Freshwater Fishing Fun in Florida

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) scheduled the first of four license-free recreational fishing days on the first full weekend in April each year (April 5-6, this year), because it coincides with a productive freshwater fishing period, when the weather is usually pleasant. Many of Florida's recreational sport fishes, including black bass, bluegill and redear sunfish, move into shallow waters to spawn during spring, making them more available for anglers to catch.

License-free freshwater fishing weekends are a great time to introduce other family members, friends and neighbors to fishing and see if they and you would like to take up the sport. Besides enjoying the fun of reeling in a fish, many peo-

ple find recreational fishing to be a good motivator to enjoy the great outdoors and living a more active, healthy and natural lifestyle.

During license-free freshwater fishing weekends (the first weekend in April and the second weekend in June), no recreational fishing license is required. However, all other bag limit and season, gear and size restrictions apply.

To further encourage recreational fishing, the FWC will conduct a special contest during April to collect photos of anglers. All you have to do is post a photo of your family fishing in Florida's fresh waters on Twitter or Instagram with #FLfish (or you can use #FWC-Family-Fishing). In return for your efforts, the FWC will enter you into a drawing for one of six surprise packages, each including a \$50 gift card from Bass Pro Shops, thanks to

TrophyCatch; a Glen Lau video library on DVD; and assorted fishing lures, hooks, line and goodies to make your next trip even more productive.

Submitted photos must be your own. Editing software must not be used, and the photo cannot include inappropriate content. Photos should be taken during April while freshwater fishing in Florida and include multiple anglers enjoying their day together on the water. The FWC may subsequently use the photos for educational or outreach purposes.

So where will you go for your next freshwater fishing trip? Plenty of resources are available online to help you choose. Start by visiting MyFWC.com/Fishing and under "Freshwater Fishing" pick "Sites/Forecasts." There you can find the top destinations for pursuing bass, bream, catfish and other species in

2014, as well as regional forecasts and tips for local waters; information on all 80 FWC fish management areas; and links to our boat ramp finder and freshwater fish attractor locations. Another good resource is TakeMeFishing.org/State/FL.

Freshwater anglers have enjoyed wonderful fishing so far in 2014 across Florida, and this spring should see a continuation of that trend.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC) incentive-based conservation program, TrophyCatch, rewards anglers for participating in citizen-science, by catching, documenting and releasing largemouth bass heavier than 8 pounds. Besides the immediate gratification of releasing these older bass to fight another day, anglers

The brightness of the ribbon signals hope - hope through research and increasing awareness in people, people like you! I want raise enough awareness and want to make sure that we share the uniqueness of ASD until every piece of the puzzle fits.





Seasonal Manatee Speed Zones in effect Statewide

Now that weather and waters are warming, manatees are dispersing into their popular feeding and loafing areas. To ensure manatee safety, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) law enforcement officers, along with federal and local law enforcement partners, will be increasing patrols in these areas.



This effort coincides with seasonal manatee zones that went into effect April 1, and run through November 15. The speed zones are intended to protect the state's official marine mammal from collisions with boats.

Warming weather increases boat traffic too, which is why the FWC also reminds operators of boats and personal watercraft to slow down and watch out for man-

atees in springs, rivers and Atlantic and Gulf waters. The state's lumbering "sea cows" are leaving the warmer enclaves such as freshwater springs, power plant outflows and canals, where they spent the

winter, and migrating into more open waters. Boaters should pay strict attention to signs that delineate each seasonal manatee protection zone and their boat's speed. For information on manatee protection zones and maps, go to MyFWC.com/Manatee and select "Protection Zones." That page contains a link for county maps; select "Click here for

maps of these areas." In addition to obeying speed regulations, boaters and operators of personal watercraft can avoid collisions with these large marine mammals by:

- Wearing polarized sunglasses to help spot the creatures in the water.

- Watching for large, telltale circles on the water's surface (manatee footprints) indicating the presence of manatees.

- Looking for a snout just above the surface.

- Slowing down when the presence of manatees is indicated.

Boaters and others who find sick or injured manatees should report the animal and its location to the Wildlife Alert Hotline at 888-404-3922.

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

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

provide valuable information about the number and distribution of these trophy bass and what it takes to sustain a trophy fishery. Biologists compare the findings to existing conservation programs such as habitat restoration efforts, aquatic vegetation management strategies, bass stocking histories and various regulation management approaches to determine what works best.

Between Jan. 1 and March 23, 2014, an-

glers entered 220 Lunker Club, 89 Trophy Club and three Hall of Fame bass. That is a three-fold increase over the same period last year. Part is due to simplified rules and more anglers being aware. Nevertheless, it is clear that Florida is producing and recycling vast numbers or trophy bass.

You never know when you may find a lunker on the end of your line. To be prepared, go to TrophyCatchFlorida.com now, register and check out the rules and prize. Just registering makes you eligible for a random drawing in October for a Phoenix bass boat powered by Mercury and equipped with a Power-Pole. However, every time you have a TrophyCatch bass verified, your name is entered 10 more times. Moreover, every verified bass earns you not only bragging rights on the Web but also a customized certificate, decal and club shirt, plus at least a total of \$100 in gift cards from Bass Pro Shops, Dick's Sporting Goods and/or Rapala. Bigger fish earn greater rewards: Anglers who have 13-pound-plus Hall of Fame entries also get a \$500 fiberglass replica of their catch.

So far there are already four Hall of Fame bass this season. Joseph "Brooks" Morrell's 14 pound, 9 ounce-bass from Lake Kingsley in Clay County is the current season leader. If it holds up, he will earn the Trophy-Catch Championship ring in October, which is donated by the American Outdoors Fund.

However, there is still a lot of fishing to be done before then, so get out there and see what you can catch.

'What's the Score'

A couple of funny (odd) things happened on the Road to Dallas where the NCAA Championship will be decided within a mix of Universities of Florida, Connecticut, Kentucky and Wisconsin, beginning next Saturday with the semi-finals ending on April 7 for the "winner takes all" contest. The oddest thing that happened was Duke's University loss to tiny Mercer located in Macon, Georgia, in the heart of peach capital of the world. The second oddity that occurred and, to a degree, on par with the Duke fiasco, was the Connecticut victory over Michigan State, the odds in favor of the press and "talking heads" to win the whole thing. Duke's loss was devastating to say the least because, for one thing, it completely screwed up my East bracket not only in that but all the way to the final four, where I had them ready to face Virginia for the championship. The tragic side of that loss was the way the Duke played. Mercer, a participant in the playoffs by virtue of winning its conference tournament, has a sound ball club, but nowhere near the talent of the Blue Devils. But there it was, the final score of 78-71, Mercer. Any way you look at it, Mercer had the best team that particular day, which is mind-boggling when you consider that Duke had beaten Michigan State earlier in the year. Michigan State's loss was at the other end of the spectrum. The Spartans were the 99.9 percent favorites to win it all, and for good reason, at least very early on, coming off a win over Michigan-another hotshot Big Ten team-in the conference championship game and rolling over two previous teams on their way to the Elite Eight. The reason for the total support for the Spartans was, for one, they were healthy, everybody was back after this and that had occurred during the season and the magic of Coach Tom Izzo. No doubt about it, this was their year. And just like that, it was all over. Michigan State actually looked tight to me and confused by the Huskie's defense. I was not overly impressed by Connecticut's play, but the combination of a totally off night by the Spartans and a defense that they could never solve was too much for them to overcome. What you have as a result of these bracket-buster upsets is a final four consisting of one number one seed (Florida), a number eight (Kentucky), a four (Wisconsin) and a seven (Connecticut). Is that good or bad for the Gators? Who knows? Florida did have the advantage of playing a worn out Dayton team in the Elite Eight, which had upset Ohio State, Syracuse and Stanford. Now they will play the Huskies (Connecticut) next Saturday, which very well could have been Ohio State or Syracuse. I do believe the Gators are more likely to handle Connecticut than any of those three, but I could be off, as I have shown a propensity to be. Nevertheless, I believe Florida will beat the Huskies and might very well face a much improved Kentucky team which beat Michigan to reach the finals. First Kentucky has to beat Wisconsin, a very tough team and one that would give the Gators all they could handle, not to say the Wildcats are pushovers. Kentucky beat Michigan on the boards and attacked the middle of the Wolverine defense effectively, often breaking loose in the paint for easy shots. They definitely took advantage of their superior height down under, although it was a close game. Here, you end up with an eight seed beating a two. A Florida-Kentucky final would be something to watch, for sure. A Florida win would not only result in the championship for the Gators, but a fourth win over Kentucky this year, which is unheard of in the annals of basketball history. Could that happen? Why not?

You Can Be Your Own Healer

As a follow up to my recent article about Alternative Therapies, I would like to introduce you to some Self-Healing techniques. There are many, but to keep things simple let's focus on a few of the ones that are the best known. Acupressure, Reflexology, Breathe Therapy and Yoga/Meditation. These are some of the easiest to do and require little to no extra equipment unless you intend to take them further and make them a regular practice.

Acupressure
How many times have you rubbed your temples when you felt a headache coming on? Or maybe you came home after a long day at work and you pulled off your shoes and rubbed your aching feet. You were practicing Acupressure and you didn't even know it.

Similar to Acupuncture, Acupressure uses the points along the meridians that move the Qi in our bodies. Instead of accessing those points

with needles we access those points using pressure and massage, sometimes using essential oils to reinforce the effectiveness of the technique. There are many trigger points located all over the body. One handy trigger point to know is located at the bridge of the nose, right between the eyes, when you have motion sickness, putting pressure in this spot can help!

Reflexology
I had my first experience with reflexology when my son was very small. At the age of about 18 months he started having severe sinus infections that soon became resistant to many of the common antibiotics they were giving him. He began to need hospitalization and stronger IV antibiotics and we were growing more concerned about the cause of the infections. In between the infections, we would attend local inter-tribal Native American ceremonies as a way to get our minds off things and as a spiritual outlet. At one of the ceremonies I met a medicine woman who taught me how to use the

reflexology points in my son's hands and feet to help open up his sinuses and help them drain and also to massage his arms to help the lymph system drain the infection away and help the body get rid of it. It helped him to be more comfortable and less congested and it was a technique I used even after this particular crisis was over, any time he even had an ordinary cold.

The premise of Reflexology is that there are areas of the hands and feet that correspond to different parts of the body and stimulating these areas with pressure/massage can effect change/healing. There are charts that are used as guidelines for the hands and feet, the right and left are different as well. Practice with a partner and see what kinds of relief you can achieve. You can even use essential oils to make the massage more effective, just be sure to dilute them in some kind of carrier oil like almond or olive oil. Lavender or orange essential oils are good ones to try. One to try for a headache is peppermint, if you are feeling a head-

ache coming on, rub a drop or 2 between your hands and breathe it in. It will make you feel better and revitalized!!

Breathe Therapy
So you're probably wondering why there's a therapy for breathing, right? Well, I'm sure most of us don't think about our breathing most of the time, unless we are running or doing something strenuous and we are actually out of breath.

The truth of it is that if we are not breathing correctly, we are not completely getting rid of the toxins that are in the bloodstream. We take in air, which contains oxygen; the lungs process the oxygen and put the necessary nutrients into the bloodstream. The oxygen (O2) is used by the body's cells and they then return carbon dioxide (CO2, the toxin) to be carried out by the blood and excreted by the lungs. If we are not breathing deeply, we are not completely ridding the blood of the CO2, nor are we getting enough O2 for the cells to perform all the functions they need to do. We become toxic.

We have to learn to breathe from our abdomen rather than from our chest. When we breathe our abdomen should rise and fall if we are breathing properly and deeply. The primary causes of faulty breathing are anxiety, poor posture, too

tight clothing and in some cases surgery. Proper breathing techniques will help to alleviate tension, relieve asthma and insomnia, increase metabolic rate and boost your immune system.

One of the best exercises for the muscles that control breathing is laughter!! So put on a funny movie and exercise those breathing muscles every chance you get!!! 
Yoga/Meditation




