

PANAMA CITY — The Fourth of July is a time for fireworks, cookouts and celebrating America’s freedom.

In honor of the holiday, The News Herald asked local veterans and their spouses what Independence Day means to them. Here’s what they said:

**A free country**

The Fourth of July and what it symbolizes is part of why Vietnam veteran John Clay served. He said he is proud to be an American and live in a country where he can speak his mind.

“You could be living some place where you ain’t got no rights at all,” said Clay, who served in the Army. “Nobody’s breathing down my neck (here).”

Clay said he isn’t sure how he will spend the Fourth of July and might just watch TV at home.

**Celebrating independence**

“The Fourth of July is to celebrate our independence as Americans and the freedoms we have,” VFW Post 2185 Cmdr. and Air Force veteran Jason Frigon said.

Post 2185, at 2136 Sherman Ave. in Panama City, will commemorate the holiday with an “all-American” picnic from noon to 4 p.m. Frigon said the community is welcome to stop by and check out the fireworks.

Frigon’s favorite part of being an American is being able to “choose his own destiny,” he said.

**President revokes admissions guidance**

**Trump administration rescinds Obama recommendation on race in school admissions**

WASHINGTON — The Trump administration on Tuesday rescinded Obama-era guidance that encouraged schools to take a student’s race into account to promote diversity in admissions.

The shift suggests schools will have the federal government’s blessing to leave race out of admissions and enrollment decisions, and it underscores the contentious politics that continue to surround affirmative action policies, which have repeatedly been challenged before the Supreme Court.

The admissions memos were among 24 policy documents revoked by the Justice Department for being “unnecessary, outdated, inconsistent with existing law, or otherwise improper.” Attorney General Jeff Sessions called the changes an effort to restore the “rule of law” and blamed past administrations for imposing new rules without seeking public comment.

“That’s wrong, and it’s not good government,” Sessions said in a statement.

The action comes amid a high-profile court fight over

**Trash pickup part of PCB Fourth of July festivities**

PANAMA CITY BEACH — As with most celebrations, Independence Day creates its fair share of extra debris — firework shells, paper plates, etc. — that city employees often have to pick up.

“The July Fourth holiday is the most challenging

time of the year in terms of trash on the sandy beach. More people come out to see the fireworks displays at night and it does create more of an issue with more people on the beach for a longer period of time,” said James Tindle, Panama City Beach code enforcement manager.

“This year we have a very long July Fourth holiday that includes

two weekends.” Service trash cans are filled rapidly, and are emptied throughout the day.

Items such as beverage cans, bottles, chairs, towels, scrapped illegal fireworks and more are found on the beach after July 4 celebrations, Tindle said.

He said such items as plastic and some paper materials can be harmful to local sea turtles and the

environment. In addition, Tindle said the items can be harmful to marine life that can become entangled or accidentally ingest the trash.

Panama City Beach has an ordinance that states upland property owners within the scenic corridor, meaning all beachfront properties, are responsible for keeping their properties litter-free.

**Today is Wednesday, July 4,** the 185th day of 2018. There are 180 days left in the year. This is Independence Day.

**Today’s Highlight in History:**

On July 4, 1776, the Declaration of Independence was adopted by delegates to the Second Continental Congress in Philadelphia.

**On this date:**

In 1802, the United States Military Academy officially opened at West Point, New York.

In 1817, ground was broken for the Erie Canal in Rome, New York. The middle section of the waterway took three years to complete; the entire canal was finished in 1825.

In 1826, 50 years to the day after the Declaration of Independence was adopted, former presidents John Adams and Thomas Jefferson both died. In 1831, the fifth president of the United States, James Monroe, died in New York City at age 73.

In 1872, the 30th president of the United States, Calvin Coolidge, was born in Plymouth, Vermont.


In 1917, during a ceremony in Paris honoring the French hero of the American Revolution, U.S. Army Lt. Col. Charles E. Stanton, an aide to Maj. Gen. John J. Pershing, declared: “Lafayette, we are here!”

In 1939, Lou Gehrig of the New York Yankees delivered his famous farewell speech in which he called himself “the luckiest man on the face of the earth.”

In 1942, Irving Berlin’s musical revue “This Is the Army” opened at the Broadway Theater in New York.

In 1947, the small central California town of Hollister was overrun by thousands of motorcycling enthusiasts, dozens of whom ended up being arrested, most for drunkenness, in what came to be called the “Hollister Riot.”

## Trump continues interviews

**Official says president has spoken to seven Supreme Court candidates in total**

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump spoke with three more potential Supreme Court candidates on Tuesday as a key senator privately aired concerns about one of the contenders.

That follows four Trump interviews with judicial candidates a day earlier, as well as a conversation with Republican Sen. Mike Lee of Utah, who is not regarded as a top contender. An administration official said Trump had spoken to seven candidates in total.

“These are very talented people, brilliant people,” Trump said during an appearance in West Virginia. “We’re going to give you a great one.”

With trademark flair, Trump has said he’ll announce his pick to replace retiring Justice Anthony Kennedy on Monday, choosing from a list of 25 candidates vetted by conservative groups. Top contenders include federal appeals judges Raymond Kethledge, Amul Thapar, Brett Kavanaugh and Amy Coney Barrett.

Trump has also been consulting with lawmakers — including Sen. Rand Paul, R-Ky., who has expressed reservations about

Kavanaugh’s candidacy, according to a person familiar with the call.

Paul has told colleagues that he wouldn’t vote in favor of Kavanaugh if the judge is nominated, citing Kavanaugh’s role during the Bush administration on cases involving executive privilege and the disclosure of documents to Congress.

Trump’s choice to replace Kennedy — a swing vote on the nine-member court — has the potential to be part of precedent-shattering court decisions on abortion, health care, gay marriage and other issues.

On Monday, Trump interviewed Kethledge, Thapar, Kavanaugh and Barrett, according to a person with knowledge of the meetings who was not authorized to speak publicly about them.

The White House did not disclose Trump’s additional conversations, but two other names considered top contenders are Thomas Hardiman, who has served with Trump’s sister, now on senior inactive status, on the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Philadelphia; and Joan Larsen, who serves on the federal appeals court in Cincinnati and previously

served as a Michigan Supreme Court Justice.

The president also spoke by phone with Lee on Monday, as first reported by the Deseret News and later confirmed by the senator’s office, which characterized it as an interview. Asked about the call, White House spokesman Raj Shah said only, “Yesterday, the President spoke on the phone with Sen. Mike Lee.” Lee is the only lawmaker on Trump’s list of potential justices.

Since Trump said his short list includes at least two women, speculation has focused on Barrett, a former

law clerk to Justice Antonin Scalia and a longtime Notre Dame Law School professor who serves on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 7th Circuit.

Conservative groups rallied around Barrett after her confirmation hearing last year featured questioning from Democrats over how her Roman Catholic faith would affect her decisions.

“There’s little doubt from the movement perspective that Barrett would be an excellent choice. It also might make sense politically,” said Tom Fitton of the conservative group Judicial Watch. He said Barrett “has been through the fire in terms of an unpleasant confirmation hearing. There won’t be much new under the sun.”

Barrett has won some high-profile praise, with former House speaker and Trump ally Newt Gingrich tweeting Monday: “Judge Amy Coney Barrett would make an outstanding Supreme Court Justice. Her clarity and intellectual strength in the Senate hearings for her current judgeship showed an intellect and a depth of thought that would be powerful on the Supreme Court.”

But her short tenure on the bench may work against her. And Democrats claim that Barrett — like the other picks — would favor overturning *Roe v. Wade*, the 1973 case that affirmed a woman’s right to abortion, and would weaken President Barack Obama’s 2010 health care law.



**Jury convicts man of murder in 1973 death of wife**

A 76-year-old former Chicago-area man who authorities say used his reputation as an upstanding citizen to convince police 45 years ago that a crash that killed his wife was an accident has been convicted of first-degree murder in her death.

On Monday afternoon, jurors in Rolling Meadows, Illinois, deliberated for just three hours before returning with the guilty verdict against Donnie Rudd, a one-time school board member and respected attorney.

The speed that the verdict was returned made it clear that jurors did not believe Rudd’s attorney’s explanation that the death of 19-year-old Noreen Kumeta Rudd was a “tragic accident.”

### SAO PAULO

**Brazilian businessman Eike Batista convicted of corruption**

A Brazilian businessman famous for amassing and then losing a multi-billion-dollar fortune has been convicted of corruption and money laundering and sentenced to 30 years in prison.

Eike Batista was found guilty of paying around \$16.5 million in bribes to the then-Rio de Janeiro governor to gain an advantage in government contracts. Ex-Gov. Sergio Cabral was also convicted — one of several corruption cases against Cabral, who is already in prison.

A federal judge in Rio de Janeiro signed the decision on Monday but it did not become widely known until Tuesday.

### NANTERRE, FRANCE

**Escaped criminal had small team of loyal accomplices**

French investigators believe a team of four or five loyal accomplices carried out the brazen prison helicopter escape of one of France’s most notorious criminals.

The armed, masked men took a helicopter pilot hostage, forced him to land Sunday in Reau Prison’s yard, used power tools to break through the prison yard’s doors and hustled Redoine Faïd to freedom.

Faïd, a serial robber and murder convict, hasn’t been seen since leaving the prison near Paris. French police have launched a massive manhunt for him.

Philippe Veroni, deputy director of France’s organized crime police unit, said Tuesday that Faïd had clearly

planned the prison break carefully and had a band of accomplices willing to risk everything.

### INDIANAPOLIS

**Church cages Holy Family in immigration protest**

An Indianapolis church has placed statues of Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus in a cage of fencing topped with barbed wire to protest the Trump administration’s zero tolerance immigration policy.

The statues were erected Tuesday morning outside Christ Church Cathedral on downtown Indianapolis’ Monument Circle and surrounded by the fencing.

The Episcopal church’s dean and rector, the Rev. Stephen Carlsen, says the display that’s every part of the church’s “Every Family is Holy Campaign” condemns the nation’s

immigration policy that’s holding families in detention centers at the U.S.-Mexico border.

### ROANOKE, VA.

**Lawsuit alleging abuse of teens to move forward**

Lawyers for immigrant teens who claim they were severely abused inside a Virginia detention center said Tuesday they plan to push ahead with a federal civil rights lawsuit even though two of the teens have returned to their home countries and a third no longer wants to be part of the case.

Ted Howard, one of the lawyers suing the Shenandoah Valley Juvenile Center, said a fourth teen who makes similar allegations is expected to join the case.





Property owners also are held accountable for trash left by guests or beachgoers.

Residents are to place trash in their own dumpsters. Violators face a fine of \$250, and a fine of \$500 for repeat violations.

“With 17 million visitors to the sandy beach each year, it is imperative that property owners be responsible. We want our beaches to remain beautiful and clean,” Tindle said.

Some of the big beachfront properties do a great job

maintaining the beach, said Debbie Ward, Panama City Beach public information officer. She said businesses including The Holiday Inn, Edgewater Beach and Golf Resort, Beachcomber By The Sea and Legacy By The Sea consistently keep their properties clean.

“We would encourage everyone to help us keep the beaches clean. It is our greatest natural resource and the reason we have 17 million visitors each year. Trash can be a hazard to children, pets, sea turtles and other marine life. And it is unsightly. We take pride in our beautiful beaches and want to keep them pristine,” Ward said.

Harvard University admissions as well as Supreme Court turnover expected to produce a more critical eye toward schools’ race-conscious admissions policies.

The court’s most recent significant ruling on the subject bolstered colleges’ use of race among many factors in the admission process. But the opinion’s author, Anthony Kennedy, announced his retirement last week, giving President Donald Trump a chance to replace him with a justice who may be more reliably skeptical of admissions programs that take race and ethnicity into account.

The new policy dramatically departs from the stance of the Obama administration, which in a 2011 policy document said courts had recognized schools’ “compelling interest” in ensuring racially diverse populations. The guidance said that while race shouldn’t be the primary factor in an admission decision, schools could lawfully consider it in the interest of achieving diversity.

“Institutions are not required to implement race-neutral approaches if, in their judgment, the approaches would be unworkable,” the guidance said. “In some cases, race-neutral approaches will be unworkable because they will be ineffective to achieve the diversity the institution seeks.”

That guidance has now been rescinded, as have more than a half-dozen

other similar documents, including some that sought to explain court rulings affirming the use of race as one of several factors in the admissions process.

In one such document, the Obama administration stated, “As the Supreme Court has recognized, diversity has benefits for all students, and today’s students must be prepared to succeed in a diverse society and an increasingly global workforce.”

The Trump administration’s announcement is more in line with Bush-era policy that discouraged affirmative action and instead encouraged the use of race-neutral alternatives, like percentage plans and economic diversity programs.

Though such guidance doesn’t have the force of law, schools could presumably use it to defend themselves against lawsuits over admission policies.

The Trump administration’s Justice Department had already signaled concern about the use of race

in admissions decisions.

The department, for instance, has sided with Asian-American plaintiffs who contend in a lawsuit against Harvard that the school unlawfully limits how many Asian students are admitted.

Students for Fair Admissions, the group suing Harvard, is led by Ed Blum, a legal strategist who also helped white student Abigail Fisher sue the University of Texas for alleged discrimination in a case that reached the Supreme Court.

Blum said Tuesday the organization “welcomes any governmental actions that will eliminate racial classifications and preferences in college admissions.” Harvard, meanwhile, said it would continue considering race as an admissions factor to create a “diverse campus community where students from all walks of life have the opportunity to learn with and from each other.”

Civil liberties groups criticized the Trump administration’s

announcement, saying it went against decades of court precedent permitting colleges to take race into account.

“We condemn the Department of Education’s politically motivated attack on affirmative action and deliberate attempt to discourage colleges and universities from pursuing racial diversity at our nation’s colleges and universities,” Kristen Clarke, president and executive director of the Lawyers’ Committee for Civil Rights Under Law, said in a statement.

Lily Eskelsen García, president of the National Education Association, said “affirmative action has proven to be one of the most effective ways to create diverse and inclusive classrooms.” She said the announcement underscored the stakes surrounding the upcoming Supreme Court appointment.

The high court has been generally accepting of considering race in admissions decisions to achieve diversity. In a 2016 opinion written by Kennedy, the court granted affirmative action policies a victory by permitting race to be among the factors considered in the college admission process.

The ruling bitterly disappointed conservatives who thought Kennedy would be part of a Supreme Court majority to outlaw affirmative action in education. Justice Antonin Scalia died after the court heard arguments in the case but before the decision was handed down.

The new affirmative action guidance may add to an already contentious fight over the next justice.

# Thousands deported after fleeing gangs

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — Why did she do it? Why did she travel more than a thousand miles by bus and then ford the Rio Grande with a small band of desperate voyagers? Why did she endure the arid Texas landscape, with nothing but her common-law husband's black cap to shield her from the sun?

It was simple, the woman said.

She had already lost two children in the gang-ridden horror that is El Salvador. Her fear, she said, was that the killers "wanted to wipe out the whole family."

So the couple set out for the United States on May 13, hoping to reach Houston and her only surviving child, who had slipped across the U.S. border a year ago.

They did not make it. Barely an hour after they crossed into Texas, they were captured by the Border Patrol, separated and locked up. On Thursday, the mom, her wrists and ankles in chains, was flown with about 100 other would-be migrants back to El Salvador.

Thousands of others are in the same situation, having fled from ultraviolent gangs in El Salvador, Honduras and Guatemala, only to be caught near the U.S. border and sent back under the Trump administration's zero-tolerance policy.

U.S. President Donald Trump tweeted in June that "illegal immigrants, no matter how bad they may

be ... pour into and infest our Country, like MS-13."

Yet very few gang members try to get into the United States. In fiscal year 2017, the U.S. Border Patrol carried out 310,531 detentions of people who were in the U.S. illegally, but only 0.09 percent of them belonged to the gangs operating in Central America, according to U.S. Customs and Border Protection statistics. Instead, it's often people fleeing gangs who are trying to get into the United States.

In 2000, U.S. border patrol agents caught 1.6 million immigrants on the southwest border. Of those immigrants, 98 percent were Mexican, and only about 29,000 came from other countries. Contrast that with 2017, when nearly 163,000 immigrants from El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras were caught on the border — and roughly 128,000 Mexicans.

"These are people who are, for the vast majority, fleeing violence," said

Kathy Bougher, an American researching the human toll of migration. "And they need safety."

They are people like the woman who found herself in the immigration center for "returnees," plunged once again into the nightmare of being back in one of the world's most violent countries.

"I'm afraid," she said as she waited to be processed for re-entry. A government official called the names of other returned migrants who were sitting in orange plastic chairs so their possessions in small mesh plastic bags could be returned to them.

Because of safety concerns, the woman spoke with The Associated Press only on condition she not be identified. Her long hair twisted into a bun, wearing tight jeans and a white T-shirt smudged across the stomach from the chains she wore on the deportation flight, she said she had no option but to return to her house.

# Rising air ambulance bills hit patients with added shock

A helicopter trip to a hospital may not be the only shock a patient faces after a bad accident. The next one could hit when the bill arrives.

Rides in so-called air ambulances can lead to bills of more than \$20,000 depending on a person's coverage, and insurance experts say big invoices are becoming more common as costs rise and coverage shifts.

Air ambulances transport around 400,000 people each year in the U.S., according to industry estimates. Most trips are from one hospital to another. But they also play a vital role in getting seriously injured or ill people fast help during what doctors call "the golden hour" — the initial window after an accident when a patient's chances for recovery are better. Here's a deeper look at the issue:

## A spiraling expense

Median prices for helicopter air ambulance services doubled from around \$15,000 to about \$30,000 from 2010 to 2014, according to a U.S. Government Accountability Office report last year.

Patients with private insurance can get stuck with most of that bill if the helicopter that picks them up is not in their coverage network. In those cases, the air ambulance company

can bill the patient for the leftover balance after the insurer pays part of it. The GAO report said it was unclear how often patients are billed like this.

The main reason patient costs are rising is because the expense of running air ambulances has more than doubled in the past decade, but reimbursement from the government-funded Medicare program hasn't changed, said Blair Beggan, a spokeswoman with the trade group Association of Air Medical Services. She added that Medicare reimburses about 58 cents for every dollar air ambulance companies spend transporting patients, and some commercial insurers have been reducing their reimbursement to bring it closer Medicare rates.

That, Beggan said,

can force air ambulance companies to leave insurer networks.

The GAO report noted that air ambulance providers don't face the type of competition that could restrain costs. Patients have little control over the decision to call for an air transport and can't avoid companies that may be too expensive and outside their insurance network.

## Some preventive measures

There are limited safeguards for avoiding a big bill.

Some air ambulance companies will sell memberships that cost less than \$100 a year. Those will take care of flight expenses, but they often apply to only one company. A patient still might wind up stuck with a big bill if a competing

company responds to the call.

Some insurers will offer riders to employer-sponsored health coverage that allow workers to pay a few extra bucks a month in order to have any air ambulance flight covered as though it were in their network.

## Handling the big bill

Don't panic if a five-figure invoice arrives in your mailbox from an air ambulance company. There may be a way to resolve it, or at least knock down the amount.

Start by contacting your insurer to make sure the claim has been processed correctly. Some air ambulance companies provide patient advocates who do this.

An insurance broker also may be able to double-check the claim's accuracy or check for any potential discounts.

An air ambulance company will sometimes knock 10 percent off the bill without asking the customer to prove that it would be a financial hardship, said Marietta, Ohio, broker Kristen First. Even deeper reductions may be available for patients who produce tax filings, check stubs or other items showing how much of a strain the bill would impose.

First said her agency had a customer do that, and the air ambulance provider chopped a bill of about \$25,000 down to \$3,500.

# How much all-seeing AI surveillance is too much?

BOSTON — When a CIA-backed venture capital fund took an interest in Rana el Kaliouby's face-scanning technology for detecting emotions, the computer scientist and her colleagues did some soul-searching — and then turned down the money.

"We're not interested in applications where you're spying on people," said el Kaliouby, the CEO and co-founder of the Boston startup Affectiva. The company has trained its artificial intelligence systems to recognize if individuals are happy or sad, tired or angry, using a photographic repository of more than 6 million faces.

Recent advances in AI-powered computer vision have accelerated the race for self-driving cars and powered the increasingly sophisticated photo-tagging features found on Facebook and Google. But as these prying AI "eyes" find new applications in store checkout lines, police body cameras and war zones, the tech companies developing them are struggling to balance business opportunities with difficult moral decisions that could turn off customers or their own workers.

El Kaliouby said it's not hard to imagine using real-time face recognition to pick up on dishonesty — or, in the hands of an authoritarian regime, to monitor reaction to political speech

in order to root out dissent. But the small firm, which spun off from an MIT research lab, has set limits on what it will do.

The company has shunned "any security, airport, even lie detection stuff," el Kaliouby said. Instead, Affectiva has partnered with automakers trying to help tired-looking drivers stay awake, and with consumer brands that want to know if people respond to a product with joy or disgust.

Such queasiness reflects new qualms about the capabilities and possible abuses of all-seeing, always-watching AI camera systems — even as authorities are growing more eager to use them.

In the immediate aftermath of Thursday's deadly shooting at a newspaper in Annapolis, Maryland, police said they turned to face recognition to identify the uncooperative suspect. They did so by tapping a state database that includes mug shots of past arrestees and, more controversially, everyone who registered for a Maryland driver's license.

Initial information given to law enforcement authorities said that police had turned to facial recognition because the suspect had damaged his fingerprints in an apparent attempt to avoid identification. That report turned out to be incorrect and police said they used facial recognition because of delays in getting fingerprint identification.

# Forecast of heavy rain could complicate rescue

MAE SAI, Thailand — Heavy rains forecast for northern Thailand could worsen flooding in a cave where 12 boys and their soccer coach are waiting to be extracted by rescuers, possibly forcing authorities to have them swim out through a narrow, underwater passage in the cavern, a top official said Tuesday.

The 13, who disappeared when flooding trapped them in the cave they were exploring on June 23 after a soccer game, were found by rescue divers late Monday night in the cavern in northern Chiang Rai province during a desperate search. The effort drew international help and has riveted Thailand.

The boys, aged 11-16, and their 25-year-old coach were described as healthy and being looked after by seven members of the Thai navy SEALs, including medics, who were staying with them inside the cave. They were mostly in stable condition and have received high-protein drinks.

While efforts to pump out floodwaters are continuing, it's clear that some areas of the sprawling cavern cannot be drained, said Interior Minister Anupong Paojinda, a member of Thailand's ruling military junta. In order to get them out ahead of the bad weather forecast for later in the week, they might need to use diving gear while being guided by professional divers, he said.

Anupong said the boys would be brought out via the same complicated route through which their rescuers entered, and he conceded that if something went awry, it could be

disastrous.

"Diving is not easy. For people who have never done it, it will be difficult, unlike diving in a swimming pool, because the cave's features have small channels," he said. "If something happens midway, it could be life-threatening."

Video released by the Thai navy showed the boys in their soccer uniforms sitting in a dry area inside the Tham Luang Nang Non cave above the water as a light held by a rescuer was shone on their faces.

Cave rescue experts have said it could be safer to simply supply them where they are for now, rather than trying to have the boys dive out. That could take months, however, given that Thailand's rainy season typically lasts through October.

SEAL commander Rear Adm. Arpakorn Yookongkaew said there was no rush to bring them out, since they're safe where they are.

A doctor and a nurse were with them in the cave.

"We have given the boys food, starting from easily digested and high-powered food with enough minerals," Arpakorn told a news conference.

Having them dive out of the cave was one of several options being considered, "but if we are using this plan, we have to be certain that it will work and have to have a drill to make sure that it's 100 percent safe," he said.

Chiang Rai provincial Gov. Narongsak Osatanakorn said the health of the boys and coach were checked using a field assessment in which red is critical condition, yellow is serious and green is stable.

"We found that most of the boys are in green condition," he said. "Maybe some of the boys have injuries or light injuries and would be categorized as yellow condition. But no one is in red condition."

# Watchdog: Syrian group uncovering IS mass graves needs help

BEIRUT — Syrians working to uncover mass graves in an area once ruled by the Islamic State group need help to preserve evidence, identify human remains and shed more light on the horrors perpetrated by the militants, an international watchdog said Tuesday.

Human Rights Watch said thousands of bodies — of civilians slain by the extremists, residents killed in airstrikes by the U.S.-led coalition and of IS fighters — remain to be recovered in several mass graves in and around the city of Raqqa. The appeal came in a new report released Tuesday by the New York-based group.

Local members of the Raqqa Civil Council, a governing body set up by U.S.-backed and Kurdish-led forces, are "struggling to cope with the logistical challenges of collecting and organizing information" on the bodies uncovered and providing it to families searching for missing or dead relatives, HRW said.

Raqqa was the extremists' de facto capital and the seat of their self-proclaimed caliphate, which at the height of their power in 2014 stretched across a third of both Syria and Iraq. Since then an array of Syrian and Iraqi forces have driven IS from virtually all the territory it once held, but the group is still present in remote areas along the border.

The extremist group, which attracted fighters from around the world,

carried out mass killings and other atrocities, including public beheadings. Women and men accused of adultery were stoned to death, while men believed to be gay were thrown from the tops of buildings and then pelted with stones.

Human Rights Watch said identifying missing people and preserving evidence for possible prosecutions is critical for Syria's future.

"Raqqa city has at least nine mass graves, each one estimated to have dozens, if not hundreds, of bodies, making exhumations a monumental task," said Priyanka Motaparthi, acting emergencies director at HRW.

"Without the right technical assistance, these exhumations may not provide families with the answers they have been waiting for and could damage or destroy evidence crucial to future justice efforts," she added.

HRW quoted Yasser al-Khamis, head of first responders in Raqqa, as saying that land mines further complicate exhumations.

Recovery and analysis of remains from mass graves is a complex process that requires a high level of expertise. Exhumations carried out without forensic experts can destroy critical evidence and complicate the identification of bodies, the report said.

The team in Raqqa, for instance, didn't take photographs of bodies in accordance with international forensic standards, which is important in documentation, HRW said.

### WASHINGTON Trump courting motorcycle companies after Harley

President Donald Trump says the administration is courting motorcycle companies that want to move to the U.S. after Harley-Davidson said it's moving some assembly overseas.

# Heart of the fight

## At the root of US and China tariffs is brawl over high technology

WASHINGTON — To understand why the United States and China stand on the brink of a trade war, consider the near-death experience of American Superconductor Corp.

The company, known as AMSC and based in Massachusetts, was reeling after a Chinese partner stole its technology — the electronic brains that run wind turbines. The loss was devastating: AMSC's stock shed \$1 billion in value, and the company cut 700 jobs, more than half its workforce.

"Attempted corporate homicide" is what CEO Daniel McGahn called it. In January, its Chinese partner, Sinovel Wind Group, was convicted in a U.S. court of stealing AMSC's trade secrets.

To the Trump administration, Sinovel's predatory practices are hardly isolated. Beijing, it charges, is orchestrating a brass-knuckles campaign to supplant U.S. technological dominance

and over the next few decades make Chinese companies global leaders in such fields as robotics and electric vehicles.

According to a report by the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative, Beijing's tactics include coercing American companies to hand over trade secrets in return for access to the Chinese market; forcing U.S. businesses to license technology in China on unfavorable terms; using state funds to buy up American technology; and sometimes outright theft.

Critics have long asserted that China runs roughshod over intellectual property rights. But President Donald Trump, who ran for the White House on a vow to force China to reform its trade policies, is the first U.S. leader to risk a trade war between the world's two biggest economies.

"We've been in a trade war for a long time, but we weren't participating," said Richard Ellings, president of the National Bureau of Asian Research. "We've awakened. ... This is a fundamental change. It's a historic moment."

Critics argue, though, that while Trump has

picked the right fight, he has chosen the wrong weapon. They predict China will defy an array of U.S. tariffs set to take effect Friday and will retaliate immediately. And they warn that the escalating trade war will slow global growth and jeopardize the second-longest economic expansion in U.S. history.

Many analysts say the United States should have enlisted key allies like Japan and the European Union — which share U.S. complaints about Chinese trade policies — to impose unified pressure on Beijing. Instead, the U.S. is engaging in trade disputes with its friends over imported steel, aluminum and autos.

"There is no way to meaningfully influence Chinese behavior on intellectual property without coordination among like-minded advanced nations, and presently there is almost none," said Daniel Rosen of the economic research firm Rhodium Group.

Barring a last-minute breakthrough, the Trump administration will impose tariffs this week on \$34 billion in Chinese products that have benefited from China's strong-armed policies.

# Iran issues oil warning as UAE says production can rise

TEHRAN, Iran — Iran issued a new warning over Mideast oil supplies as the United Arab Emirates said on Tuesday it could increase its own production, the latest remarks to follow President Donald Trump's demand for lower global energy prices.

The comments by Iranian President Hassan Rouhani and the unexpected announcement by the UAE's oil-rich capital Abu Dhabi came as U.S. benchmark crude traded around \$75 a barrel.

A recent decision by the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries to increase the cartel's own production by 1 million barrels a day has yet to tamp down prices. That's led to higher prices at gasoline pumps in the United States as it heads toward midterm elections for Congress.

Speaking to Iranian expatriates Monday night in Switzerland, where he was on an official visit, Rouhani took aim at America.

The U.S. pulled out of the Iran nuclear deal in May and initially said it wanted allies to stop buying Iranian crude entirely.

The State Department said Monday it would examine waivers on a "case-by-case basis" as it re-imposes sanctions.

"The main goal of the United States by imposing sanctions is to put pressure on people, but they claim that they want to put pressure on the Iranian government," Rouhani's website quoted him as saying.

"But when they apply sanctions on people's basic needs like medicine, who will be put under pressure?"

Rouhani added that if Iran's crude oil exports were threatened, the rest of the Mideast's would be as well.

# Omaha architecture and wanting what we have

On a recent journey to Omaha, Nebraska, my husband utilized some free time to explore the city. Omaha is an exceptionally attractive and clean place, its hilly, urban sectors punctuated by unique architecture, plenty of green space

and a thriving downtown restaurant district.

A few blocks from a main thoroughfare, he found himself in a lovely, tree-lined neighborhood, with large lots and well-kept lawns, many featuring solid, brick homes built almost a hundred years ago. A real estate agent informed him that it was Warren Buffett's neighborhood. So, like millions of others, he drove by and took a photo of Mr. Buffett's house. So, sitting at my office desk and holding my phone, I find myself looking at the primary residence of America's most famous investor.

The home certainly doesn't qualify as a megamansion, even though it is extremely spacious. It actually looks fairly similar to many of the other homes in the neighborhood. There have been additions to the house over the years, and plenty of remodeling work. But the bones are the same as

when Buffett paid \$31,500 for it in 1958. It's now worth about \$650,000.

So what is Warren Buffett doing living in "only" an upper-middle-class, non-gated neighborhood? Someone worth \$87 billion can live wherever he chooses. Well, apparently Buffett likes the familiarity and feel of his long-time home. It's a classic example of wanting what we have. And of being satisfied with what is already ours, especially if it makes us happy.

So many of us (myself included) aspire to acquire, simply for the sake of "movin' on up" in the eyes of others. What most of us really seek is peace and quiet, familiarity and happiness. How many of us, for example, have traded in a perfectly good used car, one that runs well and suits our needs, just because its "newness" has faded? Glittery new purchases often are accompanied by burdensome price tags, and we can find ourselves

stuck with difficult, expensive payoffs long after the shine of newness recedes.

I am not naive enough to think that Mr. Buffett doesn't own other homes. He does, including an \$11 million house near the ocean in Laguna Beach, California. It's instructive to note, however, that Buffett paid \$150,000 in 1971 for the house, so it proved an excellent investment. That home is currently for sale, because he and his family seldom can gather to use it.

## Judge backs voters on land conservation

In a recent ruling, a circuit court judge effectively advised the Florida Legislature that it cannot implement a constitutional amendment any way that its members see fit. Good for the judge.

Good for Floridians — in this case, the overwhelming majority of voters who in 2014 supported Amendment 1, which was simply titled “Water and Land Conservation — Dedicates funds to acquire and restore Florida conservation and recreation lands.”

Environmental groups challenged the Legislature’s implementation of the amendment, which was endorsed by 75 percent (4.2 million) of those who voted on the measure. Amendment 1 was approved by 60 percent of voters in Bay County.

In other words, the water and land conservation amendment won in a landslide.

The amendment had several key requirements, and was proposed and adopted because the Legislature and governor failed to perform two vital tasks:

- Allocate sufficient revenue to satisfy a portion of the Florida Constitution that states: “It shall be the policy of the state to conserve and protect its natural resources and scenic beauty. Adequate provision shall be made by law ... for the conservation and protection of natural resources.”
- Meet the terms and intent of the Land Acquisition Trust Fund. Florida and its taxpayers made substantial investments in acquisition and preservation until 2009, when the state drastically reduced or eliminated funding of the premier program for acquisition — Florida Forever.

The Great Recession did force the Legislature to prioritize spending, and the revenues for the acquisition fund — from documentary stamps on real estate transactions — plummeted. But after the recession, conservation funding still lagged while revenues rose.

Amendment 1 had two main requirements:

- The state would allocate 33 percent of net revenues from the so-called doc stamps to water and land conservation.
- The revenues would be used to “acquire, restore, improve, and manage conservation lands including wetlands and forests; fish and wildlife habitat; lands protecting water resources and drinking water sources, including the Everglades, and the water quality of rivers, lakes, and streams; beaches and shores; outdoor recreational lands; working farms and ranches; and historic or geologic sites.”

The plaintiffs made a compelling case that the Legislature had not fulfilled the terms of the amendment. They cited a laundry list of expenses that, we suspect, few Floridians who voted for Amendment 1 would view as consistent with the amendment’s language and their intent. For instance, the lawsuit cited the use of funds for vehicles, office personnel and other expenditures that should be covered by the general fund.

Circuit Judge Charles Dodson, based in Leon County (home to Tallahassee, the state capital), clearly agreed with the plaintiffs’ arguments.

Perhaps Dodson’s ruling will be reversed. But this much is clear for now: At least one judge agreed that the implementation of Amendment One was mishandled, a view likely consistent with that of the 4.2 million Floridians who voted in favor of the measure.

## Democrats Should Nominate a Woman in 2020

In 1970, a third-party candidate named James Buckley defeated an incumbent in a race for the U.S. Senate in New York on the slogan: “Isn’t it time we had a senator?” In 2020, masses of female voters who have joined in a national mobilization against Donald Trump will be asking: “Isn’t it time we had a president?”

He won in 2016 despite getting only 42 percent of women’s votes. The first manifestation of the breadth and fervor of the postelection anti-Trump feeling was the Women’s March, held the day after his inauguration.

When the protests in Washington and other cities were tallied, scholars Erica Chenoweth and Jeremy Pressman reported that the event “was likely the largest single-day demonstration in recorded U.S. history.” More than 3 million people participated, most of them female.

One year later, huge crowds turned out again — 300,000 in Chicago — to oppose Trump and his policies. A Gallup Poll last January found that 45 percent of men approved of his performance — but only 33 percent of women did.

He has not just irretrievably alienated women; he has galvanized them.

When 28-year-old Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez upset veteran Democratic Rep. Joseph Crowley in a New York congressional Democratic primary Tuesday, she showed the value of offering something visibly different. Rep. John Yarmuth, D-Ky., said afterward, “You don’t want to run against a Democratic woman this year.”

Plenty of men reject Trump and what he stands for. But the face of the “resistance” is female — perhaps because women feel, and are, especially at risk from his administration. If he is defeated for re-election in 2020, they will be a major reason.

Such women are not likely to be content with replacing Trump with the 45th man to hold the office.

Trump’s election was a triumph of crude, old-fashioned misogyny and gender stereotyping over modern notions of equality. It forced many Americans to recognize the stubborn virulence of sexist attitudes.

The election of a woman in 2020 would serve as a thumping repudiation of Trump’s reckless, ill-informed, inhuman and dangerous policies but also his singularly malignant attitudes toward women. To replace him with Joe Biden, Bernie Sanders or one of any number of male senators and governors would implicitly discount the importance of eradicating sexism.

Trump won partly because of complacency among those who expected victory to go to Hillary Clinton,

who was so familiar and flawed that she defused enthusiasm even among members of her own sex.

Barack Obama was perfectly matched for the historical significance of being the first African-American president. Clinton lacked the capacity to inspire that moments of this magnitude demand.

Fortunately, the Democratic Party has many able and well-qualified female prospects. The most plausible all happen to be senators: Elizabeth Warren of Massachusetts, Kirsten Gillibrand of New York, Amy Klobuchar of Minnesota, Kamala Harris of California and Maggie Hassan of New Hampshire.

It’s not just that no man on the horizon is better equipped than any of these women to repair the damage done by Trump. It’s also that for 229 years, the highest office in the land has been deprived of the abilities of half the population.

Maybe a woman would bring talents, perceptions and ideas that have been lacking in previous occupants of the Oval Office. Maybe not. But we are way past due for a female candidate to be elected president. And nothing would be more fitting than for the loser to be Donald Trump.

Gaetz, who is up for re-election this year for Florida's First Congressional District, said he is "honored to have the support of President Trump and his family."


A spokesperson for the college confirmed their facilities were being rented for a Gaetz

## Former African American Cultural Center torn down

Center has been relocated to A.D. Harris

PANAMA CITY — From a patch of shade, Leon Miller watched as an excavator punched through the roof of the former African American Cultural Center.

The city-owned building was emptied months before, artifacts — old trophies, photos, textbooks, etc. that showed the proud history of the local African American community — packed up and moved to the A.D. Harris Learning Center, where they now are on display.

All that was left of 1412 Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd. on Tuesday morning was a shell of a building, a shell

with a leaking roof at that.

It took just one hour to tear it to the ground.

There's a path forward, Leisure Service Director Keith Baker said. The contents of the Cultural Center are in a better, non-leaking facility, he said. The lot will be turned into a 50-space parking lot, which will solve the parking issue in the neighborhood and literally pave the way for the MLK Recreation Center to be turned into a premiere park.

"This is going to be a positive thing," Baker said.

But Miller — who had hand-picked the site with former Commissioner Jonathan Wilson for the center years ago — couldn't help but "hurt" watching the building crumble.

"I feel real bad," he said. "I think the money could have been found to remodel

it."

Eddie Ball, an investigator with the State Attorney's Office who pulled over when he saw the heavy equipment on the property, said he felt the same way, finding himself reluctant to watch.

"I liked this location right across from the park," said Ball, who feels it's important for the African American youth in the neighborhood to be connected to their history. "The sacrifice that's been made, it's like it's being hidden. If we hide our history from our youth that's coming up in our community they are going to be lost like Gilligan on the island."

The African American Cultural Center was established in the early 2000s as a joint effort by the city and community.

"We had let a lot of our history get away," said

Wilson, who remembers trophies of African American students at Rosenwald being thrown out when the school integrated, until a teacher picked them out of the trash. "We decided to build a cultural center to recoup that history."

They picked 1412 MLK Jr. for three reasons: the building has a long history in the community as a nightclub, church, cafe and outreach center; it was right across from the park so people could easily access it; and most importantly, it was available.

There had been plans to expand and renovate the building, which dates back to at least the 1950s, Wilson said, but they never came to fruition.

"I hate to see it go,"

## Chipleman convicted on hundreds of counts of child porn

PANAMA CITY — A Chipleman could be facing several life sentences after being convicted Tuesday of more than a 100 sex crimes he perpetrated and documented on his cellphone.

Scott Ernest Allen, 35, was found guilty as charged of 127 charges after the one-day trial. He was arrested in September 2016 after a child reported

that a man slid a cellphone under a dressing room stall in an attempt to record her changing clothes. Officers later discovered numerous disturbing videos on Allen's phone, including him sexually battering an infant. Allen could now face mandatory life in prison, three life sentences and an additional 580 years in prison for 127 combined counts in the case, including capital sexual battery on a child under 12.

According to police reports, the case came to light in August 2016 when Lynn Haven Police Department officers responded to the Goodwill, 1610 State 77, after a girl spotted the phone and walked out of the changing room to tell her father, who summoned the store's management as the man fled.

"She went and told her dad, her dad told an employee, but the guy left the other changing room and exited the store

## Chapman enters District 3 School Board race

PANAMA CITY — After eyeing the Bay District School Board District 3 seat for more than a decade, Pamm Chapman finally has tossed her hat in the ring, officially filing and qualifying to run against longtime incumbent Joe Wayne Walker.

While the desire to run for the school board never dampened, a series of events

meant that the timing was never right, she explained.

Ten years ago, her father had

just died, and her father-in-law Joe Chapman's bank, Peoples First Bank, had just failed and was taken over by another company. Then her children were in school, and, she said, people were concerned she would lose time with them by running for

school board. So she waited and watched as election after uncontested election rolled by, until it was time.

"I feel like on the board, no one has been there for the last eight or 10 years, there hasn't been anybody new," she said. "I feel like when I go to the school board meetings, I get frustrated because it's very complacent."

Saying she is the "hardest working non-working person ever," Chapman has worked on numerous fundraising projects during the

years and sits on multiple boards, including the Bay Medical Foundation board, the Gulf Coast State College Foundation board, the Tom P. Haney Foundation board and the Bay Education Foundation board. With a finance degree from Florida State University, Chapman said there's a need on the board for someone with a financial background, someone who will ask questions, stay on top of things

support in a county that voted overwhelmingly for Trump. However, the Progressives of Northwest Florida, a left-leaning group, announced Sunday it would be organizing a protest against Trump Jr.'s visit, according to Tracey Tapp, Action Committee chair for the group.

Tapp said more than

100 people were expected to join the protest, and they will be joined with the Northwest Florida State College Gay Straight Alliance for the event.

"I think many people are really concerned about the direction our country is going in," Tapp said. "I don't think authoritarianism and fascism are too strong of words to use ... the only thing that's required for evil to triumph is for good people to do nothing. We're standing on our

morals and principals."

Mark Franks, chairman of the Okaloosa County Republican Executive Committee, said he was pleased to hear about the scheduled Trump Jr. visit.

"There's going to be a lot of energy in the air with this visit and I believe Trump Jr. is coming to Okaloosa because they know Northwest Florida is a pivotal stop for any Republican race," Franks said. "The Panhandle is a large area that turns out votes and can make or break an election. We are

a very active and enthusiastic group and we look forward to the next two months and welcome all Republican candidates who want to earn our vote."

before any contact was made by either her dad or the employee," officers reported. The child "stated the guy stared at her while he was walking out of the store; she then went back in the changing room and changed back into her own pants."

But security video, a good description of the vehicle and a fast-food receipt left inside the changing room led officers to Allen. He was arrested in September and a search of his vehicle revealed several computer storage devices and computer discs, officials wrote.

With Allen wanted

on video voyeurism charges, officers obtained a search warrant for the devices, on which officers reported they found images of child pornography and bestiality, as well as photos of Allen committing sexual battery on a child under the age of 12. Some of the recordings dated back more than a year, officers reported.

Allen initially was charged with video voyeurism, possession of child pornography and sexual battery on a child under the age of 12. LHPD then filed 116 counts of possession of photographs or videos that depict sexual performances by a child under the age of 12.

He was convicted as charged Tuesday in the case and will be sentenced July 17.

Wilson said. "But changes come ... and it's fine it's at A.D. Harris, as long as people know where it is and programs are viable."

Commissioner Ken Brown, who represents the Glenwood community and has long wanted to build an African American history museum, said Wilson deserves a "standing ovation."

"We need to ensure what he started never ends. Since we needed to move the cultural center to a new building, I'm happy it was moved to A.D. Harris because it is one of the most historical buildings in the community," Brown said.

"The parking and potential expansion plans for the MLK Rec Center are going to benefit the community in many ways, one by allowing citizens to come together and host events like sporting tournaments."

In addition to the parking lot, the city — through a partnership with the Downtown North CRA — will be adding lighting and stormwater infrastructure capable of accommodating the parking lot and a potential expansion of the MLK Recreation Center in the fall.

The second part of the project has not been put out to bid.

In total, the project is expected to cost \$280,000 and is being paid for by the Downtown North CRA.

# Destin city manager asked to resign

**In 4-3 vote, council cites 'deep mistrust'**

DESTIN — In a 4-3 vote Monday night, the City Council agreed to give City Manager Carisse LeJeune two weeks to tender her resignation.

The motion was made by Councilman Rodney Braden, who did not explain his reasoning.

However, Councilman Chatham Morgan cited “deep mistrust” between Destin’s staff and the council as a big problem.

“For the past six months, there has been ... a division brewing between our staff and our City Council,” Morgan said at the meeting. “I think there are certainly members of this City Council that have serious reservations and trust issues with our staff, and I’m one of them.”

Braden, Morgan, Councilman Parker Destin and Councilwoman Prebble Ramswell voted for LeJeune’s resignation. Council members Cyron Marler, Tuffy Dixon and Skip Overdier voted no.

LeJeune was brought on as city manager in July 2016 after serving as interim city manager for about two months. The council in February unanimously approved giving her a 1 percent merit-based salary increase based on her

overall job performance in fiscal 2017. That pay hike increased her salary to \$123,821.

According to her amended employment agreement, which LeJeune signed Monday night, she has until July 13 to submit her written resignation to the City Clerk. If she resigns before or on that date, she will receive her monthly salary for July and August 2018, in addition to 26 weeks’ salary and payment for any unused sick or vacation leave on Sept. 1.

She also is eligible to receive a maximum of \$1,000 for moving expenses if she moves out of her home in Niceville before Aug. 14, 2019.

If she resigns, her last day will be Aug. 14.

The agreement specifies that the resignation “shall be deemed a resignation for the mutual benefit of the city

manager, the city, and the Destin City Council and shall not be deemed a termination in any way.”

Braden had a review of LeJeune’s performance added to the meeting agenda on late Friday afternoon. But at Monday’s meeting, several council members, including Overdier and Mayor Gary Jarvis, who were both elected in March, said they were caught off guard by that addition.

During the meeting, the council had to take a short break so each council member could receive a copy of LeJeune’s amended contract. “This is the first time I’m seeing this,” Overdier said. “What started this? What are we trying to do here? There’s obviously something going on I don’t know about.”

He and Jarvis defended LeJeune and praised her for the assistance she has

given them as new council members.

“No one would do this (crafting the terms of LeJeune’s resignation) unless they thought they had the four votes to make this happen,” said Jarvis, who does not have general voting power on the council. “I apologize, Carisse, but I want some justification for this, and if things get a little bit muddy, they get a little muddy.”

“I just think this looks bad for the city of Destin. I know this is not good for our community. It’s not good for city staff. I’m not happy.”

Marler noted that he already has been through five city managers during his time on the council.

“Destin has a reputation for not holding on to a city manager,” he said. “I was caught off guard also. What has she done that is so wrong? I don’t want to go through another city manager. I’ve been through enough of them.”

Dixon said he did not like “how this went down” and would not support Braden’s motion to have LeJeune resign.

When asked by Ramswell to comment, LeJeune said she deals with facts.

“The fact is, I was presented with this amendment to my contract sometime between 2 and 3 o’clock this afternoon,” she said.

“The fact that it was presented to me at all let me know I don’t have the

full confidence of my City Council.”

She said by tendering her resignation, she would retain her reputation as a professional, “even though it pains me to leave my staff and the citizens of Destin. But if there is no hope of a solid working relationship with all of the members of the council, perhaps I’m not a good fit as a city manager.”

Several residents spoke in support of LeJeune before Braden made most of his comments and before Ramswell and Morgan brought up problems they have with her.

Resident Mike Parker said he and the entire city have confidence in LeJeune.

“We want this woman in the position of city manager,” he said. “I ask you to reconsider and take a step back. She has done a wonderful job for this city.”

Another resident said the move to force LeJeune to resign sets a poor example of what to expect in Destin. And resident Walt Newman said he opposes the practice of council members voting on an issue but not explaining their reasoning.

Braden told the audience that no matter what he said, “You’ve already got your minds made up. There’s a whole lot more going on on this side, between the council and the city manager. If you want to see what’s going on on this side, run for the

council and you’ll see. I don’t want to go through all of my reasoning and drag anybody through the mud.”

Morgan said the “division” between city staff and the council for the past six months was not entirely LeJeune’s fault.

For example, the city’s recent visioning session “was an absolute joke,” he said.

“Not once was I, as a policy decision maker, asked for my opinion,” he said. “It was clear that city staff was not interested in my vision for the city.”

He also said that even if he voted not to amend LeJeune’s contract, “There is a large part of this council that does not have trust in her.”

Ramswell said she agreed with Morgan. She added that LeJeune has failed to provide clarification on various requested items or give reasons for various actions by staff, and that different city committee members have complained about getting their meeting agenda an hour before their meeting and not getting other documents at all.

Those represent “deep problems that cannot occur,” said Ramswell, who later added, “I don’t like hurting anyone. I don’t want to see anyone lose their job. But I have to follow my heart and my gut. Carisse feels there is no faith up here anymore. I have deep concerns that have thus far not been remedied.”

# Concealed weapon permit review finds state mistakes

TALLAHASSEE — A 2012 internal investigation released this week to The Associated Press after a records request found that 48 Florida Department of Agriculture

and Consumer Services employees made mistakes while issuing concealed weapon permits and armed security guard or similar licenses.

One employee resigned during the investigation, one was fired and others received suspensions or

written reprimands. In all, two concealed weapons permits and one armed security guard license were revoked, according to department spokeswoman Jennifer Meale.

Department Commissioner Adam Putnam, a Republican candidate for governor, was criticized last month after acknowledging that the agency revoked 291 permits awarded in 2016 and 2017 and fired an employee last year.

The department’s inspector general began an investigation in August 2012 after it learned an employee issued an armed security guard license to a felon. The employee’s supervisor said there had been past problems with the employee issuing licenses to felons and counseling occurred beginning in 2008, but no formal disciplinary action was taken. Putnam took office in January 2011.

The employee resigned during the investigation, which found he had issued 35 licenses without looking at the applications or

reviewing arrest reports. At that point, the inspector general decided to review the work of all employees who processed license applications and renewals.

Computer records from July 2010 to July 2012 were reviewed to see if employees opened license applications. Investigators also could tell if only the first page of applications was reviewed while subsequent pages were ignored.

Of the 47 other employees who failed to follow proper review procedures, the error rate varied widely, from an employee who reviewed 2,219 applications and failed in one case to look at the second page of a security officer license renewal, to a woman fired after it was learned she approved 3,625 licenses without a full review, including 99 concealed weapons permit applications that were never viewed. Her error rate was almost 13 percent of the 28,275 licenses processed.

Several employees blamed the errors on

computer glitches, while other said phone calls and other distractions might have caused them to make mistakes.

The inspector general made several recommendations since implemented by the department, including random checks of approved licenses, improved employee training and weekly reports reviewed by

supervisors to ensure employees are complying with licensing procedures.

“What these IG reports show is that we learned of a problem, evaluated it thoroughly, took action to hold employees accountable and implemented checks and balances,” Inspector General Ron Russo said in a statement issued by the department.

Man charged with making  
arson threat against  
girlfriend, child**

One man is in custody after he allegedly poured kerosene throughout his home and threatened to burn down the house with himself, his two-year-old child and the mother of his child inside, according to the Bay County Sheriff's Office.

Christopher Scott Kelley, 31, was charged last week with aggravated assault

with a deadly weapon and battery in connection with the incident.

The Bay County Sheriff's Office reported responding June 26 to the Dollar General on U.S. 231. One of the employees was complaining about her boyfriend coming to the business and harassing her at work. Before coming to work, she told deputies that she and her boyfriend, Kelley, had a verbal argument. She said Kelley had grabbed her arms and held them to her sides, then poured kerosene inside their home and threatened to light it on fire, killing himself, along with the woman and their two-year-old child. The victim provided videos of the argument.

She also told officers she tried to calm Kelley

and got herself ready for work, taking the child to her mother's house for babysitting. After she got to work, Kelley came to the business and began harassing her, officials reported.

When investigators arrived at Kelley's home, they saw evidence of kerosene poured inside the home. Kelley had been cleaning the home. Kelley later admitted to investigators he had poured the kerosene and made the threat, but only "as a threat to get her to stop arguing," officers wrote.

After his first appearance Thursday, he was held on combined \$25,000 bond.

2 men charged in theft  
of trailer from home**

Two Bay County men have been arrested after authorities said they were caught on video stealing a trailer from a home, according to the Bay County Sheriff's Office.

Ryan Weaver, 22, of 8537 Keller Road, Panama City, and Jeremy Scott, 33, of 1304 Texas Ave., Lynn Haven, were charged with grand theft and dealing in stolen property. Weaver also was charged with possession of drug paraphernalia, two counts of non-moving traffic violations, and possession of methamphetamine. ## England finally wins penalty shootout

MOSCOW — In a World Cup of surprises, England provided the latest by finally winning a penalty shootout.

A long run of penalty misery on soccer's biggest stage ended with a 4-3 shootout victory over Colombia on Tuesday, sending England to the quarterfinals for the first time in 12 years.

Eric Dier scored the decisive kick after a scrappy game ended in a 1-1 draw, denying Colombia a second consecutive trip to the quarterfinals.

"It was a nervous one," Dier said. "I've never really been in a situation like that before."

England will next play Sweden in the quarterfinals

LOS ANGELES — "Space Jam 2?" A whole new "House Party" franchise?

With the leadership of LeBron James, anything is possible.

As James comes from Cleveland to Los Angeles looking to take the Lakers to more championships with a blockbuster \$154 million contract announced this week, he could also push those two 1990s properties closer to reality and go from part-time presence to major player in Hollywood.

James hasn't yet spoken about his plans for Los Angeles. But if he wants to, he's already shown he can act, and not just in that good-for-an-athlete way.

His one real film role, playing himself in the 2015 Amy Schumer film "Trainwreck," directed by Judd Apatow, won big raves.

The Associated Press' Lindsey Bahr called him "a comedic revelation." Ann Hornaday of The Washington Post said he showed "expert, deadpan timing."

James' co-stars agreed.

"He was really good. Like everything with him it was very effortless," said Bill Hader, who played the movie's male lead with James as his sidekick and previously acted with James when he hosted "Saturday Night Live." "He's always listening. I know actors that don't listen, they're just waiting to say their line. He listened."

Hader said there was frequent improvisation on "Trainwreck," and LeBron easily kept up with the sketch comedy pros like Hader.

"You'll never believe this, but he was super confident," Hader told the AP with a laugh by phone from the Toronto set of the film "It 2."

"But not cocky," Hader added.

"I remember Chris Rock was on set and rattled off a line suggestion really fast for LeBron, and LeBron said it back during the scene verbatim," Hader

# Free agency trend: Stay home, or sign short deals

For those seeking the trend in NBA free agency this year, it's this: Most players are either staying put, or taking short-term deals that allow them to hit the market again next summer.

Such was largely the case Tuesday.

Utah kept two of its free agents, agreeing to extensions with Dante Exum (three years, \$33 million) and Raul Neto (two years, \$4.4 million). Avery Bradley, in a deal that was struck late Monday night, is also staying put — coming to terms with the Los Angeles Clippers on a two-year contract worth \$25 million.

Most of the other known deals that were made on Day 3 of free agency were all of the short-term variety.

Tyreke Evans got \$12 million to spend next season with the Indiana Pacers. Jeff Green agreed to terms on a \$2.4 million, one-year deal with Washington — which is expected to seek another one-year pact with Dwight Howard later this month when he finalizes his Brooklyn buyout — and Michael Carter-Williams got a veteran's minimum deal to play in Houston next season.

All the deals were confirmed to The Associated Press by people familiar with the negotiations, all of whom spoke on condition of anonymity because the NBA offseason moratorium on signings does not end until Friday.

The Jazz have quietly crossed off many items on

their summertime wish list, with general manager Dennis Lindsey going into free agency saying he wanted to keep all three of his team's internal free agents.

Check. Check. And check. The deals with Exum and Neto came one day after Utah agreed to keep Derrick Favors on a two-year, \$36 million deal.

Evans will give Indiana's offense a lift. He's a proven scorer, someone who expanded his 3-point ability last season when he averaged 19.4 points per game with Memphis.

Green fills a big-man void, after the Wizards traded away starting center Marcin Gortat — the hole that Howard conceivably will fill — and losing backup power forward Mike Scott to free agency. Green, who turns 32 in August, spent last season with the Eastern Conference champion Cleveland

Cavaliers.

Carter-Williams gives Houston some guard depth behind MVP James Harden and Chris Paul, and Houston gives Carter-Williams yet another chance to restart what was a very promising career. He was the NBA's rookie of the year for Philadelphia in 2013-14 when he averaged 16.7 points per game. But his scoring average has dropped each year since, and the Rockets will be his fifth team in six seasons.

With LeBron James being a very obvious exception — getting four years to leave Cleveland for the Los Angeles Lakers — most of the biggest signings so far have been players staying home. Those include Paul staying with Houston, Nikola Jokic with Denver, Paul George with Oklahoma City, Aaron Gordon with Orlando, Golden State's Kevin Durant and Denver's Will Barton.

# Past champs Sharapova, Kvitova beaten at Wimbledon of upsets

LONDON — These are not the sorts of matches Maria Sharapova is supposed to lose, letting lead after lead slip away Tuesday against a qualifier ranked 132nd — and in the first round of Wimbledon, no less.

Then again, at this edition of The Championships, as they prefer to call the event around here, the initial 48 hours have provided more surprising exits than anyone's accustomed to: A total of seven top-10 men's and women's seeds departed in the opening round, more than in any previous year in the professional era's half-century.

That includes two-time champion Petra Kvitova, who was sent home by Aliaksandra Sasnovich of Belarus 6-4, 4-6, 6-0 a few hours before 2004 titlist Sharapova folded against Vitalia Diatchenko in a 6-7 (3), 7-6 (3), 6-4 loss she seemingly controlled time and again before dropping the last three games.

"Sometimes," Sharapova said, "you put yourself in a better, or winning, position, and you don't finish."

A 15-month doping ban kept her out of the grass-court Grand Slam tournament in 2016, and an injury sidelined her a year ago. It looked as if it would be a pleasant, straightforward return when she

went ahead by a set and a break at 5-2.

Sharapova then served for the match at 5-3, but faltered. After being pushed to a third set, Sharapova went up a break at 2-1. That edge disappeared right away. She went up another break at 4-3. That advantage, too, was given right back. Sharapova's collapse eventually ended, perhaps fittingly, with her 11th double-fault.

How unlikely was this result?

Since losing the first two Grand Slam matches of her career as a teenager, Sharapova was 49-1 in openers at majors, 13-0 at Wimbledon.

She's a former No. 1, now seeded 24th, who owns five Grand Slam titles.

And Diatchenko?

Repeatedly sidetracked by injuries of one sort or another — "I think I will write a book after I finish playing," Diatchenko joked about her health history, even on a day she was visited by a trainer for groin and lower back issues — the 27-year-old Russian came in 0-2 at Wimbledon and 8-25 overall in main-draw matches at all tour-level events.

"Everybody," Diatchenko said afterward, "expects me to lose the match."

But she didn't, in part because Sharapova failed to win it.

said. "I remember thinking, 'I can't do that.'"

He wouldn't be the first Laker to try acting. Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Shaquille O'Neal had their share of famous, and infamous roles. And Kobe Bryant ended up with an unlikely Academy Award for an animated short based on a poem he wrote about basketball.

Whether or not he appears on screen, James has already begun a major media career that can only get a boost from LA.

Gone are the days when athletes had to be in a major market to make it in film and television, as James himself has shown through his years building his brand in Cleveland.

But there's nothing like face-time for becoming a force in Hollywood.

James and his business partner Maverick Carter have a production company, SpringHill Entertainment, that has a deal with Warner Bros. and office space on the legendary movie company's lot, where he could become a regular.

"Certainly the proximity will make it easier for LeBron personally to be part of future projects," said David Schwab, an executive vice president at Octagon, a global sports and entertainment marketing and management firm. "The advantage of a market like New York, Los Angeles and Golden State is the ability to have coffee, lunch or dinner daily" with key decision makers. "In a smaller market you don't get those consistent opportunities," he said.

on Saturday in Samara. It is the furthest England has progressed in any tournament since the David Beckham era, when a golden generation of players exited the 2002 and 2006 World Cups in the last eight.

England is advancing in Russia after defending champion Germany was eliminated early and Argentina, Portugal and Spain went home in the round of 16.

Harry Kane gave England the lead with a penalty kick in the 57th minute. But as the game entered the third minute of stoppage time, Yerry Mina headed in an equalizer.

"To get knocked down at the end like we did at the end, it's difficult to come back from that," Dier said. "But we were ready for that. We were calm. We stuck to our plan."

England trailed 3-2 in the penalty shootout after Jordan Henderson's shot was saved, but Mateus Uribe hit the bar and goalkeeper Jordan Pickford then saved Carlos Bacca's kick.

"I did a whole bunch of research," Pickford said.

"Falcao is the only one who didn't go his way. I don't care if I'm not the biggest keeper in the world. I have the power and agility."

Pickford succeeded where Peter Shilton, David Seaman and Paul Robinson failed as the 1990, 1998 and 2006 World Cup campaigns ended in shootout losses. On top of that, England was knocked out of the 1996 European Championship semifinals and the quarterfinals in 2004 and 2012 on penalties. The country's only shootout success came earlier at Euro '96.

With a fresh generation of players not burdened by past misery, England coach Gareth Southgate has helped to banish painful memories of his own: Missing the final kick at Euro '96 against Germany.

After exiting the 2014 World Cup without winning a game in the group stage, the squad has been remodeled with a youthful, more street-wise mentality by Southgate at his first major tournament as coach.

### SWEDEN 1, SWITZERLAND 0:

The heir to Zlatan Ibrahimovic finally delivered for Sweden at the World Cup. Emil Forsberg scored a deflected goal in the 66th minute to give the Swedes a victory over

Switzerland and a place in the World Cup quarterfinals for the first time in 24 years. Shy and understated, the 26-year-old Forsberg couldn't be more different than the larger-than-life Ibrahimovic, who ruled the Sweden team for more than a decade and was the greatest player the country ever produced. But Forsberg arrived in Russia shouldering the creative burden left by Ibrahimovic following his retirement two years ago, and the attacking midfielder's skills and slick movement stood out at St. Petersburg Stadium. Forsberg's scruffy shot from the edge of the area was likely heading straight for Switzerland goalkeeper Yann Sommer, but it took a deflection off the boot of center back Manuel Akanji and landed in the net. In stoppage time, Michael Lang was sent off for Switzerland for a professional foul on Sweden substitute Martin Olsson. The referee initially awarded a penalty kick but later gave a free kick after a video review. Sweden became the fifth European team to reach the quarterfinals and will play either England or Colombia on Saturday in Samara. The last time Sweden made it this far at the World Cup was in 1994, when the team reached the semifinals.

Sanders comes from Hinds Community College

in Mississippi. He is the brother of running back Trey Sanders, a five-star recruit in the 2019 recruiting cycle. He turned down scholarship offers to Jackson State and Murray State to walk-on at UF.

Jackson is a versatile athlete who played cornerback, wide receiver and quarterback during a standout high school career at Tampa Cambridge Christian.

As a dual-threat quarterback, he passed for 5,621 yards and 66 touchdowns and rushed for 1,858 yards and 30 TDs during his high school career. He could get a look at several positions at UF.

Ortiz, who is from Richmond, Va., was rated one of the nation's top long snappers coming out of high school. The 6-5, 230-pound Ortiz was ranked a five-star prospect and the No. 6 long snapper in the country by Rubio Long Snapping.

### Owens says he will give speech at Chattanooga

Terrell Owens has decided to celebrate his induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame at Chattanooga, where he played college football.

The former NFL All-Pro receiver, who has said he was not attending the induction ceremony in Canton, Ohio, released a statement on Tuesday saying he would give his acceptance speech at his alma mater.

“I have decided to give my Hall of Fame speech at the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga in McKenzie Arena on Saturday, August 4,” Owens posted on Twitter. “The event, which is free and open to the public, starts at 3:17 p.m.”

Owens added that he is “proud to be a Moc, and I’m honored to be able to share this experience with my family, friends, teammates and fans at the place that provided me an opportunity beyond high school and where I truly began to find myself as an athlete.”

### MOSCOW US World Cup ratings down 42 percent

The lack of a U.S. team caused a big viewership drop for World Cup telecasts.

The 48 group stage telecasts on Fox and FS1 averaged 2,069,000 viewers, according to Nielsen Media Research. That is down 42 percent from the 3.54 million average on ESPN, ESPN2 and ABC four years ago and down 15 percent from the 2,429,000 average on ESPN, ESPN2 and ABC eight years ago.

Excluding games involving the U.S. team in previous World Cups, the average declined 28 percent from the 2014 tournament in Brazil and was up 1 percent from the 2010 tournament in South Africa.

Most group-stage kickoff times this year were morning EDT, starting as early as 6 a.m., and the latest matches began at 2 p.m. Games in 2014 started mostly from noon to 4 p.m. EDT, while in 2010 games there were many matches at 10 a.m. and some as early as 7:30 a.m.

# Russia tries to shake off doping scandals at World Cup

NOVOGORSK, Russia — A global event on Russian soil, and the home team can’t stop winning. Sports fans have seen this story before, and it had a bitter ending.

Russia hopes its surprise World Cup success is finally bringing it out of the shadow of the Sochi Olympics, which were tainted by widespread doping and accusations the government was complicit.

Goalkeeper and captain Igor Akinfeev, the hero of Russia’s surprise win over Spain on Sunday, said Tuesday the football team is writing its own story, and has nothing to do with Russia’s troubled Olympic program. Russian athletes had to compete under a neutral flag at the Winter Olympics in February after years of doping scandals.

“I don’t think football and the Olympics really come into contact with each other. Of course we all watched the Olympics and we

were worried but that’s its own story,” he said. “The current national (football) team wants to win and that’s the most important thing.”

Akinfeev was speaking after training at Russia’s Novogorsk Olympic base outside Moscow, a vast complex which the team shares with numerous other sports. On the next field, members of Russia’s suspended track and field team trained, including the triple jumper Ekaterina Koneva, who was once banned for having artificially high testosterone levels.

Deputy Prime Minister Vitaly Mutko — who was Sports Minister for the 2014 Sochi Olympics — is a frequent visitor to Russia’s World Cup training sessions and celebrated the Spain win in the team’s dressing room. He was banned for life in December after the International Olympic Committee ruled his ministry didn’t do enough to stop organized doping.

## ACES ON BRIDGE: BOBBY WOLFF

"Never wrestle with a pig. You'll both get dirty, but the pig will like it."  
— Irish proverb

In today's deal, three different declarers all reached six no-trump rather than six diamonds. That contract looks best at both pairs and teams, since there are some additional chances in no-trump when diamonds do not behave.

The first declarer won the heart lead in dummy and played a diamond to the nine and queen. The defenders persisted in hearts, so declarer cashed a top diamond to find the bad news, then took the club ace and the heart winners. He pitched a club and diamond from dummy and ran the spades, squeezing West in the minor suits.

The second declarer won the heart jack and cashed the diamond ace and king. The bad break made him pause, but he eventually decided to cash the hearts, pitching a diamond and club from the table, then run the spades. West came down to two diamonds and the bare club king, but declarer had no option but to play a club to the ace. When the king came tumbling down, he had his 12th trick.

The third declarer played a diamond to the ace and ducked a diamond; this was technically best, since if the suit had split 4-1, he would have been home regardless of the rank of West's singleton, as well as when East had a bare honor. As it was, when West won the diamond jack and returned a heart, declarer had transposed into the first declarer's line. He took his club ace and heart winners, and ran the spades to force West to concede in the two-card ending.

## Stone fruit recipes sweeten summer

PANAMA CITY — Peaches are at season's peak — making July Fourth the perfect time for snacking, dipping, drinking, grilling and baking with this versatile stone fruit.

My husband's recent craving for cobbler led to a trip to Lucky's Market for Southern peaches to make Fresh Southern Peach Cobbler — something the whole family could dive into — and my passion for peaches was reignited.

"Peach season is June, July and August," said Sara Bartoli, assistant produce manager at Lucky's Market, 2329 Martin Luther King Blvd., which hosted Power to the Pit (a celebration of seasonal stone fruit) on June 30 and July 1.

From Southern to Donut, White and Large Yellow, there's a peach for every occasion. The mildly sweet Donut, aka "Saturn" for their shape, and White peaches both have white flesh and are perfect for eating raw, while the tarter Southern and Large Yellow peaches are best for cooking.

"The White peaches, I personally think, are sweeter than the yellow," Bartoli said. "The yellow is good for pies and cobblers, peach smoothies."

Once you've decided the type of peach, then you can check for ripeness. Peaches should be

yellow to deep golden, and firm with a little give when squeezed.

"When you squeeze, you want to use the palm of your hand instead of your fingers," Bartoli said.

Peaches will continue to ripen on the counter, so get less ripe peaches if you don't plan on making the recipe for a couple of days. Once ripe, yellow peaches will last in the refrigerator three to five days. Lucky's produce managers also advise white peaches ripen quicker, so they won't last more than a day in the fridge.

"For me, I always try to find the worst looking one possible, looking bruised and dented. The ones you think no one is going to want, but you bite into it and it has a nice sweet flavor," said Lucky's Produce Manager Nick Van Meter.

While those peaches can be good to enjoy the same day for snacking, overripe peaches can be mushy when used in recipes.

Peaches can be eaten with or without the skin, though I left the skin on for snacking as well as the recipes. If you prefer to peel the peach, Lucky's suggests using a paring knife to mark the peach in quarters and then peel back each section. The peach also can be boiled for 20 to 30 seconds, then cooled and peeled from the top down.

Van Meter demonstrated how

### Pick perfect peach

Lucky's Market produce managers shared tips: Buy stone fruit that is fragrant and responds gently to palm pressure.

You can't just drop them in your grocery bag like an apple. They can get crushed and bruise easily; pack them carefully.

Stone fruit should ripen at room temperature (two to three days, stems down) and out of direct sunlight. At peak ripeness, store in the refrigerator (in a bowl and not a plastic bag) to preserve flavor.

Remove fruit from the refrigerator one hour before eating and enjoy at room temperature.







to remove the pit from a peach. Carve around the pit from the stem to the bottom, then twist the halves in opposite directions to open. The knife can be used knife to dislodge and pop out the pit.

I decided I was up to the challenge of trying more peach recipes, and I picked up additional Southern peaches for a second batch of cobbler and a Fresh Peach BBQ Sauce.

The Fresh Peach BBQ Sauce, which was adapted from Food Done Light, seriously made for the best grilled chicken quarters I have ever eaten. The sauce was smoky from the cumin, savory yet slightly sweet from the four to five fresh peaches, with a little bite from the fresh jalapeno. We omitted the pureed chipotle in adobo sauce and used regular, not low-sodium, Worcestershire and soy sauce. See the full recipe at FoodDoneLight.com. The sauce was brushed on the six chicken quarters (seasoned with kosher salt) toward the end of cooking to caramelize. The sauce was so good I used it as a dipping sauce for my French bread, and my husband, Mike, brushed it on a rack of spare ribs the following day. (There's still plenty of sauce to do it all over again.)

I also had picked up a jar of McClain's Chunky Peach Spread to make Lucky's recipe for Peach Compound Butter, which we served on warm biscuits Sunday morning for breakfast. (Bartoli also recommended spreading it on cornbread muffins.) I cut the compound butter recipe in half (using only two sticks of unsalted butter), and we still have

more than enough to savor and share.

Peaches stole the show in the Fresh Southern Peach Cobbler, easy and delicious, and it makes the house smell like cinnamon. I admit Mike's turned out slightly better — he didn't slice the peaches quite as thin, so they retained their shape. (He also had used salted butter and omitted the salt from the recipe.) While Mike likes his peach cobbler with a scoop of vanilla ice cream and fresh mint from the back yard, I just like it plain — hot or cold.

## Peach Compound Butter

- 1 pound unsalted butter, room temperature
- 1/3 cup peach preserves
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar

Add all ingredients to a large mixing bowl. Using a hand mixer, combine all ingredients thoroughly.

Place a 12-inch sheet of plastic wrap onto a table or clean workspace. Using a rubber spatula, spoon the compound butter onto the center of the plastic wrap.

Pull the bottom portion of the plastic wrap up over the butter and start rolling, forming a log shape. Close the ends of the plastic wrap and let the butter set in the refrigerator for 2 to 3 hours.

## Fresh Southern Peach Cobbler

- 8 fresh peaches, peeled, pitted and sliced into thin wedges
- 1/2 cup white sugar, divided, plus 3 tablespoons
- 1/2 cup brown sugar, divided
- 1 1/4 teaspoons ground cinnamon, divided
- 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon cornstarch
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 6 tablespoons unsalted butter, chilled and cut into small pieces
- 1/4 cup boiling water

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F.

In a large bowl, combine peaches, 1/4 cup white sugar, 1/4 cup brown sugar, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg, 1 teaspoon lemon juice, and 2 teaspoons cornstarch. Toss to coat evenly, and pour into a 2 quart baking dish. Bake in preheated oven for 10 minutes.

Meanwhile, in a large bowl, combine 1 cup flour, 1/4 cup white sugar, 1/4 cup brown sugar, 1 teaspoon baking powder, and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Blend in the butter with your fingertips, or a pastry blender, until mixture resembles coarse meal. Stir

in water until just combined. Remove peaches from oven, and drop spoonfuls of topping over them. Mix together 3 tablespoons sugar and 1 teaspoon cinnamon and

sprinkle mixture over entire cobbler. Bake dish until topping is golden, about 30 minutes.


