

Pipe fix won't raise rates

Cost of replacing leaky pipe inside Hathaway bridge with underwater line estimated at \$7.1 million

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PANAMA CITY — Water bills will not increase to pay the estimated \$7 million to install a new underwater drinking water line by the Hathaway Bridge going to the Beach, County Manager Bob Majka said Monday.

The County Commission on Tuesday is voting on a resolution that allows the board — should it take out bonds to finance the work — to include money it has already spent on dealing with the leaky water pipe in the bond financing, such as the cost of hiring Marshall Brothers Construction to lay down a temporary line along the south sidewalk of the bridge.

“Let’s say we get a traditional bank loan,” Majka said. “This (resolution) will be irrelevant. It won’t matter. But it’s a necessary step in the

event we want to use tax-exempt bonds to do this, so the board is not obligating itself to any terms.”

Majka said the latest cost estimate for installing the new underwater pipe combined with the costs incurred so far is no greater than \$7.1 million, Majka said.

Staff is considering financing options of either 10 years or 30 years.

The funds to pay for the work or finance it would come from the county’s wholesale water fund reserves, which Majka said are significant. According to Majka, there’s enough in the fund to pay cash to lay down the line, though the county is unlikely to take that route as depleting the fund too much could spell trouble if another emergency expenditure comes along.

Right now, because of the reserves the repair “won’t impact the water rates — retail or wholesale — for any customer,” he said.

But if the county drained the reserves — which are built up slowly by a setting aside

Justices side with baker in cake case

Supreme Court says larger issue ‘must await further elaboration’

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court ruled Monday for a Colorado baker who wouldn’t make a wedding cake for a same-sex couple in a limited decision that leaves for another day the larger issue of whether a business can invoke religious objections to refuse service to gay and lesbian people.

The justices’ decision turned on what the court described as anti-religious bias on the Colorado Civil Rights Commission when it ruled against baker Jack Phillips. The justices voted 7-2 that the commission violated Phillips’ rights under the First Amendment.

The case had been eagerly anticipated as, variously, a potentially strong statement about the rights of LGBT people or the court’s first ruling carving out exceptions to an anti-discrimination law. In the end, the decision was modest enough to attract the votes of liberal and conservative justices on a subject that had the potential for sharp division.

Justice Anthony Kennedy said in his majority opinion that the larger issue “must await further elaboration” in the courts. Appeals in similar cases are pending, including one at the Supreme Court from a florist who didn’t want to provide flowers for a same-sex wedding.

The disputes, Kennedy wrote, “must be resolved with tolerance, without

Former Beach officer claims self-defense in Rock-it Lanes assault

PC officer also involved in dispute has resigned

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PANAMA CITY BEACH — A former Panama City Beach police officer charged with pulling his service weapon on a citizen in the parking lot at Rock-it Lanes while off-duty has filed a motion asking a judge to dismiss the case, saying he acted in self

defense.

Former PCBPD Corporal Scott Womack filed the motion two weeks ago. He has been charged with aggravated assault with a firearm and battery after the March 2 incident, but claims under Florida Statute 776.012 and 776.032, which states a person is justified in the use of force or threat of the use of force to defend themselves against imminent “unlawful” force against them, that the case should be dismissed. A

judge has not yet ruled on the motion, and Womack’s case will be up for a hearing again on June 28.

An internal investigation, completed by PCBPD Lt. Eusebio Talamantez and completed on March 26 with Womack’s resignation from the department sheds light on the series of events that led up to the altercation, as well as possible discipline Womack could have faced had he not resigned.

According to the internal report, Lt. Talamantez found

during the course of his investigation that Womack violated several articles of the department’s Standard Operating Procedures, including involvement in a major crime of moral character; disorderly conduct off duty; flagrant misuse, handling or display of firearm; being intoxicated in public and carrying an off-duty firearm into an establishment where the officer will consume alcohol.

TODAY IN HISTORY

Today is Tuesday, June 5, the 156th day of 2018. There are 209 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 5, 1968, Sen. Robert F. Kennedy was shot and mortally wounded after claiming victory in California's Democratic presidential primary at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles; assassin Sirhan Bishara Sirhan was arrested at the scene.

On this date:

In 1527, a month after Rome was conquered by troops of the Holy Roman Empire, Pope Clement VII surrendered.

In 1794, Congress passed the Neutrality Act, which prohibited Americans from taking part in any military action against a country that was at peace with the United States.

In 1884, Civil War hero Gen. William T. Sherman refused the Republican presidential nomination, saying, "I will not accept if nominated and will not serve if elected."

In 1917, about 10 million American men between the ages of 21 and 31 began registering for the draft in World War I.

In 1933, the United States went off the gold standard.

In 1947, Secretary of State George C. Marshall gave a speech at Harvard University in which he outlined an aid program for Europe that came to be known as The Marshall Plan.

In 1950, the U.S. Supreme Court, in *Henderson v. United States*, struck down racially segregated railroad dining cars.

In 1967, war erupted in the Middle East as Israel, anticipating a possible attack by its Arab neighbors, launched a series of pre-emptive airfield strikes that destroyed nearly the entire Egyptian air force; Syria, Jordan and Iraq immediately entered the conflict.

In 1976, 14 people were killed when the Teton Dam in Idaho burst.

In 1986, a federal jury in Baltimore convicted Ronald W. Pelton of selling secrets to the Soviet Union. (Pelton was sentenced to three life prison terms plus ten years.)

It's back for a third year of family-friendly fun



Effort to address mental, addiction issues shows progress

ROSC, a coalition of local government and community stakeholders, was formed just over a year ago

LYNN HAVEN — Over one year after first rallying the troops to start addressing mental and substance abuse and treatment in Bay County, Ann Wing, the organizer of the Recovery Oriented System of Care (ROSC) coalition, seemed relieved to see a crowd of over 50 show up for the first meeting since January.

"This is not the case everywhere," Wing said.

Since April 2017, leaders from local law enforcement agencies, mental health agencies, substance abuse agencies, local government and community stakeholders have been meeting to find a better way to treat mental health and substance abuse issues and, by extension, lower arrests, recidivism rates, substance abuses, overdoses and suicides.

Key to their goal, Wing said, is ensuring they are all moving in the right direction and improving relationships between agencies.

It's a big goal, but little by little, Wing reminded the group, progress is being made.

"There are ROSC efforts that are happening in our county on an everyday basis," Wing said. "Some of it is not necessarily brought to the group, but

there are partnerships going on ... that we haven't had in the past."

After putting out a report analyzing strengths, weakness and challenges in January, the group has spent the last six months in small groups addressing some of the issues identified.

For example, Chairwoman of the Housing Steering Committee Lisa Aufdencamp said they've been successful in increasing housing by two units a month.

"Michael Johnson with the City of Panama City has done a really great job of getting some local landlords on board with being more accepting," Aufdencamp said. "Some new landlords have opened up to allowing individuals to live in their properties that do have a history with substance abuse and mental health."

The group also talked about some broad initiatives they intend to take on during their Monday meeting.

One of the possible initiatives is opening a Recovery Community Organization, which would be a center for people in recovery and their families to find resources and activities. Ginny LaRue, with the Florida Alcohol and Drug Abuse Association, stressed when presenting the idea that the community organization would not favor one kind of treatment and would be certified.

The community

There's no place like a tent

BAYOU GEORGE — A deputy is dispatched "in reference to a tent up in the backyard of a vacant property." It turns out it's not the first time deputies have been called there in the last few months.

The deputy arrives and doesn't notice any unfamiliar vehicles, "but I did observe a red and white tent behind the shed in the backyard with two older white males seated next to it," the deputy wrote. "I

spoke with the males and they stated that they recently had been staying at a homeless mission in Pensacola, Florida, where they met a female who stated that she owned a house at this address. They stated that she stated that she would be returning to the residence on today's date and, if they could make traveling arrangements, they could stay at this residence."

The men said the address and directions, and that they had only

been there a few hours. One of the men then "produced a hand-written note with (the homeowner's) name and address on it, and with directions to the residence." The man accurately describes the owner but says she has no phone for the deputy to call and verify their story.

"I explained to (them) that there had been some controversy in reference to people coming onto the currently vacant property without authorization and lack of a credible manner to contact (the owner)," the deputy wrote.

The men say they will leave if the owner doesn't arrive by the next day. The men do not have any outstanding warrants, so "due to lack

of a credible way to verify or dispute their claims of permission, the males were left on the premises."

The deputy contacts the neighbor who complained and explains "the difficulty in dealing with persons found on the property because law enforcement was unable to contact (the owner) for verification," the deputy wrote. "He advised that he would keep an eye on the property and call if any suspicious activity took place."

Burnout burns man's wallet

PANAMA CITY BEACH — If you think you can afford the replace tires prematurely aged by "burnouts," you might want to consider the

cost if you get caught.

One local man found that out over the weekend when a sheriff's deputy on patrol on Thomas Drive near Dolphin "could hear the sound of an engine revving and tires breaking traction," according to a deputy's report. "I then visually observed a white Chevrolet coupe with black racing stripes breaking traction with the right rear tire while the vehicle remained in place (burnout)."

The deputy wrote he turned on his emergency lights, "effecting a traffic stop."

"The driver, George Ervin, acknowledged he was doing a 'burnout' in the roadway and was issued" a notice to appear







CALLAWAY 17-year-old charged with 3 burglaries

After a string of burglaries in Callaway and Cedar Grove last week, investigators with the Bay County Sheriff's Office believe they have arrested the culprit.

Elliot Rashod Peterson, 17, was arrested Monday, and has been charged with three burglaries, according to a BCSO news release.

Peterson is also believed to be connected to multiple burglaries in Panama City and Parker.

Video recovered from several businesses allegedly show Peterson burglarizing the property. Investigators believe Peterson's committed a rash of burglaries starting last Tuesday through Thursday morning, according to the release.

According to BCSO, Peterson allegedly stole \$300, three checks, and a high school invitation that was in amongst the checks and cash from Grover Tax and Accounting. He also allegedly broke into Lucky's Bingo, where he set off an alarm and fled the scene leaving behind a backpack with the high school graduation invitation, connecting the two incidents.

When video was showed to a family member of Peterson, they positively identified him as the man in the video. Not long after, Peterson become aware law enforcement was looking for him, and he reportedly shave his head to

try to change his appearance to throw off law enforcement.

It didn't work as a disguise, and Peterson was located by BCSO investigators Monday afternoon at a family member's home and arrested. Peterson, of 235 Wabash Avenue, was charged with two counts of Burglary of a Structure, Attempted Burglary of a Structure on a business next to Grover Tax and Accounting in Callaway, and Criminal Mischief.

Additional charges on Peterson from the BCSO are possible, as are charges from the Panama City Police Department and Parker Police Department.

TALLAHASSEE BearWise funding available to local governments

The report does find that a citizen's complaint filed in regards to Womack using a racial slur during the altercation was not sustained, as no witnesses interviewed, including the subject of the alleged slur, could corroborate the allegation.

A second officer involved in the altercation, Sgt. John Wray with the Panama City Police Department, has also resigned while under internal investigation, according to PCPD Chief Scott Ervin and the matter has been forwarded to CJSTC (Criminal Justice Standards & Training Commission) for review.

According to reports prepared by Lt. Jason Jones and Investigator Noel Howard, Womack and Wray were at Rock-it Lanes with their families and were intoxicated at the time of the altercation. A lieutenant with the Bay County Sheriff's Office, who works off-duty security at Rock-it Lanes, told investigators "he had to deal with Corporal Womack on several occasions during the evening for getting into arguments with other patrons at the bar."

At one point, Womack's daughter brought her parents over to where she and her friends were sitting, and several witnesses interviewed said that during the conversations, Womack and his wife allegedly made comments that were racial in nature to one of their daughter's friends, though not racial slurs,

which precipitated the arguments that eventually spilled out into the parking lot when the victim in Womack's assault case stood up for his friend.

After exchanging words, Wray and the black male began exchanging blows, with Wray at one point knocked to the ground after being struck. The victim stated that he grabbed Womack in a "bear hug" to keep him from joining the scuffle with Wray, but Womack "was going bezerk," allegedly taking his off-duty weapon out of its holster and pointing it at the victim, putting it to his head and saying "you want me to cap you, motherf*****? I will cap you." During his interview, Wray stated that at no point during the altercation, even when he was on the ground, did he feel like deadly force was justified. Another Panama City officer also at Rock-it Lanes with them that night but not involved in the altercation agreed that "nothing she witnessed constituted deadly force." Womack declined to be interviewed, instead referring investigators to his attorney.

A video of the incident posted to the social media at SnapChat appears to show Womack pushing something into the face of the victim with his right hand. As the video progresses, it becomes clear that object is a handgun. It appears that a woman, at one point, attempts to get Womack to put the gun down. Later in the altercation, Womack holsters the handgun again, but keeps his hand on it throughout the video, until he and his wife leave the area.

March for Our Lives plans voting drives this summer

PARKLAND — March for Our Lives, a youth movement started by students who survived a school shooting that killed 17 people here, plans to fan out across the country this summer in a bus tour to register young people to vote.

The tour is scheduled to start on June 15 in Chicago and has dozens of planned stops over 60 days, and activists plan to register young people to vote in states including California, Connecticut, Iowa, Missouri, South Carolina and Texas. A separate tour is scheduled to make 27 stops in Florida, one in each of the state's congressional districts.

"We are encouraging people around the country to educate themselves on their vote, to get out there and turn voting into more of an act of patriotism than a chore," Cameron Kasky, a student at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School and founder of March for Our Lives, said at a news conference here Monday morning. "This generation is the generation of students

you will be reading about next in the textbooks."

Organizers said the bus tour will register young people at each stop, talking to them about gun reform and whether local candidates support them or have the support of the National Rifle Association. Kasky pointed out that more than four million people turned 18 this year and are eligible to vote in November's mid-term elections.

The stops on the bus tour are targeted: the group aims to register students in areas of the country where politicians are backed by the NRA, and activists also will travel to communities that have been impacted by gun violence, meeting with survivors and victims.

"This issue affects every community, and we're all fighting for our lives," said Ryan Deitsch, a Parkland student. "We need to take our communities back from the NRA, and continue this movement. We'll make our voices heard, register young people to vote, get them to the polls, and change America's gun policies so that these senseless tragedies stop."

The bus drive is the latest iteration of March for Our Lives, which was founded by students shortly after the Feb. 14 shooting at Stoneman Douglas. It has led to a wave of activism; in March, tens of thousands of people across the country gathered to demonstrate gun violence

in student-organized marches.

March for Our Lives is working to make voter registration its long-term goal. Shortly after the Parkland shooting, students fanned out to register young people to vote at high schools and colleges nationwide. Groups from around the country hosted voter drives during school walkouts in April on the anniversary of the 1999 massacre at Colorado's Columbine High School. They are setting up voter-registration tables at gun-control marches and are working to galvanize the nation's youngest voters around a single issue.

The students have taken particular aim at the NRA and politicians who receive support from the organization, and gun control advocates have started the #votethemout movement to remove those politicians from office. The NRA did not immediately respond to a request for comment Monday.

Groups including Rock the Vote, Headcount, NAACP and Mi Familia Vota will be working with the student bus tour to support digital and in-person voter registration.

undue disrespect to sincere religious beliefs, and without subjecting gay persons to indignities when they seek goods and services in an open market."

The same-sex couple at the heart of the case, Charlie Craig and Dave Mullins, complained to the Colorado commission in 2012 after they visited Phillips' Masterpiece Cakeshop in suburban Denver and the baker quickly told them he would not create a cake for their wedding celebration. They were married in Massachusetts because same-sex marriage was not yet legal in Colorado.

Colorado law prohibits discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation, and the commission concluded that Phillips' refusal violated the law, despite Phillips' argument that he is opposed to same-sex marriage on religious grounds.

Colorado state courts upheld the determination.

But when the justices heard arguments in December, Kennedy was plainly bothered by comments by a commission member that the justice said disparaged religion. The commissioner seemed "neither tolerant nor respectful of Mr. Phillips' religious beliefs," Kennedy said in December.

That same sentiment coursed through his opinion on Monday. "The commission's hostility was inconsistent with the First Amendment's guarantee that our laws be applied in a manner that is neutral toward religion," he wrote.

Liberal justices Stephen Breyer and Elena Kagan joined the conservative justices in the outcome. Kagan wrote separately to emphasize the limited ruling.

Justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Sonia Sotomayor dissented. "There is much in the court's opinion with which I agree," Ginsburg wrote of Kennedy's repeated references to

protecting the rights of gay people. "I strongly disagree, however, with the court's conclusion that Craig and Mullins should lose this case."

The Trump administration intervened in the case on Phillips' behalf, and Attorney General Jeff Sessions praised the decision. "The First Amendment prohibits governments from discriminating against citizens on the basis of religious beliefs. The Supreme Court rightly concluded that the Colorado Civil Rights Commission failed to show tolerance and respect for Mr. Phillips' religious beliefs," Sessions said.

Kristen Waggoner, the Alliance Defending Freedom senior counsel who argued Phillips' case, said the court was right to condemn the commission's open antagonism toward Phillips' religious beliefs about marriage.

Waggoner said Phillips is willing to sell ready-made products to anyone who enters his store. But,

"he simply declines to express messages or celebrate events that violate his deeply held beliefs," she said.

Phillips was at his shop Monday morning, where he was busy answering the phone and getting congratulations from his supporters in person, including his pastor. One woman brought him balloons and others hugged him.

The American Civil Liberties Union, which represented the couple in its legal fight, said it was pleased the court did not endorse a broad religion-based exemption from anti-discrimination laws.

"We read this decision as a reaffirmation of the court's longstanding commitment to civil rights protections and the reality that the states have the power to protect everyone in America from discrimination, including lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people," said James Esseks, director of the ACLU LGBT & HIV Project.

a small portion of customers' payments each month — and an emergency came along it would present a problem. While the fund had about \$24 million in it at the beginning of the fiscal year, portions of that are already budgeted out for other projects.

"If we end up being short at that point, that could result in a rate increase. And we want to avoid that," Majka said.

The line built into the Hathaway Bridge, one of two major water lines going to the Panama City Beach, is intermittently leaking. The Department of Transportation (DOT) designed

the bridge to include the line inside the bridge, but later changed its guidelines so this is no longer allowed.

Two major unresolved issues are whether the existing water line inside the bridge must be completely removed and whether the state DOT could pitch in funds to help the county with those costs since it designed the bridge to include the pipe.

"That is something that still needs to be decided," Majka said. "Typically, the DOT does not pay for the relocation of utility lines."

Majka said taking the existing water line out of the bridge would be doable, but tedious.

"We'd just cut (the pipe) up into a bunch of small thin pieces and get it out through the access way," Majka said. "It would just

be very time-consuming."

Jason D. Peters, the director of transportation operations for the District 3 DOT office, said in a letter to the county on March 7 that the department would like the county to pursue the relocation of the water line off the bridge and removal of all pipe from inside the bridge.

Ian Satter, a spokesperson for DOT, said Monday that state officials and the county are in discussions about the issue and who might pay for it.

"Nothing has been decided at this point," Satter said.

Beach Mayor Mike Thomas said he feels confident in the county's \$7 million figure, which he said was provided by Marshall Brothers. "They have

been very accurate with their proposals," Thomas said. "They've done a great job every time they've done something for Bay County."

Thomas said residents need not be concerned about water rates increasing as a result of the project, as the city is locked in contractually with the county on the wholesale rates.

He said the city's water pressure has been fine since Marshall Brothers laid down the temporary line on the south side of the bridge.

"Certainly until it's done, everybody kind of worries about having a problem before the project gets finished," he said. "They seem to be moving really good, so I'm not concerned about it at all."

Programs remove 15,000 lionfish

More than 15,000 lionfish were removed from Florida waters thanks to several tournaments held across the state that target the tasty invasive species.

Five of those fish were tagged previously by Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) staff — earning a hefty payday for the angler — as part of the 2018 Lionfish Challenge, a removal incentive program that started May 19 on Lionfish Removal and Awareness Day.

“This is an amazing showing for the 4th annual Lionfish Removal and Awareness Day weekend and surrounding events,” said Jessica McCawley, director of FWC’s Division of Marine Fisheries Management.

“Lionfish were removed via tournaments and the FWC’s incentive program, and the public got to learn first-hand about lionfish and what they can do to help at festivals like the one in Perdido Key held by the FWC and Coast Watch Alliance, as well as various other partners.”

Winning and setting a record in Perdido Key was Capt. Josh Livingston and the crew aboard the Dreadknot out of Destin, known as Team Florida Man.

Last year, the Dreadknot group of fishermen won the FWC Lionfish Challenge and they are on track to do it again.

“We should win it again,” Livingston said, noting they snagged 1,200 pounds of lionfish in the two-day tournament at Perdido Key a couple of weeks ago.

Livingston and crew go

fishing for lionfish about once or twice a week and have an efficient working system.

He said they send one diver down per site.

“We can clean a site off in two to three minutes,” Livingston said. They average about 25 fish per site.

“We’re putting a hurting on them,” he said.

The Lionfish Challenge runs through Sept. 3. More than 200 people

have already registered to participate in the statewide challenge, which rewards lionfish harvesters with prizes for their lionfish removals, tagged or not.

The tagged lionfish component is new this year and includes cash prizes up to \$5,000.

Lionfish were tagged at 50

public artificial reefs across the state. Harvesters who caught the five tagged fish took home cash prizes up to \$2,500 and non-cash prizes as well.

All five tagged fish were caught off Escambia County.

Although, Livingston and crew pulled in 2,403 fish during the World Championship at Perdido Key, they didn’t get a tagged one. He said they were fishing on private spots and not the public reefs.

Tourist hotspots Vegas, Orlando get more anti-terror money

LAS VEGAS — Federal officials have awarded more money under an anti-terrorism grant to tourist hotspots such as Las Vegas and Orlando after deciding to include the number of visitors and high-profile special events when calculating the risk of an attack.

The Urban Area Security Initiative awards money by ranking cities’ vulnerability based on population, valuable targets and other factors.

Officials in Florida and Nevada have argued that Las Vegas and Orlando should rank higher on the list. An Orlando nightclub was the scene of a mass shooting in 2016, and last year a gunman opened fire on a country music festival in Las Vegas in the deadliest mass shooting in modern U.S. history.

Federal officials sent letters to Florida and Nevada officials in April and May letting them know about the change in assessing risk.

“If funding is available and we have a disproportionate risk, then we deserve to get some of the funding that our taxpayers send to Washington, D.C.,” said Jerry Demings, the sheriff of Orange County, Florida, which includes Orlando.

More than 42 million people visited Las Vegas in 2017, while Orlando saw a record 72 million tourists last year at its theme parks and other attractions, making it the most visited destination in the U.S.

Las Vegas is receiving \$5 million from the program this year, nearly double what it got last year. Orlando will get

a \$1.5 million grant — its first award in five years.

New York City, which tops the list created after the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks, saw a slight increase and will get about \$179 million.

Federal officials haven’t explained why the change was made after years of requests from politicians or said whether the large-scale attacks in Orlando and Las Vegas played a role.

Lesley Fulop, a spokesman for the Department of Homeland Security, said in a statement the agency’s grant programs are flexible and are “used to help address evolving threats.”

Nevada Republican U.S. Sen. Dean Heller and Democratic Rep. Dina Titus, whose district includes the Las Vegas Strip, both pushed for changes to the program months before the Oct. 1 shooting on the Las Vegas Strip.

After the attack, Heller’s office said he spoke to President Donald Trump about the program.

Still, Trump proposed slashing the program in his budget request earlier this year. It marked the third straight White House to say cuts were justified because some grant money sat unused.

Members of Congress instead poured another \$25 million into the program, raising funding to \$630 million.

The central Florida region plans to use the grant money for its counter-terrorism center, tactical first aid kits for mass casualties and bomb squad equipment.

The Las Vegas money is earmarked for bomb squads, hazardous material teams and a counter terrorism center.

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Accountability for opioid crisis

Every year for the past several years, hundreds of Floridians have lost their lives to opioid abuse. Countless others have lost their health, financial security, liberty, families and dignity. It's easy enough to write them off as addicts. But Florida, along with the nation, is in the grips of a drug-abuse crisis that outscales history, and over the past decade, investigative reporters and governmental regulatory agencies have uncovered clear and consequential links between the surge in addiction, and callous, deceitful behavior by large pharmaceutical companies. Even as they reaped billions of dollars from the sale of high-voltage painkillers, the companies knew their drugs were more dangerous than anyone suspected — as a recent report published in The New York Times details. That story (and others like it) portrays the myriad ways companies schemed to cover up the truth — not just through their own marketing, but with a barrage of deceptive tactics that included fake patients-rights groups and paid-for endorsements by medical professionals. But even as they touted the safety of their drugs, corporate executives were well aware patients were crushing pills for a more potent high and doctor-shopping for multiple prescriptions, the Times report and others have revealed.

That's why we applaud the decision by Florida Attorney General Pamela Bondi to drag these companies into court and hold them accountable.

Some have criticized Bondi for delaying Florida's entry into litigation. But Florida could benefit from other states' trailblazing efforts. Bondi also had to work within the confines of a Florida law that caps fees for law firms that handle this kind of massive, complex litigation — a move that made it tough to recruit a law firm, as detailed by The Tampa Bay Times.

But Bondi put together a team of private attorneys, and they're casting a wide net. Named defendants in the suit include big pharmaceutical firms such as Purdue Pharma, which makes OxyContin, as well as distributors who are accused of knowingly shipping vast quantities of the easily abused drugs to "pill mills" across the state. At one point, Florida bore the shameful distinction of being a national leader in illicit prescriptions for powerful painkillers.

The suit sums up the litany of destruction: "Loss of lives, babies born addicted to opioids, adults unable to work, treatment costs, emergency personnel costs, law enforcement expenses, naloxone (a drug used to treat addiction) costs, medical examiner expenses, foster care expenses, self-funded state insurance costs, and lost tax revenues, among many others." It accuses drug companies and distributors of a "campaign of misrepresentation" to maximize their profits, with reckless indifference for the ensuing wreckage.

Bondi, and other officials, are right to confront these massively wealthy firms and demand justice.

What better way to sell your expensive power than to own the company that you sell to and have a captive customer base? Even better, you buy a Gulf Power that has historically low rates when compared to other


power companies. You sell your expensive power to Gulf Power, their costs rise, Gulf Power runs to the commission and asks for a rate increase.

Trump: US farmers will be treated fairly in trade talks

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump defended his tough trade negotiations with China, Canada and Mexico on Monday, saying that U.S. farmers have been treated “unfairly.” The president vowed to turn the tide and break down large trade barriers with top trading partners.

Trump opened the week with a series of tweets pointing to his ongoing trade talks with China and a slew of U.S. allies, pointing to his work to help the nation’s agriculture industry. He tweeted that farmers hadn’t been “doing well for 15 years,” blaming the policies of Mexico, Canada and China.

“By the time I finish trade talks, that will change. Big trade barriers against U.S. farmers, and other businesses, will

finally be broken. Massive trade deficits no longer!” Trump tweeted. In a separate tweet, he wrote that China “already charges a tax of 16% on soybeans. Canada has all sorts of trade barriers on our Agricultural products. Not acceptable!”

The president last week imposed tariffs on steel and aluminum imports from top U.S. trading partners, including

Canada, Mexico and the European Union. And he has threatened tariffs on up to \$200 billion in Chinese imports, raising the potential for retaliation in a dispute involving the globe’s two largest economies.

Senate Republicans have warned that the tariffs could dampen the economic gains from the GOP tax cuts and sour

the mood among voters as lawmakers are campaigning to protect the Republican majority in Congress.

Many farm-belt lawmakers worry that the trade disputes could make American farmers the target of retaliation. Mexico, for example, has said it will penalize U.S. imports including pork, apples, grapes and cheeses.

Groups backed by the influential Koch brothers’ network announced they were launching a new multimillion dollar campaign to oppose tariffs and highlight the benefits of free trade. The groups — Freedom Partners Chamber of Commerce, Americans for Prosperity and The LIBRE Initiative — called on Congress to exert oversight by requiring House and Senate votes on any new tariffs and urged the lifting of

the recent steel and aluminum tariffs as well as those being proposed on goods from China.

Freedom Partners’ James Davis said they wanted to confront “protectionist ideas” they say would hold back the economy.

Trump has also received blowback from world leaders. British Prime Minister Theresa May told Trump that his decision to impose tariffs on steel and aluminum imports from the European Union was “unjustified and deeply disappointing.”

Trump’s hard-line rhetoric comes as Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross returns from China as part of the ongoing trade discussions. The White House said the meeting focused on reducing the U.S. trade deficit by having China buy more agricultural and energy products.

New iPhone to include ways to use it less

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Apple introduced new controls for limiting how much time customers spend on their devices as the company tackles criticism that its devices are becoming increasingly addictive and distracting. The controls allow users to set “Do Not Disturb” modes on their phones, such as at night or during trips to the playground with their kids. During that time, app notifications will be blocked from showing up on the home screen. The phone’s screen can also be set to dim automatically just before bedtime.

Apple also will give users reports on how much time they spend on apps and what gets them to check them constantly. They can set time limits on specific apps — and set controls for kids.

Last month, Google revealed plans to have Android phones go into “shush” mode when placed face down on a table and have the screen show only greyscale colors late at night. Both companies’ efforts come as experts worry that all the flashy colors and beeps give users short-term, feel-good rewards while increasing stress in the long run.

The new Apple features previewed Monday won’t reach users for a few months. Rather, they were shown to let software developers start building apps to make iPhones and other Apple devices more useful.

And that underscores a paradox: Apple is introducing features to limit iPhone use at the same time it’s encouraging more use by building in more useful features.

Other highlights from the show include:

Better browsing privacy

Apple is taking a swipe

at ubiquitous “share” buttons created by Facebook and others to track your behavior online regardless of whether you click on them. The company says it’s shutting down that tracking through its Safari browser in an update to Mac and iOS devices, including iPhones and iPads. Apple senior vice president Craig Federighi said such tracking would be blocked by default. Even if users click to share an item, they will get a prompt with an option to prevent subsequent tracking.

He also said Apple would crack down on so-called “fingerprinting,” in which data companies identify specific devices by creating a unique fingerprint based on a device’s particular configuration settings, installed fonts and plug-ins. Apple plans to instead send out generic data to such collectors, making a user’s device look just like any other Apple device. Federighi said the changes will make it “dramatically more difficult for data companies to identify you and track you.”

Last year, Apple added “intelligent tracking prevention” that imposes time limits on tracking cookies and takes other measures to try to prevent advertising tech companies from following users around the web.

Augmented reality gets augmented

Apple rolled out new support for augmented reality applications as it unveiled a new format for digital objects that appear to live in the real world.

The update comes as Apple tries to extend AR experiences to a broader population, rather than just hard-core, tech-savvy users. The company started that effort last year when it built AR tools into most iPhones and iPads; by contrast, Google had limited that to niche Android phone models.

Feds: Skimping can't save seniors from rising med cost

WASHINGTON — Medicare recipients filled fewer prescriptions for pricey brand-name drugs — but spent more on such meds anyway, says a government report released Monday. It blames rising manufacturer prices for squeezing older people and taxpayers.

The Health and Human Services inspector general's office says it found a 17 percent drop in the overall number of prescriptions for brand-name medications under Medicare's "Part D" drug program over a recent five-year period.

But beneficiaries' costs for branded drugs went in the opposite direction. From 2011 to 2015, their share of annual costs rose by 40 percent, from \$161 in 2011 to \$225 on average. Data for 2011-2015 were the most recent available for the analysis.

"Increases in unit prices for brand-name drugs resulted in Medicare and its beneficiaries paying more for these drugs," said the report. Rising Medicare payments for brand-name drugs "will continue to affect Part D and its beneficiaries for years to come."

Although new drugs priced at \$100,000 a year or more grab headlines, the report emphasized that the most persistent problem for Medicare beneficiaries is the high cost of maintenance medications for common chronic conditions like diabetes. Total out-of-pocket costs for patients were highest for brand-name insulin, cholesterol drugs and asthma inhalers.

The affordability of

maintenance medications "directly impacts Medicare beneficiaries and their ability to access the prescription drugs they need to stay healthy," Ann Maxwell, assistant inspector general, said in an interview. "This has an immediate direct impact on their quality of life and their health."

The data driving the report predate the Trump administration, but its conclusions dovetail with how officials view the problem. HHS Secretary Alex Azar says two of the main issues for the U.S. are high list prices for drugs and high out-of-pocket costs, especially for Medicare beneficiaries.

The administration has proposed a long list of measures to increase competition, shed light on pharmaceutical pricing and straighten out industry and government practices seen as artificially raising costs. But drug pricing is cryptic and complex; it remains unclear how long the administration will take to put plans in place, and how dramatic an impact that would have.

President Donald Trump seems to be itching for something more immediate. He recently hinted that major drug companies will soon announce "voluntary massive drops in prices." No details were

forthcoming.

About 43 million Medicare beneficiaries have prescription coverage under a Part D plan, according to the nonpartisan Kaiser Family Foundation, with premiums that vary widely, averaging \$41 a month this year. The benefit is subsidized by taxpayers and administered through private insurers, which are supposed to act as negotiators for beneficiaries and Medicare.

Initially the program was credited for encouraging a frugal shift to generic drugs, but in recent years spending has accelerated. Polls regularly find that the public is alarmed

about the cost of prescription drugs, and that voters regardless of political affiliation want government action.

Among other findings from the report:

- Drugmakers raised prices more rapidly for the most commonly used brand-name medications, with the highest demand among Medicare patients. Average costs for the 200 drugs with the most prescriptions in 2015 rose at nearly double the rate of increase for branded drugs as a whole.

- The share of Medicare enrollees spending \$2,000 a year or more of their own money for brand-name drugs nearly doubled over the five years studied, reaching 7.3 percent in 2015.

- Total program spending for brand-name drugs increased by 77 percent from 2011 to 2015, from \$58 billion to \$102 billion. That statistic is a measure of taxpayers' growing exposure.

- Rebates paid by manufacturers didn't seem to make a huge dent in costs. After accounting for rebates, Medicare reimbursement for branded drugs still increased by 62 percent. That was the case even though total rebates more than doubled, from \$9 billion in 2011 to \$23 billion in 2015.

Drugmakers often pay rebates to middlemen called pharmacy benefit managers, or to insurers. The payments are tied to expected sales of a drug and other factors. Insurers say they use the money to keep monthly premiums in check. But the Trump administration wants some of the rebates to be paid back directly to patients when they purchase medications.





Man agrees to 15-year term for plotting San Francisco attack

A man who told undercover agents that he wanted to carry out a Christmas Day bombing and shooting attack at a popular San Francisco tourist attraction will receive a 15-year sentence after pleading guilty Monday in a federal case.

Everitt Aaron Jameson, 26, admitted under a plea deal that he attempted to aid a terrorist organization after he planned the attack during talks with undercover FBI agents, including one he thought was with the Islamic State group.

Jameson, a former tow-truck driver from Modesto, told undercover federal agents that he planned to use pipe bombs to channel victims into part of Pier 39 so he could shoot them.

Kenya accounting officials to have anti-corruption vetting

All procurement and accounting officers in Kenya's ministries and state-owned corporations are to leave their offices for fresh screening, an official announced Monday, as President Uhuru Kenyatta's government grapples with endemic corruption.

The officers are to submit personal information including their assets, liabilities and previous record of service by Friday, according to a statement signed by Interior Ministry Spokesman Mwenda Njoka. He said he does not know how many officers will be affected, but some experts say that more than 500 officials will have to step away from their jobs and submit to new scrutiny.

MOGADISHU, SOMALIA
US says airstrike in Somalia kills 27 al-Shabab extremists

The U.S. military says it has carried out an airstrike in northern Somalia that killed 27 al-Shabab extremists.

The statement issued Monday by the U.S. Africa command said it assesses that no civilians were killed in the attack on Sunday about 26 miles southwest of Bosasso, the commercial capital of the semiautonomous Puntland state. The area has recently seen attacks on local forces by extremists aligned with the Islamic State group.

The Trump administration approved expanded military operations against extremists in Somalia, including al-Shabab, which is linked to al-Qaida and was blamed for the truck bombing in October that killed more than 500 people.

George H.W. Bush released from Maine hospital

Former President George H.W. Bush has left a Maine hospital after more than a week of treatment for low blood pressure and fatigue.

A Bush spokesman tweeted Monday that the president "deeply" appreciates the care and good wishes he has received. Spokesman Jim McGrath also said that Bush is "back to his old self" and looking forward to a summer with family and friends. The 93-year-old Bush was admitted to the hospital on May 27 and was released Monday.

The 41st president posted a picture of himself Friday reading the book "George & Barbara Bush: A Great American Love Story." Bush said the book is "a wonderful walk down memory lane."

Italy mayor halts school lunch after suspect food poisoning

The mayor of the Adriatic city of Pescara has suspended the public school lunch service as a precaution after some 80 children and half a dozen teachers were treated at hospital emergency rooms over the weekend for intestinal cramps, diarrhea and vomiting.

Public health officials said Monday they hadn't determined the cause, saying the suspected food poisoning could be from a toxin or bacteria, but not a virus. Most of the children were sent home but a few were admitted to the hospital.

Mayor Marco Alessandrini posted the city ordinance suspending the lunch program on his Facebook page.

Bill Clinton bristles at questions on Lewinsky, #MeToo

WASHINGTON — Former President Bill Clinton says the #MeToo movement is overdue. Just don't ask him about Monica Lewinsky.

In an interview with NBC's "Today Show" released Monday, Clinton bristled at questions over whether he should have resigned 20 years ago over his sexual relationship with the White House intern and whether the #MeToo movement has changed his perspective.

At the same time, the former Democratic president claimed credit for empowering women in his orbit and disputed that he might owe Lewinsky a private apology, insisting his public televised apology was adequate.

Lewinsky wrote in March that their relationship "was not sexual assault" but "constituted a gross abuse of power."

"I dealt with it 20 years ago, plus," said Clinton. "And the American people, two-thirds of them stayed with me. And I've tried to do a good job since then, and with my life and with my work. That's all I have to say."

Clinton is promoting his new fictional thriller, "The President Is Missing," with

best-selling author James Patterson.

In clips released from the interview, Clinton was at times both vague and combative in his answers, repeatedly blaming his critics and even the NBC interviewer for "omitting facts" by trying to lump him in with other men who have abused their positions of power to leverage sexual relationships.

Clinton said he was right not to resign. And while he said he supports the #MeToo movement, "I still have questions about some of the decisions which have been made."

Clinton said he doesn't think President Donald Trump has gotten a free pass, but that Trump's alleged exploits haven't "gotten anything like the coverage you would expect." Trump has been accused by more than a dozen women of sexual misconduct and was caught on tape bragging about grabbing women's crotches.

On any parallels between the two presidents, Clinton said: "A lot of the facts have been conveniently omitted to make the story work, I think partly because (Trump's supporters) are frustrated that they got all these serious allegations against the current occupant in

the Oval Office. And his donors don't seem to care."

On not resigning, Clinton said: "I think I did the right thing. I defended the Constitution."

Patterson joined Clinton for the NBC interview, and seemed equally surprised that Clinton would be asked about the Lewinsky scandal on his book tour. At one point, Patterson noted that other presidents, John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson, also were suspected of having extramarital affairs and that it was in the past.

"It's 20 years ago. Come on. Let's talk about JFK. Let's talk about, you know, LBJ. Stop it already," Patterson said.

In March, Lewinsky wrote in "Vanity Fair" about Clinton:

"He was my boss. He was the most powerful man on the planet. He was 27 years my senior, with enough life experience to know better. He was, at the time, at the pinnacle of his career, while I was in my first job out of college. (Note to the trolls, both Democratic and Republican: none of the above excuses me for my responsibility for what happened. I meet Regret every day.)"

They were harassed. Now, they want a hearing on profiling

When Darren Martin found himself facing a half-dozen armed police officers summoned by a new neighbor who thought he was an armed robber, his dominant emotion was fear — of not being able to explain himself in time, of making the wrong move, of getting shot while doing absolutely nothing wrong.

A month later, the former Obama White House staffer has a different concern: that his widely shared #MovingIn-WhileBlack experience will be a largely meaningless blip in history.

Trying to turn their bad moments into a national call for action, Martin and several other black people who've had police sicced on them while they've been doing innocuous things — a meme-able phenomenon hashtagged #LivingWhileBlack — are asking for a congressional hearing on the issue.

On Monday, they sent a letter to the leaders of the House and Senate Judiciary committees, asking for a hearing on racial profiling before the August recess.

"These egregious affronts on human rights, eerily reminiscent of some of the darkest chapters in our nation's history, are the sad reality for Black people in America," the letter says. "We would request that this new hearing widen the focus from just the police, as in previous hearings, to addressing prejudice and profiling from public companies to private citizens, as well."

The signers shared the letter with The Washington Post before sending it to Congress.

The other unexpectedly viral stars who've signed the letter have their own horror stories: Lolade Siyonbola, the Yale graduate student who was #NappingWhileBlack when a fellow student dialed 911, and Donisha Pendergast, the Bob Marley granddaughter of #AirBnBingWhileBlack fame.

The request for a congressional hearing is an attempt to use their sudden celebrity to combat a culture they say too often looks at the actions of black people with criminal-tinted glasses.

Martin said the notion of a congressional hearing was obvious, given his political background. Then he reached out to Siyonbola, Pendergast and others, hoping their collective voices would spur legislative action.

Policymakers in the past have held hearings to address racial profiling by police, but Martin said legislators should do something to combat unnecessary and outrageous calls by the people who summon officers in the first place.

Martin said he's not promoting a specific policy position or piece of legislation, but rather would like to hear what a collection of experts, victims and legislators has to say about potential solutions to the issue.

"If it's a conversation about an American problem, we want to have solutions for that," he told The Washington Post. "Why don't we formalize that?"

"This is something that [black people have] talked about in our community for a long time. It's finally getting out to other people. Everyday

racism is sort of getting out there. It's like 'now y'all have seen something, let's do something about it.'"

The "do something," of course, is the hard part. Calling the police on people who are doing nothing except being black is an affront to an innocent person's dignity and, Martin argued, a possible threat to their safety. But should it also be a crime?

"I think it's an important question. I don't think there's an easy answer," said Phillip Atiba Goff, president of the Center for Policing Equity, a nonprofit that promotes police transparency and accountability. "If you fine people for things like that, you're creating a huge moral hazard where people who are most likely to need to call law enforcement are hesitant to do so."

"But if you fail to regulate [the calls], you're doing nothing to punish the racist decisions of the citizens who weaponize law enforcement."

In the letter, Martin says the issue of the assumed criminality of black people is something that has haunted black people in America since black people have been in America.

Still, he told The Post that he realizes that his moment of fame is as fleeting as the #Living-WhileBlack hashtag, and he wants to seize the moment.

When he hit record on his phone that Friday night in Manhattan, "I didn't know when I shared it that it would go viral. . . . Now it's a real opportunity for us to have a real conversation."

Volcano death toll expected to rise

Guatemala's disaster agency says hot ash and mud have already killed 62 people

EL RODEO, Guatemala — Rescuers pulled survivors and bodies Monday from the charred aftermath of Guatemala's Volcano of Fire, as the death toll rose to 62 and was expected to go higher from a disaster that caught residents of remote mountain hamlets off guard, with little or no time to flee to safety. Using shovels and backhoes, emergency workers dug through the debris and mud, perilous labor on smoldering terrain still hot enough to melt shoe soles a day after the volcano exploded in a hail of ash, smoke and molten rock.

Bodies were so thickly coated with ash that they looked like statues, and rescuers were forced to use sledgehammers to break through the roofs of houses buried in debris up to their rooflines to try to see if anyone was trapped inside. Fanuel Garcia, director

of the National Institute of Forensic Sciences, said 62 bodies had been recovered and 13 of those had been identified.

"It is very difficult for us to identify them because some of the dead lost their features or their fingerprints" from the red-hot flows, Garcia said. "We are going to have to resort to other methods ... and if possible take DNA samples to identify them."

Hilda Lopez said her mother and sister were still missing after the slurry of hot gas, ash and rock roared into her village of San Miguel Los Lotes, just below the mountain's

flanks. "We were at a party, celebrating the birth of a baby, when one of the neighbors shouted at us to come out and see the lava that was coming," the distraught woman said. "We didn't believe it, and when we went out the hot mud was already coming down the street."

"My mother was stuck there, she couldn't get out," said Lopez, weeping and holding her face in her hands.

Her husband, Joel Gonzalez, said his father had also been unable to escape and was believed to be "buried back there, at the house."

Yet a roster with only five players remaining from last year's national champion was able to prosper. Make that survive.


Chipola's 10-7 win over top-seeded Walters State late Saturday evening culminated a march through the losers'

It also overcame the result of a coin toss that required Chipola meet San Jacinto North in an elimination game while Walters gained a bye into the finals.


Then again, this was a Chipola team that lost five of its final six regular-season games prior to the state/

Davis eager to resume coaching career with Bucks

After spending two years away from high school basketball, Tony Davis decided it was time to get back on the sideline. He'll get to do just that starting next season for Bozeman High School, as the Bucks named him their new head boys basketball coach after former coach Michael Memmen left for the same job at Mosley High School.

Davis, 45, was a former football and basketball star at Chipley High School who went on to play football for the University of Florida. He last coached high school basketball at Bainbridge (Ga.) as an assistant to his old high school coach Rickey McCullough in his final season with the Bearcats in 2015-16. He had previously spent eight seasons as the head coach at Blountstown.

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Injury too much for Serena to overcome

Williams out of French Open before Maria Sharapova match

PARIS — Serena Williams tried to play through the pain of an injured chest muscle. Eventually, barely able to serve, she knew she had to call off her Grand Slam comeback.

Williams pulled out of the French Open less than an hour before she was supposed to face Maria Sharapova in a fourth-round showdown Monday, the most-anticipated match of the tournament so far.

The announcement came two days after the 36-year-old American initially felt something was wrong during a singles victory.

But she hid that bit of information — even from her coach — and a day after Williams struggled through a doubles loss with her sister, Venus.

This was Williams' first major tournament in 16 months, and her first as a mother.

She was pregnant when she won the Australian Open in January 2017 for her 23rd Grand Slam singles

championship, the most for anyone during tennis' 50-year professional era. Her baby was born last September.

"I have given up so much to be here. There is times where I'm on the court and I'm practicing, and I look on the monitor, and I see my daughter and she's playing, and I want to be there," Williams said. "But I know that these are the sacrifices you have to make to live out your dream.

"And I have made every sacrifice that I could. So it's extremely disappointing."

Her voice trembled a bit during a brief news conference, where she explained she will get an MRI on Tuesday and consult with doctors before figuring out what comes next.

Her coach, Patrick Mouratoglou, said in an interview that an ultrasound revealed the injury to the muscle, but the extent wasn't clear.

"The fact that I physically can't serve at all is a good indication that maybe I should just go back to the drawing board and stay positive," Williams said, "and try to get better and not get it to a point where it could be a lot

worse."

In a statement released by the tournament, Sharapova wished Williams "a speedy recovery."

This would have been their 22nd career meeting; Williams has won 19, including the past 18.

Because of the withdrawal, this does not count as a victory for Sharapova, who will play 2016 French Open champion Garbine Muguruza on Wednesday.

Oddly enough, Muguruza didn't have to put forth much effort in the fourth round, either.

Her opponent, Lesia Tsurenko, stopped because of an injury after only two games.

No. 1 Simona Halep, a two-time runner-up at Roland Garros, will play former No. 1 Angelique Kerber, a two-time major champion elsewhere, in Wednesday's other quarterfinal after both picked up easy straight-set wins in the fourth round.

The quarterfinals Tuesday are Sloane Stephens vs. Daria Kasatkina, and Madison Keys vs. Yulia Putintseva. Kasatkina eliminated Australian Open champion Caroline Wozniacki 7-6 (5), 6-3 in a

match that resumed Monday after being suspended a night earlier because of darkness at 3-all in the second set.

The day's biggest buzz was about a match that never took place.

Williams said she first was troubled by her pectoral muscle during the best performance of her return, a 6-3, 6-4 win in the third round against 11th-seeded Julia Goerges on Saturday. But Mouratoglou had no idea there was an issue.

She didn't tell him she was hurting? "No, because she knew I would tell her not to play the doubles," he told the AP. "I would have made her cancel the doubles, believe me."

During Sunday's doubles, though, Williams showed signs of trouble.

By the third set, she hit first serves at about 80 mph (130 kph), about 40 mph (70 kph) slower than she can.

Between points, she repeatedly jabbed a thumb into her chest to massage the muscle.

"At the end, she was just pushing the ball. ... That's when I knew she had a problem. I didn't know what kind of problem, but I knew there

was something really wrong," Mouratoglou said. "Basically, she couldn't play."

Williams tried taping up the muscle for doubles, but that didn't help.


And while she's "pretty much had every injury in the book," this was the first time dealing with this particular malady.

Mouratoglou said they held a practice session Monday morning, holding out hope that maybe rain in the forecast would postpone the match against Sharapova.

"We might gain one more day, and you never know how it feels tomorrow. So we had to wait," he said. "But we saw the sky was still blue ... and we thought, 'No chance.'"

Sharapova's coach, Thomas Hogstedt, said that word of Williams' withdrawal arrived while his player was doing warmup exercises outside the locker room at Court Philippe Chatrier, waiting for the match ahead of theirs to finish.

"She was keen on playing Serena. It's a little bit sad, I think, for everyone. Everybody looked forward to this match," Hogstedt said. "This match has had so much build-up."

Tigers draft right-hander Mize with No. 1 pick

SECAUCUS, N.J. — Casey Mize went from undrafted three years ago all the way to No. 1.

The Detroit Tigers selected the Auburn right-hander with the top pick in the Major League Baseball draft Monday night. The announcement at MLB Network studios marked the second time the Tigers led off the draft, and first since they took Rice pitcher Matt Anderson in 1997.

The 6-foot-3, 220-pound Mize had long been linked to the Tigers, and he pitched his way this season to the top spot on Detroit's list. Mize went undrafted out of high school three years ago, but developed into a potential big league ace while in college.

"It means a ton," Mize said in an interview on MLB Network's broadcast. "I'm very thankful that the Tigers thought of me enough to take me with their first selection. I can't describe this feeling right now."

Mize is 10-5 with a 2.95 ERA and 151 strikeouts with just 12 walks in 109 2/3 innings while helping the Tigers to the NCAA Tournament super regionals. Mize has solid command of four pitches, including a fastball that hovers in the mid-90s

(mph). His outstanding command and wicked split changeup whip up lots of swings and misses.

Mize became only the seventh player in draft history to go from undrafted in high school to the No. 1 pick since Stephen Strasburg went to the Washington Nationals in 2009. "All of us in the Tigers organization are thrilled to select Casey with this pick, and are confident that he will become a pillar in our player development system that's going to bring winning baseball to Detroit for seasons to come," Detroit general manager Al Avila said. "Being a college pitcher — especially coming from the Southeastern Conference — we know Casey has seen elite competition before."

With the second selection, San Francisco took slugging Georgia Tech catcher Joey Bart, the Atlantic Coast Conference player of the year. Perhaps Buster Posey's replacement someday, Bart follows in the footsteps of big league backstops Matt Wieters and Jason Varitek, who also came out of Georgia Tech.

Bart led the conference in hitting with a .359 average and topped the Yellow Jackets with a .632 slugging percentage, 79 hits, 16 home runs, 55 runs and a .471 on-base percentage.

school. He checked the box with all of those."

Patton said there were nearly a dozen applicants for the job. Six of those applicants were interviewed, and Patton said Davis separated himself in their face to face meeting.

"It was his presence. He had a presence about him in the interview. I can't quite put my finger on it," he said. "He was obviously an athlete himself and has ties to this area. He seemed confident and really wanted the job and said that Bozeman was a place where he could pick up where we left off and maybe take us to a new level. Sitting next to him, he was charismatic and I think the kids are really going to respond to him."

That process has already started, with Davis running his new players through two practices thus far. Games are more difficult to find this summer for Davis given the late date of his hire, though he said he's perfectly fine with

getting more practice time to get the players acclimated to his style of coaching.

"I really prefer a lot of practice time now anyway, especially considering we're putting in a new system," he said. "We really need the practice time before we go out and play some teams. It's one thing to go out there and look organized, but it would be organized chaos if we were playing right now."

The first summer game for the Bucks will be June 14 against Palm Bay at home. In the meantime, Davis will try to get his players up to speed on the way he wants them to play and approach the game.

"We're just trying to increase the basketball IQ, increase the knowledge and the way we try to play the game, to play it the right way," he said. "I come from a program where you always run and gun and trap up and down the court. Of course we know that your style of play will have to be adjusted to the kids you have and the type of talent on your team."

"Once I get more involved with the team, I can see what we need to do from that point. As of right now, we're just

doing some fundamentals and trying to increase the IQ in a way you can build the foundation of your program off of."

Adjusting to a new program and new players can be a difficult challenge, especially when getting a late start, but for Davis, getting back into the business of coaching after a two-year absence makes it all worthwhile.

"It's very tough (being away from it)," he said. "I've always played basketball and coached basketball, been involved with sports and activities, but I was able to step away from the game and see a lot, watch a lot, just enjoy life and kind of regain my strength and excitement. When I started watching it and training with the kids at Mowat, when you get in the gym and hear the shoes and the ball bouncing and you smell that locker room, you get the juices flowing again."

"I've had different coaches ask me to come and look at their team and critique it and give my opinion, and all that stuff together pushes you back to say I want to get back involved and that's what happened."

region tournament in Lakeland.

"You know, these kids have really been resilient and grinding it out since the start of the state tournament," Chipola head coach Jeff Johnson said. "When they got knocked down they were always getting back up."

"They never flinched. They kept battling to find ways to win games."

While quickly acknowledging the strength of competition at nationals, Johnson added that it took the Indians a few games to hit their stride.

They picked up their first win when Jared Howell hit a two-run walkoff homer in a 10-8 win over Barton. The Indians run-ruled Temple College, then advanced with an incredible 14-13 win in 10 innings against Iowa Western.

Not only did Chipola have to score twice after two were out in the top of the ninth to force extra innings, the Indians threw a runner out at home merely to get the opportunity to win in the 10th.

Chipola scored twice in the

eighth inning to break a tie with Walters State in the first rematch, then Phillip Sanderson tossed a shutout in another run-rule triumph, that one reduced to just five innings against San Jacinto North.

The brevity of that encounter, which advanced Chipola to the championship against Walters State, also was crucial.

"(Sanderson) came to me after the game and told me that he could go the next day," Johnson said. "We got to the seventh and he said 'Coach, I'm ready to go.'"

Sanderson closed out the Senators, 60-8, to culminate Chipola's rally from a three-run deficit in the finals. The comeback cemented the Indians' third national championship, all under Johnson.

"We had some very interesting situations where anything could have happened," Johnson said. "They just kept grinding it out."

"We didn't play very well early in the championship game, had some baserunning mistakes and some errors. It probably was the sixth inning until we zeroed in."

Center fielder Edmond Americana and catcher/first baseman Max Guzman were the only two regulars who returned

from the 2017 championship team. Spot starter Andrew Grogan was the lone pitcher, and reserves Francisco Urbabaz and Jordan Hollins quickly grew into featured roles.

"I think that's a great credit to our coaching staff and for the players buying in," Johnson said. "When we lost five out of six we were concerned going into the state tournament."

In addition to Sanderson, who was named the tournament's outstanding pitcher, Morgan McCullough was 13 for 22 with two home runs offensively and named both the best defensive player and all-around MVP.

Americana was 14 for 32 with four home runs.

Johnson said that some of the Indians, including Guzman who came on strong during the second half of the national tournament could be rewarded accordingly in the three-day Major League Baseball Draft that began on Monday.

Maybe not during the opening rounds on Monday night, but possibly some in rounds 3-10 on Tuesday and others during rounds 11-40 on Wednesday.

Last June, 10 players from Chipola's 2017 national powerhouse were selected in the draft.

Capitals on verge of Stanley Cup

The expansion team's Cinderella run is in danger of coming to a quick end.

Marc-Andre Fleury allowed six goals on 23 shots, and by the time Neal and Reilly Smith scored in the third period, it was too late.

Tenn. Tech, Duke break through to make 1st super regionals

A Tennessee Tech team that boasts the nation's most high-powered offense relied on its pitching to earn the biggest win in program history Monday night.

The Golden Eagles of the Ohio Valley Conference knocked No. 4 national seed Mississippi out of the NCAA Tournament by beating the Rebels twice, 15-5 in the afternoon and 3-2 to clinch the Oxford Regional title.

Tech joins Duke, Minnesota, Stetson and Washington as teams that will make their first appearances in super regionals. Winners in those eight best-of-three series advance to the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska.

Duke won the Athens Regional on Monday with two wins over No. 8 national seed Georgia. Mississippi State and South Carolina also advanced, giving the Southeastern Conference five teams in supers.

Eight of the 16 national seeds have been eliminated in regionals, including four of the top eight.

Defending national champion Florida, the No. 1 overall seed, played Florida Atlantic late Monday night in the Gainesville Regional final. Florida Atlantic forced a second final with a 7-4 win earlier in the evening.

Tennessee Tech, a No. 2 regional seed, has put up some of the college game's biggest offensive numbers in years this season, but it was the pitching of closer-turned-starter Ethan Roberts in the afternoon and Devin Lancaster and Nick Osborne at night that carried the Golden Eagles against Ole Miss.

"Everyone talks about our offense, but our pitchers can pitch, too," said Trevor Putzig, whose homer tied it 2-2 in the sixth.

Lancaster went the first 5 1/3 innings, allowing two runs on four hits. Osborne came on to start the seventh after playing the first six innings in right

field and allowed two hits the rest of the way to make Kevin Strohschein's seventh-inning sacrifice fly stand up.

In the first game, Roberts, normally the closer, made his second start in 63 appearances and went a career-long 7 2/3 innings before leaving the game with a 10-2 lead.

"Our goal from the beginning was Omaha, so we're one step closer," Putzig said.

Where do they stand?

As Warriors chase third title in 4 years, how would Kevin Durant and Co. stack up against NBA's dynasties?

OAKLAND, Calif. — Stephen Curry and coach Steve Kerr's Golden State Warriors have repeatedly said they want to build something special for the long haul, to compete for championships year after year.

LeBron James considers his familiar NBA Finals opponent among the best teams ever.

Where the Warriors will put themselves in the dynasty debate if they win a third championship in four years. And if they continue to win titles — and there domination doesn't appear to be ending anytime soon — there won't be any debate.

"As a fan of the NBA, you could go down the list of the teams that won multiple years and just dominated the league for stretches of time," Curry said.

The Warriors are trying to join Bill Russell's Celtics, the Bulls led by Michael Jordan and the Lakers' trio of title runs fueled by George Mikan in the 1950s, Magic Johnson and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar in the '80s, and Shaquille O'Neal and Kobe Bryant nearly 20 years ago as the only franchises in NBA history to capture three championships in four years.

The Warriors are halfway there, holding a 2-0 lead against the underdog Cavs as the series shifts to Cleveland for Game 3 on Wednesday.

"Listen, Golden State is one of the best teams I've ever played. It's one of the best teams that's ever been assembled," said James, who is playing in his eighth straight NBA Finals and fourth in a row against Golden State.

Curry, sharp-shooting Klay Thompson, fiery Draymond Green and 2015 Finals MVP Andre Iguodala make up an All-Star-studded squad trying to repeat after James thwarted that quest two years ago when the Cavs stopped the defending champs. Kevin Durant bolted from Oklahoma City to join the cast last season.

"You look at it, they've got four Hall of Famers on their team in Klay, Dray, Steph and KD. They've got a Finals MVP that comes off their bench," James said in reference to Iguodala. "... I don't know where they will fall in my book, but they will have a nice chapter."

Not everybody is ready to crown the Warriors as a dynasty, not just yet anyway. Not even if they win the title this year.

"I don't like to go dynasty stuff, they've been the team of the decade," said Gary Payton, the longtime Seattle SuperSonics point guard who played 17 seasons through 2007. "That's what it is. They've been doing their thing. When we get into a dynasty is Michael Jordan and them winning six, that's a dynasty. The Golden State Warriors (would have) won three out of four, that's great."

"It's coming to be a dynasty. If you win a couple more, then you're talking about a dynasty. So three of them is in the right stage and the right movement to becoming a dynasty, yes."

The defending champions are playing in a fourth straight finals chasing a repeat they couldn't pull off in 2016 after capturing the franchise's first title in 40 years during 2014-15 with Kerr as a rookie head coach.

TNT analyst and former player Charles Barkley wants nothing to do with dynasty talk regarding the Warriors.

"We don't have any dynasties. It's been a long time since we've had a dynasty," Barkley said. "The Bulls won six, the Spurs won five. We've had a lot of really good teams. I think the only dynasty is the Spurs. They've been great for 20 years. The Warriors are not going to win. Winning two in four years is not a dynasty."

Golden State would love nothing more than to continue building momentum as the franchise approaches the opening of its new San Francisco arena, Chase Center, in summer 2019 if all remains on schedule. That leaves one last season at Oracle Arena.

B.J. Armstrong earned titles alongside Jordan with the Bulls from 1991-93. If the Warriors win another, they will join dynasty status in Armstrong's mind.

"They're right there," Armstrong said. "For them to have a sustained level of excellence like they've had, I don't take that for granted and I think anyone who's played or observed this game knows how difficult that is for one, let alone to be able to get here four times and have an opportunity to win three speaks for itself...."

"If they win this one, they're right up there with all of the teams for a dynasty-type caliber situation up here in Golden State."

FIFA says the interim order applies while Guzman is under investigation.

Details of the case were not published Monday, though Guzman reportedly allowed FIFA-funded facilities to be used for a political meeting.

FIFA rules require soccer federations to stay neutral from politics.

MOSCOW Security Putin's top priority but threats loom

For President Vladimir Putin, the World Cup marks a moment of pride, a long-sought opportunity to showcase



Russia's achievements and bolster its international prestige.

The Russian leader has made security of the tournament the top priority, ordering an array of measures to fend off any potential threats from the ground, sea or air.

"This whole event was intended to be a soft power exercise for Russia," said Mark Galeotti, a senior fellow at the Institute for International Relations who has closely followed Russian security agencies. "The Russians are going to try to ensure they can do whatever they can to

make it secure."

But despite the meticulous preparations, security challenges abound in a country that has fought a separatist insurgency in the North Caucasus, faced a spate of suicide bombing and other terror attacks for years and waged a military campaign in Syria.

Radical Islamists of all stripes could be eager to target the World Cup to hurt Russia and raise their profile.

OAKLAND, CALIF. Burke, ESPN agree to contract extension

Doris Burke is staying on ESPN's airwaves for several more years, after the basketball analyst and the network announced Monday they have agreed on a long-term extension.

Burke will remain a full-time NBA game analyst, as well as a reporter for ESPN and ABC coverage of the conference finals and NBA Finals.

Her tenure with ESPN dates to 1991, not long after her playing career at Providence ended.

Burke will be honored later this year by the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame as a recipient of the Curt Gowdy Media Award, honoring what the Hall said is her "significant contribution to the game of basketball."

WASHINGTON Trump calls off Eagles visit over anthem dispute

Digging deeper into a culture war that he's repeatedly stoked, President Donald Trump on Monday called off a visit by the Philadelphia Eagles to the White House Tuesday, citing the dispute over whether NFL players must stand during the playing of the national anthem.

Trump said in a statement that some members of the Super Bowl championship team "disagree with their President because he insists that they proudly stand for the National Anthem, hand on heart, in honor of the great men and women of our military and the people of our country."

He said the team wanted to send a smaller delegation, but "the 1,000 fans planning to attend the event deserve better."

Instead, Trump said he would be hosting "a different type of ceremony," featuring the United States Marine Band and the United States Army Chorus, that "will honor our great country, pay tribute to the heroes who fight to protect it, and loudly and proudly play the National Anthem."
