## Former mayor finds apparent hit and run victim

The former mayor of Keystone Heights discovered the apparent victim of a hit-and-run accident on C.R. 21 Wednesday afternoon.

Tony Brown said he was driving from Keystone Heights to Gainesville when he noticed a large object lying in a ditch on the east side of C.R. 21, between Harvey's Supermarket and Geneva Lake Estates.

"I just happened to glance over there," Brown recalled, and thought it was odd to see something that big in the ditch."

Brown turned around and discovered what he saw was a person that he knew: Jeffery Redding, a fellow church member of Brown's at Keystone United Methodist Church.

Brown called 911 and emergency medical workers transported the man to UF Health Shands.

Acquaintances of Redding said doctors operated on him Thursday to treat a hip injury, and he was on a respirator.

The Florida Highway Patrol has not issued a public report on the incident, and neither FHP nor the Bradford County Sheriff's Office returned calls inquiring about the cause of Redding's injuries.

The Florida Highway Patrol said a 64-year-old Keystone Heights man was killed Monday night while he was walking along C.R. 214 at Fifth Avenue, near Postmaster's Village.

According to an FHP report, Alfred E. Griggs died after being struck around 9:34 p.m. by a 2002 Oldsmobile Aurora, driven by Rachel Bellman, 22 of Keystone Heights.

Bellman was driving eastbound on the road, and the victim was walking in the eastbound travel lane. According to the report, no charges are pending.

be recognized by Audubon Florida," she said. "The ecological importance of the Florida Everglades reaches far beyond our state. I'm proud to have sponsored the legislation that will reduce harmful discharges from Lake Okeechobee and will allow for a large volume of water to be cleaned, stored and moved south into the Everglades and Florida Bay."

Audubon is Florida's oldest and largest conservation organization and presents the Champion of the Everglades Award each year to a person who has gone above and beyond to protect Florida's water and

wildlife in the River of Grass. Previous award recipients include Nathaniel Reed, Senator Bob Graham, and Governor Jeb Bush. Bradley was the sponsor of Senate Bill 10 during the 2017 legislative session, considered the most important Everglades legislation in a decade.

The legislation funds the construction of a reservoir south of Lake Okeechobee to store runoff from the lake.

Although conservationists have been pushing for the reservoir for 17 years, a 2016 algae bloom in the Indian River Lagoon, which killed scores of fish prompted Senate President

Joe Negron to push for the bill earlier this year.

"Senator Bradley's leadership on behalf of the Everglades proves his dedication to protecting Florida's land and water resources," said Julie Hill-Gabriel, Audubon Florida's deputy director. "He secured support in the Florida Legislature for the biggest legislative victory for Florida's environment in 2017. We applaud Senator Bradley and are glad to name him as this year's Champion of the Everglades."

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
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# Monitor Salutes Lake Region Firefighters Two new fire stations slated for Lake Region

Clay County's fire chief said that his agency hopes to break ground on a new fire station in the Keystone Heights area before year end.

Combined with Bradford County's recent approval of a Theresa substation on the property of the Santa Fe College Watson Center, the Clay County facility means two new fire stations will be operating in the Lake Region soon.

Clay County Fire Rescue Chief Lorin Mock said that now, five firefighters live and work out of an 800-square foot facility owned by the Keystone Heights Volunteer Fire Department. He added that since the facility could not be brought up to current building codes, county officials instead looked to build a new station.

Clay County leases from the

State of Florida the land that used to be the home of a Florida Forestry Service tower. Mock said the parcel, on S.R. 21 north of town, between Helen Hersey Realty and Keystone Heights Insurance, will be the site of the new station.

Mock said the county has had \$2 million in its budget over the past two years for the project, adding that because the parcel is narrow, the building will be a two-storied structure with a traditional fire station pole, allowing firefighters to quickly reach the first-floor six-bay garage from second story sleeping quarters.

"That doesn't happen in many places anymore," Mock said of the fire pole, "because it's cheaper to build one-story structures. But where you have narrow properties, you can still do two-story stations."


He said the planned facility

will not only be able to house the station's current engine and rescue unit, but can also host additional equipment, which Mock predicts will be necessary for the area in the future.

The Bradford County station will also house county satellite offices for constitutional officers and provide a substation for the sheriff's office, in addition to eventually hosting an ambulance and emergency medical response crew.

Along with equipment and manpower, the former Keystone Heights Volunteer Fire Department has pledged \$75,000 toward the cost of establishing the Bradford station, where they would work in conjunction with the Theresa department.

Earlier this year, the Bradford County Board of County Commissioners approved a \$650,000 budget for the station.



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



## KHHS boys cross country team earns 4th straight trip to regionals

Girls team members Taylor, Williams advance

The Keystone Heights High School boys cross country team got a third-place (out of 39) finish from Alex Guy in placing third as a team at the Oct. 25 District 5-2A finals in Lake City and earning its fourth straight regional berth.

Keystone finished with a team score of 69 behind champion Santa Fe (30) and runner-up Eastside (38). The top three teams earned the right to advance to the Region 2 finals, which will be held Saturday, Nov. 4, at Atlantic High School in Port Orange.

Guy had a time of 18:17.1,

which was six seconds behind first-place finisher Rilyn Crouch of Santa Fe. The Indians had three other runners place in the top 20: Tyler Shaw, who was 12<sup>th</sup> with a time of 19:43.78, Jay Payne, who was 16<sup>th</sup> with a time of 20:13.65, and Jerry Payne, who was 18<sup>th</sup> with a time of 20:30.81.

Also competing for Keystone were Joseph Danella and Travis Dockery, who were 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup>, respectively, with times of 21:26.65 and 21:40.7.

Keystone did not field a full girls team, but had four runners compete, with Camryn Williams and Dee Dee Taylor earning regional berths with top-15 finishes. Williams placed fourth out of 32 with a time of 22:13.06 to earn her second straight regional berth, while Taylor was sixth with a time of 22:37.33.

"We knew we kind of had to bring a little something extra," Union head coach Jordan Windham said.

The Tigers did just that, defeating Bell 3-1 (25-18, 15-25,

25-15, 25-10) in a Region 3-1A volleyball semifinal on Oct. 26.

Union (12-11) next travels to Mayo to play Lafayette (11-6) for the Region 3 championship on Thursday, Nov. 2, at 7 p.m. Lafayette, the District 5 champ, defeated District 6 runner-up Crescent City 3-0 (25-13, 25-18, 25-18).

Madelyn Kish provided a lot of the offensive firepower in getting the Tigers to the next

round, recording 20 kills.

"She was on fire," Windham said. "Any set that came her way, she was able to put down."

Setter Madison Adams was her usual steady self with 34 assists. However, Adams does more than just create opportunities for Kish and others. During one point in the match, she dove into the bleachers to keep the play alive, with the Tigers eventually earning a point as a result.

"She is the kind of kid who does not stop," Windham said.

Offensive opportunities don't happen without strong defensive play. Windham said her team responded well to some defensive changes that were made prior to the match.

"They embraced (the changes) and did an amazing job," Windham said.

Windham took the blame for the loss in the second set. Taylor Beatty was serving to close out the first set, so the coach, instead

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# Great Strides still makes its impact during busy weekend

The Great Strides of Bradford-Union didn't have its usual turnout, but the community still stepped up in trying to make a difference in the lives of those with cystic fibrosis.

Less than 20 turned out for the Oct. 28 event at Shands Starke Regional Medical Center, but Leisa Sims, one of the organizers, said somewhere in the neighborhood of \$15,000 had already been donated in the form of cash or prize-drawing items.

"It's been a blessing as always," Sims said. "This community — they amaze me every time. They really do."

The event is normally held in September, but was postponed due to Hurricane Irma. There wasn't much time to publicize the new date once it was cleared by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

"We didn't have but just a few weeks to throw it together," Sims said.

Plus, this year's event just fell during a busy time of the year with fall festivals, Bradford High School's homecoming and Starke's Pumpkin Escape, which occurred later that night.

"We thought about just skipping this year," Sims said. "We thought, if we do that, we lose the momentum. We don't want to do that."

It also kept the spirit of event alive. Sims asked if those assembled wanted to actually go through with walking since there was such a small turnout. The answer was a resounding yes. Participant Nicole Zillmer said, "That's the whole point of the walk — to do it."

Zillmer has CF and has been participating in the Bradford-Union walk since she met its founder, Katelyn Sims, who is

Leisa's daughter.

"It's important," Zillmer said of returning every year. "It's supporting a good cause. I have it, so I try to support it when I can."

Great Strides events have been a way to raise money to put toward the development and testing of medications in hopes of finding a cure for CF. However, due to selling the royalty rights to a medication it helped fund,

the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is fully funded until 2030, Leisa Sims said. With that in mind, Sims said the plan is to continue to hold a fundraiser in Starke to directly help local families.

"We're going to continue to do the walk," Sims said, "but the money will go to a CF family grant and scholarship program so that every year, one of our high school students can apply for scholarships and families can get grants."

A grant can greatly impact a family struggling to meet costs associated with CF. Sims talked of one family, as an example, that didn't qualify for any financial assistance due to the amount of money both parents earned. However, this multiple-children family faced the dilemma of deciding which was more important — making a mortgage payment to keep a roof over their children's heads or paying for the medication their child with CF needed.

"That's a decision no family should have to make," Sims said.

Sims said the family had good insurance, but added, "The co-pay is what can kill you." For example, medication for Sims' daughter costs almost \$10,000 a week. "If you've got insurance that's a 20-percent co-pay, that's 2 grand a week you need," Sims said.

What's also tough is that Sims' daughter wants to have a good job and is currently going to school with an eye on a career. Yet if she gets a good job, she risks losing any kind of financial assistance available to her to help pay for medical costs.

"She doesn't want to not work," Sims said. "She doesn't want to sit on the couch and be sick. She wants a life just like any young person."

Like Katelyn, Leisa Sims doesn't want to sit around and do nothing when it comes to helping others dealing with CF. That's why the establishment of the grant/scholarship program is currently in the works.

"We don't want to not do

anything because this is too important of a cause to not do anything," Sims said. "We want to be there for those families." # Tornadoes roll again, defeat Trojans 56-8 on homecoming

Homecoming king Chris Cummings had three touchdown receptions, while quarterback Zion Barber had five scoring tosses in all as the Bradford High School football team defeated visiting Hamilton County 56-8 on Oct. 27.

For the second straight week, the Tornadoes watched their opponent take a lead, while the offense struggled its first two series. However, just like its 51-15 win over Crescent City, Bradford scored five touchdowns and gained more than 300 yards before halftime.

"Once we decided to play, it was on," Bradford head coach Brian Tomlinson said.

The Tornadoes (7-1), who cap the regular season with a road game against Middleburg (1-8) on Friday, Nov. 3, at 7 p.m., have now scored more than 40 points in four straight games and have not lost since their season opener against Taylor County.

"They're starting to get more comfortable with everything," Tomlinson said. "We're able to do more things. We had to go back after the first few games and change how we were doing things. Once we were able to

master the little things, now you're seeing the result."

Hamilton County (1-9) has struggled mightily this season, but the Trojans needed just two plays to take an 8-0 lead. A 60-yard pass completion and horse-collar penalty had the Trojans at the Bradford 13. Keyvon Webb scored on a run from there. A successful two-point conversion had Hamilton up 8-0 less than a minute into the game.

Bradford's defense set its offense up in good position when D.J. Mackey, Jaquez Mosley and Dallin Woods combined on a tackle that led to a fumble, which the Tornadoes recovered at the Hamilton 29-yard line. The Tornadoes, though, had to settle for a 44-yard field-goal attempt by Barber, which was no good.

A 50-yard run by Webb put the Trojans at the Bradford 25. Hamilton eventually moved inside the 10, but a tackle by Bradford's Nathan Davis resulted in a loss of a yard and forced the Trojans into a fourth-and-5 at the 8. The Trojans went for it, but quarterback Alex Scarborough's pass fell incomplete.

The Tornadoes were in danger of entering the second quarter with a zero on the scoreboard, but Cummings took care of that.

He caught a pass of about 15 yards from Barber, made one tackler miss and was off to what would be an 81-yard touchdown play with 12 seconds left in the first quarter. Barber's PAT made the score 8-7.

Tally Chandler had the Tornadoes on the move on their next series with three carries for 20 yards. Barber picked up 8 yards before Jeremiah Vaughn took a handoff and turned the corner on what was a 22-yard touchdown run with 9:44

remaining in the second quarter. Barber's PAT put the Tornadoes up 14-8.

Chandler, who rushed for 103 yards on 10 carries, had a 21-yard run on the Tornadoes' next series, which helped them advance to the Hamilton 31. Bradford wound up facing fourth-and-4 at the 25, converting when Cummings scored on a 25-yard pass. Barber's PAT made the score 21-8 at the 4:28 mark of the second quarter.

Cummings, who was crowned

homecoming king the previous night, put the exclamation point on a great week on Bradford's next series, scoring on a 54-yard pass play. Barber added the PAT for a 28-8 lead with 2:37 left in the half.

For the game, Cummings caught four passes for 165 yards.

Bradford's offense got one more chance before halftime, thanks to a defense that forced Hamilton to go three-and-out for the fourth straight series, with Gerald Smith and Donovan Etienne recording tackles for losses on two plays. Cummings returned the punt 19 yards to the Hamilton 47. One play later, Nathan Davis caught a screen pass from Barber and took it to the house. Barber's PAT made the score 35-8 with 1:12 remaining before halftime.

Halftime was the only thing that could slow the Bradford offense down. Once play resumed, the Tornadoes were at it again. Barber completed a 54-yard pass to Tavi'en Young, which set up his 10-yard touchdown pass to Dakota Matthews. Barber was again good on the PAT, giving Bradford a 42-8 lead approximately a minute into the second half.

It was the fifth touchdown pass for Barber, who finished 9-of-10

for 278 yards.

"I think three, maybe, has been my most ever," Barber said. "To get five — and I could've thrown more — that's pretty great."

Barber has thrown for more than 200 yards in each of the past two games. He said he's benefiting from the fact that the playbook has expanded as the season has progressed.

"We've been working on it a lot," Barber said of the passing game. "Ever since we've been doing that, (the offense has) been more of a dual threat."

Bradford rushed for 228 yards against the Trojans. It was the running game that produced the final two scores. First, Chandler broke free for a 32-yard touchdown run, followed by Jardin Simmons adding a 2-yard touchdown run.

Barber successfully kicked the extra point after each touchdown, giving him a perfect night in that department.

The defense continued its strong play, with Mosley and Smith making 11 and 10 tackles, respectively, and Davis and Mackey each recovering a fumble. Earl Green made two straight tackles for a total loss of 9 yards on the Trojans' final series.

# Indians break 5-game losing streak, edge rival Rams 28-21

Keystone Heights snapped a five-game losing streak on Friday night with a 28-21 home victory over Interlachen.

single bounce and returned it all the way to the Keystone 24. Fortune was on the Indians' side, as on first down, yet another Kutchko pass in the end zone was dropped. On a big third-and-5 play from the 27, Colton Crane pulled in a 5-yard reception. After the chains came out, it was deemed a first down. 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



and-2 situation. That's when Kutchko hit senior tight end Stephen Larsen at the 21 as the half approached the two-minute mark. On third-and-7 from the 18, Kutchko found Reed at the 6 for another first down.

Finally, with 13 seconds left, Fields would punch it in from the 1. The extra point would not only give the Rams their first lead of the game, but a one-point halftime lead.

It was not exactly a dream start for the Tribe as they began the second half with a three-and-out. However, their fortune quickly changed when senior Dominic Randall intercepted a Kutchko pass. Sanders would soon return the lead to Keystone

Heights when Ciena found him wide open in the flat on fourth-and-goal from the 1. The two-point conversion was good. With 3:10 remaining in the third, the Indians were back in front, 14-7.

The Rams would waste no time in answering, as on the third play of the ensuing drive, Fields took it 43 yards to paydirt to tie the game up at 14.

With 2:08 remaining in the third, Keystone's offensive line had begun to establish their dominance. After taking over at their own 24, the quarter would end with Friedlin crossing midfield to the Interlachen 49. Head Coach Chuck Dickinson decided to roll the dice again on fourth down. Smith took it to the 44, picking up all 3 yards that the Indians needed.

"I told the kids this week that we aren't going to punt unless they have us way back in our

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
