## Teen slain; 4 arrested in shooting

PANAMA CITY BEACH — A teenager is dead and four people in custody after shots were fired during an attempted drug robbery in the 79 West Apartments Monday afternoon, police said. Officers responded to the complex about 1:53 p.m. to find Peyton Thomas Meyers, 18, of Panama City, lying in the walkway of the fifth floor.

Meyers died from a single gunshot wound, officers said. Taylor Ann West, 19, of Panama City and Brandon Maurice Turntime, 20, have been arrested and charged with armed home invasion and felony murder. Police said Meyers, West and Turntime believed a resident in the apartment complex, Holly Christina Buchanan, 34, was selling drugs out of her apartment and planned to rob her, according to a press release.

Armed with guns, Meyers and Turntime forced their way into Buchanan's apartment and forced her to hand over the narcotics and some of her personal belongings, police said. At some point during the confrontation, Buchanan grabbed a knife and her roommate grabbed his gun. The pair followed Meyers and Turntime out into the hallway, where police said

## Supreme Court OKs full travel ban

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court on Monday allowed the Trump administration to fully enforce a ban on travel to the United States by residents of six mostly Muslim countries. This is not a final ruling on the travel ban: Challenges to the policy are winding through the federal courts, and the justices themselves ultimately are expected to rule on its legality. But the action indicates that the high court might eventually approve the latest version of the ban, announced by President Donald Trump in September. Lower courts have continued to find problems with the policy. Opponents of this and previous versions of the ban say they show a bias against Muslims. They say that was reinforced most recently by Trump's retweets of anti-Muslim videos. "President Trump's anti-Muslim prejudice is no secret. He has repeatedly confirmed it, including just last week on Twitter. It's unfortunate that the full ban can move forward for now, but this order does not address the merits of our claims," said Omar Jadwat, director of the American

## Rescued sea turtle given second chance

PANAMA CITY BEACH — A single fishing hook tethered Lazzie, a juvenile green sea turtle, to the bottom of the Russell Fields Pier when Caryn VonBlankenburg Siegfried, a beach rescue officer, spotted it on her two-mile training swim. At first, VonBlankenburg Siegfried wasn't sure if it was a turtle or just another piece of debris caught in the pier. When she dove the 15 feet for another look, she determined it was a turtle but was pretty sure it was dead. "I figured it had to be a

**EMPTY STOCKING FUND**



**Today's Highlight in History:**

On **Dec. 5, 1952**, the Great Smog of London descended on the British capital; the unusually thick fog, which contained toxic pollutants, lasted five days and was blamed for causing thousands of deaths.

**On this date:**

**In 1782**, the eighth president of the United States, Martin Van Buren, was born in Kinderhook, New York; he was the first chief executive to be born after American independence.

**In 1791**, composer Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart died in Vienna, Austria, at age 35.

**In 1792**, George Washington was re-elected president; John Adams was re-elected vice president.

**In 1831**, former President John Quincy Adams took his seat as a member of the U.S. House of Representatives.

**In 1916**, British Prime Minister Herbert H. Asquith resigned (he was succeeded by David Lloyd George).

**In 1933**, national Prohibition came to an end as Utah became the 36th state to ratify the 21st Amendment to the Constitution, repealing the 18th Amendment.

**In 1945**, five U.S. Navy torpedo bombers mysteriously disappeared after taking off from Fort Lauderdale on a training mission with the loss of all 14 crew members; "The Lost Squadron" contributed to the legend of the Bermuda Triangle.

**In 1967**, pediatrician Dr. Benjamin Spock and poet Allen Ginsberg were among more than 260 people arrested during an anti-Vietnam War protest outside an armed forces induction center in lower Manhattan.

**In 1977**, Egypt broke diplomatic relations with Syria, Libya, Algeria, Iraq and South Yemen in the wake of criticism that followed President Anwar Sadat's peace overtures to Israel.

## Parker, Callaway hosting Christmas events Friday

**BAY COUNTY** — The east side of Bay County will be ringing in the Christmas season Friday during annual events hosted by Callaway and Parker.

The City of Parker will hold a tree lighting from 4:30-7 p.m. at Memorial Park next to City Hall, 1001 W. Park St. off U.S. 98.

The City of Callaway, meanwhile, will hold Christmas in Callaway from 6-9 p.m. at its Arts and Conference Center, 500 Callaway Park Way, off State 22. Both events are free.

The events will have plenty for parents and children to do including hayrides, appearances by Santa and vendors. Parker will have "snow" from several snow machines and a barbershop quartet, while Callaway will have a balloon slide and obstacle course.

"We had about 400 people there last year, which for our size community is pretty substantial," Parker Mayor Rich Musgrave said. "All the employees are excited about it because it presents the city in a good light and shows we're doing stuff for the citizens. I

personally like to have events because it enables folks to get together and socialize."

Musgrave said Parker officials expect to hit, and maybe exceed, last year's attendance, and there also will be 50th Parker anniversary coins for sale.

In Callaway, free hot dogs and hot chocolate are on the menu, and there will be live entertainment inside and outside the Arts and Conference Center.

Musgrave and Callaway Mayor Pam Henderson said Friday's events are "major expansions" of past events. Fliers for the Callaway event have been sent to Tyndall and Callaway Elementary, and robo-calls to the city's residents are planned Wednesday to get the word out.

"This is a major event," Henderson said. "I think it's going to be great. ... I want Callaway to be family-friendly and that's the direction we're heading in. Everybody sounds excited about it."

"We want everyone in the city to know," Callaway City Manager Eddie Cook said. "I'm expecting thousands. We want people to come and enjoy Christmas and be part of it."

#### Loved wife and toolbox both gone

A deputy is dispatched to talk to a couple concerned that their very is afoot in their neighborhood.

The complainant says "her and her boyfriend toolboxes were taken out of their yard."

The woman goes onto to say that she and her boyfriend recently moved into her father's home, and ever since multiple items have been stolen from the property. She tells the deputy, "she is not from this area and her father never warned her about the thieves that lived in this area," and that the theft of the toolboxes was too much.

She described one as a "grey Craftsman with red lettering... that had the engraving 'I love

my wife' on the inside. She explained this was a gift from her ex-husband."

The woman also says she keeps most of her personal items in one of her cars out front and that the car and home are not as secure as they could be.

"She advised this vehicle does not lock," the deputy wrote. "She also explained the front door to her home can be opened with a credit card."

The deputy searches the yard for footprints and does not see any and it is too wet to try for fingerprints, so the two discuss options to prevent further thefts.

#### Tip: Move the tip jar

The tip of the day from this case may be move the tip jar to

a safer location. An officer was dispatched to a coffee shop recently where an employee said a man "wearing a blue hooded jacket and plaid pajama pants ran up to the drive-thru window, grabbed the tip jar and ran off."

The tip jar had about \$10 in it.

The employee is unsure of the suspect's race, but is sure "this has happened previously about 10 or 12 times" at the drive-through window." The employee says he's unsure if the surveillance cameras work, but if they did he would contact police with that information.

#### Rocky road for unsteady driver

An evening drive had a rocky ending for a woman in Lynn

Haven recently.

A Lynn Haven police officer spotted a car pulling into a parking lot of a business on Country Club drive, except the business was closed. The vehicle stopped, then pulled forward under the awning. The car moved forward another 30 feet before stopping, then another 15 feet or so before making it to the stop sign, the officer wrote.

The car then headed south but stopped before the next road, then started again before "speeding off down Colorado Avenue." The officer wrote the vehicle had trouble maintaining its lane or is speed, so it was pulled over.

The driver opened her door, but the officer asked her to stay inside and roll down her window instead. The driver,

"began messing with the ignition of the vehicle and attempted to roll the window down but initially was unable to. I observed a small dog in the passenger seat of the vehicle. At this time she picked the dog up and set it in her lap and began petting it. I told her again to roll down her window and this time she was successful."

After some difficulties, the driver produced a driver's license and other paperwork.

"I asked her where she was coming from and she advised she was "hiding rocks", the officer wrote. "Her eyes were very dilated and she had slurred speech."

The woman is eventually taken into custody and someone is called to pick up her car and her dog.







"entitlement and greed" in siphoning money from the One Door for Education Foundation for personal use. Prosecutors said the pattern of fraud by Brown and her top aide included using hundreds of thousands of dollars from the foundation for lavish parties, trips and shopping excursions.

Brown represented a Florida district that included Jacksonville during her almost 25-year career.

The judge said Brown used her high profile to lure donors to fundraisers, abusing her power, and was unrepentant when faced with evidence that contradicted her claims of innocence.

"The rules, she decided, did not apply to her," Corrigan said.

Brown's former chief of staff, Elias "Ronnie" Simmons, and One Door's executive director Carla Wiley accepted plea deals and testified against Brown. They also were sentenced Monday. Simmons was given four years in prison, followed by three years of probation, and Wiley received a one-year, nine-month sentence followed by three years of probation. They too were ordered to report for prison in January.

Federal prosecutors said the three used One Door to bring in more than \$800,000 between 2012 and 2016, through donations and events including a high-profile golf tournament at TPC Sawgrass. The Virginia-based One Door gave out only one scholarship — for \$1,200, to an unidentified person in Florida, according to court documents.

## Scott pick resigns after misconduct allegation

TALLAHASSEE — A former state legislator tapped by Florida Gov. Rick Scott to help oversee the state's powerful utility industry abruptly resigned from his post Monday after being accused of sexual misconduct by a Republican state senator.

Sen. Lizbeth Benacquisto said in a statement that Ritch Workman had touched her inappropriately and made "vulgar" comments to her at a charity event in 2016.

"Workman approached me from behind, pushed his body up against me and made vulgar and

inappropriate gestures," said the Fort Myers Republican. "I immediately asked him to stop. He continued to make vulgar and inappropriate comments and gestures until other attendees intervened. I found his conduct to be abhorrent."

Scott had appointed Workman, a Republican from Melbourne, to a \$131,000 a year job on the Public Service Commission. He was scheduled to start work in January.

Workman's position was subject to Senate confirmation. Senate President Joe Negron said as a result of the allegations against Workman that he would not be confirmed. Workman called

the governor's office and resigned within minutes of Benacquisto releasing her statement.

"The governor has consistently said that any misconduct cannot be tolerated," said Lauren Schenone, a spokeswoman for Scott. "He supports his decision to resign."

Workman did not immediately respond to a call to his cellphone seeking comment.

Benacquisto, who holds a top position in the state Senate and is ally of Negron, had a private meeting with Scott and his chief of staff back in early November. Scott's office refused to comment on what was discussed

during the meeting, including whether or not the senator talked about Workman.

Scott picked Workman from a list of nominees given to him by a nominating panel controlled by the state Legislature. Workman, who unsuccessfully ran for the state Senate in 2016, had been working for Keiser University since 2013. He gained a bit of attention in 2015 when it was discovered that he was working as a driver for the ride-sharing service Uber while still a legislator.

John Tupps, a spokesman for Scott, said the governor relied on the nominating council to look at qualifications

and the backgrounds of candidates.

"Our office relies on this committee to provide names of qualified applicants which have been vetted and thoroughly reviewed by the nominating commission," said Tupps. "This vetting process includes a background screening conducted by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement."

Workman's abrupt resignation comes as the state Capitol has been thrown into turmoil due to allegations of sexual misconduct.

GOP Sen. Jack Latvala has been accused by six women of groping or making

demeaning comments about their bodies. The Florida Senate is investigating Latvala. Latvala has denied the allegations, but last week one of his anonymous accusers went public. Rachel Perrin Rogers is a top aide to Senate Majority Leader Wilton Simpson and her husband is a prominent GOP consultant.

Simpson put out a statement on Monday that said his aide is "trusted and valued member of my team for more than five years."

Gov. Scott has called Latvala "a distraction" and has said that he should resign if the allegations against him are true.

# Former Chipley resident netted in \$250K burglary

**HOLMES COUNTY** — The Holmes County Sheriff's Office has arrested a former Chipley resident in connection with the October theft of more than \$250,000 in cash and firearms from a home on County 171.

Thursday's arrest comes after a two-month investigation led law enforcement first to South Florida and then to Geneva, Alabama, where Billy Ray Dreblow Sr. was identified as suspect.

The investigation began when deputies were dispatched Oct. 5 to a home on County 171 in Holmes County that had been burglarized. The complainant reported someone had broken into his home and stolen a gun safe containing several weapons and more than \$200,000 in cash.

After Dreblow was identified as a possible suspect, investigators began looking into Dreblow's financial records and interviewing individuals who knew him. Investigators learned that Dreblow, who previously had been living in a rental home in Chipley and "barely making rent," had used cash to purchase a home in Geneva, as well as multiple vehicles in the weeks after the burglary.

Investigators also said Dreblow knew the victim and had prior knowledge the victim kept large amounts of cash in his home. Investigators served search warrants Thursday at two Geneva homes,

including Dreblow's, where \$7,500 in cash was confiscated, as well as about \$25,000 worth of merchandise for which receipts in the home showed had been purchased since the burglary.

Holmes County Sheriff John Tate said Dreblow's assets and bank accounts have been frozen, and the sheriff's office is in the process of having a lien placed on Dreblow's home to help recover money lost by the victim.

"We are still in the early stages of the investigation, but I want to thank the investigators for their hard work, as well as those in the community who have called in tips," Tate said. "Meanwhile, if anyone

has purchased any weapons or merchandise from (Dreblow), we ask that they contact the sheriff's office. I also would like to thank the Geneva Police Department and Geneva Police Chief Tony Clements for their assistance in this case."

Tate said more arrests are expected to be made in the case.

Dreblow is being held in the Geneva County Jail on charges of receiving stolen property. He is awaiting extradition to Holmes County, where initial charges include armed burglary, dealing in stolen property, grand theft, and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

# DEP makes right call on Everglades

It's been 50 years since the state of Florida has permitted someone to drill for oil in the parts of the Everglades the state deems most worthy of rehabilitation. Thanks to Noah Valenstein, the wait will continue.

Valenstein, the secretary of the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, last week overturned an administrative law judge's recommendation allowing the Kanter family, some of South Florida's most high-powered developers, to sink a 12,000-foot-deep exploratory oil well on 20,000 acres the family owns a few miles west of Miramar.

The landowners, as Early found, made the reasonable argument that they should be allowed to drill on their own land.

According to court records, their ownership claim extends to underground mineral rights. An expert for the family asserted that the area in question could yield reserves totaling up to 10 million barrels of oil. Confirming that would require setting aside 5 acres for a test well.

The judge noted that the test site was of little environmental value, and far less significant for conservation purposes than an area in the Big Cypress National Preserve, in the western Everglades, where the federal government authorized an exploratory well last year.

Valenstein, however, rejected those arguments.

Valenstein observed that state law requires DEP to weigh three factors before granting such an application: the nature of the lands involved; the owner's rights, including how much time has passed before they were exercised; and the likelihood of success.

His order zeroed in on two of them. First, the secretary pointed out that the Kanters' test well would be situated in an environmentally sensitive area of the "endangered" Everglades ecosystem.

While acknowledging the Kanters' property rights, he also noted that the family has owned the land since the mid-1970s, but have not sought an oil-drilling permit in at least 39 years — or well before 1991, when the Legislature passed the Everglades Forever Act, calling for enhanced protection for the River of Grass. Valenstein observed that in 26 years lawmakers have not revised the law to indicate a shift in thinking on that.

We would note two points the secretary did not delve into. First, state and the federal governments are well into a decades-long, \$16 billion effort to restore the original flow and health of the Everglades.

Oil drilling could upset that. And even if it didn't, the 10 million barrels of crude that potentially could be pumped from the Kanters' land would be enough to power America for about 12 hours.

Valenstein concluded that, under the state's legal test, "the balance tips against issuance of an oil and gas permit to drill an exploratory well in the environmentally sensitive Everglades."

For now, Gov. Rick Scott's administration, which has not always been an ally of the environment, has sent a clear and appropriate message that the Everglades is not the place to hunt for gushers.

## 'I'm humbled and troubled — especially since I got caught'

There's a new apology template for famous men who act like pigs, which is why their apologies sound so similar.

You wouldn't be surprised to know that these somber statements of contrition are carefully tweaked by public relations consultants and attorneys.

"There are no words," said an apology attributed last week to fired "Today" host Matt Lauer, "to express my sorrow and regret for the pain I have caused others."

The very phrase "there are no words" can't be taken seriously unless the whole statement literally ends with the word "words."

It doesn't. It goes on: "To the people I have hurt, I am truly sorry."

Here they chose "truly" as the go-to adverb because it's perceived as more down-home and heartfelt than saying, "I am sincerely sorry," or "I am deeply sorry," or "I am profoundly sorry."

But, truly, Lauer is most sorry about the same thing Bill O'Reilly and Charlie Rose are sorry about: They got called out for sexually harassing women who worked with

them, and they lost their high-paying, high-profile jobs.

And if they hadn't gotten caught, they'd still be doing what they'd gotten away with for years and years.

O'Reilly paid out millions in settlement hush money but never feigned an apology, called his firing a "hit job" and at one point even implicated God in his downfall. Lauer opted for a more downcast version of the Charlie Rose response, framing the scandal as an overdue personal awakening.

"Repairing the damage will take a lot of time and soul searching, and I'm committed to beginning that effort," said the Lauer apology.

Unfortunately, it sounds like he's talking about the damage done to his career and personal life, not to the female colleagues he accosted. At least Rose's crisis team used the word "women" in his apology. As for the nod to "soul searching," that's boilerplate damage control. The main thing Lauer is searching right now is his own memory bank, trying to figure out who on the long list of former NBC co-workers might sue him or, worse, press charges.

His apology acknowledges his bringing shame "to the people I cherish dearly."

Crafting apologies for major media figures with sleazy offstage habits is challenging. The P.R. goal is to make them appear shocked and dismayed by their own

awful actions, though still morally redeemable.

That's a tough sell, especially as the allegations continue to pile up.

"Some of what is being said about me is untrue or mischaracterized," said Lauer's statement, "but there's enough truth in these stories to make me feel embarrassed and ashamed."

More doses of truth are probably coming. In advance Lauer and his team are checking all the requisite boxes: regret, sorrow, shame, embarrassment and a vow to change his ways.

"The last two days have forced me to take a very hard look at my own troubling flaws," his statement said. "It's been humbling."

First of all, "troubling" is the lamest possible way for him to depict his predatory romps. Disgusting, outrageous, unforgivable — perfectly sound, suitable adjectives.

Second, "humbling" is an egocentric reaction to the experience of being exposed for behavior that caused others to be humiliated, intimidated or afraid. Sickened is how Lauer should feel.

But these are just words.

He had to say something. So will the next one who gets caught. They'll each sit down with their lawyers and PR gurus and begin a long serious discussion about what words to use.

Even though none exists that will make it better.

### ALBANY, N.Y. Senator wants tougher rules for tour buses

A lawmaker is raising concerns about double-decker sightseeing buses in New York City, saying Monday that tougher regulations are needed to protect tourists, pedestrians and motorists on the busy streets of the nation's largest city.

Democratic state Sen. Brad Hoylman, of Manhattan, urged the state to beef up its rules for the tourist buses. He said several legal loopholes allow the buses to skirt the safety and regulatory rules that apply to other kinds of buses.

"Double-decker tour buses aren't only a nuisance to my constituents in Manhattan, but it turns out they also are evading regulatory scrutiny in New York, making them a potential disaster waiting to happen," Hoylman said.

Double-decker tourist buses are treated differently in state law than school, charter or public transit buses.

# CVS deal may mean more services

CVS Health wants to do much more than fill your prescription or jab your arm with an annual flu shot.

The second-largest U.S. drugstore chain is buying Aetna, the third-largest health insurer, in order to push much deeper into customer care. The evolution won't happen overnight, but in time, shoppers may find more clinics in CVS stores and more services they can receive through the network of nearly 10,000 locations that the company has built.

"They'll be pretty much a soup-to-nuts health company... except for the hospital part of it," said Craig Johnson, president of Customer Growth Partners, a retail consulting and research firm.

Patients also may find the CVS-Aetna combination much more involved in managing their care, especially for those with expensive

chronic conditions like diabetes. The bulked-up company also may gain more negotiating leverage over prescription drug prices, but it's far too early to say how much or whether that benefit will trickle down to customers.

The \$69 billion deal announced Sunday evening will push the drugstore chain more forcefully in a direction it has been heading for

years, according to Wall Street analysts. The company, which stopped selling tobacco products in 2014 to further burnish its image as a care provider, already runs about 1,100 clinics and has been steadily expanding the health care it offers.

The clinics started off as a place to treat basic health care needs like sinus infections or strep throat. Gradually, CVS added services like blood

draws or monitoring of chronic conditions such as high blood pressure and diabetes. Expect that trend to continue as the drugstore switches more from selling products in its stores to services that can't be bought online, where retailers face formidable competition from the likes of Amazon.

"I think over time you're going to see less of that front-store retail and more health care services

in their stores," said Jeff Jonas, a portfolio manager for Gabelli Funds who follows drugstores.

The mammoth acquisition pairs a company that runs more than 9,700 drugstores with an insurer covering around 22 million people. CVS Health Corp. is also one of the nation's biggest pharmacy benefit managers, processing more than a billion prescriptions a year for clients like large employers and insurers including Aetna Inc.

Analysts say the combined company could add more clinics and expand in-store services to include eye care or maybe centers for hearing aids. That could gradually turn CVS into a one-stop-shop for health care, a place where patients can get a hearing aid checked, then see a nurse practitioner and pick up prescriptions.

"If you think about it, we actually don't have anything like that," said Jefferies analyst Brian Tanquilt said.

## Facebook launches Messenger for kids

NEW YORK — Facebook is coming for your kids.

The social media giant is launching a messaging app for children to chat with their parents and with friends approved by their parents.

The free app is aimed at kids under 13, who can't yet have their own accounts under Facebook's rules, though they often do.

Messenger Kids comes with a slew of controls for parents. The service won't let children add their own friends or delete messages — only parents can do that.

Kids don't get a separate Facebook or Messenger account; rather, it's an extension of a parent's account.

Messenger Kids came out Monday in the U.S. as an app for Apple devices — the iPhone, iPad and iPod Touch.

Versions for Android and Amazon's tablets are coming later.

### A kids-focused experience

While children do use messaging and social media apps designed for teenagers and adults, those services aren't built for them, said Kristelle Lavalley, a children's psychology expert who advised Facebook on designing the service.

"The risk of exposure to things they were not developmentally prepared for is huge," she said.

Messenger Kids, meanwhile, "is a result of seeing what kids like, which is images, emoji and the like. Face filters and playful masks can be distracting for adults, Lavalley said, but for kids who are just learning how to form relationships

and stay in touch with parents digitally, they are ways to express themselves.

Lavalley, who is content strategist at the Center on Media and Child Health at Boston Children's Hospital and Harvard University, called Messenger Kids a "useful tool" that "makes parents the gatekeepers."

But she said that while Facebook made the app "with the best of intentions," it's not yet known how people will actually use it.

As with other tools Facebook has released in the past, intentions and real-world use do not always match up. Facebook's live video streaming feature, for example, has been used for plenty of innocuous and useful things, but also to stream crimes and suicides.

### Hooked on Facebook

Is Messenger Kids simply a way for Facebook to rope in the young ones?

Stephen Balkam, CEO of the non-profit Family Online Safety Institute, said "that train has left the station."

Federal law prohibits internet companies from collecting personal information on kids under 13 without their parents' permission and imposes restrictions on advertising to them.

This is why Facebook and many other social media companies prohibit younger kids from joining. Even so, Balkam said millions of kids under 13 are already on Facebook, with or without their parents' approval.

He said Facebook is trying to deal with the situation pragmatically by steering young Facebook users to a service designed for them.

## Lawmakers work to reconcile dueling tax bills

WASHINGTON — Significant differences separate the massive tax packages passed by the House and Senate on estate taxes, health care and a prized deduction for home mortgage interest, though Republican leaders are confident none is insurmountable.

Republicans are trying to pass the biggest rewrite of the tax system in more than 30 years.

“We’re looking forward to getting a final bill to the president’s desk, soon,” Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., said Monday.

Both versions would cut taxes by about \$1.5 trillion over the next decade while adding billions to the deficit. But they take different approaches.

“I don’t see anything here that is a deal-killer,” said Jon Traub, a former staff director for House Ways and Means Republicans who is now at Deloitte Tax. “Having come this far, I don’t know why they wouldn’t be able to finish.”

The Senate bill passed by a thin 51-49 margin, so any changes in that measure will have to be negotiated with the senators who care about that issue, said Marc Gerson, a former tax counsel for Ways and Means and now chair of the law firm Miller & Chevalier.

“Overall, I think that the Senate bill is kind of the base text,” Gerson said.

### Personal income tax rates

The House bill condenses current seven brackets to four: 12 percent, 25 percent, 35

percent and 39.6 percent. The Senate measure retains seven brackets but changes them and reduces the top bracket from 39.6 percent to 38.5 percent.

The Senate bill ends the reductions in 2026; they’re permanent in the House version.

It has long been a Republican goal to reduce the number of tax brackets, so House Republicans will have a strong argument on this issue.

The Senate bill has been criticized because the tax cuts for individuals are temporary while the tax cuts for corporations are permanent.

Senators, however, had to make some of the tax cuts temporary to comply with Senate rules that prevented Democrats from blocking the bill.

On Sunday, Trump’s budget director, Mick Mulvaney,

said he was comfortable with the Senate plan because he doubted that future congresses would let the tax cuts expire.

### Home mortgage interest deduction

The House version limits the deduction to interest paid on the first \$500,000 of a loan for new home purchases. The Senate retains the current \$1 million ceiling.

The housing industry is lobbying hard for the Senate version.

### Alternative minimum tax

The House bill repeals both the individual and the corporate AMT, which is designed to ensure that higher-earning

people pay at least some tax. The Senate bill scales back the individual AMT and keeps the corporate AMT.

House Majority Leader Kevin McCarthy, R-Calif., blasted the Senate plan on Monday, saying it would kill research and development because tax credits wouldn’t be worth as much.

Expect a strong push to adopt the House version or to make significant changes to the Senate bill.

“They will have to do something different than what the Senate did,” said Rohit Kumar, a former aide to Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky. Kumar is now at accounting firm PwC.

### Inheritance tax

Under current law, when

someone dies the estate owes taxes on the value of assets transferred to heirs above \$5.5 million for individuals, \$11 million for couples. The House bill initially doubles those limits and then repeals the entire tax after 2023. The Senate bill doubles the limits but does not repeal the tax.

This is an ideological battle. Very few estates pay the tax, but repealing it has long been a Republican goal. They call it the “death tax.”

“That’s one where it seems likely that the Senate prevails,” Kumar said. “I don’t say that lightly because (repealing it is) something Republicans have wanted to do.”

### Pass-through businesses

Millions of U.S. businesses “pass through” their income to individuals, who then pay personal income taxes on those earnings.

The House bill taxes many of them at 25 percent, plus creates a 9 percent rate for the first \$75,000 in earnings for some smaller pass-throughs.

The Senate bill lets people deduct 23 percent of their business earnings and then pay at their personal income tax rate on the remainder.

The House plan is more generous but the Senate plan was the result of delicate, last-minute negotiations that secured some of the final votes to pass the bill.

“The pass-through stuff was well-litigated in the Senate,” Kumar said. “If they do something different than what was in the Senate bill, they will have to check with the people who care.”

### UNITED NATIONS UN political chief heads to North Korea on rare visit

The U.N. political chief is heading to North Korea on a rare four-day visit at the invitation of the government for a wide-ranging discussion on policy issues “of mutual interest and concern.”

Greek police say they have arrested a Serbo-Croatian man suspected of being involved in an international smuggling ring importing drugs from Latin America to Europe, after seizing 300 pounds of cocaine from the Athens apartment he was living in.

Police said Monday the 33-year-old man, who wasn’t named, was arrested Saturday and charged with felony drug offenses, while authorities were also seeking a 35-year-old Serb man believed to be an accomplice.

Police estimated the drug ring’s profits were more than 15 million euros based on the quantity of drugs seized and the amount already trafficked.

### MOSCOW Russian parliament to bar US media named foreign agents

Russian lawmakers on Monday drafted new regulations that would bar U.S. media designated as foreign agents from accessing parliament’s lower house. The move is retaliation for the withdrawal of a Russian state-funded television station’s credentials in the U.S.

The State Duma’s procedural committee proposed that the house vote on the measure Wednesday. The upper house, the Federation Council, plans to take similar action later this month.

In the U.S., a committee governing Capitol Hill access for broadcast journalists withdrew credentials for Russia’s state-funded RT television after it complied with a U.S. demand that it

register as a foreign agent.

### BATON ROUGE, LA. Trial delayed for man who tried to get Trump’s returns

A federal trial has been postponed for a Louisiana private investigator accused of trying to illegally obtain Donald Trump’s tax returns during last year’s presidential campaign.

Jury selection was scheduled to begin Monday for Jordan Hamlett’s federal trial, but a filing from the court says it must be delayed due to an “unforeseen conflict with the court.”

The new trial date is Dec. 11. The 32-year-old Lafayette resident is charged with misusing a Social Security number while trying unsuccessfully to access Trump’s tax information through a security weakness in a U.S.

Department of Education financial aid website.

### SYRACUSE, N.Y. Lawyer: Coach arrested in NY with teen to return to Florida

The lawyer for a 27-year-old soccer coach accused of running away with a teenage girl says his client wants to return to Florida as soon as possible to face charges.

Rian Rodriguez was taken into custody in suburban Syracuse on Friday night on a Florida charge of interference with child custody.

He had a court hearing Monday to determine if he’d be extradited.

Officials say the 17-year-old girl sneaked out of her home in Fort White, Florida, on Nov. 25. Her parents flew to Syracuse to get her Saturday.

# Trump bemoans treatment of Flynn

WASHINGTON — Lobbing new criticism at the special counsel's Russia investigation, President Donald Trump said Monday he feels "very badly" for former national security adviser Michael Flynn, who last week pleaded guilty to lying to the FBI about reaching out to the Russians on the president's behalf.

"I think it's a shame," Trump said of Flynn's situation, adding that it's "very unfair" and that Flynn had "led a very strong life."

Trump tried to contrast Flynn's treatment with that of his Democratic presidential rival, Hillary Clinton, who he said "lied many times to the FBI and nothing happened."

"Flynn lied and they destroyed his life," Trump said.

The FBI didn't conclude that Clinton lied to agents, however. Former FBI Director James Comey testified last year that agents found Clinton to be truthful in her interview, telling a House committee, "We have no basis to conclude she lied to the FBI."

Flynn is cooperating with special counsel Robert Mueller's investigation.

Even as Trump sought to minimize Flynn's misdeeds, the Kremlin insisted that Flynn's conversations with the Russian ambassador to the U.S. had not influenced Russian President Vladimir Putin's response to sanctions imposed by Trump's predecessor.

Flynn was forced to resign in February following reports that Obama administration officials had informed Trump's team that Flynn had discussed sanctions

with Russian Ambassador Sergei Kislyak, a fact at odds with the public assertions of Vice President Mike Pence. Putin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said Monday it was "absurd" to suggest that the phone conversation could have influenced Putin's decision and added that "such requests couldn't have been passed on" to him.

Trump, who spoke to reporters Monday as he left the White House to head to Utah, unleashed a string of tweets over the weekend in which he criticized the FBI and raised questions about the federal investigation into Russian election meddling and possible ties to his campaign.

In one of his messages, Trump again denied that he directed Comey to stop investigating Flynn.

Trump questioned the direction of the federal law enforcement agency and wrote that after Comey, whom Trump fired in May, the FBI's reputation is "in Tatters — worst in History!" He vowed to "bring it back to greatness." The president also retweeted a post saying new FBI Director Chris Wray "needs to clean house."

Eric Holder, a U.S. attorney general under President Barack Obama,

tweeted in response: "Nope. Not letting this go. The FBI's reputation is not in 'tatters'. It's composed of the same dedicated men and women who have always worked there and who do a great, apolitical job. You'll find integrity and honesty at FBI headquarters and not at 1600 Penn Ave right now."

Trump seized on reports that a veteran FBI counterintelligence agent was removed from Mueller's team last summer after the discovery of an exchange of text messages that were viewed as potentially anti-Trump. The agent, Peter Strzok, had also worked on the investigation of Clinton's use of a private email server.

Peter Carr, a spokesman for Mueller, said Mueller removed Strzok from the team "immediately upon learning of the allegations." He would not elaborate on the nature of the accusations.

Trump tweeted Sunday: "Tainted (no, very dishonest?) FBI 'agent's' role in Clinton probe under review." Led Clinton Email probe." In a separate tweet, he wrote: "Report: 'ANTI-TRUMP FBI AGENT LED CLINTON EMAIL PROBE' Now it all starts to make sense!"

# Trump offers full support, endorses Republican Moore

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump formally endorsed embattled Republican Roy Moore in the Alabama Senate race on Monday, looking past sexual misconduct allegations against the GOP candidate to argue that Moore's vote is needed in Congress.

Trump tweeted early Monday that "Democrats refusal to give even one vote for massive Tax Cuts is why we need Republican Roy Moore to win in Alabama."

Trump also spoke with Moore by phone. White House Spokesman Raj Shah said the two discussed the state of the Alabama Senate race and that the president "endorsed Judge Moore's campaign."

It was Trump's strongest show of support for Moore since allegations surfaced that the candidate had sexually assaulted teenage girls decades ago, including one who said he molested her when she was 14 and he was in his 30s. Many national Republicans have called on Moore to step aside in the wake of multiple sexual assault and harassment allegations.

Shortly after Trump's tweet, Moore responded on Twitter: "Thankful for President Trump's support. The America First agenda will #MAGA. Can't wait to help him #DrainTheSwamp."

Trump also had assailed

Moore's Democratic rival Doug Jones, tweeting that "Putting a Pelosi/Schumer Liberal Puppet Jones into office in Alabama would hurt our great Republican Agenda of low on taxes, tough on crime, strong on military and borders...& so much more."

Trump for weeks was silent after the allegations against Moore surfaced, and the White House has said he had no plans to make campaign appearances before the Dec. 12 election. But Trump in recent days has raised doubts about the allegations against Moore, and he has agreed to headline a campaign-style rally in Pensacola, Florida — less than 20 miles from the Alabama border — just four days before the Alabama election.

And Trump tweeted of Moore on Monday: "We need his vote on stopping

crime, illegal immigration, Border Wall, Military, Pro Life, V.A., Judges 2nd Amendment and more. No to Jones, a Pelosi/Schumer Puppet!"

White House legislative director Marc Short told CNN that Trump was "making the case to the people of Alabama that it's a factor to consider that not one Democrat has been able to find time to say they support" the GOP tax plan.

Short said Trump's point is that "when allegations arise 38 years later, when Roy Moore has been a very public figure for those 38 years, he's run multiple times statewide in Alabama, the people in Alabama have an opportunity to choose and make some decisions about Roy Moore's character. Putting all that together, he's encouraging the people of Alabama to make the right decision."

Civil Liberties Union's Immigrants' Rights Project. The ACLU is representing some opponents of the ban.

Just two justices, Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Sonia Sotomayor, noted their disagreement with court orders allowing the latest policy to take full effect.

The new policy is not expected to cause the chaos that ensued at airports when Trump rolled out his first ban without warning in January.

The ban applies to travelers from Chad, Iran,

Libya, Somalia, Syria and Yemen. Lower courts had said people from those nations with a claim of a "bona fide" relationship with someone in the United States could not be kept out of the country. Grandparents, cousins and other relatives were among those courts said could not be excluded.

The courts were borrowing language the Supreme Court itself came up with last summer to allow partial enforcement of an earlier version of the ban.

Now, those relationships will no longer provide a blanket exemption from the ban, although visa officials

can make exceptions on a case-by-case basis.

The justices offered no explanation for their order, but the administration had said that blocking the full ban was causing "irreparable harm" because the policy is based on legitimate national security and foreign policy concerns.

In lawsuits filed in Hawaii and Maryland, federal courts said the updated travel ban violated federal immigration law. The travel policy also applies to travelers from North Korea and to some Venezuelan government officials and their families, but the lawsuits did not challenge those restrictions. Also

unaffected are refugees. A temporary ban on refugees expired in October.

All the rulings so far have been on a preliminary basis. The San Francisco-based 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals and the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Richmond, Virginia, will be holding arguments on the legality of the ban this week.

Both courts are dealing with the issue on an accelerated basis, and the Supreme Court noted it expects those courts to reach decisions "with appropriate dispatch."

Quick resolution by appellate courts would allow the Supreme Court to hear and decide the issue this term, by the end of June.

dead turtle, so I thought I would pick it up and turn it in," she said. "So I dove down and got it, pulled it up and it seemed lifeless."

The turtle didn't move as she unwrapped the line.

It didn't move as she swam it back to shore. It didn't move when it was carried out of the water.

And it still didn't move, almost 10 minutes later, when she brought it to the lifeguard tower to radio the right people.

"I'm standing at the lifeguard tower and this lifeless turtle just goes whooooo," she said, miming a big breath. "And we all were startled, looked at each other, and immediately said 'Lazarus!'"

A little known fact about sea turtles is they can hold their breath for hours if they stay completely inactive.

One round of antibiotics later, Lazzie was ready to head back to the Gulf when released Monday morning.

"He's been feisty the entire time so it was nice to see him take off," said Lauren Albrittitan, Gulf World's stranding coordinator. "It was a nice day for it. You could see him going the whole way out."

The water was a clear aquamarine so the small crowd could see every paddle and cheer every breath as Lazzie swam along the shore for a few

minutes before disappearing into the surf and over a sandbar.

Standing in the center of the crowd was Von-Blankenburg Siegfried, who coincidentally had been passing by.

"I just happened to be here," VonBlankenburg Siegfried said, noting things come full circle. "I was one of only one or two people who would ever be down there (the first time)."

Albrittitan said she hopes people who came to the release and heard Lazzie's story leave with a better understanding of conservation.

"Hopefully, the more people who get out here to encourage us and see them and witness this great event will encourage them to take conservation messages back home," Albrittitan said. "Like cleaning up the beaches and supporting the local responders."

This past summer was particularly busy for the institute, with a large amount of turtle strandings, particularly loggerheads.

Many of them were found at the pier, which likely is at least partially a result of increased coordination between the institute and pier staff.

Albrittitan said most of the turtles have been returned to the Gulf.

Now, the Gulf World staff is gearing up for the cold stun season, which is when temperatures suddenly dip in the waters — normally the bays locally — chilling the turtles to the point they need rescuing.

Anyone who finds a stranded or dead dolphin or sea turtle, or who sees one of these animals acting strangely, should report it to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission at 1-888-404-3922.

Meyers and Turntime pointed their guns at Buchanan.

Buchanan's roommate fired at least two rounds, with one striking and killing Meyers.

Police said Turntime and West immediately fled the scene in Meyers' truck, but were spotted by witnesses and quickly apprehended on Front Beach Road.

Buchanan and the roommate, who has not been named by Panama City Beach police, remained on scene and "cooperated with this investigation."

Police learned that before they arrived, Buchanan gave her

remaining narcotics and money to Jeffrey Amistad Clark, 25, of Panama City Beach.

Buchanan was arrested and charged with possession of marijuana with intent to distribute, tampering with evidence and possession of paraphernalia. Clark was arrested and charged with tampering with evidence.

All four have been booked into the Bay County Jail and police said more charges are anticipated.

Neighbors in the complex said they heard two shots fired, and one man, who asked not to be named, said he saw a man flee the apartments by hopping from balcony to balcony with a rifle.

The crime scene started at the apartment complex and stretched to the

Summer Breeze neighborhood about half a mile away, where Meyers' truck was pulled over and searched by police.

This is not the first time there have been issues at 79 West Apartments.

In March, 43-year-old Shawn Anthony Dumitras of Villa Rica, Georgia, was shot and killed by police at the complex.

PCBPD officials reported Dumitras had a history of drug trafficking and firearm offenses.

At the time of his death, they reported, he had an active warrant from the U.S. Marshals Service for drug trafficking.

He became hostile when approached by police.

Neighbors also said there are consistent problems with drugs at the complex.

## Geer's last-second shot lifts NBH past Freeport

PANAMA CITY — Josselin Geer converted a three-point play with 2.1 seconds left and North Bay Haven rallied from a 14-point second-half deficit to take a 39-37 victory over Freeport on Monday night.

Geer scored 26 points to lead the Buccaneers, who improved to 3-1 on the season. Adelle Strickland had 12 points for the Bulldogs, who dropped to 2-4. Caylee Bates added nine points for Freeport and Kameron Light seven.

Freeport led 30-16 midway through the third quarter, but

NBH finished on a 6-1 run to get to within nine points going into the fourth. The Buccaneers took the lead 35-34 on a baseline jumper by Hannah Jones with under a minute to play, but Light's driving bank shot put the Bulldogs back on top 36-35 with 16 seconds on the clock.

After Geer and Strickland exchanged free throws, NBH took the ball out from under its own basket with 9 seconds to play. Jones got the ball in the backcourt and passed ahead to Geer, who drove into the lane and drew contact while banking the shot in to put the Bucs back on top. Out of timeouts, Freeport was unable to get the ball up

the court in time to get a last-second shot off.

NBH coach Kevin Jacobs said he was proud of his team for finding a way to win and for his two seniors who hooked up on the game-winning play.

"We have seniors that when we needed to make a big play they made it," he said. "That was a big pass by Hannah to Josselin and Josselin makes a great shot and a free throw. I thought Freeport played really well. If they make a free throw or two, we wouldn't have been in that situation."

The Bulldogs struggled mightily from the free throw line, converting just 5 of 15 for the night and 2 of 7 in

the fourth quarter. NBH took advantage by outscoring Freeport 17-6 in the final eight minutes, with 10 of those points coming from Geer.

The senior guard was almost all of her team's offense early on, scoring 14 of the Buccaneers' 16 points in the first half and seeing her team trail 22-16 going into the break. Freeport built on the lead in the third quarter with an 8-0 run, getting a driving bucket from Bates, a basket from Strickland after a turnover, a bucket inside by Bates, and another from Strickland after a steal to

## Unbeaten FSU blasts Florida

GAINESVILLE — Terance Mann scored 25 points, CJ Walker added 17 and Florida State upset No. 5 Florida 83-66 on Monday night to remain undefeated.

The Seminoles (7-0) extended their winning streak against the Gators (5-2) to four, their longest in the 68-game history of the series.

Florida State's length and athleticism posed problems all night. The Seminoles altered shots, forced turnovers, controlled the boards and didn't allow Florida many clean looks, especially from long range.

The Gators entered the game with the nation's top offense, having averaged 99.6 points in their first six games. But they went cold down the stretch against top-ranked Duke in the Phil Knight Invitational in Portland, Oregon, last week, and never found a rhythm against the Seminoles.

Florida blew a 17-point lead with 10 minutes left against the Blue Devils and lost 87-84. Big man Marvin Bagley III dominated Florida inside in that one.

The 6-foot-6 Mann was the main culprit Monday.

Mann made 11 of 17 shots and added eight rebounds. Every time Florida looked like it would make a run, Mann answered on the other end. The junior had a tip-in and two three-point plays in the final 8 minutes.

With Mann leading the way, Florida State outrebounded Florida 51-34, including 23-11 on the offensive glass. The Seminoles also outscored the Gators 36-20 in the paint and 12-2 on fast breaks.

Florida guards Jalen Hudson (16 points), KeVaughn Allen (15), Egor Koulechov (11) and Chris Chiozza were a combined 13 of 40 from the field, including 4 of 20 from 3-point range. Chiozza was scoreless until making three free throws down the stretch.

Equally troubling for the Gators: A season-high 17 turnovers.

### Big picture

**Florida State:** The Seminoles lost Jonathan Isaac, Dwayne Bacon and Xavier Rathan-Mayes from last year's NCAA Tournament team, and in some regards, look better. They have enough talent and depth to give opponents fits, especially on the boards and in transition.

**Florida:** The Gators are in survival mode until 6-foot-11 center John Egbunu returns from a knee injury. Egbunu averaged 7.8 points and 6.6 rebounds last season before tearing a ligament in his left knee at Auburn in February. The senior is expected to return in mid-January, and Florida believes he again will be an imposing force in the paint.

## Steelers pull out 23-20 win over Bengals

CINCINNATI — Chris Boswell kicked a field goal on the final play shortly after Antonio Brown caught a 6-yard touchdown pass — taking a hit to the head while landing in the end zone — and the Pittsburgh Steelers pulled off another improbable comeback against the Cincinnati Bengals, rallying for a 23-20 victory Monday night.

Down 17-0 early, the Steelers (10-2) extended their best start since 2004 in a physical game with a couple frightening injuries. Brown's touchdown tied it at 20 with 3:51 to go, setting up Boswell's 38-yard field goal, his second straight winner in the closing seconds.

The Bengals (5-7) simply can't find a way to beat their Ohio River rival, not even after getting off to the big early lead. They have dropped six straight against Pittsburgh, including the Steelers' 18-16 playoff win at Paul Brown Stadium that included another Bengals meltdown.

Pittsburgh lost leading tackler Ryan Shazier to a back injury in the first quarter. The linebacker was taken off the field on a cart and taken to a hospital for evaluation. Bengals linebacker Vontaze Burfict was carted off in the fourth quarter after Juju Smith-Schuster threw a high hit, then taunted him by walking over him.

# Walker scores 29 in return, Hornets top Magic

Kemba Walker had 29 points and seven assists in his return from a shoulder injury, Dwight Howard reached a rebounding milestone and the Charlotte Hornets defeated the Orlando Magic 104-94 on Monday to snap a four-game losing streak.

Walker, who missed the previous two games, was the spark plug all night for the Hornets and became the first player in franchise history with 200 career 20-point games. He made all 14 free throw attempts.

Howard had 12 points and nine rebounds, moving past former Charlotte coach Paul Silas and Dikembe Mutombo for 19th on the all-time NBA rebounding list.

The Hornets raced to a 54-45 lead at halftime behind 13 points from Walker and 11 from Frank Kaminsky, but the Magic trimmed an 11-point deficit to one to start the fourth quarter.

The game turned early in the fourth when Marreese Speights lost his cool.

Speights received a flagrant foul when he shoved Cody Zeller to the ground following a dunk by Kaminsky, giving the Hornets two foul shots and the ball. Zeller made both and Jeremy Lamb was fouled on the ensuing possession, essentially resulting in a six-point swing that allowed the Hornets to take a 86-76 lead.

Walker made sure the Hornets didn't fall apart down the stretch.

He went 1-on-4 on one transition opportunity, but still found his way to the basket for a layup while drawing a foul.

The Hornets were coached by assistant Stephen Silas after head coach Steve Clifford came down with an illness.

"I spent a lot more time delving into the stats, delving into our last game, and really making sure I'm prepared for situations — late-game situations — that sort of thing," Silas said before the game. "It was a long day."

## PACERS 115, KNICKS 97:

Thaddeus Young scored 20 points to lead seven Indiana players in double figures as the Pacers routed the short-handed New York Knicks. Bojan Bogdanovic scored 19 points and Victor Oladipo added 16 for the Pacers (13-11), who led by 26 at half and 95-65 after three quarters. The Knicks (11-12) were without leading scorers Kristaps Porzingis (25.8 ppg) and Tim Hardaway Jr. (17.8 ppg) for

a second consecutive loss. Porzingis is dealing with a sprained right ankle and illness and Hardaway has a lower left leg injury. Michael Beasley led the Knicks with 13 points.

## SUNS 115, 76ERS 101:

Devin Booker scored 46 points and TJ Warren added 25 to lead the Phoenix Suns to a win over the Philadelphia 76ers. Booker made 17 of 32 shots and hit four 3-pointers, including three in the fourth quarter that helped the Suns put away a Sixers team that played one of their worst games of the season. Booker scored 32 points on 11 of 17 shooting in the second half. Joel Embiid had 22 points and 12 rebounds and Ben Simmons, battling an illness, scored 20 points. JJ Redick led the Sixers with 25 points. Redick rallied the Sixers from 17 down and hit consecutive 3s in the fourth that sliced the deficit to five.

## NETS 110, HAWKS 90:

Caris LeVert scored a season-high 17 points, Rondae Hollis-Jefferson had 16 points and the Brooklyn Nets used a strong third quarter to grab momentum and beat the Atlanta Hawks. Brooklyn, avenging Saturday's home loss to Atlanta, had everything working in its favor in the second half. It began the third trailing by one but went on a 17-0 run to go ahead 70-54 on DeMarre Carroll's 3-pointer. The lead swelled to 29 in the fourth as the Nets earned their largest win of the season. Dennis Schroder finished with 19 points and Kent Bazemore and DeAndre' Bembry each had 13 for Atlanta, which dropped to 5-18, second-worst in the NBA. The Nets improved to 5-9 on the road. They didn't win their fifth away from home last season until early March.

## CELTICS 111, BUCKS 100:

Kyrie Irving had 19 of his 32 points in the second half, helping offset a 40-point

night by Giannis Antetokounmpo as the Boston Celtics held off the Milwaukee Bucks. Al Horford added 20 points, nine rebounds and eight assists. Jayson Tatum chipped in 17 points to help Boston improve to an NBA-best 21-4. The Celtics have won five of their last six. It was the third 40-point game this season for Antetokounmpo. Khris Middleton added 19 points while Eric Bledsoe had 18 points. Boston led by as many as 20 in the third quarter, before the Bucks stormed back, thanks in large part to Antetokounmpo. He almost singlehandedly kept the Bucks in it, scoring 16 points in the period and trimming Boston's lead to 88-81 entering the fourth.

## CAVALIERS 113, BULLS 91:

Dwyane Wade and Kevin Love each scored 24 points, LeBron James had 23 and the Cleveland Cavaliers beat the Chicago Bulls for their 12th straight win. Backed by a trio of stars, the Cavaliers matched their longest winning streak since the 2014-15 season. Wade made 9 of 13 shots in his first game in Chicago since agreeing to a buyout with his hometown team in late September. Love grabbed 13 rebounds and made 8 of 13 from the field. James finished 9 of 15 with seven rebounds and six assists. The Cavaliers shot just under 52 percent. Kris Dunn led Chicago with 15 points. Robin Lopez and Justin Holiday scored 14 apiece as the Bulls fell to 3-19 with their ninth straight loss.

## GRIZZLIES 95, TIMBERWOLVES 92:

Marc Gasol scored 21 points, Tyreke Evans added 16 — including two key free throws with 12.7 seconds left — and the Memphis Grizzlies snapped an 11-game skid with a victory over the Minnesota Timberwolves. Memphis, which hadn't won since Nov. 7, had to wait a bit longer after Evans' free throws. On the

ensuing possession, Jimmy Butler's off-balance, 26-footer over Andrew Harrison bounced off the backboard and grazed the rim, snapping the Grizzlies skid. Butler led Minnesota with 30 points, his second-straight game with at least 30. Taj Gibson finished with 14 points, while Andrew Wiggins and Jeff Teague added 12 points each. The game was close throughout with 14 lead changes and 12 ties, the last tie coming at 86-all with 5:43 remaining. After a pair of free throws from Gasol, Memphis never surrendered the lead the rest of the way, although the margin didn't reach more than three points.

## WARRIORS 125, PELICANS 115:

Stephen Curry had 31 points and 11 assists but sprained his ankle late in the game, and Golden State came back from 21 points down late in the first half to defeat New Orleans. Klay Thompson scored 22 points and Kevin Durant and Draymond Green each had 19 for the Warriors, who won their fourth straight. After it was over, Curry went for X-rays on his right ankle. Jure Holiday scored 34 and E'Twaun Moore added a career-high 27 for the Pelicans, who lost for the fourth time in five games.

## MAVERICKS 122, NUGGETS 105:

Harrison Barnes scored 22 points, Dennis Smith Jr. added 20 and Dallas beat short-handed Denver. Six Dallas players scored in double figures as the Mavericks earned their second straight wire-to-wire win after beating the Clippers by 26 on Saturday. Dallas had its highest scoring game of the season and has won five of eight since starting 2-14. Will Barton led Denver with 23 points, Jamal Murray added 22 and Gary Harris had 21. Denver played without two-thirds of its starting frontcourt as Paul Millsap (left wrist injury) and Nikola Jokic (sprained left ankle) remained out.

## SPURS 96, PISTONS 93:

LaMarcus Aldridge had 17 points and 10 rebounds and the San Antonio Spurs rallied to beat the Detroit Pistons. Reggie Jackson had 27 points for Detroit, which led by as many as nine points before dropping its third straight. The Spurs were without Kawhi Leonard and Kyle Anderson, who has started in place of Leonard all season. Rudy Gay, making his first start in place of Anderson, had 12 points, 10 rebounds and four assists. His final points came on a three-point play that gave San Antonio an 88-86 lead with 3:39 remaining.

# Duke still unanimous No. 1, Notre Dame drops to No. 9

Notre Dame won the Maui Invitational with an impressive comeback against Wichita State.

The Fighting Irish didn't fare as well against another top 10 team, leading a shuffling at the top half of The Associated Press Top 25 poll.

Duke (10-0) received all 65 first-place votes in the poll released Monday after a pair of easy victories, its second straight week as the unanimous No. 1. The next three spots also remained the same from last week: Kansas, Michigan State and Villanova.

Notre Dame was No. 5 last week, but dropped to No. 9 following its 81-63 loss to the Spartans.

"They come at you with fresh bodies, they just keep coming at you and it takes its toll," Notre Dame coach Mike Brey said of Michigan State.

Florida moved up to No. 5 despite not playing last week, followed by Wichita State, Texas A&M, Kentucky and Miami at No. 10 behind the Irish.

Notre Dame (7-1) pulled off an impressive comeback in Maui to beat Wichita State for its first title in paradise.

The Irish were no match for Michigan State last week, taken out of rhythm by the Spartans while falling into an early hole. Notre Dame did make a push in the second half, but Michigan State pushed back to run away with it.

The Irish bounced back to beat St. Francis Brooklyn on Sunday despite the ejections of preseason All-American Bonzie Colson (flagrant two foul) and Brey. The pair ended up in the locker room watching the rest of the game on Colson's phone.

"That's new territory for me," Brey said. "That was very unusual."

## Pack on the rise

Nevada has made big strides in Eric Musselman's three seasons and this was expected to be his best team yet.

A year after making it to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2007, the Wolf Pack were picked as the favorites to win the Mountain West Conference title behind Jordan Caroline and Lindsey Drew.

Nevada has lived up to expectations so far, winning its first eight games for its best start as a Division I program (since 1970). The Wolf Pack were No. 22 in this week's poll for their first ranking since finishing the 2006-07 season at No. 15.

"It's great to see that we have that record now, but we have to keep improving and don't want to stop now and be 8-1 or 8-2," Caroline said after the Wolf Pack shook off an ugly first half to beat UC Irvine 76-65 last week. "We're rolling and we have to keep moving along."

## Rising fast

Xavier had the biggest rise in this week's poll, moving up eight spots to No. 13 after a pair of Top-25 wins. The Musketeers beat No. 16 Baylor 76-63 and No. 11 Cincinnati 89-76 last week.

Arizona State moved up four spots to No. 20 after being ranked last week for the first time since 2009.

## Longest slide

Louisville dropped out of the poll from No. 17 after losing to Purdue and Seton Hall.

USC is down 11 spots to No. 25 following consecutive losses and Baylor fell seven places to No. 23 after losses to Xavier and Wichita State. Cincinnati was down six spots to No. 17 following its loss to Xavier.

## Top 25 Playoff Takeaways: Tide-Tigers III; Mayfield's legacy

For the third straight season, Alabama and Clemson will meet in the College Football Playoff. For the first time ever, Georgia and Oklahoma will play, and it will be in the College Football Playoff.

The field was set Sunday and it is probably going to be a while for fans who thought Ohio State, or maybe some other team, should have been in over Alabama to get past the selection of the Crimson Tide.

Too bad, because the games look pretty good. Recent history suggests Alabama and Clemson in the Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 will be entertaining. Rarely in his college career has Baker Mayfield failed to deliver for Oklahoma, and Georgia brings one of the best defenses the Heisman front-runner has ever faced in a brilliant career to the Rose Bowl.

Simply having the games back on New Year's Day is probably reason for celebration.

Twenty-five thoughts, takedowns and takeaways on the playoffs:

**1.** Alabama vs. Ohio State. In the end, Alabama got in for being Alabama, the surest best in college football. When choosing between other flawed choices, 10 years of dominance gets the Tide the benefit of the doubt.

**2.** The problem with trying to predict the committee's tendencies is that after four years we're still learning those tendencies.

**3.** It is probably safe to say now that we should not get too hung up on conference championships, which begs the question: Why play conference championship games?

**4.** Money mostly. They are quality inventory for television partners and showcase events for the conference. But as conference tournaments have become just more games for the NCAA basketball selection committee to consider, the conference championship game in football is becoming the same. Sometimes it will be helpful. Sometimes not.

**5.** So how do conferences balance the desire to play a lucrative championship with a desire to create a fair and equitable way to determine a champion and best position teams to reach the playoff? The Big 12 seems to have provided the answer. You don't balance them. You just play

the conference title game, cash the checks and live with the consequences.

**6.** It's becoming pretty apparent that the ideal way to reach the playoff is to bulk up the resume with 12 regular-season games, but come up just short of making the conference title game. Then take a weekend off and be one of the leaders in the clubhouse as the other contenders pound each other on championship weekend and maybe end up with, say, two losses.

**7.** It is a weird quirk that will continue to be an issue that undermines the selection process in the eyes of many fans.

**8.** So eight-team playoff? There is no appetite for it among those who lead the power conferences. The way the revenue is divvied up, not making the playoff only cost the Big Ten \$2 million dollars.

**9.** As long as the Big Ten gets the Rose Bowl two out of every three years, occasionally getting shut out of the playoff isn't the worst thing in the world.

**10.** As he has done before, Alabama coach Nick Saban said he would like to see all the Power Five teams play just Power Five teams and maybe even the same number of conference games.

**11.** Stanford coach David Shaw made a similar comment — as he has done before — wanting to see uniformity throughout college football. At least in terms of number of conference games and not scheduling FCS teams.

**12.** A few problems with all of that. First, Saban has one of the few college teams that has enough depth and talent to withstand 12 regular-season games against Power Five competition. For the three-quarters of Power Five teams that have no shot of ever winning a national title, this is a bad idea.

**13.** Uniformity in college football makes it look more like the NFL. Not only does that take a lot of the fun out of college football, it also makes the whole billion-dollar enterprise look more like a business than something that belongs embedded in institutions of higher learning. The antitrust lawyers know this, too.

**14.** Now about those playoff games. With Deshaun Watson in the NFL, don't expect the back-and-forth scoring the last two meetings between the Tigers and Tide have provided. The aggregate so far: Alabama 76, Clemson 75.

**15.** Kelly Bryant has been

excellent in his first season as Watson's replacement for Clemson, but the junior is a long way from the first-round draft pick and Heisman runner-up. Bryant has 13 touchdown passes and 646 yards rushing (3.7 yards per carry).

**16.** A tip for Alabama defensive coordinator Jeremy Pruitt: When Clemson really needs a play, find No. 13 Hunter Renfrow. The former walk-on has 18 catches for 180 yards and four touchdowns in the last two national championship games against Alabama.

**17.** A tip for Clemson defensive coordinator Brent Venables: O.J. Howard is gone, but don't lose track of the Alabama tight ends.

**18.** By the time Clemson and Alabama play on Jan. 1, the Crimson Tide's linebackers should be as healthy as they have been since the start of the season. The Tide won't get Shaun Dion Hamilton back but Mack Wilson, Terrell Lewis and Christian Miller should all be far more effective since missing significant time during the regular season.

**19.** Alabama quarterback Jalen Hurts led his team to a championship game as a freshman, but there are still Tide fans who doubt him. Tough crowd.

**20.** Oklahoma comes into the playoff with the worst defense by far but the best quarterback by far among the four teams.

**21.** Baker Mayfield will win the Heisman next weekend and then have just one thing left to put him among the great college quarterbacks of all-time: A national title.

**22.** Oklahoma is 7-3 in its last 10 games against the SEC, including a rout of Auburn last year in the Sugar Bowl.

**23.** Georgia's Jake Fromm has the third-most touchdown passes in the SEC with 21. He also has the ninth-most passing attempts with 230. The freshman has been very good, but the two games he has thrown his most passes were Georgia's loss to Auburn (28) and its one-point win at Notre Dame (29).

**24.** Roquan Smith showed in the SEC championship why he might be the best linebacker in the country.

**25.** And the winners will be: Clemson and Georgia. With both campuses less than two hours away from Atlanta, tickets for the title game on Jan. 8 at Mercedes-Benz Stadium will be impossible to find.

# Georgia, Auburn split top awards on AP All-SEC team

ATLANTA — After meeting in the Southeastern Conference championship game, Georgia and Auburn split the top awards on The Associated Press All-Southeastern Conference team released Monday.

Auburn running back Kerryon Johnson was picked as the offensive player of the year, while Georgia linebacker Roquan Smith was selected as the top defensive player. Smith was MVP of the title game, grabbing two fumble recoveries in the Bulldogs' 28-7 victory.

Georgia's Kirby Smart got the nod as SEC coach of the year after leading his team to the College Football Playoff in just his second season between the hedges. Auburn quarterback Jarrett Stidham, a transfer from Baylor, and Georgia freshman quarterback Jake Fromm shared the award for newcomer of the year.

Alabama, which also claimed a spot in the four-team national playoff despite failing to win the SEC West, led the way with eight players voted to the first team: receiver Calvin Ridley, offensive tackle Jonah Williams, tackle Ross Pierschbacher, center Bradley Bozeman, defensive tackle Da'Ron Payne, linebacker Rashaan Evans and safeties Minkah Fitzpatrick and Ronnie Harrison.

There were no unanimous selections to the team. Fitzpatrick and Auburn offensive guard Braden Smith came the closest to a sweep, each picked on all but one ballot.

## IOC weighs Russian Olympic ban, risks provoking Putin

LAUSANNE, Switzerland — Russia could be banned from competing at the Pyeongchang Olympics, a prospect that President Vladimir Putin has already warned would be humiliating for his country.

The decision will come on Tuesday when the International Olympic Committee executive board meets in Lausanne, less than nine weeks before the games open on Feb. 9 in South Korea.

The 14-member board, which includes two Americans, has received a so-far confidential report from an IOC-appointed panel. That panel was asked to assess if Russian state agencies did organize the doping program used at the 2014 Sochi Olympics. IOC President Thomas Bach, a German lawyer long seen as an ally of Russia, is scheduled to announce the decision at 7:30 p.m. (1830 GMT). It might not be the last word, however. Russia can challenge any IOC sanction by appealing to the Court of Arbitration for Sport.

Here is a look at the case, and the possible results:

### Punishment options

- A total ban on Russia competing in Pyeongchang.
- Some Russian athletes compete, if judged to be clean under long-term doping controls operating to international standards. They would be classed as neutral athletes competing under the Olympic

flag, and would be denied hearing the Russian anthem if they win Olympic gold. Those rules were imposed on Russian athletes at the athletics world championships in August.

Putin has said either of those outcomes would be humiliating, and could provoke a Russian boycott.

• The IOC board could ask the seven governing bodies for Winter Olympic sports to decide on individual athlete eligibility. That compromise applied to the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Olympics.

• Impose a fine on the Russian Olympic committee. Tens of millions of dollars could go toward anti-doping work worldwide.

A financial penalty would be "grossly inappropriate," according to Joseph de Pencier, chief executive of iNADO, a global group of national anti-doping agencies.

### Timeline

A big red flag regarding Russian doping went up in July 2013, weeks before Moscow hosted the athletics worlds. British newspaper the Mail on Sunday reported wrongdoing by Grigory Rodchenkov and the Moscow laboratory he directed, but its claims were mostly ignored. In December 2014, 10 months after the Sochi Olympics, German network ARD broadcast a film by journalist Hajo Seppelt about extensive doping in Russian athletics using footage secretly filmed by whistleblowers.

#### Reeling Giants fire coach McAdoo, GM Reese

Believing the team was spiraling out of control, the New York Giants went out of character by making two major in-season moves, firing coach Ben McAdoo and general manager Jerry Reese.

With the team reeling at 2-10 in a season where most felt it was capable of challenging for a Super Bowl, co-owners John Mara and Steve Tisch reached the decision Monday morning. It came less than a day after the Giants lost in Oakland, with quarterback Eli Manning benched and the offensively inept team performing poorly again.

Defensive coordinator Steve Spagnuolo will take over as interim coach for the final four games. He coached the St. Louis Rams from 2009-11.

### COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS

#### Fisher gets 10-year, \$75 million deal at Texas A&M

Jimbo Fisher wasn't wearing a white hat when he arrived at Texas A&M on Monday, no signs of a swashbuckling, down-home savior for a program desperate to compete with the best in the Southeastern Conference.

But the West Virginia native made sure to profess his love of all things country when he was introduced as an event that started

with the school's signature greeting of "howdy," and ended with him being given a pair of custom, A&M-embroidered Lucchese cowboy boots.

The Aggies signed Fisher to a 10-year, \$75 million contract to lure him away from Florida State, a place where he captured the 2013 national title and won three Atlantic Coast Conference championships in eight seasons.

### NEW YORK

#### Ohtani cuts to 5 West Coast teams, Cubs, Rangers

Japanese pitcher and outfielder Shohei Ohtani has cut the field of major league teams he is considering to five clubs on the West Coast plus the Chicago Cubs and Texas Rangers. The Los Angeles Dodgers and Angels, San Francisco, San Diego and Seattle all remain in contention.

Several teams said Sunday they were told they had been eliminated, and the seven remaining were confirmed Monday to The Associated Press by a pair of people familiar with the choices. They spoke on condition of anonymity because not all teams had announced whether they were in or out.

Ohtani is limited to a minor league contract because of restrictions imposed by the MLB collective bargaining agreement. The Rangers have the largest signing bonus amount remaining among the teams he is considering at \$3,535,000, followed by the Mariners (\$1,557,500) and Angels (\$1,315,000).

## ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

"There is only one real sin, and that is to persuade oneself that the second best is anything but the second best."

I am sufficiently senior to remember the days when jump overcalls were invariably made as strong bids, although not forcing. Nowadays, the fashion is to play weak jump overcalls everywhere one can imagine — and in some places one cannot.

In today's deal, my partner as South took his pre-empting duties seriously. West led the diamond 10, and I wondered if we might have missed a slam when my partner ruffed in. I need not have worried, since it turned out that my partner had to work hard to make his game.

He drew trumps in two rounds, ruffed dummy's remaining diamond, then got off lead with the ace and another club. West won with the jack, cashed the king and was faced with the choice of opening the heart suit or conceding a ruff-and-discard.

He made a fair try by eventually shifting to the heart 10. This went to the jack and king, and East played back the heart six, on which my partner took a good view when he tried the seven from hand. This forced West's queen, and South's heart nine became our 10th trick.

West explained, at length, how unlucky he had been to find his partner with the six rather than the seven of hearts; with the latter, his defense would have succeeded. True enough, but at least one player at the table had to bite his tongue to refrain from commenting that it would have been better to shift to the heart queen. Then, no matter what declarer tries, he must lose two tricks in the suit.
