PANAMA CITY — At first, the Downtown Improvement Board meeting started the way it always does.

It opened with a review of the financials and the usual concerns about the organization's small coffers. Then there was the update on the new website Director Daric Freeman said is almost ready to launch, which many pointed out was the same update as last month. Next up, a discussion about whether they should continue hosting monthly events that have been plagued with

Dozens lose 'everything they've ever worked for'

EASTPOINT — A fast-moving fire that whirled like a tornado Sunday evening through an almost thousand-acre stretch of mobile homes that border the state forest destroyed at least three dozen of them, Franklin County officials said.

That doesn't include the many fishing boats and pickup trucks that once populated almost every front yard, now reduced to a pungent carcass of charred metal or fiberglass.

Pam Brownell, the county's emergency management director, said the fire took the structure and contents of at least 36 homes, with four more burned to some degree. Because of its wind-driven gyrations, the fire missed several properties along its path, leaving them unscathed.

The loss of property is estimated to be at least \$800,000, according to Property Appraiser Rhonda Skipper.

Among those who lost everything was Matt Polous, whose property at 605 Ridge Road was among the first to be consumed after the fire quickly curled south from Bear Creek Road. Polous ran to awake his neighbor, Sean Boatwright, and when his wife Paula pulled up, returning from her job on St. George Island, he yelled for her to leave. She never entered the home; he left without even his billfold.

WASHINGTON — U.S. health regulators on Monday approved the first prescription drug made from marijuana, a milestone that could spur more research into a drug that remains illegal under federal law, despite growing legalization for recreational and medical use.



Today is **Tuesday, June 26**, the 177th day of 2018. There are 188 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On **June 26, 1948**, the Berlin Airlift began in earnest after the Soviet Union cut off land and water routes to the isolated western sector of Berlin.

On this date:

In 1483, Richard III began his reign as King of England (he was crowned the following month at Westminster Abbey).

In 1541, Francisco Pizarro, Spanish conqueror of Peru, was slain in Lima by rival conquistadors.

In 1870, the first section of Atlantic City, New Jersey's Boardwalk was opened to the public.

In 1917, the first troops of the American Expeditionary Force deployed to France during World War I landed in St. Nazaire.

In 1925, Charles Chaplin's classic comedy "The Gold Rush" premiered at Grauman's Egyptian Theatre in Hollywood.

In 1936, President Franklin D. Roosevelt was nominated for a second term of office by delegates to the Democratic national convention in Philadelphia.

In 1959, President Dwight D. Eisenhower joined Britain's Queen Elizabeth II in ceremonies officially opening the St. Lawrence Seaway. Swedish boxer Ingemar Johansson knocked out Floyd Patterson in the third round of their match at New York's Yankee Stadium to win the heavyweight title.

In 1963, President John F. Kennedy visited West Berlin, where he delivered his famous speech expressing solidarity with the city's residents, declaring: "Ich bin ein Berliner" (I am a Berliner).

In 1968, President Lyndon B. Johnson announced his choice of Abe Fortas to succeed the retiring Earl Warren as chief justice of the United States (however, Fortas later withdrew in the face of stiff Senate opposition).

In 1977, 42 people were killed when a fire sent toxic smoke pouring through the Maury County Jail in Columbia, Tennessee. Elvis Presley performed his last concert at Market Square Arena in Indianapolis.

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

86 killed in Nigeria as farmers, herders clash

LAGOS, Nigeria — Scores of people died in central Nigeria during vicious weekend clashes between mostly Muslim herders and Christian farmers, with one report citing police saying 86 people were killed. By some accounts, the growing conflict over resources has become deadlier than Nigeria's Boko Haram extremist insurgency.

Nigeria's president accused unnamed politicians in a statement Monday of taking advantage of the chaos ahead of next year's elections, calling it "incredibly unfortunate."

Dramatic footage from Jos showed angry people waving machetes and sticks and shouting at passing security forces as they weaved around overturned and burning vehicles. Smoke rose in the distance. Women and children clutching overstuffed bags piled into the back of trucks, seeking a way out.

President Muhammadu Buhari warned against reprisal attacks after the "deeply unfortunate killings across a number of communities" in central Plateau State as the military, police and counterterrorism units were sent to end the bloodshed.

"No efforts will be spared" to find the attackers, Buhari said.

Nigeria's government said "scores" were killed, but did not provide an official

death toll. The independent Channels Television cited a Plateau State police spokesman, Mathias Tyopev, as saying 86 people had been killed and at least 50 houses destroyed.

Mass burials began Monday amid fears that the death toll was even higher.

"Please remain calm," said the Plateau State governor, Simon Bako Lalong, as a helicopter whirred

overhead. "It is very, very, unfortunate that an incident is happening again like this."

The deadly clashes between herders and farmers are a growing security concern in Africa's most

populous country, which is roughly split between Muslims in the north and Christians in the south.

The threat from Boko Haram, which continues to carry out attacks in the northeast, has been cited as a cause of the growing tensions. Herders in search of safe grazing land, and also feeling the effects of climate change, have been forced south into more populated farming communities.

The widespread security issues pose a major challenge to Buhari, a Muslim former military ruler who won office in a democratic transfer of power in 2015, as elections approach next year.

The latest clashes began when about 100 cattle were rustled and some herders were killed, the statement from Buhari's office said. "Less than 24 hours later, violence broke out. Some thugs then took advantage of the situation, turning it into an opportunity to extort the public, and to attack people from rival political parties."

Some people were dragged from their cars and attacked if they said they supported certain politicians, the statement said.

The Plateau State governor announced a 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew in the communities of Jos South, Riyom and Barkin Ladi until further notice.

"Observe the curfew, observe the curfew, and I will still remind them to observe the curfew," he said.

MINNEAPOLIS Lawsuits challenge proposed mine near wilderness area

Environmental groups filed two more lawsuits Monday challenging the Interior Department's decision to reinstate the federal mineral rights leases for the proposed Twin Metals copper-nickel mine in northeastern Minnesota.

One of the lawsuits was filed by three national groups: The Wilderness Society, the Center for Biological Diversity and the Izaak Walton League of America. The other was filed by the Minneapolis-based Friends of the Boundary Waters Wilderness. They follow a similar lawsuit filed Thursday by nine businesses that rely on the Boundary Waters Canoe Area, plus Northeastern Minnesotans for Wilderness. All three were filed in federal court in Washington, D.C.

BUCHAREST, ROMANIA Probe sought in communist-era deaths of 340 orphans

A Romanian government institute asked prosecutors Monday to investigate the deaths of 340 children at a communist-era orphanage during the 1980s.

The Institute for Investigating the Crimes of Communism said the deaths occurred from 1980-1989 at "the Horror Orphanage," the nickname local residents gave to a facility for children with chronic neurological disorders in the northern town of Siret.

A total of 8,586 children were admitted there from 1956 until the facility closed in 2001. There were 1,500 deaths during that period, but the institute only reviewed ones from the 1980s due to time constraints. It said 81 children died in 1981 alone.

BERLIN Court convicts Syrian who beat man wearing Jewish cap

A Berlin court convicted a 19-year-old Syrian on Monday of serious bodily harm and slander for attacking a man wearing a Jewish skullcap in the German capital in April.

The 21-year-old victim, an Arab Israeli who said he wore the Jewish kippa, or yarmulke, in a show of solidarity with his Jewish friends, filmed his attacker whipping him violently with a belt while shouting "Yahudi!" — Jew in Arabic.

Berlin's regional court sentenced the defendant, who wasn't named due to privacy rules, to four weeks of juvenile detention, which he has already served while awaiting trial.

BATON ROUGE, LA. Lawsuit: Police chief imposed mandatory religious counseling

A federal lawsuit claims a Louisiana city's elected police chief imposed his religious beliefs on officers and reprimanded them for missing mandatory religious counseling sessions.

Former police officer Patrick Marshall sued Port Allen Police Chief Esdron Brown on Friday. Marshall's suit claims the chief threatened to fire or suspend him if he didn't attend the monthly counseling sessions with a chaplain.

Marshall also claims he was passed over for promotions given to less experienced officers because they attended the same church as the chief. The suit doesn't specify the chief's religious affiliation.

BRUSSELS EU slaps sanctions on Venezuelan VP, 10 others

The European Union banned travel and froze the assets of 11 senior Venezuelan officials on Monday, including new Vice President Delcy Rodriguez, pressing the nation's leaders to hold fresh elections and return to democratic rule.

The people "listed are responsible for human rights violations and for undermining democracy and the rule of law in Venezuela," EU headquarters said in a statement.

Venezuela immediately responded, accusing European leaders of meddling in Venezuela's internal affairs and undermining the nation's peace.

Bay County helps Eastpoint fire victims

PANAMA CITY — After a wildfire tore through Eastpoint on Sunday night destroying 40 homes, Bay County residents are showing up to help.

“When you have and know that people need, you need to give,” said Kathy Dykes, one of the people who donated goods. “You need to step up to the plate and help them out.”

The Bay County

Sheriff’s Office organized a quick relief drive via a Facebook post Sunday at 10 p.m. that asked the Bay County community to drop off goods the victims can use. By Monday afternoon, cars constantly rolled into the BCSO driveway to fill a truck with donations.

Sheriff Tommy Ford said the fire was “devastating” and said Bay County’s generosity was “amazing.”

“We expect to fill the truck,” Ford said.

More than 50 people dropped off donations

by 11 a.m., BCSO officials said. The public donated socks, underwear,

diapers, soap, shampoo and other goods. BCSO staff also went shopping

for essential items using donated money.

In addition to BCSO, the Salvation Army responded to the need sending in a Disaster Response Team from Panama City with food.

“Our team is prepared to serve meals and snacks and will continue to provide additional services, such as emotional and spiritual care, to help meet the needs of the displaced families,” Lt. Chelsea Fleeman said in a press release.

Officials at Heartland Rescue Ranch, 1435 Skunk

Valley Road, Panama City, have said they are available to temporarily house horses for families affected by the fires.

The Franklin County Emergency Management office has started a disaster fund. The office says that cash donations are desperately needed, as clothing donations are covered. The Franklin County Sheriff’s Office has started a GoFundMe to help the victims.

The Bay and Franklin County sheriff’s offices will be posting updates on their Facebook pages.

“My whole backyard was full of boats,” he said, at least 14 different ones, from a 55-foot grouper boat down to a 17-footer. One of those boats belonged to his brother-in-law, Jeff Page, who planned to oyster Monday morning.

Sheriff A.J. Smith said Monday morning that one man died Sunday evening of what appeared to be heart attack, after receiving CPR near the Eastpoint Cemetery as he rushed to rescue his dogs from the fire.

The fire began about 4 p.m. Initial fire crews from Apalachicola and Eastpoint at first watched as the fire remained at a distance, but as the fire neared, the winds helped propel it through Bear Creek, Ridge Road and Wilderness Road. By a little after 6 p.m., the fire was threatening those homes and an evacuation was called by the sheriff for those areas, as well as CC Land, Twin Lakes, North Bay Shore and portions of State 65.

“It’s terrible. It’s catastrophic,” said Smith.

“There are a lot of homes that are gone. It’s probably one of the most intense fires I’ve seen in my career. Some of them lost everything they’ve ever worked for. It’s heartbreaking.”

Gov. Rick Scott toured the damage about 8 a.m. Monday, and Chief Financial Officer Jimmy Patronis later in the afternoon. Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam will be visiting Tuesday.

Duke Energy crews worked all day to restore power, and law enforcement officials gradually let property owners return to their homes.

Todd Schroeder, a public information officer for the Florida Forest Service, said the fire was 95 percent contained by early Monday evening.

Speculation was rampant in the Eastpoint community that a controlled burn by a state contractor earlier in the week had reignited and spread out of control, but Schroeder offered no further details.

“I am sure over this period there’s been controlled burns,” he said. “I don’t have knowledge to be able to speak to that yet. I can’t substantiate that for

you tonight.”

At least three arson investigators from the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services were on hand, as well as those from sheriff’s office, who are working closely with them.

“We’re going to be working on what caused the fire,” said Smith. “We’ll get to the bottom of it.”

Fire departments from throughout the county, as well as Liberty, Wakulla and Gulf counties, responded to the fire as deputies rushed to evacuate the area. Brownell estimated about 125 people were forced from their homes.

“We called out every deputy we had,” said Smith. “It was all hands on deck.”

Eastpoint Fire Chief George Pruett said deputies’ quick evacuation efforts saved lives.

“Had they not been there, there would have been a massive loss of life there’s no doubt in my mind. We were bypassing houses that were completely burning,” he said. “We were trying to save the ones we could save.”

The sheriff said there was

at least one traffic mishap in the rush and confusion, and that deputies made one arrest, although it was not related to looting.

The Eastpoint Fire Station initially opened up for those evacuees, and those who didn’t find a place with family or friends, were directed to the Eastpoint Church of God. The American Red Cross was busy registering people, and offered them an overnight shelter. The women of the church prepared breakfast for the people Monday morning.

The Red Pirate served up food Sunday night to those who fled the flames, cooking up hamburgers brought over from Fisherman’s Choice from the recent youth fishing tournament.

Among those who stopped by was Cody Putnal, who lives at 677 Wilderness Road, along with his mother Martha, and brother Joey.

Putnal said he believes their home was spared because about six months ago they had cleared out much of the property to make room for four horses they brought in.

He said Joey let the horses loose as the flames neared, and the family

quickly packed goats, chickens and ducks into a Jeep to get them out safely.

“The fire just missed the horses,” said Putnal.

Cody Putnal said he heard an explosion, and went to see what it was. Others recalled hearing what likely were propane tanks, shotgun shells, gasoline cans, and even vehicles exploding.

Martha Putnal said she looked out a window and noticed “It’s getting black out there” and then realized the flames were whipping toward the house, and she had better leave.

Paul Sanders stopped by the Red Pirate, and said he believes the fire destroyed his home. He comforted his 8-year-old son.

“We have each other,” he told the boy, who just months earlier had lost his mother.

Cody Putnal said he ran out of the house so fast he left his medicines, some for a heart ailment. His mother said that as they fled, they passed by the house of a friend, Mason Moore, and saw it was completely gone.

“You could see through the house all the way to Ridge Road,” she said.

“The fire was moving down the road. We drove through it.”

Christy Russell had to convince her boyfriend, Ryan Williamson, who at first thought it was “a little house fire down the road,” to flee.

“Everybody was going down the road,” he said.

“Panicking,” she added. Williamson didn’t even grab his wallet and Russell took only one thing as she left.

“The first thing I grabbed was my baby’s blanket,” she said.

She ran next door to alert her neighbor.

“All I could see was orange,” Russell said. “I felt the heat.”

The Humane Society animal shelter remained open, and accepted animals displaced by the fire.

Gov. Scott promised to bring those affected the help they need.

“Our heart goes out to all the families impacted by this. We’re going to see what resources there are at the state and federal level,” he said. “Franklin County is a county that shows up and takes care of its citizens and we’re going to do the same thing as well.”

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Authorities abandon 'zero-tolerance'

RENO, Nevada — The nation's top border enforcement official acknowledged Monday that authorities have abandoned, for now, the Trump administration's "zero-tolerance" policy toward immigrant families after the president ordered an end to the separation of parents and children who cross the southern border.

The comments by Customs and Border Protection Commissioner Kevin McAleenan came shortly after Attorney General Jeff Sessions defended the administration's tactics in a speech in Nevada and asserted that many children were brought to the border by violent gang members.

Together, their remarks added to the nationwide confusion as mothers and fathers struggled to reunite families that were split up by the government and sometimes sent to different parts of the country.

McAleenan told reporters in Texas that he stopped sending cases of parents charged with illegally entering the country to prosecutors after President Donald Trump ordered an end to the separations last week.

The commissioner and Sessions insisted that the administration's policy remains in effect, but the cases cannot be prosecuted because parents cannot be separated from their children. McAleenan said he is

working on a plan to resume prosecutions.

Speaking at a school-safety conference in Reno, Sessions cast the children as victims of a broken immigration system and urged Congress to act.

While hundreds of protesters rallied outside a hotel-casino, the attorney general said more than 80 percent of children crossing the border arrive alone, without parents or guardians, and are "often sent with a paid smuggler. We can only guess how many never make it to our border during that dangerous

journey."

He claimed the MS-13 gang "is recruiting children who were sent here as unaccompanied minors, and some are brought to help replenish the gang. And they are terrorizing immigrant schools and communities from Los Angeles to Louisville to Long Island to Boston. They are able to do so because we do not have a secure southwest border."

He said five children had been found at the border carrying a combined 35 pounds of fentanyl, the powerful synthetic

opioid drug blamed for an epidemic of overdose deaths nationwide.

Drug cartels, Sessions said, "take advantage of our generosity and ... use children to smuggle their drugs into our country as well."

Just outside the building where Sessions spoke, more than 200 protesters opposed to the administration's immigration policies blocked a busy road. The coalition of civil rights, religious and union activists carried signs and drums and were joined by a

mariachi band. Some sat in a busy roadway for while police diverted traffic around them.

No arrests were reported. McAleenan's remarks follow an announcement last week by the federal public defender's office in El Paso that federal prosecutors would no longer bring criminal charges against parents entering the U.S. if they have their child with them.

U.S. defense officials said the administration had chosen two military bases in Texas to house detained migrants. The officials identified the bases as Fort Bliss and Goodfellow Air Force Base. They spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to speak on the record about a pending announcement.

As many as 2,300 children were separated from their migrant parents from the time the administration adopted the zero-tolerance policy until June 9, officials have said.

The exact process to reunite families has been unclear because migrants are first stopped by Customs and Border Protection. Then children are transferred to the custody of the Department of Health and Human Services, while adults are detained through Immigration and Customs Enforcement, which is under the Department of Homeland Security. Children have been sent to far-flung shelters around the country, raising alarm that parents might never know where their children can be found.

Mourners: Black teen killed more than a hashtag

SWISSVALE, Pa. — Classmates, teachers, family and neighbors of Antwon Rose Jr. described him Monday as a caring and charismatic young man who deserves to be remembered as more than just the latest hashtag given unarmed black men killed by police.

The funeral for Rose, 17, was held in a school auditorium six days after he was fatally shot by a police officer as he fled a traffic stop in a town near Pittsburgh. He would have been a senior.

The funeral program included a poem Rose wrote in 2016. In it, he wrote about being "confused and afraid" and wondering what path his life would take.

"I see mothers bury their sons," he wrote. "I want my mom to never feel that pain."

Rose was a passenger in a car pulled over by Officer Michael Rosfeld because police said it matched the description of a car wanted in a shooting in a nearby town.

As Rosfeld was taking the driver into custody, Rose and a second passenger fled.

Mourners displayed signs reading "Justice for Antwon" and "#SayHisName" in the funeral procession.

The messages in the windows of some of the cars were the only outward sign of protest after a week of demonstrations calling for the officer who shot

Rose to be charged in the shooting. Protesters said there would be no demonstrations Monday out of respect for the family.

Rose's shooting remains under investigation by the county district attorney. No charges have been filed.

His mother, Michelle Kenney, told ABC News in an interview over the weekend that the officer "murdered my son in cold blood."

"If he has a son, I pray his heart never has to hurt the way mine does," she said. "But I think he should pay for taking my son's life."

Rosfeld, who shot Rose, is on administrative leave. He told WTAE-TV last week he could not discuss the shooting but said he was getting a lot of support from law enforcement. His attorney did not return a call Monday seeking his comment on the family's statements.

A video taken from a nearby house shows Rose and another passenger running from the car. Three gunshots can be heard, and the passengers can be seen either falling or crouching as they pass between houses. It is unclear from the video if Rosfeld yelled for them to stop.

Authorities said two handguns were retrieved from the car, and District Attorney Stephen Zappala said an empty gun clip was found in Rose's pocket.

Lawyers for his family have said no evidence has been produced to show Rose posed a threat to police.

Dems risk treading on Trump's home field

NEW YORK — Political rancor over immigration boiled over into increasingly personal insults Monday, as President Donald Trump took a harsh shot at a prominent congresswoman's intellect and Democrats worried that some of their own anti-Trump rhetoric might play into his hands and backfire in November.

With language reaching belligerent levels seldom heard since the 2016 campaign, Republican tactics seemed aimed at least in part at activating loyal supporters for the midterm elections.

The issue of what passes for political civility in 2018 has been eagerly stoked by Trump, who has embraced the cultural battles playing out everywhere from restaurant tables to football fields to late-night comedy. And the ejection of White House press secretary Sarah Huckabee Sanders and her family from a Virginia restaurant over the weekend symbolizes the public anger that has tied Democrats in knots, leaving them torn as to how to respond to a president who defies the norms of his office.

Trump punched back sharply Monday after Democratic Rep. Maxine Waters of California told a crowd in her state over the weekend that "If you see anybody from that Cabinet in a restaurant, in a department store, at a gasoline station, you get out and you create a crowd, and you push back on them!"

Trump, always eager for a foil, tweeted in retort: "Congresswoman Maxine Waters, an extraordinarily low IQ person, has become, together with Nancy Pelosi, the Face of the Democrat Party. She has just called for harm to supporters, of which there are many, of the Make America Great Again movement. Be careful what you wish for Max!"

Other Democrats quickly

distanced themselves from Waters' call to action, suggesting it could endanger Democrats' chances in the midterms that could determine the next chapter of Trump's presidency.

"In the crucial months ahead, we must strive to make America beautiful again," tweeted House Minority Leader Pelosi. "Trump's daily lack of civility has provoked responses that are predictable but unacceptable. As we go forward, we must conduct elections in a way that achieves unity from sea to shining sea."

Senate Minority Leader Charles Schumer said Monday from the Senate floor that "the best solution is to win elections. That is a far more productive way to channel the legitimate frustrations with this president's policies than with harassing members of his administration."

Trump welcomes the fight, from the depiction of his supporters in the short-lived "Roseanne" revival to NFL players kneeling for the national anthem, believing that us-vs.-them partisan issues fire up his base of supporters. With the Russia investigation swirling and Republicans facing an uncertain fate in November, he has further abandoned any unifying power of his office, leaning hard into partisan warfare while adopting

an aggrieved stance to dish out attacks that dominate the news and distract from scandals.

And while his rough rhetoric since his campaign has given license for some of his followers to engage in inflammatory acts, the anger on the left has sparked its own set of unruly images, further amplifying the political divisions in the nation's civility war.

Sanders was shown the door at the Red Hen in Lexington, about three hours outside Washington, by the restaurant's owner on Friday. The press secretary tweeted from her government Twitter account that she was asked "to leave because I work for @POTUS and I politely left. Her actions say far more about her than about me." She used her press briefing on Monday, the first in a week, to declare that Americans are "allowed to disagree, but we should be able to do so freely and without fear of harm."

The restaurant episode comes amid other acts of street protests against Trump aides and allies. Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen was hounded from a Mexican restaurant in Washington amid cries of "Shame!" last week. Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi was heckled at a screening of a documentary about Mr. Rogers, the paragon of kindness and civility.

The Food and Drug Administration approved the medication, called Epidiolex, to treat two rare forms of epilepsy in patients 2 years and older. But it's not quite medical marijuana.

The strawberry-flavored syrup is a purified form of a chemical ingredient found in the cannabis plant — but not the one that gets users high. It's not yet clear why the ingredient, called cannabidiol, or CBD, reduces seizures in some people with epilepsy.

British drugmaker GW Pharmaceuticals studied the drug in more than 500 children and adults with hard-to-treat seizures, overcoming numerous legal hurdles that have long stymied research into cannabis.

FDA officials said the drug reduced seizures when combined with older epilepsy drugs. FDA chief Scott Gottlieb said his agency had supported research on cannabis-derived products "for many years."

"This approval serves as a reminder that sound development programs that properly evaluate active ingredients contained in marijuana can lead to important medical therapies," Gottlieb told reporters.

The FDA has previously approved synthetic versions of another cannabis ingredient for medical use, including severe weight loss in patients with HIV.

Epidiolex is essentially a pharmaceutical-grade version CBD oil, which some parents already use to treat children with epilepsy. CBD is one of more than 100 chemicals found in marijuana. It doesn't contain THC, the ingredient that gives marijuana its mind-altering effect.

Physicians say it's important to have a

consistent, government-regulated version.

"I'm really happy we have a product that will be much cleaner and one that I know what it is," said Dr. Ellaine Wirrell, director of the Mayo Clinic's program for childhood epilepsy.

Side effects with the drug include diarrhea, vomiting, fatigue and sleep problems.

Several years ago, Allison Hendershot considered relocating her family to Colorado, one of the first states to legalize marijuana and home to a large network of CBD producers and providers. Her 13-year-old daughter, Molly, has suffered from severe seizures since she was 4 months old. But then Hendershot learned about a trial of Epidiolex at New York University.

"I preferred this to some of those other options because it's a commercial product that has gone through rigorous testing," said Hendershot, who lives in Rochester, New York.

Since receiving Epidiolex, Hendershot says her daughter has been able to concentrate more and has had fewer "drop" seizures — in which her entire body goes limp and collapses.

CBD oil is currently sold online and in specialty shops across the U.S., though its legal status remains murky. Most producers say their oil is made from hemp, a plant in the cannabis family that

contains little THC and can be legally farmed in a number of states for clothing, food and other uses.

The immediate impact of Monday's approval on these products is unclear.

FDA's Gottlieb warned about the use of CBD products with "unproven medical claims."

"The promotion and use of these unapproved products may keep some patients from accessing appropriate, recognized therapies to treat serious and even fatal diseases," Gottlieb said.

The FDA previously issued warnings to CBD producers that claimed their products could treat specific diseases, such as cancer or Alzheimer's. Only products that have received formal FDA approval can make such claims, typically requiring clinical trials costing millions. Most CBD producers sidestep the issue by making only broad claims about general health and well-being.

Industry supporters downplayed the impact of the FDA approval.

"I don't know a mom or dad in their right mind who is going to change what's already working," said Heather Jackson, CEO of Realm of Caring, a charitable group affiliated with Colorado-based CW Hemp, one of nation's largest CBD companies. "I really don't think it's going to affect us much."

Downtown Business Alliance Board last month calling for all DIB staff to be fired — didn't seem to shock anyone in the room or on the board.

Freeman had left the meeting to attend a funeral by the time Harding spoke, but sent a letter to board members last week, obtained through a public record's request, saying he is considering resigning, citing media scrutiny, the DIB's past, and alluding to tensions between the Business Alliance and DIB.

"I question the ability to work together going forward," Freeman wrote. "The parties in question absolutely refuse all communication or attempts to find common goals to work toward. ... I merely wonder, if even before all of this came about we were completely unable to work together, how are we to find common ground now?"

The difficulties at the DIB are not new. In the last six years, the agency has cycled through six directors, including Freeman. Some have left for promotions, such as the current

interim City Manager Jared Jones, who started his career in Panama City at the DIB, but more recently those departing have cited the small budget and a failure to garner cooperation from the downtown business owners.

The organization, which was founded in the 1970s, also has struggled to find a place for itself in the downtown community as more and more agencies have played greater roles in the neighborhood, including the Community Redevelopment Agency, Destination Panama City and the Business Alliance. After canceling Friday Fest in 2016 — an event that was loved by some, but also drew constant criticism — the board has struggled to find a path forward it can stick with.

Events meant to replace Friday Fest, such as Heard it on Harrison and the now canceled Historic Downtown Block Party, failed to take off. The DIB did have some successes with encouraging development and beautification efforts, but ultimately was bogged down in issues like the Gateway Park Fountain repairs and event management.

Conversations turning the DIB into a grant organization are still in their early stages. Board members plan to revisit the topic next meeting, and City Public Information Officer Caitlin Lawrence said the city is open to having conversations about this new vision.

In the meantime, the DIB will be hosting its annual Salute to Freedom on the Fourth of July at the marina, including the annual fireworks show.



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The GOP's farm bill mess

The federal farm bill currently working its way through Congress is an outdated relic and a wasteful vehicle for corporate welfare and handouts paid to many of the nation's wealthiest farmers. While the Obama administration took baby steps to limit taxpayer-funded subsidies to rich farmers, congressional Republicans now reportedly are moving to roll back those reforms and make an already bad policy even worse.

As Baylen Linnekin recently outlined at Reason.com, the Obama-era subsidy caps on rich farmers were a tiny step toward many, much-needed agricultural reforms — virtually all of which involve Congress and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) giving away less of our money. But if Republicans in Congress pass a farm bill without those caps, they would “confirm almost all of what critics of both Washington lawmakers and farm subsidies have long contended: They are unnecessary, embarrassing, shambolic, shameless, ossified, counterproductive, abominable and grotesque,” Mr. Linnekin observes.

News of Congress' plan to push through a regressive, bloated farm bill came mere days before a scathing new report from the Environmental Working Group showing tens of thousands of Americans took home billions of dollars in annual farm subsidies (or other taxpayer-funded payments) for more than 30 years.

Studying USDA data from 1985 to 2016, the group found upward of 28,000 farmers received more than \$19 billion — or an average of \$675,000 per farmer — in taxpayer subsidies. Mr. Linnekin reveals the

handouts typically have benefited “larger farmers who farm just a handful of crops” and simply don't need them. The list of recipients includes millionaires and billionaires. Mr. Linnekin notes Paul Allen, Charles Schwab, Jon Bon Jovi, Bruce Springsteen and Scottie Pippen have all received subsidies in the past, as have members of Congress.

According to a 2006 Arkansas Leader report cited by Mr. Linnekin, the family farm owned by former Rep. Marion Berry, D-Ark., was able to rake in nearly \$100,000 per year in subsidies during the nine years he was in Washington. Mr. Linnekin also referenced a Politico report showing former Rep. Michele Bachmann, R-Minn., took in \$251,000 in farm payments between 1995 and 2006 while at the same time speaking out against wasteful government programs.


Farm subsidies direct billions of taxpayer dollars to those who don't need them, disrupt the marketplace, stunt innovation, block competition, create dependence on taxpayer dollars and drive up consumer prices.

American farm policy is a Depression-era collectivist relic. Short of blowing up the whole farm bill, the goal should be for Congress to craft a measure that weans farmers off taxpayer handouts.

If Congress ever gets serious about getting rid of government waste, the Department of Agriculture would be among the most vulnerable targets in a very target-rich environment.

Evangelical leaders too silent for too long

It feels surreal, as our country approaches the 242nd anniversary of its freedom, to be celebrating the fact our government is no longer pulling crying toddlers and infants away from their parents along the southern border.

Equally strange has been the sluggish response of some evangelical leaders, whose notion of biblical mercy is one that shines less brightly on immigrants. Rev. Franklin Graham, for example, only last week acknowledged the U.S. policy of separating migrant families was “disgraceful.”

Even when he finally spoke out against the separating of migrant families, Graham refused to blame the president. “This is not the administration's fault. I don't point the finger at Trump,” said the son of the late, iconic Billy Graham.

He then shrunk behind the same outlandish lie that President Trump's allies had been using to defend what was happening: Immigration law requires border officers to yank some kids away from their parents. It's all the fault of Congress!

Not even the White House,

which solely made the decision to warehouse more migrant children, successfully adhered to that narrative. In fact, Trump's flailing team changed its story more than a dozen times.

In the beginning, the aggressive push to split up families at the border was described as a new Justice Department policy. Then, on June 18, Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen said it wasn't a new policy. A day later, Marc Short, another Trump official, said it was.

Nielsen also had asserted it was “offensive” to suggest taking children from their parents was intended to deter illegal immigrants from coming. Within hours, Attorney General Jeff Sessions said exactly the opposite to Fox News.

Trump, Sessions and Nielsen all spouted the line that forced separation was required by flawed legislation and that Congress must act to fix it. Then the dependably muddled Kellyanne Conway told CNN that nobody ever claimed the law imposed mandatory separation of children from their mothers and fathers.

The dizzying whirl of contradictions culminated with a memorable flip-flop by Trump himself. Five days after telling reporters the family-separation policy couldn't legally be rescinded by an executive order, he sat down and signed one.

As ideologically fractured

as our country is, there remains a core decency that transcends politics and religious doctrine. It has been animated by compassion for children in distress and also profound sympathy for any parent forced to watch a son or daughter taken away.

WASHINGTON Supreme Court rules for AmEx in credit card case

The Supreme Court handed American Express a win Monday in a lawsuit over rules it imposes on merchants who accept its cards.

Under their contracts, merchants who accept American Express generally can't encourage customers to use other credit cards. That's even though Visa and MasterCard generally charge merchants lower fees. But American Express prevents merchants who accept its card from offering customers discounts or other incentives to use other cards or expressing a preference for other cards. The federal government and a group of states sued over American Express' so-called anti-steering provisions, arguing that they violate federal law.

Stocks sink on reports US may limit tech exports

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks are on track for their biggest loss in more than two months Monday as reports that the Trump administration may limit technology exports and foreign investment are hurting tech companies. Indexes in Europe and Asia also fell.

Tariffs by the U.S. on tens of billions of dollars in imports from China, and retaliatory taxes by China on U.S. goods, are set to take effect in less than two weeks. All but one of the 72 technology companies listed on the S&P 500 index fell Monday. Those companies have done far better than the broader market over the last year and a half and investors generally felt they were less vulnerable to tariffs than other industries.

The Wall Street Journal and Bloomberg News reported that the administration is planning to limit exports of some high-tech products to China, and will limit

investment in technology firms by companies with substantial Chinese ownership. Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin said the administration is preparing a statement on investment restrictions that was related not just to China, but to other countries that allegedly steal U.S. technology.

Elsewhere, Harley-Davidson said it would move some production out of the U.S. to avoid tariffs the European Union is placing on motorcycles made in the U.S. Those tariffs were a response to taxes the U.S. placed on steel and aluminum from Europe.

China is attempting to become a global leader in biotechnology, electric vehicles and other industries, and the report said the administration wants to slow Beijing's progress in those areas. President Donald Trump has threatened to put tariffs on hundreds of billions of dollars in Chinese imports over complaints Beijing steals or pressures foreign companies to hand

over technology. He's also pressuring China to buy more U.S.-made goods.

The S&P 500 index shed 50 points, or 1.8 percent, to 2,704 as of 2:40 p.m. Eastern time. It's on track for its worst loss since April 6. The Dow Jones Industrial Average lost 435 points, or 1.8 percent, to 24,145. The Nasdaq composite fell 200 points, or 2.6 percent, to 7,492. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks slid 28 points, or 1.7 percent, to 1,657.

Chipmaker Micron Technology, which gets half its revenue from China, lost 7 percent to \$53.09 and Advanced Micro Devices fell 4.8 percent to \$15.04. Nvidia sank 5.7 percent to \$236.71.

Germany's DAX fell 2.5 percent and London's FTSE 100 gave up 2.2 percent. France's CAC 40 shed 1.9 percent. Hong Kong's Hang Seng lost 1.3 percent. Tokyo's Nikkei 225 shed 0.8 percent and in South Korea the Kospi was little changed.

Retailers and other companies focused on consumers fell as investors sold some of the stocks that have done the best this year. Amazon lost 3.6 percent to \$1,653.16 and Netflix dropped 6.6 percent to \$384.

The S&P 500 index of consumer-focused companies has jumped 10.2 percent this year and the technology index is up 9.5 percent. The S&P 500 is up 1.3 percent.

The trade tensions continued to hit industrial companies, which are facing higher costs and the possibility of tariffs that hurt their sales. Boeing skidded 2.9 percent to \$329 and Caterpillar shed 3 percent to \$135.78.

Harley-Davidson said in a regulatory filing that the EU tariffs on its motorcycles exported from the U.S. jumped between 6 percent and 31 percent, which translates into an extra \$2,200 per average motorcycle. As a result, it will shift the production of motorcycles headed for Europe from the U.S. to overseas

facilities.

Harley stock fell 7.4 percent to \$41.13.

Bond prices rose. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note fell to 2.88 percent from 2.89 percent.

Elsewhere, cruise lines dropped after Carnival cut its annual profit forecast. The company cited the rising cost of fuel. Carnival fell 6.8 percent to \$59.23 while Royal Caribbean gave up 5.6 percent to \$105.28 and Norwegian Cruises lost 6.7 percent to \$48.49.

About three-fourths of the stocks on the New York Stock Exchange fell, but investors still responded positively to deal reports. Broadcaster Gray Television jumped 13.5 percent to \$14.53 after it said it will combine with Raycom in a deal the companies valued at \$3.6 billion. Campbell Soup rose 9 percent to \$42.08 after the New York Post said Kraft Heinz is interested in buying the company. Kraft fell 0.4 percent to \$62.93.

Harley-Davidson shifts production overseas, citing tariffs

MILWAUKEE — Production of Harley-Davidson motorcycles sold in Europe will move from U.S. factories to facilities overseas, the Milwaukee-based company announced Monday, a consequence of a retaliatory tariffs the EU is imposing on American exports in an escalating trade war with the Trump administration.

President Donald Trump has used the iconic American motorcycle maker as an example of a U.S. business harmed by trade barriers in other countries, but Harley had warned that tariffs could negatively impact its sales.

The European Union on Friday began rolling out tariffs on American imports including bourbon, peanut butter and orange juice. The EU tariffs on \$3.4 billion worth of U.S. products are retaliation for duties the Trump administration is imposing on European steel and aluminum.

The company said in a regulatory filing Monday that EU tariffs on its motorcycles exported from the U.S. jumped between 6 percent and 31 percent, adding about \$2,200 per average motorcycle exported from the U.S. to the EU.

The impact on U.S. workers because of Harley-Davidson's decision was not immediately clear. Harley-Davidson declined interview requests Monday but said in prepared remarks that the company "maintains a strong commitment to U.S.-based manufacturing which is valued by riders globally."

Harley-Davidson Inc. sold almost 40,000 motorcycles in the EU last year, its second-largest market after the United States, according to the company. The EU sales make up almost

16.4 percent of Harley-Davidson's worldwide sales. In the U.S., Harley-Davidson sold 147,972 motorcycles last year, according to company data.

"Increasing international production to alleviate the EU tariff burden is not the company's preference, but represents the only sustainable option to make its motorcycles accessible to customers in the EU and maintain a viable business in Europe," the company said in its prepared remarks.

Harley-Davidson said it will not raise its prices to avert "an immediate and lasting detrimental impact" on sales in Europe. It will instead absorb a significant amount of the cost in the near term. It anticipates the cost for the rest of the year to be approximately \$30 million to \$45 million.

Shifting the production overseas could take up to 18 months, the motorcycle maker said.

The company is already struggling with falling sales. In January, it said it would consolidate its Kansas City, Missouri, plant into its York, Pennsylvania, facility. U.S. motorcycle sales peaked at more than 1.1 million in 2005 but then plummeted during the recession. It wasn't immediately known whether any other facilities would be consolidated.

"Harley-Davidson's announcement today is the latest slap in the face to the loyal, highly-skilled workforce that made Harley an iconic American brand," Robert Martinez Jr., president of the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers, said in a statement. The union represents Harley-Davidson workers in Milwaukee, and the Kansas City and York plants.

Boater fatally injured by spinning vessel identified

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PANAMA CITY — A boater injured in an accident near the Panama City Marina on Sunday afternoon has died of his injuries.

According to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission (FWC), which investigates boating accidents, Brad Martin Bramblett, 59, was killed after he was ejected from his 17-foot Aquasport in a single-vessel boating accident. The boat continued to circle and struck Bramblett several times while he was in the water.

The first emergency calls came in about 4 p.m. Sunday as witnesses spotted the vessel spinning in the water to the west of the Panama City Marina. Michael Fuller, who was one of the witnesses to call 911, said Bramblett at first was able to call for help.

Bramblett was pulled from the water by a Good Samaritan vessel, the Marquesa, where one of the Good Samaritans, reportedly a firefighter from Alabama, began performing CPR on Bramblett while he was ferried to the fuel dock behind the Marina Store. They were met there by first responders, who continued to perform CPR on Bramblett as he was loaded into an ambulance and taken to Bay Medical Sacred Heart.

The boat continued to circle for more than an hour until U.S. Coast Guard personnel were able to throw several ropes in the water and foul the prop, stopping it within yards of colliding with a barge parked at the end of the marina's T-dock.

FWC is continuing to investigate the accident. It is not yet known what caused Bramblett to be ejected from his boat.

Sleep Center donates \$25K of Tempur-Pedic mattresses to Anchorage Children's Home

PANAMA CITY — Before teenagers come to Anchorage Children's Home — a shelter for homeless, runaway or abused youth — most of them become used to sleeping on floors or outside.

If they're lucky, said Brooke Bullard, director of development for Anchorage, they might have slept on a couch or a cot.

But after Monday, 16 teenagers staying at Anchorage will have new Tempur-Pedic mattresses to sleep on, thanks to a generous donation from The Sleep Center Superstore Panama City. In total, the donation is worth about \$25,000.

Richard Branham, owner of The Sleep Center, said he's been working with Tempur-Pedic for the past two years to get into their donation program. Every year when he goes to look at the new Tempur-Pedic inventory, he goes out to dinner with the CEO and takes the time to explain some of the needs in the local community.

This year, he said they finally got it worked out where he would be given a truckload of Twin XL Tempur-Pedic mattresses to outfit the local fire departments, but when he opened the truck, he saw

they had mistakenly sent over Twins, not Twin XLs.

"They asked if I could still use them and I said, 'Yeah, I can use them, I'll take those too,'" Branham said, adding that when he found out he could keep the Twins and get a new truck of Twin XLs, he "did a happy dance."

With a truck full of 16

mattresses, Branham said he knew just the agency that could use them. In fact, he helped outfit Anchorage with its last batch of mattresses five years ago, and Bullard said Branham has been a familiar face for longer than the 11 years she's been with the organization.

"Richard has always been

that guy," Bullard said. "He's always stepped up and provided for us when we need him too. All we have to do is pick up the phone and he'll be there."

The shelter has about 20 teenagers at any given time, Bullard said, and Anchorage serves about 220 teenagers in a year. As such, such things as mattresses, linens and household furniture see a lot of "wear and tear." With the cost of running a shelter already "very expensive," and a shortage of foster families in the community leading to teenagers with longer and longer stays in the shelter, things like beds can be hard to come by. Even families who aren't going through hardship, Branham said, hardly think about their beds.

"It's one of the last things you want to buy anyways if you have extra money," Branham said.

When he worked out the donation, Branham said he expected Tempur-Pedic to send its thinnest, least expensive models, which are usually about 6 inches thick. The models coming out of the truck Monday afternoon, though, all were between 10 inches and 14 inches thick, with Branham excitedly calling them "monsters!"

LAGUNA BEACH Christian retreat no protection from thieves

As one young man found out recently, nothing much good happens outside after midnight and thieves aren't impressed with anyone else's clean living.

The man told Bay County Sheriff's Office deputies he was sitting in front of the Christian retreat where he was staying about 3:30 a.m. reading a book when he saw two men appear and start walking around the pool deck.

"He believed it looked like

they were looking for something, however he did not think it was suspicious since it was a Christian Retreat," the deputy wrote. "He stated a few minutes later he picked up his black back pack and walked to his room. He left his back pack on a chair in front of the room, and when he came out a few minutes later, he realized it was gone."

Also missing were the two men he had seen minutes earlier. He gives the deputy a description over the phone and goes outside to flag him down as he arrives. In the meantime, he sees a pickup truck "driving erratically" in the area as if the driver was "possibly looking

for someone."

The deputy finds two men nearby on a golf cart and talks to them, then looks for any other signs of missing items, and returns to talk to the complainant who says the truck he saw earlier is parked down the street. The deputy drives to it and finds it "sitting on the side of the road running with no one in it."

A man walks out of a nearby business and says it is his truck, but that he "has not been in the area at all today."

"It should be noted inside the back pack was a set of keys belonging to (the complainant's) Van which was parked

out front the above location," the deputy wrote. "There was also a silver mac book laptop, which (the complainant) could not provide the serial number for."

The case remains under investigation.



shoplifting complaint: "a white female wearing blue jeans and a grey T-shirt with a shaved head weighing over 200 pounds," according to the deputy's report. The suspect was last seen walking north along U.S. 231, so the deputy heads that way.

"I responded to the area and located a female matching that exact description at the intersection of Gardenia Street and Highway 231," the deputy wrote. "The female ... was actively drinking a Natural Light 16 ounce can of beer. I observed two other beers of the same brand at her feet and one still concealed within her waistband. It appeared she had stolen a four pack of this beer and was attempting to consume it as quickly as possible."

The deputy reports the woman is not cooperative, or "verbally non compliant," and claims an unknown person had "just dropped the beer off for her. She could not provide this person's name or vehicle description and denied having just been inside" the store. In addition to her alleged non-compliance verbally, the deputy wrote, the woman "also threw an unknown item into the woods while I was speaking with her. I was unable to identify the item and it was not able to be recovered due to the thick brush."

The woman is driven back to the store where the complainant says charges should be filed. She tells the deputy she saw the suspect walk into the store and ask for directions and "she did not notice anything concealed in her waistband at that time. She was then observed walking around the store, stopping at the beer section and the prescription eye glasses section. The complainant observed a noticeable bulge in her Kreis' waistband as she exited the store ... and the suspect removed a can of beer from her waistband and began drinking it as she walked North out of the parking lot."

The complainant takes a look at the suspect in the back of the patrol car "and noticed she was wearing eyeglasses on her head that she believed belonged to the store. I removed these glasses from the suspect and ... the exact same pair of glasses were located on the shelf where the complainant stated the suspect had been concealing an unknown item in her shirt."

The glasses are valued at \$6 and the beer at \$4, but the report "stated the glasses and beer had been concealed in a manner that made them now unsanitary to resale."

The suspect is charged with shoplifting.



Rally will advocate for migrant families

PANAMA CITY — An upcoming rally in Bay County against the treatment of undocumented immigrants will join similar events set for Washington, D.C., and across the country.

The Families Belong Together March will happen at the Hathaway Bridge in Panama City at 4 p.m. Saturday to protest undocumented immigrant children being separated from their families at the border.

The separation and treatment of immigrants under President Donald Trump's administration has sparked national outrage. Trump reversed the policy last week, though exactly what steps are being taken to reunite previously separated families remains unclear.

Washington County resident Melinda Hall, who frequently commutes to Bay County, initiated the Hathaway Bridge rally after finding out one would be held in the nation's capital. Hall said children are "voiceless" on the issue and should be advocated for. "This march is about speaking up for them and advocating for child safety," Hall said.

Several state and local organizations, including CAIR-Florida (Council on American-Islamic Relations) and the Young Democrats

Hiba Rahim, coordinator for CAIR-Florida's north region

of Bay County, will participate. The event will include speakers and a walk across the bridge. Participants are asked to meet at the Gulf Coast State College side of the bridge before the walk starts.

"We demand Trump and his administration take immediate and transparent steps to reunite families," said Hiba Rahim, coordinator for CAIR-Florida's north region. "It's inhumane. It's cruel. It's an unacceptable way to treat families coming here seeking refuge."

Trump signed an executive order to keep families together, though Rahim said families still aren't being reunited and the zero tolerance border security policy hasn't ended. Trump also has called an end to due process for immigrants crossing the border.

Similar rallies will be held in Gainesville, San Diego and other places throughout the nation on Saturday.

Buzz Aldrin sues children, alleging misuse of finances

ORLANDO — Apollo 11 moonwalker Buzz Aldrin is suing two of his children and a former business manager, accusing them of misusing his credit cards, transferring money from an account and slandering him by saying he has dementia.

Aldrin's lawsuit filed earlier this month in a Florida state court came a week after his children, Andrew and Janice, filed a petition claiming their father was suffering from memory loss, delusions, paranoia and confusion. They asked for the court to name them his legal guardians, saying Aldrin was associating with new friends who were trying to alienate Aldrin from his family and that he had been spending his assets at "an alarming rate."

Court-appointed mental health experts planned to evaluate Aldrin in Florida on Tuesday and Wednesday.

In April, the 88-year-old Aldrin underwent his own evaluation conducted by a geriatric psychiatrist at UCLA, who said Aldrin scored "superior to normal" for his age on tests.

"I also believe that he is perfectly capable of

providing for his physical health needs, food, clothing and shelter, and is substantially able to manage his finances and resist fraud and undue influence," said Dr. James Spar in a letter to Aldrin's attorney.

In Aldrin's lawsuit, the former astronaut asked a judge to remove Andrew Aldrin from control of his financial affairs, social media accounts and several nonprofit and business enterprises. Andrew Aldrin had been a trustee of his father's trust. Buzz Aldrin said in the complaint that despite revoking the power of attorney he had given his son, Andrew Aldrin continued making financial decisions for him.

"Specifically, defendant Andrew Aldrin, as

trustee, does not inform plaintiff of pending or future business transactions, removes large sums of monies from plaintiffs accounts, and continues to represent plaintiff in business and social capacities despite plaintiff's repeated requests for such representations to be terminated," the lawsuit said.

Aldrin accused his daughter, Janice, in the lawsuit of not acting in his financial interests and conspiracy, and he accused his former manager, Christina Korp, of fraud, exploitation of the elderly and unjust enrichment. Also named in the lawsuit are several businesses and foundations run by the family.

Aldrin's oldest son, James, isn't involved in the legal fight.

commissions meet today**

The Lynn Haven and Callaway city commissions will meet in separate regular meetings at 6 p.m. today.

Lynn Haven will meet at its City Chambers, 108 E.

Ninth St., to tackle several items on the agenda. The commission will discuss second readings for a code amendment for animal adoption fees and regulation updates to water courses and water bodies to keep water clean. The commission also might approve a contract with the Bay Haven Charter Academy Foundation for school resource officer services at Bay Haven Charter Academy for the 2018-19 school year.

Adoption fees in Lynn Haven for male cats and dogs will be set at \$75, and \$85 for females. Other service prices, such as for pet cremations, also will be set. The amendment also adds in language regulating "dangerous" dogs and animal neglect.

In Callaway, commissioners will discuss approving an ordinance allowing trespass warnings on public property and other agenda items. The trespass ordinance allows Bay County Sheriff's Office deputies, who have recently patrolled Veterans Park for vagrants, to issue trespass warnings on public property.

The commission will meet at the Callaway Arts and Conference Center, 500 Callaway Park Way.

\$95,000 IRS bill has DeFuniak Council looking for answers

DeFUNIAK SPRINGS — The DeFuniak Springs City Council voted unanimously Monday to approve a request for assistance from an accounting firm that has agreed to help get answers to questions surrounding a recently arrived federal tax bill of \$95,196.22.

One of the questions will be whether there actually is a debt. Another centers around why a previous finance director had received three other letters from the IRS demanding money and chose to inform no one.

The latest bill arrived May 28 and, though addressed to the city clerk, wound up in the hands of Morgan Hulion, who is working under the title of finance supervisor while the city searches for someone to replace former Finance Director Joe Brown, who left in April of 2017.

Hulion contacted the IRS and was told agents couldn't speak to her unless she agreed to acknowledge and accept the debt owed on behalf of the city, City Attorney Clay Adkinson told council members. Hulion wisely declined, he said.

The request to place the IRS item on the city's

consent agenda was made by Hulion to City Clerk Loretta Laird. Laird said she had not seen the letter prior to late last week.

"They just handed it to me, and I just put it on there," Laird said.

On the consent agenda, however, the item could have been voted on without discussion. A motion by Council Member Ron Kelley pushed it onto the agenda for discussion.

Adkinson told the council that a search of the city's finance department found a file with three other letters, one from 2016 and two from 2017, also demanding the tax bill be resolved. Brown, apparently was the only one who knew of these letters.

Mayor Bob Campbell said he had spoken personally to Brown, who acknowledged receiving the previous letters. He told Campbell the tax matter had been resolved.

Brown apparently sent an email to Campbell on Sunday evening saying the IRS problem had begun with "a 2013 payroll tax issue." City Marshall Weeks addressed the council to tell members he recalled in 2013 employees noticing social security payment discrepancies on their paychecks.

No one could say whether the issues were related, and Adkinson said

it was not immediately clear from paper work discovered whether the IRS problem had, as Brown contended, been resolved.

Council members agreed to engage the firm of Saltmarsh Cleaveland and Gund to engage the IRS and see what answers can be found. Council member Kermit Wright asked about the possibility of prosecuting if the investigation leads to findings of criminal mischief.

The discussion of the bill came on the same night Adkinson reviewed a report he filed in response to grand jury findings released in February following an investigation into city finances. The investigation followed the revelation that the city lost just under \$221,000 in state funding because it had failed to turn in annual audit reports for fiscal years 2013-14 and 2014-15.

Jurors found much wrong with DeFuniak Springs' policies and procedures, and were critical of the failure of county officials to respond to letters from the state warning them of the potential consequences for not completing the audits.

Much of Adkinson's Monday rebuttal pinned the blame for the city's financial woes not so much on policies and procedures, but on the failings of those employed as public

servants.

Brown in particular, received heavy criticism in the Adkinson report. Adkinson later recommended that at some point the council consider taking action that would allow "remedial" action taken against former employees who had engaged in wrongdoing.

"Mr. Brown, who was the director of finance during key time periods when responses to the state of Florida related to untimely audit filings may have been able to avoid or reduce the sanctions imposed," the report states. "Mr. Brown's dereliction of duty, by failing to properly respond or even notify the City Council of the nature of the state's communication in a sufficient manner, prevented the city from being able to mitigate or avoid the imposed financial penalty."

Brown stepped down from the finance director's job in April 2017 to accept a job with the city of Callaway.

In the report Adkinson also faults Mayor Bob Campbell for not acting when letters from the state arrived.

"It appears to be grossly inadequate to report on the failings of the city without directly addressing individuals eschewing their public duty," his report states.

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

Lawmakers: Children being
well cared for in center**

Two members of Florida's congressional delegation toured a shelter where unaccompanied minors are being held south of Miami on Monday, and both agreed the children are being well cared for by Catholic Charities.

Republican Rep. Carlos Curbelo and Democratic Rep. Debbie Wasserman Schultz said during separate news conferences that they disagree with President Donald Trump's former policy of migrant children being separated from parents who are detained at the U.S.-Mexico border. Trump signed an executive order last week ending the policy, but many children remain separated from their relatives.

"We're going to continue working in Washington to end this policy of family separation permanently," Curbelo told reporters. "There must be a way to both keep families together and enforce our country's immigration laws."

Wasserman Schultz said that while the children she saw at the Monsignor Bryan Walsh Children's Village in Cutler Bay seemed happy,

the policy that allowed them to be separated from their parents is "sadistic," "outrageous" and "demonic."

The Children's Village is caring for about 70 children, including 22 migrant minors separated from their parents. Wasserman Schulz said the children she saw Monday were between the ages of 4 and 10 and most were from El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala.

"The children were smiling, they were happy," Curbelo said. "We were able to ask them questions, and they all expressed that they were happy and at peace at this facility."

Brazilian soccer great Kaka might have left Orlando's Major League Soccer team but he's reappearing in the theme park mecca during the World Cup, at least on TV.

Universal Parks & Resorts officials said Kaka is appearing in a commercial starting Saturday that shows off Universal's most popular attractions.

The commercial shows Kaka dribbling a soccer

ball throughout the park and taking a shot at a goal guarded by a Transformer.

Kaka played three seasons with Orlando's soccer team before leaving the team in October and then retiring in December.

State says appeals court
can take up 'Jane Doe' issue**

Attorney General Pam Bondi's office has acknowledged that legal precedents would allow a three-judge panel of a federal appeals court to decide a dispute about whether the identity of a 19-year-old Alachua County woman should be kept secret in a challenge to a Florida law that raised the age to purchase rifles and other long guns. But in a filing Friday at the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, Bondi's office also raised the possibility of later taking the "jurisdiction" issue to the full appeals court or the U.S. Supreme Court. The issue stems from a ruling last month by U.S. District Judge Mark Walker that the woman, identified as "Jane Doe," could not remain anonymous as a plaintiff in a National Rifle Association challenge to the gun law.

The NRA then went to

the Atlanta-based appeals court seeking to allow the woman to remain anonymous. The appeals court, on June 8 raised the question about whether it should consider the anonymity matter and said that if "it is determined that this court is without jurisdiction, this appeal will be dismissed."

The NRA filed the underlying lawsuit March 9 after Gov. Rick Scott signed into law a sweeping school-safety measure that included new gun-related restrictions. The legislation was a response to the Feb. 14 shooting at Parkland's Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School that left 17 students and faculty members dead. In part, the law raised from 18 to 21 the minimum age to purchase rifles and other long guns.

In late April, the NRA filed a motion to add "Jane Doe" as a plaintiff to the lawsuit and asked Walker to allow the woman to remain anonymous due to fear that public exposure could result in "harassment, intimidation, and potentially even physical violence." Bondi's office objected to the anonymity request.

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Finding bodies in Walmart stores a growing phenomenon

MELBOURNE — Peter Unger traveled the world, first in the Navy at the tail end of the Korean War and then as a free spirit searching the ancient paths of India for life's sacred meaning.

Toward the end of his life, Unger, sporting a flowing white beard and well-off financially thanks to his handcrafted jewelry business, sought sanctuary in the idea of living simply.

But in a twist of fate, the 85-year-old who shunned worldly cares was found dead May 7, alone in a nondescript white Ford van that sat parked undisturbed for days at a Walmart, a retail giant seen by many as America's temple of commerce and materialism.

Unger was among the growing number of people around the country who drew their last breaths in Walmart parking lots.

It is not that the parking lots are unsafe. In fact, it is the relative safety of the well-lit and busy lots — combined with a welcoming corporate policy — that has drawn more people like Unger to call the Walmart parking lots home, if only temporarily.

And where people live, they also die.

They include those who are homeless, truckers, immigrants, drug-addled, suicidal or ill — all whose bodies are found nationwide in cars, vans and other vehicles in the parking lots of the retail giant. It is the last stop, one that can go unnoticed amid the daily crush of shoppers searching for

deals, sometimes focused on the rattle of carts instead of their crowded surroundings.

In Brevard, police have investigated almost half a dozen such parking lot deaths since 2015, from the badly decomposed remains of a man found inside a fly-swarmed sedan at a beachside Walmart in the simmering July heat to that of a man who suffered from cancer, found the same year in a sport utility vehicle that sat in a far corner of the Walmart lot in Viera. In both cases, it was the pungent smell that first caught the attention of passers-by or workers.

"It's unfortunate but these do happen. It's not uncommon," said Lt. Cheryl Trainer, spokeswoman for the Melbourne Police Department, an agency that has investigated the bulk of the Walmart parking lot deaths on the Space Coast.

In each case, officers turn up in environmental suits and masks, sorting through the grisly discoveries, from pill bottles to notepads and photos left behind, hoping to piece together the lives of people like Unger who ended up in the parking lots.

The bodies — the shell of their physical humanity faded and decomposed by the elements — are carefully removed and turned over to medical examiners. Family members, if any can be found, are contacted.

Across the nation, the stories bear similar refrains:

— In California, a woman missing for months turned up dead.

Investigators in the February 2016 case said the woman's body remained in a car, parked at the retailer, for up to three months.

— In Illinois, the body of a 49-year-old man who was reported missing more than a month earlier, was found dead May 18, 2018, in a van at a Bradley, Illinois, Walmart. He was seen going into the store on May 1 and then leaving a short time later. He died of natural causes, according to media reports.

— In Ohio, police said a 59-year-old man found April 17, 2018, in a pickup truck at an Airport Thruway Walmart, died of natural causes. The body was in the truck, parked on the side of the retail store since April 8, authorities reported.

— Here in Florida, a Walmart employee walking the parking aisles Feb. 22, 2018, at a Tarpon Springs store reported a strong odor. Officers arrived and found an unidentified body. Police suspected suicide.

Walmart has a long-standing corporate policy that anyone is welcome to stay in its parking lots overnight, depending on local laws. The open-lot policies vary from area to area, depending on the store managers.

"Most of the people we see are actually travelers, people in RVs. There's like a whole society or culture out there. We do go out and check the lots, get the cars and keep an eye out for trash, but our workers aren't peeping into people's cars," said Casey Staheli, a spokesman for Walmart, whose corporate offices are based in

Arkansas. "Unfortunately, they might smell something and that's when it's brought to our attention."

Other retailers in addition to Walmart see similar deaths in their parking areas. A West Melbourne McDonald's was the site of another gruesome discovery in April 2017 when a man's body was found inside a van. He had overdosed. But none are as pervasive or as consistent as the ones that happen at Walmart, which has about 4,000 stores nationwide.

Truckers, recreational vehicle enthusiasts, and others view parking spaces as prime locations to find rest. Weary travelers see the stores as friendly and convenient, modern meccas for the nation's transient, mobile culture. Inside are restrooms, lower-priced groceries, medical supplies and even portable grills for cooking. There's also hot coffee, newspapers and smiles from greeters.

Others also find the lots — despite the hustle and bustle or the sound of the occasional bass-heavy car blasting music — as places of safety and belonging.

Tommy Studstill, a Cocoa minister who advocates for the homeless, readies hygiene products, food and clothes for clients who colonize diverse locations from wooded areas to store lots.

Some who might be living in their automobiles are transient, struggling to hold on to jobs, Studstill said. Some park at Walmart in the cool of night and then move on to other sites in the heat of the day.

"But not everyone who sleeps at Walmart is homeless. They just might not be able to afford a motel room. Walmart is one of the very few retailers that would say, 'Look, don't cause us any problems and you can go ahead and sleep in the parking lot,'" he said.

"These are people who stay low-key. For some, it's extremely embarrassing to be homeless, sleeping in a car. I know one man whose family lives in a car. During the daytime, the wife drops him off at work. That's why I will have to give Walmart credit for what they're doing," Studstill said. "People just don't realize just how many people are out here."

According to estimates from the Brevard Homeless Coalition, about 845 people — sheltered and unsheltered — in Brevard County are homeless, according to statistics from 2017. And many use Walmart as a way station, or a place to find supplies or even live from time to time, says the group's executive director Mark Broms.

For others like Unger, though, the lure of the open road has led them to abandon houses and apartments and live in their vehicles.

Unger, who chose to be homeless for the last decade of his life, had been writing letters to his son, talking about his exploits and a life untethered to materialistic values.

The two last talked face to face about two years ago.

"He was a philosopher, a wisdom-seeker," said Charles Unger of his

father, whose remains were found at the Melbourne Walmart on Wickham Road.

"He liked to teach people to be positive. He could have bought a house but didn't believe in material things and barely had a cellphone," said Unger, who lives just outside of Las Vegas.

But his father did like Walmart, where he found commonality with others who would be passing through and needing a place to rest.

"He could cook in the parking lot," Unger said. "He would tell me that wherever you go in the U.S., you would find professional campers you could associate with. It's like a little subculture."

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

Saudis beat Egypt

Last-second goal gives Green Falcons Cup win

VOLGOGRAD, Russia — The oldest person to play in a World Cup match made some spectacular saves Monday. He also watched two go past him.

Egypt goalkeeper Essam El Hadary, who is 45, took the field for his team's final group match to set the record. Although he saved one penalty, he couldn't stop Saudi Arabia from winning 2-1 in a game between two teams that had already been eliminated.

"I am very sorry for the fans, for everyone in Egypt,"

El Hadary said. "I want to thank my teammates. It was a great honor for me to play."

Salem Aldawsari scored the winner for the Saudis with almost the last kick of the match, volleying past El Hadary from a tight angle inside the Egypt penalty area.

Mohamed Salah, playing for the second time since injuring his left shoulder in last month's Champions League final, had put Egypt ahead in the 22nd minute after deftly controlling a long ball from Abdalla Said and then lobbing goalkeeper

Harden accepts 1st NBA MVP

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — Third time was the charm for James Harden.

The Houston Rockets star was voted the NBA's Most Valuable Player after twice being runner-up, beating out four-time winner LeBron James and Anthony Davis of the Pelicans at the NBA Awards on Monday night.

Harden joined Michael Jordan as the only players to average at least 20 points, eight assists, five rebounds and 1.7 steals in a season. He led the league in scoring, 3-pointers and 50-point games with four while helping the Rockets to an NBA-leading 65 wins.

"The last four years have been like knocking on the door, knocking on the door. Now the moment is finally here," Harden said backstage. "Just every single year you try to come back and be better than you were the year before, and just to be holding that trophy finally, it means a lot."

James didn't attend the show in Barker Hangar at the Santa Monica Airport amid frenzied speculation about his future. He has until Friday to tell the Cavaliers if he will pick up his \$35.6 million option for next season or opt for free agency.

"I'm not going to get emotional," he said from behind dark sunglasses. "She's my backbone in good times and bad times."

Carlson signing is first domino to fall in NHL free agency

The first big free agent re-signing with his own team is just the beginning of what's to come around the NHL.

Defenseman John Carlson signed a \$64 million, eight-year deal with the Stanley Cup champion Washington Capitals. His agent and the representatives for other pending unrestricted free agents were able to start talking to any

interested teams on Sunday at the beginning of the negotiating window that precedes the opening of the market July 1.

Serious talks between New York Islanders center John Tavares and five suitors begin Monday in what should be the next step in shaking out signings and trades.

"There's going to be a lot happening," Chicago Blackhawks general manager Stan Bowman said Saturday in Dallas.

"Things have sort of been at a standstill around the league, but I think with the free agent market being opened up to be able to have discussions with

the agents, that will help, as well. Once you talk, you have an idea that you're going to be able to get a free agent or if you won't, then it might sort of move some teams to start looking at potential trades."

Only a handful of current NHL players were traded over the weekend at the draft: four in a swap between Carolina and Calgary and Washington sending two to Colorado to clear salary-cap space to resign Carlson. Montreal could still try to trade captain Max Pacioretty this week, and Hurricanes GM Don Waddell wants to make a move for a goaltender and said there's a

lot of interest in winger Jeff Skinner.

"We have a lot of other possibilities, pieces to move around," Waddell said.

Tavares headlines this free agent class and his decision — reportedly among the Sharks, Maple Leafs, Stars, Bruins, Lightning, incumbent Islanders and perhaps a few more teams — could set up the rest of the market.

Paul Stastny is the next-best free agent center available followed by the likes of Tyler Bozak, Derek Ryan and Tomas Plekanec. Teams that don't land one of them could turn to Buffalo's Ryan

O'Reilly, who may be a better candidate to be traded July 2 after the Sabres pay him a \$7.5 million bonus.

At \$8 million a year, Carlson ties Brent Burns for the second-highest cap hit in the league among defenseman behind only P.K. Subban's \$9 million with Nashville. Agent Rick Curran fielded calls from other teams Sunday before the deal got done with the Capitals.

"Whatever your intentions are, you still have to do your due diligence because there's more to it for me than that,"

It was Salah's second goal at the World Cup, and Egypt's first in open play at the World Cup since 1934.

Salman Alfaraj got the Saudis level with a penalty kick in first-half stoppage time after Ali Gabr brought down Fahad Almuwallad in the area. The decision was confirmed after a video review and the penalty was taken in the sixth minute of injury time.

"I think that in general we kept control of the pace, we kept possession ... and I think that we deserved to win," Saudi coach Juan Antonio Pizzi said. "Talking about the future, well, the association will have to decide what they're going to do."

Almuwallad had earlier missed a chance to equalize when El Hadary saved his penalty. The veteran goalkeeper dived to his right and flicked his left hand up to push the shot onto the bar before it was cleared.

El Hadary was unable to repeat the feat at the end of the half, going the wrong way and having no chance as Alfaraj scored from the spot.

El Hadary also made a series of good saves in the second half to deny Saudi Arabia, notably in the 69th minute when he tipped a header from Hussain Almoqahwi over the bar. A minute later, he parried away a goal-bound header from Muhammad Asiri.

He had no chance with Aldawsari's last-gasp winner, however.

El Hadary overtook Faryd Mondragon as the oldest person to play at the World Cup. The Colombia goalkeeper was 43 when he came on as a late substitute in his team's 4-1 victory over Japan four years ago at the World Cup in Brazil.

"It is true that it was a special record today and many, many people in Egypt love him and support him," Egypt coach Hector Cuper said. "and he has played a great game."

URUGUAY 3, RUSSIA 0: Luis Suarez and Edinson Cavani scored a goal each and Uruguay went on to defeat Russia, finishing undefeated in group play and handing the host nation its first loss of the World Cup. Both teams were already assured of spots in the knockout round, but Uruguay's victory put it at the top of Group A and looking toward a match in Sochi on Saturday against the second-place finisher from Group B. Uruguay, which also benefited from an own-goal in the first half, had its third straight shutout of the tournament after consecutive 1-0 victories over Egypt and Saudi Arabia. By advancing to the round of 16 with victories over Saudi Arabia and Egypt, Russia secured its best World Cup showing in the post-Soviet era.

SPAIN 2, MOROCCO 2: A video replay in injury time gave Spain the goal it needed to win Group B at the World Cup. Spain substitute Iago Aspas scored the late equalizer in a draw with Morocco. His clever deflection off a cross from Dani Carvajal was initially disallowed for offside, but the video assistant referee overruled the call at Kaliningrad Stadium. Another substitute, Morocco forward Youssef En Nesyri, headed in a goal in the 81st minute to give already-eliminated Morocco hope of a victory.

Sunny Sochi turns into World Cup playground

SOCHI, Russia — Warm weather, beaches, amusement parks.

It's not exactly what Australian fan Adam McKinley expected to find when he decided to make the trip to Russia for the World Cup.

But that's exactly what he got in Sochi, the city introduced to the world as a winter destination during the Olympics four years ago, with its coastal location on the Black Sea and its majestic snow-capped peaks a short distance away.

"Whenever I think of Russia, I picture something like cold Siberia. I picture, like, real cold stuff," McKinley said. "I've been blown away by this. We even went for a swim and it was lovely. It was just nice and warm. We've been pleasantly surprised."

Sochi wasn't so cold during the Olympics, either, with temperatures frequently climbing into the mid-50s Fahrenheit in the Olympic Park. The chillier mountains are roughly an hour's drive away.

But in the summer, the snow is replaced by sun, lots of it, as Russia's seaside playground explodes into a scene more akin to Southern California or Miami Beach than Siberia.

"The moment we saw Peru was going to play in Sochi, we wanted to come here," said Peru supporter Luis Medina, one of the thousands of World Cup fans who have come to the city. "We knew this was going to be the place to be."

Even the teams based in Sochi were taking full advantage of the region's attractions. Brazil was feeling right at home, enjoying the warm temperatures and a private beach at the team's hotel in possibly the closest setting to what it had back home before traveling to Russia.

"We are having lunch and

breakfast with a view of the sea. That's a plus for us," goalkeeper Alisson said shortly after Brazil arrived.

The Brazilians fought hard to secure Sochi as their base. The Austrian federation initially picked the five-star hotel where Brazil is staying, but luckily for the Brazilians, Austria did not end up qualifying for the World Cup.

Germany stayed in Sochi during the Confederations Cup last year, but this time it chose a different location in part because it said it couldn't secure a proper private training field.

The Capitals did not tender a qualifying offer to playoff star Devante Smith-Pelly, who will now become an attractive option to other teams as an unrestricted free agent.

Washington said it's still negotiating with Smith-Pelly, who scored seven goals in the postseason and would have had arbitration rights.

HARTFORD, CONN. UConn president: Ollie made serious violations

UConn President Susan Herbst told Kevin Ollie she was upholding his firing because the former men's basketball coach had a pattern of breaking NCAA rules and committed serious violations, according to a letter obtained by The Associated Press. The school released the June 19 letter from Herbst to Ollie on Monday in response to open records requests from the AP and other news organizations. Ollie has asserted that the violations which led to his firing in March were minimal and isolated. Herbst refutes that idea in the letter, writing that "eventually even a series of 'isolated' or 'de minimis' violations can become a pattern of non-compliance, which is what occurred in the Men's Basketball program under your leadership."

She said the violations "are serious under any definition which may be applied and constitute just cause for your termination." Ollie's attorney, Jacques Parenteau, said the minor issues cited by Herbst can't be called a pattern "just by lumping them together and claiming a pattern exists."

CANBERRA, AUSTRALIA Kangaroo stops play during soccer match

The Australian soccer team competing at the World Cup is called the Socceroos. But a different kind of soccer-roo has dominated a pitch for half an hour in Canberra during a women's match.

The misguided marsupial made its first appearance on the stadium soccer field during the half time break on Sunday afternoon in a match between Canberra's two top teams — Canberra Football Club and Belconnen United, Canberra FC official Amber Harvey said on Monday.

The male eastern gray kangaroo bounded back during the second half, indifferent to efforts to drive him away and delaying play for 32 minutes, Harvey said.

"It was just a real menace," Harvey said.

"A few people came close to it to see if they could maybe get it to move on. It stood up pretty tall. I think it was just over 6 feet, so they backed off pretty quickly. But I don't think anyone was alarmed too much by it," she added.

Players and officials tried to drive the unexpected pitch invader away by kicking balls at him with little impact. Video showed it apparently using his long hind legs and powerful tail to deflect balls from the goal area.

"It didn't react. It just kind of lay down," Harvey said.

A coach in a pickup truck eventually chased the roo from the stadium through a break in the fence into a car park from where it disappeared.

Rafael Nadal is back at No. 1 in the ATP rankings, retaking the top spot from Roger Federer after just one week.


