

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Bay advances courthouse move

PANAMA CITY — Bay County on Tuesday submitted a formal proposal to transform the current Juvenile Justice Center at 533 E. 11th Street into the new federal courthouse.

In the meantime, the county and city are together are spending about \$300,000 to do asbestos work and inside demolition to the former

Panama City Hall, which is slated to become the temporary Juvenile Justice Center.

Bay County is spending \$60,000 and Panama City is spending \$120,000 for the work inside Panama City Hall as part of a plan “with many moving parts” to keep the federal courthouse here, though there is no guarantee Bay County’s proposal will be chosen by the federal government.

“I don’t think we’re gambling, but we are certainly

taking a risk,” said County Manager Bob Majka. “Our only other alternative is to do nothing for the courthouse to leave. The community has said they want courthouse to stay there. To do that, there is going to have to be some investment of funds.”

The demolition work and asbestos abatement on the former Panama City Hall is underway and expected to be done in November.

“We certainly are looking at investing that money in the

hopes that the return will be that the courthouse will stay here,” Majka said, adding that they expect the courthouse decision to be made by August.

The county’s proposal, made to Public Properties LLC on behalf of the federal government’s General Services Administration, is not public record, as it will be used in a potentially competitive process with others interested in getting the courthouse project.

“This is an initial offer, and we fully anticipate General Services Administration will come back and negotiate,” Majka said. “We don’t know for certain how many other proposals were submitted, but it is our understanding that they have the ability to negotiate with more than one proposer at a time. We expect that to happen.”

In 2017, the federal district

Dangerous rip currents lingering from Subtropical Storm Alberto

PANAMA CITY BEACH — A 61-year-old Georgia man died Wednesday after going snorkeling in the Gulf of Mexico while first responders spent much of the day trying to keep beachgoers out of dangerous rip currents in the wake of Subtropical Storm Alberto.

According to the Bay County Sheriff’s Office, Rick Correll was found floating face down in the water behind Regency Towers, 5801 Thomas Drive. Before and since Alberto made landfall, double red flags have flown over the beach to indicate swimming is prohibited. But as the sun appeared Wednesday, law enforcement saw a sharp increase in water rescues and issued dozens of warnings to those venturing into the dangerous currents.

About 2:45 p.m., though, tragedy struck behind the Regency Towers.

BCSO reported finding Correll about 200 yards from shore. His family said he had gone snorkeling, but they hadn’t seen him in more than an hour. Once Correll was brought to shore, CPR was performed but he was pronounced dead at the scene, BCSO reported.

Correll’s body has been turned over to the Medical Examiner’s Office to determine a cause of death.

Sheriff Tommy Ford said his officers responded to several distressed swimmers and responded to 30 beach ordinance calls to

warn swimmers to get out of the water while double red flags were out.

“We are always saddened by any loss of life,” Ford said. “I would like to remind people to take the flag warning system seriously.”

PCBPD Chief Drew Whitman said his officers have not had any serious distress calls but have been responding to several water calls in the days since Alberto.

“We just had a lot of people stay after Memorial Day longer so they wouldn’t have to drive in the rain,”

Trump remaking women’s reproductive health policy

WASHINGTON — Step by methodical step, the Trump administration is remaking government policy on reproductive health — moving to limit access to birth control and abortion and bolstering abstinence-only sex education.

Social and religious conservatives praise the administration for promoting “a culture of life.” But women’s-rights activists and some medical experts view the multi-pronged changes as a dangerous ideological shift that could increase unintended pregnancies and abortions.

“When I ran for office, I pledged to stand for life,” President Donald Trump said in a recent speech to the Susan B. Anthony List, which backs political candidates who oppose abortion. “And as president, that’s exactly



TODAY IN HISTORY

Today is Thursday, May 31, the 151st day of 2018. There are 214 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 31, 1921, a race riot erupted in Tulsa, Oklahoma, as white mobs began looting and leveling the affluent black district of Greenwood over reports a black man had assaulted a white woman in an elevator; hundreds are believed to have died.

On this date:

In 1578, the Christian catacombs of ancient Rome were accidentally discovered by workers digging in a vineyard along the Via Salaria.

In 1669, English diarist Samuel Pepys (peeps) wrote the final entry of his journal, blaming his failing eyesight for his inability to continue.

In 1889, some 2,200 people in Johnstown, Pennsylvania, perished when the South Fork Dam collapsed, sending 20 million tons of water rushing through the town.

In 1916, during World War I, British and German fleets fought the naval Battle of Jutland off Denmark; there was no clear-cut victor, although the British suffered heavier losses.

In 1935, movie studio 20th Century Fox was created through a merger of the Fox Film Corp. and Twentieth Century Pictures.

In 1949, former State Department official and accused spy Alger Hiss went on trial in New York, charged with perjury (the jury deadlocked, but Hiss was convicted in a second trial).

In 1962, former Nazi official Adolf Eichmann was hanged in Israel a few minutes before midnight for his role in the Holocaust.

In 1977, the Trans-Alaska oil pipeline, three years in the making despite objections from environmentalists and Alaska Natives, was completed. (The first oil began flowing through the pipeline 20 days later.)

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



'Slain' Russian journalist turns up alive

KIEV, Ukraine — To the gasps, whoops and applause of stunned colleagues, Russian journalist Arkady Babchenko walked into a news conference Wednesday, less than a day after police in the Ukrainian capital said he had been assassinated.

Authorities said his death had been staged to foil a plot on his life by Moscow's security services and one arrest was made. Russia denounced the faked killing as an outlandish attempt at defamation by its neighbor and foe.

Even Babchenko's wife was unaware of the deception, and the 41-year-old Kremlin critic who fled to Ukraine 15 months ago apologized to her "for the hell she had to go through in the past two days. There was no choice there, either."

Neither Babchenko nor Ukrainian Security Service chief Vasyl Gritsak gave details of the sting operation or how they made his wife believe he was dead.

Kiev Police Chief Andriy Krushchenko had announced Babchenko's death Tuesday, saying the journalist's wife found him bleeding at their apartment building in Kiev but that he died en route to the hospital. Lawmaker Anton Gerashchenko, an adviser to the interior minister, said the assailant had waited on a staircase in the building and shot Babchenko in the back as he was going to buy bread.

Just hours before the shooting was reported, Babchenko wrote

on Facebook that he considered the day a "second birthday" because it was the fourth anniversary of his missing a flight on a Ukrainian military helicopter that later was shot down in the conflict between Ukraine and Moscow-backed separatists in the eastern part of the country.

At the start of Wednesday's news conference, Gritsak announced the journalist's murder had been solved and called the day Babchenko's "third birthday."

Babchenko, clad in a black sweatshirt, walked into the room as other reporters gasped and exclaimed their surprise, then broke into applause.

"I'm still alive," an uneasy-looking Babchenko said with a

straight face. Then he apologized for the deception.

"I know that sickening feeling when you bury a colleague," he added.

The news conference produced mixed emotions.

"I was shocked. But then a feeling of happiness rose up," said Serhii Nuzhnenko, a freelance journalist.

Babchenko said he was not allowed to go into the details of his false death. He said Ukraine's law enforcement had been aware of a contract on his head for two months. He said he was approached by the Ukrainian Security Service, or SBU, a month ago.

"The important thing is my life has been saved and other,

bigger terrorist attacks have been thwarted," he said.

It also was unclear why authorities decided to go to such lengths to make it look as if Babchenko was dead.

Gritsak said investigators had identified a Ukrainian citizen who allegedly was paid \$40,000 by the Russian security service to organize and carry out the hit. The unidentified Ukrainian man in turn allegedly hired an acquaintance to be the gunman, he added.

The suspected organizer of the alleged hit plot was detained Wednesday, Gritsak said, suggesting the bogus killing was aimed at flushing him out, and he showed a video of the arrest.

OTHER NOTABLE FAKED DEATHS

JUAN PUJOL

Spanish chicken farmer Juan Pujol, codenamed Agent Garbo, played a key role in the Allied invasion of Normandy during World War II. He pretended to be an agent of Germany, but was really working for Britain's MI5, feeding the Nazis misleading information about Allied war efforts.

After the war, fearing revenge from surviving Nazis, he traveled with MI5 help to Angola where in 1949 he faked his death from malaria. Pujol, very much alive, moved to Venezuela, where he ran a bookshop.

KEN KESEY

Ken Kesey — ringmaster of acid-tripping band of 1960s jesters the Merry Pranksters — had published the acclaimed novel "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest" when he was arrested in 1965 for marijuana possession. Fearing prison, he left his truck parked on a cliff-side road in California with an apparent suicide note. He returned to the United States several months later, was arrested and served several months in prison.

JOHN STONEHOUSE

John Stonehouse was a British Labour lawmaker with financial troubles. Stonehouse went to Florida in 1974 and faked his own death by leaving his clothes in a bundle on a Miami beach. He was arrested a month later in Australia. Extradited to Britain, he was sentenced to seven years for theft, fraud and deception.

DALLAS Abbott offers long list of school safety proposals

Texas Gov. Greg Abbott on Wednesday called for schools to have more armed personnel and said they should put a bigger focus on spotting student mental health problems but he proposed only a few small restrictions on guns following a shooting at a high school near Houston that killed 10 and wounded 13.

The Republican and staunch gun-rights supporter released a 43-page report Wednesday. The only significant gun-related proposal mentioned by Abbott for Texas was a possible "red flag" although he gave it only a tepid endorsement, asking leaders of the Legislature to "consider the merits" of such a law.

ROME Italy's populists get another chance to form government

Italy's president gave populist politicians another chance Wednesday to try to form a coalition government after his naming of an interim leader roiled global markets that feared a new election would amount to a referendum on the euro.

Carlo Cottarelli, the former International Monetary Fund official tapped Monday to be a neutral, temporary premier, said "new possibilities" had emerged for a government based on the results of the March election to run Italy.

The two populist parties that prevailed in the March 4 vote — the euroskeptic 5-Star Movement and the right-wing League — presented their proposed Cabinet over the weekend.

GAZA CITY, GAZA STRIP Gaza's Hamas rulers say cease-fire reached with Israel

Gaza's Hamas rulers said Wednesday they had agreed to a cease-fire with Israel to end the largest flare-up of violence between the sides since 2014.

Khalil al-Hayya, a senior Hamas official, said Egyptian mediators intervened "after the resistance succeeded in warding off the aggression." He said militant groups in Gaza will commit to the cease-fire as long as Israel does.

Israeli Cabinet minister Arie Deri told Israel's Army Radio that he expected calm to be restored.

"If it will be quiet, we will respond with quiet. We've given Hamas a chance to prove that we can return to routine ... If they release the reins there will be a very painful strike," he said.

PESHAWAR, PAKISTAN Gunmen kill anti-Taliban Sikh activist in Pakistan

Police in Pakistan say gunmen riding on a motorcycle have shot and killed a human rights activist in the northwestern city of Peshawar.

Charanjit Singh, 52, was a well-known member of the country's minority Sikh community and an outspoken critic of the Taliban.

Local police chief Shaukat Khan said Singh was killed at a shop on Tuesday. His funeral was held Wednesday.

Singh's family in recent years had migrated to Peshawar from the Khyber tribal region, where he had been a vocal supporter of the military's efforts to crack down on Islamic extremists.

MIRAMAR Dog kills 8-month-old girl at Florida home of caregiver

A pet dog attacked and killed an 8-month-old girl at the Florida home of a caregiver.

Miramar police said they received a call about the attack just before noon Wednesday, but by the time officers and paramedics arrived the baby was dead.

They said the suburban Fort Lauderdale home belongs to a relative who was babysitting the child.

No names or further details were immediately released, including the breed of the dog.

Two other dogs at the house were not involved.

court announced it would not renew the lease on the current federal courthouse at 30 W. Government St. because of problems with the building. The court indicated that if that happened, the Panama City division would be dissolved.

For the past year, officials with the Bay County Chamber, Bay County, Panama City and the region's federal representation have been lobbying to keep the courthouse in Panama City.

Should Bay be chosen, it could use money from the lease to pay down the debt on the current juvenile facility and to help fund a new juvenile courthouse on the same campus as the Bay County Courthouse, which is estimated to cost between \$9 million and \$11 million.

Majka said the GSA has not indicated yet what kind of renovations or security upgrades it would like to see with the current Juvenile Justice Center on 11th Street.

"That will be part of this process," he said. "There certainly will be some requirements for some security upgrades, new carpeting, maintenance, operating of the building. All of that cost is included as part of our proposal."

Carol Roberts, the president of the Bay County Chamber, said the investment to win the federal courthouse is well worth it.

"I by no means think it's a waste" of tax money, she said. "I think it's an investment. We have to make it."

She said the community has made it loud and clear that the federal courthouse is a valuable resource that needs to stay here.

"If we don't keep it here, those (court) proceedings

would go to either Pensacola or Tallahassee. It would be a huge, huge inconvenience," she said. "Monetarily, it would be a huge impact on clients on the legal community. It's just something I think we have to pull out stops to keep it here."

If the federal courthouse left Bay County, it would lose 27 direct jobs and 100 indirect jobs, Roberts said. She said law firms might even move if the courthouse left Bay County.

"That's not to mention a potential loss of nearly half a million dollars annual that the county receives for housing federal inmates at the county jail," she said. "If it leaves Bay County, prisoners would be housed somewhere else, and we'd lose that funding."

Whitman said. "Once the sun came out, they hit the beach."

BCSO worked several water rescues in the immediate area behind Regency Towers. Within a matter of minutes after emergency crews left with Correll's body, remaining officers

with the Beach Rescue Unit again were running into the water.

Sarah Bohannon of Memphis, Tennessee, said she was just trying to swim to the sandbar. When she realized she was too far out, Bohannon tried to swim back on her boogie board but couldn't make any headway against the strong rip currents.

"I was scared until I saw the lifeguard coming," Bohannon said. "When I

saw him, I tried not to panic and that helped."

As Bohannon gave a brief hug to the officer who had rescued her, crime scene investigators were speaking with Correll's visibly distraught family.

Double red flags mean the water is closed to swimming — even to the strongest swimmers. In Bay County and Panama City Beach, swimmers can be fined or arrested for violating the ordinance.

what I've done. And I have kept my promise, and I think everybody here understands that fully."

Most of the changes involve rules and regulations under the administration's direct control, such as a proposal to forbid federally funded family planning clinics from referring women for abortions and separately allowing more employers who cite moral or religious reasons to opt out of no-cost birth control for women workers.

Trump also is appointing numerous new federal

judges endorsed by anti-abortion groups.

Justice Neil Gorsuch, the president's only appointment to the Supreme Court so far, has a sparse record on abortion, but has drawn praise from anti-abortion groups and criticism from abortion rights supporters. Unlike regulatory changes, judicial appointments cannot be reversed by a future president.

Democrats say Trump is changing policy in ways that could disrupt access to family planning for some women.

A recently proposed rule would make major changes to Title X, the family-planning program, including banning clinics from sharing physical space and financial

resources with abortion providers. Providers like Planned Parenthood could be forced out.

"It's across the spectrum of women's health services," said Rep. Diana DeGette, D-Col. "They're proposing abstinence-only sex education — which study after study has shown doesn't work — restrictions to family planning, and more and more restrictions to abortion."

Title X serves about 4 million low-income people, mainly women. Disruptions could affect women's access to long-acting contraceptives, such as implants and IUDs. Those are more effective than daily pills that can be forgotten but also much more expensive up-front.

Hurricane straps help hold the roof to the walls. In the attic, inspect for straps of galvanized metal. Go to the attic and see how well the roof sheathing, often plywood, is attached. If most of the large nails or staples coming through the sheathing have missed the trusses, your roof sheathing is improperly attached. This was a big problem during Hurricane Andrew.

Preparing your house
Check in your attic for diagonal 2-by-4s between the gable end and the rafter trusses. Gable-end bracing in an "X" pattern makes the roof stronger. You should also have truss bracing running the length of the roof. In fact, if you don't have it.

Shingles or tiles
Replace damaged or missing tiles or asphalt shingles.

Look for loose
Loose roof tiles should be spaced 6 inches apart when attaching plywood to trusses.

Remove
Remove any loose roof tiles so when the storm blows you can remove the loose tiles and cap the hole. Winds of more than 100 mph will pull tiles off.

Garage door
If your garage door can't be made with hurricane-resistant panels, reinforce it by screwing additional support bars to the door and anchoring the door hardware bars at the bottom and top. If you add horizontal bracing instead, check that the door tracks have enough anchor bolts.

Trim trees
Cut overgrown limbs so they don't damage your home. Use shielded bark for ground cover instead of grass.

Potential missiles
Move your valuable possessions to a safe place to prevent damage or injury.

Hurricane shutters
Inspect your hurricane shutters for damage or missing fasteners. Practice putting them on.

Boats
Secure your boat in the garage, marina or boat storage facility.

Anchor / secure carports, porches or any structure that is attached to your home because wind can get underneath an open structure like this and tear a hole in your house. Tie down any sheds and garages that you have as well.

Make sure you have adequate window protection for your home and replace any shutters or plywood that may need to be replaced.

Move items in your yard that could possibly become projectiles and cause damage to your home or injury to you and your family.

Trim the trees and cut any dead limbs and branches throughout your yard to protect your home, sheds, cars, ect. from damage.

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Corporations muddy government's swamp

The swampiest places in Washington politics aren't in the nation's capital at all. The thickest, smelliest muck is in C-suites worldwide, where executives shell out cash to toadies like Michael Cohen and other influence peddlers. Those who sink in so deep they get caught respond with hollow apologies and by dismissing subordinates.

Such is the case with AT&T, the Squire Patton Boggs law firm and the Swiss health care conglomerate Novartis. All paid President Donald Trump's so-called "fixer" and personal attorney for insights into understanding the new administration.

The three business giants are the outliers here — only in that their attempts to ingratiate themselves with the then-newly elected president came to light as part of the Stormy Daniels lawsuit.

Corporations, trade associations and other special interest groups spend more than \$3 billion annually for influence, access and insights, usually through lobbyists.

That Cohen's credentials in that regard are dubious — he's a former personal injury attorney and an owner of taxi cab medallions, not a registered lobbyist — doesn't change the fact that his perceived relationship with Trump attracted AT&T and the others.

Corporations are so desperate for political influence they will invest in anyone who might have an official's ear or who might be owed a favor by a government leader.

Those same influence buyers then demonstrate their hypocrisy by feigning ignorance, offering disingenuous apologies and scapegoating underlings.

The American people should refuse to stand for such political boot-licking.

AT&T paid Cohen for insights into understanding the new administration. At the time of the payment, the telecommunications giant was acquiring Time Warner, a deal that required government approval. It's hard to believe the timing was a coincidence.

The behavior doesn't fit the definition of bribery — not unless investigators could show conclusively that Cohen was a conduit to government officials — but it certainly is in the spirit of such nefariousness.

Perhaps AT&T's leadership figured the risk was worth the potential reward, and the penance is a pittance. The merger with Time Warner is still in play — a federal judge will issue a ruling on the matter June 12.

Make no mistake; Cohen's influence peddling is a form of lobbying. Squire Patton Boggs characterized its association with Cohen as a "strategic alliance," but the law firm is among the biggest alligators in the Washington lobbying swamp.

Run by a pair of former senators, the firm is well connected on Capitol Hill, but Trump comes from the business world, not the political sphere, making those close to the president in demand.

The Trump administration can control the narrative if it chooses to do so. The president has spoken out against the AT&T-Time Warner deal, and he can stiff-arm others attempting to influence him.

Dumping 'Roseanne': Quick, dirty and smart

Roseanne Barr's divorce from civilization started 28 years ago. Given the honor of singing the national anthem at a San Diego Padres-Cincinnati Reds game, she shrieked the words and, upon concluding, spit at the ground and scratched her crotch — all choreographed for a national TV audience.

Then-President George H.W. Bush called the performance "disgraceful." So did most good Americans, with conservative commentators of that very different era expressing the most umbrage.

Roseanne's comedic talents and the public's short memory enabled her career to rise from the ash heap. Come the age of Donald Trump, her addiction to attention-grabbing attacks on surviving notions of propriety made Roseanne a timely cultural fit. Helping her along, clever TV writers gave her a show that exposed the country's political and social polarization in a socially redeemable way.

But Roseanne the public personality wasn't as smart as her writers. She apparently thought headlining a hit network program would give her license to upchuck just about any vile sentiment crossing her mind.

After all, she had the example of Trump. The Electoral College made him leader of the land despite his tweeting racist lies, his insults against war heroes and evidence of his gross ignorance on matters both foreign and domestic. She also may have assumed the money "Roseanne" brought in would shield her from serious consequences from whatever she would do.

The basis for that assumption was incorrect. Advertisers were sure to rebel against associating their products with such toxic assertions. Many already had abandoned Sean Hannity and Laura Ingraham in the wake of their repellant mutterings. Their support for Trump was never the issue. It was their use of time they paid for to throw gasoline on whatever was left of mainstream America's sense of decency. "Roseanne" the TV show and Roseanne the Hollywood star were over regardless of how ABC responded.

But economic considerations aside, ABC has been hailed for promptly canceling the show after Roseanne tweeted: "muslim brotherhood & planet of the apes had a baby=vj." The initials referred to Valerie Jarrett, an Obama adviser who is African-American. This followed a spate of other revolting tweets, including one promoting the obscene lie that progressive billionaire George Soros was a Nazi who turned in

fellow Jews to be murdered.

And then she started issuing abject apologies for causing offense. "Guys I did something unforgivable so do not defend me," she posted. And oh, dear, she blamed her use of Ambien, a sleep medication, for what she posited as unguarded remarks. That might work for some celebrities with fairly clean records who slip. Given her history, this seemed a final act of desperation to dissuade ABC from dumping her show.

Next comes the inevitable self-pity phase. After Bush chastised Roseanne for her gross rendition of the national anthem, she whined, "I have the right to sing 'The Star-Spangled Banner,' too." She also referred to the booing baseball fans as "50,000 drunk [expletive]." She's now back on Twitter saying she's "tired of being attacked & belittled."

The slob culture long preceded the most recent presidential election, but it's enjoyed a flowering under Trump. Social media will ensure it a permanent place on the American couch, but resistance to the barbarian onslaught at the higher corporate level is most encouraging.

"Roseanne" is gone. Score one for civilization.

BEIJING China vows to fight Washington on tariff hike

China's government accused the Trump administration of hurting its credibility by acting erratically on trade and vowed Wednesday to fight back if Washington goes ahead with a threatened tariff hike.

A foreign ministry spokeswoman complained the U.S. decision to renew a threat to raise duties on a \$50 billion list of Chinese goods conflicts with an agreement in mid-May aimed at settling that dispute.

Treasury Steven Mnuchin said then that the conflict was "on hold" after Beijing promised to buy more U.S. goods to help narrow its multibillion-dollar trade surplus with the United States.

No easy way in

Need an entry-level job at a store? It can be harder now

NEW YORK — Asia Thomas knew she was at a disadvantage. It had been 16 years since she quit a job at McDonald's to raise her kids. When she left, restaurants didn't have kiosks to take orders, people didn't use smartphones to pay, and job seekers did applications on paper.

"Things have changed," said Thomas, who lives in Baltimore. "And there were a lot of things I forgot."

Getting a job at a store or fast-food restaurant — often a way into the economy for an unskilled worker — used to be as simple as walking up and down the mall and applying. Now, with store chains closing and laying off thousands of workers, that path is more complicated. The stores that remain financially healthy are actually raising wages in a tight labor market. But they're seeking a new type of worker — one who has a lot more skills up front.

Thomas, 44, was able to get a job at wholesale club B.J.'s for \$12 an hour — but that was only after signing up for computer lessons and taking a class in retail basics like how to track inventory and handle issues like returns. That led her to another opportunity at a casino.

Across all entry-level retail jobs, the number of skills being demanded rose from 2010 to 2016, according to an analysis done for The Associated Press by Burning Glass Technologies, which scours 25 million job postings.

Burning Glass found a greater emphasis on customer service and communications skills for cashier, stock clerk and sales floor support jobs. And for many other entry-level jobs, employers want even more skills, like the ability to use customer relations software like Salesforce. Even forklift operators are being asked to be proficient in inventory management software. This has major consequences for workers without college degrees or vocational training trying to get an economic foothold. A decade ago, workers, especially young ones, could start as cashiers and move up to become store managers or even higher. But now, it's harder to even get in the door.

"The bottom may be coming out of the career ladder," said Burning Glass CEO Matt Sigelman.

Experts say those who might otherwise have started out at working at a store may head instead to cleaning, dishwashing or health aide jobs. The number of jobs in those fields is expected to grow far more than in retail. While these jobs may pay about the same as retail, they can be more demanding physically and provide less opportunity

to move up.

"This phenomenon is creating more pressure on incomes at the lower end of the middle class and will push people down closer to and even below the poverty line," said Fred Crawford, senior vice chairman of consulting firm AlixPartners. "It will exacerbate the growing gap between the haves and have-nots."

The retail industry "relied on a largely unskilled entry labor force. Now, it's leaning more toward skilled people and competing with other sectors" like technology, said economist Frank Badillo, founder and director of research at MacroSavvy.

The training programs are making difference. Nadine Vixama would have never had a shot without them. Vixama, 42, emigrated from Haiti eight years ago and worked in a money payment business and then at a dry cleaners. But she wanted something that was more about customer service.

She did snag a job at Whole Foods in Cambridge, Massachusetts, first as a bagger and now as a cashier, making a little more than \$11 an hour. But that was after taking English classes and the store basics program developed by the NRF.

"I've learned to treat customers in a better way ... how to keep pace with them," Vixama said. At another class offered by a workplace group, she learned about spreadsheet programs like Excel and studied basic accounting.

Stock markets reverse course

NEW YORK — Banks and energy companies surged Wednesday and smaller companies made huge gains as stocks got back almost all the ground they lost the day before. Investors reversed course as they hoped Italy would be able to avoid a new round of elections after all.

Financial companies rallied as bond yields turned higher and energy companies rose along with U.S. crude oil, which busted out of a five-day losing streak. The shift came after Carlo Cottarelli, nominated to be Italy's next prime minister, said there were "new possibilities" to form a government.

Stocks had plunged the previous day as investors expected gridlock to be resolved with new elections that could have turned into a yes-or-no referendum deciding whether Italy would continue to use the euro.

JJ Kinahan, chief market strategist for TD Ameritrade, said the market often reacts irregularly to political events like the uncertainty in Italy or tensions between the U.S. and North Korea: stocks often fall fast and then recover in quick fashion. That process can sometimes repeat itself weeks or months later.

"If there's no follow-up news, they tend to come back near where they started," he said. "I wouldn't count on it being done for the summer."

While the S&P 500 and Nasdaq recovered Tuesday's losses and then some, smaller and more U.S.-focused companies did ever better as investors continued to worry about trade. Small companies finished with minor losses Tuesday, and on Wednesday they made even bigger gains than larger multinationals did. The Russell 2000 index surged 24.34 points, or 1.5 percent, and closed at a record high of 1,647.99.

The Chinese government criticized the U.S., which had renewed a threat to raise duties on some imports from China. At the same time, officials from the U.S. and European Union held talks on the tariffs the Trump administration has proposed on European steel and aluminum. European Union negotiations seemed pessimistic and said they expected the U.S. to announce a final decision Thursday.

China and the EU have both said they will react to new tariffs imposed by the U.S. with duties of their own, which has raised the prospect of greater tensions and the possibility of trade wars. Kinahan, of TD Ameritrade, said investors feel smaller companies are less vulnerable.

Walmart offers employees new perk: cheap access to college

NEW YORK — Walmart is offering its employees a new perk: affordable access to a college degree.

America's largest private employer, which in the past has helped its workers get their high school or equivalency degrees, hopes the new benefit will help it recruit and retain higher quality entry-level employees in a tight U.S. labor market.

The company is working with Denver-based startup Guild Education to give employees the chance to obtain a bachelor's degree in business or supply-chain management. It will cost a dollar a day at one of three nonprofit universities with online programs that have

Both full-time and part-time workers who have been with the company at least 90 days will be eligible, Walmart said. About 68,000 of Walmart's 1.4 million U.S. employees are expected to enroll in the first five years, based on interest from its workers, said Julie Murphy, executive vice president of people at Bentonville, Arkansas-based Walmart. Walmart declined to disclose the cost of the program.

had success working with adult learners: the University of Florida, Brandman University and Bellevue University. It plans to eventually expand to more types of degrees.

It will also offer college-prep classes for workers who

need extra help. Walmart is subsidizing the cost of tuition, books and fees.

The move underscores how retailers and restaurant chains are under increasing pressure to improve the skills of their workers as shoppers move online. Store chains including Walmart have also raised wages as low unemployment gives trained retail workers more options.

Walmart has said the tax overhaul helped it also give workers one-time bonuses and expand parental leave benefits. Critics say Walmart should share even more of its profits with employees. But a shareholder proposal presented Wednesday, calling on the company to invest as much money in the stock plan for employees as it does on share buybacks, was rejected.

Residents and visitors have not complained about a lack of parking, but as the city expands, parking and traffic might become a burden, said City Manager Mario Gisbert.

The city has three public parking lots with parking

meters that require a fee of \$5 a day. The lots are at 1117 Front Beach Road, 9961 Thomas Drive and 600 Henley Circle. Annual passes are available for \$250 and can be purchased at the Public Works Department, 116 S. Arnold Road.

“A lot of people do not know about these lots and they are not clearly marked. They are all located in the CRA, and we will be updating signage in the future to make them more visible for our guests,” Gisbert said.

During the summer, the lots

are 80 percent to 90 percent full, Gisbert said. Panama City Beach can pull in thousands of visitors and locals in a weekend for events such as “Real. Fun. Fourth,” Pepsi Gulf Coast Jam, the summer concert series and more, leading to an increased usage of parking.

Solis filed the defamation lawsuit in March, claiming he has been maliciously attacked on air with falsehoods about his

employment history as an officer in the federal prison system. However, Thompson has since argued the lawsuit should be dismissed on grounds that he never exhibited a reckless disregard for the truth and was only questioning a public official about a campaign platform that contributed to Solis’ being elected.

Circuit Judge James Fensom heard from both sides and will issue a ruling at a later date. Both Thompson and Solis filed public records stating up to Wednesday’s hearing.

Thompson had previously filed a one-page motion for dismissal in April but expanded on his request Tuesday in a supplemental court filing. In the document, Thompson said that the lawsuit is baseless because he did not demonstrate “actual malice” against Solis, which is an element elected officials have to prove in defamation suits.

“The complaint filed by (Solis) alleges that I... committed reckless disregard for the truth with malicious

Woman’s research helps military families find closure

PANAMA CITY — Rhonda Masters can’t imagine not knowing what happened to an elder relative who left to serve in the military and never returned home.

That feeling has come over Masters in the six years she’s spent researching and identifying remains and burial sites of the men who disappeared during World War II while serving overseas. Masters’ investigation into the Bataan Death March, which saw over 70,000 American Filipino prisoners of war sent to their deaths in the Philippines, yielded new information and gave closure to service members’ families, who knew little about their loved ones’ deaths and whereabouts before her research.

Masters, a Panama City Kiwanis Club member, spoke about her research during a club meeting Wednesday. Genealogy is a long-time hobby for Masters, who began researching World War II members’ burial sites after her brother-in-law asked







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Local doctor's office employee charged with pill fraud

PANAMA CITY — A Bay County doctor's office worker has been arrested on numerous charges after she allegedly forged prescriptions for 2,370 pain pills with a pad stolen from her employer, according to official reports.

Angel Sierra Bocanegra, 30, appeared in court Wednesday in the case. The Bay County Sheriff's Office arrested her after discovering she allegedly had been passing forged prescriptions for hydrocodone taken from the Institute of Endocrinology, 633 E. Baldwin Road, where she worked. Bocanegra is being held on 34 counts of forgery, 34 counts of uttering a forged instrument and 34 counts of obtaining a controlled substance by fraud, court records show.

According to BCSO reports, Bocanegra forged 34 prescriptions to receive 2,370 pain pills that officers estimated had a street value of \$23,700. Bocanegra admitted forging the prescriptions once confronted by investigators because "she needed money" for child support, BCSO reported.

"During this conversation, I went through the list of suspected fraudulent prescriptions (Bocanegra) was suspected of passing and she admitted to all of them, stating she acted alone except

in selling them, which her boyfriend did for her," officers wrote. "... Furthermore, (Bocanegra) stated she is the only one who actually picked the prescriptions up and turned the prescriptions in to be filled, knowing that they were forged and intending to obtain the controlled substance by this fraud."

Officers reported becoming involved with the case Tuesday after responding to the Walgreens on Tyndall Parkway for possible fraudulent prescriptions. Investigators learned the prescriptions came from the Institute of Endocrinology, which the doctor confirmed. While looking through the prescriptions, though, the doctor noticed some had been written to one of his current employees, BCSO reported.

"At this point, D.R. Kamel called (Bocanegra) into his office, and he confronted her about the fraudulent prescription, while I was in the back of the office," officers wrote. "Upon D.R. Kamel doing this, (Bocanegra) told D.R. Kamel that she needed money, and at this point I introduced myself."

Bocanegra was arrested afterward and taken to the Bay County Jail.

Officers detailed 34 prescriptions at various pharmacies in Bay County dating back to October. In total, Bocanegra allegedly obtained 2,370 hydrocodone pills but said she never sold the pills personally, giving them to her boyfriend to distribute, BCSO reported.

It's unclear whether charges are pending against Bocanegra's boyfriend, who was not identified in BCSO reports.

like July 4, and when we have special events like concerts," Gisbert said. "Several of the condos and hotels along Front Beach Road utilize these lots for their guests as overflow parking."

When the summer season winds down, Gisbert said usage declines considerably.

The city owns the property for the lots, which were created about a decade ago, he said. The lots are the only

public parking lots on the Beach.

"Currently there is no meter at the Thomas Drive grass lot located across the road from Ripley's Believe It or Not. That meter should be up sometime in June," Gisbert said.

The lots on Henley Circle and Front Beach Road are paved, well lighted and close to hotels, lodgings and the beach, Gisbert said.

"They are ideal for people coming to the beach from Panama City, Lynn Haven, Southport ... because they are so close to the beach.

They are great for day trippers," he said. "The two paved lots have about 175 parking spaces each. The lot on Thomas Drive is 5 acres, so it's very large. This lot is ideal for bike week or boaters, as it is perfect for accommodating small trailers."

If the three parking lots are full, drivers also can park their vehicles at the lot near Pier Park. Gisbert said the city owns parking to the west of Pier Park, facing Front Beach Road. He said there are 500 spaces for those who want to shop in Pier Park or visit the beach.

her to look into his grandfather, who never came home from the war. She used online ancestry resources and obtained help from families, who supply DNA samples.

"They now know where he lies. He's with his comrades," said Masters, who splits her time between Bay County and St. Augustine. "If I were the brother or sister or mother, not knowing must be terrible."

Masters has identified other military personnel buried overseas, such as Army Pvt. Raymond Sinowitz, who died in 1942. She also located Arthur "Bud" Kelder, whose remains were returned home to Chicago in 2015, an emotional moment for his family. Masters has even been invited to the funerals by some families.

"It was amazing to be there," Masters said.

Multiple service members tended to be buried

in mass graves after their deaths, and some families have declined to be involved or have a member reburied back in the U.S. after finding out about Masters' research. During her talk Wednesday, Masters showed Kiwanis members maps of the Bataan Death March, pictures of the service members and previous news reports of past research efforts.

"Know that you can be a part of this. You can go out online," Masters said. "You can look it up if you know something. They're

looking for people who will help give their DNA. This is just the tip of the iceberg."

The men who served in World War II came from a variety of demographics, from teens to men in their 40s, married and single, Masters said. She pointed to the nonfiction book "Ghost Soldiers: The Epic Account of World War II's Greatest Rescue Mission," the film "The Great Raid" based off the book, and the documentary "GI Jews: Jewish Americans in World War II" for people curious about World War II history.

intent," Thompson wrote. Solis "goes on to allege that a letter from his friend with an

inaccurate retirement date did not need a correction because his friend had since retired from the Federal Bureau of Prisons. Insisting that a journalist should accept this inaccurate document as employment verification highlights the

shear absurdity of (Solis') claim."

A couple of weeks earlier, Solis argued against Thompson's motion, writing that actual malice had been demonstrated by Thompson repeating "scandalous accusations in the face of considerable

evidence to refute them."

"The First Amendment freedom is not unlimited," Solis wrote. "Similarly, even taking as given (Thompson) is a journalist, the fact alone would not provide him with the unfettered right to say any and everything he chooses to say."

Solis claims in the lawsuit the slander began because of his support for laws in 2016 meant to tone down Spring Break, which led him to run a successful campaign for a council seat as a law-and-order candidate and former law enforcement officer.

In April 2017, Thompson began questioning Solis' campaign statements that he worked as a corrections officer at a federal prison and claimed that Solis was instead a "ground-keeper." Thompson often pontificated on air whether the claim amounted to "stolen valor," a federal crime.

In January, a friend of Solis' posted online the document meant to verify his 29-year career. However, the date of retirement on the documents was incorrect. Despite later receiving what Solis considers confirmation from the bureau of federal prisons, Thompson did not issue a retraction as Solis requested.

Solis has claimed at least \$15,000 in damages, which is the minimum claim required in circuit court lawsuits, and demanded a jury trial. A jury could award more, less, or side with Thompson. The case also could be settled out of court.

MYTH #2 ➤ **Psoriatic Arthritis Only Affects Your Joints.**

Many people with psoriatic arthritis also have psoriasis, which can cause a skin rash and pitted nails. In addition to joint issues, psoriatic arthritis may cause pain and stiffness where ligaments attach to the bone. Psoriatic arthritis can also cause an inflammatory eye disease and put you at higher risk for metabolic syndrome, heart attacks, stroke, osteoporosis, and depression. It has even been associated with inflammatory bowel disease and damage to the lungs.

Psoriatic arthritis is a type of inflammatory disease. That means your body's immune system mistakenly sets off inflammation that rages uncontrolled, and attacks your own tissues. Usually, our immune systems use inflammation to fight off disease or heal an injury, then shuts it off. In psoriatic arthritis, it doesn't shut off.

In psoriatic arthritis, that inflammation keeps attacking healthy skin, nail, or joint tissues, and causes damage and pain. Psoriatic arthritis is also one type of inflammatory arthritis. That means it involves inflammation that often attacks the joints, causing swelling, stiffness, redness, and pain. Your organs can also be affected by out-of-control inflammation, including your skin.

People with psoriatic arthritis may have arthritis that affects their fingers, toes, neck, or spine. They may also have enthesitis, or painful inflammation at the sites where tendons go into bones at the joints, or tendinitis. Not all people have all symptoms. Remember to report any symptoms to your rheumatologist or dermatologist. Both kids and adults can have psoriatic arthritis, although it usually first appears between age 30 and 50. Both men and women can get it.

Psoriatic arthritis usually affects the distal joints (those closest to the nail) in fingers or toes. You may also experience symptoms in your lower back, wrists, knees or ankles. In 85 percent of patients, psoriasis occurs before joint disease. If you have been diagnosed with psoriasis, it is important to tell your dermatologist if you have any aches and pains.

There is little connection between your psoriasis severity and psoriatic arthritis severity. Having a severe case of psoriasis does not necessarily mean a person will have a severe case of psoriatic arthritis. A person could have few skin lesions, but have many joints affected by the arthritis. Because psoriatic arthritis can affect people in so many different ways, doctors may not always spot your problem right away.

Keep in mind, early recognition, diagnosis and treatment of psoriatic arthritis are critical to relieve pain and inflammation and help prevent irreversible joint damage.

Okaloosa drug bust hits PayDirt

OCSO sting leads to largest heroin, fentanyl bust in county history

SHALIMAR — The Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office on Wednesday announced the largest seizure of heroin and fentanyl in the county's history after a months-long investigation.

Operation PayDirt began in August 2017 and led to the execution of two search warrants in late February at two homes in Crestview. The investigation is continuing and more arrests are coming, according to Sheriff Larry Ashley.

"Okaloosa County is tied with West Palm Beach County in having the most heroin overdoses in the state of Florida," Ashley said at a news conference.

"I'm here to tell you that (our guys) hit a big hit. As a matter of fact, since February, our overdoses on heroin have dropped dramatically because of this single effort."

Fifteen people were arrested in connection with the local drug operation and almost \$7 million worth of drugs was confiscated. The alleged leader, 33-year-old Kevin Powell Jr., is charged with trafficking heroin and trafficking cocaine, among other charges.

"It seems that none of these people are new to the criminal justice system," Ashley said. "Accountability has to start somewhere. ... These convicted felons,

they go right back to doing it. ... (They) should go to prison forever."

The sheriff's office seized 3,582 grams of heroin worth some \$895,500, according to OCSO officials. About 770 grams, or about 300,000 doses, of fentanyl worth \$6 million on the street also was seized. About \$100,000 worth of cocaine also was confiscated, as well as \$500 worth of crack cocaine and \$1,575 of MDMA.

According to Ashley, one milligram of fentanyl equals to one dose and two milligrams is an overdose.

The amount of the drug lawmen seized could kill 150,000 people from an overdose, almost the entire population of Okaloosa County, he said.

A pill press was taken from one of the homes, and hundreds of diet pills were found that investigators believe were to be converted into fentanyl.

Weapons also were confiscated, including a 9mm Taurus semi-automatic rifle, which allegedly was stolen; a .22 caliber semi-automatic Ruger MKIII Hunter pistol with two magazines; an Intratec Arms AB-10 firearm; and a Sig Sauer .40 caliber handgun.

According to Ashley, all the suspects live in Okaloosa County. Other major players in the operation include Anthony Porter, 45, of Mary Esther; Gill McGee, 29, of Crestview; Keithen Brown, 40, of Crestview; Aaron Johnson, 33, of Fort Walton Beach; and Jamaal Hunt, 33, of Fort Walton Beach.

Nine other people face

charges ranging from possession of a controlled substance to illegal use of a two-way communication device to facilitate a felony, according to the sheriff's office.

Ashley said he wanted people to know that if they are involved in drug trafficking, they will get caught. Selling drugs is not a victimless crime as many believe, he said.

"You need to get into a rehabilitation center, you need to re-educate your mind and find some way to get off of this poison, because it's going to kill you," Ashley said. "Make yourselves known now and get it over with, because we're coming. ... There's no place in Okaloosa County for you."

Federal, state and local agencies assisted in the investigation.

Also present at the new conference were Chuck Bufalino from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement; Brandon Findley, a Drug Enforcement Administration Task Force officer and the assisting case agent; Sheriff's Office Investigator Mitch Landis; Crestview Interim Police Chief Jamie Grant; Assistant State Attorney David Stephens, the lead prosecutor in the case; Bill Bishop, chief assistant state attorney; and Fort Walton Beach Police Chief Ed Ryan.

According to Ashley, the sheriff's office received 125 overdose reports in 2017, 25 of which were fatal. There have been 21 suspected heroin overdoses and three deaths so far this year.

"Still bad, but much better," Ashley said.

PANAMA CITY PC starting road 'rejuvenation' today

To extend the life of pavement, Panama City is starting a "rejuvenation project" today.

In February, the City Commission awarded a \$160,000 contract to Pavement Technology Inc. to apply an asphalt rejuvenator to extend the life of all the pavements resurfaced from 2013 to 2016. The process works by adding oils back into the pavement that allow the binder in asphalt pavement to remain pliable and resist fatigue, according to city officials.

The city is planning to treat 8 miles of road, which is expected to add five years to their lifespans.

The project is expected to take seven days, according to a city news release, but could be delayed or rescheduled depending on weather.

During the project, Pavement Technology will set up single-lane closures with flagmen directing traffic. According to the release, the process typically takes 20 to 30 minutes with the road reopened within an hour.

The plan is to tackle portions of Agnes Scott Circle, Candlewick Drive, Gabriel Street, Jazz Drive, Kristianna Drive, Loyola Lane, Rosemont Drive, Stanford Road and Woodmere Drive on day one. On day two, the list includes portions of 17th Street, 19th Court, 20th Street, 21st Street, 22nd

Court, Alabama Avenue, Arthur Avenue, Baltimore Avenue, Brown Avenue, Drake Avenue, Drummond Avenue, Grant Avenue, Mound Avenue, North Bay Drive, Palmetto Avenue, Pritchard Street, Shepherd Street, Wainwright Avenue and Wilmont Avenue.

On day three, crews will move on to portions of 12th Street, 22nd Street, Balboa Avenue, Chestnut Avenue, Edgemont Circle, Friendship Avenue, Hickory Avenue, Louisiana Avenue, Marie Ann Boulevard, Monroe Avenue and Wood Avenue.

On the fourth day, the crew will focus on Jenks Avenue.

On the fifth day, the crews will head to 12th Street, 14th Court, 14th Street, Seventh Street, Ninth Street, Critter Lane, Harris Avenue, Magnolia Avenue, McKenzie Avenue, Mercedes Avenue, Mercer Avenue and Oak Avenue.

On the sixth day, the plan is to rejuvenate portions of Sixth Street, Seventh Street, Eighth Court, Bonita Avenue, Church Avenue, Clarie Drive, Cove Boulevard, Elm Avenue, Everitt Avenue, Harris Avenue, MacArthur Avenue, Oak Hammond Drive, Palo Alto Avenue and Satsuma Avenue.

On the planned final day, crews will finish off with portions of Fourth Street, Seventh Court, Eighth Street, Balboa Avenue, the City Hall Area, Government Street, Harrison Avenue and Oak Avenue.

DEFUNIAK SPRINGS Outstanding warrant arrest leads to crack bust

The Walton County Sheriff's Office VICE/Narcotics unit has arrested two men after discovering they had about 1½ ounces of crack cocaine, according to the sheriff's office.

Sheriff's investigators identified Kadeem Kenneth Ingram, 28, standing in a yard on Bay Street just before 5 p.m. Tuesday. Investigators were aware that Ingram had two outstanding arrest warrants, a news release from the WCSO said.

ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

When I saw a close variant of this deal from the Common Game in 2017, I thought it had the makings of a good problem. At the table, most North-South pairs played five clubs on a deal where slam seemed highly likely to make. But with neither spades nor clubs behaving, the limit on the hand turned out to be 11 tricks.

However, imagine that North finds a slightly off-center raise to two spades rather than a negative double. This is sensible enough, since a decent hand with Q-10 of spades plus short hearts virtually corresponds to a three-card raise. Can you imagine how the defense would go against four spades?

West leads from his heart sequence. Declarer wins and crosses to the diamond king to run the spade queen to West, who forces declarer with a second heart. Now declarer must be careful not to draw any more trumps. Instead, he plays a club to the ace and a second club. East will probably discard, and declarer will clear the clubs. He can now ruff the next heart in dummy and come to hand in diamonds to draw trumps, then claim the rest. Note that had declarer drawn trumps before playing on clubs, the combination of bad breaks in the minors would sink him, since he runs out of trumps.

Still, I wonder if the defenders might have prevailed by following a more devious line. If West can duck the first trump smoothly, declarer will probably repeat the spade finesse. Now the force in hearts will work, since dummy is out of trumps.



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



Holtby capped his energetic performance with a jaw-dropping stick save with 1:59 to play, stretching back to rob Alex Tuch of a possible tying goal.



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76ers investigate critical tweets linked to Colangelo

PHILADELPHIA — The Philadelphia 76ers are investigating whether team president Bryan Colangelo used Twitter accounts to anonymously trash some of his own players and fellow executives and to defend himself against criticism from fans and the sports media.

The five accounts took aim at Philadelphia players Joel Embiid and Markelle Fultz, former Sixers general manager Sam Hinkie, Toronto Raptors executive Masai Ujiri and former Sixers players Jahlil Okafor and Nerlens Noel, according to a report by

The Ringer website.

Colangelo acknowledged using one of the accounts to monitor the NBA industry and other current events, but said he wasn't familiar with the other four and didn't know who was behind them.

"The allegations are serious and we have commenced an independent investigation into the matter," the Sixers said Wednesday in a statement. "We will report the results of that investigation as soon as it is concluded."

Embiid, the 24-year-old All-Star center, tweeted that he didn't believe the report.

"I don't believe the story. That would just be

insane," he wrote.

The Ringer said in its report that it has been monitoring the accounts

since February, when it received an anonymous tip about the accounts. The site said it does not

know the source of the tip, but archived and monitored the tweets themselves and found connections between the accounts.

The Ringer said it initially asked the Sixers about just two of the five accounts to see if anything would change with the other three after its query, and the same day the other three accounts were made private.

Colangelo was hired as president of basketball operations for Philadelphia in April 2016. He served as Toronto's general manager from 2006-2013.

Colangelo, the son of longtime sports executive Jerry Colangelo, stepped

in with the Sixers after Hinkie resigned. He lost his GM job in Toronto after the Raptors missed the playoffs for the fifth consecutive season, and Ujiri took over basketball operations.

According to The Ringer, one of the Twitter accounts it connected to Colangelo downplayed Hinkie's role in the franchise's turnaround. It also lamented in another post that Ujiri hadn't done anything to make the Raptors better.

Another account accused Embiid of "playing like a toddler having tantrums," and one criticized Fultz for his work with his "so called mentor/father figure."

The Capitals have made the playoffs in 13 of 19 seasons since their only other trip to the Final in 1998, but hadn't managed to get their fans back to the final round until this year. Capital One Arena in downtown Washington was packed with red-clad fans watching Game 2 on the videoboards.

The Caps improved

to 9-3 on the road in the postseason after two games in this frequently chaotic series. The first two games of the Stanley Cup Final were split for only the third time in the last 13 editions of the NHL's final round.

After a rough opener in Vegas, Holtby rounded back into something approaching his form in back-to-back shut-outs to close the Eastern Conference finals. While his save on Tuch was the most impressive, he kept the Caps in charge with 15 saves in the third period, including a tenacious effort during a 5-on-3 advantage for 1:09 for the Knights.

The goal was the fifth of the postseason for Neal, the gifted scorer left unprotected in last summer's expansion draft after reaching the Final with Nashville.

Shortly afterward, Kuznetsov went straight to the dressing room after absorbing a high check from McNabb. The game immediately took on a nastier tone, and the teams played 4-on-4 hockey moments later after a prolonged scrum led to two penalties.

With extra space, Washington strung together several sharp passes culminating in Eller's sixth goal of the postseason. The Danish forward failed to hit an open net on a rushed play for a potential tying goal late in Game 1.

Washington's excellent power play finally got a chance early in the second period, and Ovechkin scored a vintage goal with his powerful shot from a sharp angle.

The Russian superstar led the NHL with 49 goals in the regular season and added 12 more in the Eastern Conference playoffs. After scoring the first Stanley Cup Final goal of his 13-year, 1,121-game NHL career, he skated to the glass with both arms raised triumphantly.

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Djokovic reflective after French Open win

PARIS — Despite all of Novak Djokovic's success over the years — the 12 major championships, the career Grand Slam, the time ranked No. 1 — he still finds himself searching for self-confidence these days.

That's what an elbow injury and forced absence from the ATP tour can do to a player.

Djokovic was reflective and revealing Wednesday after moving into the third round at the French Open by virtue of a self-described up-and-down performance in a 7-6 (1), 6-4, 6-4 victory over 155th-ranked Jaume Antoni Munar Clar of Spain. Both of Djokovic's matches so far have been against qualifiers; neither win was particularly impressive.

"At the moment, I'm not playing at the level I wish to, but at the same time, I understand that it is the process that obviously takes time," said Djokovic, whose seeding of No. 20 is his lowest at a Slam in 12 years. "And I'm trying to not give up."

At least he got through in straight sets, saving energy for whatever might come next at Roland Garros. Other leading men were forced to work a lot harder in matches they would have been expected to breeze through: No. 2-seeded Alexander Zverev, No. 4 Grigor Dimitrov and No. 19 Kei Nishikori all faced two-sets-to-one deficits and all emerged to win Wednesday.


OAKLAND, Calif. — Cleveland and Golden State were stretched to their limits in the conference finals this time around, leaving little time to recoup and prepare for their latest date in the NBA Finals.

"Splintered" is how Stephen Curry described what he feared could happen in the second quarter of Game 7 at Houston with the Warriors pushed to the brink by the Rockets in a thrilling West showdown.

So, Golden State held a serious team chat and got it together at last. LeBron James willed his Cavaliers back to the big stage with another spectacular performance as Kevin Love sat out.

"It was a special moment for us. And I think one that we'll look back, if we get the job done over these next two weeks, where, again, as an appreciation of all that goes into winning a championship," Curry said Wednesday, "and doing it by committee and making sure every guy, whether you're playing well or not, or things are going your way or not, that we all bring something to the fold that have gotten us to four straight Finals.

"And we've done it by appreciating everybody that's a part of that

group. I think that two and a half minutes was a special moment for us, and it should give us great momentum going into the series."

Here are some things to watch for heading into Game 1:

James' shot

James isn't ready to make any bold predictions about how great he might be in his eighth straight Finals.

There's no doubt in his mind he will be ready when the ball tips.

"The level that I can play at is to be seen, but the level that I put into the game and put into my craft is who I am," James said. "So numbers and things like that kind of take care of itself. But

for me, I understand and I know how much I put into the game. So everything else is OK."

No rest for the weary

With only two days between games after the Warriors eliminated the Rockets 101-92 on Monday night, Draymond Green is happy to have an opponent in Cleveland he knows so well.

"In recent years we've been kind of having a week off, at most, to prepare for the Finals. It's almost a day to prepare this time," he said. "So it definitely helps knowing the opponent, knowing, obviously, everything stops and starts with LeBron, and trying to do what we can to make things tough on him, but also take other guys out of the game."

The Cavs finished their series Sunday at Boston, so James spent a relaxing Memorial Day Monday with family having a barbecue.

Injury woes

Both teams face significant injury concerns: Golden State defensive stopper and 2015 Finals MVP Andre Iguodala was ruled out for Game 1 with a bone bruise in his left knee, while Love remains in the NBA's concussion protocol with his status uncertain.

Woods hopes he's close to putting his game together

DUBLIN, Ohio — The two biggest figures at the Memorial, Jack Nicklaus and Tiger Woods, managed to carve out some private time at the back of the 10th tee amid a mass of people Wednesday at Muirfield Village.

Some of it was just catching up. The two most prolific winners of major championship had not seen each other since April at the Masters.

And the tournament host had some encouraging words.

Nicklaus complimented Woods on his swing, and then told him what Woods has felt for the last few months.

"He was saying that my swing is starting to look a little bit better," Woods said. "And I said, 'Yeah, I'm really not that far away,' and he totally agreed. He just kept urging me to be patient with it because he could see that I've made some pretty big strides this year, and not far away from putting it all together."

The Memorial presents such an opportunity.

Woods has won at the course Jack built a record five times. The most recent victory was in 2012, when he took command from behind the 16th green by turning a potential bogey into a chip-in birdie that Nicklaus still thinks is one of the best shots he ever saw.

The most recent appearance? That's different.

Woods last played the Memorial in 2015. In the last few months before a series of back surgeries, Woods shot 85 in the third round, the worst score of his career. Because an uneven number of players made the cut, Woods teed off Sunday morning as a single and shot 74.

"I tried, and

unfortunately on this golf course, hitting it as bad as I did, it just wasn't good enough," Woods said.

As for playing as a single? Woods smiled.

"I didn't want to have anyone watch me play the way I was playing," he said.

Rory McIlroy was standing at the side of the room as Woods spoke, listening to a player with 90 victories worldwide talking about the time he signed his name to an 85 on his scorecard. McIlroy recalled his highest round at 83 in the South African Open in 2007, his seventh tournament as a pro.

McIlroy climbed the steps to the stage as Woods was leaving and said to him, "Aside from your 85, you have won here five times."

Those are the memories Woods hopes to draw from when the Memorial begins Thursday on a Muirfield Village course in its usual mint condition. The tournament is two weeks before the U.S. Open at Shinnecock Hills, and it has the kind of field that makes it feel like a mini-major.

Only two players from the top 10 in the world are missing: Jon Rahm

making his debut at No. 1 in the world, an achievement that doesn't come with a trophy but one that meant enough to him that he stayed up later than usual when he got home after The Players Championship to see the world ranking page with his name at the top. He took a screen shot.

"Seeing every golfer in the world behind my name is a pretty fun thing," Thomas said.

Dustin Johnson, who doesn't appear to be concerned with much in life, conceded he was eager to get back the No. 1 ranking he held for 15 months. This is his first tournament since he lost the No. 1 spot to Thomas.

Nicklaus was around the first and 10th tee boxes during the pro-am to greet them all, a list that includes Jordan Spieth and Rickie Fowler.

Woods has made strides since his return from

a fourth back surgery, including a runner-up finish at the Valspar Championship in March, and an exciting charge at Bay Hill that ended with a tee shot out of bounds on the 16th hole.

Nicklaus suggested on Tuesday that Woods has to learn anew how to win because it has been five years since his last victory.

McIlroy understood what he meant, having gone 18 months between victories until he won the Arnold Palmer Invitational. McIlroy started this year with good chances at Abu Dhabi and Dubai, and then he broke through at Bay Hill.

"As long as you put yourself in contention more and more and keep knocking on the door, sooner or later you're going to step through," McIlroy said. "And then with that, experience will do great things for you going forward."

DETROIT Mother of G League player who died sues

The mother of a G League player who died in March after collapsing on the court during a game has filed a federal lawsuit accusing the NBA and the Detroit Pistons of negligence.

Zeke Upshaw played for the Grand Rapids Drive, a G League affiliate of the Pistons. He collapsed during a game at Grand Rapids on March 24 and died two days later.

The lawsuit was filed Wednesday in U.S. District Court for the Southern District of New York. The NBA and Pistons are named as defendants. Jewel Upshaw, the player's mother, is the plaintiff, both individually and on behalf of Zeke Upshaw's estate.

PHILADELPHIA Judge considering fraud investigator in NFL case

Lawyers for the NFL urged a federal judge Wednesday to appoint a special investigator to look into what the league said is extensive fraud in claims on the \$1 billion concussion settlement.

NFL attorneys said a study by the independent auditors in the claims process showed about 440 claims were flagged for denial based on evidence of fraud by attorneys, doctors or former players. Lawyers representing the former players and their estates said most of the opportunity for fraud has been resolved because anyone filing a claim after the settlement's effective date has to see a neuro-specialist from a list of approved certified physicians.

VALENCIA, SPAIN Egypt's FA: Salah won't be out longer than 3 weeks

The Egyptian Football Federation says Mohamed Salah's shoulder injury will not keep him out for longer than three weeks, meaning he should be fit to play at least some part in the country's World Cup campaign.

Magic president Jeff Weltman said the team used a "deliberate approach" and took its time, but insisted that the franchise made the right hire.

Brees nabs Wooden jersey for Purdue to display

When Drew Brees heard a 1930s-era Purdue jersey worn by John Wooden was being sold at auction, he saw an opportunity to help his alma mater showcase its ties to a man most known for winning 10 NCAA men's basketball titles as UCLA's coach.

Brees says he paid \$264,000 to win a late-hour bidding war for the jersey in mid-May and will allow Purdue to display it at Mackey Arena in West Lafayette, Indiana.

"I had never seen any Purdue related in regards to memorabilia ever from John Wooden," the New Orleans Saints quarterback said in a phone interview with The Associated Press. "I mean, think about it, it's over 80 years ago. So the minute that I saw this, I thought 'This belongs at Purdue. Purdue has to have this and I'll do whatever I can to make sure they do.'"

The jersey is white — albeit somewhat yellowed by time — with "Purdue" written across the front in gold letters with black trim. A gold No. 13 with black trim is on the back.


