

Auto supply company opening U.S. HQ in Bay

Air Temp of Mexico expects to bring 50 jobs to area

PANAMA CITY — A company based in Mexico that supplies auto parts to manufacturers worldwide has chosen Bay County to open its first United States headquarters and manufacturing operation.

The company, Air Temp of Mexico, which is located in Merida, Yucatan, expects to initially hire 50 people to fill high-tech manufacturing jobs at an average annual salary of \$42,000.

"We are excited about opening our new operation in Bay County, Florida and investing in manufacturing in the United States," said Jorge Habib Sr., president and CEO of Air Temp of Mexico, Inc. in a prepared statement. "Having

worked with Port Panama City for nearly a decade, we knew Bay County would be the perfect place to build our U.S. operation."

The company, which already ships auto parts into the Port of Panama City, will be opening its American subsidiary, Air Temp of American, Inc., in a building in Panama City formerly known as the Boyd Brothers property at 425 E. 15th Street.

"They closed on that property about three weeks ago," said Becca Hardin, president of the Bay Economic Development Alliance said at the announcement.

The new headquarters should be fully functional by next June, Hardin said. Everyone except the general manager of the new facility will be hired locally, Hardin said.

"They have more than 1,000 employees in Mexico, so we are very optimistic that as they get here, get established, Phase 1 will grow into Phase 2, and Phase 3," she said. "And we will continue to see them creating high-paying jobs and high-tech jobs in Bay County."

Hardin said the company will be performing tasks such as plastic injection molding at the manufacturing facility here.

Panama City and the county will be offering performance-based property tax breaks to the company for up to 10 years. "It's based on job creation," Hardin said. "When they create the jobs, they get the abatement."

The company, which was founded in 1982, produces automotive parts

that include condensers, radiators, heat exchangers, evaporators and other components. Air Temp is a "Tier 1" supplier to Volkswagen, Nissan, Ford, Peugeot, and other original manufacturing companies. Air Temp has been named as the Volkswagen supplier of the year five times

Wayne Stubbs, executive director of the Port of Panama City, said Air Temp is the first auto parts manufacturing company to located in Bay County based on the shipping connection between the Port of Panama City and the Port of Progreso in Mexico. "We commend them for making this very strategic and timely move and expect others will follow their example," he said.

Bay County man charged with sex trafficking

Police say he made a minor 'visit' men 5 times a day

PANAMA CITY — After being sought for months, a Bay County man is in cus-

today on charges that he arranged for a juvenile to meet with men for sexual encounters five times a day for about a month, according to official reports.

Antonio Young, 34, appeared in court Wednesday. The Panama City Police Department had been looking for him since obtaining arrest warrants in February for one count each of human trafficking and commercial sexual activity in connection with a prostitution sting, when the unidentified juvenile said she'd been a victim of sex trafficking that was arranged and executed by Young. He is now being held on a \$52,500 bond at the Bay County Jail, court records stated.

Young has been court ordered to not have contact with the victim.

PCPD Capt. Paul Powell said the case seems to be

Americans detained in North Korea freed

WASHINGTON — Freed after more than a year in prison, three Americans flew homeward from North Korea late Tuesday toward a big middle-of-the-night celebration featuring President Donald Trump — the latest sign of improving relations between longtime adversaries in the buildup to a historic

summit between Trump and North Korea's Kim Jong Un.

Trump promised "quite a scene" at Joint Base Andrews outside Washington for the detainees, who were released as Secretary of State Mike Pompeo visited North Korea on Wednesday to finalize plans for the summit. Singapore was the likely site, late this month or in early June, for Trump's most ambitious

TODAY IN HISTORY

Today is Thursday, May 10, the 130th day of 2018. There are 235 days left in the year.

Today's Highlights in History: On May 10, 1968, the "Night of the Barricades" began in Paris' Latin Quarter as tens of thousands of student protesters erected obstacles against riot police; in the pre-dawn hours of May 11, the police moved in, resulting in violent clashes that left hundreds of people injured. Preliminary peace talks between the United States and North Vietnam began in the French capital.

On this date:
In 1611, Sir Thomas Dale arrived in the Virginia Colony, where, as deputy governor, he instituted harsh measures to restore order.
In 1775, Ethan Allen and his Green Mountain Boys, along with Col. Benedict Arnold, captured the British-held fortress at Ticonderoga, New York.
In 1818, American patriot Paul Revere, 83, died in Boston.
In 1865, Confederate President Jefferson Davis was captured by Union forces in Irwinville, Georgia.
In 1869, a golden spike was driven in Promontory, Utah, marking the completion of the first transcontinental railroad in the United States.
In 1924, J. Edgar Hoover was named acting director of the Bureau of Investigation (later known as the Federal Bureau of Investigation, or FBI).
In 1933, the Nazis staged massive public book burnings in Germany.
In 1940, during World War II, German forces began invading the Netherlands, Luxembourg, Belgium and France. The same day, British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain resigned, and Winston Churchill formed a new government.
In 1960, the nuclear-powered submarine USS Triton completed its submerged navigation of the globe.

How Trump opted to scrap Iran deal

WASHINGTON — It was all there on paper in black and white, down to the precise number of centrifuges: the terms of a potential “fix” that President Donald Trump had demanded for the United States to stay in the Iran nuclear deal.

Dragged kicking and screaming into five months of negotiations, America’s closest allies in Europe had finally agreed in principle to the toughest of Trump’s demands. They conceded that some expectation could be put into place in perpetuity that Iran should never get closer than one year from building a bomb. All that was left was to figure out creative language for how that constraint would be phrased that everyone could support.

Trump walked away from the deal anyway. Announcing the U.S. was out, he called the 2015 pact his predecessor brokered “defective at its core” and said the U.S. would immediately re-impose sanctions lifted under the deal.

“We can’t allow a deal to hurt the world,” Trump added Wednesday, as the world scrambled to figure out what comes next.

Behind the scenes, though, the Trump administration had been actively preparing for a pullout since January, when Trump declared that he would withdraw if an “add-on” deal wasn’t reached. To many U.S.

officials, it was as clear then as now that the president would not be swayed to accept even a toughened-up version of the accord.

Trump had just celebrated the anniversary of becoming president in January when he issued his ultimatum: If there’s no fix to the deal by May 12, the U.S. would be out. There was no chance that three of the deal’s members — Iran, Russia and China — would consider changes, so Trump focused on the Europeans — Germany, the U.K. and France — in hopes that the rest would go along once a fix was agreed to by the rest.

“This is a last chance,” Trump said.

Right away, a team led by Brian Hook, the State Department’s policy chief, began intensive negotiations with the Europeans on the issues Trump insisted must be fixed: new penalties on Iran’s ballistic missile inspections, expanded access for U.N. nuclear inspectors and an extension of the restrictions on Iran’s enrichment beyond the current life of the deal.

Before long, the U.S. found the Europeans were amenable to dealing with the first two. The third was a nonstarter. After all, the

terms of the 2015 deal explicitly say that the restrictions “sunset” over time. Any extension without Iran’s explicit consent would put the Europeans themselves in breach of the deal.

A supplemental agreement was drafted, and tweaked, and tweaked again, even as negotiations continued about what mechanism to use to hold the Iranians to the restrictions indefinitely. At least one draft included footnotes specifying that the same nuclear parameters in the 2015 deal should continue to be in place: no more than 5,060 IR-1 centrifuges, no uranium stockpiles

larger than 300 kilograms, no enrichment beyond 3.67 percent and no advanced centrifuges, according to an individual who read the draft.

His decision was kept closely quarantined until the end, with even most White House, State Department and Treasury Department officials unsure what he’d decided. The State Department and Treasury prepared three versions of the public statements and technical guidance that would have to be released with his decision: one for staying in, one for full withdrawal and one midway option in which only some sanctions would be immediately re-imposed, potentially preserving the possibility that the U.S. could later reverse course and stay in.

Trump’s administration also didn’t explicitly tell the Europeans he was withdrawing. In a call with Macron just ahead of his announcement, Trump made clear he was still ardently opposed to the deal but left Macron guessing about precisely what he would do.

He and the other Europeans learned when everyone else did: on Tuesday, when Trump appeared on live television in the Diplomatic Reception Room and said he was out.

“The fact is this was a horrible, one-sided deal that should have never, ever been made,” Trump said. “It didn’t bring calm, it didn’t bring peace, and it never will.”

MOGADISHU, SOMALIA Suicide bomber strikes market, kills at least 10

A Somali official says a suicide bomber has killed at least 10 people at a crowded market in a southern town.

Security official Ali Mohamed tells The Associated Press that the bomber, thought to be with the al-Qaida-linked al-Shabab extremist group, detonated a suicide vest in the market in Wanlaweyn, 90 kilometers (55 miles) south of Mogadishu.

Fifteen other people were wounded in the attack. Mohamed says most of the victims are civilians.

There is no immediate claim of responsibility for the blast but the Somalia-based al-Shabab has carried out similar attacks in the region. Despite being ousted from most of its key strongholds in the Horn of Africa nation, the extremist group continues to carry out attacks across large parts of southern and central Somalia.

LONDON UK makes it harder for officials to get patient data

Britain’s government says it has modified a controversial data-sharing agreement that allowed officials to track down people who might have broken immigration rules based on information collected by doctors.

The agreement had previously granted the government permission to seek details on people if there were questions about their immigration status, an arrangement slammed by British medical organizations as a violation of doctor-patient privilege.

In a statement Wednesday, the government said “the circumstances in which the Home Office will request data ... has changed with immediate effect.”

NEWARK, N.J. New law lets students without legal status get aid

In-state financial aid for hundreds of New Jersey students without legal status could now be possible under a new law Gov. Phil Murphy enacted Wednesday.

Murphy signed the legislation permitting New Jersey students without legal status to apply for state financial aid at Rutgers University-Newark. He was joined by Democratic lawmakers who pushed the bill.

The Democratic governor cast the law as a repudiation of Republican former Gov. Chris Christie’s 2013 conditional veto of similar legislation as well as pushback of President Donald Trump’s crackdown on immigration.

“This is the America that I think we all know and embrace,” Murphy said.

HAZELHURST, WIS. Medical helicopter was inspected days before crash

A preliminary report by the National Transportation Safety Board says a medical helicopter that crashed in northern Wisconsin had been inspected the day before.

Three crew members died when the helicopter crashed on April 26 in Hazelhurst. The NTSB released its preliminary report this week. The report does not determine what caused the crash.

The report says the Ascension Health Spirit helicopter had undergone 100- and 600-hour safety inspections a day earlier. The pilot, 34-year-old Rico Caruso of Hazelhurst, had more than 3,200 hours of flight time and had completed additional training earlier this year.

LAS VEGAS Truck filled with \$800K worth of dimes crashes

Brother can you spare a dime? How about 8 million of them?

A semi-trailer truck hauling \$800,000 worth of dimes crashed Tuesday into a guard rail on an interstate near Las Vegas, spilling thousands of coins on the side of the road.

State troopers established a crime scene so a recovery team could collect the money.

The Nevada Highway Patrol says the truck was heading south on I-15 about 50 miles from Las Vegas when it hit a guard rail in the early morning.

KSNV-TV reported Wednesday the truck was hauling the money under a contract with the U.S. Treasury Department when it dumped the load and several bags split open.

isolated to only one victim and contained to Panama City. He said that the broader issue, though, is not contained to Panama City.

"Prostitution is a problem everywhere, but it's hard to prove someone else's involvement without the cooperation of the victim," Powell said, noting victims are often scared of traffickers. "Closing the loop and making a criminal case is difficult without that cooperation."

According to PCPD reports, officers first opened an investigation Dec. 4, 2017 after receiving reports of a juvenile that had gone missing from the Hidle House, 2121 Lisenby Ave. Under cover officers began communicating with what they believed to be the minor over social media

and developed information that she could be engaging in prostitution. During their communications, the minor agreed to meet at a hotel on 23rd Street and allegedly told officers to have condoms, PCPD reported.

"In these messages, (the juvenile) did not want to have sex but stated it would be \$100 per hour for her time to just hang out," officers wrote. "I agreed and told her I would pay for two hours."

PCPD conducted the prostitution sting Dec. 22, 2017 and took the minor into custody. The juvenile then told officers that Young had allegedly created prostitution advertisements for her on Craigslist, an online classified site, and took pictures for the posting. Young allegedly also negotiated prices for sexual encounters with the minor, transported her to the locations and coached her on how to present herself, PCPD

reported.

"The victim stated (Young) would make her perform five 'visits' a day for a rate of \$100 an hour," officers wrote. "The victim stated she was required to perform sexual acts during the 'visits.'"

A warrant was signed in February for Young's arrest. On May 8, officers found him and arrested him in connection with the case. He was additionally charged with driving without a license.

Powell said there are routes for trafficking victims to take to get out of the situation. He said victims can also choose to elect out of creating a criminal case by going through agencies such as the Gulf Coast Children's Advocacy Center, although authorities would rather bring traffickers to justice.

"There are resources out there if they want help," Powell said. "But breaking the cycle is rough."

foreign police effort yet.

Shortly after they touched down on American soil in Alaska — for a refueling stop Wednesday afternoon — the State Department released a statement from the freed men.

"We would like to express our deep appreciation to the United States government, President Trump, Secretary Pompeo, and the people of the United States for bringing us home," they said. "We thank God, and all our families and friends who prayed for us and for our return. God Bless America, the greatest nation in the world."

The men had boarded Pompeo's plane out of North Korea without assistance and then transferred in Japan to a separate aircraft with more extensive medical facilities. They are expected to arrive at Joint Base Andrews outside Washington in the wee hours of Thursday morning.

Trump made a point of publicly thanking North Korea's leader for the prisoners' release — "I appreciate Kim Jong Un doing this" — and hailed it as a sign of cooling tensions and growing opportunity on the Korean peninsula. Kim decided to grant amnesty to the three Americans at the "official suggestion" of the U.S. president, said North Korea's official news agency, KCNA.

North Korea had accused Kim Dong Chul, Kim Hak Song and Tony Kim, all Korean-Americans, of

anti-state activities. Their arrests were widely seen as politically motivated and had compounded the dire state of relations over the isolated nation's nuclear weapons.

Trump entered office as an emboldened North Korea developed new generations of nuclear weapons and ballistic missiles capable of hitting the continental U.S. Those advances were the subject of President Barack Obama's starkest warning shortly before Trump took office, and this is a crisis he's convinced his negotiating skills can resolve.

Crediting himself for recent progress, Trump has pointed to Kim's willingness to come to the negotiating table as validating U.S. moves to tighten sanctions — branded "maximum pressure" by the president. The wee-hours ceremony Thursday was to be an early celebration for an issue that has already put the prospect of a Nobel Peace Prize on Trump's mind.

"Everyone thinks so, but I would never say it," he said Wednesday when asked if the award was deserved.

The release capped a dramatic day of diplomacy in Pyongyang. After Pompeo's 90-minute meeting with Kim Jong Un, he gave reporters a fingers-crossed sign when asked about the prisoners as he returned to his hotel. It was only after a North Korean emissary arrived a bit later to inform him that the release was confirmed.

The three had been held for periods ranging from one and two years. They were the latest in a series of Americans who have been detained by North Korea in recent years for seemingly

small offenses and typically freed when senior U.S. officials or statesmen personally visited to bail them out.

The last American to be released before this, college student Otto Warmbier, died in June 2017, days after he was repatriated to the U.S. with severe brain damage.

Warmbier was arrested by North Korean authorities in January 2016, accused of stealing a propaganda poster and sentenced to 15 years in prison with hard labor. His parents, Fred and Cindy Warmbier, have filed a wrongful death lawsuit, accusing the government of torturing and killing their son.

"We are happy for the hostages and their families," the Warmbiers said in a statement Wednesday. "We miss Otto."

Of the newly released detainees, Kim Dong Chul, a South Korean-born U.S. citizen, had been held the longest. The former Virginia resident was sentenced in April 2016 to 10 years in prison with hard labor after being convicted of espionage. He reportedly ran a trade and hotel service company in Rason, a special economic zone on North Korea's border with Russia.

The other two detainees hadn't been tried.

Kim Hak Song worked in agricultural development at an experimental farm run by the Pyongyang University of Science and Technology, or PUST. The university is the only privately funded college in North Korea and was founded in 2010 with donations from Christian groups. He was detained last May for alleged anti-state activities.

Stubbs said he sees the potential for this to just be the beginning of companies with ties to Mexico locating here. He said when Linea Peninsular shipping company came to the port with its six ships in 2005, it gave the port "incredible connections to the Yucatan of Mexico."

"To this day, we get two voyages a week, sometimes

three voyages a week, connecting us to the Yucatan in Mexico," he said. "We have the best shipping connection to Mexico of any port in the United States. It's hard to imagine, our little port in Panama City. And we've not even started to tap into the potential that it has for our region."

Panama City Mayor Greg Brudnicki, who went down to Mexico two years ago with economic development and port officials to talk to Air Temp officials, said after the announcement that the 50 jobs

may only be the beginning of the hiring if the company decides to continue to expand its operation. Brudnicki said the headquarters is going into one of the areas of focused growth in the city.

"They are going to go in there and renovate (the building) and do a lot of work on it," Brudnicki said. "There hasn't been anybody in there in a few years. It is like intercepting a pass in the end zone and running it back for a touchdown. It is a big swing, a good deal for Panama City."



Winds of change at NASCAR

The news that NASCAR may be for sale rumbled through the racing world Monday, but it resonated particularly loudly in Daytona Beach, its headquarters. This is the birthplace of the stock car racing organization, and for more than a half-century home to its biggest annual event, the Daytona 500. NASCAR is inexorably tied not only to this community's economy, but also to its identity.

So when Reuters reported the France family, whose late patriarch Bill France Sr. founded NASCAR in 1948, is working with the investment bank Goldman Sachs to identify a potential buyer for the company, it did more than raise eyebrows. Hearts skipped a beat at the uncertainty surrounding such a deal. What impact, if any, would such a historical change have in Florida?

NASCAR is a privately owned company with a very large public footprint. The Frances also own International Speedway Corp. (ISC), a publicly traded company also headquartered in Daytona Beach that operates 13 tracks — including Daytona International Speedway — that host 19 Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series races throughout the year. ISC also has branched out into commercial development: It created the One Daytona retail complex across from the Speedway.

The France family, NASCAR and ISC are deeply intertwined. Lesa France Kennedy — granddaughter of "Big Bill" France Sr. and daughter of the late Bill France Jr. — lives in Daytona Beach and serves as CEO and vice chair of the board of ISC, while also serving as vice chair of NASCAR. Her brother Brian France, who lives in New York City, is chairman and CEO of NASCAR. Their uncle, Jim France, is chairman of ISC's board. Selling off NASCAR likely would necessitate a complex reorganization of professional duties and financial relationships.

That could open up a wide range of possible effects on Daytona Beach, from virtually no change to almost anything goes. Much would depend on who the new ownership is. A giant media conglomerate — perhaps similar to Liberty Media Corp., which bought Formula One racing two years ago — might believe NASCAR requires major modifications to improve its market share. That could involve tweaking, if not altogether abandoning, some of the traditions race fans hold dear (which is not to say that current management has been afraid to shake up the sport at times — note the "Chase for the Cup" playoff format).

We're going to go out on a limb and assume NASCAR will not abandon Daytona Beach. But beyond that, the uncertainty surrounding a potential sale invites speculation.

It shouldn't give rise to panic, though. The Frances may simply be testing the market and won't receive an offer to their liking. And their interest in exploring a sale may be strictly familial — such as whether a fourth generation of Frances is willing to run the business.

It can't be ignored that after enjoying a boom in popularity in the 1990s and early 2000s, NASCAR's fan fuel lately hasn't been as high octane. Ticket sales are never made official, but the number of empty seats seen on TV at so many races tells you all you need to know. So do spreadsheets: ISC reported a year-on-year drop in admissions revenue of 1.6 percent in its fiscal 2017, blaming it "substantially" on NASCAR events. Speedway Motorsports, which owns eight tracks that host NASCAR events, reported an even bigger decrease in 2017 revenue — 7.8 percent.

NEW YORK Buy tires on Amazon, install them at Sears

Shoppers will be able to buy any brand of tires on Amazon.com, have them shipped to a Sears Auto Center and then bring in their car to get them installed.

It's the latest deal between Sears and Amazon as the struggling department store operator seeks to boost sales. Last year, Amazon began selling Sears's Kenmore brand of ovens, washers and other appliances.

Sears said Wednesday that Amazon shoppers can now ship tires to 47 Sears Auto Centers in eight cities, including Chicago, Dallas and New York. It plans to eventually roll it out to all 400 of its auto centers nationwide in the coming weeks. As part of the deal, Sears said its DieHard brand of tires are available on Amazon for the first time. *The Associated Press*

Walmart makes \$16B bet on booming India

NEW YORK — Walmart will soon reach shoppers in India's massive consumer market directly, as it takes control of the online retailer Flipkart that's known for its ubiquitous delivery drivers on motorcycles with oversized backpacks.

The \$16 billion controlling stake, announced Wednesday, is the largest acquisition yet by the world's largest retailer.

India's hot economy makes it attractive to companies eager to sell goods to its massive population. Walmart and Amazon have pushed hard to catch up to Flipkart and to establish a substantial foothold in the country.

But instead of competing with Flipkart, Walmart has essentially taken over the company. It's a move that might have near-term losses but is part of a larger shift by Walmart to look toward the future. That includes its decision last month to sell its British unit, Asda, which primarily operated a chain of traditional supermarkets. Amazon, which operates an online marketplace in India, was reportedly in talks

with Flipkart as well — but Walmart won it.

Flipkart had net sales of \$4.6 billion in its latest fiscal year. That's a fraction of Walmart's latest annual revenue of \$485.8 billion. But Walmart believes India, which has 1.3 billion people, could be among the world's top five e-commerce markets within the next five years.

"We are actively working to shape the portfolio of geographies and businesses we're in, in order to set the company up for success for another generation," Walmart CEO Doug McMillon said in a conference call Wednesday.

Shares of Walmart Inc. dropped more than 3 percent Wednesday as investors worried about the investment hurting profits.

Flipkart is, in some ways, an echo of Amazon. Founded in 2007 by two college friends and former Amazon employees, Flipkart began life as an online bookseller.

In a country where many still see paying online with credit or debit cards as risky, Flipkart earned millions of customers in its early years by allowing buyers to pay cash on delivery. It now allows for

a variety of payments, from credit cards to gift cards to direct bank transfers.

Flipkart also focused early on mobile phones, and in 2016 became the first app in India to reach 50 million users.

The Bangalore-based company has acquired a string of other companies in recent years, from fashion e-commerce company Myntra to mobile payment firm PhonePe. Flipkart now has over 100 million registered users and more than 100,000 registered sellers. Flipkart's supply chain arm, eKart, serves more than 800 cities and makes 500,000 deliveries daily.

Foreign retailers, including Walmart, have faced years of political resistance to opening outlets in India, where mom-and-pop store owners wield enormous influence. Walmart's business in India was previously focused only on selling items directly to small businesses through its Best Price stores.

The Flipkart purchase gives Walmart far more influence in India — both politically and economically — and positions it to shift quicker into retail outlets if the regulatory landscape changes.

What happens when the robots sound too much like humans?

Artificial intelligence has a new challenge: Whether and how to alert people who may not know they're talking to a robot.

On Tuesday, Google showed off a computer assistant that makes convincingly human-sounding phone calls, at least in its prerecorded demonstration. But the real people in those calls didn't seem to be aware they were talking to a machine. That could present thorny issues for the future use of AI.

Among them: Is it fair — or even legal — to trick people into talking to an AI system that effectively records all of its conversations? And while Google's demonstration highlighted the benign uses of conversational robots, what happens when spammers and scammers get hold of them?

Google CEO Sundar Pichai elicited cheers on Tuesday as he demonstrated the new technology, called Duplex, during the company's annual conference for software developers. The assistant added pauses, "ums" and "mmm-hmms" to its speech in order to sound more human as it spoke with real employees at a hair salon and a restaurant.

"That's very impressive, but it can clearly lead to more sinister uses of this type of technology," said Matthew Fenech, who researches the policy implications of AI for the London-based organization Future Advocacy. "The ability to pick up on nuance, the human uses of additional small phrases — these sorts of cues are very human, and clearly the person on the other end didn't know."

Fenech said it's not hard to imagine nefarious uses of similar chatbots, such as spamming businesses,

scamming seniors or making malicious calls using the voices of political or personal enemies.

"You can have potentially very destabilizing situations where people are reported as saying something they never said," he said.

Pichai and other Google executives tried to emphasize that the technology is still experimental, and will be rolled out cautiously. It's not yet available on consumer devices.

It's unclear how the company will navigate existing telecommunications laws, which can vary by state or country. Google didn't return a request for comment Wednesday on how it plans to seek the consent of people called by its bots.

One co-owner of a San Francisco Bay Area barber shop patronized by some Google employees was a little creeped out by the privacy implications.

Stocks deliver as oil prices surge

Technology companies and banks helped power U.S. stocks to solid gains Wednesday, improving on the market's flat finish a day earlier.

Energy stocks led the gainers after the price of crude oil climbed back above \$70 a barrel a day after the U.S. moved to withdraw from a nuclear accord with Iran. Gains in industrial and materials companies outweighed losses in safe-play sectors such as utilities and phone companies.

The S&P 500 index rose 25.87 points, or 1 percent, to 2,697.79. The gain nudged the benchmark index into positive territory for the year. The Dow Jones industrial average posted its fifth gain in a row, climbing 182.33 points, or 0.7 percent, to 24,542.54.

The Nasdaq added 73 points, or 1 percent, to 7,339.91. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks picked up 9.66 points, or 0.6 percent, to 1,596.05.

The indexes are on track to end the week with solid gains. They were moving higher for much of the morning as investors weighed the latest corporate quarterly results.

Electronic Arts led a technology sector rally, climbing 5.7 percent to \$131.01 after the video game maker's latest quarterly results beat forecasts.

TripAdvisor soared 22.8 percent to \$47.62 after the online travel booking company reported earnings that were much higher than analysts expected. It also raised its annual forecast.

While technology companies helped drive the market higher, energy sector stocks racked up the biggest gain as crude oil prices rebounded a day after the Trump administration moved to withdraw the U.S. from a 2015 nuclear accord with Iran and reinstate sanctions on the country.

Benchmark U.S. crude oil climbed \$2.08, or 3 percent, to settle at \$71.14 per barrel in New York. That's the highest level in nearly three and a half years.

Townsend resigns during meeting

Decision marks second time a Callaway city leader resigns in a year

I refuse to come to this wonderful meeting place and be pummeled. I'm no masochist," Townsend

said. "The commission works for the citizens. ... I don't want us to see the city go back like it was when the city manager ran the whole kit and caboodle, lock, stock and barrel."

Townsend further said people can make up their own reason for him leaving "like they did" when former Mayor Bob Pelletier resigned in September. Pelletier said he resigned due

to a disagreement among commissioners over hiring additional sheriff patrols.

After resigning Townsend literally walked away from his seat at the commission podium and went to sit in the audience.

In a phone interview Wednesday with The News Herald, Townsend said he will continue going to meetings as a citizen and encourages others to do so.

At the previous commission meeting, commissioners voted 4-1, with Townsend the sole dissenting vote, to repair instead of replace a dilapidated bridge on South Berthe Avenue. Commissioners and citizens engaged in a

heated discussion on the two options and whether to fund a new bridge during that meeting, with Townsend saying citizens he talked to wanted a new bridge.

"The folks that I talked to are talking replace," Townsend said during the previous meeting. "Did all of us canvass our citizens and ask them what they think? This is important to a few right here in the audience tonight."

During the Wednesday phone call, Townsend said he felt like he was "pummeled" since during that meeting he requested the bridge discussion be tabled, a suggestion the commission denied.

"I was like the Lone Ranger," Townsend, who was in office for two years, said Wednesday.

Mayor Pam Henderson thanked Townsend for his public service during Tuesday's meeting, while other commissioners and City Manager Eddie Cook did not comment on Townsend's resignation during the meeting beyond discussing details on how to fill the vacancy.

In a phone interview Wednesday with The News Herald, Cook said he didn't understand Townsend's reasons for resigning.

"We're going to start the

PORT ST. JOE — Just a couple of miles off the coast of Port St. Joe, a 7-acre private island with no roads, one restaurant and 26 private bungalows awaits anyone looking for a quiet Floridian getaway.







PANAMA CITY Man convicted of molesting child

A Bay County man convicted of molesting a child has been sentenced to spend his natural life behind bars, according to official reports.

Anthony C. Marshall, 48, was convicted as charged Tuesday after a one-day trial and will be designated a sexual predator. Testimony at trial revealed that Marshall inappropriately touched and engaged in sexual activity with the victim from the time she was 10 years old until she was 15 — from 2010 to 2016 — while they were at home and at his shop. Other testimony established Marshall forced or enticed the victim and another individual to engage in sexual activity while Marshall watched and masturbated.

The jury deliberated for about an hour before returning a verdict of guilty as charged of sexual battery on a person between 12 and 18 years of age by a person in custodial control, lewd or lascivious molestation on a person younger than 12, lewd or lascivious molestation on a person between 12 and 16 years of age and lewd or lascivious battery. Assistant State Attorneys Jennifer Hawkins and Alyssa Yarbrough prosecuted the case with help from Lt. Jeremy Mathis with the Bay County Sheriff's Office and Victoria Maines with the Department of Children and Families.

Circuit Judge Brantley Clark Jr. sentenced Marshall afterward to two consecutive life sentences followed by two consecutive sentences of 15 years in the Department of Corrections.

PANAMA CITY BEACH Man arrested for rape

An 18-year-old has been arrested on charges that he allegedly raped a minor, according to the Bay County Sheriff's Office.

Investigators also believe there may be multiple other victims. Aldane Murray, of Panama City Beach, appeared in court Wednesday on a single count of sexual battery on a person less than 18 by person 18 or older. BCSO reported that on May 7 a victim came forward with information that she had been sexually assaulted by an 18 year old boy she knew — identified as Murray.

"While in his neighborhood to visit, she went to his house to charge her phone, officials wrote. "While in his home, the victim stated Murray pulled down her pants, told her she had to do this to gain his trust, and raped her." The victim told friends, one of whom stated it was known that Murray had done that to other girls, BCSO reported. Investigators made contact with Murray, and he allegedly stated that he did not rape the other girls he was questioned about, as they were "good" girls, but that the victim was "trash," officials quoted Murray as saying. TALLAHASSEE Court to hear felons' rights fight in July

Moving quickly on the issue, a federal appeals court has tentatively scheduled oral arguments in July in a constitutional battle about Florida's process for restoring the voting rights of felons.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals is expected to hear arguments the week of July 23 in Atlanta, though an online docket does not list a specific date. In an order filed late last month, the appeals court said it was expediting consideration of the case, a move that included speeding up deadlines for attorneys to file briefs.

The case went to the Atlanta-based appeals court after U.S. District Judge Mark Walker declared unconstitutional Florida's process for restoring the voting rights of felons who have served their sentences. Gov. Rick Scott and members of the state Cabinet, who serve as the clemency board, have defended the current process, which involves felons waiting five to seven years to apply to have their rights restored — and years after that to complete the process.

Walker had ordered Scott and the Cabinet to revamp the process by April 26. But state officials won a partial victory April 25, when a panel of the federal appeals court stayed the order.

Florida House speaker won't run for governor, backs Putnam

TALLAHASSEE — After months of considering a run for governor, Republican House Speaker Richard Corcoran announced Wednesday he will stay out of the race and instead back Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam.

The decision means that what once looked like a crowded primary to replace outgoing Republican Gov. Rick Scott will now be a showdown between Putnam and U.S. Rep. Ron DeSantis.

"I said for the last year or so that we would look to run for governor or go home," Corcoran said as he stood with Putnam. "When you look at it, Florida is an expensive state. It costs a lot of money to run ... I don't think we have the resources to move forward."

Corcoran said after making the decision to stay out of the race, backing Putnam was an easy choice.

"I know his character. Adam is sincere, he is authentic, he is principled, he is passionate. He loves this state," Corcoran said. "Once I made the decision that I wasn't going to run, I'm definitely not someone who sits on the sidelines, and it took all of 2.2 seconds for me to utter the name Adam Putnam."

Scott can't run for re-election because of term limits and is instead running for U.S. Senate. By the end of 2017, it looked like at least four major Republicans would be in the

race to replace him. Sen. Jack Latvala entered the race, but later resigned from his position and dropped out after a Senate investigation found he likely groped a woman who worked as a Senate aide.

Corcoran was widely expected to announce a campaign at the end of this year's legislative session. He raised close to \$7 million through a political committee and began running ads taking a stance against undocumented immigrants. But he's not well known statewide, and after spending \$4.6 million, he wasn't polling well.

DeSantis' campaign characterized Corcoran's endorsement of Putnam as one Tallahassee political insider backing another.

"Conservative principles don't matter to career insiders, just deals and dealmaking," DeSantis spokesman David Vasquez said in a press release sent out before Corcoran's announcement.

Putnam dismissed the criticism.

"Richard and I know Florida. We have been through every corner of this state," he said. "Floridians want someone who will lead our state with passion and conviction, with high character, someone who knows our state and will always put Florida first."

Democrats running for governor include former Miami Beach Mayor Philip Levine, former U.S. Rep. Gwen Graham, Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum and Orlando-area businessman Chris King.

search for a new commissioner," Cook said. "We're not going to do anything but better ourselves. We're going to roll with it. ... This commission is growing and getting better."

Cook further said the city manager is hired to run the city, and his style of leadership is to keep the commission informed of everything that goes on regarding the city and he works for the commission.

Callaway is growing and its economy has picked up, Cook said.

"This is a city manager form of government," Cook said. "I will not step beyond my responsibilities in any way, shape or form."

Cook also said commissions and people's situations change over time and if someone feels they can't serve the city they should step down so someone else can step up and continue pushing Callaway forward.

In a separate phone interview Wednesday, Henderson said she was surprised by Townsend's

resignation. She further said while Callaway has gone through a lot of changes in the past months with Pelletier's resignation and elections, the city will keep "pushing forward."

Henderson also said she appreciated Townsend's time on the commission, where public officials can face scrutiny, and that she hopes he stays involved in city politics.



chair-to-chair crowds and U. S. Highway 98 gridlock of Okaloosa and Walton County beaches in the summertime.

It's accessible only by boat, and there's no grocery store, gas station or T-shirt shop in sight. The only lodging are the bungalows, built just four years ago, each with its own waterfront view. Ten are available for rental at \$500 per night, while the rest can be purchased for \$1.2 million a pop.

Each of the bungalows sleeps six and has a full kitchen, along with a washer and dryer.

Koran said in the past, he's had well-known visitors come to the island whose names he can't release, but described them as people who "just really needed to get away."

"It's just a real relaxing place," he said. "A laid-back type of facility."

"And when you're a 13-year-old, it's a particularly unlovely time in human development."

She gets to know her students so well, in fact, that she often brags she can tell them three things they don't even know about themselves, all by watching them in the classroom.

Underwood's Mowat Middle School lair has two sets of rules — one for the students and one for the teacher. While she has final veto power, she gives students the opportunity to shape how their classroom is run, and what they expect out of their teacher. It creates accountability for the students, who help keep each other on track, and for herself.

"It gives them some control over what happens in their life," Underwood said. "This is an age where they control nothing in their lives ... Middle school sucks, so this is a little bit of control."

Beyond just getting her students reading on

grade level and across the FSA finish line, Underwood said she makes it a priority to ensure that when they leave her classroom, her students will continue to learn and grow and be self sufficient.

"Most of my students are ESE (Exceptional Student Education) kids that have a list of accommodations," she said. "One of the things we work on all year is the ability to say to an adult, in a respectful way, 'I am entitled to get this accommodation. You need to help me get it.'"

"Standing up for yourself to adults is a really hard thing to learn to do," she continued.

And just like in the real world, classes don't always go smoothly and everyone isn't always perfect, but there are other lessons to be learned in that imperfection.

"At some point during the year I will make a mistake and I will lose my temper," she said. "And if I blow it in public, I should own it in public. That's how we model for them ... one of the hardest things to do as a teenager is square your shoulders and say, 'Yeah, I did that.'"

3 arrested after posting fight video on Snapchat

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Deputies have arrested a man who drove two women to a home where they attacked another woman “for absolutely no reason” while he posted it on social media, according to official reports.

Aaron Michael Eardley, 20, appeared in court Tuesday on a charge of principal to burglary with battery.

The Bay County Sheriff's Office arrested him in connection with an April 28 beating at a Clarence Street trailer, in which Eardley allegedly drove Katelyn Renae Jones and Euriah Lichel Dunlop, both 18, to and from what witnesses described as an unprovoked attack.

Eardley is now being held at the Bay County, where he joins Jones and Dunlop in custody, court records stated. All three have been court ordered to not have contact with the victim.

According to BCSO reports, the victims told officers the attack was “totally unprovoked,” but they also said alcohol played a factor.

The victims “further blamed their actions on drinking ‘Four Lokos’ prior to the incident,” officers wrote. “Statements was [sic] obtained from Katelyn and Euriah which also detail Aaron was responsible for taking them to this area as well as assisting them with fleeing the area.”

When BCSO arrived April 28 to the Clarence Street trailer on Panama City Beach at about 2 a.m., deputies were greeted by a woman holding ice to her swollen and bruised face. The victim told officers that two females had shown up at her home unannounced and began attacking her, BCSO reported.

At one point, the victim's mother attempted to intervene, and the two females attacked her also. In doing so, the incident broke the threshold of the victim's trailer, where they were told to leave but refused, BCSO reported.

Investigators gathered information about the possible identities of the women and a man who drove them to the trailer, taken video of

the attack and posted it to the social media app, “Snapchat,” BCSO reported.

“As the video played, a male's voice (who is said to be Aaron Eardley recording this incident) is heard yelling and enticing the fight to continue,” officers wrote. “The video depicted both girls originally yelling at (the victim) as they stood just at the resident's front door entrance.”

Jones and Dunlop were taken into custody on May 3 and remain in jail each on a \$20,000 for a charge of burglary with battery. Eardley was ordered to be held on a bond of \$25,000, court records stated.

Jones had charges filed April 5 of disorderly intoxication, resisting without violence and attempted escape in connection with a physical altercation in Parker. She all attempted to remove the handcuffs as she was being taken to jail and flee the patrol car, police reported.

Eardley also had charges pending of interfering with child custody and possession of a controlled substance from November 2017. He was arrested while leaving Pier Park in Panama City Beach with two missing juveniles. Officers reported also finding an orange amphetamine pill in his possession at the time, police reported.

Payroll specialist for Bay County clinic charged with fraud

PANAMA CITY — A former payroll specialist with a Bay County cardiovascular clinic has been arrested on allegations she systematically stole hundreds of thousands of dollars from her employer over the course of about four years, according to official reports.

Angela Lynn Manning, 52, appeared in court Wednesday on several charges related to the case. The Panama City Police Department (PCPD) reported that from 2014 through April 2018 she allegedly manipulated business books at the Cardiovascular Institute of Northwest Florida, 801

E. Sixth Street, in order to write checks to herself totaling more than \$200,000. Manning is charged with grand theft of more than \$100,000, scheme to defraud and falsifying books of a business entity, court records stated.

Manning, of Panama City, was conditionally released Wednesday on a pretrial program. She has been court ordered to not contact the victim or break the law.

According to PCPD reports, Manning admitted under oath to the crimes.

Police reported she was employed by the Cardiovascular Institute

for several years, but over the course of the past four began writing “hundreds” of business checks to herself without permission in amounts “ranging from several dollars to over \$18k each,” officers reported.

Manning “would manipulate the businesses Quickbooks to appear as if the money had been used to pay a vendor,” officers wrote. Manning “would then cash the checks or deposit them straight into her personal bank account.”

Officers reported that so far they have uncovered more than \$200,000 worth of embezzled funds.

The Cardiovascular Institute did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

***MYTH #2** ➤ **HAVING LUPUS IS THE SAME AS HAVING ARTHRITIS**

Lupus is not a form of arthritis, but it does include arthritis as one of the most common symptoms, so it is easy to see why some people think about it that way. It is very important not to make this mistake, because lupus is quite different than any other illness that causes arthritis. It should not be lumped in with these other causes of arthritis, because the causes and the treatments are very different.

General arthritis vs. lupus arthritis

Arthritis is caused by either inflammation or wear and tear of the body's joints. It is characterized by pain, stiffness, swelling and redness and can limit movement such as in the shoulders or knees.

Lupus arthritis is caused by inflammation. After a long time of uncontrolled lupus, however, people can have damage in the joints which causes problems even when the lupus is not flaring.

Other forms of arthritis are caused by sports injuries, being overweight, or by inflammation that is different from the type of inflammation seen in lupus.

The inflammatory process

Lupus is an autoimmune disease in which the immune system is very active and has trouble moderating itself, leading to widespread inflammation in the bloodstream. This bloodstream then serves every organ in the body.

It is still a cruel mystery, and quite unpredictable, to determine from patient to patient which types of healthy tissue might become inflamed or when.

Arthritis is the most common symptom seen in lupus, but it would be an extremely rare patient with lupus who experienced arthritis as their only manifestation. Other common manifestations are rashes and inflammation of the blood vessels. In fact, almost any organ can become inflamed in some patients. Some patients only experience inflammation in the skin and joints, others in multiple areas.

In some cases, lupus manifests in only one part of the body, though the most common examples of that are rash and decreased blood cells.

ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

One of my occasional correspondents is Maureen Hiron, who lives in Spain but writes a newspaper column for Ireland. She commented that she had first met this type of hand early in her bridge career, and her partner bawled her out for going down. When a similar situation arose a short while later, she knew what to do. As Hiron said, the good bridge player only makes the same mistake four times. By the fifth time, she has learned her lesson.

Barring bizarre distribution, the only thing that could go wrong in six hearts was the trumps breaking 4-1 or worse. If West holds the length, you are doomed; but if East has the critical holding, you may be able to survive as long as you take the appropriate precautions early.

Against the slam, West cashed the diamond ace and continued the suit. Hiron won in hand and noticed that if East did indeed hold jack-fourth in trumps, she would need to reduce her trump holding to parity with East, ending with the lead in dummy.

So at trick three, she took the spade ace then ruffed a spade, reducing South's trump holding to five. Then came the heart ace and a heart to the king to find the bad news.

However, another spade ruff reduced the South trump holding to the same length as East's. Hiron could then take her minor-suit winners, ending in dummy with the club ace, and she was happy to see East follow throughout. In the two-card ending, a spade from dummy caught East's trump jack under South's Q-10 of hearts.

ANSWER: This is a problem with no sensible answer. If you bid two diamonds, you will force the hand to game without any real confidence in a fit or source of tricks. You could raise either clubs or hearts to the three-level to invite game, which somewhat overstates your trump support in either case, or you could go very low by bidding only two hearts. If you twisted my arm, I would bid three hearts, but don't expect me to like it.

Celtics take down 76ers, advance to face Cavaliers

BOSTON — Jayson Tatum caught a pass underneath the basket, shook off a hit and went up for the go-ahead layup with 23 seconds left and the Boston Celtics beat the Philadelphia 76ers 114-112 on Wednesday night to advance to the Eastern Conference finals.

Tatum scored 25 points, Jaylen Brown had 24 and Terry Rozier 17, sinking a pair of free throws after forcing Joel Embiid's turnover in the final seconds. Al Horford added 15 points and eight rebounds for Boston,

which will play Cleveland for the second straight year for a spot in the NBA finals.

Game 1 is Sunday in Boston.

Embiid had 27 points and 12 rebounds for the 76ers, who roared back into the playoffs for the first time since 2012, winning won 20 out of 21 games before Boston beat them three straight times to open the conference semifinals. Dario Saric had 27 points and 10 rebounds, and Ben Simmons added 18 points, eight rebounds and six assists.

Embiid had a chance to tie it after Tatum made it 111-109 with 18.8 seconds

left. But he missed a heavily contested layup, failed to tip it back in and then grabbed that rebound, too. Rozier knocked the ball out of his hands, off his leg and out of bounds with 10.8 seconds left.

Rozier made a pair of free throws to make it 113-109 — eight straight points for Boston. J.J. Reddick's 3-pointer cut the deficit to one.

Marcus Smart missed his first free-throw attempt and appeared to try to miss the second, too — to force the Sixers to bring the ball up the court with the clock running — but the ball went

in. Philadelphia's full-court inbounds pass was intercepted by Smart, and he threw the ball in the air to run out the clock.

The Celtics and Cavaliers will meet in the Eastern Conference finals for the second straight year, but both teams have undergone near-complete overhauls since the Cavaliers eliminated Boston in five games last year. Only four players on each side remain from that series.

The Celtics scored the last eight points of the first half, including 3-pointers by

Wait is over

Rockets, Warriors set to clash with spot in NBA Finals on the line

The buildup for this series truly began in February, with some pointed comments from Golden State's Draymond Green.

Or in October, when Houston won at Golden State on ring night.

Or in June, when the Rockets landed Chris Paul.

Whenever it started, however it started, it's clear that this is the series that the NBA-watching world wanted. Western Conference finals, Golden State versus Houston, Game 1 on Monday on the Rockets' home floor. Series winner to the NBA Finals, series loser will undoubtedly feel like they let a championship ring slip away.

"They got us. We got them," Green said. "Got to go out there and play. We'll see who better."

After more than 10 months of playing, posturing and some pontificating, it really is that simple.

This Rockets team was assembled — the key being the trade for Paul last summer — with hopes of unseating the reigning champion Warriors from their perch atop the NBA. So far, so good. Houston set a franchise record with 65 wins in the regular season, went 2-1 against the Warriors in games that were hyped at the time though seem meaningless now, and has the likely MVP in James Harden.

But how this Houston season will be

remembered hinges largely on the outcome of this series.

"Everybody at the beginning of the year thinks they've got a chance to be here," Houston's P.J. Tucker said. "Everybody talks about winning. Everybody talks about fighting for a championship. ... We really believed it. We're really fighting to get there. This is not a game. Everybody takes their job serious."

He's right on all counts, particularly on the talking.

And the talking will most definitely continue over the next few days. With five full off days between the Warriors' and Rockets' respective second-round clinchers on Tuesday and Game 1 of their series, a lot of people will be saying a lot of somethings.

"I think it's going to be a great series," said New Orleans coach Alvin Gentry, whose Pelicans fell in five games to the Warriors in the West semifinals. "I think it will be very entertaining. I think the people will have a great time watching that series, because you have great players out there. ... I'm looking forward to it."

He's hardly alone.

For as great as LeBron James has been, again, the West matchup is going to overshadow the East finals between Cleveland and either Boston or Philadelphia. That's no disrespect to the East; that's just reality given the seasons that the Warriors and Rockets have had, and the collision course that seemed so inevitable for either to avoid.

"The whole world's been waiting for this matchup," Hall of Famer

Shaquille O'Neal said in his role as an analyst Tuesday night on TNT.

The three Warriors-Rockets games were about as anticipated as any in the regular season: Golden State lost two of the three, and the final combined score of those matchups was Warriors 353, Rockets 352.

"That was so long ago," Warriors forward Kevin Durant said. "I think both teams are different and playing better. So you know, I try not to look at those games but we kind of know, they know what we do and they know what we do."

It's the second time in four years that Houston and Golden State have met in the West finals; the Warriors ousted the Rockets in five games in 2015 on their way to the NBA title. Golden State was the No. 1 seed that year, Houston was No. 2. The seeds are flipped this time, after Houston finished the regular season with the league's best record.

The verbal jousts between the Warriors and Rockets go back to the preseason, with Green questioning Houston's commitment to defense. And after Houston beat Golden State 122-121 on opening night of the season, that prompted Rockets coach Mike D'Antoni to turn that phrase back around on Green.

It picked up in January, when the teams split a pair of games. And in February, Green told Sports Illustrated that he knew the Rockets were focused on knocking the Warriors off.

"Noted. Great. We'll see y'all soon," Green said then.

Both programs also are reflective is that they missed the playoffs last season in Class 5A. Mosley finished 6-5, losing a post-season bowl game. Arnold was 4-6.

Arnold coach Josh Wright said that the Marlins are undertaking somewhat of a different methodology this spring, and that includes with Ledman.

"It's been more of a cerebral approach with him," Wright said. "We want to make the most out of his senior campaign, and he's spending more time in meeting rooms."

Wright added that former Arnold quarterback Cody Saunders, who went on to West Virginia on scholarship before an injury short-circuited his playing career, will be on hand to offer his input this summer.

Wright said that spring practice is being conducted at a faster tempo with an end goal in mind.

"We've been a little more demanding, and hopefully our line play, especially our offensive line will show a different temperament," Wright said. "We want to be a little grittier. We want to come off the ball more aggressively."

"That's what the emphasis has been. Getting down the field and getting out of the huddle."

Part of Wright's assessment sounded like a page from Mosley's playbook as far as offensive line philosophy.

"With us, it always starts on the offensive line," Brown said. "Castor Gay will be a three-year starter for us, Adrian Strickland at offensive tackle, Will Lord is a returning starter and Javien Moody is a ninth-grader who has had a good spring."

Hilario Gasca also is in that mix, although he's been hampered by injury. Brown said that Maddox, however, is fully recovered from injuries that waylaid his junior season, and possibly Mosley's playoff hopes as well.

Brown stressed that there isn't any competition for the starting job, although sophomore Liam Byrd also returns after having had to start on varsity ahead of schedule as a freshman.

"We haven't lost a game with Michael Maddox starting at quarterback," Brown said. "He's a senior. We felt like we were right there in the West Florida Tech game when he got hurt."

"He's had a great off-season, has gotten stronger. Liam has, too, and gotten a little bigger."

Wright said that Arnold's coaching staff already has seen the emergence of some players who are expected to have a greater impact this coming season.

"Casey Peppers, who will be a senior, Hunter Kruger, and Daveno (Ellington) has become a real clear picture of the player he has been in the past," Wright said.

"He's more involved in the offense within our style. We've got to get him the ball. With line play, Eli Mosley is leading the way for our offensive line."

Jets fans unleash support in Winnipeg

Ed Olczyk takes one look at the white-out-wearing crowds of Jets fans packing Winnipeg's arena and surrounding streets and is reassured about what he always knew of the Canadian prairie city, even during its bleakest days.

Winnipeg was a hockey-mad town deserving of an NHL team some 22 years ago, when Olczyk played in what became the franchise's final game before relocating to Arizona. Very little has changed with "Jets 2.0," launched when the Thrashers left Atlanta for the Manitoba capital in 2011.

"It made me nauseous to know what was going to happen," the NHLer-turned-broadcaster said, recalling the uncertainty after the Jets were eliminated following a 4-1 loss to Detroit in Game 6 of their first-round playoff series on April 26, 1996. Jets players and fans lingered long after the final horn sounded in the former Winnipeg Arena, where the oversized portrait of Queen Elizabeth II hung prominently from the rafters.

"But I always knew that Winnipeg was an NHL city even though they didn't have a team there," Olczyk added. "It's just incredible to see. The white outs bring back a lot of memories. And I couldn't be happier."

The NHL is, indeed, back in "The 'Peg." And the Jets are better than ever in preparing for Game 7 of their second-round playoff series at Nashville on Thursday night.

No matter the outcome, the Jets are already enjoying the deepest playoff run of any Winnipeg-based NHL team. This marks just the third time Winnipeg has advanced to the second round in 13 postseason appearances. The previous two times, the Jets were swept in four games by Edmonton in both 1985 and '87.

As for the current franchise's 18-year history, the team was swept in its two previous playoff appearances before opening this postseason with its first victory, a 3-2 decision over Minnesota.

The only real hockey success Winnipeg enjoyed was when the Jets won three Avco Cups as members of the defunct World Hockey Association before joining the NHL after the league folded in 1979.

Suddenly, these Jets have captured the imaginations of all Manitobans, and many Canadians as well. They stand as nation's last team with a shot to end Canada's Stanley Cup drought dating to 1993, when Montreal won the title.

The Jets are wowed by their fans' support.

"I don't know if they can yell any louder," coach Paul Maurice said.

Even Edmonton Oilers forward Ryan Nugent-Hopkins took notice from Denmark, where he's representing Canada at the world championships.

"It looks like a crazy atmosphere,"

Nugent-Hopkins said. "Even during the regular season it's pretty fun and loud and intense. So I can only imagine that right now in the playoffs."

The white out in Winnipeg first became a playoff staple in 1987, and has reached new levels this spring, with estimated crowds of 20,000 gathering to watch games outside the arena.

"I've never experienced this level of excitement for our team or confidence in our city," Winnipeg Mayor Brian Bowman said. "My 10-year-old son is sleeping with his hockey stick."

The excitement is evident in Bowman's Twitter account, which features the mayor wearing a Jets jersey, and pictures and videos of fans in makeup, putting on makeup and dancing in the streets.

This is as far removed as anyone expected after the Jets left in 1996 at a time when the Winnipeg's economy and population base were also dropping.

"It was a kick in the gut," Bowman said. "It was demoralizing and a lot of people were questioning the city's future because we were losing people to other cities."

The Jets' on-ice success mirrors the city's rebound. With a population of 750,000, Winnipeg now ranks as Canada's seventh-largest city and features one of the nation's fastest growing economies.

"I think that's one of the really nice parts about this playoff run. It's allowing Winnipeggers to take stock in where we were in the '90s and compare it to where we are now," Bowman said. "People are feeling good about the city, and their confidence and swagger is growing."

Despite the city's size and 145-year history, Winnipeg is often overlooked in the national media because of how far it's removed from major centers such as Toronto, Montreal and Vancouver.

To some, Winnipeg is best known for its black flies and mosquitoes in the spring and summer, and frigid winters, made notable in the Neil Young and Randy Bachman song, "Prairie Town," which includes the lyric "Portage and Main, 50 below," in reference to the city's main intersection.

Perhaps the Jets' success can begin changing perceptions.

"It's an opportunity for us to show North Americans what's going on in Winnipeg," Bowman said.

Even former Thrashers fans in Atlanta are on board. Bud Ellis overcame the frustration of losing the Thrashers by continuing to root for the Jets in Winnipeg. He couldn't begrudge Jets fans in knowing they once lost their team.

"I am so happy for the people there, the way they embrace that team," Ellis said. "In a way, they've kind of taken care of my team and they've let me stay along for the ride and welcomed me in."

Fleury back to being great playoff goalie

Anyone who has played with Marc-Andre Fleury can tell he's dialed in by watching his mannerisms.


Last year, he rubbed the shaft of his stick after making a save with it on Alex Ovechkin. This year, he continued a career-long tradition of rubbing the post as a sign of appreciation for keeping a puck out.

"That's when you know he's in the zone," Pittsburgh defenseman Olli Maatta said.

Fleury is in one of the best zones of his career in the playoffs with the expansion Vegas Golden Knights, who have followed up a magical inaugural season with a trip to the Western Conference final. The goaltending of Fleury is the biggest reason they've gotten this far and is a continuation of his remarkable playoff reputation rehabilitation.

After taking the Penguins to the Stanley Cup Final in 2008 and winning it all in 2009, Fleury lost four of the next five series he played and each postseason posted a save percentage under .900. He has since gotten his groove back, helping the Penguins win the Cup again a year ago, and now leads the NHL playoffs with a 1.53 goals-against average, .951 save percentage and four shutouts.

"I don't think it was anything physically that

he changed," former Penguins teammate and current Capitals defenseman Brooks Orpik said. "It was all confidence-driven. He's always been a guy who's really competitive and really loose at the same time. I think it was just confidence. I think he needed a fresh start. Maybe he just needed a clean slate, and you perform better when you're more appreciated."

It's impossible not to appreciate the impact "Flower" has made in the desert as the face of a new franchise as he went 29-13-4 with a 2.24 GAA and .927 save percentage for Pacific Division-winning Vegas. The fresh start might have rejuvenated Fleury more than a decade into his career, but his bounce-back in becoming a great playoff

goalie again is six years in the making.

The low point came in 2012. Fleury allowed 26 goals over six games to Philadelphia in a first-round exit. The next playoffs, backup Tomas Vokoun started more games, and it was fair to wonder if Fleury had lost it.

"You learn from losing," Fleury said Wednesday. "You learn from tough times and pressure and stuff like that. It made me a better goalie from it."

Now-Capitals defenseman Matt Niskanen was there for some of the struggles but didn't level them all on Fleury. By 2014, he noticed a different goalie.

"There was a period of time there where maybe (it was) not entirely his fault, a few things went

wrong and it snowballed on him and he had a tough go there, I think, mentally for a couple springs," Niskanen said. "But by the time of my last year there he was really good again."

The scars of another second-round exit led to more blame for Fleury, who was scapegoated for a team with Sidney Crosby and Evgeni Malkin not doing more after the Cup in 2009.

"Sometimes it's the way your team plays in front of you," said Penguins winger Carl Hagelin, who beat Fleury with the Rangers in playoff series in 2014 and 2015. "Sometimes, like any other player, you might have a bad series or a bad playoffs and I think for a goalie if you have that, people are going to be all over you."

McIlroy still searching for the secret to Sawgrass

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. — Rory McIlroy didn't break par until his fourth time at The Players Championship.

The next step is having a chance on Sunday.

The four-time major champion has learned to love the TPC Sawgrass — "learned to like," he quickly clarified with a smile — and he has taken small steps toward contention. The Stadium Course has a history of not favoring any one style of play, and the list of winners at the PGA Tour's premier event illustrates that, going from Greg Norman to Lee Janzen, from Tiger Woods to Craig Perks, from Henrik Stenson to Tim Clark.

"I felt like it handcuffed me," McIlroy said. "I felt like I was just being stubborn, trying to hit driver where there's no point in hitting drive. So I've learned to take it for what it is — a very positional golf course."

Attitude is everything in golf, especially on this Pete Dye-designed course created on land that used to be a swamp.

McIlroy said he now looks forward to The Players Championship, even though he has yet to finish closer than four shots of the winner. Much of that has to do with the water, just not any found on the golf course.

"I started staying on the beach a few years ago, and that's made the event a lot more enjoyable," McIlroy said.

McIlroy is not alone in his struggles.

Jordan Spieth has gone the opposite direction. He nearly won the first time

he played and didn't even make a bogey until his 59th hole. He tied for fourth. And that was the last time he played on the weekend at Sawgrass.

"I just kind of assumed that it would come easy to me," Spieth said.

Dustin Johnson has never finished better than a tie for 12th. That was last year, and he had to close with a 68 to finish that high. Even more remarkable for the No. 1 player in the world is that he has shot in the 60s just three times in 30 rounds.

It all starts to unfold Thursday, the final time The Players Championship will be held in May after a 12-year run before returning to the pre-Masters date in March.

The star attraction is Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson paired in the same group for the first time since the 2014 PGA Championship. This is only the second time they have played with each other on

the Stadium Course. The other was the third round in 2001, when Woods holed a birdie putt from one end of the island green to the other on the par-3 17th and wound up winning the next day.

Serena Williams pulls out of Italian Open

Serena Williams has withdrawn from next week's Italian Open, saying she needs more time to be "100 percent ready to compete."

The tournament made the announcement via Twitter.

Williams returned to the tour briefly this year after a 14-month absence to give birth to her daughter.

The 23-time Grand Slam champion also withdrew from this week's Madrid Open and sitting out Rome puts her status for the French Open, which starts May 27, in doubt.

Williams, a four-time Italian Open champion, has not played since her first-round loss to Naomi Osaka in March at the Miami Open.

Catherine Bellis takes Williams' place in the Rome draw.

Raptors' Casey named NBA's top coach by peers

The Toronto Raptors' Dwane Casey was the NBA's best coach this season, according to his fellow NBA coaches.

Casey was announced Wednesday as the coach-of-the-year selection by the National Basketball Coaches Association. The award, named for longtime NBA executive director Michael H. Goldberg, is voted on only by the league's head coaches.

A media panel voted separately for the NBA's Coach of the Year award, which will be announced June 25.

Casey won after a season in which Toronto went a franchise-best 59-23 and finished with the No. 1 seed in the Eastern Conference, before getting swept by Cleveland in the second round of the playoffs.

Other coaches who received votes were Philadelphia's Brett Brown, Houston's Mike D'Antoni, Indiana's Nate McMillan, San Antonio's Gregg Popovich, the Los Angeles Clippers' Doc Rivers, Utah's Quin Snyder and Portland's Terry Stotts.

United say Ferguson out of intensive care

Former Manchester United manager Alex Ferguson is out of intensive care but remains in the hospital following surgery for a brain hemorrhage.

The announcement on Wednesday from United was the first official

word on the 76-year-old Ferguson's condition since he underwent the emergency operation on Saturday. There remains no detail on the treatment Ferguson requires.

"Sir Alex no longer needs intensive care and will continue rehabilitation as an inpatient," United said in a statement. "His family have been overwhelmed by the level of support and good wishes but continue to request privacy as this will be vital during this next stage of recovery."

The encouraging prognosis follows an outpouring of concern from across the game over the health of the most successful manager in British football history.

"We are very, very positive," current United manager Jose Mourinho said earlier Wednesday.

Mourinho is the third manager since Ferguson's retirement in 2013 to be unable to win the Premier League trophy that the Scot collected 13 times. During almost 27 years as manager of United, Ferguson won 38 titles at United.

Since leaving the dugout, Ferguson has remained involved in football — attending United matches and passing on advice at coaching forums — and attended a variety of events from the Oscars to golf's Ryder Cup.

Some items stolen from top picks's car recovered

Police say several items have been returned after they were stolen from Chicago Bears first-round draft pick Roquan Smith's car in Georgia, but not his Bears-issued iPad.

Athens-Clarke County Police public information officer Epifanio Rodriguez tells the Chicago Tribune a fingerprint found in the linebacker's car identified the suspect and detectives recovered some of the property, but not the iPad.

The Bears said Monday that they remotely wiped the password-protected tablet.

Rodriguez says Smith was "ecstatic" when detectives notified him. Rodriguez says authorities expect to obtain arrest warrants soon and charges will be filed in the case.

Smith called police Saturday to report the thefts, including his Georgia helmet and Georgia Bulldogs jerseys.


