Mexico Beach requests fire service

Mayor: City has 'significant' fire fee, poor ISO rating

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BAY COUNTY — Mexico Beach wants Bay County to take over the city's fire department, saying the county could operate the service more efficiently.

"As you may be aware, the city of Mexico Beach has recently

implemented a fire assessment," Mexico Beach Mayor Al Cathey wrote in a letter dated May 17 to county commissioners. "In order to comply with the new Florida fire regulations and to avoid an undesirable 10 ISO rating, the city chose to abandon our long-established volunteer fire department. Addressing the deficiencies with our equipment and facilities became our top priority."

The Bay County Commission on Tuesday directed staff to study the proposal, in which

the Mexico Beach Fire Department would be incorporated into the Bay County Fire District, and Mexico Beach residents would be charged a county fire tax on property taxes instead of the city's fire assessment fee - which ranged from \$281 annual assessments on residential to 40 cents per square foot for commercial land and \$43 a year for vacant land. That tax was approved earlier this year.

The board agreed to hold a public hearing on the issue at the June 19 county commission

meeting.

In his letter, Cathey adds that the new fire assessment "has come with a significant unavoidable cost to all residents, businesses and property owners."

"Not only does our fire department service our city limits, we also service neighboring portions of unincorporated Bay County," Cathey wrote.

On behalf of the Mexico Beach City Council, the letter formally

Temporary city offices up and running during repairs

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PANAMA CITY — Throughout A.D. Harris Learning Center, classrooms have temporarily been converted into Panama City offices.

New blue signs direct visitors around the temporary City Hall, but it doesn't stop a steady stream of people from visiting the new city manager's office — the closest building to the parking lot — and saying, "I'm sorry, but I'm so lost. Can you tell me where (insert office) is?"

Meanwhile, city departments have pared down to their most basic supplies, put the rest in storage and embraced the, at times, almost comically tight quarters that come from fitting multiple cubicles into former classrooms.

"No secrets in this room," said Public Works Director Neil Fravel, who is in one of the most crowded spaces, with a smile. "I don't have to

Prosecution: Teen's rape began with tainted drink

PCB man faces sex charges after 2016 encounter

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PANAMA CITY — In May 2016, neighbors in an affluent community watched as a naked and distraught 16-year-old fled the house of a man he said had drugged and raped him.

More than two years later, the teenager faced Andrew Allan Pace in court to tell a jury that one of the last memories he had from that day was taking a drink from Pace.

"About 15 minutes later I started feeling really

light-headed," the man, now 18, told the jury Tuesday. "It was a fainting feeling, like I was feeling depressed. It was weird."

The teen said he'd had about three beers and a shot beforehand. But although he had consumed alcohol before, he'd never felt effects like that. Afterward, he only remembered flashes of the scene until he said he briefly awoke in Pace's bed.

"I came to, and I'm tied to the bed," he told the jury. "He walks in the door naked, and I started freaking out. ... He raped me."

Pace, 65, was arrested later that day, May 20,

Today is Wednesday, June 6, the 157th day of 2018. There are 208 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: **On June 6, 1968,** Sen. Robert F. Kennedy died at Good Samaritan Hospital in Los Angeles, 25 1/2 hours after he was shot by Sirhan Bishara Sirhan.

On this date:

In 1523, Gustav Vasa became Sweden's new king, Gustav I. In 1654, Queen Christina of Sweden abdicated; she was succeeded by her cousin, Charles X Gustav. In 1799, American politician and orator Patrick Henry died at Red Hill Plantation in Virginia. In 1809, Sweden adopted a new constitution. In 1918, U.S. Marines suffered heavy casualties as they launched their eventually successful counteroffensive against German troops in the World War I Battle of Belleau Wood in France. In 1925, Walter Percy Chrysler founded the Chrysler Corp. In 1933, the first drive-in movie theater was opened by Richard Hollingshead in Camden County, New Jersey. (The movie shown was "Wives Beware," starring Adolphe Menjou.) In 1944, during World War II, Allied forces stormed the beaches of Normandy, France, on "D-Day" as they began the liberation of German-occupied Western Europe. In 1966, black activist James Meredith was shot and wounded as he walked along a Mississippi highway to encourage black voter registration. In 1978, California voters overwhelmingly approved Proposition 13, a primary ballot initiative calling for major cuts in property taxes. In 1982, Israeli forces invaded Lebanon to drive Palestine Liberation Organization fighters out of the country. (The Israelis withdrew in June 1985.)

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Trump seeks separate talks over NAFTA

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump couldn't get what he wanted from months of three-way trade talks with Canada and Mexico.

So now his administration wants to pursue separate negotiations with the two U.S. neighbors to try to overhaul the 24-year-old North American Free Trade Agreement, which Trump has condemned as a job-killing disaster.

Trump's top economic adviser, Larry Kudlow, went on "Fox & Friends" on Tuesday to convey the president's preference for dealing separately with Canada and Mexico. Kudlow said Trump doesn't plan to abandon NAFTA — something the president has threatened since taking office — but "is just going to try a different approach."

Yet it's far from clear that separate discussions by the United States with Mexico and Canada could leave the three-nation NAFTA deal altered but intact.

"It's impossible to make sense of (Kudlow's) statements," said Michael Camunez, president of Monarch Global Strategies consultancy and a former U.S. Commerce Department

official.

By saying there is no plan to leave NAFTA, "he's probably trying to keep the markets calm ... while we negotiate separate bilateral agreements."

Trade analysts said they were skeptical that Canada and Mexico, angry that the U.S. has slapped tariffs on their steel and aluminum, would be drawn into one-on-one negotiations to appease Washington.

"This divide-and-conquer strategy is not entirely unexpected, especially now that the three-way negotiating process seems to have hit a wall," said Mary Lovely, an economist at Syracuse University.

Trump has frequently expressed his preference for reaching agreements with other countries one at a time, rather than multilateral agreements like NAFTA or a 12-country Asia-Pacific deal he abandoned upon taking office last year. Earlier this year, he nudged South Korea into making concessions and accepting changes to a six-year-old trade pact between the two countries.

"He's believed that bilaterals have always been better," Kudlow said, adding: "He hates large treaties... When you have to compromise with a whole bunch of countries,

you get the worst of the deals. Why not try to get the best of the deals for the American people, the American workforce, the American economy and presumably for their economies as well?"

Most economists say broader trade deals typically work more effectively than one-on-one pacts between countries. A hodgepodge of two-country trade deals tends to distort corporate decision-making. Companies will then typically target countries with the lowest tariffs instead of trying to sell to the markets that make the most economic sense.

It "replaces market signals with tariffs and quotas," Lovely said.

What's more, Washington's new strategy could prove a hard sell in Ottawa and Mexico City, with the Canadians and Mexicans still furious over Trump's decision last week to impose tariffs on their steel and aluminum shipments. The administration has argued that a reliance on imported metals poses a threat to America's national security.

"The atmosphere is utterly toxic right now," said Edward Alden, senior fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations. "There will be enormous pressures on Canada and Mexico not to talk to President Trump."

get up and walk down the hall to talk to Dale now. I just say 'Hey Dale.'"

Staff has affectionately nicknamed it "City Hall Summer Camp."

Over the weekend, Motivated Movers packed up the last boxes from 9 Harrison Ave., closing that chapter in the city's history.

Originally, the city planned to move directly from 9 Harrison Ave. — which was abandoned because of age and to make way for new development on the marina — to what will be the new city hall in the former Trustmark building at 501 Harrison Ave. However, a number of factors complicated the move, namely construction delays and pressure to vacate 9 Harrison Ave. by the end of May as part of a series of building swaps to attempt to keep the federal courthouse in Panama City.

As a result, City Hall needed a temporary home, and A.D. Harris — which the city already owned and therefore would not have to pay rent for — was the perfect fit, according to city public information officer Caitlin

Lawrence.

"This is an ideal, because each department has their own space and we were able to accommodate things we needed to accommodate," Lawrence said.

The campus is able to fit all of the departments that used to be housed at the old city hall, including the city manager's office, public works, information technology, human resources, planning, licensing and utilities. The moving costs were \$24,580.94, according to Lawrence.

None of A.D. Harris's other tenants — a summer feeding program for youth, a GED program, a performing arts school, and a smoking cessation non-profit — were displaced by the city temporarily taking up residence.

By the end of October, Lawrence said the new city hall is scheduled to be completed and staff from both the A.D. Harris and the city's other off-site departments, including leisure services and community development, will move into their new, permanent home.

Right now at the Trustmark building, crews are working on the roof and air-conditioning units. Lawrence said as of the last meetings, the work is on schedule for the October move-in.

2016, on charges of sexual battery, unlawful sexual acts with a minor and false imprisonment.

Prosecutors opened their case Tuesday by telling the jury that Pace used promises of a modeling career to lure the teen to his home.

The victim "thought he had found a friend, but what he got was a nightmare when he was drugged, tied up and raped," prosecutor Jennifer Hawkins told the jury.

Hawkins told jurors DNA evidence would solidify their case.

Pace's defense attorney, Stan Peacock, countered that in the state of Florida, the age of consent is 16. He attempted to show jurors that the teen's recollection was unreliable because of other substances — including "Flakka," a highly addictive designer drug that causes paranoia and psychosis — and that no sexual contact ever happened.

The teen "has some foggy memories about some of the events that led to that," Peacock said. "It is our contention that (the teen's) selective memory is not contributed to my client's behavior but more so to his own behavior."

Peacock also claimed the DNA evidence for his advantage, saying it would show a third party's presence and present a doubt to state's case.

Hawkins began laying out the case that Pace had pursued the teen on social media for months before the incident. They eventually arranged to meet for lunch, drinks and to take measurements to be sent off to the Tallahassee-based Marsha Doll Models and talent agency.

At one point, the teen said he went to the bathroom and returned to Pace awaiting with a drink for him.

"Minutes after this drink, everything began to change," Hawkins said.

Rebecca Kildow, one of Pace's neighbors, was walking to the Delwood Beach community mailbox with a friend that night. As the two

spoke, they could see a naked and "hysterical" teenager running from the front door of Pace's neighboring house.

"He was begging us to not let the man in the white car get to him again," Kildow told the jury Tuesday. "He was crying and hysterical. He said he'd been tied up, raped and drugged. He thought he'd been tied up for three days."

Kildow gave the boy a towel to cover himself with. As she did, she said she realized he had once been a student at the school where she worked. But she'd never seen him act the way he was that night.

Bay County Sheriff's Office investigator Aubrey Chance arrived shortly after to find the teen curled up and laying on the ground. He noticed the teen appeared to be drugged and was wearing a watch and rings too big to fit him properly.

"He said they belonged to 'him,'" Chance said. "He didn't give a name, he just said 'him.'"

Chance said he also noticed the teen had ligature marks on his wrists and ankles.

When Chance went to the house from which the teen had fled, he said, Pace opened the door — himself completely naked. The interview eventually led to Pace's master bedroom.

"As I was scanning the room, I observed the bed had several ties on its posts," Chance said. "On all but one, there were different restraints."

Chance said one of the restraints looked identical to a ligature marking on the teen's ankle. When Chance confronted Pace with the sum

of all he'd seen and heard, Pace changed the subject and began sweating "profusely," Chance said.

Dr. Ricardo Revilla, a physician at Bay Medical Center, treated the juvenile once he arrived. He said the teen was "agitated, incoherent and fighting EMTs" and had a blood alcohol content of 0.223 percent.

Once Revilla learned how the juvenile had arrived at the hospital, he said his behavior "absolutely" made sense.

"I'm sure for him it was not clear because of the alcohol," Revilla told the jury. "But it was clear to me he had an extremely traumatic experience that day."

Peacock indicated that also could have been because of the other substances in the juvenile's body; he also tested positive for benzodiazepeme, cannabinoids and traces of "flakka."

Prosecutors also called to the stand a man alleging to have once been a target of Pace's at a Panama City Beach bar in 1999.

The man said he met Pace when he was 28 and was similarly lured into conversations with prospects of a modeling career but later felt like he'd been drugged and raped.

When asked why he had not come forward until recently, the man said "it seemed embarrassing."

As he pointed out in court the man he believed had drugged and raped him almost 20 years earlier, Pace sat with his mouth agape.

The trial continues today and is expected to go to a jury for deliberation.

requests that Bay County consider implementing a county fire tax of 1.38 mills, which would match the existing fire millage rate elsewhere in the county. The city would do away with its assessment if the proposal is approved. A millage rate is based on property value, with a mill being equal to \$1 for every \$1,000 in property value; a fire assessment is a flat fee.

County Commissioner Tommy Hamm said he had no problem with the county doing its due diligence on the proposal, but he would not want the county to get involved with a project that could be a money pit for Bay County.

Commissioner Robert Carroll, whose district includes Mexico Beach, said

the city's ISO rating, which determines homeowners insurance rates, is poor.

"We have an opportunity to help residents over there," he said. "Their ISO rating is extremely high."

However, he said the county millage rate for the service has to be fair.

Cathey asks that Mexico Beach be incorporated into Bay County's service effective Oct. 1 and requests that current chief Daniel Simmons remain as the division chief.

County Manager Bob Majka said the commission isn't committing to the proposal by asking staff to study it and scheduling public comment for June 19.

"If we come to the conclusion that it's not in the best interest of the city, the county and the taxpayers to do this, then you have the opportunity at that public hearing to deny the request," Majka said.

Guatemala volcano ravaged entire families

ESCUINTLA, Guatemala — Lilian Hernandez wept as she spoke the names of aunts, uncles, cousins, her grandmother and two great-grandchildren — 36 family members in all — missing and presumed dead in the explosion of Guatemala's Volcano of Fire.

"My cousins Ingrid, Yomira, Paola, Jennifer, Michael, Andrea and Silvia, who was just 2-years-old," the distraught woman said — a litany that brought into sharp relief the scope of a disaster for which the final death toll is far from clear.

What was once a collection of verdant canyons, hillsides and farms resembled a moonscape of ash, rock and debris on Tuesday in the aftermath of the fast-moving avalanche of super-heated muck that roared into the tightly knit villages on the mountain's flanks, devastating entire families.

Two days after the eruption, the terrain was still too hot in many places for rescue crews to search for bodies or — increasingly unlikely with each passing day — survivors.

By afternoon a new column of smoke was rising from the mountain and Guatemala's disaster agency said volcanic material was descending its south side, prompting an evacuation order and the closure of a nearby national highway. Rescuers, police and journalists hurried to leave the area as a siren wailed and loudspeakers

blared, "Evacuate!"

On Sunday, when the volcano exploded in a massive cloud of ash and molten rock, Hernandez said her brother and sister ran to check on their 70-year-old grandmother on the family's plot of land in the village of San Miguel Los Lotes.

"She said that it was God's will, she was not going to flee," Hernandez said. "She was unable to walk. It was hard for her to get around."

Her brother and sister made it to safety, but their grandmother has not been seen again.

Hernandez and her husband, Francisco Ortiz, survived because they moved out of Los Lotes just two months ago to begin a new life on a small plot of land.

The couple has been staying at a Mormon church in the nearby city of Escuintla and going to a morgue there to await news. So far only the

body of one relative, her 28-year-old cousin, Cesar Gudiel Escalante, has been recovered and identified.

"The people ended up buried in nearly 3 meters of lava," Ortiz said. "Nobody is left there."

Other families experienced similar tragedies.

As President Jimmy Morales toured the area and met with survivors on Monday, a woman begged him to help her loved ones in Los Lotes.

"Mr. President, my family is missing. Send a helicopter to throw water over them because they are burning," she said. "I have three children, a grandchild, and all my brothers, my mother, all my family are there. ... More than 20 have disappeared."

The fast-moving flows with temperatures as high as 1,300 degrees Fahrenheit (700 Celsius) and hot ash and volcanic gases that can cause rapid asphyxiation caught many off guard.

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
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Trump tweet reflects anticipation for report

WASHINGTON — Eager to begin another assault on the credibility of those investigating him, President Donald Trump said Tuesday he wants to know “what is taking so long” with an internal Justice Department investigation that is expected to cast a harsh spotlight on the FBI.

The early-morning tweet underscores how the White House and Trump’s legal team view the upcoming watchdog report as a way to damage the reputation of fired FBI Director James Comey — and, by extension, discredit special counsel Robert Mueller’s investigation into possible ties between the Trump campaign and Russia.

The report is expected to sharply criticize Comey’s handling of the Hillary Clinton email investigation, which the White House initially cited as the rationale for firing the FBI chief last year. Trump and his allies continue to believe that any censures of Comey would undercut his value as a witness against the president and back up the decision to dismiss him last May.

Democrats have long criticized Comey’s decisions — including an unusual news conference announcing his recommendation against criminal charges for Clinton, and his notification to Congress days before the election that the investigation was being reopened — as having broken from protocol in

ways that damaged Clinton’s election prospects. An inspector general report, expected within days, is likely to find fault with some of those same actions and could reopen wounds of Democrats who maintain their candidate was unfairly treated.

Trump, nonetheless, has eagerly awaited the report in hopes that any damning conclusions about Comey and the FBI will give him additional fodder to attack federal law enforcement officials. Part of the defense team strategy has been to discredit Mueller’s investigation by condemning Comey, who has testified publicly about his interactions with the president and who set in motion Mueller’s appointment by releasing to a friend a private memo he wrote documenting a pivotal encounter with Trump.

The president’s allies have come to believe that pitting Trump’s trustworthiness against Comey’s is an argument they can win, according to three people close to the White House but not authorized to discuss private conversations.

They have repeatedly attempted to tarnish the reputation of the special counsel probe, of late fixating on the claims that it was launched on the backs of memos they believe Comey improperly disclosed.

Comey has said he was authorized as a private citizen to share one of his memos with a friend, who later disclosed details of it to reporters, and has said the document did not contain classified information. In the

memo, Comey described being asked by Trump to consider ending an investigation into former White House national security adviser Michael Flynn.

Rudy Giuliani, one of the president’s lawyers, told The Associated Press in recent days that he believed the report would be damaging to Comey’s reputation. A separate report on fired FBI Deputy Director Andrew McCabe accused the former No. 2 official of having misled internal investigators about his role in an October 2016 news media disclosure, heightening anticipation that the upcoming report would pile onto that criticism.

“This is going to be the final nail in his coffin,” Giuliani said. “This guy has already proven to be a leaker and liar and we believe the report is going to make that plain.”

Trump took to Twitter Tuesday to vent publicly what he has been saying privately for days: that he wants the report released as soon as possible and is fearful that his enemies in the Justice Department may attempt to doctor it to protect Comey, according to an outside adviser and a White House official who were not authorized to speak publicly about private conversations.

“What is taking so long with the Inspector General’s Report on Crooked Hillary and Slippery James Comey,” the president tweeted. “Numerous delays. Hope Report is not being changed and made weaker! There are so many horrible

things to tell, the public has the right to know. Transparency!”

Though a draft has been done for weeks, people

whose actions have been scrutinized in it — and their lawyers — have been permitted to review a copy and propose tweaks.

That review is standard, and there is no indication that its release has been delayed for any unusual or improper reasons.

Kate Spade found dead in apparent suicide

NEW YORK — Kate Spade, a fashion designer known for her sleek handbags, was found dead in her Park Avenue apartment Tuesday in an apparent suicide, police said. She was 55.

News of her death shocked the fashion world and led to an outpouring of tributes from her legions of fans.

A housekeeper discovered Spade’s body hanging in her bedroom, police said. While investigators were still in the early stages of their inquiry, the department’s chief of detectives, Dermot Shea, said evidence including a note pointed to “a tragic suicide.”

Shea wouldn’t discuss what was in the note, but law enforcement officials told The Associated Press that, among other things, it contained a message to Spade’s 13-year-old daughter, saying it was not her fault. The officials were not authorized to speak publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity.

“We are all devastated by today’s tragedy,” Spade’s family said in a statement through a spokesman. “We loved Kate dearly and will miss her terribly. We would ask that our privacy be respected as we grieve during this very difficult time.”

The body was found not long after 10 a.m., police said. Her husband and business partner Andy Spade was in the apartment at the time. The couple’s daughter was at

school

It’s not clear how long she had been dead. The medical examiner will perform an autopsy.

A crime scene truck was parked outside Spade’s building on Manhattan’s Upper East Side, and barriers had been set up to keep back reporters and gawkers who were arriving to the building.

The company she founded and later sold, Kate Spade New York, now has over 140 retail shops and outlet stores across the U.S. and more than 175 shops internationally.

Julia Curry, a spokeswoman for the company, said that “Kate will be dearly missed” and “our thoughts are with Andy and the entire Spade family at this time.”

Neva Hall, executive vice president at Neiman Marcus Stores, said the news was devastating.

“Her creative light and bright mind will be greatly missed,” Hall wrote in a statement.

Kate Spade was born Katherine Brosnahan and grew up in Kansas City, Missouri.

She was working as an accessories editor at *Mademoiselle* magazine when she launched her company with husband Andy in their New York apartment in 1993. She started the company based on six shapes of bags that she thought every working woman needed. It created a smash.

“I grew up in the Midwest, where you have to have it (a fashion item) because you like it, not because you’re supposed to have it,” she told the AP in 2004. “For our customers, fashion is in the right place in their life. It’s an adornment, not an obsession.”

From the original boxy handbags, she expanded into shoes, luggage and other accessories, as well as a home line, stationery, and three books. Spade won multiple awards from the Council of Fashion Designers of America and was named a “giant of design” by *House Beautiful* magazine.

“As an accessory, a great bag that takes the outfit somewhere else is interesting,” she told the AP in a 2000 interview.

WASHINGTON World Bank says global economy healthy

The steadily expanding global economy should remain resilient — at least for a couple of years — the World Bank says.

The anti-poverty agency predicted Tuesday that global growth will decelerate from a solid 3.1 percent this year to 3 percent next year and 2.9 percent in 2020.

The world economy is generally healthy.

The World Bank predicts that U.S. growth will register 2.7 percent in 2018, aided by tax cuts, before slowing to 2.5 percent next year and 2 percent in 2020.

What's in your 401(k)? For more investors, just 1 mutual fund

NEW YORK — More and more retirement savers have their entire 401(k) account in just a single mutual fund, and investment advisers are fine with it.

Last year, for the first time, more than half of Vanguard's 4.6 million retirement account participants were invested in a single target-date retirement fund, according to an analysis by the mutual fund giant.

This may sound anathema to an industry that preaches the value of diversification, but these funds are designed to provide it for investors in one package. And after years of trying to manage their own investments, savers are

finding it easier to pick one fund that does the job, even if the fees may sometimes be higher.

The stakes are high that workers choose wisely because they're increasingly in charge of their own retirement savings, with traditional pension plans rare and pressures mounting on Social Security.

"People need to get two things right: They need to save enough, and they need to invest appropriately," said Jean Young, senior research analyst with the Vanguard Center for Investor Research. "That sounds easy, but it's not."

Target-date retirement funds can help with the second of those responsibilities. Savers pick a fund pegged to the year they hope to retire. If the date is far away, the fund loads up on stocks and other high-growth investments. As the

targeted year approaches, the funds automatically move into more conservative investments so that savers don't get wiped out by a plunge just before retirement, like what occurred in 2008.

It's a far cry from a couple decades ago, when one of the biggest selling points for a 401(k) plan was all the choice it afforded investors. Want a fund that specializes in just high-risk foreign bonds? How about stocks of tiny companies from Europe? Or technology stocks? No problem, you were in control.

Ultimately, many investors felt overwhelmed by the amount of choice, and that led some to have either too much or not enough risk in their 401(k). The migration into target-date funds has helped investors avoid these two danger zones of investing.

If you could go back to a pivotal age in your life, say 16 years old, and start over again, would you choose to do it?

My husband and I fell into this conversation during a recent holiday respite. While both of us wish we could have avoided some mistakes and missteps and make better use of our time,

neither of us said, "Yes, I'd like to go back and relive most of my life."

My guess is that not all but most people would make the same choice, if granted the option of starting over. Maybe we're happy with the way things turned out. Maybe we're just tired and can't envision pushing the rock up the hill again for decades. Maybe we feel like we've faced life's most difficult challenges, like childbirth and raising small children, or growing a business from the ground up, and we don't want to return to the starting line. Maybe, though, we realize that even if granted another chance, we'd probably make mistakes in our second life, too.

The same is true of our financial history. We all experience mishaps with money. How much better off would we be financially if we could go back 50 years and do things differently? We'd save more, wouldn't we? We'd start investing at an earlier age. We'd spend less on useless items and eschew unnecessarily expensive purchases. Maybe we'd make an investment that scared us off at the time; maybe we'd avoid one that didn't turn out as well as we had hoped.

Managing our money is a lot like managing our personal lives. We've all made mistakes. We all need to forgive ourselves. And we all need to realize that it's never too late to turn things around.

Winning the lottery or scoring big at a casino isn't the answer. It's not too likely, anyway. What most of us need to do is simply attempt to live within our means, to save and invest as much of our income as we can, and to keep our investments in the black each year. Some years we'll earn more than others, but we just need to move in the right direction over time.

David Koch leaving business, politics

NEW YORK — Billionaire conservative icon David Koch is stepping down from the Koch brothers' network of business and political activities.

The 78-year-old New York resident is suffering from deteriorating health, according to a letter that older brother Charles Koch sent to company officials Tuesday morning.

Charles Koch wrote that he is "deeply saddened" by his brother's retirement. "David has always been a fighter and is dealing with this challenge in the same way," he wrote.

David Koch is leaving his roles as executive vice president and board member for Koch Industries and a subsidiary, Koch Chemical Technology group, where he served as chairman and chief executive officer. Koch is also stepping down as chairman of the board for the Americans For Prosperity Foundation, the charity related to Koch brothers' primary political organization.

Charles Koch had assumed a more visible leadership role in the brothers' affairs in recent years. He will continue to serve as the CEO of Koch Industries and the unofficial face of the network's political efforts.

Democrats have demonized the Koch brothers for their outsized influence in conservative politics over the last decade. Former Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid regularly attacked Republicans for what he called a "Koch addiction."

Citing concerns about Trump's style and substance, the network refused to endorse either presidential candidate in the 2016 election. And while they have praised Trump's policies on taxes, de-regulation and health care, they have aggressively attacked the Republican administration's trade policies. On Monday, the Koch network announced a multi-million-dollar campaign to oppose Trump's tariffs and highlight the benefit of free trade.

Using the money they made from their Kansas-based family business empire, the Koch brothers have created what is likely the nation's most powerful political organization with short- and long-term goals. Their network has promised to spend \$400 million to shape the 2018 midterm elections. They have also devoted significant time and resources to strengthening conservative influence on college campuses, in the Hispanic community and in the nonprofit sector.

David Koch, who served as the Libertarian Party's vice presidential candidate in 1980, had planned to focus more on philanthropy in recent years.

Warning to the West

To be a Venezuelan of a certain age is to have endured a staggering turn of fortune. Venezuela was once the richest country in Latin America, measured by per capita GDP. It sits atop the world's largest proven oil reserves, has copious arable land, and once boasted healthy government institutions and an educated population. That was then.

Today, Venezuela is a country collapsing before our eyes, with horrific consequences for its people. The economist Benjamin Powell recently tallied up the sorry score: Inflation is running at about 18,000 percent (not a typo). There were 800,000 private businesses in 1998; today, there are 230,000. Hunger and poverty are rampant, with people trying to survive by eating rats and dogs. The average Venezuelan lost 24 pounds last year (after losing 19 the year before).

Reliable data are hard to come by, but the International Monetary Fund estimates that the country's GDP shrank by 17 percent last year alone. Crime has skyrocketed, and desperate Venezuelans are fleeing the country, creating a crisis in neighboring countries, including Colombia. The U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees estimates 5,000 Venezuelans leave every day. At that rate, 1.8 million people will depart this year.

What happened?
 In 1998, Venezuela elected socialist strongman Hugo Chavez to be president. He did what militant socialists tend to do: Expropriate private industries, spend like a drunken sailor, and chase away private capital.

For a while, the regime could get away with this, as oil prices were high. (About 95 percent of Venezuela's export revenues come from oil.) But after Chavez died in March 2013, oil prices tanked, and newly installed president Nicolas Maduro, a former bus driver, found himself in a tricky situation.

Mr. Maduro doubled down on Mr. Chavez's socialist policies. To make up for falling revenues, he simply printed money, leading to the ruinous inflation mentioned above. Now starved for foreign currency, Venezuela can't import anything, hence the grievous shortages of basics like medicine and toilet paper. Mr. Maduro's price controls, meanwhile, ensure the few remaining private businesses don't stock necessary items — they can't make any money on them.

As is often the case, as economic liberties have withered, so have political freedoms. Venezuela, on May 20, held a sham election, one roundly condemned by the United Nations, the European Union, the United States, and much of Latin America.

Mr. Maduro "won" of course, taking more than two-thirds of the vote.

It is hard to see any path out of the people's misery as long as the current regime holds power and pursues catastrophic policies.

What has happened to Venezuela is a tragedy. It also serves as a sobering warning to the West about what results when freedoms and free markets are taken away, even for supposedly compassionate ends.

Tariffs don't enhance national security; they harm it

American motorists have never had it so good. Cars and trucks are better than ever, and their prices have barely risen in this century. A host of automakers here and abroad compete fiercely to satisfy every whim a driver could have.

And I do mean every whim. The Subaru Ascent SUV offers eight seats but 19 cup holders. Last year, The Wall Street Journal reports, Ford filed a patent application for "a gyroscopic cup holder to keep a drink upright while accelerating, braking or 'while the vehicle travels upward at an incline.'"

These developments are more remarkable when you consider that the first car with built-in cup holders didn't arrive until 1983. Until then, vehicles were only slightly less austere than a stagecoach.

Today's cars also feature other innovations that even the Jetsons could not have imagined: backup cameras, navigation devices, air bags, collision avoidance systems, TVs and much more. Anything people desire, it's safe to say, automakers are either providing or

figuring out how to provide.

But it appears drivers are about to be banished from this asphalt Eden. The Trump administration has begun an investigation to determine whether imported passenger vehicles undermine national security. It argues that when Toyota or Volkswagen sells you a car that was built abroad, it puts Americans at risk.

Wrong. In the first place, we don't require a domestic supply of RAV4s to fight the next wars. In the second, we don't go begging our enemies for shipments of passenger sedans and crossovers. We buy them from our allies, who have a stake in our well-being.

The only way Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross can treat auto imports as a national security matter is to claim they damage our economy. "Without a strong economy," he claims, "you can't have a strong national security."

Oh? The Soviet Union was a superpower even though it was notorious for making shoddy consumer goods — and never enough of them. North Korea, which suffers chronic food shortages and a miserably low standard of living, presents a serious military threat to South Korea, Japan and even the U.S., which are economic giants by comparison.

But the bigger flaw in Ross' argument is the assumption

that imports harm the economy. In fact, they enlarge it and invigorate it while improving the welfare of consumers and businesses. A nation that produced everything for itself would be a materially poor one.

International trade lets us acquire more goods and services at lower costs. It makes the nation wealthier, which makes it possible to invest more in the military, intelligence agencies and other institutions that protect us from enemies foreign and domestic.

Slapping foreign-made autos with a 25 percent tariff, which is what the administration has in mind, would only impoverish us. It would raise the price of cars and trucks — not just imports but also domestic ones. If the price of a German car were to jump, makers of comparable American models would be free to raise their own prices without fear.

Trump's tariffs would undoubtedly be passed on to consumers. A new RAV4, which currently goes for about \$25,000, would probably go for about \$31,000. Luxury cars would get an even bigger increase. An Audi A6 sedan's price, now around \$50,000, would jump by about \$12,000.

Marshall Brothers to submit water plan

County requests 60 percent design plan before moving forward on waterline

BAY COUNTY — Bay County will try to negotiate a contract with Marshall Brothers Construction and Engineering to handle the design and construction of a new underwater drinking line

going to the beach instead of bidding the work out.

The Bay County Commission on Tuesday morning authorized staff to enter into negotiations with Marshall Brothers to come up with a contract in which the firm completes 60 percent of the design work for the new line along the Hathaway Bridge. The study will give the county a clearer picture of what the line might cost. County officials have estimated it won't cost more than \$7.1 million,

but acknowledge there are many variables that could alter the price.

"Once the 60 percent design work is complete, then we would negotiate a guaranteed maximum price with Marshall Brothers Construction," said Bay County Utilities Director Ben Blitch.

If the county can't negotiate a decent price with Marshall Brothers, it would re-advertise the project to other firms, Blitch said.

Blitch said staff needs

the 60 percent design plans before negotiating the work price because of the many unknowns on the project, such as exactly where the pipe will go, what size it will be and what type of materials are going to be used.

"We feel that a significant amount of design is needed in order for us to negotiate a final contract," Blitch said.

A line inside of the bridge that has been supplying the eastern end of the beach with water for years is

leaking intermittently, and the county initially hired Marshall Brothers to install a temporary line on the southern sidewalk of the bridge.

In April, the county advertised a "request for qualifications" from firms interested in handling the project, which involves laying down the water pipe under the bottom of St. Andrews Bay by the Hathaway Bridge. Only Marshall Brothers

PANAMA CITY BEACH — Panama City Beach's new \$3 million City Hall could be built as soon as next year, and residents can learn more about those plans at a public forum Monday.

Newly seated Ward 3 Councilman Geoff McConnell will host the forum, which he said will be an opportunity for residents to meet him and get insight on the history of the City Hall building.

People can "learn what the schedule and timeline


has been regarding a new City Hall and see what is proposed," McConnell said. "We will talk about the current state of the building and cover any other topics that people want to discuss."

Construction could begin in July, and City Hall could be built in a year or less, City Manager Mario Gisbert said.

"The new City Hall conceivably could be constructed by first quarter 2019," he said.

Gisbert said the new building will be funded through the city's reserve funds, which are used for capital expenditures. The city issued a request for construction bids May 3, and bids will open

Collection from 'Grandfather of Photoshop' up for auction in NYC

Photography pioneer Jerry Uelsmann has created photo montages by simply overlaying negatives since the 1960s

GAINESVILLE — Standing over a piece of familiar darkroom equipment, he hesitates.

Jerry Uelsmann, an 84-year-old photographer and longtime Gainesville resident, is an artist deemed by many as the "Grandfather of Photoshop."


Ironically, he has never used the digital software.

His fingers dance in the air. Whatever technique he may have lost to age over the years, his fingers effortlessly remember from decades spent in the darkroom.

Now watching expectantly, an image emerges where a blank canvas floated just moments before.

"It's still magic for me," he said, peering into the chemical tray where his prints are developed.

Renowned for his surrealist

black-and-white photo montages, Uelsmann is able to seamlessly overlay negatives from separate photos together into a single composite without the use of digital technology.

"I can invent a personal reality," said Uelsmann, who wears deep blue, rounded glasses and sports an "Einstein-esque" hairdo.

When he first began his work in the 1960s, it was seen

as experimental, even controversial, he said.

The world merely saw photography as a means of documentation, but he saw it as art.

Describing his creative process, Uelsmann said it's a matter of implicit memory, a subconscious energy that inspires his artwork.

Every photo he has ever taken is an experience he has

had, he said.

Now with an archive of around 50,000 photos taken in dozens of countries, from Ireland to China, organized in pull-out drawers by the year they were taken, from the 1960s until now, Uelsmann said he has a subconscious inventory of every one.

He can spend hours in the studio sifting through his archives finding combinations for his next piece, which can include up to seven separate photos, he said.

Throughout his life, he estimates he's created around 1,000 finished pieces.

But the largest-ever collection to be seen in auction, at 56 pieces, will be offered today in New York City.

The collection, previously owned by a longtime Uelsmann supporter and friend, will be sold through Heritage Auctions, one of the world's largest auction houses.

Nigel Russell, the director of photographs, said he expects the collection to do well, considering that they have auctioned around 36 of Uelsmann's works in the past, with the highest bid being \$3,750 for

one piece.

The live auction, at the Lotte New York Palace in New York City, will accept bids in person, online or by phone. The collection also is available for early bidding online at HA.com.

Although bidders tend to wait until the very last minute, Russell said as of May 29 there were already significant bids made online.

The most expensive print in the lot, 1976 Untitled (Philosopher's Desk), is estimated to sell between \$2,500 and \$3,500.

"We're very fortunate to have this large collection of Jerry's work," he said.

Although now a retired University of Florida professor, Uelsmann said he will never retire from creating art in his beloved southwest Gainesville home and studio. He jokes that it keeps him sane.

It's become more and more therapeutic, he said.

Although his medium is one slipping away to the digital age, Uelsmann stays true to the form.

"Photography has become my way to interact with the world," he said.

ST. PETERSBURG Man gets 3 years for filing false oil spill claims

Federal authorities say a man charged with filing fraudulent claims in the aftermath of the Deepwater Horizon disaster has been sentenced to just over three years in prison.

A U.S. Attorney's Office news release said Monday that 62-year-old Joseph Bassler also faces a money judgment of \$77,224. He pleaded guilty last June.

Prosecutors say Bassler was a licensed tax preparer who assisted companies after the 2010 oil spill in filing business loss claims. He filed inflated claims on behalf of his clients.

Officials say as payment for his services, Bassler accepted a portion of the recovery money from the claims he submitted. He submitted 62 claims, and three were paid off, with Bassler and his clients receiving over \$600,000 more than they were entitled to.

Dangerous fruit flies found in South Florida

State Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam said Tuesday that eradication efforts have started after three Oriental fruit flies were discovered in South Florida.

The fruit flies, which last were found in Florida in 2015, are dangerous to the farming industry because they attack 400 different fruits, vegetables and nuts, Putnam's department said in a

news release. The three fruit flies were found in southern Miami-Dade County.

"We successfully eradicated this invasive pest, protecting Florida's \$120 billion agriculture industry, three years ago, and together with the U.S. Department of Agriculture we'll implement an aggressive eradication program to do so again," Putnam said in a prepared statement. Eradication involves attracting male fruit flies to bait. The males die

when they feed on the bait.

More legal battles crop up over medical pot

Separate cases challenge pot smoking, license awarding

TALLAHASSEE — Two more clashes over medical marijuana have cropped up this week.

In the first, lawyers representing two ailing Florida women asked a Tallahassee judge Monday to lift a hold on her ruling that a state law banning patients from smoking pot is unconstitutional, but attorneys for the state argued that there's no need to rush while her decision is under appeal.

In the second, a Tampa-based orchid grower is challenging a rule proposed by state health officials, arguing the proposal fails to properly carry out a law giving preference for up to two highly sought-after medical marijuana licenses to applicants who own

facilities that were used to process citrus.

In the smoking case, Leon County Circuit Judge Karen Gievers heard arguments in the plaintiffs' request to lift a stay in the lawsuit, which was initiated by Orlando trial attorney John Morgan after the Legislature included the smoking ban in a law carrying out a voter-approved constitutional amendment that broadly legalized medical marijuana.

Gievers last month agreed with Morgan and the plaintiffs, who argued that the text of the constitutional amendment allows patients to use any form of marijuana as their treatment. Morgan largely bankrolled what was known as Amendment 2 on the 2016 ballot.

Lawyers for the Department of Health have maintained the amendment does not expressly permit smoking and that the state has the authority

to approve regulations to implement the law and to protect the public from the negative side effects of smoking.

The state immediately appealed Gievers' May 25 decision striking down the smoking prohibition. The appeal put her ruling on hold, but the plaintiffs then went back to Gievers and asked her to lift the stay.

Failing to lift the stay would cause "irreparable harm" to plaintiff Cathy Jordan, who was diagnosed with Lou Gehrig's disease more than three decades ago and who credits smoking marijuana with saving her life, lawyer Jon Mills told Gievers on Monday. And hundreds of thousands of other Floridians who are eligible for medical marijuana, including veterans who are suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder, would benefit from smoking their medicine, Mills argued.

"It would seem that,

taking the facts as a whole, and that is the irreparable harm to the parties and to the citizens of Florida, it's hard to imagine more a compelling circumstance," said Mills, a former state House speaker and former dean of the University of Florida law school.

But Assistant Attorney General Karen Brodeen argued there's no hurry for Gievers to lift the stay, in part because of a lengthy state rulemaking process. Smokable pot "won't be available for a long time," if the courts ultimately decide that it is legal, Brodeen said.

Gievers, who agreed to a seven-day delay after Mills assured her his clients did not object, did not immediately rule on the request to lift the stay.

The citrus preference was included in a law passed last year that implemented a voter-approved constitutional amendment broadly legalizing

medical marijuana. The law required health officials to issue 10 new licenses to applicants that meet certain requirements.

The state overall has issued licenses to 13 operators, including a handful of new operators who met the criteria laid out in the 2017 law, but has yet to begin accepting applications for four new licenses from potential vendors that may not have participated in the process before. The new rule challenge will likely delay the application process even further.

The 2017 law requires health officials to give special preference for up to two licenses to applicants that "own one or more facilities that are, or were, used for the canning, concentrating, or otherwise processing of citrus fruit or citrus molasses and will use or convert the facility or facilities for the processing of marijuana."

The proposed rule,

however, "seeks to grant a preference to a broader group of applicants than the statute permits" by giving the preference to applicants who own "property" that was once used for the citrus-processing purposes but will be used for growing, processing, or dispensing medical marijuana, if the applicants are chosen for licenses, lawyers for Louis Del Favero Orchids Inc. wrote.

"By using the broader word 'property' rather than 'facility,' the department is granting the citrus preference to a broader group of applicants than the statute permits, such as owners of packinghouses and other parties that fail to meet the definitions of 'processor' or 'canning' or 'concentrating.' The statute is clear and unambiguous," lawyers Seann Frazier and Mark Ito wrote in the 18-page administrative complaint.

MARIANNA Convicted murderer sentenced to 25 years


A Jackson County man accepted his fate to die in prison Tuesday after pleading no contest to killing his estranged girlfriend and her roommate, according to official reports.

William Hawk, 76, was sentenced Tuesday to 25 years in prison after accepting a plea to two counts of second-degree murder and one count of aggravated assault on a law enforcement officer. On Feb. 11, 2017, Hawk shot and killed his girlfriend, Mary Reed, and her friend, Kassi Henderson, at Reed's home in Jackson County. When confronted by arresting deputies from the Jackson County Sheriff's Office, Hawk refused to drop his handgun and was subsequently shot.

Hawk recovered from his injuries, but was then sent to the Florida State Hospital in Chattahoochee after being found legally incompetent to proceed. On June 5, 2018, Judge Chris Patterson found Hawk restored to competency based on the most recent evaluation from the State Hospital.

Hawk acknowledged that by accepting the 25-year offer, it would most likely amount to a life sentence for a man of his age, officials reported.

"I understand that I will

die in prison," Hawk told Patterson.

The case was prosecuted by Bob Sombathy, and the lead investigator was Sgt. Billy Benton of the Jackson County Sheriff's Office.

Judah, who investigators say was "cooperative," was arrested and charged with cultivation of marijuana.

Troutman is 6A Player of the Year

The Arnold softball program has previously had two different players win state Offensive Player of the Year awards – Sarah Robertson in 2015, Danielle Lee in 2017 – but thanks to a stellar junior season by Ashley Troutman, the Marlins have their first overall state Player of the Year.

Troutman has been named the Florida Dairy Farmers 6A Player of the Year after hitting .678 with four home runs, 61 hits, 34 RBI, 59 runs, and 42 stolen bases in

the 2018 season. She also had nine doubles and six triples and posted a .727 on-base percentage and a 1.044 slugging percentage while setting single-season school records for batting average, hits, runs, and stolen bases.


It's the kind of resume one would expect for a Player of the Year, but the news of the honor still came as a surprise to Troutman, who is currently committed to Rollins College in Winter Park.

"I couldn't believe it, really," she said. "I didn't pay attention too much to my stats this year. I knew I was doing good, but I wasn't keeping up on it because it can

get on your mind. When I'm at bat, I don't want to think about my average because that can get in your head and affect how you play. I just wanted to go up there and hit."

That she did, breaking her teammate Lee's record of 49 hits she set just last season by 12 hits. Troutman had 19 multi-hit games and nine with three hits or more. She also set a single-game Arnold record with seven hits in a 16-15 win over Liberty County on April 19. Arnold coach Rick Green said he was astonished by the numbers that Troutman

Seminoles claim 1st NCAA softball championship

OKLAHOMA CITY – Pitcher Meghan King settled down after a rough start to complete a record-setting Women's College World Series, and Florida State beat Washington 8-3 on Tuesday night to claim its first national title.

The Seminoles (58-12) won the best-of-three

championship series 2-0. They lost their opener before winning six straight to become just the third team to come through the losers' bracket and take the title.

King broke a World Series record for lowest ERA among pitchers who threw at least 10 innings with a mark of 0.20. She earned four wins and a

Seiffert comes up short in bid to qualify for U.S. Open

ROSWELL, Ga. – Chase Seiffert didn't stay around to participate in a playoff for the second alternate spot.

After experiencing his greatest disappointment thus far in a budding professional golf career, Seiffert saw his opportunity to advance out of a U.S. Open sectional qualifier on Monday end with a double bogey on the par-4 finishing hole, his 36th hole of the day at Ansley Golf Club.

Had Seiffert made a routine par he would have been in a playoff with former PGA Tour player Roberto Castro and amateur Bryce Hendrix at 1-under par for the third and final spot available to the field of 43 players.

Castro, currently 13th on the Web.com Tour money list, joined Canadian mid-amateur Garrett Rank and Michael Hebert of Atlanta, co-medalists at 2-under par, in qualifying for the 118th U.S. Open to be held June 14-17 at Shinnecock Hills Golf Club in Shinnecock, New York.

Rank has been a full-time National Hockey League referee and even worked during the recent NHL playoffs this spring. He has participated in 15 United States Golf Association championships, but never before a U.S. Open.

Hebert, who played collegiately at Auburn and turned pro in 2013, is 48th on the Web.com money list. He, too, has never played in a U.S. Open.

Seiffert, 26 and a graduate of Mosley High School and Florida State University, was trying to qualify for his first Open having advanced out of regional qualifying to the sectional stage for the fourth

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Talk about political football: No Eagles at White House

WASHINGTON — Taking on the NFL and football's Super Bowl champs, President Donald Trump gave the boot to a White House ceremony for the Philadelphia Eagles on Tuesday and instead threw his own brief "Celebration of America" after it became clear most players weren't going to show up.

Both sides traded hot accusations about who was to blame.

Trump tried to turn the fracas into a referendum on patriotism and tie it to the dispute over players who have taken a knee during the national anthem to protest racism and police brutality. However, Eagles players never knelt during the "Star-Spangled Banner," throughout the 2017 season and their march to the Super Bowl.

The White House accused

Eagles team members of pulling a "political stunt" and abandoning their fans by backing out at the last minute. Indeed, few apparently were going to come, though some expressed

disappointment that they'd been disinvited and complained Trump was unfairly painting them as anti-American.

Through it all, Trump appeared to revel in fanning

the flames of a culture war that he believes revs up his political base.

Trump had long been leery of the Eagles' planned visit to the White House, in part because the team's owner, Jeffrey Lurie, has been a Trump critic, and because several players have been vocal critics of the league's new policy that requires players to stand if they're on the field during the national anthem or else stay in the locker room.

White House spokeswoman Sarah Huckabee Sanders said the team notified the White House last Thursday that 81 people, including players, coaches, managers and others would be attending the Super Bowl celebration. But she said the team got back in touch late Friday and tried to reschedule, "citing the fact that many players would not be in attendance." The Eagles proposed a time when Trump would be overseas.

Eagles officials declined

comment on the White House version of events, sticking with a simple earlier statement: "We are truly grateful for all of the support we have received and we are looking forward to continuing our preparations for the 2018 season."

No one connected with the team said the players' reluctance to attend had anything to do with the national anthem, as Trump tried to portray the situation. And comments by star players in the current pro basketball finals indicated it's not about football.

"I know no matter who wins this series, no one wants the invite anyway. So it won't be Golden State or Cleveland going," said LeBron James of the Cleveland Cavaliers. There was no disagreement from Stephen Curry, who angered Trump last year when he said he wouldn't go to the White House after the Warriors' NBA triumph, leading the president to disinvite him and his team.

Djokovic falters, Cecchinato soars in French Open stunner

PARIS — It was difficult to discern which was less likely: that 12-time major champion Novak Djokovic would falter in his French Open quarterfinal or that Marco Cecchinato, who never won a Grand Slam match until last week and once faced a possible ban for losing on purpose, would rise to the occasion.

Either way, Tuesday's outcome was stunning. To both men. And to anyone watching.

Djokovic, bothered by neck and leg problems, went from two sets down to the verge of forcing a fifth, but he frittered away good chances and in the end was beaten by the 72nd-ranked Cecchinato 6-3, 7-6 (4), 1-6, 7-6 (11) in a rollicking match filled with engaging exchanges and plenty of drama.

"A hard one to swallow," a glum Djokovic acknowledged during a brief news conference, in which he delivered clipped answers and said he might not play during the upcoming grass-court season.

Cecchinato is the lowest-ranked French Open semifinalist in 19 years and the first Italian man to make it that far at any major in 40 years.

"The best moment of my life," Cecchinato said.

Djokovic served for the fourth set at 5-3 — "I thought," Cecchinato would say, "my Roland Garros was about to end" — but the 2016 French Open champion got broken. Djokovic then held three set points in the tiebreaker — "I saw ghosts," Cecchinato would joke — but couldn't convert.

"A pity," Djokovic said.

At 7-6 in the closing tiebreaker, he pushed a

backhand long. At 8-7, Cecchinato ended a 20-stroke exchange with a swinging volley winner. At 9-8, Djokovic flubbed a forehand, knelt and clasped his hands together as if praying, then raised an index finger as if to plea, "Let me have ONE of these!"

"I had a lot of courage, especially toward the end of the tiebreaker," Cecchinato said. "I was cool. Clear-headed. My heart was beating 1,000 mph. It wasn't easy. My hand was even shaking a little."

Cecchinato (it's pronounced cheh-key-NAH'-toe) came through on his fourth match point, looping in a backhand return winner as Djokovic tried to surprise him with a serve-and-volley attempt.

The 25-year-old Cecchinato dropped onto his back on the clay, then sat in his sideline chair, bowed his head and cried.

Told in an on-court interview that he wasn't dreaming, Cecchinato responded: "Are you sure?"

Consider that Cecchinato has never won a tour-level match on a surface other than red clay; as it is, he entered this season with a career record of 4-23 and entered this tournament with a Grand Slam record of 0-4.

Then there's this: The 25-year-old from Sicily was suspended for 18 months and fined 40,000 euros (about \$45,000) by his national federation in July 2016 for allegedly fixing a match by losing at a lower-tier Challenger event in Morocco a year earlier. Cecchinato appealed and, eventually, the Italian Olympic Committee announced that the sanctions were dropped on a technicality.

Mason's two-run homer in the fourth made it 7-3, and Warren hit a solo shot in the same inning to make it 8-3.



Cavs home looking to turn around NBA Finals

CLEVELAND — LeBron James laughed as he came around the backstage partition after arriving fashionably late for his crowded, post-practice news conference.

As he stepped onto the podium, back among friendly faces and in the building where he has done some of his finest work, James seemed at ease, almost content. No signs of stress anywhere.

Moments later, his demeanor shifted.

A few reminders about his team's urgent predicament against Golden State, questions about President Donald Trump and another review of Cleveland's heartbreaking loss in Oakland swung his emotions.

"I know it feels like we're down 2-0, and I don't like the way I feel," James said. "I don't like the mood that I'm in right now. There's no, like, 'OK, you're down 2-0 and you feel better than when you're down 2-0 before.' When you're down like this, in a deficit like this — versus a team like this — there's no good feeling. So I don't feel

good about it."

The Cavaliers may be in a dark place.

For the third time in the past four Finals, James and his teammates enter Game 3 against the Warriors in a win-or-make-summer-vacation-plans situation. After they wasted a 51-point

effort by James — with a reversed official's call, missed free throw by George Hill and bone-headed move from J.R. Smith — and let Game 1 slip away in overtime, and following Stephen Curry's 3-point barrage in Game 2, the Cavs are faced with the reality that their season,

strange as it has been to this point, is in serious jeopardy.

However, coach Tyrone Lue, who plans to give disappointing forward Rodney Hood playing time on Wednesday night, feels his team can change the complexion of this series.

"We're very confident we

can do that," Lue said. "The guys are engaged and locked in. Winning tomorrow is a step forward, but then going out with Game 4 also. We're locked into doing that, and we know we can."

"We believe."

It's easy to understand Lue's confidence. After what the Cavaliers have experienced this season, a 2-0 deficit in the Finals against a star-studded Warriors squad on the cusp of being stamped as a modern-day dynasty seems manageable.

Cleveland has endured injuries, trades, tragedy and drama for months. The Cavs, who climbed from a 2-0 hole to beat Boston in the conference finals, have major roster holes and unfixable flaws. There's no denying their toughness.

"We've been very persistent and very resilient throughout this whole season, no matter what has been going on," James said. "We have an opportunity to come home and protect home, as Golden State has done. It's a very tall task. A very tough challenge going against these guys, going against this team."

Justify draws No. 1 post for Triple try in Belmont Stakes

NEW YORK — Something Bob Baffert always dreads has come true ahead of the Belmont Stakes: Justify drew the No. 1 post for the colt's bid to sweep the Triple Crown.

The Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner was made the early 4-5 favorite in the 10-horse field for Saturday's race.

Baffert is not a fan of the inside post for his horses, no matter what the race.

"I never do like to draw the rail, but my horses seem to live in it," he said Tuesday. "We have it, we can't change it. We'll deal with it."

And history may be on Justify's side.

Since 1905, a leading 23 horses have won from the No. 1 post. The last to win from there was Empire Maker in 2003 when he spoiled Funny Cide's Triple Crown bid.

"He is so talented, I think he can dictate the race," Hall of Fame trainer D. Wayne Lukas said of Justify. "That is the thing that makes him very tough to beat. He can pick his spots. He is the key to how all of us run."

Justify won the first two legs of the series from the No. 7 post. He ran on sloppy tracks both times and the forecast for Saturday calls for a 60 percent chance of

rain.

This time the No. 7 hole went to Tenfold. The colt was a fast-closing third in the Preakness and is 12-1 for the Belmont.

Hofburg was made the 9-2 second choice. Trained by Hall of Famer Bill Mott, the colt finished seventh in the Kentucky Derby and skipped the Preakness.

The only other horses with single-digit odds are Preakness runner-up Bravazo and Vino Rosso, both at 8-1. Vino Rosso finished ninth in the Derby and didn't run in the Preakness.

Baffert is seeking a second Triple Crown victory in four years. American Pharoah ended a 37-year drought when he completed the sweep in 2015. He broke from the No. 1 post in the Preakness.

In the 2010 Kentucky Derby, Baffert had the favorite with Lookin At Lucky, who broke from the No. 1 hole. The colt was pinned to the rail and had nowhere to go until a late run helped him finish sixth. He won the Preakness.

"Everybody is always joking in my family, (wife) Jill is always saying, 'They should just put you in the one hole and just draw the rest of the race,'" Baffert said. "I had a feeling I was due for the one."

Jockey Mike Smith will need to use Justify's speed to get him away from the

starting gate before the rest of the field comes over on him along the rail.

"It's all you can hope for," Baffert said. "He is on the inside, so he can sort of dictate what's going to go, what's happening."

Wearing a Mets jersey with his name on the back, Baffert tossed out a ceremonial first pitch at Citi Field before the Mets hosted the Orioles. His throw from in front of the mound was high to infielder Luis Guillorme, who rose up to catch it.

Justify and Bravazo, trained by Lukas, are the only two horses that will have run in all three Triple Crown races. Bravazo was sixth in the Derby and came running late to finish a half-length behind Justify in the Preakness.

"One of these horses or two maybe has to run a little bit better than you would expect them to, mine included (to win)," Lukas said.

Baffert has another horse in the race: Restoring Hope, the third-place finisher in the Wood Memorial. Smith rode him in his last race on the Derby undercard, but will be replaced by Florent Geroux on Saturday.

Gronkowski is a 12-1 long shot, no doubt an attractive odds for his part-owner Rob Gronkowski, the New England Patriots tight end. He and teammate Tom Brady have wagered together at the Derby in past years.

Smith-Pelly, Kempny are perfect pieces of Caps' Cup puzzle

WASHINGTON — A salary-cap squeeze threatened to slam the Washington Capitals' Stanley Cup window shut. Instead, it busted it wide open.

When the dollars didn't add up to be able to keep a handful of key contributors to back-to-back Presidents' Trophy-winning teams, the Capitals went bargain hunting to sign bought-out winger Devante Smith-Pelly, who general manager Brian MacLellan termed a "project." Up against the cap at the trade deadline, they acquired lightly used defenseman Michal Kempny from Chicago.

"Some of the best acquisitions are ones that are under the radar, ones that fit almost seamlessly," coach Barry Trotz said. "Some of the best deals that we've made are those ones that, even myself I'm like, 'Hmmm, that's a little bit of an upgrade, not a big one.' And they ended up being the biggest upgrades because they're not sexy names."

Kempny said "probably nobody knew my name when I came here or played in Chicago," and Smith-Pelly had his name on the back of three other NHL teams' jerseys before this season. Now they're key pieces for a team one win from the Stanley Cup after the Capitals hit on exactly the kind of moves every championship contender is looking to make.

All it cost was a one-year deal at the league minimum to sign Smith-Pelly after he was bought out by the Devils, and a third-round pick to get Kempny from the Blackhawks. Alex Ovechkin, Evgeny Kuznetsov and Braden Holtby

have led Washington to this point, up 3-1 on the Vegas Golden Knights with the chance to raise the Cup after Game 5 on Thursday night. But they wouldn't be here without the contributions of Smith-Pelly and Kempny.

After a seven-goal regular season, Smith-Pelly has six goals in the playoffs, including potential series daggers in Games 3 and 4 of the final. This isn't exactly where the 25-year-old thought he'd be just under a year ago when he found out a minute before the buyout deadline that the Devils were cutting him.

"You only get so many chances to stick," said Smith-Pelly, a 2010 second-round pick who bounced from Anaheim to Montreal to New Jersey, never putting up more than 17 points in a season. "I knew that this could be my last one, so I kind of took the buyout personally and listened to what the coaching staff had to say and what they wanted, and just went out there and did it."

Smith-Pelly wasn't even guaranteed a roster spot when he signed. He developed into a teammate on and off the ice that helped propel the Capitals to another division title despite losing forwards Justin Williams, Marcus Johansson and Daniel Winnik, and defenseman Nate Schmidt, Karl Alzner and Kevin Shatkin last summer. He was the Capitals' Masterton Trophy nominee for perseverance and dedication to hockey after taking an incident of racist "basketball, basketball, basketball" taunts and turning it into a positive when he facilitated a donation to Fort Dupont Ice Arena in Washington.

ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

This deal (with a slight alteration of the heart honors) came up in the Common Game in December last year. Pretty much everyone would have bid the North-South cards to three no-trump; North has just enough to use Stayman and invite game, since if partner has a heart fit or a maximum, there should be decent play for game.

The opening lead gives you grounds for optimism as declarer. The club 10 comes around to your queen, and now it seems natural to go after diamonds. Beware, though! If you play the ace and another diamond, the defenders can clear the clubs and remove your last sure entry to hand. If the defenders duck the first spade and win the next, then cash their club winner, West can exit in hearts and collect the fifth trick for their side.

A much better line is to lead the diamond eight to the queen at trick two. At the table where I was involved, East won her diamond king and continued clubs, but declarer could simply drive out the spade ace and come to nine tricks painlessly enough.

Had East ducked the diamond king, South would next go after spades by running the jack, then leading a spade to the king. The defenders can still make life awkward by winning the second spade and returning a club, but the fall of the spade 10 and the fact that hearts are 3-3 allows you to come home against any defense. You win the third club, cash the remaining top spade to pitch a heart, and set up diamonds, leaving the defenders with two clubs, one spade and one diamond trick.

GRILLING GOOD STEAK

The following tips come from the Food Lab's Definitive Guide to Grilled Steaks.

- For better searing, rest your steak uncovered on a rack in the fridge overnight or up to 4 days.

- Use hardwood coal if you've got it (but briquettes will work). Arrange the coals with the heat under half of the grill.

- Cook your meat gently, then sear at the end.

- Use a thermometer, but if you don't have one, poke or cut the steak.

- Let your meat rest for about a third of the cooking time to prevent moisture loss.

Dandelions are delicious, with a little prep

We are born into this world loving dandelions. We grow up playing with them, blowing seed heads and rubbing the yellow flowers on our faces.

Somewhere along most of our personal journeys, the grown-ups manage to convince us that dandelions are bad, because of what they do to the grass monocultures that most Americans cultivate instead of food. My wife is the outlier who would have me veer the lawnmower around a dandelion, which are like the sacred cows of our yard. But unlike most people who worship sacred cows, she eats the object of her reverence.

In fact, she's got the whole family doing it, which is no mean feat. Human beings may be born with an appreciation for the aesthetics of dandelions, but not so much for the flavor. You could say it takes work to overcome that bitter hump, but it's really a matter of appreciating the benefits and associating them with those bitter flavors, as I've managed to do with bitter foods like beer, chocolate and coffee.

I try to pay as much attention to how something makes me feel afterward as I do to how it tastes, and dandelions make me feel good. It wasn't surprising to learn they are full of nutrients including carotenes, antioxidants, calcium and vitamin A.

The secret to eating dandelions is a decadent sauce.

Fry it up

The entire plant is edible, from the tip of its tenacious taproot to the bright yellow pollen in the blossom. While bitter is the dominant flavor throughout, there is complexity as well. The flowers have

an aromatic flavor that has been likened to banana or licorice.

When you drop a dandelion in butter, some magical stuff happens. The flower waves its petals for a few minutes like a dying creature, and slowly browns, absorbing butter, shrinking down to a crispy nub that tastes like artichoke with a faint, intriguing note of bitterness.

There are two basic approaches to dandelion eating: bury the bitter flavor, or work with it. Either way, a rich sauce is involved. Most examples of burying involve cooking, while the more daring approaches leave the plant raw. We consume bitter greens with a salad dressing of olive oil (2 part), soy sauce (1 part) and mixed vinegars (balsamic, cider, white, lime) (1 part).

But for many of us, the right sauce may be that into which we dip our batter-fried dandelion blossoms. I hit the supermarket for a box of Tony Chachere's seasoned Creole fish fry mix, which contains a mix of corn flour and corn meal, in addition to seasonings. The checkout guys were excited about my dandelion plans.

At home, I made an egg wash so the batter would stick to the dandelion flowers. It contains one beaten egg with a splash of cream, a shake of garlic powder, a few drops of fish sauce and a teaspoon of oyster sauce. Oil from a jar of anchovies would work, too. I dumped the Creole corn coating in a pan, and went outside for some dandelions.

It was sunset, and the sky was beautiful. My wife was in the garden, and all of the dandelion flowers were gone. Every single one. I assumed she was responsible, but she informed me that dandelion flowers close up at night, so I needed to look a little more closely.

To deep-fry open or closed flowers, first wash them and let them dry. Drop the blossoms in the egg wash, pull them out one at a time, and roll each flower in the breading.

Heat an inch of olive oil to 300 degrees, and drop the flowers in. Cook until they are golden brown all around. Remove and drain.

Going raw

Another approach to eating dandelions is to just eat the yellow petals. If you pinch and squeeze the sepal area behind the petals, you can work them out. They can be added raw to anything, from salad to sushi to pancakes. They make a striking garnish for a soup, and they way they dress up rice is perhaps my favorite way to eat dandelion flowers.

Tossing those bright stamen into the grains of jasmine or basmati rice is kind of like a poor man's saffron rice, with a similar pollen-y glow. Whole dandelion buds can be added too, raw or cooked, to any dish at virtually any point, as can the leaves, typically chopped. Topped with some crumbled nori sheets, soy sauce, sesame oil and hot sauce, the bitter dandelion flavors disappear into a symphony of other strong, wonderful notes.

The bitter power of the dandelion can give pizzazz to the bland and balance any strong flavor, be it spicy, sweet, salty or fatty, and even more bitter.

Adapting casseroles to slow-cooker world

Whatever happened to the classic casserole? As a young bride I relied heavily on casseroles, especially in hot weather. You could make a complete meal in one dish. Now the slow cooker has taken the place of casseroles because most casserole recipes can be prepared in a slow cooker.

Mama's Chicken with Vegetables and Rice Casserole is complete in that the meat is already in it. I see no reason why this casserole could not be made in a slow cooker.

Broccoli and Cauliflower Casserole is what I would call a side dish casserole in that it goes well with any meat, or meat could be added to make a complete meal.

Either ham or chicken would be a good addition.

Mama's Chicken with Vegetables and Rice Casserole

- 2 cups instant rice
- 4 cups cooked and coarsely chopped chicken
- Broth from chicken or canned broth
- 1 (16 oz.) can tomatoes
- 1 (16 oz.) can mixed vegetables
- 1 (10 ¾ oz.) can cream of mushroom soup or creamy chicken mushroom soup
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 ½ cup grated Cheddar cheese

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Put the rice in the bottom of a 9x13-inch casserole or pan. Put chicken over the rice. Drain the tomatoes and mixed vegetables, reserving the liquid. Add enough chicken broth to the reserved liquid to make 3 ½ cups. Chop the tomatoes. Spoon the tomatoes and mixed vegetables on top of the chicken. In a medium-sized saucepan, heat the reserved liquid with the soup. Stir until smooth. Pour over the vegetables. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake for about 35 to 40 minutes.

Broccoli and Cauliflower Casserole

- 2 12 oz. bags frozen broccoli and cauliflower, steamed
- ¼ to 1/3 c. chopped roasted red bell pepper
- 1 cup mayonnaise

- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 tsp. garlic powder
- 8 oz. finely shredded Italian style cheese
- ½ cup Italian style Panko crumbs

Preheat oven to 350. Spray casserole dish (about 1 quart). Pour vegetables into large bowl and cut into small pieces. Stir in roasted red peppers, mayonnaise, sour cream, garlic powder and cheese. Spoon into casserole dish. Sprinkle with Panko crumbs. Bake 30 minutes.







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Try avocado atop these crab cakes

These light but sumptuous two-bite treats stand miles apart from the mayo-heavy, crab-flavored bread-crumbs mounds that often pass for crab cakes nowadays.

Here, they are all about the succulent crab, which is bound minimally with whole-grain bread crumbs and egg — no mayo at all. The sweet tenderness of the seafood is elevated, not overwhelmed, with lime, ginger and cilantro, and enriched with fragrant, toasted sesame oil. The cakes are coated in more whole-grain bread crumbs, specifically Japanese panko, which make for an extra-crispy exterior when pan-fried (not deep-fried) in a small amount of oil.

The sauce rises above the densely mayonnaise-y typical tartar as well, both flavor and healthwise. Its creamy richness comes from avocado, which is mashed with lime and spiked with a heady punch of wasabi paste. Dolloped on top of the crab cakes, it is exactly the crown they deserve. These crab cakes may be made as regular-size patties as well, but at this size they are ideal as party finger-food.

Mini Crab Cakes with Avocado Wasabi Sauce

4 to 6 servings (makes 12 crab cakes)

- 1 pound crab claw meat, picked over
- 1 cup whole-wheat panko bread crumbs
- 1 large egg, lightly beaten
- ¼ cup seeded, finely chopped red bell pepper
- 3 tablespoons chopped scallion greens
- 1 ½ tablespoons fresh lime juice (from 1 or 2 limes)
- 2 teaspoons toasted sesame oil
- 1 ½ teaspoons peeled, finely grated fresh ginger root
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh cilantro
- ¾ teaspoon kosher salt
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- ¼ cup canola or other neutral-tasting oil
- Fresh of 1 ripe avocado
- ½ teaspoon prepared wasabi paste, or more as needed

Stir together the crab, ½ cup of the panko, the egg, red bell

pepper, scallion, ½ tablespoon of the lime juice, toasted sesame oil, ginger, cilantro, ½ teaspoon of the salt and the pepper in a mixing bowl, until just combined. Place the remaining ½ cup of panko in a shallow bowl or rimmed plate.

Divide the crab mixture into 12 equal portions. Shape each into a round patty about 2 ½ inches in diameter. Coat each patty with the remaining panko. Cover and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes, and up to 1 day.

Heat the oil in a large non-stick skillet over medium heat. Once the oil shimmers, add the crab cakes and cook for 3 to 4 minutes per side, until golden brown on both sides and warmed through.

Meanwhile, mash the avocado with the remaining tablespoon of lime juice, the wasabi paste and the remaining ¼ teaspoon of salt to form a smooth sauce. Taste, and add more wasabi paste, as needed.

To serve, top each with a tablespoon-size dollop of the avocado wasabi sauce.

Everything you need to know about marinating meat

For a lot of home cooks, marinating meat is almost as automatic as cooking the meat itself. But there are reasons to put a little more thought into how you marinate.

"I'm going to step on the conservative side of controversy," says grilling and barbecue expert Steven Raichlen, author of the new "Project Fire" cookbook, which has a companion public television series. "I do believe they add flavor."

Here are some ways to ensure you're marinating the right way — and for the right reasons.

• Think about what goes into your marinade. Ingredients generally fall into three categories, according to Raichlen: Acids, oils and aromatics. Acids — think of them in terms of sour flavors — can include citrus juice, vinegar and yogurt. Oils, which help keep the meat from drying out, can be neutral in flavor (canola, vegetable, peanut); in-between (olive, nut); and assertive (sesame). The world of aromatics is wide, including garlic, onions, ginger, herbs, chile peppers and spices. Make sure your marinade contains a salty component, because that is one of the most effective flavoring agents. But "it doesn't have to actually be salt," Raichlen says, so feel free to use soy sauce, miso or fish sauce.

A marinade's flavor will evolve as it cooks, but it should taste good even before you use it, Raichlen says. Especially

if you're winging it, be sure to sample along the way.

• Don't expect it to penetrate that much. Turns out, marinades are essentially a surface treatment. Most flavors will not go farther than a few millimeters into meat. Raichlen, however, is fine with that, because, as he points out, the surface is what you taste first. The limited distance traveled is another reason marinades are generally better for lean proteins like chicken breasts, flank steak, shrimp: You'll get a better ratio of flavored surface per serving than you would in a larger, thicker cut of meat.

• Longer does not mean better. You can often get the same results in an hour or less as you would overnight. In "Barbecue Sauces, Rubs, Marinades — Bastes, Butters, and Glazes, Too," Raichlen gives a rough guide to marinating times.

- Very large pieces (brisket, prime rib, pork shoulder, leg of lamb, turkey): 24 hours
- Large pieces (beef and pork tenderloins, pork loins, rack and butterflied leg of lamb, whole chickens, large whole fish): 6 to 12 hours
- Medium pieces (porterhouse steaks, double-cut pork chops, chicken halves or quarters, small whole fish): 4 to 8 hours
- Medium-to-small pieces (steaks, pork and lamb chops, bone-in chicken breasts or legs, fish steaks; also tofu, mushrooms and vegetables): 1 to 3 hours
- Small pieces (boneless chicken breast, fish fillets, shrimp): 15 minutes to 2 hours.



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
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
