26 dead in Texas church attack



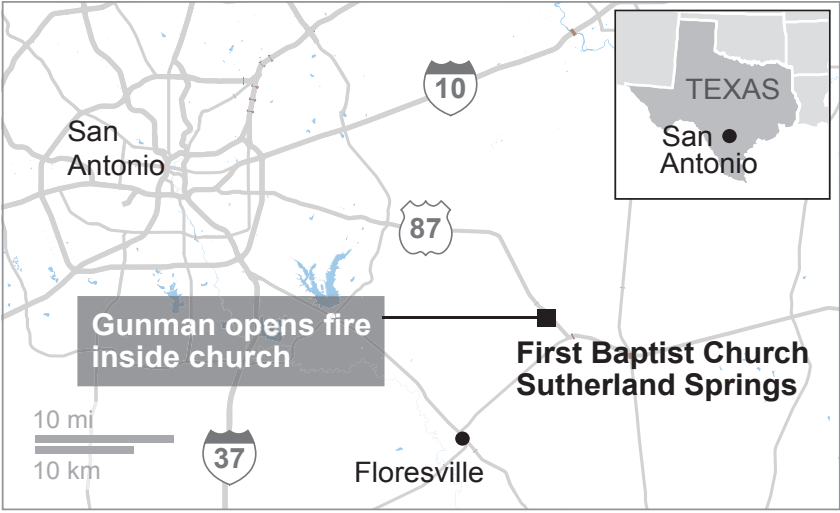

SUTHERLAND SPRINGS, Texas — A man dressed in black tactical-style gear and armed with an assault rifle opened fire inside a church in a small South Texas community on Sunday, killing 26 people and wounding about 20 others in what the governor called the deadliest mass shooting in the state's history.

Officials didn't identify the attacker during a news conference Sunday night, but two other officials — one a U.S. official and one in law enforcement — who were briefed on the investigation identified him as Devin Kelley. They spoke to The

Ethics complaints filed in Walton

1 former, 2 current employees allege misuse of power

SANTA ROSA BEACH — Two current and one former Walton County employees now have filed ethics complaints against Walton

County Commission Chairwoman Cecilia Jones. The first complaint was filed Oct. 17 with the Florida Commission on Ethics by Arthur Miller, who lived in South Walton from 2001 to 2016 and was treasurer of the South Walton Tourist Development Council and a member of the Zoning Board of Adjustments. Miller alleges Jones is guilty of conflicts of interest and misuse of power.

Separately, Brad Alford, facilities manager with the Public Works Department and a 13-year county employee, has filed a complaint alleging suspected violations of the law, gross mismanagement and malfeasance on Jones' behalf.

"I am confident that I have done nothing unethical and I believe the investigation, once concluded, will support that confidence," Jones said in a statement.

Miller did not respond to a request for comments. However, in his complaint, he states that Jones attempted to influence the outcome of a whistle-blower lawsuit on behalf of Walton County employee Hal Laird, who sued the county in 2015 for wrongful termination. Miller states that Jones had a personal interest in the outcome of the case because she is a personal friend of the Laird family, which she did not disclose before giving testimony in the case. Miller also said Jones advised Laird that he would not have been fired if she had known about the termination. She then voted to settle with Laird for \$130,000.

Miller also states that Jones' son owns a beach vending business, an issue on which she votes to regulate.

He also alleges that during the 2016 County

On this date:
In 1860, former Illinois congressman Abraham Lincoln of the Republican Party was elected President of the United States as he defeated John Breckinridge, John Bell and Stephen Douglas.
In 1861, Confederate President Jefferson Davis was elected to a six-year term of office.
In 1906, Republican Charles Evans Hughes was elected governor of New York, defeating newspaper publisher William Randolph Hearst.
In 1928, in a first, the results of Republican Herbert Hoover's presidential election victory over Democrat Alfred E. Smith were flashed onto an electric wraparound sign on the New York Times building.

Saudi arrests consolidate power grab

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia — Saudi Arabia’s heir to the throne is overseeing an unprecedented wave of arrests of dozens of the country’s most powerful princes, military officers, influential businessmen and government ministers — some potential rivals or critics of the crown prince now consolidating his power.

Among those taken into custody overnight Saturday in the purported anti-corruption sweep were billionaire Prince Alwaleed bin Talal, one of the world’s richest men with extensive holdings in Western companies, as well as two of the late King Abdullah’s sons.

The arrest of senior princes upends a longstanding tradition among the ruling Al Saud family to keep their disagreements private in an effort to show strength and unity in the face of Saudi Arabia’s many tribes and factions. It also sends a message that the 32-year-old crown prince, Mohammed bin Salman, has the full backing of his father, King Salman, to carry out sweeping anti-corruption reforms targeting senior royals and their business associates, who have long been seen as operating above the law.

Reports suggested those detained were being held at the Ritz Carlton in Riyadh, which only days earlier hosted a major investment conference that the crown prince attended with global business titans. A Saudi official told The Associated Press that other five-star hotels across the capital were also being used to hold some of

those arrested.

The Ritz Carlton had no availability for bookings until Dec. 1, 2017 — a possible sign that an investigation of this scale could take weeks. Marriott International said in a statement that it is currently evaluating the situation at the Ritz-Carlton in Riyadh, but declined to comment further, citing privacy concerns.

A Saudi government official with close ties to security forces said 11 princes and 38 others were being questioned. The official spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to speak to the media.

The surprise arrests were

immediately hailed by pro-government media outlets as the clearest sign yet that Prince Mohammed is keeping his promise to reform the country, wean its economy from its dependence on oil and liberalize some aspects of the ultraconservative society.

The kingdom’s top council of clerics issued a public statement overnight saying it is an Islamic duty to fight corruption — essentially giving religious backing to the high-level arrests.

It’s unclear if the U.S. had any advance word of the arrests. President Donald Trump’s son-in-law and White House adviser Jared Kushner and

others made an unannounced trip recently to Riyadh. Earlier on Saturday, Trump said he spoke to King Salman, though the White House readout of that call did not include any reference to the impending arrests.

The Saudi government says the arrests are part of a wider effort to increase transparency, accountability and good governance — key reforms needed to attract greater international investments and appease a Saudi public that has for decades complained of rampant government corruption and misuse of public funds by top officials. Surprise moves reshaping the kingdom, however, are likely

to worry investors.

Among those reportedly taken into custody were two sons of the late King Abdullah: Prince Miteb bin Abdullah, who Saturday evening was ousted from his post as head of the prestigious National Guard tasked with protecting the Al Saud family, and Prince Turki bin Abdullah, who was once governor of Riyadh.

Prince Miteb was once considered a contender for the throne, though he has not been thought of recently as a challenger to Prince Mohammed.

Saudi Twitter accounts released several other names of those arrested, including Alwalid al-Ibrahim, a Saudi businessman with ties to the royal family who runs the Arabic satellite group MBC; Amr al-Dabbagh, the former head of the Saudi Arabian General Investment Authority; Ibrahim Assaf, a former finance minister, and Bakr Binladin, head of the Saudi Binladin Group, a major business conglomerate.

Analysts have suggested the arrest of once-untouchable members of the royal family is a clear sign that the crown prince is sidelining potential rivals for the throne.

Meanwhile, the Saudi-owned, Dubai-based satellite news channel Al-Arabiya reported that a helicopter crash Sunday in the kingdom’s south killed Prince Mansour bin Murquin and seven others. Prince Mansour was the son of Prince Muqrin bin Abdulaziz, a former intelligence director and a one-time crown prince of the kingdom. Authorities gave no cause for the crash.

GRIFFIN, GA. Cold-case slaying of black man now linked to racism

A Georgia district attorney says Timothy Coggins was killed in 1983 for “socializing with a white female.” Prosecutor Ben Coker told a judge Wednesday that Coggins was dragged behind a truck through the woods, news outlets reported. Arrest warrants say he was stabbed and sliced to death and suffered “severely disfiguring” wounds.

A break in the cold case came in mid-October, when local and state law enforcement officials announced the arrests of five longtime local residents on charges stemming from the slaying. All five are white; two worked in law enforcement.

Spalding County Sheriff

Darrell Dix was emphatic about the motive during an Oct. 13 news conference in Griffin, about 40 miles south of Atlanta.

LOS ANGELES Auction house: \$700K sale for Prince’s guitar a record

A bidding war resulted in a \$700,000 price tag for a Prince guitar — the highest price ever paid for one of the late icon’s guitars, according to Julien’s Auctions.

The blue teal “Cloud” guitar went far above the \$60,000 to \$80,000 expected at the Saturday auction. The guitar was one of several items up for sale by rock legends.

A Michael Jackson black and white rhinestone glove sold for \$102,000 while a red snakeskin jacket in the mold of the one he wore in

his “Beat It” video sold for \$118,000. A MTV Video Music Award Moonman won by Kurt Cobain went for \$62,500; a Nehru shirt worn by Jimmy Hendrix sold for \$106,000, and handwritten lyrics to David Bowie’s “Starman” was sold for \$81,000.

SAN DIEGO Navy sailor hit by plane being towed on aircraft carrier

Military officials say a sailor aboard the USS Carl Vinson was seriously injured when he was struck by a plane as it was being towed on the flight deck.

Navy spokesman Steve Fiebing says the accident occurred Friday evening aboard the San Diego-based aircraft carrier, which was off the coast for training exercises.

The Los Angeles Times

reports the sailor was flown by helicopter to a hospital with a serious but non-life-threatening injury.

PARIS French women ask Macron for plan against sexual abuse

Prominent French women challenged President Emmanuel Macron on Sunday to organize an “attack plan” against sexual violence and harassment, saying in a blunt verdict on the recent revelations of alleged past abuses by powerful men: “Our society mistreats women.”

About 100 performers, filmmakers, writers and others who say they have suffered harassment or abuse demanded action in an open letter to Macron and an online petition carried in the Journal du dimanche newspaper.

KINSHASA, CONGO Election commission sets Dec. 23, 2018 date for vote

Congo’s top election official announced Sunday that a long-awaited presidential vote would not be held until late December 2018, months later than key opposition leaders have been seeking.

The tensions over President Joseph Kabila’s continued tenure have provoked deadly street demonstrations in cities around the country since December 2016, when his official mandate ended.

Critics have accused Kabila of postponing the vote to maintain his power in the mineral-rich country. Election officials, though, have cited widespread violence in central Congo as contributing to the delay.

Ryan: Health mandate part of GOP tax talks

WASHINGTON — House Speaker Paul Ryan says Republicans are discussing whether their tax plan should include a repeal of the Obama health law’s requirement that people have insurance coverage or face a penalty.

It would be another shot at further undermining the Affordable Care Act after repeated failures by the GOP-led Congress to repeal and replace the law, as President Donald Trump has demanded.

The Congressional Budget Office has estimated that repealing the individual mandate, as the requirement is known, would save \$416 billion over a decade.

The mandate provides a powerful incentive for people to get coverage before health problems

arise. But the money represents a tempting revenue source for GOP tax-writers whose tax plan would add an estimated \$1.5 trillion over 10 years to the national debt.

Ryan told “Fox News Sunday” that “a lot of members are suggesting” that the tax plan repeal the mandate. He did not weigh in personally on how to deal with the coverage mandate.

Rep. Mark Meadows, the chairman of the House Freedom Caucus, said on ABC’s “This Week” that revenue counted through the repeal could in turn be used to soften the blow from the expiration of various tax credits and elimination of the deduction for state income and sales taxes.

“We’re advocating on behalf of that,” said Meadows, R-N.C.

The House and Means Committee planned to


begin taking up the bill today.

Some Republican lawmakers from New York and New Jersey have come out against the bill in its current form, saying that ending deductions for state and local sales and income taxes would hit their constituents the hardest.


Republicans talking up the tax bill on the Sunday shows played down concerns that the bill would add substantially to the nation’s debt. It’s projected to increase the debt by \$1.5 trillion over 10 years.

“Preliminary numbers really look very good in terms of economic growth. So, over a longer period of time, some 10 to 15 years, we believe that the economic growth will outweigh any short-term deficit increase that we see,” Meadows said.

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What is Perjury?

ANSWER:

Perjury, in its simplest form, is lying under oath about a material fact, meaning a fact which could affect the entire outcome of a proceeding. It literally threatens the very foundation of our Court system, and thus, our Criminal Justice system as a whole. Imagine a world in which nobody told the truth to law enforcement during the investigation of a crime, nor to a jury in a Courtroom. We would have innocent people being convicted, and guilty people walking our streets. Such is why Perjury is such a serious threat to our society, and must not be tolerated regardless of whom the speaker is, whether it be an everyday citizen, a trusted law enforcement officer or even an officer of the Court, such as a lawyer or Court personnel.

In Florida there are multiple types of Perjury, each of which are outlined in Florida Statute 837. Perjury offenses range from a very serious 2nd Degree Felony, such as lying under oath during the prosecution of a Capital Criminal offense, down to the Misdemeanor level (i.e. lying under oath outside of an “official proceeding”). As a general rule, if you lie under oath in an “official proceeding,” then you are facing a Felony charge. An “official proceeding” includes a proceeding heard, or one which may be or is required to be heard, before any Legislative, Judicial, Administrative or Governmental Agency or Official authorized to take evidence under oath. Examples of an “official proceeding” include oaths administered by Judges, Special Magistrates, a Notary, as well as testimony given in a deposition.

Lying outside of an “official proceeding” is also a crime, though it is generally a Misdemeanor. It includes lying to law enforcement during an investigation, as well as providing written statements to a public servant with the intent of misleading the public servant in his official duty. Though such examples are Misdemeanors, you can see how such remains a very serious threat to our society, jeopardizing our innocent citizens while harming the ability to prosecute the actual guilty parties.




Generally speaking, in order to prove the offense of Perjury, the State must prove the following:

- 1) The Defendant took an oath or otherwise affirmed that he was obligated by conscience or by law to speak the truth in an official proceeding or not in an official proceeding;
- 2) The oath or affirmation was made to a person who was in their official capacity;
- 3) While the Defendant was under oath, he made a statement about a material matter;
- 4) That statement was false; and
- 5) The Defendant did not believe the statement was true at the time it was made.

Recantation is a Defense to any prosecution for Perjury or False Statement only if the person making the false statement admits such statement is false during the same continuous proceeding or matter, and the false statement has not substantially affected the proceeding; or such admission is made before it has become obvious that the false statement has been exposed or will be exposed. You can also argue the statement was not a material fact, and therefore did not affect the outcome of the proceeding, or that the person speaking honestly believed the statement was truthful.

Associated Press on the condition of anonymity because they weren't authorized to discuss the investigation.

The U.S. official said Kelley lived in a San Antonio suburb and doesn't appear to be linked to organized terrorist groups. The official said investigators are looking at social media posts Kelley may have made in the days before Sunday's attack, including one that appeared to show an AR-15 semiautomatic weapon.

At the news conference, Freeman Martin, the regional director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the attacker was dressed all in black, wearing tactical gear and a ballistic vest, when he arrived at a gas station across from the First Baptist Church at around 11:20 a.m.

He crossed the street and started firing a Ruger AR rifle at the church, and continued after entering the building. As he left, he was confronted

by an armed resident who chased him. A short time later, the suspect was found dead in his vehicle at the county line, Martin said. There were several weapons inside.

Martin said it's unclear if the attacker died of a self-inflicted wound or if he was shot by the resident who confronted him. He said investigators weren't ready to discuss a possible motive for the attack. He said the dead ranged in age from 5 to 72 years old. Twenty-three were found dead in the church, two were found outside and one died after being taken to a hospital.

Federal law enforcement swarmed the small community 30 miles southeast of San Antonio after the attack to offer assistance, including ATF investigators and members of the FBI's evidence collection team.

Among those killed was the 14-year-old daughter of the church's pastor, Frank Pomeroy, and his wife, Sherri. Sherri Pomeroy wrote in a text message to the AP that she and her husband were out of town in two different states when the attack occurred. "We lost our 14 year

old daughter today and many friends," she wrote. "Neither of us have made it back into town yet to personally see the devastation. I am at the charlotte airport trying to get home as soon as i can."

The wounded were taken to hospitals. Video on KSAT television showed first responders taking a stretcher from the church to a waiting AirLife helicopter. Eight victims were taken by medical helicopter to the Brooke Army Medical Center, the military hospital said.

Megan Posey, a spokeswoman for Connally Memorial Medical Center, which is in Floresville and about 10 miles from the church, said "multiple" victims were being treated for gunshot wounds. She declined to give a specific number but said it was less than a dozen.

Alena Berlanga, a Floresville resident who was monitoring the chaos on a police scanner and in Facebook community groups, said everyone knows everyone else in the sparsely populated county. Sutherland Springs has only a few hundred residents.

Commission election, Jones improperly used her position as a commissioner to influence the election of the District 5 seat in favor of Tony Anderson, a candidate she openly supported, and assisted with his campaign, including use of county assets. He cites Section 104.31 of the Florida Statutes, which prohibits a county officer or employee from using their official authority or influence to interfere with an election or nomination.

Anderson beat incumbent District 5 Commissioner Cindy Meadows in the election.

Miller's complaint also alleges Jones uses her husband, Jerry Jones, as an intermediary to contact other commissioners regarding official county business, a violation of the Florida Sunshine Law. He cited a recent example Jerry Jones' communication with District 4 Commissioner Sara Comander to discuss his wife's desire to fire Deputy County Administrator Dede Hinote in an attempt to influence her

vote on the termination. Florida Sunshine Law prohibits county commissioners from communicating outside of a formal commission meeting about potential agenda items, including communicating personally or through a third party about any action the board may take or matters that will come before it for action in the foreseeable future, or to exchange information between commissioners. Hinote filed a complaint against Cecilia Jones in early October.

Miller stated in his complaint that Jones also used her husband to intimidate, bully and threaten other commissioners, county employees and electors. In Alford's complaint, also filed recently, he alleges Jones regularly inserts herself in day-to-day operations or uses her husband to do so, for the betterment of the herself, her family or friends.

Alford also claims he was demoted at Jones' suggestion and that Jones' husband has tried to intimidate him. The complaint also alleges Jones directed the construction of a waterfront park adjacent to

her home on North Eden Park Drive, but when the public began to use it, she directed a fence be built around it so that it is not accessible except by walkers or bikers.

Alford's attorney, Jennifer Sullivan, states in the complaint that the activities reported by Alford and other county employees show a pattern of behavior by Jones and/or the county that wrecks of misuse of public office and/or interference or injection into day-to-day operations, and retaliatory action against employees for performing their jobs, including through third-party intermediaries.

Sullivan said she believes more county employees will step forward to make reports. She requested that County Administrator Larry Jones appoint an independent investigator to conduct a thorough investigation of the issues raised by Alford and other employees.

"It would be inappropriate for Commissioner Jones to be involved in directing such investigation," Sullivan states.

Attempts to contact Alford and Larry Jones for comment were unsuccessful.

"We take such matters seriously and have engaged outside legal counsel to investigate this situation," Cecilia Jones said. "The investigation is under way, giving all parties an opportunity to be heard, and on the advice of counsel, we have no further comment until the investigation is complete."

Our country celebrates Veterans Day on Nov. 11, the anniversary of the end of World War I. This U.S. holiday was created in 1919 to honor members of our armed services.

A military **veteran** is a person who has served in the armed forces. Do you know any veterans?

This week, The Mini Page looks at the reserve branches of the U.S. military.

Reserve support

The idea for a reserve force goes all the way back to Founding Fathers George Washington and Alexander Hamilton. They thought all men should be trained for military service so they could support the Army if needed.

The Air Force, Coast Guard, Marine Corps and Navy also have reserve branches. Many reservists are former active-duty troops.

A monthly job

Usually, reserve soldiers work part-time, just one weekend a month and two weeks in the summer. Sometimes, such as in wartime, they are called upon to be full-time. They might fill active-duty positions when those soldiers go to war.

The president of the U.S. is the commander in chief of reserve units. They answer to the **federal**, or national, government.

The National Guard is another branch of service. Each governor serves as commander in chief of the National Guard units in his or her state. They can be called to federal service by the president.

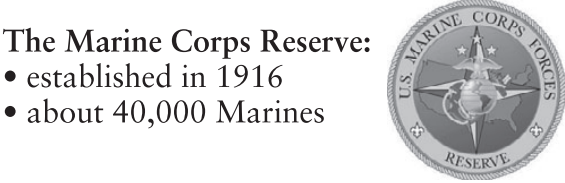
The Reserve branches

Reserve soldiers receive pay and other benefits, such as education and insurance. Many of them like the idea of serving their country while continuing their civilian lives at home.

- The Army Reserve:**
- established in 1908
 - about 202,000 warrior-citizens



- The Navy Reserve:**
- established in 1915
 - about 47,000 sailors



- The Marine Corps Reserve:**
- established in 1916
 - about 40,000 Marines



- The Coast Guard Reserve:**
- founded in 1941
 - about 7,500 Guard members



- The Air Force Reserve:**
- established in 1948
 - about 69,000 airmen

Army reservist training

When a person joins the Army Reserve, he or she must complete **basic training**, which lasts eight weeks. After completing training, the reservist receives an Army **beret**, or hat. This ceremony marks the transition from civilian to soldier.

A special job

An Army Reserve soldier chooses a **specialty**, or a job to do in the service, and trains for it after basic training. These jobs might include medics, military police, cooks or carpenters.

After specialty training is complete, Reserve soldiers may train together one weekend a month to keep their skills sharp. They also must go to yearly training for two weeks that will help them work together better.

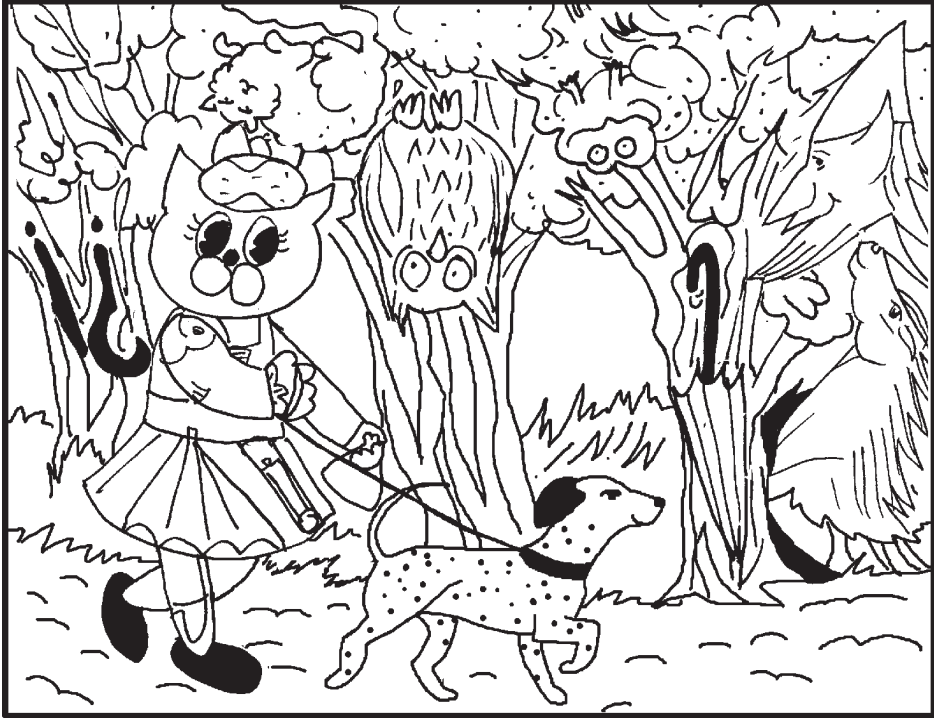

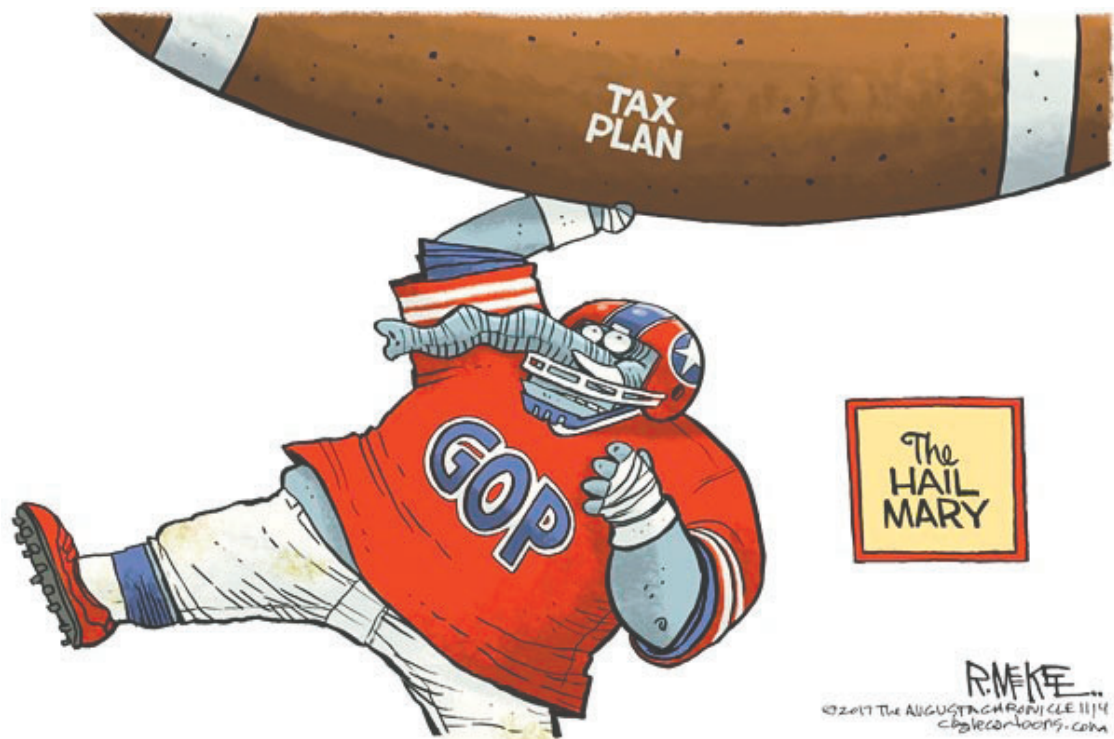
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Trump takes lead on deregulation

All the bluster directed toward — and emanating from — the White House these days tends to obscure the actual progress President Donald Trump has made since taking office. And while the president’s approval ratings remain mediocre at best, one segment of the population gives him high marks: the business world. As the Wall Street Journal noted last week, there’s a one-word explanation for that support: deregulation. In the wake of the 2016 election, the Weekly Standard explains, President Trump and congressional Republicans set their sights on shrinking the nation’s oppressive and expanding regulatory state. The plan was to use the obscure Congressional Review Act, passed as part of the Republican Contract With America back in 1994. The act lets Congress override any regulation within 60 days of being published. Prior to this year, the law had been used only once. But Mr. Trump and Congress have tossed out 14 Obama-era regulations in the past nine months thanks to the legislation. Yes, some regulation is necessary for health and safety purposes. But the American regulatory apparatus has mushroomed into an impenetrable mountain of red tape that discourages entrepreneurship and innovation. Some observers estimate that regulatory costs constrain the economy by an average of 2 percent annually. On top of the Congressional Review Act, Mr. Trump placed a moratorium on new regulations upon taking office and has utilized directives and executive orders to roll back the rules and regulations of his predecessor. Perhaps the most effective was Executive Order 13771, which requires that two outdated, ineffective or costly regulations be killed before one new regulation can be issued. As the Weekly Standard points out, another effective mechanism of controlling the administrative state has been a Trump order stipulating that the cost of any new regulations be offset by savings from canceled ones. The two orders have combined to slow the net number of new regulations to practically zero. The business world has responded enthusiastically. According to the Journal, the government says the economy grew at a 3 percent rate in the third quarter, bolstered partially by business spending on new equipment, which rose at an annual rate of 8.6 percent. In addition, the stock market has been shattering records on a regular basis, as the Dow is up more than 18 percent so far this year. “Since January of this year, we have slashed job-killing red tape all across our economy,” Mr. Trump said in a speech last month. “We have stopped or eliminated more regulations in the last eight months than any president has done during an entire term. It’s not even close.” While it’s tempting to discount Mr. Trump’s bragadocio, in this instance, it’s hard to argue with him.

Amazon is going too far

Jeffrey Preston Bezos is the man of unbounded ambition who founded Amazon, the online retailing colossus that trumpets itself as “Earth’s most customer-centric company.” He’s considered a model of tech wizardry for having totally reinvented retail marketing for our smart-phone, globally-linked age. Amazon peddles a cornucopia of goods through a convenient “1-click” ordering system, rapidly delivering the goods right to your doorstep. No one has imagined corporate domination more expansively nor pushed it harder or further than Bezos, and his Amazon stands today as the most advanced and the most ambitious model of a future under oligarchic control, including control of markets, work, information, consumerism, media and beyond. He doesn’t merely see himself remaking commerce with his vast electronic networks, algorithms and metrics — but rebooting America itself, including changing our society’s concept of a job, the definition of community, and even our basic values of fairness and justice. It amounts to a breathtaking aspiration to transform our culture’s democratic

paradigm into a corporate imperium, led by Amazon. Amazon’s most recent announcement is that it wants to get inside your home — and, ironically, it’s using “security” as its rationale. Rather than Amazon leaving products you order on your doorstep, the corporation wants a key to unlock your door so its delivery crews can do you the favor of placing the products you order inside your abode. What could possibly go wrong with that? Need I mention that Bezos expects you to pay for the privilege of having his employees enter your home? “Amazon Key,” is available only to customers who shell out \$99 a year to be “Amazon Prime” members, and you need a \$250 system you buy from Amazon of course. What a deal! For Amazon, that is. Bezos’ real goal (indeed, his only goal, always) is not to get inside your home, but inside your wallet. Bezos is coming after your tax dollars as well. Many politicians across the country piously rant against giving a few bucks worth of jobless benefits to the needy, then turn around and shove billions of our tax dollars into corporate welfare for the greedy! And with Amazon, here we go again. We’re presently witnessing the most disgusting spectacle yet of the politico-corporate cabal extracting money from the People’s wallets to enrich

In a Facebook discussion the other day, a friend of a friend made the following comment: “I don’t really want an old car. I can’t imagine the upkeep.” Over the last year, I’ve been using my 1978 Chevrolet Blazer as regular transportation. One morning the alternator stopped doing what it was supposed to do. Here’s what it cost to fix versus your average, everyday used car. For this example, we’re using the 2011 Honda Accord.

A quick internet search reveals pricing of \$31 for a Blazer alternator, plus \$11.38 for a replacement belt, which it doesn’t really need, but it’s a good time to replace it. I ended up paying a few more bucks to get it locally: \$39, plus the cost of the belt.

Replacement is a snap. GM alternators from this era had only three wires and an internal voltage regulator, so it’s a matter of removing a 7/16-inch nut that holds a couple of wires in place, and a harness that comes out with the push of a tab.

Now let’s take a look at the 2011 Honda Accord alternator: Online, it lists for \$128.58.

Again, it’s a good time to replace the belt, which is around the same price as the Chevy’s belt. But you’ll want to simultaneously replace the belt tensioner, which is almost guaranteed to fail if you don’t. That’s \$65 for a replacement belt and tensioner kit.

Swapping out the alternator in the Accord requires a lot more time under the hood. It’s packed tight in there and the alternator doesn’t just come right out. You’ll have to take off the air inlet, plastic radiator cowl, unbolt the top radiator mounts, remove the electric fan and remove the radiator overflow bottle. You’ll also need a sizeable breaker bar to release the tension on the tensioner. None of it’s all that difficult, but it’s not something you’re going to be doing in a parking lot.

Starter replacement is the same story. Online, a high-torque, OEM-spec K5 Blazer starter carries a price of about \$69. You could get away with an aftermarket version of the same for \$39. Replacing it requires crawling under the truck, but there’s tons of room to work down there.

A starter for the 2011 Honda Accord is \$111 at a minimum. Replacing it requires the same disconnection of the battery

cables, but to replace the starter, you’re also going to have to remove the radiator and the intake manifold.

All of that work is certainly doable by your average DIY mechanic, but it’s going to take a lot longer.

So what if you’re not up to doing it yourself? According to three different sources online, the average replacement cost for an alternator replacement on a Honda Accord runs about \$500 for parts and labor. The replacement cost for a starter including parts and labor runs closer to \$650.

If you went to a garage to have an alternator replaced on a vehicle like this K5 Blazer, the cost would run in the \$175 range. To replace a starter, the cost is somewhere around \$225.

There are loads of reasons not to drive an older car. Safety is a big one, especially if you’re spending a lot of time in the car with kids. But the cost of maintenance shouldn’t be one of those considerations. Every single major component — from the engine block right back to the brake light bulbs — is significantly less expensive, and less expensive to repair and replace in any relatively common American car or truck from the 1960s and 1970s.

Options vs. stocks: Which is right for you?

When taking stock of how to invest in the market, you have options — literally and figuratively.

You can buy stocks, which represent shares of ownership in individual companies, or options, which let you bet on the direction you think a stock price is headed. While there are important differences between stocks and options — and the type of investors who gravitate to each — these assets can complement one another in your portfolio.

Stocks: Best for beginners, long-term investors

The beauty of investing in stocks is simplicity: You buy a stock, betting its price will rise so you can sell at some point down the road for a profit. That applies whether you plan to hold a stock for years or try your hand at day trading — actively buying and selling stocks over short time frames like days or weeks.

For beginner investors, and especially people with a long-term strategy, stocks are a clear winner over options, says Aaron Anderson, senior vice president of research at Fisher Investments. That’s because in addition to lower expenses and a more straightforward approach, stocks allow for a hands-off investing style.

Potential drawbacks: Risk, fees, taxes: The risk associated with stocks is straightforward: The price could plummet to zero and you’d lose your entire investment. Because individual stocks can be volatile day to day, experts generally recommend investing in stocks with money you won’t need for at least five years. To further reduce risk, don’t pile all your money into a single stock. How active a trader you are will affect performance, and how much you’ll pay in commission fees and capital gains tax on profits. Commission fees vary, so shop around before opening an account. Your capital gains tax rate depends on whether you realize a profit on the sale of the stock, how long you’ve held it — rates are higher for stock held less than a year — and your income.

Options: Best for active traders who want flexibility

With options, the associated time period for investment is shorter, making them more appealing to traders who buy and sell regularly. All options contracts have expiration dates, which can range from days to years.

While many people like the flexibility afforded by options — namely, time to see how a trade plays out and the ability to lock in a price without an obligation to buy — they add complexity to the investing process. Rather than making one decision, such as betting that a stock’s price will go up, you must make three:

- What direction the stock is headed
- How high or low it will move from its current price
- The time frame in which that will happen

Potential drawbacks: effort, additional risks, cost: Options trading requires a more hands-on approach. You may wish to exercise the option before expiration, and that means you’ll have to keep a watchful eye on the related stock’s price.

Another downside is the related costs, which generally are much higher than for stocks. Options traders usually pay a flat fee per trade, ranging from zero to \$6.95 at the major brokers, plus a per-contract fee ranging from 15 cents to 75 cents. The more you trade, the higher your costs — and you’ll pay fees to sell, too.

Finally, as with stocks, be sure to factor in capital gains taxes on profits; these taxes are higher for assets you’ve held less than a year.

Learn from ex-NFLer Owens’ money mistakes

Legendary NFL receiver Terrell Owens knows a thing or two about money: the opportunities it can bring and the mistakes you can make with it. Since retiring from the NFL, the former wideout has been candid about his past financial turmoil.

Owens recently sat down with NerdWallet to talk about how he’s helping new NFL players — and their fans — avoid similar money woes.

1. Don’t bust your finances chasing

someone else’s lifestyle. Owens remembers how, after being drafted by the 49ers, he and the other rookies were smitten with the flashy lifestyles of the veteran players.

“At that time I got sucked into wanting to be like everybody else, the guys with the Mercedes and all the flashy cars and the jewelry,” Owens says. “I think those are some of the most idiotic purchases players can do, especially when they don’t have that money in the bank account to really pay for that stuff.”

“My advice to any fan or athlete out there: Just don’t live beyond your means.

You definitely have to be smart.”

2. It’s your money. Take ownership. Athletes coming into money hear it all the time from financial advisors, according to Owens: “We’re gonna take care of you. We’re gonna have your best interests at heart.”

“I took it for face value and I got burned,” Owens says.

Even if you’re letting someone else manage your money, you should be confident in the choices he or she is making. Pay attention, and make sure you understand the reasons for your advisor’s decisions.

3. Be smart about impulse purchases. When money is tight, you get used to thinking hard before making any purchase. But when you have a financial windfall, it becomes a lot easier to spend money on a whim.

“Well, it’s like ‘mo’ money, mo’ problems,’ so to speak,” Owens says.

4. But sometimes, spending the money is worth it. NerdWallet calculated that Owens was fined around \$150,000 during his career for his “excessive” touchdown celebrations. Was it worth it?

“Oh yeah, it was worth it,” Owens says. “That’s the least of my worries.”

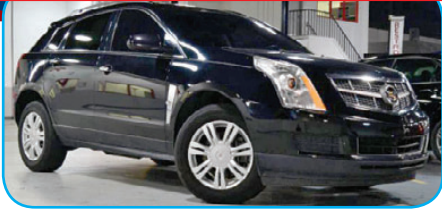

Bethel Village sees upgrades after more than 40 years

PANAMA CITY — After more than 40 years, the facilities at Bethel Village are undergoing some much needed renovations. “The program is top notch, the classes, the structure of the program, and so we just want our building to match,” said Rachel Duvall, the women’s recovery program manager. “We want the outside to match the

innard.” Thursday marked the official kick off of the renovations, with leadership from Bethel Village and Bethel’s parent, the Panama City Rescue Mission, breaking ground alongside representatives from ReliantSouth Construction Group, the contractors for the project. The work will gut the building, replacing the floors, electric and plumbing. Richard Dodd, the President of Reliant, is

donating his personal time to the project. “The Rescue Mission helps so many people and it’s such a great charity in terms of trying to get people back on their feet, and if you can help some of these folks it can be a generational change,” said Dodd. “It can make such a huge positive impact not only in their life, but in the lives of others.” Bethel Village runs two programs for women, an emergency shelter and a recovery program.

The emergency shelter portion has been closed for the renovations, which are expected to take about nine months. Bethel helped to find places for the women they were previously housing in the shelter, and people in need of emergency services have been advised to call the 211 hotline. The recovery program will continue to run. The project is being done in two phases. The first

Autopsy: Heart condition contributed to Evers’ death

BAKER — A heart issue may have caused former state Sen. Greg Evers to lose control of his pickup truck and plunge off a bridge near Baker on the night he drowned in the deep water of Penny Creek. An autopsy report released Tuesday lists arteriosclerotic cardiovascular disease as contributing to Evers’ death. Drowning is listed as the actual cause of death. The Aug. 21 single-vehicle wreck was determined to have been an accident. Arteriosclerosis is defined on medical websites as a hardening and thickening in the walls of the arteries. The report states some of Evers’ internal organs showed symptoms commonly associated with congestive heart

Several in Evers’ inner circle have said they were aware the 62-year-old veteran lawmaker had been having heart problems. State Sen. 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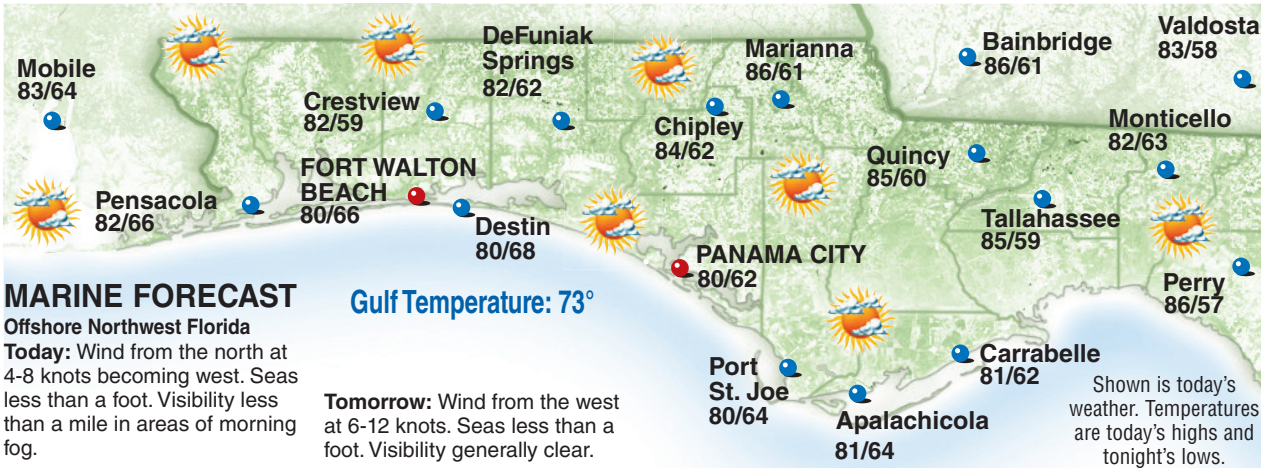

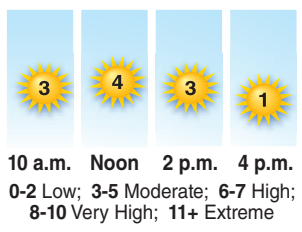

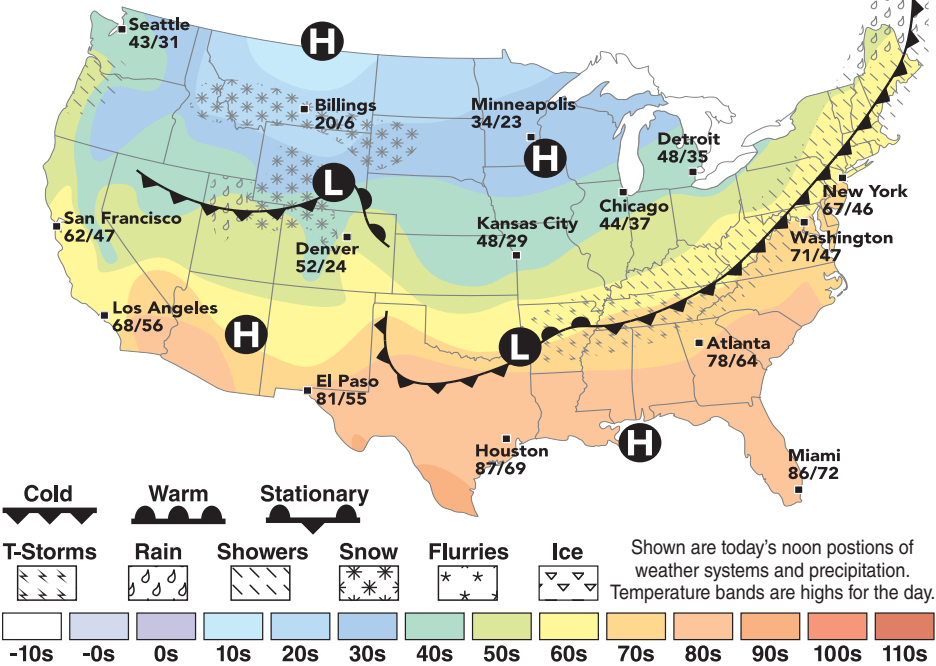

Destin water tank wins national award

DESTIN — Out of 12 finalists, the Destin Water Users water tower — located at the George French Water Reclamation Facility and visible behind Target — won Tank of the Year in a nationwide water tank competition hosted by paint business Tnemec Company Inc.

For twelve years, Tnemec has run the Tank of the Year competition culminating with the top 12 finalists being showcased in their annual calendar. Doug Hansen, director of marketing for Tnemec, said that the winning water tank is selected based on artistic value, significance of the tank to the community, and challenges encountered during the project.

“The city of Destin water tank reflects the tranquility and beauty of the coastal resort town in the Florida Panhandle,” Hansen said. “What astounded everybody was the artistic value and the beauty of the tank itself. That tank is going to look good for a long time.”

The Destin water tank mural, painted by Eric Henn, is a beach scene depicting the emerald waters of Destin with two colorful beach chairs in the white sand and a fishing boat passing by. The mural was

completed in mid-February of this year.

failure.

Dr. Cameron Snider conducted the autopsy for the First Judicial Circuit Medical Examiner’s Office. Snider and others from the Medical Examiner’s Office did not return phone calls Tuesday seeking comment.

Several in Evers’ inner circle have said they were aware the 62-year-old veteran lawmaker had been having heart problems. State Sen. Doug Broxson, R-Gulf Breeze,

who replaced Evers in the Florida Legislature’s upper chamber in 2017, said he and Evers had discussed the health concerns “fairly close to his death.”

The Florida Highway Patrol, which has not released its official report on the accident, did say that Evers was traveling north on Griffith Mill Road near his home in Baker when he failed to negotiate a right curve. The report stated Evers’ truck crossed a southbound lane and hit the guardrail on the west shoulder.

The pickup went

through the guardrail and into the creek, which has an average depth of 12 feet and could have swelled to as high as 18 feet on the night of the accident.

Evers was partially ejected when the truck hit the water and the vehicle’s windshield was broken.

The autopsy report states he suffered “multiple superficial lacerations” as well as abrasions and contusions.

The pickup truck was mostly submerged following the wreck and wasn’t discovered until the afternoon of Aug. 22.

Evers started his

business career as a farmer and built a popular u-pick-em strawberry operation near Baker that he called Akers of Strawberries.

He was elected to the Florida House of Representatives in 2000 and served until his term limits expired in 2010. He moved on to the Senate that year and served there until 2016.

The always affable Evers left the Senate in 2016 to face off against fellow Republican state lawmaker Matt Gaetz and several others for a seat in the U.S. House. Gaetz won the election.

company MAT Media sued the House on Friday, contending that the records sought by the House include trade secrets and confidential business information. Attorneys for Roberts are asking a judge to block a subpoena issued by the House for the records.

Tim Jansen, one of the attorneys, blasted House Speaker Richard Corcoran for the subpoena.

“One politician in his drive for publicity, power and higher office has trampled over the rights of private businesses and individuals that properly contracted services with a quasi-state agency,” Jansen said.

The show called “Emeril’s Florida” aired on The Cooking Channel and featured the chef touring the state and visiting some of Florida’s top restaurants. Visit Florida paid at least \$10 million over a five-year period for the show.

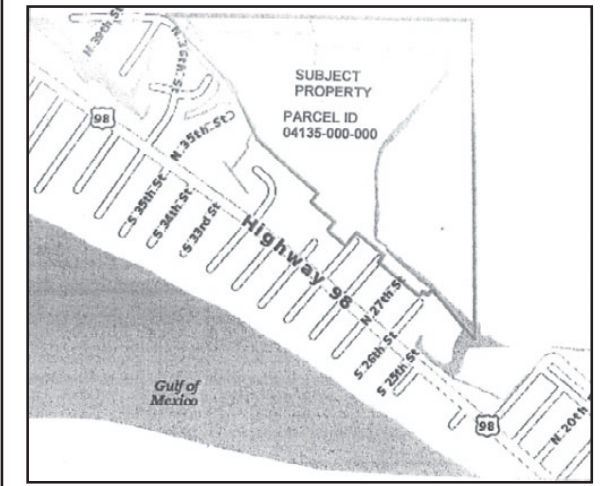

previous roles with the Senate Ethics and Elections Committee.

“During my initial assessment, it became clear to me that my professional relationship with Senator Latvala through the years, most recently as staff director of the Senate Committee on Ethics and Elections, of which he was chair during President (Don) Gaetz’s administration, could call into question the objectivity of the investigation,” Roberts wrote. “I have always ascribed to the belief that no one person is more important than the institution itself. Therefore, effectively immediately,

I am recusing myself from the investigation.”

Negron issued a memo Saturday afternoon saying he is “ordering a professional, independent, third party investigation of the allegations regarding Senator Latvala. A professional, independent, third party investigator will ensure a full, fair, and impartial investigation.

Senators and staff will be notified when the independent third party investigator has been selected.”

The series of events came after Politico Florida late Friday published a story in which six women accused Latvala, a Clearwater Republican who is running for governor, of groping them without their consent and making demeaning comments

about their physical appearances. Politico reported that the women were legislative staff and lobbyists but did not identify them.

The story came a week after former Sen. Jeff Clemens, D-Lake Worth, resigned from office after disclosures about his extramarital affair with a lobbyist --- and after days of rumors about lawmakers being involved in affairs and engaging in sexual harassment.

Negron, who told reporters Thursday that the Senate has “zero tolerance” for sexual harassment, quickly ordered the investigation Friday night amid calls from some lawmakers that Latvala be stripped of his chairmanship of the Appropriations Committee or leave the Legislature altogether.

But Latvala issued a statement Friday night saying he “unequivocally” denies the allegations and that he finds it “interesting that these anonymous complaints have only come forward after I began my campaign for governor.”

“I am in consultation with my attorney and will take all legal actions necessary to clear my name,” Latvala said in the statement.

“I also welcome a complete review of these allegations by the Senate. If my political opponents want a fight, then it’s a fight they will get.”

While Negron ordered the probe Friday evening, he did not immediately strip Latvala of his post as the chairman of the budget committee.

phase will update the area that runs as shelter, and the women in the recovery program will stay in their normal space. When the project moves to phase two, the women in the recovery program

will temporarily move into the emergency shelter part of the facilities.

Thurman Chambers, the President and Chief Executive Officer of the Rescue Mission, said they started working toward the renovations two years ago, when they launched a capital campaign.

Their big break came when they received a

federal bank affordable loan for \$500,000 to do the renovations. As long as they continue to serve the community as a shelter, the loan will be forgiven and the Rescue Mission won’t have to pay it back.

“It’s just a blessing beyond a blessing to tell you the truth,” Chambers said.

After years of patch updates, both Chambers and Duvall said they were pleased to see the renovations begin.

“We want the women to be proud of something when they come in. We want them to feel good about where they are,” Duvall said. “We want them to enjoy the nice facility.”

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Chipley residents plead guilty to operating prescription drug lab

MONTGOMERY, ALA-BAMA — Three Chipley residents have pled guilty for their involvement in a steroid and counterfeit prescription drug lab in Northwest Florida, announced Louis V. Franklin, Sr., United States Attorney for the Middle District of Alabama.

Ryan Anthony Sikora 24, John Joseph Bush, II 26, and Ariel Anna Murphy 29, all of Chipley, have pled guilty to conspiracy charges for importing, manufacturing, and distributing anabolic steroids as well as counterfeit prescription drugs. On Thursday, October 26, the last of the three defendants, John Bush, pled guilty before

a Federal Judge in Montgomery, Alabama.

According to court documents, United States Postal Inspectors determined that large amounts of steroid and counterfeit prescription drug ingredients were being shipped from China to various locations in South Alabama and Northwest Florida.

During the investigation, law enforcement found the defendants' illegal drug lab near Chipley. In the lab, investigators uncovered a hefty amount of steroids. The list includes over 42,000 pills, over 3,000 liquid vials, and more than a kilogram of raw powders used to make the steroids.

Law enforcement also discovered over 35,000 counterfeit prescription

pills labeled as Viagra, Cialis, Accutane, and Clomid. Each of these four drugs are regulated by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), and are exclusively produced by major pharmaceutical companies. They also require a prescription to be legally dispensed. The defendants mass-produced the pills at the lab using two large-scale pill presses.

The defendants marketed the counterfeit drugs online using the brand name "Future Pharma" and they would typically process the orders through encrypted email, and then use the United States Postal Service to send the contraband products across the United States.

Sikora's sentencing is scheduled for January 18, 2018. The other two

defendants are expected to be sentenced at the same time. Each defendant faces a maximum term of 15 years in federal prison, as well as significant fines and restitution.

U.S. Attorney Franklin would like to thank the following agencies for their assistance with this case: The United States Postal Inspection Service, the FDA Office of Criminal Investigations, the Alabama Law Enforcement Agency (ALEA), the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE), the Washington County (Florida) Sheriff's Office, and the Chipley, Florida Police Department. This case is being prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Bradley Bodiford.

TDC closes another banner year

Storms, an uncertain scallop season and changes in leadership, through it all tourism marched to another stellar year in Gulf County.

Bed tax collections for the month of September, the final month of the fiscal year, jumped 20.7 percent compared to the same

month in 2016, an unexpected surge in a chaotic month.

That translated into a 2016-2017 fiscal year during which collections were nearly 8 percent ahead of the prior fiscal year and, for the first time, eclipsed \$2 million in revenue.

With total collections of \$2,015,000 for the year, bed tax revenue grew by \$132,000 compared to 2016.

Bed tax collections in the

county moved past the \$1 million threshold just five years ago; the TDC implemented a fifth penny since that time, but collections, based on four or five pennies, have still grown in each year.

"We've been up each of the past four years," said Kelli Godwin, executive director of the Gulf County Tourist Development Council. "We are very excited with that."

September's fuel

balanced an August which had been down, a decrease that was skewed by reporting glitches.

In the summer of 2016, one of the larger bed tax collectors reported July collections in August, all but guaranteeing August 2017 would reflect a dip.

And given the external forces at work during September, that the fuel arrived in such bold numbers was a pleasant surprise for the TDC.

Harvick passes Truex for win

FORT WORTH, Texas — Kevin Harvick went around the outside of Martin Truex for the lead on the 324th of 334 laps, then stayed in front the rest of the way to win the Cup Series race at Texas on Sunday and earn his championship shot in NASCAR's finale.

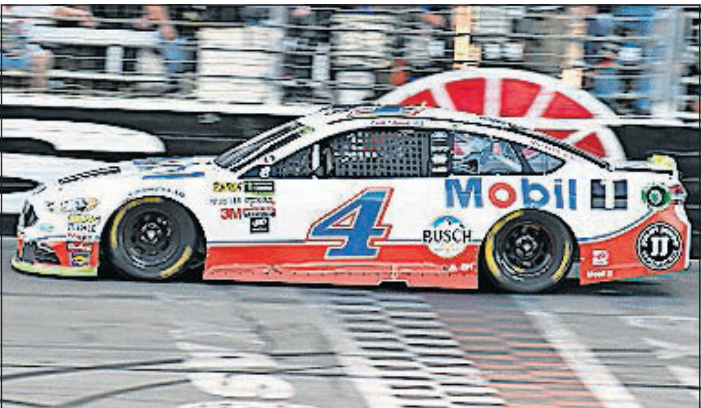
Truex had led 107 laps and was still up front until his bobble on the backstretch that allowed Harvick to take the lead. But Truex,

the points leader who has won three of the eight play-off races, also locked into one of the four championship-contending spots at Homestead in two weeks.

Harvick and Kyle Busch clinched championship shots with their wins during the third round of the play-offs. That leaves only one spot up for grabs next week at Phoenix.

Harvick got his first Cup win at the 1 1/2-mile high-banked Texas Motor

instigate a scuffle along the sideline.

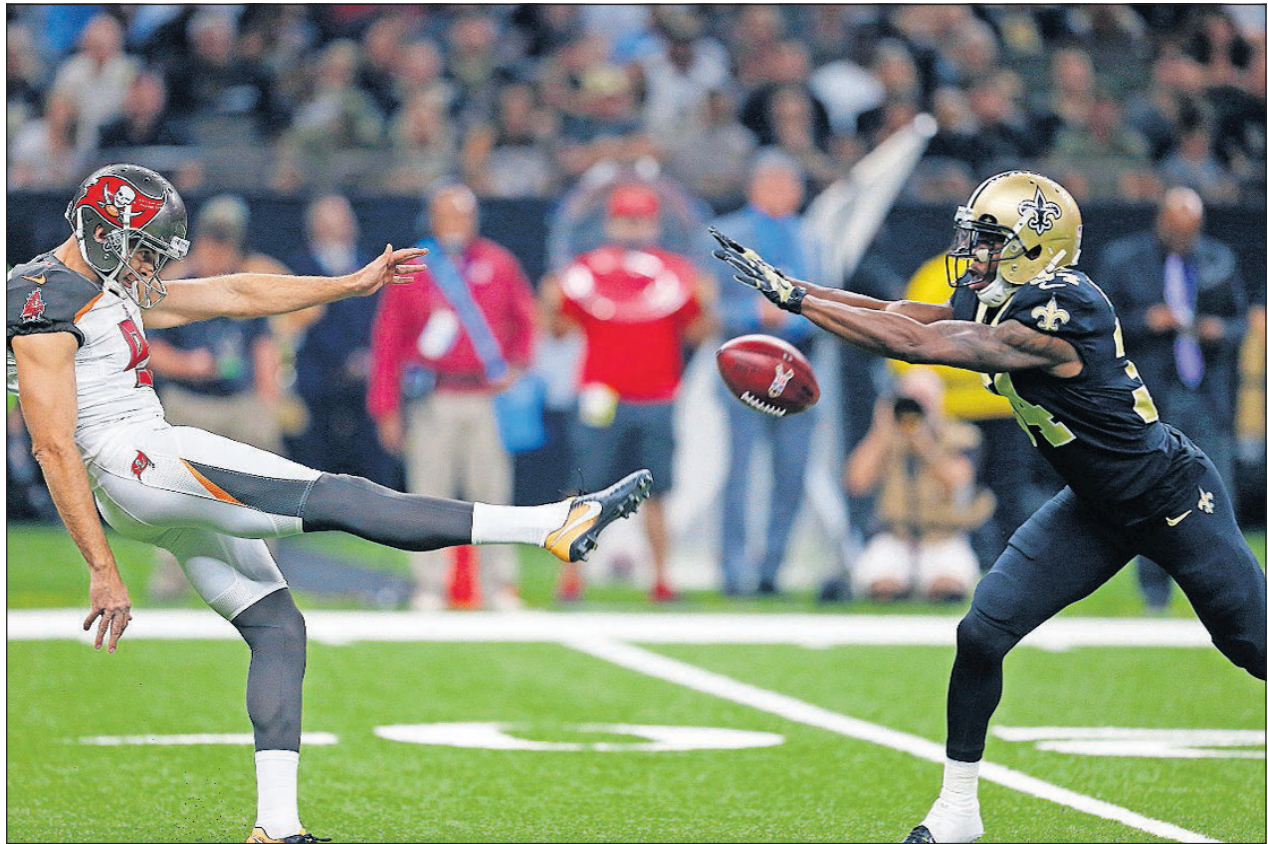

Mickens delivers knockout blow

Jaguars handle
Bengals 23-7

JACKSONVILLE — With A.J. Green and Jalen Ramsey ejected for fighting, Jaydon Mickens delivered the knockout blow by returning a punt 63 yards for a touchdown, helping the Jacksonville Jaguars beat the Cincinnati Bengals 23-7 on Sunday.

The Jaguars (5-3) won consecutive games for the first time in 13 months and were victorious at EverBank Field for the first time since last December.

Blake Bortles threw for 259 yards and a touchdown in another efficient performance. Marqise Lee had his first TD reception of the season and responded by punting the ball into the stands. And Jacksonville's defense handled Cincinnati's woeful offense for most of the afternoon.

But most of the talk will center on Green and Ramsey.

The perennial Pro Bowl receiver retaliated against the trash-talking cornerback in a violent way late in the first half. After Ramsey knocked Green to the ground at the end of a running play, Green grabbed Ramsey around the neck and slammed him to the ground. Green then delivered numerous punches to Ramsey's helmet — never the smartest idea — and put another MMA-style choke hold on Ramsey. It was the kind of aggressive attack that could lead to a suspension.

Players from both sidelines rushed the field, pushing, pulling, shoving, screaming and looking like they would brawl.

Coaches and officials stepped in and prevented a melee. Green and Ramsey were ejected, a decision that prompted loud objections from Jacksonville's coaching booth next to the press box. Jaguars executive Tom Coughlin and general manager Dave Caldwell were in the box.

Players jawed even as they left the field for halftime, and there was plenty of chippy play in the second half.

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. — Jalen Hurts passed for a touchdown and ran for a score and Alabama sweated out a bruising 24-10 victory over LSU on Saturday night.

The Crimson Tide (9-0, 6-0 Southeastern Conference) had to withstand a rare challenge this season from a league opponent, managing it with big plays from the defense and a handful of timely ones from Hurts.

MIAMI GARDENS — Malik Rosier threw two touchdown passes and ran for another score, Travis Homer had a 64-yard touchdown run and Miami moved to the brink of clinching what would be its first spot in an Atlantic Coast Conference championship game.

Braxton Berrios and Christopher Herndon IV had touchdown catches for Miami (8-0, 6-0 ACC, No. 10 CFP), which extended the nation’s longest current winning streak to 13 games.

Rosier survived a three-interception night, helped out by Miami’s turnover chain the gaudy bauble that gets awarded amid much fanfare on the sideline when the Hurricanes get a takeaway making four appearances to the delight of Alex Rodriguez, Jennifer Lopez and about 63,000 other people in the crowd.

Virginia Tech (7-2, 3-2) got a touchdown run from quarterback Josh Jackson. He was 20 of 32 passing for 197 yards and two interceptions.

NO. 10 TCU 24, TEXAS 7

FORT WORTH, Texas — Kyle Hicks ran for two touchdowns and TCU rebounded from its only loss, staying tied for the Big 12 lead

and in contention for a playoff spot.

In a game dominated by two of the Big 12’s best defenses, Hicks had 41 yards rushing on 11 carries. That included his 1-yard TD to end TCU’s opening drive and his 14-yarder that put the Horned Frogs (8-1, 5-1 Big 12, No. 8 CFP) up 17-0 early in the second quarter. Texas (4-5, 3-3) managed only 263 total yards in its biggest losing margin in coach Tom Herman’s first season.

With freshman quarterback Sam Ehlinger missing his second straight game for the Longhorns, Shane Buechele completed 21 of 44 passes for 254 yards with a 33-yard scoring pass to Collin Johnson.

NO. 12 WASHINGTON 38, OREGON 3

SEATTLE — Washington’s Dante Pettis became the NCAA’s all-time leader in punt return touchdowns and had a 47-yard TD reception.

A year after breaking a 12-game losing streak to the Ducks, Washington (8-1, 5-1 Pac-12, No. 12 CFP) kept alive its hopes for a return to the College Football Playoff by thumping its rival to the south.

Pettis sparked Washington’s blowout on a frigid, wet night along the shore of Lake Washington. After a

sluggish start, Pettis’ ninth career punt return TD started an avalanche of Washington points.

Washington quarterback Jake Browning threw for 204 yards, and his two TD passes tied Keith Price for the school record at 75.

Brandon Burmeister started at quarterback for Oregon as the Ducks (5-5, 2-5) kept Justin Herbert out for one more game due to a collarbone injury. Herbert has not played since being injured in late September. Royce Freeman rushed for 122 yards, but the Ducks had almost no passing attack.

NO. 15 UCF 31, SMU 24

DALLAS — McKenzie Milton threw a touchdown pass and ran for a score, Adrian Killins Jr. rushed for two more touchdowns and UCF stayed undefeated.

The Knights (8-0, 5-0 AAC, No. 18 CFP) remained the only undefeated team in the Group of Five, keeping them on track to play in a major New Year’s Day bowl game if they can win out.

SMU’s best opportunity at an upset fizzled with 5:10 remaining when wideout Trey Quinn dropped a pass on fourth-and-3 that would have given the Mustangs (6-3, 3-2) a first down deep in UCF territory.

Killins scored on runs of

64 yards and 34 yards for UCF, splitting defenders and shedding would-be tacklers along the way. And early in the second quarter, Milton found wide receiver Gabriel Davis down the right sideline for an 80-yard touchdown strike.

NO. 17 SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA 49, NO. 23 ARIZONA 35

LOS ANGELES — Ronald Jones II rushed for 194 yards and three touchdowns, and Southern California overcame a big second-half rally led by Arizona quarterback Khalil Tate.

Sam Darnold passed for 311 yards and two TDs for the Trojans (8-2, 6-1 Pac-12), who led 28-6 midway through the third quarter before Tate finally got the Wildcats (6-3, 4-2) rolling. Arizona scored 29 points in about 11 minutes, tying it at 35 on Zach Green’s TD run and a 2-point conversion with 8:23 to play.

But Jones ran wild in the fourth quarter, racking up 96 yards while scoring the tiebreaking touchdown with 5:37 to play and adding another score with 3:09 left as the Trojans pulled away.

USC is alone atop the Pac-12 South after its 15th consecutive victory at the Coliseum. One victory in the Trojans’ final two games against Colorado and UCLA

Three weeks after North Carolina’s flagship public university escaped NCAA penalties and closed an academic fraud case, the school’s athletic director is getting a \$1 million compensation boost.

The News & Observer of Raleigh reports the university system’s governing board approved the deferred-compensation deal for Bubba Cunningham, the athletic director at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

The agreement approved Friday calls for Cunningham to receive tax-advantaged retirement contributions of \$200,000 a year over the next five years. The money will come from athletic department money, not state appropriations.

Sock beats Krajinovic to
win Paris Masters

Jack Sock beat Filip Krajinovic 5-7, 6-4, 6-1 Sunday to win the Paris Masters and qualify for the season-ending ATP Finals.

It was the 16th-seeded American’s third title of the year, fourth overall and first at a Masters. It sends him through to the finals in London for the first time. He will break into the top 10, climbing to ninth.

He sealed victory on his first match point when Krajinovic, a Serbian qualifier ranked No. 77, sent a backhand long. Sock fell onto his back with his hands on his face, then jumped into the seating area to celebrate with his team.

Goerges tops Vandeweghe
to win WTA Elite Trophy

Julia Goerges defeated CoCo Vandeweghe 7-5, 6-1 in the WTA Elite Trophy final on Sunday.

Goerges fell behind 5-2 in the first set before rallying to win 10 of the next 11 games as she cruised to her second straight WTA title.

“I can’t imagine a better ending to this season, two titles in two weeks and this is the biggest one,” said Goerges.

Goerges qualified late for the 12-player field in Zhuhai by winning the Kremlin Cup in Moscow two weeks ago. She has won nine matches in a row.

Flanagan upsets Keitany, ends US drought at NYC Marathon

NEW YORK — Shalane Flanagan thought about the seven years building to this race, possibly her last. She thought about the running star striding next to her. She thought about her family. She thought about Meb.

With one hellacious holler at the finish, it all poured out.

Flanagan dethroned Mary Keitany on Sunday and became the first American woman to win the New York City Marathon since 1977, potentially ending her decorated career with her first major marathon victory.

Flanagan’s breakthrough came in the last career race for American great Meb Keflezighi. The 2009 New York winner collapsed at the finish line, his 42-year-old body pushed to its limit in his 26th marathon. Keflezighi finished 11th, about five minutes behind 24-year-old winner Geoffrey Kamworor of Kenya.

This may have been Flanagan’s final race, too, although the four-time Olympian wasn’t ready to commit. But she likes the idea of her and Keflezighi going out together.

“I was thinking of Meb, and I was thinking of how I wanted to make him proud,” Flanagan said.

Her win came five days after the bike path terror attack in lower Manhattan killed eight and raised questions about security for Sunday. That hit home for Flanagan, a Massachusetts native who completed the 2013 Boston Marathon shortly before a bomb went off at the finish line, killing three and wounding more than 260 others.

“It’s been a tough week for New Yorkers, and a tough week for our nation,” Flanagan said. “I thought of, ‘What a better gift than to make Americans smile today?’”

Flanagan ended a dominant stretch in New York by Keitany, a Kenyan runner who had won here three straight years. Flanagan stalked Keitany most of the way, hovering behind her during an unusually slow first 20 miles by the lead women.

Flanagan, Keitany and third-place finisher Mamitu Daska of Ethiopia broke from the pack in the 21st mile, and with about three miles left, Flanagan hit the jets. She finished in 2 hours, 26 minutes, 53 seconds, about a minute faster than Keitany.

Flanagan cried and yelled as she approached the finish line without another runner in sight.

“It’s indescribable,” the 36-year-old said. “It’s a moment I’m trying to soak up and savor.”

The last American woman to win New York was Miki Gorman, who took consecutive titles in 1976-77.

“Way too long,” Flanagan said.

Flanagan knows about long waits. She finished second here in her debut marathon in 2010 but hadn’t run New York since. It was also her first marathon since finishing sixth at the Rio Games. She fractured her lower back last winter and missed the Boston Marathon in the spring. She was “heartbroken” to miss her hometown race, but the injury set her up to take aim at Keitany in New York.

Flanagan had called Keitany “the alpha racer” and said she was ready to “suffer dearly” while keeping pace with the unpredictable Kenyan. As she went stride-for-stride with Keitany in the middle miles, Flanagan wasn’t sure what she’d have for the final stretch.

“There’s always creeping doubts of whether I was going to have enough to beat the best in the world,” she said.

Keitany never found her top gear Sunday, though, and finished with her slowest New York time since a third-place result in 2010. Keitany said she had a problem of a personal nature Saturday afternoon that affected her Sunday, but she would not disclose the issue.

Flanagan held a stern look on the course until getting emotional near the finish in Central Park. On the podium, she put her hands over face and began to cry again when she was announced the winner. She turned to hug Keitany before accepting her medal.

“This is the moment I’ve dreamed of since I was a little girl,” Flanagan said.

She’s determined to pass on that dream, too. She and husband Steven Edwards — a former track and field star — have been fostering two teenage daughters who are also aspiring runners. Flanagan’s parents were also marathoners, and her mom, Cheryl Treworgy, once held the world record.

“This means a lot to me, to my family,” Flanagan said. “And hopefully inspires the next generation of American women to just be patient.”

Kamworor beat countryman Wilson Kipsang by three seconds, winning with a time of 2:10:53. Kamworor separated from the pack late and seemed like he would cruise to his first major marathon victory, but Kipsang sneaked up on him at the very end. Kamworor was surprised to see the 2014 New York winner behind him on a large video board located near the finish line.

“I look at the camera, I saw

someone was coming, which was Wilson,” Kamworor said. “And I had to believe in myself because I was holding out for the finish.”

Kamworor kissed the pavement right after crossing the finish, then turned to embrace Kipsang. Ethiopia’s Lelisa Desisa finished third.

A few minutes later, the Central Park crowd gave perhaps its loudest cheers of the day to Keflezighi. He waved and blew kisses to the grandstands through the home stretch, then had to be carried away after crumbling at the finish line.

“It was a beautiful victory lap, you could say,” Keflezighi said.

The race went off as planned a few days after New York’s biggest terror attack since 9/11. Police had promised an unprecedented effort to secure the course, a plan including hundreds of extra uniformed patrol and plainclothes officers, roving teams of counterterrorism commandos armed with heavy weapons, bomb-sniffing dogs and rooftop snipers.

Mayor Bill de Blasio said the city was expecting 2 million fans to line the streets. The only interruption came when firetrucks had to cross the course to address an emergency that organizers said was unrelated to the race. The course was briefly closed around Mile 18 to let the trucks through, but that was well after the elite runners had finished.

Beverly Ramos competed with a Puerto Rican flag headband two months after her home island was ravaged by Hurricane Maria. Like many in Puerto Rico, Ramos was without power after the storm. Still, she decided to continue training near San Juan, seeking out safe places to run amid the wreckage.

“You have to stay strong no matter what,” Ramos said. “A lot of runners encouraged me to continue and to push.”

The wheelchair events were a Swiss sweep. Manuela Schar finally upended four-time defending champion Tatyana McFadden to win the women’s race, while countryman Marcel Hug repeated as the men’s champ. Schar had been runner-up the last three years but beat her nemesis McFadden by nearly three minutes. Hug has won New York three times.

Comedian Kevin Hart made his marathon debut at New York. Forget about chasing gold — the actor and fitness nut was mostly worried about avoiding humiliation.

“I don’t want to see a bunch of memes of me looking weird out here,” Hart said shortly before starting.

Patrick Cantlay wins playoff in Las Vegas

Patrick Cantlay won the Shriners Hospitals for Children Open on Sunday in a playoff for the first victory in a PGA Tour career mostly derailed by a severe back injury.

The 25-year-old former UCLA star hit from behind a tree and got up-and-down for par from off the back of the 18th green to beat Alex Cejka and Whee Kim on the second extra hole.

Cantlay bogeyed the final two holes of regulation for a 5-under 67 to get in at 9-under 275 at windy TPC Summerlin.

Cejka birdied the 18th with an 18-footer for 63 more than two hours before Cantlay and Whee — who bogeyed 18 for a 66 — finished the round. The three played the 456-yard, par-4 closing hole twice in the playoff, matching bogeys the first time.

Cantlay broke through to win after a remarkable return last season from the back problems. Out of golf since 2013, he didn’t miss a cut and made it to the Tour Championship while playing only 12 events. Part of that was due to an ankle injury that slowed him for two months.

Cantlay earned \$1,224,000, a two-year PGA Tour exemption and a spot in the Masters.

Patton Kizzire (64), J.T. Poston (66) and Chesson Hadley (68) finished a stroke out of the playoff. Hadley bogeyed the 18th in the second-to-last group.

ROSE WINS TURKISH AIRLINES OPEN FOR BACK-TO-BACK TITLES: Justin Rose made a 10-foot birdie putt on the final hole to win the Turkish Airlines Open by a shot on Sunday for his second straight title on the European Tour, moving him close to fellow Englishman Tommy Fleetwood in the Race to Dubai standings. Rose shot a 6-under 65 in the final round to finish on 18 under par 266 overall, securing victory a week after taking the WGC-HSBC Champions title in Shanghai. Nicolas Colsaerts had the chance to take Rose to a playoff but rolled his birdie putt on the 18th just left of the hole, moments after Rose had holed from two feet further out. Colsaerts had birdied Nos. 15, 16 and 17.

DEFENDING CHAMPION FENG FIRES 68 TO WIN JAPAN CLASSIC: Defending champion Shanshan Feng of China fired a 4-under 68 on Sunday to win the LPGA Tour’s Japan Classic by two strokes. Feng recovered from two bogeys on the first three holes with six birdies to finish at 19-under 197, two shots ahead of Japan’s Ai Suzuki, who also shot a 68. Feng became the first golfer on the LPGA Tour to defend a title in 2017 and claimed her second victory of the year, having captured the LPGA Volvik Championship in May.
