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

Tiny bug combats invasive air potato vines

PANAMA CITY — The appetite of a tiny beetle might be Florida’s best defense against the fast growing, invasive air potato vine.

“Ten beetles is all they need, assuming you get some females,” Kristen Bowers, a PhD student at the University of Florida. “It’s not going to eradicate it, but it’ll keep it from spreading further ... and it allows other plants to compete with it.”

On Wednesday, representatives from the University of Florida were in Panama City distributing paper coffee mugs serving as makeshift homes for colonies of *Lilioceris cheni* — better known as the air potato leaf beetle — to homeowners looking for a little extra oomph in their fight against the air potato vine.

With a name like “air

potato,” the invasive vine might not sound like much of a problem, but it can grow up to eight inches a day and 70 feet long in its quest for sunlight and other resources, choking out other native or desirable species.

“They’re taking over more of the natural vegetation, like the azaleas,” said homeowner Greg Presser, who has noticed the vine in his neighborhood in the Cove. “It just shades out the other vegetation.”

Bower said she’s even seen the plant, which is native to the tropics in Asia, take over cypress domes.

“As high as you could see, it was air potato,” she said.

There is a lot of uncertainty about how air potato plant might have gotten to Florida — theories include slave ships, as an ornamental plant and as a medicinal plant — but what is known is that it’s a pest.

Scientists recognized it as a problem plant starting in the 1970s, and by the 1990s it was considered one of the “most

Pace’s rape case ends in mistrial

Juror reports fearing for her safety

PANAMA CITY — A man accused of drugging a 16-year-old to sexually take advantage of the teen will get second chance at trial after jury deliberations deteriorated Wednesday to the point that one juror asked to leave immediately out of fear for her safety.

Andrew Allan Pace, 65, appeared in court Wednesday for the second day of testimony in his trial. He was arrested in May 2016 after neighbors in the affluent neighborhood of Delwood Point saw a naked and distraught 16-year-old boy fleeing Pace’s house, claiming to have been drugged and raped. At the end of the trial, though, Circuit Judge Brantley Clark declared a mistrial after the jury members said they could not reach a verdict.

Pace is scheduled to go before a jury again July 2 to face the charges of sexual battery, unlawful sexual acts with a minor and false imprisonment.

Jurors deliberated for almost four hours Wednesday before telling Clark they would not be able to reach a verdict. What transpired in the jury room was unclear, but discussions apparently became hostile, from the reaction of one juror. By the end of the evening, that juror sent a message to Clark that she no longer felt safe in the discussions and wanted to

Justify arrives in New York for Triple Crown bid

Some Brazil ‘Zika kids’ try school, others fight to survive

FREI MIGUELINHO, Brazil — On Tuesdays, 18-month-old Joaquim Santos spends an hour sitting by himself in a corner of a special needs classroom in this small city in northeast Brazil, one of the country’s poorest regions and one hit hard by the Zika virus.

Two harried teachers look on as other toddlers play around Joaquim, who has severe developmental

delays after being born with a small head.

As limited as Joaquim is in the early education classroom, his family and doctors say he is lucky to be there.

“When Joaquim was born I thought he was going to be in a vegetative state forever,” said his mother, Maria de Fatima Santos, who must take the boy to therapy sessions and medical appointments most other days of the week. “I thought my life was going

to be in a hospital.”

Three years ago, an outbreak of the Zika virus in Brazil’s impoverished northeast led to thousands of babies being born with a birth defect called microcephaly. The virus is spread by mosquito, and scientists determined that it could lead to congenital defects in fetuses of mothers who were infected during pregnancy.

Today, some of the children born during the

Today’s Highlight in History: On June 7, 1776, Richard Henry Lee of Virginia offered a resolution to the Continental Congress stating “That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States.”

On this date: In 1099, the First Crusade began besieging Jerusalem, which was captured the following month.

In 1654, King Louis XIV, age 15, was crowned in Rheims, 11 years after the start of his reign.

In 1769, frontiersman Daniel Boone first began to explore present-day Kentucky.

invasive” plants in Florida. It’s currently found in nearly every county in the state, as well as in Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi and Texas.

For decades, there wasn’t a good way to control the vine besides frost, but after 10 years in testing, scientists unveiled the air potato leaf beetle as a classical biocontrol in 2012.

The tiny red winged beetle — only about the size of a pinky finger nail — spend their whole lives gnawing little holes into the vine’s broad, heart-shaped leaves. By the time they are done, the leaves resemble a worn out doily, and then shrivel up and die.

In addition to eating the leaves, the beetles lay their eggs on the plant — up to 2,000 eggs during their life cycle — and will occasionally eat the tubers.

Over 600,000 of the beetles have been released

in Florida, according to Bowers. A study found the beetle has resulted in a 39 percent decrease in vine density and a 60 percent decrease in bulbil production.

“In places where we have released the beetles, where they have been real successful, and it allows other plants to compete with it because otherwise nothing can compete with this,” she said, holding up a particularly large leaf.

“You put the beetles out, and next spring you see, ‘Oh look, these other plants are coming back in.’ It gives them a chance.”

At the invasive species workshop at the UF IFAS Extension offices, Bowers gave out a “few hundred” beetles as part of the day’s festivities to pre-registered property owners struggling with air potato.

outbreak are trying school for the first time — in very limited capacities — while others have died or are struggling to survive, hindered by health and developmental problems.

Dr. Eptacio Rolim of the Getulio Vargas Hospital in Recife, where many children with Zika-related birth defects are treated, said there are still myriad unknowns.

“How much they will learn or live, unfortunately, is a huge question mark,” said Rolim, who during a recent afternoon spent hours injecting babies with Botox to ease muscle spasms.

Beyond developmental delays, around 40 percent of the children with microcephaly treated at the hospital started showing new physical problems by the time they reached their first birthdays, including dislocated hips, which needed to be repaired surgically.

“I only know of four who are walking,” said Rolim.

Zika began spreading in Latin America’s largest nation in April 2015 and exploded in 2016, with more than 260,000 cases of virus that year, according to the Health Ministry. In 2015, there were 960 confirmed cases of microcephaly and just over 1,800 the next year, the majority in the northeast. Then, thanks to what scientists call “herd immunity” in hard-hit areas and public awareness campaigns, the number of cases of Zika and microcephaly plummeted. In 2017, there were fewer than 18,000 Zika cases and fewer than 300 children born with microcephaly. So far this year, Brazil has seen about 2,200 cases of Zika and 20 cases of microcephaly

and other developmental abnormalities.

For doctors, researchers and therapists, the Brazilian toddlers born with microcephaly a few years ago represent by far the largest pool in the world for them to observe and learn from.

Seeing the children in school helps provide a window into the challenges children with microcephaly may face as they grow, but the institutions receiving them are often ill-equipped to meet their needs.

Vaneide Campos, the principal where Joaquim attends school in Frei Miguelinho, a city of 13,000 in the Brazilian drylands, said she had to rejigger an already-tight budget to get a second special needs teacher.

Joaquim has shown modest development. He can hold a pen and scribble on paper. He hears classmates recite letters of the alphabet, though he can’t speak. He has also been included in school plays, all more than many other children with microcephaly.

“We have had more goodwill than training here,” Campos said. “We were not ready, but we knew we needed to offer a chance.”

Schools and daycares at the Zika epicenter face similar issues, with teachers and principals learning as they go. Jose Wesley Campos, who will be 3 years old in September, attends school in the city of Bonito, in the state of Pernambuco, two days a week. He and three other children with disabilities are in a room with 14 normally developing toddlers.

“He was our first case with microcephaly. It was scary, and we didn’t know what to do,” said deputy principal Viviane Simon, who has worked at the school for 20 years. “But now we learn more from him than he learns from us.”

leave.

Walking from the courthouse, the victim in the case, who is now 18, said he was disappointed by the outcome. He declined to comment further but will again testify when the case goes back before a different jury.

The teen and Pace both testified in the trial and gave starkly different accounts of what happened May 20, 2016, including how DNA from the teen ended up on Pace’s genitals.

Pace told the jury Wednesday he’d been taking measurements of the teen inside his Delwood Point home to be sent off to a Tallahassee modeling agency.

At one point, the teen jumped on the bed and began tying ligatures around his own ankles, Pace said, requesting to be completely restrained.

“He asked me to tie up his hands, and I said that’s too much for me — I’ll tie up one hand in a slipknot, but I’m not tying up your your other hand,” Pace told the jury. “I said, ‘I want you to get up and get free anytime you want, but that’s the most I’ll do.’”

Pace claimed no sexual contact occurred afterward and that instead, a trip to the bathroom a short time later was how DNA matching the teen

was found on his genitals after his arrest.

During his testimony, though, the teen refuted Pace’s story and said he never jumped on the bed, asked to be tied up or consented to sexual contact with Pace.

A day earlier, he instead told jurors that he had been the one to return from the bathroom to find Pace waiting with a drink in hand.

“About 15 minutes later, I started feeling really light-headed,” the 18-year-old told the jury Tuesday. “It was a fainting feeling, like I was feeling depressed. It was weird.”

In the prosecution’s closing arguments, Jennifer Hawkins told jurors that not only did the DNA evidence recovered from Pace point to his guilt, but so did the accounts of two witnesses who saw the teen fleeing Pace’s home that night.

The victim “leaves all his clothing in the house

and flees into the street looking for any help ... desperate to be hidden from that man in an absolute state of terror,” Hawkins told the jury, pointing to Pace. “And someone else saw him seconds after all this happened.”

When the teen later was taken to the hospital, a toxicology report revealed a blood-alcohol content of 0.233 percent and the presence of benzodiazepine and cannabinoids.

During the trial Hawkins laid out the theory that Pace lured the 16-year-old through social media with the promise of a modeling career. Pace then arranged a meeting over lunch with the teen before returning to his house in an affluent neighborhood to take measurements for presumptive modeling gigs. But once there, Hawkins said, Pace instead gave the juvenile a laced drink and took advantage of him.

“After that drink, he was done,” she said. “It’s just flashes.”

Defense attorney Stan Peacock, however, presented an alternate story line that the juvenile had approached Pace for modeling opportunities after knowing him for years. He’d at times done yard work for Pace at another of his properties, Peacock said.

Peacock told the jury that, as a 16-year-old, the juvenile was able to legally consent to sex. He also honed in on physical examination of the teen in an attempt to show no sexual contact occurred. And Peacock used a statement the teen made to law enforcement to accuse him of doing anything to become a model with an underlying motive of becoming rich.

“He was in it to make money,” Peacock told jurors. “He’s able to tell the various kinds of modeling he was willing to do ... if he could just get a foot in the door from his photographer buddy Andy.”

Hawkins countered that the teen had been looking to succeed as a model with a promise of a career from a man he considered a friend.

“There is no question this 16-year-old wanted a job and that he would make money,” Hawkins said. “He went over there with hopes he would get found, make money and be able to get away.”

The jury, ultimately, could not definitively pick a side.

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Dem's take Trump to court

Case surrounds foreign government favors president has allegedly accepted



WASHINGTON — Lawyers representing nearly 200 Democrats in Congress plan to argue in federal court Thursday that President Donald Trump is violating the Constitution by accepting foreign state favors without first seeking congressional approval.

The case argues that the president has received foreign government favors, such as Chinese government trademarks for his companies, payments for hotel room stays and event space rentals by representatives of Saudi Arabia and Kuwait, and proceeds from Chinese or Emirati-linked government purchases of office space in Trump Tower.

Ethics experts say the constitutional emoluments clause was created by the Founding Fathers to ensure that government officials act with the interests of the American public in mind instead of their own pocketbooks. Since then, it has been applied to the lowest of government officials up to the president without a court challenge.

"This argument on Thursday will essentially put to the test the proposition that no one is above the law, not even the president," said Sen. Richard Blumenthal, a Connecticut Democrat who is leading the effort. "He's thumbed his nose

at the plain text and in doing so he's thumbed his nose at the American people."

Unlike prior presidents, Trump chose not to divest from his assets and he remains the owner of the Trump Organization, a sprawling business empire with 550 entities in more than 20 countries that include branded hotels, golf courses, licensing deals and other interests. His Washington, D.C., hotel just steps from the White House has become a magnet for foreign governments, including groups tied to Kuwait, Bahrain, Turkey, Malaysia and Saudi Arabia.

The District of Columbia case is one of three that argues

the president is violating the emoluments clause, which bans accepting benefits from foreign governments unless a majority of both houses of Congress consent.

But Thursday's case is different in that the plaintiffs in the suit — members of Congress — are mentioned in the clause itself, and they believe that Congress not only has a right but is required, as part of their jobs, to weigh in on potential emoluments such as a \$6.5 million condo purchase by the Qatari government or a Chinese-government owned company's investment in a project that will include a Trump-branded hotel and golf course in Indonesia.

"These members of Congress are injured every time the president accepts a foreign government benefit, whether that benefit is a trademark from China or proceeds from a government buying space in a Trump property," said Brianne Gorod, the nonprofit Constitutional Accountability Center's chief counsel who will argue the plaintiffs' case Thursday.

Separate emoluments cases in Maryland and New York are based on a claim of competitive standing, arguing that the president's businesses are being used by lobbyists, government officials and political groups to curry favor with Trump, and thus have an unfair

advantage over other businesses. The New York case was dismissed and is being appealed. Justice Department lawyers have argued that such business activity, including hotel room stays, isn't an emolument.

Thursday's arguments before U.S. District Court Judge Emmet Sullivan will be solely focused on whether the lawmakers have standing to sue the president by showing they've suffered harm from the alleged violation of the clause.

In papers supporting the plaintiffs' suit, nearly two dozen former national security officials, including Madeleine Albright and Chuck Hagel, said that "allowing private business deals with foreign governments to go undisclosed, unapproved, and unmonitored creates substantial danger that national security or foreign policy decisions (could) be motivated by something other than the public's interest."

The Justice Department, which has filed for dismissal of the case, declined to comment. Its lawyers argued in court papers that the 108 Democrats suing the president are not being injured by him at all but by their colleagues in Congress, who have refused to take up the emoluments issue.

The Trump Organization did not respond to a request for comment.

"The enforcement of the emoluments clause is the only way we can preserve our ability to do our job," Blumenthal said. "If Congress does not have standing, no one does."

At volcano, time running out for rescue chances

SAN MIGUEL LOS LOTES, Guatemala — Emergency crews cautiously resumed search-and-rescue operations Wednesday in towns and villages devastated by the eruption of Guatemala's Volcano of Fire, but time was quickly running out to find survivors of a disaster that killed more than 75 people with another nearly 200 still missing.

Thousands of people displaced by the eruption have sought refuge in shelters, many of them with dead or missing loved ones and facing an uncertain future, unable to return to homes destroyed by the volcano.

Firefighters said the chance of finding anyone alive amid the still-steaming terrain was practically nonexistent 72 hours after the volcanic explosion on Sunday.

The thick gray ash covering the stricken region was hardened by rainfall, making it even more difficult to dig through the mud, rocks and debris that reached to the rooftops of homes.

"Nobody is going to be able to get them out or say how many are buried here," said Efraín Suarez, standing amid the smoking holes dotting what used to be the village of San Miguel Los Lotes on the flanks of the mountain.

"The bodies are already charred," the 59-year-old truck driver said. "And if heavy machinery comes in they will be torn apart."

Once a verdant collection of canyons, hillsides and farms, the terrain was now a barren moonscape. Rescuers poked metal rods into the ground, sending clouds of smoke pouring into the air in a sign of the super-hot temperatures still remaining below

the surface, which firefighters said reached as high as 750 to 1,300 degrees Fahrenheit (400 and 700 degrees Celsius) in some places.

At a shelter in the Murray D. Lincoln school in the city of Escuintla, about 10 miles from the volcano's peak, Alfonso Castillo said he and his extended family of 30 had lived on a shared plot in Los Lotes where each family had its own home.

Everyone was accustomed to the volcano, one of Central America's most active, rumbling and spewing smoke, the 33-year-old farm worker said, so at first nothing seemed abnormal on Sunday. But then a huge cloud of ash came pouring out.

"In a matter of three or four minutes the village disappeared," Castillo said, smothered in what he described as a "sea" of muck that came crashing into homes, inundating people, pets and wildlife.

The family holed up in a house that heated up "like a boiler" inside, then made their way onto the roof and then to the upper story of another, concrete home. After

a cellphone call to Castillo's brother, rescuers arrived and brought the family to safety.

But the life they knew was gone.

"Nobody wants to go back there. My children say they would rather be in the streets. ... There are many people who are helping us, but we have absolutely nothing. We could not get anything out," Castillo said. "For us, there is no tomorrow."

Still, there were glimmers of a return to some semblance of normality as Guatemalans across the country donated supplies and local volunteers reached out to those in need.

In an open-air patio at the shelter, people displaced by the volcano sat on plastic chairs as student hair stylists gave them free haircuts.

Naomi Diaz of the Ciraiz Beauty Academy said they were moved to help because they saw people who had lost everything. She said she cut the hair of one woman whose hair had been so badly scorched she was unable to comb it.

"This can serve as a tiny bit of consolation for the people," Diaz said.

ACLU sues over plans for citizenship question on 2020 census

NEW YORK — Civil rights lawyers sued the U.S. Commerce Department on Wednesday to try to stop plans to add a citizenship question to the 2020 census, calling it an unconstitutional attempt to discriminate against immigrants.

The Manhattan federal court lawsuit on behalf of immigrants' rights groups blames racial animus for the recent announcement that the census will include a citizenship question for the first time since 1950.

The lawsuit, filed by the American Civil Liberties Union and others, claims the question intentionally discriminates against immigrants and will increase fear in their communities.

It alleges census participation will be depressed, diluting the economic and political power of residents in places like New York City; Prince Georges' County, Maryland; Houston; San Antonio, Texas; and the Florida counties of Miami-Dade, Broward and Orange.

The lawsuit predicts the citizenship question will result in at least two states losing a congressional seat. It alleges that the question was added unconstitutionally with discriminatory intent to diminish the political power and influence of Latinos, Asian-Americans, Arab-Americans and immigrant communities of color generally.

U.S. Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross announced the plan in March, saying the question was needed in part to help the government enforce the Voting Rights Act, a 1965 law meant to protect political representation of minority

groups. The Commerce Department is responsible for the census.

The plan has resulted in several lawsuits, including one in California, the nation's most populous state with the highest concentration of foreign-born residents, and another in New York brought by 17 Democratic attorneys general, the District of Columbia, six cities and the bipartisan U.S. Conference of Mayors.

The decennial census is required by the Constitution and used to determine the number of seats each state has in the House of Representatives, as well as how federal money is distributed to local communities.

The Justice Department did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Donna Lieberman, head of the New York Civil Liberties Union, said in a release that President Donald Trump's administration was "shamelessly weaponizing the census to wage its war on communities of color, immigrants and the poor."

She added: "New Yorkers refuse to be undercounted, discriminated against or driven into the shadows."

Steven Choi, executive director of the New York Immigration Coalition, said the citizenship question "is toxic to New York's four million immigrants and all New Yorkers, who stand to lose millions of dollars in federal aid and representation in Congress."

Plaintiffs in the lawsuit include the coalition, the American-Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee and other groups. Besides the Commerce Department and Ross, the Bureau of the Census and its director, Ron Jarmin, were also named as defendants.

Secret permit let Iran convert funds

WASHINGTON — After striking an elusive nuclear deal with Iran, the Obama administration found itself in a quandary in early 2016: Iran had been promised access to its long-frozen overseas reserves, including \$5.7 billion stuck in an Omani bank.

To spend it, Iran wanted to convert the money into U.S. dollars and then euros, but top U.S. officials had repeatedly promised Congress that Iran would never gain access to America's financial system.

Those assurances notwithstanding, the Obama administration secretly issued a license to let Iran sidestep U.S. sanctions for the brief moment required to convert the funds through an American bank, an investigation by Senate Republicans released Wednesday showed. The plan failed when two U.S. banks refused to participate.

Yet two years later, the revelation is re-igniting the bitter debate over the nuclear deal and whether former President Barack Obama was too eager to grant concessions to Tehran.

"The Obama administration misled the American people and Congress because they were desperate to get a deal with Iran," said Sen. Rob Portman, R-Ohio, who chairs the Senate panel that conducted the investigation.

And Republican Rep. Ed

Royce, the House Foreign Affairs Committee chairman, accused Obama of trying to "hide a secret push to give the ayatollah access to the U.S. dollar."

Not so, former Obama administration officials said, arguing the decision to grant the license adhered to the spirit of the deal, which included allowing Iran to regain access to foreign reserves that had been off-limits because of U.S. sanctions. They said the public assurances that Iran would be kept out were intended to dispel incorrect reports about nonexistent proposals that would have gone much farther by letting Iran actually buy or sell things in dollars.

The former Obama officials disputed that the momentary access to U.S. banks to convert funds through the dollar constituted "access to the U.S. financial system." What's more, they dismissed the report as another example of a faulty approach to Iran policy by Republicans

and by President Donald Trump, who last month withdrew the U.S. from the landmark 2015 nuclear accord.

"They continue to malign the deal in an effort to justify President Trump's unjustifiable decision," said Ned Price, who was Obama's White House National Security Council spokesman, referring to GOP lawmakers.

Still, the report by the Senate Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations sheds light on the delicate balance the Obama administration sought to strike after the deal, as it worked to ensure Iran received its promised benefits without playing into the hands of the deal's opponents. Amid a tense political climate, Iran hawks in the U.S., Israel and elsewhere argued that the United States was giving far too much to Tehran and that the windfall would be used to fund extremism and other troubling Iranian

activity.

The Treasury Department license, issued in February 2016 and never disclosed, would have allowed Iran to convert \$5.7 billion it held at Oman's Bank of Muscat from Omani rials into euros by exchanging them first into dollars. If the Omani bank had allowed the exchange without such a license, it would have violated sanctions that bar Iran from transactions that touch the U.S. financial system.

The situation resulted from the fact that Iran had stored billions in Omani rials, a currency that's notoriously hard to convert. The U.S. dollar

is the world's dominant currency, so allowing it to be used as a conversion instrument for Iranian assets was the easiest and most efficient way to speed up Iran's access to its own funds.

"Yikes," one former Treasury official told colleagues in an email, as described by the report. "It looks like we committed to a whole lot beyond just allowing the immobilized funds to settle out."

The Obama administration approached two U.S. banks to facilitate the conversion, the report said, but both refused, citing the reputational risk of doing business with or for Iran.

Issuing the license was not illegal. Still, it went above and beyond what the Obama administration was required to do under the terms of the nuclear agreement, in which the U.S. and world powers gave Iran billions of dollars in sanctions relief in exchange for curbing its nuclear program.

The license issued to Bank Muscat stood in stark contrast to repeated public statements from the Obama White House, the Treasury and the State Department, all of which denied that the administration was contemplating allowing Iran access to the U.S. financial system.

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Nursing gap demands statewide response

The United States is, in many ways, a land of plenty. But demographics, technology and societal changes are threatening to create shortages — not in, say, food products or consumer goods, but in people willing, able and trained to perform vital jobs that often save or shape lives.

The challenges and consequences of an impending nursing shortage are being experienced nationwide, but particularly in Florida, which has one of the oldest per-capita populations in the United States.

Fortunately, private-sector groups such as the Suncoast Nursing Action Coalition, and public institutions, including the State College of Florida and the University of South Florida, Sarasota-Manatee, are working feverishly to get ahead of the curve.

SNAC has hired a “navigator” who is committed to helping nurses and would-be nurses advance their education and training efficiently and based on their needs; this kind of assistance is vital, especially for prospective students who are already busy and working.

One of SNAC’s priorities is to increase the number of nurses with advanced degrees, based on evidence that the additional learning translates into better care. To that end, the coalition has offered scholarships, and SCF and USF have worked to streamline the pursuit of bachelor’s degrees.

These are admirable efforts, but insufficient statewide.

Florida’s funding of community colleges and local universities, in particular, must be enhanced and the processes for training and educating health care practitioners re-examined.

And, yes, at some point, Florida and other states should re-examine the practicality of expecting students in high-demand jobs to assume large loans and other debts in order to prepare for the state’s future. (By the way, these professionals pay taxes on good incomes.)

The same can be said of other professions and jobs where shortages loom: physicians and physician assistants; teachers; law enforcement officers.

It is crucial for private investors to leverage existing assets. Already, donors are supporting the Florida State University College of Medicine in Sarasota. Having a training ground in our region increases the likelihood that graduates will remain here and practice medicine. But more private and public support is warranted locally and throughout the state.


Due to a convergence of factors — including the retirement of Baby Boomers, a devaluing of the teaching profession and pay — a shortage of motivated, high-quality teachers is already impacting schools. Cognizant of this crisis, the Charles and Margery Barancik Foundation has launched an initiative to ask and answer this question: Why is it so difficult for public schools to retain good teachers?

In its first phase, the foundation received 789 survey responses from teachers in the Sarasota County School District. More work will come after the replies are analyzed.

Whether the shortage involves teachers or nurses, or plumbers, for that matter, it is vital to seek advice from the practitioners — before coming to “solutions.”

Immigration policy both nasty and ineffectual

President Trump’s sound and fury on immigration has delivered close to nothing. Trump never lets up, thundering against “illegal aliens” as a criminal class while pushing his enforcers to treat the impoverished ones without mercy. But actually, illegal immigration is again rising — and significantly.

Here’s the naked truth: Trump tries to look tough by brutalizing Central Americans without papers but avoids disturbing the companies that hire them.

Every semi-informed American knows that the vast majority of undocumented immigrants come for jobs. And there’s a proven system in place that greatly weakens the job magnet. It’s called E-Verify, basically a database that lets employers easily check whether a prospective new hire may legally work in this country.

Candidate Trump supported requiring use of E-Verify nationwide. President Trump put money for E-Verify in his budget but doesn’t talk about it at all. There are three possible reasons:

One, solving the problem of illegal immigration would deprive him of a potent issue.

Two, it would greatly inconvenience many of his business supporters, who want the cheap labor. Three, it would shine bright lights on the reality that our economy needs more foreign-born labor, not just the tech-savvy but also low-skilled people eager to work.

Eight states already require their employers to use E-Verify. Arizona started in 2008. Since then, the number of undocumented workers in the state is 33 percent lower than what was projected without the law, according to the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas. The other E-Verify states are Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Utah.

Some of the governors complain that their companies are losing business to competitors in states that avail themselves of the lower-cost illegal labor. Florida Gov. Rick Scott says that’s why he backed off his campaign promise to institute E-Verify statewide.

You’d think that all these politicians would therefore back making use of E-Verify a national mandate. But you’d be wrong. As Sen. Thom Tillis of North Carolina explained, Republicans aren’t calling for it because of the low unemployment rate.

Let’s digest that. If there is a shortage of labor but you want the labor to be legal, why not mandate E-Verify but bring in more immigrants through normal channels? The answer is that what many really want is more cheap illegal labor.

A sensible approach would have the U.S. establish a panel of labor experts to continually monitor the economy’s needs. The job would include keeping an eye on wages to ensure that employers provide decent pay.

The panel would then recommend the number and skills of immigrants to be admitted. There would still be special programs for agriculture and other industries that need temporary help.

E-Verify would move most immigration enforcement from the border to the employment office.

Marry E-Verify to a realistic immigration program and the obscene show of separating children from their parents would close. There could be an orderly process for assessing asylum claims. More poor foreigners could enter via the front door. And law enforcement could concentrate on dangerous criminals.

Lastly, add in comprehensive reform. That would mean legalizing the status of most undocumented immigrants who’ve set roots here while requiring all employers to use E-Verify going forward.

Administration officials insist on doing the enforcement part only. But without E-Verify, they’re not doing enforcement. They’re only roughing up brown people for the cameras.

Rising seas, raising questions in booming Boston district

BOSTON — In this old city's booming Seaport District, General Electric is building its new world headquarters, Amazon is bringing in thousands of new workers, and Reebok's red delta symbol sits atop the new office it opened last year. Three tech companies are testing self-driving cars and restaurants and apartments have gone up virtually overnight.

But after bad flooding this past winter, some wonder whether it was a bright idea to invest so much in a man-made peninsula that sits barely above sea level.

"That was the first winter where we really saw waves splashing onto the boardwalk and water in the streets," said Greg Hoffmeister, who watched the brief deluge from the third-floor Seaport office of his real estate firm. "You start to think: Is that what we're in for, as sea levels rise?"

As they gear up to host the International Mayors Climate Summit on Thursday, municipal officials insist they're making the proper preparations in a city that was less than 500 acres when the Puritans settled it in 1630 but now includes more than 5,000 acres of man-made landfill — one-sixth of its entire area.

"We know the water is going to be coming in through South Boston, pretty much from every direction, by 2070," said Richard McGuinness, a city planning deputy, referring to the neighborhood that includes the Seaport.

A 2016 city report projected Boston could see 8 inches (20 centimeters) of sea level rise by 2030, with the Seaport District the most vulnerable area. By 2070, seas could rise 36 inches higher than in

2000 levels, affecting some 90,000 residents and 12,000 buildings and potentially causing economic losses of more than \$14 billion, the report said.

While some new Seaport developers are building with climate change in mind, many office towers and high-rise condos erected earlier simply didn't — even after 2012's Superstorm Sandy slammed New York and showed what a bad storm could do on the East Coast. And environmental activists and some researchers complain the city isn't moving quickly or aggressively enough to change development patterns.

Boston officials say they're looking at ways to revise the city's zoning code, moving ahead on relatively inexpensive neighborhood-wide improvements, and assessing the need for the kinds of massive public works projects that European cities built long ago — such as a barrier across Boston Harbor that could cost \$12 billion and take 30 years to build.

The Boston Planning and Development Agency also revamped in October the "climate-ready checklist" developers have been required to submit since 2007 detailing strategies they're incorporating into their designs to mitigate climate change impacts.

But the requirement is still "largely procedural"

since the city doesn't require developers to follow through, complained Bradley Campbell, president of the Conservation Law Foundation, an environmental advocacy group.

Boston officials counter that any design changes still need city approval and note that many newer Seaport developers are already preparing for the worst.

General Electric, which moved its corporate offices from Connecticut to temporary digs in Boston's Seaport in 2016, says the first floor of the new global headquarters it's building will be elevated nearly 5 feet, or enough to protect it from the higher sea levels projected by 2070. Electrical systems are also being placed on the second floor, and emergency generators will be on the roof of the 12-story building.

The developers of Seaport Square, a 20-block complex of apartments, office buildings, and stores where Amazon has recently committed to leasing space for 2,000 workers, says its buildings stayed dry this winter, thanks to similar design features.

"We believe in science," said Yanni Tsipis, a senior vice president at WS Development. "We go into development in the Seaport with eyes wide open."

EU tariffs on US imports start in July

BRUSSELS — The European Union on Wednesday announced it will start imposing duties from July on a list of U.S. products in response to President Donald Trump's decision to slap tariffs on steel and aluminum imports from Europe.

"The new duties start applying in July," European Commission Vice-President Maros Sefcovic told reporters. "It is a measured and proportionate response to the unilateral and illegal decision taken by the United States."

Sefcovic said that formalities in finalizing the list should be completed this month. The EU says it will introduce "rebalancing" tariffs on about 2.8 billion euros' (\$3.4 billion) worth of U.S. steel, agricultural and other products, including bourbon, peanut butter, cranberries and orange juice.

Trump imposed tariffs of 25 percent on steel imports and 10 percent on imported aluminum from the EU on June 1. He said the move is meant to protect U.S. national security interests, but the Europeans claim it is simply protectionism and breaks global trade rules.

The EU exported some 5.5 million tons of steel to the U.S. last year. European steel producers are concerned about a loss of market access but also that steel from elsewhere will flood in.

The EU — the world's biggest trading bloc — has also taken its case to the World Trade Organization. If the WTO rules in its favor, or after three years if the case is still going on, the EU plans to impose further tariffs of 3.6 billion euros on U.S. products.

"The EU's reaction is fully in line with international trade law. We regret that the United States left us with no other option than to safeguard EU interests," Trade Commissioner Cecilia Malmstrom said in a statement.

Grady wins top Bay High honor

Coach, teacher earns Henshaw-Whitley Teacher Excellence award

PANAMA CITY — When it comes to Bay High School, Michael Grady Jr. has impressive roots.

His father attended during his senior year, which was the first year of forced

integration, and was one of only three black players on the Bay High basketball team. His mother was a longtime para-professional with the school district, and Grady himself was named Mr. Bay High in 1994, with his sister taking the honor of Homecoming Queen two years later.

It's those roots and that pride in Bay High School that Grady says he brings both to the classroom, where he teaches math to seniors, and the court, where he coaches

basketball. And it's why he was awarded this year's Henshaw-Whitley Teacher Excellence Award, given to Bay High teachers who make major contributions to their students' lives.

"Sometimes when you're a coach, when you do other things, sometimes people overlook the pride you take in your teaching and your classroom abilities," Grady said. "I enjoy the coaching, but I do

March, April bed tax numbers up in Bay, statewide

PANAMA CITY BEACH — With Florida coming off a record year for tourism in 2017, newly released numbers indicate sun-seekers continued to flock to the state — Bay County included — during the first three months of 2018.

March and April bed tax figures have risen 15 percent for both months combined in Panama City Beach, following the state's upward trend, local officials said Wednesday. They credit the increase largely to the Tourist Development Council's strategies.

"The TDC is constantly strategizing different ways to bring visitors to the destination," said Catie Feeney, TDC public relations manager.

"Panama City Beach is a premier destination for spring travel, and providing multiple events for visitors to enjoy is crucial."

That year, those events included the Seabreeze Jazz Festival, the inaugural Sand-Jam and an April 1 Easter holiday.

April 2018 figures were at \$1.02 million, up from 2017's \$975,190. The March figures showed a jump as well, with 2018 numbers at \$1.07 million compared to the \$853,070 collected in 2017. All figures were based on a 3 percent bed tax rate, instead of the current 5 percent rate, which the TDC does to accurately compare prices before and after 2009 when the rate changed.

The tax is a 5 percent bed tax gathered from a taxing jurisdiction within Bay County on short-term rental properties. Tax dollars go toward

Peters discusses minimum wage, health care, pot

Congressional candidate: Marijuana should be decriminalized under federal law

PANAMA CITY — Florida's minimum wage, single-payer health care and armed teachers were among the issues Congressional candidate Brandon Peters discussed Wednesday during a stop in Panama City.

Peters, an attorney and mediator from Williston vying for Florida's District 2 seat currently held by Republican Neal Dunn, stopped by the Bay County Public Library to meet voters and hear their concerns. Peters and Bob Rackleff are campaigning for the Democratic primary election, which will be held Aug. 28. The winner then will face Dunn in the general election

Nov. 6. "I'm a big proponent of the \$15-an-hour minimum wage, and that's for full-time employees," Peters said. "For part-time employees, I believe it ought to be \$16.50 to stop this game that employers play where they hire seven part-time workers instead of three full-time folks to avoid paying benefits."

"I believe that it's very important that we provide health care for everybody, regardless of means or socioeconomic background. I believe very strongly in single-payer health care."

The crowd who came to see Peters was small but passionate and comprised teachers, attorneys and community activists. They asked Peters how a single-payer system would be funded, his thoughts on marijuana and whether police should be "demilitarized."

Steve Moss files for School Board re-election

PANAMA CITY BEACH — When Steve Moss, a financial planner by trade, thinks about what insight he brings to the Bay District School Board, he just looks around his dinner table.

With a son in elementary school, a daughter in middle school and a wife who is a Bay District Schools employee, Moss says he gets immediate feedback on just about everything related to the district and school board policy — from uniforms to transportation and even cafeteria food

— every night, whether he wants it or not.

"We run the gamut of school-related

topics," Moss said. "If I don't have a vested interest in our school system, I don't know who does."

Moss has officially launched his re-election bid for his District 5 seat on the Bay District School Board, representing Panama City Beach. So far, he's raised \$500 in donations.

Being the only school board member with children in the Bay District Schools system,

Moss said, has given him a unique and vital perspective on the board. And being a financial planner by trade and serving on the budget subcommittee, many of the financial-type decisions have been deferred to him.

"I try really to do my homework and make good decisions," Moss said. "Could we always do a better job? Yes, but a lot of times, it comes down to priorities."

For Moss, the biggest priority looking back and ahead, is school safety. The Bay District School Board shooting occurred on what was only Moss's second board meeting ever, and it prompted him to

push for an initiative in 2013 that expanded the School Resource Deputy program, which put a sheriff's deputy at every middle and high school in the district.

"Maybe we were naive to think that something like that couldn't happen in Bay County, but it did, at our school board meeting," Moss said. "That has been one of the things I've been trying to advocate for."

That advocating would continue should Moss secure another term, as the district looks to expand its police force into the elementary schools and undertake costly, but necessary, according to

Moss, security upgrades.

When it came time to file again for re-election, Moss said he looked at other positions and where he might be a good fit, whether at the county or state level.

But, he said, he always came back to his dinner table, and where he could make the most impact.

"I sincerely believe that God has me exactly where he wants me to be at this time in my life," Moss said.


"I truly enjoy serving our community as a school board member and I eagerly look forward to the opportunity to continue in this role in the future."





Walton official refutes Facebook post claiming 6 drownings

SEACREST — A Facebook post that went viral over the weekend warning people about the dangers of rip currents in Walton County had many people believing that six people drowned last week, but beach safety officials say that's not the case.

The Facebook post was written by a Georgia man who said he was visiting Seacrest Beach on County Road 30A last weekend. He wrote that he was standing knee-deep in the Gulf of Mexico at a sand bar Friday when he was swept out to sea in a rip current.

He said he was rescued by two good Samaritans, who pulled him to the beach right as a lifeguard arrived.

According to the post, the man said the lifeguard told him six people had drowned in the previous two days. The man who almost drowned lauded the men who saved him, calling them "heroes," and warned people about the dangers of swimming in the Gulf.

The post had been shared more than 33,000 times as of Tuesday afternoon.

But David Vaughan, Walton County's beach safety director, said Tuesday morning that while he appreciated the post spreading the message about the dangers of rip currents and the importance of swimming safely, the part about six people drowning was "absolutely false."

"We pulled a ton of people out of the water," Vaughan said. "We had a very, very

busy week. But six people did not die in Walton County." According to Vaughan, lifeguards oversaw 232,607 visitors on guarded beaches between May 27 and June 3. Of those, 3½ days were double red flag days, meaning the water was closed to swimmers. The remaining days were single red flag days.

During that time, Vaughan said lifeguards made 226 public assists, which is when guards have to go in the water to help people get out, and 22 full-blown water rescues. He said there were no fatalities.

However, a 28-year-old man did die after he was pulled from the water near the 700 block of Scenic Gulf Drive in Miramar Beach on May 25. Vaughan said it was the first swimming fatality of the season in Walton County, and that the man was swimming in the evening after lifeguards had left the beach.

He said he did not know the victim's name or where

he was from.

In Bay County, a 61-year-old Georgia man died May 30 after going snorkeling in the Gulf of Mexico while first responders spent much of the day trying to keep beachgoers out of dangerous rip currents in the wake of Subtropical Storm Alberto. On May 25, a 31-year-old male was pulled from the Gulf by several bystanders behind Tropic Winds Resort. And on May 19, a 5-year-old boy from Dothan, Ala., died after being pulled from the Gulf of Mexico behind Sterling Breeze condominiums.

Vaughan said he has fielded calls from national media outlets since the Facebook post about the supposed six fatalities went viral.

"The bottom line is that it was a very, very challenging week, and our lifeguards did an amazing job of keeping the word out and keeping people safe," he said. "We appreciate the overall message of what this post is trying to convey."

Study says tropical cyclones slowing

WASHINGTON — Tropical cyclones around the world are moving slightly slower over land and water, dumping more rain as they stall, just as Hurricane Harvey did last year, a new study found.

This isn't about how powerful a storm's winds are, just how fast it chugs along. Storms in the last few years — before 2017's Harvey — were moving about 10 percent slower globally than in the late 1940s and 1950s, according to a study published in Nature Wednesday. Storms worldwide in 2016 moved about 1.25 mph slower than 60 some years ago.

In the Atlantic Ocean basin, the slowdown was not dramatic, just 6 percent. But when Atlantic storms hit land — like Harvey — the study said the slowdown is a significant 20 percent. Atlantic storms that make landfall moved 2.9 mph slower than 60 some years ago, it said.

"The slower a storm goes, the more rain it's going to dump in any particular area," said study author James Kossin, a government climate scientist. "Hurricane Harvey last year was a great example of what a slow storm can do."

Harvey, which killed at least 68 people, dropped a record 60 inches of rain in parts of southeastern Texas, according to the National Hurricane Center.

Kossin started his research before the 2017 season, stopping his analysis at 2016. Adding last year's storms would have made the slowdown a bit more prominent,

he said.

Unhurried hurricanes also mean strong winds blowing more often over the same place and possibly more storm surge, Kossin said.

The trend has all the signs of human-caused climate change, Kossin said. But the study did not look at causes by using computer models to simulate the Earth with and without warming. It is based solely on past observations, he said.

Another study that came out recently, using computer models, concluded future storm movements will slow because of climate change.

Climate change is tinkering with and slowing down atmospheric circulation patterns — the wind currents that move weather along, Kossin said.

Outside scientists were skeptical. That's mostly because data before the 1970s is not reliable so it is hard to make such conclusions, said University of Miami hurricane researcher Brian McNoldy.

Kossin acknowledged problems with pre-1970s data but said most of it deals with how strong storms are. Older data on location, and thus movement, are more reliable, Kossin said.

"Kossin is right that a 10 percent change in tropical cyclone motion would be an important change due to its effect on accumulated precipitation," Texas state climatologist John Nielsen-Gammon said in an email.

"I just need more convincing that there actually has been a 10 percent motion change."

Billionaire Jeff Greene jumps into governor's race

TALLAHASSEE — Billionaire Jeff Greene is jumping into Florida's crowded Democratic primary for governor less than three months before the election.

Though a late entry into the race, Greene has enough money to shake up an election where about half the voters are undecided.

He filed his paperwork to run Friday, but didn't immediately make a public announcement about the run.

It's not the first political run for Palm Beach real estate tycoon, who lost a U.S. Senate primary eight years ago despite spending \$30 million of his own money.

Greene ran for Senate in 2010 and lost by a landslide to then-U.S. Rep. Kendrick Meek and despite far outspending the congressman.

His campaign was dogged by distractions, including reports that former boxer and convicted rapist Mike Tyson was the best man at his wedding, and Hollywood Madam Heidi Fleiss was his house guest for a year.

There were also news reports about parties on his yacht, which once made a stop in Cuba while the U.S. had a travel ban to the island.

After he lost, he sued what's now the Tampa Bay Times, accusing the

newspaper of libel during its coverage of the campaign. The newspaper settled the lawsuit in 2016.

Forbes magazine lists Greene as being worth \$3.8 billion, with 3,500 apartments in Los Angeles, 2,500 units in Florida, three buildings in Manhattan and five homes.

Greene didn't immediately return a voicemail seeking comment on his campaign.

Two years ago, Greene opened a private school in Palm Beach serving pre-school through grade 6. It has an enrollment of 85 and is expanding to grades 7 and 8 this year.

Greene won't be the only candidate spending millions of their own money on the race.

Former Miami Beach Mayor Philip Levine has already spent about \$8 million, and Orlando businessman Chris King has spent about \$2.3 million on the race.

Other Democrats running are former U.S. Rep. Gwen Graham and Tallahassee Mayor Andrew Gillum.

Republicans running include Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam and U.S. Rep. Ron DeSantis.

Republican Gov. Rick Scott can't seek reelection because of term limits.

Instead, Scott is challenging Democratic Sen. Bill Nelson.

Judson Wood declared incompetent

He is accused of beating his wife, son with a metal mallet

NICEVILLE — Judson Wood, the man charged with attempted homicide in the metal mallet beatings

Judson Wood of his wife and adult


disabled son in February, has been declared incompetent to stand trial and has been sent to Florida State Hospital in Chattahoochee for treatment.

Additionally, authorities might upgrade one of his charges to second-degree murder, pending the autopsy results of his wife, 68-year-old Sharron Wood, who passed away in April.

Judson was arrested on Feb. 6 after authorities say he tried to kill his wife and 40-year-old disabled son, David, with a metal mallet while they slept in their beds at their home at 1911 Benton Ave. in Niceville. Sharron and David were taken to hospitals with critical injuries, and Sharron had to undergo extensive facial reconstruction. Both were eventually transferred to a rehabilitation facility, according to the Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office.

According to her obituary, Sharron died on April 20.

"Sharron was instrumental in the lives of many," her obituary read. "Sharron retired from the

Okaloosa County School District after 15 years as a child care director at Plew Elementary School. Taking care of children was her passion; however, her number one priority was her son, David. She enjoyed entertaining family and friends. Her smile and caring heart will be missed."

Bill Bishop, chief assistant state attorney in Okaloosa County, said it was unclear if Sharron died due to the injuries she suffered in the alleged attack or because of previous health issues.

Her body was sent to the Medical Examiner's Office for an autopsy. If the autopsy shows that Sharron died from the alleged attack, authorities could upgrade one of Judson's charges from attempted murder to second-degree murder, Bishop said. He would still face attempted premeditated murder for the alleged attack on his son.

But it's unlikely Judson will face a jury anytime soon. On May 18 he was

declared incompetent to stand trial and was ordered to be transferred from the Okaloosa County Jail to Florida State Hospital in Chattahoochee, where he will undergo treatment for undisclosed medical and/or psychiatric issues, according to Bishop.

"I can't get into any details as far as specific mental or physical problems," Bishop said. "But by law, there are some issues which would have made it difficult for (Judson) to assist in his own defense, and based upon those findings, the court made that determination (of incompetency)."

A competency evaluation addresses several aspects of the defendant's ability to understand the legal process, including his appreciation of charges and possible penalties, ability to relate to his attorney, ability to "manifest appropriate courtroom behavior" and motivation to help himself

in the legal process.

Insanity is a determination that a person suffers from a mental illness, and because of that mental illness they don't realize what they did was wrong.

Bishop said incompetency relates to a person's ability to stand trial, while insanity would go toward whether or not somebody can be found guilty or not guilty by reason of insanity.

Judson will be re-evaluated every six months, and if at any point he is determined to have regained his competency, Bishop said his office will move forward to prosecute him.

According to his arrest report, Judson told investigators shortly after the alleged attack that David's round-the-clock care had "become too much" for him, and his own health was deteriorating as well. Neighbors told the Daily News that David suffered from cerebral palsy, and they believed Sharron's health had also taken a turn for the worse.

Mossy Head man gets 25 years for son's death

DeFUNIAC SPRINGS — A man from Mossy Head was sentenced to 25 years in prison Monday for the murder of his infant son.

In December 2015, Walton County sheriff's deputies responded to a call at the Raceway station in Mossy Head regarding an unresponsive 9-week-old boy, according to a press release from the Sheriff's Office.

The infant was taken to a hospital in Pensacola, where he was later

pronounced dead. The investigation turned criminal after an autopsy report showed the child had suffered significant injuries.

Harold Clifford Bielec Jr. was charged with the death of his son in June 2016 and was later indicted on first-degree murder charges, the press release said.

A jury found Bielec guilty of second-degree murder April 12.

The State Attorney's Office and Sheriff's Office had sought a maximum sentence of life in prison.

After he is released from prison, Bielec must serve 15 years of probation with special conditions.

New advertisement: Florida Gov. Scott is the one helping Puerto Rico

A new campaign ad for Florida Gov. Rick Scott says he is the "one public official" who has helped Puerto Rico.

The Scott campaign announced Wednesday that it has begun running an online ad that sharply criticizes U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson and defends Scott's efforts to help Puerto Ricans displaced by Hurricane Maria. Scott is challenging the Democratic incumbent this fall.

The ad began running less than a week after the Republican governor's most recent trip to the U.S. territory. During a press conference, Scott said he didn't know what the federal government could have done differently after last year's devastating storm.

Campaign spokesman Ryan Patmintra said the ad is not suggesting that the administration of President Donald Trump did not help those harmed by the storm.

The Broward Principals and Assistants Association says Thompson will oversee the recovery efforts to make sure the 3,200 students and their teachers are getting the help they need. He asked the district to appoint a co-principal to help with the job's other duties.

Hall has been the principal at West Broward High, a 2,300-student school.

If the school board approves Hall on Tuesday, the Sun Sentinel reports she'll start at the Parkland school on July 1.

Cutting "trillions of dollars" in "wasteful" defense spending, such as with the F-35, would help fund single-payer health care, Peters said, drawing a contrast between money for fighter aircraft and "men and women in uniform" who can't afford to live in Bay County and qualify for food stamps.

As for marijuana, the drug should be decriminalized under federal law, non-violent marijuana-related offenses should be expunged and voting rights should be restored to felons who had them taken away for such offenses, Peters said. Regarding police, he said every police department wants and needs more resources and training in non-lethal intervention.

"There's a lot we can do with basic communication with individuals to talk them out of a violent situation," Peters said. "As a mediator, I studied crisis negotiation very seriously because I find applications to what I do as a mediator. ... There are literally successful hostage negotiations that have taken place by text with a young person. The officers want that training."

The Democratic candidate mentioned other issues,

including arming teachers.

"I haven't met a single [teacher] that wants to carry a gun into the classroom, but I also haven't a single one that would turn down a pay raise," Peters said. "The people with a badge and gun need to be the people with a badge and a gun. The folks that are teaching our children calculus and AP history and chemistry don't need to be worrying about how to move and shoot at the same time."

Peters also said he would vote no on any bill that's drafted "in secret" and brought to the floor without a debate, is refusing corporate donations and supports paying teachers more. He plans to be in Apalachicola today.

marketing, beach maintenance and other ventures.

Florida drew an estimated 33.2 million visitors from January through March, which was a 7.4 percent increase over the same period in 2017 and is a record quarterly number, Gov. Rick Scott and the tourism-marketing agency Visit Florida said Tuesday.

The increase this year was buoyed by 29.1 million domestic visitors, 8.5 percent more than during the first quarter of 2017. The number of Canadian visitors was up 2.5 percent during the quarter, though overseas visitors were down 0.7 percent, according to comparisons posted on the Visit Florida website.

Ken Lawson, CEO of Visit Florida, said in a recent interview that tourism funds 1.4 million jobs in the state.

"It makes sure those people can feed their families and pay their mortgages," he said. "Tourism is the No. 1 economic driver in Florida."

Scott, who is running for U.S. Senate this year, has made a high-profile priority of increasing tourism numbers and has pushed the Legislature to set aside money for Visit Florida's marketing efforts. Lawmakers approved \$76 million for the current year and the same amount for the fiscal year that starts July 1.

Florida drew an estimated 116.5 million visitors in 2017, despite grappling with issues such as damage from Hurricane Irma in the Florida Keys and other areas, according to state numbers. That was up from a previous high of 112.4 million in 2016. If last year is an indication, the first-quarter total of 33.2 million visitors — a period that included the northern cold-weather months of January and February — will be a high-water mark in 2018. Last year, Florida drew 30.9 million visitors in the first quarter, with the next-highest total of 29.36 million in the second quarter, Visit Florida numbers show. The third quarter, which included steamy parts of the summer and Hurricane Irma, was the lowest at





27.7 million.

The 2017 numbers also showed that an estimated 9.6 percent of domestic out-of-state visitors came from Georgia, while 8.5 percent came from New York, 5.5 percent came from Texas, 5.3 percent came from Ohio and 5.3 percent came from Pennsylvania. Domestic travel was largely concentrated from states in the eastern half of the country.

Canada was the top source of international visitors in 2017, followed by the United Kingdom, Brazil, Argentina and Columbia, according to the Visit Florida website. Canada, however, was the only one of those countries that provided an increase in Florida visitors in 2017.

feel greatly honored that the recognition has gone past the basketball and into what I'm doing in the classroom."

For Grady, every day in the classroom is a day to model for his students how to be successful, how to work hard and how to take pride in their school. Every day, he's on time, and he said he's made it a point to shuck the traditional coach uniform of tennis shoes and shorts, instead opting for professional, business attire. He sings Bay High's alma mater with his students, and chides them for leaving trash around campus.

"They don't understand that this is sometimes bigger than them," Grady said. "We try to make everything about the individual, but sometimes it is about the community, about the school. I try to do two things: make sure they're getting what they need and get individual attention, but also understand that the world is bigger than each individual."

Growing up around educators, Grady himself "just fell into" teaching. In the pre-med program at the University of Florida with a degree in chemistry and good MCAT scores, when Grady came home, he'd substitute teach to earn extra money. Burned out on college, he wanted a year off before tackling medical school, and at the behest of his parents, he got a

full-time teaching job.

Eighteen years later, he still hasn't looked back at medical school.

"I was always a natural teacher, I always had a knack," Grady said. "I think it takes a natural gift. I know a lot of smart people, but most of the super smart people I know do not have an ability to teach. They can't explain things to other people."

Grady especially takes the mantle of teaching seniors seriously, counseling them on their future goals and plans before they head off to college and into adult life. It's his goal, he said, to help them reach their goals.

"Honestly I embrace that," he said. "I like being able to catapult them into their own choices and their own goals."

Today's deal sees North with a promising hand for slam when his partner opens the bidding. However, the one-no-trump rebid persuades North to look no higher than three no-trump. He certainly has no reason to assume that game will be as delicate as it actually turns out to be.

When West leads his fourth-best diamond, the fate of the contract hinges on declarer's play to the first trick. He should reason that West is relatively unlikely to have led low from a suit headed by all three of the king, queen and 10, so one of those honors must be held by East. If this is so, and the suit divides 4-3, the defenders will have three tricks in diamonds, but no more.

If diamonds break 5-2, the play of the ace may block the run of the suit for the defense. South's correct play, therefore, is to go up with the ace in dummy. This play does not lose even if West has led from both the king and queen, because the fact that the 10 would then be doubleton in East's hand would prevent the run of four tricks. Declarer must still exercise caution; if he next finesesses in clubs, the defenders can unscramble their six winners.

Instead, declarer must unblock spades and go after hearts at once, since he needs no more than two tricks in that suit to make his game.

West can win with the heart ace, but his side can take no more than two diamond tricks, even if East has unblocked his king at the first trick.

Justify arrives in NY for Triple Crown bid

NEW YORK — Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner Justify arrived in New York on Wednesday ahead of this weekend's Belmont Stakes, in which the colt will try to sweep the Triple Crown.

Justify traveled smoothly to Belmont Park via a flight from Louisville, Kentucky, and a van ride from an airport on Long Island.

He was greeted by a throng of media recording every step as he walked into Barn 1, the same place American Pharoah stayed before

ending the sport's 37-year drought with a Triple Crown sweep in 2015 and becoming the 12th horse to achieve the feat.

"It's just a different vibe," said Bob Baffert, who also trained Pharoah. "It's like we know it can be done."

Justify will face nine rivals on Saturday in the 1 1/2-mile Belmont, the longest and most grueling of the three-race series. He brings a 5-0 career record to the race in which the colt is the morning-line favorite at 4-5 odds.

"Now he has to just close the deal," Baffert said. "It's a lot of pressure, too. You're in

New York. The place is going to be rocking. You want to see superstars."

Justify was greeted with squeals from horses already in the barn of trainer John Terranova, who hosts Baffert's out-of-town runners.

"He got their attention somehow. He must give off something," Baffert said. "When he got off the van, he was just dragging me around there."

Baffert was the victim of a bite on his hand from Justify the other day while walking the horse.

Warriors take 3-0 lead

Durant hits for 43, Cavs one game away from elimination

CLEVELAND — Kevin Durant scored 43 points, draining a 3-pointer for emphasis in the final minute, and the Golden State Warriors beat the Cleveland Cavaliers 110-102 in Game 3 of the NBA Finals on Wednesday night to move within a victory of a sweep and their third title in four years.

Durant stood motionless after dropping his 33-footer, which gave the Warriors a

106-100 lead and effectively ended the fourth straight finals matchup between the rivals.

Golden State will have four chances to wrap up its championship starting with Game 4 on Friday night. LeBron James scored 33 points and Kevin Love 20 for the Cavs, who have fallen into a hole in which no team has ever emerged. In NBA playoff history, teams down 3-0 are 0-131.

The Warriors won despite a 3-of-16 shooting performance from Stephen Curry.

Capitals eager to end their title drought in Vegas desert

LAS VEGAS — The Washington Capitals will play for a Stanley Cup championship Thursday night for the first time in 43 NHL seasons. Alex Ovechkin is one win away from carving his name into history at the peak of his incredible hockey career.

With a 3-1 lead in the Stanley Cup Final and a city thousands of miles away thirsting for its first championship in a generation, the Vegas stakes are awfully high for the Caps in Game 5.

Ovi still wants his teammates thinking about the Golden Knights, not that silver trophy.

"To be honest, I think most of us have never been in this position," said Ovechkin, who could become the first Russian captain to raise the Cup. "For me personally, I don't try to think about it too much what's going on and just try focusing on different things. But it's hard."

Exactly what could distract an athlete of Ovechkin's magnitude from the imminent chance to validate his place in his sport?

"Whatever. Cars. Hotels. You know, Vegas."

Indeed, this desert is a strange place to end a drought. But with three chances to get one win, Ovechkin and his teammates want to seize their very first opportunity for the clincher on the Las Vegas ice.

With one more victory, Ovechkin would finally have team success to complement his formidable individual accomplishments. The vaunted goal-scorer can also succeed where a generation of Washington athletes have fallen short by leading the Capitals to their first title and the city's first major pro sports championship in a quarter-century.

Steelers' Shazier working hard to play again

PITTSBURGH — Ryan Shazier's routine hasn't changed much, even after a life-altering spinal injury put his football career in jeopardy.

The Pittsburgh Steelers linebacker still arrives at the team facility around 7 a.m. He still watches copious amounts of film. He still works out regularly, often with his teammates alongside. And he still believes one day he will run out of the Heinz Field tunnel in full uniform despite the many obstacles he understands are in his path.

"My dream is to come back and play football again," Shazier said on Wednesday in his first wide-ranging public remarks since undergoing spine stabilization surgery last December. "I'm working my tail off every single day; have (playing again) in the back of my mind every single time I go to rehab."

Shazier walked into the media room with help of a cane and spent 20 minutes

outlining his journey since he lowered his head to hit Bengals wide receiver Josh Malone in the first quarter on Dec. 4. He called the moment after impact when he grabbed the small of his back while his legs lay motionless "a little scary," but was quick to thank emergency responders in Cincinnati for their delicate work on the field in the immediate aftermath.

He underwent spine stabilization surgery on Dec. 6 and has spent

the intervening months remaining adamant he would play again while being a fixture at the team's practice facility, where he has become a de facto coach. It's a role he's embracing, but one he's not quite ready to accept on a full-time basis.

"Just because I got hurt doesn't mean I'm going to stop loving the game of football," said Shazier, who added that despite the injury he's going to give it "everything I have"

in an effort to return to play.

Details of the exact nature of Shazier's injury and his long-term prognosis remain sparse. He declined to get into specifics about whether playing again is even medically feasible, saying his medical team has told him to focus on making incremental improvements.

"Honestly right now, I'm not a doctor," Shazier said. "Every day I take it one day at a time. The further we get along in rehab, the better they can give me answers."

Shazier has made remarkable progress in the last six months. He spent several weeks in the hospital following surgery, though he took time out to attend several Steelers home games near the end of the 2017 season. He regularly posts updates through his social media accounts and provided an indelible moment during the NFL draft in April when he walked on stage in Dallas to announce Pittsburgh's first-round selection.

With his 33rd birthday looming in the fall, Ovechkin understands the opportunity before him and the magnitude of the situation for everyone who has ever worn the Capitals' jersey.

It's enough to tighten anybody's grip on the stick, but the Caps didn't appear overly tight during their workout or in the dressing room afterward.

"It's a great time," Ovechkin said Wednesday. "Probably the best time in my life, hockey-wise. We just enjoy it together, this moment. It's fun."

Even with a commanding series lead, the Caps all spoke of the importance of consistency

and seizing the moment after their light workout. Washington has a shockingly lengthy franchise history of playoff collapses, but these Caps potentially won all three potential closeout games in their first three playoff series this spring.

"Maybe because we've talked about it so much," Caps defenseman John Carlson said. "Guys are sick of hearing about it from the meetings. Sick of not getting it done. They all kind of blend together, but I think we have come out with great efforts every closing-out game, and we're going to need a big one. This is a good team at home. It's going to take a really good effort to get it done."

The Caps don't have the luxury of thinking about the minor disappointment of not being at home to secure Washington's first championship in a

major pro sport since the Redskins' Super Bowl victory in January 1992. Back home in D.C., fans will be cheering on their team at Capital One Arena in a watch party that sold out in about 20 minutes.

"I think the history of the organization is definitely an important thing, but we're focused on this group," Washington's Tom Wilson said. "We're focused on this year, and obviously once all is said and done or whatever happens, you can look back on it. We want to do it for the city. We want to do it for ourselves."

So far in this series, the Caps have done just about everything well. Washington has scored 16 goals in four games against the reeling Golden Knights, whose charmed expansion season has run short of magic in three

consecutive losses.

While the Caps focused on changing nothing from their last three efforts, the Golden Knights also don't believe they need a wholesale change. Coach Gerard Gallant's team is banking on the resilience of a group that hasn't lost four consecutive games at any point in their utterly charmed inaugural season.

"It's not the first adversity we've faced this year," forward Jonathan Marchessault said. "You'd rather have the odds in your favor, but I'm thinking about (Game 5). If you start thinking that we have to win three games, sometimes it gets demoralizing. We're just focused on the next one. ... They're in a better situation than us, that's for sure. Stuff we've done this year has never been done, so I think that's what we're thinking about."

Kenseth OK with role at Roush Fenway

DARLINGTON, S.C. — Matt Kenseth's goals are all short-term these days.

The 2003 NASCAR champion who rejoined owner Jack Roush at Roush Fenway Racing two months ago understands he's not yet a threat to win in the No. 6 Ford. And with a part-time schedule, Kenseth is not worried about points or the Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series playoffs.

"It's a lot different than anything I ever done before," Kenseth said Wednesday at Darlington Raceway, where he took part in a tire test. "It's stepping into something that's somewhat of a project."

And one that Kenseth's not sure he's yet helped improve.

He was 36th in his return with Roush Fenway at Kansas last month due to an accident. Kenseth took the pole for the All-Star race at Charlotte and finished 14th in the race, then 17th a week later in the Coca-Cola 600. Kenseth felt the team had improved a week ago with a 13th at Pocono and is looking for better things this weekend at Michigan.

Kenseth had 39 wins in 21 years of racing, most of those as Roush driver. Their biggest moments came in the 2003 championship season when the ultra-consistent Kenseth had a win and 25 top 10s to capture the title.

After the 2012 season, Kenseth jumped to Joe Gibbs Racing where he finished second in the championship chase in 2013. He lost his ride at JGR after this past season and could not find a fulltime seat for 2018.

Instead of fretting about lost opportunities or lobbying for a spot, Kenseth stayed content and comfortable on the sidelines with his family. His 25-year-old son Ross races stock cars, and Matt and wife Katie

have four daughters ranging from 8-year-old Kaylin to five-month-old Mallory.

But amid the family time, a call came from his old boss, Roush.

Kenseth thought about the offer and, because of his respect for Roush, decided to return and help improve the one-time powerhouse No. 6 ride made famous by Hall of Famer Mark Martin. Trevor Bayne was in the No. 6 at the start of the season.

Kenseth said his role is to help get his car and the No. 17 team of Ricky Stenhouse Jr. running alongside NASCAR's best.

"There's a lot of great things there and they have a lot of good momentum," Kenseth said of the Roush Fenway teams. "But we still know there's a lot of work to do to get both cars up there contending week in and week out."

That's part of the reason Kenseth and the team came to Darlington for the tire test. Kenseth won the Southern 500 here in 2013 and has 12 top-10 finishes in 24 starts, so he's adept at navigating the track. The extra laps, though, give him an extra chance to bond with the No. 6 crew during the tire tests.

"That's an important thing," he said.

Kenseth has enjoyed his changed role in NASCAR and hopes he can improve Roush Fenway's fortunes for this season and beyond — but not necessarily with him in the car long-term. The 46-year-old driver sees this season as a week-to-week proposition without an eye on staking himself to a full-time job because of satisfactory performance.

Many of his contemporaries like Jeff Gordon, Dale Earnhardt Jr., Carl Edwards and Tony Stewart have wrapped up their racing careers and Kenseth said he enjoyed his free time around his family. But he's grateful, he said, to do his part to help Roush, who gave Kenseth his big boost in NASCAR.

"He's a tough horse," the trainer said. "For about four seconds, you can love on him, but that's it."

Justify will step onto Belmont Park's deep, sandy surface for the first time on Thursday. Baffert had yet to decide exactly what the colt will do the next two days, although it won't be anything of consequence; his major training has been completed.

Justify won the Derby and Preakness on sloppy tracks.

Baffert's 13-year-old son, Bode, already texted his race-day forecast to his father, who read it out loud off his phone. Bode wants to be a meteorologist.

"Tell dad that we are having half an inch of rain on Belmont day. Cold front pushing through Elmont day of race. Showers and thunderstorms likely, with isolated downpours at times," Baffert said, chuckling. "That's my weatherman. He's always right."

Truth be told, Baffert prefers a dry, fast track.

Some of Justify's rivals have already tested the track after arriving earlier in the week.

Hofburg, the early 9-2 second choice, galloped on Wednesday and visited the paddock where he will be saddled on race day. Bravazo, the Preakness runner-up, also galloped.

Justify and Bravazo are the only horses that will compete in the Derby, Preakness and Belmont. Justify's half-length victory in the Preakness allowed Baffert to tie D. Wayne Lukas with his 14th victory in a Triple Crown race, the most by any trainer.

Now, Bravazo and Lukas will try to upend history.

"I think it'll get down to which horses have the pedigree and the stamina to finish," Lukas said.

That won't be known until Saturday because none of the horses has ever run 1 1/2 miles in a race, and likely won't be asked to again in their careers.

"We've seen so many good horses come in here and get beat," Baffert said. "Is he good enough? He's good enough, but he needs to run his race. He's going to be a target now and you don't know what's going to happen."

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Girand takes winding path to starting lineup

GAINESVILLE — Jonah Girand's path to the NCAA baseball tournament had more movement than a knuckle ball.

The 23-year-old Florida catcher started at nearby Santa Fe College, left after one season, returned home and took a job in retail. He was away from baseball for a year before ending up at another junior college near Orlando.

He started playing again, got his associate's degree and reached out to Florida coach Kevin O'Sullivan last spring.

His timing was impeccable. The Gators were losing starting catcher Mike Rivera and backup Mark Kolozsvary, and in need of some depth.

"I just thought he maybe could be a good bullpen catcher," O'Sullivan recalled.

Girand turned out to be a lot more. The junior stepped in for injured captain JJ Schwarz (hand) last week, homered three times in four games and was named the Most Outstanding Player of the Gainesville Regional. He also caught two first-round draft picks, right-handers Brady Singer and Jackson Kowar.

"It's been crazy, having been out a year to playing in the regionals with the Florida Gators," Girand said. "It has been an amazing opportunity."

It's not over, either. Girand likely will be behind the plate again this weekend when overall No. 1 seed and defending national champion Florida (45-18) hosts Auburn (42-21) in one of eight best-of-three super regionals. The winner advances to the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska.

For Girand, getting to Omaha would be another trip on his unpredictable journey.

"It's amazing these stories that happen," O'Sullivan said. "You sit up here and he's Regional MVP and he wasn't recruited by anybody."

Girand began his college career at Santa Fe in 2015. After failing to hit his weight

in 19 games, the 6-foot-2, 200-pounder returned home to the Orlando area and got a job. It didn't take long for him to realize he would rather deal with curveballs than customers.

He revved up his workouts, put out some feelers and traded in his name tag for a jersey number. He landed at Seminole State College in nearby Sanford.

"It sits in the back of your mind as to whether or not you're going to get back to it," Girand said.

Playing big-time college baseball was still Girand's goal, even after hitting .256 in 39 games with the Raiders in 2017.

So he contacted O'Sullivan, who had seen Girand play in high school and in summer leagues. Girand figured it was a long shot, but O'Sullivan needed help.

"It's kind of a weird story," O'Sullivan said. "I remember him being a big, strong kid."

Girand flashed potential during fall practice, but was buried on the depth chart behind Schwarz and highly touted freshmen Cal Greenfield and Brady Smith. It stayed that way through much of the season, with Schwarz starting 45 games behind the plate. Greenfield started eight, and Smith five. Girand spent his time in the bullpen.

He got his chance after Schwarz took a ball off his right hand in the final

regular-season series at Mississippi State last month. Schwarz broke a bone in his hand and would miss several weeks, at the very least. In the Southeastern Conference Tournament, O'Sullivan made a gut decision to start Girand over Greenfield and Smith. Girand doubled in his first at-bat as a starter.

"It just looked right," O'Sullivan said. "It's hard for freshmen to play this time of year. There's just a lot that goes into it. You just make a decision. You have a hunch, and (Jonah) makes you look good. I don't know any other way to explain it."

Girand made O'Sullivan look great in the regional.

Girand homered in each of Florida's first two games, the second one a solo shot that turned out to be the winning run against Jacksonville. He was at his best with the team's season on the line. Trailing 2-1 against Florida Atlantic in a win-or-go-home finale, Girand delivered a towering, two-run shot to left that put the Gators ahead for good.

"It's awesome. Jonah has worked so hard this whole season, even in the fall," teammate and SEC player of the year Jonathan India said. "I think he was our best hitter in the fall. He works at it, works at his craft and now it's paying off for him. Now he has his chance to play and he's showing why he should play. I'm happy for him."

Stetson well-armed in first NCAA Super Regional appearance

Stetson's recent claim to fame in baseball has been a two-time American League Cy Young winner and 2014 National League Rookie of the Year. But this year's team is trying to change that.

The Hatters are in the NCAA Tournament's Super Regional for the first time. The national No. 11 seed (48-11) will travel to sixth-seeded North Carolina (41-18) for the best-of-three series, which begins Friday, with a spot in the College World Series on the line.


"The buzz the past couple weeks around the program has been electric," said coach Steve Trimper, in his second season. "This has been a great opportunity to go out there and prove we belong with some of the nation's top programs."

The smallest school remaining in the field is also the one with the most momentum. Stetson, which has 3,089 students and is located in central Florida, has the nation's longest current winning streak at 18 games. Stetson was 25-27 last season, but Trimper said there was a feeling things could turn around quickly.

Brooks Wilson decided to come back for his senior season instead of going to Texas, which took him in the 22nd round of the MLB draft.

Wilson, a starting pitcher his first three seasons, said he came back because he wanted to complete his degree in business administration, but also because he saw the pieces of a strong team coming back.

The move paid off for both. Wilson switched to the closer's role and became the team's designated hitter. That has made him one of the nation's top two-way players as he led the nation in saves with 20 and was the Atlantic Sun's Player of the Year, batting .307 with 33 runs batted in. On Tuesday, he was drafted by the Braves in the seventh round.

"If Brooks did not come back, you and I wouldn't be talking today," Trimper said. "He is a great leader and that has carried through to the rest of the team."

For a program that counts Indians ace Corey Kluber and the Mets' Jacob deGrom as alumni, it is fitting the Hatters have a strong pitching staff. Three of their starters have more than 100 strikeouts for the second straight season, the first time that has happened since Rice did it in 2002-03.

Leading the way is Logan Gilbert, who on Monday became the highest-drafted player in program history when he went ninth overall to Seattle. The right-hander (11-1, 2.52 ERA) leads the nation with 169 strikeouts.

Kluber said he watched last Saturday's 10-3 win over Oklahoma State because he had heard a lot about Gilbert. There are similarities: They both have great fastballs and an equally dominant second pitch in their slider. Over the past two seasons Gilbert has put up Kluber-esque numbers, going 21-1 with a 2.30 ERA and 264 strikeouts.

Gilbert said despite the increasing attention around the program, his teammates have been taking everything in stride.

"We are pretty loose, which is good to see. You would kind of expect it to be the opposite with more expectations, but we've been pretty laid back," he said.

Junior Jack Perkins, taken in the 11th round by the Phillies, is more of a workhorse right-hander who uses his

offspeed pitches to keep hitters guessing. The junior is tied with Gilbert for the team lead in wins, going 11-2 with a 2.34 ERA.

Left-hander Mitchell Senger, who could get the call if it goes to a third game Sunday, also has a lively fastball and likes to work quickly. The offense has also started to come around. They are batting .277 during the winning streak, 22 points higher than their season average. The middle of the order — center fielder Jacob Koo, Wilson, first baseman Eric Foggo, shortstop Jorge Arenas and third baseman Jonathan Meola — combined to go 25 for 73 with 16 RBIs in regional play.

"I think we have been more aggressive early in finding the right pitches and that has made everyone more comfortable in their approach at the plate," Wilson said.

Stetson is hoping this year's run can spur success in future years, and that his program can be on the same level as Coastal Carolina, which won the College World Series two years ago, and Cal State Fullerton.

"We definitely have seen an uptick in recruiting," Trimper said. "We have good facilities, a great location and a tough schedule. I feel like this can keep us in the national forefront."

Kluber said his only regret is that he wishes this run could have happened while he was there.

"But it's fun to watch," he added. "I think it's an exciting time for the program."

Muguruza, Halep set up French Open semifinal

PARIS — Garbine Muguruza's big strokes overwhelmed Maria Sharapova right from the start. Their French Open quarterfinal Wednesday was no contest at all, a 6-2, 6-1 one-way journey.

Simona Halep went from out-of-sorts to on-target

against Angelique Kerber, scrambling to every ball and staying the course to erase an early deficit. Halep pointed her right index finger at her temple when she eventually completed a 6-7(2), 6-3, 6-2 comeback to reach the semifinals, too.

"I never gave up. So I think that's why I won today," Halep said. "My head won it."

When the top-seeded Halep and No. 3 Muguruza meet Thursday, their contrasting styles will match up with plenty at stake. The winner earns a berth in the final at Roland Garros — plus the No. 1 ranking that currently belongs to Halep.

"I have just to stay strong, to try to make her uncomfortable on court," Halep said, "and to try to

play my game."

The women got their matches done before rain arrived at Roland Garros, leaving the men's quarterfinals suspended in progress. That might very well have been a relief to 10-time champion Rafael Nadal, who was not at his best Wednesday and dropped a French Open set for the first time since 2015.

St. Jude Classic takes final turn as PGA tuneup for US Open

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Count Phil Mickelson among those happy to see the St. Jude Classic shift to a World Golf Championship even as he uses the TPC Southwind one final time as a tuneup for the U.S. Open.

"I really, really enjoy this golf course," Mickelson said Wednesday. "I think it's the most underrated on tour. I'm really excited that we are coming back here for a World Golf Championship to end our season-long race next year. It's quickly become one of my favorite events."

Mickelson has tied for second twice and tied for third, all since 2013. He wouldn't mind doing more than just playing well at the PGA Tour's last stop before

the U.S. Open next week at Shinnecock Hills.

"I very much would like to win," Mickelson said. "Winning earlier this year meant a lot to me, and I'd love to add a couple more this year and this is an ideal spot to do it. It's a course that I've played well in the past, that rewards good ball-striking, good putting. I know I'll be in it on Sunday. I just hope I shoot low enough on Sunday."

Mickelson has plenty of company. Dustin Johnson, a winner here in 2012, is here working his way back to the top-ranked golfer in the world after slipping to No. 2. That still makes Johnson the highest-ranked player in this event since Rory McIlroy came in at No. 2 in 2012, and he's among six of

the world's top 28 ranked players here this week.

Quality won't be a problem next year. That's when this event sponsored by FedEx replaces the WGC-Bridgestone Invitational and becomes the World Golf Championships-FedEx St. Jude Invitational. Johnson said he likes how he is hitting the ball. The 2016 U.S. Open champ will be heading to Shinnecock Hills on Sunday night after this 72-hole event starts Thursday.

"I always tend to play well on very challenging courses," said Johnson, whose lone win this year came in January at the Tournament of Champions. "I like it. It makes you think, and it's fun. You got to really focus on every shot, so it's something that I enjoy."


