## Hundreds turn out to support boy with cancer

PANAMA CITY — It started, as many things do now, with a Facebook post.

Aimee Livingston put out a call on her page hoping to attract the attention of local car enthusiasts. Her daughter's friend, nine-year-old Mikah Phillips, was struggling with stage four glioblastoma, an aggressive form of brain cancer extremely rare in children. His family had just learned the tumor removed through surgery in early February was growing back and he would need to go in for another surgery as soon as possible, then through at least six weeks of radiation and chemotherapy.

Mikah really loves cars, and Mikah especially loves the Nissan GTR, a high-performance coupe that puts out well over 500 horsepower. And Mikah, Livingston wrote on Facebook, would really love to take a ride in a Nissan GTR before having to leave for his surgery Tuesday and two months of radiation.

"I know a lot of car people, my husband knows a lot of car people — someone has to have a GTR," Livingston said.

As quick as a race car off the line, the post took off. Livingston was quickly contacted by several people who owned a GTR and wanted to drive Mikah around, but it didn't stop there. Through word of mouth, and social media, Livingston was

contacted by other car enthusiasts who wanted to show up and support Mikah. Soon, Livingston said they outgrew their original venue plan and had to find a new space, at the Panama City Surgery Center off Jenks Avenue.

"This was more than anything I could have expected," Livingston said. "It blew up into something I never could have imagined."

All of this, of course, was a secret to Mikah. He knew something was going on, his mother Debbie Phillips said, and knew he would get to ride in a GTR, but he had no idea that on Sunday, dozens of cars and hundreds of people would line the parking lot of the surgery center to welcome him to his very own car show.

"It's hard," Debbie Phillips said. "He got upset last night, and I told him, 'Remember, you get to ride in a GTR tomorrow,' and he said, 'Oh yeah, that's right!'"

The cancer diagnosis, Debbie Phillips said, has been hard on Mikah and his family. His father, Justin Phillips, said they've tried as hard as they can to make sure he's taken care of, but also keep life as normal as possible for their three older daughters, but sometimes, the stress and the uncertainty gets the better of them.

"He's very scared," Debbie Phillips said. "It makes him very scared and very nervous. We just tell him we love him and these are the things that we have to do to make him better."

But at Sunday's surprise car show, cancer was a four-letter word, replaced instead with words like "McLaren," "Skyline," "RPM" and the loud revs of engines that could be heard from blocks away. After being picked up and driven to the show

# Scouting for history

New program asks citizens to help preserve history

MARY ESTHER — Storms are a part of Florida life. After homes and businesses are torn down, they're built back up.

But what about historic sites that can't be rebuilt?

Sea levels are rising along the coast of Florida — in some areas more than third of an inch every year — according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). Historical sites that sit along the coast are at risk of being washed away for good.

"Once they're gone, they're gone forever,"

# 'Trump slump' in gun sales continues

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Gun store owners called it the "Trump slump." Sales of firearms slowed dramatically after the election of Donald Trump as president in 2016 allayed fears of a Democratic crackdown on gun owners.

That trend has continued in recent weeks even with talk of gun control in Congress and among business leaders following the Feb. 14 massacre of 17 people at a

Florida high school. In the past, gun massacres generally led to an uptick in sales as people worried about the government restricting access. But with Parkland, things are different.

"The day after the election, it's just like somebody turned a faucet off," said David Dobransky, 67, who owns Dobransky Firearms, a small gun shop in North Canton, Ohio. Since then, sales there have been cut in half, and nothing



**TODAY IN HISTORY**

Today is **Monday, March 5**, the 64th day of 2018. There are 301 days left in the year.

**Highlight in History:** On **March 5, 1868**, the impeachment trial of President Andrew Johnson began in the U.S. Senate, with Chief Justice Salmon P. Chase presiding. Johnson, the first U.S. president to be impeached, was accused of "high crimes and misdemeanors" stemming from his attempt to fire Secretary of War Edwin M. Stanton; the trial ended on May 26 with Johnson's acquittal.

**On this date:** In **1770**, the Boston Massacre took place as British soldiers who had been taunted by a crowd of colonists opened fire, killing five people.

In **1867**, thousands of members of the Irish Republican Brotherhood launched the Fenian Rebellion in Ireland in an attempt at overthrowing British rule; the poorly-organized rising was swiftly put down by British and Irish authorities.

In **1933**, in German parliamentary elections, the Nazi Party won 44 percent of the vote; the Nazis joined with a conservative nationalist party to gain a slender majority in the Reichstag.

In **1946**, Winston Churchill delivered his "Iron Curtain" speech at Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri, in which he said: "From Stettin in the Baltic, to Trieste in the Adriatic, an 'iron curtain' has descended across the continent, allowing police governments to rule Eastern Europe."

In **1953**, Soviet dictator Josef Stalin died after three decades in power.

In **1963**, country music performers Patsy Cline, Cowboy Copas and Hawkshaw Hawkins died in the crash of their plane, a Piper Comanche, near Camden, Tennessee, along with pilot Randy Hughes (Cline's manager).

In **1966**, BOAC Flight 911, a Boeing 707, crashed into Japan's Mount Fuji after breaking up in severe turbulence; all 124 people on board were killed.

said Mike Thomlin who works with the Florida Public Archaeology Network (FPAN). "Increased temperatures means more intense storms and drastic storm surge. And we're already seeing it happen at sites such as Shell Bluff Landing in St. Augustine."

Protecting archaeological sites from rising sea levels is a big job. In fact, it's too big.

"There are only 15 archaeologists in the state of Florida and 200,000 recorded sites," said Nicole Grinnan, public archaeology coordinator with FPAN. "It's impossible to keep up with. Getting the local community to be stewards for them is really important."

In 2016, FPAN started its Heritage Monitoring Scouts program allowing "citizen scientists" to take part in preserving their local history. Anyone interested in the program can sign up for a training session, where you'll learn how to identify any damage or erosion and document your chosen sites. Scouts are also trained in identifying historic artifacts such as shell tools or historic ceramics.

While the program is fairly new, Grinnan said there's been a lot of positive feedback. Across the state, 350 people have signed up to be a scout.

"It's a good way to learn a little bit about your local history," she said.

afternoon, a handful of locals showed up at the Mary Esther Library to sign up for the program. After some indoor training, FPAN staff took the new scouts over to Jesse Rogers Memorial Cemetery to put their new training to test.

At the historical end of the cemetery, which overlooks the Santa Rosa Sound, Kelsey Woellner of Navarre started documenting an old tombstone. "I'm really interested in archaeology and anthropology," she said. "I'd like to help preserve these sites."

Once you're trained, you can choose when and where you want to monitor. In Northwest Florida, there are about 25 sites to monitor in the Northwest Region. Statewide there are 700. Grinnan said all

of the sites through the monitoring program are publicly accessible.

"You can look for a site when you're traveling and choose to stop," said Della Scott-Iretton, associate director of FPAN Northwest Region. "You can choose your own adventure."

Carol Visalpatara of Fort Walton Beach said she always had an interest in history. For the last decade, she's been a volunteer with the Historic Preservation Alliance. As a Heritage Monitoring Scout, she's most excited about visiting new sites she's never seen before.

"I think this program is important because remembering our past means looking to our future," she said. "It's good to know you can do something to help."

## White House: No exemptions from tariffs

**Despite criticism, no country will be excluded from Trump's stiff duties on aluminum, steel**

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump's administration appears unbowed by broad domestic and international criticism of his planned import tariffs on steel and aluminum, saying Sunday that the president is not planning on exempting any countries from the stiff duties.

Speaking on CNN's "State of the Union," White House trade adviser Peter Navarro said: "At this point in time there's no country exclusions."

Trump's announcement Thursday that he would impose tariffs of 25 percent and 10 percent, respectively, on imported steel and aluminum, roiled markets, rankled allies and raised prospects for a trade war. While his rhetoric has been focused on China, the duties will also cover significant imports from Canada, Mexico, South Korea, Japan and the European Union.

The Pentagon had recommended that Trump only pursue targeted tariffs, so as not to upset American partners abroad. But Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross said Sunday that was not the direction the president

would take.

"He's talking about a fairly broad brush," Ross said on ABC's "This Week." He rejected threats of retaliation from American allies as "pretty trivial."

Few issues could blur the lines of partisanship in Trump-era Washington. Trade is one of them.

Labor unions and liberal Democrats are in the unusual position of applauding Trump's approach, while Republicans and an array of business groups are warning of dire economic and political consequences if he goes ahead with the tariffs.

Trade politics often cut along regional, rather than ideological, lines, as politicians reflect the interests of the hometown industries and workers. But rarely does a debate open so wide a rift between a president and his party — leaving him almost exclusively with support from his ideological opposites.

"Good, finally," said Sen. Sherrod Brown, an Ohio Democrat and progressive as he cheered Trump's move. Sen. Bob Casey of Pennsylvania, a Democrat who has called for Trump to resign, agreed.

"I urge the administration

to follow through and to take aggressive measures to ensure our workers can compete on a level playing field," Casey tweeted.

This moment of unusual alliance was long expected. As a candidate, Trump made his populist and protectionist positions on trade quite clear, at times hitting the same themes as one of the Democratic presidential candidates, Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders.

"This wave of globalization has wiped out totally, totally our middle class," Trump told voters in the hard-hit steel town of Monessen, Pennsylvania, during one of his

campaign stops. "It doesn't have to be this way."

Trump's criticism of trade agreements and China's trade policies found support with white working-class Americans whose wages had stagnated over the years. Victories in big steel-producing states such as Ohio, Pennsylvania and Indiana demonstrated that his tough trade talk had a receptive audience.

Both candidates in a March 13 House election in Pennsylvania have embraced the president's plans for tariffs. They addressed the topic Saturday in a debate that aired on WTAE in Pittsburgh.

"For too long, China has been making cheap steel and they've been flooding the market with it. It's not fair and it's not right. So I actually think this is long overdue," said Democratic candidate Conor Lamb.

"Unfortunately, many of our competitors around the world have slanted the playing field, and their thumb has been on the scale, and I think President Trump is trying to even that scale back out," said Republican candidate Rick Saccone.

But Trump's GOP allies on Capitol Hill have little use for the tariff approach. They argue that other industries that rely on steel and aluminum products will suffer. The cost of new appliances, cars and buildings will rise if the president follows through, they warn, and other nations could retaliate.





**Mike Tyson's former home becoming a house of worship**

A garishly appointed Ohio mansion that heavyweight boxing champion Mike Tyson once called home and subsequently fell into disrepair is being converted into a house of worship.

The Living Word Sanctuary Church has been cleaning up the property in Trumbull County's Southington Township, roughly 45 miles southeast of Cleveland, since the 25,000-square-foot mansion was donated to the church several years ago.

"The property had been untouched for 10 years," Living Word Pastor Nicholas DeJacimo told the Warren Tribune-Chronicle. "You had so much grass you could have sold it for hay."

**Report: Mexican man assumed American identity for 37 years**

A Mexican man who was deported twice and had a history of arrests was able to assume the identity of an American citizen and receive more than \$360,000 in government benefits for nearly four decades, California court records show.

Andres Avelino Anduaga used a fake birth certificate starting in 1980 to develop a seemingly legitimate persona by applying for a California driver's license, Social Security number and U.S. passport. The official U.S. documents identified him as Abraham Riojos, born in Texas in 1958.

Anduaga, who's actually 66 years old and a resident of Tijuana, Mexico, pleaded guilty last week to theft of public property.

**'M.A.S.H.' actor Stiers dies of bladder cancer at age 75**

David Ogden Stiers, a prolific actor best known for playing a surgeon on the "M.A.S.H." television series, has died. He was 75.

The actor's agent Mitchell Stubbs confirmed Saturday night in an email that Stiers died at his home in Newport, Oregon after battling bladder cancer.

In addition to playing the aristocratic Maj. Charles Winchester III on "M.A.S.H.," beginning in its sixth season, Stiers did voice acting in several Disney animated films, voicing the character Cogsworth in "Beauty and the Beast" and played characters in "Lilo & Stitch" and "Pocahontas." He was also the voice of an announcer in "THX 1138."

**Ex-Catalan leader Puigdemont withdraws bid to regain power**

Catalonia's fugitive ex-leader dropped a political bombshell Thursday, unexpectedly announcing that he is temporarily withdrawing his bid to get back his old job as president of the independence-minded Spanish region.

Carles Puigdemont said in a video message posted from Brussels, where he fled to escape arrest in Spain, that he is standing aside so the Catalan parliament can find another candidate to form a regional government that presses ahead with efforts to win independence.

Puigdemont is a leader of the independence movement and is the preferred candidate of most Catalan secessionists to head the regional government.

**China to recruit civilian astronauts for missions**

China will begin recruiting civilian astronauts for its military-backed space program and plans to increase the number of crewed missions to around two a year, a top official with the country's space program said.

China's third batch of astronaut trainees will include recruits from industry, research institutions and universities who will help build and crew China's independent space station, Yang Liwei, deputy director of the China Manned Space Engineering Office, told reporters on the sidelines of the annual session of China's ceremonial parliament.

in a pristine white GTR, Mikah took his time exploring every car in the parking lot with its hood up, talking show with the owners and getting behind the wheel. Richie Brose let Mikah sit in the driver's seat of his super-charged Dodge Challenger SRT Demon, and Dominik Briggs of Wiregrass Cars

and Coffee, let Mikah rev the engine of his Nissan Skyline - the predecessor of Mikah's beloved GTR - until it was so loud everyone had to cover their ears. "It's been a long seven weeks, and we have a very long way to go," said Justin Phillips. "But this puts everything in the back of your head so you're not really worried about it."

For the first time in a while, Mikah was all smiles Sunday as he wandered from car to car, checking out Maserati's

and souped-up muscle cars, monster trucks and motorcycles. He went for a spin around the block in Brose's Demon, and hopefully, his father said, as he's recovering from Tuesday's surgery, he's not thinking about tumors and radiation, but what kind of car he'll ask his parents for when he gets his driver's license.

"This will be fresh on his memory for many days to come," Justin Phillips said. "This will be on his mind for years."

the president or Congress has done or said following the Florida shooting has improved business.

Gun owners apparently have faith that Trump won't impose more restrictions, gun show owners say. That's even with the confusing messages Trump has sent in the past week.

He has cast himself as a strong supporter of the National Rifle Association but on Wednesday criticized lawmakers for being too fearful of the NRA to take action. He also reaffirmed positions opposed by the NRA, such as banning gun sales to those under 21.

Then the next day, Trump met with NRA officials and tweeted they'd had a "Good (Great) meeting." The NRA's executive director,

tweeting about the same meeting, said Trump and Vice President Mike Pence "don't want gun control."

At Rapid-Fire Firearms in Rapid City, South Dakota, business is "just like normal," owner Robert Akers said Thursday, contrasting business with the panic buying under President Barack Obama.

In an earnings conference call last week, American Outdoor Brands, which owns Smith & Wesson, said revenue fell by one-third over the past three months, consistent with a drop since Trump was elected.

Demand dropped in December and January, before the Florida shooting and the debates on gun laws that followed, he said. The company doesn't expect sales to improve much over the next year.

Sturm Ruger and American Outdoor Brands have both seen their stocks plunge since Trump was

elected, as they have mostly reported disappointing sales in recent months. American Outdoor Brands has plunged 67 percent since the presidential election and Sturm Ruger is down 28 percent.

Potentially dampening sales further, four major retailers last week - Kroger, Dick's Sporting Goods, L.L. Bean and Walmart - announced they will no longer sell guns to anyone under 21.

In addition, outdoor retailer REI says it's halting future orders of some popular brands - including CamelBak water carriers, Giro helmets and Camp Chef stoves - whose parent company also makes ammunition and assault-style rifles.

Over the past 30 years, U.S. gun production has tripled. Nine million were produced in 2015, compared with 3 million in 1986, according to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.

# During Trump hotel strife, a 'Trump Mojito' but no water

PANAMA CITY - If you can overlook the intermittently running water, Friday's four-hour power outage and occasional police presence in the lobby, the Trump hotel in Panama City retains its status as one of the city's finest.

The hotel remains open for business against a backdrop of service interruptions, bad press and a fight over the Trump Organization's management contract that ended in fisticuffs and repeated police calls last week.

"This isn't what you expect from a luxury hotel," one guest was heard fuming when told Thursday that access to running water would not be restored for hours.

The hotel's lobby is notable mostly for its shortage of guests, compensated for by a generous allotment of reporters and security

staff bracing for renewed confrontations after investor Orestes Fintiklis tried to wrest the administrative office back from the Trump Organization last week.

Armed with termination notices for the hotel's management, he met stiff resistance from Trump lawyers and security - the first skirmish in a battle for physical control of the hotel property.

Unlike the Trump International Hotel in Washington or the Mar-a-Lago resort in Florida, which draw guests hoping to bask in Donald Trump-style affluence, guests who spoke to The Associated Press seemed less enamored of the Panama City property's fondness for aggressive branding.

"I could really do without the Trump Mojito. There are like four or five Trump drinks on the menu," said Leanne Horning, a tourist from Chicago staying at the hotel

because she got a good deal online.

Horning is "adamantly not" a supporter of the U.S. president and said it irked her that instead of ordering standard cocktails, guests had to choose from among the Tropical Trump, Trump Breeze and Trump Rose.

While Trump Meritage and Trump Chardonnay also were available, what was lacking a good chunk of this past week was Trump water, at least when guests turned on the hotel's faucets.

According to municipal authorities, Trump receptionists, housekeepers and a maintenance man, city workers spent much of last Tuesday and Wednesday repairing a damaged water main at the hotel. Though water was restored late Wednesday, the Trump Organization seized the opportunity to perform some additional maintenance, extending the cutoff into late Thursday.

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

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# Keep a lid on government shenanigans

Lawmakers are roaring up on the last week of the legislative session — a time when bills start to fly between House and Senate, being amended and approved with minimal debate. It's also bare-knuckles negotiation time on the state's \$87 billion budget.

And it's a time when secrets start to fester. Bills become bloated with bad ideas that couldn't withstand the sunshine of public committee hearings and testimony. In prior years, lawmakers have become so caught up in the horse-trading and arm-twisting that they forget the interests of the people they were elected to serve.

That should not be allowed to happen this year. But we're not optimistic.

Certainly, some bad ideas appear to be dead (at least for this year). One example with local significance: a bill that would seriously undermine local control by stopping most city and county governments from regulating short-term vacation rentals. But some good bills are on life support, too, including legislation that would make texting while driving a primary offense. Florida's highways have seen far too much carnage from distracted driving, yet the legislation remains bottled up in a Senate committee.

Meanwhile, the Senate Appropriations Committee resuscitated a gambling bill that would allow local voters to authorize slot machines — a clear attempt at an end-run around a proposed constitutional amendment on the November ballot. And a massive education "train" that would authorize private-school vouchers for students who believe they've been bullied has actually gotten worse, with the addition of language that would kneecap state teachers' unions in collective bargaining. A change that big should have been presented as standalone legislation, with ample opportunity for debate and discussion.

Lawmakers are also going down to the wire on some major budget issues, including a Medicaid funding shift that would hurt "safety net" hospital systems like Halifax Health Medical Center. Also in limbo: the amount of money that will flow to restoration of springs and the St. Johns River. And as always, the stage appears to be set for raids on state trust funds.

Every year starts the same way, with deliberative discussion and opportunity for public input. But sessions always end in a swirl of frenzied backroom dealmaking. In some years, lawmakers have passed legislation without even realizing it — until the dust settled.

Negron and House Speaker Richard Corcoran, along with other key lawmakers, should send a clear message: There will be no last-minute surprises this year, no dead-of-night dealmaking.

That should include school-safety legislation. If there's no consensus on solutions, the issue should be delayed until lawmakers have time for full and open debate.

Lawmakers have plenty of experience with last-minute shenanigans, and in too many cases, Floridians have had to deal with the consequences. Going into the last week of session, Corcoran and Negron should try making sunshine the status quo.


### Personal freedom without political freedom

# Definition of an electable candidate is changing

Last year's grassroots progressive runs for office laid to rest much of the Democratic Party's orthodoxy about who is "electable," and how it's essential that candidates — in hopes of attracting moderate "swing" voters — run big-money campaigns on small-bore, middle-of-the-road issues.

For example, meet these eight big-issue/low-dollar candidates who rejected party orthodox and won: Danica Roem — Virginia House of Delegates; Andrea Jenkins — Minneapolis City Council; Phillipe Cunningham — Minneapolis City Council; Lisa Middleton — Palm Springs City Council; Stephe Koontz — Doraville, GA City Council; Raven Matherne — Stamford, CT City Council; Tyler Titus — Erie, PA School Board; and Gerri Cannon — Somersworth, NH School Board.

One thing these victors have in common is that each of them is openly transgender. Even two years ago, political pros assumed that transgender people were unelectable nearly everywhere. So these eight barrier busters show how rapidly attitudes are changing.

The nationwide progressive offensive in 2017 produced other ground shifting results such as: many victories by

millennials (five elected to the State House in Virginia alone); victories by immigrant candidates, including in Somerville (MA), Helena (MT) and Minneapolis; and a rebellion in previously red suburbs. Victories like these are proliferating because immigrant populations are growing, Trumpism and GOP extremism are turning voters off, a rapid and relentless downsizing of the middle class is altering attitudes and serious grassroots political organizing. Unprecedented numbers of women are running or considering runs for public office in 2018. She Should Run, a non-partisan support group for women candidates, reports that since the 2016 elections, it's been contacted by more than 15,000 potential women candidates from every part of America. Likewise, after Trump's election, Emily's List, the longtime PAC that supports pro-choice women seeking office, reported an "unprecedented" surge in interest by more than 20,000 potential candidates.

It's one thing to jump into a political race, but if you want to win, it helps to have some structural support. Grassroots groups are making a difference, for example Our Revolution has already helped elect 120 Bernie-style populists committed to serve as ardent agents of change — not bad for a self-financed, volunteer-based movement that's barely a year and a half old.

These rebellious "little-d" democratic campaigns know that every vote

counts. It's volunteers' hard, get-out-the-vote work that enables them to win tight races against the slick attack ad-based campaigns of their corporate-backed opponents.

These victories (and a multitude of similar wins across the country) not only lift the spirits of progressives everywhere but, significantly, have greatly elevated the skills of our progressive ground forces. Volunteer recruiters, campaign managers, social media teams, field coordinators, door knockers, schedulers, get-out-the-vote organizers, online fundraisers and all the rest are now better at what they do than they were a year ago. Just as important, they're part of a growing network able to teach others these essential campaign skills, thus expanding and refreshing the pool of talent as they gear up for this year's full slate of elections.

# ...Should you be concerned?

**N**ews that the Dow Jones Industrial Average is down several hundred points sends shivers down the spine of even the most weathered investor.

Like the tale of Eskimos having dozens of words for “snow,” investors have many words for a decline in the stock market. These words distinguish the length and severity of the fall, though their definitions are not etched in stone.

- A dip is any brief downturn from a sustained longer-term uptrend. For example, the market may go up 5 percent, linger, and come down 2 percent over a few days or weeks.

- A crash is a sudden and very sharp drop in stock prices, often on a single day or week. Sometimes a market crash foretells a period of economic malaise, such as the 1929 crash when the market lost 48 percent in less than two months, kicking off the Great Depression. But that's not always the case. In October 1987 stocks plunged 23 percent

in a single day, the worst decline ever, before roaring back over the next year. Crashes are rare, but they usually occur after a long-term uptrend in the market.

- A correction is often defined as a 10 percent drop in the market from recent highs.

- A bear market is a long, sustained decline in the stock market. Once losses surpass 20 percent from the market's most recent high, it's considered to be a bear market.

## Why the market crashes

At the most basic level, the market declines because investors are more motivated to sell than to buy. That's simple supply and demand, but it doesn't explain why investors are selling.

While the reasons for a one-day drop may vary, a longer-term decline is usually caused by one or several of the following reasons:

- **A slowing or shrinking economy:** This is a solid, “fundamental” reason for the market to decline. If the economy is slowing or entering a recession, or investors are expecting it to

slow, companies will earn less, so investors bid down their stocks.

- **Lack of “animal spirits”:** This old phrase refers to the surges of investor emotion and risk-taking during a bull market. As they see the chance for profits, people jump into the market, pushing stock prices up.

- **Fear:** In the stock market, the opposite of greed is fear. If investors think the market is going to fall, they'll quit buying stocks, and sellers will have to lower their prices to find takers.

- **Outside (and outside) events:** This miscellaneous category consists of everything else that might spook the market: wars, attacks, oil-supply shocks and other events that aren't purely economic.

These reasons often work together. For example, as the economy overheats, some investors see a slowdown in the future and want to sell before a stampede of investors flees the market. So they sell, pushing stocks lower and dampening animal spirits. If the move down persists long enough, it may make investors fearful, sending stocks still lower.

## HOW LONG WILL THE SELL-OFF LAST?

That's a billion-dollar question. If you knew that, you could time the market and become rich. Still, there are some guideposts for how long crashes, corrections and bear markets last. (We'll skip dips for now; there are just way too many of them.)

- In the last four corrections since the 2008-09 global financial crisis, the average decline was 15.3 percent over three and a half months.
- In the three bear markets since 1987, the average decline has been 46.5 percent over 1.4 years.
- In contrast, the last three bull markets have lasted nearly nine years on average. Downturns tend to be short-lived, especially relative to uptrends.

## Never feel stupid about money again

A lot of smart people have a secret: They feel stupid about money.

“One of the most common things I hear from clients is, ‘I feel like I should understand this better, and I'm embarrassed to show you this,’” says Linda Leitz, a certified financial planner and co-owner of Peace of Mind Financial Planning Inc. in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

But it's better to admit what you don't know than to let fear of looking foolish drive you into bad decisions. When they're afraid to ask “dumb questions,” people don't get the information they need to make good choices, and they can get talked into the wrong financial products, Leitz says. Or they avoid money decisions altogether.

“I see this issue a lot. It generally comes in the form of paralysis,” says Christina Empedocles, a certified financial planner and owner of Insight Personal Finance in San Francisco. “People are embarrassed to find themselves adults without a clue about what to do with their money, and they're afraid of reaching out.”

So they delay doing anything, sometimes for years. “There's this long period of agonizing,” she says.

### Realize you're not alone

If you feel like you should know more about managing money than you do, join the club.

“We imagine our friends and our neighbors know so much more and are doing so much better than we are,” Empedocles says. “Since people hesitate to share this vulnerability, they don't realize that a lot of people are in the same boat. ... The first thing I do with new clients is to normalize this issue, so they realize they aren't alone.”

That realization can serve as a jump-start. In the personal finance workshops she leads, Empedocles says participants start to come to life when they realize they're not the only ones who don't know what a Roth IRA is.

### Start with what you know: yourself

Think about your big goals and concerns. Once you can articulate those, it will be easier to move forward. Maybe you want to pay down student loan debt, or start a college fund for the kids or retire in 20 years.

Don't let shame over past mistakes and inaction keep you stuck.

“Don't worry about what you should have done,” Leitz says. “Look at what you can do now.”

### Choose financial advisors carefully

It might make sense to work with a financial advisor if you're overwhelmed, dealing with a big life event such as divorce, or feeling financially insecure.

Above all, understand how the advisor is paid. Some advisors are paid commissions for products they sell. Fee-only advisors charge a percentage of your assets, a flat fee or by the hour.

Ask advisors to explain terms in everyday language, says Cristina Guglielmetti, a certified financial planner and president of Future Perfect Planning in New York. “Or repeat what they say in your own words to make sure you understand it.”

## Best practices for safe online banking

Online banking is safe when secure bank technology on the back end is met with alert consumers on the front end. As an account holder, you have a role in making sure accounts are protected.

- **Don't respond to emails that seem too good — or bad — to be true.** Large-scale data breaches get the headlines, but criminals also work on a smaller scale by attacking consumers directly. For example,

fraudsters often use so-called phishing scams, in which they send out emails pretending to represent a financial institution in the hopes of hooking an unsuspecting consumer.

If you reply, the criminal could use the information to illegally make purchases or withdraw money from your account.

- **Skip public Wi-Fi for private banking.** The security of your private home network is ideal. If you have to log in while away from home, consider using your cellular data plan instead of Wi-Fi, or a virtual private

network, known as a VPN. However you choose to log in, check for web page encryption by making sure the address on the browser starts with “https.” The “s” signals that the page is secure.

- **Keep anti-virus software current** on your home computers and mobile devices.

- **Choose an institution that uses industry-standard security.** An example is multifactor authentication. When logging in, instead of just asking for a username and password, the financial institution requires you

to provide another piece of information, or factor, to verify yourself. It could be a unique passcode sent to your smartphone as a text message, or even your own fingerprint. The point is it's another layer, one not so easy to steal.

- **Change passwords regularly.** Use combinations that are difficult to guess, such as a mix of upper-case and lowercase letters, numbers and symbols. The more complex the password, the harder it will be to crack and the more likely it will provide protection against hackers.

## Hampton Inn coming to Callaway in 2020

Inn part of development as influx expected from Reaper wing at Tyndall

CALLAWAY - A 68-room Hampton Inn is coming to Callaway in 2020, one of the first announced projects in what local officials are hoping will be an influx.

The inn will be built on Tyndall Parkway, near the Walmart, according to Callaway code enforcement officer Bill Frye. The three story building is expected to have a pool and have a footprint of just under three acres, according to architectural drawings.

Callaway City Manager Eddie Cook expects the hotel will attract not only people visiting Tyndall Air Force Base, but also spill over from Panama City Beach's marketing of the area as a good place for sporting tournaments.

"This will also give more availability for people to stay that want to visit this side. Not to mention, our arts and conference center, we enjoy the overflow from Frank Brown [Park] when they have [sports] tournaments come in," Cook said. "This will give more accommodations for teams coming in to play in the tournaments."

The area, he said, is poised for growth. One of the biggest factors in development is the MQ-9 Reaper wing program coming to Tyndall Air Force Base in 2020 which will increase the base's staff by almost a third, with 1,600 new airmen, assuming the base passes a mandatory environmental study.

"We're getting ready to have a huge influx, hopefully from the base and the stuff that's going on there," Cook said.

# First LGBTQ support center opens in Panhandle

PANAMA CITY - Cindy Wilker could hardly believe what she was seeing Sunday afternoon.

# Eastern Shipbuilding details St. Joe project

PORT ST. JOE - Eastern Shipbuilding Group outlined their plans in Gulf County during a presentation Tuesday to the Board of County Commissioners.

Attorney William Harrison sketched out additional details, including the timeline for the design and construction of a floating dry dock at the bulkhead on the former paper mill site as well as job projections.

That timeline, he qualified,

is contingent on funding from Triumph Gulf Coast, Inc., and permitting.

If the rest of the portrait fills in as projected, sometime between June 2019 and June 2020 the dry dock would be up and operational in Port St. Joe, en route to creating 120 permanent jobs and 314 indirect jobs, based on accepted maritime economic projections, Harrison said.

The Port St. Joe location is part of establishing an efficient quality production process as Eastern enters the initial phases of a \$10.5 billion contract with the U.S.

Coast Guard to build off-shore patrol vessels. The yard, according to Harrison, would serve as a dry dock facility, a key component for the work flow as language in the Coast Guard contract requires a vessel, after initial launch, can not be in the water more than 365 days if not already delivered.

Port St. Joe would also become the lone dry dock facility between Tampa and Mobile, AL, which would open the facility for ship repair.

But key to making this happen is the money.

On Tuesday, the commission approved for \$440,000 contract for Harper Dry Dock to design the dock. Down the line, the plan is for the components of dry dock, 120-feet by 425-feet, would be constructed in Eastern's Allanton yard in Bay County and shipped to Port St. Joe for assembly. The county would own the facility and enter a lease agreement with Eastern, under the unsolicited proposal brought to the county late last year.

But to get to that point,





## New home for Ringling circus railroad cars

WILLISTON — When Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus closed last year, much of the focus was on the future of the many animals used in the show and whether they would be sent to places where they could comfortably spend the rest of their lives.

But it took a lot of railroad cars to transport those animals and the human performers from town to town, and trains have dedicated enthusiasts just as animals do.

The first of 20 of those circus cars were hoisted by cranes and laid on tracks Feb. 23 at Kirby Family Farm south of Williston, an unofficial train museum that offers the public programs in railroad history.

"This is an educational thing and a permanent exhibit. I couldn't tell you how many people from the circus have contacted us and thanked us," said Daryl Kirby, who with his wife Tracy runs the 174-acre farm. "This is really a national treasure. We were proud to know we were going to have this. We were told (by the circus owner) that this is the largest collection of Ringling Circus trains in the world. Now we realize it means a lot to a lot of other folks."

Many of them came to the farm to watch the delivery of the cars to Kirby — a production worthy of a traveling circus.

The train cars — 16 coaches and four flat cars — were on tracks next to the Kirby property. Two mobile cranes then hoisted them up and put them down on new Kirby rails. Kirby would not say how he came to acquire the cars, citing an agreement with Feld Entertainment, the circus owner.

They join five locomotives and six open-air passenger cars already at the farm.

The public was invited and many set up chairs and picnicked while the transfer was underway.

"I'm a train buff. I traveled on trains when I was younger and then in the military," said Vince Tubman of Ocala. "I have a fascination of trains. They may not be around forever."

Also from Ocala were Tim and Lou Petty, who enjoy trains and circus performances. Lou Petty said they traveled from the Midwest to California on a train.

"We stopped at all of the stations but we lived on the train. It's so peaceful because you can go places where no cars can go. We went through 15 tunnels, over mountains, across gulches that were 150 feet down," she said. "The scenery was amazing. And if you looked out, you could see the train in front of you and behind you."

Kirby Farms, registered as an educational nonprofit, holds several events a year, including night train rides in the Christmas season.

# Destin council candidate gets trespass warning

DESTIN — A candidate for the Destin City Council was issued a trespass warning last week after he reportedly tried to campaign at the home of a current council member.

Council candidate Mark Robertson was issued the trespass warning from the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office at 7:18 p.m. last Monday.

The warning was requested by Councilman Rodney Braden, who is seeking another term

in the March 13 municipal election.

"My magnetic City Council signs are on the cars in our driveway. Our cameras caught (Robertson) coming in our yard and he left one of his cards on the car windshield," Braden said. "I don't want him on my property."

Sheriff's Office

spokeswoman Michele Nicholson said it was the first time she could recall an election candidate filing trespassing paperwork against another candidate.

When asked about the trespass warning, Robertson said that he didn't know he was canvassing Braden's home.

"I've been campaigning door-to-door for eight weeks so I can talk heart-to-heart with people," Robertson said. "I think I left my business card on a car. I just believe in talking face-to-face."

The warning reads: "Mark Alan Robertson was warned in my presence to stay off the residence by Rodney Braden, who controls said property or who has been authorized by said owner/management. This warning was given on 2/26/2018 7:18 p.m. Additionally, the above named person was advised that if they returned onto said property that they will be in violation of applicable provisions of Chapter 810 Florida Statutes, prohibiting trespass, and be subject to arrest."

## Woman killed in crash on Back Beach Road

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Alcohol is suspected as a factor in a car accident that killed a woman early Sunday morning at the intersection of Back Beach Road and Highway 79.

Panama City Beach Police identified Kimberly Mason as the victim.

### HOUSE

**Post-Parkland Dispute Over Gun Bills:** The House voted 228-184, to block an attempt by Democrats to force floor consideration of two gun-safety bills. One (HR 3464) would prevent a firearms dealer from selling a weapon before completion of a federal background check. The second bill (HR 4240) would, in part, expand criminal and mental health background checks to cover all firearms transactions except those among family members, friends and hunting partners. This vote was conducted after Republican leaders, who control the House agenda, declined to immediately bring gun legislation to the floor following a Feb. 14 mass shooting at a high school in Parkland,

Florida. A yes vote was in opposition to allowing floor debate on the two bills.

**Voting yes:** Gaetz, Dunn

**Online Sex Trafficking:** Voting 388-25 the House passed a bill (HR 1865) stipulating that Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act can be used to prosecute websites that facilitate prostitution and sex trafficking even if they do not produce the content. The bill would deny protection in federal, state and local courts to websites such as Backpage whose business model is to advance the sex trade. But critics including the Department of Justice said it has an overly broad reason-to-know standard that would imperil the free speech of innocent third parties, and therefore make prosecution of sex traffickers more difficult. A yes vote was to send the bill to the Senate.

**Voting yes:** Dunn  
**Voting no:** Gaetz

**Capital Reserves for Megabanks:** Voting 245-169, the House passed a bill (HR 4296) that would

direct federal banking regulators to redefine rules under which America's 10 largest banks hold capital as a cushion against future losses. At present, the risk for determining the megabanks' reserves is based largely on past performance. This bill would base risk instead on current and projected performance, disregarding previous management mistakes. The change would free up hundreds of billions of dollars that the banks could use for purposes such as lending, paying dividends or buying back stock. But critics said it could potentially lead to failures and taxpayer bailouts of banks deemed too big to fail. A yes vote was to send the bill to the Senate.

**Voting yes:** Gaetz, Dunn

**Wells Fargo Exclusion:** The House defeated by a vote of 185-228, a Democratic bid to prevent benefits under HR 4296 (above) from going to any megabank found to have engaged in a pattern of fraudulent acts against its customers. The measure was directed mainly at Wells Fargo, which paid

finances and is under Federal Reserve sanctions after having admitted to systematically defrauding millions of customers in recent years. A yes vote was to adopt the Democratic motion.

### SENATE

**Russell Vought Confirmation:** By a vote of 50-49, with Vice President Pence casting the deciding vote, the Senate confirmed Russell Vought as deputy director of the Office of Management and Budget. Vought held Republican staff positions in the House, including one under Pence when he was a congressman, and served for seven years as vice president of Heritage Action, the political arm of the Heritage Foundation. A yes vote was to confirm the nominee.

## A look at Broward Sheriff Israel's career

FORT LAUDERDALE — The outspoken Florida sheriff whose deputies responded to the Parkland school shooting usually deals with critics head on. But in recent days, Broward County Sheriff Scott Israel has been mostly silent.

He is taking heat from Republicans and gun rights activists who believe the sheriff is focusing on guns and not accepting responsibility for failing to stop the school gunman before the shooting — and for his deputies not charging into Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School.

Israel faced reporters outside a rally Thursday and has refused most interview requests, including one for this story. Meanwhile, his conservative critics have

taken to the internet and airwaves to blast him.

This contrasts with the days after the Feb. 14 shooting when Israel and his deputies were lauded for their work and he railed against the "detestable" killer who took down 17 people. He got cheers from his community when he told National Rifle Association spokeswoman Dana Loesch during a nationally televised town hall she wasn't supporting gun violence survivors until she said, "I want less weapons."

A tanned and muscular lawman with a New York accent, Israel for years has called for tougher gun laws in Florida. His stance created critics long before the school shooting.

The recent backlash began the day after the town hall, when the 61-year-old Democrat

revealed that Deputy Scot Peterson, the school resource officer at Stoneman Douglas High, didn't run into the school to confront 19-year-old Nikolas Cruz. Peterson, who says he thought the shots were coming from outside, retired rather than accept a suspension.

Then reports surfaced that three other Broward deputies ignored exhortations from Coral Springs police officers to join them in charging the building. On top of that, the sheriff learned his agency received almost two dozen calls about Cruz in the years before the shooting, but never arrested him. That included a caller who said in November that Cruz was a potential school shooter.

Israel says while Cruz was troubled, he never did anything "arrestable." And he

said the state's statutes for involuntarily incarcerating the mentally ill are weak.

Steve Bucci, a former Army special operations officer, wrote in a column for the conservative website The Daily Signal that Israel should stop putting all the blame on Peterson while also saying on CNN, "I've given amazing leadership."

"If he was too incompetent to recognize the shooter was still firing inside the building, it is on you, sheriff. Leaders take responsibility," Bucci wrote.

Comparing Israel to the mythological lawman epitomized by Wyatt Earp, National Review editor Rich Lowry wrote Israel is a reminder that a sheriff "can be a hack politician whose primary concern is protecting his own political reputation and little fief."

# Students plan 'March for our Lives' in Fort Walton Beach

FORT WALTON BEACH — A group of Choctawhatchee High School students is organizing a "March for our Lives" to push for gun reform and school safety.

Baili Pettet, a 17-year-old senior at Choctaw who is dual enrolled and one of three student organizers of the event, said the march is part of a nationwide day of protests to encourage legislative action on gun reform.

"It's really important for us to raise awareness because students everywhere in our community are starting not to feel safe in schools because our legislators aren't doing what they're supposed to do and they're not protecting us," Pettet said. "So we think that it's very important that we get together as a community

and express what we want and make it impossible for our legislators not to notice."

Pettet said the march is scheduled for 10 a.m. Saturday, March 24 in Fort Walton Beach, though an exact route has not been determined. She said the group is working with the Fort Walton Beach Police Department to finalize a route.

High school students across the country were galvanized into action following a mass school shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida on Feb. 14, during which 17 people, including teachers and students, were killed, and 14 more were injured. Pettet said the actions of student activists who survived the shooting have inspired her and others, including adults, to take action.

"We don't want guns to be illegal," Pettet said.

"We aren't anti-gun or anti-Second Amendment. We're just tired of being afraid and we want our legislators to take action and put an end to violence."

Among the change organizers hope to see is a ban on automatic and semiautomatic rifles, as well as universal background checks and mandatory mental health

screenings when purchasing a firearm. Pettet said they also want to "make sure that teachers do not have weapons in classrooms."

The march, she said, is open to both students and adults. She said she has received mobilizing help from the Okaloosa County Democratic Executive Committee, and has reached out to other

organizations for "bipartisan support" but has not received welcoming responses from them.

Pettet she is organizing the event with two other Choctawhatchee students, Sofia Louah and Elena Patterson.

Ultimately, Pettet said the people participating in the march want to see more "responsible gun owners" and want to emphasize that they are not "asking for everyone to get rid of their handguns and their hunting rifles."

"We just want to see responsible action taken," she said. "We would like for no one in the state of Florida to have access to semi-automatic rifles and magazines ... we believe it's not necessary and it's killing children. We just want everyone to know that this is what we want, and we're going to make it really hard for everyone to ignore us."

Alabama-based LGBTQ youth advocacy group Free2Be, held a soft opening for the support center Sunday afternoon, meant to serve as an open house and a way to gauge interest in the new undertaking. The center is a long time coming, said Cathy Rifenburg, the "mama" who started the local PFLAG chapter 12 years ago, after her son came out.

"We are here because we feel the LGBTQ youth of Panama City need a safe place where they can gather," Rifenburg said. "They need support. And eventually, with some time, our real goal is to develop this into a resource center, not only for the LGBTQ youth, but many of the populations within the county, and parents and families."

After working in the area for over a decade growing PFLAG, Rifenburg said she and others realized

that, despite all their hard work, they were missing the younger generations of LGBTQ youth, who were often left isolated and without support.

"You work at something for a decade — two years ago we just celebrated 10 years here — and okay, we've made some progress, but there's still a huge piece missing," Rifenburg said. "We knew we were missing a big part of the population."

At the same time, Free2Be was opening offices and starting groups across Alabama, offering support groups and free counseling to victims of violence

in their state. When the organization opened an office in Dothan last year, they caught the attention of Rifenburg and her PFLAG group, and the two organizations partnered together to start a support group in Panama City.

"We eventually want to open an office down here and continue our partnership," said JQ Kirkland, Director of Operations for Free2Be. "They've exceeded our expectations already. We're having a hard time keeping up."

The support center will offer a free peer-to-peer support group for LGBTQ youth every Monday from

5 p.m. to 7 p.m. The group is aimed at ages 13-18, a demographic that is largely missed when it comes to services, but who are perhaps in need of the most support.

"It's time to step up and give them what we never had," Kirkland said. "It means the world to these kids to be able to say, 'I don't care who you are, what you look like, what you wear or who you love. I love you.'"

"It doesn't matter who you are," Kirkland continued. "It just matters that you're here."

For Wilker, who said she fields calls every day from people looking for these kinds of services, the support center is truly miraculous, as well as the positive reaction she's seen from the community. Eventually, she said, they want to be able to offer free mental, physical and psychological health services.

"We want to make everybody's lives better," she said.

The support center will have a grand opening April 14.

Gulf County is seeking nearly \$30 million in BP fine dollars from Triumph Gulf Coast to facilitate the design and construction of the dry dock.

The county has cleared the first hurdle, the pre-application process, but still has to go through the full application.

In the short-term, a \$6 million state

appropriation in 2017, \$1 million of that for dredging around the bulkhead, is to be used to create an "outfitting yard" on which Eastern will outfit a vessel which will arrive in Port St. Joe as mostly hull and motors and whatever is needed to sail, Harrison said.

Eastern has a contract with New York City for three 300-foot long ferries, with the first hull under construction and potentially arriving in Port St. Joe the middle of next year, Harrison said.

Outfitting could take as long as 18 months, Harrison said.

If the project comes to pass, Harrison said for every direct job the dry dock would create, another 2.62 indirect jobs could be expected, primarily in the services sector, but also wholesale and retail trade, finance, insurance and real estate, and manufacturing.

Harrison said it was not possible to Eastern to require subcontractors and vendors to use Gulf County employees, the

hope being that between building a workforce and sheer convenience, some of Eastern's 150-odd vendors would ultimately set up shop in Port St. Joe.

The overall goal, Harrison said, was to "prime the pump and get things going here."

Workforce is expected to be a challenge, Harrison said. The county is pursuing a \$625,000 state appropriation to be used for workforce training, even the establishment of a training facility in Gulf County to try to fix that.

**Algae again threatening Indian River Lagoon**

Scientists are seeing concerning levels of algae this year in Florida's Indian River Lagoon, just two years after massive blooms led to the worst fish kills on record.

State biologists are measuring similar algae levels in the lagoon's waters that they saw before the devastating 2016 blooms, Florida Today reported. Satellite images of the current bloom also resemble the spring of 2016.

The lagoon on the state's central Atlantic Coast is one of the most biologically diverse waterways in the nation. But sewage spills from the region's growing communities and the legacy of pollution from farms has increased levels of nitrogen and phosphorus in the water, which algae feed on.

When algae grow at high concentrations in the water they remove oxygen used by fish, manatees and other creatures.

Kayakers are reporting that the lagoon's waters appear olive-brown in color, rather than clear as in years past.

While no fish kills have been reported yet, biologists are worried that the problem will worsen as temperatures rise.

"The cell concentrations

that we've had in February have been actually quite similar to the cell concentrations in 2016," said Ed Philips, a University of Florida marine biologist.

Philips says none of the lagoon's algae are known to be toxic to humans, but can kill fish by depleting oxygen or clogging gills.

Scientists say it'll be three weeks or so before they'll know if a repeat of 2016 is likely.

"Right now it's sort of a wait and see game," Philips said.

**TALLAHASSEE**  
**House set to vote on gambling**

The state House could vote as soon as Monday on a wide-ranging gambling bill that includes ratification of a 20-year agreement with the Seminole Tribe of Florida.

But after years of failed attempts to agree on gambling legislation, the House and Senate continue to have differing proposals as the 2018 legislative session enters its final week. The House on Friday took up its version of the bill (HB 7067) and positioned it for a vote, while the Senate Appropriations Committee approved the Senate version (SB 840).

The House bill would lead to the Seminole Tribe paying \$3 billion to the state over

seven years. In exchange, the tribe would have exclusive rights to conduct banked card games, such as blackjack, at five of its casinos. Also, the tribe would continue to have exclusive authority to offer slot machines outside of Miami-Dade and Broward counties, and pari-mutuel facilities would be barred from offering lucrative "designated player" card games.

**TALLAHASSEE**  
**Negron: Budget talks on a clear path to resolution**

Negotiations over a new state budget moved Friday to the top House and Senate budget chairmen, with lawmakers predicting a timely resolution.

"As we move forward and narrow the differences, if you look at where we are now, the amount of things that we're arguing over now are very modest," said Senate President Joe Negron, R-Stuart. "I see a very clear path to resolution."

The remaining differences in an \$87 billion-plus spending plan for 2018-2019 will now be negotiated by Senate Appropriations Chairman Rob Bradley, R-Fleming Island, and House Appropriations Chairman Carlos Trujillo, R-Miami. Conference committees spent

part of the week settling issues in the various areas of the budget.

Any issues left unresolved by the end of the weekend will be decided by Negron and House Speaker Richard Corcoran, R-Land O'Lakes. Lawmakers face a Tuesday deadline to finish the budget. That would allow a required 72-hour "cooling off period" before a vote next Friday, the last scheduled day of the legislative session.

**GAINESVILLE**  
**Businessman guilty of \$1.7 million tax fraud**

A Florida business owner pleaded guilty in federal court to a \$1.7 million tax fraud and other charges related to his employment of undocumented immigrants.

The Gainesville Sun reports that 50-year-old Mac Johnson entered the pleas in federal court in Gainesville, and will be sentenced on May 29.

Johnson is owner of roofing, tree service and trash businesses.

Federal prosecutors say he concealed the wages of undocumented immigrant workers to avoid paying income taxes, as well as taxes for Medicare and Social Security.

Johnson also was accused

of deducting money from the workers' checks for transportation and rent.

He faces a maximum sentence of 45 years in prison, and the government is seeking forfeiture for any property he owns up to \$800,000.

**THE VILLAGES**  
**Florida homes evacuated due to sink holes**

Six apparent sinkholes in Florida have made at least two homes unsafe to occupy.

The Ocala Star-Banner reports that the houses in The Villages were evacuated and condemned Feb. 15 after multiple holes emerged between them, cracking the walls of one.

The Villages is not blaming sinkholes for the problem, instead classifying the incident as a "catastrophic event."

Either way, Villages resident Ron Neumann and his wife are forced to live elsewhere with the help of their insurance company. They have not been told when they can return home.

Other evacuees were put up in a hotel or were staying with friends while the holes were being filled and investigated.

On Friday, the houses were still roped off and a Villages employee was on site to prevent people from entering.

- Read the contract thoroughly. Verify each point of the contract and be sure that any verbal promises discussed are part of the written contract. Make sure the contract includes the start and completion date and any payment schedule discussed. Be sure that warranties and guarantees of workmanship are also included within the contract. Clarify any questions you have prior to signing the contract.

- Be cautious of a contractor who asks to be paid in full - up front. In some cases, a contractor may need a down payment to cover materials but the bulk of the money should not be paid until the work is completed and inspected.

- Don't make the final payment or sign an affidavit of final release until you are satisfied with the work and know that the subcontractors and suppliers have been paid. Ask the contractor to provide a lien waiver. A lien waiver is a statement that all suppliers and

contractors have been paid for materials and labor.

- Return to the BBB Business Profile of the contractor after the work is completed and write a review on your experience.

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

## How Did Music Begin?



**Mini Fact:**  
This cave painting at the Bhimbetka rock shelters in India shows people dancing.

Do you play an instrument? Some kids learn to play the piano or violin. Others join the school band.

You and your friends or family might enjoy music at home, in the car or at concerts. Even if you just like to sing, you're using a completely natural musical instrument — your voice!

Music is a big part of our modern lives. But music in one form or another has been part of people's lives for thousands of years.

March is Music in Our Schools Month. This year's theme is Music Connects Us. The Mini Page plays along by looking at the origins of some musical instruments.



### The earliest musicians

Prehistoric music is music made before people were writing things down. Because there are no records, experts have to hypothesize (hi-POTH-eh-size), or make guesses, about how early people made music.

### Human voices

Humans used different noises to express fear or joy. These sounds, along with some of the sounds they heard from animals, such as birds' chirping, might have led them to make music.

### Finding a rhythm

When people began to use tools, for instance to pound grains, they may have done so in a rhythm, or a regular pattern. These sounds

might have led them to make other pleasing rhythms with the first percussion instruments.

### Percussion instruments

Early humans probably banged rocks together to make tools. When they did, pieces might have broken off that they used for another purpose, such as scraping.

Those same pieces of stone could have been used to scrape rhythms on shells, wood or other stones.

Early people probably made clapping sounds with their hands. They also might have hit sticks on a hollow tree and noticed how loud it was. This may have been the beginning of a hollow wood instrument called a **slit drum**. These drums are still played in parts of Africa, Southeast Asia and Oceania.

Later, people stretched animal skins over wooden frames, then hit the drums with their hands or sticks. Such drums were used in honor of animals or plants.

Some filled gourds, shells or other items with small stones, nut shells or animal teeth and shook them as **rattles**. They were used to accompany, or go along with, music and dance.

### Early music makers

One of the earliest instruments that experts have identified is the **bullroarer**. It was a piece of bone with a hole in one end where a long piece of hide was attached.

The bullroarer was "played" by whirling it overhead. Music experts think the noise of the bullroarer was intended to scare off enemies or evil spirits.

Prehistoric wind instruments, such as **whistles**, were probably used in hunting and in war. These whistles might have been made from the bones of birds, from shells or horns, or from a **phalanx** (FAY-lanks), or a finger or toe bone from an animal.

People made some wind instruments from bird bones, which are hollow. Those made from bone or horn had to be hollowed out.

## ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

*"Protection is not a principle, but an expedient."*  
— Benjamin Disraeli

One of the secrets of declaring at bridge is to identify which of your opponents is the danger hand, and to take steps where possible to keep that player off lead. An example is today's deal, where the contract of four hearts is touch-and-go. The contract should always succeed if the spade finesse works, but what if it does not?

If West makes the normal opening lead of the club queen, declarer should let the queen hold. Since he has to lose a club and probably a diamond, he must direct his attentions toward not losing more than one spade.

There is a chance of developing dummy's long diamond, but it must be by a duck into the non-danger hand, West. Meanwhile, declarer must keep East off lead, since a spade lead through South would be fatal if West has the ace. To cover all the bases, declarer wins the second club and draws trumps in two rounds. Then he eliminates the clubs and leads the diamond king, following up with a diamond to the 10.

This line succeeds when West had one diamond honor in either a two- or three-card suit. The reason is that if West has no diamonds left to lead, he must play a black suit and allow declarer to hold his spade losers to one. If West started with three diamonds, declarer will obtain his discard in due course. Likewise, if West began with four diamonds and can exit with a diamond, declarer will cross to dummy's trump and fall back on the spade finesse.

ANSWER: You seem to have four tricks in your own hand, and if your partner has an ace, you rate to defeat this contract easily enough. So you need to assume he doesn't, and still find a way to set the hand. To my mind, the choice is between a passive spade or a top club; the chance of finding a diamond ruff here is extremely low. I would lead a trump, rather than a club, but it is close.







### Braves hope to rebound in 2018

KISSIMMEE — Dansby Swanson and Sean Newcomb are hoping to rebound from rocky seasons with the Atlanta Braves.

“It’s almost silly to think about it like this, but this is a game of failure,” said Swanson, who had a 144-game audition as the Braves shortstop in 2017.

“What happened last year, we’re going to build off of it and be better now. I’ve already reflected and I’m ready to move on.”

Newcomb, a left-handed pitcher, came up in June and showed he could strike out major league hitters (108 in 100 innings) without giving up too many home runs (10). However, his 57 walks were a contributing factor to his 4-9 record and 4.32 ERA.

In the major league camp for the first time as a member of Atlanta’s rotation, Newcomb’s spring plan is “just getting more comfortable, being able to trust my stuff in the zone and let it rip, not try to strike everyone out.” He said cutting down on the walks is “an over-time kind of thing in my development.”

Swanson and Newcomb are at the developmental core of what the Braves are trying to do to improve. Both are 24. Both were drafted in the first round by other teams and came to the Braves as prospects in trades.

They both had mixed results in their first full seasons (Swanson played in 38 games in 2016), but they will be expected to do more this season.

## Harvick dominates Vegas for back-to-back victories

LAS VEGAS — From his dynamic opening laps to his comfortable cruise to the checkered flag, Kevin Harvick was the safest bet in Sin City this weekend.

Harvick’s air of inevitability increased with each lap around the Las Vegas Motor Speedway on Sunday, and the rest of the NASCAR Cup field must be a bit worried about

how they’re going to catch up this year.

Harvick raced to his second straight NASCAR Cup win with a dominant performance in Vegas on Sunday, earning his 100th career win across the three national series.

“There was no catching that 4 (car),” second-place finisher Kyle Busch said. “He was on rails, and lights out.”

Harvick followed up his stellar performance last weekend in Atlanta with

another victory in his Stewart-Haas Racing Ford. He led a track-record 214 of the 267 laps, won all three stages and capably held off Busch’s late hometown charge to win in Vegas for the second time in four years.

“These last two weeks, we’ve just hit on everything we needed to,” said Harvick, who cruised home 2.9 seconds ahead of Busch. “My (team has) done their homework on a number of

things. Just really proud of everybody.”

Busch got close to his second career victory in his hometown with his Joe Gibbs Racing Toyota, but couldn’t overcome the dominant leader. Kyle Larson finished third after winning the Xfinity Series race on Saturday, while defending champion Martin Truex Jr. was in fourth and pole-sitter Ryan Blaney in fifth.

## UCF’s Griffin has strong day at combine

INDIANAPOLIS — There’s always energy in the bench press room at the NFL scouting combine when players grip the crossbar and begin pumping the 225 pounds of free weights as everybody nearby counts the repetitions.

But never like this. Even Shaquem Griffin, the one-handed do-it-all defender from Central Florida and a late invitee to the combine, didn’t expect to do what he did Saturday with his prosthetic left hand.

His personal max was 11 reps, but he had a much more modest benchmark in mind here.

“My goal was six,” Griffin

acknowledged.

Griffin clipped his prosthetic hand onto the bar, then leaned back.

This wasn’t his brother spotting him — the one who he was sure used to surreptitiously help him — but this new spotter was hyping him up and the crowd joined in as did his fellow linebacker prospects.

“Everybody in the stands was hyping me up. I got the guys I’m here with hyping me up. It felt amazing,” Griffin said. “I was ready to go. I was ready to attack it.”

His chest heaved. And the counting began. One, two, three.

### France plays to draw with US in SheBelieves Cup

Eugenie Le Sommer scored just before half-time and France finished with a 1-1 draw against the U.S. women's national team on Sunday in the SheBelieves Cup at Red Bull Arena.

Mallory Pugh had put the United States in front in the 35th minute with her ninth international goal. Goalkeeper Alyssa Naehar made a pair of big saves with France pressing late in the game.

The gold medal-winning U.S. women's hockey team was honored before the match in Harrison, New Jersey.

The United States, the top-ranked team in the world, was coming off a 1-0 victory over Germany in the tournament opener in Columbus, Ohio, on Thursday.

France, ranked sixth, won the SheBelieves Cup last year, but dropped the opening match against England 4-1.

### UDINE, ITALY

#### Fiorentina captain Astori found dead before match

Fiorentina captain Davide Astori was found dead in his hotel room on Sunday at the age of 31 after a suspected cardiac arrest before an Italian league match.

The defender, who also played 14 times for Italy's national team, was discovered by Fiorentina staff when he failed to show up for breakfast at the hotel in Udine. Fiorentina's game at Udinese in northeast Italy was called off, along with all fixtures in the country's top two divisions.

Astori's body was taken to the Santa Maria della Misericordia Hospital for an autopsy.

"The belief is that the player died of a cardiac arrest by natural causes," Udine prosecutor Antonio De Nicolo said. "It is strange that such a thing should happen to a professional who is so closely monitored without there being any warning signs."

### LITTLE ROCK, ARK.

#### Mo., Ark. runners win 2018 Little Rock Marathon

A Missouri man and an Arkansas woman have claimed the top spots in the 2018 Little Rock Marathon.

Unofficial results from Sunday's race indicate 23-year-old Drew Mueller of St. Louis won the men's race with an unofficial time of 2:32:35. Mueller, who ran cross country and track for Arkansas State University, says he's been running for 10 years and trains with a club in St. Louis.

Coming in second in the men's race was 31-year-old Benjamin Kopecky, and 27-year-old Jeremy Provence finished in third.

Unofficial results indicate 39-year-old Tia Stone of Searcy won the women's race in just under three hours, marking her third marathon win in a row. Stone previously ran cross country and track at Harding University and has a daughter who runs cross country in middle school.

## Barkley, Griffin shined but Brown didn't at NFL combine

INDIANAPOLIS — All that's left of the 2018 NFL scouting combine is for the deepest class of defensive backs ever to attend the annual assembly of college prospects to wrap up their testing and timing Monday at Lucas Oil Stadium.

Then, they'll join the other hopefuls in returning home to prepare for their pro days, team visits and the NFL draft in Arlington, Texas, next month.

Here's a look at some of the highlights and lowlights of this year's combine:

### Barkley blows it up

Penn State running back Saquon Barkley exceeded lofty expectations in Indianapolis. His 29 reps on the bench bested Luke Kuechly's 27. His 4.4 time in the 40-yard dash was better than Ezekiel Elliott's 4.47 and his 41-inch vertical jump was higher than Odell Beckham Jr.'s 38½.

"Oh no, I'm not surprised," said Nittany Lions linebacker Jason Cabinda, saying he's seen that kind of dogged determination every day out of Barkley, who could go anywhere in the top five picks depending on the run on quarterbacks.

"I'm competitive," Barkley said, "but I don't care if I'm drafted 1, 5 or 72 or the last pick, I'm going to come in with my head low ready to work."

### Great Griffin

Shaquem Griffin did 20 reps on the bench press with a prosthetic left hand in what was by far the best feel-good story of the combine.

"My goal was six," acknowledged Griffin, who almost doubled his previous high of 11 reps and surpassed the 17 his twin brother, Shaquille, managed at last year's combine before the Seattle Seahawks selected the speedy cornerback in the third round.

Griffin is expected to be a mid-rounder like his brother.

"This is a legitimate football player," NFL Network analyst Mike Mayock said. "He's an energy giver."

One who, conversely, fed off the hoots and hollers during his bench press.

"Everybody in the stands was hyping me up. I got the guys I'm here with hyping me up. It felt amazing," Griffin said.

### Jack of one trade

Louisville QB Lamar Jackson showed off a strong arm and excellent footwork but

also some inconsistency while throwing to receivers Saturday. What he didn't do was run routes.

Many wonder if the 2016 Heisman Trophy winner might be best suited as an NFL receiver, but he insists he's "strictly a quarterback."

Mayock called Jackson the best and most fascinating athlete in this year's draft, noting that while his passing game needs plenty of polish, he's going to have an immediate impact running the football.

"He's Michael Vick," Mayock said. "He has as good a pair of legs as anybody in the history of the game. And he's going to win games with his legs."

### Darnold's dodge

USC quarterback Sam Darnold refused to throw at the combine, preferring to show off his arm at his upcoming pro day with receivers he's used to playing with.

"I was a little disappointed Darnold didn't throw," Mayock said. "You get a chance to show off a little bit here. This is all about competition. I wonder in his heart of hearts if he missed competing (Saturday). Because the other guys went out and ripped it pretty good."

"I thought Josh Allen put on a show."

### Hurst goes home

Michigan defensive lineman

Maurice Hurst Jr., a possible first-rounder, was kept out of drills at the combine after doctors reportedly red-flagged a heart condition. Hurst told Utah defensive lineman Lowell Lotulelei that he had been diagnosed with the same heart condition as Lotulelei's older brother, Star.

Hurst, a 6-foot-2, 280-pound defensive tackle, had 59 tackles and 5½ sacks last season. He also had 13 tackles for loss and has been considered one component of a deep class of defensive tackles in this year's draft.

### Bad, bad Orlando Brown Jr.

The only thing that went well for Oklahoma's massive tackle Orlando Brown Jr. was the vote of confidence from his Heisman Trophy-winning teammate.

"When are you ever going to watch Orlando Brown run 40 yards down the field?" quarterback Baker Mayfield asked. "You can watch last year's tape and see he allowed zero sacks. I'd say that's pretty important for a left tackle."

It sure is.

But measures matter, too, and Brown's wretched week will surely cause him to slide down draft boards: He managed just 14 reps on the bench press, lumbered through the 40-yard dash in 5.85 seconds and put up historically poor numbers in the broad and vertical jumps.

## Focus turns toward power conference tournaments

DURHAM, N.C. — North Carolina's bumpy last week of the regular season ended up leaving the ninth-ranked Tar Heels with a tougher road in the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament.

The Tar Heels lost at home on a buzzer-beating 3-pointer to Miami on Tuesday, and then blew a 10-point halftime lead in Saturday's loss at fifth-ranked rival Duke's Cameron Indoor Stadium in their regular-season finale. That dropped the reigning national champions into the No. 6 seed in the ACC Tournament in Brooklyn, meaning the Tar Heels will have to win four games in four days to claim the title.

Had they beaten the Blue Devils, UNC would have been the No. 2 seed and earned a double-round bye into the quarterfinals.

The ACC went into Saturday's final slate of games with plenty of uncertainty behind No. 1 Virginia, which finished four games ahead of second-seeded Duke and had its own buzzer-beating win at Louisville. Then there was a four-way tie at 11-7 in the league between UNC, No. 18 Clemson, North Carolina State and Miami — and the tiebreakers dropped the Tar Heels into Wednesday's second round to face the Wake Forest-Syracuse winner.

Then again, maybe it doesn't matter. Four of the last five ACC teams to win the national championship failed to win the ACC Tournament beforehand, including Duke in 2015 and UNC in 2017. Both lost in the semifinals.

"It's just time to bounce back, not time to panic," senior Joel Berry II said. "That game (against Duke), it's not a national championship game. We've just got to go back and get ready for Brooklyn."

### Arizona's week

No. 19 Arizona generated plenty of headlines in the past week.

Coach Sean Miller's future appeared to be in doubt after an ESPN report said the coach was caught on an FBI wiretap discussing a \$100,000 payment to Deandre Ayton to attend the school.

He missed last weekend's game against Oregon and sat out three practices as the school investigated. But the school announced Miller would keep his job while Miller denied the report in a statement Thursday.

Meanwhile, the Wildcats beat Stanford and California to claim the top seed in the Pac-12 Tournament in Las Vegas. And after Saturday's win against Cal, Miller announced in front of the home crowd that Deandre Ayton, Allonzo Trier and Rawle Alkins would leave school early.

Got all that? Stay tuned for what happens in Vegas.

# Mickelson ends drought with playoff win in Mexico

MEXICO CITY — The shot through a gap in the trees only he could see. The two birdies he had to have when time was running out.

Phil Mickelson finally looked like the Lefty of old Sunday in the Mexico Championship, especially when a final round of pressure, possibilities and dramatic shots that kept the crowd buzzing finally ended at Chapultepec Golf Club.

He was posing with the trophy.

For the first time in 102 tournaments around the world, dating to the summer of 2013 when he won the British Open at Muirfield, the 47-year-old Mickelson showed he still had the stuff to beat players who weren't even born when he collected the first of his 43 victories on the PGA Tour.

"This is a very meaningful win," Mickelson said after beating Justin Thomas in a playoff. "I can't really put it into words given the tough times over the last four years, and the struggle to get here, and knowing that I was able to compete

at this level but not doing it.

"To finally break through and to have this validation means a lot to me."

Mickelson, who closed with a 5-under 66, was at his best over the back nine with as many as six

players still in the mix.

Suddenly two shots behind when Thomas holed out from 119 yards for eagle on the 18th hole, Mickelson played a high-risk shot through the smallest of gaps in the trees to escape with par on the 14th hole. That's when he saw the score, and he followed with a two-putt birdie on the par-5 15th and a 20-foot birdie on the 16th.

Thomas, who won last week in a playoff at the Honda Classic, capped off a 62-64 weekend with more clutch play, no shot bigger than his sand wedge that bounced behind the flag and spun back into the cup on his final hole for eagle.

The playoff — — the sixth in the last eight weeks on the PGA Tour — lasted only one hole on the par-3 17th, where Thomas made bogey for the second time.

With Simpson playing catalyst on both ends of the floor — running Michigan's efficient offense and leading its lock-down defense — and Teske scoring a surprising 14 points, the 15th-ranked Wolverines beat the Boilermakers 75-66.

Fifth-seeded Michigan (28-7) became the first team to repeat as Big

Ten Tournament champs since Ohio State in 2010 and '11.

**No. 11 WICHITA STATE 61:**

Jacob Evans scored 19 points and Cincinnati beat Wichita State to wrap up the American Athletic Conference title.

Cincinnati (27-4, 16-2) survived a slugfest of a second half as the teams combined for just two baskets in the final five minutes. Wichita State (24-6, 14-4) needed a victory to share the conference title and would have earned the top seed in the AAC Tournament after beating Cincinnati earlier this season.

## DeRozan, Raptors hold off Hornets

TORONTO — DeMar DeRozan scored 19 points, Jonas Valanciunas had 18 points and 13 rebounds and the Raptors beat the Charlotte Hornets 103-98 on Sunday night, Toronto's 11th win in 12 games.

Serge Ibaka scored 17 points and Kyle Lowry had 14 as the Eastern Conference-leading Raptors completed their first season sweep of Charlotte since 2006-07. Both DeRozan and Lowry made key 3-pointers down the stretch as Toronto improved to 26-5 at Air Canada Centre, the best home record in the NBA.

Fred VanVleet and C.J. Miles each scored 12 points for the Raptors, who have won four

straight since an overtime loss to Milwaukee on Feb. 23.

"We don't feel like any of those guys are finished products yet," manager Brian Snitker said. "Dansby was coming in after the really good end of the season before, and ... this is a tough league.

"You just don't come in and conquer it. There's been a lot of Hall of Famers that had rough goes at the beginning.

You're going to have setbacks in this game; it's going to beat you over the head probably more times than not. And you have to learn from it and survive it."

Swanson, the No. 1 overall pick by the Arizona Diamondbacks in the 2015 draft, was sent to Triple-A in July after struggling.

"Obviously that's not how you planned for it to go, but there's always a bigger plan to trust," he said. "I was willing to take that in stride and be better

from it. I don't think I ever truly lost confidence in myself. It was just more of like re-evaluating, like finding it again."

Swanson, who came to the Braves along with Ender Inciarte and Aaron Blair in the trade for Shelby Miller in December 2015, hit .213 before his 11-game demotion and .268 when he came back. He said the daily grind was an experience that required adjustments.

"The most I ever played in college was 72 games in a year," he said, "and

now it's 162, you play every day. Physically it's tough, but mentally it can be tough too, if you let it."

Newcomb, the 15th overall pick by the Los Angeles Angels in 2014, came to the Braves a month before Swanson in the Andrelton Simmons trade. He has been in the Braves' rotation since his major league debut on June 10 last year. However his spot for 2018 is not secure yet like those of Julio Teheran, Mike Foltynewicz and Brandon McCarthy.

"I said, this thing feels like 135. Let's go!" Griffin recounted. "And I just started cranking them out."

Four, five, six.

That was easy.

Seven, eight, nine.

The crowd was hollering by now.

Ten, 11 — this was his personal best.

Twelve.

A new high.

Thirteen ... 14 ... 15 ... 16.

The crowd was roaring in disbelief.

Seventeen.

Can this really be happening?

Eighteen!

That's one more than his twin brother, Shaquille, managed at last year's combine before the Seattle Seahawks selected

the speedy cornerback in the third round of the NFL draft.

Nineteen!

One more ... 20!

"I got chill bumps watching him do 20 reps," said NFL Network analyst Mike Mayock. "I literally choked up a little bit watching him do that and I can't wait to watch him tomorrow."

On Sunday, Griffin will run the 40-yard dash, do some quickness drills and some on-field testing at Lucas Oil Stadium.

Griffin was 4 years old when doctors amputated his left hand a day after his mother found him in the kitchen attempting to cut off his jelly-like fingers, which were in scorching pain whenever he touched anything, the result of amniotic band syndrome, a congenital birth defect.

Despite having just one hand, he kept up with his twin brother on and off the field.

As dozens of reporters and photographers gathered around him Saturday, Griffin said, "I thought I was going to walk over here and it was going to be like three people."

Not after becoming the best feel-good story of the combine so far — and by far.

"It was amazing, hearing the crowd and having the juices flowing, I mean I felt it," Griffin said. "I didn't know I had it in me."

Griffin said he's mindset is he always has to do more than those around him to impress coaches.

"I always hold myself to a higher standard than a lot of people just because if we're running drills, if I drop a ball, they're going to like, 'Well, he dropped the ball because he has one hand.' If anybody else drops a ball, they're going to be like, 'Well, maybe it was a bad ball,'" Griffin said.

# Bannister, first to break 4-minute mile, dies at 88

LONDON — Roger Bannister, who as a lanky medical student at Oxford in 1954 electrified the sports world and lifted postwar England's spirits when he became the first athlete to run a mile in under 4 minutes, has died at 88.

Bannister died Saturday in Oxford, the city where he accomplished the feat many had thought impossible. He had been slowed in recent years by Parkinson's disease and, before that, an ankle shattered in a 1975 auto accident.

On a typically cool, wet and blustery English day in May nearly 64 years ago, Bannister put on his spikes and ran four laps around a cinder track in 3 minutes, 59.4 seconds, for one of the defining sporting achievements of the 20th century.

The image of the young Bannister — head tilted back, eyes closed and mouth agape as he strained across the finishing tape — captured

the public's imagination, made him a global celebrity and boosted the morale of Britons still suffering through austerity measures.

Bannister soon retired from competition and went on to a long and distinguished career in medicine, and his mark was broken over and over again, with the world record for the mile now at 3:43.13. But he was a national hero to the end.

Prime Minister Theresa May saluted Bannister as a "British sporting icon whose achievements were an inspiration to us all."

While he will forever be remembered for his running, Bannister said he considered his contributions to neurology more satisfying.

"I wouldn't claim to have made any great discoveries, but at any rate I satisfactorily inched forward in our knowledge of a particular aspect of medicine," he said. "I'm far more content with that than I am about any of the running I did earlier."
