$600

worth of fireworks. When she told him to pay for them, reports said, he lifted his shirt, pulled a pistol from his waistband and pointed it in the air. Albaugh said she and her employee ran inside her tent, then heard a gunshot a few seconds later.

The suspect fled in a car with the fireworks and two other men, who later spoke with deputies but face no charges.

Another witness who identified herself as the manager of nearby Club 27,

215 U.S. 27, but whose name appears different on sheriff's reports, told deputies that Santisteban returned to the area and shot at her while she stood outside behind the club. She earlier had thought he was planning to steal from the club.

Deputies searched the area but did not locate the suspect. Several hours later, however, Santisteban was found in an undisclosed location, tased and arrested. He was being held Thursday at the Lake County Jail.

He walked around the corner to the Grove Center Plaza and went behind the shopping center where he soon found himself hemmed in by a chain-link fence.

"At that point, with the gun in his hand, he charged the deputies, yelling at them, and that's when they shot to defend themselves," Herrell said.

The five SWAT team members have been put on administrative leave pending a Florida Department of Law Enforcement investigation into the officer-involved shooting. It's standard procedure. Meanwhile, the Sheriff's Office has other SWAT teams that can respond in case of an

emergency, Herrell said.

Two weeks ago, a deputy was forced to shoot a home-invasion suspect in the leg in a shootout at a Bassville Park house, and three weeks ago, Eustis police shot and killed a suicidal man, Dillan Ezell, who was making threatening gestures with what they later learned was a BB gun.

"It's a sign of the times," Herrell said of the rising number of law enforcement-involved shootings. It is troubling and it is scary."

"That's why we tip our hats to them. They go out every day and put their lives on the line and do what they can to keep us safe," he said.

There have been 13 law-enforcement officer involved shootings in the Orlando area, not counting the three in Lake County, since May, according to the FDLE.

"They were definitely in the road and it was very dark," said Trooper Kim Montes.

Kim Johnson, 53, of Lady Lake, told troopers she saw the headlights but not the men. Because Pringle did not have his blue lights flashing, she did not even know it was a patrol car, Montes said.

She was headed north in a 2013 Chevy Camaro and the men were standing in the northbound lane at 6:09 a.m. The patrol car was facing south. Damage to the Camaro is consistent with a car traveling 35 to 40 mph. The speed limit at that location is 45,

Montes said.

The Sheriff's Office is still investigating the car burglary, Herrell said.

Wednesday's incident highlights the dangers that law enforcement officers face during traffic stops. The Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles documented 212 crashes involving motorists who failed to move over for emergency or service vehicles stopped on roadsides.

And on Thursday, a Lady Lake police officer experienced a close call just after midnight when he was stopped along the side of the road to help an injured dog and a passing motorist struck his patrol car.

The motorist, Iman Adonis Braddock, 31, was charged with driving under the influence with property damage and driving with a revoked license.

of the transformative work that is occurring," Pruitt wrote. "However, the unrelenting attacks on me personally, my family, are unprecedented and have taken a sizable toll on all of us."

Pruitt had appeared Wednesday at a White House picnic for Independence Day, wearing a red-checked shirt and loafers with gold trim. Trump gave him and other officials a brief shout-out, offering no sign of any immediate change in his job.

Trump said in a tweet that Deputy Administrator Andrew Wheeler, a former coal industry executive, will assume the acting administrator position Monday.

Pruitt's resignation came days after two of his former senior staffers spoke to House oversight committee investigators and revealed new, embarrassing details in ethics allegations against Pruitt.

Samantha Dravis, Pruitt's former policy chief at EPA, told the investigators last week that Pruitt had made clear to her before and after he became EPA administrator that he would like the attorney general's job, held then and now by Jeff Sessions.

Pruitt "had hinted at that (sic) some sort of conversation had taken place between he and the president," Dravis told congressional investigators, according to a transcript obtained Thursday by The Associated Press. "That was the position he was originally interested in."

A former Oklahoma attorney general close to the oil and gas industry, Pruitt had filed more than a dozen lawsuits against the agency he was picked to lead. Arriving in Washington, he worked relentlessly to dismantle Obama-era environmental regulations that aimed to reduce toxic pollution and planet-warming carbon emissions.

During his one-year tenure, Pruitt crisscrossed the country at taxpayer expense to speak with industry groups and hobnob with GOP donors, but he showed little interest in listening to advocates he derided as "the environmental left." Those groups applauded his departure.

"Despite his brief tenure, Pruitt was the worst EPA chief in history," said Kieran Suckling, executive director of the Center for Biological Diversity. "His corruption was his downfall, but his pro-polluter policies will have our kids breathing dirtier air long after his many scandals are forgotten."

Summer twisters and water spouts are pretty typical in Florida, said Jessie Smith, a meteorologist in the Weather Service's Melbourne office.

The problem is that they flair up fast and fly under the radar - literally.

The biggest weather radars can see what's going on up to 7,000 feet, but distance is a factor, too. Because of the curvature of the earth, a water-hugging tornado like the one that tormented Tavares won't even show up on a radar far away, maybe not even on the ones used by Orlando TV stations, she said.

"There was no watch or warning on this one," said Tom Carpenter, director of the EOC. "It just popped up from a thunderstorm."

Wednesday's twister damaged the roof of the restaurant, especially the skylight, which popped off, sending ceiling tiles crashing to the floor.

Exhaust turbines were blown away and a heavy exhaust fan was dumped on U.S. Highway 441.

Behind the Winn-Dixie down the road, a shed exploded, spewing contents and pieces of aluminum everywhere. The roof also seemed to have sustained damage.

The Weather Service sends experts to damage sites for big storms, but in this case, the Lake County Emergency Operations Center checked it out. The big clincher, however, were the videos on news websites and those from individuals. "It was obvious it was a tornado," Smith said.

It's important to note the difference, she said, because micro-bursts with their severe down blasts are often mistaken for twisters.

There was no doubt about the kind of storm that that roared through mobile home parks in Lady Lake and Lack Mack on Ground Hog Day 2007, killing 20 and crushing and flipping houses like sardine cans.

"You can't even compare the two storms," Smith said.

With customary fanfare, Trump plans to announce his selection Monday night. But as he builds suspense for his second court pick in two years - a nominee who could tip the balance toward conservatives and revisit landmark rulings on abortion access, gay marriage and other

issues - momentum is also growing among GOP supporters and detractors of the top contenders.

Conservatives and some libertarian-leaning Republicans, including Sen. Rand Paul of Kentucky, have raised concerns about Kavanaugh, warning he could disappoint Republicans if his past decisions are a guide.

To counter that, Kavanaugh's allies have begun pushing back, reaching out to influential

Republicans to ward off potential criticisms, according to one conservative who was the recipient of such outreach and spoke on condition of anonymity Thursday to discuss the situation.

With the Senate narrowly divided, 51-49, in favor of Republicans, Trump's announcement will launch a contentious confirmation process as Republicans seek to shift the court to the right and Democrats strive to block the effort.

In November 1951, NAACP Special Counsel Thurgood Marshall had the death penalty verdicts overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court. While transporting Shepherd and Irving from Raiford State Prison back to the Lake County Jail, McCall claimed he was jumped by the handcuffed pair, so he shot them three times each. Shepherd died instantly, and Irvin said he survived by playing dead.

Irvin was eventually found guilty, had his sentence commuted to life in prison and was paroled in 1968. Greenlee was paroled eight years earlier.

Descendants of the both families also live in the area and there have been at least two books written about the incident - one by Gary Corsair and one by Gilbert King -- and a movie, based on King's Pulitzer Prize winning "Devil in the Grove: Thurgood Marshall, the Groveland Boys, and the Dawn of a New America," is due out soon

The museum board and Historical Society's stance is that because there are so many conflicting stories about what happened and there is no one to prove or disprove any of it, so it's best not to promote the story at all.

Groveland Historical Society President Marie Padgett - who is not related to Norma Padgett - said when people come into the Groveland museum asking about the Groveland Four, they are referred to online sources for information or to the city library for the books that have been published on the subject.

"We agreed since the first Groveland Four book was being published, and we could not offer any additional documentation or expertise, we did not wish to risk backlash from the community with a "best guess" exhibit," Howard King wrote in an email. "Anyone who is asked about the events will give a different description. Few people alive today were there, and even their descriptions vary, if they offer one. In today's times, I would not believe ANYONE who was not old enough at the time to comprehend the mood of the community with respect to the sequence of events..."

Bob Grenier, the curator of the Lake County Historical Museum, run by the Lake County Historical Society, said the responsibility of a museum and the job of its

curator, is to simply share the known and "complete" history of the area.

"My job as a curator is to tell the County's complete story, which means the beautiful stories and the tragic ones as well," Grenier said.

Grenier said that although none of the initial incidents surrounding the Groveland Four took place in Tavares, the story is part of Lake County's history as much as Groveland's.

He said though every detail may not be known, it is known that the incident took place.

Grenier is planning a Groveland Four exhibit in the Lake County Historical Museum.

He also said that because the museum is located in the old Lake County Courthouse where McCall once roamed the halls and where trials took place, a display there would be meaningful.

"Especially now, we should be ready for those people who have seen the documentary or the movie when it comes out. That's our job. That's the job of

any museum," Grenier said. "What happened at the time is nobody's fault today. People can look at the information and take away what they want from it. It's just a piece of our history."

Tim Loucks, a former Groveland mayor who helped push to exonerate the Groveland Four, believes there should be a Groveland Four display at the Groveland museum.

In 2016, the city issued a resolution apologizing to the families. The Lake County Commission and the Florida Legislature followed suit.

"The alleged crime did not happen in Groveland, but the arrest did and the command post was located here. Ignoring it is not going to make it go away," Loucks said. "I don't think we have the right to be selective on which history we choose to recognize or tell and which history we choose not to, even if don't like elements of it."

Howard King said the community is embarrassed by what happened

but creating an exhibit at the museum wouldn't help people "put it behind them."

"When all that happened, Groveland was a little Southern town with families that had learned to live in peace 'together but separate' and what happened was really out of their control," he said. "The town was segregated but it was not violent."

Groveland Councilman Mike Radzik is sensitive to the stigma created by the event and hopes to create a "Unity Day" to bring people together.

Groveland City Manager Mike Hein said there have been discussions about commemorating the Groveland Four.

"Apologies have been issued by the city, but sometimes people need something more durable," Hein said.

"We are the fastest growing city in Lake County and one of the most diverse," he said. "We enjoy that and because of that, we have to have inclusive conversations."

Bracing for impact

Bluster aside, US and China vulnerable to pain from tariffs

WASHINGTON — The U.S. and Chinese governments have been flashing a lot of bravado just before firing the first shots in a conflict that risks erupting into a mutually damaging trade war.

“China will not bow in the face of threats and blackmail, nor will it be shaken in its resolve to defend global free trade,” a spokesman for Beijing’s Commerce Ministry declared Thursday, one day before the two sides were to subject billions of

dollars of each other’s goods to punishing tariffs.

President Donald Trump, who ran for the White House on a vow to force China and other nations to reform their policies, has insisted that a trade war would be easy to win.

Yet among the people and business in both countries that are suddenly under threat from higher costs, closed-off markets and deep uncertainties, there’s far less confidence. A trade war between the world’s two biggest economies will leave casualties — from makers of musical instruments to farmers in America’s Midwest to a manufacturer of soldering irons south of Shanghai.

In some areas and

industries, pain is already being felt.

“There’s going to be an awful lot of battles lost on the way,” said Tim Velde, a fourth-generation farmer in western Minnesota’s Yellow Medicine County who is bracing for China’s tariffs on American soybeans. “I don’t see anybody winning.”

Tong Feibing, general manager of China’s Ningbo Top East Technology Co., which makes soldering irons and had been exporting 30 percent of its output to the United States — before sales plunged in advance of tariffs — is worried.

“There is a chance the company will lose money and might bankrupt,” Tong warned. “I will do whatever I can, including layoffs.”

At 12:01 a.m. Eastern time Friday, the United States was set to slap tariffs on \$34 billion in Chinese products. And Beijing was ready to respond in kind. From there, the hostilities could escalate quickly and drastically. Trump has threatened to slap tariffs on up to \$450 billion in Chinese imports — nearly 90 percent of all goods China sent the U.S. last year — if Beijing continues to retaliate and doesn’t yield to Trump’s demands.

The Trump administration wants China to drop what it calls its predatory drive to supplant American technological dominance, through tactics that include forcing U.S. companies to reveal trade secrets in return for access to the Chinese market and committing cyber-theft.

Kudos to two lawmakers who heard the public on 'do not call'

Each year Florida's Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services releases Florida residents' top gripes about business' bad behavior. And typically leading the list — by a long shot, with nearly half of overall complaints in 2016 and 2017, for example — are the telemarketers and robocallers who violate the state's "Do Not Call" law. It's also a major problem for Floridians on a national scale. The Federal Trade Commission, which regulates the national Do Not Call List, reported that in 2017 Florida residents filed 588,000 of the 3.5 million complaints it received for unwanted telephonic solicitation.

But as of last Sunday, Florida residents got some much-needed help in this regard — thanks to lawmakers from neighboring Polk County's delegation: state Sen. Denise Grimsley, a Sebring Republican who represents the southern half of Polk County, and state Rep. Sam Killebrew, R-Winter Haven.

The pair sponsored a new state law, which took effect Sunday, that empowers telephone companies to proactively block calls from numbers of suspected robocallers or "spoof" callers, or those who utilize a fake number to disguise the real number from which they are calling.

In a recent meeting with The Ledger's editorial board, Grimsley told us her advocacy was based on personal experience. She had to deal with "Elizabeth," an aggressive and annoying prerecorded telemarketer who made repeated calls to Grimsley in an effort to sell her a vacation package.

Federal and state laws already prohibit much of this activity. For instance, consumers who enroll on the federal or state do-not-call lists are supposed to be shielded from such calls, except under certain circumstances, which can include having a prior relationship with the company or if the call comes from a charity, pollster, or political campaign.

Yet, as a House staff analysis of the new law noted, "Many robocalls and spoofed calls are made without regard to the laws in place to prevent them." One reason is that these callers, many of which are scammers or identity thieves, utilize new technology to circumvent the lists.

Grimsley shared with us that another key reason for that is the phone companies themselves weren't permitted to block such calls, except when people were members of the do-not-call registry.

This new law changes that, and should help reduce such activity, she added.

What's noteworthy about this new law is that it builds on the work of the industry.


According to the House analysis, the Federal Communications Commission in 2016 urged the telecommunications industry to help address this problem, and from that emerged the Robocall Strike Force. One task force recommendation entailed the creation of a "Do Not Originate" list, a compilation of phone numbers known to be illegitimate. Last November the FCC adopted the recommendation, which also helped form the basis of Florida's new law.

Under the new statute, telecom providers can now block calls if the customer requests so after recognizing a number is for inboundcalls only, if the number is not a valid phone number (such as consisting of just one repeated digit), or if the number has not been allocated to a provider or has been allocated but has not been used or assigned to a customer.

As the government acknowledges, no law is perfect. So it's possible the scammers and the irritating "Elizabeths" will still find a way through this electronic wall. But we appreciate the work of Grimsley, Killebrew and the rest of the Legislature to help reduce consumers' frustration level and protect them from the fraudsters.

Shady election politics

The write-in scam reared its ugly head again when Kimberly Semento, a Republican, filed as a write-in the District 2 Commissioners Republican primary race between Sean Parks and Tad Schnauer. By filing, without paying any money or collecting petitions, Kimberly disenfranchised 128,265 voters in Lake County for this race.

The legal but ethically challenged act by Kimberly disenfranchised all the registered Democrats, Independents, NPA's and other party voters in Lake County. It is all based on an advisory opinion issued in 2000 by Katherine Harris, that a write in meets the Florida Constitutions requirement of opposition in the General Election. Article VI, Section 5(b). That provision

states: If all candidates for an office have the same party affiliation and the winner will have no opposition in the general election, all qualified electors, regardless of party affiliation, may vote in the primary elections for that office.

The advisory opinion by Katherine Harris has been challenged only once in the courts in 2006. I was the plaintiff in Marvin Jacobson v. Hubert Dale Martin III in a hearing held in Lake county. Needles to say, I did not win.

The write-in's name does not appear on the ballot, but as a registered write in, all votes received are counted. In many elections the write-in has not received a single vote, rarely having double digit votes.

In some counties we have professional write-in candidates who have been in many different races for a fee to help one candidate. In this latest scam in Lake county, I will leave it to the voters to decide which candidate hired the write in.

It is a sad reflection on the Florida Legislature and governor and gives meaning to the "duh" into Flori"duh."

Thanks.


Of course, Rob — who cringed at compliments but offered them frequently — turned it around to thank me.



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Muguruza, finalist Cilic out

LONDON — Garbine Muguruza insisted she wasn't thinking about attempting to collect a second consecutive Wimbledon championship. She was adamant that she was not focusing on defending her title.

"It doesn't really matter," she would say, "what happened in 2017."

Well, it seems safe to say she'll really want to forget what happened at the All England Club in 2018. Muguruza

was stunned in the second round 5-7, 6-2, 6-1 by 47th-ranked Alison Van Uytvanck of Belgium on Thursday, the latest upset in a series of them at the grass-court major tournament.

"It's a little bit sad," Muguruza said. "But today didn't go my way."

That's become a familiar refrain for prominent women at this topsy-turvy Wimbledon.

Only two of the top eight seeded women are still in the field after four days of action.

Van Uytvanck, meanwhile,

began this week with a 1-4 record at Wimbledon and only one Grand Slam quarter-final appearance to her name. Muguruza, meanwhile, owns two major titles, including the 2016 French Open, and was the runner-up at the All England Club in 2015.

But that didn't matter on this day.

Van Uytvanck was aggressive from the baseline, compiling a 29-18 advantage in winners, and broke in seven of Muguruza's 13 service

NASCAR's 'Young Stars' tired of blame for sport's woes

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — It was the finish NASCAR banked on as the genesis of its ballyhooed youth movement.

Austin Dillon and Darrell Wallace Jr. finished 1-2 in the Daytona 500, a promising pair of 20-somethings

behind the wheel of iconic car numbers that could excite old-school fans, yet a pair with enough social media savvy that might attract millennials to a sport in dire need of a spark.

The kids were coming! Wallace and good buddy Ryan Blaney, Chase Elliott, William Byron and Daniel Suarez were among the relative newcomers in NASCAR who had their images plastered on billboards and program covers and hailed

as NASCAR's version of The Next Big Thing.

Yet, at NASCAR's halfway point, the series returns this weekend to Daytona International Speedway with the so-called Young Guns in danger of becoming The Next Big Bust.

They're not winning races — or even fans inside their sport.

International Speedway Corp. President John Saunders pinned some of NASCAR's woes on the

failure of the new crop of drivers that have failed to replace retired stars Dale Earnhardt Jr., Tony Stewart, Jeff Gordon, Carl Edwards and even Danica Patrick in performance or popularity.

"We still have an issue with star power, and hopefully this stable of young drivers coming along will start to win and build their brands," Saunders said Thursday.

First faceoff features foes

MOSCOW — What to watch for in Friday's matchups at the World Cup quarterfinals:

Teammates vs. Teammates

The first match features a number of teammates on their professional clubs facing off against each other when France takes on Uruguay in Nizhny Novgorod. France forward Antoine Griezmann plays at Atletico Madrid alongside Uruguayan defenders Diego Godin and Jose Maria Gimenez; Godin is godfather to Griezmann's daughter.

Those ties are so thick that Uruguay striker Luis Suarez needed Griezmann this week for trying to be Uruguayan. Suarez himself will find a Barcelona teammate on the other side of the pitch in French defender Samuel Umtiti.

With so much talent on both sides, the late game in Kazan features even more intrasquad intrigue: Manchester City's Gabriel Jesus, Fernandinho and Danilo against teammates Vincent Kompany and Kevin De Bruyne of Belgium; Brazil's Willian against Chelsea teammates Eden Hazard, Michy Batshuayi and Thibaut Courtois, all Belgian; and Belgium's Thomas Meunier against his Brazilian teammates at Paris Saint-Germain — Marquinhos, Thiago Silva and Neymar.

Speed and skill vs. Solid D

Belgium is scoring almost a goal a game more than any other team in the tournament, with 12 in four matches. Brazil, to the surprise of some, has allowed just one goal in its four games. Only one other team has been that stingy: Uruguay, which will face a France attack loaded with speed and scorers. In both cases, something will have to give.

Neymar being Neymar

The most expensive player in the world has had a strong tournament so far and is the biggest star whose team is still alive. Some think Neymar could even win his first FIFA player of the year award if Brazil wins it all.

But he's increasingly catching grief about his flopping, diving and writhing around after minor contact. Will that prompt the referee to give the Belgian defenders more leeway, or will Neymar keep getting the calls?

Webb Simpson's 61 leads PGA event in WV

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W.Va. — Webb Simpson ran out of sensational shots in the end to keep him from joining an elite group.

Simpson shot a 9-under-par 61 for a one-stroke lead over Whee Kim after the first round of A Military Tribute at The Greenbrier in West Virginia on Thursday.

Simpson posted his best career score after shaking off a two-hour weather delay with six holes left in his round. He came up short in his bid to shoot the eighth sub-60 round on the PGA Tour. Needing birdies on the par-5 17th and the par-3 18th for a 59, he parred both.

"I knew a 59 was in there, but it's all right," Simpson said. "Great start. Scores were good though, so you've got to keep the pedal down."

Kim had back-to-back bogeys on the front nine on the Old White TPC, and then ran off five birdies over a seven-hole stretch. The South Korean had 10 birdies overall and shot 62. Teenager Joaquin Niemann of Chile was another stroke back at 7-under 63.

Kelly Kraft shot 64 while Jason Kokrak, Keegan Bradley and J.J. Henry were at 65.

Playing in the afternoon, Simpson had three consecutive birdies around the turn, then chipped in for eagle on the par-5 12th to move to 7 under. A few minutes later,

the horn sounded stopping play just as he was hitting his tee shot on the par-4 13th. The shot landed on a hillside.

"Momentum is a funny thing, but I should feel good when I got back out there," Simpson said during the delay.

After play resumed, Simpson's pitch from the hill went across the 13th fairway into tall fescue. His approach shot landed 3 feet from the pin and he escaped with par. He added birdies on the par-4 14th and 16th holes.

Simpson, whose four-shot victory at The Players Championship in May was his first win in more than four years, has seen his share of chances in West Virginia before. He finished third in

2014 and lost a one-stroke lead on the back nine in the final round in 2011 and 2012.

He's got several youngsters chasing him.

The 26-year-old Kim has never won on the PGA Tour, losing in a three-way playoff in Las Vegas in November.

The 19-year-old Niemann had his lowest score in nine PGA Tour starts this season. Niemann played in this tournament a year ago as an amateur, shot 64 in the final round and tied for 29th place.

"I'm one of the youngest out here so I feel like I've got nothing to lose," Niemann said. "My game was feeling really good and my putter was good. So all my game was good today."

Georgia quarterback Jake Fromm has a broken bone in his left hand but isn't expected to miss any summer workouts. School athletics spokesman Leland Barrow said Thursday that Fromm has a "small fracture" in his non-throwing hand, though he is already throwing the football. Barrow didn't have details on how Fromm was injured, while coach Kirby Smart told ESPN on Wednesday that the injury happened earlier this week. Fromm won the starting job as a freshman last season and led the Bulldogs to the Southeastern Conference championship before losing in overtime to Alabama for the national championship.

MONTREAL Habs defenseman Weber out after surgery

Montreal Canadiens defenseman Shea Weber will be out for an extended period after

undergoing arthroscopic knee surgery to repair a torn meniscus in his right knee.

The Canadiens said Thursday that Weber's recovery time is expected to be five to six months, meaning he won't be suiting up until December at the earliest.

It's the second surgery this year for Weber, who had a torn tendon in his left foot repaired in March.

Team surgeon Dr. David Mulder said the damage to Weber's knee was discovered last month as part of his rehabilitation from foot surgery.

The 32-year-old Weber said earlier this year that his foot injury occurred in Montreal's season opener against the Buffalo Sabres.

He continued to play with the torn tendon until a Dec. 16 game in Ottawa, when he realized the situation wasn't improving.

Weber had six goals and 10 assists in 26 games despite the injury.

England's Stones: Colombia 'dirtiest team' he's faced

REPINO, Russia — England defender John Stones described Colombia as the “dirtiest team I’ve ever come up against” and said his team’s ability to rise above the provocation is a sign of its growing maturity at the World Cup.

England won a penalty shoot-out Tuesday after a feisty, physical round-of-16 game finished 1-1 following extra time and with eight yellow cards handed out by the referee — tying for the most issued in any game in the tournament. Colombia’s players received six of them.

“I’ve never seen a game like this before and how they behaved,” said Stones, who has played five years in the Premier League and four years for England. “There were things that we’ve never experienced before.”

Among them, said Stones, was Colombia’s players surrounding and pushing the referee, head-butting Jordan Henderson and scuffling the penalty spot before Harry Kane’s second-half spot kick. Stones also highlighted a member of Colombia’s technical staff barging into Raheem Sterling as the players came off for halftime.

“It’s obviously their image and how they’ve represented their country,” Stones said Thursday. “We stuck to our game plan and never got involved in the brawl that they wanted. At the end of the day, they are on the plane back home.”

England’s players weren’t completely innocent, however, with Henderson getting booked and appearing to use his head to barge into an opponent.

Argentina great Diego Maradona criticized American referee Mark Geiger and said the outcome of the game was a “monumental theft,” comments he apologized for

Thursday after FIFA rebuked him.

England’s national team has often been accused of not being streetwise enough in major tournaments but it passed this test against Colombia, with players killing time at free kicks, for example.

“We kept playing our own football and that’s a great sign for a team to have,” Stones said, “to make sure we have that quality of tunnel vision to get out of the game. It was a difficult situation to be in and we can look back on it and be very proud of it.”

A grueling game has taken its toll on England, with striker Jamie Vardy missing training

on Thursday because of a groin injury and battling to be fit for the quarterfinal match against Sweden in Samara on Saturday. Expectation levels were generally considered to be low among England fans coming into the tournament but they are rising now, particularly since the team is in the half of the draw with the supposedly weaker teams.

Beat Sweden, and England has a game against Croatia or host nation Russia to reach a first World Cup final since 1966.

Stones isn’t looking too far

ahead, though, not with England having won only two of its last 15 meetings with the Swedes.

“I think if you say it’s an easy game in a quarterfinal of a World Cup, then you are pretty stupid to say that,” the Manchester City defender said. “They play very structured from the back, sit quite deep from what we’ve seen and we know what we’re up against.”

“Sometimes they can throw you these teams, they can go kind of under the radar, but there is no question they are a good team.”

games. Still, it was not easy finishing off the most significant victory of her career.

“Inside,” the 24-year-old Belgian said, “I was, like, dying.”

The No. 3-seeded Muguruza joined No. 2 Caroline Wozniacki, No. 4 Sloane Stephens, No. 5 Elina Svitolina, No. 6 Caroline Garcia and No. 8 Petra Kvitova on the way out so far, along with five-time major champion Maria Sharapova. Those departures leave No. 1 Simona Halep, the French Open champion who won in straight sets Thursday, and No. 7 Karolina Pliskova in the field, along with seven-time Wimbledon champion Serena Williams, who is seeded 25th, and five-time champ Venus Williams, who is No. 9.

“I mean, anyone, on a good day, can beat anyone,” Van Uytvanck said. “That’s what I think. I still think the top players, their average level is higher than, let’s say, sub-top players. But anyone on a good day can beat anyone, for sure.”

Sure seems that way, particularly this week.

Among the men, too.

Resumes and past performances do not matter. At all.

Marin Cilic, for example, entered his second-round

match with all sorts of advantages in experience and success over his opponent, including a runner-up finish at the All England Club a year ago and a U.S. Open title in 2014.

So when Cilic took a two-sets-to-none lead against a guy who began the week with records of 0-2 at Wimbledon and 6-15 at all majors, it appeared the No. 3 seed was on his way to a straightforward victory and a step closer to a potential semifinal rematch against defending champion Roger Federer.

Hold that thought. The outcome that seemed obvious vanished, and Cilic is gone, giving away a big edge in a 3-6, 1-6, 6-4, 7-6 (3), 7-5 loss to 82nd-ranked Guido Pella of Argentina in a match completed Thursday after being suspended midway through the third set because of rain the evening before.

“A big surprise,” Pella said. Cilic called it a “big disappointment.”

“Just didn’t feel so good. I was not as accurate as yesterday,” he said. “I was just missing some balls, giving him chance to keep playing.”

His exit means the highest-seeded man No. 1 Federer possibly could face before the final as he bids for a record-extending ninth Wimbledon title would be No. 8 Kevin Anderson or No. 9 John Isner. They’re two of the tour’s biggest servers, and both won contests carried over from Wednesday.

ISC owns tracks in California, Kansas, Virginia, Arizona and Alabama and reported a 10 percent dip in attendance this season for the six races held on its properties from March through May.

Weather and travel; ticket prices and event oversaturation; and long, boring races — all kinds of critical issues and mundane nuisances — have been blamed for NASCAR’s tumble.

Now it’s Saunders’ turn to gripe about the dearth of stars, and the drivers have had enough of serving as NASCAR’s whipping boys.

“Honestly, this whole ‘young guys need to win now’ thing is getting old,” the 24-year-old Blaney said. “We’re trying. We’re trying our hardest. It’s not like I go out there and I’m happy for fifth every single week.”

“Any other guy under the age of 25, I’ll just say is the same way. It’s not a competition here between young guys and old guys. It’s a competition between 39 other cars and yourself. No matter what your age is or your experience level, everyone is trying to accomplish the same goal.”

Wallace threw the criticism back at Saunders, saying outdated tracks that fail to keep pace with modern-day

amenities are just as much at fault for driving away fans.

“It kind of goes hand-in-hand from us behind the wheel to people that are here hosting us,” Wallace said.

Wallace, whose second-place finish in the Daytona 500 was the best ever by a black driver in the event, is a social media darling with more than 176,000 Twitter followers, posting behind-the-scenes videos and starring in a documentary series that aired on Facebook Watch. The 24-year-old Richard Petty Racing driver even takes on his critics and serves as his own one-man publicity machine for NASCAR fans.

But it’s checkered flags and championships that will define drivers, not likes and retweets. “I might not post stupid videos every week or stuff like that to try and gain fans,” Kyle Larson said, taking a subtle shot at Wallace. “I try to gain fans on the race track.”

Larson, 25, nearly broke his season-long winless streak last week when he lost a last-lap dual with Kyle Busch at Chicagoland. Busch won his fifth race of the season and rubbed his hand in his eye to mimic a crying child for all the fans whining that the 2015 Cup champion won another race.

NASCAR has a three-driver chase toward the championship through the first 18 races:

- Busch, 33, five wins.
- Kevin Harvick, 42, five wins.
- Martin Truex Jr., 38, three

wins.

Dillon and 28-year-old Joey Logano, an 11-year veteran and former Daytona 500 champ, are the only drivers in their 20s who have won this season. Just six drivers have won races, and NASCAR’s 16-driver playoff field could have more contenders making it on points than victories.

“I think it would be healthy for the sport if we just see more variation in winners,” Blaney said. “There have been six winners this year. Come on now. You can’t just put that on the young guys for not winning. That’s a lot of other people that aren’t winning, too.”

Seven-time champion Jimmie Johnson is winless. So is former Daytona 500 champion Denny Hamlin and 2012 series champ Brad Keselowski.

But those greats all have resumes that can stamp them as future Hall of Famers.

Fair or not, NASCAR and its tracks threw their promotional weight this season behind up-and-comers instead of perennial contenders and have paid the price for the slight: FOX and FS1 averaged 2.54 million viewers for Cup Series races this season, down 23 percent from 2017.

The youth movement needs to start, well, moving. “I just want to know what we do about it, do you know what I mean,” Dillon asked. “How do you move forward with that? Because the guys that are in the sport are talented enough to win.”



1933: The first major league All-Star game was played at Comiskey Park in Chicago. The AL, managed by Connie Mack, defeated the NL, managed by John McGraw, 4-2 on Babe Ruth's two-run homer.
1966: Boog Powell of the Baltimore Orioles knocked in 11 runs in a doubleheader against the Kansas City A's to tie an AL record. In the first game, Powell hit two home runs, including a grand slam, two doubles and a sacrifice fly to drive in seven runs as the Orioles won 11-0. Powell had four RBIs in the nightcap.
1983: On the 50th anniversary of the All-Star game, Fred Lynn's grand slam off Atlee Hammaker, the first in All-Star competition, capped a record seven-run third inning. The AL also set a one-game record for runs scored in a 13-3 victory that ended an 11-game NL winning streak. Chicago's Comiskey Park was the site, as it was for the first All-Star game in 1933.
1986: Atlanta's Bob Horner became the 11th player in major league history to hit four home runs in a game and it still wasn't enough to win the game. The Montreal Expos pounded the Braves' pitching staff for an 11-8 victory.
2009: Chase Utley hit a three-run homer and Shane Victorino and Greg Dobbs each had two-run shots during a 10-run first inning, helping the Philadelphia Phillies rout the Cincinnati Reds 22-1.

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

Overheating engine is a mystery

Q: I loaned my car to my brother for a few days and when he returned it he told me it was overheating and I should get it fixed right away. I hadn't noticed anything like this previously. What could be causing this?
— Angie T.

A: This will be difficult without more details. I'm curious what your brother observed to lead him to say this and what actions he took to protect the car from damage. Normal engine operating temperature for most cars and trucks is about 195 degrees, with occasional increases to perhaps 230 degrees. Perhaps he observed a higher than normal reading? Anything over 240 would get my heart beating faster! If there's a red coolant light that's illuminating, this is a really big deal as the threshold for lighting is likely 250 degrees, seriously hot. Also, if the car is spewing coolant on the ground, emitting steam, or making gurgling sounds from under the hood, it's screaming "fix me right now!"

Here come the questions: When does the higher than normal temperature occur, at low speeds, or at higher speeds? Is the car a front-wheel drive vehicle with a transverse (side-ways) engine? If so it would use an electric cooling fan to draw air through the radiator as conditions warrant (fluctuations in temperature between 195 and 230 degrees are normal when it is stopped or operating at speed as the fan cycles on and off). If you have an older car or pickup truck with a longitudinal engine, it would likely have a mechanical fan driven by the engine (you won't see temperature swings at idle as the fan runs all the time). If higher than normal engine temperatures are encountered mostly at low speeds in an electric fan vehicle, an inoperative fan is a likely cause. If overheating occurs mostly at high engine load with a mechanical fan, the fan clutch may be faulty. Overheating at all or higher speeds (both fan types) can have many causes: low coolant level, faulty water pump impeller, sticky thermostat, collapsing radiator hose, missing/damaged air diverter, among others.

Checking the coolant level would be an important and simple first step to begin assessment of this condition. Be sure to only do this with the engine cool, as hot and pressurized coolant can cause serious burns when a radiator cap is removed or a hose bursts. Some vehicles use an overflow tank (thin plastic with loose fitting cap) and the radiator cap is on the radiator, while others use a thick-walled expansion tank with a pressure relief cap on top. Checking fluid level in only an overflow tank is not sufficient as the radiator could still be low (it's OK with an expansion tank). If the coolant level is found to be low and there are no signs of rapid leakage it's OK to add water temporarily and seek nearby professional services right away. If there's rapid leakage, a tow is best.

Overheating an engine can cause serious damage and is to be avoided at all costs. Please make every effort to get this to a shop as soon as possible for a complete diagnosis. With luck, perhaps the fault could be as simple as a leaky hose or loose hose fitting.

A welcome wardrobe update

The 2018 Buick LaCrosse Avenir is a lively, athletic premium sedan

GREENWICH, Conn. — Behind the perfectly trimmed hedges and expertly manicured lawns of many gated neighborhoods, the 2018 Buick LaCrosse resides in the driveways, garages and the hearts of active adults. After all, not everybody wants to drive a car that looks as if it's leapt out of a gaming video and rides with all of the forgiveness of an oxcart. It doesn't matter if it's fastest around the Nurburgring. It has to be fast enough for the daily commute while comfortably ensconcing me in a plush cabin with the latest in high tech. And it has to look good.

So it's no surprise that when the redesigned 2017 Buick LaCrosse debuted, its sculpted lines flowed with a sporting, dynamic grace. Inside, supple shapes with wood and metallic trim framed the center-mounted infotainment screen. A huge sunroof brightens up the cabin. It's contemporary, not classic.

This is enhanced for with the 2018 LaCrosse's new Avenir trim, first introduced on the 2018 Enclave in October. Think of it as Buick's answer to GMC's Denali or, in a new version of Buick's Ultra badge. To distinguish this new trim level, the 2018 LaCrosse Avenir is adorned with a unique cross-mesh grille with chrome accents,

Avenir-badged doorsills, and exclusive 19-inch or optional 20-inch Midnight Silver wheels distinguish this car's appearance. Inside, you'll find Avenir embroidered on the headrests, and a handsome new Chestnut-colored interior.

This new top trim level adorns Buick's largest sedan, one that competes against the Kia Cadenza, Toyota Avalon, Nissan Maxima and the Chrysler 300. The front-wheel-drive LaCrosse is offered in Base, Preferred, Essence, Premium and Avenir trims. All-wheel drive is available on the top three trim levels. All Avenirs are powered by a double-overhead cam 310-horsepower V-6 and

a nine-speed automatic transmission. A mild hybrid system that GM calls, "eAssist" pairs an electric motor and 24-cell lithium-ion battery pack with a 2.5-liter four-cylinder gas engine and a six-speed automatic transmission that produces 194 horsepower. It's offered on all trim levels except the Avenir, which comes solely with the V6. While eAssist does boost fuel economy by 4 mpg — no small thing — it trails the Toyota Avalon Hybrid.

Given that, it makes it the 2018 LaCrosse Avenir the best way to spend your Buick bucks, delivering a boatload of premium features.

If high-tech driver-assistance features are important,

Honda dominates most American-made vehicles list of 2018

The most American-made cars may not be made by the most American car brands. Four out of the top 10 most American-made vehicles of 2018 are made by Japanese brand Honda, according to the annual report from Cars.com.

"It's part of the globalization of automotive manufacturing," Cars.com Executive Editor Joe Wiesenfelder said in a phone interview. "The brand on the vehicle isn't the only part of the equation of what makes it American."

The Honda Odyssey, for instance, is built in Lincoln,

What does the econ mode actually do?

Obviously, economy modes are intended to save gas. But how do they do it? We break it down. Eco, Econ, or economy modes have become common in modern vehicles. These driving modes are intended to save you fuel, but how do they actually work, and how much can they save you? The first question is one we can answer, but the second, how much you'll save, is a bit trickier.

1. POWER REDUCTION: Enable the economy mode in your vehicle and the first thing you will notice is that the power pedal changes. We'd call that the "gas pedal", or "throttle" but electric cars have economy modes too, use no gas, and have no throttle. The pedal can change in its feel, or how it makes the vehicle respond.

2. HVAC CONTROL CHANGES: The second most important way that economy modes alter your vehicle's settings to save energy is by taking control of your heat and air conditioning. Running an AC compressor and the fans in your car consumes a lot of energy. Economy modes do a variety of things to cut back on that consumption, while still keeping the driver comfortable.

3. CRUISE CONTROL CHANGES: Modern cruise control systems do much more than just try to keep a car on or above a certain set speed. They can follow a car in front of you and speed up and slow down and they can also slow your car when you are on a steep decline.

Test Drive: 2018 Volkswagen Atlas SE 4Motion

There's a brand-new SUV in town called Volkswagen Atlas, and it's sure one of the roomiest midsize SUV's we've ever tested. With three rows of standard seating allowing up to seven passengers, the all-new 2018 Volkswagen Atlas replaces the five-passenger Toureg and looks to be a stern competitor in this popular class. Currently, Atlas sits alongside smaller compact crossover Tiguan at VW dealerships, the latter which receives a major makeover for 2018. (We're hoping to drive one soon).

Atlas starts with the entry S for \$30,375, then moves up through another 11 models to reach the summit SEL Premium, which retails for \$48,740 fully loaded. Both Turbo4 and V6 engines are available until you get to the top rung SEL Premium, which comes with the V6 engine as standard fare.

Recommended is the V6 over the Turbocharged 4-cylinder for obvious power benefits and towing advantages. Expressly, the 3.6-liter V6 develops 276 horses and 266 lb. ft. of torque versus the small 2.0-liter inline turbo four-cylinder that delivers 235 horses and 258 lb. ft. of torque.

When you have your Atlas loaded up with passengers and cargo is filled to the brim

(for a trip to the beach for example), the extra 41 horses will surely be appreciated. All Atlas models utilize a fine shifting eight-speed automatic Tiptronic transmission that shifted perfectly during our test review.

The new Atlas offers both front-wheel-drive (2WD) or VW's famous 4Motion all-wheel-drive (AWD) with Active Control, the latter which our tester featured. In choosing your preference of adhesion, keep in mind that only the V6 models offer the 4Motion AWD. The entry price for our Atlas V6 SE Tech V6 4Motion is \$38,890, and comes delivered with just

about every standard feature you'll need. If you live in a warm climate state, this same vehicle with front-drive starts at \$37,340.

Of all the trims available, the Atlas SE V6 w/technology 4Motion may well be the best of the bunch as for return on investment. Standard features include all the high-tech items like Apple and Android compatibility, Volkswagen App-Connect, (which begins when you plug in your compatible Smartphone) adaptive cruise, enhanced rear view camera, front collision warning, emergency braking, lane assist, lane departure, eight-speaker SiriusXM with CD player, power liftgate and much more.

In summary, when you look back at Volkswagen's heralded past in building

unique vehicles made to transport seven or more passengers, memories of the 23-window Microbus, Kombi vans and those popular Vanagon wagons and Westfalia Campers come quickly to mind. These VW buses date all the way back to 1950 here in the U.S. following the Beetle introduction in 1949. During the 1960 decade, no other vehicle came close to the popularity of a VW "Mini Bus" painted in multi-color, "Peace and Love" livery.

Now perfected, this new VW Atlas is sure to be a worthy competitor in our modern-day culture of moving family, friends and cargo.

cruise control, forward automatic braking, pedestrian detection and automatic parking assist are optional.

And being a Buick, it's going to indulge your inner-hedonist with a leather interior, Bose Centerpoint 11-speaker surround sound audio system; Head-Up Display; power panoramic moonroof; power rear sunshade; heated/ventilated front seats, heated steering wheel, 4G LTE onboard Wi-Fi, Android Auto and Apple CarPlay, and — of course — an infotainment system with

navigation. Available features include an electronically controlled active suspension system with Touring and Sport modes. Other extra goodies include massaging front seats, and wireless phone charging.

But being Buick's finest four-door, you'd expect a heavy equipment load, as well as a spacious interior, which this car has in spades. You can't say the same of the trunk; it's disappointingly small given the vehicle's size.

Nevertheless, being a Buick it cruises quietly, just as you'd expect. It ably brushes off the effects of America's deteriorating highways, delivering a comfortable ride. The engine proves to be smooth and

powerful, the transmission being the perfect partner. This is one Buick that won't be travelling too slowly in the left lane. Perhaps most surprisingly of all is this car's agility; this is no senior shuttle. The LaCrosse Avenir proves responsive for its size, although you might want to drive it with and without the adaptive suspension; the added handling prowess may not be worth the trade-off in ride quality.

With its simple elegant interior, flowing lines and posher trim, the 2018 Lacrosse Avenir is a lively, athletic premium sedan, one that still pampers you in the finest Buick fashion — thank goodness.

Ala., and is made with 75 percent domestic parts. Compare it with Buick, which is considered to be as American as the red, white and blue in its badge: the Buick Envision crossover is manufactured in China with only 2 percent domestic parts, said Wiesenfelder.

The Odyssey (ranked second) sold in its home country doesn't share much with the larger one here, just to give some perspective on how confusing it can be to assign nationalism to a brand. The other Hondas cracking the top 10 were the Honda Ridgeline pickup (third), Honda Pilot SUV (sixth) and Acura MDX midsize SUV, all made in Alabama on a shared platform to simplify manufacturing. The Acura MDX (seventh) is also made in East Liberty, Ohio.

"The way the American-made Index has been built was to reflect U.S. economic impact," Wiesenfelder said. "You can't tell what the U.S. economic impact is based solely on the brand."

The global nature of auto manufacturing means parts can be sourced from all over the world then produced domestically, with profits funneled

to headquarters in another country.

The most American-made car in the first quarter of 2018 is the Jeep Cherokee, manufactured in Belvidere, Ill. But Jeep is owned by Fiat Chrysler Automobiles, an Italian company headquartered in London. Fiat rescued Chrysler from bankruptcy in 2009 and earlier this month made a commitment to invest globally in Jeep and Ram while Chrysler and Dodge will be lower-volume regional brands.

"I think Chrysler is going to continue to be relevant in the U.S.," FCA CEO Sergio Marchionne said of the company's five-year strategic plan. "Don't expect it to be a global brand."

Globalization has diluted nationalism for automakers beyond the United States' Big Three of FCA (formerly Chrysler), Ford and General Motors.

"Jaguar Land Rover is an iconic British brand owned by Tata Motors in India," Wiesenfelder said. "Volvo is a Swedish car company owned by Chinese company Geely. Does that mean Volvo is not a Swedish brand anymore? Our position is there is no clear answer."

The American-made Index attempts to define where a car model comes from and where its revenue goes because it's insightful for consumers.

"People have a good idea of

what they want to buy, and will research things to dissuade them," Wiesenfelder said. "This is another data point."

A Cars.com survey of 1,000 participants found that 71 percent believe buying American contributes significantly to the U.S. economy. The vast majority (82 percent) also believe buying American-made vehicles creates more jobs in the U.S. So is buying Volvo good for America?

Yes, if you're buying the redesigned S60 sedan. Volvo just opened its first plant in the U.S. on June 20 in Ridgeville, S.C. The Swedish brand owned by a Chinese multinational with an American factory invested \$1.1 billion in the area just inland from the port city of Charleston. It makes the S60 and will employ up to 4,000 people to make the XC90 SUV in 2021.

This proves the difficulty in defining American-made when it comes to brands. And even individual models are becoming less and less definitively American. Last year, Cars.com tweaked the formula for its index because fewer vehicles were meeting the threshold of 75 percent domestic parts content.

"Twelve years ago when it started, over 60 vehicles qualified," Wiesenfelder said. "In 2016, we only had 8."

In 2016, the Toyota Camry

topped the list. In 2017, it was the Jeep Wrangler. The latter is an American icon. The former is an American best-seller. Both vehicles were redesigned for 2018, and neither vehicle made the top 10 this year.

So it goes in the global manufacturing era.

Tesla is another American brand but only had about 50 to 55 percent domestic parts, which didn't make the cut for top 10, said Wiesenfelder.

The new methodology is variable, based on the domestic parts content of the top 40 percent of the model year's eligible vehicles. Excluded are low-volume models that sold under 2,500 units in the first quarter and all heavy-duty vehicles with a gross vehicle weight over 8,500 pounds, according to Kelsey Mays, senior consumer affairs editor at Cars.com. Mays said 114 models were eligible for the ranking this year. Of those 114, the 45 models with the highest percentage of domestic parts made the next cut for the five factors used in the rankings.

Information for domestic parts content can be found through the American Automobile Labeling Act of 1992, which requires manufacturers to label three things: the percentage of U.S. equipment on the car; the percentage of man-hours

by U.S. workers assembling it; and the name of any other country where at least one-third of equipment originated. Cars.com added engine and transmission country of origin last year to give its index five data points to consider for economic impact.

"If consumers care about making car purchases that support the U.S. economy, it means looking beyond the assembly location," Wiesenfelder said.

The exact formula for the index is kept a secret. The Detroit-made Chevrolet Volt ranked fifth, while the Chevy Corvette out of Bowling Green, Ky., ranked 10th. America's best-selling vehicle, the Ford F-150 made in Missouri and Michigan, ranked ninth.

Illinois was home to three of the top 10, including the Ford Taurus (fourth) and Ford Explorer (eighth) manufactured in Ford's Chicago Assembly plant in the South Side neighborhood of Hegewisch.

"It's something for Illinoisans to be proud of," Wiesenfelder said. Ford, as is also headquartered in Chicago. "Illinois is right in the middle of the country, so it's great for distribution. And Chicago is the rail hub of the U.S. I don't know of a final assembly for an automaker that doesn't use rail. That works in our favor in Illinois."

'Ant-Man' sequel sits at kids' table of the Marvel universe

It would be fair to say that within the vast labyrinth of the Marvel Universe, Ant-Man is a minor character. And that "Ant-Man," the 2015 film that starred Paul Rudd as Scott Lang, a petty criminal who, once donning his story's version of a super suit, was able to get small, grow tall, and zip around fighting off all sorts of bad guys, was, when compared to other entries in Marvel moviedom, a minor film.

But it was certainly an entertaining endeavor and, by the way, took in just over half a billion dollars at the box office. A sequel was inevitable. And so, with the usual question about the need to see the first film before moving on to the second hanging over it, the answer is a resounding no. The gaggle of writers who fashioned this screenplay took care to include enough information before the opening credits run to allow any newcomers to catch up on what's going on, much of which was hinted at the first time around.

Here's a taste: Brilliant inventor Hank Pym (Michael Douglas) and his brilliant wife and science partner Janet Van Dyne

(Michelle Pfeiffer), both of whom had the ability to shrink down to ant size, were long ago involved in a save-the-world scenario that ended with Janet going "subatomic" and vanishing into the Quantum Realm. Now Hank and his daughter Hope (Evangeline Lilly) believe that Janet might still be alive, and that only Scott can help them find her. Well, Scott, along with the acquisition of a special technical component that's in the hands of the smarmy villain Sonny

Burch (Walton Goggins).

Too much to keep track of already? Sorry, there's plenty more. Scott, a divorced dad who gets to see his young daughter on weekends, is going through two years of ankle-braceleted house arrest (due to something that happened in one of those "Avengers" movies). Hope, who has wings attached to her super suit when she becomes the Wasp, flies around stinging people when she's small, and beating them up when she's tall, especially

people like Sonny Burch and his band of thugs. But things go awry when everyone gets to meet the ghostly Ava (Hannah John-Kamen), who also goes by the name Ghost and who, even while wreaking havoc on some of the good guys — for reasons of revenge — is physically fading away.

More: There's also Bill Foster (Laurence Fishburne), a long-ago acquaintance of Hank, who's brought into the fold because, as luck would have it, he's a professor

of quantum physics, and knows a little something about the Quantum Realm.

Yeah, there's too much going on, but the script tries to buffer that by tossing in lots of large vs. small sight gags, having the villains keep showing up at inopportune moments, and splitting the goofiest of line delivery between Rudd and his character's friend Luis (Michael Pena).

But the story does what it's supposed to do: It keeps returning to the idea introduced at the beginning, that Janet might still be alive and that they must try to find her. Of most importance, Stan Lee shows up at about the 80-minute mark, the ending will confound anyone who hasn't yet seen "Avengers: Infinity War," and there's a huge car chase through the streets of San Francisco, which should bring smiles to Michael Douglas fans. Those who don't get this reference should IMDB his 1970s TV work.

'Three Identical Strangers' a strange documentary

With documentary features continuing to gain ground as mainstream entertainment — lots of people are showing up for "Won't You Be My Neighbor?" and "RBG" — their subject matters are becoming more intriguing and, in many cases, more peculiar. "Three Identical Strangers," a darling at this year's Sundance and Hot Docs International Documentary Festivals, clicks on both counts.

The opening sights and sounds are of 56-year-old Bobby Shafran, sitting down, looking into the camera, and saying, "When I tell people my story, they don't believe it ... but it's true, every word of it." Then he calmly launches into that story, explaining that it really began when he was 19 and a freshman at Sullivan County Community College, where other students joyfully greeted him, many of them saying, "Welcome back, Eddy!"

"What? But I've never been here before," remembers Bobby. And, "My name is Bobby."

Even after so much time has gone by, Bobby is still incredulous about the events that followed. The film shows some of them in a series of imaginatively presented old-style "flashbacks"

that are actually color-saturated recreations of what went down.

Those college kids weren't completely wrong; they did know Bobby Shafran. But his name was Eddy Galland, who had been at the school the year before. Bobby Shafran and Eddy Galland were identical twins, who were separated when they were 6-months-old, put up for adoption, and raised by different families, never knowing that they were twins.

One of the film's many talking heads, a journalist named Howard Schneider, says that after writing about them, "the story went from amazing to incredible."

That's because 19-year-old David Kellman, who was also adopted, read the article, realized that he looked a whole lot like Eddy and Bobby, and noted that they all shared the birthday of July 12, 1961.

But, giving away only that the film takes a strange turn, both in its story and in its mood, what you see at the beginning does not prepare you for where it goes.

The "10 That Changed America" series on PBS returns this summer with three new episodes that continue to explore aspects of the nation's built environment. In the first, "10 Streets that Changed America," the series chooses 10 influential roads that have connected, divided and transformed communities across the country. It's an interesting look at the role streets have played in shaping our lives and work.

Enthusiastic host Geoffrey Baer keeps the educational tone light and cheerful as he takes the viewer on a road trip from New York City's Broadway to Los Angeles' Wilshire Boulevard.

Meeting with experts, Baer reveals a street's backstory with the addition of early film footage, paintings and archival footage that together, form a historical picture. The idea is to offer fun, bite-size pieces of learning.

Aside from the slightly gimmicky top 10 format and Baer's over-excited delivery, the show offers worthwhile insight on the social and cultural impact of something we all take for granted. Broadway's 400-year-old history from a Native American road to

a Dutch thoroughfare to a brightly lit theatre district is one example. Along with some fun facts, like how Wall Street got its name, the backstory of Broadway has broader social implications, namely the addition of lights, which changed how women lived. For the first time, it was acceptable for them to shop alone after certain hours.

The other featured streets include the Boston Post Road, a highway that carried vital information during the American Revolution, St. Charles Avenue in New Orleans where the electric streetcar led to suburban development across the country, and the National Road, which ran from Cumberland, Virginia to Vandalia, Illinois, and was the first road paid for by the federal government. Its establishment enabled settlers to travel in covered wagons to the West.

Highlighting the far-reaching cultural and social impact of roads, the show also makes a point about the role of ingenuity in the country's newfound mobility. Streets belonged

to people and then they belonged to cars, which meant opportunities for business development. Roads meant travelers, which meant places were needed where they could stop to eat, sleep and be entertained. One 1920s visionary predicted that the automobile would take over Los Angeles, so he created L.A.'s "Miracle Mile," a shopping district specifically for motorists.


Not all streets connect however, a lesson the series explores in a segment on Greenwood Avenue in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Known as the "Black Wall Street," the prosperous African-American business district was burned to the ground in 1921 as a result of a race riot.

"10 Streets that Changed America" wouldn't be out of place screening in a high school classroom, but it offers some interesting commentary on the effects of our built environment.

Son strives to revive faded memories of mom long gone

Bidding quiz

You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been:

South	West	North	East
1♥	Pass	2♣	Pass
2♥	Pass	2♠	Pass

What would you bid now with each of the following four hands?
 1. ♠A82♥AQJ92♦J7♣J54
 2. ♠K972♥AKJ643♦K8♣7
 3. ♠843♥KQ8652♦AQ♣KJ
 4. ♠J3♥KQJ7543♦A62♣6

1. Three clubs. Whenever the responding hand names a new suit, the opening bidder is forced to bid again. Therefore, you could not pass when partner bid two clubs, and you cannot pass now. The only problem is what to bid over two spades.

Since partner named clubs before spades, it is reasonable to assume that his first suit is longer and that he has only four spades. Had the suits been of equal length, partner would surely have bid spades first. Since you cannot bid notrump without a diamond stopper, you must now show a preference for partner's longer suit by bidding three clubs.

2. Four spades. In the preceding hand, your three-club bid, following the weakish rebid of two hearts, showed that you had started with a minimum opening bid. Both bids

implied that you were acting only under the compulsion of partner's forcing bids.

In the same way, if you were to bid only three spades now, partner could rightfully assume that your hand was a dead minimum. But this is far from the actual case. With the discovery of a spade fit, your hand has risen tremendously in value, and the proper way to get this message across to partner is to jump to game rather than make a simple raise.

3. Three notrump. The same policy is followed in this case. A two-notrump bid would sound weak because it could be read as showing a dead-minimum hand that included a diamond stopper.

However, you had values in reserve when you bid two hearts. These extra values — 15 high-card points instead of the 12 or 13 you might have had — can now be shown by jumping to game in notrump. This bid cannot be construed as showing a powerhouse, since the two-heart bid that preceded it indicated that the opening bid was in the minimum class.

4. Three hearts. Having opened the bidding with only 11 high-card points, all you can do is stick to your story that your opening bid is a minimum based largely on great heart length.
