Lawmakers back removal of constitution panel

TALLAHASSEE — Largely appointed by former Gov. Rick Scott and Republican legislative leaders, a state commission placed seven constitutional amendments

on the November ballot that were approved by voters.

But the commission could become a thing of the past after stirring a controversy with many of its proposals.

The House State Affairs Committee on Thursday approved a measure (HJR

249) that would ask voters to abolish the Constitution Revision Commission, which has unique powers to put proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot.

The 37-member commission — which meets every 20 years — created controversy

because five of the seven constitutional amendments it placed on the ballot included multiple subjects. For example, one proposal included a ban on offshore oil drilling and a ban on vaping

Infamous teen car thief faces gun charge

LEESBURG — Leesburg's infamous teen car thief was arrested again Wednesday, but this time for allegedly menacing his sister with a gun.

Jakiel Monroe, 14, was arrested by Leesburg police for allegedly pointing a loaded gun at his sister during an argument.

Their father, who lives in Wildwood, heard about it a few days later, and after learning it went unreported he called Leesburg police, who visited the family's Leesburg residence. Jakiel was not home at the time.

Officers interviewed the sister, who told them she didn't fear for her life and wasn't even sure the gun was real. When their mother got home, she apparently tried to stop the girl from filing an official statement, but then relented after speaking with officers.

Many Republicans defect in Senate vote over president's emergency declaration

WASHINGTON — The Republican-run Senate firmly rejected President

Donald Trump's declaration of a national emergency at the southwest border on Thursday, setting up a veto fight and dealing him a conspicuous rebuke as he tested how boldly he could ignore Congress in pursuit of his highest-profile goal.

The Senate voted 59-41 to cancel Trump's February proclamation of a

border emergency, which he invoked to spend \$3.6 billion more for border barriers than Congress had approved. Twelve Republicans joined Democrats in defying Trump in a showdown many GOP senators had hoped to avoid because he commands die-hard loyalty from millions of conservative voters who could punish defecting

lawmakers in next year's elections.

With the Democratic-controlled House's approval of the same resolution last month, Senate passage sends it to Trump. He has shown no reluctance to casting his first veto to advance his campaign exhortation,

In 420-0 vote, House says Mueller report should be public

WASHINGTON — The House voted unanimously Thursday for a resolution calling for any final report in special counsel Robert Mueller's Russia investigation to be made public, a symbolic action designed to

pressure Attorney General William Barr into releasing as much information as possible when the probe is concluded.

comes as Mueller is nearing an end to his investigation. Lawmakers in both parties have maintained there will have to be some sort of public resolution when the report is done — and privately hope that a report shows conclusions that are favorable to their own side.

Four Republicans voted

present: Michigan Rep. Justin Amash, Florida Rep. Matt Gaetz, Arizona Rep. Paul Gosar and Kentucky Rep. Thomas Massie.

The nonbinding resolution calls for the public release of any report Mueller provides to Barr, with an exception for classified material. The resolution also calls for the full report to be

released to Congress.

"This resolution is critical because of the many questions and criticisms of the investigation raised by the president and his administration," said House Judiciary Committee Chairman Jerrold Nadler.

JEFFERSON CITY, MO. Missouri considers making impeachment more difficult

The Missouri Senate is backing an effort that could make it harder to impeach and oust top officials, less than a year after the state's governor resigned while facing potential impeachment.

Senators behind the proposal say it isn't motivated by the case against former Republican Gov. Eric Greitens. But had the measure been in place last year, House members likely would have been unable to pursue impeachment of Greitens.

The proposal would delete the current eight grounds for impeachment — including two of the causes against Greitens, “misconduct” and “moral turpitude” — and instead limit impeachment to “corruption or crime in office.”

BRUSSELS Donors pledge \$7 billions in aid for Syria, refugees

International donors have pledged around \$7 billion in aid for Syria and Syrian refugees who fled the conflict-ravaged country, the European Union announced Thursday, as the war enters its ninth year.

But it was unclear how or when the money would be made available to those in need.

EU Humanitarian Aid Commissioner Christos Stylianides said the donors made a “collective pledge of almost \$7 billion” for 2019, short of the \$8 billion that the United Nations had hoped to raise for humanitarian aid inside Syria and for refugees living in difficult conditions in neighboring Jordan, Lebanon, Turkey and Iraq, as well as Egypt.

NEW DELHI Pedestrian bridge collapses in Mumbai; 5 killed, 36 hurt

A pedestrian bridge connecting a train station with a road collapsed in Mumbai on Thursday, killing at least five people and injuring more than 30, police said.

Police officer Praveen Satpal said 36 injured people were hospitalized, some in serious condition. Some motorists who were driving under the bridge when it collapsed were among the injured, the Press Trust of India news agency reported.

An audit of the bridge's safety was carried out last year, said Maharashtra state Education Minister Vinod Tawde. He told reporters that some minor damage was detected and had not been repaired before the collapse of the bridge.

O'Rourke enters 2020 field

Former Texas rep. attempting to score with bipartisan appeal

AUSTIN, Texas — Former Texas Democratic Rep. Beto O'Rourke jumped into the 2020 presidential race Thursday, shaking up the already packed field and pledging to win over voters from both major parties as he tries to translate his political celebrity into a formidable White House bid.

After months of ignoring states that vote early in the presidential nominating process, O'Rourke made his first-ever trip to Iowa — popping into a coffee shop in the town of Keokuk while many cable networks went live. He took questions about everything from his support of federal legalization of marijuana to abortion rights to the possibility of a universal basic income — all while waving his arms and gesticulating.

It was the kind of high-energy, off-the-cuff style that made him a sensation in Texas, but O'Rourke also was clear that he doesn't believe in strict immigration policies — drawing a policy distinction that could allow him to clash with President Donald Trump on the issue.

Trump, for his part, took note of O'Rourke's energetic gesticulation, on display as several cable TV networks aired O'Rourke's comments.

“Well, I think he's got a lot of hand movement,” Trump told reporters in the Oval Office. He added: “Is he crazy or is that just how he acts?”

Until he challenged Republican Sen. Ted Cruz last year, O'Rourke was little known outside his hometown of El Paso. But the Spanish-speaking 46-year-old former punk rocker used grassroots organizing and social media savvy to mobilize young voters and minorities and get within 3 percentage points of winning in the nation's largest red state.

“This is going to be a positive campaign that seeks to bring

out the very best from every single one of us,” O'Rourke said in a video announcement before dawn Thursday, with his wife on a couch. “We saw the power of this in Texas.”

Weeks of gleefully teasing an announcement are behind him, but O'Rourke now must prove whether his unique campaign style will resonate on a much larger stage than Texas. For all the buzz associated with his candidacy, the former three-term congressman hasn't demonstrated much skill in domestic or foreign policy. And, as a white man, he's entering a field that has been celebrated for its diverse roster of women and people of color.

California Sen. Kamala Harris singled him out by name in an email to supporters, noting that a “record number of women and people of color” are running and adding she was looking forward to “substantive debates” with candidates including “the newest to join the race today, Beto O'Rourke.”

In Iowa, O'Rourke said, “I could care less about your party persuasion, your religion, anything other than the

fact that, right now, we are all Americans.” O'Rourke's record in Congress has drawn criticism from some on the left for being too moderate, but he spoke at length about combating climate change and supporting the Green New Deal on Thursday.

O'Rourke has promised to travel the country listening to voters, then will return to El Paso, on the border with Ciudad Juarez, Mexico, on March 30 for an official campaign kickoff.

The sports and entertainment world already had its eye on O'Rourke during the Senate campaign: NBA star LeBron James wore an O'Rourke hat after video of the Texan defending NFL players' right to protest during the national anthem went viral this summer. Beyonce, a Houston native, endorsed O'Rourke.

Trademark, black-and-white “Beto for Senate” yard signs became staples in places like New York and Los Angeles — with some supporters now converting them to read “Beto for President 2020.” And he was the only presidential prospect interviewed

by Oprah Winfrey, who appeared genuinely excited last month about the prospect of an O'Rourke White House run.

Should he parlay a 2018 Senate defeat into a successful 2020 White House campaign, O'Rourke would be the first U.S. politician to do so since Abraham Lincoln lost his Senate bid to Stephen Douglas in Illinois in 1858, then was elected president two years later.

Democrats have long dreamed that a booming Hispanic population and droves of Americans moving to Texas from elsewhere could turn the nation's largest red state blue and transform the Electoral College by making the Republican path to the presidency all but impossible. Another Texas Democrat, former Obama administration housing chief Julian Castro, was already running.

O'Rourke visited all 254 of Texas' counties while running for Senate. It's a strategy that could serve him well in Iowa, where Cruz campaigned in all 99 counties before winning its caucus during the 2016 GOP presidential primary.

FORT LAUDERDALE Surgeon denies posting patient genitalia on social media

A prominent gender-reassignment surgeon has resigned from a Florida hospital after being accused of posting photos of patients' genitalia along with racist and homophobic comments on his Instagram account. He denies making the posts, saying his account was hacked.

Dr. Christopher Salgado also told The Associated Press on Thursday that he planned to continue his efforts to support transgender people.

The accusation surfaced in an anonymous petition filed with the American College of Surgeons, accusing the surgeon of posting graphic photos of male and female genitalia in various stages of surgery on his personal Instagram account @sexsurgeon. The account has since been deleted.

The petitioner said the comments were "horribly inappropriate," and harmful to an already vulnerable population.

PANAMA CITY Man accused of marriage and visa fraud

A 47-year-old Indian foreign national who lives in Florida has pleaded guilty to conspiracy to commit marriage and visa fraud and conspiracy to commit money laundering.

U.S. Attorney Lawrence Keefe said in a news release Thursday that Ravi Babu Kolla is being detained and a hearing has been set for May 22.

Keefe also announced that Kolla's co-defendant 40-year-old Krystal Cloud was sentenced Tuesday to 24 months in prison for marriage and visa fraud after pleading guilty in December. He said Cloud is a U.S. citizen who participated in a business with Kolla.

Kolla faces a maximum of five years in prison on marriage and fraud charges and 20 years for money laundering.

ASTOR Pair charged with pummeling woman

A man and woman from Astor were arrested Wednesday for attacking a passenger in their car, rendering her unable to tell her side of the story, police say.

James Stokes, 31, and Ruth Gill, 53, were charged with battery for allegedly slapping a woman in the rear passenger seat of their car multiple times.

When a deputy arrived at a residence on 23859 Hare Lane, Gill and Stokes accused the victim of attacking them first, saying she was out of control and using methamphetamine. Stokes even offered the deputy a video from his phone as evidence.

The only problem is, the video did the opposite. It reportedly showed that the victim did bite Gill, but only after Gill went on the attack. It also apparently showed Stokes join in pummeling the woman. Two witnesses confirmed Stokes and Gill were the aggressors.

The report said the victim was found in an "infantile" state on the ground next to the car, and was unable to answer questions.

WOMAN STRANGLERED AT EUSTIS CEMETERY

EUSTIS — Eustis Police arrested a Eustis man Wednesday for allegedly attempting to strangle to death his pregnant stepmother.

Ian Magnus Anselmo, 20, was charged with second-degree attempted murder

Anselmo called the police around 4:08 p.m. to report that he had killed his stepmother, Sue-Ellen Kathleen

and aggravated assault on a victim he knew to be pregnant.

According to an arrest affidavit,

Anselmo.

"I killed my mom, she's dead," Anselmo allegedly told the operator. "I strangled her."

The operator said it was difficult to understand Anselmo over the phone but that he mentioned being in an argument with her before strangling her.

When officers arrived

on the scene they found Anselmo in a parked car with his stepmother, who had a cord wrapped around her neck and was bleeding from the nose and mouth. Officers at the scene noted that Anselmo's hands and clothes were covered in blood.

Anselmo told officers

House panel calls for stricter scrutiny in wake of UCF scandal

The Florida House's top investigative committee adopted a series of recommendations on Thursday that would reform spending practices in the state university system after finding University of Central Florida officials ignored state rules when misspending \$85 million in state funds.

Seeking to address a systematic problem, the House Public Integrity and Ethics Committee wants more training for university trustees and is recommending changes to practices and rules of the Board of Governors, which oversees the state university system.

"The personalities and relationships overtook checks and balances and controls and I think that was part of the problem that led to the issue here today," Committee Chair Tom Leek, R-Ormond Beach, said.

The House panel also called on the BOG to further investigate complaints of "waste, fraud and mismanagement" at universities. The committee now is turning its focus to the University of South Florida, which last year self-reported misusing \$6.4 million on construction project.

"An investigation in the size and scope of what had to take place with UCF took all of our personnel time and bandwidth, so now with the end of this chapter we can turn to some of the other things we need to look at," Leek said.

For now, the only set of recommendations pushed by the committee is in relation to UCF's problems, which stem from the misuse of \$38 million in leftover operating money, which cannot be spent on construction, to build Trevor Colbourn Hall.

The misappropriation of funds quickly snowballed, leading to the resignation of university leaders, including President Dale Whittaker. Whittaker, who had served as UCF's provost and executive vice president before becoming

LEESBURG — Mammograms just got more comfortable at Leesburg Regional Medical Center.

GE Healthcare has collaborated with the hospital to bring new 3-D mammography technology to patients. The Senographe Pristina, a new image detector, offers an exam with greater comfort and less pain, hospital officials say.

"The Senographe Pristina offers patients a reinvented mammogram experience," said Leesburg Regional's lead mammographer, Eileen Jones, in a press release. "The equipment

combines comfort with the best imaging technology to deliver precise diagnoses. GE designed it to alleviate the stress and tension often associated with mammography."

The Senographe Pristina technology includes a handheld remote which allows patients to play an active role in determining their level of breast compression.

The image detector is designed with rounded corners to help reduce patient discomfort under the arms. It also comes equipped with armrests in place of conventional handgrips, which may

Students sue colleges in admissions scandal

SAN FRANCISCO — In the first lawsuit to come out of the college bribery scandal, several students are suing Yale, Georgetown, Stanford and other schools involved in the case, saying they and others were denied a fair shot at admission.

The plaintiffs brought the class-action complaint Wednesday in federal court in San Francisco on behalf of themselves and other applicants and asked for unspecified damages.

They argued that applicants who played by the rules were victimized when rich and famous parents paid bribes that enabled unqualified students to get into highly selective universities.

"Each of the universities took the students' admission application fees while failing to take adequate steps to ensure that their admissions process was fair and free of fraud, bribery, cheating and dishonesty," the lawsuit said.

Legal experts, though, said the students could have difficulty holding the colleges responsible.

The scandal erupted on Tuesday when federal prosecutors announced charges against 50 people, including coaches and dozens of parents, among them TV actresses Felicity Huffman and Lori Loughlin. Prosecutors said parents paid to rig standardized exams and bribed coaches to get their children designated as recruited athletes in sports they didn't even play, thereby boosting their

chances of getting in.

The colleges have cast themselves as victims and have moved to distance themselves from the coaches, firing or suspending them.

The investigation began with a tip from an executive under suspicion in a securities fraud probe, according to a law enforcement official who was not authorized to discuss the case and spoke on condition of anonymity.

The executive told Boston authorities that the women's soccer coach at Yale offered to label the executive's daughter a recruited athlete in exchange for cash, the official said.

Among other developments Thursday:

- The Hallmark Channel cut ties with Loughlin, a longtime star of its

feel-good movies.

- Cosmetics company Sephora dropped Loughlin's daughter Olivia Jade Giannulli, a 19-year-old social media star who frequently pushes products online.

- Golfer Phil Mickelson said he used the college consulting company accused of orchestrating the scheme, but emphasized his family was not involved in any fraud. One of his daughters is a sophomore at Brown University. Brown said it has found no evidence of fraud among its athletes.

The class-action complaint was brought initially by Erica Olsen and Kalea Woods, now students at Stanford. It was revised Thursday to remove Olsen and add three new plaintiffs, students at Tulane, Rutgers and an unnamed

community college.

One of the institutions being sued, the University of Texas at Austin, issued a statement saying that it is "outraged" over the bribery scheme and that any wrongdoing at the school does not reflect its admissions practices and was carried out by "one UT employee."

Other schools named in the lawsuit were the University of Southern California, the University of California at Los Angeles, Wake Forest University and the University of San Diego.

The students in the lawsuit could have a difficult time tying the schools to the fraud in the absence of further evidence, said Joy Blanchard, a professor at Louisiana State University who focuses on higher education law.

"They won't be able to prove that the universities were behind some grand scheme," she said.

Kyle McEntee, an attorney who has pushed for reforms in law school education, said the lawsuit "reeks of opportunism."

"It's tough to see these succeeding," he said.

Legal experts said the plaintiffs at highly selective Stanford would have had an especially hard time showing they suffered any harm, since they still got into an elite institution. Messages seeking comment from Olsen and Woods were not immediately returned.

Among other claims, the lawsuit said that the universities should have discovered the bribes and that their failure to do so through audits or other practices reflects "an unfair business practice."

president July 1, said he would step down in part to repair the rift between the school and

the Legislature.

Thad Seymour, the university's interim president, promised to use the financial scandal as an opportunity to do better. "I promise we will make things right and we will make you proud," he said.

Committee members also heard from Lee Kernek, who played a key role in the panel's probe of UCF.

Kernek, the university's associate vice president for facilities and safety, said she is one of four UCF employees who were targeted to be fired after she reported what she considered wrongdoing.

"I was targeted because I did report things that I knew were suspected or wrong, not because I was responsible for the mispending or for failing to report the mispending of funds," Kernek told the panel Thursday.

When asked if he would reinstate Kernek,

Seymour sidestepped the question, saying only that a decision would be made "in the near future."

State Rep. Cord Byrd, R-Neptune Beach, said he wants the House to delve into how state lawmakers can better help whistleblowers come forward.

"Just want to let anyone out there know that the Public Integrity & Ethics Committee is open for business and we will help in any way we can," he said.

Kernek testified on Thursday that she had to learn how to do her job while on the job, because neither the university nor the Board of Governors provided training manuals

about spending rules.

She also asked House investigators to scrutinize the external investigation UCF conducted last September through the Atlanta-based Bryan Cave Leighton Paisner law firm, which she said protected university leaders.

"The House report needs to call into question the Bryan Cave report, which white-washed the roles of the leadership who made the decisions and covered up their actions," Kernek said.

The committee's recommendations, which do not address the law firm's investigation, are focused on ways to prevent systematic problems

in the university system, according to Leek. The suggestions are "not unnecessarily harsh or inappropriately lenient," he added.

If the Legislature does not approve those recommendations this year, Leek said he believes the public exposure to the issue will likely push the Board of Governors and other universities' boards of trustees to take corrective action on their own.

"I want to close the book on this unfortunate chapter of UCF's history and I look forward to turning our attention to improving the state university system for students and for the staff," Leek said.

“Build the Wall,” which has prompted roars at countless Trump rallies. Approval votes in both the Senate and House fell short of the two-thirds majorities that would be needed for an override to succeed.

“VETO!” Trump tweeted minutes after the vote.

Trump has long been comfortable vetoing the measure because he thinks it will endear him to his political base, said a White House official, commenting anonymously because the official wasn't

authorized to discuss the matter publicly.

Though Trump seems sure to prevail in that

battle, it remains noteworthy that lawmakers of both parties resisted him in a fight directly tied to his

cherished campaign theme of erecting a border wall. The roll call came just a day after the Senate took a step toward a veto fight with Trump on another issue, voting to end U.S. support for the Saudi Arabian-led coalition's war in Yemen.

In a measure of how remarkable the confrontation was, Thursday was the first time Congress has voted to block a presidential emergency since the National Emergency Act became law in 1976.

Even before Thursday's vote, there were warnings that GOP senators resisting Trump could face political consequences. A White House official said Trump won't forget when senators who oppose him want

him to attend fundraisers or provide other help. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak publicly on internal deliberations.

At the White House, Trump did not answer when reporters asked if there would be consequences for Republicans who voted against him.

“I'm sure he will not be happy with my vote,” said moderate Sen. Susan Collins of Maine, a GOP defector who faces reelection next year in a state that reverses independent streaks in its politicians. “But I'm a United State senator and feel my job to stand up for the Constitution. So let

the chips fall where they may.”

Underscoring the political pressures in play, Sen. Thom Tillis, R-N.C., one of the first Republicans to say he'd oppose Trump's border emergency, voted Thursday to support it.

Tillis, who faces a potentially difficult reelection race next year, cited talks with the White House that suggest Trump could be open to restricting presidential emergency powers in the future. Tillis wrote in a Washington Post opinion column last month that there'd be “no intellectual honesty” in backing Trump after his repeated objections about executive overreach by President Barack Obama.

Jakiel's mother, who once pleaded with a court to offer Jakiel a lenient curfew after an arrest, who turned him in. Captain Joe Iozzi of the Leesburg Police Department said Thursday that she turned Jakiel over to them for fear he might end up pointing the gun at officers.

“We're happy that he's in custody and we're happy that this is the way it happened,” Iozzi said.

Wednesday's arrest was the latest in a very long line

of arrests for the teen. Jakiel has achieved a degree of notoriety in law enforcement circles for being a prolific car thief.

In 2016, when he was just 12, he was charged with stealing 12 cars and was sentenced to 11 months of detention. When he was released he reportedly told his mother and a juvenile justice official that he planned to return to his criminal ways.

True to his word, within days of getting out in July 2017, he and another juvenile were charged with breaking into a garage and stealing a motorcycle. In October 2017, he was convicted of four new auto

thefts and sent to juvenile detention for another six to nine months. During his sentencing, police estimated the teen was responsible for roughly one in every five car thefts in Leesburg.

At his sentencing, Judge Michal Takac encouraged the youngster to mend his ways.

“Jakiel, I can't count on one hand the number of times someone has come up to me and said, ‘Judge, you don't remember me but you sentenced me to a program and I'm doing good. I have a job, I have a family now.’” Takac told the boy. “People have been successful and are doing

well. Got it?”

“Yes sir,” Jakiel replied.

Yet Iozzi said police have seen another uptick in auto thefts since the boy's latest release from juvenile detention. He's just glad officers didn't encounter an armed Jakiel stealing a car.

“We prefer to do this the easy way,” Iozzi said. “Nonetheless it's sad every time a juvenile is going through a time of life where they have the opportunity to change direction and they don't take it.”

Walter Forgie of the State Attorney's Office said it's too early to say whether Jakiel will be tried as an adult for the gun incident. He said his office

will carefully consider the boy's age, number of

crimes and the severity of the crime.

in workplaces; another linked death benefits for first responders with the creation of a governance system for the 28 state and community colleges.

Bundling such seemingly unrelated issues in single ballot proposals drew widespread criticism.

“Those were not revisions, those were policy changes,” said Rep. Brad Drake, a Euclieanna Republican who is sponsoring the measure aimed at abolishing the commission. “I don't think that's the intention of the commission.”

Drake added that with almost all members of the commission appointed by the governor, House speaker, Senate president — all Republicans like Drake — and the chief justice of the Florida Supreme Court, the panel has become too politically “crony” and “too dangerous.” The attorney general also serves on the commission.

Rep. Wengay Newton, D-St. Petersburg, agreed the selection process was “highly political” while acknowledging “the party in power controls policy.”

Separate proposals also are moving through the Legislature that would require the commission's proposed constitutional amendments to include only single subjects. The Legislature and citizens' initiatives are already required to follow such a single-subject rule when putting proposed constitutional amendments before voters.

“What we challenge the citizens to do, to go out and get the signatures and have a single subject to amend the Constitution is what we should abide by when we do a revision,” Newton said.

Drake's proposal to abolish the commission, if approved by the Legislature, would have to go before voters in 2020 because it would require a constitutional change.

While the House committee Thursday backed Drake's idea, the board of directors at the LeRoy Collins Institute, a non-partisan think tank located at Florida State University,

opposes abolishing the commission.

The institute supports the separate efforts (SJR 74, HJR 53) that would place a single-subject requirement on the commission.

“Clearly bundling of disparate issues can be a problem with an electorate that is not well informed on issues and with voters who might support one part of the amendment but not

another,” institute Director Carol Weissert said in a prepared statement. “This, however, does not justify abandoning a fundamentally good idea — the commission itself.”

The commission was created in the 1960s as the state modernized its 1885 constitution.

Both proposals in the House — to abolish the commission and to limit

amendments to single subjects — must go before the House Judiciary Committee before they could reach the full House.

A Senate proposal to abolish the commission (SJR 362) must appear next before the Senate Rules Committee. The Senate measure seeking to impose a single-subject requirement is ready to go to the Senate floor.

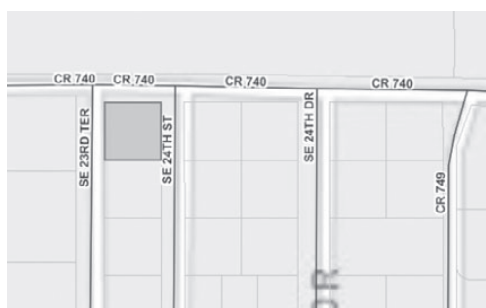

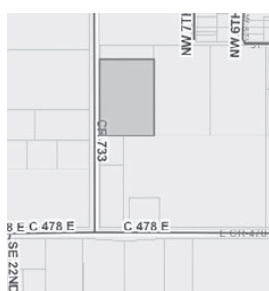

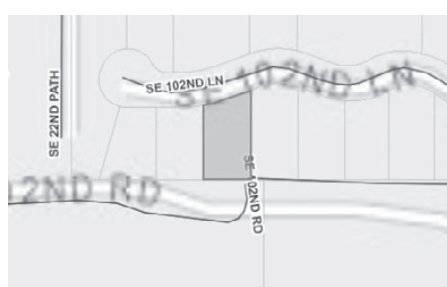

Ethiopia crash black boxes arrive in France for analysis

HEJERE, Ethiopia — Flight recorders from a doomed Ethiopian Airlines flight arrived in France for analysis Thursday as frustrated relatives of the 157 people killed stormed out of a meeting with airline officials in Addis Ababa.

Sunday's crash was the second fatal flight for a Boeing 737 Max 8 in less than six months. More than 40 countries, including the U.S., have now grounded the planes or refused to let them into their airspace.

After holding out for several days, the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration issued an emergency order grounding the planes Wednesday, saying they had new satellite data and evidence that showed the movements of the Ethiopian Airlines Flight 302 were similar to those of Lion Air Flight 610. That flight crashed into the Java Sea off Indonesia in October, killing 189 people.

Officials at Lion Air have said sensors on their plane produced erroneous information on its last four flights, triggering an automatic nose-down command that the pilots were unable to overcome on its final voyage.

Ethiopian Airlines CEO Tewolde Gebremariam said its pilots had received special training on how to deal with that problem, and Boeing sent further instructions for pilots after the Lion Air crash.

Tewolde said he is confident the investigation will reveal that the crash is not related to the safety record of Ethiopian Airlines, widely seen as the

best-managed in Africa.

Firm answers about what caused the crash could take months. The French air accident investigation authority, known by its French acronym BEA, said Thursday it will handle the analysis of the flight recorders, often referred to as a plane's black boxes, retrieved from the crash site.

The BEA has experience with global air crashes, and its expertise is often sought whenever an Airbus plane crashes because the manufacturer is based in France. A BEA official told The Associated Press that the recorders have already arrived in France but gave no time frame on how long the analysis could take.

The U.S. National Transportation Safety Board said it is sending three investigators to France to help with the downloading an analysis of the flight recorders.

In Addis Ababa, about 200 angry family members of crash victims left a briefing with Ethiopian Airlines officials, saying that the carrier has not given them adequate information. Officials said they have opened a call-in center that is available 18 hours a day to respond to questions, but family members said they are not getting the answers they need. People from 35 countries died.

At the crash scene in Hejere, about 50 kilometers (31 miles) from Addis Ababa, growing numbers of family members arrived, some wailing or beating their chests as a bulldozer navigated piles of debris. Blue plastic sheeting covered the wreckage of the plane.

UK lawmakers vote to seek Brexit delay

LONDON — In a stalemate over Brexit, British politicians have chosen to delay it.

After weeks of political gridlock, Parliament voted Thursday to seek to postpone the country's departure from the European Union, a move that will likely avert a chaotic withdrawal on the scheduled exit date of March 29.

With Brexit due in 15 days and no divorce deal yet approved, the House of Commons voted 413-202 to ask the bloc to put off Britain's exit until at least June 30. The official result was initially announced as 412-202, but was later amended to 413 in the official voting list.

The vote gives Prime Minister Theresa May some breathing space, but is still humbling for a leader who has spent two years telling Britons they were leaving the bloc on March 29.

Power to approve or reject the extension lies

with the EU, which has signaled that it will only allow a delay if Britain either approves a divorce deal or makes a fundamental shift in its approach to Brexit. In a historic irony, almost three years after Britain voted to leave the EU, its future is now in the bloc's hands.

May is likely to ask EU leaders for an extension at a March 21-22 summit of the bloc in Brussels.

The European Commission said the bloc would consider any request, "taking into account the reasons for and duration of a possible extension."

May was forced to consider a Brexit delay after lawmakers twice rejected her EU divorce deal and also ruled out, in principle, leaving the bloc without an agreement. Withdrawing without a deal could mean major disruptions for businesses and people in the U.K. and the 27 remaining countries.

By law, Britain will leave the EU on March 29, with or without a deal, unless it cancels Brexit or secures a delay.

Thursday could have been worse for May. Lawmakers rejected an attempt to strip her of control over the Brexit agenda. They defeated by the narrowest of margins — 314-312 — an opposition attempt let Parliament choose an alternative to May's rejected divorce deal and force the government to negotiate it with the EU.

Lawmakers also voted against holding a second Brexit referendum — at least for now.

By a decisive 334-85 vote, they defeated a motion that called for

another vote by the public on whether to stay in the EU or leave. Campaigners for a new referendum are divided over whether the time is right to push for a second Brexit vote. The vote doesn't prevent lawmakers from trying again later to get Parliament's support for another referendum.

Despite the rebuffs and the political chaos that have weakened her authority, May has signaled she will try a third time to get backing for her agreement next week. She is seeking to win over Brexit-backing opponents

in her own party and its Northern Irish political ally, the Democratic Unionist Party, who fear the deal keeps Britain too closely tied to the EU.

Alan Wager, a researcher at the U.K. in a Changing Europe think tank, said May faced a struggle to overturn a 149-vote margin of defeat in Parliament this week.

"It's still really difficult to see how the numbers stack up for Theresa May, but she's giving it one more go," he said.

If May's deal is approved, she hopes to use a delay until June 30 to enact legislation needed for Britain's departure. She has warned Brexit supporters who oppose her deal that if no withdrawal agreement is passed in the coming days, the only option will be to seek a long extension that could mean Brexit never happens.

Any delay in the Brexit process would require the unanimous approval of all 27 remaining EU member states — and leaders in the bloc are exasperated

at the events in London. They have said they will approve an extension if there is a specific reason, but don't want to provide more time for political bickering in Britain.

"Under no circumstances an extension in the dark!" tweeted the European Parliament's Brexit coordinator, Guy Verhofstadt. "Unless there is a clear majority in the House of Commons for something precise, there is no reason at all for the European Council to agree on a prolongation."

Belgian Prime Minister Charles Michel said the EU needed "more decisions" from London.

The EU is also reluctant to postpone Brexit beyond the late May elections for the European Parliament, because that would mean Britain taking part even as it prepares to leave.

The bloc is more open to a long delay to allow Britain to radically change course — an idea favored by pro-EU British lawmakers who want to maintain close ties with the EU.

"It is important that Congress stand up for the principle of full transparency."

It's unclear exactly what documentation will be produced at the end of the probe into possible coordination between Trump associates and Russia, and how much of that the Justice Department will allow people to see. Mueller is required to submit a report to Barr, and then Barr can decide how much of that is released publicly.

Barr said at his

confirmation hearing in January that he takes seriously the department regulations that say Mueller's report should be confidential. Those regulations require only that the report explain the decisions to pursue or to decline prosecutions, which could be as simple as a bullet point list or as fulsome as a report running hundreds of pages.

"I don't know what, at the end of the day, what will be releasable. I don't know what Bob Mueller is writing," Barr said at the hearing.

The top Republican on the Judiciary panel, Georgia Rep. Doug Collins, said the vote on the resolution was unnecessary

but that he would support it anyway. He said he has no reason to believe that Barr won't follow the regulations.

But Democrats have said they are unsatisfied with Barr's answers and want a stronger commitment to releasing the full report, along with interview transcripts and other underlying evidence.

In introducing the resolution, Nadler and five other Democratic committee chairs said "the public is clearly served by transparency with respect to any investigation that could implicate or exonerate the president and his campaign."

Texas Rep. Will Hurd, a GOP member of the

House intelligence committee, said before the vote that he believes the resolution should have been even broader to include the release of underlying evidence.

"I want the American people to know as much as they can and see as much as they can," said Hurd, a former CIA officer. He added that "full transparency is the only way to prevent future inuendo."

If a full report isn't released, House Democrats have made it clear they will do whatever they can to get hold of it. Nadler has said he would subpoena the final report and invite — or even subpoena — Mueller to talk about it.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., has been less eager to push Barr on the release of the report, despite some in his caucus who have said they want to ensure transparency.

Republican Sen. Chuck Grassley of Iowa introduced legislation with Democratic Sen. Richard Blumenthal of Connecticut that would require Mueller to submit a detailed report to lawmakers and the public at

the end of the investigation. But both McConnell and the chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, South Carolina Sen. Lindsey Graham, have declined to say whether they would support the legislation.

Graham said he agrees "with the concept of transparency," but stopped short of supporting Grassley's bill, saying he disagrees with taking discretion away from the attorney general.

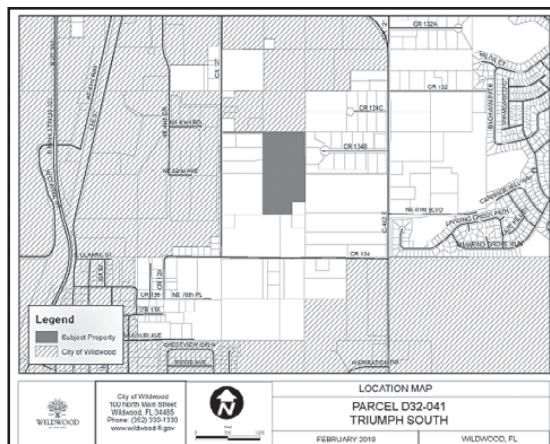

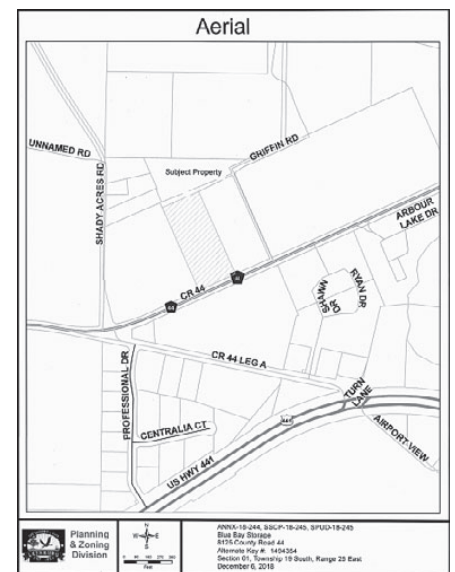

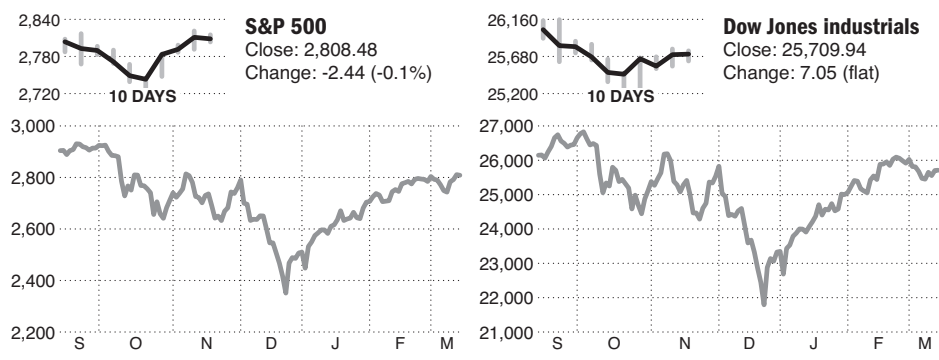

Boeing's stock rise ground to a halt

Company's performance accounted for more than 15 percent of Dow's increase in 2019 before this week's crash

Boeing soared early in 2019 and lifted the Dow Jones Industrial Average with it. Now concerns about the safety of the newest version of its flagship airplane have halted the momentum.

Shares rose 36 percent in January and February thanks to steady orders for Boeing jetliners, including its popular 737. Then came Sunday's deadly crash of a 737 Max 8 in Ethiopia, just months after the crash of a Lion Air Max 8 in the Java Sea. Now, aviation authorities from the U.S. to Britain to

China have ordered the planes grounded, with U.S. regulators saying new information showed some similarities between the two incidents.

Boeing shares were down nearly 11 percent this week through Wednesday, and had lost about \$26 billion in market value. The shares still have outpaced the market in 2019, and account for more than 15 percent of the Dow's increase so far.

The immediate question for Boeing investors is whether the grounding of the planes and crash investigations will have just a short-term effect on Boeing shares and finances, or have a longer-term impact.

"We think an investment in Boeing stock should take into account its long history of safe flight, a strong book of business and strong demand

dynamics," said Jim Corridore, an equity analyst at CFRA.

Canaccord Genuity analyst Ken Herbert said Boeing has likely been working on a software fix for the new 737s since the Lion Air crash last year and much of the cost has already been factored into its guidance for the year. But other risks remain. Plane delivery delays are now a concern along with costs for compensating airlines for service disruptions.

"We still see some uncertainty around the timing of the grounding and risk around the root cause analysis," he said.

The Max 8 is the latest version of the single-aisle 737, which is the world's most common passenger jet. Boeing has taken orders for more than 5,000 of the Max planes from scores of airlines and delivered 376 of them.

Indexes end mostly lower

U.S. stocks indexes barely budged Thursday as the market's three-day winning streak stalled.

The benchmark S&P 500 index finished essentially flat as losses in communications, industrial and health care stocks outweighed gains in financial and technology companies. Several retailers and homebuilders also declined.

Reports of a criminal investigation into Facebook's data-sharing practices weighed on the social media giant's shares.

The market was coming off a solid three-day rally as it reclaimed some of the momentum it had in January and February.

Investors are still waiting for some more news on U.S.-China trade negotiations before they feel comfortable pushing the market much higher.

Media reports had stoked hope that a summit would take place this month, but no concrete announcement has been made.

Despite some softness over the last few weeks, U.S. stocks are still considered a safe haven relative to the rest of the world, said Scott Wren, senior global equity strategist for Wells Fargo Investment Institute.

"We're still the lead sled dogs here, we're pulling the global economy along," he said.

Major indexes in Europe finished higher.

The S&P 500, Nasdaq, Dow and Russell 2000 are showing double-digit gains for the year so far.

Still, investors spent Thursday in a wait-and-see mode, keeping a close watch on global trade issues and continuing to mostly brush off the chaos surrounding Britain's exit from the European Union, its key trading bloc.

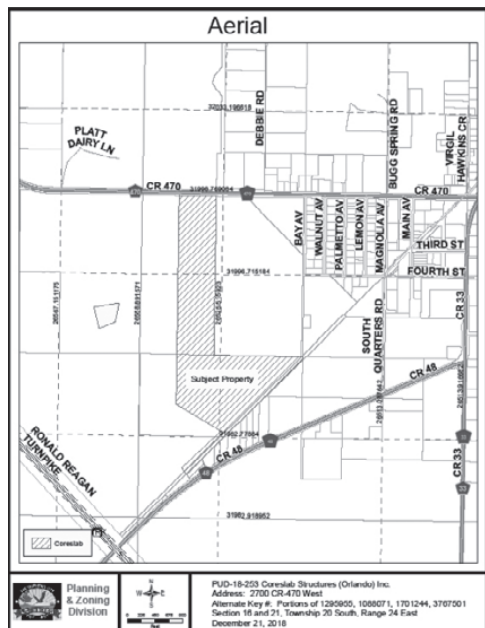

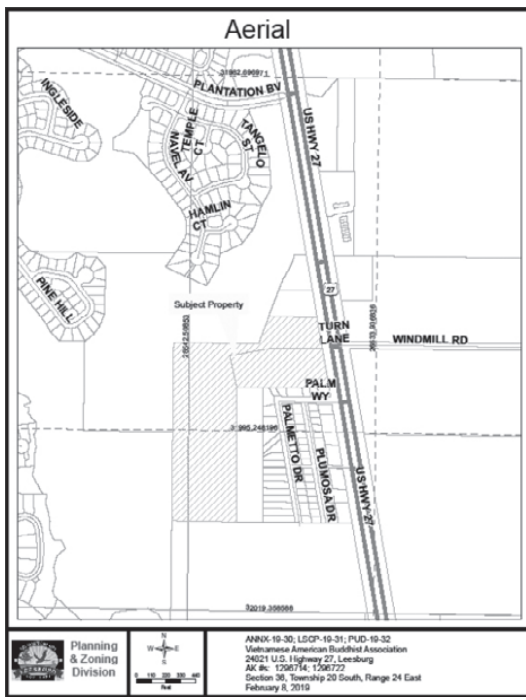

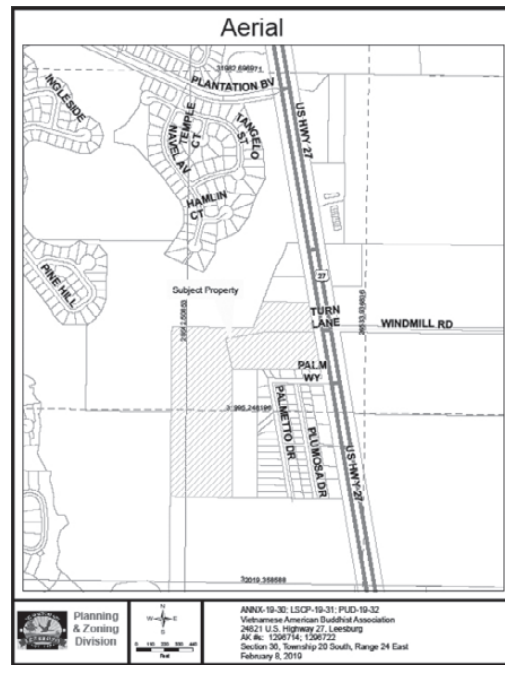

Legislature reaches too far down, again

In his survey of America during the 1830s, French philosopher Alexis de Tocqueville wrote that the heart of American democracy was the “township” — that is, local government. “In the township, as well as everywhere else, the people is the only source of power; but in no stage of government does the body of citizens exercise a more immediate influence,” Tocqueville wrote.

Can someone please teach that lesson in Tallahassee?

The Republican-led Legislature is once again trying to flex its muscle over local governments, stripping Floridians of their ability to have “immediate influence” with local officials.

Lawmakers this year are pursuing a number of “pre-emption” bills whereby Tallahassee decides how Florida counties and cities will govern themselves.

One such measure — House Bill 3, offered by state Rep. Michael Grant, R-Port Charlotte — has local governments particularly perturbed.

A House staff report notes that Grant’s bill would prohibit local governments from enacting or imposing new regulations on businesses after July 1, 2019, unless the local governing body can publicly justify such requirements are essential to protect public health, safety, or welfare; that the regulations do not “adversely affect the availability of the business’ services to the public”; and that the “least restrictive and most cost-effective regulatory scheme is being used.”

If local governments can achieve all that, officials still must prepare a statement showing the estimated regulatory costs. At that point the regulation requires support from two-thirds of the governing body, and would sunset within two years of the date of adoption.

The bill exempts proposed regulations dealing with zoning, nuisances and alcohol or tobacco, as well as those that increase building costs by less than \$750.

Last week Grant told the Florida Phoenix that the bill’s intent “is to save small business owners money.”

“When you have a series of regulations from one county to another that differ,” he said, “it increases the cost to businesses.”

Cragin Mosteller of the Florida Association of Counties told us the bill will affect things like retail sales, civil rights laws such as employment protection for the LGBT community, and ordinances governing strip clubs. She added that the association believes the bill is applicable to zoning ordinances, based on its reading of the language. The Florida Phoenix reported that coastal communities worry it will repeal or preclude bans on plastic straws or cups on the beaches.

Who knows where else it could lead?

This bill destroys the right of local officials to regulate commerce as they see fit for their constituents. People in Polk County, for example, may disagree with bans on plastic straws or local mandates on hiring practices for certain minority groups. But that doesn’t mean Miami, Fort Myers or Orlando should be blocked from enacting such rules if they want them.

The authority of local governments is not sacrosanct. On some issues, the Legislature must step in and overrule. But Grant’s bill is too much, too controlling and goes too far. Lawmakers ought to reject it.

Given these statements, it is quite amazing that Sanders currently holds a seat in the U.S. Senate, let alone that he almost won the 2016 contest to become the Democratic Party’s presidential candidate.

Some might feel tempted to give Bernie the benefit of the doubt. After all, he made those crazy statements many years ago.

No doubt Sanders, along with the rest of the world, witnessed the horrific collapse of communism in the late 20th century.

Moreover, some might think Sanders has learned from the chaos taking place in Venezuela and the human rights tragedies in North Korea, two modern examples of socialist and communist horrors.

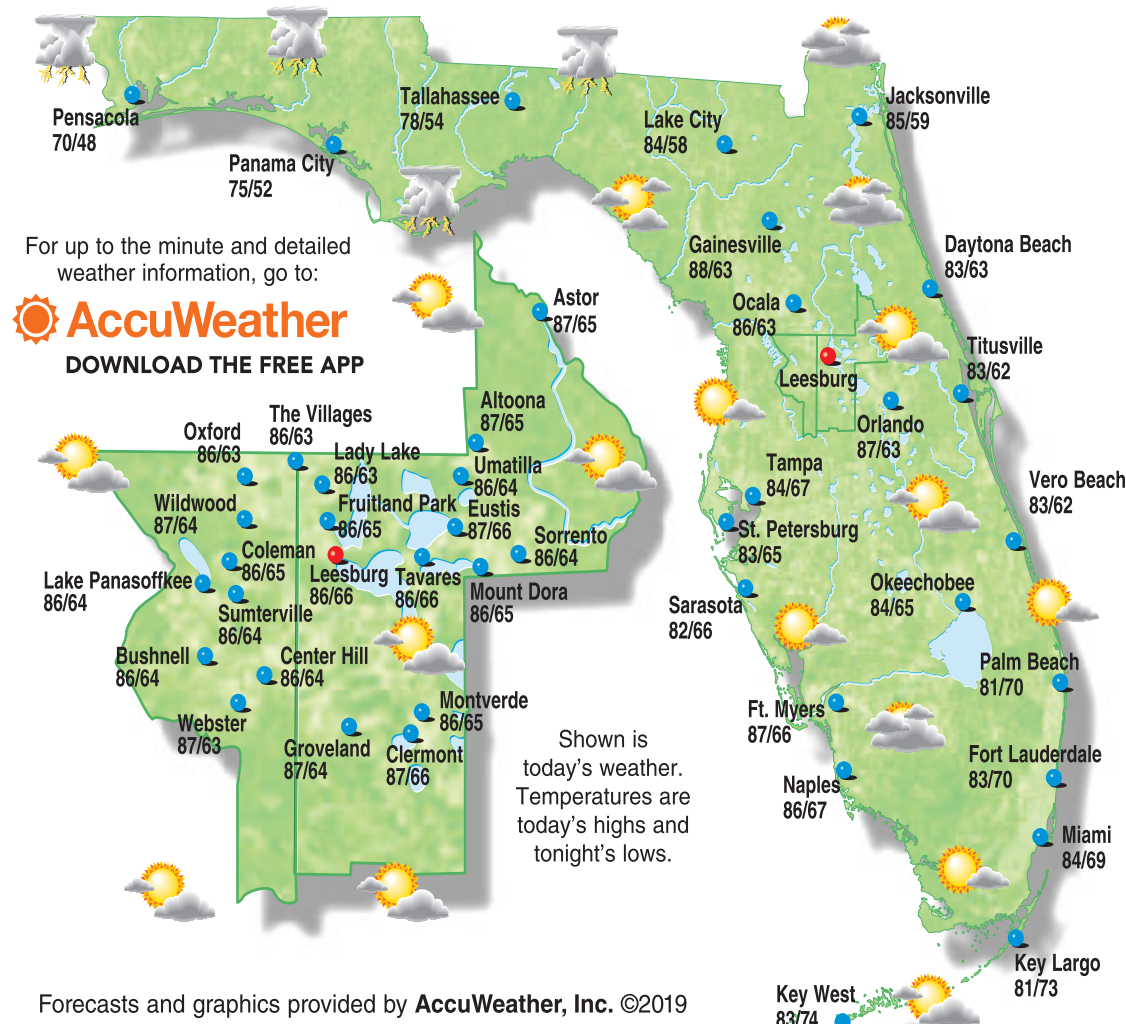
interpret that media as factual, then in effect, the media’s proclamations are actually fake news.

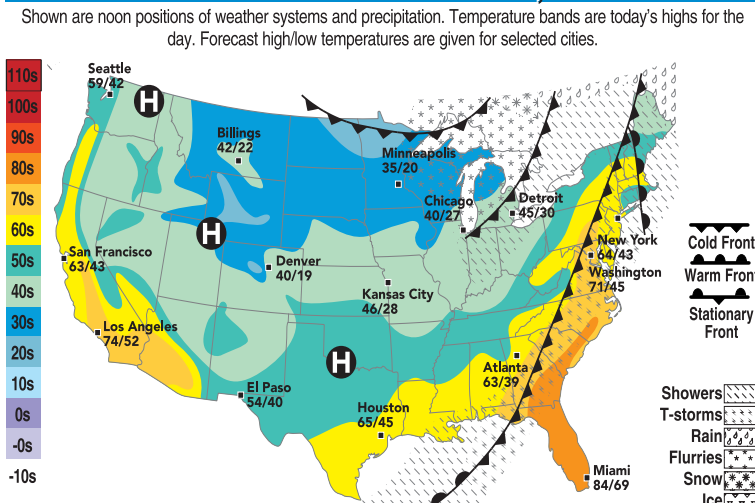

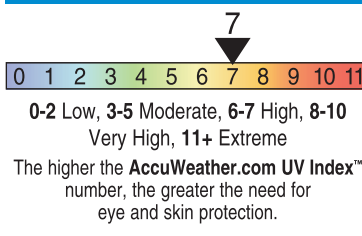

FSU goes OT to beat Va. Tech in ACCs

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — With the clock winding down in a tie game, Florida State's Terance Mann pushed upcourt and launched a twisting off-balance shot that ended with him flat on his back, his feet up in the air and the ball rattling around the rim.

Never a doubt, right? "I knew," Mann said. "I knew it was going in."

Mann's shot with 1.8 seconds left helped the No. 12 Seminoles edge No. 16 Virginia Tech 65-63 on Thursday in the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament quarterfinals, keeping the Seminoles' hot hand with the wildest-looking — yet nonetheless effective — of shots.

Mann's shot broke a 63-all tie for the fourth-seeded Seminoles (26-6), who secured the win when Nickell Alexander-Walker missed a long 3-pointer at the horn on a desperation inbounds play from the far end.

Mann had the biggest shot of the game, but the Seminoles had two other big ones to secure this one in a testament to their balance. That included freshman Devin Vassell hitting a contested 3-pointer with 4.5 seconds left in regulation to force overtime.

"That's just how our team is," said Mann, who had 10 points and nine rebounds. "Whoever feels comfortable with the position they're in, they're going to do it. And we all have full faith in here in everybody to do so."

Vassell scored 14 points to lead the Seminoles, who started the game with a 17-4 lead yet ended up in that tense finish.

It finally came down to Alexander-Walker missing a contested shot in the paint with about 10 seconds left in overtime. The Seminoles didn't call timeout, opting instead to push the ball back the other way.

"I was going to live and die with whatever happened as a result of that," FSU coach Leonard Hamilton said.

Alexander-Walker finished with 21 points for the Hokies, including a 3 that bounced up off the front

Florida beats Arkansas 66-50 in SEC Tournament

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Florida ended its slump just in time to rescue its hopes of making the NCAA Tournament.

Keyontae Johnson scored a career-high 20 points and pulled down 12 rebounds Thursday as No. 8 seed Florida snapped a three-game skid by defeating No. 9 seed Arkansas 66-50 in the Southeastern Conference Tournament.

"It was a must-win to get there," said Florida's KeVaughn Allen, who scored 17 points. "We were thinking win or go home."

Florida's victory boosted its postseason profile, but the Gators (18-14) can make an even bigger statement today by upsetting No. 9 LSU (26-5)

in the SEC quarterfinals (1 p.m., ESPN).

LSU is the No. 1 seed in this tournament. Florida won 82-77 at LSU on Feb. 20 but lost to the Tigers 79-78 at home on March 6, with both those games requiring overtime.

"I feel like we still have more to go," Johnson said. "We still have to get more big wins to prove our point."

Florida took the lead for good with just over 18 minutes remaining and stayed ahead thanks to its defense. Arkansas (17-15) failed to make a basket in the game's final 7 minutes, 54 seconds.

"I feel like we could have got anything that we wanted," said Arkansas' Daniel Gafford, who led the Razorbacks with 15 points. "We couldn't

execute. We shot ourselves in the foot down the stretch."

Arkansas and Florida entered the tournament heading in opposite directions, though only the slumping Gators had a realistic shot at an NCAA Tournament at-large bid. At the start of the day, Florida was 33rd and Arkansas 63rd in the NET rankings, which have replaced the RPI as a criterion for the NCAA Tournament selection committee.

Arkansas had followed up a six-game losing streak by winning its last three regular-season contests to go back above .500. Florida had won five straight in late February before ending the regular season with three consecutive

was a child and to watch him come through what he has and still remain so positive is amazing. In the future, we want the communities to help us select a winner, but I chose D.J. myself because I know his story so well and have seen the impact he's had on so many lives."

In addition to the award, a local film crew was on hand to begin shooting a documentary about Myers. He did not know about the award, despite the commotion on the field caused by multiple camera crews setting up in various locations for interviews.

"I was told that it was about some football stuff," Myers said. "It's an honor to be recognized like this. I knew that some people looked up to me for the way I've handled everything since my accident,

but I never realized how many people have been inspired by my story."

Myers was paralyzed following a freak accident in July of 2017 while making a tackle at summer camp at Stetson University in DeLand. He gets around with the aid of wheelchair and attends classes on campus at South Lake.

Even though his playing days were over, Myers

remained a member of the football team. He patrolled the sidelines during every game and often went to midfield with his teammates for the pregame coin toss.

In South Lake's final home game of the 2018 season, the school honored Myers by retiring his jersey and uniform number.

"The first time I met D.J., I knew he was special," said South Lake

football coach Mark Woolum. "He's always had what few of us ever have; even before his injury, D.J. always brought out the best in everyone he met. And it's amazing to me that after all he's been through, he still has the same upbeat personality he did before he was hurt."

"You can't be around D.J. and not be inspired by him."

Purl believes Myers'

upbeat personality and positive approach to life is genetic.

"After he was hurt, it certainly would've been human nature for D.J.'s mother to tell parents they shouldn't allow their kids to play football," Purl said. "Instead, she never blamed football for her son's injury and even continued to encourage young people to play the game. Instead of feeling sorry,

the family never lost hope or blamed anyone for what happened."

Purl expects the documentary about Myers, which will be filmed over the course of three days, will be released on the United Way YouTube channel. In addition to Thursday's filming, camera crews will also follow Myers away from school and include interviews with Woolum, Myers' South Lake teammates, family and friends.

Through the video, Myers hopes his message will be seen by a larger audience.

"Life is not always what you expect it will be," Myers said. "Nothing is promised to anyone and there will always be a lot of obstacles. The key is to keep pushing forward through the obstacles and coming out on the other side of adversity."

"Don't take anything for granted, but don't ever let anything stop you."

Tiger Woods made only one par on the back nine — five birdies, three bogeys — in a round of 70. He has only broken 70 in the opening round one time at the TPC Sawgrass, when he won in 2013.

"Usually if I had one par, it's usually shooting 30 or 29," Woods said. "Not what I did today."

It wasn't as clean as Woods wanted, especially playing late in the afternoon when the wind began to die and the greens picked up a little more speed.

Even so, it was a reasonable start at a tournament where the key is not to fall too far behind, whether it's in March or May.

The move from May to its traditional spot on the calendar brought green, softer conditions and more wind than usual. Even so, Fleetwood was among several early starters who managed to take aim on the TPC Sawgrass.

Fleetwood had only one birdie on the slightly easier back nine, and finished with birdie putts from 15 feet, 30 feet and 18 feet.

"If you're in the fairway all the time, the course feels very, very different," Fleetwood said. "And it's a massive key around here. And then I just started picking a few shots up, and then you get on a run like 7, 8, 9, and it feels great after that. Just one of them would feel like a great round, so three of them ... I'll take it."

Byeong Hun An and Brian Harman were at 66, while Rory McIlroy also played bogey-free for a 67. He was in a group with Ryan Moore, who made the ninth hole-in-one on the island-green 17th hole,

and Vaughn Taylor, who

must love the move back to March.

Taylor is among 23 players who have competed on the Stadium Players Course in both months. He tied for eighth the last time it was in March in 2006. In the eight times he played in May, he never made the cut.

Bradley, who a week ago shared the 36-hole lead with Fleetwood at Bay Hill, has only one top 10 in his eight trips to the TPC Sawgrass.

Early in my career, I felt so uncomfortable on this course. I really didn't play well here," Bradley said. "It didn't really enjoy ... it just wasn't a good fit for me. And then this year, I really enjoy the different conditions that we're playing in. I like the rough better, and I think it's a great time of year to play here."

Bradley had eagle putts from the fringe on the par-5 11th and short par-4 12th, both times settling for two-putt birdies. He drilled his second shot on the par-5 16th to the middle of the green and watched it feed to 12 feet away for his eagle. He played the back nine in 31, made a 5-foot birdie on No. 1 and sprinkled in a few key par saves before a final birdie to catch Fleetwood.

Harris English had an albatross — the third straight year for one at The Players — on the par-5 11th hole.

The scoring wasn't unusual, nor was the tight leaderboard. It was simply the way the golf course was playing — longer off the tee because the fairways aren't quite as fast with rye overseed, softer around the greens.

In May or in March, there's generally no lack of excitement at Sawgrass.

McIlroy was among those who approved of

the calendar change. This was only the third time in 10 starts at The Players he broke 70 in the first round.

"I think the course over the last 10 years ... it hasn't lent itself to aggressive play," McIlroy said. "It's sort of position and irons of the tee and really trying to plot your way around the golf course. I hit drivers on holes today that I would never have hit driver the last few years."

"I don't know if the course is easier or not," he said. "We'll see what the stroke average is at the end of the day. But

because I think it's playing longer, it'll play longer for most of the guys, and I think it should all even out. But I definitely like the golf course the way it is in March."

Whatever the month, the island green is still there.

Moore used a 54-degree wedge for the first ace on the 17th hole since Sergio Garcia two years ago. It was the ninth hole-in-one on the most infamous hole at Sawgrass during The Players. Paul Casey put two in the water on the 17th and made a quadruple bogey.

losses.

Florida turned things around Thursday in part because leading scorer Allen broke out of his personal slump.

Allen had scored a total of 18 points in his last four regular-season games, but the graduate of North Little Rock (Arkansas) High School scored 17 points Thursday against his home-state school.

Florida was clinging to a 47-44 lead when Allen took a 3-point shot that bounced off the rim multiple times before falling through with 7:26 remaining. That 3-point shot started a 17-4 run that helped Florida seal the victory.

“He got a couple for him to go early, and you could see in his body language, his confidence level increased a little bit,” Florida coach Mike White said. “Down the stretch, we rode him.”

BIG PICTURE

Arkansas: The Razorbacks were unable to do anything against Florida’s defense again. Arkansas’ 50 points Thursday represented a season low. The Razorbacks’ lowest point total during the regular season came in a 57-51 loss to Florida on Jan. 9.

“Very disappointed in our performance,”

Arkansas coach Mike Anderson said. “(We’d) been playing some pretty good basketball. To come on this stage and not play as well as we’ve been playing is kind of disappointing.”

Florida: Allen’s recovery from his late-season slump gives Florida plenty of reason for encouragement. The Gators’ hopes of beating LSU could depend on whether second-leading scorer Noah Locke can bounce back after shooting 1 of 9 against Arkansas.

REVERSAL OF FORTUNE

Johnson had gone scoreless in Florida’s regular-season victory at Arkansas. He had arguably the best performance of his career in the rematch.

His 20 points shattered his previous career high of 15, set three times during the regular season. His 12 rebounds were just one off his career high.

QUOTABLE

“Bottom line is they played a lot more aggressive than we did,” said Arkansas’ Isaiah Joe, who scored 12 points. “They wanted it a lot more.”

UP NEXT

Arkansas awaits a possible NIT invitation. Florida faces LSU in an SEC quarterfinal today.

Returning
a stored car
to service:
What to do

Brad Bergholdt

Q: I inherited a 2003 Final 500 Edition Oldsmobile Aurora with 58,000 miles and in pretty decent condition. It has only been driven about 300 miles in the last five years as it sat in a three-sided carport. I drive a late model SUV full time, but I'm thinking of using the Olds as a summer weekend sedan. I have a trusted mechanic and am wondering what type of things I should have him check out to insure its reliable roadworthiness. Fluids, belts, hoses, belts, brake lines, etc. Any advice would be greatly appreciated. My father was the original owner and there is some sentimental value attached.

—Mark S.

A: Your Tech should have no problem with any of this, but I'll chip in as if this potential classic were mine.

I'd approach this from three angles: first, a comprehensive used vehicle inspection in order to establish a baseline for needed service and repairs; second, bringing maintenance up to date and mileage; and, finally, addressing possible issues related to long-term storage.

With 58,000 miles on the clock, the Olds should be in pretty good mechanical condition, with the possible exception of the battery, brake wear and rotor rust, and belts and hoses. A 60,000 service would take care of needed fluid and maintenance needs.

As to storage issues, I'd certainly flush and renew brake fluid, remove and replace as much fuel as possible (gas goes stale over time), and check all four tires for their date code. This is a four-digit number embossed on the sidewall, the final four digits of the tire information number. Look for the abbreviation "DOT" (Department of Transportation). Following this will be four characters; keep going to the right to an oval shaped area with bullets at each end. The date code is the final four digits of this sequence. For example 4304 would mean the tire was manufactured in the 43rd week of 2004. It's recommended to discard tires more than 10 years old. If the carport offered shade for the tires I might be tempted to stretch this a bit, if they look great otherwise.

Adding a bottle of Techron or similar fuel system cleaner will help to diminish fuel system deposits. I'd run a half tank of fuel through and refill to remove/dilute any remaining stale fuel before taking any trips or strong hill climbs. And if you'll be storing the car during the off-season, how about hooking up a battery

2020 Soul is the best of the cute 'utes'

SAN DIEGO — We're told by automakers that Millennials would rather cycle, scooter, or take the bus than own a car.

The reality is far different: they can't afford a car — new or used. Once they can, Millennials opt for something fun, something that enhances their life. It must have room for friends, family and lifestyle debris. It must be able to travel to who knows where to do who knows what.

And not only must it have an audio system loud enough to inflict hearing loss, it must also be reliable, easy on gas, cheap to insure and visually compelling. And it helps if it looks vaguely like a crossover SUV that's been left in the dryer too long. In essence, a cute ute.

The Japanese-market Toyota bB, sold stateside as the 2003-2006 Scion xB, established this class, joined shortly thereafter by the ugly and ungainly 2003-2011 Honda Element,

the distinctly odd 2009-2014 Nissan Cube, the over-caffeinated 2011-2017 Nissan Juke and — of course — the ever-funky Kia Soul, introduced in 2010 in advertising featuring human-sized hip-hop hamsters, a fairly disturbing thought once you think about it.

Marketed as unambiguous boxes of hipness, these reasonably priced vehicles resembled mobile toasters designed with an unexpected impudence. But as the sale rack at H&M proves, fast fashion possesses the lifespan of a lightning bug in September. Of the boxes mentioned, only the Kia Soul remains, now competing against a host of less compelling and far more conventional entry-level adversaries, including the Nissan Kicks, Honda HR-V, Ford Eco-Sport, Toyota CH-R, Jeep Renegade, Mazda CX-3 and Chevrolet Trax among others.

But the Kia Soul endures.

It's the vehicle that endowed Kia with a personality that its identical corporate cousin lacks. Credit design honcho Peter Schreyer and his staff for making Kia something more

than brand for those with thin wallets. Sure, you might flip burgers for a living, but you don't want to be constantly reminded of the fact.

And the 2020 Soul is the best of the mainstream cute ute breed.

Design

While the second generation Soul, introduced for 2014, didn't stray far from the corporate Habitrail, the 2020 model plays the same melody in a different key. Its looks are fresh, yet it retains the attitude of previous models without slavishly mimicking them. Its overall stance and shape remains the same, taking its inspiration from a boar with a backpack, according to Kia's PR minions. This means a rounded box with slab sides and a snub nose accentuated by new renditions of Kia's trademark tiger nose grille. Squinty lighting now crowns the front end.

Out back, the styling still features the appearance of a colored panel floating in the tailgate, except it's now framed by wider wraparound taillights. The only sour note in its styling

2019 Ascent takes Subaru to new heights

2019 Subaru Ascent Premium: price, \$36,630 as tested. (\$34,195 for the trim level. \$1,460 for Reverse Automatic Braking, keyless entry and start, and power rear gate.)

Conventional wisdom: Motor Trend calls it "Three-row winner."

Marketer's pitch: "Take in the view."

Reality: A step up in many ways, but some caveats.

What's new: Everything. The Ascent offers three rows of Subaru for the growing American family needing to spread out.

Up to speed: The Ascent really offers some oomph, and 0-60 happens in 7.3 seconds, according to Motor Trend. The 2.4-liter turbo creates 260 horsepower but feels like more. And the horizontally opposed engine setup sounds cool doing it.

Shifty-ish: Though the Ascent uses a gearless CVT to transfer engine power to the wheels, Subaru offers a manual mode with seven steps for drivers to enjoy. The paddle shifters — the only way to shift — work fairly well.

Automatic mode works fine.

On the road: For so long,

Subarus have gone down in my notes as having competent, if not fun, handling. Perhaps the people at Subaru weren't happy with this, but they should have been.

Because now handling in the Ascent — as well as in the new-for-2018 Crosstrek — feels wifty and uncertain. The Ascent is fine on the highways, but take a country lane with a few hilly curves and it becomes more challenging to stay in lane.

Much to be alarmed about: The jagged handling is bad enough, but the Ascent comes

with a lane-departure warning that chimed whenever I would drift a bit while traveling above 40 mph. Try as I might, I never did figure out how to shut it off. (I later learned there's a button near the rearview mirror.) This is a pain in construction zones, when easing left or right to avoid an obstacle, or whenever the sensor feels like being an obnoxious nanny.

The EyeSight program does offer some nifty features, though, including lights that tell you when you've drifted to one side or another, or to

slow down, or when the cruise is spotting a car ahead.

On the downside, cruise control won't work when there's no radar, for instance because of gummed-up sensors. Bummer.

And little things like landscape plants activate the sensors. Reverse Automatic Braking slammed the brakes on so hard in my driveway that even my wife was startled. (And, of course, I got that look. "Oh, sure, blame the car.")

Friends and stuff: Subaru is pretty unaccustomed to three rows, but it has scored one big success: Legroom in the compact three-row Ascent is actually fairly generous. At 5 feet 10 inches, I can sit comfortably in all three rows, at least leg-wise. And there's even room for eight, depending on the configuration.

Headroom in the third row, though, is among the worst I've tested, as my head presses flat against the ceiling without trying. And that third row is really close to the rear hatch glass.

And standard cloth seats make cleanup pretty challenging, not what you'd expect from a Subaru.

In back, 17.8 cubic feet is available for luggage and 86.5

Test Drive: 2019 Buick Regal

This week, we're driving Buick's new generation 2019 Regal GS, with the "GS" taxonomy standing for "Gran Sport." Built in Russelsheim, Germany, our tester features standard fully electronic all wheel drive (AWD), lighter and stronger rear multi-link suspension components and the expected GS performance upgrades.

Dating back to the first ever Regal in 1973, today's Regal is a real beauty and features both four-door sedans and a cool looking station wagon called Regal TourX. So be it the Gran Sport, an entry Buick Sportback or top grade Regal Avenir, this line is still a popular choice for those who still like midsize cars.

Buick's GS heritage also deserves note as car collectors agree the legendary Buick Skylark Gran Sport muscle cars made a big splash during the days of high horsepower and boulevard cruising. Built from 1965-1972, these Gran Sport models are still beloved and very collectible, especially the magnificent 1970 Buick GSX that touted a 455-inch V8 and 510 lb. ft. of torque.

Starting at \$25,070 in Sportback front drive format, non-GS Regals

come standard across the line with 4-cylinder engines and either 8- or 9-speed automatic transmissions. However, on GS models, all-wheel-drive and the 3.6-liter V6 are both standard fare as no 4-cylinder or front-drive is available. This V6 delivers 310 horsepower and 282 lb. ft. of torque and mates to a special GS specific 9-speed automatic transmission the results in 19 city and 27 highway EPA fuel mileage estimates.

If you want AWD and insist on a 4-cylinder, Buick offers several Regal models with the turbocharged, high-output Ecotec 2.0-liter engines delivering 250 horsepower and 260 lb. ft. of torque. These Regals offer

good AWD EPA numbers at 21 city and 29 highway while the front-drive only Regal with the 4-cylinder delivers 22 city and 32 highway. (If you live in warm climate, the 4-cylinder front-drive Regal is a fine choice).

On the road, Gran Sport's AWD suspension works well and the added traction pays dividends in snowy weather climates. All GS models come with 19-inch Continental tires on sporty alloy wheels and drivers can select their GS steering response, suspension and other driving dynamics with three interactive drive control settings of Touring, Sport and GS. Surprising is no GS paddle shifters are available.

The Regal cabin is really slick and features GS specific trim, aluminum alloy pedals, keyless entry and start, tilt and telescopic steering, premium infotainment stereo system, USB ports, Bluetooth, dual zone air, Sirius XM Satellite, On-Star, heated steering wheel, and much more.

In summary, the 2019 Buick Regal in any style is a fine car.

Likes: Looks, AWD abilities, cargo space, Gran Sport legend.

Dislikes: Only two red caliper Brembo disc brakes, current V6 could use more ponies.

behind the first row.

Play some tunes: For so long, my stereo reviews have been pretty positive, to the point where I worried I was starting to lose my touch — or my hearing.

Unfortunately for the Ascent, this old kid is still alright. The sound from this stereo unit is acceptable when I'm listening to any old song, but I want my favorites to be played just so. Maybe it works great for the rap set, but those of us still stuck on jangly guitars are still paying the bills.

And changing the controls? Oy. Bass, treble, and midrange controls involve touchscreen sliders, so Ascent drivers better really appreciate the sound while the vehicle is in motion. Changing them on the highway can be hazardous to your health. Fortunately, dials control volume and

tuning.

Information, please: Standard trip computers are among the most useful inventions to come along in the past 10 years or so. But Subaru plunks down its old LCD trip computer at the top of this all-new SUV's dashboard.

What's worse, the miles remaining figure changes only in 10-mile increments, and these are ludicrously unrealistic. I filled the Ascent tank, had 310 miles remaining, then had 320 miles a mile later, then dropped to 260 miles after a 25-mile drive. And I was driving as I'd driven the previous 250 miles, so it wasn't due to unfamiliarity with my typical consumption. On another occasion, I started with 190 miles, and dropped to 80 miles after an 80-mile round trip.

Fuel economy: I averaged about 21 mpg: in the usual round of testing.

Where it's built: Lafayette, Ind.

than it really is.

Practicality

The new wardrobe lends it a larger look. And while its wheelbase grows 1.2 inches, and overall length expands 2.2 inches, width remains unchanged. This allows for a spacious cabin, with a commanding seating position, particularly in the rear seat. As before, headroom is impressive — so if you have a bouffant hairdo, this is your ride. There's also a generous 24.2 cubic foot cargo hold that expands to 62.1 cubic feet with the rear seats folded.

The inside story

The Soul's interior ambience is about what you'd expect for the price. There are soft touch points just where you'd want them. As before, interior accent lighting can be set to pulse with the audio system's music, although now the lighting has been added to the door handles and speaker grilles. Sweet.

A 7.0-inch infotainment touchscreen is standard and includes Bluetooth, Android Auto and Apple CarPlay. Sponder EX and GT models have a 10.3-inch display providing space for up to 10 apps. Tucked ahead of the transmission shifter is a small space with 12-volt outlets and USB ports. You can add Qi wireless charging to it, making it the perfect place to recharge wireless devices. Kia also offers a head-up display that projects crucial information, such as speed, onto a pop-up panel that pops out on top of the instrument cluster.

That said, deciding on a model has become more complicated now that Kia offers the Soul in double the number of trim levels for 2020, including LX, S,

GT-Line, X-Line, EX and GT-Line Turbo.

Behind the wheel

Except for the GT-Line Turbo, an Atkinson-cycle 2.0-liter four-cylinder engine with 147 horsepower and 132 pound-feet of torque is standard. It's mated to a continuously variable automatic transmission, although a six-speed dual clutch transmission is available on base LX models. Top-shelf GT-Line Turbos get a turbocharged 1.6-liter four-cylinder and seven-speed dual-clutch automatic transmission that generates 201 horsepower and 195 pound-feet of torque. Front-wheel drive is standard; all-wheel drive is not offered.

Most buyers will be satisfied with the performance of the base 2.0-liter engine, which furnishes enough power, only becoming a little winded on hills — although the transmission makes up for it. The transmission shifts unobtrusively, and never allows the engine to rev too high, like many continuously variable transmissions. It will also imitate a conventional six-speed automatic, although this seems more gimmicky than helpful. Enthusiasts should consider the GT-Line Turbo. It's extra horsepower and dual clutch gearbox delivers more fun, even if it suffers from a bit of turbo lag. Nevertheless, it will sinfully seduce your soul into

flogging the Soul with unremitting passion.

Regardless of which model you choose, you'll find that it's not ultimate power that makes the Soul so impressive, it's the vehicle's nuance and poise. Easy to drive smoothly, it remains poised without undue body motions, thanks to excellent bump absorption and body lean that's held in check while cornering. The numb steering is nicely weighted and precise, and brakes are light in feel but progressive in action. Even with the base powertrain, there's little to no road or tire noise, let alone engine noise.

There are luxury crossovers that don't behave this well. It's a superlative performance, one that was once unthinkable in a Kia. Credit R&D chief Albert Biermann, who formerly ran BMW's M performance division. Biermann, who oversaw this car's engineering, has brought his touch to a number of Kia products, including the new Stinger and K900.

Closing thoughts

Its performance is a transformative trait, one that makes the Kia Soul more than one-trick hamster. It's a superlative performance, one with the features and athleticism that belie its price. And as a design statement, it smartly stands apart at a price that won't break the bank.

Spend some quality time with 'Gloria Bell'

If anything about "Gloria Bell" seems familiar to you, it probably means that you're a connoisseur of South American cinema, specifically of Chile, and that you likely saw the 2013 film "Gloria" at your local art house.

In an unusual move, that well-received film, written and directed by Chilean auteur Sebastian Lelio, has been rewritten and re-directed by him, now in English, with its setting relocated from Santiago to Los Angeles, and its lead roles now handled by Julianne Moore — the title character — and John Turturro.

It's a busy movie, with Gloria Bell, a divorced insurance adjuster and mother of two adult children trying her best to stay occupied, even if it means settling into a life of repetition. She keeps going to the same disco club, hoping to find a dance partner, but usually drinking alone. She regularly calls her kids, but they're too busy to meet up with her. She chats with a sassy friend at work, but the discussion always ends up being about her friend's dissatisfaction with the job.

But don't feel bad for Gloria. Yes, there's a longing for meaningful companionship, but there are other friends to visit — couples, of course. There's a doctor who tells her she'll need eyedrops for the rest of her life. There's a stray cat that keeps breaking into and hanging out at her apartment. Her mom (Holland Taylor) is nearby by so there are lunch dates. There's her car radio, with which she sings along to every pop song it plays. She seems to be fine with the mundane.

Besides, there are ways to get together with her kids. She can go visit her son Peter (Michael Cera), who's always home with his new baby, explaining that his wife is "finding herself in the desert" or is just away without sufficient explanation. She can take one of the yoga classes that her daughter Anne (Caren Pistorius) teaches, but Anne can't stay around

afterward because she must run off to see her Swedish boyfriend who is — wait for it — a professional surfer.

But then, one night at the club, she makes eye contact with Arnold (John Turturro), a new face on the scene, who has a pretty good opening line. They talk, they drink, they dance, they let each other know they're divorced, and she goes home with him.

So, it's a busy movie. But nothing of much significance happens. It consists of little slices of Gloria's life. She's affable, the kind of person you want nice things to happen to. Alas, Arnold isn't exactly a nice thing. No, he's not an abuser or a thief, nothing like that. He's a victim, one of his own making, who can't get away from the suffocating family he left ... or was left by: A wife we learn nothing about, and two adult daughters who can't handle even the simplest of problems, who constantly call him, demanding his help, often when he's with Gloria. And he always goes. He also leaves Gloria, unannounced, if he's uncomfortable. And even though they appear to be right for each other, it's never long before he's uncomfortable.

Which is when he ups and vanishes, one time after saying, in a restaurant, "I'll be right back."

What's poor Gloria to do? She's strong. Arnold is pathetic. Gloria gains our sympathy, yet she keeps being used as if she were a doormat. So, is she pathetic, too? The lingering question is how are we supposed to feel about her?

Or maybe the trick is just to watch her, to eavesdrop on her life. There's nothing very funny or very dramatic

going on. The film is not plot-driven. But there are great performances from everyone, and if the film is about anything, it's about acting, about strong actors portraying appealing — and not-so-appealing — characters. Two things are certain about Gloria. We like her and she's going to be OK.

Bidding quiz

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

East	South	West	North

What would you bid now with each of the following five hands?

1. ♠AKJ5♥Q63♦AJ4♣952
2. ♠Q84♥KQ72♦AQJ93♣6

5. ♠AK5♥AQ94♦KQJ82♣2

1. **Pass.** A takeout double shows the values for an opening bid, but the range of strength may extend from 12 or 13 points to more than 20. Also, distributional features may range from poor, as in this hand, to very good, as in some of the succeeding hands.

The doubler has an obligation to identify the nature of his hand after partner responds to the double. With minimum values — 13 to 15 points — he passes if partner has made a non-jump response. With this hand, therefore, South should not bid again. If he were to continue bidding, he would be implying values in excess of a minimum double.

2. **Two hearts.** The player who responds to the double (in this case, North) may have a very weak hand, since he is merely obeying partner's command that he bid. The doubler therefore has to tread gingerly when deciding what to do next.

Here, South can afford to bid two hearts, not on the basis of his high cards, which are close to minimum, but on the basis of his distribution, which is reasonably good. Four trumps and the singleton club, as well as the strong diamond suit, are trick-taking features that pull the hand out of the minimum class and justify a further bid. The single raise is mildly invitational and shows 16 to 18 points (including distribution).

3. **One notrump.** This indicates a hand a bit too strong for an original one-notrump overall with at least one stopper in opener's suit.

4. **Three hearts.** Here you have only 15 high-card points, but the chances of making game with this hand are far better than those in the preceding 18-point hand.

The way to gauge such hands is not by point count but by the probable number of winning tricks. Thus, if partner has as little as five hearts to the queen and the queen of diamonds, there is an excellent chance of making four hearts. The three-heart bid (highly invitational) asks partner to carry on to game with values of this sort.

5. **Four hearts.** Here, the chance of making 10 tricks is so good that you bid game yourself rather than risk partner's passing a lesser bid. If partner has nothing but five hearts to the jack, there is a reasonable chance of making 10 tricks.
