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Trump tweets Iran threats

President threatens Iranian leader in tweet sent late Sunday

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump's explosive twitter threat to

Iran's leader comes as his administration is ratcheting up a pressure campaign on the Islamic republic that many suspect is aimed at regime change.

No one is predicting imminent war. But Trump's bellicose, all-caps challenge addressed to President Hassan Rouhani followed a speech

by Secretary of State Mike Pompeo in which he accused Iran's leadership of massive corruption and widespread rights abuses and urged Iranians to rise up in protest.

Both the tweet and the speech landed less than two weeks before the administration will begin re-imposing sanctions on Iran that had

been lifted under the 2015 nuclear deal. In the meantime, the U.S. is stepping up Farsi-language outreach that is intended to support Iranians demonstrating against the policies of their government.

Trump's tweet doesn't appear to have been prompted by any notable shift in rhetoric from Iran.

It could have been an impulsive reaction to reports from Tehran quoting Rouhani as giving the U.S. an oft-repeated reminder that conflict with Iran would be "the mother of all wars." Yet animosity directed at the Iranian leadership is an

Lawyer: Woman booted after complaining about man in locker room

LEESBURG — Planet Fitness in Leesburg has come under fire after a woman

claimed she was banned from the gym for complaining about a man claiming to be a transgendered woman in the women's locker room, according to a law firm that is asking for her membership to be reinstated.

Liberty Counsel, a national litigation and civil liberties organization, has written to the company

complaining that its client, identified only as "Mrs. H," has been the victim of discrimination and is demanding that it "make changes to its membership and locker room policies to prevent blatant sex-based harassment by males in the women's facilities."

Trump tries to cast fresh doubt on Mueller probe

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump tried to cast fresh doubt Monday on the federal investigation into Russian election interference in the 2016 presidential

election, calling it a "fraud and a hoax designed to target Trump" and demanding an immediate end to the "Witch Hunt."

Trump also said former campaign adviser Carter Page,

Duck boat probe will check if Coast Guard rules ignored

The investigation into the sinking of a sightseeing boat that claimed 17 lives will look at whether operators violated Coast Guard rules by venturing onto a Missouri lake

as thunderstorms rolled in, a Coast Guard official said Monday.

More than three days after the deadly accident, a crane attached to a barge pulled the amphibious duck boat from Table Rock Lake near Branson, where it was submerged in 80 feet of water.

Divers attached a sling to the 33-foot, 4-ton vessel, then raised and drained it, officials said. It was to be loaded onto a vehicle and turned over to the National Transportation Safety Board.

Coast Guard Lt. Tasha Sadowicz of the agency's St. Louis office said the boat that

capsized and sank was known as "Stretch Duck 07." Like all 22 duck boats in operation in Branson, it was required to undergo annual inspections. The most recent was in February.

But Sadowicz said the Coast Guard's "certificate of inspection" placed limits on when the

boats can enter the water based on wind speed and "sea state," which refers to the height of waves.

Sadowicz did not have information on Stretch Duck 07's limits but said they will be a focal point of the investigation.

ZAGREB, CROATIA Police deny using violence against migrants

Croatian police have denied reports that the European Union nation's border guards have been using violence against migrants attempting to enter from neighboring Bosnia.

Police told The Associated Press on Monday that they "have not recorded" such incidents along Croatia's border with Bosnia and other neighbors.

The response comes after the Red Cross last week warned it has received reports that dozens of people who tried to cross the border from Bosnia were being treated daily for injuries. The International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies also have said some migrants recounted being beaten by Croatian border guards, but that IFRC could not verify the accounts.

HELSINKI Car transport ship runs aground off Sweden's coast

Swedish officials say a large Panama-flagged cargo vessel carrying hundreds of vehicles has run aground on the country's east coast en route to the port of Sodertalje, south of Stockholm, and has reportedly leaked some oil.

The Swedish Coast Guard said the 456-foot Makassar Highway ran aground in an archipelago north of Vastervik about 7:30 a.m. Monday in good weather on the Baltic Sea.

Officials are inspecting damages to the vessel, which according to the Swedish public broadcaster SVT has left traces of oil in the sea.

JERUSALEM Russian FM meets Netanyahu over Syria, Iran

Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov met in Jerusalem with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on Monday in talks focusing on the Iranian presence in Syria.

Early in his meeting with the Russian delegation, also attended by Israeli defense officials, Netanyahu stressed the "extraordinarily important" link between the two countries, demonstrated by "the direct meetings between myself and President Putin and between our staffs."

Netanyahu announced earlier at a Cabinet meeting that Russian President Vladimir Putin had a few days ago requested the meeting with the high level delegation that includes Russia's chief of the military's General Staff, Gen. Valery Gerasimov.

Two dead, 13 wounded in Toronto shooting

Suspected shooter's family said he struggled with psychosis, depression

TORONTO — A man whose family said he suffered from psychosis and depression fired a handgun into restaurants and cafes in a lively Toronto neighborhood, killing a 10-year-old girl and an 18-year-old woman and wounding 13 others in an attack that has shaken the confidence of many in the normally safe city.

Authorities on Monday evening identified the suspect as Faisal Hussain, 29, of Toronto, who died in an exchange of gunfire with police. It was not immediately clear whether he killed himself or was killed by police.

The mass shooting in Toronto's Greektown district Sunday night came just three months after a van struck and killed 10 people in an apparent attack directed at women.

A statement from the family of Hussain said their son had severe mental health challenges that the struggled with psychosis and depression. They said medications did not help him and the interventions of professionals were unsuccessful.

"While we did our best to seek help for him throughout his life of struggle and pain, we could never imagine that this would be his devastating and destructive end," the Hussain family said.

"Our hearts are in pieces for the victims and for our city as we all come to grips with this terrible tragedy. We will mourn those who were lost for the rest of our lives."

Police Chief Mark Saunders earlier said he would not speculate on a motive but did not rule out terrorism.

"It's almost inconceivable that these things can happen," said Mayor John Tory. "We were so used to living in a city where these things didn't happen and as we saw them

going on in the world around us (we) thought they couldn't happen here."

"This is an attack against innocent families and our entire city."

The slain 18-year-old was identified as Reese Fallon, a recent high school graduate who volunteered for Canada's Liberal party and was due to attend McMaster University in the fall. Her family said in a statement they were devastated.

"She was ... smart, passionate and full of energy. It is a huge loss," said Canadian Member of Parliament Nathaniel Erskine-Smith, who knew Fallon.

Flags at Toronto City Hall as well as at Fallon's former high school, Malvern CI, were lowered to half-staff.

"An engaging student, Reese Fallon graduated from Malvern CI just last month and was highly regarded by staff and loved by her friends," the school board said in a statement, adding that support was being offered to students.

The 13 wounded ranged in age from 10 to 59, and suffered injuries ranging from serious to minor, Saunders said. He did not name the victims, who included eight women and girls, and seven men.

Dr. Najma Ahmed of St. Michael's Hospital said five patients had been admitted in serious or critical condition and that three of the five underwent immediate lifesaving operations.

A video taken by a witness

showed a man dressed all in black walking quickly down a sidewalk and firing three shots into at least one shop or restaurant in Toronto's Greektown, a residential area crowded with Greek restaurants and cafes.

Witnesses heard many shots and described the suspect walking past restaurants and cafes and patios on both sides of the street and firing into them.

At the corner of Danforth and Logan, where some of the shots were fired, about 50 people milled about on a small square Monday evening, talking in several languages. They expressed shock at a shooting in such a neighborhood, which is graced with parks, pretty two-story brick homes and street cafes.

Some hugged, others wept. Others were sadder, wondering both why someone would want to hurt people in their neighborhood — and how he obtained a gun in a country with far stricter gun laws than in the neighboring U.S.

Bouquets of flowers lay near a plaque commemorating the city, while a few steps away people signed a makeshift memorial made of plywood. "we are Danforth strong," it says, referring to the neighborhood's main street, The Danforth.

"I'm out of my mind just thinking about it," said 66-year-old Augustino Speciale, who paused to smell a bouquet of white lilies attached to a lamppost. "It's Toronto." Ontario's police watchdog

said there was an exchange of gunfire between the assailant and two officers on a side street before the gunman was found dead near Danforth Avenue where the shootings occurred.

Tanya Wilson was closing her tattoo shop on the street when she heard gunshots and a mother and her son ran into her store with gunshot wounds to their legs

"They said they were walking and a man told them to get the hell out his way and he just shot them," Wilson said.

Wilson said she tied and elevated their wounds and tried to keep them calm while they waited for paramedics. She locked the door and shut off the lights, not knowing what was happening outside.

Jody Steinhauer was celebrating her birthday with family at Christina's restaurant on Danforth Avenue when they heard 10 to 15 shots. They ran to the back to the restaurant and hid under a table.

"We heard a woman yell, 'Help!' My partner went outside the restaurant and the woman was right there. She had been shot," she said.

Her boyfriend and a doctor who was in the restaurant attended to the woman who was shot in the thigh. "She was screaming and yelling and in shock. Nobody was with her. That was the scary part," Steinhauer said.

Though mass shootings are rare in Canada's largest city, Toronto police had deployed dozens of additional officers over the weekend to deal with a recent rise in gun violence in the city, which has seen 23 gun homicides so far this year, compared to 16 fatal shootings in the first half of 2017.

Toronto Councilor Paula Fletcher said the attack was "not gang related" and that the gunman shot "indiscriminately" into restaurants and into a park.

"I know we always say, 'That can't happen here,' when we see those gunmen in the States doing the same thing and it has happened here now," Fletcher said.

Police: 2 injured when tree falls during storm

Authorities say two people were injured when a tree fell on them during a thunderstorm in Florida.

Ormond Beach police spokesman Keith Walker told news outlets that 56-year-old James Allen was taken to a hospital for treatment on Sunday afternoon. He says Walker and another person were unloading furniture from a truck in the driveway when the tree fell.

The second person suffered minor injuries.

Neighbor Heather Marz tells WESH-TV in Orlando that she heard the tree crashing down and heard Allen yelling for help. She called 911 and performed CPR until rescuers arrived.

Convenience store owner faces murder charge

Charges have been added against convenience store owner Mehedeun Hasan, who was arrested July 18 on charges of shooting into an occupied vehicle and attempted second-degree murder.

The Polk County Sheriff's Office reported Monday that the man who was shot, 43-year-old Rennie Defoe Jr. of Plant City, died July 21 at Lakeland Regional Health Medical Center. After updating the State Attorney's Office on Defoe's death, Hasan was additionally charged with second-degree murder with a weapon.

According to reports, Defoe entered a Shell gas station/convenience store in Lakeland at approximately 11:40 p.m. July 17, walked to the beer cooler, picked up three 18-packs of Natural Ice beer — valued at approximately \$36 — and then walked out of the store without paying.

Hasan, 22, co-owner with his father, then picked up a 9mm handgun from the store office and ran out after Defoe, according to the PCSO. He caught up with Defoe when the suspect was in his vehicle, and surveillance video shows Hasan point a gun at Defoe. Hasan shot Defoe as he was backing up to leave. Defoe drove off, then crashed his vehicle.

Teen injured during police chase dies at hospital

Authorities say a teenage Florida boy who was seriously injured during a police chase last week has died.

The Naples Daily News reports that the teen died Friday, three days after the crash in Immokalee.

Florida Highway Patrol says the 17-year-old passenger was ejected from a Mercedes-Benz when the 16-year-old girl driving the car veered off the road and overturned while being chased by Collier County deputies.

The boy was taken to a Fort Myers hospital, where he eventually died. The driver was taken to a Naples hospital with minor injuries.

Neither teen was wearing a seat belt.

FHP says the driver faces charges of reckless driving and driving without a license.

Officials didn't immediately say what prompted the chase.

Candidates address gun permits

Agriculture commissioner hopefuls look at concealed weaponsBy Jim Turner

TALLAHASSEE — State Sen. Denise Grimsley would immediately order a “full audit” of Florida's concealed-weapons licensing process, as well as examine the management structure of the program, if she is elected agriculture commissioner.

And the Sebring Republican is joined by two of her primary opponents, former state Rep. Baxter Troutman of Winter Haven and Plant City businessman Mike McCalister, in saying accountability for problems with background checks rests with Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam, a Republican who is running for governor.

Yet, Troutman accepts that Putnam, who has served as agriculture commissioner since 2011, has taken responsibility for heavily publicized issues in the licensing process.

“Setting an environment that demands accountability, productivity and success lies at the top — the buck stops with the commissioner, which is something Commissioner Putnam has acknowledged,” Troutman said, when asked about Putnam's degree of accountability.

The Tampa Bay Times reported last month that state investigators found a former Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services employee, who had been promoted from a job in the mailroom, failed for a year to conduct one of the national background checks for concealed-weapons licenses.

The Associated Press later reported state investigators determined that 48 employees had made mistakes in the review process, requiring the agency to revoke two concealed-weapons licenses and an armed security guard license.

The Times has also reported that Putnam's agency paid \$30,000 to settle a lawsuit with a former employee who claimed she was required to meet a daily processing quota and that she had been advised “she worked for the NRA.”

This year's fourth Republican candidate for agriculture commissioner, state Rep. Matt Caldwell of North Fort Myers, did not respond to the questions last week about the licensing issues from The News Service of Florida.

Putnam's office has pushed back against the reports, with Putnam saying after the initial Times report last month that problems had been corrected and that “public safety was not at risk.” But Democrats have seized on the reports to criticize Putnam.

Nikki Fried, a Democratic candidate for agriculture commissioner, said she intends — if elected — to do an audit of the entire department “to ensure it is operating efficiently and effectively on behalf of the people of Florida.”

“The recent revelations of Commissioner Putnam's failures to properly oversee the permitting of concealed-carry and private security guard licenses are potentially indicative of a broader mismanagement of the department,” Fried said. “We must find out if that is the case, and if so, take action.”

Grimsley said an audit she plans would determine if any administrative changes are needed regarding the licensing

procedures.

McCalister, also a retired Army National Guard and Reserves colonel, said no concealed-weapons license should be deemed complete until all required background checks are included with an application.

Troutman intends to implement a new reporting structure that would measure outcomes and expectations.

“In business, things that get measured get done, and people must be held accountable,” Troutman said.

Grimsley mirrored Troutman with a “buck always stops at the top” comment, but added she needs to better

Man arrested with cop's rifle

LEESBURG — Detectives responding to a shots-fired call on Saturday arrested three men when they discovered drugs in a house and an AR-15 rifle stolen from the Tavares Police Department.

Residents who called police at 5:52 p.m. directed officers to 107 S. Lake St. There, they saw Kendrick Jones, 26, who said he had been in an argument with people in an apartment complex across the street.

“Mr. Jones stated he did not own a gun and no one shot a gun from his house,” according to the arrest affidavit. Two other men,

They then obtained a search warrant.

Jones said he owned the gun,

but a trace of the weapon showed it had been stolen from a Tavares police officer in late January. Someone broken out the window of the officer's patrol car at his home and pried the rifle from the gun rack.

Malcolm and Smith were charged with possessing less than 20 grams of marijuana, possession of methamphetamine and drug paraphernalia. Jones was charged with grand theft of police equipment from a vehicle, possession of a short-barreled rifle and discharging a firearm on a public road. He was jailed on \$31,000 bond.

Remains found in yard of missing man

BUSHNELL — Sumter County sheriff's investigators have unearthed human remains in the backyard of a man who has been missing for about a month.

Investigators received a call Friday from family members of Claudio Carvajal-Hernandez, 40, saying they have not heard from him since June 22.

There has been no activity on his Facebook page or his debit card and he has not picked up his paychecks, according to Capt. Tony Prevatt.

The last reported sighting came from his stepson, Benito Pealta-Farrar, 23, who also lives at the home at 212 E. Belt St. Pealta-Farrar said he last saw Carvajal-Hernandez leaving for work at 4 a.m. on June 22.

On Friday, investigators contacted a private company about using a cadaver dog. On Saturday, the dog alerted to an area near a fire pit in the backyard. It was there that investigators found charred bones.

Lady Lake man shot by Sumter deputies identified

LADY LAKE — The man shot to death by Sumter County sheriff's deputies Friday during a domestic disturbance call has been identified as Anthony Coleman, 38.

Deputies said they shot him when he pointed a gun at them.

Deputies were called to

Northeast 105th Lane in Lady Lake at 6:20 p.m. The woman, who met deputies at a nearby church, said

her husband punched their dog in the face three times. They began to argue, and the man pushed her, so she gathered her children, left and

called law enforcement.

While talking to her, deputies heard gunshots. When they confronted him, he refused to comply with their commands to surrender, then he raised his firearm. Two deputies shot him.

He was flown to the trauma center at Ocala Regional Medical Center where he died a few hours later.

The Florida Department of

Law Enforcement is investigating the shooting, which is standard procedure in all officer-involved shootings.

According to Sumter County Jail records, Coleman was arrested in December of 2016 on four counts of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon (vehicle) and leaving the scene of a crash involving injury. He was sentenced to three years of probation.

Administration reports nearly 1,200 family reunifications

SAN DIEGO — The Trump administration says nearly 1,200 family reunifications have occurred for children 5 and older who were separated at the U.S.-Mexico

border, still leaving hundreds to go before a court-imposed deadline.

The Justice Department said in a court filing Monday that there have been 1,187 reunifications "or other appropriate discharges" by the Health

and Human Services Department's Office of Refugee Resettlement. The filing doesn't elaborate on "other appropriate discharges."

The administration has identified 2,551 adults who have been separated from

their children 5 and older.

U.S. District Judge Dana Sabraw has set a deadline of Thursday for the government to reunite all older children with their parents. He set an earlier deadline for children under 5.

There were also some bones in a burn barrel, Prevatt said.

A skull was not found.

The remains were sent to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement crime lab. DNA will be extracted from the bones and compared to known family members for comparison.

The case is similar to one in Lake County.

Friends of Michael

Shaver called the Lake County Sheriff's Office early this year to say they have not seen the 35-year-old since 2015. His estranged wife allowed deputies to look inside the house they shared in the Clermont area, but demanded a lawyer when they wanted to look in the back yard.

In March, crime scene investigators unearthed remains under a concrete slab near a fire pit that were later identified as Shaver's, thanks to a DNA match.

That hot lunch delivered to your door? Your health insurer might pick up the tab.

The cleaning crew that fixed up your apartment while you recovered from a stroke? The hospital staff helped set that up.

Health care is shifting in a fundamental way for millions of Americans. Some insurers are paying for rides to fitness centers and checking in with customers to help ward off loneliness. Hospital networks are hiring more workers to visit people at home and learn about their lives, not just their illnesses.

The health care system is becoming more focused on keeping patients healthy instead of waiting to treat them once they become sick or wind up in the hospital. This isn't a new concept, but it's growing. Insurers are expanding what they pay for to confront rising costs, realizing that a person's health depends mostly on what happens outside a doctor's visit.

"For many people, taking care of their blood pressure or their diabetes is not particularly high on their list when they don't know where their next meal is coming from," said Dr. Lori Tishler, vice president of medical affairs with the nonprofit insurer Commonwealth Care Alliance.

Some of this shift is driven by how health plans pay doctors and other care providers. For decades, they've

reimbursed mainly for each procedure or service performed, which limits the type of help a doctor can provide. But insurers are shifting more to reimbursement that centers on the patient's health. That often involves paying providers to coordinate all the help a patient needs to improve their health — and lower health care costs.

"You get a lot more attention to the sickest population," said Dr. Sam Ho, chief medical officer for UnitedHealthcare, the nation's largest insurer.

Beyond payment changes, insurers and care providers also are stretching their approach to helping patients, especially those with low incomes or chronic conditions.

Virta Woodard receives weekly calls

from her care manager, Armando Contreras, and she gets rides to a fitness center, all covered under a program called "Togetherness" started last year by the insurer Anthem. The 56-year-old, who has diabetes and lives with chronic pain, has lost 34 pounds since joining the program.

"I don't cry every day like I used to because I don't want to be telling Armando that," the Long Beach, California, resident said. "I want to tell him I did something good."

The thinking behind this program is that people who are more engaged socially will become more involved keeping up their health, Anthem spokeswoman Jill Becher said.

Sharon Romano was feeling overwhelmed months after her stroke last year. In stepped

social worker Alicia Velez.

Velez, from Mount Sinai Health Partners, spent several hours helping Romano sort through medical bills on her first visit. She also researched companies that could clean Romano's one-bedroom Manhattan apartment and remove clutter. Then Velez started calling weekly to check in with Romano.

"It gave me a little bit of hope that I can get through this," Romano said.

The Affordable Care Act expanded coverage to millions of people and increased recognition through the health care system that "just giving someone coverage is not going to be enough to ultimately improve health outcomes," said Samantha Artiga, a Kaiser Family Foundation researcher.

TITUSVILLE Authorities rescue 11 people from capsized boat

Florida authorities rescued nearly a dozen people after a boat capsized in a coastal waterway.

Florida Today reported that the Titusville Fire Department and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission pulled people out of Indian River as rough weather was moving through the area. Indian River is located on Florida's east coast.

On its Twitter account Titusville Fire Department said that it rescued nine adults and two juveniles. One other person was evaluated, but refused to be transported.

The newspaper said that at least six people were in the water while at least three more were on a nearby island about 200 yards away, just south of the A. Max Brewer Bridge.

understand the procedures used to process the applications.

"I look forward to speaking with Commissioner Putnam and his management team to better understand the procedures they have used and then think about ways to ensure that we are deploying resources and using processes that work to provide safety and security going forward," Grimsley said.

Democratic candidate Jeff Porter, who is the mayor of Homestead, joined Grimsley and McCalister in maintaining that the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services can continue to handle the applications.

"I would institute a level of professionalism not found in the program today," Porter said. "It is unconscionable to have had a mailroom clerk be responsible for the checking of the NCIC (National Crime Information Center) checks. I would hire a team with a law-enforcement background to oversee this critical program to all

Floridians."

McCalister said the permitting process "should be handled by a statewide elected official to ensure consistent standards and not left to unelected persons."

Democratic candidate David Walker, a marine biologist, favors moving the checks to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement.

"Law enforcement officials are better equipped to perform a thorough background check," Walker said. "It will also link the concealed weapon permit, which is under the commissioner of agriculture,

with gun purchase, which is under Florida Department of Law Enforcement. Linking concealed weapon license with gun purchase will make it easier for law enforcement officials to see compliance with gun purchases."

Fried said moving the processing to the FDLE is something that deserves discussion.

"All concealed-weapons permit applications are run through the Florida Crime Information Center, which is run by the FDLE," Fried said. "Background checks are run to ensure that CWP's (concealed weapons permits) don't end up

in the hands of the wrong people and to protect society. So, in my opinion, it is completely reasonable to have the conversation of moving this responsibility over to the law enforcement professionals."

Troutman said he's also open to such discussions.

"Florida is one of four states where someone other than law enforcement issues concealed-carry permits," Troutman said. "The Legislature and governor ultimately decide where this program is housed, and I'm open to discussions exploring improvements to the application process."

None of the candidates

called for eliminating or scaling back the concealed-weapons licensing process. In December 2012, Florida became the first state in the nation to surpass 1 million active conceal-carry permits.

But the Democrats expressed some concerns with proposals to expand laws dealing with gun rights, such as allowing people with concealed-weapons licenses to openly carry handguns — an issue that lawmakers have considered.

"It is not in the best interest of Floridians to have an open-carry policy as it places everyone in danger," Walker said. "If there is an incident, police would not know who is the perpetrator versus the victim."

Porter said "open carry" isn't necessary due to the large number of legal gun owners in the state.

"Criminals should think twice about committing a crime against a resident of Florida, whether or not they are showing a gun, the odds are that the potential victim is carrying a legal weapon to defend themselves," Porter said.

Grimsley and Troutman, who recently received "B plus" and "C minus" grades, respectively, from the National Rifle Association, offered outright support for the Second Amendment.

Grimsley added she'd support "any efforts to give law-abiding Floridians more freedom to exercise it."

The state had surpassed 1.9 million active concealed-weapons licenses as of June 30.

established part of the administration's broader foreign policy.

Iran has dismissed Trump's late Sunday message — "NEVER EVER THREATEN THE UNITED STATES AGAIN OR YOU WILL SUFFER CONSEQUENCES THE LIKE OF WHICH FEW THROUGHOUT HISTORY HAVE EVER SUFFERED BEFORE" — as a "passive reaction" to Rouhani. But, Tehran was already aware of what was coming from the administration as consequences of Trump's May withdrawal from the 2015 nuclear accord take shape.

As Pompeo noted in his speech to

Iranian-Americans and others in California late Sunday, the centerpiece of those consequences will be the re-imposition of U.S. economic sanctions; the first batch will go back into force on Aug. 4 targeting the Iranian automotive sector and trade in gold and other metals. A more significant set of sanctions that will hit Iran's oil industry and central bank by punishing countries and companies that do business with them will resume on Nov. 4.

"Right now, the United States is undertaking a diplomatic and financial pressure campaign to cut off the funds that the regime uses to enrich itself and support death and destruction," Pompeo said in his speech at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library and Museum in Simi Valley.

"We have an obligation to put maximum pressure on the regime's ability to generate and move money, and we will do so.

Pompeo also slammed Iran's political, judicial and military officials, accusing several by name of participating in rampant corruption, and called its religious leaders "hypocritical holy men" who amassed wealth while allowing their people to suffer. He said the government has "heartlessly repressed its own people's human rights, dignity and fundamental freedoms," and he hailed the "proud Iranian people (for) not staying silent about their government's many abuses."

"The United States under President Trump will not stay silent either," he said.

He was right. True to form, Trump did not stay

silent. But the White House blamed Rouhani for inciting the war of words with his comment that "America must understand well that peace with Iran is the mother of all peace and war with Iran is the mother of all wars."

"WE ARE NO LONGER A COUNTRY THAT WILL STAND FOR YOUR DEMENTED WORDS OF VIOLENCE & DEATH. BE CAUTIOUS!," Trump wrote.

Reaction from Congress, particularly Democrats, was swift and critical.

Democratic Sen. Jeanne Shaheen of New Hampshire, a member of the Foreign Relations Committee, acknowledged that Iran's terrorist activities in the Middle East pose a threat but suggested it wouldn't be solved through a tweet from Trump.

Some witnesses have said the lake was calm and the storm came up suddenly. Sadowicz said investigators want to find out if operators were adequately monitoring the weather and should have reasonably known a storm was approaching.

Turbulent weather has caused trouble for duck boats before.

Coast Guard records show that a similar duck boat in Philadelphia took on a 3- or 4-foot wave on Oct. 3, 2015, as it carried 12 passengers on a tour of the Delaware River. Water got into the engine

compartment, causing the engine to stall and setting the vessel adrift.

The boat was safely towed to shore. The cause of the failure was determined to be "the rapidly worsening river conditions." But the Coast Guard also cited a "failure to anticipate the change in the weather conditions."

"The change of the tide from slack to flood and the strong northerly winds caused the waves to quickly build and exceeded the restriction on the vessel's COI (certificate of inspection)," the Coast Guard report stated.

Duck boats were designed for military use in World War II. The Missouri boat that sank was built in 1944.

the subject of government documents released over the weekend, wasn't a spy or an agent of Russia.

"Carter Page wasn't a spy, wasn't an agent of the Russians - he would have cooperated with the FBI. It was a fraud and a hoax designed to target Trump," the president said in a series of tweets quoting Tom Fitton, president of the conservative watchdog group Judicial Watch.

Fitton was interviewed Monday on "Fox and Friends," an appearance Trump tweeted about.

"A disgrace to America," Trump's tweet continued. "They should

drop the discredited Mueller Witch Hunt now!"

The president was responding to the Justice Department's Saturday release of documents related to the wiretapping of Page. Trump has asserted without evidence that the documents, heavily redacted and released Saturday under the Freedom of Information Act, "confirm with little doubt" that intelligence agencies misled a special court that approved the wiretap warrant.

But lawmakers from both political parties said that the documents don't show wrongdoing and that they even appear to undermine some previous claims by top Republicans on the basis for obtaining a warrant against Page.

Visible portions of the documents show the FBI

telling the court that Page "has been collaborating and conspiring with the Russian government." The agency also told the court that "the FBI believes Page has been the subject of targeted recruitment by the Russian government."

Trump's tweets landed as he continues to try to reassure the country that he accepts that longtime foe Russia interfered in the 2016 election, despite his public undermining of U.S. intelligence agencies in Helsinki while standing alongside Russian President Vladimir Putin.

"So President Obama knew about Russia before the Election," Trump tweeted late Sunday. "Why didn't he do something about it? Why didn't he tell our campaign? Because it is all a big hoax, that's why, and he thought

Crooked Hillary was going to win!!!"

White House press secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders said Monday that Trump was "obviously" referring to allegations of collusion between his presidential campaign and Russian agents.

U.S. intelligence agencies unanimously concurred that Russia interfered in the 2016 campaign. Trump only reluctantly accepted their assessment amid the firestorm of last week's reaction to his comments at a summit news conference with Putin.

"Obviously the president is talking about the collusion with his campaign," Sanders said. "He's been very clear that there wasn't any. I think he's said it about 1,000 times."

The letter, from Liberty's attorney Richard Mast to the fitness company's CEO Chris Rondeau, said the gym revoked her membership after telling management she was "intimidated and alarmed" when Jordan "Ivy" Rice invaded her privacy on May 29.

In an email to the Daily Commercial Monday, the company said: "Planet Fitness is committed to creating a non-intimidating, welcoming environment for all of our members and their safety and privacy is our top priority.

"Under our gender identity non-discrimination policy, members and guests may use all gym facilities based on their sincere self-reported gender identity. Furthermore, all of our locker rooms include private changing areas for those that seek additional privacy. As this is pending litigation we are unable

to comment further."

No lawsuit has been filed, and Liberty has given the fitness company until Aug. 10 to respond to the complaint.

"This is not the only incident with Mr. Rice known to Planet Fitness," Mast noted in his letter. "Another woman reported that he exposed his naked body to her in the women's locker room at this location. In another instance, he was involved in an argument with another woman over use of the tanning room. Misogynist, anti-woman harassment should have no place in Planet Fitness locations, and it violates Florida Law."

Biological gender is a protected class under Florida law, Mast told the Daily Commercial in a phone interview. Women are especially vulnerable to sexual attacks. "You don't see females claiming to be males in these cases," Mast said.

Mast said Mrs. H is also the victim of a past rape attempt.

Mast said she found Rice standing before a mirror and putting on

makeup in the women's locker room.

"She thought at first that he had just made a mistake," Mast said.

"She was disturbed by his presence, politely confronted him and asked him to leave the women's locker room," he said in his letter. "Instead, he smirked back at her, and continued to stare at her, remaining standing in front of the mirror 'applying makeup,' where he had a full view of every single woman entering or exiting the shower area and every single locker."

She left to continue her workout, and when she returned an hour later, he was still standing in front of the mirror.

Rice, who could not be located for comment, called 911 to request that police come to the gym on 735 N. 14th St. in Leesburg so he could file a sexual harassment complaint against Mrs. H. No police report was filed.

Mast noted in his letter that Rice was allowed to move his membership to another gym, while Mrs. H's was canceled.

He claims in his letter

that management did not talk to Mrs. H to get her side of the story. Instead, they mailed her a cancellation letter accusing her of violating the gym's "Lunk" policy. That policy prohibits members from grunting, dropping weights and "judging."

It is not judging to complain about a man in the women's locker room, Mast said.

Even if she had violated the "Lunk" policy somehow, members are to be given warnings before a third offense results in the revoking of a membership, he noted.

Actually, Mrs. H. said it was Rice who violated gym rules by wearing flip-flops on a treadmill, Mast said.

Mast also believes that he has a strong consumer complaint case against the company.

Nowhere does it state in members' contracts that men will be allowed in women's locker rooms, he said. "In fact, they should put it in big bold letters on the wall."

"If that is the policy, Planet Fitness will have a big drop in memberships," Mast said.

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Senate confirms Wilkie for Veterans Affairs secretary

WASHINGTON — The Senate on Monday confirmed Pentagon official Robert Wilkie to be secretary of Veterans Affairs, charged with delivering on President Donald Trump's campaign promises to fire bad VA employees and steer more patients to the private sector.

Wilkie won approval on a bipartisan vote of 86-9, securing the backing of many Democrats after insisting at his confirmation hearing that he will not privatize the government's second-largest department. It was a moment of respite from the sharp political divisions engulfing Trump's other nominees in the final months before congressional midterm elections.

Wilkie is Trump's third pick for the job in 18 months. The longtime public official says he will "shake up complacency" at VA, which has struggled with long waits in providing medical treatment to millions of veterans.

Trump selected Wilkie for the post in May after firing his first VA secretary, David Shulkin, amid ethics charges and internal rebellion at the department over the role of private care for veterans. Trump's initial replacement choice, White House doctor Ronny Jackson, withdrew after allegations of workplace misconduct surfaced.

Wilkie, a former assistant secretary of defense under President George W. Bush, has received mostly positive reviews from veterans' groups for

his management experience, but the extent of his willingness to expand private care as an alternative to government-run VA care remains largely unknown.

Trump last year pledged he would triple the number of veterans "seeing the doctor of their choice." Currently more than 30 percent of VA appointments are made in the private sector.

Under repeated questioning at his hearing, the Air Force and Navy veteran said he opposed privatizing the agency of 360,000 employees and would make sure VA health care is "fully funded." When pressed by Sen. Jon Tester, the top Democrat on the panel, if he would be willing to disagree with Trump, Wilkie responded "yes."

"I have been privileged to work for some of the most high-powered people in this town," said Wilkie, currently a Pentagon undersecretary for Defense Secretary Jim Mattis. "They pay me for their opinions, and I give those to them."

Wilkie's main task in

the coming months will be carrying out a newly signed law to ease access to private health providers. That law gives the VA secretary wide authority to decide when veterans can bypass the VA, based on whether they receive "quality" care, but the program could face escalating costs.

Some Democrats have warned the VA won't be able to handle a growing price tag, putting it at risk of budget shortfalls next year. Major veterans' groups want full funding for core VA medical centers, which they see as best-suited to veterans' specialized needs such as treatment for post-traumatic stress.

As VA secretary, Wilkie also will have more power under a new accountability law to fire VA employees. Lawmakers from both parties have recently raised questions about the law's implementation, including how whistleblower complaints are handled and whether the law is being disproportionately used against rank-and-file employees rather than senior managers who set policy.

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

Fiat Chrysler is shaken without visionary CEO behind wheel

MILAN — Fiat Chrysler shares were volatile Monday as investors expressed worry about the exit of ailing CEO Sergio Marchionne, whose driven and creative management style has been the company's fortune.

Shares in the Italian-American carmaker closed down 1.5 percent after a harder 4 percent opening tumble in the first trading since Marchionne's grave health condition was disclosed over the weekend.

Trading was volatile, particularly after news that the head of the company's big European operations, who had been considered one of Marchionne's potential successors, was

quitting. Ferrari, where Marchionne was also replaced at the helm, closed down about 5 percent.

The Fiat Chrysler board on Saturday named long-time Jeep executive Mike Manley as CEO, unexpectedly accelerating a transition that was planned for early next year. The company said the 66-year-old Marchionne suffered complications from shoulder surgery in Zurich, Switzerland, last month that worsened in recent days, and that he could not resume his duties. No other details were released.

Marchionne will be a hard act to follow. Analysts credit his industry vision and ability to strike deals and take risks for increasing the market value of Fiat by tenfold since he took over in 2004. And while he was due to retire in 2019, most expected him to stay on in some role to guide the company.

"Some of us assumed he'd remain as chairman and be there to phone in his instructions," said Max Warburton, an analyst at market research firm Bernstein who often publicly tussled with Marchionne on conference calls about the company's earnings.

"Marchionne ran FCA in a command and control style, with constant firefighting measures. There is no operating manual to follow," he said.

Marchionne engineered both the turnarounds of Italian carmaker Fiat and Chrysler, which Fiat acquired in 2009 in a deal with the U.S. government, creating the world's seventh-largest carmaker out of two formerly dysfunctional entities. He created shareholder value for the Fiat-founding Agnelli family with successful spinoffs of Fiat's heavy vehicle maker CNH Industrial and of the iconic Ferrari super sports

car company. But his goal of another big merger failed to find any takers.

Marchionne proved himself a consummate deal-maker. He won control of Chrysler in a 2009 deal with U.S. President Barack Obama's government without putting a penny down, only in exchange for bringing more small-car technology to Chrysler.

In May of 2011, less than two years after leaving bankruptcy, Marchionne pulled off a huge refinancing of the company's \$7.5 billion loan from the U.S. government, retiring it with a combination of corporate bonds, loans and payments, even though Chrysler had not yet turned an annual profit. Some of the debt carried at 12 percent interest rate and cost the company \$1.2 billion in interest per year. The maneuver helped the company to start making money again.

Last friend standing

How to form new friendships as you age

Donn Trenner, 91, estimates that two-thirds of his friends are dead.

"That's a hard one for me," he said. "I've lost a lot of people."

As baby boomers age, more and more folks will reach their 80s, 90s and beyond. They will not only lose friends but face the daunting task of making new friends at an advanced age.

Friendship in old age plays a critical role in health and well-being, according to recent findings from the Stanford Center on Longevity's Sightlines Project. Socially isolated individuals face health risks comparable to those of smokers, and their mortality risk is twice that of obese individuals, the study notes.

Baby boomers are more disengaged with their neighbors and even their loved ones than any other generation, said Dr. Laura Carstensen, who is director of the Stanford Center on Longevity and herself a boomer, in her 60s. "If we're disengaged, it's going to be harder to make new friends," she said.

Trenner knows how that feels. In 2017, right before New Year's, he tried to reach his longtime friend Rose Marie, former actress and co-star on the 1960s sitcom "The Dick Van Dyke Show." Trenner traveled with Rose Marie as a pianist and arranger doing shows at senior centers along the Florida coast more than four decades ago.

"When we were performing, you could hear all the hearing aids screaming in the audience," he joked.

The news that she'd died shook him to the core.

Although she was a friend who, he said, cannot be replaced, neither her passing nor the deaths of dozens of his other friends and associates will stop Trenner from making new friends.

That's one reason he still plays, on Monday nights, with the Hartford Jazz Orchestra at the Arch Street Tavern in

Hartford, Connecticut.

For the past 19 years, he's been the orchestra's pianist and musical conductor. Often, at least one or two members of the 17-piece orchestra can't make it to the gig but must arrange for someone to stand in for them. As a result, Trenner said, he not only has regular contact with longtime friends but keeps meeting and making friends with new musicians — most of whom are under 50.

Twice divorced, he also remains good friends with both of his former wives. And not too long ago, Trenner flew to San Diego to visit his best friend, also a musician, who was celebrating his 90th birthday. They've known each other since they met at age 18 in the United States Army Air Corps. They still speak almost daily.

"Friendship is not be taken for granted," said Trenner. "You have to invest in friendship."

Even in your 90s, the notion of being a sole

survivor can seem surprising.

Perhaps that's why 91-year-old Lucille Simmons of Lakeland, Fla., halts, midsentence, as she traces the multiple losses of friends and family members. She has not only lost her two closest friends, but a granddaughter, a daughter and her husband of 68 years. Although her husband came from a large family of 13 children, his siblings have mostly all vanished.

"There's only one living sibling — and I'm having dinner with him tonight," said Simmons.

Five years ago, Simmons left her native Hamilton, Ohio, to move in with her son and his wife, in a gated, 55-and-over community midway between Tampa and Orlando. She had to learn how to make friends all over again. Raised as an only child, she said, she was up to the task.

Simmons takes classes and plays games at her community. She also putters around her community on a golf cart (which she won in a raffle) inviting folks to ride along with her.

For his part, Trenner doesn't need a golf cart.

His personal formula for making friends is music, laughter and staying active. He makes friends whether he's performing or attending music events or teaching.

Simmons has her own formula. It's a roughly 50-50 split of spending quality time with relatives (whom she regards as friends) and

non-family friends. The odds are with her. This, after all, is a woman who spent 30 years as the official registrar of vital statistics for Hamilton. In that job, she was responsible for recording every birth — and every death — in the city.

Experts say they're both doing the right thing by not only remaining open to new friendships but constantly creating new ways to seek them out — even at an advanced age.

Genuine friendships at any age typically require repeated contact, said Dr. Andrea Bonior, author of "The Friendship Fix: The Complete Guide to Choosing, Losing and Keeping Up with Your Friends." She advises older folks to join group exercise classes or knitting or book clubs.

She also suggests that seniors get involved in "altruistic behavior" like volunteering in a soup kitchen or an animal shelter or tutoring English as a second language.

"Friendships don't happen in a vacuum," she said. "You don't meet someone at Starbucks and suddenly become best friends."

Bonior recommends that seniors embrace social media. These social media connections can help older people strike up new friendships with nieces, nephews and even grandchildren, said Alan Wolfelt, an author, educator and founder of the Center for Loss and Life Transition.

Hurdler stretch good for hips and lower back

No matter the physical activity, stretching and warming up is imperative to your performance. The intensity of the activity will depend on how in-depth your pre-stretching and post-stretching will be. And always remember, stretching doesn't have to be connected to physical activity or intense fitness. It can simply be a way to wake up, preparing your body for the day, or taking a few moments for yourself and giving your body a stress release.

Our move today is a hurdler stretch. This move will be stretching your hips, hamstrings, inner thighs and your lower back. All you will need is a flat surface and a yoga mat.

Begin this move by sitting and positioning one leg in front of your body, bending your knee in a 90-degree angle, pointing

the foot inward while the knee is placed outward. Take the other leg to your backside and position it opposite of the front leg, bending in the knee and placing your weight on the inner thigh. Imagine watching an Olympic hurdler's body position as they cross over the hurdle.

Once you find your proper

positioning, proceed to lean forward into a fold over the front leg. Go as far as you can and hold this stance until you feel a good release in the hips, hamstrings, and lower back. Shoot for at least a 10 count, or even a 30 second hold would be substantial. Release, and repeat on the opposite side.

You may notice one side

is always more comfortable than the other, as we tend to use one side of our body more than the other.

This stretch is good for lower-body workouts and for runners as well.

So even when you're taking a small break in your day to watch a little TV, this stretch is a great viewing position.

Hidden money is cancer on democracy

The Internal Revenue Service is not the Federal Election Commission. That should be obvious, but the tax agency has been embroiled in debate in recent years over regulating the cash that is flowing into tax-exempt social-welfare groups that engage in political activity.

The IRS got into hot water a few years ago when it attempted to scrutinize conservative and tea party groups over this. Now, the IRS is throwing up its hands, saying it will no longer collect information on the identity of donors to such groups. The river of dark money in American politics just got darker and wider.

At issue are social-welfare groups under section 501(c)4 of the tax code. The social-welfare exemption was originally designed for groups operated, as the law said, “exclusively for the promotion of social welfare.” In 1959, regulators declared that the groups had to be “primarily” engaged in social welfare but could conduct some politics.

The threshold was defined in recent years as no more than 49 percent of spending for political activity. The logic was that groups such as renters’ associations or firefighter units could be allowed to do some politicking while not giving up their central social welfare purpose.

Until now, the 501(c)4 groups did have to identify to the IRS those who donated more than \$5,000, but the donors were not disclosed to the public, making these groups an increasingly attractive vehicle for channeling hidden money to campaigns. By contrast, donations to political action committees,

regulated by the FEC, must be disclosed. The social-welfare groups became a vehicle for dark money in politics in a way that was not originally intended.

But the IRS clearly had no stomach for this fight, which caused it so much grief during the tea party scandal. The Treasury Department announced on July 16 that the tax agency would no longer ask for donor identities from these groups and some others. (The disclosure rules for a different type of charity, 501(c)3 organizations, are set in law and will not change.)

The IRS said it didn’t need the donor identity information and that not collecting it would save budget funds. That may be true, but it also moves the country still further down the road toward a murky politics influenced by dark money.

Perhaps it was too much to expect the IRS to be the lone government cop on this beat. But that should not mean giving up. Ideally, Congress ought to step in and clarify the law to require full disclosure for all money going into politics, including cash being pumped into the battle over a Supreme Court appointment. But the reality is that Congress benefits from the dark-money tide and has failed to act on bills that would boost transparency, such as the Disclose Act.


Hidden caches of money are just the first half of corruption. The second half comes when politicians do the bidding of the secret fat cats and vested interests. Both are a cancer on democracy that ought to be excised.

After Ortega's crackdown, Nicaragua is in a tailspin

Nicaragua is taking a dangerous turn toward civil war. Since protests and riots began three months ago, Nicaraguan soldiers, police and paramilitary groups have killed more than 280 people and injured 1,800 others.

The demonstrations were sparked in April by changes to the country’s Social Security system and the government’s slow and inadequate response to a large fire in the Indio Maiz biological reserve. Protesters are now demanding that President Daniel Ortega resign. Rather than negotiate, Ortega has cracked down further. Police and paramilitary forces killed 31 civilians on Sunday and violently retook the Monimbo neighborhood in the city of Masaya this week.

As grim as the situation is, it could be much worse. Nicaragua is not a heavily armed society. It has one of the lowest rates of guns per capita in the world and one of the lowest homicide rates in the Americas. In fact, compared to its Central American neighbors, Nicaragua has been a relatively safe haven for decades.

It’s partly because Nicaragua enjoyed peaceful conditions that its citizens are suddenly up in arms. Although there were signs of corruption within the Ortega government as it sought to weaken democratic institutions, Nicaraguans were mostly willing to look away — until they weren’t.

There are at least three

reasons why Nicaragua has remained relatively peaceful compared with most of its Central American neighbors.

First, it does not have the kind of gang culture you find in the so-called Northern Triangle countries of El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras. The gangs that do exist in Nicaragua — there are at least 100, spread across the country’s urban areas — are not nearly as violent as the maras and pandillas next door. Most of those more violent gangs originated in Los Angeles. Many members of MS-13 and Barrio 18, for instance, are children of refugees who had fled civil wars in the 1970s and 1980s and were deported back to Guatemala City, San Salvador or Tegucigalpa. By contrast, Nicaragua’s street gangs tend to be homegrown.

Perhaps more important, the Nicaraguan government largely avoided the mano dura anticrime policies so common in the Northern Triangle countries. It placed a much greater emphasis on crime prevention, police reform, community policing, alternative sentencing and social welfare programs. The results were startlingly effective.

Nicaragua also invested heavily in a wide range of economic development programs to address the underlying causes of criminal violence, with a particular focus on reducing poverty, inequality and social exclusion. Nicaragua’s approach was fundamentally different from the strategies applied

in the Northern Triangle.

Many of these progressive policies began to change in 2007, the year after Ortega was re-elected.

By 2017, Nicaraguans’ unusually high trust in their state security forces had started to deteriorate. Police and parapolice detained demonstrators during protests over local elections last November in which Ortega’s Sandinista party won 135 of 153 seats. Armed forces killed six protesters.

That smaller outbreak of violence fueled a suspicion that Ortega’s government may have ties to drug trafficking groups. There are long-standing allegations that Ortega’s campaigns were financed partly by the drug trade. The claims go back to the 1980s, when Ortega was accused of colluding with the kingpin Pablo Escobar.

Still, more than 70 percent of Nicaraguans said they approved of their government in 2017.

This has changed dramatically since April. Ortega’s latest crackdown laid bare his determination to hold onto power at any cost and shocked many citizens into resistance. As Nicaragua’s relative prosperity and stability collapses, fewer Nicaraguans will be willing to look the other way.

How to tell if a president's words are treasonous

John Brennan, former director of the Central Intelligence Agency, tweeted as follows:

“Donald Trump’s press conference performance in Helsinki rises to & exceeds the threshold of “high crimes & misdemeanors.” It was nothing short of treasonous.”

Tweets should not be expected to capture the nuances of constitutional law. But a lot of people have been reacting along Brennan’s lines. It’s important to put his comment in context. As it turns out, it contains a major mistake — but it also raises a legitimate question.

The Constitution states, “Treason against the United States, shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort.” That is an exceedingly narrow definition. “Enemies” are nations with whom we are at war

(whether declared or open).

The United States is not at war with Russia. People who are alarmed by President Trump’s statements in Helsinki are of course entitled to use the word “treasonous” in the colloquial sense — but not in the constitutional sense.

The Constitution allows the president to be impeached and removed from office for “Treason, Bribery, or other high Crimes and Misdemeanors.” As the debates during the founding era make clear, egregious misconduct can count as a “high Crime and Misdemeanor” — even if it is not a violation of the criminal law.

During the constitutional convention, James Madison saw impeachment as a provision “for defending the Community agst. the incapacity, negligence or perfidy of the chief Magistrate.” He added that the president “might pervert his administration into a scheme of speculation or

oppression. He might betray his trust to foreign powers.” It was clear that Madison believed these to be sufficient grounds for impeachment.

Gouverneur Morris, who originally opposed the idea of impeachment, added that the president should “be impeachable for treachery” (a broader concept than treason). He added, “Corrupting his electors, and incapacity were other causes of impeachment.” His crucial, soaring words: “The people are the King.”

Also at the convention, Edmund Randolph summarized the grounds for the impeachment clause: “The Executive will have great opportunity of abusing his power.”

In *The Federalist*, Alexander Hamilton similarly referred to “the abuse or violation of some public trust.” He argued that high crimes and misdemeanors “are of a nature which may with

peculiar propriety be denominated POLITICAL, as they relate chiefly to injuries done immediately to society itself.”

Importantly, the founding generation did not want impeachment to be a partisan affair, or a means of undoing the outcome of an election. They recognized the gravity of any effort to remove a sitting president. Consistent with their goals, we do well to adopt a firm principle of neutrality.

For those who think, with Brennan, that impeachment is worth contemplating, it is necessary to ask: Would you think the same thing, if you agreed with the president on matters of policy, and thought that he was doing a wonderful job?

For those who think that the very idea of impeachment is ridiculous, it is necessary to ask: Would you think the same thing, if you did not vote for the president, and

thought that he was driving the nation into a ditch?

It is not easy to argue that a performance at a press conference, standing by itself, can be counted as a high crime or misdemeanor in the constitutional sense. But Brennan was right to be alarmed by Trump’s shifting, ambivalent reactions to the findings of his own intelligence community; by his apparent deference to Vladimir Putin; by his obvious reluctance to condemn foreign interference in American elections by Russia.

It may not yet count as “perfidy” — but it’s gotten uncomfortably close to that neighborhood.



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Lochte banned until July 2019

US swimming star suspended over use of IV

FORT LAUDERDALE — Ryan Lochte posted a photo for the world to see, and the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency noticed.

It got him suspended — again.

The longtime U.S. swimming star has been banned from competition until July 2019, which means the 12-time Olympic medalist cannot compete as planned in the national championships that start this week in California. Lochte, a former University of Florida swimmer, will also be ineligible

for other top meets, including the Pan Pacific Championships later this year and next year's world championships.

He did not take a banned substance. But he got an intravenous injection of vitamins in May — a method typically banned under anti-doping rules. The 14-month ban, retroactive to May 24 and announced Monday by USADA, is his second in less than two years following his 10-month suspension for his behavior during a drunken incident that created widespread scorn at the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Olympics.

"A rule is a rule and I accept that there is a technical violation," Lochte said. "I am hopeful that other athletes learn from my mistake."

Lochte said he took the IV because both his wife and his son were ill, and that he didn't want to get sick as well. He said the IV contained mostly B-complex vitamins, products that he said could be purchased at any pharmacy.

But the issue was the amount — it exceeded 100 milliliters, and that's the rule he broke.

"It's crazy to think about," Lochte said. "I was back in top shape, I've been training every day, and now this."

In Brazil, there were questions about his version of what happened.

This time, he revealed what happened — obviously unaware of the ramifications it would bring.

5 storylines entering camp for Jags

JACKSONVILLE — Before the Jaguars hold their first training camp practice Thursday, the Florida Times-Union examines five burning questions with a beat writer's roundtable.

From expectations surrounding quarterback Blake Bortles to position battles worth monitoring, John Reid and Phillip Heilman offer their takes.

1. Bortles is healthy, signed to a new contract and coming off a turnover-free playoff run. What will represent a successful preseason for the Jaguars' fifth-year quarterback?

PH: Is it too soon to make a joke about avoiding five interceptions in one practice? In all seriousness, how Bortles performs in Minnesota will be a talker. The Jaguars have two days of joint practices with the Vikings prior to their second preseason game, giving Bortles ample opportunity to establish a rhythm while going against one of the NFL's best passing defenses. Last year, the Vikings were second to the Jaguars in passing yards allowed per game. In terms of actual game action, Bortles attempted just 34 passes last preseason, and

that number isn't likely to increase. Leading the offense effectively those two days in Minnesota will be the best indication of the offense is in good shape entering Week 1 at the New York Giants.

JR: From Day 1 of training camp to the two days of joint practices with the Vikings next month, success for Bortles is showing that he has command of the offense and is accurate on the majority of his throws. He must make strides to be a consistent performer each day — avoid turnovers. Bortles didn't perform that way during last season's training camp and his five-interception effort during the first day in pads impacted his confidence for the remainder of training camp. But it didn't linger into the regular season as Bortles ended with 21 touchdowns and a career-low 13 interceptions in leading the Jaguars to the AFC title game. I think Bortles is on his way to having his most productive season in his career in 2018.

2. Which rookie — drafted or undrafted — are you most looking forward to seeing when pads go on?


JR: The Jaguars don't have a No. 1 wide receiver but they

Not even Tim Tebow can escape bad luck when it comes to player injuries within the New York Mets organization.

The 30-year-old former Florida Heisman Trophy winning quarterback is out for the rest of the baseball season after breaking the hamate bone in his right hand while swinging a bat over the weekend. Tebow is set for hand surgery today and likely done for the season, dashing his hopes of playing in the majors this year.

"So his season is effectively over," Ricco said. Tebow had been hitting well lately for the Rumble Ponies during his second full season in the minors. "I view this as nothing but a positive," Ricco said of Tebow's progress. "He's made great strides."

Last year, Tebow hit .226 with eight homers and 52 RBIs in 126 games at two levels of Class A.

Troy Merritt wins rain-delayed Barbasol, gains spot in PGA

NICHOLASVILLE, Ky. — Troy Merritt briefly wondered about trying another line of work as time passed following his initial PGA Tour victory more than three years ago.

He can now look forward to two more years as a professional and participation in next month's PGA Championship after clutch putting earned him his second trophy.

Merritt shot a 5-under 67 on Monday to win the rain-delayed Barbasol Championship by one stroke. He led or shared the lead after each round. His second career PGA Tour victory came with a spot in the PGA Championship at Bellerive in St. Louis.

A pretty nice payoff for renewed dedication that helped him keep his tour card after struggling

to follow up his 2015 Quicken Loans National victory.

"You always ask yourself, is this the time to move on?" said Merritt, who earned \$630,000 and 300 FedEx Cup points with the victory. He also is exempt through the 2019-20 season.

"To get a win like this late in the season and move up to No. 65 on the points list and secure a job for two more years, it's a pretty good feeling." The win highlights a good run for Merritt, who is 34-under par in his last seven rounds dating back to the second round of last week's John Deere Classic. He tied for 43rd.

Merritt was one of four players tied for the lead at 18 under when the round at Barbasol began. He made five birdies and had an eagle on the par-4 eighth hole, to stay in contention.

hope their entire group will provide the same type of play-making. Rookie DJ Chark has the potential to make a big impact because of his speed and ability to separate. It will be interesting to see how the Jaguars take advantage of his versatility. During the offseason program, he worked at the outside wide receiver spot and slot receiver. Early in the season, Chark's biggest contribution could be on special teams as a punt and kickoff returner.

PH: Is it lame to go with the first-round pick here? I was skeptical of the Jaguars selecting Taven Bryan and bypassing a possible upgrade along the offensive line or getting a play-making tight end in April, but he is winning me over. Bryan is a big man (6-7/290) with a big personality, which has been refreshing. Things I'll be looking for: How explosive is Bryan's first step

when pads are worn? How comfortable does he look at the "big" end spot? How much work does he get inside? Did his nasty turf burn from the offseason program finally heal? There's a lot to watch with him.

3. Doug Marrone led the Jaguars to a 10-6 record during his first season as coach. What will be his biggest challenge in Year 2?

PH: Managing injuries. The Jaguars were remarkably healthy last season, particularly on the defensive side of the ball. Telvin Smith (concussion) missed two games, and Abry Jones (back) was out for one. No other starter missed a game. Could the Jaguars be that fortunate again this season? Sure. Is it likely to happen? No. A few positions I would be especially concerned about if the starter goes down: quarterback (obviously), running back, cornerback and edge rusher.

JR: Overconfidence among players. Willing to bet Marrone's top focus during the first couple of days of camp will re-emphasizing that last season is over and it's all about what's ahead. But

this team has players like defensive tackle Malik Jackson, who boasted last week that they're going to have a 16-0 season. Until last season when they fared 12-7, the Jaguars hadn't posted a winning season since making the playoffs in 2007. Despite reaching the AFC title game for the first time in 18 years, they will need to be better to return. They also need to remain the cohesive group that never got caught up in the moment, but worked weekly to make more progress.

4. Paul Posluszny's retirement led to a shuffling at the linebacker position and an opening at the strong side next to Myles Jack and Telvin Smith. Who should be the Week 1 starter?

JR: I'm convinced Donald Payne is a special player — just needs the opportunity to show it. He's the only player in the NFL from Stetson, which doesn't offer football scholarships. Until last season, Payne had never played linebacker. He was a three-time All-American at safety for Stetson. Yet, as an undrafted free agent in 2017, Payne was one of the

Ravens' final cuts after signing him to play linebacker. After his release, the Jaguars signed Payne, who ended last season with the third-most special teams tackles in the NFL with 13. Now, there's open competition at strong-side linebacker and Payne's strength is stopping the run. In a close battle with Blair Brown and rookie Leon Jacobs, Payne is going to win the job.

PH: I'll go with Leon Jacobs. Sure, it's a risk to depend on a seventh-round rookie, but the 6-foot-2, 245-pound Wisconsin product has experience playing the position in college and plenty of raw tools. If Jacobs can handle being on the field roughly 30-40 percent of the time when the Jaguars are in their base defense, it would allow them to keep Blair Brown as a backup at the other two linebacker spots, developing impressive depth in the middle of their defense. Chalk this up as a darkhorse pick, but I'm interested to see if Jacobs can pick up the defense quickly enough to take advantage of the opportunity.

• Jon Gray, Rockies. Gray may be baseball's biggest enigma at the moment. He's averaging 11.33 strikeouts per nine innings, the second-best mark in the National League, but he's just 8-7 with a 5.44 ERA. A .381 batting average on balls in play is a major culprit in his struggles, so he could be a good bet to turn things around, but the Rockies were sufficiently concerned that they sent him down to the minors briefly before the break. After returning, he pitched impressively into the eighth inning against Seattle on July 14.

Colorado made the postseason last year and is currently just two games behind the NL West-leading Dodgers, so if Gray pitches well down the stretch, the Rockies could remain in the mix again.

• Nick Pivetta and Vince Velasquez, Phillies. The rest of the NL East better hope these two don't hit their stride any time soon. They've both struck out nearly as many hitters as staff ace Aaron Nola, despite significantly fewer innings. But consistency has been elusive. Pivetta has been strong with the exception of two awful starts against the Nationals in which he allowed a total of 13 runs in 2 2/3 innings. Velasquez gave up 10 runs against Milwaukee on June 8 but has held opponents to two or fewer in five of his six starts since then.

Lochte's violation essentially came to light when he posted the photo of him getting the IV on his social media accounts. That triggered the USADA investigation, one that Lochte "fully cooperated" with according to U.S. officials.

"Lochte received an intravenous infusion of permitted substances at an infusion clinic," the USADA announcement of the suspension said. Under most circumstances, athletes cannot receive IVs unless related to a hospitalization or when allowed under the terms of a USADA-approved exemption — and Lochte fell into neither of those categories.

Suspensions for use of an IV are extremely rare: The USADA database shows only two other athletes being sanctioned for using such a method, one of them getting a six-month suspension and the other a 14-month ban. That same database shows that before Monday, no other U.S. swimmer in the last 10 years, for any reason including actual positive tests, had been suspended for more than one year by USADA.

This week could have been a significant step forward for Lochte, who was entered in four events at the U.S. championships at Irvine, California, and was preparing to compete in what would have been his biggest competition since the Rio Games. Lochte said that he and three other U.S. Olympic swimmers there were robbed at gunpoint at a gas station, a story that quickly unraveled.

The investigation in Brazil is continuing, and Lochte said it's "concerning" to him that a court there recently decided that he could still face prosecution for filing a false report.

Lochte was not only suspended 10 months for that debacle, but also forfeited \$100,000 in Olympic medal bonus money and was banned from competing in last year's national and world championships.

But the bigger hit was to his reputation, one that was less than pristine to begin with.

And now, he's back in hot water. USADA agreed to start the 14-month clock on May 24, the day that he posted the photo that no longer can be found on his Instagram page. He has previously said that he wants to compete in the 2020 Tokyo Olympics, though those hopes would seem to be in at least some doubt now.

Lochte spent much of his career portraying a party-boy image, while his wildly successful exploits in the pool — six Olympic golds, 36 world championship gold medals, no fewer than four world records — were always overshadowed by 28-time Olympic medalist and 23-time Olympic champion Michael Phelps.

After Rio, Lochte was dropped by at least four major sponsors including Speedo USA and Ralph Lauren, though he has added some endorsement deals since. He was also apparently targeted by two men wearing T-shirts bearing an anti-Lochte message who rushed the stage while he was competing on ABC's "Dancing with the Stars."

Lochte returned to competition last year, most notably winning the 200-meter individual medley at the U.S. Open. He also has become a father and a husband since Rio — he married former Playboy model Kayla Rae Reid in January, seven months after their son was born.

Lochte will turn 36 during the Tokyo Games. He won gold medals at the 2004, 2008, 2012 and 2016 games, and if he found a way to win another in Tokyo he would become the oldest Olympic swimming champion.

"I have goals that I want to accomplish in 2020," Lochte said. "If anything this is going to add more fuel to my fire."

"This was my dream ever since I was a 5-year-old playing soccer in San Jose, Costa Rica," Campos said recently on mvasports.com. "I know for sure that if it wasn't for SIMA and Montverde Academy, I would not be where I am right now as the coaches there always pushed me to become better each day. It is the same at the professional level and I am used to it, which helps me develop more as a player."

With the Eagles, Campos fashioned a stellar career while helping Montverde Academy become, arguably, the top high school program in the country.

Campos led Montverde Academy to back-to-back national championships and a No. 1 national ranking in his two seasons with the program. He scored 25 goals as a junior and 37 as a senior and was named Most Valuable Player in 2014 of the prestigious Montverde Academy Soccer Tournament.

His play with the Eagles was impressive enough to earn a scholarship to Clemson University, where he scored 23 goals in four seasons. At Clemson, Campos played more than 5,600 minutes and was the Tigers' Offensive Player of the Year as a junior and senior.

After graduating from Clemson in 2017, Campos played for SIMA Aguilas in the Premier Development League, a development soccer league sponsored by United Soccer Leagues. During his stint with the Aguilas, Campos scored six goals and dished out four assists in eight games.

Headquartered in Tampa, the PDL is considered by many to be the fourth tier of U.S. soccer competition, behind international play, the MLS and the USL.

SIMA is an elite level soccer specific training program at Montverde Academy. Student athletes registered with SIMA must complete their full academic workload in the classroom at Montverde Academy each day before taking part in athletic specific training in the afternoons and evenings.

Montverde Academy boys soccer coach Mike Potempa, who has led the Eagles to an unbeaten record every year since taking over in 2010, is the general manager and co-founder of SIMA.

"I'm not surprised at the success Diego has had since he graduated from Montverde Academy," Potempa said. "I knew he had the ability — the natural talent — to play. He wasn't mentally prepared to be a professional when he came to Montverde, but he eventually developed the right mentality. Since only eight international players are usually permitted on an MLS roster, they often go to highly experienced international players."

"It says a lot about Diego to get one of those coveted roster spots."

Campos is the latest Montverde Academy and SIMA grad to earn spots on various MLS rosters since 2013. Others in that span included Matheus Silva (San Jose), Deybi Flores (Vancouver), Hassan Ndam (New York), Monday Bassem Etim (LAFC), along with a trio who have seen time with Orlando City — Moussa Orlando, Albert Dikwa, and Youmeni Gildas.

All told, 26 former Montverde Academy student athletes have played professionally in the MLS, USL or in various leagues around the world.



A defender can't always sit back and play safe. Passive defense may be best on most hands, but certainly not on all of them.

Consider this deal where South got to three notrump as shown. East won the heart lead at trick one and continued with a heart to South's king.

Declarer led the diamond ten, ducked by East, and another diamond drove out the ace. South won the heart continuation with the queen, crossed to the ace of clubs and then cashed five diamonds, finishing with

11 tricks in all.

Although declarer appears to have had tricks to spare, the plain fact is that East slipped at the crucial moment. Had he defended more accurately, South would not even have made nine tricks.

After taking the heart ace at trick one, East should realize that three notrump cannot be defeated if declarer is allowed to utilize dummy's diamonds. South is marked with the K-Q of hearts by the play to the first trick, and these two tricks, added to six diamonds and a club, come to a total of nine. Furthermore, declarer is sure to have additional high-card strength in spades for his opening bid.

East's only chance, therefore, is to try to stop South from capitalizing on dummy's long suit. Accordingly, he should return the king of clubs at trick two!

Although this makes declarer's queen a trick, the overall effect is devastating. South can take East's king or duck it (if he ducks, East just gives him more of the same medicine), but he can no longer come to nine tricks.

After East refuses to take the first diamond lead, declarer can try to establish his spades, but when the suit fails to divide 3-3, he is kaput. In fact, with best defense, he cannot avoid going down two!
