Tennessee teenager and an unnamed 60-year-old die in separate incidents

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PANAMA CITY BEACH — An already deadly month in the Gulf of Mexico turned even deadlier Tuesday as two more swimmers, including a teenager, died after being pulled from the surf in separate incidents.

Fifteen-year-old Tyler Spann from Lexington, Tenn., was pronounced dead at a local hospital after he was found unresponsive by Beach and Surf Patrol employees behind Bikini Beach Resort about 1:30 p.m. According to the Panama City Beach Police Department, Spann had been swimming in the Gulf when he became distressed, and his body was recovered a short time later.

Less than three hours later and 3 miles down the beach, a 60-year-old unidentified male was pronounced dead at the scene behind Dunes of Panama at 4:12 p.m., according to the Bay County Sheriff's Office.

Guests in the pool and hot tub area of Dunes of Panama stood stark still as they watched rescuers attempt CPR on the man laying in the white sand. One man, who declined to be identified, said the victim was "gray" when he was pulled out of the water and "didn't think he made it." On the beach, visibly shaken

Officials: Know the flags, stay near lifeguards

PANAMA CITY BEACH — After seven drownings in the past month — eight in 2018 — law enforcement and government officials are urging people to be careful when they head to the beach.

Bay County Beach Operations supervisor Tabitha Kimball encouraged people to stay near lifeguards — city or county lifeguards are stationed at M.B. Miller County Pier, Rick Seltzer Park and Russell-Fields City Pier from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily — because they are extremely knowledgeable when it comes to water safety. None of the drownings in the past month has occurred at a lifeguard-monitored location.

"Always go to a lifeguard tower," Kimball said.

In particular, Kimball and other officials emphasized being familiar with the beach flag system, which warns visitors about hazardous conditions in the water. Yellow flags indicate an intermediate level of risk and urges beachgoers to be cautious, while a single red flag means high hazard and two red flags mean the water is closed to the public.

At least two of the past month's drownings, however, have happened in yellow-flag conditions. Kimball said the majority of the rescues the lifeguards have performed since patrols began in 2016 have been in red-flag conditions, although swimmers have been pulled from the Gulf on calmer days as well.

"People need to use good judgment, talk to the lifeguard," Kimball

WHERE ARE LIFEGUARDS IN PCB?

Beachgoers, especially those not confident in their swimming abilities, are encouraged to swim where lifeguards are present. Lifeguards officially patrol three locations in Panama City Beach: M.B. Miller County Pier, 12213 Front Beach Road; Rick Seltzer Park, 7419 Thomas Drive; and Russell-Fields City Pier, 16201 Front Beach Road. The guards and roving ATVs are on duty from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily.

WHAT TO DO IN A RIP CURRENT

Rip currents carry water away from shore. If you are caught in one, do not fight the current by trying to swim directly back to shore. Instead, swim parallel to shore until you escape the current. Then, swim back to shore, or float/tread water while waving or calling for help.

said. "I would never go out further than you feel uncomfortable."

The Bay County Sheriff's Office also has Beach Patrol units that patrol the beaches, specially trained in surf rescue and education. The patrol units are headquartered at Rick Seltzer Park, and Sheriff Tommy Ford said Tuesday that BCSO had put three additional patrol units on duty.

Bay County Manager Bob Majka said the recent drownings have been noticed by local officials, and are being evaluated to understand why they happened. Majka encouraged people to pay attention

TODAY IN HISTORY

Today is Wednesday, June 20, the 171st day of 2018. There are 194 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On June 20, 1893, a jury in New Bedford, Massachusetts, found Lizzie Borden not guilty of the ax murders of her father and stepmother.

On this date: **In 1782,** Congress approved the Great Seal of the United States, featuring the emblem of the bald eagle.

In 1789, during the French Revolution, members of the Third Estate took the "Tennis Court Oath," vowing not to disband until a written constitution was in place.

In 1791, King Louis XVI of France and his family attempted to flee in the so-called "Flight to Varennes," but were caught.

In 1837, Queen Victoria acceded to the British throne following the death of her uncle, King William IV.

In 1863, West Virginia became the 35th state.

In 1921, U.S. Rep. Alice Mary Robertson, R-Okla., became the first woman to preside over a session of the House of Representatives.

In 1943, race-related rioting erupted in Detroit; federal troops were sent in two days later to quell the violence that resulted in more than 30 deaths.

In 1948, the variety series "Toast of the Town," hosted by Ed Sullivan (for whom the show was later renamed), debuted on CBS television.

In 1967, boxer Muhammad Ali was convicted in Houston of violating Selective Service laws by refusing to be drafted and was sentenced to five years in prison. (Ali's conviction was ultimately overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court).

In 1977, the first oil began flowing through the recently completed Trans-Alaska Pipeline from Prudhoe Bay to Valdez.

In 1988, the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously upheld a New York City law making it illegal for private clubs with more than 400 members to exclude women and minorities.

China hopes NKorea, US implement summit talk

BEIJING — Chinese President Xi Jinping told North Korean leader Kim Jong Un on Tuesday he hopes Pyongyang and Washington can fully implement the outcome of last week's nuclear summit at which Kim pledged to work toward denuclearization in exchange for U.S. security guarantees.

State broadcaster CCTV said Xi told Kim that through the "concerted efforts of the relevant countries" negotiations regarding issues on the Korean Peninsula are back on track and the overall situation is moving in the direction of peace and stability.

The summit between Kim and U.S. President Donald Trump in Singapore marked an "important step toward the political solution of the Korean Peninsula nuclear issue," Xi was quoted as saying in the meeting at the Great Hall of the People in central Beijing.

China hopes North Korea and the U.S. can "implement well the outcomes achieved at the summit," Xi said. China would "as always play a constructive role" in that process, he said.

Along with a statement signed by Kim and Trump offering vague commitments to denuclearization and security, Trump also agreed to suspend military exercises

with South Korea in what was seen as a major win for North Korea and its chief allies, China and Russia.

Kim's two-day visit to China, which began Tuesday, had not been announced in advance but was expected as part of the Communist neighbors' tradition to report to each other on major developments.

The visit is Kim's third to China since March, highlighting China's crucial role in efforts by the U.S. and others to get North Korea to abandon its nuclear program. The U.S. has long looked to China to use its influence with North Korea to bring it to negotiations, but the visit comes as ties between Beijing and Washington are being tested by a major trade dispute.

CCTV showed Kim and his wife, Ri Sol Ju, being

welcomed by Xi with full military honors. Xi and his wife, Peng Liyuan, later hosted Kim and Ri at a banquet, CCTV reported.

China's official Xinhua News Agency announced the North Korean leader's visit shortly after he apparently landed Tuesday morning, dispensing with the secrecy shrouding previous trips to China by Kim and his father and predecessor, Kim Jong Il.

On the younger Kim's first visit to China as leader, he took an armored train as his father had. His first two trips were not announced until after he had safely returned to North Korea.

Xi "is exerting a lot of influence from behind the scenes," said Bonnie Glaser, senior adviser for Asia at the Center for Strategic and International Studies in Washington.

Stopping SKorea-US drills risks weakening NKorea deterrence

SEOUL, South Korea — U.S. and South Korean defense officials formally suspended a major joint military exercise in hopes of advancing nuclear negotiations with North Korea. It's a bold gamble that could trigger a serious security crisis if the talks falter and the allies are forced to resume the drills, infuriating North Korea, analysts say.

The cancellation, abruptly decided by President Donald Trump at his summit last week with North Korean leader Kim Jong Un, was formally announced by the Pentagon on Monday.

South Korea's Defense Ministry simultaneously confirmed the suspension of the Ulchi Freedom Guardian exercises, consisting largely of computer-simulated war games.

In announcing his decision, Trump said suspending the "provocative" war games would "save us a tremendous amount of money."

The decision, which apparently came without consultations with South Korea or the Pentagon, surprised many in South Korea and the United States who believe the

training is a central pillar of their countries' seven-decade military alliance dating back to the 1950-53 Korean War.

South Korean military commentator Lee Illwoo described the halt as "temporarily pulling off the wheels of the alliance." Other experts agree that the suspension will weaken, at least temporarily, the allies' defense posture against North Korea and open gaps in their combined deterrence.

Seoul and Washington describe the move as a temporary measure to prolong ongoing detente on the Korean Peninsula and increase the chances of successful nuclear diplomacy with North Korea.

But if North Korea doesn't reciprocate by taking serious steps toward denuclearization, the allies would be compelled to resume the drills, and that would certainly draw a furious response from North Korea, which views the exercises as rehearsals for an invasion, experts say.

"Suspending drills once is dangerous because it causes a hole in our national security. But resuming suspended drills would cause a bigger security crisis because more extreme resistance from North Korea would come," Lee said.

UN chief: Global conflicts highest in 30 years

The number of countries involved in "violent conflicts" is the highest in 30 years, while the number of people killed in conflicts has risen tenfold since 2005, the U.N. secretary-general said Tuesday.

Antonio Guterres added that the number of "violent situations" classifiable as wars, based on the number of casualties, has tripled since 2007.

He also told reporters in Oslo, Norway, that "low-intensity conflicts" rose by 60 percent since 2007. Guterres gave no specific figures.

"Prevention is more necessary than ever," Guterres said, adding "mediation becomes an absolutely fundamental instrument in our action."

Source: Trump Jr. cancels Bush fundraiser appearance

A dispute between two political families escalated Tuesday as Donald Trump Jr. canceled plans to raise money for the eldest son of former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush.

Donald Trump Jr. decided to withdraw from a fundraiser for Texas land commissioner George P. Bush in New York City next week after Jeb Bush criticized President Donald Trump's policy of separating immigrant children from their families at the border, according to two people with direct knowledge of the situation. They spoke on condition of anonymity to discuss private conversations.

"Children shouldn't be used as a negotiating tool," Jeb Bush wrote on Twitter Monday.

MOSCOW

Energy company's manager arrested on spying charges

A top manager of a state-controlled Russian energy company has been arrested on spying charges, a Moscow court said Tuesday.

The Lefortovo District Court announced that Karina Tsurkan has been put in custody on charges of espionage, but wouldn't give further details. The court hearing was held Friday. Russian news agencies said that Tsurkan is a member of the management board of Inter RAO, an energy holding dealing with electric power supply and heat generation that has assets in Russia and other nations.

Details of the charges weren't immediately known, but the state Tass news agency said that Tsurkan is accused of spying for Romania. She may face up to 20 years in prison if convicted.

TRENTON, N.J.

2nd arrest made in deadly shooting at arts festival

Authorities have made a second arrest stemming from a deadly shooting at a 24-hour arts and music festival in New Jersey. Mercer County prosecutors say Davone White is facing three weapons charges. The 26-year-old Trenton resident was among nearly two dozen people wounded in the shooting, and he remained hospitalized Tuesday.

About 1,000 people were attending the Art All Night Trenton festival that showcases local art, music, food and films when shots rang out early Sunday. Authorities have said several neighborhood gangs had a dispute, and multiple suspects began shooting at each other, with police returning fire. One suspect, 33-year-old Tahaj Wells was killed.

ANCHORAGE, ALASKA

Agency seeks public's help in recovering stolen tusk

A federal agency in Alaska wants the public's help to solve a mammoth theft. The Bureau of Land Management says someone stole a 100-pound (45.4-kilogram) mammoth tusk from the Campbell Creek Science Center, an interpretive center in east Anchorage.

The woolly mammoth is Alaska's official state fossil.

The BLM in a release says the tusk was on display when the center was burglarized March 8.

The tusk is about 5.5 feet (1.7 meters) long. It is 8 inches (20 centimeters) in diameter on the large end and 6 inches (15 centimeters) in diameter at the narrow end.

The dark- and light-brown mottled tusk is curved.

onlookers held each other. At least four nurses had run over to help, but they declined to comment on what they saw.

A short time later, a body wrapped in a sheet was loaded into a BCSO truck as investigators attempted to console and take statements from family members still standing in shock on the beach.

Yellow flags were flying Tuesday during both incidents.

Tuesday's drownings bring the total of Gulf-related deaths in 2018 to eight, with seven of those in the past month, going back to May 19 when 5-year-old Christian Doyle drowned behind the Sterling Breeze condominiums. According to data from the Florida Department of Health, this puts the number of unintentional drowning deaths at a 10-year high, with nine recorded in the county in 2008. Last year, three people drowned in the Gulf of Mexico, according to Panama City Beach Police Chief Drew Whitman.

to local media reports on safety conditions, and recommended people talk to lifeguards and beach patrolmen if they have questions on flags or water safety.

"We encourage people to be very vigilant," Majka said, also encouraging swimmers to go

to lifeguard-monitored beaches. "Pay attention to the flag warning system."

Panama City Beach Police Department investigator Nicholas Caligiure said beachgoers should be familiar with the Gulf of Mexico and monitor children frequently when they're in the water.

Even where lifeguards can't patrol, Kimball said there is plenty of signage at local beaches that explains flag colors and what they mean. The guards also set

out signs indicating where rip currents have been seen or are likely to be the strongest.

Catie Feeny, public relations manager for Visit Panama City Beach, said in addition to safety flags and outdoor signage, Visit Panama City Beach provides flag updates on its website, runs message planes during double red flags and has informational billboards up year-round on key highways leading to the beach.

8 DROWNINGS IN 2018

Eight people have died after being pulled from the Gulf of Mexico off Panama City Beach in 2018, with seven of those deaths occurring in the past month. None of the drownings has been in the jurisdiction of the city and county's lifeguards, who are stationed at M.B. Miller County Pier, Rick Seltzer Park and Russell-Fields City Pier, and the Medical Examiner's Office has not definitely concluded that each death was caused by drowning.

FEB. 18: Nevio Visovich, an 83-year-old Canadian citizen who died after being pulled from the water behind AquaVista Condominiums, 17155 Front Beach Road. The Medical Examiner's Officer later ruled Visovich's cause of death was hypertensive and atherosclerotic heart disease, with submersion in water a contributing factor.

MAY 19: Christian Doyle, 5, from Dothan, Alabama, is pulled unresponsive from the Gulf behind Sterling Breeze condominiums, 16701 Front Beach Road.

MAY 25: Darrius Stone Jr., 31, of Birmingham,

Alabama, is pulled from the Gulf behind Tropic Winds Resort, 17643 Front Beach Road.

MAY 30: Rick Correll, 61, of Georgia, is found floating behind Regency Towers, 5801 Thomas Drive.

JUNE 16: Eugene Spann, 67, of Atlanta, is pulled from the Gulf behind the Flamingo Motel, 15525 Front Beach Road.

JUNE 17: Tony Orlando, 21, from Cartersville, Georgia, is found floating about half a mile east of the county pier.

JUNE 19: Tyler Spann, 15, of Lexington, Tenn., is pulled unresponsive from the Gulf behind Bikini Beach Resort, 11001 Front Beach Road. A 60-year-old male is pronounced dead on scene after being pulled from the water behind the Dunes of Panama, 7205 Thomas Drive.

Bay County so far has seen eight drowning deaths, including two Tuesday and one Monday. The last time the county saw eight drowning deaths was in 2008. The most on record in the past 20 years was in 2008 and 2003, when nine drownings were recorded.

NEW YORK — If meat is grown in a lab without slaughtering animals, what should it be called?

That question has yet to be decided by regulators, but for the moment it's pitting animal rights advocates and others against cattle ranchers in a war of words.

Supporters of the science are embracing "clean meat" to describe meat grown by replicating animal cells. Many in the conventional meat industry are irritated by the term and want to stamp it out before it takes hold.

"It implies that

traditional beef is dirty," says Danielle Beck, director of government affairs for the National Cattlemen's Beef Association.

The spat shows the power of language as a new industry attempts to reshape eating habits. It's why the \$49.5 billion U.S. beef, poultry, pork and lamb industry is mobilizing to claim ownership of the term "meat."

Squabbles over language are erupting across the food business as established definitions for mayonnaise and milk are also challenged by the likes of vegan spreads and almond drinks.

What gets to be considered "meat" is a

particularly touchy subject as new companies come up with substitutes they say are just like the real thing.

Impossible Burger's plant-based patty "bleeds" like beef.

Companies such as Memphis Meats are growing meat by culturing animal cells, though it could be years before products are on shelves. Big meat producers like Tyson Foods and Cargill Inc. are among Memphis Meats' investors.

The FDA — which in the past has called out Kraft's use of the term "pasteurized process cheese food" — plans to hold a public meeting to discuss "cultured" meat next month.

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Some fear changes in states as US weighs pot medicine

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — Some American parents who for years have used cannabis to treat severe forms of epilepsy in their children are feeling more cautious than celebratory as U.S. regulators near a decision on whether to approve the first drug derived from the marijuana plant.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration is expected to issue a decision by the end of the month on the drug Epidiolex, made by GW Pharmaceuticals. It's a purified form of cannabidiol — a component of cannabis that doesn't get users high — to treat

Dravet and Lennox-Gastaut syndromes in kids. Both forms of epilepsy are rare.

Cannabidiol's effect on a variety of health conditions is frequently touted, but there is still little evidence to back up advocates' personal experiences. The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration has long categorized cannabis as a Schedule I drug, a category with "no currently accepted medical use and a high potential for abuse." That strictly limits research on potential medical uses for cannabis or the chemicals in it, including cannabidiol, or CBD.

But for years, parents desperate to find anything to help their children have

turned to the marijuana-based products made legal by a growing number of states.

Meagan Patrick is among the parents using CBD to treat symptoms in their children. She moved from Maine to Colorado in 2014 so she could legally get CBD for her now-5-year-old daughter, Addelyn, who was born with a brain malformation that causes seizures.

"My child was dying, and we needed to do something," Patrick said.

As for the potential approval of a pharmaceutical based on CBD, she said fear is her first reaction.

"I want to make sure that her right to continue using what works for her is protected, first and foremost.

That's my job as her mom," Patrick said.

Advocates like Patrick became particularly concerned when GW Pharmaceuticals' U.S. commercial business, Greenwich Biosciences, began quietly lobbying to change states' legal definition of marijuana, beginning in 2017 with proposals in Nebraska and South Dakota.

Some worried the company's attempt to ensure its product could be legally prescribed and sold by pharmacies would have a side effect: curtailing medical marijuana programs already operating in more than two dozen states.

The proposals generally sought to remove CBD from states' legal definition of marijuana, allowing it to be prescribed by doctors and supplied by pharmacies. But the change only applies to products that have FDA approval.

Neither Nebraska nor South Dakota allows medical use of marijuana, and activists accused the company of trying to shut down future access to products containing cannabidiol but lacking FDA approval.

Britain-based GW Pharmaceuticals never intended for the changes to affect other marijuana products, but they are necessary to allow Epidiolex to be sold in pharmacies if approved, spokesman Stephen Schultz said.

He would not discuss other places where the company will seek changes to state law. The Associated Press confirmed that lobbyists representing Greenwich Biosciences backed legislation in California and Colorado this year.

"As a company, we understand there's a significant business building up," Schultz said. "All we want to do is make sure our product is accessible."

Industry lobbyists in those states said they take company officials at their word, but they still insisted on protective language ensuring that recreational or medical marijuana, cannabidiol, hemp and other products derived from cannabis plants won't be affected by the changes sought by GW Pharmaceuticals.

Patrick Goggin, an attorney who focuses on industrial hemp issues in California, said the company would run into trouble if it tried to "lock up access" to marijuana-derived products beyond FDA-approved drugs.

"People need to have options and choices," he said. "That's the battle here."

Legal experts say the changes are logical. Some states' laws specifically prohibit any product derived from the marijuana plant from being sold in pharmacies. The FDA has approved synthetic versions of another cannabis ingredient for medical purposes but has never approved marijuana or hemp for any medical use.

A panel of FDA advisers in April unanimously recommended the agency approve Epidiolex for the treatment of severe seizures in children with epilepsy, conditions that are otherwise difficult to treat. It's not clear why CBD reduces seizures in some patients, but the panel based its recommendation on three studies showing significant reduction in children with two forms of epilepsy.

Verizon, AT&T say they'll end location data sales to brokers

Verizon and AT&T have pledged to stop providing information on phone owners' locations to data brokers, stepping back from a business practice that has drawn criticism for endangering privacy.

The data has apparently allowed outside companies to pinpoint the location of wireless devices without their owners' knowledge or consent. Verizon said that about 75 companies have been obtaining its customer data from two little-known California-based brokers that Verizon supplies directly — LocationSmart and Zumigo.

Verizon became the first major carrier to declare it would end sales of such data to brokers that then provide it to others. It did so in a June 15 letter to Sen. Ron Wyden, an Oregon Democrat who has been probing the phone location-tracking market. AT&T followed suit Tuesday after The Associated Press reported the Verizon move. Neither company said they are getting out of the business of selling location data. Verizon and AT&T are the two largest U.S. mobile carriers in terms of subscribers.

Chief privacy officer Karen Zacharia said Verizon would be careful not to disrupt "beneficial services" such as fraud prevention and emergency roadside assistance. In an email to the AP, AT&T spokesman Jim Greer cited similar reasons for cutting off the intermediaries "as soon as practical."

Last month, Wyden revealed abuses in the lucrative but loosely regulated field involving Securus Technologies and its affiliate 3C Interactive. Verizon says their contract was approved only for the location tracking of outside mobile phones called by prison inmates.

Verizon notified LocationSmart and Zumigo,

both privately held, that it intends to "terminate their ability to access and use our customers' location data as soon as possible," Zacharia wrote.

Location data from Verizon and other carriers makes it possible to identify the whereabouts of nearly any phone in the U.S. within seconds. Popular commercial uses for the information include keeping tabs on packages, vehicles and employees; bank fraud prevention; and targeted marketing offers.

The cutoff won't affect users' ability to share locations directly with apps and other services. Rather, it deals with the practice of providing data to third parties with which users have no direct contact.

Wyden wrote all four major U.S. wireless carriers on May 8 after learning about a web portal that let law officers track Americans' locations without proper oversight.

A former sheriff in Missouri has been accused of using Securus data for unauthorized surveillance of a judge, a sheriff and state highway patrol officers.

Days later, a Carnegie Mellon University security

researcher discovered a security flaw in LocationSmart's website that could have allowed any reasonably sophisticated hacker to secretly track almost any phone in the U.S. or Canada.

Wyden asked the carriers to identify which third parties have been acquiring carrier location data and to provide details such as any third-party sharing of location data without customer consent. His office shared the companies' responses with The AP.

None of the four carriers named any third parties, with two exceptions. One was Securus, which all four carriers have since cut off. The other was 3C Interactive, the reseller that supplied Securus.

"Verizon did the responsible thing and promptly announced it was cutting these companies off," Wyden said in a statement, referring to the aggregators as "shady middle men."

"The big concern was that this was probably the tip of the iceberg," said Laura Moy, deputy director of the Georgetown Center on Privacy and Technology. She said Verizon's move

"indicates that it cannot actually police this process, that it doesn't have the ability." Nor can the other carriers, she said.

Verizon and AT&T did not respond to questions from the AP on whether and how they plan to sell location data directly to companies or individuals instead of relying on the two California companies. Sprint and T-Mobile did not immediately respond Tuesday to emailed requests for comment.

AT&T and T-Mobile, No. 2 and 3 in customers, said in letters to Wyden they only allow authorized third parties to access customer location data if the affected customers have given consent or if it is required by law — for instance, a court order. Verizon said the same.

Sprint said account holders must "generally be notified" if the data is to be used so they can decide whether they consent. T-Mobile has offered to buy Sprint for \$26.5 billion.

The carriers left most of Wyden's questions unanswered — such as how many of their customers had been affected by location sharing they never agreed to.

Malls, anchor tenants and downtown revivals

Since the first shopping mall was built more than 60 years ago in Edina, Minnesota, malls have represented the apex of American retail and social culture. If we needed anything, from a prom dress to a lawn mower, we headed to the mall, left our car in a vast parking lot, and attempted to navigate an endless variety of stores. We negotiated long, well-lighted corridors, well-lit aisles of fellow customers in a shop-til-you-drop mania,

which gave way to planes and cars, malls are now being replaced by online retail and the new outdoor "walking retail" concept. Mall anchor tenants, some of them household names, are closing in droves. Many municipalities are attempting to revive their downtown and inner city regions with new, walker-friendly retail developments, often placed adjacent to apartments and lofts. The irony is obvious, as the trend comes full circle. The advent of suburban malls hastened the decline of our inner city shopping districts. Now, the return to walking retail in downtown areas is rendering the suburban mall obsolete.

I remember the first time I read about the Mall of America shortly after it opened in Bloomington, Minnesota, in 1992. One of the first mega-malls, the MOA was the largest in the U.S. in total floor area and the third largest in North America in leasable space.

But like railroad travel,

located in Providence, Rhode Island, has been converted to small, one-bedroom apartments. Restaurants and other walk-in retail outlets now occupy abandoned malls. Dozens of new schools and churches have utilized store space in malls. Once we worried that our children were wasting too much time hanging out at the mall. Well, they're still there, only now they're attending class.

So what are we doing with our mall space? In California, one mall now houses a prominent tech firm. In Tennessee, another has been converted to a skating rink, a recreation center, a community college and a library. One of the nation's oldest indoor retail spaces,

Keep children with their parents

Enforcing immigration laws is important — open borders are not in America's interest — but compassion for children should be a very high priority, and that's why the Trump administration should roll back its "zero tolerance" immigration policy that results in parents being separated from children at the border.

The new strategy, announced by Attorney General Jeff Sessions last month, departs from the approaches of former Presidents Barack Obama and George W. Bush.

Under those presidents, parents who crossed the border were simply told to show up at court on a certain date so that their right to be in the country could be adjudicated. Many of them, of course, never appeared in court; they became de facto Americans.

Then the Trump administration decided to take the parents into custody, separating children until their cases could be resolved. The administration's supporters have argued that, under our justice system, children are often separated from parents and placed in foster care when their parents are incarcerated. Trump officials have argued that separating and protecting the children during this process is compassionate, since dangerous criminals are among those who come across the border.

Trump officials have argued that those who do not support the law should change it, rather than urge that the law be ignored. Politicians do seem to be using children as political pawns in the fight over immigration reform, including President Trump's efforts to get funding for a wall and other measures to try to deter illegal immigration.

Former first lady Laura Bush made an impassioned plea against the approach in an op-ed piece in *The Washington Post*.

"I live in a border state. I appreciate the need to enforce and protect our international boundaries, but this zero-tolerance policy is cruel. It is immoral. And it breaks my heart," Mrs. Bush wrote.

"Americans pride ourselves on being a moral nation, on being the nation that sends humanitarian relief to places devastated by natural disasters or famine or war. We pride ourselves on believing that people should be seen for the content of their character, not the color of their skin. We pride ourselves on acceptance. If we are truly that country, then it is our obligation to reunite these detained children with their parents — and to stop separating parents and children in the first place," she wrote.

A spokeswoman for first lady Melania Trump, meanwhile, said, "Mrs. Trump hates to see children separated from their families and hopes both sides can finally come together to achieve successful immigration reform."

Blaming Democrats alone for the immigration laws on the books seems preposterous since Republicans now control both the House and Senate, but certainly Democrats can work with Republicans on these issues.

How Republicans went soft on Communism

If you had told Ronald Reagan in 1988 that in 30 years, the president of the United States would be chummy with Communist dictators in China and North Korea, eager to please a brutal Kremlin autocrat, and indifferent to the needs of our military allies, he might have said: That's what you get for electing a Democrat.

Today's Republicans make up a party he wouldn't recognize. For decades, the Russians and Chinese dispatched spies and enlisted American sympathizers to try to harm the United States and tilt its policies in their favor. Under Donald Trump, they don't have to. They have a friend in the Oval Office.

It's the most astonishing reversal in modern American political history. Over the past century, the right accused liberals and Democrats of excusing the crimes of Josef Stalin, Mao Zedong and Fidel Castro. Often, the criticism was well-founded.

Harvard's John King Fairbank, the dean of American China scholars, spoke for many on the left in 1972 when he said the Communist revolution was "the best thing that has happened to the Chinese people

in centuries." President Jimmy Carter, who spurned Americans' "inordinate fear of Communism," was shocked by the invasion of Afghanistan. Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev, he lamented, "lied to me."

Conservatives saw Carter as a starry-eyed dupe. "The most flagrant offenders of human rights including the Soviet Union, Vietnam and Cuba have been the beneficiaries of administration goodwill, while nations friendly to the United States have suffered the loss of U.S. commercial access and economic and military assistance," said the 1980 Republican platform.

"The evidence of the Soviet threat to American security has never been more stark and unambiguous, nor has any president ever been more oblivious to this threat and its potential consequences," the platform added. "The president's failure to shoulder the burden of leadership in the Western alliance has placed America in danger without parallel since Dec. 7, 1941."

All these charges have deafening echoes today. But this time, the credulous appeaser failing our allies is a Republican president. For Communist dictators such as Xi Jinping and Kim Jong Un, Trump exudes admiration and amity. To the anti-Western Russian President Vladimir Putin, he offered congratulations for winning a rigged election.

When it comes to Canada's

Justin Trudeau and Germany's Angela Merkel, by contrast, he seethes with resentment. With Trump, it's better to be a long-standing American adversary than a faithful ally.

The pattern is uncannily reminiscent of the Communist Party USA in the years leading up to World War II. First it opposed President Franklin D. Roosevelt as a capitalist lackey. Then, as fascist movements rose in Europe, it joined with noncommunists on the left in "popular front" organizations that aligned with FDR in opposing fascism.

An abrupt turnabout came in 1939, when Stalin signed a nonaggression pact with Adolf Hitler. American Communists jumped to defend this cooperation with the Nazis — and condemned Roosevelt for providing aid to Britain, which was at war with Germany.

When Hitler and Stalin proceeded to divide up Poland by force — putting millions of Polish Jews under Nazi rule — the party defended the dismemberment. When Hitler shocked Stalin by invading the Soviet Union, American Communists shifted yet again, getting behind Roosevelt and calling to help the countries fighting Germany.

Bay axes Mexico Beach request

Bay commissioners decline to take over city's fire department as costs, ISO rating expected to rise

PANAMA CITY — Mexico Beach's fire department will not be taken over by Bay County as city residents had requested.

The County Commission on Tuesday morning voted not to move ahead with a proposed ordinance that would incorporate the service into the county's system.

Staff presented a study showing that residents' fire service rates — which they already believe are too high — would more than triple if the county took over the system. The study also showed that the positive ISO fire safety rating for all county residents

potentially could be put in jeopardy by incorporating the Mexico Beach service into the county system. The ISO rates are a factor in homeowners' insurance rates.

Mexico Beach wanted the county to take over the city's fire department, saying the county could operate the service more efficiently because of economies of scale.

"As you may be aware, the city of Mexico Beach has recently implemented a fire

assessment," Mexico Beach Mayor Al Cathey wrote in a letter dated May 17 to county commissioners. "In order to comply with the new Florida fire regulations and to avoid an undesirable 10 ISO rating, the city chose to abandon our long-established volunteer fire department. Addressing the deficiencies with our equipment and facilities became our top priority."

Earlier this year, Mexico Beach adopted an annual fire

assessment fee of \$281 for residential properties and 40 cents per square foot for commercial land and \$43 a year for vacant land.

Mexico Beach's department currently has six full-time firefighters that is supplemented by volunteers.

To try to accomplish the 3 ISO rating for Mexico Beach that Bay County's system has received, Bay County

Man convicted in death receives 15 years

PANAMA CITY — After asking to be released on probation,

a Bay County man convicted of leaving a drunken and wounded

family friend for dead in the shallows of North Bay has been sentenced to 15 years in prison.

PCPD: Woman's body found floating near marina

PANAMA CITY — Police have opened an investigation after a woman's body floated up to the Panama City Marina on Tuesday. The woman's identity or how long authorities believe she had been deceased have yet to be released, though officers said Tuesday evening she has been identified. Foul play is not suspected but that the body will be turned over to the Medical Examiner's Office to determine cause of death, according to the Panama City Police Department.

PCPD officers responded to the marina, 1 Harrison Ave., about 4:45 p.m. Tuesday to a call of a possibly dead woman. When they arrived, officers discovered the woman's body under a boat dock and began documenting the scene.

Officers said it was too early to tell what caused her death or how she got there.

A group of people nearby, visiting from Orlando for a dance tournament at the Marina Civic Center, said they had decided to waste time by fishing on the marina. About 4:45 p.m., they saw something floating toward them, coming from west of the

marina.

"We were just fishing and it came floating up," Dan Abbarno said. "We thought it was a turtle at first."

Abbarno said he couldn't get a good look to see the age of the woman or if she had any injuries on her as he and his friends called 911. He said he was shocked to realize it was a woman's body.

"I've never seen anything like that," he said. "That's why we couldn't guess what it was."

PCPD officers said the investigation is continuing, and more information will be released as it becomes available.

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Putnam picks up endorsements from 5 Panhandle sheriffs

LYNN HAVEN — In a near desolate town hall, Agricultural Commissioner Adam Putnam received endorsements Tuesday from several Panhandle sheriffs and spoke about his “Secure Florida First” platform for the gubernatorial race.

Putnam’s words echoed in the front room of Robert’s Hall, 831 Florida Ave. in Lynn Haven, filled mostly with a handful of his staffers and local news outlets. He spoke about his plans for the state, boiling it down to a central point: public safety. Beforehand, Bay County Sheriff Tommy Ford said he had reviewed the plan and that it was “spot on” for protecting

Bay County.

“Adam knows Florida, he knows Bay County, and he knows how to keep Florida safe,” Ford said before introducing Putnam to the dais. “It’s an honor to be here with my fellow sheriffs to endorse Commissioner Putnam as the next governor of the state of Florida.”

Ford, Walton County Sheriff Michael A. Adkinson Jr., Washington County Sheriff Kevin Crews, Gulf County Sheriff Mike Harrison and Liberty County Sheriff Eddie Joe White stood along Putnam as he spoke about the plan.

The main point to Putnam’s six-point plan is public safety.

“If people believe that our highways, our beaches, our attractions aren’t safe then Florida

can’t be a world-class tourism destination,” Putnam said. “If families don’t feel safe in their neighborhoods and their communities, Florida

cannot continue to attract 100 new permanent residents per day.”

Putnam went on to say that public safety is not possible without “strong laws”

to give law enforcement tools to keep criminals off the street, which includes mandatory minimums for violent felons and maximum penalties for repeat

offenders. That idea, though, has come under fire recently by Florida Republicans and Democrats alike, who say the current criminal justice system in our country is very expensive and ineffective.

Putnam also outlined other parts of his proposal that include toughening the state’s response to the opioid epidemic by creating a state drug czar and gave his position on detaining illegal immigrant families together rather than separating parents from children. However, he mostly gave his support for law enforcement.

“What these men and women do for us when they put on that badge ... they know there is no such thing as a normal day or a routine shift,” Putnam added. “To put Florida first, we have to put law enforcement first.”

TALLAHASSEE Patronis, Ring report net worths topping \$5 million

This fall’s campaign for state chief financial officer will pit two multimillionaires.

As he qualified for the race Monday, incumbent Republican Jimmy Patronis filed a financial-disclosure form that listed a net worth of \$6.49 million. The largest chunks of Patronis’ assets, totaling about \$4.72 million, were in stock, partnership interests and a retirement account in family businesses, according to the disclosure. Patronis’ family, at least in part, owns Capt. Anderson’s Restaurant in Panama City Beach. Patronis also listed a \$486,000 home in Panama City Beach.

Democratic candidate Jeremy Ring, a former state senator from Broward County, filed a financial-disclosure form this month listing a net worth of \$5.12 million. Ring, a former executive with Yahoo who also qualified for the Cabinet race Monday, listed assets including \$4.35 million in securities and a \$962,000 home in Parkland.

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Lawmakers barred from South Florida child migrant facility

HOMESTEAD — U.S. Sen. Bill Nelson accused the Trump administration of a “cover-up” after officials denied him entry Tuesday to a detention center for migrant children in South Florida where he had hoped

to survey living conditions. Nelson and U.S. Rep. Debbie Wasserman Schultz, both Florida Democrats, went to the contractor-run Homestead Temporary Shelter for Unaccompanied Children after reports alleged it was receiving detained

migrant children who had arrived in the country illegally. Wasserman Schultz said the facility was being used for an estimated 1,000 children, aged 13 to 17, who arrived here as unaccompanied minors as well as children separated

from their families at the border. She said two other facilities in South Florida were being used for younger children. “It is an affront as the senior senator of this state that an agency head would tell me that I do not have entrance into a federally

funded facility where the lives and health of children are at stake,” Nelson said. President Donald Trump’s immigration policies have come under intense scrutiny after reports of the forced separation of migrant

children from their parents. Democrats and some Republicans are urging an end to the practice at the U.S.-Mexico border. Thousands of children split from their families at the U.S. southern border are being held in government-run facilities.

week as about 200 teens and youth leaders with the PC Changers program volunteered time on Monday, Tuesday and again Wednesday to help others. In its seventh year, the PC Changers service event is about getting the students outside the church and into the community to connect with people. In addition to Hiland Park students, students from a Youngstown parish also were out working in the 92 degree heat.

But Addison Armistead, one of the Hiland Park students working at Sharon’s

house, said he didn’t mind the heat.

“Best way to do it,” he said with a smile.

On Monday and Tuesday, Armistead had mowed the lawn at Hiland Park Elementary School, pressure washed the building and trimmed weeds before heading to Sharon’s house. While he admitted he was starting to get sore, he also was itching to get back to work instead of talking about work.

“It’s not about us. We don’t do anything here for ‘hey look at us, look at me,’” he said. “We do it all for God and what he’s done for us. We are just giving back

to Him through helping others. That’s what motivates me.”

It’s exactly the message Tucker hopes his students get out of the event.

been found guilty of contributing to the October 2015 drowning death of 47-year-old Timothy E. Morrell by beating and slashing him with a knife beforehand. Circuit Judge Brantley Clark Jr. decided Hutchinson should spend 15 years behind bars for his role in Morrell’s death.

Dozens of Hutchinson’s family members filled the courtroom, some weeping as Clark announced

the sentence. Hutchinson expressed remorse to the court before making his case for leniency — asking to be sentenced to some length of probation.

“I wish none of this would have ever happened,” he told Clark. “But before you make a decision, please consider that my fiancée is seven months pregnant. I do have a stable job and home. I will contribute to society, and you’ll never see me in this court again.”

Hutchinson’s older brother, Jimmy Hutchinson, and mother, Carmen Hutchinson, also pleaded

for leniency from the court. They said they felt remorse because Morrell had been a family friend for about 30 years. However, they asked that Thomas Hutchinson be released back into the community.

“He is a good man, has a fiancée and a daughter on the way,” Jimmy Hutchinson said. “I think he would serve society better out here than laying up on the taxpayer’s dime.”

Prosecutor Bob Sombathy argued that Thomas Hutchinson was more culpable for Morrell’s death than his co-defendant in the case, 38-year-old Mary Arlette King. She was sentenced earlier this year to 14 years in prison.

“He was the driving force behind this,” Sombathy told the court.

“It was his knife that slashed (Morrell’s) back and forced him from the boat to crawl to his death. ... He knew this man was drunk and hurt.”

In the course of Hutchinson’s trial, jurors saw pictures from the morning of Oct. 15, 2015, when Bay County Sheriff’s Office deputies discovered Morrell — shirtless and shoeless — floating face down in the shallows of North Bay. He last had been seen about 8 p.m. Oct. 13, 2015, after the altercation aboard Hutchinson’s boat, officers reported.

BCSO reported the trio — consisting of Hutchinson, Morrell and Mary Arlette King — had embarked on a clandestine crab trap-poaching and gator-hunting expedition the day of Morrell’s death, all of them heavily

consuming whiskey. As the sunlight faded in the MariFarms area of North Bay, Morrell caused the boat to take on water by sitting unevenly on the vessel. He refused to help bail water, though, and that’s when the outing turned violent.

King later admitted to punching Morrell, then stabbing him with a flounder gig out of anger. Hutchinson then allegedly struck Morrell multiple times in the face and slashed him with a “duck bill knife” before forcing him drunken and injured from the boat at knifepoint, BCSO reported.


In the five hours that followed, Hutchinson and King sipped whiskey aboard the boat while calling 911 for assistance. In none of the calls did they mention Morrell

being injured.

Hutchinson’s defense attorney, Rusty Shepard, questioned how much responsibility Hutchinson owed to the drunken and belligerent Morrell, who incited the events. He also said Hutchinson believed Morrell knew the area and did call 911, although he did not directly mention Morrell.

“It’s undisputed Morrell was heavily intoxicated before and during the incident,” Shepard told the court. “... There had been a fight, but there was never evidence (Hutchinson) knew the extent of Morrell’s injuries.”

Clark did not explain his decision, although one of the three attempts to try the case was derailed by Hutchinson smoking marijuana before showing up to court.

would need 27 full-time firefighters and the average homesteaded house owner would have to pay \$676 a year, Budget Director Ashley Stukey said. County Manager Bob Majka said the firefighters would need to be on staff and the county wouldn’t want to rely on volunteers because they can be unreliable.

The worst ISO number is a 10; the best is a 1.

Bay County Chief of Emergency Services Mark Bowen said the county would be required to hire enough firefighters to try to bring the ISO rating for Mexico Beach to a 3 like the rest of the

county. But Bowen said there is no guarantee that the department would get that 3 ISO rating even if the 27 firefighters were hired.

“It’s just a very complex system that ISO uses,” Bowen said.

Commissioners said it just didn’t make sense for Bay County or the residents to bring Mexico Beach into the county’s system.

Commissioner Tommy Hamm said this proposal looks like the “money pit” he mentioned at the last meeting that the county needs to avoid.

“And then, too, the ISO rating that we have now we run the risk of jeopardizing it for the balance of Bay County. It’s just too great (of a risk) for myself,” Hamm said.

Commissioner Robert Carroll said the proposal

also would be bad for Mexico Beach residents, who would see their fire assessments more than triple under the county’s proposal.

“I think the burden is too expensive for them to take on that additional tax for us to provide all the fire service,” he said.

But Carroll said he would like to see the county increase the \$15,000 payment to Mexico Beach it pays each year to cover areas outside of the city between the city limits and Tyndall Air Force Base.

Several residents who attended the public hearing left disappointed at the commission’s decision.

Resident George Williams said he would like Mexico Beach to talk with Gulf County about possibly becoming part of that county instead of staying

in Bay County. He said he questions what Mexico Beach gets from Bay County.

“We have a mutual aid agreement with Gulf County (firefighters). They are coming anyway,” he said, pointing out that Gulf County has a station within 15 miles of Mexico Beach.

Mexico Beach Fire Chief Danny Simmons said the department will continue to push ahead.

“We’ve made big strides on our own so we’ll continue,” he said.

Simmons said he foresees the city’s ISO rating improving to a 6 when it is evaluated next because of the number of firefighters and equipment the city has paid for from the assessments.

“So the citizens have got what they paid for,” he said.



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
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


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
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

Wrestling pioneer Mulligan dead at 86

Instrumental in developing high school programs here

PANAMA CITY — It is difficult to develop a detailed Bay County timeline as part of George Mulligan's lifetime commitment to amateur wrestling.

Whether Mulligan is referred to as the founding father of the sport here in many ways does not seem as important as his continued passion for and support of wrestling at the high school level.

Mulligan's devotion

continued until his death on Monday at age 86.

"Dozens of times every year he would come into practices. He worked one-on-one with some of the guys," said Vern Barth, outgoing athletic director and a wrestling coach at Bay High School the past six years.

"He came to the matches and the tournaments here. He even went to the regionals in Jacksonville this year. He had the biggest heart and would train anyone who wanted to learn wrestling."



Mulligan

Mulligan was honored during a ceremony in September by Tornadoes senior Aaron Curry who unveiled a granite bench dedicated to Mulligan outside of John Cobb Gymnasium on Bay's campus.

It was no accident that among those in attendance were former county wrestling coaches Jim Lawson and Frank Fuder from Bay and Bob Hunt from Mosley.

Mulligan was credited with starting Bay's wrestling program from 1960-62 before moving back to New Jersey where he coached at Middlesex High School.

Mississippi State beats UNC 12-2 at CWS

OMAHA, Neb. — Go bananas, Mississippi State Bulldogs! You're one win away from the College World Series finals.

Jordan Westburg hit a grand slam, doubled and drove in seven runs and Mississippi State continued its surprise postseason surge by beating North Carolina 12-2 on Tuesday.

The Bulldogs (39-27), with two wins at the CWS, are off until Friday. Win then or on Saturday, and they'll be playing for the national championship next week.

This game was all about Westburg, the freshman who two weeks ago came up with the "Rally Banana" that's become the Bulldogs' good-luck charm in the NCAA Tournament. His seven RBIs, on the slam in the second inning and three-run double in the eighth, tied a CWS record.

"I think we had a good banana today. That's all I can say," Westburg deadpanned.

Westburg crushed a breaking pitch Austin Bergner left hanging, and

the ball landed in the seats above the left-field bullpen for a 4-1 lead.

When Westburg returned to the dugout, a teammate handed him his Rally Banana.

Westburg came up with the Bulldogs' alternate mascot during a regional game against Oklahoma on June 3.

The Bulldogs were struggling when he went into the tunnel and grabbed a banana.

Instead of eating it, he put it on his head in hopes of turning the Bulldogs' luck. It must have worked. Mississippi State won, Westburg and his banana got some TV time, and the meme took off.

Since then, Westburg has been the curator of the fruit. (No, it's not the same banana every game.)

He's put sunscreen and bug spray on it.

He's wrapped one in a towel, as if it were relaxing at a spa.

Sometimes Westburg or a teammate puts the banana up to his face like a mustache; other times it's a faux radar gun.

Early penalty helps Japan beat Colombia 2-1 at World Cup

SARANSK, Russia — Japan did what no other Asian team had ever done at a World Cup — beat a South American squad on the biggest stage in soccer.

The 2-1 victory over Colombia on Tuesday was another surprising result in an unpredictable tournament.

A costly mistake by Colombia midfielder Carlos Sanchez in the opening minutes led to a red card and a penalty, helping Japan take an early lead. Coming in the third minute, it was the second fastest red card in World Cup history and the first of this year's tournament.

Yuya Osako won a bouncing ball to begin a sequence that led to the red card and the penalty. Sanchez blocked Shinji Kagawa's shot with his extended right arm and was ejected. Kagawa then converted from the spot.

Colombia, which played with 10 men for the rest of the match, scored late in the first half on Juan Quintero's rolling

but accurate free kick, which sneaked inside the right post. Osako's gritty determination led to a 73rd-minute header from Keisuke Honda's corner kick that gave Japan three points in Group H.

"He played well in Germany this season," Honda said of the Werder Bremen forward. "He also couldn't score last World Cup and I knew he really wanted to score this game. I'm happy he scored."

Japan became the latest team to pull off an upset at the World Cup, joining Mexico, Switzerland and Iceland in earning unexpected results. The win was a surprise also because Japan changed coaches shortly before the tournament, and because Asian teams had failed to beat South American opposition in 17 previous World Cup meetings.

"Normally you prepare a match to play 11 players against 11 and to lose one player in the first three minutes — to lose such a crucial player — that's not an easy thing," Colombia coach Jose Pekerman said.

"In the second half, Japan adapted its style and managed to score by playing better and taking advantage of their opportunities."

Sanchez did not speak to reporters after the match.

Japan will next face Senegal on Sunday in Yekaterinburg, while Colombia takes on Poland in Kazan on the same day.

SENEGAL 2, POLAND 1: Senegal became the first African team to win at this year's World Cup, defeating Poland on a first-half own-goal and a controversial second-half score by Mbaye Niang. Senegal, back in the tournament for the first time since 2002, went ahead in the 37th minute when Thiago Cionek's attempted block of Idrissa Gueye's shot wrong-footed

goalkeeper Wojciech Szczesny, who was picked to start over fellow Arsenal castoff Lukasz Fabianski. Niang, who returned to the field from treatment, later beat Szczesny to double the lead in the 60th. Senegal is tied for the group lead with Japan, which upset Colombia 2-1 earlier. Senegal will play Japan on Sunday, when Poland meets Colombia.

RUSSIA 3, EGYPT 1: Russia scored three goals in a 15-minute span early in the second half to set up a win over Egypt, moving the host nation to the brink of the World Cup's knockout stage. Mohamed Salah won and converted a penalty for a consolation goal on his return from injury but Egypt's first World Cup in 28 years could be over in barely five days following a second straight loss. Russia's place in the round of 16 will be assured if Uruguay wins or draws against the Saudis on Wednesday. Those two scenarios would also eliminate Egypt, which started with a 1-0 loss to Uruguay.

When he returned to Panama City in 1970, he helped rejuvenate Bay's program while teaching at Haney Technical Center.

Curry recently graduated from Bay where he was a successful wrestler for the Tornadoes and reached the state tournament as a senior. Dedicating the granite bench helped Curry complete his Eagle Scout requirements while also serving as a lasting tribute to Mulligan.

Hunt remembered Mulligan as an opponent when the men coached the rival wrestling

programs at Bay and Mosley, but what really stood out was Mulligan's love of the sport.

"It was his life," Hunt said. "We were competitors and then we coached together. He was totally dedicated to it."

"We packed up kids in vans and went all over the place for freestyle tournaments in the summer. He had a great wife who put up with it and we'd take off and go to Atlanta, Chattanooga, Fort Lauderdale. It was all out of our pockets."

Hunt said the last time he saw his friend was during the bench ceremony. Mulligan looked good, Hunt said. He no longer was running, but he was walking every day.

"He was a good friend," Hunt said. "He bounced around and helped everybody

because he loved it."

Barth said that Mulligan bequeathed his passion for the sport to his family. His sons both wrestled, and Barth said that grandson, Carson Segler, was with the Tornadoes when Barth started at Bay. Mulligan's daughter, Ann Segler, was the booster club president.

"So they've been involved with it since the beginning of my time here."

George Richard Mulligan was born May 25, 1932. A Mass of Christian Burial will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday at St. John Catholic Church. Entombment will follow.

The family will receive friends at Kent-Forest Lawn Funeral Home on Friday from 5-7 p.m.

The Kansas City Royals' first-round draft pick struck out the side in the third and sixth innings and broke his previous high of 11 Ks he set against TCU in the CWS last year. He became the first pitcher in the CWS since UCLA teammates Gerrit Cole and Trevor Bauer in 2010 to record 13 strikeouts.

"Those guys are doing pretty well for themselves right now, so that's pretty cool company," Kowar said. He's the first to strike out 13 at the CWS in fewer than seven innings in 40 years, according to ESPN.

Jonathan India, the No. 5 overall draft pick by the Cincinnati Reds and Southeastern Conference player of the year, singled to make it 1-0 in the first inning and he broke the game open with a three-run homer in the sixth.

Texas starter Blair Henley (6-7) struggled with his control and lasted only 2 2/3 innings, the second-shortest

of his 22 career starts. He gave up four hits, walked four and threw a wild pitch.

Florida (48-20) came into the game after a 6-3 loss to Texas Tech in its CWS opener. The Gators had committed 16 errors in their last 11 games and had batted .186 and scored a total of eight runs in their previous three games.

The Gators played error-free against the Longhorns, and their offense had 10 hits.

Kowar (10-5) didn't allow a base runner past second until the seventh. With runners on second and third, Kowar struck out Tate Shaw and Ryan Reynolds and then left to applause from both Florida and Texas fans.

"The first inning, the first three batters I didn't make really any quality pitches," Kowar said. "Getting through that first was big, and then I was able to kind of get the fastball command working, and everything else played off of that the rest of the way."

Chase Shugart took over for Henley in the third and kept it a 1-0 game until there were two outs in the sixth. Nelson Maldonado's RBI single came

before India's 21st home run of the season made it 5-0.

"Nelson, the whole year, he's a clutch hitter for us," India said. "He rarely strikes out. He competes at the plate. That's what we needed. And he came through clutch for us. As they say, hitting is contagious. Just pass it on to me and I'll pass it on to the next."

Texas (42-23) broke through for a run in the eighth on DJ Petriskin's one-out single.

The Longhorns struck out a season-high 15 times against Kowar, Jordan Butler and Michael Byrne, the most for the program since fanning 17 times against TCU in 2017.

"People expected it to be a building year due to everybody we lost last year," Shugart said. "But these guys proved everybody wrong and that's because of their attitude. The attitude we had was gritty. We weren't giving anything; we had to take it. We took the Big 12 championship and the regional and super regionals. We went out and competed every inning, every out, and that's what good teams do and I wouldn't trade this for the world."

The season's five-time Cy Young Award winner Roger Clemens batted .419 (13 for 31) in the NCAA Tournament with five home runs, two doubles and 11 RBIs.

Up next

Florida plays another elimination game Thursday against the loser of Wednesday's game between Arkansas and Texas Tech. The Gators still need three wins to reach the best-of-three finals for the second year in a row.

The season is over for Texas, which lost 11-5 to Arkansas on Sunday and went winless in the CWS for only the fifth time in its record 36 appearances.

MILWAUKEE Bucks' Brown sues Milwaukee over arrest

Milwaukee Bucks guard Sterling Brown sued the city of Milwaukee and its police department Tuesday, saying officers' use of a stun gun during his arrest for a parking violation constitutes excessive force and that they targeted him because he is black.

Brown's attorney Mark Thomsen filed the lawsuit in federal court, accusing police of "discriminating against Mr. Brown on the basis of his race."
 The lawsuit alleges officers involved in his arrest used their incident report to try to reframe what happened to give the impression Brown was resisted and obstructed them.

Brown had been talking with officers while waiting for a citation for illegally parking in a disabled spot outside a Walgreens at about 2 a.m. on Jan. 26, when officers took him down because he didn't immediately remove his hands from his pockets as ordered. An officer yells: "Taser! Taser! Taser!"

ROSTOV-ON-DON, RUSSIA Saudi players not rattled by plane incident

Saudi Arabia's national team endured an engine malfunction on the flight to Rostov-on-Don. That's not exactly the best preparation for a World Cup match against Uruguay. The Saudis landed in the southern Russian city late Monday after flames were seen coming out of one of the engines.

Team officials refused to speak to reporters after the incident, but the country's soccer association confirmed the episode and said all its players and staff were fine.
 "The pictures speak for themselves and point to some kind of emergency," Saudi Arabia coach Juan Antonio Pizzi said Tuesday. "But the players were all calm. It won't affect our performance tomorrow."

Saudi Arabia needs points against Uruguay on Wednesday after a 5-0 loss to Russia in the opening match of the World Cup. Uruguay won its first match against Egypt 1-0.

SOCHI, RUSSIA Neymar leaves Brazil training session limping

Neymar limped out of Brazil's training session at the World Cup on Tuesday because of pain in his right ankle.

The Brazilian soccer federation said the injury was not serious, adding Neymar left as a precaution and would be back in training on Wednesday.

The federation said Neymar has been in pain since the team's 1-1 draw against Switzerland on Friday, when he was consistently fouled.

Neymar started practicing with the rest of the squad but left accompanied by a doctor about 30 minutes into the session in Sochi.

He had been playing keep-away with a few other players when he started showing signs of discomfort in his ankle. He was visibly in pain after he tried to intercept a ball with his right foot while at the center of the keep-away circle.

OKLAHOMA CITY Oklahoma approves \$25M deal for Riley

Oklahoma will pay football coach Lincoln Riley \$25 million over the next five years, including \$4.8 million this season.

Oklahoma's Board of Regents approved the new numbers on Tuesday.

The 34-year-old Riley was one of the highest-paid assistant coaches in the nation before being promoted to head coach after Bob Stoops' abrupt retirement. Shortly after becoming head coach, the board approved a deal for him that started at \$3.1 million. He led the Sooners to the Big 12 title, a spot in the College Football Playoff and a No. 3 final ranking while coaching Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback Baker Mayfield.

The biggest jump came in his supplemental income, which increased from \$2.475 million to \$3.475 million and is set to increase by \$100,000 per year. He has an annual retention benefit of \$500,000.

ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

"I must have women — there is nothing unbends the mind like them."

Over the last four years, an elite annual bridge tournament for women has been organized in Beijing. The Hua Yuan Cup is for eight national women's teams, and today's deal comes from the main event.

Poland's Justyna Zmuda had the opportunity to find a sparkling defense after an unusual sequence. While the jump in a minor suit opened on your left can be played as natural, typically a jump bid in the suit the opponents have opened asks your partner to bid three no-trump with a guard in that suit. The call is usually based on a long, solid minor suit, plus guards in at least one of the other two suits.

On lead against three no-trump, Zmuda started with the spade ace in order to get a look at dummy. East followed with the spade five, and South with the three. The auction showed that South had started with a spade stopper — probably queen-third or queen-fourth.

Zmuda took heed of East's five and decided that unless East had started with the doubleton 5-4, it was consistent with a suit-preference signal for diamonds, the lower of the red suits. And since she needed less from her partner in diamonds than she did in hearts, she made the killing switch to the diamond jack, though today the diamond king would have worked equally well. (That would not have been the case if partner had held the doubleton A-9 or A-10.)

The defenders could now cash five diamonds and two spades for three down.

ANSWER: If you wanted to drive this hand to game, you could bid three spades now. This is the Smolen convention, showing four spades and five or more hearts, game forcing. This transfers declarer to partner if you end up in hearts. But I think this hand is closer to a signoff in two hearts once it is clear that your side does not have a real fit. So I would bid two hearts, allowing my partner to choose a major at the two-level.

Decadence and delight in Florence

Detrained in Florence, I was greeted by two tall, impossibly handsome men in Armani suits who swept open the passenger door of a sleek, black luxury sedan. These were not my gli amanti (lovers), nor were they drivers of an Uber Plus. Transportation is one of many luxurious amenities offered to guests of the Grand Amore Hotel and Spa in Florence, cradle of the Renaissance.

Upon my ever-so-stylish arrival at the property, I marveled at its breathtaking views over the rooftops of the city and the famed Il Duomo cathedral, a gigantic brick and marble edifice completed in the 1400s. I was similarly impressed by the hotel's sensuous lobby design by Marianna Gagaliardi, a renowned architect.

A smiling concierge ushered me to a room tricked out with my personally chosen favorite flowers, beverages, pillows and mattress, thanks to a pre-arrival form I'd been asked to submit. Am I worthy of all this attentiveness? I was too tickled to care. I unpacked, freshened up a bit, and headed back outside.

First stop: The Ponte Vecchio, a medieval stone bridge over the Arno River that has become the city's landmark shopping area, and is of course, thick with tourists, today as always. My next stop is not to be missed: the Galleria dell'Accademia, one of Europe's treasured art museums and home to Michelangelo's magnificent David, among other sculptures and exhibits, including an early Stradivarius viola.

Artistic greatness brings on hunger, so a lunch of bruschetta, salad and pasta — all washed down with excellent Chianti — was in order. Much renewed, I continued to take in the sights and sounds of Florence until utter exhaustion brought me crawling back to my custom bed and pillow at the Grand Amore, where I napped.

Thirty minutes later, I headed downstairs for a food and wine tasting at the hotel's Cuore Café Bistrot. My first sip, a 2014 Vernaccia di San Gimignano, was a crisp and lively white from Tuscany, and accompanied by foie gras topped with crunchy apple shavings. An expertly aerated glass of Tenuta San Guido Bolgheri Sassicaia, a deep red Cabernet Franc/Cabernet Sauvignon blend from Livorno, was paired with spicy chocolate-covered pistachios and figs. I swear I heard angels singing.

Primed for dinner, I headed off the beaten path to Café Notte on Via della Caldaie, an inexpensive local hang-out where all of the food tastes like a Florentine grandmother cooked it — and she did! After a delicious plate of house-made pasta, I was spent.

Fiori di Zucca Ripieni e Fritti

Zucchini flowers are available in better produce/farmers markets in the U.S., and this cheese-filled, deep-fried version is a Florentine specialty. Mary Anne Dimity developed the recipe after a trip to Florence and teaches how to cook this at her Napa Valley cooking school Andiamo Cucinare, which means "Let's cook."

- 12 zucchini blossoms, cleaned and inner stamens removed
- 2 tsp. grated Pecorino-Romano cheese

For the filling

- 8 oz. full-fat ricotta cheese
- 1 large egg yolk
- 1 tsp. chopped, fresh mint
- Salt & pepper, to taste

For the batter

- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup sparkling water or beer

Whisk the batter ingredients together and allow to stand for 15 minutes.

Combine all filling ingredients and



stuff approximately 1 heaping tablespoon inside each blossom. Gently twist the top of the flower to re-close. Dredge the blossom in the batter.

Heat an inch or more of grapeseed oil to high heat in a deep frying pan and sauté the batter-dredged blossoms, turning them often for even browning and crisping. Drain each blossom on a paper towel and serve hot, topped with the Pecorino-Romano.

Candy turns bread pudding into gourmet delight

It's amazing how you can add easy and inexpensive ingredients to your favorite dish and come up with a gourmet delight. I don't mean gourmet in the sense of buying expensive and hard to find ingredients, but gourmet in flavor.

Several years ago, when I was doing more experimenting in the kitchen, I decided to add candy to my old-fashioned bread pudding. The first one I made was a Mounds bread pudding. I wanted a richer

liquid with this pudding, so I used cream of coconut and half and half.

With the addition of chopped Mounds candy, you will love this dessert. When served, it is topped with whipped topping, drizzled with chocolate sauce and sprinkled with toasted coconut. This turned out so well that I decided to try another candy. Enjoy!

Mounds Bread Pudding

- 1 can cream of coconut
- 2 cups half and half
- 1 tsp. coconut flavoring
- 3 large eggs
- 6 c. French bread cubes, slightly packed
- 2 c. chopped Mounds candy bars
- Whipped cream/Cool Whip

- Chocolate sauce
- Toasted coconut

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray a 9x13x2 inch baking pan or dish. Combine cream of coconut, half and half, coconut flavoring and eggs. Beat well. Add bread cubes and soak each piece of bread. Stir in Mounds.

Mix well and pour into pan. Bake for an hour. To serve, spoon pudding into dessert dish, top with whipped topping, drizzle with chocolate sauce and sprinkle top with toasted coconut.

Snickers Bread Pudding

- 6 c. French bread chunks
- 3 c. chocolate milk
- 1 (12 oz.) jar caramel ice cream topping

- 3 large eggs
- 2 c. chopped Snickers candy bars

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Butter a 13x9x2 inch baking pan. Put bread chunks into large bowl. In another bowl, combine the chocolate milk, caramel toppings and eggs. Whisk until smooth. Pour over bread chunks and press down to soak each piece.

Stir in candy and pour into prepared pan. Bake for 55 to 60 minutes. Good served with chocolate sauce and a dollop of whipped cream.







Yes, you can make great pizza at home

The quest for excellent homemade pizza can sometimes border on obsession. Pizza stones, pizza steels, pizza ovens, rigging your oven to act like a pizza oven, special flours, special blends of flour . . . it can all be a bit much - enough to prompt the more intimidated among us to just dial up delivery.

But it doesn't have to be that way.

As long as you are okay with not expecting to re-create the pies you might find coming out of a wood-burning Neapolitan oven, you can make good pizza at home with normal home kitchen equipment, even more basic than you might think.

That is what I found with a crust recipe pulled from the reliable King Arthur Flour archives. You can mix the dough with your hands very easily. Instead of a pizza peel, the pies are topped on a rimless baking sheet or overturned baking sheet. No pizza stone? No problem. We still very much enjoyed the crust when the pizza was baked on an overturned baking sheet. Of course, if you have a peel or stone for baking and would rather knead the dough in a stand mixer or bread machine, by all means use those tools.

Here are a few things to keep in mind to help you make the most of your pizza experience:

- Heat is your friend. I crank up the oven to 500 degrees and let it pre-heat for an hour, with the baking sheet (or stone) on the bottom rack. A hot surface helps the crust brown.
- Time helps, too. You can let the dough rise for an hour, and the pizza would be fine. I go with the upper range of what KAF recommends, which is two hours, so the dough has a little more time to develop flavor and expand. You can develop even more flavor by letting the dough rise and/or rest in the refrigerator overnight. Just put it on the counter a half-hour or so before you plan to shape it to take the chill off.
- Don't go overboard on the toppings. I get the temptation, but putting too much on top of the pizza can make the crust soggy. It can also create a mess when toppings slide

- off and burn.
- Be confident. Kneading definitely takes some work to do by hand, so don't worry about being too rough on the dough. My preferred method involves alternating arms, using the heel of one hand to almost push the dough away from me, then pulling it back before repeating with the other hand. But do whatever feels natural, as long as you're not holding back. Make sure you are working all parts of the dough. Similarly, the dough may need some not-so-gentle nudging to stretch into a 12-inch round. And when it comes to sliding the pizza into the oven, that is not the moment you want to lose heart. Give the sheet a quick jerk forward so the far edge begins to slide onto the sheet in the oven and then pull the one with the pizza back so the rest of the pie glides off.

Are there crushed bugs in your Negroni? Here's how to tell

That vibrant red color in your Negroni? It may be from crushed-up bugs. We'd have mentioned this earlier in Negroni Week, but it's rather like when you initially eat escargot: Better to taste how delicious they are before learning that they're land snails.

First, the drink itself. The Negroni is an iconic Italian aperitif: Equal parts gin, sweet vermouth, and Campari, served on the rocks and garnished with an orange peel. It was created in 1919 for Count Camillo Negroni at Café Casoni in Florence. The bartender was trying to heed the count's request for a little more oomph in his Americano (sweet vermouth, Campari, soda): Scarselli simply replaced the recipe's club soda with gin; thus was born the Negroni.

The Americano came from Milan's Caffè Campari, circa 1860s. Gaspare Campari concocted his eponymous bitter liqueur from a still-secret recipe of 60-plus ingredients. To the herbs, tree bark, and fruit peels, Campari added a natural red dye called carmine that gave the liqueur its distinctive red color for nearly 150 years.

That dye was made from a *Dactylopius coccus*, aka cochineal, a scaly insect that looks like a tiny gnochchi. Cochineals thrive on prickly pears in South America and Mexico, living off the cactus juice. To defend themselves from ants and other predators, female cochineals developed a

brilliant strategy: engorge themselves with carminic acid. Up to 26 percent of her body weight, in fact, is carminic acid. Squish one in your fingers, and that stuff is bright-crimson red.

To the Aztecs, that bug juice was *nochezli*, "blood of the prickly pear." They used it as a textile dye, body paint, and food coloring. "Pinch a female cochineal insect and blood-red dye pours out. Apply the dye to mordant cloth, and the fabric will remain red for centuries," wrote Amy Butler Greenfield in her book, "A Perfect Red Empire, Espionage, and the Quest for the Color of Desire" (Harper Perennial, Reprint, \$15.99).

According to Threads of Peru, a fair-trade Peruvian clothier, fiber is still dyed in the region by artisans that use family recipes passed down through generations. Some use minerals salts, wood ash, and even urine to alter pH levels, which can transform cochineal from red to orange or purple.

With the advent of synthetic dyes - and perhaps, the increasing market clout of vegans - Campari (now owned by the Campari Group, along with Skyy Vodka and Grand Marnier) ceased using cochineal in the U.S. market in 2006, opting for something created in the lab vs. the belly of a bug. (According to the labels collected around the world, Campari sold in Malaysia, Australia and Canada may still use the natural dye; the company didn't respond to inquiries for clarification.)






