## Boat wreck under investigation

**Eight rescued after boat hits jetties, sinks Sunday night**

**PANAMA CITY BEACH** — A dramatic water rescue followed a late night boat crash at the St. Andrews State Park jetties Sunday night, with Florida Fish and Wildlife Officers still trying to piece together the details a day later.

Eight people were rescued after a 30-foot Hydrocat owned by Logan and Megan

Dezan of Westville, Fla. struck the east side of the jetties around 8:45 p.m. with enough force to cut down through the fiberglass plating and splinter the wooden hull, sinking the vessel shortly after emergency crews arrived.

Also rescued were Brandon Donaldson, Jacob Martin, Joshua Waite and Hannah Waite of Bonifay, Travis Fondren of Slocumb, Ala., and Jonathon Griffin of Westville. Martin and two other passengers were transported to local hospitals, according to the U.S. Coast Guard, and their conditions were not

immediately known.

Bay County Sheriff's Deputy Alex Young was one of the first on scene, according to the BCSO incident report, arriving on the park's beach and climbing over the jetty rocks to find several passengers clinging to the jetty rocks, as well as several more passengers on board the quickly sinking vessel. Young helped pull some of the passengers up over the rocks, moving them toward land, noting that one was sporting a laceration on their head and two more had other minor

### Tropical development not likely for Gulf front

**PANAMA CITY** — A broad low pressure system in the Gulf of Mexico is forecasted to bring lots of rain to the Panhandle over the next few days, but meteorologists say it is unlikely to develop into a tropical or subtropical system.

In their most recent forecast, the National Hurricane Center pegged the likelihood of the system developing into tropical weather over the next two days at 20 percent and the next five days at 30 percent.

"Although this system could still acquire some subtropical or tropical characteristics while it moves slowly northward across the eastern Gulf of Mexico during the next few days, the low has not shown signs of increased

organization during the past 24 hours," according to a press release.

Instead, they said to expect cloudiness and thunderstorms, with the potential for periods of heavy rainfall and flash flooding.

It's not uncommon for storms to start forming in the Gulf of Mexico just ahead of hurricane season, which officially starts June 1, according to Jason Sheler, with the Tallahassee National Weather Service.

"This year, we had a very cold winter and delayed summer," he said. "Then, a lightswitch just came on and we had all this heat come out of nowhere."

The heat, he said, is fueling the weather system.

Sheler said he is seeing rain during the week but expects the weather to start to clear up by the weekend.



## Jerusalem ready to embrace new US Embassy

JERUSALEM — The windy road leading up to the city was decorated with fluttering American and Israeli flags Monday as signs everywhere declared “Trump, Make Israel Great.” A popular soccer team even renamed itself: “Beitar Trump Jerusalem.”

Jerusalem is ready — sort of — for the official opening of the U.S. Embassy in a city at the epicenter of the Israel-Palestinian conflict.

For most of Jerusalem’s residents, the wider Israeli public and the country’s leaders, the official move of the embassy from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem is a cause for huge celebration.

Israel feels vindicated by the Trump administration’s decision to recognize its capital as Jerusalem. It declared sovereignty over the city 51 years ago following the 1967 Arab-Israeli war, but most countries do not recognize Israel’s rule over the city, where a third of the residents are Palestinian. And most states say their embassies will remain in Tel Aviv until Israelis and Palestinians reach some sort of peace agreement.

Palestinians and others — including some U.S. allies — see the U.S. decision as a provocative step that undermines any changes of an eventual peace accord. In Cairo, the Arab League called a crisis meeting to discuss the “illegal” U.S. embassy shift.

“This is a hostile act against

international law and against the people of Palestine,” said Saeb Erekat, secretary general of the Palestine Liberation Organization. “It places the U.S. on the side of the occupying power.”

The inauguration will take place at the site of the new embassy, which is really the existing consulate, just with a spanking new plaque. President Donald Trump will not attend, but he planned to address the high-profile crowd, including his daughter Ivanka, son-in-law Jared Kushner and a host of political, religious and communal leaders, via live video linkup.

At a celebratory breakfast in Jerusalem, Justice Minister Ayelet Shaked called Trump the “Churchill of the 21st century.”

“He has reversed Chamberlain’s policy of capitulation and teaches the world that ‘the landowner has returned,’” said Shaked at an event attended by members of the visiting White House delegation, making a reference to Britain’s prewar prime minister, Neville Chamberlain.

“Europe insists upon not learning from history,” Shaked added. “It closed its eyes to the strengthening of the Nazis; today it is

choosing to close its eyes to the strengthening of Iran. In such a reality in particular, it is good that the leader of the free world is President Trump.”

A day earlier, at a special “Thank you America” event at Israel’s Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu told a crowd — including 250 visiting U.S. senators, congressmen, community and religious leaders — that Monday “will be a historic day for our people and for our state.”

“President Trump’s decision to move the embassy to Jerusalem affirms a great and

simple truth: Jerusalem has been the capital of the Jewish people for the past 3,000 years. It’s been the capital of our state for the past 70 years. It will remain our capital for all time,” said Netanyahu, who later hosted members of the official White House delegation at a celebratory dinner.

Palestinians view it as a major betrayal of Washington’s decades-old role as a potential broker for a peace deal with Israel.

“Outside of the U.S. and a few other countries, most of the world is against this move,” said Ayman Odeh, leader of the Arab faction in Israel’s parliament, who despite being invited to the opening ceremony is consciously objecting by boycotting the event.

“Most want to see peace created along the lines that existed in 1967,” he said. “This is a one-sided move that strengthens occupation and moves us further from peace.”

Palestinians are planning to protest the move at events planned throughout Jerusalem and the West Bank. Israeli police spokesman, Micky Rosenfeld, said that security forces were on high alert for what is expected to be a tense few days.

On Tuesday, Palestinians mark the Nakba, Arabic for “catastrophe,” a term used for the flight and expulsion of an estimated 700,000 Palestinians seven decades ago upon Israel’s creation. The day also draws large protests.

### SACRAMENTO, CALIF.

Suspect in serial killings in court amid fight over records

A 72-year-old former police officer accused of being one of California’s most elusive serial killers appeared in a courtroom cage used for defendants in jail Monday as a judge put off a decision on whether to release search and arrest warrants in the case.

Prosecutors allege Joseph DeAngelo is the Golden State Killer responsible for at least a dozen murders and about 50 rapes in the 1970s and ‘80s. The Associated Press and other news outlets are seeking to unseal details related to the arrest and search warrants prosecutors obtained in April, arguing they will provide important details about how prosecutors identified DeAngelo and what evidence they have gathered from him.

### MADRID

Catalonia’s lawmakers pick fervent separatist as new chief

Lawmakers in Catalonia elected a fervent separatist as the new chief of the restive region Monday, ending a leadership vacuum of more than six months and setting the scene for more confrontations with the Spanish government.

Quim Torra, a former corporate lawyer who went on to lead a prominent pro-secession group, vowed to build an independent Catalan republic by working under the leadership of his fugitive predecessor, Carles Puigdemont.

Torra was elected 66-65 in a second round vote after he failed to secure an absolute majority in the 135-strong Catalan Parliament over the weekend.

### LONDON

Alfie Evans, toddler at center of legal storm, laid to rest

Hundreds of mourners have gathered in Liverpool to say goodbye to Alfie Evans, the British toddler whose parents fought an unsuccessful legal battle to keep him on life support.

People applauded as the boy’s funeral cortege passed the Everton Football Club stadium Monday after a private family funeral. Inside a hearse, Alfie’s coffin was decorated with images of toy soldiers and the Everton logo.

Alfie had a degenerative neurological condition that left him with almost no brain function. His parents fought in court to take him to the Vatican children’s hospital and gained support from the pope.

Louisiana’s hyped criminal-justice overhaul under review

Months after the rewrite of Louisiana’s criminal justice codes became law, a flurry of proposals to change the policies, including a wide-ranging bill that already has won unanimous Senate support, have emerged at a dizzying pace.

At least 10 proposals targeting aspects of the overhaul have been introduced during the current legislative session, with lawmakers taking aim at provisions that shorten probation periods, let sick inmates get medical treatment outside prison and limit aspects of the state’s habitual offender sentencing law.

A wide-ranging bill that combines elements of many of those proposals has won unanimous Senate support and awaits a House vote.

Police: German held Syrian in headlock, set dogs on him

Police say a 23-year-old German man is being investigated for letting two attack dogs loose on a Syrian man in a park in the eastern town of Magdeburg.

The suspect is alleged to have racially abused the 29-year-old Syrian, who was in the park with his family on Sunday afternoon.

When the victim tried to protect his family, the assailant put him in a headlock while the dogs attacked the Syrian.

In a statement Monday, police said they have identified the suspect and seized his dogs. The victim is being treated in hospital for bite wounds.

injuries.

While Young helped the passengers on the jetties, the U.S. Coast Guard dispatched a 45-foot response boat and crew, pulling five of the passengers off the boat before it sank down into the pass.

Back on the jetties, Young and a Bay County firefighter that had joined him spotted Martin on the last rock before the jetties give way to open water. With a noticeable arm injury, Young wrote that the firefighter determined Martin to be a critical patient and his condition was deteriorating rapidly to the point where couldn't support himself on the rock any longer. At 50-yards away, the Coast Guard boat couldn't move in any closer because of the shallow water, and Young yelled for them to toss a rope, which unfortunately fell short of Young's position.

Handing over a duty belt, Young then "deployed" into the water, according to the report, grabbing the rope and swimming to Martin's location on the rock. Young then adjusted Martin's life jacket so it was on him correctly and "advised him I had him as he gained trust in me," Young wrote.

Life jacket on and trust established, the two went back into the water, Young holding Martin's body close to the surface and his head above water until they could be pulled out of the water by the Coast Guard crew.

"It should be noted throughout the incident my agency uniform, boots and bullet proof vest were completely submerged in water," Young wrote at the closing of the report. "As my duty belt was possibly submerged in water, which resulted in my radio and taser getting wet."

The five passengers on the Coast Guard boat were brought back to the Panama City Marina, while the remaining three were brought back to shore by BCSO. The boat was retrieved by Sea Tow and brought to the Treasure Island Marina.

The cause of the crash remains under investigation.

"I'd still make plans," he said.

# Health agency aims to wipe out trans fats worldwide

NEW YORK — The World Health Organization has released a plan to help countries wipe out artery-clogging trans fats from the global food supply in the next five years.

The United Nations agency has in the past pushed to exterminate infectious diseases, but now it's aiming to erase a hazard linked to chronic illness.

In a statement Monday, the U.N. health agency said eliminating trans fats is critical to preventing deaths worldwide. WHO estimates that eating trans fats — commonly found in baked and processed foods — leads to the deaths of more than 500,000 people from heart disease every year.

"It's a crisis level, and it's major front in

our fight now," WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus said at a news conference in Geneva on Monday.

Officials think it can be done in five years because the work is well underway in many countries. Denmark did it 15 years ago, and since then the United States and more than 40 other higher-income countries have been working on getting the additives out of their food supplies.

The WHO is now pushing middle- and lower-income countries to pick up the fight, said Dr. Francesco Branca, director of the WHO's Department of Nutrition for Health and Development.

Artificial trans fats are unhealthy substances that are created when hydrogen is added to vegetable oil to make it solid, like in the creation of margarine or shortening. Health

experts say they can be replaced with canola oil or other products. There are also naturally occurring trans fats in some meats and dairy products.

The WHO recommends that no more than 1 percent of a person's calories come from trans fats.

"Trans fats are a harmful compound that can be removed easily without major cost and without any impact on the quality of the foods," Branca said.

Countries will likely have to use regulation or legislation to get food makers to make the switch, experts said.

At the WHO news conference Monday, a representative from a leading food industry trade group said companies are working to reduce trans fats in their products.

"We call on food producers in our sector to take prompt action and

we stand ready to support effective measures to work toward the elimination of industrially produced trans fats and ensure a level playing field in this area," said Rocco Rinaldi, secretary-general of the International Food and Beverage Alliance.

Dr. Tom Frieden, a former director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention who worked with WHO officials on the call to action, called its move unprecedented.

"The world is now setting its sights on today's leading killers — particularly heart disease, which kills more people than any other cause in almost every country," said Frieden, president of Resolve to Save Lives, a New York-based project of an organization called Vital Strategies.

In the U.S., the first trans fatty food to hit the

market was Crisco shortening, which went on sale in 1911. Trans fatty foods became increasingly popular beginning in the 1950s, partly because experts at the time thought they were healthier than cooking with butter or lard.

Food makers liked artificial trans fats because they prolonged product shelf life. They used them in doughnuts, cookies and deep-fried foods.

But studies gradually revealed that trans fats wreck cholesterol levels in the blood and drive up the risk of heart disease. Health advocates say trans fats are the most harmful fat in the food supply.

In the U.S., New York City in 2006 banned restaurants from serving food with trans fats. The same year the FDA required manufacturers to list trans fat content information on food labels.

## Marijuana growers turning to hemp as CBD extract explodes

SPRINGFIELD, Ore. — A glut of legal marijuana is driving Oregon pot prices to rock-bottom levels, prompting some nervous growers to start pivoting to another type of cannabis to make ends meet — one that doesn't come with a high.

Applications for state licenses to grow hemp — marijuana's non-intoxicating cousin — have increased more than twentyfold since 2015, making Oregon No. 2 behind Colorado among the 19 states with active hemp cultivation. The rapidly evolving market comes amid skyrocketing demand for a hemp-derived extract called cannabidiol, or CBD, seen by many as a health aid.

In its purified distilled form, CBD oil commands thousands of dollars per kilogram, and farmers can make more than \$100,000 an acre growing hemp plants to produce it. That distillate can also be converted into a crystallized form or powder.

"Word on the street is everybody thinks hemp's the new gold rush," Jerrad McCord said, who grows marijuana in southern Oregon and just added 12 acres (5 hectares) of hemp. "This is a business. You've got to adapt, and you've got to be a problem-solver."

It's a problem few predicted when Oregon voters opened the door to legal marijuana four years ago.

The state's climate is perfect for growing marijuana, and growers produced bumper crops. Under state law, none can leave Oregon. That,

coupled with a decision to not cap the number of licenses for growers, has created a surplus.

Oregon's inventory of marijuana is staggering for a state its size. There are nearly 1 million pounds (450,000 kilograms) of usable flower in the system, and an additional 350,000 pounds (159,000 kilograms) of marijuana extracts, edibles and tinctures.

"Usable flower" refers to the dried marijuana flower — or bud — that is most commonly associated with marijuana consumption.

The Oregon Liquor Control Commission, which regulates the industry, says some of the inventory of flower goes into extracts, oils and tinctures — which have increased in popularity — but the agency can't say how much. A comprehensive market study is underway.

Yet the retail price for a gram of pot has fallen about 50 percent since 2015, from \$14 to \$7, according to a report by the Oregon Office of Economic Analysis. Growers and retailers alike have felt the sting.

"Now we're starting

to look at drastic means, like destroying product. At some point, there's no more storage for it," Trey Willison said, who switched his operation from marijuana to hemp this season. "Whoever would have thought we'd get to the point of destroying pounds of marijuana?"

That stark prospect is driving more of Oregon's marijuana entrepreneurs toward hemp, a crop that already has a foothold in states like Colorado and Kentucky and a lot of buzz in the cannabis industry. In Oregon, the number of hemp licenses increased from 12 in 2015 to 353 as of last week.

Colorado and Washington were the first states to broadly legalize marijuana. Both have seen price drops for marijuana but not as significant as Oregon.

Like marijuana, the hemp plant is a cannabis plant, but it contains less than 0.3 percent of THC, the compound that gives pot its high. Growing industrial hemp is legal under federal law, and the plant can be sold for use in things like fabric, food, seed and building materials.

## Veteran found dead in Tidal Basin had wandered the country for 20 years

WASHINGTON — Percy Ronald Chess left home for good 20 years ago and made his way across America. He had served in the Air Force in the early 1970s, then rejoined relatives in Miami. But he struggled to hold a job, and his family believes he suffered from mental illness.

At first he'd wander for weeks or months. But one day he didn't come back.

Over the years, Chess's relatives scoured the Internet, tracking his travels through his arrest record of mostly petty crimes of loitering, prowling, stealing and receiving stolen property. They found signs he'd been in Florida, Alabama, Washington, Tennessee, Mississippi, Georgia, Virginia.

They think Chess hitchhiked and earned a few dollars fixing cars and broken machines — skills he learned as a child. They tried to find him, to help him, but they were never able to catch up.

His story came to a sad end on March 31, when a tourist in a paddle boat found his body floating in the Tidal Basin near the Jefferson Memorial. It took authorities two weeks to find his family. Chess was 65. D.C. police do not suspect foul play; his cause of death is pending.

Chess's family plans to bury him Tuesday at Georgia National Cemetery for veterans, outside Atlanta, where several of his relatives now live.

"In different times and different circumstances, he could have had a really great life," said his niece, Margaret Smith-Williams, 33, who lives in Miami and last saw her uncle when she was 13. "You don't want your loved ones to pass away alone."

An obituary written by his family notes that Chess was received "with much excitement and great joy" when he was born in Miami on Aug. 21, 1952.

Chess's sudden death, his obituary says, "is most disquieting and without answers."

The family did not try to hide Chess's troubles. They wrote that the man who had once coveted family and church had returned from military service a recluse,

disappearing for long spells even as his parents kept a room for him. Not much is known about his military service, but records indicate he was never deployed overseas.

"Percy lived his life out in the open," the obituary says, "sometimes alone and sometimes sleeping in the rough terrors and fierce weather of the night. . . . We can only speculate what life may have been for Percy from day-to-day."

Relatives said they prefer to recall Chess as a youth — a boy who looked after his younger sister and an enterprising teen who would take the toaster apart and put it back together again. He read books on engineering, fixed his neighbor's cars.

Chess also set out to "master the game that matched his name," said Smith-Williams, his niece. He spent hours studying strategy and plotting moves far ahead in the game. His family said he used "his quick wit and charming savvy" to draw competitors into what he called "his game."

His family described him as a "cool dresser" who is "remembered for having 'swag' even before any of us knew what 'swag' meant."

Chess enlisted in the Air Force in May 1971 at age 19 after he had graduated from high school in Miami. What happened during those years remains a mystery to his family.

From his discharge notice, it appears Chess never left the United States, although he served during the final years of the Vietnam War. The one-page form the Air Force provided his family after his death lists his service time as two years, eight months and 18 days, none overseas. It notes that Chess served in an engineering division as a tractor operator.

He was honorably discharged in February 1974 from McChord Air Force Base, now part of Joint Base Lewis-McChord outside Tacoma, Washington. He went back to his family home in Miami, but seemed different. Relatives said he appeared to be suffering from mental illness, although they can't recall a diagnosis.

"He was very secluded," said one of his sisters, Louise Chess

Williams, who lives in Atlanta. "It was as if he was in a totally different world."

He retreated to his room for dinner, eating whatever was served as long as it came with ketchup. He never married, and had no children. Over the next 20 years, he often left for weeks, sometimes months, but would return, sometimes with bruises from being beaten or bitten by dogs. He hitchhiked, carrying a mat to sleep on and a baseball bat.

He went with Williams when she moved to South Carolina. He did odd jobs but couldn't keep them. His father, retired from a gas company, started a yard service that could have meant steady work for Chess.

But by then Chess was drinking and refusing to take his medication. He emerged from his room only at night. He walked away from programs his family had enrolled him in to help. His sister said she paid \$500 to put him in a mental health facility but he didn't stay long. "He would come out and say we were the ones who were crazy, he wasn't," Williams said.

One day 20 years ago, Chess left.

In the years that followed, if a family member lived close to a police station or a courthouse where they thought he might be, they'd speed over in hopes of finding him. They never did.

One cousin, learning he had just been released from a jail in Jacksonville, Florida, drove around the city all night, but with no luck. One of Chess's brothers is convinced he saw Chess walking along a highway in Atlanta, but by the time he reached the next exit and turned around, the man was gone.

In mid-April, one of Chess's brothers in Florida got a call from the police in Fort Lauderdale, who had been contacted by the police in the District of Columbia.

They had located Percy Chess.

Though not an unexpected ending, it was still tragic.

"We're talking over 40 years of him coming and going, and us really wondering if he's dead or alive," said his sister, Williams. "In one way it's a relief. But it's sad because he was so much a part of us."

## Congo OKs use of Ebola experimental vaccine

KINSHASA, Congo — Congo has agreed to allow the World Health Organization to use an experimental Ebola vaccine to combat an outbreak announced last week, the WHO director-general said Monday.

The aim is for health officials to start using the vaccine, once it's shipped, by the end of the week, or next week if there are difficulties, said WHO Director-General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus.

"We have agreement, registration, plus import permit — everything formally agreed already. And as you know that vaccine is safe and efficacious and has been already tested. So I think we can all be prepared," he said. "All is ready now, to use it."

The outbreak was announced last week in Bikoro, in Congo's

northwest. Health officials traveled there after Congo's Equateur provincial health ministry on May 3 alerted them to 17 deaths from a hemorrhagic fever.

As of May 13, Congo has 39 suspected, probable and confirmed cases of Ebola since April, including 19 deaths, WHO reported. Two cases of Ebola have been confirmed.

Congo's Ministry of Health has requested that WHO send 4,000 doses of the vaccine, said ministry spokeswoman Jessyca Ilunga, who said they should arrive by the end of the week.

"The vaccination campaign starts next week, everything depends on the logistics because the vaccine must be kept at minus 60 degrees Celsius, and we need to assure that the cold chain is assured from Geneva to Bikoro," she said.

The Ebola vaccination campaign will first target health workers, Ilunga said.

Three nurses are among those with suspected cases, and another is among the dead.

The teams on site have already identified more than 350 contacts, who are people who have had contact with the patients, she said.

Mobile laboratories were deployed to Mbandaka and Bikoro on Saturday, she said, adding that results from the first 12 samples tested with that method should be available tomorrow.

This is the ninth Ebola outbreak in Congo since 1976, when the deadly disease was first identified. Congo has a long track record with Ebola, WHO said. The last outbreak that was announced a year ago, was contained and declared over by July 2017.

None of these outbreaks was connected to the massive outbreak in Guinea, Liberia and Sierra Leone that began in 2014 and left more than 11,300 dead.

## China tries policing our language

Since the end of the Chinese Civil War in 1949, two countries have called themselves by the same name: China.

The communists, who won that brutal war, formed the People's Republic of China. The nationalists, who retreated to Taiwan, declared Taipei would be the temporary capital of the Republic of China.

The People's Republic proved to be a brutal tyranny, overseeing the deaths of tens of millions of people through execution, imprisonment and starvation. The Republic of China has fostered liberal ideals, with elections and free speech, while creating one of the world's most vibrant economies.

The United States has acknowledged a one-China policy, accepting that only one sovereign state can legitimately be called "China." But this is a diplomatic dodge, since both the communists and nationalists claim this particular status.

Unsurprisingly, the relationship between China and Taiwan has been uneasy for nearly 70 years. There have been periods of relative calm set off against increasing tensions.

Of late, China seems back to bullying the island. It recently demanded all international airlines, including those based in the United States, stop referring to Taiwan as a separate country. It is pressing other businesses, such as the Marriott hotel chain, to do the same.

The White House blasted the effort. Press Secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders called it "Orwellian nonsense" that is "part of a growing trend by the Chinese Communist Party to impose its political views on American citizens and private companies." She said President Donald Trump will stand up for all Americans and oppose "Chinese political correctness."

Taiwan's president, Tsai Ing-wen, tweeted on May 6: "We call on all businesses to resist #China's efforts to mischaracterize #Taiwan."

China's reaction was predictable. "Whatever the U.S. says will never change the objective fact that there is only one China in the world," Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang said in a statement, "and the Hong Kong, Macau and Taiwan regions are an inalienable part of China's territory."

With a far stronger military and vastly more people than Taiwan, China has long tried to pressure the international community into helping it isolate the island.

Last year, Taiwan wanted to attend the World Health Organization's annual assembly in Geneva, Switzerland. Although it had been granted observer status annually since 2009, the request was denied. While China never admitted its role, it seems clear it was pulling the strings.


A difficult status quo prevails, with China gradually forcing Taiwan from the world stage. But, for decades, U.S. presidents, even as they have grown closer to China, have made it clear they stand behind Taiwan. There is no sign that Mr. Trump is about to change that approach.

## Police dogs and 'Reefer Madness'

Years ago, a government propaganda film entitled "Reefer Madness" depicted first-time cannabis smokers turning into instant maniacs, hallucinating, killing and raping after just a couple of puffs.

It has become known as a grand parody, though that was not the intent.

Please welcome to the same stage "The Illinois Histrionics Players," starring Macon County Sheriff Howard Buffett and his amiable sidekick, Chad Larner, training director of the K-9 Training Academy in Decatur, Illinois.

When asked about possible effects of legalizing marijuana in Illinois, the players went into full "Reefer Madness" mode, saying it would make the dogs useless and a threat to society, requiring them to give their dogs the "Old Yeller" treatment.

While Larner did not specifically say how he would kill "a number" of his 275 narcotics-sniffing dogs, he made it clear he is prepared to sacrifice their lives on the altar of marijuana phobia.

He told Pantagraph reporter Ryan Voyles, "Because many K-9s are

trained not to be social so their work won't be affected, a number of dogs would likely have to be euthanized."

Voyles then talked with police in two other Illinois towns who told him what many of you already know — which is that retired K-9 dogs typically live with their handlers. They don't slaughter the dogs.

Do you think for a minute that if any Macon County dogs are butchered, it's not because Larner just plain wants to do it?

Another less brutal, "Reefer Madness" moment is when Macon County Sheriff Howard Buffett tells Voyles, "The biggest thing for law enforcement is, you're going to have to replace all of your dogs. So to me, it's a giant step forward for drug dealers, and it's a giant step backwards for law enforcement and the residents of the community."

On the record, Jay Casillas of the Denver Police Department told me, "We do not euthanize our K-9s. ... Our K-9s are still working, and they continue to be trained on four odors (MJ, cocaine, methamphetamine, and heroin)," he said.

"Since the legalization of marijuana, we have slightly changed the training with regard to sniffing marijuana. We now train our dogs to detect larger amounts (10 pounds or

more) of marijuana because we still have to address the black market for MJ.

"We retire the dogs when it is necessary and they usually stay with their police handler as their family pet," Casillas added. "When a K9 is retired, we purchase a new one to take their spot."

What about that less dramatic and equally ignorant statement in which Macon County Sheriff Buffett said all the dogs would have to be replaced?

Why? Because they could no longer detect cocaine, heroin and other drugs now that marijuana is legal?

Don't the Illinois trainers know how to train their dogs to detect the large amounts of marijuana still deemed illegal?

Maybe it's the Illinois officials that need to be replaced or trained by the Seattle and Denver K-9 officers.

# 'Get it done'

**Trump's bid to help Chinese firm draws fire but raises hopes**

WASHINGTON — A long-running dispute between American regulators and Chinese telecom company ZTE may have handed President Donald Trump some unexpected leverage in avoiding a trade war with Beijing.

Trump's tweet Sunday that he was working with President Xi Jinping of China to put ZTE "back into business, fast" after U.S. sanctions threatened ZTE's existence and 70,000 Chinese jobs caught many trade-watchers by surprise.

"Too many jobs in China lost," Trump tweeted. "Commerce Department has been instructed to get it done!"

The overture came just as Vice Premier Liu He is flying to Washington for talks aimed at heading off a mutually harmful battle between the world's two biggest economies and just before U.S. companies plan to plead during three days of hearings for a resolution to the dispute.

Trade analysts say it is highly unusual for a president to intercede in a case brought by the Commerce Department and to mix regulatory sanctions with trade negotiations. But they also note that Trump's offer to rescue ZTE, which makes cellphones and other telecommunications equipment, has the potential to clear the way for progress.

## Immigration crackdown shifts to employers as audits surge

WASHINGTON — Immigration officials have sharply increased audits of companies to verify that their employees are authorized to work in the country, signaling the Trump administration's crackdown on illegal immigration is reaching deeper into the workplace to create a "culture of compliance" among employers who rely on immigrant labor.

Expansive plans also have been drafted for a long-term push to scrutinize employers' hiring practices more closely.

Under a 1986 federal law, companies must verify their employees are authorized to work in the United States by reviewing their documents and verifying to the government the employees' identity and work authorization. If employers are found to hire someone without proper documents, the employers may be subject to administrative fines and, in some cases, the criminal prosecution.

"It's a way to unlock negotiations," said Wendy Cutler, a former U.S. trade negotiator specializing in Asia and now vice president at the Asia Society Policy Institute.

The United States has proposed imposing tariffs on up to \$150 billion in Chinese products to punish Beijing for forcing American companies to hand over technology in exchange for access to the Chinese markets. In retaliation, Beijing is threatening tariffs on \$50 billion in U.S. products.

"Trump's tweet creates an atmosphere where there's more hope for reaching an agreement on trade," said David Dollar, senior fellow at the Brookings Institution and a former official at the World Bank and the U.S. Treasury Department.

The United States also needs China's support

as it prepares for talks with North Korea that are intended to persuade the Pyongyang regime to abandon nuclear weapons.

Commerce and ZTE last year settled charges that the Chinese company sold sensitive

telecommunications equipment to Iran and North Korea in violation of U.S. sanctions. ZTE agreed to plead guilty and pay about \$1 billion in fines.

Last month, Commerce accused ZTE of violating the agreement and blocked ZTE from importing American components for seven years. The department said ZTE had misled regulators: Instead of disciplining all employees involved in the sanctions violations, Commerce said, ZTE paid some of them full bonuses and then lied about it.

The seven-year ban was tantamount to a death sentence for ZTE.

"It was basically going to put them out of business," Dollar said. "They rely on American technology."

## Man chilled out after recovery of ice cream cart

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Ice cream vendor Tosh McKenzie took some time to chill out Monday after his stolen bright yellow, 250-pound (when loaded) cart was found by Pilcher Storage Center employees and returned to him undamaged and ready for duty.

It not only reaffirmed what brought him to Bay County in the first place — that this is an area where people look after each other — but it also still had the \$115 mariner's bell that held more sentimental value to him than the cart itself.

"It was still there, it was still on it," McKenzie said Monday. "I was very excited; I've rang it about 15 times already."

As with many reunifications, however, not everything involved will emerge unscathed. McKenzie had purchased a blue replacement for the stolen \$2,500 cart, but there isn't room in his life for two of the

## Pledges to bolster vocational training

PANAMA CITY — Gubernatorial candidate Adam Putnam chose Eastern Shipbuilding in Panama City as a site to announce his "Florida Jobs First" agenda, bolstering vocational and technical education training throughout the state.

As the clanking sounds of shipbuilding echoed in the background, Putnam told the media that these are the types of jobs that Florida needs to support.

"As I look behind me there is welding, manufacturing, heavy equipment operating," he said. "These are the jobs that built America — jobs that made the last century 'The American Century.' And variations of these jobs will continue to make this century also The American Century."

He said his "Florida Jobs First" plan begins with modernizing career training.

Putnam said according to the Florida Chamber of Commerce, the state needs to add about 2 million jobs by 2030 just to keep pace with the state's population

increase, and many of the fastest-growing jobs in Florida will not require a four-year degree.

"So we begin with our Jobs First agenda by modernizing that career training, bringing career and technical training back into the middle schools,

back into the high schools where they were stripped away from over the last generation," Putnam said.

But he said the program is "not your father's shop class."

"This a modern version of it," Putnam said. "It involves laptops and coding, cyber security, health care, as well as the traditional construction trades. Inviting businesses to the table has to be a part of successful vocational education. The job providers know what skills are needed when they arrive at the workplace."

Putnam said creating a "common course number system" would make it seamless for vocational and technical students to transfer credits from one school to another.

"That is not currently the case for career and

#### No means no contact

BAYOU GEORGE — Being in jail can't stop some people from violating no-contact orders.

According to a Bay County Sheriff's Office incident report, the victim in a domestic violence battery case involving her significant other received two text messages from unknown numbers — while her significant other was in jail.

The first, sent from a number with an out-of-state area code, said, "Hi my husband is locked up with yours and he asked me yo setted up you abd tell u how to mess up calls where it don't charge you. You need to asd some money to the phone like ten dollars or so. When he calls click 3 and hang up and he will call back and u can accept the



call without being called". The second, sent later the same day according to the report, stated, "Let me know u got the message bc my husband is calling back so your husband can call abd talk to you."

Yes, the messages included all of those typos.

Still on the same day the woman received a text from a local number saying her "husband has been concerned about you and he loves and misses you and hopes to talk to you soon. Start working on that business."

The deputy notes the woman had missed "numerous" calls from the Bay County Jail in this

same time period.

Calls out of the jail are on recorded lines, so deputies go back to that time period and review them.

"It was discovered through listening to Bay County Jail phone calls that (the significant other) did in fact request that an inmate contact her and give the above stated messages," the report said. "(The defendant), himself, got on the phone and requested theses messages be delivered."

The man is charged with violating the no-contact order.

#### Deputy's presence doesn't deter threats of violence

CALLAWAY — A man reports that his dad's ex-girlfriend is sending him threatening messages on Facebook saying she is going

to kill him.

The man says his dad is in jail "for stealing guns" and the ex-girlfriend "was upset with him ... about testifying against her in his dad's case."

The man tells a Bay County sheriff's deputy he's in fear for his life due to the message that "showed (her) threatening to harm and shoot (him) with a .22 handgun she stated she had in her possession," according to the report.

So the deputy does his job.

"I made contact with her through phone on FaceBook messenger (and she) informed me she was still going to harm (the complainant), even after I informed her I am a Deputy with Bay County Sheriffs Office. I took photographs of







# Official: Lyft drivers at Disney World can join union

ORLANDO — The drivers are summoned by a Lyft app. They are expected to entertain with storytelling as they whisk passengers around Walt Disney World in what are known as “Minnie Vans,” named

after Minnie Mouse. And now these drivers can be represented by a union. A regional director of the National Labor Relations Board last week ruled about 60 drivers who pick up Disney World guests using the Lyft app can be represented by the Teamsters local in Orlando. The Lyft

drivers are Disney World employees who earn extra money by driving guests around the resort that is roughly the size of the city of San Francisco. Disney had argued that the Lyft driver jobs couldn't be covered by a union since the Teamsters waived their right to represent any

workers not mentioned in its five-year contract. The Teamsters negotiated the contract in 2014 along with five other unions that form a coalition called the Service Trades Council. The council already represents about half of the 77,000 employees at Disney World.

technical education. We need to increase the flexibility, reduce the time to completion and save students money by preventing them from re-taking classes they've already taken,” he said.

Putnam said his initiative would create more career academies in the high schools so that students graduate with certificates in their career fields. “And they are ready to leave high school and find a job, not simply leave high school and find a mountain of student debt if they want to go to the next level of higher education,” he said.

Putnam said guidance counselors need to be given better resources and training for students on the technical training path.

“They deserve to know what all of the salary options are for any number of careers that they may be interested in,” he said. “We need to attract top teachers. Think about this — Florida has never had as a 'Teacher of the Year' anyone with a career in technical education background.”

He said that is a powerful example of how “we've treated career and technical education like a second class citizen.”

He said as governor he would expand Florida's apprenticeship programs.

“It is an earn-while-you-learn approach that

rewards students for their hands-on learning experiences,” he said. “There should be no barriers to prevent a student from both earning a paycheck and earning credit towards a certification or credit hours towards a degree.”

Putnam is facing U.S. Rep. Ron DeSantis for the Republican nomination to replace outgoing Gov. Rick Scott. Scott cannot run for governor again due to term limits.

On Monday morning, the Democratic Party of Florida, noting that Putnam was going to make the announcement in Panama City, issued a statement criticizing Putnam's record on supporting vocational education. “In Congress, Putnam spent years voting against job training grants and STEM education. Putnam's so-called plan to improve vocational education is just a cynical political stunt designed to hide his long record of opposing educational opportunities for Florida students and workers,” the statement said.

But Putnam defended his record, saying “Anyone who has ever watched me, followed me and paid attention to things that I am focused on knows that I have always made vocational training, supporting small businesses and working families a priority,” he said. “It comes from who I am, and my own background as a small business owner, as a farmer, as somebody who benefited from vocational education in Florida's public schools.”

contraptions. “I think I'm going to have to trade in my new relationship with the blue one for my true love, the yellow one,” McKenzie said. “I'm definitely attached to that one.” McKenzie reported his cart stolen May 3 by someone who cut the lock on his storage unit at Pilcher Storage Center on the Beach. His story was in The News Herald on Monday morning, and

not too long after that McKenzie received a call from the business' owner, John Pilcher. “I actually got a call from him and we verified that it was mine,” McKenzie said. “They offered to drop it off to me and it's back.” McKenzie has been a familiar sight along the Beach over the last three to four years, selling ice cream and making friends. When his cart was stolen, friends and customers took to Facebook to try and help him. The fact that they succeeded doesn't surprise him. It's that attitude that

lot of trust here because in Daytona Beach you don't do that.’ “ Even with the replacement cart, McKenzie said he had a good Mother's Day highlighted by some people he met under a shelter waiting for the rain to pass. “I looked back and saw 20 to 30 people sitting with their kids eating a frozen dessert from me,” he said. “That was enough for the day. We're just overwhelmed with the response from the community but not really surprised. “The people in Bay County are fantastic.”

## Hungry shark circles kayaker

PANAMA CITY BEACH — A kayaker off Panama City Beach had a run-in this weekend with what seemed to be a hungry hammerhead shark.

Capable of sensing a teaspoon's worth of blood in an Olympic swimming pool, the

hammerhead had no problem locating the pile of fish Pony Donald had stashed in the bottom of his kayak.

"He was pretty interested," Donald said. "They're usually not that fast... but he had his fins down and he was ready."

A kayak fishing guide, Donald has had his share of run-ins with sharks, saying it happens "quite frequently." Tiger sharks

have rubbed up against his kayak before, and more than a few come by hoping for a share of his catch.

"As soon as you step off the shore, you're in their territory," he said.

But this incident Donald called a "first" when he posted three videos of the encounter on Facebook because of how persistent the hammerhead was. The videos

have been shared more than 100 times.

To get the shark to move along, Donald hit the side of his boat with a paddle to try to scare it. When the hammerhead came close enough, Donald, who was fishing by himself, gave the shark a light whack on the head.

"That was it; he was done," Donald said. "He learned I wasn't prey."

# County awards restoration bid

CAPE SAN BLAS — At long last, more than two years after first stepping down the path to a restoration project for St. Joseph Peninsula beaches, the Board of County Commissioners last Thursday awarded a bid.

Manson Construction, which is based in Washington state, will perform the work after submitting a bid to put the most sand on the beach within the county’s \$10.2 million budget.

The start date is Aug. 1, though the timeline for the project is now entirely dependent on the U.S. Treasury Department approving the RESTORE Act funding application.

That application, part of a multi-year spending plan for the county’s direct allocation under RESTORE, has been with Treasury for more than a year.

However, changes in the scope of the project combined with a required window for public comment have pushed the final approval of the \$2.8 million into summer.

Manson, according to Michael Dombrowski, the county’s consulting coastal engineer, will be using a large hopper to dredge the sand from an offshore borrow area.

That will mean instead of a potential 120-day project, Manson is projecting to complete the work and be off the beach within 45 days of the start date.

“Not only will they be

quicker but there will be less monetary cost for supervision of the project,” Dombrowski said.

If the timeline presented last week proves accurate, that will mean the work will fall directly on sea turtle season, just as the season is transitioning from nesting to hatchlings emerging.

Dombrowski said he has communicated with Jessica Swindall with the St. Joseph Peninsula Turtle Patrol on a relocation plan.

Permits from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and U.S. Army Corps will allow for the relocations to be undertaken, Dombrowski said.

Manson was one of two bidders, the other Great Lake Dredge, on the project, which was re-bid late last year after the commission rejected the initial round of bids.

Those initial bids came in some 40 percent over the county’s budget.

In re-bidding, the county “reverse-bid” the project, requiring contractors to detail how much sand the county could purchase and place on the beach for the \$10.2 million.

Manson’s bid was 705,882 cubic yards; Great Lakes bid less than half that amount.

The sand, Dombrowski said, should take the project from the Stump Hole rock revetment to the southern boundary of Billy Joe Rish Park, with sufficient sand to produce the desired width.

“That is the plan,” Dombrowski said.

Dombrowski said the county ended up saving money by re-bidding the project.

With the elimination of some surveying, oversight and inspection services due to the shorter timeframe for the project, the county saved right at \$1 million, he said.

The unit cost per cubic

yard of sand of \$1.50 was also lower.

Had the county accepted the low bidder on the first round of bids last year, which was Great Lakes, it would have received 510,000 cubic yards of sand, based on per unit cost in the bid and the county’s available funds, Dombrowski said.

“There was a substantial cost savings by doing this method,” Dombrowski said. “We gained 200,000 cubic yards.”

The hope of the over-arching plan is that sand placed on the southern end of the six-mile length of the project area moves north.

That was the case in the original restoration project of a decade ago, with a significant amount of sand, in the hundreds of thousands of cubic yards, move south to north.

Similar accretion is the hope in the future, but in the short-term the county has had to deal with some controversy regarding the origins of the project and the funding.

Some residents to the north of Billy Joe Rish Park have complained that while they were taxed as all peninsula property owners were to provide local funding for the project, under three separate taxing units, but will not immediately received sand as originally pledged.

In addition, some have criticized that a project deemed urgent two years ago, which was initially estimated to be completed nearly a year ago, has yet to start and will not wait for RESTORE funding.

“We need to get sand out there,” said Dr. Pat Hardman, president of the Coastal Community Association of Gulf County.






### FORT MYERS Fugitive grandma pleads not guilty to murder charge

A Minnesota woman accused of killing her husband and a Florida woman before leading authorities on a cross-country manhunt has entered a not guilty plea to a second-degree murder charge.

News outlets report 56-year-old Lois Riess entered the plea Thursday in Fort Myers, Florida.

Court documents say 54-year-old David Riess was found dead at the couple's Blooming Prairie, Minnesota, home on March 23. Authorities say Lois Riess came to Fort Myers and soon met 59-year-old Pamela Hutchinson.

Investigators believe Riess killed Hutchinson to assume her identity. Riess was captured in South Padre Island, Texas, and returned to Florida to face charges.

Charges in Minnesota are also pending.

The public defender's office in Lee County is representing Riess.

### ORLANDO Investigators identify woman found dead in pond

Authorities in Florida have identified a woman whose body was found in a retention pond.

Orange County Sheriff's spokesman Jeff Williamson said in a news release Monday that officials have made the next of kin notification in the death of 19-year-old Tamara Lamour.

Her body was found Thursday, hours after a man called 911 to report that he heard what he thought was a teenage boy screaming for help before going under in an alligator-infested pond.

Authorities said they didn't know how she'd gotten into the fenced-off pond near Orlando. No further details were

released.

### FORT MYERS Woman hit by lightning while pregnant is expecting again

A pregnant Florida woman who was struck by lightning last year just days from her due date is expecting another child.

WINK-TV in Fort Myers reports Meghan and Matt Davidson are expecting a baby in October.

The couple said Meghan Davidson's heart briefly stopped beating when she was hit by lightning while walking outside her house last June. Doctors delivered the baby, named Owen, but he died about two weeks later.

Meghan Davidson said she doesn't remember much about the lightning strike or the days immediately after it.

The Davidson's said they're excited about the future but will never forget baby Owen.

SASEBO, Japan — A Fort Walton Beach native and 2016 Americas High School graduate is serving in Guam in the U.S. Navy aboard the expeditionary submarine tender USS Emory S. Land.

Seaman Apprentice Crissell Gravinolebron is a logistics specialist aboard the Guam-based submarine tender. The ship routinely deploys to protect alliances, enhance partnerships, and respond if a natural disaster occurs in the region.

The Emory S. Land made a routine port visit recently in Sasebo, Japan, while conducting an exercise.

“I think it's awesome being forward-deployed,” said Gravinolebron. “A year

ago I was living with my mom, now I'm here in Japan, which is somewhere I use to dream about. The Navy has made me respect the chain of command and the structure of the Navy allows me to see where I want to be and have a lot of role models to look up

to.” As a Navy logistics specialist, Gravinolebron is responsible for managing inventories of repair parts and general supplies and distributing mail for ships, squadrons and shore-based activities.

With a crew of 42 officers and 600 enlisted, submarine tenders are 649 feet long and weigh approximately 23,493 tons.

Their mission is to provide maintenance, repairs, hotel services, weapons reload and logistics support to deployed guided-missile and fast-attack submarines. Submarine tenders are additionally capable of providing repair and logistics services to deployed surface ships.

“Serving in the Navy allows me to build charisma and self confidence and I really want to be an asset to the team,” said Gravinolebron.

# Court upholds ‘stand your ground’ shift

TALLAHASSEE — A South Florida appeals court has upheld the constitutionality of a controversial change to the state’s ‘stand your ground’ self-defense law — but also might have set the stage for a debate at the Florida Supreme Court about how the change should apply in some cases.

The decision Friday by the 3rd District Court of Appeal in a Miami-Dade County shooting case came a week after another appeals court ruled on similar issues in a Hillsborough County case. The two appellate courts disagreed on a key issue about how judges should carry out the “stand your ground” change in older cases, a type of legal conflict that can spur the Supreme Court to take up issues.

Both rulings dealt with a move by the Legislature in 2017 to shift a key burden of proof in “stand your ground” cases from defendants to prosecutors.

In the decision Friday, a panel of the 3rd District Court of Appeal disagreed with a Miami-Dade County circuit judge, who ruled that the legislative change was

unconstitutional because it violated the separation of powers. The circuit-court ruling was rooted in the Supreme Court’s constitutionality authority to set rules of practice and procedure for the court system.

The “stand your ground” law says people are justified in using deadly force and do not have a “duty to retreat” if they believe it is necessary to prevent death or great bodily harm. When the defense is successfully raised in pre-trial hearings, defendants are granted immunity from prosecution.

Before the change was passed last year, the Florida Supreme Court had said defendants had the burden of proof in pre-trial hearings to show they should be shielded from prosecution. With backing from groups such as the National Rifle Association, the 2017 change shifted the burden from defendants to prosecutors to prove whether self-defense claims are justified.

In Friday’s decision, the 3rd District Court of Appeal said the Legislature did not overstep its constitutional authority in shifting the burden of proof. It said lawmakers have “the constitutional authority

to enact procedural provisions in statutes that are intertwined with substantive rights.”

“The amendment (to the “stand your ground” law in 2017) shifts the burden of proof to the prosecution after the defendant has made a prima facie claim of justified use of force, and it requires that the state (prosecutors) meet this burden of proof with clear and convincing evidence,” said the decision, written by appeal-court Judge Ivan Fernandez and joined by judges Thomas Logue and Edwin Scales. “This is consistent with the well-established legislative practice of passing statutes allocating the burden of proof in judicial proceedings.”

The decision came in a case in which Tashara Love sought to use the “stand your ground” law to be shielded from prosecution after a November 2015 altercation outside a Miami-Dade County nightclub. Love shot a man as he was about to hit her daughter, according to the decision.

But the appeals court Friday ruled against Love on a key issue — and created a conflict with a May 4 decision by the 2nd District Court of Appeal in a Hillsborough County case.

## ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

"Stealing, of course, is a crime. ... But if you were very, very hungry, and you had no way of obtaining money, it would be excusable to grab (a) painting, take it to your house, and eat it."

When this deal came up at the 2001 Cavendish teams event in Las Vegas, the daily bulletin remarked that Bruce Ferguson has made a career of trying to fool all of the people all of the time. The more outrageous things he does, the more people suspect him, so he has to keep trying ever more unusual tricks. But he still keeps reeling in the victims!

Consider this affair from the last match of the teams, where he caught another world champion and added yet one more notch to his belt.

If you play three no-trump as South, as did the vast majority of the field, you find the cards lying exceptionally well. With the diamond ace doubleton and spades and hearts apparently favorably located, it looks very hard to go down.

As West, Ferguson started the war of attrition by leading a deceptive heart four, playing fourth-highest leads. When you have a hand this strong, that can be a good move. When South ducked the first heart, Ferguson had won the first battle. Back came a second heart; South won, crossed to a top diamond and passed the club queen. Ferguson won and put the spade four on the table!

Declarer eyed this suspiciously and decided to duck. We can all see that this may not be technically supportable, but Ferguson had given him the chance to go wrong, and he took it. Now, when the club finesse lost, West had five winners. Ferguson left the table chortling, with yet another victim added to what is by now a rather long list.

**DEAR ABBY:** I'm a mother of two boys, 13 and 12. My oldest son has become very abusive, both physically and emotionally. He has been arrested for hitting me and hitting his little brother. He was recently kicked off the bus for hitting another student and has also been locked out of school.

I have tried therapy and medications for him, but he hasn't changed. I'm at my wits' end, ready to give up

and hand him over to the court. He has both parents and a loving home. I don't know what to do anymore. I love my son, but can no longer do this. Please tell me how to help him! — LOVING MOTHER IN TENNESSEE

**DEAR LOVING MOTHER:** Much information is missing from your letter. What triggers your son's violent episodes? Could he have a learning disability? Is he being teased or bullied, which might explain why he hit another student? Has he been ill, or could he have sensory integration difficulties?

At 13, it's too soon to throw up your hands and give up. Because therapy and medication haven't helped your son, I would

have to ask what kind of therapist has been seeing him. When treatment doesn't work, a patient may need a more comprehensive assessment — a second opinion or even a third. My suggestion would be to take him to a teaching hospital. And while you're there, please consider asking about some support for yourself because you have a lot on your shoulders.





### Mosley, Hudson draw on playoff experience against West Florida

LYNN HAVEN — Mosley has been through the drawn-out baseball postseason enough that adopting a football mentality of one game a week is not a hardship.

Nor does Hudson expect it to against West Florida projected starter John Pease. The Jaguars' ace is 8-1 with a 1.56


ERA and 20 walks against 77 strikeouts on the season.

## Supreme Court says states can OK sports betting

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court cleared the way Monday for states coast to coast to legalize betting on sports, breaking a longtime ban and creating a potential financial boon for states and the gambling industry. The first bets could be placed within weeks.

Despite opposition from the major sports leagues and the Trump administration, the high court struck down a federal law that had barred betting on football, basketball, baseball and other sports in most states. States that want to take advantage of the ruling now will generally have to pass legislation to allow sports books to open. Some, including New Jersey, which brought the case to the Supreme Court, have a head start.

Sports leagues had expressed concerns about any expansion of sports gambling. Their huge businesses could be badly harmed if people thought the outcome of games could be altered by

someone who had wagered money on a certain result.

However, the ruling also could be seen as merely bringing an activity out of the shadows that many people already see as a mainstream hobby. Americans wager about \$150 billion on sports each year illegally, according to the American Gaming Association. The law the justices struck down forbade state-authorized sports gambling with some exceptions and made Nevada the only state where a person could wager on the results of a single game.

Stock prices for casino operators and equipment makers surged after the ruling was announced.

Gambling on sports could quickly become widely available, with one research firm estimating that 32 states would likely offer sports betting within five years.

The ruling "opens up the floodgates" for sports gambling in any state that wants to have it, said Daniel Wallach, a sports law expert in Florida.

The decision had been eagerly anticipated by

gamblers and also states that hope their cut of legalized sports betting can help solve budget problems. States that have already laid the legal groundwork include New Jersey, where one racetrack said it would begin taking bets within two weeks. Mississippi and West Virginia have also been preparing for sports betting, and gamblers there could be placing bets as early as this summer and certainly before the NFL season starts in September.

Delaware, too, could quickly expand beyond certain bets currently offered at its casinos. Pennsylvania and New York have also made moves to begin sports gambling. However, other states that want to allow sports betting could still see several Super Bowls come and go before people there can place a legal bet close to home.



# Rival trainers share a strong friendship

Bob Baffert has spent his whole life following D. Wayne Lukas.

As a teenager at the quarter horse track in Arizona where Baffert tagged along with his dad and learned about racing, he looked up to Lukas as a legend.

"I'll never forget when he came in with his fancy trailer and man, there's Wayne Lukas," Baffert said. "He was huge then. He's always set the bar."

Baffert even asked Lukas for a job out of high school. Lukas turned Baffert down, but in the four-plus decades since, they've developed a friendship as deep as their combined success.

They are two of the best thoroughbred trainers in racing history and their paths are crossing again this week at Pimlico Race Course in Baltimore. They will go head to head in the Preakness, a race that each has won six times.

"We've become good friends because we have a lot in common, we had a lot of quarter horse stories and friends that we knew coming up," Baffert said. "It's been a lot of fun."

Baffert goes into the Preakness with Kentucky Derby winner Justify, the heavy favorite to advance to the Belmont Stakes with the chance to give the 65-year-old his second Triple Crown champion in four years. A win Saturday would tie the 83-year-old Lukas' record of 14 Triple Crown victories.

Lukas said Baffert "is going to roll right past that" mark.

"Bob is an excellent horseman," said Lukas, who is expected to start Bravazo and Sporting Chance in the Preakness. "Not only has he got a good clientele base and gets some nice horses, but he absolutely knows what to do with them."

Baffert's dad got him involved in horse racing at age 11 and he considers his father his mentor — but he holds

Lukas in high regard. Lukas has been an icon and rival for Baffert over the years, especially in the 1990s and 2000s when owner Bob Lewis pitted the two against each other.

Calling Lukas one of the hardest workers he has ever seen, Baffert set out to duplicate those efforts with incredible success. Lukas and Baffert just kept winning — including a combined 34 Breeders Cup' races to go along with the Triple Crown victories — and became closer along the way.

"The one thing that you quickly find out is who you can greatly respect and respect is what really starts to bond these friendships that we develop over the years," Lukas said. "I have developed a deep friendship and respect with him and his whole family, (his wife) Jill and everybody for the simple reason that I think he's a very good horseman and he does a very, very good job."

Baffert has done such a good job that Lukas considers

him one of the top three or four trainers in history. If Justify wins Saturday, it would tie him with 19th-century trainer R.W. Walden for the most Preakness victories.

Leading up to Saturday's race, Baffert will again share a barn with Lukas, who is

looking for his first win on the Triple Crown trail since 2013. Despite the drought, Lukas is still the standard by which many younger trainers measure themselves.

"To me, he is still above me," Baffert said. "He thinks he's going to win everything."

## Golden State takes opener

Durant's 37 lead  
Warriors over Rockets  
119-106

HOUSTON — Kevin Durant scored 37 points and Klay Thompson added 28 to lead Golden State to a 119-106 win in the long-awaited showdown with the Houston Rockets in Game 1 of the Western Conference finals on Monday night.

Starting a playoff series on the road for the first time since 2014, the Warriors trailed by as many as 9 early, but had evened it up by halftime and used a big run at the beginning of the fourth quarter to pull away.

Eric Gordon opened the final period with a 3-pointer to get the top-seeded Rockets within 4, but Thompson scored the first eight points of a 13-4 run to make it 100-87 with about eight minutes left.

Houston used a 9-3 spurt, where James Harden scored five, to cut the lead to 103-96 with less than five minutes to go. But Thompson struck again, hitting a wide open 3 to leave the Warriors ahead by 10 with four minutes left.

Harden scored 41 to lead the Rockets, who lost at home for the second time this postseason.

Steph Curry added 18 for the Warriors, who are in the conference finals for a franchise-record fourth straight time. It's Houston's first trip since 2015 when Golden State won the series in five games.

strikeouts.

into a Hard Rock casino resort. All four major U.S. professional sports leagues and the NCAA also had urged the court to uphold the federal law, saying a gambling expansion would hurt the integrity of their games. They also said that with legal sports betting in the United States, they'd have to spend a lot more money monitoring betting patterns and investigating suspicious activity.

Sports gambling proponents argued that the leagues already do that work and that legal sports betting will make enforcement easier than it is now, when most bets in the U.S. are made illegally. They

say state regulators are capable of monitoring suspicious bets, as is done in Nevada.

On Monday, NBA commissioner Adam Silver and Major League Baseball issued statements saying the "integrity" of their games would remain a priority. Representatives of the National Hockey League, National Football League and NCAA said they were reviewing the court's decision.

Some saw other concerns, including for some gamblers. The ruling "will likely increase gambling participation and gambling problems unless steps are taken to minimize harm," said Marlene Warner, the president of the National Council on Problem Gambling's board of directors. The council said any government body or sports league that receives a direct percentage or portion of sports betting

revenue should dedicate some of it to treat gambling problems.

The law the justices struck down was passed by Congress in 1992 and called the Professional and Amateur Sports Protection Act.

Justice Samuel Alito wrote for the court, "The legalization of sports gambling requires an important policy choice, but the choice is not ours to make." The court's "job is to interpret the law Congress has enacted and decide whether it is consistent with the Constitution," he wrote. "PASPA is not."

Justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Stephen Breyer and Sonia Sotomayor dissented. Ginsburg wrote for the three that when a portion of a law violates the Constitution, the court "ordinarily engages in a salvage rather than a

demolition operation," preserving what it can. She said that instead of using a "scalpel to trim the statute" her colleagues used "an axe." Breyer agreed with the majority that part of the law must be struck down but said that should not have doomed the rest of the law.

Congress could try to step in again. Sen. Orrin Hatch said he would soon introduce legislation to set national standards for sports betting, but it is unclear whether the rest of Congress will want to join him.

The ruling was a particular victory for New Jersey, which has fought for years to legalize gambling on sports at casinos and racetracks. Former Republican Gov. Chris Christie tweeted that it was a "great day for the rights of states and their people to make their

own decisions." The state's current governor, Democrat Phil Murphy, said he was "thrilled" to see the high court strike down the "arbitrary ban." Several hours after the Supreme Court ruled, New Jersey lawmakers introduced new legislation that would regulate and tax sports gambling in the state.

Casinos and racetracks in the state are also moving quickly. Monmouth Park, a racetrack at the Jersey Shore, has already set up a sports book operation and said Monday it plans to start taking bets within two weeks "unless someone stops us." And Tony Rodio, president of Tropicana Entertainment, said his Atlantic City casino will offer sports betting once it can get it up and running.

"It's been a long time coming," he said.

# Marchessault-led Golden Knights top Jets in Game 2

The expansion Golden Knights appeared to be rusty in the series opener and the Jets scored three goals early in a 4-2 win.

It looked like they were going to pick up where they left off, but Fleury made key saves early and got help from a teammate and a post in the opening minutes to keep the puck

out of his net.

Vegas generated offense by making plays without the puck, forcing turnovers to set up goals.

After the Jets failed to clear the puck out of a corner in their end, Tatar ended up stuffing the puck in the net after hitting the side of the net with a shot.

Connor was pressured into turning over the puck near center ice late in the opening period and Reilly Smith set up Marchessault, his former Florida Panthers teammate, at the blue line and he scored on a breakaway backhand.

The Jets closed the scoreless second period and started the third on the power play and still couldn't get the puck past Fleury.

# Capitals pull away, beat Lightning for 2-0 series lead

TAMPA, Fla. — The Washington Capitals scored in the opening minute of the game and twice in the last 1:02 of the second period to pull away to a 6-2 victory over the Tampa Bay Lightning on Sunday night and a 2-0 lead in the Eastern Conference final.

Evgeny Kuznetsov and Lars Eller each had a goal and two assists. Alex Ovechkin and Tom Wilson had a goal and an assist apiece.

Devante Smith-Pelly and Brett Connolly also scored for the Caps, who took the first two games of the best-of-seven matchup on the road. Since 1974-75, teams that take a 2-0 lead in the conference final or semi-final have a series record of 39-2 (95.1 percent).

Game 3 is Tuesday night in Washington. Braden Point and Steven Stamkos had early power-play goals for Tampa Bay, which rebounded after falling behind on Wilson's

goal 28 seconds into the game.

Smith-Pelly's one-timer finishing an odd-man rush made it 2-2 at 2:30 of the second period. The Caps took control when Eller scored with 1:02 remaining and Kuznetsov — with assists from Ovechkin and Eller — delivered on a power play less than a minute later.

Lightning goaltender Andrei Vasilevskiy was called for tripping Washington's Andre Burakovsky with 10 seconds left in the period.
