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Bay schools net \$2M in grants



Lucille Moore, Springfield earn Schools of Hope grants

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PANAMA CITY — Two local elementary schools will have an addition \$2 million to help boost student achievement thanks to a controversial grant program.

Lucille Moore and Springfield elementary schools were among 11 selected Wednesday to receive grants through Schools of Hope, which derived from House Bill 7069.

Bay District Schools Superintendent Bill Husfelt said he

can't wait for schools to put the money to use toward wraparound services — those used to build productive relationships and support networks among students and youth with emotional and behavioral disabilities and their families.

“Our staff worked incredibly hard to put these grants together, and so it's obviously very rewarding to have two of our schools receive them when only 11 have been awarded thus far in the entire state,” he said.

About \$18 million Schools of Hope funding was available for up to 25 low performing schools, but the state chose only 11. The nine others were

in Dade, Seminole and Palm Beach counties.

Both Bay District schools applied for the grant in August.

Springfield Elementary Principal Russell Brock said his school will spend its \$903,424 grant on mental health services and counseling through school psychologists and social workers on the school's campus. He said the money will also be used for additional classroom support for teachers.

“Thanks to the district staff who helped with the application process,” he said. “We expressed our ideas for the grant, and they helped us

make it happen. This is a truly exciting time for Springfield Elementary.”

Increased parental involvement and engagement in students' education are among the many things Lucille Moore Elementary School will aim to implement with its \$1,022,048 grant, said the school's principal, Lisa M. Jones.

“As we know, income often dictates access to necessary resources,” Jones said. “This grant will help provide much needed resources for the Lucille Moore Patriot family, which includes our faculty, staff, students, student

Collaboration key to area's future says St. Joe's Jorge Gonzales

PANAMA CITY — The Gulf Coast State College Foundation is looking to raise a million dollars to support students who are active duty military, veterans or their dependents as part of its “Thanks a Million” campaign.

And St. Joe Co. president and CEO Jorge Gonzales,

the night's keynote speaker, said that is just one example of the collaboration that has our area on the edge of something special.

“We think the region is entering a renaissance period,” said Gonzales, who noted St. Joe has moved its operations here and sees its long-term success as being hand-in-hand with the area's future. “Bay County is the epicenter of our future and we are ready. We believe we're

reaching a tipping point in our area, we really believe it.”

Gonzales' keynote address ended an evening focused on the past, present and future of Gulf Coast State College 50 years after the Foundation was formed. The foundation, which funds scholarships and other programs that offset education costs, made the announcement about

Trump's health subsidy shutdown may bring surprise

WASHINGTON — If President Donald Trump prevails in shutting down a major “Obamacare” health insurance subsidy, it would have the unintended consequence of making free basic coverage available to more people, and making upper-tier plans more affordable.

The unexpected assessment comes from consultants, policy experts, and state officials, who are trying to discern the potential fallout from a Washington health care debate that's becoming even more complicated and volatile.

What's driving the predictions? It's because another subsidy that's part of the health law would go up for people with low-to-moderate incomes, offsetting Trump's move.

“It's a kind of counter-intuitive result,” said Kurt Giesa, a health insurance expert with the Oliver Wyman consulting firm.

Think of pushing down on one end of a see-saw and the other end goes up.

According to one estimate, more consumers would sign up for coverage next year




Today’s Highlight in History:

On Oct. 20, 1967, a jury in Meridian, Mississippi, convicted seven men of violating the civil rights of slain civil rights workers James Chaney, Andrew Goodman and Michael Schwerner; the seven received prison terms ranging from 3 to 10 years.

On this date:

In 1714, the coronation of Britain’s King George I took place in Westminster Abbey. In 1803, the U.S. Senate ratified the Louisiana Purchase. In 1936, Helen Keller’s teacher, Anne Sullivan Macy, died in Forest Hills, New York, at age 70. In 1947, the House Un-American Activities Committee opened hearings into alleged Communist influence and infiltration in the U.S. motion picture industry. In 1964, the 31st president of the United States, Herbert C. Hoover, died in New York at age 90. In 1968, former first lady Jacqueline Kennedy married Greek shipping magnate Aristotle Onassis. In 1973, in the so-called “Saturday Night Massacre,” special Watergate prosecutor Archibald Cox was dismissed and Attorney General Elliot L. Richardson and Deputy Attorney General William B. Ruckelshaus resigned. In 1976, 78 people were killed when the Norwegian tanker Frosta rammed the commuter ferry George Prince on the Mississippi River near New Orleans. In 1977, three members of the rock group Lynyrd Skynyrd, including lead singer Ronnie Van Zant, were killed along with three others in the crash of a chartered plane near McComb, Mississippi.

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

Still struggling in Puerto Rico

A month after Maria, many people on the island still lack supplies, housing and electricity

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — One man climbs 24 flights of stairs several times a day alongside dormant elevators. Street vendors hawk plastic washboards for \$20. And families outstretch their hands as crews in helicopters drop supplies in communities that remain isolated.

This is life one month after Hurricane Maria slammed into the U.S. territory on Sept. 20 as a Category 4 storm that killed at least 48 people, destroyed tens of thousands of homes and left tens of thousands of people without a job.

It was the strongest hurricane to hit Puerto Rico in nearly a century, with sustained winds just shy of Category 5 force.

"I've never seen anything like this," retired schoolteacher Santa Rosario said as she scanned empty shelves at a supermarket in the capital of San Juan that had run out of water jugs — again.

Maria caused as much as an estimated \$85 billion in damage across an island already mired in an 11-year recession. That has complicated and delayed efforts to restructure a portion of a \$74 billion public debt load that officials say is unpayable. And it has thrust Puerto Rico's

territorial status into the international spotlight, reviving a sharp debate about its political future as the island of 3.4 million people attempts to recover from flooding, landslides and power and water outages.

Roughly 80 percent of power customers remain in the dark, and another 30 percent are without water. Schools remain closed. Stoplights are not operating.

And while nearly 90 percent of supermarkets have

reopened, many have bare rows of shelves empty of goods ranging from water to bananas to canned tuna.

"We're not eating well," said 28-year-old maintenance worker Pedro Lopez as he took a break from cleaning a damaged apartment complex. "It's a lot of white rice and fried eggs."

Near where he stood, massive tree trunks, pieces of zinc roofs and soggy items including mattresses still lined the

street — a scene common across the island.

Less than half of Puerto Rico's cellphone towers are operating, and only 64 percent of bank branches have reopened, some of them with dead outdoor ATMs whose empty screens prompt a roll of eyes from people seeking to withdraw money.

A brown haze has settled over parts of the island as more and more generators are turned on to light hospitals,

homes and even the power company itself. In turn, the number of asthma cases and thefts has increased.

Newly precious generators have been stolen from places including a nursing home, an airport cargo terminal and a hospital.

Nearly 5,000 people remain in shelters, with many using rainwater to shower.

"Life has changed dramatically," said Gilberto Del Orbe, 50, who used to install marble and gypsum board. "I've had no work. Everything is paralyzed."

Last week, the House of Representatives passed a \$36.5 billion disaster aid package for places including Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands, and now a group of Democratic lawmakers are pushing for tax relief, saying that people and businesses in both U.S. territories affected by Hurricane Maria receive unequal treatment compared with U.S. states.

The U.S. Federal Emergency Management Agency also has pledged more than \$171 million to help restore power across the island, and it has distributed more than \$5 million to municipalities in need, as well as \$1 million to Puerto Rico's National Guard.

Resident Commissioner Jennifer Gonzalez said the storm set Puerto Rico back 20 to 30 years, and while generators, food, water and other types of aid are still being flown and shipped to the island, people say it's not enough.

Report: Medicaid enrollments, costs begin to stabilize

States are seeing more stability in their Medicaid programs after experiencing a surge in enrollment and costs associated with the Affordable Care Act.

At the same time, they are experiencing a high level of uncertainty as Republicans in Congress continue to advocate for a major overhaul of a program that provides health insurance to tens of millions of lower-income and disabled Americans.

Thursday's report by the Kaiser Family Foundation found Medicaid enrollments in the states slowed considerably to an increase of just 2.7 percent in fiscal year 2017. By comparison, states reported a 13.9 percent increase in enrollment during fiscal year 2015.

Lawsuit challenges DeVos' guidance on sexual assault

A national women's rights group is challenging Education Secretary Betsy DeVos' new guidance on investigating campus sexual assault.

The organization Equal Means Equal and three women who say they were assaulted in college filed a federal lawsuit Thursday in Boston alleging the rules violate civil rights laws.

On Sept. 22, DeVos scrapped President Barack Obama-era rules and issued new guidance allowing schools to use a higher standard of evidence when handling complaints.

The lawsuit says DeVos' rules violate civil rights laws because they treat violations based on sex differently than civil-rights abuses based on race or nationality.

KIRKUK, IRAQ

Court issues arrest warrant for Kurdish vice president

A Baghdad court issued an arrest warrant for the vice president of Iraq's autonomous northern Kurdish region on Thursday for saying that Iraqi forces had "occupied" the disputed province of Kirkuk this week.

However, the warrant against Kosrat Rasul is unlikely to be executed as the central government in Baghdad has no enforceable authority in the Kurdish-administered north.

The court accused Rasul of "insulting" Iraq's armed forces, which is forbidden by Iraqi law.

On Monday, Iraq's federal forces, supported by Iranian-sponsored militias, rolled into the oil-rich city of Kirkuk, forcing Kurdish militias to withdraw after brief clashes.

PARIS

France committed to nuclear deal despite Trump decision

France has reaffirmed its support for the Iran nuclear deal following the decision by U.S. President Donald Trump to no longer back it in its current form.

French Foreign Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian said Thursday after a meeting in Paris with head of the International Atomic Energy Agency, Yukiya Amano, that the deal "remains valid despite the decision of the president of the United States not to certify its implementation."

Trump announced last week that he would not re-certify the deal to Congress and would terminate the Obama-era pact if Congress can't come up with new legislation satisfying him on the agreement.

Tourist killed by falling masonry in famous church

A 52-year-old tourist from Spain was killed Thursday by falling masonry in one of Florence's most famous churches, the Basilica of Santa Croce.

The church, a top tourist attraction, is where Italian luminaries Michelangelo, Galileo Galilei and Niccolò Machiavelli are buried. The fatal accident raised questions about the state of Italy's considerable cultural heritage, which includes numerous aging and fragile monuments.

The victim was struck by a decorative stone fragment that fell from a height of 66 feet as he visited the church with his wife.

US has 8 border wall types to choose from

SAN DIEGO — The last two of eight prototypes for President Donald Trump's proposed border wall took shape Thursday at a construction site in San Diego.

The prototypes form a tightly packed row of imposing concrete and metal panels, including one with sharp metal edges on top. Another has a surface resembling an expensive brick driveway.

Companies have until Oct. 26 to finish the models but Border Patrol spokesman Theron Francisco said the last two came into profile, with crews installing a corrugated metal surface

on the eighth model on a dirt lot just a few steps from homes in Tijuana, Mexico.

As the crews worked, three men and two women, one carrying a large red purse, jumped a short rusted fence from Tijuana into the construction site and were immediately stopped by agents on horseback.

Francisco said there have been four or five other illegal crossing attempts at the site since work began Sept. 26.

The models, which cost the government up to \$500,000 each, were spaced 30 feet apart. Slopes, thickness and curves vary.

One has two shades of blue with white trim.

The others are gray, tan or brown — in sync with the desert.

Bidding guidelines call for the prototypes to stand between 18 and 30 feet high and be able to withstand at least an hour of punishment from a sledgehammer, pickaxe, torch, chisel or battery-operated tools.

Features also should prevent the use of climbing aids such as grappling hooks.

The segments must be "aesthetically pleasing" when viewed from the U.S. side.

The administration hasn't said how many winners it will pick or whether Trump will weigh in on the winner himself.

the "Thanks a Million" campaign at the dinner Thursday night, noting they have already raised about \$300,000 and given aid to hundreds of students already.

The dinner, which took place at the school's Advanced Technology Center, was intended to celebrate the foundation and school's past and present while also looking to the future.

They also took the opportunity honor Bill Cramer, owner of Bill Cramer Chevrolet Cadillac GMC, who spent decades championing the college whether it was as chairman of the foundation, fundraising, putting feet on the ground for the school or just finding a way to help make it successful. The latest campaign to assist veterans is a continuation of that drive, and Foundation president Joey Ginn said Cramer was "spearheading" it and had already drawn a huge commitment from Gulf Power. Later in the evening Gulf Power announced it was committing \$150,000 long-term to the drive.

College President John Holdnak spoke about the foundation's legacy and said it's hard to imagine any one person making the kinds of differences Cramer has for the school.

"I have been associated with Gulf Coast for over 30 years now," Cramer, who's been on the Foundation board before,

said. "We've seen there's been a great need for our military active duty and veteran students and their dependents. The government tuition assistance and GI Bill do not cover all the expenses our students have to bear."

Active duty sometimes pays for books and other costs which be unaffordable since it can add up to \$100 a course, Cramer said.

Trey Hutt, a Foundation board member, said they are "very confident" the million dollars will be raised "pretty quickly."

"That's going to pay for an awful lot of things for veterans and military families that federal benefits don't pay for, a lot of fees and things like that," Hutt said. It's "a lot of things that veterans benefits don't cover and we're going to cover that for them because we want to be the most military-friendly campus in Florida."

Doing so "made sense" since the large community of military and veterans in the area have supported Gulf Coast for so long, Hutt said.

What also makes sense, Gonzales said later, continuing the night's theme, was the collaboration in the community that has brought the college this far and which is prepared to take it further.

"I did not bring my crystal ball with me," Gonzales said, but he made it clear St. Joe is bullish on the area's future.

"I think you'll notice we more and more have become a local company," he told the audience. "More and more our future is intertwined with

the local area's future more than it has ever been before."

He noted the company has sold off a lot of land and now owns more property in Bay County than any other by far.

He said St. Joe made carefully thought out, strategic decisions to be a part off this area, not just a company doing business here.

"We've made them cause we believe in the future of Bay County," Gonzales said. "We feel very strongly about it."

Gonzales said there are "stars aligning" for good things here and alluded to a hoped-for positive announcement from the military soon.

"As our communities go, so do we, we are joined at the hip," he said. "The way we see it, we succeed when you and your neighbors' succeed; we are your neighbors, our employees live here. We are 100 percent inline with your vision."

Most important, he said, are quality jobs and quality wages. And he pointed to GKN, an international aerospace company that is now officed by the new airport.

"I'm not sure everybody recognizes the significance of GKN yet," he said. "Ninety percent of every aircraft that takes off daily has GKN technology equipment or component on board."

"They're here, they could've gone anywhere in the world and the chose us," he continued. They'll tell you the No. 1 reason they came here was the collaboration (within the community), it matters."

unconstitutional because it places restrictions on the power of local school boards to supervise all public schools in their districts.

Husfelt said many of the school systems felt the bill was not "properly vetted" and didn't go through an appropriate legislative process. He said there are some positive aspects of the bill, but it is overwhelmingly not in the best interests of all of the students in the state of Florida.

"We don't believe that HB 7069 treats all students equally, and we believe firmly in equal opportunities for all of our students," he said.

The goals of Schools of Hope are to assist and supplement schools in the application of an initial district-managed turnaround plan, and to increase student

achievement by providing wraparound services that leverage community assets, improve school and community collaboration and develop family and community partnerships, said Cheryl Eters, Florida Department of Education deputy director of communications.

"This is the first year of the grant. The State Board of Education just approved 11 schools to get the grant," she said. "Fifty-seven public schools applied for the Schools of Hope grant."

Husfelt said he wished funding was available for wraparound services at all Title I schools because all students deserve it.

"Grants like this certainly help us deliver services where they are needed, but we have more needs that these particular grants can cover," he said.

even though Trump says the Affordable Care Act is "virtually dead."

On Thursday, the fate of the health law's subsidy for copays and deductibles remained unclear as a bipartisan congressional deal to continue payments faced political roadblocks. Separately, state attorneys general were seeking a federal court order to keep the money flowing.

Trump's attempt to shut off the subsidy for copays and deductibles would cause a different subsidy to jump up, the one for premiums.

The Obama-era health care law actually has two major subsidies that benefit consumers with low-to-moderate incomes. The one targeted by Trump reimburses insurers for reducing copays and deductibles, and is under a legal cloud. The other subsidy is a tax credit that reduces the premiums people pay, and it is not in jeopardy.

If the subsidy for copays and deductibles gets eliminated, insurers would raise premiums to recoup the money, since by law they have to keep offering reduced copays and deductibles to consumers with modest incomes.

The subsidy for premiums is designed to increase with the rising price of insurance. So government spending to subsidize premiums would jump.

"This is where the counting gets sort of

weird," said Matthew Buettgens, a senior research analyst with the Urban Institute.

The nonpartisan policy research group has estimated that richer premium subsidies could entice up to 600,000 more people to sign up for health law coverage. That depends on how insurers and state regulators adjust, which isn't totally clear yet.

The group also found that the federal government would end up spending more overall on health insurance through higher premium subsidies.

None of this would be any comfort to people who buy individual health insurance policies but aren't eligible for government subsidies. Many are still facing significant premium increases for 2018, aggravated by political turmoil that has made insurers fearful they'll lose more money.

Still, the potential for a subsidy windfall hasn't been lost on officials at the state level.

"It means many more Californians and people across the country will get a zero-premium bronze plan," said Peter Lee, executive director of Covered California, the health insurance marketplace in the nation's most populous state.

"Bronze" is the health law's basic coverage level. "Silver" is the mid-range standard plan and the most popular. "Gold" is close to employer health insurance in value.

In addition to free bronze plans, many consumers would be able to buy a gold plan for about

the same monthly premium as silver coverage, Wyman and the Urban Institute concluded.

Other states where consumers could see zero-premium bronze plans include Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Mississippi, Pennsylvania, Utah and Wyoming, according to an industry estimate.

It's complicated, but here's why:

- First, the subsidy for copays and deductibles is provided only if you have a silver plan.

- Next, the other subsidy, the one for premiums, is pegged to the cost of a lower-priced silver plan.

In California, regulators instructed insurers to increase premiums for silver plans sold on the public marketplace to account for the loss of the subsidy for copays and deductibles.

Premiums for bronze plans and gold plans were shielded from that increase.

But because the federal subsidy for premiums is tied to the cost of a silver plan, that subsidy will be higher for everybody whose income qualifies them for financial assistance.

So consumers can use their richer premium subsidy to get a bronze plan for no monthly cost or very little, or a gold plan for much less than they would pay now.

Lee, the California official, said he believes regulators in close to half the states have taken a similar approach.

Final premiums for 2018 have not been officially unveiled yet, and some states are still making adjustments. Sign-up season starts Nov. 1.

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NCAA shows it is useless

When the NCAA turns a blind eye to criminal behavior while punishing players who legitimately make money for themselves, something is seriously wrong. The NCAA is a toothless and increasingly useless organization, as shown by its decision last week in one of the worst cases of academic fraud in college sports history. The NCAA announced Friday that it wouldn't punish the University of North Carolina for sham classes that were used for decades to keep hundreds of athletes eligible. Even though the practice disproportionately benefited athletes, the NCAA decided it couldn't punish the university because other students also took the classes.

The rulings comes on the heels of the FBI arresting 10 people, including assistant coaches at some top-tier college basketball programs, in an alleged bribery scheme involving apparel companies.

The rulings comes on the heels of the FBI arresting 10 people, including assistant coaches at some top-tier college basketball programs, in an alleged bribery scheme involving apparel companies. The NCAA subsequently announced the creation of a committee, which includes former University of Florida athletic director Jeremy Foley, to study how to guard against corruption in college basketball. The committee's charge should be expanded to consider whether the NCAA should

even exist in its current form. The North Carolina case shows how the organization cares more about protecting the billions of dollars in profits generated by football and men's basketball than its supposed mission to protect student-athletes.

As if to drive the point home, the NCAA on the same day as the ruling announced a student transferring to another school in the state was ineligible to play men's basketball for a year. The student briefly attended classes at Ohio State University but stopped when the coach there quit, but the NCAA ruled that was enough to bar him from playing at North Carolina State University for a year.

Here in Florida, we have seen plenty of similar examples of the hypocrisy and moral compromises in big-money college athletics. Some that happened at Florida State University are detailed in a book by New York Times reporter Mike McIntire, "Champions Way: Football, Florida, and The Lost Soul of College Sports."

McIntire, writes of cases such as a FSU teaching assistant who alleged she was pressured to give special breaks to athletes in online courses. FSU, like other schools including UF, hides behind student-privacy laws to prevent reporting on whether such problems are prevalent.

UF deserves credit for suspending nine football players facing charges on credit card fraud, despite the negative impact of the team's season. The actions stand in contrast to the tenure of former coach Urban Meyer, who won two championships but also led major programs in players arrested.

The NCAA largely allows universities to police themselves for arrested players or academic fraud, but take a hard-line approach on athletes who receive outside money.

CNN smear job a surprise to no one

Did you happen to catch CNN's latest smear?

Anderson Cooper's show recently featured a "two-part exclusive" that claims Donald Trump's EPA director had conspired with the CEO of a mining company to "withdraw environmental restrictions" so the company could dig "the largest open pit mine in the world in an extremely sensitive watershed in wild Alaska."

The report was enough to horrify any caring person. CNN showed beautiful pictures of colorful salmon swimming in Bristol Bay, and the reporter intoned dramatically, "EPA staffers were shocked to receive this email obtained exclusively by CNN which says 'we have been directed by the administrator to withdraw restrictions' ... (P)rotection of that pristine area was being removed."

No! A "pristine" area and gorgeous salmon were about to be obliterated by a mine! I would have believed it, except I happened to report on that mine a couple years ago.

I knew that the real scandal was not EPA director Scott Pruitt's decision to "withdraw the restrictions"; it was what President Obama's EPA

did to the company's mining proposal in the first place.

Zealots at the EPA had conspired with rich environmental activists to kill the mine before its environmental impact statement could even be submitted. This was unprecedented.

The House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform later concluded: "EPA employees had inappropriate contact with outside groups and failed to conduct an impartial, fact-based review."

Now, appropriately, Pruitt undid that censorship of science.

But CNN, implying devious secrecy said, "according to multiple sources, he made that decision without a briefing from any of EPA's scientists."

many scientists believe will destroy one of the most pristine sockeye salmon sporting grounds in the whole world."

By the way, Collier isn't an evil Republican-businessman-nature-destroyer. He's a Democrat who once ran environment policy for President Bill Clinton and Vice President Al Gore. CNN never mentioned that either.

Destin airport preps for new control tower

DESTIN — The Destin Executive Airport is preparing to unveil its long-awaited Lt. Gen. Leroy J. Manor, USAF (Ret.) Air Traffic Control Tower next month.

The airport will host the christening of the \$5.3 million tower on Nov. 1 with Manor, an Air Force veteran and Shalimar resident, guiding the first plane off the runway.

"This has been over a decade in the making," said Tracy Stage, Okaloosa County airports director. "From a safety standpoint, this is huge."

With construction on the tower complete, Stage said staff are working to finish policy and procedures and operational guidelines before the official launch.

"We've had a couple of public meetings that we've held, and we'll have a couple more," Stage said. "That way we

can educate residents on changes that will take place."

Stage said the airport also has been working closely with Eglin Air Force Base, signing letters of agreement and a memorandum of understanding.

The tower's purpose, according to Stage, will be to regulate the busy airspace shared by the military, general aviation, commercial aviation, helicopters and more.

"It's a proactive measure," he said. "An uncontrolled field will now become a controlled field."

A native of Morrisonville, New York, Manor, 96, began his career as a P-47 fighter pilot in World War II. He is best known as task force commander of Operation Ivory Coast, a Special Forces raid on the prisoner of war camp at Son Tay, Vietnam, on Nov. 21, 1970. The assault group landed in the camp and killed about 50 North Vietnamese Army guards, but there were no prisoners of the war at the camp.

Applying for a credit card? Take a selfie

NEW YORK — The selfie is everywhere — Facebook, Instagram, Twitter — and soon your bank could be asking for one in order to approve your purchase or credit card application.

Payment processing giant Visa Inc. is launching a platform to allow banks to integrate various types of biometrics — your fingerprint, face, voice, etc. — into approving credit card applications and payments.

Consumers could experience Visa's new platform in a couple different ways. If a person were to apply for a credit card application on their smartphone, the bank app could ask the applicant to take a selfie and then take a picture of a driver's license or passport. The technology will then compare the photos for facial similarities as well as check the validity of the driver's license, all happening within seconds.

The selfie could also play a role in an online purchase. With the wider acceptance of chip cards in the last couple of years, in-person fraud at retailers is on the decline. But online fraud is still a concern, with as many as one of six transactions being declined due to suspicious activity, according to Mark Nelsen, senior vice president for risk and authentication products at Visa.

Instead of a bank call center autodialing a customer when they have a concern about a transaction, this new technology could allow the customer to use Apple's TouchID or other fingerprint recognition technology, or take a selfie or record their voice, to verify they made the transaction. With voice recording, a customer may have to speak a certain phrase.

"Customers will be able to choose their own preference for biometric authentication: voice, face, fingerprint. Any manner that they want," said Tom Grissen, CEO of Daon, one of the companies that Visa is partnering with to launch the platform.

The announcement comes at a time when a huge amount of personal information on 145.5 million Americans was recently accessed or stolen from the credit bureau Equifax. The information — birthdates, Social Security numbers, addresses, last names — is also information that could be used tomorrow or 20 years from now to potentially commit identity fraud.

Financial companies are particularly interested in biometrics, not surprisingly, as mostly a fraud protection measure. While a birthdate, Social Security number or last name can be more easily stolen or mimicked — as anyone who has been a victim of identity fraud will tell you — it's much harder to fraudulently mimic a person's face, fingerprint or voice.

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Authorities are investigating what led to the death of a person at a Bay County motel, which so far appears to have occurred under suspicious circumstances, officials reported.

FOUNTAIN — A Bay County man has been arrested after a couple allegedly routed electrical lines directly to their trailer, inside of which deputies also reported finding dog feces in a child's bed.

When officers arrived, several appliances were running inside the house as they sought to make contact with Bertucci.

"The rear door was cracked open and all of the a/c units in the windows were on," officers wrote. "Several electrical items inside the residence such as TVs and radios were turned on which showed that someone had been in the residence within the last 24 hours."

Land-use change sought for go-kart track

SAND HILLS — Lynn Haven construction company owner James Finch is asking Bay County for a large-scale land plan development in the Sand Hills area that would allow 26 acres of rural residential zoning and 17 acres of general commercial.

But Finch, the owner of Phoenix Construction and former owner of a NASCAR team, said he has no ambitious development plans and simply asked for the land-use plan change so he could develop a go-kart track for his

son that would eventually be open to the public, and that would not be allowed under the current land designation.

On April 21 of last year, Finch bought the 142 acres at 215 Hatcher Drive from the City of Lynn Haven for \$604,300. The city had planned to use the property for a public use, a county staff report states. On Sept. 21, the Bay County Planning Commission voted 5-0 to find the proposed land-use change consistent with the Bay County Comprehensive Plan and recommended that it be transmitted to the state's Department of Economic Opportunity for analysis.

The County Commission on Tuesday voted to transmit the plan change to the state for its input.

A sand mining operation currently exists on a 99-acre portion of the site, and on that property Finch has requested that the land use be changed to agriculture zoning. Finch said the mining operation would stay.

Finch said he isn't planning on developing a residential-commercial project on the property, just a site where he can build the go-kart track that would eventually be open to the public, a fish pond, an area for trucks with Baldwin containers to park vehicles

and a caretaker's house.

"There are about 250 acres there," Finch said. "Most of it is going to be a barrow pit, and on 15 acres we're just going to put a go-kart track on it and a couple of houses or something. It's not a development or anything."

He said he finds the bureaucracy of the permitting process frustrating.

Should the land plan and zone change be approved, Finch or anyone he sells the land to in the future could do more with the land than what Finch has outlined in his immediate plans.







WCSO: PCB man had sex with teen employee

NAVARRE FWC: Bear fatally shot in Navarre

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is investigating the apparent shooting death of a black bear that was found in the back yard of a Navarre home on Wednesday.

Elizabeth Garrett arrived at her home on Casa De Oro Street in Navarre on Wednesday afternoon, when she noticed a bear that she thought was "sleeping" in her back yard.

"He was just lying in the grass," Garrett said. "I thought he was

sleeping, but he was shot and dead."

Garrett said the bear — which had been shot in the stomach — could have been there overnight, because she did not check her back yard Wednesday morning. She posted a video of the dead bear on a local Facebook page in hopes someone will come forward with information on who shot the bear.

The FWC went to the home to retrieve the dead bear, and Garrett said they will be conducting an official investigation.

According to the FWC's website, killing a bear is a misdemeanor, which can result in fines up to \$500 and/or 60 days in jail for a first offense. Prior offenses can result in higher penalties, with imprisonment up to 1 year, a fine of up to \$1,000 and suspension of recreational hunting and fishing licensing privileges.

"It's sad, you know?" Garrett said. "It's not their fault that we're cutting down their habitat."

Dolphin stranded during Nate recovering

PANAMA CITY BEACH — The 1-year-old dolphin stranded on Okaloosa Island during Nate is doing much better after spending a week at Gulf World Marine Institute.

"She is quite a spunky young dolphin," Gulf World spokeswoman Sam Tuno said.

Staff have named the bottlenose Samira, which Tuno said means "she who is of pleasant company." Midweek, Samira still was under 24-hour care, but she has started to eat on her own, and her blood tests have improved.

So far, she shows no signs of pneumonia or the deadly morbilli virus, two conditions that would

have complicated recovery. She will need to be monitored for at least three more weeks for continued monitoring.

During this time, she will not be put on display to the public.

"At this time, Gulf World Marine Institute is not open to the public," Tuno said. "Marine mammals that are undergoing rehabilitation are not authorized to be on public display in the best interest of the animal."

How and why Samira became stranded on the beach is still unknown. She was found washed up on shore by the dune line on Oct. 8 by two beachgoers looking for shells on Princess Beach.

When help arrived, the rescuers said it looked like the young dolphin has become exhausted

fighting the rip currents.

Normally, Samira still would be swimming

alongside her mother. Her young age will be a factor in her care, according to

Tuno. Whether she can be released will be determined by the National

Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Caring for a sick dolphin is expensive, Tuno said.

"The first week for a dolphin in rehabilitative care costs approximately \$10,000," she said. "Of course, each case is unique and there are many variables involved."

"We have a very extensive curriculum," said Adkins, who came to Bozeman this year after teaching ROTC in Indiana and retired from 20-plus years in the military in 2006. "Most of it is not even military-based. We teach civics, a lot of American history, a lot of government, how the government works. We teach a lot of leadership skills. We strive to teach them to be better citizens. ... The kids are required every year to do a service learning project. That can be anything from adopting a highway to building flower beds to bolster school spirit."

DeShawn Everett, 16 and a junior, said the JROTC program is "starting to really kick up." "We're having different events. We're finally having a Color Guard," said Everett, a command sergeant major in the program. "We're working

on a drill team. We're putting in effort to have a better ROTC program for Deane Bozeman School. ... It's like another family for me."

Everett, who's been in the program for two years, said classes also incorporate physical training, which helps if cadets "want to go into the military or become better citizens." Another way Everett is learning discipline is through his rank, which gives him the authority to handle the Color Guard and kids who "act up."

Bozeman Principal Josh Balkom said the school hasn't always had a JROTC program because of small classes compared

to the larger Bay schools. Bozeman students who wanted to take a JROTC course previously had to be bused to Mosley High School in the morning.

However, after a chat with Superintendent Bill Husfelt, the school got the green light to offer JROTC courses courtesy of the school board. Husfelt said one of the promises made to Bozeman when they became a K-12 school was a JROTC program.

"It's a great investment. We're just elated that we got the program there," Husfelt said. "The community there appreciates it. It's neat to have the Army on board."

Balkom said having an

Army JROTC program makes sense for Bozeman because not only is there an Army facility down the road from the school, but many of their students either come from military families or end up joining the service themselves after graduation.

"There was a need for an Army program here in Bay County," Balkom said. "We are a very heavy military heavy driven community here. ... It's a strong military foundation in this entire community. It just made sense to partner with the U.S. Army with this program."

The program hasn't been without its challenges, though. Balkom said he knew when the program started it would take several years to get off the ground, and with instructors initially making a teacher's salary — a step down from the money they receive from other positions or retirement pay — turnover has been high. Instructors must be retired military.

But now that Bozeman has federal funding, the school has high hopes.

"This is a big moment for our school," Balkom said. "This is something we have been really wanting for a long time and needed. It's going to do so much good for the environment of our school, the morale and for our community."

died under more suspicious circumstances, although he declined to comment on what led

investigators to that determination.

"There really are no suspects at this time," Mathis said. "We are working this as a homicide until proven otherwise."

A neighbor from a nearby room, who

declined to be identified, said two men had been staying in the room for about three weeks. He said they were both white males, who appeared to be in their 30s.

"They would sit outside the room together, drinking and smoking,"

the neighbor said. Mathis said BCSO has yet to locate the roommate, but officers were working to find him. He also declined to identify the roommate.

Spencer takes the stage in Gainesville

Alt-Right movement leader, protesters tussle for spotlight at talk months in making

Richard Spencer's talk at the University of Florida on Thursday was months in the making.

Within 30 seconds of Spencer taking the stage at the Phillips Center, it was clear protesters were hell-bent on drowning him out.

After an hour and 40 minutes of some questions, some answers and a whole lot of taunting on the stage and in the audience, Spencer and his posse left 20 minutes early.

Thursday was Spencer's second attempt at speaking at the university. After a protest he attended in Charlottesville, Virginia, turned violent and one woman died, UF denied a request in August for Spencer to speak in September, citing safety concerns.

Spencer's attorney, Gary Edinger, threatened to sue the university based on the First Amendment's protection of free speech. On Sept. 1, UF sent Edinger a letter saying it would

accommodate Spencer at a later date.

Though thousands converged on campus to show their distaste for Spencer's views, many more stayed away, at the urging of UF, local government and religious leaders, who suggested that avoiding the event would be the best way to keep the peace.

During his talk, Spencer said he wasn't responsible for the death of Heather Heyer, who was killed in Charlottesville when James Alex Fields Jr. drove a car into protesters.

"Life doesn't work that way, that you can self-righteously say 'It's your fault,'" Spencer told the crowd, who chanted "It's your fault" after a woman asked Spencer to respond to beliefs that he's responsible for his supporters' violence. "What, are they going to throw me into moral prison? That is just ridiculous."

Spencer is a white nationalist and leader of the National Policy Institute. He promotes ethnic cleansing to create a white ethno-state but rejects being called racist.

"I'm not against everything that's not white," Spencer said.

Two people were arrested Thursday, and

five people were injured. UF and law enforcement estimated some 2,500 demonstrators attended.

"If it looks like a Nazi and it quacks like a Nazi, it's a f---ing Nazi," Trisha Ingle, a 48-year-old Gainesville resident, told a Spencer supporter before the talk.

About 1,000 police from 50 law enforcement agencies, many from across the state, monitored the event and the city.

William Fears, 29, said he was inspired to travel to Gainesville to attend the talk partly because of Charlottesville. He supports Spencer and thought he had "a hell of a story to tell."

"I don't know if anyone else has had a state of emergency declared just because they were going to open their mouth, but I want to hear what he had to say that didn't get said in Charlottesville," Fears said.

Spencer follows a trend of far-right leaders trying to speak at public universities, which cannot refuse speakers based on their beliefs because of the First Amendment, unlike private schools. Eli Mosley, an organizer for the white separatist group Identity Evropa who spoke before Spencer's talk, said Thursday that universities were

"cesspools of anti-white vitriol" with professors and administrators who hope to create a "Marxist utopia."

In December, Spencer was invited to Texas A&M University by a graduate of the university. While he had a handful of supporters there, twice police had to intervene between Spencer's supporters and his protesters. At that event, opponents booed and hissed, though it appeared Spencer was able to carry on with his remarks, for the most part.

The school spent up to \$3,500 on security, a pale comparison to UF's reported \$600,000 out-of-pocket costs.

In February, the University of California, Berkeley,

canceled an event with Milo Yiannopoulos after about 150 protesters started fires and threw barricades during an otherwise non-violent protest. Yiannopoulos had been invited by the Berkeley College Republicans.

And in April, Spencer spoke at Auburn University, leading to hundreds of protesters gathering outside the event. Like UF, Auburn initially barred Spencer, citing safety concerns. A federal judge reversed the decision, saying the First Amendment protected his speech.

No UF entity invited Spencer to speak. The National Policy Institute paid roughly \$10,000 to rent the Phillips Center.

On Thursday, 25 news cameras were pointed at its stage. About two dozen men, many in white button-down shirts and khakis, took up the front two rows of the auditorium and cheered for Spencer. More than 100 protesters booed and yelled while Spencer spoke.

During one of the louder shouting matches, Spencer said protesters feared reality.

"Why do you think you need to suppress speech?" he asked the heckling crowd. "You know what I am saying is going to change the world."

"We are stronger than you, and you know it," he said with a smirk.

ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

At the 2001 Bermuda Bowl in Paris, the U.S. suffered maybe their most humiliating defeat against Italy ever. With 32 deals to go, the match was almost tied, but then the roof fell in and they lost the last two sets of the match by over 100 IMPs, having been held virtually scoreless in both sets.

Here, for example, both tables reached four hearts, leaving the two Wests with about the same amount of information. Say you lead a top club — and infer from trick one that partner has one or two clubs; what would you do now?

For the U.S., Jeff Meckstroth shifted to a diamond — which looks logical enough. Declarer won and ducked a club to Meckstroth, won the next trump in dummy, ruffed a club, crossed with a diamond ruff and ruffed a club, then drew the last trumps and claimed 10 tricks. Had Meckstroth played back a spade at trick four, declarer could have cross-ruffed to 10 tricks.

By contrast, Alfredo Versace shifted to a spade at trick two, knocking out the late entry to dummy. This is the only defense to succeed here. (A trump shift lets declarer overtake and play clubs from hand.)

The American declarer could do nothing now. He chose to duck this trick — hoping to be allowed to play a crossruff or set up the clubs — but Lorenzo Lauria overtook the spade queen and gave his partner the ruff, for down one. Very nicely done after the club lead; of course, most leads but a top club also succeed outright.





"It feels really good, really good. It was a good win," Michelle Mask said. "It's been an emotional couple of weeks

for us. Obviously we've got a lot going on with my family, but I've got great assistant coaches and a great athletic department at Mosley from the football coach to the pep club representative. Everybody has kind of had our back in this. I don't feel like I'm the only coach for this team.

"We've got such a tremendous staff around these kids supporting them while our family is going through what we're going through, and I really think it showed today. You saw how many people came up and hugged me after the game."

Blocked extra point dooms Bucks

Freeport prevails 42-41 in overtime thriller

SAND HILLS — A cursory view of Freeport's 42-41 overtime victory over Bozeman on Thursday night reveals that the deciding factor was a blocked extra point by the Bulldogs' 6-foot-4, 300-pound defensive lineman Shannon Carswell.

While it is true that Carswell batting down Cameron Walker's boot to force a second overtime finally ended the game, it was its timing that was critically important.

For on a night where each team's effort mirrored the other as far as giving as good as it received, Bozeman also had a blocked extra point, Triston Tiller rejecting Tragon Appelman early in the fourth quarter to keep his team ahead 35-27.

The difference was that Freeport, 5-4, had time to overcome that setback. It did so after terrific freshman running back K'wan Powell took a pitch from receiver Austin Johnson on a trick play and sprinted the final 65 yards of a 70-yard pass and run.

With 4 minutes, 27 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter, quarterback Rajah Hooks found Cameron Hardee on a crossing pattern for a conversion to tie the game.

Consider the similarities throughout the battle and it underscores Bozeman's futility. Credit the Bulldogs for twice rallying from a two-touchdown deficit to win on the road.

Otherwise, each team had a running back who scored four touchdowns and eclipsed 200 yards rushing. Powell did so for the Bulldogs with 23 carries for 205 yards while

Raiders score on final play to beat Chiefs 31-30

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Derek Carr threw a 2-yard touchdown pass to Michael Crabtree on the final play after the game was extended by two straight defensive holding calls and the Oakland Raiders snapped a four-game losing streak with a 31-30 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs on Thursday night.

With their season on the line following the recent slump, Carr led an 85-yard touchdown drive in the final 2:25 to give the Raiders (3-4) the thrilling comeback win in a game they trailed by nine points heading into the fourth quarter.


Carr finished 29 for 52 for 417 yards and three touchdowns, with Amari Cooper catching 11 passes for 210 yards and two of the scores. Alex Smith threw for

342 yards and three touchdowns but it wasn't enough for the Chiefs (5-2). They lost consecutive games for the first time since Oct. 11-18, 2015, and had their 12-game winning streak in the AFC West snapped in a thrilling finish.

The Raiders had an apparent go-ahead touchdown pass to Jared Cook with 18 seconds left overturned when replay ruled he was down at the 1. An offensive pass interference on Michael Crabtree wiped another touchdown on the next play.

County teams face Pensacola purgatory

There's no purpose in trying to sugar coat it. Bay County is 0-fer this high school football season against District 1-5A Pensacola opponents.

Not only have West Florida and Pensacola each posted two wins against county schools thus far in the district, Arnold head coach Josh Wright pointed out that the Marlins haven't beaten tonight's opponent West Florida during his five-year tenure.

"It would be such an achievement to do something we haven't done," Wright said. "We were close two years ago, and obviously will be the underdog, but to beat them would be quite an achievement."

West Florida (6-1) is second in Region 1-5A with 41.14 points toward a playoff position. Arnold (3-4) has 27.00, which is 18th in the region.

Rutherford returns to Class 4A competition when it hosts South Walton at Bozeman for Homecoming. Mosley (4-3) also will attempt to post the county's first

win against a Pensacola opponent when it travels to meet Pensacola High (3-4). Bay (1-6) will try and end a similar drought against Fort Walton Beach (3-4), which already has defeated Arnold and Mosley. All kickoff times are 7 p.m.

North Bay Haven is idle.

Arnold yielded 41 points last week in its loss at Pensacola, so the objective with West Florida starts in trying to nullify the Jaguars' offense.

"It's a whole different ballgame in terms of ways they come at you," Wright said. "They find ways to get the ball in their guys' hands. They have a distributor (junior quarterback Trevor Jordan) that knows the ins and outs of the offense.

"And they don't over-complicate things. On defense they're very aggressive and also find a way to bully you around and get you out of your mental game."

Wright said that position by position West Florida has the edge on Arnold. Despite having had a few players tap out along the way this season,

there hasn't been a stam-pede of Marlins to turn in shoulder pads.

"We are who we are ... but I honestly can say that yesterday was our best practice as far as tempo, energy and enthusiasm," Wright said. "By no means are guys throwing in the towel. This game is still fun.

"(Dylan) Gandy was resilient in that (Pensacola) game. Cade (Ledman) played his best game by far. (Jarrett) Dutton continues to do good work on both sides of the ball and (Branson) Stuckey has been an impact on both sides as well."

Jordan has thrown 16 touchdown passes while orchestrating an offense that is equally adept running and passing.

South Walton (3-5) at Rutherford (2-5)

All coaches are getting indoctrinated to the new playoff system, especially in classifications 1A-4A. With that in mind, Rutherford head coach Loren Tillman has taken a "you never know" approach to tonight's outcome.

"With these points, you never know how things

will shake out," Tillman said. "South Walton is sitting fourth right now. We've got two teams (also Marianna) in 4A left on our schedule."

Rutherford was idle last week, which has helped the Rams absorb Homecoming week without a lack of preparation. South Walton is experiencing its first season playing up in class from 1A. In addition to a new schedule, the Seahawks also are replacing 20 seniors this season.

In that regard, the teams have something in common — inexperience. "Exactly," Tillman said. "The way I look at it we're almost in the same boat but we got there two different ways. We've got a lot of kids that this is their first year at the varsity level. For their kids, it's the first time getting game time at the varsity level."

Tillman noted that Rutherford will start six sophomores tonight on defense, but said they no longer are playing like 10th-graders.

"They're more like seasoned juniors," Tillman said. "I expect them to play well."

Despite using a spread

philosophy on offense the Rams are more of a ball-control team than a quick-strike attack. Quarterback KD Heard and running back James Caldwell are their main weapons.

"We haven't broke the big play," Tillman said. "In the second half of our last game (Arnold) our whole rushing offense played really well. I think we have a good plan for South Walton."

Road games

Mosley should reveal how much it has benefited from a week off to heal from an abnormal amount of injuries, many of them at key positions on offense.

The Dolphins will be tested on defense by Ladarius Harris, the Pensacola quarterback who already has bedeviled county opponents Bay and Arnold while helping the Tigers turn around their season with consecutive wins after a 1-4 start.

Bay faces a Fort Walton Beach squad that has surrendered a combined 142 points in three consecutive defeats. The

Tornadoes have dropped five straight games since trouncing Rutherford.

Elsewhere

The show down between visiting Blountstown (5-1) and Port St. Joe (6-1) takes the area spotlight tonight, with both schools heavy favorites to be playoff-bound next month.

Holmes County (5-2) will try and build on its resume at Vernon (3-3) and winless Sneads (0-6) attempts to break through against visiting Pataula Charter Academy.

Cottondale (6-1) is at Franklin County (4-3) in an intriguing matchup. The Hornets have lost only to once-beaten Chipley and boast an envious arsenal of offensive weapons. Host Franklin County, however, has turned it around under first-year head coach Tony Yeomans and won four straight games.

Chipley (6-1) will try and bounce back from its lone defeat at 4A Walton (2-6). Graceville (0-6) looks for a first win at powerful Lafayette (7-0) and Florida High (4-3) is at Marianna (3-3).

HOUSTON — Riley Ferguson threw for 471 yards and had a 21-yard TD pass with 1:28 left, Patrick Taylor rushed for a career-high four touchdowns and No. 25 Memphis overcame a 17-point deficit to beat Houston 42-38 on Thursday night.

Ferguson was 33 of 53 and found Sean Dykes to cap an 8-play, 80-yard drive that took 1:49 to give Memphis (6-1, 3-1 American) its only lead. Anthony Miller caught 10 passes for 178 yards, and Tony Polard had nine catches for 91 yards.

Memphis finished with 501 yards.

Houston (4-3, 2-2) was driving when Kyle Postma fumbled at the Memphis 49, with T.J. Carter recovering with a minute remaining. After Memphis punted, Postma's pass was intercepted by Carter with 24 seconds remaining to end the game.

Dillon Birden finished with 126 yards and a touchdown on 21 carries,

and Duke Catalon rushed for 65 yards and a career-high three touchdowns as Houston built a 17-0 lead at the half.

The Cougars led 38-28 with 6:44 left after Postma found Steven Dunbar for an 8-yard touchdown pass. Taylor cut the lead to three with a 5-yard run with 5:14 left. After Memphis forced a Houston three-and-out, Ferguson capped the comeback.

Postma finished 29 of 40 for 315 yards, and Linell Bonner caught eight passes for 121 yards for Houston. The Cougars had 554 yards.

Smart has No. 3 Georgia on path to showdown with Saban, Tide

ATHENS, Ga. — Javon Wims refers to last year's beginning of the Kirby Smart era at Georgia as the trial-and-error phase, when the Bulldogs adjusted to changes implemented by the new coach.

The stakes were raised this year. The break-in period was over.

"This year we wanted to get it right and we understood to get it right we've got to change a few things and that's what we did," said Wims, Georgia's senior wide receiver.

Smart has No. 3 Georgia on a clear path for a showdown with No. 1 Alabama and his former mentor, Nick Saban. There's no doubt Smart learned a thing or two after spending a decade as a defensive coach with Saban at LSU and Alabama.

The time has helped prepare Smart for this moment: leading his alma mater to a top-five ranking in only his second season in charge of the program.

Georgia (7-0, 4-0 Southeastern Conference) already is drawing comparisons to Alabama.

"Georgia's being built like Alabama," Vanderbilt coach Derek Mason, who has faced both teams this season, said Wednesday. "It looks very, very similar in terms of the mold. And Kirby was a part of those great defenses there. I think he's well on his way to establishing himself."

Key ingredients of Alabama's championship formula, defense and a strong running game, also are Georgia's strengths. The schools rank first and second in the league in rushing offense and total defense.

Mason said "Alabama's a better team" than Georgia, giving the Crimson Tide the edge at receiver and in the secondary.

Alabama's success with Saban is established. Smart has Georgia

on the rise.

The Bulldogs look like a stronger, more disciplined football team.

Wims said Smart and his assistants have "absolutely" been more intense this season and have pushed players harder in practice. That includes this off week before the Bulldogs play Florida on Oct. 28.

"I told them the off week is not a bye week, it's a work week," Smart said.

More work also means more difficult practices.

"He's still on-the-edge type Kirby," said outside linebacker Davin Bellamy. "At practice he makes sure you don't get relaxed. He hasn't changed a bit. He does a great job of preaching that message to never get complacent."

That sounds like his mentor, who sees the results.

"I think he's done a great job," Saban said Wednesday when asked about Smart. "I think they have probably one of the best teams in our league right now. They're playing great on both sides of the ball. Play together. They're confident in what they're doing. They look very, very well-coached on both sides of the ball, so I think he's done a fabulous job. No question about it."

Saban also applauded Smart's success in recruiting.

Earlier this month,

Georgia received a verbal commitment from dual-threat quarterback Josh Fields, the nation's top prospect according to the 247 Sports composite rankings. Fields is from Harrison High School in Kennesaw, Georgia. Smart also has a verbal commitment from a top-rated running back, Zamir White from Laurinburg, North Carolina. Smart has shown the ability to juggle the wealth of talent, and keep everyone happy so far.

Smart is starting a true freshman at quarterback for the second straight year. Jacob Eason was the starter most of last season. Jake Fromm, forced onto the field when Eason sprained his left knee early in this season's opener against Appalachian State, has proved to be more than a fill-in.

Smart said Fromm has improved each week, so he has kept the job. The talented Eason played a backup role at Vanderbilt on Oct. 7 but did not play in last week's 53-28 win over Missouri.

Georgia's powerful and deep running game, led by seniors Nick Chubb and Sony Michel, has taken some pressure off Fromm.

Georgia and Alabama lead the SEC's East and West divisions, respectively, as they remain on a path to the conference championship showdown in Atlanta.

PHILADELPHIA — Pekka Rinne stopped 28 shots, Colton Sissons scored in the third period and the Nashville Predators beat the Philadelphia Flyers 1-0 on Thursday night.

Sissons got his second goal of the season early in the third, giving the Western Conference champions their fourth win in five games. Rinne was strong in his 44th career shutout and first of the season.

The Flyers had combined for 13 goals in their first two home games and scored 26 overall in their first six games.

Philadelphia pulled goalie Michal Neuvirth on a power play and couldn't score in the final minute with a 6-on-4 advantage.

The Flyers had outscored the opposition 12-4 in the second period, and their revitalized offense a year after missing the playoffs gives hope that better days are ahead.

But they couldn't solve Rinne.

The Predators beat the Flyers 6-5 nine days ago, but the rematch was far more defensive. The Flyers and Predators were locked in a scoreless tie through two periods, each with 16 shots.

Turned out, the Predators just needed Sissons in the lineup — he sat out the game last week with an injury.

Wayne Simmonds, who leads the Flyers with five goals, briefly left the game late in the second when he appeared to get poked in the face with a stick. Simmonds had proclaimed himself healthy at morning skate after he left a win against Florida on Tuesday with an undisclosed injury.

Neuvirth earned a second straight start on the heels of his 40-save effort against the Florida Panthers on Tuesday night. Brian Elliott has three wins for the Flyers, though neither goalie has established himself as a true No. 1.

The Flyers lost on the 50th anniversary of their first home game, a 1-0 win over the Pittsburgh Penguins at the Spectrum. The win was the first of 696 Flyers' victories at the since-demolished building and home of the Broad Street Bullies.

The Flyers honored founder Ed Snider before the game with a 9-foot bronze statue outside the Wells Fargo Center. Snider remained chairman until his death in April 2016.

Snider's statue has a Stanley Cup championship ring on his left ring finger that fans are encouraged to rub for good luck. Flyers President

"Everything I am as a human being, thank you Ed Snider," Hall of fame goalie Bernie Parent said as he threw a kiss toward the statue.

Hernandez hits 3 HRs, Dodgers top Cubs to reach World Series

CHICAGO — Enrique Hernandez put a Hollywood ending on an LA story three decades in the making.

Fueled by a home run trilogy from their emotional utilityman, Clayton Kershaw and the Los Angeles Dodgers are finally going to the World Series.

Hernandez homered three times and drove in a record seven runs, Kershaw breezed through six crisp innings and Los Angeles ended the Chicago Cubs' title defense with an 11-1 rout in Game 5 of the NL Championship Series on Thursday night.

"It feels good to hear World Series," Kershaw said. "It's been a long time coming for this team."

After years of playoff heartache, there was just no stopping these Dodgers. With Kershaw firing away at the top of a deep pitching staff and co-NLCS MVPs Justin Turner and Chris Taylor leading a tough lineup, one of baseball's most storied franchises captured its first pennant since Hall of Famer Tommy Lasorda managed Los Angeles to its last championship in 1988.

The Dodgers will host the New York Yankees or Houston Astros in Game 1 of the World Series on Tuesday night. The Yankees have a 3-2 lead in the ALCS heading into Game 6 at Houston on Friday night, so one more New York win would set up another chapter in an old October rivalry between the Yankees and Dodgers.

Los Angeles made the playoffs eight times in the previous 13 seasons and came up short each time, often with Kershaw shouldering much of the blame. The three-time NL Cy Young Award winner took

the loss when his team was eliminated by the Cubs in Game 6 of last year's NLCS at Wrigley Field.

The ace left-hander was just OK in his first two starts in this year's postseason, but Los Angeles' loaded lineup picked him up each time. Backed by Hernandez's powerful show in Chicago, Kershaw turned in an efficient three-hit performance with five strikeouts in his sixth career playoff win — matching Burt Hooton for the franchise record.

When Kenley Jansen retired Willson Contreras on a liner to shortstop for the final out, the party was on. The Dodgers poured out of the dugout and mobbed their dominant closer near the mound, and a small, but vocal group of Los Angeles fans gathered behind the visitors' dugout and chanted "Let's go Dodgers! Let's go Dodgers!"

Kris Bryant homered for Chicago, but the NL Central champions finished with just four hits in another tough night at the plate. Each of their eight runs in the NLCS came via the long ball, and they batted just .156 for the series with 53 strikeouts.

Long playoff runs in each of the last two years and a grueling five-game NL Division Series against Washington seemed to sap Chicago of some energy, and its pitching faltered against sweet-swinging Los Angeles. Jose Quintana was pulled in the third inning of the final game, and the Cubs never recovered.

Hernandez connected on the first two pitches he saw, belting a solo drive in the second for his first career playoff homer and then a grand slam in the third against Hector Rondon. He added a two-run shot in the ninth against Mike Montgomery.

Bridgewater: 'I definitely believe I'll play this year'

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. — After nearly 14 months of arduous rehabilitation for his left knee, Teddy Bridgewater has arrived at the final stage.

For all the progress he's made, appearing in a game for the Minnesota Vikings again will be no small step to take.

"I definitely believe I'll play this year, but I can't just sit here and say it," Bridgewater said.

"I have to continue to put the work in on the practice field and show the training staff or the higher authority that eventually I can get back to the player that I was."

Bridgewater spoke to reporters Thursday for the first time since the beginning of training camp and only the second time since he crumpled to the grass during a non-contact drill at practice Aug. 30, 2016.

He was cleared to rejoin the

team Wednesday, another significant milestone in his recovery from the knee dislocation and multiple ligament tears that would end the career of many players.

"If that doesn't inspire you, I don't know what will," wide receiver Stefon Diggs said.

The 24-year-old quarterback said his knee was feeling fine after completion of his first practice, though he hasn't taken any hits.

"It's baby steps," offensive coordinator Pat Shurmur said. "A little bit at a time. We try to amp it up a little bit each day as we go."

Bridgewater will be brought along slowly, realizing his return to the field this week did not signify an automatic assumption of the starting job.

"We have to be smart with everything," Bridgewater said. "The plan is to get to the race to be able to run the race. So if we're not being smart, and I'm

not doing whatever it takes to get to the race, I'll never be able to run the race."

Bridgewater acknowledged he'll need to prove to himself and to the team that he can complete some basic skills without problem in live action. Simulating the movements off to the side is another story.

"I'm going to have to see how I feel going forward. It could be just completing a pass down the field or making a sudden movement in the pocket," he said.

"So I'm just going to look for little things each day to do whatever I can to get back to where I was before, and even better."

The one-day-at-a-time attitude was a must for making it this far, given the daunting comeback that waited for him when he left the field by ambulance that fateful afternoon and medical staff needed to act quickly to save his leg from

amputation.

"Each day I wake up I put my feet on the ground and I'm thankful I'm able to walk, I'm able to stand up on my own," Bridgewater said. "There was a time where I needed help."

Bridgewater was coming off a solid second season, after which he made the Pro Bowl team as an injury replacement, and had just produced a stellar performance in the team's third exhibition game when he went down.

There's no telling what kind of a player he'll be when he does take the snaps again, but he said he has been "working out like crazy" and thus added some upper-body strength because of it.

"He's tough. I'm not worried about contact for him," Diggs said. "He probably wants a little bit of contact being out that long."

With Sam Bradford struggling through trouble with

his left knee, Case Keenum has taken over as the starter. Rookie Kyle Slotter is on the active roster as another backup.

In three weeks, the Vikings will have to decide whether to give Bridgewater one of the 53 spots or simply place him on injured reserve and give him more time.

For now, as long as Keenum can stay productive and healthy, there's no rush.

"He's worked extremely hard to get to this point where he can get back out on the practice field," coach Mike Zimmer said.

"We still don't know where it's going to go or where that's going to lead to, but I think everybody feels good for him because they know what kind of kid he is and how hard he has worked. He's probably not going to play this week. We need to put the brakes on things a little bit."

Westbrook has triple-double, new-look Thunder rout Knicks

OKLAHOMA CITY — Russell Westbrook had a triple-double and the Oklahoma City Thunder beat the New York Knicks 105-84 on Thursday night in their first regular-season game with All-Star additions Paul George and Carmelo Anthony. Westbrook, the NBA MVP last season when he averaged a triple-double, had with 21 points, 16 assists and 10 rebounds.

Paul George, who was acquired in an off-season trade with the Indiana Pacers, led the Thunder with 28 points. Anthony, who was traded from the Knicks to the Thunder right before training camp began, had 22 points and 10 rebounds.

Kristaps Porzingis had 31 points and 12 rebounds for the Knicks. Enes Kanter, who joined the Knicks in the deal that sent Anthony to the Thunder, finished with 10 points and seven rebounds. No other New York players scored in double figures.

George broke away for a dunk as time expired in the first half to give the Thunder a 53-42 lead.

Porzingis scored 19 points before the break to keep the Knicks in it.

Kanter made three buckets early in the third quarter to keep the Knicks in it, but Westbrook found Steven Adams and Andre Roberson for back-to-back alley-oop dunks to give the Thunder a 69-52 lead.

After that, it was time for the Westbrook triple-double watch. He reached double digits in points and assists midway through the third quarter. He grabbed his 10th rebound with about four minutes remaining in the game.

RAPTORS 117, BULLS 101: Jonas Valanciunas had 23 points and 15 rebounds, C.J. Miles scored 22 points in his Toronto debut and the Raptors beat short-handed Chicago in the opener for both teams. Chez Reavie, Gavin Kyle Green, Scott Brown, Patrick Reed and Marc Leishman all opened with 66s and were in a five-way share of second at 6 under.

EDEN PRAIRIE, MINN. Bridgewater: 'I definitely believe I'll play this year'

After nearly 14 months of arduous rehabilitation for his left knee, Teddy Bridgewater has arrived at the final stage.

For all the progress he's made, appearing in a game for the Minnesota Vikings again will be no small step to take.

"I definitely believe I'll play this year, but I can't just sit here and say it," Bridgewater said.

Bridgewater spoke to reporters Thursday for the first time since the beginning of training camp and only the second time since he crumpled to the grass during a non-contact drill at practice Aug. 30, 2016.

He was cleared to rejoin the team Wednesday, another significant milestone in his recovery from the knee dislocation and multiple ligament tears that would end the career of many players.

MINNEAPOLIS NFL to give away 500 tickets to the Super Bowl

Now that the NFL is providing tickets for an entire youth football team from Minneapolis to attend the Super Bowl, it's also giving away more free tickets to the game.

Hayward, Lin out for year, and many others in league are hurting

MIAMI — Brooklyn's Jeremy Lin was horrified to see what happened to Gordon Hayward, whose season almost certainly ended in a most disturbing fashion five minutes into the Celtics' season-opener.

A night later, Lin met a similar fate.

Here's some of what should be celebrated from the opening nights of the NBA season: Milwaukee's Giannis Antetokounmpo had a 37-point game, Cleveland's LeBron James was one assist away from a triple-double, Houston beat Golden State on the Warriors' ring night and Miami's Hassan Whiteside went for 26 points and 22 rebounds.

It all seems overshadowed by injuries.

No, this is not the start the NBA wanted.

"It's tough watching that happen to anybody in the NBA," said Golden State guard Shaun Livingston, whose horrific knee injury from 2007 — so bad that doctors originally thought he could lose his leg — was compared to the grotesque nature of Hayward's injury Tuesday night. "It's all a brotherhood. You want to see guys succeed."

Many members of the brotherhood are ailing, none causing bigger shock waves than Hayward.


San Antonio's Kawhi Leonard hasn't played yet this season because of a quadriceps injury. The Warriors sent Draymond Green to get an MRI on an aching left knee, which sidelined him before the end of their season opener and has him listed as doubtful for Golden State's game at New Orleans on Friday. Houston's Chris Paul missed a game at Sacramento on Wednesday with knee pain. Cleveland's Isaiah Thomas won't be back until January, at least, while recovering from a hip injury.

And those guys, along with Hayward, are just the hurting All-Stars from last season.

"There's no doubt we'll get him back to be better than he was before," said Mark Bartelstein, Hayward's agent.

Lin's injury was nowhere near as visibly horrifying as Hayward's, but the end result was the same — a bad landing at Indiana on Wednesday left him in tears and saying, "I'm done, I'm done."

His personal diagnosis was officially confirmed Thursday morning: Lin ruptured the patella tendon in his right knee, the Nets said.

"We feel awful that the injury will cost him the season," Nets general manager Sean Marks said.

Plenty of other teams are missing key players and would-be starters.

Among them: Utah's Dante Exum may miss the whole season with a dislocated left shoulder, Miami's Rodney McGruder had surgery on a stress fracture in his leg, Phoenix's Brandon Knight blew his knee out in the summer, San Antonio's Tony Parker (leg) is still several weeks from returning, Indiana's Glenn Robinson III (ankle) may miss half the season and Milwaukee's Jabari Parker (knee) has months of rehab work left.

"You worry about guys getting nicked up," Memphis

forward Brandan Wright said. "Lot of big injuries ... You want to just take care of your guys."

Hayward had surgery Wednesday night and is likely to miss the remainder of the season, after breaking his leg and dislocating his ankle in Boston's opener at Cleveland.

Livingston had no interest in seeing the replay of Hayward's injury. He knows the road that awaits the Boston star.

"I'm not watching the video, but I've seen the pictures," Livingston said. "Prayers go out to him. It's going to be a long road back for him but if he puts his mind to it, is a man of faith, keeps good people around him ... it's going to be a long rehab for him but he's very capable of coming back and being the same player."

Astros now face must-win situation

HOUSTON — Justin Verlander agreed to that last-second trade to the Houston Astros with hopes of another World Series, and has since won all eight games he has pitched.

Eight is not enough. The Astros have to win Verlander's ninth game — or their season will end short of that goal.

"Obviously, I know this is one of the main reasons I was brought here," Verlander said Thursday. "This is why I'm here."

Six days after the big right-hander threw a complete game against the Yankees to put Houston up 2-0 in the best-of-seven AL Championship Series, the teams will be back in Minute Maid Park for Game 6 on Friday night with the Astros facing elimination after New York swept three games in the Bronx.

"Well, there's immediate belief when you have a Justin Verlander go," manager A.J. Hinch said. "His presence will immediately make everybody sit up straight, stand up a little bit more, have a little bit more energy because of the presence that he brings."

The Astros certainly need the boost.

Aaron Judge and the Baby Bombers from New York, who had a pair of 2-1 losses in Houston and struck out 13 times against Verlander, definitely have a lot more energy and confidence after outscoring the Astros 19-5 and outhitting them 25-12 in their three home games.

And they have already turned the tables on Dallas Keuchel, the other Astros ace who lost Game 5 after winning the series opener with 10 strikeouts over seven scoreless innings.

"Look at a number of other players that have been through playoffs, and they've had their struggles, and all of a sudden they can get hot," Yankees manager Joe Girardi said. "And I think everything is magnified when you're in the playoffs, and two games seem like forever, where if you struggle two games in the season people don't say much."

The Yankees are one win away from their first AL pennant since 2009 and record 41st overall.

Houston has to win Verlander's start and then another game for its first AL pennant. The Astros were still in the National League for their only World Series appearance 12 years ago.

Verlander in Game 2 threw 124 pitches, exactly twice as many as Luis Severino did for the Yankees. That is also the starting matchup for Game 6.

Severino didn't take the mound for the fifth in Game 2, an inning after Girardi and a trainer visited when the 23-year-old right-hander uncharacteristically wound his arm several times soon after giving up a solo homer to Carlos Correa. He stayed in, but then he was struck on the wrist by his no-throwing hand by a one-hopper that was the inning-ending out.

Afterward, Severino said he was fine — and that checked out with doctors — and had wanted to keep pitching.


THREE THINGS TO WATCH

2. The 1.5 factor

Three of the last five races will be staged at tracks measuring 1.5 miles, including the championship final at Homestead-Miami Speedway. The schedule favors Martin Truex Jr., who has five wins this season, with four on 1.5-mile ovals. His primary rival, Kyle Busch, has four wins, but none

horsepower produced by Roush Yates Racing Engines, which lost its co-founder, Robert Yates, two weeks ago. Brad Keselowski's Talladega victory snapped a 13-race losing streak for the folks at the Blue Oval. Keselowski's last win was in April.

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

Celebrate the Governor Stone's history


The British comedian Eddie Izzard had a bit in one of his shows that poked fun at Americans' sense of history. Coming from a country where people still lived or worked in buildings that dated back 300 to 500 years, he found it hilarious that Americans celebrated architecture erected in the mid-20th century.

He tells of a building in Miami that had been restored to how it looked "more than 50 years ago," and the public reacting with, "No, surely no. No one was alive then."

But while structures of granite and sandstone tend to stand the tests of time, the same can't be said of wooden sailing vessels. Between the forces of water, rot, insects, natural disaster and simple wear-and-tear, these ships don't enjoy an extended lifetime.

One that has survived — and the only one of its kind still on the water — will be celebrated this weekend. The Governor Stone survived several hurricanes, was sunk and recovered three times. It worked as a freighter, oyster boat, World War II sail trainer, sponge boat and pleasure craft.

Originally built in Pascagoula, Miss., in 1877 for Charles Greiner, the Governor Stone was a cargo freighter for his chandlery business and named after the first elected post-Civil War governor of

Mississippi, Greiner's friend John Marshall Stone. Initially, she carried equipment and materials to deep-draft ships lying off shore, and hauled general freight between ports along the Gulf Coast, according to the

website, GovernorStone.org. Thousands of these type craft plied the shallows of the Gulf back in that day.

Her history will be celebrated as the Friends of the Governor Stone host a 140th birthday party

for the vessel at her slip in St. Andrews Marina from 2-4 p.m. on Sunday, Oct. 22. The party will include music, cake and camaraderie. The public is invited to attend. A representative of the National Park Service will present the organization with a plaque stating the National Historic Landmark status of the vessel, which was conferred several years ago. Check Facebook.com/GovernorStone for updates and schedule additions.

I had the opportunity in 2014 to visit the vessel while it was undergoing renovations under the eye of master boat builder Bill Holland. Booms, gaffs and masts were replaced; rough-cut boards were transformed into cargo

hatch covers, while old hatch covers were recycled for other uses; replacement pulley blocks were shaped, sanded, stained and varnished; a new engine was installed; cypress boards were used to construct a new gear box for the captain's wheel. Volunteer carpenters from Eastern Shipbuilding replaced rotted wood in the stern and starboard bulwark, shaping it to match the original.

If you're interested in more on the vessel's history, there's an extensive display in the window of the Bay County Historical Society Museum at 133 Harrison Ave. in Panama City. It was put together by the Friends of the Governor Stone and museum curator Penny Daffin. The museum is open Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. This display is scheduled through Sunday, but a smaller exhibit is on permanent display as well, and related exhibits may also be seen at the Panama City Publishing Museum in St. Andrews and the Heritage Museum of Northwest Florida in Valparaiso.

Designated as a National Historic Landmark in 1991 through the U.S. Department of the Interior, the Governor Stone is owned and maintained by the all-volunteer 501(c)3 non-profit group Friends of the Governor Stone Inc. The vessel still sails as an enhancement to cultural, historical and ecological education and community events along the Northern Gulf Coast.

And with the proper care, it could continue doing so for another 140 years or more. Even Eddie Izzard might be impressed.

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

Fall Pattern Inshore Fishing

My step-son Jacob Wright and I went out Sunday to watch the redfish pattern as we have the Emerald Coast Redfish Circuit championship the second week in November and the fall pattern is in full effect. We decided we were going to check on some spots we like, but pay more attention to some new spots we found on Bing maps.

We headed to spot number one, which was 1.5 feet deep over a grassy bottom. In the past, we have had excellence luck from here on a high tide or when the water was pushed up. High tide was peak at 7:36 a.m. and we arrived at 10 a.m. I was throwing the usual Matrix Shad Blazing Hornet on a 1/8th ounce jig while my son was throwing a Gulp! 5-inch Jerkshad on a 1/16th ounce Owner weighted twistlock hook.

We were moving the shoreline and my son hooked up and brought in a 24-inch red. We continued to move, look, and cast, and I hooked up on a 23-inch red. We spent about another hour

there and moved on to a new spot. The new spot was 2 feet deep, mixed bottom (sand and grass), point, stacked mullet, and cord grass; it had everything I look for in a spot. We started casting. First cast, I got slammed but missed the hookset. I threw back in the same area and got slammed again but this time set the hook, fought it and landed a toad of a redfish that was 26.5 inches and weighed more than 6 pounds.

We threw in the same area and caught two more. The next two cast were 25 inches and weighed in the high 5s and low 6s. We pulled the anchor pole and moved to another spot to look at.

The second new spot was 2 feet deep, grass bottom, point, and stacked mullet. Upon arriving, we immediately started seeing gator trout cruising the bottom. As we worked this area, we caught some rat reds and a couple small slots. Nothing too exciting, but by this time the tide was

a strong outgoing and things were moving a little deeper.

We decided to head back to the landing. We had a very successful day fishing and knew it wouldn't get any better than it was.

Some of the year's best inshore fishing on the Florida Panhandle is from mid-September through October. The shallows that have been in the 90-degree temps since June are now in the high 70s to low 80s. The shallow bite is happening in the better part of the day on a moving tide. The abundance of fish pushed up on the flats in the middle of the day right now is unreal.

The trout are slamming top water on the flats in the 2 feet to 3 feet range from sunrise until 8 or 9 a.m. I like to throw the Matrix mullet or the Heddon Spook Jr.; both are quality top water baits and produce. After 9 a.m. if you move to broken flats and move slowly and just watch, you will see the reds cruising usually in schools of four or more. I throw a 3-inch or 4-inch soft bait such as Matrix Shad or Bass Assassin on a 1/8th ounce or 1/4 ounce jig head when sight-fishing the reds.

The fall pattern with the cooler air temps is the time to be on the water with your best chance of being successful.

Because we expect quite a crowd, they might want to take that into account and just bring the costume and put it on for the contest,” Somerset said. “The raffle will have everything from gift certificates to T-shirts to doggie bandanas and bow ties. We will have a guitar player, playing mostly rock 'n' roll and some country.”

Registration and raffle ticket sales begin at 2 p.m. Each raffle ticket is a \$2 donation for Bay Families with Dogs and Heartland Rescue Ranch, although Somerset added there is a ticket discount for larger quantities. Raffles are scheduled for 3:30 p.m., and ticket holders must be present to win. Live music follows from 4-5 p.m.

In addition to ample gift bags, raffle items will include selections from Jimmy Buffett's Margaritaville, The Carousel, PetSmart, Panama City Beach Parks and Recreation, Wine World, Eden Salon, Breeze Animal Hospital, Pet Supermarket “and Ron Jon's Surf Shop with beach towels and other things you would use if you took your dog to the dog beach,” Somerset said.

Schooners hosts back-to-back celebrations on the beach

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Chill out during the second annual Bloody Mary & Music Festival from

11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday on the sand behind Schooners, a perfect place to search for the best Bloody Mary in the Grand Lagoon.

“Last year, we sold 550 tickets. The event just blew up, so we figured we’d put it on the beach,” said Chef Konrad Jochum of Schooners, winner of last year’s Bloody Mary competition at Treasure Island

Marina. “The beach behind Schooners just screams festivals.”

Schooners regularly hosts large festivals, which most recently included the 28th annual Lobster Festival & Tournament, and they are prepared for a crowd this year.

“We have 20 different participants. We’re all trying to compete for that trophy for the Best Bloody

Mary in the Grand Lagoon. This year the competition is so high we are adding things to our recipe. People are going crazy trying to win this thing,” said Paul “Buster” Busuttill, owner of Buster’s Beer and Bait.

In addition to Schooners and Buster’s, this year’s competitors include Spinnaker, Patches Pub and Grill, Moe’s Original Bar B

Que, C-Level, Dick’s Wings, Vic’s Sports Bar, Chubby’s, Foghorn’s, Christo’s, Pineapple Willy’s/Wicked Wheel, Dat Cajun Place, Shipyard Grill, Sheraton Bay Point Resort, Dirty Dick’s Crab House, Dockside, Sisters of the Sea, Grand Marlin, and Dolce 101/Salty Goat.

For a \$20 wristband, sample all you want in 5-ounce cups, then use your ticket to vote. Competitions also are heating up for the Best Booth and Best Token Collection Box. Admission is free if you aren’t drinking Bloody Mary cocktails; just get your favorite beverage from Schooners’ bar inside or on the beach, where tents began going up Wednesday.

“We’ll have tents, a stage, music, bands,” Jochum said. “Every time we throw a party on the beach people show up.”

And that party extends into the water, which becomes a sea of anchored boats. Hang out in the sand or water and listen to Southern Sunday on the stage, as well as the Ukulele Orchestra of St. Andrews.

Jochum has prepared a special festival menu of Lobster & Black-Eyed Pea Chili, Lobster Corn Dogs, Smoked Hot Wings, Mini Muffaletta Sliders, Smoked Brisket Sandwich, Smoked Pork Belly & Sausage Sandwich and Caroline BBQ Pulled Pork (\$10 each), with sides of Cole Slaw and Potato Chips available (\$2 each).

“It’s beach food on steroids,” said Jochum, who explained, “It’s lobster tails dipped in corn dog batter and deep-fried. Since we are the lobster people and I’m the Lobster Man, anything anyone can do with beef and pork, I can do with lobster.”

The food and bar tent will be set up on the sand to the right just as festival-goers step down from Schooners.

“It’s going to be decked out pretty good,” said Jochum, who added a big smoker will be set up on the beach. “The restaurant will be open too, but if you want to, you can stay on the beach and eat.”

The Bloody Mary & Music Festival was organized by the Grand Lagoon Coalition.

While franchises are helping to bring needed growth to the area, Jochum said, “We’re organic over here; the East end is more mom and pop stuff.”

Since the beach already will be set up for Saturday’s festival, Jochum explained, Schooners teamed up with Buster’s, Pineapple Willy’s and Thunder Beach Productions for a new charity event the following day.

“On Sunday, we came up with Bikes, Blues & Brews,” Jochum said. “Bike week is the next week. Bill (Buskell of Pineapple Willy’s) secured three different blues bands for Sunday.”

Each band will perform an hour and a half show Sunday with 45-minute breaks in between. The Blue Mama Blues Band goes on stage from noon to 1:30 p.m., followed by the Tyler Mac Blues Band from 2:15-3:45 p.m. and the Biscuit Miller Blues Band from 4:30-6 p.m.

The same Beach Food menu also will be served at Schooners on Sunday.

“We tried to do a combination for both events, because we will have bikers the next day,” Jochum said. “Blues just cries out for barbecue.”

Pops season evokes 'Big City Music'

PANAMA CITY — The 22nd season of shows by the Panama City Pops Orchestra will follow the theme of “Big City Music,” inspired in part by the title of artwork chosen to embellish the organization’s marketing materials.

“For the past 10 years, the Pops has collaborated with the local arts community to tie the performing arts to the visual arts,” said Pops Board President Tammala Spencer. “A generous artist donates his or her work to adorn The Pops’ promotional materials. At the end of each season, a fundraising raffle is conducted and a Pops patron goes home with an exceptional piece of art.”


This year, the art was donated by Paul Brent, whom Spencer described as an “internationally renowned artist and local cultural icon.” His work, she said, “exudes the vibrancy of Panama City’s flagship orchestra and stimulates heightened interest in the coming season.”

The original art — a 27-by-31-inch giclée printed on canvas, framed and signed by the artist — will be on display at each Pops concert of the new season.

“Art and music are linked in creative expression,” Brent said. “In ‘Big City Music,’ I wanted to connect the instruments and the city environment visually communicating the various styles of music from classical to jazz and pop.”

Pops Conductor and Music Director David Ott will once again return to the Marina Civic Center stage for the new season, unveiling a series of classical and popular music intended to evoke distant places and bygone eras. Full symphonies, myriad overtures and countless compositions by composers from every age will be performed by the orchestra.

The season opens in exciting style on Saturday, Oct. 21, with a program titled “Under the Sea,” which will feature classical selections by

‘Happy Death Day’ feels familiar



Matt: ‘Happy Death Day’ charms

“Happy Death Day” comes from Blumhouse Productions, the studio made famous for the resurgence of horror in theaters (“Get Out,” “The Purge,” “Insidious”). However, this is the lightest of light thrills. Sure, it would fit in the slasher movie bin, but with its bubble gum aesthetics and goofy comedy, it’s really more “Freaky Friday” than “Friday the 13th.” And in that sense, it’s mildly charming ... if not bright enough to be great.

For starters, the premise is pretty stupid, and the execution of that premise isn’t much better. A brash and awful sorority girl is forced to relive the same birthday over and over, each one ending in her own murder by a masked killer. Imagine “Groundhog Day” or “Edge of Tomorrow,” but in the teen-screams genre and with a lot less complexity. In fact, most of its “originality” just comes in its blanket theft from other properties and throwing them all together: the youth world of “Mean Girls”; the comedy of “Scream Queens”; the protagonist from “The Good Place”; the scares from “The Purge.” It’s not bad, just familiar, like we’re reliving this recognizable movie just as the character relives her day.

Once our girl starts trying to solve the whodunit-mystery, things get more assured and fun, as we find it easier to root for her and her insistence on not dying each day ad infinitum. Even though the deaths and scares are wanting, the other elements work, especially the humor and (gasp!) the heart. It’s harmless and forgettable

October fare, made more for people who hate horror than me. In other words, my wife will love it.

every night she is murdered, triggering the same day to restart. It may sound like a mashup of ideas that have been done before, but here it’s important to also note, it’s been done much better. It’s “Groundhog Day” as a horror film. There are elements of other films sprinkled in, too, but always much better films than “Happy Death Day.”

It’s also a poor mashup of genre. It’s a horror film that isn’t scary, a comedy that isn’t funny, a mystery without intrigue, a drama without drama. When it aims to thrill it’s laughable. When it tries to outsmart, it’s stupid. When it dips into sentimentality, it’s maudlin. There really is almost nothing positive to discuss with “Happy Death Day.”

It takes a lame premise, puts it in the hands of a despicable character we never grow to like as much as the movie wants us to, and executes the story without a sensible or functional turn from the script or the camera. Perhaps it wants us to be forgiving because it’s “silly,” but silly usually implies jest or frivolity or some kind of fun. “Happy Death Day” is only silly in a pejorative sense: it’s childish, nonsensical, and idiotic.

It might be offensive just how disrespectful it is to its audience by placing such a lazy product on screen for customers’ hard-earned money, but truly it’s not even rousing enough to get worked up about. I’ll have completely forgotten about this movie by the time this goes to print.

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
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How to improve your company image



Insisting employees address customers in a formal and respectful tone is one way for a business to improve its image.

Many people are familiar with the conventional wisdom about first impressions. When you only have one chance to make a first impression, it's a good idea to make the most of that opportunity. But not every first impression inspires fond memories, and while erasing a bad first impression might be impossible, that does not mean a second impression can't trump the predecessor. That's especially true for businesses. Businesses typically experience a few stumbles out of the gate, and sometimes those stumbles coincide with a customer's first encounter with a business. When such encounters hurt a business' image, a business owner can employ various strategies to restore that image and increase the likelihood that future interactions with customers go as smoothly as possible. Look the part. A T-shirt and flip-flops may be your ideal outfit, but such attire is rarely appropriate in a professional atmosphere. First-time customers who see employees decked out in less formal attire may feel the company also takes a lax attitude toward its work, so avoid fashion that might give the wrong impression. Prioritize positive customer service. Many businesses suffer from bad word of mouth that's spread when past customers share horror stories of negative experiences with company employees. Such a problem is easily remedied by prioritizing customer service. This includes emphasizing that those who answer the phone always address customers respectfully and, when responding to emails or engaging in online chats, write professional responses that steer clear of informal language. Customers often understand that a product may malfunction, but poor customer service is inexcusable and will reduce the likelihood that a customer will become a repeat customer. Commission a better website. Today's consumers often rely on the Internet to connect with a business. Consumers may want to peruse a restaurant's menu

before booking a reservation or view a retailer's online catalogue before walking into the store. A good website can be a tremendous asset to a business, while a bad website can drive customers away before they spend so much as a dollar. A good website is informative and easy to navigate. Restaurant owners should include some photos of their establishment on the site to show customers the type of ambience they can expect when dining. The site's URL should include only the name of the restaurant, which makes it easy for potential customers to find the site when using a search engine. If the name you prefer is already taken by a similarly named establishment in another region, then include your state or city in the URL, such as PanamaCityNewsHerald.com. If you are not skilled at building websites, hire a professional firm to build the site for you. Such an investment will likely pay for itself sooner rather than later and will increase the chances that customers' first impressions are good ones. Establish a social media presence. Another way to rehabilitate or improve a business' image is to establish a social media presence that connects the business with existing and potential customers. Use the various social media platforms in different ways. A Facebook page can explain the history of the company, while Twitter can be used to alert followers to special promotions or events. Social media can also be used to solicit customer feedback, which can be used to ensure you are meeting your customers' needs and adapting to meet those needs when necessary. A business that listens to and actively engages its customers is more likely to have a positive image than one that does not, and social media can be the tool businesses use to connect with those customers. A poor first impression can be difficult to overcome, but companies can take several steps to regain consumer trust.

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
