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# Memorial Day business declines

**Restaurateur Jack Bishop asked: "How many times can they cry wolf over these subtropical storms?"**

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Business owners and hoteliers on the Beach reported a serious decline in Memorial Day business this past weekend compared to last year, saying the national media's "hyped" coverage of incoming Subtropical Storm Alberto scared

many people away. As Valerie Sale, the Bay County public information officer fielded calls from all over, including Canadian CTV Newschannel, CBS Orlando, CNN, The Weather Channel and correspondents for CBS and NBC news, local hotels and restaurants fielded calls of a different kind — cancellations.

Business owners reported a significant decline in business this weekend, which is usually only second in sales to July 4.

Jack Bishop, who has lived on the Beach since the late

1960s, said his Jack's Family Buffet sales were down 59 percent from last Memorial Day and sales at his Harpoon Harry's waterfront restaurant were down 50 percent.

Bishop said he's survived serious hurricanes like Opal in Panama City Beach and Camille in Mississippi, and he said he is well aware of the danger of some storms. But, he said, it is just ridiculous how networks such as The Weather Channel are creating "weather hysteria" over weak tropical systems.

DESTIN — As soon as the soft drops of light rain stopped spattering the surface of the lap pool at Destin Aquatic Center, Rob Fry of Panama City and Jay McManus chose adjacent middle lanes and began some easy, but purposeful, trips up and back.

With the Department of Defense Warrior Games just a few days away, the two area Navy men were training relatively easy last week, but last Wednesday's time in the pool still would include long

work on their backstrokes, breaststrokes and freestyle swimming.

"This is where we need to be," Fry had said just minutes earlier, while he and McManus waited under an awning at the Aquatic Center for the weather to clear, watching rain clouds scudding across the late-morning sky.

The two men are among a handful of Northwest Florida residents participating in the upcoming Warrior Games. The annual competition, which begins Friday at the U.S. Air Force Academy in

# White House: NKorea summit 'expected'

WASHINGTON — Rapid-fire diplomacy played out on two continents Tuesday in advance of an "expected" summit between President Donald Trump and North Korea's Kim Jong Un, the strengthening resolve coming after a series of high-risk, high-reward gambits by the two leaders.

Officials won't say that the June 12 Singapore summit is back on, but preparations on both sides of the Pacific are proceeding as if it is. Two weeks of hard-nosed negotiating, including a communications blackout by the North and a public cancellation by the U.S., appeared to be paying off as the two sides engaged in their most substantive talks to date about the meeting.

Trump tweeted Tuesday that he had a "great team" working on the summit, confirming that top North Korean official Kim Yong Chol was headed to New York for talks with Secretary of State Mike Pompeo. In addition, teams of U.S. officials have arrived at the Korean demilitarized zone and in Singapore to prepare for the meeting.

"Solid response to my letter, thank you!" tweeted Trump. He announced he had decided to "terminate" the summit last week in an open



## Gaza militants strike Israel, drawing retaliation

JERUSALEM — Palestinian militants bombarded southern Israel with dozens of rockets and mortar shells Tuesday, while Israeli warplanes struck targets throughout the Gaza Strip in the largest flare-up of violence between the sides since a 2014 war.

The Israeli military said most of the projectiles were intercepted, but three soldiers were wounded, raising the chances of further Israeli retaliation. One mortar shell landed near a kindergarten shortly before it opened.

The sudden burst of violence follows weeks of mass Palestinian protests along the Gaza border with Israel. Over 110 Palestinians, many of them unarmed protesters, have been killed by Israeli fire in that time. Israel says it holds Gaza's Hamas rulers responsible for the bloodshed.

"Israel will exact a heavy price from those who seek to harm it, and we see Hamas as responsible for preventing such attacks," Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said.

Israel and Hamas are bitter enemies and have fought three wars since the Islamic group seized control of Gaza in 2007.

The last war in 2014 was especially devastating, with over 2,000 Palestinians killed, including hundreds of civilians, and widespread damage inflicted on Gaza's infrastructure in 50 days of fighting. Seventy-two people were killed on the Israeli side.

Tuesday's violence bore a striking resemblance to the run-up to past wars. In the early morning, Palestinian militants fired over two dozen mortar rounds into southern Israel, including the shell that landed near the kindergarten.

The Israeli military said it carried out over 35 air strikes on seven sites across Gaza, including an unfinished tunnel near the southern city of Rafah that crossed under the border into Egypt and from there into Israeli territory. No Palestinian casualties were reported.

Palestinian militants

continued to fire additional barrages toward southern Israel, setting off air raid sirens in the area throughout the day and into the evening.

Brig. Gen. Ronen Manelis, the chief military spokesman, threatened tougher action and said it was up to Hamas to stop the situation from escalating.

"These strikes will continue to intensify as long as necessary if this fire continues," he told reporters outside Israeli military headquarters.

Hamas and the smaller Islamic Jihad militant issued a joint statement Tuesday,

claiming shared responsibility for firing rockets and projectiles against Israeli communities near Gaza.

They said Israel "began this round of escalation" by targeting their installations in the past two days, killing four militants. It was the first time the armed wing of Hamas has claimed responsibility for rocket attacks out of Gaza since the 2014 war.

Hamas has been severely weakened by the three wars with Israel, as well as a stifling Israeli-Egyptian blockade that has brought the local economy to a standstill.

Hamas initially billed the weekly border protests as a call to break through the fence and return to homes that were lost 70 years ago during the war surrounding Israel's establishment.

But the protests appear to be fueled primarily by a desire to ease the blockade. Gaza's unemployment rate is edging toward 50 percent, and the territory suffers from chronic power outages.

With limited options at its disposal, and a failure so far of the protests to significantly ease the blockade, Hamas appears to be gambling that limited rocket fire might somehow shake up the situation.

Ismail Radwan, a Hamas official, said the "resistance is capable of hurting the occupation and it proved this today by responding to its crimes."

Israel says the blockade is needed to prevent Hamas from building up its military capabilities.

Also Tuesday, two fishing boats carrying students and medical patients set sail from Gaza City's port, aiming to reach Cyprus and break the Israeli blockade, which has restricted most activity along the coast. Hamas acknowledged it was mostly a symbolic act.

One of the boats quickly turned around, while the Israeli navy intercepted the second vessel after it ventured beyond a six-mile (10-kilometer) limit imposed by Israel.

The Israeli military said the boat was intercepted without incident, was taken to the Israeli port of Ashdod and the 17 people aboard would be sent back to Gaza.



### ELLCOTT CITY, MD. Body found of man who disappeared amid flooding

Searchers on Tuesday scouring a river alongside an historic Maryland town ripped apart by flash flooding found the body of a man last seen being swept away by the raging waters as it gutted shops and pushed parked cars into swollen tributaries.

Volunteers and crews with trained dogs had been methodically hunting for 39-year-old Eddison Hermond. He disappeared late Sunday afternoon, following torrential rains that prompted destructive flash flooding in historic Ellicott City.

It was the second time Ellicott City's downtown district was hit by deadly floodwaters in less than two years.

### ONTARIO, CALIF. Mother arrested on suspicion of murder in baby death

A California mother has been arrested for investigation of murder in the death of her 7-month-old daughter after police say she intentionally hit her boyfriend with a car as he held the baby.

Ontario police Sgt. Jeff Higbee says 19-year-old Sarah Gomez was arrested after the death early Tuesday morning. She's being held on a \$1 million bail.

Higbee says Gomez and her boyfriend were arguing late Monday after they had been drinking at a family gathering.

Higbee says the couple left the gathering with the girl and drove home. Higbee says the boyfriend got out of the car with the baby and that's when Gomez hit them.

### LINCOLN, NEB. Pipeline developer showers Nebraska with campaign cash

The developer of the Keystone XL pipeline is showering Nebraska public officials with campaign cash as it fights for regulatory approval in a state that is one of the last lines of resistance for the \$8 billion project.

A political action committee for TransCanada Inc. has donated more than \$65,000 to campaigns within the last year, mostly to Republican state lawmakers, the Nebraska GOP and Gov. Pete Ricketts, according to an Associated Press review of campaign disclosure records.

Pipeline opponents say the company's contributions show it's trying to exert influence over the state's top elected officials.

### NICOSIA, CYPRUS Germany: Rejected asylum-seeker sets self ablaze

German authorities say a rejected asylum-seeker from Iran suffered serious injuries after setting fire to himself at a town office near the southwestern city of Ulm.

Police said the 35-year-old, whose name wasn't released, entered the town office in Goepfingen midday Tuesday and asked two employees for help, showing them papers indicating his application for asylum had been rejected.

Ulm police say the staff assured him they would help, but the man became aggressive and then pulled a bottle out of his backpack, poured liquid over himself and set fire to it as the two workers fled.

### LISBON, PORTUGAL Portugal's parliament rejects bills legalizing euthanasia

Portuguese lawmakers Tuesday narrowly rejected a proposal to make Portugal one of only a handful of countries in the world allowing euthanasia and doctor-assisted suicide.

After a landmark debate, lawmakers voted to reject four broadly similar bills introduced by left-leaning parties. The bill that came closest to succeeding was the work of the governing Socialist Party, which failed on a 115-110 vote with four abstentions.

Euthanasia — when a doctor kills patients at their request — is legal in Belgium, Canada, Colombia, Luxembourg and the Netherlands.

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## Trump lifts language of accusers in Mueller tweet

WASHINGTON — In language that echoed that of his accusers and critics, President Donald Trump alleged on Twitter that special counsel Robert Mueller's investigative team was "MEDDLING" in the upcoming mid-term elections and blamed Democrats for "Collusion."

The tweet Tuesday was the latest example of the president co-opting the terminology of his accusers in an effort to tarnish political enemies.

It came as Mueller investigates allegations of Russian meddling in the 2016 presidential election and whether any Trump campaign aides colluded with the Kremlin to tip the outcome in the Republican candidate's favor. So far, four Trump associates have been charged in Mueller's investigation, and three — including former White House national security adviser Michael Flynn — have pleaded guilty.

Trump has repeatedly referred to Mueller's team as "13 angry Democrats," although Mueller is a Republican. Mueller was appointed by Trump's deputy attorney general, Rod Rosenstein, and before that was named FBI director in 2001 by Republican President George W. Bush.

On Tuesday, Trump tweeted: "The 13 Angry Democrats (plus people who worked 8 years for Obama) working on the rigged Russia Witch Hunt, will be MEDDLING with the mid-term elections, especially now that Republicans (stay tough!) are taking the lead in Polls. There was no Collusion, except by the Democrats."

The tweet appeared to be a reference to the fact that multiple lawyers on Mueller's team, before signing on for the assignment, contributed money to Democratic candidates, including Hillary Clinton, Trump's Democratic opponent in the presidential election. The Justice Department is barred from discriminating

against employees or applicants on the basis of political affiliation.

Later Tuesday morning, Trump appeared to be taking guidance from some of his advisers and supporters to heart, saying he needed to focus more of his attention on issues important to Americans and less on the Russia investigation.

"Sorry, I've got to start focusing my energy on North Korea Nuclear, bad Trade Deals, VA Choice, the Economy, rebuilding the Military, and so much more, and not on the Rigged Russia Witch Hunt that should be investigating Clinton/Russia/FBI/Justice/Obama/Comey/Lynch etc.," he tweeted.

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

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
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# Trump, critics trade angry immigration charges

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump and Democratic critics traded outraged, sometimes plainly false accusations about immigration Tuesday as the debate over

“lost” children and the practice of separating families caught crossing the border illegally reached a new boiling point.

False charges flew on both sides. The White House wrongly blamed Democrats for forcing his administration to

separate children from parents. Liberal activists tried to highlight the issue by tweeting photos of young people in steel cages that actually were taken during the Obama administration. Others seized on reports the government had “lost” more than 1,000 children, though that wasn’t quite the case.

It all comes just in time for the midterm elections as Republicans and Democrats try to rally core voters by pointing fingers at one another. Trump won the presidency promising to build a wall along the southern border and end illegal immigration, and the White House believes stressing the same issues will drive voters to the polls and help the GOP hang on to their majorities in the Senate and House.

The White House is “really beating the immigration drum in the lead-up to the midterm elections as a rallying cry and as a way of mobilizing voter support for Trump and the candidates that he chooses,” said Doris Meissner, a senior fellow at the non-partisan Migration Policy Institute and former commissioner of the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service during the Clinton administration. “It does seem to provoke a ratcheting up across the board.”

Indeed, the situation grew so hostile over the holiday weekend that the president’s eldest daughter, White House adviser Ivanka Trump, came under fire for tweeting a photo of herself and her youngest son in their pajamas Sunday morning. “Focus on what is

before you, on what you can control and ignore the trolls!” she later wrote.

During a White House conference call on Tuesday, senior adviser Stephen Miller contended the “the current immigration and border crisis” is “the exclusive product of loopholes in federal immigration law that Democrats refuse to close.”

That was after Trump lit up social media over the weekend by falsely claiming there was a “horrible law” that separates children from their parents after they cross the border illegally. He had said previously that “we have to break up families” at the border because “the Democrats gave us that law.”

But there’s no law mandating that parents must be separated from their children, and it’s not

a policy Democrats have pushed or can change alone as the minority in Congress. The tactic’s increased use is being driven by Trump’s own administration, which recently announced a new “zero-tolerance policy” in which it will press criminal charges against all people crossing the border illegally, even if they have few or no previous offenses. More children are expected to be separated from their parents as a result.

A Customs and Border Protection official told lawmakers last week that 658 children had been separated from their parents at the border from May 6 to May 19 as the parents face charges. That’s in addition to hundreds more who were estimated to have been removed from their parents since October.



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

letter to Kim that stressed American military might, but also left the door cracked for future communication. White House officials characterized the letter as a negotiating tactic, designed to bring the North back to the table after a provocative statement and a decision to skip planning talks and ignore preparatory phone calls.

But aides almost immediately suggested the meeting could still get back on track. And after a suitably conciliatory statement from North Korea, Trump said the same.

White House press

secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders said that since the letter, "the North Koreans have been engaging" with the U.S.

Trump views the meeting as a legacy-defining opportunity to make the nuclear deal that has evaded others, but he pledged to walk away from the meeting if he believed the North wasn't serious about discussing dismantling its nuclear program.

U.S. officials cast the on-again, off-again drama as in keeping with Trump's deal-making style, and reflective of the technically still-warring leaders testing each other. In his book "The Art of the Deal," Trump wrote: "The worst thing you can possibly do in a deal is seem desperate to make it. That makes the

other guy smell blood, and then you're dead. The best thing you can do is deal from strength, and leverage is the biggest strength you can have."

After the North's combative statements, there was debate inside the Trump administration about whether it marked a real turn to belligerence or a feint to see how far Kim could push the U.S. in the leadup to the talks.

Trump had mused that Kim's "attitude" had changed after the North Korean's surprise visit to China two weeks ago, suggesting China was pushing Kim away from the table. Trump's letter, the aides said, was designed to pressure the North on the international stage for appearing to have cold feet.

Bayer selling \$9B in ag  
ahead of Monsanto merger

German pharmaceutical giant Bayer AG has agreed to the U.S. government's demand that it sell about \$9 billion in agriculture businesses as the condition for acquiring Monsanto Co., a U.S. seed and weed-killer maker.

Antitrust regulators at the Justice Department say it's the biggest divestiture ever required for a merger.

The regulators say they directed Bayer to divest assets such as vegetable oils, seeds and seed treatments to ensure fair competition and prevent price spikes after the massive agriculture business deal goes through. The assets will be sold to BASF, a German chemical company.

# No freebies, please

**Analysis: North Korea sees US economic handouts as threat**

TOKYO — The U.S.-North Korea summit appears to be back on track, but Pyongyang is showing increased impatience at comments coming out of Washington that what leader Kim Jong Un really wants, even more than his nuclear security blanket, is American-style prosperity.

It's a core issue for Kim and a message President Donald Trump shouldn't ignore as they work to nail down their summit next month in Singapore.

Kim is as enthusiastic as Trump to see the summit happen as soon as possible, but the claim that his sudden switch to diplomacy over the past

several months shows he is aching for U.S. economic aid and private-sector know-how presents a major problem for the North Korean leader, who can't be seen as going into the summit with his hat in his hand.

The claim is also quite possibly off target.

North Korea is far more interested in improving trade with China, its economic lifeline, and with South Korea, which it sees as a potential gold mine for tourism and large-scale joint projects. Getting the U.S. to back off sanctions so he can pursue those goals, along with the boost to his legitimacy and whatever security guarantees he can take home, is more likely foremost on Kim's mind.

Even so, the North's perceived thirst for U.S. economic aid has consistently been the message coming from Trump and his senior officials. All

Kim needs to do, they suggest, is commit to denuclearization and American entrepreneurs will be ready to unleash their miracles on the country's sad-sack economy.

"I truly believe North Korea has brilliant potential and will be a great economic and financial nation one day," Trump tweeted Sunday. "Kim Jong Un agrees with me on this."

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo has laid Washington's road map out in more detail.

"We can create conditions for real economic prosperity for the North Korean people that will rival that of the South," he said earlier this month in a televised interview. "It won't be U.S. taxpayers. It will be American know-how, knowledge, entrepreneurs and risk-takers working alongside the North Korean people to

create a robust economy for their people."

Pompeo suggested that Americans help build out the North's energy grid, develop its infrastructure and deliver the finest agricultural equipment and technology "so they can eat meat and have healthy lives."

Kim has emphatically not agreed to any of that.

Under Trump's "maximum pressure" policy, international sanctions on North Korea are stronger than ever. Sanctions

relief would open the door for more trade with China, South Korea and possibly Russia — partners North Korea trusts more than it trusts Washington — and potentially unlock access to global financial institutions.

The last thing Kim wants is to give up his nuclear weapons only to have his country overrun with American businessmen and entrepreneurs.

To Pyongyang's ears, that scenario is less an offer than a threat.

### Responsible investing, clean companies and John Prine

**S**ocially responsible investing" is a phrase garnering lots of attention in the financial world. Some investors exhibit great concern over the type of companies in which their money is invested some do not.

Let's say you're an investor who prefers not to place your capital in oil and gas companies or in MLP's that transport oil or gas, because you are committed to the renewable energy movement. Or perhaps you choose not to invest in companies that produce tobacco or alcohol because you don't want to support industries that you believe produce harmful products. Your concerns are completely understandable.

Most folks can quickly decide for themselves if tobacco or alcohol-related investments are in their moral wheelhouse.

More often than not, investors who eschew ownership of these companies have some personal connection to the negative side effects produced by these types of products.

But what about companies that make soft drinks and junk food? If a company knows their products aren't healthy yet keeps producing them, is that company socially irresponsible? What about household goods companies that produce unnecessarily thick plastic containers for purely aesthetic

reasons? Are media companies behaving in a socially irresponsible way when they repeatedly produce violent movies? If they produce a family-friendly movie for every violent one, does that make it more acceptable?

Like everything else in life, it's complicated.

Take a company that checks almost all your social boxes.

They donate generously to causes you support they pay their employees a living wage even though others in their industry might not; they recycle everything they can and take active measures to reduce their environmental footprint and they genuinely try to do the right thing based on your definition of "the right thing." But what if they are extremely aggressive about avoiding taxes legally? They aren't breaking the law, but does pushing the tax boundary to the very limit of legality fit in your definition of being "good"? Head hurt yet?

Here's my take. I admire people who want to support ethical companies. Voting with your pocketbook is one of the truest forms of activism and those interested in a particular cause would naturally like to align their investments with their beliefs if possible. But for the average investor who just wants to enjoy a nice retirement, trying to only invest in companies you agree with socially, environmentally and politically is almost a full-time job.

Isolating companies that are good investments is a challenge. Finding ones that are socially responsible is difficult as well. Doing both sometimes can be impossible.

## Threat from China's navy growing

America's Navy, founded on Oct. 13, 1775, has always had a special relationship with Rhode Island. In December 1775, it commissioned the sloop Providence, and the colony's own Esek Hopkins became the Navy's first commander-in-chief on Jan. 5, 1776.

From these humble beginnings, the U.S. Navy has expanded to become the world's most powerful. In April, some 325,673 Americans were on active naval duty, and 98,481 on ready reserve.

But America's dominance is now being seriously challenged by communist China, which is using our own money — through our repayment of massive loans on the national debt — to help dramatically grow its navy.

While the U.S. has 283 deployable battle force ships at present, for example, China's People's Liberation Army Navy is expected to have 415 combat ships by 2030.

Rhode Island's J. William Middendorf, a former secretary of the Navy, provided some chilling context on these pages last year ("America faces grim peril in the seas," Commentary, April 7, 2017). "The rising capabilities of China's navy and related air assets have been underestimated," he warned. China has been building "new and larger surface units, including destroyers that are roughly comparable to the American Arleigh Burke-class and frigates and corvettes better suited to fight at sea than the American Littoral Combat Ship (LCS)."

Mr. Middendorf sees a particularly troubling threat in China's missile and anti-missile programs. The DF-21D mobile ballistic missile, "when fully developed, could be capable of destroying decks of a U.S. super carrier at a distance of up to 1,000 miles," he noted. Meanwhile, the WU-14 hypersonic glide vehicle could "from 60 miles above the earth ... release a precision-guided, supersonic missile and against which there is no present defense."

Recently, China's navy reportedly launched anti-ship cruise missiles, as well as surface-to-air missiles, on the Spratly Islands near the Philippines. This has been a disputed territory for some years, and it's the first time the Chinese have ever done something like this.

Hence, as its sea power gets stronger and more advanced, China is becoming more defiant. These developments could be highly problematic when it comes to control of the Pacific. While the U.S. has been able to protect and promote free sea trade for all countries since the end of World War II, China seems bent on controlling important sea lanes.

Seth Cropsey, director of the Hudson Institute's Center for American Seapower, noted in The Wall Street Journal on May 15 "the histories of Athens, Venice, Spain, Holland and England show that losing control of the oceans leads ineluctably to losing great-power status."

Few Americans would want this country, as the bastion of freedom and the champion of economic growth throughout the world, to join this list.

There is an Old Russian fable that fits the Democrat Play Book to a "T."



## Long nightmare of the Dreamers

A lot has happened in America since April 25, 2001 — the 9/11 attacks, two major wars, the Great Recession, the first black president, the iPhone, a Cubs World Series title and Donald Trump. That was the day the Dream Act, to protect young immigrants brought here illegally as children, was first introduced in Congress. Seventeen years later, they still are waiting for protection.

The fate of those immigrants, known as Dreamers, is stark evidence of the mind-numbing irrationality and dysfunction of our system of government. They did nothing wrong; they have contributed to American society; and they can be accommodated without harmful side effects.

The great majority of Americans reject this treatment. A January ABC News/Washington Post poll found that when asked if they supported a "program that allows undocumented immigrants to stay in the United States if they arrived here as a child, completed high school or military service and have not been convicted of a serious

crime," a staggering 87 percent of Americans said yes.

In 2012, Obama finally elected to shield many of these young people with an executive order called Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA). Some 800,000 immigrants who qualified got permits to stay here and work. But the program was of uncertain legality, and Donald Trump decided last year to end it.

DACA is now in the hands of the federal courts. It is also in the hands of Congress, which could approve the Dream Act in some form. But despite broad public sentiment for letting the Dreamers stay, nothing has been enacted and nothing is likely to be.

In closing down the program, Attorney General Jeff Sessions said DACA has "denied jobs to hundreds of thousands of Americans by allowing those same illegal aliens to take those jobs."

This is a hard argument to make at a time when the unemployment rate is 3.9 percent, the lowest since 2000. As economists universally agree, immigrants (documented or not) not only fill jobs but create them. Since Obama announced the program, the economy has added more than 12 million jobs.

Trump, whose understanding of the policy is close to nil, recently claimed "caravans" of Central Americans marching through Mexico to cross the border were "trying to

take advantage of DACA." But DACA applied only to youngsters who arrived by June 2007. Even the Dream Act would cover only people who came at least four years before its enactment.

Critics regard any accommodation as "amnesty," the term used for the legal status offered to some 3 million unauthorized foreigners in legislation signed by Ronald Reagan in 1986. Granting refuge to the dreamers, we are told, would stimulate unauthorized immigration by rewarding those who violated the law.

This is wrong for two main reasons. The first is that the foreigners it helps didn't choose to break the law: They were brought by their parents. Some grew up thinking they were citizens.

To banish them to unfamiliar foreign countries would punish them for the transgressions of their parents. Those known to be dangerous would not be eligible.

The second fallacy is the notion the Dream Act would be a magnet pulling in hordes of undocumented migrants. The potential beneficiaries have waited 17 years for a law offering them protection. If it were passed, the typical recipient would have to wait another 13 years to apply for citizenship.

In response, The Weather Channel responded in an email: "As with all storms, The Weather Channel is committed to delivering the most up-to-date, data-driven information available, and Alberto was no exception. It is our duty to deliver accurate weather information to prepare the public to lead safe and successful days."

But, Bishop asked: "How many times can they cry wolf over these subtropical storms?"

Bishop also took issue with the "state of emergency" declared by the Gov. Rick Scott over a subtropical depression. "We didn't get 2 inches of rain," he said.

Julie Hilton, whose family owns five local hotels including the Holiday Inn Resort, agreed media warnings chased people away.

"This was the kick-off to our high season," she said. "We were going to be full this week, all this week."

"I'm surprised at all the national media carriers that were here. Several of them were staying at our

hotels. I know ABC News was behind the Holiday Inn Express. They were broadcasting from the beach on Sunday night. They went down to the beach and broadcast the national news story from there."

Despite their hefty presence, Hilton said she doesn't think an accurate picture of the weather system was portrayed.

County Commissioner Philip "Griff" Griffiths, whose family owned several hotels on the beach for decades before recently selling their properties, said the national media and The Weather Channel love to hype the weather stories.

"The highest gust we had was 50 miles per hour," he said. "It is a little bit of 'cry wolf' syndrome. You don't want people to not pay attention, but you also don't want to run off (visitors). It could have been a perfectly good weekend. It was fine — hit and miss showers."

Subtropical Storm Alberto made landfall in Laguna Beach about 4 p.m. Monday. Besides some downed trees in The Cove and scattered power outages throughout the Panhandle, little damage — and no major flooding — was reported from Alberto.

A Gulf Power press release stated crews restored power within 12 hours to 11,719 of Gulf Power's 460,000 customers who lost power during Alberto, with the majority of outages in Bay, Okaloosa and Walton counties.

"We were closely monitoring every movement of the storm, and as soon as we knew it was likely to make landfall near Panama City, Gulf Power crews and equipment were positioned in advance to respond quickly to the hardest-hit areas," Kimberly Blair, Gulf Power spokeswoman, said in a statement.

Mark Bowen, chief of emergency services for Bay County, said the county was fortunate in this weather event as dry air infiltrated the subtropical system, limiting the rain.

"We were just in a good spot because so much of the weather was displaced from the center," Bowen said. "It certainly could have been a whole lot worse."

Bowen said the local media did a better job of accurately covering the weather system than national news organizations.

"I think nationally those guys have got

stockholders to take care of, because it's all about the ratings," he said.

The one upside, according to Sale, was the weather system provided a good trial run for preparation for a hurricane.

"It also helped to put

hurricane season in the forefront of the public's mind," she said. "While this storm wound up being a big nothing for us, it did help sort of highlight the message of preparation that sometimes people ignore until a storm

actually happens." Since May 21 Bay County has signed up 3,174 contacts for Alert Bay, the county's emergency alert system that sends warnings and advisories via text message, according to Sale.

## DIB making changes to monthly event

PANAMA CITY — The Historic Downtown Block Party seemed to be on the verge of becoming history at Tuesday's Downtown Improvement Board (DIB) meeting after the last two events lost money.

For the past two years, the DIB has been struggling to come up with a new formula for monthly events after deciding to cancel Friday Fest because of complaints. The board at first tried to rebrand the more "music-focused" Heard it on Harrison on Friday nights, but this year decided to ditch that event to create the Historic Downtown Block Party, a full-day event on the third Saturday of the month.

The thought was a longer event would bring more families and create more chances to turn a profit.

Instead, the March event wasn't held because police weren't available to staff it and the April event was rained out and cost the DIB about \$3,000. In addition, the weather at May's event was so hot and attendance so low that plans had to be changed at the last minute and the event cost the DIB about \$400, though a final loss isn't yet available, according to DIB director Daric Freeman.

In addition, one business owner in the audience, Greg Snow of Little Mustard Seed, said having the streets closed all day on a Saturday hurt his business, especially since many of his customers didn't know what was happening.

"I don't think a lot of people

knew about it," Snow said.

Looking at the results, Freeman suggested the board change directions and shorten the event to just the evening hours.

"I'm not excited about spending money we don't have just for the sake of spending money," Freeman said. "I'm not excited about trying to pull off an all-day event, that's for sure. I would really advise if we are going to continue doing every events we shrink down just to the evening."

The board unanimously wanted to change direction — as DIB Chairman Nick Beninate said, "The whole idea of doing an all-day event in Florida is very challenging; it's hard to get people to come out in the sun. It's hard to get

## Racial incident investigated at Mosley

Local organizations say this is latest in racially charged behavior in Bay County

LYNN HAVEN — A potentially racially-motivated incident at Mosley High School last week has one parent angry and local organizations calling for action after a classmate placed a prop noose around an African-American student's neck during class.

The incident happened last Monday, when Dercia Goffigan said her daughter was in drama class. Her daughter and two classmates were in the prop closet when they found a mannequin head hanging by a noose purchased as a prop for the play "The Crucible." According to a statement by Bay District Schools, one of the classmates picked up the noose and threw it at Goffigan's daughter and she asked them to stop. The student then picked up the noose and put it around Goffigan's daughter's neck.

According to the district,

the student apologized at the time of the incident, but when Goffigan heard about what happened, she went to speak to administration officials, who launched an investigation into the incident.

"I was in tears," Goffigan said, thinking about what happened to her daughter.

Goffigan said she was contacted by the local branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), who held a press conference Tuesday about the incident. Goffigan said she was not at the press conference because she wasn't told about it in advance, but was able to listen in on speakerphone.

At the press conference, Dr. Rev. Rufus Wood, president of the Bay County chapter of the NAACP, said the incident at Mosley was just the latest act of racially-charged behavior he and others have seen in the community. The noose, he said, is one of the most visually powerful images directed at African-Americans, harkening back to the days of lynching and symbolizing racial intimidation

the dent." The deputy spots the same thing near the vehicle's door hinge.

The deputy then notes that next door there is a parked green car facing the other direction. He also notes it has damage and "dark paint transfer to the vehicle's back right passenger-side bumper that matches the size of the damage to the victim's car."

"I asked him if he knew who the vehicle belonged to in which he stated '(the woman) who lives right next to me.'"

The deputy contacts that woman, who says the vehicle is hers.

"I asked her if she could explain the damage to her back right side passenger bumper, which she stated she 'backed into that Jeep,'

and pointed to the victim's Jeep," the deputy wrote. "She stated she was backing out of her parking spot in the parking lot, when she heard a loud 'boom' sound."

That was enough to cause the woman to get out of her vehicle and see the damage she had caused, but not enough for her to call police or leave any identifying information at the scene before leaving.

When asked why she didn't call police, "she stated, 'I didn't know who's Jeep it was.'"

The woman is charged with failing to leave identifying information at a wreck.

## BOB BORICH

1932 – 2018

"Most of the time I accepted opportunities but regretted the times I did not."

Robert Allan "Bob" Borich of Panama City Beach, Florida, and Chicago, Illinois, died suddenly of heart failure on May 23, 2018, a few days before his 86th birthday. Bob's neighbors and associates knew him as a devoted jazz, opera, and sports fan, a skilled communicator, and an inventive arts programmer. He was also a fine writer, a talented photographer, and a beloved high school English and journalism teacher whose students still speak of his presence and influence decades after sitting in his classroom. An avid sailor, ardent golfer, and aficionado of jazz and cocktails, he loved nothing more than good theater, good music, a good meal, and good nights eating charbroiled oysters at Dragos, followed by live music at Snug Harbor in New Orleans, Bob's favorite city after his sweet home Chicago. His close friends and family knew him as a vigilant defender of civil liberties and social justice, an intelligent and funny conversationalist and storyteller, an enthusiastically supportive father and grandfather, a loving husband, and a compassionate and deeply ethical man.

Born in Chicago in 1932, Bob attended St. Felicitas Elementary School on Chicago's Far South Side and in 1950 graduated from Hirsch Metropolitan High School. He attended



Chicago City Junior College-Wilson Branch as a pre-journalism student and served as president of the Letterman's Club and starting player on the college's 1952 state championship football team. It was at Wilson that he met his wife, Joan, a math major and team cheerleader. He finished his undergraduate education at Eastern Illinois University as an English and journalism major. While at Eastern, he served as editor of the Eastern State News, the university newspaper, and lettered two seasons in football.

Bob and Joan married in Chicago in 1956 and soon after he was drafted in the U.S. Army, where he served two years at Fort Huachuca, Arizona. He was joined by Joan, who taught elementary school mathematics at the Post school. After discharge from the service, he enrolled at the University of Illinois School of Communications, where he earned an MS degree in journalism with a thesis on community newspapering.

He began his professional career as a high school teacher at Rich East in suburban Chicago where

he taught English and journalism and served as adviser to the Reveiller, an award-winning student newspaper. He interrupted his teaching career in 1970 to gain practical experience as a reporter and feature writer for The Beloit Daily News, a daily newspaper. He returned to Rich East a year later, dividing his time as a classroom teacher and school district public information officer, as well as serving for several years as an officer in the Illinois School Public Relations Association.

Upon retiring from the Rich Township High School District, he started EdCom, his own public relations consulting firm. After five years in the consulting business, he and Joan moved to Bay Point in Panama City Beach, Florida, where he was able to pursue his passion for sailing, golfing, state park beach walking, and gardening. During his 25-plus years living in Bay Point, he was an active member of the Men's Golf Association. His wider community service included 17 years with the Gulf Jazz Society, including a 10-year stint as volunteer executive director, where he was a prime mover in creating and sustaining the annual Jazz-By-The-Bay festival. He also served for more than 10 years as an officer in the Panama City Music Association and five years as its program chairman, responsible for mounting the music association's annual performance series at the Marina Civic Center.



Bob and Joan have been long-time members of Panama City's St. John the Evangelist Catholic Church. Bob was preceded in death by his father, Peter Borich; and mother, Ethel Haase; and is survived by Joan, wife of 62 years; and their beloved dog Fog; as well as siblings, Beverly Coccato and Gary Borich; and his three children and their mates, Barrie Borich and her spouse Linnea Stenson of Chicago, Illinois, Peter Borich and his spouse Carrie May-Borich of Urbana, Illinois, and Bobby Borich and his spouse Itsuko Miyoshi of Redondo Beach, California. 

people to come out in the rain.” — but there was disagreement about how much of a change was necessary.

Board members Liane Harding and Sarah O’Brennan thought the DIB should drop the monthly events to focus more time and energy on encouraging redevelopment, beautification efforts and supporting

other groups trying to hold such events as the Downtown Business Alliance.

But the three other members in attendance didn’t want to give up so soon and made a motion to hold the June 16 event, which will be “All Things Dad” themed, from 6-9 p.m. and then assess if the event should continue after that.

“I would hate to say after two to throw in the towel,” said board member Pam Armstrong.

There was a short and

ultimately unresolved discussion about whether canceling the monthly events would alter Freeman’s salary, who was offered \$10,000 more than previous directors because he owns a sound equipment company the DIB would be able to use for events.

One possibility, Beninate said, was that Freeman would set up his equipment for other groups in downtown, but all of this would hinge on whether the DIB stops throwing monthly events.

# Alberto remnants leave flooding, downed trees

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — The soggy remnants of Alberto moved toward the nation’s interior Tuesday, leaving scattered flooding and downed trees in the wake of the year’s first named tropical storm.

More than 25,000 power outages were reported in Alabama, many caused by trees rooted in soggy soil falling across utility lines.

But while forecasters said the subtropical depression could dump as much as 6 inches of rain inland, few major problems were reported so far.

“We’ve had a lot of rain, but we got lucky. It was a constant rain but not a heavy rain,” said Regina Myers, emergency management director in Walker County northwest of Birmingham.

Subtropical storm Alberto rolled ashore Monday afternoon in the Florida Panhandle and then weakened overnight to a depression. Beachcombers had returned to the white sands of the Northern Gulf by Tuesday morning, but forecasters still warned of dangerous currents.

In Cuba, flooding damaged an oil refinery and caused crude oil to spill into Cienfuegos Bay as

the remnants of Alberto continued to drench the island in heavy rain.

State-owned TV showed authorities using barriers Tuesday to try to contain the spill from the Cienfuegos refinery in central Cuba about 150 miles southeast of Havana.

U.S. forecasters said rain could still cause dangerous flash floods in the coming days in northern Alabama and large areas of Georgia, Tennessee and the Carolinas.

In North Carolina, a television news anchor and a photojournalist were killed Monday while covering the weather, when a tree became uprooted from rain-soaked ground and toppled onto their SUV, authorities said.

Greenville, South Carolina, said news anchor Mike McCormick and photojournalist Aaron Smeltzer were killed.

“Two journalists working to keep the public informed about this storm have tragically lost their lives, and we mourn with their families, friends and colleagues,” North Carolina Gov. Roy Cooper said in a statement.

Alberto was more of a rainstorm than a wind threat, but the National Weather Service said at least one tornado had been confirmed.

The weather service said its meteorologists confirmed a weak tornado with maximum winds of 85 mph hit an area around Cameron, South Carolina, on Monday afternoon. No one was hurt.

and violence.

"It was no joke," he said. "It was no prank. Issues of this matter are serious."

Dr. Russell A. Wright Sr., with the Bay County Inter-denominational Ministerial Alliance, said they were not publicizing the incident to further divide the community, as the community is already divided between racial lines.

"Racism is not a learned behavior," he said. "It is taught. This was a taught behavior."

Representatives from the Council on American-Islamic Relations, National Organization of Women, Student Advocacy Center, Bay County Democratic Black Caucus and Panama City City Commissioner Ken Brown were present at the conference and expressed their support for the family, asking the administration to follow their "zero tolerance

policy." These groups also said they would support the family if it sought legal action.

Bay District Schools Director of Communication Sharon Michalik said the Mosley administration investigated the matter thoroughly last week, interviewing students, gathering information and viewing all relevant photos taken at the time. She said one of the students involved was "given the appropriate consequences" as outlined in the district's discipline matrix, but because of privacy

reasons she could not say what those consequences were.

"However, it is with total confidence that we can say that the outcome was in line with the district's discipline matrix," Michalik said.

Goffigan said this incident was just the latest in a series of racial incidents her daughter had experienced as Mosley, though she never brought the issue to administrators. She said students complain about racial slurs said to them by other students or written on restroom walls.

"Something has to change," Goffigan said. "The kids are desensitized."

To address the issue of graffiti, Michalik said Mosley will hire a part-time employee whose sole responsibility is checking restrooms throughout the day to keep them stocked with supplies and remove any graffiti immediately.

"Any student who experiences a racial slur, whether delivered verbally or in writing on a bathroom wall, is encouraged to come to administration immediately," she said. "Racial intolerance, discrimination and harassment is not tolerated on any of our campuses."

She added that Mosley staff will work to better monitor unsupervised areas of campus, such as prop rooms, to make sure students don't have access to them. She said administrators will work to have more open communication with students regarding inappropriate behavior and they will incorporate cultural awareness training for incoming freshmen.

## Middle finger points toward arrest

The deputy orders the

driver to get out of the car "with his hands up and facing away from me. Instead the driver exited the vehicle, placed his hands and on the roof of the vehicle and looked at me dumbfounded," the deputy wrote.

"I shouted numerous times for the driver to put his hands up and face away from me before he finally did remove his hands from the roof and placed them in the air."

The passenger is charged with resisting arrest without violence.

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

## Woods has come a long way from Memorial Day arrest

DUBLIN, Ohio  
Tiger Woods has made plenty of progress in his return to golf, especially in the last three months. Starting with the Honda Classic, 19 of his 24 rounds have been at par or better. Four of the last six times on Sunday, he has gone into the final round with at least a remote hope of winning. At two tournaments, he was within one shot of the lead over the final three holes.

But that's not the best measure of progress.

Think back to a year ago this week.

Just over a month after he had back surgery for the fourth time, the image of Woods in a red shirt charging to victory was replaced by a mug shot from a Florida jail after his arrest on a DUI charge in the early morning hours of Memorial Day.

He had a white shirt and hollow eyes.

He had a problem with painkillers. A mixture of them were in his system after police found him

asleep behind the wheel of his car, which was parked awkwardly on the side of the road, the motor running and a blinker flashing.

The idea of Woods catching Jack Nicklaus and his 18 majors, or Sam Snead and his 82 career PGA Tour titles, was no longer part of the conversation. It was hard to imagine Woods even getting back to golf at that point.

That now seems like a long time ago, almost as if it never happened.

LAS VEGAS — Gerard Gallant and the Vegas Golden Knights still think Tom Wilson's third-period hit on Jonathan Marchessault in the Stanley Cup Final opener was too late and probably a bit dirty.

The coach also believes it sparked his team's comeback victory in that Game 1 thriller.

So while he wasn't happy to hear Wilson will face no discipline from the NHL, Gallant is hoping his team will remember the hit — and more importantly, how they played right after it — when

they attempt to take a 2-0 series lead on the Washington Capitals on Wednesday night on the Strip.

"The good thing about the hit is it really woke our team up," Gallant said after an optional practice at the Golden Knights' suburban training complex. "I think it was a 4-4 game?"

Indeed, two novice Stanley Cup finalists were deep into an entertainingly rambunctious opener, but the Knights took charge after that fateful collision left Marchessault sprawled on the ice. Vegas quickly got Tomas Nosek's go-ahead goal, eventually won 6-4 and surged one game

closer to an improbable championship.

The focused aggression necessary to be a successful postseason team is a delicate concoction. The Golden Knights and Caps both had it during the conference playoffs, but they both admit it got away from them in Game 1.

"I think both teams can be better," Washington coach Barry Trotz said. "It was a pretty sloppy game."

After one game to get used to the sky-high stakes of the last round of this tournament, both teams intend to channel their nervous

Jordan Hicks can't explain where the gas comes from. If he's being honest, the St. Louis Cardinals rookie flame-thrower doesn't really want to. Best not to overthink it.

Even the heir apparent to New York Yankees closer Aroldis Chapman as the hardest-throwing arm in the majors can't help but peek up after letting one rip.


"I like to see because I know

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## Warriors reach 4th straight Finals

HOUSTON — Stephen Curry and Golden State turned all those Houston bricks into a road back to the NBA Finals.

Needing not only all their firepower but also 27 straight misses by the Rockets during an epic cold streak from 3-point range, the Warriors rallied to keep alive their hopes for a repeat.

Kevin Durant scored 34 points, Curry sparked another third-quarter turnaround, and the Warriors earned a fourth straight trip to the NBA Finals by beating the Rockets 101-92 in Game 7 of the Western Conference finals on Monday night.

The defending champions trailed by as many as 15 in the first half after falling behind 17 in Game 6.

"We know we can make an 11-point lead evaporate with two minutes of good basketball," Klay Thompson said.

Curry, who finished with 27 points, scored 14 of Golden State's 33 points in the third quarter as Houston's shooting didn't just go cold, it froze. The Rockets missed all 14 3-point attempts in that quarter as part of a 1-for-21 second half from long range.

The Warriors will host LeBron James and the Cleveland Cavaliers in Game 1 on Thursday night in the fourth straight matchup between the teams.

James Harden had 32 points as the top-seeded Rockets' bid to return

to the finals for the first time since 1995 fell short without Chris Paul, who was nursing a hamstring injury.

"We just didn't have that extra juice that we needed," Harden said.

The Rockets fell apart in the second half again after doing so in Game 6. The Warriors outscored Houston 122-63 in the second half of the final two games.

"It's amazing how long the NBA game is," Warriors coach Steve Kerr said. "Forty-eight minutes, it lasts a long time and there's so many opportunities to get yourself going as a team. And with our team, there's just so much firepower, we're going to get going."

The Rockets finished 7 of 44 on 3-pointers, with Trevor Ariza missing all nine of his attempts, Eric Gordon going 2 for 12 and Harden making just 2 of 13.

Golden State led by seven entering the fourth and pushed the lead to 10 on a 3-pointer by Thompson with about

9 ½ minutes left. Clint Capela made a hook shot for Houston but Durant hit a long 3 seconds later to make it 86-75.

The Rockets were behind by 13 after a 3 by Curry and had missed 27 straight 3-pointers when P.J. Tucker hit one from the corner to cut the lead to 89-79 midway through the quarter.

It was their first 3-pointer since one by Gordon with about 6 ½ minutes left in the second quarter that put the Rockets up 42-28 during a woeful Warriors start.

"We were lucky to escape out of here," Kerr said.

Tucker's 3 was the first of seven straight points for Houston which cut the lead to 89-83.

But Durant scored six points in a 9-2 spurt after that which left the Warriors 97-85 with about three minutes to go.

Houston finally found a little offense after that, using a 7-2 run to cut it to 99-92, but their rally bid came up short.

## Knights outlast Caps in Final opener

LAS VEGAS — In a single nine-minute stretch of the third period, the Washington Capitals dramatically took the lead before the Vegas Golden Knights replied with two goals of their own. Washington's Tom Wilson also flattened Vegas forward Jonathan Marchessault with a blindside hit that could reverberate through the Stanley Cup Final.

After 10 goals and a Final-record four lead changes overall in a fantastically entertaining opener, it's tough to imagine what these unlikely opponents will do for an encore.

But the upstart Golden Knights have spent their entire inaugural season speeding past all expectations, and their first Final

game didn't slow them down in the slightest.

Tomas Nosek scored the tiebreaking goal midway through the third period, and the expansion Golden Knights surged past the Capitals for a 6-4 victory on Monday night.

"We put fun ahead of everything, and you can tell," said Ryan Reaves, who scored the Knights' tying goal in the third period. "Guys have are having fun and they're smiling."

The Eastern Conference champion Capitals hadn't given up this many goals in 29 games since March 18, but they hadn't seen anything like this charmed run by the upstart Knights. With its sellout crowd of hometown fans at deafening volume all night, Vegas put its usual speed and relentlessness on full

display while overcoming that third-period deficit to win the opener of a matchup between two franchises seeking their first Stanley Cup titles.

Marc-Andre Fleury made 24 saves in an occasionally shaky performance, but the three-time Stanley Cup winner's new teammates carried the goalie who has so often carried them with a relentless outburst of offense.

"We're a good defensive group, but we weren't tonight," Marchessault said. "They're a team that's very fast in the neutral zone, and we gave them too much respect with the puck. We need to be faster in the defensive zone. We're going to fix that in our game."

The Game 1 winner has won the last six Cups and 61 of 78 overall.

energy more constructively in the future. Both coaches stressed the importance of discipline, completing assignments and not allowing the frenetic Vegas crowd to overwhelm their emotions.

"There's obviously nerves," Washington's Jay Beagle said. "I'm not surprised at anything anymore, but in the Stanley Cup Final, usually it's 2-1 or 1-0, not (6-4). But you don't know what to expect from a team that you don't know that much. Now we've got to know them a little bit more."

The mistakes that worry coaches also lead to exciting hockey, and the opener was thoroughly entertaining even before Wilson lowered the boom on Marchessault. The teams combined for a Final-record four lead changes in the highest-scoring opener in eight years for this final

round.

Wilson, who served a three-game suspension in the second round for breaking the jaw of Pittsburgh's Zach Aston-Reese, and the Capitals still insist the hard-charging forward did nothing wrong when he leveled the Golden Knights' top playoff scorer.

"It's within the rules," Wilson said after practice at T-Mobile Arena. "It's a clean hit. I don't know why it got so much media attention, to be honest. It's a hard hit, but that's the day and age we're in. ... I'm trying to play my game. There's a lot of those hits that are going on, but it's the Stanley Cup Final, and it's within the rules."

The NHL Department of Player Safety agreed when it decided not to discipline Wilson for the shoulder-to-shoulder hit, clearly deciding that Wilson's timing wasn't extraordinarily late.

Marchessault went to the dressing room and was examined for a possible concussion, but returned

to the game. Gallant said the forward is feeling fine for Game 2.

The Capitals had their own complaint about Vegas forward David Perron, who jumped on the ice after the whistle and made contact with Washington captain Alex Ovechkin during the scuffles immediately after the hit.

Once the emotions died down, both teams realized they've got to check their more primal urges if they hope to play a solid game on the NHL's biggest stage. The atmosphere in Las Vegas for the city's first Final has been electric, but the Caps weren't intimidated by the frenzied crowd.

Washington goalie Braden Holtby said the biggest difference about playing in Vegas is "the bass they put in the building. Maybe that's a little false when ... you're literally shaking from the bass. That's the only difference. (Their) fans are loud. Our fans are loud. Tampa's, Pitt's, Columbus, all fans are loud."

### CHARLOTTE, N.C. Smith: NFL anthem policy makes Kaepernick villain

Panthers wide receiver Torrey Smith believes the NFL “dropped the ball” with its new policy that forbids players from sitting or taking a knee on the field during the national anthem.

Smith is upset because he feels like the ruling has created a “false narrative” surrounding the message former NFL teammate Colin Kaepernick was originally trying to convey while taking a knee prior to NFL games.

He said it also paints players as anti-American.

“Guys aren’t against the military,” Smith said. “Kap originally started that against police brutality. It was never against the military. It was never about the military, but that narrative changed.”

Smith, acquired in an offseason trade with the Eagles, denounced the league’s ruling following Carolina’s practice on Tuesday — its first since it was announced last week at the NFL owners meetings.

### CHICAGO Pulisic dropped from US roster; Yedlin, Wood added

Midfielder Christian Pulisic was among seven players dropped from the U.S. roster for exhibitions at Ireland and France, and 10 additions included defender DeAndre Yedlin, midfielder Tyler Adams and forward Bobby Wood.

Defender Walker Zimmerman, who scored the opening goal in Monday’s 3-0 win over Bolivia, also was cut along with goalkeeper Alex Bono, who got the shutout in his national team debut. Other cuts included goalkeeper Ethan Horvath, defender Matt Olosunde and midfielders Alejandro Guido and Lynden Gooch.

Goalkeepers Zack Steffen and William Yarbrough were added along with defenders Shaq Moore and Tim Parker and midfielders Luca de la Torre, Kenny Saief and Will Trapp.

De la Torre, Moore and Parker could make their national teams debuts.

### KIGALI, RWANDA Rwanda defends \$39M deal with Arsenal

Rwanda’s government on Tuesday defended its \$39 million sponsorship deal with the Arsenal football club as some aid donors and rights activists raised an outcry.


“Visit Rwanda” will be emblazoned on the left sleeve of players in Arsenal’s first, under-23 and women’s teams.

President Paul Kagame is an Arsenal supporter. The deal was not approved by Rwandan lawmakers.

Deputy Foreign Minister Olivier Nduhugirehe told The Associated Press that the money for the sponsorship deal came from tourism, which is the small East African country’s top foreign exchange earner.

“Donors’ aid is specific and well accounted for in Rwanda,” Nduhugirehe said in response to criticism from British lawmakers in UK media.

## Last team standing

### Why the Warriors will win the NBA Finals

If there is a glaring hole on Golden State’s championship resume, it’s that the Warriors have never gone back-to-back.

That will change.

The Warriors are about to win their second straight NBA championship and their third in the last four seasons — all of them coming at the expense of the Cleveland Cavaliers, who won’t have enough even if LeBron James plays to the absolute utmost of his capabilities. The Warriors have home-court advantage, and have three of the best four players who will appear in the series.

They’re just too good to lose.

If they were going to lose, it would have been in the Western Conference finals against the Houston Rockets. Houston was a team that was built for one purpose — beating the Warriors. And the Rockets might have done it, too, had Chris Paul’s hamstring not popped in the final seconds of Game 5 and forced him to the sideline for the rest of the series.

Golden State rallied in both Game 6 and Game 7, as Paul looked on helplessly. Yes, the Warriors caught a huge break. They won’t waste this chance.

The teams have changed mightily over the last four seasons. There were 20 players who appeared in first Cavaliers-Warriors game of the 2014-15 season — only eight of them will be in uniform during this series. Kevin Durant is in Golden State now, Kyrie Irving isn’t with the Cavaliers anymore, the benches are very different particularly in Cleveland’s case.

But the principals are still there: James, Stephen Curry, Klay Thompson, Draymond Green.

And over these four years since James returned to northeast Ohio, the Warriors are 17-9 against the Cavaliers. Golden State needed six games to beat Cleveland for the title in 2015, five games last season and if Andrew Bogut didn’t get hurt in Game 5 of the 2016 Finals the Warriors — who ended up blowing a 3-1 lead that year — probably would have won that series as well.

James might be playing the best basketball of his life. That’s why Cleveland is still in these playoffs.

Even he won’t be able to save the Cavs this time.

Cleveland looked like a team that couldn’t guard anyone in the regular season, and to its credit has greatly improved on that end of the court during this postseason.

But facing Golden State will be such a bigger challenge than Indiana, Toronto and Boston could provide. And if the Warriors get Andre Iguodala back, their spacing will be even better and put further demands on the Cavs.

The Cavs won’t have any pressure on their shoulders. The Warriors will have it all, but after Curry, Durant and Thompson found a way to rally from 15 points down in Houston to win a Game 7 on the road and capture the Western Conference, Golden State will come into this series brimming with confidence.

### Why the Cavaliers will win the NBA Finals

LeBron James has rescued the Cavaliers from a 3-1 deficit in the NBA Finals and just pulled them out of a 2-0 hole against Boston.

Neither such comeback had ever been accomplished, so James has stared down tough situations before.

Winning another championship now, leading this group of Cavaliers past a much mightier Golden State team, might even be a bigger challenge. Perhaps it’s simply too much to ask.

Except for the guy being asked.

James is playing at such an extraordinary level that anything is possible, including what would go down as one of the biggest upsets in NBA history.

“No matter what the story line is going to be, no matter if we’re picked to win or not, let’s just go out and play ball,” James said. “We’re going to have a great gameplan. We’re going to try to get better throughout the series, and we’ll see what happens.”

The Warriors are better, and few outside James’ native Ohio would bother to argue. Golden State is deeper, quicker, more potent offensively and much more reliable defensively. The Cavaliers only got one game off them in last year’s finals, and that Cleveland team, with Kyrie Irving, was better than this year’s version.

But none of their weaknesses have stopped the Cavaliers from pulling out two Game 7s in this postseason, or from stomping on a 59-win Toronto team in four straight games. They find a way to play well enough to keep the games in striking distance so James can will the Cavs across the finish line, and that will be the strategy again starting Thursday at Oracle Arena.

As Stephen Curry noted, the Cavaliers are more than just James. Tristan Thompson rarely showed up anywhere but the gossip pages for much of the season, but has regained his role as a rugged rebounder and defender in the postseason. If All-Star Kevin Love is cleared from his concussion in time to play, Cleveland can surround James with dangerous perimeter shooters such as himself, Kyle Korver, George Hill and JR Smith, forcing the Warriors to play James 1-on-1 — and possibly without one of their top defenders in Andre Iguodala if he can’t return from his leg injury.

Golden State won two of the three finals meetings and is heavily favored to take this one. But the one Cleveland got is perhaps King James’ crowning achievement, when the Cavaliers overcame that 3-1 deficit to beat the 73-win Warriors in Oakland in Game 7.

Another title now wouldn’t be far behind. It might require four games of around 34 points, nine rebounds and nine assists — about what James is averaging in 18 games this postseason. It’s hard to expect that level of anyone, but that’s what’s demanded of No. 23 in Cleveland.

## Way to go, Mom: Serena wins Slam return

PARIS — For all that has changed in the 16 months since Serena Williams last played in a Grand Slam tournament — she is now married and a mother — so much was familiar about her at the French Open on Tuesday.

The fashion statement, this time in the form of a black bodysuit with a red belt that she said made her feel like a “warrior princess.” The cries of “Come on!” The big serves that provided 13 aces. The returns that eventually produced three consecutive breaks of serve.

And, yes, the victory. Competing as a mom for the first time at a major, and only about nine months since giving birth to her daughter, Alexis Olympia, then dealing with postpartum complications, Williams edged 70th-ranked Kristyna Pliskova of the Czech Republic 7-6 (4), 6-4 at Roland Garros.

Already a transcendent sports star and cultural icon, Williams now carries a new title: working mother.

“Well, my priority is Olympia. No matter what, that’s my priority. I have given tennis so much, and tennis has actually given me a lot, and I couldn’t be more grateful,” Williams said. “She’s my priority, and I work everything around her.”

The 36-year-old American had not played in one of tennis’s biggest tournaments since winning the Australian Open in January 2017 for her 23rd Grand Slam title, breaking a tie with Steffi Graf for the most in the professional era.

Williams, the world found out later, was pregnant at the time. Her baby was born Sept. 1; Williams married Reddit co-founder Alexis Ohanian in November.

Williams eventually revealed that she had an emergency cesarean section, then encountered trouble breathing afterward because of a pulmonary embolism and needed a follow-up operation.

“Just literally not sure if I was going to make it or not at several different times,” Williams said. “A lot of people have really reached out, because they have so many similar stories, too. I feel like a lot of people don’t talk about it. They talk about the baby and how happy they are. But it’s a lot that goes into it with the pregnancy and with giving birth, and it’s called a ‘miracle’ for a reason.”

The first match of her comeback was in doubles alongside her older sister, Venus, for the U.S. Fed Cup team in February. She entered two tournaments in singles the next month, going 2-2. An absence of more than two months followed, until Tuesday in Paris.

Woods is playing again, and playing well enough to win. It could happen this week at the Memorial, a course on which he has won five times and has powerful memories. He was at Shinnecock Hills on Monday, gearing up for the U.S. Open in two weeks. It could happen there.

It could happen anywhere.

Nicklaus believes the next step for Woods is win again after a drought approaching five years, most of them interrupted by back pain. Nicklaus never went more than two years without a victory during his prime. He also never had a significant injury. In that respect, it's hard for him to relate.

“But he has got to get through the barrier of not having done it for a while,” Nicklaus said Tuesday. “When you haven't won, that always happens and that's human nature.

“I was afraid he was going to try and hit 112, but he came out and probably had his best outing,” Matheny said. “And it was under control, but it still wasn't holding back, but it was in the zone. Those are the things that we need. He can throw as hard as he wants to but control counts and have a purpose of why you're making a pitch and not to just 'wow' the watching world.”

Hicks is actually doing a little of both.

I would hate to have been through what he's been through, because he's been through a lot. But I think that he is a tough competitor, he's a hard worker, and he's still driven. So that's why I never counted him out.”

## ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

*"Fortunate people seldom mend their ways, for when good luck crowns their misdeeds with success, they think it is because they are right."*

Earlier this month, we talked about squeezes and how one might identify a deal where the aim was to bring pressure to bear on one or both opponents. The next step after determining that this might be relevant is to make sure you catch the opponents in the net.

In six no-trump after the lead of the heart 10, South can count 11 top tricks. He has a 12th trick if either spades or diamonds breaks 3-3. But there is one additional chance: if one opponent has length in both diamonds and spades.

It costs South nothing to prepare for this possibility. If either of those suits divides favorably, South will make his slam without breaking a sweat. But if neither suit breaks, simply cashing winners will not bring either defender under pressure.

Squeezes tend to work best when you have all the tricks you need but one; here, declarer has 11 tricks out of the 12 needed. So South must give up a trick (sometimes referred to as "rectifying the count") by the strange-looking move of ducking a heart — which could be at trick one or two.

South wins the return and takes his club and heart winners. On the last of these, West, who guards both spades and diamonds, must concede the slam-going trick by unguarding one suit or the other. All South has to do is watch the discards, and he is home.

If South had not given up the heart trick, West would have one extra winner in his hand. He would not be squeezed, and the slam would be unmakeable.

## FLASH IN THE PAN

# No ordinary omelet

Whipped egg whites, creamy yolks and a spinach nest make this meal unique

Recently at the farmers market, I scored spinach in many forms. A sack of baby spinach at one stand, sturdy and juicy tiny leaves that were painstakingly harvested from young plants. Elsewhere, I acquired a bundle of spinach plants, bunched together like at the supermarket but with no broken stems, ripped leaves or festering pieces of slime stuck between. I also got some beefy leaves from a crop that was seeded last fall and got an early start this spring.

Every leaf would go in service of an extra-puffy inside-out spinach omelet.

#### Puffy Inside-Out Spinach Omelet Souffle

- 2 eggs
- Fresh spinach, in bunches or bags
- Bacon, cheese, garlic, mushrooms, herbs, greens — stuff to fry for a filling
- 2 T butter (at least)
- 1/4 cup cream (or half-and-half or milk)
- 2 T olive oil (or more)
- Soy sauce (to taste)
- Salt, garlic powder, pepper, other spices

We begin by preparing the stuffing, which doubles as pan crusting, browned bits of goodness that stick to the outside of the omelet. This is the one spot in the recipe where I won't be micromanaging you, so now is your chance to get creative. Bacon, chopped into little pieces, is a classic thing to include here, as it contributes its wonderful fat. If I can get good stuff I use it. Otherwise, butter and mushrooms and some kind of cheese. I like cheese curds because they fry nicely, as do chunks of semi-hard cheese. Chèvre or similar soft goat cheese is amazing in this dish. If using soft cheese, it gets added later.

Fry the browned bits slowly, never burning, adding oil if necessary. Add chunks of garlic if you wish. It will sweeten if cooked slowly. When the browned bits of goodness are nearly done, consider adding greens here. I had some watercress, which added a nice spice to the filling. Another time I used



baby bok choy.

While that is going, work on the eggs. The fresher the eggs are, the better. Separate the yolks from the whites of two eggs, storing them in separate bowls. Don't let any yolk or water get into the whites. And if you wash your hands after separating the eggs, make sure they are very dry before proceeding. Using an egg-beater or similar tool beat the whites until they are stiff, with no liquid whites in the bowl. Pour cream into the yolks and beat them with a fork until fully combined. Put both egg bowls in the fridge until it's time for the magic.

When the pan goodies are done, add a little soy sauce and garlic powder, and stir it around to mix and absorb. Remove half from the pan and set aside. Spread around the portion that remains in the pan so it's evenly dispersed. Add butter or oil if the pan isn't very oily, then begin arranging the spinach leaves. All of the stems should be parallel, with about half of the leaf tips facing one direction, and half the other. Those stems will be like rings around the rolled omelet, holding it together. Atop that matrix you can toss in more leaves haphazardly, filling in any gaps, covering pan and crustings.

Set the heat on low-ish, and remove the egg bowls. Using a spoon or rubber spatula, gently fold the egg yolk into the stiff whites. Don't mix completely. Leave areas of pure white, and let the yolks run around and gather at the bottom a little.

Carefully spoon the egg mixture onto the

spinach, in a line across the middle of the pan, directly perpendicular to the orientation of the stems. The runny yolk will find its way through the cracks between the leaves and grab onto the pan crustings.

Carefully arrange the goodies in the middle, letting them sink into the eggs. Now is the time to add soft cheese if using, also atop the egg foam.

As it heats it will puff, and soon will get so big you will wonder how to wrangle it. Two spatulas is the way to go. Let it cook about five minutes, during which the spinach will steam the egg from the bottom. Go around the pan with a knife to loosen any egg on the side, and slide a spatula under the omelet to free it from the pan. Grab the other spatula and use them both on the side of the omelet closest to you, folding it in half over the egg. As you try to lift from under with the spatulas it will try to slide away from you. Keep it up, gently, until it hits the side of the pan and is trapped. Turn off the heat and let it sit there, puffy, and serve.

If you suspect the egg is underdone, add 1/4 cup water to the pan and cook with the lid on until the water steams off.

Serve it with coffee and some hot sauce.

## IN THE KITCHEN

### Dried beans a starting point for super meal

Dried beans might seem too homey for some people, but our family likes them. They are inexpensive, feed a lot of people and are easy to make.

My preference is large butterbeans. Others in the family like pintos and black-eyed peas. Not many enjoy navy beans or northern beans, yet we eat those, too.

When we have dried beans of any kind, all we need to make it a super meal is some homemade

cornbread, freshly sliced tomatoes and a generous slice of Vidalia onion.

#### Red Beans and Rice

- 1 lb. dried small red beans
- 4 qts. water
- 1/2 cups butter
- 3/4 cup chopped onion
- 3/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 3/4 cup chopped celery
- 2 teaspoons minced garlic
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 teaspoons salt or to taste
- 2 teaspoons Hungarian paprika
- 1 teaspoon dried whole thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon ground red pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon dried whole oregano
- 1 lb. smoked Polish sausage, cut in 1-inch pieces

- 1/2 cup finely chopped fresh parsley
- Oven Rice

Sort and wash beans. Place in 6-quart Dutch oven. Cover with water 2 inches above beans; let soak overnight. Drain beans. Add 4 quarts water. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat to medium; cook uncovered 1 1/2 hours, stirring occasionally. Melt butter in large skillet. Add onions, celery, green peppers and garlic. Sauté until tender. Add sautéed vegetables and next 6 ingredients into beans; cook uncovered 1 hour, stirring occasionally and adding additional water, if needed.

Bake sausage at 350 degrees for 20 minutes; drain well. Stir sausage mixture into beans mixture. Cook uncovered 30

minutes. Remove bay leaves. Stir in parsley. Serve over Oven Rice.

#### Oven Rice

- 1 1/2 cups uncooked regular rice
- 2 1/2 cups chicken broth
- 1 1/2 tablespoons finely chopped celery
- 1 1/2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
- 1 1/2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper
- 1 1/2 tablespoon butter
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
- Dash ground red pepper
- Pinch of white pepper


Combine all ingredients in a 2-quart baking pan, stirring well. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour, or until all liquid is absorbed.





**June 1, 2018** marks the first day of Hurricane Season and time to prepare your home for possible severe weather that could include wind damage, flooding and tornados. Your home is your largest investment so protecting it from a natural disaster is important.

**Inspect your home now**  
 Homes with gabled roofs are more likely to suffer hurricane damage than homes with hip roofs because winds push into the flat roof of gabled roofs but pass over the steep pitch of hip roofs.

**Check the nails and hurricane straps**  
 Hurricane straps help hold the roof to the walls. In the attic, inspect for straps of galvanized metal. Go to the attic and see how well the roof sheathing, often plywood, is attached. If most of the large nails or staples coming through the sheathing have missed the trusses, your roof sheathing is improperly attached. This was a big problem during Hurricane Andrew.

**Preparing your house**  
 Check in your attic for diagonal 2-by-4s between the gable end and the rafter trusses. Gable-end bracing in an "X" pattern makes the roof stronger. You should also have truss bracing running the length of the roof. Truss it if you don't have it.

**Shingles or tiles**  
 Replace damaged or missing tiles or asphalt shingles.

**Nailing the plywood**  
 Plywood should be spaced 6 inches apart when attaching plywood to trusses.

**Remove**  
 Remove any items from your roof that could be blown away by the storm. Remove any items from your roof that could be blown away by the storm.

**Garage door**  
 If your garage door can't make with hurricane resistant panels, reinforce it by screwing additional support bars to the door and anchoring the door hardware to the floor and ceiling.

**Trim trees**  
 Cut overgrown limbs to prevent damage to your home. Use sheared limbs to prevent damage or injury.

**Potential missiles**  
 Move your car to a safe place to prevent damage or injury.

**Hurricane shutters**  
 Inspect your hurricane shutters for damage or missing fasteners. Practice putting them on.

**Boats**  
 Secure your boat in the garage, marina or boat storage facility.

Anchor / secure carports, porches or any structure that is attached to your home because wind can get underneath an open structure like this and tear a hole in your house. Tie down any sheds and garages that you have as well.

Make sure you have adequate window protection for your home and replace any shutters or plywood that may need to be replaced.

Move items in your yard that could possibly become projectiles and cause damage to your home or injury to you and your family.

Trim the trees and cut any dead limbs and branches throughout your yard to protect your home, sheds, cars, ect. from damage.


