At least 130 temporarily homeless; cause of fire under investigation

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EASTPOINT — As the smoke cleared Tuesday, the devastation wrought by Sunday evening's Lime Rock wildfire came sharply into view.

Residents were allowed to return Tuesday morning to the 36 properties along Ridge and Wilderness roads, bordering the southwestern edge of Tate's Hell State Forest. Where they had lived just days before stood nothing

but blackened stumps, a layer of fine ash and piles of debris, the residue from a fast-moving wildfire that torched about 820 acres early Sunday evening in a matter of a couple hours.

"We lost everything. Everything. Burned to the ground," said Paul Sanders, as he stood on his property at 582 Ridge Road with his 8-year-old grandson John Paul.

The two had been close ever since the Franklin County

Haligas calls for quicker marina progress

PANAMA CITY — After months of no apparent progress on the fate of the Panama City Marina, the City Commission has given staff a push to get moving on needed repairs.

While talks are underway about finding a new developer, interim City Manager Jared Jones confirmed, the commission, led by Commissioner Jenna Haligas, directed the city to move forward with the things they do have control of — namely repairing the bulkheads, or retaining walls which keep the marina intact.

"I understand we are trying to wait some and trying to figure out how we are going to put it all together," Haligas said. "But, I really, really wish staff would at least go ahead" and put in a request for qualifications or request for proposals "for the bulkheads." She added that the current sidewalks are "very dangerous."

In 2013, the city took out a \$12.9 million loan to make repairs to the seawall, where the tiebacks have rusted away. Parts of the work have been done, but the T-dock portion of the repairs and more than \$7 million of the loan still remain.

The city had been waiting to make the repairs at the T-dock — which will involve ripping up the sidewalks and roadway — until they had a developer secured. The developer would rebuild the area in line with the agreed-upon vision for redevelopment.

However, after the deal with Sonnenblich Development fell through, the commission directed city staff during the March goal session to "fast track" moving ahead on the T-dock repairs, and Haligas, Commissioner Billy Rader and Mayor Greg Brudnicki all seemed slightly confused that the work hadn't pushed forward.

Jones said starting the process would be "no problem."

Director of Public Works Neil Fravel said the engineering work for the bulkheads is done, but the design for the top part — the roads, green spaces and sidewalks — is not finalized.

‘It was bad, it was really bad’

Good Samaritans recall Panama City Marina boating accident

PANAMA CITY — Kip Snell was 20 minutes away from packing up his boat, the Marquesa, after a rather unsuccessful day of snapper fishing and taking his family home to Dothan, Alabama, on Sunday afternoon.

Which means Snell and his family also were 20 minutes away from not being in the right place when a fellow boater fell off his 17-foot Aquasport just off the west

side of the Panama City Marina, leaving his boat to spin uncontrollably in the brackish St. Andrew Bay.

"It was just the craziest thing I've ever seen," Snell said in an interview with The News Herald on Monday. "It was bad, it was really bad."

That afternoon, Brad Martin Bramblett, 59, was killed when he fell into the water and was struck by the prop of his boat. The incident remains under investigation by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission.

Snell, a former police officer, said he was cleaning his boat when he first heard the

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High court OKs Trump travel ban

WASHINGTON — A sharply divided Supreme Court upheld President Donald Trump's ban on travel from several mostly Muslim countries Tuesday, the conservative majority taking his side in a major ruling supporting his presidential power. A dissenting liberal justice said the court was making a historic mistake by refusing to recognize the ban discriminates against Muslims.

The 5-4 decision was a big victory for Trump in the court's first substantive ruling on one of his administration's policies. It also was the latest demonstration of a newly invigorated conservative majority and a bitter defeat for the court's liberals.

The ruling came on an issue that has been central for Trump, from his campaign outbursts against "radical Islamic terrorism" through his

presidency. He tweeted a quick reaction — "Wow!" — and then celebrated at greater length before TV cameras.

Chief Justice John Roberts wrote the majority opinion for the five conservative justices, including Trump nominee Neil Gorsuch, who got his seat only after Republicans blocked President Barack Obama's nominee for the last 10 months of Obama's term.

Roberts wrote that the travel ban was well within U.S. presidents' considerable authority over immigration and responsibility for keeping the nation safe. He rejected the challengers' claim of anti-Muslim bias that rested in large part on Trump's own tweets and statements over the past three years.

But Roberts was careful not to endorse either Trump's statements about immigration in general or Muslims in particular, including his campaign call for "a complete and

total shutdown of Muslims entering the United States."

"We express no view on the soundness of the policy," Roberts wrote.

The travel ban has been fully in place since December, when the justices put the brakes on lower court rulings that had ruled the policy out of bounds and blocked part of it from being enforced. It applies even to people with close relatives in the United States and other strong connections to the country.

In a dissent she summarized aloud in court, Justice Sonia Sotomayor said, "History will not look kindly on the court's misguided decision today, nor should it." Justices Stephen Breyer, Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Elena Kagan also dissented.

Sotomayor wrote that based on the evidence in the case "a reasonable observer would conclude that the Proclamation inflicts upon countless families and individuals, many of whom are United States citizens."

She likened the case to the discredited *Korematsu v. U.S.* decision

that upheld the detention of Japanese-Americans during World War II. Roberts responded in his opinion that "Korematsu has nothing to do with this case" and "was gravely wrong the day it was decided."

The travel ban was among the court's biggest cases this term and the latest in a string of 5-4 decisions in which the conservative side of the court, bolstered by the addition of Gorsuch last year, prevailed. He was chosen by Trump after Republicans in the Senate refused to grant a hearing to federal appeals Judge Merrick Garland who was nominated by Obama in March 2016.

Soon after the ruling, the campaign of Senate

Majority Leader Mitch McConnell of Kentucky, who orchestrated the strategy to keep the high court seat away from Obama, tweeted a photo of McConnell and Gorsuch.

The Trump policy applies to travelers from five countries with overwhelmingly Muslim populations — Iran, Libya, Somalia, Syria and Yemen. It also affects two non-Muslim countries, blocking travelers from North Korea and some Venezuelan government officials and their families. A sixth majority Muslim country, Chad, was removed from the list in April after improving "its identity-management and information sharing practices," Trump said in a proclamation.

The administration had pointed to the Chad decision to show that the restrictions were premised only on national security concerns.

The challengers, though, argued that the court could not just ignore all that had happened, beginning with Trump's campaign tweets to prevent the entry of Muslims into the United States.

Trump had proposed a broad, all-encompassing Muslim ban during the presidential campaign in 2015, drawing swift rebukes from Republicans as well as Democrats. And within a week of taking office, the first travel ban was announced with little notice, sparking chaos at airports and protests across the nation.

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Flooding complicates cave search for soccer team

MAE SAI, Thailand — Efforts to rescue 12 boys and their soccer coach who have been missing inside a flooded cave in northern Thailand for three days hinge on pumping out water so that navy divers have room to operate, the first high-level Thai official to visit the site said Tuesday.

Interior Minister Anupong Paojinda told reporters that navy SEAL divers leading the search are seriously handicapped by muddy water that has filled some chambers of the large cave to the ceilings. He said the divers can proceed only when enough water is pumped out so there is space between the water and the ceiling to make it safer to work. The divers will also soon start using special oxygen tanks that provide longer diving times, he said. A SEAL diver said the water is so murky that even with lights they cannot see where they are going underwater, so they need to be able to lift their heads above the water.

Anupong said rescuers would be working night and day in the dark cave.

“The SEAL team will be working nonstop because it’s already dark here too,” he said. “So night and day doesn’t make a big difference. They’ll just need to rotate.”

About a dozen navy divers and other rescuers re-entered the cave on Tuesday morning to search for the boys, aged 11-16, who have been missing since their coach took them to the Tham Luang Nang Non cave complex on Saturday after a practice match. But the search had to be suspended again because of high water.

Divers have been seeking

a way forward through the chambers of the cave complex, but have been forced to suspend their search several times. The authorities are also seeking alternative ways in, using helicopters and search parties on foot to find possible holes in the ceilings of other parts of the cave. A small glimmer of hope was dashed Tuesday afternoon after explorers found two fissures in the rock on the mountain in which the cave is located. After evaluation, experts found neither could be used as a “chimney” to gain access to the cave.

Rain that fell overnight increased the difficulty of exploring inside the cave. However, the initial chambers near the cave’s entrance are dry, and a power line was extended inside to provide light and ventilation and help the divers communicate with those outside.

The boys and their 25-year-old coach entered the cave in Chiang Rai province late

Saturday afternoon. A mother reported that her son did not return from soccer practice that day, setting off the search.

Relatives of the missing boys and others performed a ritual Tuesday morning calling for those who are missing. They played drums and gongs and two relatives held fishing nets as symbols to fish out lost spirits from the cave. Organizer Jirata Kodyee said the ritual was a traditional way of showing support for the boys’ families.

The cave complex extends several miles and has wide chambers and narrow passageways with rocky outcrops and changes in elevation. Still, officials have said they are hopeful the boys found a safe space away from the floods.

Rising waters Monday evening frustrated efforts to search farther in the cave, and efforts were halted temporarily. During the night, rescue teams and electricians extended a power line half a mile and communication lines into the cave.

Enemy turned ally: Poliovirus is used to fight brain tumors

One of the world’s most dreaded viruses has been turned into a treatment to fight deadly brain tumors. Survival was better than expected for patients in a small study who were given genetically modified poliovirus, which helped their bodies attack the cancer, doctors report.

It was the first human test of this and it didn’t help most patients or improve median survival. But many who did respond seemed to have long-lasting benefit: About 21 percent were alive at three years versus 4 percent in a comparison group of previous brain tumor patients.

Similar survival trends have been seen with some other therapies that enlist the immune system against different types of cancer. None are sold yet for brain tumors.

“This is really a first step,” and doctors were excited to see any survival benefit in a study testing safety, said one researcher, Duke University’s Dr. Annick Desjardins.

Preliminary results were to be discussed Tuesday at a conference in Norway and published online by the New England Journal of Medicine.

Making an enemy an ally

Brain tumors called glioblastomas often recur after initial treatment. Sen. John McCain is being treated for one now. Immunotherapy

drugs like Keytruda help fight some cancers that spread to the brain but have not worked well for ones that start there.

Polio ravaged generations until a vaccine came out in the 1950s. The virus invades the nervous system and can cause paralysis. Doctors at Duke wanted to take advantage of the strong immune system response it spurs to try to fight cancer. With the help of the National Cancer Institute, they genetically modified poliovirus so it would not harm nerves but still infect tumor cells.

The treatment is dripped directly into the brain through a thin tube. Inside the tumor, the immune system recognizes the virus as foreign and mounts an attack.

When doctors explained the idea to Michael Niewinski, it seemed a feat “like putting a man on the moon,” he said. The 33-year-old from Boca Raton, Florida, was treated last August, and said a recent scan seemed to show some tumor shrinkage.

“I’m pain-free, symptom-free,” he said.

Study results

The study tested the modified poliovirus on 61 patients whose tumors had recurred after initial treatments. Median survival was about a year, roughly the same as for a small group of similar patients given other brain tumor treatments at Duke. After two years, the poliovirus group started faring better.

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Migrants meet hostile reception

MILAN — On both sides of the Atlantic, migrants flooding across borders by the hundreds each day have met a hostile reception and governments unable to agree on how to cope with the arrivals. In Europe, where far-right parties have joined the governments in Italy and Austria and made gains elsewhere, even the most basic decision of which port would accept a ship filled with migrants has been fraught.

On Tuesday, yet another rescue boat loaded with migrants struggled to find safe harbor in the Mediterranean, while in Austria police cadets playing the role of desperate refugees rattled a chain-link fence demanding to be let in as part of a high-profile training exercise to test the mettle of a new border force charged with preventing an influx of migrants.

“We have had migratory crises in the past, but that is not what we are going through now. What we are living through now is a European political crisis,” French President Emmanuel Macron said after a day-long meeting with Pope Francis at the Vatican during which they discussed the issue.

The European crisis mirrors the one in the United States, where a broad-ranging Republican immigration bill was set for a vote Wednesday, with little certainty that it would survive. With legislation in disarray and a global uproar over the separation of more than 2,300 migrant children from their parents, the Trump administration abruptly reversed a key element of its zero-tolerance immigration policy last week, halting the practice of separating immigrant families caught illegally crossing

the border, but leaving more than 2,000 separated children in limbo in government-contracted shelters.

The standoffs in Europe involve multiple governments, all running their own immigration policies but with open borders among them.

Twice this month, as calm seas and warm weather spurred greater numbers to set sail, rescue ships filled with migrants have been left in a holding pattern in the Mediterranean. The latest standoff involves the German-operated Lifeline, which has sailed for five days without safe harbor. France, Portugal, Italy and at least one other country agreed to divide up the migrants on board, and said Malta would take in the ship.

But the German aid group operating the ship said Malta had sent a message refusing entry into its territorial waters, further confusing an agreement that had taken days to negotiate. Malta also flatly refused to accept an empty rescue ship, the Aquarius, which needed some mechanical work before it could resume its sweeps of the Mediterranean. The ship headed to the French port city of Marseille instead.

It was the Aquarius that touched off last week's show-down, when the ship, operated by French aid groups and carrying 630 migrants, had its journey to land extended by a week after Malta and Italy refused docking rights. Spain ultimately accepted the passengers, and the Aquarius traveled an additional 900 miles to get there.

“It's five useless days to come here when the Aquarius is not on the migrant route to rescue, and that's a shame in terms of saving human lives,” Frederic Penard of SOS Mediterranee said in Marseille, where the ship was expected on Friday. Italy,

which believes the rescue ships operated by aid groups only encourage more migrants, also refused docking in Sicily.

Italy's new right-wing interior minister, Matteo Salvini, has contended that the rescue boats essentially provide “taxi service” at sea for the human traffickers.

But with calm seas and fair weather, more migrants continued to take their chances crossing from North Africa.

Spain's Maritime Rescue Service picked up over 400 people from the Mediterranean on Monday, bringing the total number of rescued migrants to around 1,800 in just four days.

Macron has pushed for asylum demands to be processed in North Africa before the rickety boats attempt the crossing, but so far no country in the region has agreed to play host. Algeria has expelled more than 13,000 migrants into the Sahara Desert since last May, forcing them to walk without food or water, according to an Associated Press investigation. And in Libya, which has turned back dozens of migrant boats, there have been complaints of rampant human rights abuses

against migrants in detention.

On Tuesday, Austrian police staged a high-profile training exercise simulating an influx of migrants along its frontier with Slovenia to demonstrate how it would deal with such a crisis.

Hundreds of officers in heavy armor, backed by soldiers and Black Hawk helicopters flying overhead, performed a dry run for the media near Spielfeld, 110 miles south of Vienna. The town was a major crossing point for migrants in late 2015, but has hardly seen any arrivals recently.

The “migrants” were played by 200 Austrian police cadets, who chanted and rattled a metal fence, demanding to be let in.

Austria's top security official said the exercise was necessary and lawful, dismissing concerns at home and abroad.

“A state which, if things come to a head, can't protect its borders effectively, loses its credibility,” Interior Minister Herbert Kickl told reporters. “I'm strongly determined that events like those in 2015 must never happen again.”

“This has nothing to do with inhumanity, this isn't unlawful, this isn't indecent,” he said.

“This is what the law demands from us. It is what the people expect from us.”

Kickl's far-right Freedom Party has pushed for a hard line against migrants for years and saw a surge in support following the 2015 migrant crisis, when thousands of people fleeing war and hardship in the Middle East and Africa poured through Europe's open borders daily, triggering a humanitarian and political crisis that has left deep divisions on the continent.

This summer's numbers come nowhere near the 2015-2016 migrant crisis, but German Chancellor Angela Merkel is under heavy pressure from conservative allies in Bavaria to turn away migrants who come through other European countries.

Merkel, whose decision to allow migrants stuck in Austria and Hungary to come to Germany was initially welcomed by voters, has warned that unilaterally closing borders could trigger a string of national measures by individual countries that would further divide Europe.

Speaking in Berlin, Merkel said most EU countries are more concerned about preventing migrants from illegally entering Europe in the first place.

Neighboring Slovenia protested the Austrian exercise, saying its own forces are already doing enough to protect the borders of the Schengen travel zone within which Europeans can travel freely without passports.

“I even see (the exercise) as somewhat provocative,” Slovenian Prime Minister Miro Cerar said Tuesday, according to the official STA news agency. Cerar said the number of migrants entering Austria from Slovenia has not increased and described his country as an “exemplary” protector of the Schengen border.

third-grader was a baby, but in the past two months, after the death of the boy's mother at age 34, they have bonded even more tightly.

"He had pictures of his mama, we had all her pictures up on the walls," Sanders said. "And he lost all his clothes and toys and stuff."

Sanders also still has his daughter, Cynthia Gilbert, who fled safely as the flames neared the family's home, and her husband, Jason, who had been out of town Sunday — attending a class on fighting fires.

But gone is the family's mobile home, plus a 28-by-28-foot backroom Sanders had added on.

The oysterman is fortunate to still have two important tools of his trade that many of his neighbors lost. The back of his mullet boat caught fire, but it was put out, and both it and another oyster boat were pulled to safety by sheriff's deputies.

"We did everything we could to help," Sheriff A.J. Smith said. As the fire

neared Sunday, some residents stood sentry armed with water hoses, but as the flames crept closer just before 6 p.m., many had to be firmly ordered to leave.

Deputies did their best to keep order, but with acrid black smoke billowing around them, it wasn't always easy to stay on the narrow dirt roads that crisscross the affected section of Eastpoint. At least two vehicles still stand beside the road, gutted by the flames, along with scores of others that never left their homes.

The sheriff's GoFundMe page has so far raised more than \$60,000, with one goal in mind — "Every bit is to buy homes for people," Smith said.

Victim advocates from the sheriff's office and state attorney's office have been counseling those affected by the fire.

Emergency Management Director Pam Brownell said 136 people were directly affected and are now possibly homeless, among the 250 or so who had registered with the American Red Cross as of Monday evening. She and Joe Taylor, director of the Franklin's Promise Coalition, the

long-term recovery organization designated by the county's emergency management, were out doing a closer inventory late Tuesday afternoon, bringing food and water to the barren properties as they assess the details of the disaster.

Sharon Tyler, who directs the Capital Area Red Cross, said after a full house Sunday evening,

the Eastpoint Church of God had no overnight stays Monday, but they plan to keep it open as shelter anyway.

"We expect the population to increase," she said, noting that several people might find that the emergency housing they have found at area hotels and friends' homes isn't sustainable for much longer.

"We're keeping that option open," Tyler said.

Franklin's Promise is looking for long-term rentals for the affected families, but with ongoing and growing demand for short-term transient housing geared toward tourists, such options might be few and far between.

The cause of the fire won't be known until

the end of the week at the earliest, Agriculture Commissioner Adam Putnam said after viewing the destruction via a helicopter tour with state forestry officials Tuesday. Putnam met with first responders and Duke Energy linemen as well, to thank them, and talked with affected families.

"We got a bird's-eye view of total devastation, as far as you can see," Sheriff Smith said. "It's chilling."

Putnam's department has three fire investigators on the ground, as well as scores of state foresters who have been busy taking steps that have kept the fire contained and all but out, with only pockets of embers still smoking.

Todd Schroeder, a public information officer with the Florida Forest Service, said the fire was stopped dead in its tracks by a mitigation road south of Wilderness Road, which the department had kept maintained in recent years.

It was that line that kept the fire from spreading into an adjacent subdivision. Otherwise, "It would have burned right into Whispering Pines," he said.

commotion. He wrote it off as someone on a jet ski, or someone who had just caught a really big fish and was celebrating, until he realized he was hearing the same noise over and over and it dawned on him that what he was hearing wasn't a

particularly rambunctious jet skier. He walked onto his deck to see the Aquasport circling in the water with no driver behind the wheel.

"At that point, it hit me that the sound I heard was probably the driver falling out of the boat," he recalled. "I went back inside and looked at my son Kaleb and said, 'Kaleb, we've got to go. I don't have time to explain, I think there's

someone in the water.'

"It's probably the fastest we've ever run the boat, to be honest with you," he added.

Because of the time of day — about 4 p.m. — and the angle of the sun, the glare on the water made it difficult to spot the boater. Kip Snell said he remembered getting on the radio and "hollering" to the "Coast Guard, FWC, whoever can hear" while he and his son fought the sun

to get eyes on the boater.

Then, Kip Snell saw it — a glimpse of a head rising to the surface.

Kaleb Snell saw it too, and without a second thought, jumped off the side of the Marquesa into the bay.

"I saw a man in distress, and with doing what I bered getting on the radio and 'hollering' to the 'Coast Guard, FWC, whoever can hear' while he and his son fought the sun

Making his way over to the boater, Kaleb Snell could see the man had only enough energy to wave his right hand above the water.

"He looked at me and said, 'Help me,'" Kaleb Snell said. "And I said, 'I've got you.'"

With the help of a rope tossed by his father, Kaleb Snell managed to get the boater back to the Marquesa, where Kip Snell

realized this wasn't a random boater, but Brad Bramblett, a friendly man who had been living on a sailboat at the Panama City Marina for the past two months.

"I said, 'Brad, you've got to help us,'" Kip Snell said while grabbing Bramblett's hands and, with help from his son in the water, hoisting him on board.

Then Kip and Kaleb Snell caught sight of Bramblett's leg, which had been struck by his boat's prop.

"I was thinking, 'Oh God, this is bad. This is really bad,'" Kip Snell said.

Grabbing supplies from around the boat, Kaleb Snell fashioned a makeshift tourniquet for Bramblett's leg, but in the process, realized he couldn't get a pulse on him and started CPR. Kaleb said he felt a pulse start up again, and kept at it until they

returned back to marina fuel dock and were met by first responders, who kept up chest compressions on Bramblett as he was loaded into a waiting ambulance and taken to Bay Medical Sacred Heart, where he was later pronounced dead.

The Coast Guard later wrangled Bramblett's boat by using ropes to foul the prop and it was towed back to the marina.

The incident has left some members of the Snell family shaken, Kip Snell said. It was a terrible thing to see, he said, and while some people have reached out and called them heroes, both father and son are adamant that they were just doing what was right.

"I didn't start those engines to go be a hero," Kip Snell said. "I started them to help someone."

Form, not function?

New tax form is now smaller, but filing is not simpler

The Trump administration may deliver on its promise to reduce a commonly used tax form to postcard size, but it does not shrink the workload for many Americans filling out their taxes.

A draft copy of the new 1040 income tax form given to The Associated Press by a staffer on the Ways & Means Committee shows that the form will be reduced from two full pages to a double-sided half page. But the legwork to claim many popular deductions and provide other critical information has been moved to one of six accompanying worksheets.

The postcard-sized form was a big selling point for the administration during its promotion of the divisive new tax law — President Donald Trump even kissed at one meeting to show his

approval. Experts say that while the law does simplify the process for some Americans, many will still have to go through the same hoops to complete their taxes with this new format.

The tax law greatly increases the standard deduction, meaning that millions of Americans will claim the deduction and skip the time-consuming process of itemizing on their taxes. The Tax Policy Center estimates that about 27 million fewer taxpayers will itemize under the new law.

Taxpayers may still need to crunch the numbers to see if they should itemize or not. And 19 million filers will continue to itemize, according to TPC, so they will still need to fill out one or more of the six additional forms.

The supplemental paperwork would be needed to make common tax moves, such as a reporting an educator expense or claiming a deduction for interest paid on a student loan, as well as reporting childcare expenses and retirement savings contribution credits.

“Don’t confuse creating a

postcard with simplifying a tax filing. It’s not the same thing at all,” said Howard Gleckman, a senior fellow at the Tax Policy Center.

Gleckman said that most taxpayers are going to have to fill out one if not more of the new accompanying forms. And the new structure makes some beneficial components of tax law, such as the ability to claim the earned income credit — which is designed to help low to moderate-income working people — harder to find.

The postcard is more of a concept than practice anyhow.

The bulk of taxpayers complete their taxes online, meaning they still answer all the same questions regardless of how the paperwork is laid out. And unlike a postcard from vacation, those that fill out their taxes on a postcard will likely want to send it in an envelope to protect their private information on the document, such as their Social Security number.

“I am not sure this is going to make a whole lot of difference,” Gleckman said.

LONDON Uber wins back license in London, but on probation

A London court gave ride-hailing firm Uber a shorter than usual license to keep operating in the capital, accepting Tuesday the firm’s claim that it has changed its aggressive corporate tactics and is now a more responsible corporate citizen.

But Chief Magistrate Emma Arbuthnot granted an operating license lasting just 15 months, short of the five-year permit Uber had had been seeking. That means the company will remain under scrutiny and serve a probation period of sorts in meeting the terms of regulators at Transport for London.

“The rapid and very recent changes undergone by (Uber) lead me to conclude that a shorter period will enable TFL to test out the new arrangements,” the judge wrote in her ruling.

MIAMI Royal Caribbean invests in ship to attract millennials

Royal Caribbean has invested \$120 million in a 15-year-old ship as part of a plan to attract younger travelers with shorter cruises.

A company news release says the Mariner of the Seas arrived at its new home last week in PortMiami. The ship will offer 4-night weekday and 3-night weekend trips from Miami to the Bahamas. Its first voyage left Monday.

Besides restaurants and bars, other new attractions include a virtual reality bungee trampoline, a pair of racer waterslides, a glow-in-the-dark laser tag room, a room escape challenge and a surf simulator.

Restaurants, houses and growth runways

While in high school, I worked at my parents’ lunch restaurant in Lake Zurich, Illinois, then a sleepy little town that has since become a booming suburb of Chicago. Even though restaurants often are bad investments, my parents opened one anyway. My Mom said, and I remember it well: “People have to eat.” Mom built a solid business which she later sold when she and my Dad traded frigid Illinois winters for sunny Florida.

I was thinking about my Mom’s “people have to eat”

rationale recently while researching the large, publicly traded homebuilders. The shares of these companies have fallen since the start of the year, presumably because interest rates have risen slightly and because the pace of sales has slowed a bit. I believe that the country’s largest homebuilders have a multi-year growth runway ahead of them, so naturally the falling share prices further piqued my interest. Rising rates or not, people have to live somewhere, as well as eat.

In the past, homebuilding was a relatively low margin, capital intensive, boom-and-bust industry dominated by thousands of local builders. Small homebuilders still put up the majority of new houses in America, but that’s changing quickly. The 10 largest homebuilders have been growing their market share and now construct almost a third of all new homes. Industry consolidation often is a sign that the remaining

players will become more profitable since they face less aggressive competition.

Less competition isn’t their only advantage, though. Homebuilding costs are rising, which also should benefit the larger players because they can borrow money cheaper than smaller builders; buy materials in bulk and save money; and spread their design and labor costs over more projects. All this means more profit per home than subscale competitors.

Additionally, the largest homebuilders are moving to an “asset light” business model which has substantially improved their returns on capital. Instead of having their money tied up in land that might or might not be developed in the near future, some homebuilders are increasingly using purchase options to reserve land they might buy rather than buying the land outright.

This sometimes means they end up paying a few percent more for a parcel

of land. But by securing construction sites this way, companies can build more homes where the demand (and prices) are currently highest and forgo projects that might not be as profitable. In the old days when a project got scrapped, the homebuilders had to find a buyer for their land, which isn’t always an easy task. Now, when a project doesn’t work out, they walk away from the land and forfeit the small option payment.

Method of ingestion is a patient choice

As a general rule, smoking, as most define it, is bad for you.

But the court battle around whether medical marijuana patients can legally smoke their medicine at home is ridiculous and petty — much like the draconian federal laws that classify marijuana as a Schedule I drug with “no currently accepted medical use” — just like heroin, LSD and methamphetamine.

Floridians spoke clearly and loudly in 2016, when 71 percent of the voters approved the amendment allowing the use of marijuana for medical purposes. And supporters of allowing the legally obtained marijuana to be ingested via smoking also are speaking loudly, and with good reason. The amendment included language that smoking was illegal in public, by default signaling it was legal in the privacy of one’s home.

Just as there are laws on the books that forbid things like consummating a relationship or urinating in public, by default allowing such activity in the privacy of your home, we are certain there is not a law that specifically says you are allowed to relieve yourself in your home’s toilet. Laws tend to tell you what you can’t do, or put parameters on what you can do, not state the obvious.

Yet the 1st District Court of Appeal refuses to lift a stay on a judge’s ruling that would have cleared patients to smoke their medicine in the privacy of their homes.


Opponents — including state health officials — weakly argue that because the amendment did not expressly say smoking was allowed, it is illegal. That is like saying it might be illegal to drink on the beach all year because while a local law prohibits the possession of alcohol on our sandy white beaches for a defined period during March, it doesn’t specifically say you can drink on the beach the rest of the year.

Bottom line: The state needs to withdraw its opposition to smokable medical marijuana. If state health officials want to discourage smoking, perhaps an education campaign — TV commercials and print and Web ads, for example — are in order, directing people to alternatives like vape pens that distribute marijuana oil and, therefore, aren’t as harmful to the lungs.

But arguing it is illegal instead is a copout akin to outlawing fatty foods rather than educating people on why they’ll be healthier and likely live a lot longer if they lose weight and eat healthy foods.

For those who talk about the dysfunction of government, the futility of “fighting city hall,” this is a prime example of government employees being unreasonably defiant. The voters have spoken; they have jumped through the system’s hoops. Supporters of medical marijuana — not to mention the patients themselves, who are suffering as this battle slowly wends its way through the court system — deserve a speedy resolution to this ineptitude.

NEW HOLLAND, Ohio — The mayor — only half-jokingly — says he thinks Village Hall offices might be bugged.

The county sheriff's office has charged the village police chief with criminal trespassing.

The chief has criminally charged a local woman with making false accusations against him.

That woman cries — and points to the elaborate security system installed at her home — as she says that after 41 years of living there at the edge of town, she doesn't feel safe around the police.

And the council president says, basically, there's nothing to see here, folks.

Welcome to New Holland, population 801, give or take, depending on the day's obituaries.

"No, the village is not in chaos," said council President Greg Shaw, a 66-year-old who has lived his whole life in the village that straddles the Pickaway/Fayette county line. He blames a few people for creating

"I hate to see all the hate," Shaw said. "I am not really sure where it comes from. We know that we are doing what's best for the majority of the people in the village. That's what we have to stay focused on."

What he was talking about, specifically, was the creation of a village police department last year. William "Jason" Lawless

is chief. He isn't paid for that position but makes almost \$65,000 a year to also serve as village administrator. Lawless has twice run unsuccessfully for Pickaway County sheriff. That's important to note, he said, because he thinks the misdemeanor charge he is now facing stems from Pickaway County Sheriff Robert Radcliff's animosity toward him.

Radcliff says that's bunk and points out that he is, in fact,

the sheriff. He has no reason to be bitter. He said prosecutors approved the filing of charges against Lawless and police Capt. David Conrad because they were somewhere they shouldn't have been.

Mayor Clair "Butch" Betzko and the village council in early 2017 ended a \$2,400 annual contract with Radcliff's office for patrol coverage in the village, appointed Lawless chief, and took out a \$15,000 loan to buy three cruisers and in-car radios. Lawless recruited volunteer officers, and the New Holland Police Department was born. There are currently seven officers in addition to Lawless and Conrad, and the council recently approved paying \$10 an hour for a total of 15 hours a week among them instead of letting them all do unpaid work.

Enter Karen Francis. She owns some storage units inside the village, but the house she's lived in for 41 years sits just outside its limits. She said she saw Lawless and his officers doing things she didn't like — namely, concealing their cruisers and then racing out of town to run down drivers who

hadn't slowed down for the short stretch of Route 22 in the village where the speed limit is 25 mph.

In October, she painted a 4-foot-by-3-foot piece of plywood, wired up a spotlight and put a "speed trap ahead" sign in her front yard. At the other edge of town, friend Teresa Bayer posted a sign, too. Officers have written 53 speeding tickets so far this year.

"That's when the harassment started," Francis said. "When I say I'm scared, I mean I am scared. I am petrified. I don't know what they are capable of." She accuses officers of honking their cruiser horns and blowing their sirens when they pass her home and says Lawless himself shined his spotlights in her windows. In January, she went to a council meeting and complained. She posted no trespassing signs on her property inside the village and told Lawless to stay off it.

Lawless denied the spotlighting, and Betzko told her she shouldn't have come to an open meeting. Rather, he said, she should have met him privately.

"There is work that needs to be done to complete those parts of design," Fravel said. "If the commission tells us to press on, we can do that. To be honest, we had been slow rolling it because we thought there were additional talks going on with some other folks."

Brudnicki said he does not believe conversations with any other developers will be a problem.

"Whatever development comes in will have to work with what we have," he said.

Jones said while the request for proposals has not been issued, staff has been gathering price quotes for what the bulkhead repairs might cost.



Balcony fall ruled a suicide

PCBPD report: Victim was teen visiting from Georgia with family

PANAMA CITY BEACH — A Georgia teen's fall from a 17th-floor balcony Friday night has been ruled a suicide

by the district medical examiner's office.

According to a Panama City Beach Police Department report, the 16-year-old was a Georgia boy staying at Emerald Isle Condominiums with his older sister, father and family friend.

Whit Majors, chief

investigator with the District 14 Medical Examiner's Office, said Tuesday that the death had been ruled a suicide.

A condo tenant first reported seeing something fall past his 12th-floor balcony at 11 p.m. Friday.

"He stated he did not know it was a person falling, but

stated he heard a loud impact sound he thought was an explosion," PCBPD reported.

The fall was called in to police by a security guard, and EMS declared the boy dead at 11:08 p.m.

Shortly after the fall, the boy's family arrived on scene, saying the teen was

not in their unit, and they were afraid he might have been the one who fell. They were allowed to view the body and confirmed the boy's identity.

The scene was turned over to PCBPD and the medical examiner's office for investigation and an autopsy.

Uber driver fatally shot on Okaloosa Island

'It could be anybody': Drivers speak out after apparent murder

OKALOOSA ISLAND — The Okaloosa County Sheriff's Office is continuing to follow leads and investigate the case of an Uber driver who was found shot dead in his car early Sunday morning.

Meanwhile, other ride share operators on the Emerald Coast say they're wary of getting behind the wheel again.

Filip L. Kirilov, a 29-year-old Uber driver from Destin, was found dead of multiple gunshot wounds in his blue van at 656 Santa Rosa Blvd. about 6:30 a.m. Sunday. Authorities have not released much information about the case, and no arrests have been made, according to Michele Nicholson, OCSO spokeswoman.

Investigators have said, however, they believe the shooter was one of Kirilov's passengers that night.

"Our investigators are working around the clock, and we do have leads on this case," Nicholson said. "What we can't do is speculate publicly (about motives). Their main goal is obviously to catch the person responsible, and we'll do everything in our power to do that."

Nicholson said investigators were working to determine if the person of interest was a passenger who had logged into Uber's system and if his information, including name and banking information, could be tracked, or if he was picked up another way.

An Uber spokesperson sent a statement to the Daily News on Tuesday about Kirilov's death. The company said he was a driver with the company for about 21 months.

"We are extremely saddened by this devastating news and our thoughts are with the driver's family," the statement read. "Our law enforcement response team is working with police to assist with their investigation."

Inmate faces death penalty in cellmate's death

State legislators get insight into school board budget

PANAMA CITY — Hoping to give state legislators a better understanding of the challenges faced on a local level, Superintendent Bill Husfelt and the Bay District School Board held a budget workshop Tuesday morning to highlight the challenges districts face when it comes to education funding.

Attended by Sen. George

Gainer and Reps. Jay Trumbull and Brad Drake, the workshop took a deep dive into how the district spends its money, the constraints it faces when money is earmarked for "categoricals" such as instructional materials or transportation, and how quickly increases in funding are eaten up by fixed costs.

Husfelt said workshops like the one held Tuesday help legislators, who are pulled in different directions when

they get to Tallahassee to "connect the dots" when it comes to education funding.

"I think today went a long way to understanding the issues," he said.

The workshop covered a wide range of topics: outdated transportation formulas that don't take into effect the district's highly mobile student population, restrictions in the Best and Brightest bonus program's requirements that exclude some of the district's best teachers, and lottery

funding that has dwindled during the years. But one of the biggest sticking points of the meeting was how low Florida ranks in per-student spending and average teacher salaries, and how little Base Student Allocation (BSA) spending has budgeted during the past decade.

"The recession had a lot to do with that, and we've had a lot of catching up to do," Husfelt said, adding that Florida really believe that Florida can do better than where

they are with this."

Since the 2007-08 school year, BSA funding from the state has increased by \$40.95, going up only 47 cents between last year and this year. Husfelt said the district was given about \$5 million in additional funding, but \$3.7 million was earmarked for specific categories, and the remaining \$1.7 million was quickly eaten up by \$600,000 in

retirement expenses, \$700,000 in additional health insurance costs and other fixed costs, leaving no money for boosting teacher pay.

Also complicating

funding was the passage of the Marjory Stoneman Douglas Public Safety Act, which took money set aside to boost the BSA funding and teacher raises and re-appropriated it for school safety and mental health resources. Husfelt applauded the legislature for taking a step in the right direction but said the funding provided

isn't sufficient to meet the requirements of the bill, and the district is looking at spending about \$1.2 million above what has been given to it by the state.

"It's not enough to do what we need to do," Husfelt said. "We have to cut other areas to do it. We're doing it and we're not arguing about it."

Ultimately, the board asked Gainer, Trumbull and Drake to consider raising the BSA funding and setting aside additional money specifically earmarked for teacher raises during the next session. Trumbull asked that the district come up with a "realistic number" they could work toward, saying he also would try

to loosen restrictions on new funding.

"Hopefully we can try to lose some of the constraints and do what we harp on as conservatives, which is allow locals to make decisions," Trumbull said.

At the close of the meeting, Gainer said the workshop helped him "get on the same page"

with the school board and hopefully change some of the communication problems he sees between local boards and Tallahassee.

"Today has been very enlightening as to how we need to approach that," Gainer said. "These are things that we know, we just don't know how important they are."

Mom gets almost 3 years for fatally smothering infant

PANAMA CITY — A Bay County mother who drunkenly fell asleep and fatally smothered her infant child has been sentenced to almost three years in prison.

Crystal Ann Cagle, 40, appeared in court Tuesday for a plea hearing in the case. The State Attorney's Office initiated a charge of child neglect with great bodily harm on April 30 after police had responded months earlier to an unresponsive 5-month-old at an Oak Hammock address. After she pleaded no contest to the charge, Circuit Judge Brantley Clark Jr. sentenced Cagle to 34½ months in prison followed by two years of probation.

SAO officials said parental co-sleeping deaths

recently have been occurring with more frequency. But in Cagle's case, she also was highly intoxicated at the time of the infant's death.

Prosecutor Mark Graham said the father of the child was in agreement with the prison term agreed upon by the SAO and Cagle's defense attorney.

The case stems from Jan. 13.

"We went to an address in the Oak Hammock area, where we found a female performing chest compressions on an infant," Panama City Police Department officials reported. "Officers and fire crews attempted to resuscitate the child, but

we were unsuccessful." PCPD awaited the results of an autopsy on the child and a toxicology test on Cagle as the investigation proceeded. Police then sent the case to the SAO to decide whether charges were appropriate.

Weighing Cagle's intoxication at the time, they decided to pursue the charge of child neglect with great bodily harm.

SAO officials said Cagle had been out at a bar earlier that night. When she came home, she reportedly passed out on the couch with the 5-month-old child beside her. At some point, Cagle caused the child to suffocate, leading to its death, officials said.

Authorities took her into custody in April. In addition to her probation, Cagle also will have to attend AA or NA four times a week after her release from prison.

No injuries in Watercrest blaze

Dozens evacuated, but fire contained to one room

PANAMA CITY BEACH — No serious injuries were reported, but tensions were high as dozens of residents and visitors were evacuated after a condo fire Tuesday afternoon.

Tenants were evacuated just after 4 p.m. from Watercrest Condominiums, 6201 Thomas Drive.

A caller initially told emergency personnel that fire appeared to be

dripping from his ceiling. Casey Speegle, an Alabama resident who was staying on the 10th floor with her family, said she spoke to the man after they were evacuated.

"He said the ceiling tiles were falling out of the ceiling and the embers were raining down with them," Speegle said.

Witnesses gathered outside the condo said a dark plume of smoke had poured out from the 12th floor, where the initial call came from. They said the elevators were inaccessible, causing some people to

have to flee down dozens of flights of stairs, a challenge for people with disabilities.

Speegle said her 9-year-old daughter has cerebral palsy and is wheelchair-bound. Their room was directly below the ones spewing smoke. Speegle said they had little information at the time about what was going on and frantically fled — her daughter in her arms and the wheelchair in her father's — down 10 flights of stairs.

"Mommy mode kicked in, and we got out of there," she said.

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

Because no arrests have been made, some Uber drivers on the Emerald Coast say they're even more concerned for their safety than they were before the shooting.

Jamie Greenwood, a Fort Walton Beach resident, said she just started driving for Uber two weeks ago. She said she was "completely shocked" when she heard the news and is rethinking driving for Uber as her second source of income.

"I haven't driven since it happened, and the only reason why, honestly, is because there haven't been a lot of additional details about (the shooting)," she said. "I don't know the motive or understand what happened, and obviously they haven't caught the guy, so he is going to call another Uber? There's a chance that something could go tragically wrong. It could be anybody."

Shawn Carner, who lives in Crestview, has been an Uber driver for three years and says he's made about 4,300 trips. He said he didn't know Kirilov personally, but had seen him around before.

"A friend of mine had met him a few times. He drove mostly in the Destin area," Carner said. "He was kind of a bit shy, but very well-meaning. After so many trips, you get to know who the drivers are around here."

Carner said the shooting death certainly made him think twice about who he picks up, but even before Kirilov's death,

Uber drivers in the area took steps to keep each other safe.

For instance, Facebook groups like Gulf Coast Rideshare Drivers' network and Panhandle Uber/Lyft Drivers are forums for drivers to share tips and information about routes. Drivers also communicate via the phone application Zello throughout their trips, sharing their trips with other drivers if they don't feel safe, and sometimes communicating via codes and safe words to alert other drivers if they're in danger.

"As Uber drivers, we try to stick together, those of us that know each other," he said.

Amber LaChance is a former Uber driver who lives in Navarre and said she made about 5,600 trips while she was driving for the company. She said she's also been in "risky situations" as an Uber driver, and has heard from other drivers she still keeps in touch with after Kirilov's death.

"Since this has happened, a lot of drivers have expressed concern or fear, and some have even stated, 'I'm done,'" LaChance said. "They don't feel comfortable driving anymore. Some have decided they should get together and get a little bit more familiar with each other."

She said some drivers have expressed a desire to carry a concealed weapon to protect themselves since the shooting, something Uber's company policy strictly prohibits.

"Our goal is to ensure that everyone has a safe and reliable ride. That's why Uber prohibits riders and their guests, as well as driver and delivery partners, from carrying firearms of any kind while using our app," the company says on its website.

An Uber driver in South Florida tried to challenge the policy last August by suing the company, saying it violates a 2008 state law permitting concealed carry permit holders to have a gun in their vehicle. The company fought back, and a judge dropped the case in February 2018, saying the driver hadn't proved he was injured by the no-gun policy, according to court records.

In a statement to the Daily News, an Uber spokesman said "the safety of our driver-partners is deeply important to us."

"We have built safety features into the app (GPS tracking, ability of drivers to share their trips in real time with friends and family, phone anonymization, two-way feedback system, 24-7 incident response). We're constantly working to build on our technology from a safety perspective," the spokesman said.

LaChance said the Uber driving community has been shaken by the event, and is looking for ways to support each other and keep each other safe.

"My heart goes out to the family and friends of the driver who was killed," she said. "Ultimately we, as drivers, need to keep trying to do everything we can to help prevent these things from happening in the future, but we also need help from the company to make it safer for us, too."

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


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Man faces death penalty in cellmate's death

Daniel Craven was jailed for murdering lover's husband

Craven

opened their case three years after Craven allegedly killed his cellmate,

John H. Anderson, by repeatedly stabbing him with a shank at Graceville Correctional Facility on June 28, 2015. It's not the first time Craven has gone before a jury on a charge of premeditated murder, but it is the first time he has faced the death penalty.

Craven was indicted in July 2017 for first-degree murder, and the State Attorney's Office shortly after announced it would

be seeking the death penalty. Craven reportedly attacked Anderson early June 28, 2015, stabbing him with a shank more than a dozen times while Anderson was sleeping in his bunk.

Prosecutors first will have to show the jury that at some point — before or during the attack — Craven exhibited premeditation in the killing. Once a verdict is rendered in that portion of the case, prosecutors will have to show aggravating factors, including that Craven was incarcerated because he already had been convicted of premeditated murder.

At the time of Anderson's

death, Craven was serving a life sentence for killing a romantic rival and burning the body in the yard of his Apopka home in April 2011.

According to court records, Craven boasted to investigators about the violent killing of Ronald Justice, whose marriage Craven had broken up by having an affair with Justice's wife.

Craven attacked Justice on April 6, 2011, at a home where Justice was squatting and beat him with a baseball bat as Justice begged for his life. He went on to handcuff Justice, drown him in a dog bowl, then wrap his body and take it to the house

near Apopka, where he burned it for several days in a pit in which he frequently burned furniture and trash, according to court records.

In a recorded conversation, Craven bragged, "I wouldn't have burned and killed (Justice) if I didn't know what I was doing," adding if he was arrested, "I'd get a lawyer ... pro bono just like Casey Anthony."

Craven's sister later told detectives Craven had claimed killing four other people in Florida, something detectives continue to explore, though records show no additional arrests. Craven also received a

bevy of additional charges a month ago after he reportedly had tied 6-inch metal shanks to his hands in preparation as officers lined up outside his cell. Minutes after breaching the door, one of the correctional officers was carried out lifeless, turning purple and frothing at the mouth. A second officer was injured in the encounter with Craven, who jail officials said aimed to kill the officers. Both officers survived.

Craven was charged May 17 with two counts of attempted homicide and two counts of aggravated battery on law enforcement.

to 35, and it did — less than 5 percent of people who attended the 2017 Pepsi Gulf Coast Jam also attended SandJam.

Lovelady predicted last year that SandJam would be bigger than the Pepsi Gulf Coast Jam and so far seems to be on track. In its first year, SandJam had a \$6.3 million total overall economic impact compared to the \$5.3 million economic impact from Gulf Coast Jam's inaugural year.

The two events were on par in bed tax dollars in year one, with Gulf Coast Jam bringing in a little more than \$150,000 and SandJam pulling in a little less. Gulf Coast Jam has had a \$66 million impact over five years, setting the bar for SandJam.

At Tuesday's meeting, TDC and CVB officials authorized staff to approve a three-year SandJam sponsorship agreement, providing \$350,000 per year. The agreement is contingent upon the county commission providing a three-year agreement allowing the festival use of the county pier and upon organizers acquiring all required government permits. The contract will allow the SandJam to be relocated off the beach in the event of an emergency, if the CVB agrees.

TDC Chairman Andy Phillips said he was happy with SandJam's first year.

"I was pleasantly surprised, and it was a good event for the first year," he said. "The attendees were the most respectful people, and they were walking to trash cans to throw away trash."

Treasurer Yonnie Patronis, however, voted

against the motion. He said he would agree with the contract if it were on a one-year basis.

"As a business owner, I'm not going to do it without due diligence to the numbers," he said.

But by and large, city and tourism officials have been happy with the festival's quick turnaround, audience and potential.

"It was something that showcases Panama City Beach in a different light," TDC member Philip Griffiths said Tuesday.

Lovelady said he still is working to secure acts for the next SandJam, scheduled for April 26-28, 2019. Other projected dates are April 24-26, 2020, and April 23-25, 2021.

He said the inaugural event was held Thursday-Saturday, but SandJam will switch to a Friday-Sunday festival to match other events he produces.

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'Suspicious' fire destroys 18 Okaloosa condos

Residents begin to dig out at Pier 1 Condominiums

FORT WALTON BEACH — Scarlett Hamilton sifted through the medicine cabinet in her first-floor condominium Monday morning, as water dripped from the ceiling and gathered in puddles around her feet.

Soot and ashes covered almost all of her condo, from the kitchen stove to the living room futon. With no electricity and no air conditioning, Hamilton, who suffers from stage-four melanoma, stood in the kitchen, still dazed from the fire that destroyed her unit and 17 others Sunday morning.

"It was intense, definitely intense," Hamilton said as she recalled being awakened just after 3 a.m. Sunday by firefighters banging on her door. "My first thought was to grab my chemotherapy medicine, because it's so expensive, and we just kind of went out and were watching it happening."

"It sucks the life out of you, watching all the stuff you had just get ruined," she added.

Residents of 18 units at Pier 1 Condominiums were just beginning to dig out Monday from the fire that started on the third floor — the top floor — and tore through the building. Most of the units on the third floor were charred beyond recognition, and many of the first- and second-floor units suffered extensive water and soot damage.

Lance Tomkins, a spokesman for the State Fire Marshal's Office, confirmed the agency was investigating the fire as "suspicious."

"A final determination into the exact cause and origin of the fire remains under investigation," Tomkins wrote in an email to the Daily News. "The fire was estimated to cause \$700,000 worth of damages to the structures and are listed as a total loss."

All of the residents made it out safely and no major injuries were reported, according to the Ocean City Wright Fire Control District officials.

American Red Cross of Northwest Florida Executive Director Jerry Kindle said the Red Cross had assisted at least 40 residents after the blaze, including a 6-week-old baby and a pregnant woman.

"Just like all fires, we went out and opened up a place to help people," he said. "When it's a larger fire like this, we just try to get it sorted out ... we get people real-time care as needed."

Karen Coleman lived in a second-floor unit and

said she got \$125 from the Red Cross on Sunday. She waded through the almost 2 inches of water that covered her floor Monday morning with a broom, trying to sweep out debris and clean any bit of her condo that she could.

"Everything is gone, everything. I'm just sick," she said as she stood in the

doorway of what was once her bedroom. "I don't know what I'm going to do. I don't know how I'm going to restart my life."

Jim McElroy, property manager at Pier One

Condominiums, said recovering from the fire was an "ASAP type of situation," and he would be meeting with contractors to begin figuring out what to do about the building.

"It'll be chaos for a while, people are going to get their feathers ruffled," he said. "But we're going to go forward and get these things taken care of in a timely manner."

Arkansas downs Oregon State in CWS opener

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Arkansas scored four fifth-inning runs against a faltering Luke Heimlich and moved a step closer to its first national championship in baseball with a 4-1 win over Oregon State in Game 1 of the College World Series finals Tuesday night.

The finals opener, delayed a day because of rain, seemed to have a little bit of everything — a fly ball lost in the sun that went for a ground-rule double, a runner interference call against Oregon State and an overturned foul call on a

ball hit down the right-field line.

Then there was the sudden collapse of Heimlich, who looked so good, and then so bad.

After failing to get out of the third inning in both of his previous CWS starts, the Beavers' ace was in full command while striking out five and limiting the Razorbacks (48-19) to one hit through four innings.

In the fifth, though, the senior left-hander issued a walk, hit two batters, gave up two hits and got a bad break

when second baseman and first-round draft pick Nick Madrigal fumbled the ball trying to make a throw.

Arkansas starter Blaine Knight (14-0) went back to the mound with a 4-1 lead, pitched another inning and left having allowed seven hits with six strikeouts. Barrett Loseke and Matt Cronin combined to pitch three scoreless innings of relief.

Michael Gretler's base hit in the second put Oregon State (53-12-1) up 1-0. The

MOSCOW — A game no team needed to win became the game no fan would want to watch.

France and Denmark produced the World Cup's first 0-0 draw at the 37th attempt amid boos and whistles from fans on Tuesday.

The slow-paced game was out of step with a vibrant tournament. But it advanced both teams to the round of 16 unbeaten, with the bonus of no players suspended and no serious injuries. France will now play Argentina, and Denmark faces Croatia.

The draw would always have ensured that outcome, and became inevitable in the second half. Events elsewhere in Group C made this game all but irrelevant.

Peru beat Australia 2-0 in Sochi at the same time, meaning the Danes would have advanced even if they lost to France before 78,011 at the World Cup's signature Luzhniki Stadium.

"We did what we needed," Denmark coach Age Hareide said, praising his team for

a disciplined display. "We would have been stupid to open a lot of space for the French team."

France was already sure to advance with two opening victories, and this result spread the happiness to Denmark and its thousands of fans who stayed to dance and cheer in an empty stadium.

Less happy were the neutral

fans in the crowd. Many Russians cheered the host team's name and whistled misplaced passes and slow play as the game progressed with Denmark protecting its one point for a draw.

It was the longest a World Cup had gone without a goalless draw since 1954, a

Still no dominant player halfway through the year

POTOMAC, Md. — Tiger Woods already has played 10 times as the year reaches the halfway point.

Some might consider that a surprise considering where he was a year ago.

Woods has finished within five shots of the lead only once, a runner-up finish in the Valspar Championship, and he was never in the picture at either of the two majors.

Some might consider that a surprise considering how well he is swinging the club.

Six months into 2018, golf hasn't offered a lot of clarity with Woods, or anyone else.

Golf keeps trending younger, with few exceptions, a point driven home two weeks ago at the U.S. Open when 28-year-old Brooks Koepka made it five straight majors won by players in their 20s. Dustin Johnson is still No. 1 in the world, a ranking he has held for all but four weeks.

But there isn't a dominant figure,

except when it comes to attracting a crowd.

Woods is at the Quicken Loans National this week, a field so weak that Rickie Fowler (No. 8) is the only player from the top 10 in the world, and no one from the top 15 in the FedEx Cup is playing. There's still plenty of energy along the Potomac River, mainly because of the No. 82 player in the world — Woods.

With two majors, the FedEx Cup, the Ryder Cup and the Race to Dubai still to come, here's how golf is shaping up so far:

Best player

Given the significance of majors, Masters champion Patrick Reed gets the nod going into the second half of the year.

Reed and Koepka each have only one victory — the best kind — and while Koepka didn't really start his year until two months ago, Reed had a share of the lead during the final round of the U.S. Open and looked certain to get into a

RT's Bo Jangles has won three of his last four and made six straight quinieras for the evening ninth. He's 21-32 in the win column, but Katie Clawson has won three of four and must be considered.

At Palm Beach, TC's Bitterman has won two straight and 15 overall for the matinee 14th, contested at 660 yards. JS Mane Event is a 12-race winner stepping up to the longer distance.

Magic: I'll step down if I don't land free agents for Lakers

EL SEGUNDO, Calif. — Magic Johnson is betting his job on his free-agent recruiting skills for the Los Angeles Lakers.

Johnson declared Monday that he will step down as the Lakers' president of basketball operations if he can't persuade an elite free agent to sign with the 16-time NBA champions within the next two summers.

"Next summer, if nobody comes and I'm still sitting here like this, then it's a failure," Johnson said after a news conference to introduce draft picks Moe Wagner and Svi Mykhailiuk.

Johnson was put in charge of the Lakers' front office by owner Jeanie Buss in February 2017, and the former superstar point guard immediately announced his plans to revive the struggling franchise by enticing the game's best players to join as free agents.

With Paul George and potentially LeBron James headlining the market this summer, Johnson is leading the Lakers' efforts to land both players this weekend. If they sign elsewhere, Johnson and the Lakers will pursue the large crop of 2019 free agents.

And if he strikes out with every big name, Johnson said he will quit.

"Like I told you when I took the job, it's going to be a two-summer thing for the Lakers," Johnson said. "This summer, and next summer, and that's it. And if I can't deliver, I'm going to step down myself. She won't have to fire me. I'll

step away from it. Because then, I can't do this job. But so far, so good."

Although the Lakers are mired in the worst five-year stretch in franchise history and haven't made the playoffs since 2013, Johnson and general manager Rob Pelinka have been successful in achieving their initial goals since they took over 16 months ago.

They have solidified a decent core of talented young players — Brandon Ingram, Lonzo Ball, Kyle Kuzma and Josh Hart — to provide their potential free-agent signees with support. They have made several slick trades and personnel moves to clear enough salary cap room to offer two mammoth free-agent contracts this summer.

Now comes the tough part: Persuading George or James or other big names to move to Hollywood. Johnson said he has no idea whether the Lakers' pitch will be well-received, but he also feels confident in his task.

"I'm Magic Johnson," he said with his ubiquitous smile.

"You know how many finals I've been in? So you think I'm worried about this? I played against Larry Bird in the Finals. I played in nine Finals."

Johnson is the second straight basketball decision-maker for the Lakers to create a self-imposed deadline for success.

In 2014, co-owner Jim Buss told the Los Angeles Times that the Lakers had to be a contender within three to four years, or "I will step down, because that means I have failed."

Johnson, meanwhile, is No. 1 for a reason. Even with two victories, his year is shaping up as what might have been. He shared the 54-hole lead at the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am and the U.S. Open. Going back to the PGA Tour season that began in October, he lost a six-shot lead in the HSBC Champions.

Most improved

Bubba Watson has as many victories in the last four months as the previous three years combined.

Watson has recovered from a health issue (he won't say what it was) that caused him to lose 20 pounds, and he abandoned the Volvik colored golf balls he used last year. The result is another victory at Riviera, another victory at Hartford and another World Golf Championship at the Dell Match Play.

Watson lobbied to be an assistant captain at the last Ryder Cup. He now is No. 5 in the Ryder Cup standings. He was at No. 117 in the world going into Riviera. Now he's up to No. 13.

Rising

Among the top players, Rory McIlroy and Jason Day appear to be on the cusp of at least having a chance to get back to No. 1 in the world.

McIlroy dropped out of the top 10 until winning with a big charge at Bay Hill, his first victory since September 2016.

His momentum stalled when he closed with a 74 at the Masters while playing in the final group, lost a weekend lead at Wentworth and missed the cut at the U.S. Open.

Day had gone nearly two years without winning until his playoff victory at Torrey Pines, followed by another victory at the Wells Fargo Championship.

Deschamps rested six starters to put out a team that barely tested Denmark goalkeeper Kasper Schmeichel until substitute Nabil Fekir tried two long-range shots.

It was a mostly forgettable first major tournament start for France goalkeeper Steve Mandanda, who has been a backup at two World Cups and three European Championships. The 33-year-old made his only save in the 54th minute, spilling Christian Eriksen's free-kick before pouncing on the loose ball.

France's first-choice goalkeeper and captain, Hugo Lloris, was among those given the day off. Midfielders Paul Pogba and Blaise Matuidi were obvious choices to sit after collecting yellow cards in a 1-0 win over Peru. A second yellow card before pouncing on the loose ball.

Perhaps sensing it was time

to make entertainment midway through the first half, fans created a wave that made three laps of the stadium.

Whistles and jeers got louder after a misplaced pass in the 64th by France midfielder Thomas Lemar went off the field 10 yards (meters) away from any player.

Only in the final 20 minutes, when Fekir and Kylian Mbappe came off the bench, did France show more pace and direct intent. They met a solid Danish defense content with the draw.

PERU 2, AUSTRALIA 0: Already-eliminated Peru ended Australia's hopes of advancing to the knockout round at the World Cup with a victory. The Australians had to beat Peru and hope Denmark lost to France in the other Group C match, but neither result happened. France and Denmark drew 0-0 in Moscow. Andre Carrillo's first-half goal — a half-volley from inside the area — was Peru's first in a World Cup since 1982, the last time the South Americans played in the tournament. Peru hadn't won a World Cup match since defeating Iran in 1978. Peru captain Paolo Guerrero, who almost missed the

tournament because of a doping suspension, scored the second goal early in the second half to give his team an honorable finish after two opening losses. Tim Cahill, a 38-year-old striker who entered the match in the second half, couldn't give Australia a boost as it tried to reach the round of 16 for the first time since 2006.

ARGENTINA 2, NIGERIA 1: Lionel Messi and Argentina finally came alive at the World Cup. Messi scored an exquisite 14th-minute goal to give the two-time

champions the lead Tuesday, but it wasn't until Marcos Rojo's 86th-minute strike that Argentina was assured of a place in the round of 16. Victor Moses scored a penalty in the 51st minute for Nigeria, putting Argentina in danger of being eliminated without winning a match in Russia. It took an unlikely goal by Rojo to save Argentina and give it second place in Group D. Digo Maradona, in the stands at the St. Petersburg Stadium, celebrated both goals wildly. Argentina will play France in the last 16 in Kazan on Saturday.

CROATIA 2, ICELAND 1: Fielding a side filled with reserves, Croatia ended Iceland's first ever World Cup run with a win in Rostov-on-Don. Milan Badelj crashed a volley against the bar, and moments later scored for Croatia in the 53th minute, sprinting into the area to fire a bouncing shot past goalkeeper Hannes Halldorsson. Croatia playmaker Luka Modric led the already-qualified Croats for 65 minutes before being taken off, as his team remained in low-gear for most of the match to contain the Icelanders who had needed a win to hope for a place in the last 16. Iceland equalized with a penalty shot taken by Gylfi Sigurdsson in the 76th minute after substitute Dejan Lovren carelessly handled the ball. But Ivan Perisic punished a defensive error to make it 2-1 at 90 minutes. Russian fans at the 45,000-seat Rostov Arena rooted for the underdogs as the traveling Iceland supporters kept up their singing and chanting all evening. Defender Sverrir Ingason twice threatened for Iceland, hitting the crossbar with a header in the second half.

Bettman, Brodeur, O'Ree top Hockey Hall of Fame class

Willie O'Ree didn't know he had broken the NHL's color barrier when he made his debut in 1958. Martin Brodeur couldn't see the three Stanley Cup titles and jaw-dropping career ahead when he played his first game in goal for the New Jersey Devils in 1992 and, a year later, Gary Bettman didn't know he would end up growing the league by leaps and bounds over the next 25 years as its commissioner.

All three will go into the Hockey Hall of Fame together as the headliners of a trailblazing class of 2018 that also includes diminutive forward Martin St. Louis, four-time gold-medal-winning Canadian women's national team star Jayna Hefford and Russian Alexander Yakushev.

O'Ree was the first black player in the NHL, Bettman has overseen the league's expansion into a multibillion-dollar industry and Brodeur piled up the most wins and shutouts of any goaltender in NHL history.

"This is an exciting class to be around because everyone has tried to take their game to the next level," Bettman said Tuesday. "I really wasn't focused on whether this was happening now; I was really focused on whether Willie O'Ree was going to be selected because that to me was a very important act for the Hall to take."

Bettman has been commissioner since 1993, during which time the NHL has expanded its footprint across North America and increased from 24 to 31 teams. In that time, the league has gone from a \$437 million business to one with almost \$5 billion in revenue. It's been an occasionally bruising ride, with three work stoppages, including one that canceled the entire 2004-05 season and led to the salary cap. But Bettman has been nothing if not a strong leader, and all-time great Wayne Gretzky said the efforts to help each club compete have made the game stronger.

"His leadership and love for hockey is very

evident," Gretzky said. "Hockey has become more entertaining year after year, thanks in part to his passion for the game."

Brodeur lifted the Stanley Cup three times with the Devils between 1995 and 2003. He leads all goalies with 691 wins and 125 shutouts in 1,266 regular-season games with the Devils and St. Louis Blues, and he won the Vezina Trophy four times. He won 113 playoff games and had a 2.02 postseason goals-against average. Brodeur also scored two regular-season goals and another in the playoffs — more than any other goalie.

The Montreal native was the last real standup goaltender as the position moved almost exclusively to the butterfly technique, and his puck-handling prowess led the NHL to institute the trapezoid behind the net as a way to increase scoring.

"You play your whole career and you don't expect to get this phone call, but when it does, it definitely does feel pretty good," said Brodeur, the Blues assistant GM who was sitting alongside Hall of Fame defenseman Larry Robinson at prospect camp in St. Louis when he got the news. "I want to thank the committee for putting me on so early."

While Brodeur and St. Louis were first-ballot selections, O'Ree had been waiting decades for this honor since making history at the Montreal Forum on Jan. 18, 1958, with the Boston Bruins. He was 32.

A native of Fredericton, New Brunswick, in Eastern Canada, O'Ree finished with four goals and 10 assists in 45 NHL games during the 1957-58 and 1960-61 seasons despite being 95 percent blind in his right eye. O'Ree was the first black player in the NHL but he will be the third inducted into the Hall of Fame, joining Edmonton Oilers goalie Grant Fuhr and Canadian women's national team captain Angela James.

"Willie paved the path for the rest of us," Fuhr said. "In that way he is a true builder of the game. If you look up the word 'builder,' there should be a picture of Willie. He is the Jackie Robinson of hockey."

NEW YORK CBS Sports hires Steratore as rules analyst

CBS Sports has hired former referee Gene Steratore as a rules analyst for its NFL broadcasts.

Steratore retired this offseason after leading the officiating crew at the Super Bowl in Minneapolis. He says that after 15 years of officiating in the NFL, "it's time to hang up my whistle for a new challenge."

CBS Sports announced Tuesday that Steratore would provide analysis in New York on Sundays throughout the NFL season. He will join announcers in the booth for its Thanksgiving and NFL playoff coverage, including the Super Bowl, which is in Atlanta next year.

Steratore also will provide analysis during CBS Sports' college basketball coverage, including the NCAA men's championship. He started officiating college basketball in 1997 and finished as a Big Ten primary official.

Says Sean McManus, chairman of CBS Sports, "His strong communication skills combined with his knowledge of the rules will allow him to quickly interpret and explain the calls, giving viewers a better understanding of the rules and enhancing our overall coverage."

Daly says USGA won't let him use cart

John Daly has withdrawn from the U.S. Senior Open, citing a deteriorating knee condition and blaming the USGA for not allowing him to use a golf cart.

The 52-year-old two-time major champion went on Twitter to say the USGA turned down his request to use a golf cart, which could have been allowed under rules that conform with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The USGA responded, saying it offered Daly a chance to provide additional information about his condition. Daly said he never received such a request.

Joshua ordered by WBA to fight Povetkin

Anthony Joshua was ordered to sign a deal to fight Alexander Povetkin "within 24 hours" or face being stripped of the WBA portion of his world heavyweight boxing titles.

The WBA lost patience with the talks between Joshua and WBC champion Deontay Wilder for a unification bout, and want Joshua to fight its mandatory challenger from Russia.

WBA president Gilberto Mendoza said on Tuesday in a statement: "The WBA have allowed over a month extension to negotiations with Povetkin and also ongoing discussions with Deontay Wilder."

"It appears the Wilder team have not returned the contract for the fight and therefore we are requesting a date for the Joshua versus Povetkin fight with immediate effect."

There seemed no choice for Joshua (21-0, 20 KO).

Field to fingertips

Tech divide narrows between teams at World Cup

KALININGRAD, Russia — As gigabytes of data flow from field to fingertips, click by click, the technological divide has been closing between teams at the World Cup.

While the focus has been on the debut of video assistant referees, less obvious technical advances have been at work in Russia and the coaches have control over this area, at least.

No longer are the flashiest gizmos to trace player movements and gather data the preserve of the best-resourced nations. All World Cup finalists have had an array of electronic performance and tracking systems made available to them by FIFA.

"We pay great attention to these tools," Poland coach Adam Nawalka said. "Statistics play an important role for us. We analyze our strength and weaknesses."

The enhanced tech at the teams' disposal came after football's law-making body — on the same day in March it approved VAR — approved the use of hand-held electronic and communications equipment in the technical area for tactical and coaching purposes. That allows live conversations between the coaches on the bench and analysts in the stands, a change from the 2014 World Cup when the information gathered from player and ball tracking systems couldn't be transmitted in real-time from the tribune.

"It's the first time that they can communicate during the match," FIFA head of technology Johannes Holzmüller told The Associated Press. "We provide the basic and most important metrics to the teams to be analyzed at the analysis desk. There they have the opportunity either to use the equipment provided by FIFA or that they use their own."

The KPI — key performance indicators — fed by tracking cameras and satellites provide another perspective when coaches make judgments on substitutions or tactical switches if gaps exposed on the field are identified.

"These tools are very practical, they give us analysis, it's very positive," Colombia coach Jose Pekerman said. "They provide us with insight. They complement the tools we already have. It improves our work as coaches, and it will help footballers too. I think technologies are a very positive thing."

It's not just about success in games. Player welfare can be enhanced with high-tech tools to assess injuries in real time allowed for use by medics at this World Cup. Footage of incidents can now be evaluated to supplement any on-field diagnosis, particularly concussion cases.

A second medic "can review very clearly, very concretely what happened on the field, what the doctor sitting on the bench perhaps could not see," FIFA medical committee chairman Michel D'Hooghe said.

Pekerman is pleased "football is advancing very quickly." Too quickly, though, for some coaches who are more resistant to the growing role for machines rather than the mind.

"Football is evolving and these tools help us on the tactical and physiological side," Senegal coach Aliou Cisse said. "We do look at it with my staff, but it doesn't really have an impact on my decision making."

Hernan Dario Gomez, coach of World Cup newcomer Panama, has reviewed the data feeds. But ultimately the team has been eliminated in the group stage after facing superior opponents.

"This is obviously very important information, but not

more important than the actual players," Gomez said. "We think first and foremost about the players and the teamwork that is done."

The data provided on players by FIFA is still reliant the quality of analysts interpreting it.

"You can have millions of data points, but what are you doing with it?" Holzmüller said. "At the end even if you're not such a rich country you could have a very, very clever good guy who is the analyst who could get probably more out of it than a country of 20 analysts if they don't know really how they should read the data and what they should do with it."

"So it's really up to each team and also up to each coach because we realize that for some coaches they say, 'Look I have a gut feeling ... I don't need this information.'"

FIFA is happy with that. The governing body's technical staff — the side often eclipsed by the high-profile members of the ruling-council — will continue to innovate.

But artificial intelligence isn't taking over. For some time, at least.

"People think now it's all driven by computers," Holzmüller said. "We don't want that at FIFA."

Washington State player had brain damage at suicide

PULLMAN, Wash. — The family of the Washington State football player who died of suicide in January said the 21-year-old quarterback had extensive brain damage that's been linked to concussions from playing the sport.

Tyler Hilinski was found dead in his apartment with a gunshot wound and a suicide note on Jan. 16.

Mark and Kym Hilinski told NBC's "Today" show on Tuesday that the Mayo Clinic requested to do an autopsy of their son's brain. The interview comes alongside the debut of a new Sports Illustrated documentary about the family's search for answers.

The family in those interviews said the autopsy results indicated that their son had signs of extensive brain damage known as chronic traumatic encephalopathy, or CTE, which has been found in hundreds of former NFL players.

The sophomore quarterback was last seen alive the same day, when he dropped a teammate off on campus for morning class. Police said the rifle belonged to a teammate and that Hilinski took it without the teammate's knowledge on or before Jan. 12.

Kym Hilinski said they were shocked and numb after finding out that he had shot himself. She said he'd never shot a gun until the day before he died.

There were no verbal signs that the young football player was suffering. His mother said he was quiet, reserved but always happy.

"Did football kill Tyler?... I don't think so. Did he get CTE from football? Probably. Was that the only thing that attributed to his death? I don't know," Kym Hilinski said in the documentary.

The family's other son also appeared in the documentary. Ryan Hilinski was noted as a star quarterback at his high school in California and is set to play at the University of South Carolina with the support of his parents.

Ryan Hilinski said his brother's brain damage diagnosis scared him and made him worried he may suffer what his brother went through, but that he's still committed to playing football.

"I think Tyler would want me to do the same thing. I don't think he'd want me to stop," Ryan Hilinski said.

Tyler Hilinski appeared in eight games during his sophomore season, throwing for 1,176 yards and seven touchdowns. His most memorable outing came in the second week of the season, when he led Washington State from a 21-point deficit in the fourth quarter to beat Boise State 47-44 in triple overtime. Hilinski threw for 240 yards and three touchdowns and was carried off the field after the victory.

After a straightforward auction to three no-trump, South should count his winners when West leads the spade four. With at least six tricks coming from hearts and clubs and at least one trick in each of spades and diamonds, he seems to be in good shape.

At trick one, South captures East's jack with his queen. Since West appears to have led from the A-10, it would be very dangerous to allow East to come on lead. East would then be in position to lead a spade through South's king, letting West run spades and possibly defeat the game.

There is no such danger in letting West on lead. If West leads spades again, South can establish his ninth trick from the spade king. To put it another way, East is the dangerous opponent and West if the safe hand. If possible, South must develop his tricks while keeping East out of the lead.

Declarer begins by leading a heart to dummy's king. If hearts break, declarer will have nine tricks without any need for further work — but that can wait. Declarer now goes after diamonds by running the diamond eight through East. If East has both top honors, he cannot be kept off lead; but in virtually every other scenario, it may be possible to develop diamonds while keeping East off play.

The diamond eight loses to the nine, and South wins the club return, then leads a heart to dummy and leads another diamond, covering East's card. Declarer can then run the diamonds and cash out for nine tricks.

ANSWER: This hand appears to be a simple raise of diamonds, but is that call forcing or invitational? For simplicity's sake, I suggest that after a reverse, responder's raise of either of opener's suits be played as forcing. This in turn means that weak hands must do something else. You can play two no-trump as artificial and weak, or you can play the cheaper of fourth suit and two no-trump as weak; both methods work.







Garlic & greens

Early season pea shoots provide a flavorful intro to summer

Garlic with pea shoots is a combination worth exploring. It's hardly a secret, especially in Asia where pea greens are widely consumed. In many regions, peas are sown throughout the summer specifically for their greens, every week or so like American farmers plant lettuce. A simple, heaping pile of pea greens in brown sauce is one of my favorite Chinese foods.

The culinary deconstructionists in the Cook's Illustrated test kitchen, meanwhile, have broken down the savory nature of pea greens into "grassy," "slightly bitter" and "tastes like peas but not sweet." They conclude this flavor is maximized in a pan with nothing more than garlic, salt and fat, and I have seen no evidence to the contrary.

Unless your local store has an extra-special produce section, you'll only find pea shoots at the farmers market, or in your backyard. Before you harvest from your own pea patch, consider the trade-off between a mouthful of greenery today and a handful of peas tomorrow. The peas you already have in the ground, climbing their way up the trellis and probably showing some pale yellow flowers, perhaps dangling some little peas that your kids are waiting patiently to eat? You'd better let those gangly climbers live.

But if they need to be thinned, eat the ones you pull. And you can always trim the shoots for a quick snack. The last 6 inches of a 3-foot plant are heavenly, and a little trim here and there won't stop progress.

Pruned plants will continue growing undaunted, sometimes with more vigor in response to the insult.

Elsewhere in the garden, the appearance of garlic flowers, aka scapes, marks the New Year according to the garlic calendar. After months of eating soft, sprouting garlic cloves, we can eat new garlic. The plant is alive and juicy and the flavor is sharp and spicy. Scapes are the first taste of the season's new garlic crop.

Scapes, like pea greens, are curly. Each garlic flower wants to go around twice before uncurling and standing up, eventually opening into a purple flower that looks like a celestial explosion.

China Train Pea Greens

- 1 bunch pea greens, chopped or left whole
- 1 handful garlic scapes, chopped into inch-long sections
- 1-2 tablespoons butter
- 1-2 tablespoons olive oil
- Black pepper, salt, garlic powder, to taste
- Bacon (optional, sort of); I keep my bacon frozen and cut it lengthwise off of one end, like slicing a sausage but through the ends of several pieces of frozen bacon at once. Most heavy knives have no problem because the fat prevents bacon from freezing rock-hard. It doesn't take a lot of these little bacon bits, sometimes called lardons, to make a difference in a meal. Use a slice of bacon's worth of lardons for this dish.

For the Train Sauce:

- 4 tablespoons soy sauce

- 4 tablespoons oyster sauce
- 2 teaspoons fish sauce
- 2 teaspoons sesame oil
- 3 tablespoons lime juice

Make the sauce by stirring together the ingredients. Cook the lardons (if using) patiently, until they are crispy, then remove from pan. Add the oil, butter and scapes, turn the pan to medium, and wait for the glorious fragrance of fresh garlic to fill the room.

Add the pea sprouts; spread them around so they are evenly distributed, and wait until they flatten down, about 30 seconds. While still bright green, turn the pan to high and add the sauce. Bring to a boil and let the sauce boil 30 seconds, then stir it around and turn it off.

Serve with the carbohydrate of your choice, or unadulterated in all of its savory, tangy, green garlicky glory.

More to try

And finally, a recipe created by my 5-year-old son, Remy:

Pea Green Chips

1. With a heavy pan on lowest setting, melt 2 tablespoons salted butter. Lay pea shoots in the pan next to each other, taking up the whole pan without crowding them together too much; keep it all one layer. (Remy uses the leaves exclusively, carefully removing them and discarding the stems.)

2. Keep the heat on the lowest setting. Listen to the pea greens sputter peacefully as their moisture cooks out. Let them cook a half-hour or more until crispy.

Remy calls it good here, but predictably, I add some form of garlic: scapes, bulbs, even minced leaves if you have them. Let the the garlic cook, and gently mix it with the delicately crunchy pea greens.

Serve on a plate, next to a piece of toast.

You don't need meat to have a complete meal

Bishop and I always wanted okra that "rattles") and tomatoes (yes, I know tomatoes are really fruit, but to me they are much better served as a vegetable), and don't forget a thick slice of Vidalia onion to complete the meal.

Now take a look at a young person's plate. How many veggies do you see? Not many.

You probably see potatoes (more than likely french fries). They need to learn to appreciate the better foods on the table — vegetables of all kinds.

I received an email from Gainesville, Florida, asking me to include more vegetarian dishes. A note was attached that said awhile ago the farmers market there had a chili contest, and a vegetarian chili won the grand prize. It reminded me that I

also make a super vegetarian chili you might like.

Vegetarian Chili

- 1 tablespoon oil
- ½ cup chopped green bell pepper
- ½ cup chopped onion
- 1 can (14.5 oz.) Mexican stewed tomatoes
- 1 zucchini diced, do not peel
- 1 yellow squash, diced
- 1 tablespoon chili powder
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- ¼ teaspoon salt or to taste
- 1 can vegetable broth (about 2 cups)
- 1 (16 oz.) can black beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 (11 oz.) can whole kernel corn
- 1 (16 oz.) pinto beans, drained and rinsed
- 2 tablespoons margarine
- ¼ teaspoon Tabasco (or to

taste)

- Shredded Mexican cheese (to sprinkle over top)
- Tortilla chips

Heat oil in large Dutch oven over medium heat. Add bell pepper and onions. Cook until tender, but not browned. Add tomatoes and cook about 3 minutes. Add zucchini, yellow squash, chili powder, sugar and salt. Cook about 1 minute. Add remaining ingredients and simmer uncovered about 15 minutes. If chili gets too thick, add more water or broth. Serve as suggested.







Bulgur + lamb = good stuff on the grill

It seems our food culture today allows little room for middle ground, leaving the impression that you have to choose between Team Meat and Team Meatless. But that all-or-nothing notion is more about zeitgeist than it is about science.

While you can certainly eat healthfully and get all the nutrients you need without red meat, you can include it if you are smart about it.

One strategy is to go with smaller portions than, say, the eight-ounce burgers or 12-ounce steaks you might ordinarily cook up and fill that extra space on your plate with vegetables and/or whole grains.

The accompanying recipe is a supremely tasty example of how satisfying that tactic can be. In

it, whole-grain bulgur wheat, cumin, garlic and herbs are mixed with lean ground lamb to form flavor-packed, Middle-Eastern-style meat patties that are chargrilled and served with a lemony three-herb sauce. Besides adding a wonderful texture and earthy, nutty taste to the rich lamb, the bulgur

provides whole-grain nutrition and volume, so the relatively modest amount of meat has a satisfying presence on the plate.

Served drizzled with the sauce, and perhaps alongside a heap of simply grilled vegetables or a large salad, these lamb patties are a compelling way to enjoy meat in healthful balance.

Grilled lamb and bulgur patties with herb sauce

4 servings (makes 8 patties)

Ingredients

- 1/3 cup bulgur wheat (medium-coarse grind)
- 2 medium cloves garlic
- 1 large shallot (2 ounces)
- 1 1/2 cups lightly packed fresh parsley leaves, plus more for garnish
- 1/2 cup lightly packed fresh cilantro leaves
- 1/2 cup lightly packed fresh basil leaves
- 12 ounces lean ground lamb
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper flakes
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1 1/2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon finely grated

Steps

Cook the bulgur according to the directions on the package and allow to cool slightly. Prepare the grill for direct heat. Pulse the garlic in a mini food processor. Add the shallots; pulse until they are chopped as well. Add the parsley, cilantro and basil; pulse 10 to 15 times, until they are chopped yet still have some texture. Transfer half the herb mixture to a mixing bowl (leaving the other half in the food processor). Add the ground lamb, cooked bulgur, cumin,

crushed red pepper flakes, and 1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper to the mixing bowl. Use your clean hands to blend well and then form eight oblong patties of equal size. Add the lemon juice and zest and the remaining 1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper to the herb mixture in the food processor; pulse to incorporate, then, with the motor running, drizzle in the oil and as much of the water as you need, depending on how thick you want the sauce. Transfer to a serving bowl. Place the patties on the grill; close the lid and cook for about 3 minutes per side (for medium), until grill marks have formed.

5 essential pans to use for baking and so much more

I have devoted an entire cabinet in my kitchen to baking pans. And then some. It's a little embarrassing. Square pans in multiple sizes. Round pans in multiple sizes. The new loaf pans. The old, maybe-I-can-still-use-them loaf pans. I could go on.

I have surely gone overboard, but my hoarding notwithstanding, having a few different baking pans and dishes is smart and it's a worthwhile investment.

Here are my essentials and a few ideas about what you can do with them.

- Rectangular baking dish. The most common size is 9 by 13 inches. You can choose from glass, metal or even ceramic, and what you choose really depends on what you think you'll be making most. Glass is better for all-purpose cooking/roasting, although you can get away with baking if you keep a close eye on your baked goods and/or turn down the temperature. If you're more interested in baking at that size — mega brownies, for instance — stick with metal.

- Square cake pan. Typically 8- or 9-inch squares, although I think the larger size is more versatile. Again, look for metal pans with right-angled corners. This is the classic brownie pan, meaning it's also good for

other desserts (cakes or bars). I also use it to bake one of my favorite coffee cakes. Square pans are a nice vessel for baked eggs, or a small casserole or batch of mac and cheese.

- A loaf pan. The standard sizes are 9 by 5 inches or the slightly smaller 8 1/2 by 4 1/2 inches, and they're pretty much interchangeable as long as you tweak the cook time if you're swapping one in for the other. I generally prefer metal over glass for the same reasons mentioned above.

- Round cake pan. Also available in 8- or 9-inch sizes. Pick whichever size you prefer (go for metal, though) and adapt recipes accordingly. If you think you'll ever be making a layer cake, consider buying at least two in one size. Or a savory cheesecake.

- Pie plate. Standard size is 9 to 9 1/2 inches. You can buy cute ceramic ones, but I prefer good ol' Pyrex — it's cheap, bakes evenly and lets you see exactly what color your pie is.

Yes, definitely make pies in your pie dish! Or pie-adjacent dishes, including quiche. I've also used mine to make shortbread. When you need something shallow for dipping (bagels in toppings) or breading (chicken cutlets, above), a pie plate is very handy. It's great for a gratin, too. Even baked oatmeal is an option.

Cheesy French toast is a mashup we can all get behind

Savory French toast is a concept I can get behind, and Nigella Lawson does a turn with Parmesan cheese and sourdough in her cookbook, “At My Table.” I substituted bread for the next best thing: whole-wheat pitas. As it happens, they

are truly the right vehicle for the makings of stuffed French toast, savory or sweet. Cut into half moons, their resulting pockets provide the right amount of space for tucking in cheese, and, in this case, a deftly seasoned batch of ground turkey that will convince you it’s sausage. Bonus: There’s almost no

knife work involved, and just one pan. You dunk the stuffed packets in an eggy milk mixture; unlike when you make sweet French toast, you can cook up whatever’s left of that mixture after your pitas are done. And they get done pretty quickly, because the turkey patties are cooked first in the pan and remain warm while you

assemble and cook the pitas to golden brown. They are surprisingly filling, crisp and tender at the same time. Some millennials I know (who are not related to me) have declared these cheesy pitas would make good “drunk food.” Enough said about that. If you have already shredded/grated Parm, you’ll save a step.

Cheesy French Toast Pitas

2 to 4 servings

Ingredients

- For the ground turkey
- 1 pound ground turkey (light or dark meat)
 - 1 teaspoon kosher salt
 - ¾ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper, plus more as needed
 - Leaves from 3 stems fresh thyme (may substitute 1 teaspoon dried thyme)
 - 1 teaspoon celery seed
 - ½ teaspoon dehydrated onion flakes
 - 1/8 teaspoon ground cayenne pepper
- For the pitas
- One 2-ounce chunk Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese
 - 2 large eggs
 - 1 cup half-and-half
 - Freshly ground black pepper
 - 2 whole-wheat pita breads (6-inch rounds)
 - Fresh salad greens or frozen/thawed spinach (optional)
 - Sweet peppers (optional)

Steps

For the ground turkey: Combine the ground turkey, salt, the ¾ teaspoon of black pepper, thyme leaves, celery seed, onion flakes and cayenne pepper in a mixing bowl; use your clean hands to blend well. Divide into 4 equal portions, then shape each one into a flat patty that will fit inside a half-moon pita. Grease a nonstick skillet with cooking oil spray and place over medium heat. Clean the mixing bowl. Arrange the patties in the hot skillet; cook for 9 to 11 minutes total, turning them as needed. The patties should be browned and

just cooked through (firm to the touch, 165 degrees at the center using an instant-read thermometer). Transfer to a plate and cover loosely to keep warm.

While they are cooking, prepare the pitas: Grate the cheese onto a cutting board. Whisk together the eggs, half-and-half and a pinch of the black pepper in the clean mixing bowl. Cut each pita in half, forming two half moons. Open each one along the cut side and fill with a good pinch of the cheese, then a cooked turkey patty, more of the cheese.

Use paper towel to wipe out the skillet you used for the turkey; re-grease with cooking oil spray; place over medium heat.

Working with one stuffed pita at a time, hold the cut side closed as you dip the pita into the egg mixture; tip to drain slightly and then place in the hot skillet. Cook for a total of 6 minutes, turning to cook both sides, until golden brown and you can see some of the cheese has melted.

Some of the egg mixture may ooze out into the pan; use your fingers (careful!) to press the stuffed pitas down; use a spatula to push it back into the pitas as they cook. (It’s just softly scrambled eggs.) Feel free to cook up the remaining egg mixture afterward, in the same pan, or discard the mixture. Cut each pita in half, for easy eating. Serve hot.

Obvious, and not so obvious, ways to use all four sides of your box grater

If you own the most typical type of box graters, it has four sides. You probably routinely use only one of them — or maybe two. You might almost exclusively use it to shred cheese.

Still, there are at least a few more things you can do to get the most out of your box grater.

- The largest shredding holes. These typically take up one of the wide sides of the grater. If you are grating cheese, this side is probably where you are going to do it most of the time. Hard (cheddar) or soft cheeses (mozzarella) are both possibilities. Freeze the cheese briefly to make it easier to grate. You can also lightly spritz

the grater with cooking oil spray for smoother shredding and easier cleanup.

This side is useful for produce, too. Grate apples for oatmeal or muffins. Carrots and zucchini destined for muffins, cakes, quick breads or fritters work well. If you want onion that melts into a tomato sauce, grate it rather than chop it.

- Smaller shredding holes. Use this side for finely grating hard cheeses that you still want to be in separate but thin pieces, such as Parmigiano-Reggiano to sprinkle on top of pizza or pasta. Finely grated Parm is also great for using in breading for chicken and eggplant, as well as a baked topping for bread. For an easy, attractive dessert garnish, pull out a chunk of chocolate to

grate. You can also make bread crumbs using hardened stale or toasted bread.

- Rough, raspy holes. For when you really need to chew through something, the teethlike edges of these small holes are ideal. Think citrus zest, garlic, nutmeg and hardened brown sugar. For cheese “dust” that will really melt into a sauce or soup, grate it here. To get potatoes pulpy for latkes, this is the place.

- Slicing holes. One or several, depending on the grater. These are not necessarily a replacement for a sharp knife or mandoline. But they are an option, especially for relatively small amounts of food. You can use the slots to make large curls or slices of cheese that will stand out in a salad.
