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FSU PC engineering its future

\$1 million is college's goal for mechanical engineering program



PANAMA CITY — About an hour after taking the stage last October during the annual Gulf Power Economic Symposium to talk about diversifying the area's economy, Gulf Power CEO Stan Connally had an offer to do just that.

In what was probably one of the fastest turnarounds to date, Connally was approached by Randy Hanna, dean at Florida State University Panama City, with an opportunity that would both allow FSU Panama City to grow its fledgling mechanical engineering program and allow Gulf Power a chance to be a part of that growth through a contribution to an endowment that would be used for everything from scholarships to equipment, professorships and

professional development. "We had just come out of talking about how we can grow the advanced manufacturing economy of this area," Connally said. "It was a perfect fit." "I give him all the credit, though, for having the vision," Connally added. On Tuesday, FSU Panama City officially announced the creation of the Engineering the Future endowment, which will help support the

Ambulance rides now free for Bay residents

County commission also OKs buying 9 new ambulances

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PANAMA CITY — The cost of ambulance bills will no longer add insult to injury for Bay County residents. A new policy went into effect May 1 in which the county will only collect the amount insurance pays, and nothing out of pocket, for ambulance transports of Bay residents with insurance, and nothing from residents who don't have insurance. "EMS is a public service," said Mark Bowen, the

county's chief of emergency services. "A lot of people over the years told us they hesitate to call 911 (because of the cost), and that is the last thing we want." At a price that could exceed \$1,400 per ride, before Monday the county had the highest rates in the state for an ambulance ride. However, when the county commission voted to give the ambulance service a \$2.2 million EMS subsidy out of its budget, officials felt it only fair that residents be given a break on the ambulance bills. The rate system will remain

the same for riders who are not county residents, who make up about 17 percent of all transports. County Commissioner Bill Dozier said other areas of the states run similar programs. "There are other areas that have a similar structure in place, and it's worked very well for them," he said. "As we looked at the numbers and put all the information together, we feel this will benefit the citizens of Bay County the best, being able to do this for them, without



Trump: 'Disgraceful' leak of Mueller questions

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump says it's "disgraceful" that a list of proposed questions from special counsel Robert Mueller was "leaked" to the news media.

The New York Times late Monday published around four dozen questions compiled by Trump's lawyers during negotiations with Mueller's investigators earlier this year over the prospect of a presidential interview. Mueller is investigating Russian meddling in the 2016 election, whether Trump's campaign was involved and if the president obstructed justice after the campaign.

The Times report said Trump's lawyers compiled the questions into a list and that document was "provided to The Times by a person outside Mr. Trump's legal team." The questions range from Trump's motivations for firing FBI Director James Comey a year ago to contacts Trump's campaign had with Russians. Although Mueller's team has indicated to Trump's lawyers that he's not considered a target, investigators remain interested in whether the president's actions constitute obstruction of justice and want to

TODAY IN HISTORY

Today is Wednesday, May 2, the 122nd day of 2018. There are 243 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On May 2, 1908, the original version of "Take Me Out to the Ball Game," with music by Albert Von Tilzer and lyrics by Jack Norworth, was published by Von Tilzer's York Music Co.

On this date:

In 1536, Anne Boleyn, second wife of King Henry VIII, was arrested and charged with adultery; she was beheaded 17 days later.

In 1670, the Hudson's Bay Co. was chartered by England's King Charles II.

In 1863, during the Civil War, Confederate Gen. Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson was accidentally wounded by his own men at Chancellorsville, Virginia; he died eight days later.

In 1927, the U.S. Supreme Court, in *Buck v. Bell*, upheld 8-1 a Virginia law allowing the forced sterilization of people to promote the "health of the patient and the welfare of society."

In 1936, "Peter and the Wolf," a symphonic tale for children by Sergei Prokofiev, had its world premiere in Moscow.

In 1946, violence erupted during a foiled escape attempt at the Alcatraz Federal Penitentiary in San Francisco Bay; the "Battle of Alcatraz" claimed the lives of three inmates and two correctional officers before it was put down two days later.

In 1957, crime boss Frank Costello narrowly survived an attempt on his life in New York; the alleged gunman, Vincent "The Chin" Gigante, was acquitted at trial after Costello refused to identify him as the shooter. Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R-Wis., died at Bethesda Naval Hospital in Maryland.

In 1968, "The Odd Couple," the movie version of the Neil Simon comedy starring Jack Lemmon and Walter Matthau, opened in New York.

In 1970, jockey Diane Crump became the first woman to ride in the Kentucky Derby; she finished in 15th place aboard Fathom. (The winning horse was Dust Commander.)

In 1982, the Weather Channel made its debut.



raising taxes.”

By adopting the policy, the county is foregoing the collection of about \$400,000 to \$500,000 a year, according to county documents. However, that figure represents the invoiced amount, not the amount that was actually paid, which officials have said is considerably less.

In addition to the payment changes, the county is also upgrading its EMS equipment. On Tuesday, the commission voted to sell four ambulances that had reached end-of-life,

to help pay for nine new ambulances the county is purchasing.

The purchase, which will cost over \$1.5 million, marks the first time the county has bought brand new vehicles since they took over ambulance services in October 2013.

“This has been a long time in coming,” Bowen said. “They’re so old, parts aren’t made for them anymore.”

Maintaining the ambulances was becoming a challenge — to keep eight on the road at any time, the county was paying to maintain 13 to 14, according to Bowen. By purchasing the new vehicles, he said the county will save money

on maintenance costs.

In addition, the ambulances were looking their age, with ripped and duct-taped upholstery, Bowen said.

“It’s certainly time to get new ambulances,” Dozier said. “They’ve lived their life out.”

The county is hoping to sell the four surplus ambulances for about \$14,000.

university’s engineering programs, particularly the mechanical engineering program and the new graduate-level systems engineering program. Started by \$150,000 contributions from both the Gulf Power Foundation and the St. Joe Community Foundation, Hanna said the goal is to raise \$1 million for the endowment.

“That’s a nice little start,” he said.

Mechanical engineering is the most popular engineering program in the country, according to Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University Engineering Dean J. Murray Gibson, who

worked with Hanna to develop FSU Panama City’s mechanical engineering program. FAMU shares an engineering program with FSU, and when looking for the nearest cluster of mechanical engineering jobs to Tallahassee, they landed on Panama City.

“We needed to take advantage of that and build that opportunity,” Gibson said.

More than diversifying the economy, Connally said education, and by extension the mechanical engineering program at FSU PC, are the first steps down the “pathway to prosperity,” allowing local students to stay local, attend schools locally and find quality jobs in the local area close to their families.

“If you’re a young person coming through

middle school and high school and you’re wondering where you’re going to work, to be able to see those jobs in this community, that’s the first part,” Connally said.

St. Joe Co. President and CEO Jorge Gonzalez said education is one of the top priorities of people looking to relocate to an area, whether it’s moving their business or their family, and there’s “nothing more important than attracting quality jobs to our region.”

The mechanical engineering program, which starts this fall, likely will begin with about 10 students, but Hanna said they hope to grow that number to between 20 and 30 students a year. He said they’ll start by hiring on two new faculty, but as students sign on, they’ll add more faculty as well.

Koreas dismantle loudspeakers

The systems were used to spread propaganda across the border


SEOUL, South Korea — The rival Koreas dismantled huge loudspeakers used to blare Cold War-style propaganda across their tense border on Tuesday, as South Korea's president asked the United Nations to observe the North's planned closing of its nuclear test site.

The dismantling of dozens of loudspeakers was in line with an agreement on reconciliation by the leaders of the Koreas at their historic summit last Friday. It is still unclear if such measures can bring permanent peace because no major breakthrough in the North Korean nuclear standoff was produced at the summit.

South Korean soldiers disassembled loudspeakers in multiple front-line areas in the presence of journalists before pulling them away from the border, the Defense Ministry said.

A South Korea military officer said later Tuesday that North Korea had also begun taking down its propaganda loudspeakers earlier in the day. He requested anonymity, citing department rules.

Both Koreas had turned off the propaganda broadcasts along the 154-mile-long border last week before the summit.

They had restarted their propaganda warfare in early 2016 when tensions rose sharply after North Korea's fourth nuclear test. South Korea broadcast K-pop songs as well as criticism of the North's abysmal human rights conditions, world news and weather forecasts. The North broadcast anti-South messages and praises of its own political system.

North Korea is extremely sensitive to any outside criticism of its system, and most of its 24 million people are not allowed access to foreign TV and radio programs.

In 2014, North Korean soldiers opened fire after South Korean activists sent anti-North leaflets over the border with large balloons, prompting South Korea to return fire. There were no reports of casualties.

North Korean leader Kim Jong Un has suspended nuclear and missile tests and placed his nuclear program up for negotiation, but skepticism lingers about how serious his offer is and what disarmament steps he would eventually take. Some experts say Kim's sincerity will be tested during his

planned meeting in several weeks with U.S. President Donald Trump, in what would be the first North Korea-U.S. summit talks since the end of the 1950-53 Korean War.

Trump said Monday he likes the idea of going to the southern side of Panmunjom, the location of the Korean summit, to meet Kim, though he said Singapore was also under consideration.

Ahead of that meeting, the leaders of South Korea, Japan and China are to meet next Wednesday in Tokyo for a

regular trilateral summit that is expected to focus on North Korea's nuclear program and other regional issues.

During their meeting last Friday, Kim told South Korean President Moon Jae-in that he would shut down his country's only known nuclear test site and allow outside experts and journalists to watch the process. He also said he would be willing to give up his nuclear programs if the United States commits to a formal end to the Korean War and pledges not to attack the North, according to South Korea's presidential office.

During a telephone call with U.N. Secretary-General Antonio Guterres on Tuesday, Moon said he wants the U.N. to observe the closure of the Punggye-ri test site. Moon also asked the U.N. to formally declare its support for his summit declaration with Kim. Guterres responded that he will try to contribute to the establishment of peace on the Korean Peninsula, according to Moon's office.

Some experts downplayed the closure of the Punggye-ri site, saying the six underground nuclear explosions that have been conducted there may have made it too unstable for more testing. Kim denied such views, saying the site has two additional underground tunnels that could be used for new tests.

Playboy art director who created bunny logo dies at 93

Magazine designer Art Paul, who created Playboy's famous tuxedoed bunny head logo, has died. He was 93.

Paul died of pneumonia on Saturday at a Chicago-area hospital, according to his wife, Suzanne Seed.

Paul was a freelance illustrator when he started working with Playboy founder Hugh Hefner as the magazine's first employee in the 1950s. He has said he crafted the bunny logo in about an hour.

Paul also hired artists to create illustrations for Playboy, including Salvador Dali, Andy Warhol and Shel Silverstein.

Paul was the magazine's art director until he retired in 1982.

La. elections chief quits amid sexual misconduct claim

With calls for his resignation increasing, Louisiana's secretary of state announced Tuesday that he is leaving his position as state elections chief amid allegations he sexually harassed one of his employees.

Secretary of State Tom Schedler said in a letter to the governor that he will be stepping down May 8, becoming the highest-level public official in Louisiana to be felled by sexual misconduct accusations since the #MeToo movement began unseating people in positions of power in Hollywood, the media and government.

"I leave office with a heavy heart knowing I have disappointed the people in my life who care for me the most," Schedler wrote.

GENEVA

Swiss police say 6th hiker dies after snowstorm in Alps

The death toll among a group of hikers trapped by an unexpected snowstorm in the Swiss Alps rose to six Tuesday, police said. The victims were identified as five Italians and a Bulgarian woman.

The regional Valais police department said another person remains in critical condition following the blast of snow and high winds in the Pigne d'Arolla region of Switzerland, about 6 miles west of the famed Matterhorn.

A total of 14 hikers from two groups were trying to reach the Vignettes hikers' hut, located at 10,357 feet in the Pennine Alps, when they were caught in the bad weather.

YOLA, NIGERIA

Twin blasts at mosque in Nigeria kill at least 28

A pair of explosions killed at least 28 worshippers at a mosque in Nigeria and wounded at least 56 others, with many of the victims caught in the second blast while trying to flee, police said.

The attack in Mubi town came a day after President Muhammadu Buhari met with U.S. President Donald Trump and discussed the threat from the Nigeria-based Boko Haram extremist group.

This is the second time in six months that dozens have been killed in an attack on a Mubi mosque. In November, a teenage suicide bomber attacked worshippers as they gathered for morning prayers, killing at least 50 people in one of the region's deadliest assaults in years.

YEREVAN, ARMENIA

Armenia's parliament rejects protest leader as premier

Armenia's parliament rejected making the opposition lawmaker who led weeks of anti-government rallies the country's new prime minister Tuesday, prompting him to call for a nationwide strike in protest.

After a nine-hour session, the National Assembly of Armenia voted 55-45 against appointing Nikol Pashinian. He was the only candidate nominated to replace long-time leader Serzh Sargsyan, who resigned as prime minister because of the protests.

Between 30,000 and 40,000 opposition supporters spent the day peacefully rallying outside the parliament building to support Pashinian.

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2 of Pruitt's top aides leave EPA amid ethics investigations

WASHINGTON — The two top officials in charge of security and toxic-waste cleanups at the Environmental Protection Agency have abruptly left their jobs, days after EPA administrator Scott Pruitt told lawmakers his subordinates were to blame for ethics problems that have imperiled his political future and prompted more than a dozen federal investigations.

In statements Tuesday, Pruitt praised the two men — Pasquale “Nino” Perrotta, the security chief, and Albert Kelly, who ran the EPA’s Superfund program — and gave no reason for their unexpected departures.

Perrotta was expected to appear Wednesday for a transcribed interview by staffers of the House oversight committee, one of the congressional bodies and federal organizations probing reports of excessive spending by Pruitt and other issues at the agency. Committee aides said Perrotta’s resignation was not expected to derail his appearance.

EPA spokesman Jahan Wilcox said that the departures were unrelated to the ongoing federal investigations and that the agency was fully cooperating with the congressional probe, led by House oversight chairman Rep. Trey Gowdy, R-S.C.

Pruitt’s spending on security and some of the security contracts with Perrotta are among the topics of the federal probes involving the EPA under

Pruitt, a former Oklahoma attorney general. Pruitt, an ardent advocate of minimizing regulation, has survived the kind of scandals that have brought down several other Cabinet appointees of President Donald Trump’s.

At House hearings last week, Pruitt weathered six hours of scathing questions, criticism and a couple of calls from congressional Democrats to resign over the steady flow of news reports and announcements of new investigations allegations of ethical lapses at his agency. They include spending on Pruitt’s behalf for round-the-clock security guards, first-class plane tickets and a \$43,000 soundproof telephone booth.

Pruitt repeatedly deflected blame last week, describing subordinates as going too far in carrying out their duties, in excesses that occurred without his knowledge.

In the case of the \$43,000 booth, for example, Pruitt acknowledged to lawmakers he had asked for a private and secure phone line when he arrived at the agency, but he said staffers took it upon themselves to spend tens of thousands of dollars on it. It was security officials, not Pruitt, who decided he should fly first class, he said.

Pruitt pledged last week to take care of the problems. “Ultimately, as the administrator of the EPA, the responsibility of identifying and making necessary changes rests with me and no one else,” Pruitt told lawmakers then. Notably, most

Republican lawmakers at the hearings declined to join the Democratic dog-pile on Pruitt.


It was unclear Tuesday whether lawmakers from Pruitt’s majority party would take the internal shakeup as a needed and promised house-cleaning by Pruitt or an indication of even greater trouble at the agency.

“I don’t know how to take this, yet,” Rep. Ryan Costello of Pennsylvania, one of the few Republican lawmakers last week to fault Pruitt on expenditures such as taking bodyguards with him to Disneyland and the Rose Bowl, said in a statement by email. “I’m waiting on more details ...to shed more light on what, if anything, to make of it.”


Pruitt said in his statements that Perrotta was retiring after a 23-year government career that included time in the Secret Service and under previous EPA administrators. He praised Perrotta for hard work and dedication.

Pruitt thanked Kelly for what he said was his “tremendous impact” in Kelly’s year overseeing the nation’s Superfund program, charged with handling the cleanup of toxic waste sites.

Pruitt hired Kelly, an Oklahoma banker, at the EPA after federal banking regulators banned the man from banking for life. Regulators have not publicly specified the actions that led to the banking ban. Days ago, Rep. Scott Peters, D-Calif., pressed Pruitt for more details about why Kelly had been sanctioned.



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May Day protests focus on Trump

NEW YORK — Immigrants say President Donald Trump's administration has become almost everything they feared, but while they rally across the United States on May Day, their focus is less on huge turnout Tuesday than on the first Tuesday in November.

People were marching and holding other demonstrations for labor and immigrant rights from New York to Georgia to California on International Workers' Day, amid similar actions worldwide.

"The Trump administration has made very clear that they've declared war on the immigrant community on all levels," said Javier Valdes, co-executive director of the advocacy group Make the Road New York.

Immigrant rights groups have joined in May Day activities for more than a decade, initially to push back against harsh legislative proposals and later to clamor for reform and legal status for immigrants in the country illegally who were brought to the U.S. as children or overstayed their visas.

Now, they want to drive turnout in the midterm elections.

Advocates hope voters target lawmakers who have pushed for measures that hurt immigrants and replace them with immigrant-friendly policymakers, said Angelica Salas, executive director of the Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights in Los Angeles.

"Elections have

consequences, and the consequences for our community have been dire, and if we do not change the balance of power, we question our ability to remain free in this country," she said.

Protesters still are taking aim at policy changes under Trump, including a country-specific travel ban, the end of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, high-profile detention and deportation efforts, and proposals to cut back the overall numbers

of people allowed to immigrate permanently.

Trump and his supporters say the enforcement and policy changes are needed for national security and economic benefits. Some of the new policies are tangled up in court.

"It is really a fundamental question about what kind of a country we're going to be," Salas said. "For us, the question of immigration is a question about race, and it is also a question about real equality in this country."

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Most of caravan waiting at border

A few of the migrants have been allowed to apply for asylum in US

TIJUANA, Mexico — U.S. border inspectors allowed some of the Central American asylum-seekers to enter the country for processing, ending a brief impasse over lack of space. But the migrants who crossed Mexico in a caravan may face a long legal path.

Caravan organizers said eight members of the group criticized by President Donald Trump that traveled from southern Mexico to the border city

of Tijuana were allowed in to be interviewed by asylum officers, but U.S. Customs and Border Protection did not provide a number.

About 140 others were still waiting in Mexico to turn themselves in at San Diego's San Ysidro border crossing, the nation's busiest, said Alex Mensing, project organizer for Pueblo Sin Fronteras, which is leading the caravan.

"The spirits are high, there was good news for everybody," Mensing said on the Mexican side of the crossing, moments after learning that some were allowed in.

U.S. attorneys who volunteered advice in

Tijuana last week warned the Central Americans that parents may be separated from their children and be detained for many months while their asylum cases are pending.

Asylum-seekers are typically held up to three days at the border and turned over to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement. If they pass initial screenings by asylum officers, they may be detained or released with ankle monitors while their cases wind through immigration court, which can take years.

Nearly 80 percent of asylum-seekers passed the initial screening from

October through December, but few are likely to win asylum.


The denial rate for El Salvadorans seeking asylum was 79 percent from 2012 to 2017, according to asylum outcome information from Syracuse University's Transactional Records Action Clearinghouse. Hondurans were close behind with a 78 percent denial rate, followed by Guatemalans at 75 percent.

Trump administration officials have railed against what they call "legal loopholes" and "catch-and-release" policies that allow people seeking asylum to be freed while their cases are adjudicated. The president tweeted Monday that the caravan "shows how weak & ineffective U.S. immigration laws are."

Attorney General Jeff Sessions has pledged to send more immigration judges to the border if needed and threatened criminal prosecution. On Monday, the Justice Department said it filed illegal entry charges against 11 people identified as caravan members. U.S. Customs and Border Protection said it processed hundreds of asylum-seekers in the previous week, many of them Mexican, which contributed to a bottleneck that led inspectors to turn away caravan members since they arrived late Sunday afternoon.

Asylum-seekers did not appear to be thrown off the by the delay.

Elin Orrellana, a 23-year-old pregnant

woman from El Salvador, said she is fleeing the violent MS-13 street gang, a favorite target of both Sessions and Trump because of their brutal killings in communities in the United States. She said her older sister had been killed by the gang in El Salvador, so she is attempting to join other family members in the Kansas City area.

"Fighting on is worth it," she said.

Customs and Border Protection has room for about 300 people at the San Diego border

crossing. "As in the past when we've had to limit the number of people we can bring in for processing at a given time, we expect that this will be a temporary situation," the agency said.

During a surge of Haitian arrivals at the San Diego crossing in 2016, Customs and Border Protection required people to wait more than five weeks in Mexico. Since then, smaller upticks of Mexican asylum-seekers have caused delays of several hours.

When asked if there are any myths about arthritis he would like to dispel, Dr. Kenawy said, "Arthritis is not to be taken lightly and it's not diagnosed by a simple blood test. Don't brush off your symptoms. Just because you have some joint aches and pains, it may be much more serious than that. There are a lot of rheumatic diseases that involve other organ systems and you may not notice those signs or feel the symptoms."

Dr. Kenawy said that rheumatic diseases are not just arthritic diseases. They can, and do affect other organs and sometimes "can be life threatening, if not properly diagnosed and treated."

"If a person is experiencing unintentional weight loss, fever, skin rashes, fatigue, muscle aches... if they are experiencing any joint pain, swelling, or stiffness that has been ongoing for more than a few days, that's when I would recommend that they seek a rheumatologist," Dr. Kenawy said.

Brazil firemen lament failing to save man as building fell

SAO PAULO — They just needed 30 seconds more, a firefighter sergeant said. He had thrown a rope with an improvised harness to a man hanging from a burning building in Sao Paulo's old downtown, and the man managed to secure his leg and shoulders. But just as the sergeant's team was ready to tug the man away, the building collapsed like a pile of dominoes, pulling the man into a cloud of red-hot debris.

Brazilian TV broadcast Tuesday's dramatic rescue attempt and the collapse of an abandoned

government building that had been occupied by squatters. By the end of the day, only the man whose rescue failed was believed dead. Firefighters and dogs were continuing to search the smoldering rubble — some of which was still too hot to walk over — for his body and any other victims. No firefighters were hurt.

"Of course, it's impossible to not be emotional," firefighter Sgt. Diego Pereira da Silva Santos later told reporters. "It was a victim, it was a person who needed help, who shouted for help."

The sergeant described how he and his team climbed onto the roof of a neighboring

building — using axes to gain access. He said he urged the man to be calm, to look only at the firefighters, to try to ignore

the blazing heat coming from the fire.

"He was secured, he was ready," Santos said. "The problem was the building

collapsed and the amount of rubble and hot embers that fell on him."

The building, a former federal police headquarters, caught fire around 1:30 a.m. and firefighters worked to evacuate people. Less than two hours later, the 25-floor building collapsed. The cause of the fire is under investigation.

The blaze scorched the facade of a neighboring building and damaged a church. In all, five buildings nearby were evacuated.

The fire is sure to put a spotlight on occupations of other abandoned buildings in Brazil's biggest city. The occupations are often led by highly organized

fair-housing groups that run the dwellings like regular apartment buildings, with doormen and residents paying monthly fees. Others are less formal and more precarious.

In a July 2017 story on the occupations, The Associated Press reported that around 350 families were living in the former police headquarters. Local media said Tuesday that between 50 and 150 were currently living there, underscoring the sometimes fluid nature of such makeshift dwellings.

Mayor Bruno Covas ordered civil defense authorities to evaluate the approximately 70 other occupied buildings in the city.

interview him about several episodes in office. They have not yet made

a decision about an interview.

Trump lawyer Jay Sekulow declined to comment to The Associated Press, as did White House lawyer Ty Cobb.

In his tweet, Trump said there were “no

questions on Collusion” and, as he as many times before, called Mueller’s investigation a “Russian witch hunt.” He said collusion with the Russians “never existed.”

In a second tweet, Trump said: “It would

seem very hard to obstruct justice for a crime that never happened.”

The questions do appear to indicate that Mueller is looking into possible collusion. Some touch on Russian meddling and whether the Trump campaign coordinated in any way with the Kremlin. In one question obtained by the Times, Mueller asks what Trump knew about campaign staff, including his former campaign chairman Paul Manafort, reaching out to Moscow.

Mueller has brought several charges against Manafort already, including money laundering and bank fraud. None of the charges relate to allegations of Russian election interference and possible coordination with Trump associates, and Manafort has denied having anything to do with such an effort.

One question asks what discussions Trump may have had regarding

“any meeting with Mr. Putin,” referring to Russian President Vladimir Putin. Another question asks what the president may have known about a possible attempt by his son-in-law, Jared Kushner, to set up a back channel with Russia before Trump’s inauguration.

Many of the questions obtained by the Times center on the obstruction issue, including his reaction to Attorney General Jeff Sessions’ recusal from the Russia investigation, a decision Trump has angrily criticized.

The queries also touch on Trump’s businesses and his discussions with his personal lawyer, Michael Cohen, about a possible Moscow real estate deal. Cohen’s business dealings are part of a separate FBI investigation.

Additional questions center on Michael Flynn, Trump’s former national security adviser, who has pleaded guilty to lying to

the FBI about his discussions on sanctions against Russia with Russian Ambassador Sergey Kislyak during the presidential transition. Flynn is now cooperating with Mueller’s investigators.

“What did you know about phone calls that Mr. Flynn made with the Russian ambassador, Sergey I. Kislyak, in late December 2016?” reads one question. Another asks if there were any efforts to reach out to Flynn “about seeking immunity or possible pardon.”

Flynn was fired Feb. 13, 2017, after White House officials said he had misled them about his Russian contacts during the transition period by saying that he had not discussed sanctions.

The following day, according to memos written by Comey, Trump cleared the Oval Office of other officials and encouraged Comey to drop the investigation into Flynn.

SACRAMENTON, CALIF. California sues over plan to scrap emission standards

California and 16 other states sued the Trump administration Tuesday over its plan to scrap Obama-era auto-emissions standards that would require vehicles to get significantly higher gas mileage by 2025.

At issue is a move by Environmental Protection Agency administrator Scott Pruitt to roll back 2012 rules aimed at curbing greenhouse gas emissions.

Under those rules, vehicles would have to get 36 miles of real-world driving per gallon, about 10 miles over the existing standard.

Turning point?

Zuckerberg pledges to 'keep building' in no-apology address

SAN JOSE, Calif. — With a smile that suggested the hard part of an “intense year” may be behind him, Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg addressed developers Tuesday and pledged the company will build its way out of its worst-ever privacy debacle.

It was a clear and deliberate turning point for a company that's been hunkered down since mid-March. For first time in several weeks, Zuckerberg went before a public audience and didn't apologize for the Cambridge Analytica scandal, in which a political data-mining firm accessed data from as many as 87 million Facebook accounts for the purpose of influencing elections. Or for a deluge of fake news and Russian election interference.

Instead, Zuckerberg sought to project a “we're all in this together” mood that was markedly different from his demeanor

during 10 hours of congressional testimony just a few weeks ago. His presentation also marked a major change for the company, which seems relieved to be largely done with the damage control that has preoccupied it for the past six weeks.

On Tuesday, speaking in San Jose, California, at the F8 gathering of software developers, Zuckerberg said to cheers that the company is re-opening app reviews, the process that gets new and updated apps on its services, which Facebook had shut down in late March as a result of the privacy scandal.

Zuckerberg then vowed to “keep building,” and reiterated that Facebook is investing a lot in security and in strengthening its systems so they can't be exploited to meddle with elections, including the U.S. midterms later this year. The company had previously announced almost all of those measures.

“The hardest decision I made wasn't to invest in safety and security,” Zuckerberg said. “The hard part was figuring out how to move forward on everything else we need to do too.”

He also unveiled a new feature that gives users the ability to clear their browsing history from the platform, much the same way people can do in web browsers. Then Zuckerberg returned to techno-enthusiasm mode.

Facebook executives trotted out fun features, most notably a new dating service aimed at building “meaningful, long-term relationships,” in a swipe at sites like Tinder. After Facebook announced its entry into the online dating game, shares of Tinder owner Match Group Inc. plummeted 22 percent.

Poking fun at himself, Zuckerberg unveiled a “Watch Party” feature that gives users the ability to watch video together — such as, he suggested, “your friend testifying before Congress.” Up flashed video of Zuckerberg's own turn on Capitol Hill.

“Let's not do that again soon,” he said.

Zuckerberg got big cheers when he announced that the thousands of people in attendance would get Facebook's latest virtual reality headset — the portable, \$199 Oculus Go — for free. “Thank you!” he yelled.

Vista Outdoor to get rid of its firearms business

WASHINGTON — Another company, this one among the largest ammunition makers in America, is distancing itself from firearms following the massacre at Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High in February.

Vista Outdoor Inc. has been pressured for months by retailers that sell its other goods like Bell bicycle helmets and CamelBak water carriers, to stop manufacturing firearms.

The Utah company said Tuesday that it will be seeking buyers for its firearms manufacturing business, and will focus on products for outdoor enthusiasts.

It will continue to sell ammunition, its biggest core businesses.

REI, the national outdoor retailer, suspended all orders from Vista in March after it refused to say if it would continue to manufacture weapons. REI said it's aware of Vista's announcement, but did not say if it would resume doing business with the company.

During a conference call Tuesday, Vista CEO Christopher Metz said that the company was already moving in the direction of shedding its firearms business, “way before any of the noise came about eight weeks ago.”

In the aftermath of the Parkland, Florida shooting, Dick's Sporting Goods banned the sale of assault-style rifles and the sale of all guns to anyone under 21. Other retailers followed with similar restrictions, including Walmart, Kroger and L.L. Bean.

In March, Citigroup became the first bank to put new restrictions on firearm sales by its business customers, requiring its clients and business customers not to sell a firearm to anyone who hasn't passed a background check or anyone under the age of 21.

Teacher strikes: 'Blowin' in the Wind'

Teachers in West Virginia have returned to the classroom after a nine-day wage strike. Teachers in Oklahoma staged a walkout earlier this month. At this writing, teacher walkouts in Arizona and Colorado are planned for the next few days. There's a sense that these public employees have been dissatisfied for some time now. Why these protests are coalescing simultaneously is anyone's guess. Perhaps it's, thank you Robert Zimmerman, “Blowin' in the Wind.” Oklahoma's minimum teacher salary starts at

\$31,600 and can range up to \$46,000. Granted, it costs far less to live in rural Oklahoma than in New York, a state whose teachers are compensated better than any other. So, some argue that teachers in states like Oklahoma should be paid far less. But \$31,000, even in Oklahoma, doesn't afford a lavish lifestyle.

How much should we pay those who educate our young people? If we really care about the quality of education our kids are receiving, should we demonstrate that concern by reallocating funds in state budget sessions?

Many people say, “What's in it for me? I don't have kids,” or “My kids are grown. Why do I care about teacher salaries and school funding?” And it's an understandable stance. But here's a thought: Even if we don't currently have children in school, we can all appreciate living in better communities. A better educated population saves us money.

It's a good economic decision. Investing in teacher salaries and schools means less unemployment, less crime, more productive taxpayers, more educated decisions being made about health care choices. These are all issues that end up costing us taxpayers a huge amount of money.

So is increasing teacher pay the only answer? No, of course not. Education, like all industries, faces a myriad of challenges beyond compensation. Difficult, complicated issues hound our educational institutions at every level. But one wonders what caliber of instructor could be recruited if starting salaries approached, say, \$75,000 a year? How would our young people be impacted? In what ways would it reshape our culture?

In many countries, teachers are widely respected, and it is understood that their calling is an indispensable and valuable one. Here, we ask quite a lot of our teachers, including serving as

bulletproof warriors and oftentimes funding their own materials when school supplies aren't available, but we don't compensate them particularly well. As an investment adviser, I work with educators, and I haven't met one who didn't come out of his or her own pocket countless times to buy needed educational supplies or for students.

Paying teachers more is like funding public libraries. They don't normally turn a profit. But who wants to live in a community without one?

Officer's sign-off strikes chord

The video of Jenkins' last radio sign-off — a 10-7, out of service, in cop code — provided in a matter of minutes a testament to the bonds that he developed with his profession, and with his brothers and sisters in arms, over the course of a 30-year career in his hometown. Jenkins struggled to hold back tears and his voice quivered as he signed off and then listened to the "happy retirement" wishes of his fellow officers.

In a job that blends uncertainty with regimentation, the 10-7 represents more than a perfunctory punching of a time clock. It means that, for another day, an officer has made it to the end of another shift — alive. The final sign-off upon imminent retirement assumes even more meaning, signaling the end of a career and the beginning of a new life.

For the viewer of the video, taken by his partner, it was clear that Jenkins has relished his job, his colleagues and the community he has served — the very same community where he graduated from high school. It was touching to see a cop showing his tender side, an African-American man proud of a profession that often draws criticism for its treatment of minorities.

The video also serves as a reminder that, like Jenkins, millions of Americans develop deep emotional attachments to their jobs and the people with whom they work. These bonds are among the reasons that so many folks embark upon the daily grind — for years and years — with determination and a sense of purpose, regardless of their pay grade or station in life.

They are the people who are good at what they do, but hesitate to declare themselves as "self-made" successes.

In his last radio transmission on the police force, Jenkins reiterated that view.

"I'd like to thank my SPD family for the last 30 years of being by my side," he said. "Especially for today, for making it a memorable one. I had plenty of good times and a lot of good memories over my career. I will appreciate it, I will cherish them for the rest of my life. ..."

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Why some believe abortion is murder

At the heart of the pro-life movement is a basic premise: Abortion is murder. An Idaho state senator, however, got unusual attention in February when he voiced that sentiment to a group of students lobbying for birth control measures.

If abortion is morally indistinguishable from killing a newborn, why shouldn't those who procure abortions be severely punished? It's the clear logical implication of the pro-life argument.

Donald Trump inadvertently deviated from the pro-life playbook in 2016 when he said women who get abortions should face "some sort of punishment," only to recant. Mike Pence insisted he and Trump "would never support legislation against women who make the heartbreaking choice to end a pregnancy."

Jeanne Mancini, president of the March for Life Education and Defense Fund, said then, "No pro-lifer would ever want to punish a woman who has chosen abortion. We invite a woman who has gone down this route to consider paths to

healing, not punishment."

"Healing" is not what people normally think is appropriate for cold-blooded killers, and murder is rarely portrayed as a "heartbreaking choice." Those who speak this way are effectively conceding that abortion is fundamentally different from homicide.

Trump is one of them. He regularly calls for tough measures to curb Chicago's homicides, which totaled 650 last year. Nationally, however, there are some 650,000 abortions annually. If they amount to murder, then the non-fetuses who die are a small share of the homicide total.

But hardly anyone truly regards having an abortion as equal in evil to killing an adult or a child. Hardly anyone thinks a woman who has an abortion belongs in a cell next to a guy who strangles his child.

About one of every four American women will have an abortion by age 45, according to the Guttmacher Institute. If you regard abortion as murder and think your sister, daughter, aunt, niece, cousin or friend should go to prison for decades — or be executed — if she ever terminated a pregnancy, you're being consistent. If you regard abortion as murder and think they deserve a gentle path to healing, you're not.

But few opponents of

abortion grasp what it would mean to seriously regard the embryo as a full human starting at conception. As Northwestern University bioethicist Katie Watson notes in her recent book "Scarlet A: The Ethics, Law and Politics of Ordinary Abortion," half of fertilized eggs fail to implant, and up to 20 percent of pregnancies end in miscarriage.

"If fertilized eggs are morally equivalent to born people," she asks, "why aren't we devoting tremendous research dollars to stopping miscarriages?" The silence on "natural" losses in pregnancy speaks volumes.

If abortion is not murder, it is impossible to justify banning it, early in pregnancy or later. Women have the right to control their own bodies — have knee surgery or not, donate blood or not, go sky diving or not. The freedom to end a pregnancy is part of that physical autonomy.

You may be able to justify forcing a woman to carry a fetus in her womb for nine months and then endure the pain and physical trauma of delivering a baby — if you genuinely believe abortion is murder. But I'm pretty sure you don't.

To no avail, some citizens in opposition made strong and logical points as to other avenues that should be considered. One suggestion that was offered but seemed to have fallen on deaf ears was the one measure that would've erased any appearance of covert racism. Attorney Alvin Peters tried forcefully to convince Superintendent Husfelt and his group to go "federal" with the issue.

Now, if Patterson should close and a great number of black kids are involuntarily displaced from their community school as a corrective measure, it will forever be said that having a concentrated number of black students in a single facility is unteachable, and they cannot measure up to the educational standards set forth by the state of

Florida. On the other hand, it is my firm belief that anyone failing to understand the culture of these kids and their families has failed to know our local history. Therefore, we should be bound and committed to provide necessary funding and other resources to help wipe away these last stains from racial segregation.

Hence, if these kids are made to feel that they cannot learn while at their community school of Oscar Patterson, but will do better at "Smart Elementary" across town, what is this School Board implying? As an alternative to this radical approach, I offer this as a more sensible solution: Mandate that a cadre of teachers from "Smart Elementary" be moved to Oscar Patterson. And finally, stop insinuating that these kids can't learn.

School half-cent tax to appear on ballot

Funds would go toward security, renovation, construction

PANAMA CITY — A new 10-year cycle of the Bay District Schools' half-cent sales tax will appear on the Aug. 28 primary ballot.

The Bay County Commission voted to place the referendum on the ballot during their Tuesday meeting, putting the decision in the hands of the voters.

"There's no better way than to let people decide how to tax themselves," Commissioner Tommy Hamm said. "That's basically what we are doing." If the initiative passes, the

school district would start collecting the renewed tax in January 2021, just as the current tax sunsets. School officials decided to start the process of renewing the surtax early, to hopefully prevent a lapse in collections that could stall projects.

The funds supplement what the school district receive from the state to fund maintenance, renovations and new construction.

"Bay District Schools does not get enough money to do the things we have to do," School Board Chairman Ginger Littleton said. "This is a revenue stream that for the most part doesn't hurt us too much. It is shared by a huge group of people, many of whom do not live here, and we are the beneficiaries."

A new use for the funds will be addressing security concerns that became more urgent after the Parkland shooting earlier this year.

"Ten years ago, we did not have any idea what would happen," Littleton said, adding when the school board itself was approached by a shooter in 2010, they considered it an aberration.

"It was just odd, and then we had Sandy Hook," she said. "We realize it's a new day, and we have to be prepared for whatever in terms of keeping our children safe."

The district plans to use half-cent money to secure the entrances to all buildings, add fencing and purchase security software. The district is also

Both sides rest in North Bay drowning trial

PANAMA CITY — After two false starts, both sides now have rested in the case of a Bay County man accused of leaving a family friend to drown in the shallows of North Bay.

Thomas Lee Hutchinson, 21, appeared in court Tuesday for the second day of testimony in his manslaughter case. While prosecutors have argued that injuries he inflicted could have contributed to the Oct. 13, 2015, death of 47-year-old Timothy E. Morrell, Hutchinson's defense attorneys have countered that he was defending himself and had no reason to think the injuries would be fatal.

If convicted of principal to

manslaughter and molesting crab traps, Hutchinson could face up to 30 years in prison.

Prosecutor Bob Sombathy rested his case Tuesday, telling the court that Hutchinson and his co-defendant, 38-year-old Mary Arlette King, had both participated in beating, slashing and stabbing Morrell. Hutchinson then forced Morrell at knife-point to swim away from the boat, where he drowned in the shallow water of North Bay.

"He knew Morrell was hurt. He knew Morrell was drunk," Sombathy said. "Despite this, he forced Morrell with a knife off the boat and withheld information that would have prompted a law enforcement search. That evinces a reckless disregard for human life."

Defense attorney Jean

Woman arrested after infant's suffocation

Police: Woman fell asleep with 5-month-old while intoxicated

PANAMA CITY — A Bay County woman is behind bars after she allegedly fell asleep while intoxicated with her 5-month-old and suffocated the child, according to officials.



Few details were immediately available about the circumstances that led to the child's death. Crystal Ann Cagle, 40, appeared in court Tuesday in connection with the case. The State Attorney's Office (SAO) initiated the charge of child neglect with great bodily harm against her late last week but has not filed an arrest affidavit in the case. Cagle is being held at the Bay County Jail, and a bond has yet to be determined.

The case stems from Jan. 13, when the Panama City Police Department responded to a call of an unresponsive child at an Oak Hammock address.

"We went to an address in the Oak Hammock area, where we found a female performing chest compressions on an infant," PCPD Capt. Paul Powell said. "Officers and fire crews attempted to resuscitate the child, but we were unsuccessful."

PCPD awaited the results of an autopsy on the child and a toxicology test on Cagle as the investigation proceeded. Police then sent the case to the SAO to decide whether charges were appropriate.

SAO officials said Cagle had been out at a bar earlier that night. When she came


BERNARD CLARKE MEREDITH, JR. 1926-2018

Boy's body found 5 days after wave swept him away

The body of a 4-year-old boy was found five days after a ferocious wave swept him out to the sea while he was walking with his mother on a beach in Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, police said.

Wesley Belisle's body was found about 7:40 a.m. Monday on Carova Beach, about 30 miles north of the beach from where he disappeared, Kitty Hawk Police Chief Joel Johnson said in a statement on Facebook.

"Wesley's family has been notified and are making arrangements for

him to be transported back to New Hampshire," Johnson said. "We hope that the outpouring of compassion and offers of support, thoughts and prayers to the Belisle family from people all over the world can bring them some amount of solace in this time of tremendous grief."

Wesley and his mother, who had been visiting the Outer Banks from their home in Manchester, New Hampshire, were walking in the shallow waters of the beach on a warm and sunny spring afternoon. But the surf was intense, with waves 4 to 6 feet high. Wesley and his mother were alone when

the current knocked them off their feet, and ripped Wesley away from his mother.

She scoured the water for him, but another wave rushed in, and Wesley's mother lost sight of him in the surf, U.S. Coast Guard officials said.

The rescue crews searched Wednesday a total of 130 square nautical miles, deploying a Jayhawk helicopter and 47-foot motor lifeboat to scan the waters for the boy, according to a Coast Guard news release. But the only sign of the child was his hat, found about 2 miles north of where he was swept away, about an hour after

he vanished, according to 13 News Now. By 8:30 p.m., the Coast Guard had suspended its search.

"Suspending a search for anyone, let alone a young child, is the most difficult thing a commanding officer in the Coast Guard is called upon to do," Capt. Bion Stewart, a commander of the North Carolina sector, said in a statement at the time. "I can't imagine what the family of this little boy is going through right now."

The news of the boy's disappearance had stunned residents and officials in this Outer Banks community, prompting locals to gather at the beach to join the search.

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Charges dropped against 1 in shark-dragging video case

TAMPA — Hillsborough County Judge Mark Wolfe dropped charges Tuesday against one of three men involved in a widely publicized shark-dragging case.

Spencer Heintz, 23, of Palmetto, was charged in December with two counts aggravated animal cruelty, but attorney Paul Sisco said evidence did not show his client was involved in criminal activity on a boat last summer.

"We're just very thankful that the State

Attorney's Office looked at all the facts in the case as it applied to my client," Sisco said after a hearing in Tampa Tuesday morning. "There is recognition that different roles were played on the boat. Mr. Heintz was not involved in any of the conduct that the state determined constituted criminal activity. I think that is clear now." There was no change in charges for Heintz's crewmates Michael Wenzel, 21, of Palmetto and Robert Lee Benac, 28, of Bradenton. They are charged with two counts of third-degree aggravated animal cruelty and one count of misdemeanor illegal method of take.

"Any person who has viewed the video from this incident should be

outraged, but as prosecutors we must evaluate the evidence and law without emotion or prejudice," Andrew Warren, State Attorney of the 13th Circuit, said in an emailed statement. "After additional analysis, we decided to drop the charges against Mr. Heintz, who was largely a spectator, and move forward with the more culpable defendants for their senseless animal cruelty."

Wenzel and Benac pleaded not guilty to the charges in January.

Sisco said Tuesday's court events indicate his client's willingness to cooperate with the investigation.

"He naturally feels good, but candidly, all he did and all he had done is told the truth about what happened on the boat," Sisco said. "He'll continue to do that if and when he's called as a witness by either side."

Last summer, popular Miami-based shark hunter Mark Quartiana received a 10-second video clip showing a shark being dragged behind a boat at high speed. The shark thrashes and slams against the wake of the engine, as four men looked back.

"Look it's already almost dead," one of the men in the boat said, pointing toward the shark.

Quartiano received the video in a direct Instagram message while he was fishing off of Miami Beach.

Florida offers framework for pot licenses

Proposal comes six months after deadline

More than six months after an Oct. 3 deadline to issue new medical-marijuana licenses, the Florida Department of Health has released a proposed rule outlining an application process for potential operators in what could be one of the nation's largest cannabis markets.

Lawmakers ordered the new licenses after voters approved a 2016 constitutional amendment broadly legalizing marijuana as a treatment for patients with debilitating medical conditions, including cancer, HIV/AIDS, post-traumatic stress disorder, Parkinson's disease, ALS and multiple sclerosis.

Under a 2014 law that allowed limited types of medical cannabis, the Department of Health had awarded some licenses before the constitutional amendment passed. But the Legislature last year gave state health officials until Oct. 3 to grant 10 new licenses to marijuana operators who meet certain requirements, including applicants who were involved in litigation before January 2017.

The state so far has issued licenses to 13 operators, including a handful of new operators who met the criteria laid out in the 2017 law. But it has not started accepting applications for four highly sought licenses from businesses seeking entry into Florida's burgeoning

market.

The proposed rule released Tuesday mirrors an emergency regulation floated by the state Office of Medical Marijuana Use late last year, but it also incorporates elements included in a law, passed during this year's legislative session, aimed at addressing legal and regulatory concerns that have plagued state officials since the Legislature first approved non-euphoric cannabis for a limited number of patients four years ago.

For example, the proposed rule lays out requirements for a license earmarked for a black farmer who was part of settled lawsuits, known as "Pigford" cases, about discrimination against black farmers by the federal government. The proposed rule released Tuesday reflects changes included in this year's law, which did away with a previous requirement that black-farmer applicants be members of the Black Farmers and Agriculturalists-Florida

Chapter. The change in the law, reflected in the proposed rule, was focused on solving a problem raised in a legal challenge over the black-farmer issue.

Another element of the proposed rule deals with a requirement, also ordered by the Legislature, that gives preference for up to two licenses to applicants that "own one or more facilities that are, or were, used for the canning, concentrating, or otherwise processing of citrus fruit or citrus molasses and will use or convert the facility or facilities for the processing of marijuana."

The citrus preference is the focus of one of several ongoing marijuana-related lawsuits, including a challenge to the state's ban on smokable pot and a separate case in which a circuit judge recently gave Tampa strip-club owner Joe Redner permission to grow his own cannabis for use in juicing to prevent a recurrence of lung cancer. The state has appealed the Redner ruling.

a woman is kind of cool because you get to honor Rosie the Riveter. ... If we didn't have Rosie the Riveter we could have been doubted or people could have said, 'You can't do this.' It's showing us we can do it."

The roses are a special breed created in 2017 for memorial Rosie gardens across the country. Tuesday's ceremony drew a crowd of about 50 people, including residents and representatives from Tyndall Air Force Base. Though no women who served during World War II attended — organizers weren't able to find any local Rosies despite searching for and inviting them — they weren't forgotten by the people there.

Callaway resident Carolyn Hagan said her aunt Ester Johnson worked at a Navy yard in Pensacola during the global conflict.

Johnson, who died last month, never talked much about her wartime efforts. Tyndall Air Force Association President Edward Hood, who promoted the event, also mentioned how Rosies across the country helped America and its allies win the war.

"These women have done great things. This is one of hundreds of Rosie the Riveter gardens being planted across the country, forming a national living memorial to honor the women who made history on the World War II homefront," Hood said. "Everyone at home knew they had a job to do. They saved critical materials for the war effort, planted victory gardens, bought war bonds and found creative ways to make ration stamps last."

Craig Deatherage, Congressman Neal Dunn's military and veteran affairs liaison, said that during war, people back home sacrifice just as much as service members. Rosie the Riveter symbolizes those efforts, he said.

"It's one thing to put up a monument and pressure wash it every 10 years," Deatherage said. "It's an entirely different thing to plant a garden and trim that garden and care for that garden and prune the roses year after year, season after season, and help them grow into a beautiful and living example for the women who contributed so much during World War II. These are women who stepped out of their normal roles and went into factories and took on jobs that were nontraditional for women at that time."

Girl Scouts Troop 750 leader Tonia Perkins said the Girl Scouts' participation was great because the organization is all about empowering girls, just like Rosie the Riveter and the women during World War II did. Girl Scouts also teaches young girls gardening, science and other skills, Perkins said.

Along with roses, a sign featuring Rosie the Riveter also was put up at Veterans Park before the ceremony.

dipping into other pots of money to address concerns quickly.

"Enhancing the safety and security of our school campuses is an ongoing project," according to Director of Facilities Lee Walters. "Moving forward, every new construction or renovation project will include addressing the safety and security needs of the campus. The new half-cent funding cycle, if approved by voters,

will enable that work to continue alongside other much-needed renovation and construction work."

Commissioner Guy Tunnell, who previously served as the county sheriff, offered his support.

The money also is earmarked for more traditional uses, such as building a Fine Arts Center at Bay High School, and maintenance costs, Littleton said.

Only one speaker, Charles Mitchell, spoke

against putting the extension on the ballot.

"How big is this apple for the half-cent sales tax?" he asked, saying he would rather keep the money than pay taxes. "When will it stop?"

Though the question will appear on a primary ballot, Supervisor of Election Mark Andersen said all voters, whether they are registered as Democrats, Republicans, Libertarians or something else, will receive information on the referendum and have the opportunity to vote.

"They have the same opportunity in a primary as they have in a general election," he said.

Marie Downing, however, argued Hutchinson had no duty to keep the drunken and belligerent Morrell aboard his boat after causing it to take on water. Downing said the injuries Hutchinson inflicted on Morrell were in self-defense, as were his orders to keep Morrell away from the boat.

"It was, 'Get away from us. Go over there,'" Downing told the court. "They were on land, next to shore, in shallow water. ... (Morrell's drowning) is not something a reasonable person could assume would happen."

Before resting their case, prosecutors showed jurors pictures from the morning of Oct. 15, 2015, when the Bay County Sheriff's Office discovered Morrell — shirtless and shoeless — floating face-down in an area of North Bay known as Marifarms, after a defunct shrimp farm. He last had been seen about midnight Oct. 13, after the altercation aboard Hutchinson's boat, officers reported.

BCSO Investigator Tim Adkins described for the jury the conditions where authorities believe the altercation took place.

"The soil there was very soft," Adkins told the jury. "There were

times I would sink while walking."

Prosecutors then showed the jury pictures of the injuries Morrell sustained in the course of the incident. He had a slash down the length of his back and a bleeding blunt-force trauma to the back of his head. He also had several puncture wounds on his body from being stuck repeatedly with a flounder gig.

Dr. Jay Radtke, 14th Judicial Circuit Medical Examiner, told the jury Morrell accidentally drowned after leaving the boat. But his wounds that night — along with alcohol and pill consumption that caused Morrell's blood alcohol content to be at 0.304 percent — could have contributed to his death, he said.

Hutchinson only briefly glanced up at the pictures.

BCSO reported that the trio had embarked on a clandestine crab trap-poaching and gator-hunting expedition the

day of Morrell's death, all of them heavily consuming whiskey. As the sunlight began to fade, Morrell caused the boat to take on water by sitting unevenly on the vessel. He refused to help bail water, though, and that's when the outing turned violent.

King later admitted to punching Morrell, then stabbing him with the flounder gig out of anger. Hutchinson then allegedly struck Morrell multiple times in the face and slashed him with a "duck bill knife" before forcing him drunken and injured from the boat at knifepoint, BCSO reported.

In the five hours that followed, Hutchinson and King sipped whiskey aboard the boat while calling 911 for assistance. In none of the calls did they mention Morrell being injured.

Hutchinson's trial has been rescheduled twice because of mistrials: first after Hutchinson admitted to having smoked marijuana the night before his January trial, and again April 3 when one juror realized he knew a witness and a second called in sick.

The trial is expected to wrap up Wednesday after closing arguments.

King already has been convicted of the same charges Hutchinson faces. She was sentenced to 14 years in prison.



Justify installed the early 3-1 favorite for Kentucky Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Bob Baffert had no chance to fret over the Kentucky Derby draw.

By the time the Hall of Fame trainer managed to get into Churchill Downs, the process was halfway done and Justify had landed in the No. 7 post on Tuesday.

"We didn't want the 1-hole, that's for sure," the four-time Derby winner said. "I was relieved when I saw him in seven."

Justify was made the early 3-1 favorite for the Derby, with Europe-based Mendelssohn the second choice in a full field of 20 horses.

Six horses have won from the No. 7 post, most recently Street Sense in 2007.

"The only reason I'm the favorite is because I beat Bolt d'Oro and he was the horse to beat," said Baffert, referring to Justify's three-length

win over his rival in the Santa Anita Derby last month.

Justify is one of two horses in Saturday's 1 1/4-mile race who didn't race at age 2. The other is 6-1 third choice Magnum Moon. No horse since Apollo in 1882 has won the Derby after not racing as a 2-year-old.

"I don't buy into the Apollo Curse or whatever at all, mainly because Bob Baffert and Todd Pletcher have got the horses," four-time Derby-winning trainer D. Wayne Lukas said. "Todd's going to have his (horse) ready, and Baffert is going to have his."

Justify is 3-0 in his brief career, winning by a combined 19 lengths. Magnum Moon is 4-0, winning the Arkansas Derby and Rebel Stakes in his last two starts.

"It's one of the toughest Derbies I've ever seen," Baffert said. "All the important


It came as little or no surprise that Panhandle Conference champion Chipola dominated the postseason awards, recently released, for both baseball and softball.

"Probably that they had a higher football IQ," said Siegal, whose previous stop was at a school in Racine, Wis., prior to being hired at NBH. "I got here so late that I didn't throw a whole lot at them."

Siegal said on Monday that the learning curve has been accelerated because of that, and that on offense there isn't that much of a transition from the Bucs' scheme in 2017. Defensively, however, there will be a different look.

Watkins said that Bay could see its greatest improvement on defense next season. With

With that in mind, Siegal said the Bucs will remain active in the weight room during spring drills, a time many programs traditionally back off on weight training after having concentrated their focus there during the winter.

Ovechkin gave the Capitals a 2-1 series lead when he collected a pass from Nicklas Backstrom and fired a shot that ripped by Murray before hitting the right post.

Ovechkin stayed with it and his baseball-like swat gave him eight goals in the playoffs and the Capitals their fourth consecutive road win in the postseason.

Ovechkin has also scored in four consecutive playoff games this postseason.

Matt Niskanen, John Carlson and Chandler Stephenson also scored for Washington. Braden Holtby finished with 19

saves. Backstrom had three assists.

Jake Guentzel had a goal and an assist for Pittsburgh. Sidney Crosby and Patric Hornqvist also scored, but the Penguins lost consecutive playoff games for only the fourth time since the start of their runs to consecutive Stanley Cups began in 2016.

Matt Murray made 18 stops but couldn't get his glove — a problem area all postseason — on Ovechkin's initial shot, allowing the Russian star to have a shot at the rebound.

Game 4 is Thursday night in Pittsburgh.

The game featured a significant uptick in physical play, a byproduct of the pressure and the fallout of the NHL's decision not to discipline Washington's Tom Wilson for his high hit in Game 2 on Pittsburgh defenseman Brian Dumoulin, who went into the league's concussion protocol after Wilson blindsided him while Dumoulin braced for a collision with a charging Ovechkin.

James has triple-double, Cavs beat Raptors in OT

TORONTO — LeBron James had 26 points, 13 assists and 11 rebounds, J.R. Smith scored 20 points and the Cleveland Cavaliers beat the Toronto Raptors 113-112 in overtime on Tuesday night to win Game 1 of their second-round playoff series.

Kyle Korver scored 19 points, including the go-ahead 3-pointer in overtime after Cleveland never led in regulation. Tristan Thompson had 14 points and 12 rebounds for the Cavaliers, who have eliminated Toronto in each of the past two seasons.

Toronto's Fred VanVleet missed a 3-pointer with 3.4 seconds to go in overtime that could have won it for the Raptors, who couldn't hold on to a 14-point, first-quarter lead.

Jonas Valanciunas had 21 points and 21 rebounds, Kyle Lowry had 18 points and 10 assists, and DeMar DeRozan scored 22 points for the Raptors, who host Game 2 on Thursday night.

The Cavaliers beat the Raptors in six games in the Eastern Conference finals in 2016 before going on to win their first NBA championship. Last year, Cleveland swept Toronto in the second round.

Korver's 3 early in overtime gave the Cavaliers their first lead of the game, 108-105.

Lowry's three-point play made it 113-112 with 57 seconds to go and, after the Cavs were called for a shot-clock violation, Toronto had one more chance to win, but VanVleet couldn't come through.

VanVleet was one of four Raptors to miss in the final seconds of regulation. Toronto got four looks at the potential winning basket on its next possession but missed all four, including a wide-open 3 by VanVleet, giving Cleveland the ball with 0.6 seconds remaining. Green inbounded to James, but his shot bounced off the rim.

The Raptors shot 5 for 24 in the fourth quarter, with Valanciunas missing six of seven attempts.

HOUSTON Gymnast sues Karolyis, others over doctor's abuse

A former member of the U.S. national team on Tuesday became the latest gymnast to file suit over sexual abuse by imprisoned former sports doctor Larry Nassar's, alleging USA Gymnastics, the U.S. Olympic Committee and the husband-and-wife duo who coached America's top female gymnasts for three decades failed to protect her and other athletes.

Sabrina Vega, who was on the team that won a gold medal at the 2011 World Championships, alleges the organizations along with Bela and Martha Karolyi ignored signs about Nassar's behavior or should have known he posed a risk to the gymnasts he treated.

Vega alleges that during medical treatments, Nassar molested her hundreds of times from 2008, when she was 12 years old, until 2012, during competitions and while she trained at the Karolyi Ranch. The ranch is outside of Huntsville, about 70 miles north of Houston. Vega's lawsuit was filed in state district court in Huntsville.

LONDON Wimbledon champs to get more than \$3 million

The winners of the singles titles at Wimbledon will each receive about \$3 million as part of a 7.6 percent increase in the total prize money at this year's tournament.

The All England Club says the total prize fund will be \$46.5 million.

Of that, \$3.07 million will go to the men's and women's champions — \$68,000 from 2017.

First-round losers will receive \$53,000, but they may have to forfeit their prize money if they retire from the match or perform "below professional standards."

Injured players will receive 50 percent of their first-round prize money if they withdraw on site by the Thursday before the start of play. An injured player's replacement would take the other 50 percent.

WASHINGTON Trump honors Army's football team

President Donald Trump is honoring Army's football team at the White House and predicting the service branches of the military could have a new addition: the space force.

Trump saluted the Black Knights with the annual Commander-in-Chief's Trophy on Tuesday, recounting their victory over Navy on a snowy day in Philadelphia. He received a white Army jersey. It's the first Commander-in-Chief Trophy for West Point since 1996.

The president says the Trump administration is "seriously thinking" about creating a space force, part of his efforts to build up the nation's military.

New Secretary of State Mike Pompeo, a West Point graduate, attended the Rose Garden ceremony. Trump joked that Pompeo was "a man who has gotten more publicity than me lately."

Women's leagues band together with SheIS

NEW YORK — Women's sports leagues are banding together with a new initiative, SheIS.

Eight leagues, including the WNBA, U.S. Tennis Association, Women's Pro Fastpitch League and Canadian Women's Hockey, will try to help each other increase resources, viewership and attendance.

"Each commissioner has agreed to come to one and another's events," WNBA President Lisa Borders told The Associated Press. "Women have to support women before you ask other people to support you. I'll buy a ticket to a hockey game in Canada or a fast-pitch softball game."

All the league commissioners signed a pledge and filmed a public service announcement promoting the effort. Those ads will start rolling out Tuesday.

"It's a social media campaign for now but will grow," Borders added. "This is only tier one."

The initiative was the brainchild of Brenda Andress, commissioner of the Canadian Women's Hockey League, who came up with the idea last November.

"This collective sports voice has never been heard. I wanted to create some type of program or challenge to bring women together that was born out of positivity," Andress said. "So I thought of SheIS. When I thought of myself, she is a grandmother with young kids. She is a commissioner. She is a hockey player. She is anything she wants to be. That's where SheIS came from."

Andress reached out to Borders and USTA chief executive Stacey Allaster, who quickly jumped on board.

"Right off the bat, they were so supportive," Andress said. "We have to do it together. Let's do it, but let's do it right. It's going to be professional, top notch. It's about us as females recognizing we can bring the fans not just to hockey, but to the WNBA. Tennis needs more eyes on the TV. It's not about everyone else making the difference for us, but us making the difference for ourselves."

There has been much discussion over the years about the

wage gap in sports between the sexes. Tennis is one of the few sports where the women have some parity — all four Grand Slam events pay both sexes equally.

"I think the secret sauce for women's tennis started with our athletes," Allaster said. "It took their advocacy and courage to stand up to the establishment much like soccer players and female hockey players have. It was Billie Jean King and the 'Original 9' saying they'd do this back in the 1970s. The athletes have the power and SheIS is a great time to energize our athletes."

The SheIS group can point to a Seattle group already using the multisport format. Force 10 Sports Management owns and operates the WNBA's Seattle Storm. The group also runs the Seattle Reign of the National Women's Soccer League and the Seawolves of Major League Rugby. There is cross-promotion among the sports.

"Seattle is absolutely the

model," Borders said. "They were doing that before SheIS is born."

The city has embraced female athletes such as Sue Bird, Megan Rapinoe and Breanna Stewart.

Before the launch Tuesday, members of the founding committee, league commissioners and prominent figures from across sports gathered at the WNBA office in New York to sign the SheIS pledge.

"The heroes who run, walk and play among us make up 51 percent of the global population, yet have little to no visibility in the sports world," said Dr. Jen Welter, who was the first female coach in the NFL.

"SheIS will give the first true platform for these real-world, real-women heroes who have been living among us. With that comes the opportunity to be much more visible and for female athletes and their supporters to join forces in a really positive way. I love that this

bubbling movement is coming from the sports industry, because sports has the ability to change the world."

The other leagues that already joined are Women's Pro Lacrosse, Canada Basketball, Rugby Canada and the National Women's Hockey League. Andress expects other sports like soccer, gymnastics, swimming, cycling and running to join soon, too. Through the initiative, the leagues also aim to help increase young girls' participation in sports.

"Women for so long have been competitive no matter what they do in life," WNBA player Chiney Ogwumike said. "We are even more powerful when we are collaborative. In public, we have to support each other."

The initiative also has support from the WWE. Stephanie McMahon, the chief brand officer of the company, signed the pledge.

"We need to encourage audiences to watch and attend games and live events, and young girls to stay in sports," she said. "Girls need to see themselves across sports, entertainment and business, and it's going to take all of us to show the world that SheIS anything she wants to be."

Patrick returns to Indy's famous oval

INDIANAPOLIS — Danica Patrick's initial return to the storied oval at Indianapolis Motor Speedway was brief. One lap, not even up to speed.

After having a March refresher course pushed back because of bad weather, then waiting through Monday's practice and Tuesday's rookie orientation program, Patrick finally pulled her neon green No. 13 car onto the 2.5-mile oval four minutes into the afternoon session Tuesday — only to return immediately to pit road with a water temperature problem.

Eventually, the car was towed back to the garage as Patrick followed. She returned to the track about an hour later.

All she can do now is hope the rest of this month goes a little smoother.

The 36-year-old Patrick is the biggest draw for this week's three-day test session

as she prepares for the final race of her career. Patrick is attempting to make her seventh start on the Indianapolis 500's traditional 33-car starting grid, though at least two entries will not make the field depending on how qualifying goes. The race will be held May

27 and then Patrick will retire.

Team owner Ed Carpenter senses Patrick is a little anxious about climbing back into an Indy car cockpit for the first time since leaving the series for NASCAR following the 2011 IndyCar season.

"I think she's a little

nervous because it's been so long," he said. "But I told her yesterday that I get nervous every year because this place is so special. I told her I'd be more worried if she wasn't nervous about getting back in. She does have a lot of experience and although things change, the way you drive this race track stays the same."

Patrick sure didn't seem nervous. Instead, Patrick looked determined as more than a dozen reporters gathered for her pre-driving routine. She strapped into her seat, pulled down her helmet visor and got the go signal from her team just four minutes after the green flag opened the session.

Patrick wasn't the only driver taking refresher laps. Sage Karam followed Patrick onto the track and Jay Howard was scheduled to drive as well.

Patrick was the 2005 Indy 500 rookie of the year and is one of 14 drivers to lead the Indianapolis 500 and Daytona 500.

ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

Gabriel Chagas is one of the few players to have won the three major world teams championships as well as the World Open Pairs. Forty years ago, he wrote a Bols bridge tip to alert players to the intra-finesse, using this hand to illustrate his point.

Against four spades, the defense begins with three rounds of hearts, South ruffing the third. The success of the game hinges on not losing more than one trump trick. Under normal circumstances, you would lead toward the queen after cashing the ace. But here, East is known to hold the king, by virtue of his opening call of one no-trump.

There are two sensible lines of play that declarer should consider. The first is that East might have started with the doubleton spade king, in which case declarer can drive it out without wasting the queen. The other possibility is that West holds the doubleton 10 or jack, so an intra-finesse will be the winning move. Start by leading a spade to the nine, which lets East win with the jack to return the club queen. Now declarer ruffs a club to hand and discovers that East also began with a doubleton club.

Although East might be 2-4-5-2 for his one no-trump opening bid, 3-4-4-2 is a far more likely shape. So, declarer leads a diamond to dummy's ace and advances the spade queen. Since West's 10 falls under the queen, whether East covers or not, declarer holds his trump losers to one and has succeeded in his task.

ANSWER: This hand comes down to the Law of Total Tricks. When you cue-bid two hearts, you showed a limit raise with at least three trumps. (Some pairs might have a way to show a limit raise with four trumps, but we do not.) You should assume your partner does not have enough to bid to three spades, and your balanced hand argues for defending, as you have only three trumps. So pass three hearts.

Leftover magic

Salmon stars in 2 dishes

PANAMA CITY — While I often plan meals according to what will result in leftovers for my son's lunches, I had never thought about planning my weekly menu around meals that could find new life leftover — until now.


Kathie Riley Kern, who became well-known for her resourcefulness as the original owner of My Best Friend's Kitchen, recently taught a "Leftover Magic" cooking class at Somethin's Cookin.' Her recipes included Leftover Pizza Lasagna, Meatloaf Shepherd's Pie and Salmon and Spinach Fettuccine — which caught my attention.

"It's something I've always done. I seem to have a problem making a little bit," admitted Kern, now employment specialist at

The Arc of the Bay. "There's always some leftovers. Once I eat something once or twice, I want to eat something different."

So I decided to turn my house into a test kitchen — with my family helping provide the feedback. We found an amazing recipe for grilled Salmon Fillets with Roasted Corn, Tomato, and Avocado Salsa in "Weber's Greatest Hits" cookbook by Jamie Purviance. The recipe called for six 6- to 8-ounce skin-on salmon fillets, about 1-inch thick. I scaled down the recipe, and asked the seafood department at Lucky's Market to cut four salmon portions from the whole salmon (cheaper per pound than pre-portioned). My husband grilled all four fillets for the three of us to each have one the first night, and I reserved the fourth for the following night's fettuccine.

"I buy this big piece of

salmon at Sam's and put it on the grill. There's only two of us," said Kern, who cooks for herself and her husband, Jon. "We have salmon off the grill for one serving, and on salad for another and

eat it with leftover vegetables; always something different."

Knowing the avocado salsa wouldn't save, my

The Arc of the Bay expands programming

LYNN HAVEN — On Tuesday morning, The Arc of the Bay celebrated the grand opening of its Sirmons Learning Center, where day program clients will begin a hands-on curriculum Monday, May 7.

The newly renovated classroom, 1700 Alabama Ave., was named after retired Circuit Judge Don Sirmons. Clients will learn vocational and independent living skills, such as how to prepare a meal for themselves.

"It might be something as simple as a peanut butter and jelly sandwich," said Kathie Kern, employment specialist at The Arc of the

Bay. "It will be specifically for younger clientele."

The location previously had served as the non-profit agency's thrift store.

"The kitchen will be set up like a restaurant here," said Associate Director Maggie Wattenbarger. "They will learn how to wipe the tables, fill the salt and pepper shakers, and take orders off a menu. A big part of it is to learn how to cook simple meals for themselves. ADT (Adult Day Training) always brings a lunch, but this is an option of preparing lunch."

The ADT program, supporting more than 130 adults, takes place at the main location at 1804 Carolina Ave.

While some will be trained







family had no trouble finishing it off the first night. The avocado salsa also called for a mixture of red and yellow cherry tomatoes, so I knew I would be able to use the rest of the container of tomatoes in the fettuccine. The Salmon and Spinach Fettuccine recipe also calls for butter, half and half, flour, garlic, tomato paste, onion, Parmesan, baby spinach and fresh basil.

"I don't like to waste anything. Use what you have when you make it at home," Kern said. "If I didn't have fresh spinach, I would use broccoli. If I didn't have fresh basil in the garden, I'd use thyme. Most everything we do, we can be more frugal than we are."

The fourth piece of grilled salmon was more than enough for the pasta dish — resulting in another meal of about four hearty portions that didn't feel leftover. But, for Kern, the recipe is more about using what you have.

"I'm sure it would be good with chicken, anything leftover, and it would probably be good by itself (with no meat), leftover or not — Or use rotisserie chicken or steak leftover," she said. "You can use a half pound, less or more."

The spinach, basil and tomatoes are folded in the sauce at the end, just before topping the fettuccine, resulting in an al dente dish that felt lighter than traditional Alfredo sauce. The tomatoes also weren't mushy.

"I don't like the tomatoes hot," said Kern, who also used a touch of tomato

paste during the class, but previously had made the dish without it. "It made it a pretty pink color. You also can make it without flour to make it gluten-free. Just reduce it down."

More Parmesan also could be added to thicken up the sauce when serving over gluten-free pasta for a gluten-free option.

Salmon and Spinach Fettuccine

- 12 ounces dry fresh fettuccine
- ¼ cup butter
- 1 cup half and half (or milk)
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 2 inches garlic cloves, minced (or garlic paste)
- 1 inch tomato paste (optional)
- ½ cup chopped onion
- 1 cup fresh grated or shredded Parmesan cheese
- ½ pound cooked salmon, broken into bite-sized pieces
- 1 cup fresh baby spinach
- ½ cup chopped fresh basil
- ½ cup cherry tomatoes, cut in half

Cook fettuccine per package directions. In a large skillet over medium heat, melt the butter. Add an onion and cook until soft; add garlic and tomato paste (if desired) and stir until incorporated.

Add the flour and cook until flour is lightly brown. Gradually add half and half, and cook until beginning to thicken. Add Parmesan cheese and stir until melted. Add salmon, spinach, tomatoes and basil, and stir or toss until coated and ingredients are hot. Serve mixture over hot cooked fettuccine.

how to prepare food for themselves and serve at a restaurant at Sirmons Learning Center, other clients soon will be taught how to work in a restaurant kitchen to prepare meals for others.

"We are working on a certified culinary program," said Executive Director Ron Sharpe. "We live in the food service market and are trying to fill the void

and have a quality reserve of potential candidates."

The Arc of the Bay has partnered with Gulf Coast State College for the culinary program, which will be taught by certified chefs. The program will run four hours a day, with clients participating for two hours in the morning and two in the afternoon in the community room's kitchen at the main location.

"After the nine-month program, they will be restaurant ready. They will get their ServSafe card and also have skills to work in a

restaurant," Kern said.

Donations from TECO gas company and Gulf Power, among other community partners, will make it possible for their kitchen to get a commercial upgrade. The kitchen, which now has a gas line, will include a stove, deep fryers, as well as recent donations of a refrigerator and steam table.

"Currently, special events are the only times clients are able to prepare meals in the community room," Kern said.

Most recently, clients served the Rotary Club of

Lynn Haven breakfast, a thank-you for their donation of \$10,000 from the annual golf tournament.

"Clients did quick things, fresh fruit, apple turnovers. They got to help prepare and serve and they got to be hosts and hostesses. When we have special occasions, we incorporate this," Kern said. "But the culinary program will be a full-on program for clients. Chef Paul Ashman is going to write the curriculum. With the program, we will have three full-time people who would manage that. As an

employment specialist and company, I help clients find jobs, learn jobs and keep jobs. We have a lot of clients who are developmentally disabled and someones need one on one and hands-on, we stay with them through employment."

The Arc of the Bay, formerly called St. Andrew Bay Center, has provided support and opportunities for adults with disabilities since 1957.

Programs are designed around individuals' needs to help them become as independent as possible.
