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# Eustis strangling victim dies

**State Attorney will** consider upgrading charges in death of pregnant Sue Ellen **Anselmo**

EUSTIS - Sue Ellen Anselmo, the woman who police say was strangled by her stepson at a Eustis cemetery last week, died Monday, according to the State Attorney's Office and Eustis Police Department.

Anselmo, 39, was declared dead at 2:04 p.m. by physicians at Orlando Regional Medical Center. Authorities say she was pregnant.

As a result of Anselmo's death, the State Attorney's

Office will consider upgrading the second-degree attempted murder charge against Ian Magnus Anselmo, Sue Ellen's stepson.

"We'll evaluate the case and make the appropriate filing decision," said Assistant State Attorney Emily Curington, the prosecutor on the case. She added that the options range between murder and manslaughter, but the final decision will be made once she has seen all of the information.

The arraignment date and the deadline for charges is April 8, she said.

Ian, 20, was arrested Wednesday after he called Eustis police and told them he had killed his stepmother at Greenwood Cemetery in Eustis.

According to police reports, officers found Sue Ellen slumped over in a car, unresponsive and bleeding from the nose and mouth with a cord wrapped around her neck. Ian was covered in blood.

Sue Ellen was taken to

# New buses for Lake

**Lake County Schools** purchases 27 new buses with technology, safety upgrades

TAVARES — Lake County Schools purchased 27 new buses for its fleet last week, adding 24 standard buses and three that are outfitted for special-needs students.

The buses will replace older ones, mostly purchased in 2004 and 2005. Those older models will be moved into the spare fleet, made up of about 50 buses, according to Scott Pfender, the district's transportation director.

Bus purchases are made each year, Pfender said, with a goal to keep every bus within a reasonable lifespan.

"If we purchase 24 buses per school year, it would allow us to keep a bus on route for 12 years and then rotate it to our spare fleet for three years," he said.

In total, the buses cost around \$2.9 million, at \$107,550 per standard bus, and \$113,993 for buses

## Justice Dept. probing development of Boeing jets

WASHINGTON - U.S. prosecutors are looking into the development of Boeing's 737 Max jets, a person briefed on the matter revealed Monday, the same day French aviation investigators concluded there were "clear similarities" in the crash of an Ethiopian Airlines Max 8 last week and a Lion Air jet in October.

The Justice Department probe will examine the way Boeing was regulated by the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration, said the person, who asked not to be identified because the inquiry is not public.

A federal grand jury in Washington, D.C., sent a subpoena to someone involved in the plane's development seeking emails, messages and other communications, the source told The Associated Press.

The Wall Street Journal reported on the probe on Sunday and also said the Transportation Department's inspector general is looking into the plane's anti-stall system. It quotes unidentified people familiar with both cases.

The anti-stall system may have been involved in the Oct. 29 crash of a Lion Air jet off of Indonesia that killed 189 people. It's also under scrutiny in the March 10 crash of an Ethiopian Airlines jet that killed 157.

KINSHASA, CONGO Congo president suspends installing senators

Congo's interior minister says the president has suspended installing newly elected senators after weekend protests led to violence that killed at least one person.

Interior Minister Basile Olongo said Monday that President Felix Tshisekedi has also postponed governor elections set for March 27. He made the decision after meeting with the chief of the National Assembly, the president of the outgoing senate, the prime minister and foreign and interior ministers.

Tshisekedi said the suspension is meant to give prosecutors time to investigate allegations that local deputies were corrupted by candidates for senate seats.

#### **MOSCOW Putin signs bill punishing** those who insult the state

Russian President Vladimir Putin has signed bills restricting online media and making a criminal of anyone who insults the state  $-\ laws\ that$ critics see as part of Kremlin efforts to stifle criticism and tighten media control.

A bill passed by the Russian parliament earlier this month introduces fines for publishing materials showing disrespect to the state, its symbols or government organs. Repeat offenders could face a 15-day jail sentence.

Another bill envisages blocking anyone who publishes "fake news" online that is perceived to threaten public health and security. It gives those who publish such information a day to correct or remove it. If they fail to do so, prosecutors will move to block them.

#### WASHINGTON DC-area sniper shootings case to have Supreme Court hearing

The Supreme Court on Monday agreed to consider Virginia's plea to reinstate the life-without-parole sentence of a man who as a teenager participated in sniper shootings that terrorized the Washington, D.C., region in 2002.

The justices said they will take up the state's appeal in the case of Lee Boyd Malvo, who was 17 when he and John Allen Muhammad fatally shot 10 people in Maryland, Virginia and Washington. Malvo was sentenced to life-withoutparole terms in Virginia and in Maryland. Muhammad, who was 41 at the time of the shootings, was sentenced to death and was executed in 2009.

# Gunman kills 3 on Dutch tram

UTRECHT, Netherlands A gunman killed three people and wounded five during a mid-morning tram ride Monday in the Dutch city of Utrecht, raising the specter of another extremist attack only days after the murderous rampage in New Zealand.

Authorities seized a Turkish-born suspect after a manhunt that convulsed the historic city of nearly 350,000 people for most of the day.

As night set in, three victims lay in critical condition, and the motive for the bloodshed remained under investigation. Prime Minister Mark Rutte said authorities were trying to determine whether the attack had "terror motives."

Justice Minister Ferd Grapperhaus said the suspect, identified as Gokmen Tanis, 37, was known to justice authorities and had a criminal record, but would not elaborate. Police said they also detained another man on suspicion of involvement but released no details.

The shooting came three days after 50 people were killed when an immigranthating white supremacist opened fire at two mosques in Christchurch, New Zealand, during Friday prayers. There was no immediate indication of any link between the two events.

The Utrecht attack took place at a busy intersection in a residential neighborhood. The gunman was alleged to have had an automatic weapon, Grapperhaus said.

"We assume a terror motive," Mayor Jan van Zanen said as police searched for the killer, though he added that other motives could not be ruled out.

In the aftermath of the shooting, Dutch authorities put the Netherlands' fourth-largest city on lockdown, raised the threat level in the area to the maximum

of 5 and tightened security at airports and key buildings in the country. Police issued a photo of a bearded Tanis aboard a tram in a blue

hooded top.

"If it is a terror attack," the prime minister declared, "then we have only one answer: Our nation, democracy, must be stronger that fanaticism and violence."

Heavily armed officers with dogs searched for the killer, gathering at one point in front of an apartment building close to the scene. However, the suspect was later arrested at another location in the city. The threat level soon returned to 4.

Police said a red Renault compact car was carjacked shortly before the shooting and later found across town.

Local media said Tanis had been charged several times over the past years

with offenses ranging from attempted manslaughter to petty crime in and around Utrecht.

Two weeks ago he was in court on charges of raping of woman in 2017, news reports

The identities of the shooting victims were not immediately released, and Grapperhaus would not say if any were known to the gunman.

Political parties halted campaigning ahead of provincial elections scheduled for Wednesday that will also determine the makeup of Parliament's upper house. A televised debate also was canceled. It was not clear if campaigning would resume Tuesday.

**LEESBURG Family suing LifeStream Behavioral Center over** man's death

The family of a man who died at LifeStream Behavioral Center is suing the mental health center and a physician, claiming that medical malpractice led to the man's death.

John Wesley Dowell III was admitted to the hospital on Oct. 1, 2016, according to the suit filed on behalf of his widow, Audria Faleiro-Dowell and the couple's two minor children. Nine days later he was "found slumped over the edge of his bed vomiting coffee ground emesis...," according to the suit.

He was taken to Leesburg Regional Medical Center where he was pronounced dead.

The wrongful death suit also names Dr. Abid B. Darr. It claims inadequate record-keeping, monitoring, the lack of a proper plan and "inappropriate administration of Clozapine and lack of appropriate psychotropic medication."

Among the damages sought are the loss of past and future earnings, funeral expenses and loss of companionship."

ALifeStream spokesperson said the hospital and its physicians do not comment on pending litigation.

#### LAKE PANASOFFKEE **Sumter County man kills** himself after firing at SWAT

A man holed up up in his Sumter County home fired several rounds at deputies before finally turning the gun on himself Sunday night.

According to the Sumter County Sheriff's Office, deputies went to the home about 10:30 p.m. Sunday because of what they termed a domestic dispute. They tried to make contact with the 61-yearold man, but he refused to cooperate and at one point fired a shot out the front door. The Sumter County Sheriff's Office SWAT team responded with hostage negotiators, who again tried to contact with man without success.

According to deputies, the man then fired several rounds at the SWAT team, striking the SWAT vehicle multiple times. He then turned the gun on himself and was pronounced dead at the scene from a selfinflicted gunshot wound.

# Man shot by deputy identified

CLERMONT - The Lake County Sheriff's Office has identified the man who was shot and killed by a deputy during a domestic violence call Sunday as Jorge Luis Rivera-Melendez, 33.

Deputies responded to the call at about 1:45 p.m. at 16450 Macon St. in Clermont. Rivera-Melendez's girlfriend

told police he had thrown her down and attacked her with a vase, then fled before they arrived. She pointed them

to a nearby apartment complex where he was located by deputies.

Sgt. Jim Vachon with the Lake County Sheriff's Office

said deputies chased Rivera-Melendez for some time and told him to put down the gun, which they later confirmed was a loaded 9 mm pistol. At some point during the chase, Vachon said, a deputy shot him. He was taken to an area hospital, where he died. No deputies were injured.

As is standard procedure in an officer-involved shooting, Florida Department of Law Enforcement is investigating.

Rivera-Melendez had one prior arrest, according to Lake County Jail and court records. He was charged with fleeing and eluding an officer and resisting or obstructing an officer without violence. He pleaded no contest in 2016, was placed on probation and adjudication was withheld by the courts.

Vachon said he also had three prior domestic violence complaints which didn't result in arrests.

#### How to donate to those devastated by **Hurricane Michael**

PANAMA CITY - Five months after Hurricane Michael tore a 40-milewide hole through the community, many in Bay County still need help.

Instead of grass returning with the spring rains, RV's are springing up in yards as homeowners close in on half a year of being unable to live in their homes, half a year waiting for contractors or fighting with insurance. FEMA trailer parks have taken root in city and county-owned spaces, including the Bay County Fairgrounds, where families are crammed into travel trailers and packed together like sardines.

Some families are closing in on half a year of being unable to get electricity to their homes. Big box stores like TJ Maxx, Homegoods and Kohl's are still closed, representing hundreds of jobs in limbo. The State of Emergency was recently

extended for the 20th time and in Panama City alone, between 500 and 1,000 homes and about 500 businesses will need to be demolished. People are still living in tents, either in their yards or together in tent communities and some people are even still living in the destroyed public housing complexes. Debris piles taller than a person still line

some streets. The number of homeless students in Bay District Schools has doubled to more than 4,000.

# Felons' voting rights plan spurs questions

TALLAHASSEE - Hookers who've been convicted of prostitution three times, cyberstalkers and inmates who expose themselves to prison workers wouldn't be eligible to have their voting rights automatically restored, under a House proposal aimed at carrying out a constitutional amendment approved in November.

The constitutional amendment, which appeared on the ballot as Amendment 4, granted "automatic" restoration of voting rights to felons "who have completed all terms of their sentence, including parole or probation." The amendment excluded people "convicted of murder or a felony sexual offense."

But state and local elections officials, as well as clerks of court and prosecutors, are relying on the Legislature to provide guidance about the exceptions. They also want to know what conditions must be met for sentences to be considered complete.

The House Criminal Justice Subcommittee is scheduled Tuesday to take up a proposal (PCB CRJ 19-03) that would define "murder" as first-degree and seconddegree murder, but does not include attempted murder or manslaughter, offenses that backers of the amendment maintain were not intended to be considered exceptions to the automatic rights restoration.

But the House plan captures dozens of sex-related offenses, such as human trafficking and locating an adult entertainment store within 2,500 feet of a school.

### House considers higher ed spending changes

TALLAHASSEE – Seeking changes in the wake of a highprofile financial scandal at the University of Central Florida, the House is expected Tuesday to start moving forward with a plan that would revamp spending rules for the higher education system, including on construction projects.

The proposal, backed by House Speaker Jose Oliva, would broaden how universities and colleges can spend unused state dollars, known as "carry forward funds," to pay for repairs and remodeling of existing state-funded construction projects. With additional spending flexibility, the proposal would require the institutions to publicly determine their spending priorities.

The bill (PCB HEA 19-01), which will be heard Tuesday by the House Higher **Education Appropriations** Subcommittee, would also prohibit colleges and universities from transferring state money to other funds within the institutions without prior approval from the Legislature.

The proposed changes come after the House Public Integrity & Ethics Committee wrapped up an investigation into the University of Central Florida that found \$85 million in improper transfers were made by the university for building projects. The

Chairman James Grant, R-Tampa, told The News Service of Florida he instructed staff to include all felony sex offenses in the legislation.

"When the Constitution says 'felony sex offenses' and that means nothing legally, the best I can do is propose a list of felonies that are sexual," Grant, a lawyer, said. "The reality is I'm going to do my best effort to maintain what I believe the rule of law now requires in a superambiguous constitutional amendment."

The House proposal's definitions of what it means to have completed a sentence could also be controversial.

Some of the constitutional amendment's proponents believe it does not require full payment of restitution, because such a requirement was not specifically mentioned in the amendment. Other officials maintain restitution and issues such as mandatory drug testing or school attendance should be considered components of sentences if they are included in judges' sentencing orders.

The bill would require felons who've fulfilled prison or jail sentences, as well as parole or probation, to pay off any "financial obligation arising from felony conviction," unless the payment recipient has waived the debt. A financial obligation continued through a civil judgment, such as a lien, would also have to be paid off before a felon could be considered

eligible to have his or her voting rights "automatically" restored.

And before inmates are released, the proposal would require the Department of Corrections or county jail staff members to provide "an accounting of all outstanding financial obligations imposed by a court, the department, or the Florida Commission on Offender Review" for each felony conviction.

The House measure "expands what it means to complete your sentence," according to Neil Volz, the political director of a committee that backed the amendment.

"We're opposed to restricting voting rights for friends, neighbors, family members who are eligible to vote because of Amendment 4. This bill does that," Volz, whose right to vote was restored following passage of the amendment, said in a telephone interview Monday.

The measure would restrict voting rights in a variety of ways, he said.

"We believe the sentence is given to you by the judge at the time of sentencing," Volz said.

But under the House proposal, "a financial entity" or a Department of Corrections employee could "attach sentence obligations after a judge has already imposed a sentence," Volz said.

"So somebody who works for the government or works for a financial organization can determine whether somebody is eligible to vote in the state of Florida. We think that's wrong and we'll fight it," he said.

Court costs, fines and fees are not considered part of a sentence unless specifically ordered as restitution by the judge at the time of sentencing, according to the clemency processes currently used by the Florida Commission on Offender Review, Volz said.

"We think it's important to acknowledge that there's a process right now and there's discussion to change it and restrict voting in the process," he said.

According to one state analysis of the amendment, the constitutional change could open the door to voting for more than 730,000 felons in Florida, some of whom began registering to vote after the amendment went into effect in January.

Grant acknowledged the proposal is likely "to get pushback everywhere," but blames the amendment's own language for its problems.

"This notion of making policy in the Constitution is problematic for a lot of reasons, and this (Amendment 4) is a great of example of why," he said.

The Senate has heard from elections officials, prosecutors, clerks of court and others on the issue, but has not yet released its version of an implementing bill.

Whether amendment requires implementing legislation is also the subject of debate. Gov. Ron DeSantis is among those who believe legislation is necessary, but backers of the amendment – which required Florida Supreme Court scrutiny to get on the 2018 ballot — believe it is self-executing.

"Every single justice approved that language," Desmond Meade, president of the Florida Restoration of Rights Coalition, said in a recent interview. "Let's be clear. Every single justice, who were appointed by various governors, said that the language was very clear, it was not confusing. We think the language speaks for itself. The people who are excluded are people who commit murder and people who commit felony sexual offenses."

committee last week recommended to put in place a better system of checks and balances and improved training for people involved in the university's budgeting process.

A couple of days after those recommendations were made, Higher Education Appropriations Chairman Randy Fine, R-Palm Bay, filed the bill to overhaul a portion of the higher-education system's budget laws.

This proposal is in line with what Oliva vowed to prioritize on the opening day of the legislative session: passing higher education reform. Among the reforms he wants is requiring institutions to do space-utilization studies to justify the need of new buildings, which would add another step in how institutions can ask the Legislature to fund construction projects.

"Every building will require a downpayment as well as an escrow account to ensure for its future maintenance," Oliva

said this month.

Under the House proposal, any new construction or remodeling project that has not received appropriations in previous years could only be considered as a priority project if the institution has set aside at least 25 percent of the total project's cost or has an interest-bearing account with at least 10 percent of the building's value for a period of no more than three years.

Under the bill, the Florida Board of Governors, which oversees the university system, and the State Board of Education would be required to develop a "points-based prioritization method" to rank construction projects they want to recommend for state funding. That is something Oliva, R-Miami Lakes, has

sought as well. Also on Tuesday, the House Higher Education Appropriations Subcommittee will take up Fine's overall budget recommendations for the fiscal year that starts July 1. Fine's recommendation is an initial step as lawmakers prepare to draw up a final budget before the scheduled May 3 end of the legislative session.

Department's FAA regulates Chicago-based Boeing and is responsible for certifying that planes can fly safely.

The grand jury issued its subpoena on March 11, one day after the Ethopian Airlines crash, according to the person who spoke to The Associated Press.

Spokesmen for the Justice Department and the Inspector General said Monday they could neither confirm nor deny the existence of any inquiries. The FAA would not comment.

"Boeing does not respond to or comment on questions concerning legal matters, whether internal, litigation, or governmental inquiries," Boeing spokesman Charles Bickers said in an email.

The French civil aviation investigation bureau BEA said Monday that black box data from the Ethiopian Airlines flight showed the links with the Lion Air crash and will be used for further study.

Ethiopian authorities asked BEA for help in extracting and interpreting the crashed plane's black boxes because Ethiopia does not have the necessary expertise and technology.

The Ethiopian Accident Investigation Bureau intends to release a preliminary report within 30

The United States and many other countries have grounded the Max 8s and larger Max 9s as Boeing faces the challenge of proving the jets are safe to fly amid suspicions that faulty sensors and software contributed to the two crashes in less than five months.

Both planes flew with erratic altitude changes that could indicate the pilots struggled to control the aircraft. Shortly after their takeoffs, both crews tried to return to the airports but crashed.

Boeing has said it has "full confidence" in the planes' safety. Engineers are making changes to the system designed to prevent an aerodynamic stall if sensors detect that the jet's nose is pointed too high and its speed is too

nose down repeatedly, and whether the Lion Air pilots knew how to solve that problem. Ethiopian Airlines says its pilots received special training on the software.

Dennis Tajer, an American Airlines pilot and a spokesman for their union, said Boeing held a discussion with airlines last Thursday but did not invite pilots at American or Southwest, the two U.S. carriers that use the same version of the Max that crashed in Indonesia and Ethiopia.

Tajer said airline officials told the unions that Boeing intends to offer pilots about a 15-minute iPad course to train them on the new flight-control software on Max jets that is suspected of playing a role in the crashes. He called that amount of training unacceptable.

"Our sense is it's a rush to comply - 'let's go, let's go, let's go,'" Tajer said. "I'm in a rush to protect my passengers."

A spokesman for the pilots' union at Southwest Airlines also said Boeing representatives told that union they expected the upgrade to be ready the end of January.

The spokesman, Mike Trevino, said Boeing never followed up to explain why that deadline passed without an upgrade. Boeing was expected to submit a proposed fix to the FAA in early January.

# Cooking up confidence

Meal kits make healthy, balanced dinners less daunting

ic Dyer has a secret to share. "Use olive oil for everything," the 29-year-old confided.

The advice comes after a year of using meal-preparation kits, nearly all of which call for copious amounts of olive oil to coat vegetables and meats.

Dyer and his wife, Lauren, have tried five different services - Sun Basket, Gobble, Blue Apron, HelloFresh and Home Chef - and declared HelloFresh their favorite.

Once a week, a box is delivered to their home containing three recipes and nearly every ingredient needed to prepare them (pantry staples such as salt, pepper and the aforementioned olive oil are not included).

Lauren chooses the meals each week - all of which arrive in a cardboard box stuffed with ice packs – while Nic cooks each meal. (HelloFresh meals must be ordered five days in advance.)

Within an hour, he and Lauren sit down to a sizzling meal packed with vegetables and pungent flavors.

The recipe for cherry balsamic pork chops turned out

so well, in fact, that the Dyers now cook the dish using their own ingredients.

A 2017 study by consumersurvey group Nielsen found that 9 percent of U.S. households had used a meal kit in a six-month period.

Consumers have more than 150 meal-kit companies to choose from, all of which are based on the idea of creating

quick-and-healthy meals from ingredients delivered to the home.

The largest of the companies, HelloFresh and Blue Apron, were founded in 2011 and 2012. The cost for each of the services is about \$60 a week for three meals of two servings, the most common order. Through the first nine months of 2018, HelloFresh processed 11.1 million orders, and Blue Apron handled 9.2 million nationwide.

David Jennings ordered from Blue Apron for the first time in January.

A New Year's resolution to be more mindful of his eating led him to the service, with its portioned serving size and clear nutrition facts on every

His first box included scallops, a food Jennings said "always freaked me out," but thanks to the instruction sheet dry them before cooking! he prepared a flawless meal. (Blue Apron has a flexibleordering date.)

"I think the best thing about them is you get restaurantquality food that you get to make," Jennings, 34, said. "It's something to be proud of."

At HelloFresh, some credit for restaurant - quality food goes to Claudia Sidoti, a longtime chef who oversaw the test kitchen at Food Network for eight years before jumping to the meal-prep company in 2017 as the head of recipe development.

The goal of Sidoti and her staff is to create classic meals with a twist - Mexican meatloaf, cauliflower mac-andcheese – accessible to anyone, from novice cooks to seasoned culinary veterans.

They aim for the sweet spot somewhere between freezer burrito and four-course dinner.

Like going to the gym, Sidoti said learning to cook takes a few weeks of frustration before gaining muscle memory.

Once the skill develops, though, a new world of taste and smell is available to home

"The experience of cooking, and that satisfaction, everything from the aromas (to) that confidence piece, there's a significant difference from live cooking as opposed to reheating (where) you don't feel like you have any control over it," she said.

### Leg pulse targets your glutes

o you ever feel like squats and lunges aren't targeting that one little hard-to-reach spot? Maybe your knees are bothering you or just maybe you zone specific exercises.

Well, you're in luck. That one little spot is our glutes.

Our move today is an arabesque leg pulse, similar to single leg yoga poses, but with slight movement.

This pulsing move will focus on the glutes, a little deeper than squatting and lunging. You may want to use a wall, chair or broomstick for balance.

Begin by standing tall,

Once you have your position, begin to pulse the leg up and down in tiny pulsing movements, using your glutes to lift and lower and control the move.

> Give yourself at least a count of 16 pulses on each side. Alternating from side to side, for at least three to five times. If your balance is off, hold on to something and you will be able to execute the move more efficiently.

This exercise can be done on its own, but is a great addition to any lower-body routine.

# **A massacre** impelled by bigotry

he unspeakable carnage in New Zealand must be called out by its proper name: a terrorist attack by a white-nationalist bigot consumed by Islamophobia and impelled by the fervid extremism that suffuses the Internet's darkest crevices.

The alleged gunman's garden-variety racism — his rantings about the peril posed to whites faced with "replacement" by Muslims — is of a piece with other hatreds espoused by other racist killers in other places and times. That he spent his days slinking through online cesspools and communing with likeminded social networks gives his crime a postmodern gloss.

But the forces that animated him, as evidenced by his inflamed manifesto - ignorance, intolerance, bloodthirsty tribalism — are ancient. The Internet and social media did not invent or refine evil; they just made it accessible on demand, in all its banal and lurid manifestations. As for the suspect's evident wish to instigate discord and sow divisions — he wrote that he wanted to "incite violence, retaliation and further divide" and hoped that by carrying out his massacre with a firearm he would add fuel to the United States' gun debate - he's a little late.

Still, it's critical that world leaders clearly and precisely denounce this ghoulish act. An attack on mosques, as on any place of worship, is especially sinister and dangerous. Online racists lionized the murderer as a hero and cheered his killing spree as he streamed it live. In fact, he is a monster who slaughtered innocent people - parents and children, the old and the young.

President Donald Trump is not to blame for the tragedy, despite his own history of Islamophobic statements and a travel ban that targets predominantly Muslim nations. Still, he should go further than he has; for starters, by condemning the alleged killer, whose nativist rhetoric — he called immigrants "invaders," attacked "mass immigration" and wrote that he hoped to "directly reduce immigration rates" - overlaps with the president's own. On Friday, Trump cited an "invasion" of immigrants to justify his national emergency declaration to build a wall along the U.S.-Mexico border.

And Trump, who could not bring himself to criticize the white nationalists in Charlottesville who chanted that minorities (Jews, in that case) would "not replace us," on Friday said he doesn't regard white nationalism as a problem. That's the wrong message. Instead, he ought to state unambiguously that the New Zealand suspect's "replacement" ideology is an unacceptable trope in civilized discourse.

New Zealand's gun laws are more lax than those in his native country, Australia, and the massacre at the mosques in Christchurch has already inspired calls for tighter regulation. That debate should be paid heed by Americans, many of whom are by now, sadly, inured to mass killings.

Out hearts ache for the victims and their families; for a community of Muslim refugees and migrants who were welcomed with open arms in a new home that may now look threatening; and for New Zealand, a U.S. ally where the hideous tableau of firearms violence has not been prevalent before now.

# The US needs more from the Taliban than cease-fire, talks

**₹**he Trump administration has now conducted five rounds of negotiations with the Taliban, including a grueling 16-day round that ended last Tuesday in Qatar. Both sides are claiming progress, but details have been scant - including, it turns out, for the Afghan government, which has been excluded from the talks. That prompted an undiplomatic outburst Thursday by the national security adviser to President Ashraf Ghani, who told reporters in Washington that the U.S. administration is "ostracizing and alienating a very trusted ally."

A negotiated peace in Afghanistan is much to be wished for. But judging from what has been reported from Qatar, the Afghan government is right to be concerned as are Americans who don't favor throwing away all that the U.S. Afghan mission has accomplished since 2001, at enormous cost. According to administration envoy Zalmay Khalilzad, the talks are focusing on two issues: preventing al-Qaida and other terrorist groups from using Afghanistan as a base for attacks, and a withdrawal

timeline for U.S. troops. Khalilzad tweeted that an accord would need to include two other elements: "intra-Afghan dialogue and a comprehensive ceasefire." But he said talks including the Taliban and Afghan government would begin only after the "agree-ment in draft" on the U.S. withdrawal and terrorism "is finalized." That suggests that the United States would commit itself to a pullout timetable before an Afghan peace process even starts up, and that there might be no link between the

U.S. drawdown and

a final settlement.

If so, that would be a dangerous yielding of U.S. leverage that could all but doom the Afghan government — and the millions of Afghans, especially women, who prize the civil society that lives under its umbrella. Though it may have softened its oppression in some areas it controls, the Taliban has given no indication it is prepared to accept a democratic political system, share power with the Ghani government or respect basic human rights. On the contrary, its leaders have portrayed themselves in recent public

statements as victors in the war who are preparing to reap their rewards.

Khalilzad's negotiating strategy may suit the priorities of Trump, who has made it clear he wishes to withdraw U.S. troops as quickly as possible and has little interest in the consequences for Afghans. But the notion that, in the absence of a peace settlement, the Taliban could be relied on to prevent terrorism looks naive. As former CIA deputy director Michael Morell and former defense undersecretary Mike Vickers bluntly concluded in a Post op-ed, "the most likely outcome" of a U.S. withdrawal is "the Taliban will take over, and it will offer haven to al-Qaida, which will again target the U.S. homeland."

Khalilzad's efforts should continue. But the administration ought to insist that the Taliban accept a U.S. timeline for withdrawal measured in years rather than months: and it should be clear that the last forces will not depart until there is an Afghan peace accord not just a cease-fire and talks. In the meantime, it should keep Ghani's government fully briefed.

### A new miracle drug for depression? Not so fast

his month, the FDA approved Janssen's new drug Spravato, or esketamine in nasal spray form, for "treatment-resistant" depression. A Washington Post headline declared it the "biggest advance for

depression in years." A quick explanation is in order here. Many drugs come in two molecular forms, called optical isomers, which are mirrorimages of each other. Often, only one of the two isomers is active. Esketamine is one of the two isomers of the club drug ketamine, known colloquially as "Special K." Separating this isomer and dispensing it in pure form enables Janssen to patent a drug that has already been available for decades, and to market it at premium prices.

All this raises some questions.

A large and growing body of evidence indicates that

most of the benefits of these drugs called "antidepressants" are due to the placebo effect. When we say a person is "resistant" to "treatments" that may be barely distinguishable from sugar pills, have we really said anything at all? Nevertheless, let's take a look at the evidence that led the FDA to approve Spravato.

Normally, before a drug can be approved, the FDA requires the manufacturer to submit the results of two trials showing that the drug performed significantly better than placebo. That sounds pretty good, until you realize that there can be any number of trials that do not show a significant effect. That's like you and I betting on the outcome of a coin toss, with this stipulation: I get to toss the coin as many times I wish until it comes up the way I want it to.

Another point to keep in mind is that when a scientist

talks about a "significant" difference, all that means is the difference is unlikely to have arisen by chance. The difference can be tiny, as long as the probability of it arising by chance is below some arbitrarily selected level - usually 5 percent.

In the case of Spravato, a single four-week placebocontrolled trial showed a 4-point improvement on the 60-point Montgomery-Asberg Rating Scale for Depression. While this met the criteria for statistical significance, a 4-point difference is likely too paltry to be noticeable in a face-to-face assessment of global functioning by a trained clinician.

The results of the two other placebo-controlled trials of Spravato were negative. The only way to satisfy the FDA requirement for two positive trials was to count the results of a relapse study, which

essentially showed that patients who did well on the drug, did well on the drug.

The recommended course of treatment for this drug, which is to be administered only in a doctor's office, is twice-weekly for one month, followed by weekly or biweekly treatments thereafter. It comes with a price tag of \$4,720 to \$6,785 for the first month of treatment and \$2,360 to \$3,450 per month thereafter, which means the cost of a year's treatment could be as high as \$44,735. This is the same stuff (admittedly in purer form) that you can buy in a nightclub bathroom for a good deal less.


Disturbingly, there were three suicides in the trials, all in the treatment arm. This finding becomes even more ominous in light of the fact that actively suicidal patients were excluded from these trials.

By the way, Janssen is no

stranger to controversy. On Nov. 4, 2013, the United States Department of Justice announced that Janssen's parent corporation, Johnson and Johnson, agreed to pay \$2.2 billion to settle claims of illegal marketing of its products, including allegations that Janssen had illegally marketed the antipsychotic drug Risperdal for children.


Three years ago, a jury awarded a young boy \$70 million after Risperdal caused him to grow breasts. What will the long-term effects be of Janssen's latest miracle drug? We don't know, but if this is the "biggest advance for depression in years," maybe it is time to consider the possibility that this is not the sort of problem amenable to chemical solutions.

# McIlroy hits his stride

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. – Rory McIlroy managed to block out all the noise, all the distractions, and this was long before he even reached the pivotal three-hole finish at the TPC Sawgrass to win The Players Championship.

McIlroy, more than any other player, has been looked upon as golf's next big thing in the decade since age and injuries began to slow Tiger Woods.

Jack Nicklaus took to Twitter on Sunday night for memories of the time McIlroy first came to meet with him ahead of the 2010 Masters, and a few months later the precocious 20-year-old from Northern Ireland shot 62 on the final day at Quail Hollow for his first PGA Tour victory.

McIlroy set the U.S. Open scoring record a year later with an eight-shot victory. He had four majors - missing only a green jacket — at age 25.

So with McIlroy approaching his 30th birthday, and with only one victory over his previous 50 tournaments worldwide, the critics took notice. When he played in the final group nine times without winning — never mind that he was at least three shots back on five of those occasions questions about his ability to close became louder.

His patience was tested when he began this year by playing in the final group in three out of his five tournaments, finishing no worse than a tie for sixth.

But he never showed any hint on panic.

His reaction when he tapped in for par Sunday to win The Players was not much different from when he finished with a par at Bay Hill, a bogey at Riviera, a birdie at Torrey Pines. All of them were good weeks when he looked back over 72 holes. One of them was better than the other because he won a trophy.

"I feel like I've managed the first six tournaments of the year very well, even with some noise around me, whether 'he can't close, he can't play on Sundays,' blah, blah, blah," McIlroy said. "I've just got to do my thing. And if I go concentrate on me, control what I can do, good golf and good attitude takes


Florida's hopes of pulling off a second-straight upset.

Against LSU, Nembhard scored a season-high 20 points and handed out six assists. He hit 50 percent of his shots, including 3 of 7 from behind the three-point line.


Heading into Florida's NCAA Tournament opener against Nevada on Thursday in Des Moines, Iowa, Nembhard is averaging 8.1



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



# Trio of top seeds puts ACC in the spotlight

The Atlantic Coast Conference comes into the NCAA Tournament with three No.

Putting three teams in the Final Four is a different matter.

The last time one league had three teams in the national semifinals was 1985,

the year the field expanded to 64 teams. Georgetown and St. John's arrived as Big East behemoths, only to be upstaged when conference

rival Villanova took the title. The ACC's top-seeded trio this year is Duke, North Carolina and Virginia. The last time three No. 1 seeds won their regionals was in 2015, when Kentucky, Duke and Wisconsin did it.

Only one other time has a league gotten three No. 1 seeds. In 2009, Louisville, Connecticut and Pittsburgh did it for the Big East. Connecticut lost in the national semifinals, while Louisville and Pittsburgh went out in the Elite Eight. None of those teams are in the Big East

Here are a few more things to watch in the NCAA Tournament:


#### **REGIONAL OF CHAMPIONS**

If the seeds hold, the Sweet 16 in the Midwest Regional could be quite a spectacle. Top-seeded North Carolina, second-seeded Kentucky and fourth-seeded Kansas would all end up in Kansas City. Even third-seeded Houston has some history to offer, having made the national title game twice during the 1980s.

With UCLA out of the picture this year, Kentucky's eight titles are the most by any team in the field. North Carolina is second with six. Those teams have met in the regional finals twice in the past eight years, with Kentucky winning in 2011 and North Carolina in 2017.

# 'Pure stubbornness'

Oregon Blockbuster outlasts others to become last on Earth

BEND, Ore. - There are challenges that come with running the last Blockbuster Video on the planet.

The computer system must be rebooted using floppy disks that only the general manager a solid member of Gen X – knows how to use. The dot-matrix printer broke, so employees write out membership cards by hand. And the store's business transactions are backed up on a reel-to-reel tape that can't be replaced because Radio Shack went out of business.

Yet none of that has kept this humble franchise in an Oregon strip mall from thriving as the advent of on-demand movie streaming laid waste all around it. When a Blockbuster in Australia shuts its doors for the last time on March 31, the Bend store will be the only one left on Earth.

"It's pure stubbornness, for one. We didn't want to give in," said general manager Sandi Harding, who has worked at the franchise for 15 years and receives a lot of the credit for keeping it alive well past its expiration date. "We did everything we could to cut costs and keep ourselves relevant."

The store was once one of five Blockbusters owned by the same couple, Ken and Debbie Tisher, in three central Oregon towns. But by last year, the Bend franchise was the last local Blockbuster standing.

A tight budget meant no money to update the surviving store. That's paying off now with a nostalgia factor that stops first-time visitors of a certain age in their tracks: the popcorn ceilings, low fluorescent lighting, wire metal video racks and the ubiquitous yellow-andblue ticket stub logo that

was a cultural touchstone for a generation.

"Most people, I think, when they think about renting videos — if they're the right age — they don't remember the movie that they went to pick, but they remember who they went with and that freedom of walking the aisles," said Zeke Kamm, a local resident who is making a documentary about the store called "The Last Blockbuster" with a friend.

"In a lot of towns, the Blockbuster was the only place that was open past nine o'clock, and a lot of them stayed open until midnight, so kids who weren't hoodlums would come here and look at movies and fall in love with movies."

The Bend store had eight years under its belt as a local video store before it converted to a Blockbuster in 2000, a time when this high desert city was still a sleepy community with a small-town feel to match.

Customers kept coming back, drawn by special touches like staff recommendations, a "wish list" for videos to add to the rental selection and even home delivery for a few special customers who couldn't drive in. Dozens of local teens have worked there over the vears.

Then, in 2010, Blockbuster declared bankruptcy, and by 2014, all corporate-owned stores had shuttered. That left locally owned franchises to fend for themselves, and one by one, they closed.

When stores in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska, shut down last summer - barely outlasting a Redmond, Oregon, store - Bend's Blockbuster was the only U.S. location left.

Tourists started stopping by to snap selfies, and business picked up. Harding ordered up blueand-yellow sweat shirts, T-shirts, cups, magnets, bumper stickers, hats and stocking caps from local vendors emblazoned with the words "The Last Blockbuster in America," and they flew off the shelves.

Then, this month, she got a phone call: The world's only other Blockbuster, in Perth, Australia, would soon close its doors. A new T-shirt order went out this time with the slogan "The Last Blockbuster on the Planet" — and the store is already getting a new wave of selfie-snapping visitors from as far away as Europe and Asia.

On a recent weekday, Michael Trovato of Melbourne, Australia, stopped by while visiting his twin sister in Bend.

After posing for a photo, Trovato said he misses a time when choosing a movie meant browsing hundreds of titles and asking a video clerk for insight instead of letting a movie-streaming service recommend one for him based on a computer algorithm.

"I miss quite a bit being able to walk into a Blockbuster or CD store and have that social experience and see people looking at stuff and talking to people," Trovato said. "It's something you don't get from the slick presentation of a music service or, you know, from the internet."

The Bend store doesn't seem to be in danger of closing anytime soon.

Its newfound fame has been a shot in the arm, and customers stream in to buy \$40 sweat shirts, \$20 T-shirts and even \$15 yellow-andblue beanies hand-knit by Harding herself. The store pays Dish Network for the right to use the Blockbuster logo and has several years left on its

People regularly send the store boxes of old VHS tapes and DVDs. They also donate Blockbuster memorabilia: a corporate jean jacket, key chains and old membership cards.

Employees always send a thank-you note, store manager Dan Montgomery said.

Recently, Harding has noticed another type of customer that's giving her hope: a new generation of kids dragged in by their nostalgic parents who later leave happy, holding stacks of rented

movies and piles of candy. Jerry Gilless and his wife, Elizabeth, brought their two kids, John, 3, and Ellen, 5, and watched with a smile as the siblings bounced from row to row, grabbing "Peter Pan" and "The Lion King" and sur-

veying dinosaur cartoons.

#### Energy leads modest gains


U.S. stock indexes finished modestly higher Monday, extending the market's solid gains from a rally last week.

Energy companies notched the biggest gains after the price of U.S. crude oil closed above \$59 a barrel for the first time since November. Smaller company stocks fared better than the rest of the market.

Financial, consumer goods and technology stocks accounted for much of the gains. Goldman Sachs rose 2.1 percent, Advance Auto Parts climbed 4.4 percent and Microsoft added 1.4 percent.

Those gains outweighed losses in communications and health care sector companies. Facebook slid 3.3 percent and Boston Scientific dropped 5.6 percent.

Stocks were riding the momentum from last week, when the S&P 500 resumed its torrid start to the year following a brief, five-day stumble.


the mouth, or insensitive of her to flaunt her purchasing power while we're struggling?-- REGRETFULLY **UNGRATEFUL**

Opening lead — queen of clubs. Today's deal features a card combination that is frequently misplayed. Let's say declarer wins the club lead with the king and plays the king and another heart. When West shows out, South is in serious trouble. Assuming reasonable defense, the best he can do is score two spades, three hearts, a diamond and two clubs.

But declarer has a lock on the contract if he plays more carefully. He should recognize that three notrump is ice cold if he can score

four heart tricks, and all his thoughts should be focused on that one goal.

Since there is no danger of going down if the hearts are divided 3-2, South should ask himself how he can protect against a 4-1 division. If he addresses himself to that one possibility, he should come to the realization that there is a way to play the hearts so as to overcome a holding of four to the Q-10 in either opponent's

As we have seen, leading the king and another heart fails if East has Q-10-x-x. However, the proper way to initiate the suit is to lead a low heart to the ace! If both defenders follow low, South continues with a low heart from dummy, and:

1. If East shows out, South takes the king and leads the nine toward the jack to assure four heart tricks.

2. If East follows low, South plays the nine to guarantee four heart tricks whether the nine wins or loses.

3. If East produces the ten or queen, South wins with the king and returns the nine to assure four heart
