Bay, Franklin form solar co-op

Solar United Neighbors seeks interested homeowners

PANAMA CITY — A non-profit organization that can help residents get a cheaper rate on home solar electric systems has created a chapter in Bay and Franklin counties.

Solar United Neighbors is asking homeowners to agree to have their homes assessed for free to see how much money they could save with solar electric. There is no obligation to buy the system. Once Solar United Neighbors

finds at least 20 to 30 homeowners to agree to do the assessment, the organization will put out a request for proposals seeking a solar electric installer who can offer a group rate.

"A group of interested people will choose the installer, so it's locally driven," said attorney Alvin Peters, a leader in the local initiative, co-sponsored by the Bay County League of Women Voters, the Sierra Club Big Bend Group, the city of Apalachicola, Downtown Books and St. Andrew Bay Watch. "Then, each individual homeowner will enter into his or her separate contract to pay the installer for

whatever roof size they have. It's economies of scale: We're using the combined purchasing power. It increases our negotiating power in the market place. And the advantage to the homeowner is that for a short-term investment they get a long-term return."

The systems are supposed to last at least 30 years and often are paid off in eight or nine years, meaning "it's all gravy" for the homeowner in terms of pocketing money from electric savings after that, Peters said. Many systems also operate at 90 percent efficiency after 30 years, meaning in some cases,

The Landmark Concheliers sound off sunset in St. Andrews

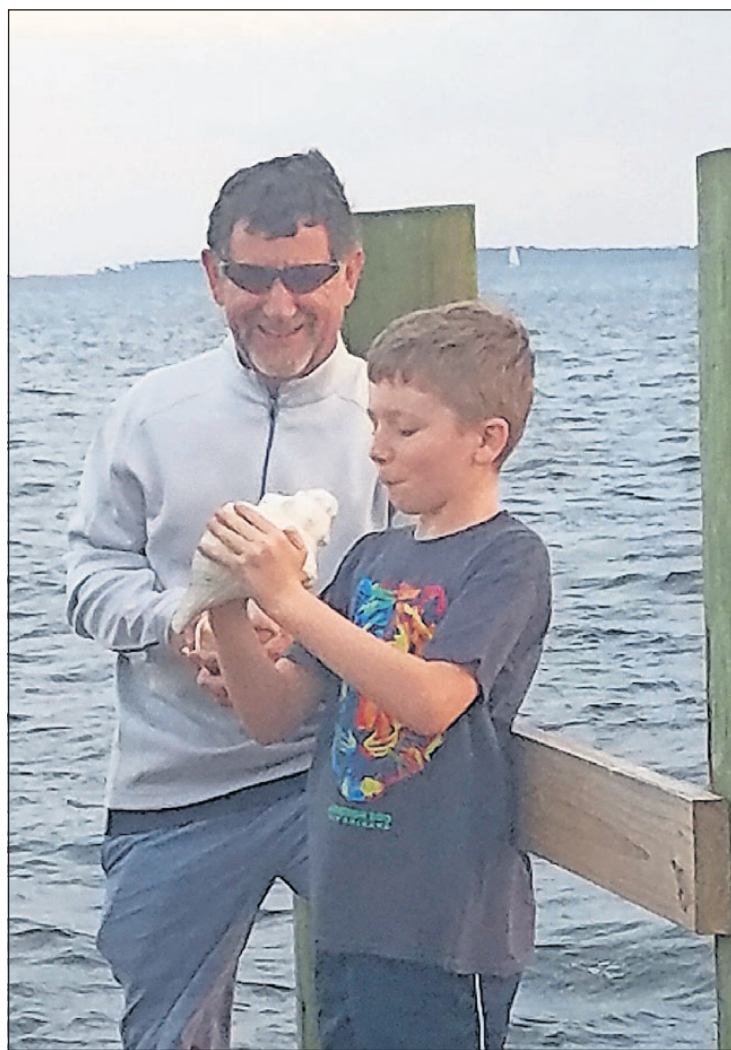
PANAMA CITY — It started with a single conch shell and a memory.

For years, the day ended in St. Andrews when Bill Tant, better known at "Cap'n Scuba", sounded his conch shell four times at sunset to celebrate the end of a day well lived. The low tone, like a coastal taps, would resonate throughout the neighborhood where merchants, businesses and friends waited for its call.

But in 2013, the diving legend died at the age of 84, and for the most part the tradition died out with him.

Then, while on vacation with her husband Billy in the Caribbean, Susie Perkins found a beautiful tiger stripe conch for sale on the beach. Remembering Tant's evening call, she bought it, brought it back to Landmark Condominiums, and started playing it.

That tiger stripe conch launched what's known now as "The Landmark Concheliers."

Miller is dubbed a good choice

Media sources in Washington D.C. have pegged former Florida First District Congressman Jeff Miller as a serious candidate to head the Department of Veterans Affairs for the Trump administration.

Two men who have known him well for many years said Friday they don't think Trump could make a better choice.

"You'd be hard pressed to find someone that knows more about the VA than Jeff Miller does," said Dan McFaul, who served as Miller's chief of staff for all of Miller's 16 years in the U.S. House.

McFaul has solid rationale to back up his statement.

Miller, a resident of tiny Chumuckla in Santa Rosa County, spent his entire congressional career as a member of the Veteran's Affairs Committee and six years as its chairman.

He was often critical of the way the nation's second-largest federal agency was being run and in 2014 played a major role in pushing a \$16 million agency reform plan through Congress.

"He'd make an awesome secretary," McFaul said.

Miller offers much the White House needs after suffering a serious setback when President Donald Trump's first choice for the job, White House physician Ronny Jackson, found himself beset by scandal and was forced to withdraw his nomination.

"I think he would have a very smooth confirmation

Today's Highlight in History: On April 30, 1945, as Soviet troops approached his Berlin bunker, Adolf Hitler committed suicide along with his wife of one day, Eva Braun.

On this date:

In 1789, George Washington took the oath of office in New York as the first president of the United States.

In 1803, the United States purchased the Louisiana Territory from France for 60 million francs, the equivalent of about \$15 million.

In 1812, Louisiana became the 18th state of the Union.

a person can wipe out most of their electric bill.

Angela DeMonbreun, the program director for Solar United Neighbors, outlined the program at a meeting Monday at the Bay County Public Library.

"We will conduct a roof review and let them know if they have a good roof, a maybe good roof (for solar energy)," she said, explaining solar energy experts analyze, among other things, the amount of space on a roof and whether the roof is facing southward.

DeMonbreun said her group is neutral and not tied in any way with solar installers.

"I think it's very appealing the fact that we're a nonprofit, third-party completely neutral to financing and installers," she said. "And we are truly just about giving the community the information that they need to make an informed decision for themselves."

DeMonbreun said Solar United Neighbors also tries to make sure a resident's financing package for solar energy doesn't exceed the savings on the electricity bill.

"We give them examples of financing that may be available," she said. "We conduct the roof review instead of just passing it on to the installer because we do not want people to be oversold something that does not work for them."

"What we also have found is that it truly opens the market as well," she said. "Our requests for proposals don't just go out to local installers. They go out to state installers. We know for a fact that

Panhandle installers have been waiting for a Panhandle co-op to come around, because it works better for them."

At this point, only a couple of companies in Bay County offer installation of solar electric systems. Pensacola-based Compass Solar Energy is one of them.

Dan Gardner, owner of the company, said solar systems can cost \$11,000 and up but can knock off 80 to 90 percent of a customer's electric bill. For example, he said, a customer can save about \$200 a month off their electric bill while paying about \$160 a month toward the loan on the system.

"Once you pay the system off, you are always saving \$200 a month," he said. "That's an investment that increases the home value."

Gardner said his

company, which has been in business since 1998, is doing four times the business this year over what it was doing last year.

"A big part of that growth is we've finally gotten away from legislative battles," he said.

Solar power has been contentious in the state, with voters in 2016 rejecting Amendment 1, a utility-backed measure to limit rooftop solar expansion that many proponents and media organizations had labeled misleading. Current Florida law forbids ordinances, deed restrictions, covenants, or similar binding agreements from prohibiting solar equipment use.

NKorea offers to surrender nukes

Kim Jong Un says at summit he is willing to denuclearize if the US vows not to attack

SEOUL, South Korea — North Korean leader Kim Jong Un told his South Korean counterpart at their historic summit that he would be willing to give up his nuclear weapons if the U.S. commits to a formal end to the Korean War and a pledge not to attack the North, Seoul officials said Sunday.

Kim also vowed during his meeting with South Korean President Moon Jae-in on Friday to shut down the North's nuclear test site in May and disclose the process to experts and journalists from South Korea and the United States, Seoul's presidential office said.

While there are lingering questions about whether North Korea will ever decide to fully relinquish its nukes as it heads into negotiations with the U.S., Kim's comments amount to the North's most specific acknowledgement yet that "denuclearization" would constitute surrendering its weapons.

U.S. national security adviser John Bolton reacted coolly to word that Kim would abandon his weapons if the United States pledged not to invade.

Asked on CBS' "Face the Nation" whether the U.S. would make such a promise,

Bolton said: "Well, we've heard this before. This is — the North Korean propaganda playbook is an infinitely rich resource."

"What we want to see from them is evidence that it's real and not just rhetoric," he added.

Seoul officials, who have shuttled between Pyongyang and Washington to broker talks between Kim and President Donald Trump that are expected in May or June, said Kim has expressed genuine interest in dealing away his

nuclear weapons.

But there has been skepticism because North Korea for decades has been pushing a concept of "denuclearization" that bears no resemblance to the American definition. The North has long vowed to pursue nuclear development unless Washington removes its 28,500 troops from South Korea and the nuclear umbrella defending South Korea and Japan.

During their summit at a truce village on the border,

Moon and Kim promised to work toward the "complete denuclearization" of the Korean Peninsula but made no references to verification or timetables.

Kim also expressed optimism about his meeting with Trump, Moon's spokesman Yoon Young-chan said.

"Once we start talking, the United States will know that I am not a person to launch nuclear weapons at South Korea, the Pacific or the United States," Kim said,

according to Yoon.

Yoon also quoted Kim as saying: "If we maintain frequent meetings and build trust with the United States and receive promises for an end to the war and a non-aggression treaty, then why would we need to live in difficulty by keeping our nuclear weapons?"

The Korean Peninsula technically remains in a state of war because the 1950-53 Korean War was halted with an armistice, not a peace treaty.

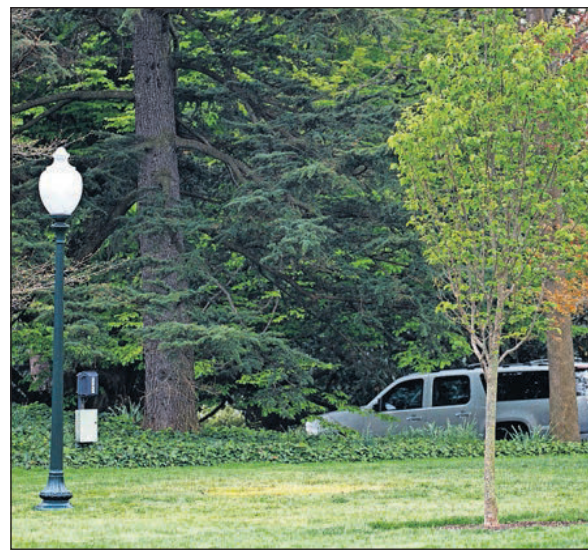
The closing of the nuclear test site would be a dramatic but likely symbolic event to set up Kim's summit with Trump. North Korea already announced this month that it has suspended all tests of nuclear devices and inter-continental ballistic missiles and plans to close its nuclear testing ground.

Still, Adam Mount, a senior defense analyst at the Federation of American Scientists, said Kim's comments were significant because they are his most explicit acknowledgement yet that denuclearization means surrendering his nuclear weapons.

"Questions remain about whether Kim will agree to discuss other nuclear technology, fissile material and missiles. However, they imply a phased process with reciprocal concessions," Mount said in an email. "It is not clear that the Trump administration will accept that kind of protracted program."

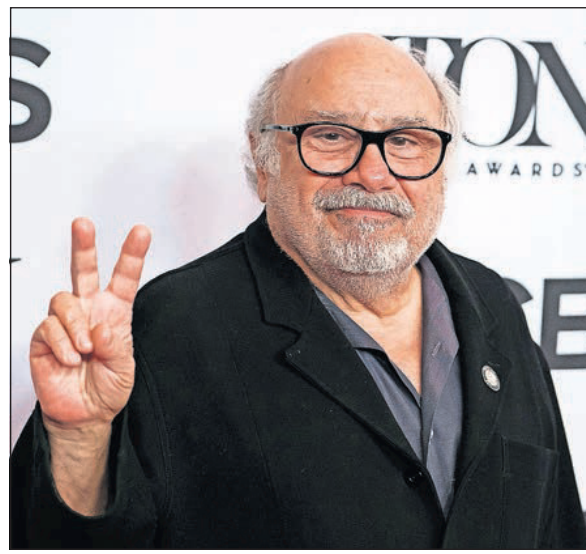

MELBOURNE, AUSTRALIA Fruit's pungent smell mistaken for gas leak

The pungent smell of the rotten durian fruit at an Australian university library has been mistaken for a gas leak, prompting an evacuation of the building.

Specialist crews wearing masks searched the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology university campus library on Saturday, but all they found was rotting durian in a cupboard.

About 600 staff and students had cleared the building.

A Metropolitan Fire Brigade spokesman said the smell alarmed staff and students as it permeated the air-conditioning system.

Durian is a tropical fruit known for its strong smell. It is commonly banned from hotel rooms and public transport.

PORTSMOUTH, VA. Coast Guard rescues man, daughter, off Virginia coast

A Coast Guard helicopter crew has hoisted a man and his 10-year-old daughter to safety after their boat ran aground and began taking on water in the Chesapeake Bay near the mouth of the York River in Virginia.

Authorities were alerted by the man's wife about 11 p.m. Saturday that her husband and daughter were overdue in arriving at Merrimac Shores Yacht Basin in Hampton after traveling down the York River from West Point.

Coast Guard officials were able to contact the man about 12:45 a.m. Sunday and learned that his boat had run aground. The boat's battery had malfunctioned, and the boat was taking on water.

KUWAIT CITY Tempers flare between Kuwait, Philippines over maid abuse

Kuwait on Wednesday expelled the Philippines ambassador and recalled its own envoy from Manila over a growing diplomatic dispute sparked by complaints of the abuse of Filipina housemaids and workers in the country.

The highly unusual move came as a surprise in the typically sedate and oil-rich Gulf Arab nation, both a long target of Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte's criticism and heavily reliant on Filipina nannies and maids.

The two nations had been negotiating an end to the Philippines' ban on workers from heading there following the shocking discovery in February of a Filipina stuffed into a freezer in Kuwait City for over a year.

BOSTON New statue honors civil rights icon Coretta Scott King

Coretta Scott King's alma mater in Boston has unveiled a new statue honoring the civil rights icon.

The New England Conservatory revealed the bronze bust, titled "Continuation of a Dream," last week to mark King's birth on April 27, 1927, in Marion, Alabama.

King was a human rights and social justice activist and wife of Martin Luther King Jr. The couple met as students in Boston.

Martin Luther King received his theology doctorate from Boston University while Coretta Scott King graduated with a music education degree from the New England Conservatory of Music in 1954.

LONDON Londoners warned of health threat from toxic caterpillars

Residents in London are being told to beware the white-haired caterpillars that can cause rashes, vomiting and asthma attacks.

The British Forestry Commission says caterpillars that become oak processionary moths have been spotted in and around the British capital since mid-April.

The caterpillars are covered in thousands of hairs containing the protein thaumetopoein, which can cause skin rashes, sore throats, breathing difficulties and eye problems.

People are being warned not to touch the creatures, which are most often found in oak trees — and to keep pets away from them, too.

Schools fret as teens take to vaping

BOSTON — Sneaking a cigarette in the school bathroom? How quaint. Today's teens have taken to vaping, an alternative to smoking that's so discreet they can do it without even leaving the classroom.

Health and education officials across the country are raising alarms over wide underage use

of e-cigarettes and other vaping products.

The devices heat liquid into an inhalable vapor that's sold in sugary flavors like mango and mint — and often with the addictive drug nicotine. They're marketed to smokers as a safer alternative to traditional cigarettes, but officials say they're making their way to teens with surprising ease.

A new wave of smaller

vapes has swept through schools in recent months, officials say, replacing bulkier e-cigarettes from the past. It's now common in some schools to find students crowded into bathrooms to vape, or performing vape tricks in class.

"We've seen significant increases across the student body," said Robert Keuther, principal at Marshfield High School on the south shore of Massachusetts.

"I started playing it," she said. "Then Randy wanted one, so we got him one, and then Randy took it way father and he started making it for everybody."

Here's what happened: When Perkins started blowing it at the end of last summer in her front yard at Landmark, a celebration sort of sprung up around her. Randy Lindsey, who plays trumpet, became very interested in this new horn, so he got one too.

Then, Lindsey found a "supplier" for conch shells from St. Andrews Bay, from a shrimp boat he didn't want to name. He started drilling holes in them, giving them new life as instruments instead of "leaving them in the sea to become basically chipped up calcium." He gave out 20 to his neighbors, creating a sort of a shell band at Landmark honoring Tant's legacy.

"Some of us are part-timers, some of us are full-timers, but we all had heard of Cap'n Scuba," said Lindsey. "We had

heard up from a distance. Every now and again we could hear him blow, and we want to keep on the tradition."

Every sunset, a group from Landmark gathers on the bayside to blow their conchs, a tradition that is both Tant's and one that has been practiced for centuries in other parts of the world.

At Landmark, the conch players and spectators alike get there a half an hour, or even an hour, early because it's become the place to be.

There are new people — who Lindsey coaches through their first time with advice like "put your lips together. Remember your first date? Pucker up"

— and there are concheliers who have been out there everyday since August 2017. There are nine-year-olds and 72-year-olds.

"You know people are going to be here," said Marilyn Agee, who is one of three full-time residents who form the backbone of the group. "People come out with us ... just to enjoy the sunset and the celebration. It has really brought a sense of community here at Landmark, which has been amazing."

When the sun starts to dip, those with shells gather together, blow their horns four times — once in each cardinal direction — and then end with one long, loud blow as the last rays are extinguished.

process. He's as humble and competent as they come," McFaul said. "He's a pretty collaborative guy and has worked over the years with both sides of the aisle and I think his veteran-centric vision of the VA is very much in line with President Trump's."

The urgency of curbing pollution from ships

The International Maritime Organization, a United Nations agency that regulates global shipping, is writing new rules to curb greenhouse gas emissions from ships by 2050 as it implements other regulations that will mandate cleaner-burning fuels at sea by 2020.

Researchers who study the shipping industry have determined that the benefits of greener shipping outweigh the costs. Yet global environmental rule-making, implementation and enforcement take a long time, creating delays that can endanger public health and the environment.

Heavy fuel oil

The more than 52,000 ships crisscrossing ocean trade routes will burn more than 2 billion barrels of heavy fuel oil this year. Heavy fuel oil, a crude oil byproduct, contains sulfur concentrations up to 1,800 times higher than the diesel fuel burned on U.S. highways.

Ships contribute between 2 and 3 percent of the world's total greenhouse gas emissions, studies show. Unless the world takes action to control noxious air pollutants and reduce greenhouse gases, harmful pollution will grow in tandem with global trade in the coming decades.

Atmospheric processes transform ship exhaust into toxic particles, which drift far from shipping routes. Originating along shipping routes, these pollutants endanger human health and acidify lakes and streams hundreds of miles inland.

Public health hazard

As part of an international team of scholars, scientists researched how sulfur-related pollution from ships affects human health. They found that ship pollution causes about 400,000 premature deaths from lung cancer and cardiovascular disease, and 14 million cases of childhood asthma each year.

Maritime regulation requires cooperation among many, if not most, of the world's nations, using their shared authority to verify compliance upon arrival in their ports. But at sea, most shipping companies operate relatively independently of the country where they are headquartered.

The International Maritime Organization sets international shipping policies through consensus agreements that specify compliance requirements and leave enforcement up to national authorities. In 2008, governments and industries agreed to adopt cleaner fuels in 2020. Since then, we estimate that ship air pollution exposure contributed to more than 1.5 million premature deaths and aggravated asthma conditions for over 100 million children.

It's possible to set smart laws that will protect both industry and the lakes, rivers and oceans by our homes as well as people's health. However, given the climate benefits of low-carbon shipping, we believe that the world can't wait three decades to set and enforce shipping greenhouse gas targets.

A Plutocratic Coup

Many Americans are reluctant to accept that coup conspiracies are part of country's history.

We tend believe that plots to overthrow the government are totally foreign to our national character. But we do do coups. In fact, the country itself was founded on an armed coup to replace the legal ruler, King George III, with a gang of revolutionary upstarts. One coup that most of us haven't heard of is The Wall Street Putsch of 1933. It's a heck of a story.

In 1933, the Great Depression was in full force, and the people's boiling political anger was scaring the aloof denizens of Wall Street, as unfettered capitalism seemed threatened.

The year before, Franklin D. Roosevelt had scored a landslide presidential victory over Wall Street's man, then-President Herbert Hoover, and, to the bankers' horror, the new president's plans included new taxes on wealth.

Such Wall Street multimillionaires as Grayson M-P. Murphy (banker and Anaconda Copper Mining Co. head) and Robert Sterling Clark (heir to the Singer sewing machine fortune) were

enraged by FDR's moves. "Class war," they wailed, claiming that their "liberty" to grab as much wealth as possible was being shackled.

Calling Roosevelt a traitor to his class, these men implemented a plan to oust him by enlisting a private military force made up of thousands of destitute World War I vets who were protesting the failure to receive promised federal bonus payments. Gerald MacGuire, Murphy's bond salesman, was an ex-soldier and an active member of The American Legion. MacGuire reached out to retired Marine Maj. Gen. Smedley Darlington Butler, a respected advocate for veterans. After several meetings spent discussing veterans' issues, MacGuire finally explained the financial powers he represented wanted Butler to create a paramilitary corps of 500,000 vets and march on Washington to force FDR from the White House.

MacGuire told Butler the Wall Street cohort plus a new group called American Liberty League (made up of corporations like DuPont, Colgate, General Foods and General Motors) were prepared to fund the cause to the tune of \$300 million (about \$5.6 billion in today's money), and Remington Arms would supply the weapons. The conspirators thought FDR would go down without a fight and would welcome the coup. Once in place, the financiers and militarists would install a "secretary of

general affairs" to run the country. And one of their choices was Smedley Butler.

But he was the wrong general. Butler was astounded and repulsed by the hubris and treachery of these aristocrats from Wall Street. Butler enlisted investigative reporter Paul Comly French to help gather proof of the bankers' intent. With evidence in hand, Butler got the House Special Committee on Un-American Activities to conduct an investigation, which convinced members of the committee Butler's story was "alarmingly true." The committee then opened public hearings with Butler giving detailed testimony.

Wall Street responded by immediately launching a coordinated counterattack assailing Butler and claiming a coup was preposterous. They got the establishment media to pile on to discredit him. But the House committee final report was "able to verify all the pertinent statements made by General Butler."

Nonetheless, officials failed to punish the perpetrators of this outrageous assault on our democracy.

Fortunately, a real patriot was able to expose the traitors, nipping the coup d'etat in the bud. Their attempt reveals the threat of concentrated wealth and the ever-present danger that the imperious rich pose to majority rule. Not only should this real-life drama be highlighted in history books; it should be a blockbuster movie.

Mallory Quigley implied that Bill Nelson had supported funding abortions through Planned Parenthood. There is no line item for Planned Parenthood. PP bills Medicaid for services covered Medicaid only. They do not waste time

billing for services that are not covered; they have to get abortion funding from the woman herself or other sources. Planned Parenthood provides and Medicaid covers a lot of other medical services for women including PAP smears, STD testing and treatment, and screening and treatment for many other women's ailments.

Further Ms. Quigley referred to Fetal Pain at 21 weeks of gestation. Medical scientists are in agreement that a fetus feels no pain prior to the third trimester and probably not until birth. A 2005 multidisciplinary review published in the Journal of American Medical Association clearly and comprehensively addressed this issue.

Thalamocortical fibers begin to form between 23 and 30 weeks of gestation, but the pathways to the cortex must be fully functional for pain to exist, usually at 29 to 30 weeks. Movement by the fetus in response to stimuli does not mean pain. If a doctor hits your knee with a rubber hammer, your leg will react, but you will feel no pain.

I personally believe that abortion should be considered a normal part of reproductive healthcare for women just like birth control and pregnancy care. I also believe that Medicaid and other health insurance programs should cover it.

Push your retirement savings into overdrive

Just 6 in 10 workers report having saved anything — anything — for retirement, according to the Employee Benefit Research Institute.

And data from workplace plan administrator and fund giant Vanguard show that just 18 percent of workers save the 10 percent or more of income that experts recommend squirreling away for retirement. More than a third are putting away less than 4 percent.

Here are some ways later-in-life savers can address anemic retirement portfolios.

1. Move the goal post

Pushing back the due date for retirement may not be your ideal tactic, but it is one of the most effective. The primary value of putting your plans on hold is that compound interest has some extra years to work its magic. Example: Give a \$250,000 portfolio an additional three years to grow and that'll get you about \$48,000 in extra padding if it earns a 6 percent average annual return.

Every extra year you work and save is also one more year you won't be drawing down your portfolio.

2. Go part-time

Easing your way out of the workforce by reducing your hours at your existing job may

provide just enough leisure time without completely cutting off the paychecks.

If part-time isn't an option at your current employer, look into working on a per-project or contractor basis. A bonus is that as a sole proprietor you can set up a SEP IRA or Solo 401(k), with which the contribution limits may be much higher than allowed in a regular IRA or employer-sponsored 401(k).

3. Play catch-up

The IRS allows workers 50 or older to make "catch-up contributions" in employer-sponsored retirement plans: an additional \$6,000 a year for a total of \$24,500.

Although that's a lot of money to defer, it comes with a lot of tax breaks, too. Not only do contributions lower your taxable income for the year on a dollar-for-dollar basis, but as long as the money's in the account, you owe nothing to Uncle Sam on the investment growth.

The IRS also offers a catch-up contribution allowance on individual retirement accounts. And if you're not already saving in an IRA, that means you can put away an additional \$6,500 a year once you're 50 or older — and potentially with some additional tax benefits.

4. Grow your spouse's savings

IRS rules state that to be eligible to contribute to an IRA you must have earned income.

But, as is the case with many things related to the tax code, there's an exception to the rule: The spousal IRA.

If one person in the household works and the other does not (or if they earn a very low income), then an IRA can be opened in the nonworking spouse's name based on all the same eligibility requirements that apply to the working spouse. You must file a joint tax return to be eligible.

5. Get someone else to pay

A reverse mortgage is a type of loan — typically issued as a home equity conversion mortgage — that allows homeowners to tap the equity they've built up tax-free for as long as you or a qualified surviving spouse has the home as a primary residence.

To qualify for the FHA's reverse mortgage program, the applicant must be 62 or older, own the house outright or have a sizable amount of equity and the financial means to continue to cover maintenance and property taxes.

6. Don't overdo your emergency fund

When you're running out of years to get your money to multiply, it's critical that every dollar you don't need in the near term is working as hard as it can. To give those dollars the chance to earn as much as possible, they should be invested in the stock market.

Smart ways to help your kids own a home

Younger home buyers face a mountain of obstacles, including rising home prices and interest rates, too few homes for sale and unpaid college debt. When the National Association of Realtors surveyed recent home buyers who had problems saving up a down payment, 53 percent of those in the youngest group (37 and younger) blamed student loan debt for their difficulty.

Families appear to be pitching in to help, according to the results of that survey in the 2018 NAR Home Buyer and Seller Generational Trends Report. Among buyers who made a down payment, 23 percent of those 37 and younger used a gift and 6 percent a loan from family or friends — the highest proportion for either type of assistance among all age groups.

Family assistance like this works best when the kids qualify for a mortgage on their own and parents make the purchase more affordable with, for example, a bigger down payment or a lower interest rate, says Jeremy Heckman, a certified financial planner with Accredited Investors Wealth Management in Edina, Minnesota.

To create a businesslike distance for these transactions, Heckman suggests that parents:

- Consider disclosing the assistance to all immediate family
- Consider treating all siblings equally
- Use contracts
- Document gifts

Formal agreements offer important benefits, says San Francisco real estate attorney Andy Sirkin. They define obligations and minimize misunderstandings. And if parent lenders die or become incapacitated, all their heirs can view the transaction and its history.

Here are three ways parents can help make it more affordable for new home buyers:

1. Give money

Parents can write a check for any amount they choose. That's it — no contract or ongoing commitments. Or they can pay all or part of an expense such as mortgage closing costs. Providing down payment assistance can help new borrowers avoid paying for private mortgage insurance, which helps keep their monthly payment low.

2. Finance the mortgage

Parents with cash to invest can become the mortgage lender, offering extra-easy terms like no closing costs or no down payment. Heckman says they can charge a higher rate of interest on their money than it earns in a savings or money market account and still offer kids a lower-than-market mortgage rate.

Jay Weil, an attorney in Wayne, New Jersey, and his wife, Judy, have financed two mortgages for their son Matt and Matt's wife, Allison. For the first, they decided to use a service that facilitates family loans: National Family Mortgage charges one-time setup fees of \$725 to \$2,100, depending on the loan size, and provides all necessary forms and documents to meet state, local and IRS requirements. It guides families through the settlement and filing process and connects borrowers with loan servicers.

Family lenders must charge at least the Applicable Federal Rate, the minimum interest rate required to keep the assistance from being considered a gift.

3. Co-borrow

Mortgages with co-borrowers were nearly a quarter of all new-purchase mortgages in the third quarter of 2017, according to ATTOM Data Solutions, a real estate data company.

Parents apply for the mortgage, too. They must meet the lender's credit requirements and sign loan papers with their kids at closing.

A separate family contract can define expectations and details such as who gets how much equity when the home sells, says Sirkin.



Still signing for card purchases? Not for long

The major credit card networks — American Express, Visa, Discover and Mastercard — will no longer require signatures on transactions in the U.S. beginning this month. Retailers can still require signatures, though some have already stopped the practice when a purchase is under a certain amount.

Why this change?

Card networks want to keep their customers happy, and that includes making payments as easy and efficient as possible. Given that signatures are no longer needed to ensure security and prevent fraud, card networks determined that requiring signatures was a waste of time.

Jasma Ghai, vice president of global products innovation at Discover, says, "With the rise in new payment security capabilities the time is right to remove this step from the checkout experience."

Does this mean I can let a friend use my card?

No. If it's your credit card, you are still the one solely responsible for all charges and for paying off the balance. Unless you have authorized users or a joint account holder on the card, you should be the only one using it.

Is my card less secure now?

Quite the opposite: Credit card security is improving all the time. In fact, the addition of chip technology to credit cards means that a unique code is created for each transaction so that if a data breach happens, your account number isn't exposed.

Card issuers also have automated systems that constantly check for aberrations in spending or unusual charges; they are often more likely than you are to first notice a fraudulent charge and call you to stop charges before you've noticed anything amiss.

Plus, credit card issuers offer robust fraud protection — so even if you do become a victim of credit card fraud, you likely won't be out any money.

Happy milestone for EOD memorial

For the first time since 2001 there are no new names from Iraq or Afghanistan

EGLIN AFB — For the first time since the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks on the United States, a memorial wall for military bomb technicians will not have any names added from action in Iraq and Afghanistan during the annual memorial ceremony.

The annual Explosive Ordnance Disposal Memorial Ceremony, which honors fallen military bomb technicians from all of America's military services, is scheduled for 9 a.m. May 5 at the memorial, located across from the

Naval School Explosive Ordnance Disposal at Eglin Air Force Base.

"While we do not have any EOD technicians that have lost their lives this past year, it is not lost upon us that our job is still inherently dangerous and we still have many airmen, sailors and soldiers that are deployed and serving in many different parts of the world today," Capt. Charles Andrews, commanding officer of Naval School Explosive Ordnance Disposal, said in a prepared statement.

This year's ceremony will honor fallen EOD technicians who served in World War II, Vietnam and Grenada, Billy Martin, the public affairs officer for the Naval School, said in an email.

Research of EOD technicians whose service qualifies

them for inclusion on the wall is ongoing, and it is possible that technicians from past conflicts will be honored significantly after their service has ended.

It's also possible that the inclusion of a name on the wall will be delayed until family members are ready to attend a ceremony.

The World War II bomb technicians whose names will be added to the memorial wall this year are Army Cpl. Norman Reynolds, Army Pvt. Joseph T. Seredinski, Army Cpl. Joseph J. Kozic, Army Cpl. Elmer L. Allison, Navy Lt. j.g. John T. S. Och, Navy Lt. j.g. George P. McNear III, Navy Lt. Lawrence L. Heideman and Navy Lt. j.g. Marvin W. Johnson.

Contracts put armed officers at elementary schools

PANAMA CITY — Every public, non-charter elementary school in Bay District Schools will officially have an armed law enforcement officer guarding it during the school day as part of a series of contracts the school district has signed with area agencies and city governments.

The agreements are expected to cost the district about \$250,000 in total through the end of the school year. After the school year ends, the district will likely move forward with hiring their own Bay District Schools Police officers to station at all of the elementary schools.

There are already School Resource Deputies assigned to the district's middle and high schools.

On Tuesday, School Board members signed the contracts, also known as Memorandums of Understanding (MOU's) with the Bay County Sheriff's Office, Panama City Police Department, Panama City Beach Police Department, Springfield Police Department, Parker Police Department and Lynn Haven Police Department to cover elementary schools within their jurisdiction. The assignments will be given out on a volunteer basis to officers normally off-duty at that time. According to the contracts, officers will be paid \$28 per hour, while BCSO deputies will receive between \$31 and \$37 per hour.

Video game champ stripped of record scores fighting back

FORT LAUDERDALE — South Florida's Billy Mitchell, once declared the Video Game Player of the Century, is now facing the ultimate test of his skills: salvaging his reputation.

Twin Galaxies, competitive gaming's governing body, found him guilty of cheating. On April 12, it banned Mitchell for life and removed all his high scores from their record books, including his undisputed Donkey Kong and Pac-Man records from the 1980s and 1990s.

Mitchell has begun to assemble a group of experts to dispute the findings. He plans to show that Donkey Kong loading screens from his games are from the real arcade game, not a software emulator, as his detractors have claimed. An emulator allows a computer program to imitate another program.

He also wants to find witnesses for his most recent — and most disputed — high score, a 1,062,800-point benchmark set at the now-shuttered Boomers in Dania Beach.

"They said it was this version or that version (of a software emulator). When they finally said it's a specific version, somebody came out and said that version didn't come out until two years after I played the game," said Mitchell, in his first interview since losing his records. "I don't really know — I don't know anything about this stuff."

Mitchell, a longtime Hollywood resident who now lives in Weston, achieved the high score at the Boomers location on July 31, 2010. He recalls more than 100

people shuffling in and out, a few dozen at any one time, as he ran up the scoreboard for several hours that day. But it was only the latest in a run of high scores going back decades.

In 1982, at the age of 17, Mitchell became the first person to reach the fabled kill screen of Donkey Kong, when the arcade game reaches its memory limit at level 117 and Mario seemingly commits suicide, dying for no reason. His total: 874,300 points.

He followed that up by

reclaiming the Donkey Kong high score four more times, three against Steve Wiebe, his rival in the 2007 documentary "The King of Kong," a film that cemented Mitchell's image as the black hat of competitive gaming. Barrel, jump, hammer, smash. 933,900 points. 1,047,200 points. 1,050,200 points. 1,062,800 points.

It's those last two high scores that have landed him in hot water. Twin Galaxies, the Guinness World Record-sanctioned

keeper of video game high scores, ruled Mitchell's scores were achieved on software that emulates Donkey Kong, not on the arcade game itself. That's a problem because the software would allow someone to save and stop a game, which in turn would allow them to go back and replay if they die or get a score on a level they don't like.

It's a far fall for a man declared the "Video Game Player of the Century" in 1999 by the Japanese Amusement Machine and Marketing Association. He had just pulled off the first perfect Pac-Man score in history — 256 levels, consuming every fruit, every dot, every power pellet and every blue ghost with every power pellet consumed, all without dying once. 3,333,360 points.

"Probably my strongest accolade is that I did the first perfect Pac-Man," Mitchell said. "It was quite the gala event. It was at the largest arcade in the world. Namco (Pac-Man's creator) took me and flew me to Japan, where I had to repeat the performance."

Now, as far as the score-keeping body is concerned, that never happened. Not to mention his record-setting scores in Donkey Kong Jr, Ms. Pac-Man and Burger Time. The tally: 957,300 points. 703,560 points. 7,881,050 points and an unknown number of hot dogs and eggs crushed beneath giant hamburger ingredients.

"The idea that they would go back and undo what was done more than 30 years ago in front of cameras and Life Magazine and the best gamers of the day — it's laughable," he said.

State holds highest rate of juveniles in adult prison

MILTON — Since leaving her family practice, retired physician Dr. Paula Montgomery spends her time advocating for juvenile delinquents along with the League of Women Voters.

Florida has the highest number of juveniles in the adult prison system in the U.S.

According to data from the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice, the First Circuit — which includes Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa and Walton counties — has the highest rate of direct-filed children, compared to all eligible for direct file, at 24.4 percent. The state average is 8.8 percent. The state's direct-file statute allows prosecutors to move a range of juvenile cases to adult court without a judge's input.

"That will blow your mind," Montgomery said. "Why is it that way?"

According to the 2017 report on Florida by the State of America's Children, 131 children were in adult jails or prisons in Florida in 2015. That same year, the Florida Supreme Court ruled that juveniles not convicted of murder may not be sentenced to life in prison, and those convicted of murder may not be sentenced to life without parole, citing that children are less liable for crimes committed and more agreeable to rehabilitation.

But is the adult prison system rehabilitating these children? Montgomery says no.

"The juvenile system is set up to include education and rehabilitation," Montgomery said. "There's really no arrangement for that in the adult prisons. Some of them have a way the kid can get a GED eventually. ... In Florida, you're not eligible for (college coursework) until three years before your release. ... The adult system is keyed in on punishment."

Montgomery said she talks to different organizations — most recently, the Milton Rotary Club — and people are reluctant to believe these facts.

Montgomery gets some of her data from the Florida Legislature Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability, which shows that the average age of juvenile cases directly filed into adult criminal court by the state attorney is 16.4, and the most common offense is burglary.

The 2017 Florida Policy Institute Report found that 63 percent of youth in prison are incarcerated for drug use, disorderly conduct, probation violations, property crimes and status offenses, such as running away.

runs counter to the dual goals of making Florida safer and rehabilitating offenders to become productive and contributing members of the community," the report said. "Youth imprisonment is ineffective and has produced a range of negative outcomes for affected youth, communities and taxpayers."

This is the same stance Montgomery has and continues to fight for. So why are the juvenile delinquents of First Circuit continuing to be filed into the adult prison system?

"The reason that my numbers are higher is a number of things," said Bill Eddins, State Attorney of the First Circuit. "If you go back 13 years since I've been in office, you will see that the number of juveniles that were transferred from juvenile court to adult court initially went down until a few years ago when it trended back up."

Eddins cites a crisis in the First Circuit approximately three years ago when juvenile gangs burglarized cars and homes.

"I decided to take a very aggressive approach about transferring juvenile gang members who committed a large number of burglaries ... or who committed violent crimes to adult court," Eddins said. "As a result, the numbers ... increased pretty dramatically. However, those numbers have now begun to trend back down."

Eddins said in the past, he transferred a lot of older juveniles, which includes teens up to 19 years old, from the juvenile justice system to adult court. However, he has recently changed his philosophy.

"I decided that unless it's a violent crime, or ... they have a bad record, I'm not going to be as aggressive about transferring older juveniles to adult court," Eddins said.

According to Eddins, transferring a child to the adult court system does not mean they will be sent to an adult prison rather than a juvenile justice facility. Under state law, the judge has the final say on the child's sentence.

The number of direct-filed children has been decreasing statewide — down 24 percent in the last five years — but the numbers in Santa Rosa County are beginning to rise again after a decline.

Santa Rosa's rate is down 2 percent from five years ago, but up 6 percent since last year.

NAPLES High red tide levels kill fish in southwest Florida coast

An outbreak of red tide is killing fish along the southwest Florida coast.

The Naples Daily News reports the algae that cause red tide were found in samples collected in the beaches of Collier and Lee counties, according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. Fish kills were reported at Bonita Beach, Fort Myers Beach and South Marco Beach among others.

High concentrations are harmful to wildlife and can cause respiratory problems in humans. Coughing and breathing problems were reported in the two counties.

Typically, red tide

season is from late summer to early fall. This year, it has been lingering in southwest Florida for much of the spring.

MIAMI Will Miami Marine Stadium ever reopen?

The Miami Marine Stadium has been added to the National Register of Historic Places. Cue the applause, but inclusion on the list won't do much to advance the stadium's long-delayed restoration.

Inclusion on the register, which is maintained by the National Park Service, is considered an honor. There are tens of thousands of properties on the list across the country ranging from the celebrated to the obscure.

But the registry doesn't confer any legal protection

to the stadium's grandstand structure or its boat basin. Nor does it advance efforts to restore the 1963 stadium, which is owned by the city of Miami and has been closed since 1992. The stadium is protected by local historic designation, conferred in 2008, which bars demolition.

Widely regarded as an architectural and engineering gem, the stadium on Virginia Key has been the focus of a yearslong local and national campaign seeking its renovation and reopening. But planning for a promised reopening of the shuttered, graffiti-covered grandstand has moved at a glacial pace.

The city earmarked \$45 million for the restoration of the stadium under former mayor Tomas Regalado, who made its renovation a cornerstone

of his administration, but left office last year after two terms with no work undertaken. Engineering and architectural studies have been underway for more than a year, but the city has no operational plan for the stadium.

The lack of an operating plan recently prompted Miami Commissioner Joe Carollo, elected in November, to rail against spending money to renovate the stadium, which he claimed no one in his Little Havana district would ever visit.

The stadium was once a popular site for boat races, concerts by stars like Ray Charles, Jimmy Buffett and the Beach Boys, Easter services and other special events.

The stadium's parking lot is now the site of the annual Miami boat show.

Expert helping to identify Daytona shipwreck

PONTE VEDRA BEACH — By identifying the different types of wood used and some of the building methods employed, one expert is helping others to narrow down the origin of a section of shipwrecked hull that washed ashore south of Ponte Vedra Beach in March.

“I don’t normally see this,” Lee Newsom said Monday morning while holding up a small section of that ship’s frame. “I see a lot of oak in this position.”

The specimen in Newsom’s hand was American beech and she pointed out that the way it had been milled provided more clues.

“That’s the center of the tree,” she said. “You don’t normally do that either unless you are short on wood.”

Newsom would know. She’s a professor of anthropology at Flagler College in St. Augustine, but her specialty and what she works most in is what she calls “environmental archaeology,” which is the study of plant-based materials at archaeological sites. Her other titles

include archaeologist, paleoethnobotanist, and wood anatomist.

“My research involves work with preserved plant remains from archaeological and paleontological sites, and is generally directed toward trying to unravel some of the deep history and inter-complexities of

the human-environmental relationship,” reads a portion of her research description on the college’s website.

The MacArthur Fellow is involved in a lot of different work, as she works with the Florida Museum of Natural History and the Department of Anthropology at the University

of Florida in addition to her teaching position. Standing in her small lab in downtown St. Augustine’s Government House surrounded by specimens from various projects she rattled off a few, veering into descriptions of each one with a healthy dose of enthusiasm.

There’s a paleo-Indian

site at Wakulla Springs, a Calusa site on Mound Key, a project in Cuba and even a small canvas bag of fossils that a local beachcomber brought in.

He also had some metal fittings that he said he found north of the city.

“Now I am wondering if they actually go with that ship,” she said, referencing the recent discovery that is now believed to be the remnants of a ship that was likely built in the mid-19th century and was probably 100- to 150-feet long.

Though she works on all kinds of projects, Newsom, the granddaughter of a shipwright, said she has worked on more than 200 shipwrecks in her career.

“I’m just super interested in the shipbuilding,” she said. “I come by it honestly.”

Chuck Meide, the director of maritime research at the St. Augustine Lighthouse Archaeological Maritime Program, said her reputation in the field preceded her.

“We were really overjoyed,” he said, recalling when they heard someone with Newsom’s background and expertise was coming to Flagler

College. “I was personally excited.”

Meide is among the archaeologists who have been studying the Ponte Vedra shipwreck — often referred to now as the “Spring Break Wreck” — since it washed up on March 28.

He and others on Thursday managed a move of the roughly 50-foot long artifact up the beach and across State Road A1A to the trailhead in the Guana Tolomato Matanzas National Estuarine Research Reserve, where officials hope to build a shelter to protect it from the elements.

Newsom, through her study of the samples she has been given, says she’s seen white pine, longleaf pine, American beech and white oak in the ship.

Though there is still more research to do and researchers have to verify where such species were growing in the mid-19th century, both she and Meide have mentioned Georgia, the Carolinas and possibly the Gulf Coast as origins for much of the timber.

“This is a great way to really narrow down the geographic origin of the ship,” Meide said.

Vietnam veterans Army Capt. Paul B. Bowman and Army Capt. Frederick P. Smith also will be added to the memorial.

Two sailors who lost their lives in Grenada, Navy Petty Officer 1st Class Stephen L. Morris and Navy Senior Chief Petty Officer Robert R. Schamberger, will also be remembered as well.

The EOD school trains

bomb technicians from all branches of the American military, Department of Defense personnel and some foreign military members. The school is managed by the Navy, but its staff includes Army, Marine Corps and Air Force personnel.

The memorial was originally located at what is now the Naval Surface Warfare Center at Indian Head, Maryland. It was dedicated there in 1970, but was disassembled, redesigned and relocated to Eglin in 1999 when EOD instruction was consolidated. The

current memorial includes four dark tablets, or cenotaphs — one each for the Army, Marine Corps, Navy and Air Force — in front of a carved white wall. A bronze tablet with the names of the fallen is attached to each cenotaph.

There are 326 men and women memorialized on the wall, all of whom died in service to their country since 1942.

The annual memorial observance routinely brings a few thousand people to Eglin to pay their respects, according to Martin.

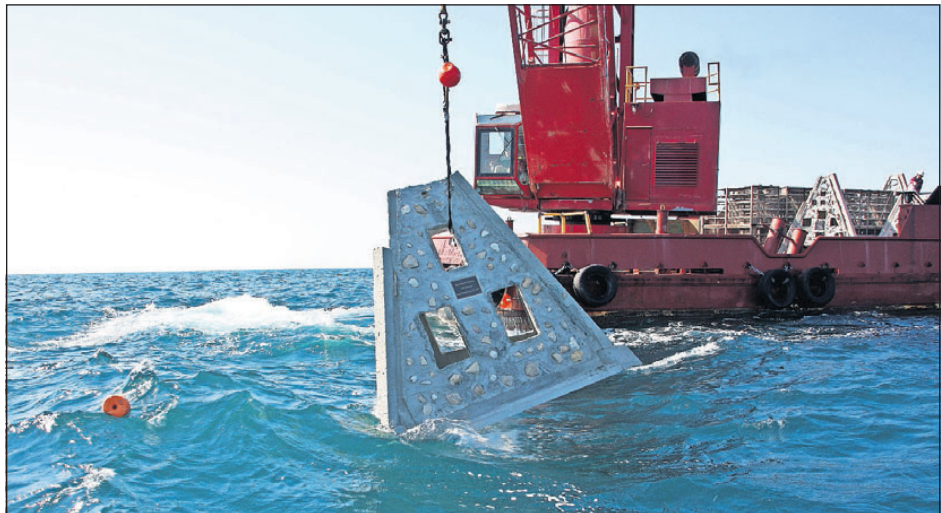
Since its founding in 1997, MBARA has deployed more than 150 artificial reefs of varying shapes and size. This month’s deployment included 10 super reefs — 16 by 15 feet and 18 tons each — 16 pyramids, nine grouper reefs and 22 chicken transport units, the smallest of MBARA’s structures.

Of the 16 pyramids, 10 were memorial reef structures honoring loved ones, friends, military, and veterans.

The deployment, which will be featured on a segment of the Discovery Channel’s “Chasin’ the Sun,” also used technology new to MBARA.

“This year’s project used a new capability aboard Walter Marine’s newest vessel, a Dynamic Positioning System (DPS),” MBARA President Bob Cox said.

The system has a robust autopilot feature

in which a computer and GPS system take control of the ship’s steering, throttles and bow thrusters, keeping the vessel in a stationary position working against currents, tides, and winds that would otherwise move the vessel away from targeted stationary location such as a reef construction site.

“This is the first artificial reef construction vessel using DPS in our region, and we’re pleased with the accurate and precise placements,” Cox

said, adding, “the DPS was instrumental in successful construction of Mexico Beach’s largest reef to date.”

Artificial reefs can help conserve marine resources and benefit the local economy. With natural reefs in jeopardy from environmental changes and physical damage, MBARA cites artificial reefs’ ability to play a mitigating role to preserve ocean ecosystems for future generations.

“Additionally, economic studies show that every

dollar invested in artificial reef construction provides an annual return of over \$131 to a local economy that’s heavily dependent tourism, recreation, and seafood industry,” according to MBARA.

Some Florida mayors want say on gun laws

WESTON — After a shooting at a Parkland, Florida, high school left 17 people dead, the mayor of nearby Weston wanted to prohibit people from carrying guns in public buildings and parks — a move that could lead to him being kicked out of office and on the hook for thousands of dollars in fines and attorneys' fees.

Florida law prohibits local municipalities from passing ordinances that regulate firearms or ammunition, and if one is passed that violates the state statute, it will be declared void. Elected or appointed officials involved in the drafting or passage of such local rules face fines of up to \$5,000, will be unable to use a city attorney and could be held responsible for footing up to \$100,000 of the legal bills for anyone who challenges the local rule in court. The governor is also given the power to kick them out of office.

Florida is among 43 states that in some way restrict municipalities from enacting gun laws stricter than those in place at the state level. After a spate of mass shootings during the past few months, some localities are challenging the laws in court or narrowly crafting rules that circumvent the state.

Weston Mayor Daniel Stermer joined nine other municipalities in a lawsuit earlier this month that says the penalties under Florida's law are "onerous, unconstitutional and unprecedented" as well as "vindictive and expressly intended to be punitive in nature."

Plaintiffs say the state laws have a chilling effect and force local officials out of taking action when it comes to guns in their communities — creating fears that local authorities could be held personally responsible for the changes.

"I'm putting my office where my mouth is," said Stermer, who initiated the lawsuit and drafted the local gun control ordinance. A city commission will discuss it at an upcoming workshop. "I'm prepared to put my

office on the line for this. Until we all stand up and say something, nothing's going to change. Parkland is in our backyard. It's 20 minutes away."

Florida's law is part of a class of ordinances called preemption laws, which are aimed at curtailing local power. They are tangible examples of the growing divide between Republican statehouses and Democratic cities, and they have been enacted to address a spate of issues during the past three decades, including taxation and minimum wage.

The best-known example is the 2016 "bathroom bill" passed in North Carolina, which attempted to undercut Charlotte's efforts to expand civil rights laws and tried to prevent cities from enacting their own minimum wage. The National Rifle Association was the driving force on the gun laws, most of which were put in place in the 1980s and 1990s. Florida's preemption law was passed in the 1980s, and the fines were added in 2011.

"Generally, these laws were imposed by the NRA and its forces to restrict the ability of cities to enact more restrictive gun-control laws," said Adam Winkler, a professor at the UCLA School of Law.

The NRA took a page from the playbook of tobacco companies — which realized that it is nearly impossible to control policy on the local level — turning their focus to statehouses, said Michael Siegel, a professor at the Boston University School of Public Health. "By implementing preemption, they could concentrate all of their focus at the state level and not worry about going from town to town and fighting these laws," he said.

The NRA Institute for Legislative Action says preemption ensures that "Second Amendment rights are not diluted or distorted through controversial local policies." The laws also allow for a uniform statewide application of laws rather than scattershot local regulations, according to NRA literature. An NRA

spokeswoman did not respond to a request for additional comment.

Chris Cox, executive director of the NRA-ILA, has said that preemption laws protect gun owners "from harassment by an unreasonable and confusing patchwork of municipal gun laws."

But local officials claim that they, not state authorities, are best suited to decide what types of rules should govern their municipalities.

In Washington state, a bill has been introduced to negate the state's firearm preemption law and restore the "inherent local authority to adopt firearms regulations under the police power to protect public health, safety and welfare."

In Illinois, a bill was filed in the legislature in February to repeal its firearm preemption law. Earlier this month, officials in Deerfield, Illinois, adopted a ban on assault weapons. The village has been sued by a resident and two gun advocacy groups, saying that the ban violated protocol. They say the law was not enacted during a 10-day window in 2013 during which jurisdictions were allowed to ban or restrict assault weapons before a law allowing residents to carry concealed weapons in public went into effect. Deerfield says the ban is an amendment to its 2013 ordinance and is therefore legal.

A bill pending in the South Carolina legislature aims to strengthen the state's preemption law, prohibiting the allocation of state funds to jurisdictions that enact rules on guns that are stricter than those at the state level.

Columbia, South Carolina, became the nation's first city to ban bump stocks late last year, months after they were used in a mass shooting that killed 58 people on the Las Vegas Strip. Democratic Mayor Steve Benjamin said the city carefully crafted the ban so that it did not violate the state's preemption law.

"I believe that smart, thoughtful, bipartisan policymaking... to end the carnage, is in the interest of all of our citizens," said

Benjamin, who considers himself a strong supporter of the Second Amendment.

In Florida, Stermer said Orlando and Gainesville have joined him in his lawsuit, as has Tallahassee, which was sued by pro-gun groups after the city did not repeal decades-old laws that barred the firing of guns in municipal parks, recreational facilities and plots smaller than five acres. A federal appeals court threw out the lawsuit, but it did not rule on the constitutionality of the city law.

The mechanism that allows local officials to be held personally responsible is "a form of bullying and intimidating, and it really undermines local

democracy," said Mike Alfano, a spokesman for Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum, a Democrat.

McKinley Lewis, a spokesman for Republican Gov. Rick Scott, who signed the 2011 law, said the governor's office is reviewing the lawsuit.

"Governor Scott's top priority has always been protecting the safety of our students and communities," Lewis said. "That's why the governor proposed and then signed major legislation that strengthens school security and keeps firearms out of the hands of those with mental illness and individuals who wish to harm themselves or others."

A spokeswoman for

Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi declined to comment, as did spokesmen for other state officials named in the lawsuit.

The Miami City Commission unanimously approved a resolution calling for the city attorney to review the 2011 law. Commissioner Ken Russell said the law does not take into account that officials in Miami might want to regulate guns in a different way than leaders in rural parts of the state. Russell said officials are now ready to fight back against onerous penalties.

"This sort of sanction is what's inspiring a lot of elected officials to stand up and challenge it," Russell said.

Are you a **shutterbug**? This is a nickname for someone who likes to take a lot of pictures.

Early photography

People have been using cameras to record images since 1839, when a Frenchman named Louis Daguerre used chemicals to make a thin piece of silver-coated metal sensitive to light. He put the sheet in a camera and exposed it to light. Pictures taken this way, called **daguerreotypes** (duh-GEHR-uh-types), could take up to 40 minutes, and you could get only one image on each metal sheet.

Cameras evolved over the 19th and 20th centuries. Almost all cameras used **film**, a long strip of plastic material, until around 1990, when **digital** cameras began to be sold.



Film had to be removed from the camera and **developed**, using chemicals, into photos printed on paper. Photographers might develop their own photos in a **darkroom**, but most people had to take the film to a store that provided developing services. Bad photos were developed right alongside the good ones, making film an expensive choice.

Modern cameras

Digital cameras are much faster: They capture the light coming into the camera and break the image up into millions of **pixels**, then store it as a computerized file that can be uploaded to a computer or viewed on the camera itself.

Although today people still use cameras (and some still use film), most of us use our mobile phones to take quick snapshots.

Why take pictures?

Before cameras came along, people had to draw or paint pictures of other people, places or things they wanted to record. Wealthy families paid artists to paint their portraits.

Photography offered a new way to share information with others, whether it was a family portrait or photos from a trip far away. Newspapers, books and magazines could illustrate an article to make it more interesting and understandable.

Artists began to work with different lighting, focus and exposure techniques to make unusual pieces of art. In this 1942 photograph called "The Tetons and the Snake River," photographer Ansel Adams captured the dramatic clouds, sunlight and shadows falling over the landscape in Grand Teton National Park in Wyoming.

In today's deal, South's response of two no-trump to an opening minor was forcing, so North simply raised to three no-trump.

West led a low spade to east's king, and South carefully counted his winners before choosing his card. He had four tricks in the majors, and there would be either four or five diamonds, depending on the finesse in that suit. Additionally, there would be one or two club tricks, also depending on whether or not that finesse were successful.

That looks like at least nine tricks, but say South had taken the first spade trick and lost a finesse to the diamond king, East would have been able to return a spade. Now the defenders would take four spades and the diamond king, defeating the contract. So South had to duck the first spade trick, playing low from both hands. The idea of the holdup was to exhaust East of his spades. If East won the diamond king, South hoped he would be unable to return a spade.

When East continued with a low spade at trick two, South put in the jack and let West win his queen. Declarer took his ace on the third round of spades and discarded a low club from dummy. He next led the diamond jack and let it ride. As expected, when East won the diamond king, he had no spade to lead.

When East returned a club at trick five, South rejected the finesse, rising with the ace and running nine tricks without taking any unnecessary risk — a wise precaution today.

ANSWER: If you lead a top spade, you need partner to have the suit run on defense — the chance that partner will have a high-card entry is quite small. If you lead a small diamond, you have a decent chance of establishing the suit, since you do have the side entries. With fewer high cards on the side, the spade lead becomes more attractive.

TALLADEGA, Ala. — Joey Logano won at Talladega Superspeedway to end a nearly yearlong losing streak.

Celtics, Sixers renew rivalry with new casts

WALTHAM, Mass. — Ben Simmons and Joel Embiid are about to find out what the NBA playoffs are really about.

After dispatching the Miami Heat in five games in the first round in their first career postseason appearance, the Philadelphia 76ers' youngsters will open the Eastern Conference semifinals on Monday night in Boston against the Celtics.

A civic rivalry that dates back to the Revolutionary War era came of age on the basketball court with Wilt Chamberlain leading the Philadelphia Warriors, and later the 76ers, against Bill Russell's Celtics in the 1960s. Larry Bird and Julius Erving picked it up in the 1980s.

Celtics forward Marcus Morris, a Philadelphia native, grew up watching the Allen Iverson-led 76ers that went to the NBA Finals in 2001 but lost to Paul Pierce and Antoine Walker's Celtics in the Eastern Conference finals the following year.

Horschel, Piercy win Zurich Classic

AVONDALE, La. — Billy Horschel and Scott Piercy won the Zurich Classic team event Sunday, closing with a bogey-free 5-under 67 in alternate-shot play.

Horschel became a two-time winner at TPC Louisiana. He captured his maiden PGA Tour triumph at the 2013 Zurich Classic when it was a traditional every-man-for-himself event.

Horschel and Piercy surged into the lead with birdies on the 10th and 11th holes. They followed that with seven pars to hold off Jason Dufner and Pat Perez by a stroke. Dufner had a 14-foot putt for the tie on 18, but left it a foot short.

This was the second year of the Zurich's switch to a two-player team format.

The victory was Horschel's fifth and Piercy's fourth. They each earned \$1.04 million and 400 FedExCup points.

The result did not count toward the world ranking.

A year ago, the Zurich format called for best-ball play in the second and final rounds, with alternate-shot on the first and third. But organizers decided this year to switch that around so that the final round would have the alternate-shot format, with one player hitting the tee shots on even-numbered holes and the other on odd numbers. That set the stage for substantial moves up or down the leaderboard; players had no choice but the play the lies their teammates left them on the previous shot.

Horschel and Piercy began the day three shots back, but immediately surged into contention with birdies on the first two holes.

Piercy's 146-yard approach set up Horschel's 5-foot birdie putt on the opening hole. On the par-5 second hole, Piercy chipped to 4 feet to set up another birdie putt for Horschel.

Horschel returned the favor on the par-5 seventh with a chip to 3 feet and did even better on the 10th, dropping a 148-yard approach shot a foot from the hole.

Area players try NFL free agent route

Staff reports

Florida junior place-kicker Eddy Pineiro went undrafted in the NFL's annual talent reload, ending any chance of he and Johnny Townsend making history as the first punter and kicker from the same school to be selected in the same draft.

But, Pineiro and Townsend will continue

to be kicking together. Shortly after the conclusion of the draft Saturday,

Pineiro announced on Twitter that he signed a free agent deal with the Raiders, the team that selected Townsend in the fifth round.

"Happy to sign with the Oakland raiders! Thank God for this opportunity can't wait to get to work," Pineiro wrote on his Twitter account.

Joining the special teamers on the Raiders is UF safety Nick Washington, who also signed a free agent deal Saturday night.

Florida tight end DeAndre Goolsby and wide receiver Brandon Powell both signed undrafted free agent contracts with the Detroit Lions, where they will be reunited with two of their former UF teammates who were drafted by Detroit a year ago — linebacker Jarrad Davis and cornerback Teez Tabor.

UF defensive back Joseph Putu signed with the Atlanta Falcons.

Of note: Former Gainesville High and Vanderbilt running back Ralph Webb agreed to a free-agent contract with the New England Patriots.

UF notes from NFL draft:

- At least one Florida player has been selected in every NFL draft since 1952, the longest streak in SEC history.

- Florida has had the third most first- and second-round picks over the last 10 years: Alabama 41, Ohio State 28, Florida 24, Florida State 22, USC 21.

- The Gators had multiple players selected in the first three rounds for the fourth straight year. That is the longest streak since its streak of eight years from 1997-2004.

- UF had two defensive players selected in the first two rounds of the draft for the third consecutive year, which is the longest such streak in program history.

- Florida has had seven defensive backs selected in the NFL draft since 2016, which ranks first in the country. Ohio State, Miami, LSU and Alabama all trail the Gators.

- For the fourth straight year at least five Gators were selected. In addition, this is the 11th time since 2000 that the Gators have notched five picks.

Seven-time NASCAR champion Jimmie Johnson's losing streak hit 33 races when he finished 12th at Talladega.

He was part of a 14-car accident late in the race when he slid in front of teammate William Byron to start the melee that knocked out two Team Penske cars — Brad Keselowski and Ryan Blaney — as well as second stage winner Paul Menard.

Johnson thought as he closed in on Byron, the air was taken off his Chevrolet.

"I was in the second lane and he came up near

my lane and then packed air underneath us and around it went," Johnson said.

McMurray's long weekend

Jamie McMurray was involved in two accidents at Talladega, including a frightening crash during a practice session in which his Chevrolet rolled several times.

He didn't catch any breaks on Sunday and was in an early accident that led to a 28th-place finish.

Hard to drive

The rules package NASCAR used Sunday at Talladega made the cars difficult to drive and

Brown out

Stevens said guard Jaylen Brown still had some soreness from a hamstring injury he sustained in Game 7 and is doubtful for Game 1 against the Sixers. Tests on Sunday were negative, the coach said.

"It looks like it could be something that allows him to play as the series goes on," Stevens said.

The No. 3 overall pick in the 2016 draft, Brown averaged 14.5 points and 4.5 rebounds per game this season. He said on Saturday he would be back.

"Whatever it takes, I wouldn't miss this series for the world," Brown said.

STUTT GART, GERMANY Pliskova wins Stuttgart Open

Karolina Pliskova ended CoCo Vandeweghe's brilliant week with a 7-6 (2), 6-4 win in the Stuttgart Open final on Sunday.

The sixth-seeded Czech held her nerve at key times to win her first title of the season and her 10th overall in just under two hours. Pliskova, who fired 41 aces over four matches on her way to the final, added another 11 against Vandeweghe.

Vandeweghe, a wild card entry who defeated the defending champion Laura Siegemund and three top 10 players including top-ranked Simona Halep over the week, was bidding to become the first American winner in Stuttgart since Lindsay Davenport in 2005.

BAKU, AZERBAIJAN Red Bull crash adds more tension to relationship

Red Bull's bosses could be forgiven for seeing red after their drivers collided at the Azerbaijan Grand Prix.

When Daniel Ricciardo smashed into the back of the swerving Max Verstappen, it ended both their races and dealt an early but heavy blow to title challenge hopes. They have clashed before, but this incident comes as Ricciardo is publicly considering a move to Ferrari or Mercedes for next season.

The stewards ruled that Verstappen had moved twice to defend his position — when only one move is allowed — and said Ricciardo admitted he left it "too late" to overtake. Both drivers received a formal reprimand, and each apologized to Red Bull.

"This is the last thing we wanted. We want to be able to race and I'm thankful that the team let us race," Ricciardo said. "Everyone is pretty heartbroken."

Verstappen said he didn't want the team to stop him fighting Ricciardo on the track in the future.

"We will learn from this and have to make sure it doesn't happen again," Verstappen said.

TORONTO Blue Jays demote 2B Travis, recall RHP Ramirez

The Toronto Blue Jays have optioned slumping infielder Devon Travis to Triple-A Buffalo and recalled right-hander Carlos Ramirez.

Travis started on opening day and was expected to be Toronto's regular second baseman but has struggled at the plate, batting .148 with one homer and three RBIs in 18 games. He struck out 18 times in 61 at-bats.

Ramirez, a converted outfielder, made his big league debut with the Blue Jays last September, going 0-0 with a 2.70 ERA in 12 games. He was 0-0 with a 6.00 ERA in six games at Buffalo this season.

The Blue Jays added Ramirez on Sunday to bolster their overworked bullpen. Toronto's starters have pitched seven innings or more only three times in 26 games.

Tampa Bay, Vegas look to bounce back from losses

LAS VEGAS — The Tampa Bay Lightning and Vegas Golden Knights were favored to win their second-round matchups.

After losses Saturday, the Lightning and Golden Knights will be happy just to reclaim home-ice advantage.

Hours after Boston beat Tampa Bay 6-2 to take a 1-0 series lead Saturday, the Sharks handed Vegas its first postseason loss in six games with a 4-3 double-overtime victory.

Tampa Bay coach Jon Cooper and Vegas coach Gerard Gallant said it was their teams' worst performances of the postseason.

"I didn't like the game we played, that was the main thing," Gallant said Sunday before he and the Golden Knights left for San Jose. "Not just losing in overtime, but I didn't like the game that we played the first 40 minutes."

And while the Lightning enjoyed six days off after eliminating New Jersey in five games, it was Boston that looked sharper after winning an emotional Game 7 at home against Toronto three nights prior.

Cooper put the Lightning through an intense, high-tempo practice Sunday in hopes of setting the tone for a more spirited performance in Game 2, after his team played with less intensity than in any of its first-round games against New Jersey.

"The purpose of our practice was to put us in the best position to be ready to play (Monday night)," Cooper said. "Often times a lot of things in your game you develop in practice. We had a week off. We did some good things, but our game was not at a playoff level like the other team that had just played in a Game 7, and that's what we have to bring (Monday night) or it's going to be a long series for us."

Boston's top line of Brad Marchand (one goal, three assists) David Pastrnak (four assists) and Patrice Bergeron (two goals, one assist) combined for 11 points, a huge contrast from Tampa Bay's top line of Nikita Kucherov, Steven Stamkos and J.T. Miller, which went scoreless in Game 1.

"With every round, you have to elevate your game, your intensity, everything, and we didn't," Cooper said. "We took a step back. A really good team showed us what happens when you do that."

Much of the same can be said for Vegas, which looked nothing like the team that opened its

second-round series with a 7-0 shellacking of San Jose. Instead of the team that looked crisp with every pass, and sharp with every shot on goal, the Golden Knights were undisciplined and sloppy through the first 40 minutes.

"We got a little too confident after Game 1, we came out a little slow in Game 2 and we just have to fix that and focus on a good start for Game 3," Golden Knights defenseman Shea Theodore said. "We can't take those kinds of penalties. When you're in the box for a good portion of the night it's not going to go good. It kind of bit us in the ass."

The Golden Knights, who surpassed its season-high 13 penalties in minutes with 22 PIM, found themselves in the box more than San Jose, 11-6.

Vegas is used to rolling four lines and three pairs of defensemen. Saturday the schematics changed with them spending more than a period in the penalty box collectively. And while Gallant admitted he didn't like some of the calls against his team, or some of what he felt were missed calls, he also said his players brought a lot of it on themselves.

"I thought we had a couple of opportunities for power plays, we didn't get them," Gallant said. "I don't want our guys in the penalty box, I don't want my top guys in the penalty box wrestling. (David) Perron took six minutes in penalties last night, (Jonathan) Marchessault's sitting in there for roughing. You play hard, you get penalties - that's fine. You don't waste your time with after-the-whistle activities."

Bounce back strong

Tampa Bay and Vegas have shown resiliency after a

setback, as the Lightning are 19-8 following a loss, while the Golden Knights are 20-10-1.

"We know they're going to come back faster and harder than they did, and they played a really good game (Saturday)," Marchand said of the Lightning. "They came out fast, they came hard and it was tough to weather that storm early on. So, we can expect more of that."

San Jose's Brent Burns, who had two goals on Saturday, said the Sharks fixed what they needed to for Game 2, but the win meant nothing more than tying the series and it's now just a best-of-five, not seven, against a Vegas team that will be looking for revenge.

"It's just one game," Burns said. "Obviously we had to win it, but it's one game, so."

Flurry on Fleury

After allowing just three goals through the first five games, Vegas netminder Marc-Andre Fleury allowed three in the second period alone on Saturday. His shutout in Game 1 was his third of the postseason, but the Sharks peppered him throughout Game 2, outshooting the Golden Knights, 47-29.

The 14-year veteran said the lack of discipline, and even his own mistakes, are nothing to dwell on if the Golden Knights want to steal back home-ice advantage.

"We have a good bunch of guys, we've been through a lot together this year," Fleury said Sunday. "You win 7-0 or you lose like last night, you always got to start fresh every night. I think we've been doing that, for the first round and the first game of San Jose. Every game is a new start, you got to start from scratch and try to win that one."

Nadal wins 11th Barca title, unbeaten on clay

BARCELONA, Spain — Rafael Nadal continues to make winning on clay look all too easy.

Nadal extended his dominance on the surface with a 6-2, 6-1 win over 19-year-old Greek Stefanos Tsitsipas on Sunday to win his 11th Barcelona Open title.

Nadal, who also won his 11th Monte Carlos Masters title last week, was never seriously challenged on his way to a 19th straight victory on clay.

The top-ranked Spaniard has won 46 straight sets on clay, extending his own record. He hasn't lost on clay since facing Dominic Thiem in Rome last year.

"It's very difficult to describe how to win 11 titles at one tournament," Nadal said. "To win 11 Monte Carlos and 11 Barcelonas is something I couldn't imagine doing. I'm just enjoying every week and the fact I'm playing in a tournament that I enjoy so much means a lot to me."

It was the 77th title overall for Nadal, tying him with John McEnroe for fourth best in the Open Era. Only Jimmy Connors, Roger Federer and Ivan Lendl are ahead.

Nadal, who won his 400th match on clay in Saturday's semifinal, needed the victory in Barcelona to secure his No. 1 ranking.

"It's hard for anybody to imagine all the feelings and emotions I have when I play here," Nadal said. "Hopefully I can keep coming back for many more years to come."

After the win, Nadal dived into a pool at the venue along with some of the tournament's ball boys and ball girls.

Nadal was out of action earlier this year because of a lingering right hip injury sustained in the Australian Open quarterfinals. He returned to help Spain defeat Germany in the Davis Cup quarterfinals and then went on to win in Monte Carlo.

"I've had two fantastic weeks but we were coming off difficult months because of the injuries," Nadal said.

The 63rd-ranked Tsitsipas was trying to become the first Greek to win an ATP Tour title. He was the first Greek to make it to an ATP final since Nicholas Kalogeropoulos in 1973.

"I knew the chances to win were small but my confidence was rising in every match, and while I was expecting a little better today, congratulations to Rafa," Tsitsipas said. "It was a first experience and tougher than I thought. I've watched him millions of times on TV, but it's tougher to face him in reality."

Tsitsipas was the youngest finalist in Barcelona since 2005 and was looking to become the first unseeded champion since Gaston Gaudio in 2002.

Cavs move on, LeBron stays perfect in Round 1

CLEVELAND — LeBron James wasn't ready to go home or to Philadelphia or Los Angeles. He's heading to Toronto, bringing a Cavaliers team that isn't done yet.

Unwilling to sit despite battling leg cramps in the second half, James scored 45 points and got some much-needed help from his teammates in Game 7 to stay unbeaten in the opening round of the NBA playoffs, leading the Cavaliers to a 105-101 win on Sunday over the Indiana Pacers, who pushed the game's best player to the breaking point.

Following the game, an exhausted James said the series took a physical toll. "I'm burnt right now," he said. "I'm not thinking about Toronto right now until tomorrow. I'm ready to go home. Can we? I'm tired. I want to go home."

James added nine rebounds, seven assists and played over 43 minutes while improving to 13-0 in the first round. He kept Cleveland's strange season alive — for the time being — but it took everything the 33-year-old and the Cavs had to 34-point win in Game 6.

But James, who at times seemed to be playing the Pacers by himself in the series, pulled the Cavs back from the brink of elimination and at least delayed any more talk about impending free agency.

"Amazing," Indiana's Victor Oladipo said of James. "He did what he always does. It's not really shocking. He's the best in the world, and that's what the best does and now I gotta work to get on that level." The Cavs will open the conference semifinals on Tuesday at top-seeded Toronto. Early in the game, James looked at agent Rich Paul sitting courtside and told him he wasn't coming out. James then played the first 35 minutes before heading to the locker room with one minute left in the third to be treated for what he said was "a little minor injury." James said he was urged to get IV fluids but turned them down.

ROCKETS 110, JAZZ 96:

James Harden scored 41 points and Houston raced out to a huge lead and sailed to a 110-96 win over Utah in Game 1 of the Western Conference semifinals. Houston was up by 25 at halftime behind 34 points combined from Harden and Chris Paul. The Jazz, who didn't wrap up their first-round series with Oklahoma City until late Friday night, looked sluggish and struggled to keep pace with the energy of the top-seeded Rockets, who hadn't played since eliminating Minnesota on Wednesday. It was Houston's fourth straight win by 10 or more points

this postseason. Harden, who also had seven assists and eight rebounds, picked up where he left off in the regular season against the Jazz when he averaged 34.3 points, led by a 56-point performance in a 137-110 win in November. The Jazz got 21 points each from rookie Donovan Mitchell and Jae Crowder while playing without starting point guard Ricky Rubio, who sat with a strained left hamstring.

Capitals hold on to lead this time, even series

WASHINGTON — Braden Holtby spun around and saw the puck on the goal line. Maybe it was in. Maybe it wasn't.

But after mounting another two-goal lead and this time building on it instead of blowing it, the Washington Capitals made sure it wasn't close enough for one questionable call either way to make a difference. With fresh memories of coughing up that same lead in Game 1, this time they took it to the Pittsburgh Penguins and emerged with a 4-1 victory in Game 2 to tie the second-round series.

"You can see what happen last game when we get the lead 2-0 and they come back and win the game," said Alex Ovechkin, who scored his seventh goal of the playoffs. "They're experienced team, they're not going to give up and they're not gonna give easy play for us. We have to earn it. Today I think we play a solid game, everybody was in and we get the result."

PREDATORS 5, JETS 4, 2OT: Kevin Fiala scored 5:37 into double overtime, and the Nashville Predators beat the Winnipeg Jets 5-4 on Sunday night in Game 2 to even the Western Conference semifinal series. The Presidents' Trophy winners had the NHL's best road record during the regular season, but the Predators got the split they needed before this series switches to Winnipeg for Game 3 on Tuesday night. That's where the Jets posted the league's best home record. Craig Smith and Fiala skated up on a 2-on-1, and Jets defenseman Byflugien failed to block Smith's cross-ice pass to Fiala who beat goalie Connor Hellebuyck with a backhand.
