Trump sends troops to border to stop caravan

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration is planning to dispatch 800 or more active duty troops to the southern border at the direction of a president who has sought to transform fears about immigration into electoral gains in the midterms

as a caravan of thousands of migrants makes its way through Mexico.

Defense Secretary Jim Mattis is expected to sign an order sending the troops to the border, bolstering National Guard forces there, a U.S. official said Thursday. The action comes as President Donald Trump has spent recent days calling attention to the migrant

caravan slowly making its way by foot from Central America into southern Mexico, claiming without any apparent basis in fact that "Middle Easterners" were among them.

The additional troops would provide logistical and other support to the Border Patrol, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss a plan that

had not yet been finalized and formally announced.

Trump tweeted earlier Thursday that "Democrat inspired laws make it tough for us to stop people at the border" and that he was using the military for what he called a "National Emergency." He vowed, "They will be stopped!" in apparent

Packages treated as 'live devices,' not hoax

WASHINGTON — Investigators probing crude pipe bombs sent to prominent critics of President Donald Trump are trying to determine whether the devices were intended to detonate or simply to sow fear, law enforcement officials told The Associated Press Thursday.

The officials said the devices were not rigged like a booby-trapped package bomb that would explode upon opening. They had timers and batteries but never went off. Law enforcement officials were still uncertain whether the devices were poorly designed or never intended to cause physical harm. The officials spoke on condition

Trust's offer to help may save Mount Dora church's bell tower

MOUNT DORA — People are rallying around not just the oldest church, but the oldest building in town in hopes of saving its bell tower.

Pastor Gary Marshall said efforts to raise the \$43,000 the 130-year-old Congregational Church of Mount Dora needs has been ongoing for about 20 years.

Church and community members have raised \$9,000 toward the bell tower's repair and restoration on their own and by way of a gofundme account.

But this year, a newfound faith that they can actually reach the goal was set in motion when the Mount Dora Community Trust responded

to a grant request from Marshall by offering to kick in \$20,000 if they could come up with the rest.

"I have the faith and we're gonna do it. It's going to get done," said Marshall, who came on board as pastor two years ago.

According to Marshall, the bell tower, completed in 1887 after the church was built in 1886, was not built with weathering in mind, resulting in a support beam that is now rotted out and threatening to collapse.

Marshall said since the discovery was made, the bell in the tower has been tied down as a precaution.

He said when repair work for the restoration of the bell tower is finished, the rope will come down. The work is tentatively set to start on Feb. 4, 2019.

"It's going to be a beautiful sound when we get to ring that bell again. We're going to light up Mount Dora,"

Marshall said.

Sarah Herick, the Mount Dora Trust's grant and scholarship manager, said the trust is sorry they cannot offer the full amount needed for repairs but hope the matching grant they offered will make it a little easier for the church to get there.

"We're hoping enough people get involved so that the bell tower can get fixed. This church has always been right there where it's standing so it's been a big part of everyone's life for as long as most people now have lived in Mount Dora," Herick said. "It's also the oldest building and the most photographed building in Mount Dora, so we want to see it restored."

Herick said she remembers walking past the church as a young girl and has heard comments from people who say they miss the bell being rung.

"There's a lot of history in

Sparks fly in final DeSantis-Gillum debate

DAVIE — Republican Ron DeSantis and Democrat Andrew Gillum accused each other of lying throughout a testy debate on Wednesday night, a second and final meeting that came less than two weeks before their nationally watched election for Florida governor.

In the one-hour televised

debate from Broward College, DeSantis hammered Tallahassee Mayor Gillum for accepting a ticket to the Broadway show Hamilton in 2016 from an undercover FBI agent who posed as a developer seeking to do business in Tallahassee. Gillum, trying to become the first black governor in Florida history, accused DeSantis of

WASHINGTON Grassley to DOJ: Investigate Kavanaugh accuser, Avenatti

Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Chuck Grassley on Thursday asked for a criminal investigation into whether Julie Swetnick and her attorney, Michael Avenatti, conspired to provide false statements to Congress and obstructed a congressional investigation during the confirmation process for Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh.

Grassley wrote in a letter to the Justice Department that Swetnick and Avenatti made serious allegations that required significant resources to investigate. But Grassley says information from media interviews and elsewhere indicates their statements “likely contained materially false claims.”

SAN FRANCISCO 2 Yosemite National Park visitors die in fall at overlook

Two visitors died in a fall from an overlook at Yosemite National Park that allows people to walk to the cliff’s edge, where there is no railing, an official said Thursday.

Park rangers were trying to recover the bodies of a female visitor and a male visitor spotted by another tourist Wednesday, spokesman Scott Gediman said. Officials are still investigating when the pair fell and from what spot at Taft Point, which is 3,000 feet above the famed Yosemite Valley floor, he said.

Railings only exist at a small portion of the overlook, which is popular for its breathtaking views of the valley, Yosemite Falls and El Capitan and fissures on the granite rock that plunge to the valley floor.

BERLIN Europe backs own space launchers amid competition

Major European countries are backing a new generation of home-grown space launchers amid growing competition from private space companies and developing nations such as India and China.

Ministers from Germany, France, Italy, Spain and Switzerland on Thursday signaled their “full support” for the development of the Ariane 6 and Vega-C rockets and their use as launchers for all European Space Agency missions.

The move is a response to the U.S. government’s decision to award lucrative launch contracts to private American space companies such as SpaceX, Orbital ATK and Blue Origin.

Florida Democrats target rural areas

CENTURY, Fla. — This little town on the Alabama border isn’t the type of place where Florida Democrats tend to stop when looking for votes.

It has a population of 1,786, and registered Republicans outnumber Democrats 2½ to 1. But Florida Democratic Party Chairwoman Terrie Rizzo stopped here recently as part of an effort to reach out to rural communities that tend to overwhelmingly support Republicans.

Even Century Mayor Henry Hawkins, a Democrat, seemed a bit surprised he had visitors.

“I’m glad you found your way to Century,” he said as Rizzo sat down with a group of fewer than 20 people. “This is a place that most people don’t know nothing about.”

The town is where Lawton Chiles started a 1,003-mile walk across Florida on his way to winning a U.S. Senate seat in 1970. Chiles is also the last Democrat to serve as governor of Florida. He was elected to his second and final term in 1994.

But a lot has changed since “Walkin’ Lawton” made his walk. Back then, Democrats dominated Florida politics, and the Florida Panhandle supported Democratic candidates. These days, rural areas like the western Panhandle firmly back the GOP.

In the more recent past, Democrats have focused on getting votes out of their South Florida stronghold — the Miami, Fort Lauderdale and West Palm Beach areas — while being competitive along the Interstate 4 corridor that cuts through the middle of the state from Daytona Beach to Tampa.

The party said it hired 47 organizers in the western Panhandle alone, an area where they typically don’t have any organizers. Party spokeswoman Caroline Rowland said the effort is paying off, with an increase as much as 6.5 percent in vote-by-mail ballots in those counties. The

party is also in communication with local officials and grassroots volunteers to help make sure people can reach early voting sites in areas hit by Hurricane Michael.

Although Barack Obama carried Florida in the 2008 and 2012 presidential contests, Democrats have had little success in midterm elections and are hoping to break their losing streak with a new focus on areas where they haven’t mounted much of a fight in more than two decades.

The thinking is that even if they don’t carry these rural counties, they can cut the margin of defeat enough to be more competitive statewide.

“We’ve lost three of the last four elections by an average of 80,000 votes. It’s important to be in every county, and it will make a difference. There are Democrats here. We’re offering them a reason to come out and vote,” Rizzo said after the meeting.

It’s a strategy embraced by Democratic nominee for governor and Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum, who is in a tight race with Republican former U.S. Rep. Ron DeSantis. Gillum said Democrats

can’t just rely on winning big South Florida counties.

“We’ve got to stop treating the race for the governor as if it’s the Electoral College. You don’t win one county and lose another — pick up Miami-Dade and Broward and Palm Beach and lose the rest,” Gillum said in an interview.

Instead, he said, the way to win the state is by “losing less in some of these red areas that we’ll never wholly get. But we don’t need to wholly get them; we need to decrease the margins.”

Still, Dan Smith, a University of Florida political science professor, questioned the strategy of using the party’s limited resources to go after small blocks of votes when there is still a turnout problem with minorities and younger voters in large urban areas.

“If I was putting my money into it, that’s where I would be focusing,” Smith said. “It’s not that those (rural) votes are less valuable, there’s just a lot less of them.”

Florida Republican Party chairman Blaise Ingoglia said he isn’t worried about losing ground in rural areas.

“The Republican Party of

Florida has had historic success in flipping these rural counties from Democrat to Republican in recent years, mostly because voters in these areas continue to walk away from today’s Democrat party,” Ingoglia said in a statement. Just because the Democrats “can fill a room with a bunch of radical activists doesn’t mean they’re making inroads.”

Rizzo lives in Palm Beach County, about 600 miles away from Century. She had never been to the town, which is surrounded by cotton fields. The small crowd at the meeting featured local candidates and party activists, and one of the main topics was the shut-down of public schools that forced children to be bused as much as 20 miles (30 kilometers) away.

The mayor said it helps to have the party pay attention to an area he says has been largely ignored by politicians in Tallahassee, the state capital.

“Now our citizens will know that people are concerned about them. We’re not pushed to the curb,” Hawkins said. “At least people can’t say nobody came by to see them.”

CHIPLEY Crash kills 3 men repairing power lines

A man faces several charges including DUI manslaughter after the Florida Highway Patrol says his pickup truck fatally struck three utility workers as they were repairing lines damaged by Hurricane Michael in the Florida Panhandle.

All three men — George Cecil, 52, of Cole Rain, North Carolina; Ryan Barrett, 22, of Roanoke Rapids, North Carolina; and James Ussery of Chipley — died from their injuries, according to a highway patrol news release.

The Wednesday evening crash occurred on State Road 77 near Chipley, which is north of Panama City. The pickup truck driven by John Goedtke, 37, of the Tampa area, was heading north when it veered onto the road's shoulder, striking the workers, Sgt. R.C. Livingston wrote in the incident report.

Goedtke then fled the scene but was later tracked down and detained by the Washington County Sheriff's Office. He was later arrested by troopers.

Ussery worked for West Florida Electric. Cecil and Barrett were both working for Lee Electric Construction Inc.

Goedtke, who received minor injuries in the crash, is charged with DUI manslaughter, felony vehicular homicide and leaving the scene. Troopers said additional charges are pending.

ORLANDO UCF warns of 'sextortion' email scam

Officials at the University of Central Florida say an email "sextortion" scam is targeting university accounts.

The Orlando Sentinel reports the emails claim to have video of users watching "adult sites" and demanding \$900 if they don't want the video shared with all of their contacts.

The university tweeted about the email scam on Thursday, asking anyone who has been targeted to report it.

The email involves someone nicknamed "darknet" who claims to have hacked into the computer, copying all the contacts and using a web-cam to record the videos the user has watched.

MIAMI Drifter accused of fatally stabbing university student

Police say a 28-year-old drifter with a history of petty arrests has confessed to killing a University of Miami architecture student.

The Miami Herald reports Robert Wayne Gore has been charged with first-degree murder and armed burglary in the death of 23-year-old Yasser Talal Ibrahim Abualfaraj, who was found fatally stabbed in his apartment on Oct. 7.

Miami-Dade police detectives found Gore on Wednesday and spent the evening questioning him. The Herald reports police found DNA matches on a beer can and clothes found inside the apartment. They also found surveillance video of the suspect wearing clothes that were found in the apartment. Police say he changed clothes after the killing.

An arrest affidavit says Abualfaraj was stabbed over 60 times.

BARTOW \$150K bail set for city commissioner in killing

A Florida judge has set bail at \$150,000 for a former city commissioner accused of fatally shooting a shoplifter at his store.

News outlets report the judge on Thursday also ordered Michael Dunn to remain under house arrest after he leaves jail. The judge said Dunn isn't allowed to work in the Army/Navy surplus store he co-owns in Lakeland because it sells firearms. He was also ordered to surrender any weapons he owns.

Dunn resigned as a Lakeland Commissioner following the Oct. 3 shooting of 50-year-old Cristobal Lopez.

Several witnesses testified during the hearing, including Dunn's wife and an employee who was working at the store when the shooting occurred.

Dunn has hired Mark O'Meara, who represented neighborhood watch volunteer George Zimmerman after he fatally shot Trayvon Martin in 2012.

Two suits claim city built park partially on private land

CLERMONT — Last week for the second time in less than two years, the City of Clermont was served with a lawsuit challenging the city's ownership of Victory Pointe.

The Victory Pointe project is part stormwater treatment system, part passive park and part event venue. It opened this summer at a cost of \$10.2 million. The stormwater system features

four interconnected ponds. It is pond 1A, located south of Minneola Avenue, that is in dispute.

In the first of the lawsuits, filed in May of 2017, Stephen Sprinkles alleges he owns a parcel located under the east side of the pond. In the most recent lawsuit Ellis Abide, a managing member of JO-EL, LLC, alleges he owns a parcel under the west side of the pond. Both lawsuits ask for damages.

The City of Clermont has no comment on either lawsuit, according to city

Killer's original testimony gets rehearing

TAVARES — Jurors took a trip back in time Thursday, to 2009, when Raul Roque testified before the original jury that would convict him of stabbing a fellow prisoner to death for stealing items from his footlocker at Lake Correctional Institution.

Jurors didn't hear a recording. Assistant State Attorney Dan Mosley read the transcript for fellow prosecutor Rich Buxman.

Roque's resentencing jury listened with rapt attention, but it was impossible to tell if the convicted killer's own words will again come back to bite him.

Roque admitted in 2009 that he was angry when he realized that someone had cleaned out more than \$100 worth of commissary items from the locker.

Then, he said, he was "nervous" about confronting Miguel Griffin, claiming that Griffin's friends might "lunge at me" in retaliation if he beat the thief.

It was that nervousness that led him to go out to the recreation yard to buy a homemade "shank" knife for \$3.

Witnesses said Roque approached Griffin downstairs and asked to speak to him.

Roque said he was so "nervous" he accidentally locked the cell door behind him. Then, he asked him: "Why are you stealing my stuff? Why are you stealing my roommate's stuff?"

Roque said Griffin replied: "I stole it. I stole the (expletive).

DeSantis health plan calls for more patient choices

TALLAHASSEE — Less than two weeks before Election Day, Republican gubernatorial nominee Ron DeSantis has released a plan that he promises would help transform Florida's health care system.

After weeks of criticism over his lack of a health care plan, DeSantis posted the proposal online Wednesday shortly before his final debate with Democratic candidate Andrew Gillum.

The plan calls for people to have the right to buy the health care they want; use price-transparency

tools to shop for care; and get rebates from insurers when patient choices save money.

The plan said DeSantis would maintain quality care by "resisting any effort to ration health care" in

Tallahassee.

"Floridians have more choices in picking out their cell phone plans than their health insurance plans. Every day in the grocery store, we make decisions about what we want to buy,

weighing price, necessity, and quality, and deciding what's right for us," the proposal said. "But, when it comes to something as important as health care, we have fewer choices and less information."

DeSantis and Gillum have tangled in two debates this week about health care.

Gillum strongly supports expanding Medicaid eligibility as allowed under the federal Affordable Care Act. Gillum has also expressed support for "Medicare for all," a single-payer system championed by Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders that

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spokeswoman Kathryn Deen. Sprinkles' attorney, Ed Jordan, also would not comment on the lawsuit.

Attorney Zachary Broome represents JO-EL. He called the dispute "a very interesting land use situation in that we have a lake that was on a plat, that existed in the late 1800s and early 20th century, then it dried up. Beginning in the '60s, at least, we know the

lake was dry, because we start seeing deeds with that dry ground description."

As Broome sees things, the property owners were treating their deeded lots, plus the adjacent portions of the dried up lake bed, as one and the same. Until Clermont started building Victory Pointe, "no one had any reason to think otherwise."

The dried up lake that Broome refers to is West Lake. The little lake was not included as part of any of the lots originally platted in Clermont, although the most recent plat, done

in 1926, does show that the lots surrounding West Lake got bigger as the lake got smaller.

In 2012, the pedigree of West Lake took an unexpected turn when officials at the state Department of Revenue sent a directive to all the county property appraiser offices that they should assign tax parcel ID numbers to lakes that didn't have them.

Lake County Chief Deputy Property Appraiser Michael Prestridge said in the age of computer-generated maps, officials in Tallahassee were having

a hard time telling the difference between a data-gap and a lake. So, in 2012, West Lake, among other Lake County lakes, was assigned brand new property tax parcel ID numbers. As a default, the State of Florida was listed as owner of the newly created tax parcels.

In mid-2014, the City of Clermont was making plans for the construction of Victory Pointe. City officials reached out to the state Department of Environmental Protection Title and Records Section in an effort to obtain the title to West Lake, only to be told that

"the State has no apparent title interest in the subject land."

Then, in December of 2014, according to property appraiser records, the listed owner of West Lake and several other landlocked Clermont lakes was changed from the state to the city, in accordance with the 1926 plat.

Sprinkles apparently did not realize there was a problem with his property until he tried to sell it. Ellis Abide (of JO-EL) reports that he didn't discover the problem until after Clermont started building Victory Pointe and

the construction company on the project contacted him about leasing part of his property during construction of the ponds.

On Oct 12 the city filed a motion for summary judgment against Sprinkles, but the motion has not yet been ruled upon.

It states in part that "there is simply no evidence demonstrating that the disputed land was ever deeded to the Plaintiff or his predecessors... The fact that the City may not own the disputed land is completely irrelevant to whether the Plaintiff owns the disputed land."

would require federal approval.

DeSantis, who resigned his Northeast Florida congressional seat last month to focus on the gubernatorial race, opposes Medicaid expansion and has lambasted Gillum over supporting "Medicare for all."

While in Congress, DeSantis was a member of the House Freedom Caucus, a group of conservatives who did not support President Donald Trump's efforts to repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act, better known as Obamacare. DeSantis and others in the group maintained at the time that the efforts didn't go far enough.

Some of the ideas cited

in DeSantis' new plan have already been percolating in the GOP-controlled Florida Legislature, including a House proposal that would have mandated insurers and health-maintenance organizations share savings with consumers who shopped for care. The 2017 legislation, which ultimately did not pass, would have opened up insurers for penalties or lawsuits if they failed to comply.

The DeSantis plan also calls for expanding what is known as direct primary care, a concept that the Legislature approved this year. Direct primary care involves contractual arrangements between doctors and patients for treatment, at least partially cutting out the role of insurers. It's not clear how DeSantis would want the plans expanded.

Democrats, who have attacked DeSantis for his

opposition to the Affordable Care Act, immediately blasted his new proposal. In part, they said it would allow the sale of what they consider "junk" health care plans, or those that don't meet minimum benefit requirements of the Affordable Care Act.

Moreover, Democrats argued the DeSantis proposal would not help people with pre-existing medical conditions. A popular feature of the Affordable Care Act provides protections in purchasing insurance for people with prior health conditions.

According to the DeSantis proposal, the Republican gubernatorial candidate would "work to ensure hard-to-insure Floridians with significant health needs have access to coverage" through market reforms that will encourage people to buy policies

"before they get sick."

Johanna Cervone, a Gillum spokeswoman, criticized the plan.

"After 268 days without a health-care plan, Ron DeSantis finally released a sham of a proposal that puts special interests over the health of Floridians and denies coverage to people with pre-existing conditions," Cervone said in a statement.

Florida Republican Attorney General Pam Bondi has joined 19 other GOP attorneys general in a federal lawsuit that, if successful, would overturn the pre-existing protections contained in federal law.

According to the Kaiser Family Foundation, Florida has 3.1 million non-elderly people with pre-existing conditions.

Central to the DeSantis health care proposal is the idea that costs must be

contained to expand access.

To that end, DeSantis said he would "aggressively" implement an all-payer claims database designed to provide more information about prices. Gov. Rick Scott pushed for passage of the database in 2016, a year after a bruising legislative battle over expanding Medicaid access for uninsured, childless adults. In lieu of expanding Medicaid, Scott said he would help uninsured Floridians by working to lower the cost of care and touted increased transparency as a key way to do that.

But some of the largest insurance carriers aren't reporting the information, after the state awarded a database contract to the Health Care Cost Institute, which was founded in 2011 by four insurance companies, including three that do business in Florida: Aetna, Humana and

UnitedHealthcare.

Another health care move championed by Scott and supported by DeSantis is the state's Medicaid managed-care program. Lawmakers and Scott in 2011 approved the program, which requires most Medicaid beneficiaries to enroll in HMOs or other types of managed-care plans.

DeSantis' proposal said that as governor he would continue to "support Florida's groundbreaking Medicaid managed-care model."

DeSantis in his proposal also said he would "finish implementing Florida's medical marijuana constitutional amendment." Voters in 2016 approved a constitutional amendment that broadly legalized medical marijuana, but the state has faced lawsuits and criticism about the way it has carried out the amendment.

The servers were also considered a unique part of the Bloom's experience, with their old-timey dresses reminiscent of a historic 1950s diner; so were its booths.

Leesburg Downtown Partnership Chief Executive

Officer Joe Shipes said Bloom's was unique. He noted that the restaurant drew good breakfast and lunch crowds and hopes that is an indicator that the closure is temporary.

The majority of Bloom's reviews on Trips Advisor and Yelp are good.

"Maybe she'll be able to regroup and come back. She had a very unique presentation to offer," Shipes said of Bloom's owner Cheryl Bloom.

Shipes said restaurants everywhere are struggling to retain good help because of a tight labor market. They're also facing growing competition.

Shipes said if Bloom's closure is a permanent decision, the building could easily accommodate another restaurant.

Before it was Bloom's Baking House & Restaurant, another restaurant called Sinfully Sweet stood in its place.

So what?"

Roque then claimed that Griffin reached into his trousers and pulled out a homemade ice pick.

"We're struggling back and forth," he said. Finally, reaching over to retrieve the knife he had hidden under his mattress.

"I lost control. It's one thing to take my things, now he's trying to take my life," he said.

Roque said he kept stabbing him until "he lost strength" and Griffin sat down on his cellmate's

footlocker. Roque said he fell back on the stainless steel toilet in the cell, put his hands on his head and said, "What have I done?"

Roque told a guard to open the door, because "this man needs attention."

Roque said he didn't realize his cellmate, Jeffrey Ferris, was even in the cell until it was over and he saw him sit up in his bunk.

But witnesses refuted Roque's story from the beginning, including seeing Ferris in the cell door window after Griffin walked into the ambush.

Roque also denied telling corrections officers that he considered Griffin to be "less than a human being," and that he had

to kill Griffin "like a dog," because that is what you do to a thief.

The defense also began presenting their witnesses, including a boyhood friend from Cuba, who said Roque's mother would tie him, and his older brother, CuCu, to a thorny ceiba tree with a chain and beat him with another chain, when he was about 5 years old.

"The children were crying. It was horrible abuse, and nobody would interfere," said Ignacio Germendio, who witnessed the abuse.

The mother would eventually kill CuCu, he said.

Defense attorney Jessica Roberts lifted the curtain on the horror show

Wednesday in her opening remarks to the jury.

Most mothers try to meet the needs of their children, and wonder what they will be when they grow up, but not Roque's. Her only interest was torture and "breaking him down," she said.

Roque grew up in a shack with seven siblings with dirt floors, no electricity and no running water.

One of his mother's favorite punishments for the 6-year-old was to turn bottle caps, sharp edges up, and make him kneel on the pieces. She made him stick his arms out so she could put weights in his hand, "not for five or 10 minutes, but an hour, but for hours

and hours," Roberts said.

"We're not saying it's an excuse," she said, but added, "he has a broken brain" and defense medical experts will present evidence they hope will convince jurors he should be spared the death penalty.

Prosecutors, for their part, promised to present the testimony of a prisoner who will say Roque told him, "He was a thief. I don't like thieves, so I killed him."

The Cuban-born 61-year-old, who escaped the death penalty by one vote after being convicted of killing Miguel Griffin, gets another chance, thanks to changes in law that demand that jury death sentences now be unanimous.

Mosley said the state will prove four requirements for a death sentence, including the fact that Roque was in prison on a previous capital felony. He was sentenced to life in prison for a 1996 second-degree murder in Miami. Another "aggravator," was the fact that he was convicted of other violent felonies: robberies,

assault on a law enforcement officer and resisting an officer with violence.

Prosecutors also intend to prove that Griffin's murder was heinous, atrocious and cruel. The fourth statutory aggravating factor is that it was cold, calculated and premeditated.

Roque, who is mentally delayed, had a hard time adapting to the U.S., Roberts said.

His murder conviction in Miami has weighed heavily on him, too.

Roque was with a friend at a trailer park who confronted a man suspected of raping his sister and attacking his 15-year-old niece. While the friend was fighting the man, Roque retrieved a handgun and shot the man.

Those friends, who didn't have much money, sent money to Roque's commissary account.

"Commissary is very important in prison," Roberts said. The fact that Griffin was taking money donated by friends was too much.



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

US mortgage rates edge up; 30-year at 4.86 pct.

Long-term U.S. mortgage rates edged slightly higher this week amid continued anxiety in financial markets as interest rates rise.

Home borrowing rates remain at their highest levels in more than seven years, with the key 30-year rate approaching 5 percent. Mortgage buyer Freddie Mac said Thursday the rate on 30-year, fixed-rate mortgages ticked up to an average 4.86 percent this week from 4.85 percent last week. A year ago, it stood at 3.94 percent.

The average rate on 15-year, fixed-rate loans rose to 4.29 percent this week from 4.26 percent last week.

LONDON UK fines Facebook over data privacy scandal

British regulators slapped Facebook on Thursday with a fine of 500,000 pounds (\$644,000) — the maximum possible — for failing to protect the privacy of its users in the Cambridge Analytica scandal.

At the same time, European Union lawmakers demanded an audit of Facebook to better understand how it handles information, reinforcing how regulators in the region are taking a tougher stance on data privacy compared with U.S. authorities.

Britain's Information Commissioner Office found that between 2007 and 2014, Facebook processed the personal information of users unfairly by giving app developers access to their information without informed consent. The failings meant the data of some 87 million people was used without their knowledge.

stoking racial fears and at one point said: "I'm not calling Mr. DeSantis a racist. I'm simply saying the racists believe he's a racist."

Gillum and DeSantis also managed to stake out differences on some issues. Gillum renewed his call for a \$1 billion tax hike on corporations and a \$15-an-hour minimum wage; DeSantis said those measures would cost jobs and slow Florida's economic momentum. Gillum called for tougher gun control measures while DeSantis said he supports gun rights and favors tougher security measures to protect schools.

Gillum has come under fire for accepting the Hamilton ticket during a trip to New York with lobbyist and longtime friend Adam Corey and the FBI agent, who used the name Mike Miller. Text messages released by Corey's attorney Tuesday showed that Corey texted Gillum that "Mike Miller and the crew have tickets for us for Hamilton tonight" and Gillum texted back: "Awesome news about Hamilton."

Said DeSantis during the debate: "He wouldn't accept responsibility for getting a \$1,000 ticket from undercover FBI agent at the last debate. We now know that he lied about that. At some point you've got to demonstrate leadership and accept responsibility for what you've done."

Gillum continued to assert that he thought the ticket came from his brother, but conceded he should have asked more questions about it.

"I was aware that Adam Corey and Mike Miller arranged so that we could go and see the show. I arrived at the theater and received my ticket from my brother. The problem that I have is that I should have asked more questions to make sure that everything that had transpired was above board ... I take responsibility for not having asked more questions," Gillum said.

"But let me tell you. I'm running for governor. In the state of Florida, we've got a lot of issues. In fact, we got 99 issues and Hamilton ain't one of them," Gillum continued.

DeSantis also criticized Gillum for taking a trip with Corey and others to a luxury villa in Costa Rica. Gillum said he paid about \$900 for his share of the trip, but Corey's

attorney has said Gillum never reimbursed his client and released a document showing a \$941.95 charge for Gillum with a line crossing it out.

"He also didn't tell the truth about the junket he took to Costa Rica... He got the junket that he didn't pay for in Costa Rica," DeSantis said.

Gillum tried to turn the tables on DeSantis by asking him to produce receipts for approximately \$145,000 in congressional travel that, according to a Naples Daily News report, included some trips to New York to appear on Fox News. DeSantis' campaign said all the trips over his six years in office were for "official business," and DeSantis said during the debate his travels were no different from those of other members of Congress.

DeSantis responded angrily when he was asked about his appearances at conferences sponsored by conservative activist David Horowitz, who once said the country's "only serious race war" is against whites.

"How the hell am I supposed to know every single statement that somebody makes?... I am not going to bow down to the altar of political correctness. I am not going to let the media smear me," DeSantis said.

Gillum gave a folksy response. "My grandmother used to say a hit dog will holler. And it hollered through this room," Gillum said.

Gillum, who during his Democratic primary campaign called for abolishing the Immigration and Customs Enforcement agency, was accused by DeSantis of favoring "sanctuary cities" that refuse to cooperate with the federal government on immigration enforcement. DeSantis gave the example of a person in the country illegally who was jailed for child molestation. When that offender was released, DeSantis charged that Gillum would not turn him over to immigration authorities.

"Shame on you," Gillum said. He said he would "absolutely cooperate" in such a case and added: "How can we expect you to be honest with the people of the state of Florida if ... you can (not) be honest with them about my record or your record? You're disqualified, in my opinion, from the office of governor."

DeSantis responded by accusing Gillum of lying about the Hamilton ticket and Costa Rica trip while Gillum repeated "Shame on you."

The candidates did not shake hands at the end of the debate but did exchange a fist bump.

reference to the caravan, which was still about 1,000 miles from the U.S.-Mexico border and starting to dwindle. Previous migrant marches have largely dissipated before reaching the United States.

The sprawling caravan of migrants — once estimated by the United Nations to be more than 7,000 strong — is hoping to make it to the United States.

Most are Hondurans, seeking to escape the poverty and violence that plagues the region.

Trump earlier this year ordered the deployment of National Guard members to the U.S.-Mexico border to respond to a spike in illegal border crossings. But those members remain under the control of the governors of the states where they're positioned, and their activities are limited to supportive roles, such as providing surveillance.

The addition of 800 or more active duty troops, if approved, as expected, by Mattis, is in response to a request from

the Department of Homeland Security, which manages the Border Patrol, a U.S. official said.

DHS asked for help in various forms, the official said, including air transport and other logistical assistance. It was not immediately clear why active duty forces were chosen, since National Guard troops can perform the same functions. Earlier this year Mattis authorized Pentagon funding for up to 4,000 National Guard troops on the border and thus far only a little over 2,000 have been used.

Trump had tweeted Monday that he'd alerted Border Patrol and the military that the caravan was "a National Emergency," but the Pentagon said then that they'd received no new orders to provide troops for border security.

But Trump told a rally crowd in Wisconsin on Wednesday that moves were underway.

"Wait'll you see what happens over the next couple of weeks. You're going to see a very secure border. You just watch," he told the crowd. "And the military is ready. They're all set."

of anonymity because they were not authorized to discuss the ongoing investigation by name.

At a press conference Thursday, officials in New York stressed they were still treating the packages as "live devices."

"As far as a hoax device, we're not treating it that way," said Police Commissioner James O'Neill.

Details about the devices came as the four-day mail-bomb scare widened. Law enforcement officials seized three more devices Thursday — two addressed to former Vice President Joe Biden and one to actor Robert De Niro — described as similar to the devices sent to former President Barack Obama, Hillary Clinton, CNN and others.

The new discoveries brought to 10 the number of suspicious packages targeting Democrats but intercepted by authorities this week.

The packages stoked nationwide tensions and fears two weeks before major congressional midterm elections. Even with the sender still unknown, politicians from both parties used the moment to decry a toxic political climate and lay blame.

"A very big part of the Anger we see today in our society is caused by the purposely false and inaccurate reporting of the Mainstream Media that I refer to as Fake News," Trump said on Twitter. "It has gotten so bad and hateful that it is beyond

description. Mainstream Media must clean up its act, FAST!"

Former CIA Director John Brennan, the target of one package sent to CNN, fired back.

"Stop blaming others. Look in the mirror," Brennan tweeted. "Your inflammatory rhetoric, insults, lies, & encouragement of physical violence are disgraceful. Clean up your act.... try to act Presidential."

The list of bombing targets spread from New York, Delaware and Washington, D.C., to Florida and California.

In politics, Santa seeks to come early

We're closing in on Halloween. But in one sense, it seems more like Christmas.

As Election Day approaches, some Democrats want to be Santa Claus, bestowing "gifts" from the government that the recipients won't have to pay for.

Consider a few ideas that have emerged recently. U.S. House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi and others insist that health care is the defining issue of the campaign. USA Today reports that about half of the Democratic House candidates running this year support the "Medicare for All" plan promoted by Sen. Bernie Sanders. A bill in Congress that would implement that, and do away with private insurance, has 123 Democratic sponsors, including Rep. Darren Soto of Kissimmee. Florida Democratic gubernatorial candidate Andrew Gillum also backs the idea.

The goal is to ensure that all Americans have healthcare coverage, and that the federal government would pay for it. Even by the most conservative estimate — conservative meaning least costly — the proposal would run almost \$33 trillion over 10 years. That would nearly double the size of the federal budget, with no clear mechanism to pay for it, except taxing the wealthy.

Besides "free" health care, U.S. Sens. Kamala Harris of California and Cory Booker of New Jersey want to give Americans something they like even more: free money.

Harris has proposed a \$6,000 tax credit for families making up to \$100,000 a year. Forbes notes Harris' credit would be atop the existing federal Earned Income Tax Credit, which provides eligible low-income families a subsidy of between \$3,400 and \$6,318, depending on the number of children. Harris' supporters say it would cost \$200 billion a year. She would pay for it by repealing the tax cuts enacted last year by President Donald Trump.

Booker, meanwhile, has proposed giving each newborn an "opportunity account," into which the government would deposit money annually with guaranteed interest. The recipient could then withdraw the money at age 18 to use for college tuition, buy a home, or perhaps for another purpose yet to be identified. The accounts are seeded with \$1,000 and the yearly deposit varies by family income level, but in some cases the child could receive roughly \$50,000 at 18. According to The Hill, the plan would cost \$60 billion a year, and Booker's office said he would pay for it by boosting rates for capital gains, estate and inheritance taxes.


Closer to home, Gillum has advocates paying starting teachers a minimum of \$50,000 a year, and, according to Politifact, would raise salaries for veteran teachers to the national average. The plan would cost \$1 billion a year, which Gillum plans to pay for by jacking up corporate taxes.

All of these programs sound nice. And maybe some might work. But the problem, setting aside the class warfare aspect, is that while America is the richest nation in the world, we don't have nearly enough rich people to soak to pay for it all. Inevitably, Democrats, who complain that tax cuts rarely help the middle class, will eventually turn to middle class families to pay for programs that allegedly benefit them.

Santa Claus is a beloved figure because his freebies bring joy at no cost. But emulating him in politics, however, has a real cost. The question voters must ask themselves us: can we really afford it?



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Gators get ground game in gear

GAINESVILLE — The results have been pretty impressive.

After getting manhandled up front in the loss to Kentucky on Sept. 8, it appeared Florida's offensive line and running backs were headed for a long and potentially unproductive season again.

The arrow was clearly pointing down for the Gators' running game.

Now, it's just as clearly pointing up.

Like the other aspects of Florida's offense, there has been steady change and improvement in the running

game over the course of the season. The line has been more assertive and physical, the running backs have been finding the holes and hitting them.

The results have been pretty impressive.

Since rushing for only 128 yards in the loss to the Wildcats, the Gators have averaged 209 yards rushing a game, including a 215-yard performance against one of the nation's strongest defensive fronts (LSU) three weeks ago and a season-high 292-yard effort against Vanderbilt two weeks ago.

The offensive line and the running game have gone from a troubling question mark to a

potential team strength.

How has this happened?

"I think it's just guys understanding the scheme a little bit better, both the backs and the quarterbacks, understanding what plays to get us into and how to check us into the right plays," UF coach Dan Mullen said. "Our coaches, just finding what our guys do well and making sure we're putting them in position to be successful. But more importantly, I think it's the line being comfortable with the schemes we're blocking and the backs being comfortable with how the plays are supposed to hit."

Whatever it is, the Gators have started having consistent success in the running game, something that was missing earlier in the season and for most of all of last season.

Jordan Scarlett, Lamical Perrine and true freshman Dameon Pierce have made the running back position perhaps the most productive in an ever-improving offense. They have combined to rush for 1,052 yards and eight touchdowns and are averaging 6.5 yards a carry.

"They have really come on," Mullen said of the running backs. "They're starting to get real comfortable in our offense and

how to run the plays within the offense and how plays hit in our offense.

"I've seen a huge step from those guys from game one to now. Hopefully, they'll continue that confidence and that progression to keep moving in the right direction."

Scarlett said the backs and line have started to mesh.

"Just the whole offense, just believing in what we can do," Scarlett said. "The offensive line is sticking together, working together and we're working together with them in sync."

The veteran offensive line was supposed to be a strength last season, but wasn't. After that UK game, it looked like it might be more of the same this season.

But the big guys have finally come together and

are starting to play up to expectations.

"They've gotten a lot better," Scarlett said. "They improve every day, working hard every day. It's really just a matter of knowing what you've got to do and knowing your assignment. They can execute and block any guy in front of them. It's just really knowing what we've got to do."

Offensive line coach John Hevesy is one of those coaches who are hard to please. But even he seems happy with the progress that's been made in the running game and on the offensive line.

"It's getting better," Hevesy said of the running game. "We've gotten better slowly each week. We've just got to keep maintaining that mentality. To win in this league

and to win in this game (with Georgia), you absolutely have to be able to run the ball well to help the passing game.

"It's a mentality. It's slowly building up with (the offensive linemen) understanding that part of being physical up front and knocking people back and worry about the linebacker later. Just take care of down linemen.

"They're getting better. I'm pleased. I'll give it that. But we still have a long way to go."

The offensive line — and the running game — is facing another tough challenge in Jacksonville on Saturday. The Bulldogs are fast and physical up front and will be determined to shut down UF's run and put the game in the hands of quarterback Feleipe Franks.

"I'm sure their goal this year is to end our (hopes of an unbeaten season). But, this is the way it's supposed to be; Wildwood is our arch-rivals and most of the kids on both teams know each other and grew up playing with each other.

"We haven't had to say anything to get our kids motivated to play this game."

Likewise in Wildwood. The Wildcat Nation has spent the week getting prepared for the game, reminding fans about the importance of the game in terms of Wildwood's playoff hopes ... a win would go a long way toward securing the program's second postseason bid in two years. School officials have planned a "Black Out" at Death Valley for the game and are encouraging fans to wear black to the game.

"This is what a high school football rivalry should be like," said Wildwood's interim head coach J.B. Bynum. "Since there are only three high schools in Sumter County — The Villages, South Sumter and us — whenever you play one of the other two, it's big. Add in the other things that are at stake, like the playoffs and unbeaten records, and this game takes on an even bigger meaning."

Ahh, the playoffs.

The unknown entity. Before last season, teams earned postseason bids by finishing first or second in their districts. They knew heading into a game what impact it might have on their playoff chances ... and with Wildwood and The Villages belonging to different classifications — Wildwood is Class 1A, while The Villages is Class 4A — games played prior to 2017 carried no postseason implications.

Not anymore. With the new Playoff Power Rankings deciding

who earns playoff berths and who doesn't, every regular-season game has an impact on the postseason. A win in September is just as important as one at the end of October.

The Villages heads into today's game ranked fourth in the Class 4A-Region 2 rankings and Wildwood is seventh in the Class 1A-Region 4 standings. In classes 1A through 4A, the top six teams in each region advance to the playoffs.

"Now, you want to go 1-0 every week and let the chips fall where they fall," Pettus said. "You can't look ahead because every game means something. Last year, a loss early in the season wound up costing us a playoff berth and the hardest thing I've ever had to do as a coach was telling our kids they didn't make it."

Said Bynum, "Certainly, The Villages is a big game for us for a number of reasons. A win would be huge not just because they're our rivals, but also because

of the bump it would give us for the playoffs. Even if we lose, there might still be a path into the playoffs, but we'd have to rely on other factors to help us get in because this is our last regular-season game.

"We don't want that, so we're approaching this as a must win."

However, today's game has always been about more than playoff berths.

For fans of each program, it's the biggest game of the year, one they've had circled for 365 days.

It's a chance to avenge a painful loss or to validate last year's win.

For coaches, players and school administrators, it's about bragging rights for two teams and programs with a healthy respect for each other.

The perfect potion for a big-time rivalry.

"It's going to be a lot of fun," Bynum said. "Both teams are going to be fired up and so will the fans. It's what a rivalry should be like."

"I understand that I haven't been playing the greatest," Rosier said.

But he wins. And that's what matters most to coach Mark Richt right now.

Rosier felt he had done enough to keep his job, especially after throwing for two scores and running for three more in a September win at Toledo. Richt thought the time was right to give Perry a chance, then wound up going back to Rosier during Miami's loss two weeks ago at Virginia. Richt met with Rosier back at home after that game, and before long the quarterback order on the depth chart was flipped again.

"Everyone looks at stats," Rosier said. "Everyone looks at completion rate. For a quarterback, there's more. Yes, that's like the big number, that and your touchdown-to-interception ratio. But there's more to a quarterback than just, 'OK, can he throw a ball?' I feel like you have to control an offense. You have to direct the line. You have to direct receivers. You have to help the young guys. You have to be able to manage a game."

The atmosphere in Chestnut Hill, Massachusetts, after sundown today will not be pleasant for

Miami (5-2, 2-1).

The Eagles (5-2, 2-1) are 4-0 at home this season, winning those games by an average of four touchdowns. 
"I think Malik is just better equipped from his abilities and his experience to lead this team right now," Richt said.

In these days of downtime darkness and fall-semester academic commitments, the National Pastime has become the National Past-Your-Bedtime.

Exhibit A: Game 1 of the 2018 World Series began on Tuesday night at 8:11 ET and ended nearly four hours later, on Wednesday morning, at 12:03 a.m. ET. That's a school night, Commissioner Manfred. One of your key target demographics needs to finish its homework and brush its teeth.

Baseball wants and needs to corral younger fans. That much is certain. The game's leaders have said it themselves on many occasions, and tried to act accordingly. So much of baseball's imagery and continuously reinforced mythology is kid-based and family-focused.

This makes sense both tactically and strategically. That's not only the audience that the leagues need for business purposes right now, but it's a population of sturdy American saplings that will preserve the game and position it for coming decades in a landscape of far flashier sports.

So why, then, ensure that the electrically charged season climax is either a) off limits to those who live in stricter households or b) a source of scratchiness between parents and kids otherwise predisposed to

love baseball together and not have it come between them?

Yes, you need to have night games. Yes, the networks call some of the time-slot shots. But a 7:05 p.m. start seems to work just fine for many of 162 games during the year, so why not now?

That extra hour could make all of this accessible to so many more people and ensure that your family fans, tucked away in their homes with Halloween pumpkins out front, are shouting at the screen together and not at each other.

Take it from those shouting at you from the parent-child trenches: This is probably an issue that warrants a committee or a task force or a bipartisan commission, if not a special prosecutor.

A family room north of Pittsburgh shortly after 11 p.m. on a frosty Wednesday night in late October 2018. The Red Sox, bolstered by J.D. Martinez's bat and the acrobatics of Andrew Benintendi in left field, are about to take Game 2 of the series.

On the floor, wrapped in a blanket like an oversized convenience-store burrito, lies an almost-12-year-old baseball fan who spent the earlier part of the evening beseeching his father to let him stay up and watch. 

PREVIEW CAPSULES FOR TONIGHT'S HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL GAMES

GAINESVILLE (5-3) at SOUTH LAKE (5-3)

7:30 p.m.
Three straight convincing wins have put South Lake in a position to control its own destiny for the playoffs. This week's game offers the Eagles a chance to really bolster its postseason chances.

South Lake currently holds the No. 7 seed in Class 6A-Region 2 while Gainesville is third in the region overall but holds the fifth seed behind the four district champions.

South Lake is coming off a 42-23 win over Ocala Forest last week while Gainesville defeated Leesburg 70-6.

The Eagles rushed for 338 yards in the win over Forest, with senior Mike Nafield going for 186 yards and a touchdown on 12 carries and senior Zach Martin adding 124 yards and two touchdowns on 18 carries. Senior quarterback Baylee Heuser hit 10 of 16 passes for 169 yards and a touchdown.

Heuser has completed 63 percent of his passes this season for 1,616 yards with 11 touchdowns and five interceptions. His top receiver is Joey Pendarvis, with 50 catches for 893 yards and four touchdowns.

Gainesville was dominant against Leesburg in its last outing, cruising to a 49-0 lead at the half behind four touchdown passes from Luke Matthews. Matthews has thrown for 2,098 yards this season while completing 71 percent of his passes. Six different Gainesville receivers have caught at least 15 passes this season, led by Jalen Kelsey with 49 catches for 859 yards and two touchdowns.

South Lake wraps up the regular season when it hosts East Ridge.

INLET GROVE (5-3) at MOUNT DORA CHRISTIAN (5-3)

The second season gets underway for Mount Dora Christian Academy as the Bulldogs host Inlet Grove in the opening round of the Sunshine State Athletic Conference playoffs. MDCA is the No. 3 seed in the Coral League half of the bracket while Inlet Grove is the No. 6 seed.

The two teams have one common opponent, with Mount Dora Christian defeating Berean Christian 43-7 last week and Inlet Grove defeating Berean Christian 26-13 on Oct. 4.

Last year, Leesburg lost to Lake Weir in a shootout 54-42. This is a Class 6A-Region 2 (District 5) contest. Leesburg has been eliminated from the postseason hunt. Lake Weir is ranked sixth in Class 6A-2 in the current Playoff Power rankings.

*Motorhome
having trouble
on long grades*

Q: We have a 2004 Ford E450 class C 23-foot motorhome with the V-10 engine. It just turned 45,000 miles this week. We did a 500-mile trip this past weekend down I-5 to Medford, Ore., and return to Tillamook, Ore. Pulling long grades the engine surges mildly as if it's running out of gas. Switching out of overdrive helps some, but the surging returns to the point I back off the throttle and accept slower climb to the top. On a 1 to 10 scale it's only about a 2, at worst a 3. O'Reilly Auto Parts did a code scan and found nothing stored.

Are there really two fuel pumps in series? Is there a second fuel filter different from the one inside the frame rails below and slightly behind the driver's seat? Is there some way a human being with normal limbs and joints can access a fuel rail test port? Do I need to pull the doghouse from the interior? It's never been out so far. I've read that some COP electrical connectors occasionally back off causing misfiring. Is this common?

Is my next step installing a pressure gauge on the fuel rail, and watching it while driving under different loads?

— Bob Moody

A: Here are answers to your questions: No, unlike the earlier Ford motor home E350/450 cutaway chassis, there is only one fuel pump, which is located in the tank. There is a sock or strainer prior to the pump, in addition to the frame mounted fuel filter. It has a coarse weave to stop larger particles. A fuel pressure test port is thoughtfully included on one of the fuel rails atop the engine. Connecting a fuel pressure gauge, such as the OTC 5630 or similar, requires removal of the engine cover, also referred to as the "dog house." (Be sure to follow published safety procedures!) I'm not aware of ignition coil connector problems, but they are known to sometimes leak spark due to faulty insulation. Observing fuel pressure while driving is a good diagnostic strategy, but there's an easier/safer way to infer proper pressure, using an inexpensive OBD-II scan tool such as the Autel AL519 or similar. Monitoring the "short and long term fuel trim" will indicate fuel system abnormalities. Ideal fuel correction is within a few percentage points, positive or negative, from zero. A strong positive indication, such as +15 percent or more during a hill climb indicates a shortage of fuel. Depending on conditions you may see this in either short or long term trim, or both.

Typically a misfire or severe fuel issue will result in a check engine light and code set. Your situation may be a bit mild for this to occur. I'd also try using the scan tool's "Mode 6" to look for misfires specific to a certain cylinder. If a cylinder is misfiring, try swapping the ignition coil with a neighbor and re-check to see if the misfire followed the coil!

Auto review: China-built CT6 Plug-In offers up to \$7,500 in federal tax credits

Cadillac's new CT6 Plug-In Hybrid is built in China? Well, no one should be too surprised, despite the fact the rest of the CT6 family comes from Detroit.

China is a land of major urban pollution, and it leads the planet in its push for electric vehicles. China produced 680,000 electric cars, buses and trucks last year alone — more than the rest of the world combined, according to Forbes magazine. And it plans to sprout 500,000 public charging posts by the end of 2020.

So, yeah, no surprise that Cadillac-parent GM wanted in on that mega-market and built a \$1.2 billion factory in Shanghai. The CT6 plug-in

should do well in a nation where cities are starting to outlaw gas-engine vehicles downtown, and where folks get great incentives to go electric.

But the new entry from Caddy may do well here, too, with its boatload of features (it comes only one way, fully loaded), and up to \$7,500 in federal tax credits, too. And, of course, it drives like a Cadillac: smooth, strong and steady.

It only gets around 31 miles on electric only — on its best day — but there's a helpful drive mode called "Hold" that will use the gas engine alone to preserve the electric for in-town driving. The electric drive is what boosts this CT6 to an eye-opening 62 mpg-e (equivalent) rating from the EPA. But when you run dry and are driving on gas only, expect no more than 25 mpg combined city/highway.

Cadillac calls its

powertrain a "blended hybrid." It starts with a conventional 2.0-liter turbocharged 4-cylinder engine that gets 265 hp. It is mated to a pair of 100-hp electric motors that make up Cadillac's electric variable transmission, or EVT.

Joining the power team is a burly 18.4-kWh lithium-ion battery, wedged between the rear seats and trunk — yes, it steals about 4 cubic feet of trunk space. The battery can be charged in about 11 hours via a typical household 120-volt outlet, and in just 4.5 hours with a 240-volt connection.

Combining the engine and electric motors, the CT6 Plug-In produces an impressive 335 hp and amazing 432 pound-feet of torque. That's comparable to Cadillac's nonturbo V-6. Also comparable is a 0-60 mph time of 5.2 seconds, not bad considering it has to lug around a 400-pound battery

Tesla's promised lowest-cost, \$35,000 Model 3 not here yet

In spite of Tesla CEO Elon Musk initially tweeting a link to a page advertising a new version of the Model 3 electric sedan for "\$35,000 before incentives," the car his company put up for sale Thursday is not the long-promised and purportedly revolutionary affordable-to-the-masses electric vehicle.

The link was soon changed to bring up a page advertising a \$45,000 Model 3, which Tesla added would cost \$35,000 in California for buyers who reap state and federal tax benefits if they take delivery by year's end. The Palo Alto electric car maker's website promises delivery of the \$45,000 version in six to 10 weeks.

"Elon has the best of intentions," said Kelley Blue Book executive analyst Rebecca Lindland. "He wants to fulfill the promise and the vision of a \$35,000 Tesla. This isn't it, though."

The Model 3 represents Tesla's grandest ambition — to make an affordable electric car that would revolutionize personal transportation. Many analysts believe the company's survival is tied to the success of the lowest-cost Model 3. But versions of the car

already in production have been plagued by manufacturing delays. In July, Tesla said it had finally reached a production rate of 5,000 Model 3s per week, after missing several previously set targets.

The \$45,000 version announced this week is rear-wheel-drive and has a mid-range battery with an estimated range of 260 miles. The more expensive Model 3 with a long-range

battery is estimated to travel 310 miles on a charge.

The Model 3 with a \$35,000 base price will be the standard-battery version, and the battery is not yet in production. That version is estimated to be ready to deliver to customers in four to six months, with a range of 215 to 220 miles.

"That's more than sufficient for most commutes," Lindland said, adding that charging the vehicles can

take hours, depending on where they're plugged in.

Tesla's four-to-six-months timeline for delivering the lowest-cost, \$35,000 Model 3 seems achievable, but whether that car, and the \$45,000 version announced Thursday, will propel Tesla to profitability remains an existential question for the company, Lindland said. The company

AUTO BITS

Always be careful when you check your vehicle's coolant

WARNING – If you do this with an engine that is not cold you are going to be injured. So be sure the car is stone cold before you begin. Wear some safety glasses. Next, pop the hood and find your coolant reservoir. In most cars, it will be a translucent white tank with a dip hose leading to it. Use your manual to find the tank if you are not sure. Observe the level of coolant. If there is none in there, you may have found the problem. The tank is marked with a high and low point. Note where it is when the vehicle is cold (usually low). Also, visually observe the level of the coolant when the car is warmed up from having been driven. The coolant should be higher in the reservoir when the car is at running temperature. Your car's heating and cooling system uses the coolant to move heat from the engine into your car's heater core. A fan blows over this heater core and the warmed air enters the cabin. If there is no coolant it can't work. If you have no coolant in your reservoir the next step is to open the radiator cap. Again – **ONLY WHEN THE CAR IS STONE COLD.** Touch the cap gently to be sure that the car is cold. If it is, open it up and carefully set it aside so it doesn't fall down into the engine. Note what you see. If there is no coolant at the top, you have made some ground on the diagnosis. If it is there, you will be calling a mechanic, but at least you can tell her the status of the fan and the status of the coolant! If there is no coolant in the radiator, use your manual to find out what type it uses and then buy it and fill it up.

Test Drive: 2018 Mitsubishi Eclipse Cross

This week, we're driving the 2018 Mitsubishi Eclipse Cross, delivered in SEL trim with all-wheel-control (AWC) underpinnings. This is our very first drive of this new Mitsubishi SUV, which sits in the middle of the Outlander Sport and larger Outlander. Prices start at \$23,205 for the entry ES, which is the only front-drive Eclipse available. When you move up to ES AWC, SE and SEL, all come with standard 4x4 underpinnings.

The big difference between the three SUV models is vehicle length. Specifically, length dimensions are 171.9-inches for the Sport, 173.4-inches for the new Eclipse, and 184.8 for big brother Outlander. The Eclipse also features a new 1.5-liter four cylinder turbocharged engine with 152-horses and 184 lb. ft. of torque. All three Mitsubishi's ride on a 105.1-inch wheelbase while the larger Outlander offers three-row, seven-passenger seating whereas the Sport and Eclipse models are five passenger designs.

Even with this new Eclipse Cross, situated in the middle price-wise between Sport and Outlander, it's been a tough ride for Mitsubishi Motors the last five years. The company now badges its new entry as an Eclipse,

the latter a huge success for Mitsubishi decades ago as a compact sports car. Overall, Mitsubishi is still trying to regain the form that found such great cars like the twin-turbo Mitsubishi 3000 GT VR4 and most recently Lancer Evolution EVO, both gone by the wayside.

Since the recession of 2007 to 2011 negatively affected all major auto manufacturers, Mitsubishi was especially hard hit. Their dealer showrooms experienced a major nosedive while their lineup of "many models

to choose from" end up with today's short list of just four offerings, which include the little Mirage three-cylinder sub-compact, this new Eclipse Cross, and the brothers Outlander.

Thankfully, the new Eclipse helps in showroom number display, but it's hard figuring out other than expanded floor space where this "new" Eclipse fits. To make room for the new Eclipse Cross, the GT line is dropped for 2018 and although marketed as all-new, this Eclipse Cross is pretty much an Outlander a bit longer than Sport all jazzed up.

There are some things to cheer about, however. Eclipse Cross features a new eight-speed CVT automatic transmission in addition to

The Eclipse Cross additionally features steering wheel paddle shifters, the latter for those seeking more control over the engine RPM, torque delivery and fuel consumption management. The Super AWC (4x4) is an electronically-controlled active front differential unit with push-button activation that engages all wheels when needed. The ride is average to good, overall.

As for near \$36,000 Mitsubishi Eclipse SUVs, remember that the lower-priced models combined with dealer discounts make the best overall buys. Also look for great leftover deals.

all the power and get-up you'd expect in a rear-wheel-drive luxury car (all-wheel-drive is not an option). It can reach 150 mph with engine and electric motors working together, and it can do 78 mph on electric alone.

The ride is smooth but there is a persistent hiccup whenever the gas engine takes over from electric. Its road manners are exceptional, staying flat on corners and S curves. Bumps and road divots are nicely absorbed, too, especially in Tour mode. The other drive mode, Sport, offers more aggressive acceleration and a (much needed) boost in steering feel and response.

Inside, it's typical Caddy comfort, luxury and high technology. Hand-stitched, leather-trimmed seats are supportive and come heated, ventilated, and with 16-way adjustment for both driver and front passenger.

Cadillac's CUE information/media system appears on a 10-inch color display and offers navigation, Apple and Android capabilities. There's a 12-inch digital gauge cluster plus a head-up display for quick data at a glance. And it has a rear mirror-camera — with washer! — that allows unobstructed video views behind instead of the reflective view.

A rear-seat, dual infotainment system with wireless headphones allows passengers equal rights to the fun stuff, music and videos. Or, if preferred, a chauffeur can take the wheel while the executive conducts business or enjoys the view through the dual sunroofs.

The battery-squeezed trunk has only 11 cubic feet of space but is deep enough for a pair of golf bags.

High-tech features extend to the safety package, including an automatic park assist that actually steers and brakes the vehicle. It also has adaptive

cruise control with automatic braking, blind-spot alert, lane-keep assist and pedestrian braking. Night vision is improved with an infrared image located between the gauges.

So, considering there aren't too many choices for a luxury

hybrid sedan, the CT6 is worth a good look. If maximum mileage is your thing, you might do better elsewhere. But the CT6 Plug-In comes fully loaded, remember, and it's still easier on the wallet than similarly-equipped options from the European entries.

shareholder letter that his firm would, in the second half of this year, reach a position of "sustained quarterly profits, absent a severe force majeure or economic downturn."

Tesla has said nearly a half million pre-orders came in for the Model 3, but it's unclear how many would-be buyers got fed up with delays or for other reasons backed out of the buying the vehicle they'd put a refundable \$1,000 deposit on,

Lindland said.

"I dropped out," she said. "I asked for my deposit back."

AllianceBernstein analyst Toni Sacconaghi, Jr. said in a research note Friday that he believed there was "pent-up demand" for a \$35,000 Model 3. But Sacconaghi questioned whether the company should have promised a version of the car at that price, when a higher-priced cheapest Tesla would have been better for the

firm's financials.

"The car is years ahead of its peers, and likely would have generated huge demand along with a tremendous consumer following, even with a base sticker price of \$40K or \$45K," Sacconaghi wrote. "A higher base price would have inevitably lessened the margin and cash flow challenges the company faces."

Tesla said in a statement Friday that Model 3 production

and sales were continuing to "grow rapidly," with "a steady volume in manufacturing capacity, allowing us to diversify our product offering to even more customers."

Musk on Thursday had also indicated that the long-range, rear-wheel-drive Model 3 will soon no longer be an option.

"Model 3 long range, rear wheel drive is still available for ordering off menu for another week or so," Musk tweeted.

Atkinson genially bumbles his way through sequel

You might have missed the first two entries in what, even without much commercial success, has become a franchise. “Johnny English” (2003) featured Rowan Atkinson as a bumbling but self-assured British spy, the only one left alive after every other agent was killed in an attack. Could he take on the bad guys? You bet! “Johnny English Reborn” (2011) saw the disgraced spy come out of retirement to stop an international assassination plot. Could he ... Oh, please, of course he could!

“Johnny English Strikes Again” stands on its own, and threads everything together by having the British Secret Service once again threatened, this time by a hacker who has revealed the identities of all active agents. When the frustrated and most likely idiotic Prime Minister (played with nuanced comic timing by Emma Thompson) is told that

every current agent has been outed, and there’s no one to figure out who did it, she commands, “So, bring back an OLD one!”

Well, there are retired Agents Five, Seven, and Nine (Michael Gambon, Charles Dance, and Edward Fox), but there’s also a fourth possibility: Retired agent-turned-geography teacher Johnny English, who is managing to surreptitiously train his young students in the art of espionage. It’s a wonderful moment when Atkinson gets to play against those three veteran actors, but know this: His character is still a big-time bumbler and, due to what I’ll call “error,” the three other agents’ parts are quickly

reduced to cameos.

So, Johnny English is back on the job, with the assistance of his returning sidekick Bough (Ben Miller, who played the role in the first film), and he’s out to find the hacker culprit. But there are ground rules: He will only work the Old School way, which means carrying a gun and driving a gas-powered (none of that hybrid crap) Aston Martin, and only a cherry red one will do. Soon, he and Bough are on the road to Antibes, where a mysterious luxury yacht awaits them.

This is a spy film with all of the usual spy ingredients: A smart, charming, wealthy, power-mad villain (Jake Lacy); a high-speed car chase along a twisty mountain road; a gorgeous woman (Olga Kurylenko) who could pass as a “Bond” girl, but in this case should probably be called an “English” girl, even though she’s a Russian girl; magnetic boots; instant-release super-high-energy pills; low-intensity exploding cotton batting; and, of course, an exoskeleton

suit that increases your strength 100 times.

It’s a spy spoof with an unending supply of sight gags — some subtle, some silly, some wildly funny, some painfully obvious. Atkinson plays English as a smooth and proper and low-key operative. For this character, he’s removed the mischievous edge that he gave Mr. Bean, but he still puts on a serious face and attitude that nicely counterbalances a series of absurd situations. Miller remains mostly in the background, staying cemented in that sidekick role, but is obviously the brighter half of the duo. Both Lacey and Thompson give their characters just the right amount of gusto (Lacey) and foolishness (Thompson).

By the time the film shifts its setting to the

G12 Summit in Scotland, where international leaders are going to meet up with that villain and his dastardly plans, viewers will be certain that, 1) the world will be saved, and 2) there’s undoubtedly another gag waiting right around the corner.

Just as Johnny English prefers deploying Old School methods to his spying, the film is an Old School spy sendup, one that might not work on modern audiences. It’s a genial, inoffensive movie that plays it safe, even in the one “nude” scene that’s so chaste, you could show it to grandma ... and your young kids.

Jonah Hill makes directing debut with authentic ‘mid90s’

If you’ve got a great opening shot, and an ending that audiences, for whatever reason, will carry with them and talk about, all you’ve got to do to make a memorable movie is have a strong middle section. We all know that kind of thing is rare, even for seasoned writer-directors.

But actor Jonah Hill has gone for and grabbed the gold with “mid90s,” his first time at the keyboard and behind the camera. His opening shot is of a 13-year-old boy being slammed, face-first, into a wall by his angry 17-year-old brother. The scene grabs your attention. The ending neatly and inventively sums up everything that’s gone on in the previous 80-odd minutes.

Those 80 minutes revolve around a plotless slice of lifestyle examination of some folks who make the gritty side of Los Angeles, circa

1995, their home. Or more specifically, their playground. The kid who meets up with the wall at the start is Stevie (Sunny Suljic, who was featured as young Bob in “The Killing of a Sacred Deer”). He lives at home with his troubled brute of a brother Ian (Lucas Hedges from “Manchester by the Sea”) and their single, not-very-happy mom (Katherine Waterston).

Hill tosses in humor and pathos, brings rifts between characters to a head, fills the atmosphere with lots of excellent period music, and manages to capture youthful exuberance in a way that hasn’t been achieved since the 2005 skateboarding movie “Lords of Dogtown.”

1. To give yourself the best chance of making 12 tricks, you should allow for the possibility of either opponent having four diamonds to the jack. Play the ten of hearts under the ace, cash the king of hearts, king of spades and ace of diamonds, then finesse the nine of hearts.

Next cash the queen of hearts and ace of spades, discarding the K-Q of diamonds from dummy! Then play the ten of diamonds to force out the jack, and this will be your only loser.

If the diamonds are divided 3-2, this method of play will cost you a trick worth 30 points, but if they are divided 4-1, you will be 1,000 or 1,500 points richer, depending on the vulnerability.

2. If you were sure of five club tricks, you'd also be sure of the contract, but since the odds strongly favor scoring only four club tricks, you must consider a diamond finesse for your 12th trick.

This train of thought leads to the surprising conclusion that since there are two ways to play the clubs and only one way to play the diamonds, you should try the diamond finesse first to help you determine how to play the clubs.

Let's say you take the first spade in your hand and lead a diamond to the jack at trick two, and it wins. Once this occurs, the contract is foolproof. The only remaining problem is to guarantee four club tricks, which can be done by returning to your hand in any suit but clubs and leading a low club toward dummy. This enables you to guard against either opponent having the K-10-8-7.

If the diamond finesse at trick two loses, you will then have to hope that South was dealt specifically the K-x or K-x-x of clubs (a 26 percent chance) and rely on a finesse to produce five club tricks.


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
